UP NEXT FOR THE 13-3 COUGARS — PEPPERDINE

BYU men's basketball will face Pepperdine (6-7, 2-2) in the second game of a back-to-back two-game series on Wednesday in Malibu. The Cougars defeated the Waves on Saturday, 65-54. After Pepperdine trimmed a 16-point BYU lead down to just three, the Cougars went on an 8-0 run to close out the game.

BYU NOTES (13-3, 4-1 West Coast Conference)

- The Cougars are 13-3, most recently defeating Pepperdine 65-54 at the Marriott Center.
- BYU has wins over Pepperdine, San Francisco, Saint Mary's, Weber State, Texas Southern, No. 18 San Diego State, Utah, Utah State, St. John's, Utah Valley, New Orleans and Westminster. The three losses were to USC, Boise State and No. 1 Gonzaga.
- BYU is led by senior guard Alex Barcello who is averaging 15.1 points, 4.6 assists and 4.4 rebounds per game. Barcello is 33-for-64 from beyond the arc. The 52% clip is No. 2 in the nation among players who have shot 60+ threes.
- Matt Haarms tied a season-high with four blocks against the Waves on Saturday, bringing his season total to 29. If the season were to end today, his 2.1 blocks per game average would place him No. 4 all-time at BYU for an individual season, just beating out Eric Mika's 1.9 average. The 56 blocks he is on track to finish with would put him at No. 7 all-time, one more than the 55 blocks Noah Hartssock had in 2011-12.

PEPPERDINE (6-7, 2-2 West Coast Conference)

- Pepperdine is 6-7, after falling to BYU 65-54 last week.
- Pepperdine has wins this season over Pacific, Portland, Concordia-Irvine, Cal, Saint Katherine, and UC Irvine. Its losses have come to BYU, No. 1 Gonzaga, CSU Bakersfield, UC Santa Barbara, CSUN, San Diego State, and No. 22 UCLA.
- In the first game against BYU, the Waves second half was much cleaner than their first, on both ends of the floor. Pepperdine shot 14% better from the field in the second half, while holding the Cougars to 13% less than what they shot in the first 20 minutes of play. Both teams scored 28 points in the second half.
- Pepperdine is led by guard Colbey Ross and forward Kessler Edwards. In the game on Saturday, Ross scored 21 points, going 7-16 from the field. He also pulled down two rebounds and led the team in assists, with four. Edwards was held in check most of the night, scoring just 11 after dropping 37 two nights earlier. He did, however, finish the night with a double-double, grabbing 10 boards, nine of which coming on the defensive end. He was named the WCC Player of the Week.

SENIOR SPOTLIGHTS

Brandon Averette

- Played his junior season at Utah Valley in 2019-20
- Earned a spot on the All-WAC Newcomer Team
- Averaged 12.8 points, 2.1 rebounds and 3.0 assists while adding 27 steals
- Posted season highs of 23 points, six rebounds, seven assists and three steals
- Played his freshman and sophomore seasons (2016-18) at Oklahoma State
- As a sophomore in 2017-18, averaged 6.3 points, 1.8 rebounds and a team-best 2.9 assists per game
- Played in all 36 games with six starts on a team that finished 21-15 overall and advanced to the third round of the 2018 NIT
- Posted season highs of 22 points, four rebounds, seven assists and three steals
- As a freshman in 2016-17 averaged 5.2 points, 1.5 rebounds and 1.8 assists
- Played in all 33 games, helping the Cowboys finish 20-13 overall and earn an at-large bid in the 2017 NCAA Tournament
- Posted season highs of 17 points, five rebounds, five assists and four steals

Alex Barcello

- Played in and started all 32 games for BYU in 2019-20
- Averaged 9.3 points, 3.1 rebounds and 1.8 assists
- Shot 49.3 percent from the field, 48.6 percent from 3-point range and 87.9 percent from the free-throw line
- Posted season highs of 18 points (twice), 7 rebounds (twice), 5 assists (twice), 3 steals (twice), 2 blocks (Cal State Fullerton) and 6 3-point field goals (at Loyola Marymount)
- In the BYU record book for a single season, finished fourth all-time in 3-point field goal percentage (minimum 35 attempts), fifth in points available percentage and 10th in effective field goal percentage
- Scored in double figures 14 times
- Had three-plus steals twice and three-plus 3-pointers nine times
- Let the team in scoring three times, rebounds three times and assists twice

Matt Haarms

- Played three seasons at Purdue from 2017-20 and appeared in 102 games with 40 starts and averaged 7.5 points, 4.4 rebounds and 2.1 blocks
- In the Purdue record book is fourth all-time in school history with 210 blocks and sixth in career field goal percentage at 58.2
- Set career highs of 26 points, 10 rebounds and seven blocks
- As a junior in 2019-20, averaged 8.6 points and 4.6 rebounds while ranking fifth in the Big Ten with 2.0 blocks per game
- As a sophomore in 2018-19, led the Big Ten in blocks with 2.1 per game and field goal percentage at 63.2 to go with averages of 9.4 points and 5.4 rebounds
- Helped the Boilermakers finish with a record of 26-10 and advance to the Elite Eight of the 2019 NCAA Tournament
- In Purdue's four 2019 NCAA Tournament games, averaged 12.0 points, 5.5 rebounds and 2.3 blocks while shooting 65.6 percent from the field
- As a freshman in 2017-18, averaged 4.8 points and 3.2 rebounds and was second in the Big Ten at 2.1 blocks per game
- Helped Purdue advance to the Sweet 16 in the 2018 NCAA Tournament and finish with a record of 30-7
- Earned a spot on the 2017-18 Big Ten All-Academic Team

BYU BASKETBALL 2020-21 PREVIEW

BYU men's basketball enters year two of the Mark Pope era with a promising roster in what will likely be one of the most unique seasons in college basketball history. In 2019-20, Pope led the Cougars to a final national ranking of No. 18/16 in the AP/USA Today Coaches polls and a 24-8 overall record. BYU was poised to return to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2016 until the NCAA Tournament was canceled due to the pandemic.

Preseason Recognition

Several Cougars have earned recognition heading into the 2020-21 season. Senior center Matt Haarms has been named one of 20 watch list members for the 2021 Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Center of the Year Award by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. In the WCC Preseason Polls, BYU was picked to finish second and senior guard Alex Barcello was named to the Preseason All-WCC Team. Finally, college basketball writer Jon Rothstein named Mark Pope one of 12 coaches on the rise entering 2020-21. Check out a position breakdown below.

Point Guard

The lead guard position will be captained by a pair of seniors who will likely play together for a majority of the minutes. Alex Barcello, who transferred from Arizona before last season, started all 32 games at the two-guard in 2019-20 and averaged 9.3 points, 3.1 rebounds and 1.8 assists in his debut season with the Cougars. He will be lioned in the backcourt by Brandon Averette, who comes to BYU as a graduate transfer from Utah Valley. Averette, who played his freshman and sophomore seasons at Oklahoma State, averaged 12.8 points, 2.1 rebounds and 3.0 assists while starting all 30 games at UVU in 2019-20.

Jesse Wade also returns to the program after an injury-riddled 2019-20. A junior, Wade played his freshman season at Gonzaga before sitting out 2018-19 at BYU due to NCAA transfer rules. Wade can play either guard spot in 2020-21. In addition to Wade, walk-on Cameron Pearson returns for his sophomore season.

Wing

Connor Harding, a two-year letterwinner with starting experience, is one of the more versatile players on the roster. A capable ball-handler and passer who can attack the basket and shoot from the outside. Last season he averaged 6.1 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.3 assists while shooting 51.8 percent from the field and 44.2 percent from 3-point range.

Trevin Knell returns for his sophomore season and has his sights set on an increased role. Knell played his freshman season just off a mission and missed significant time due to a hand injury. He has the potential to be a significant threat as an outside shooter. Wyatt Lowell is eligible after sitting out last season due to NCAA transfer rules. The 2018-19 WAC Freshman of the Year while playing at Utah Valley, has the ability to score in a variety of ways. At 6-foot-10, he gives Pope the ability to go big without sacrificing 3-point shooting.

The returnees are joined by a very intriguing group of newcomers on the wing. Hunter Erickson and Caleb Lohner are two highly touted freshmen who prepped in Utah. Erickson played at Timprview High School where he was a two-time first-team all-state honoree and averaged 22.0 points as a junior and 22.6 as a senior. The high-scoring guard served an LDS mission following high school. Lohner graduated from Wasatch Academy in 2020 and brings a college-ready 6-foot-8 frame to the Cougars. Playing with several other Division I level athletes, Lohner averaged 14.5 points and 5.8 rebounds while helping lead Wasatch to a record of 27-2 in 2019-20 and No. 2 national ranking. As a junior, he helped lead to the GEICO H.S. Nationals Townsend Tripple rounds out the incoming freshman class. A 6-foot-8 wing, Tripple earned first-team all-state honors at Rocky Mountain High School in Idaho and is a threat to shoot from the outside.

The incoming class also features three transfers, including Gideon George and Spencer Johnson from the junior college ranks. George, who played at New Mexico Junior College, was a two-time NJCAA Region V Team and All-Western Junior College Athletic Conference Team honoree. Last season he averaged 14.5 points and 8.0 rebounds and has two years of eligibility remaining. Johnson played his freshman season at Salt Lake Community College in 2019-20. He averaged 13.2 points and 4.9 rebounds while earning All-Region 18 Second Team honors and helping SLCC to a record of 29-4 and the No. 4 overall seed in the NJCAA National Tournament. Johnson has three years of eligibility remaining. Brandon Warr comes to BYU after three seasons at Westminster in Salt Lake. He averaged 15.3 points and 8.9 rebounds last season while earning second-team all-conference honors. He will play his senior year in 2021-22.

Post

BYU's leading returning player in the post is junior Kolby Lee. After dealing with injuries as a freshman, Lee started 28 games last season and averaged 7.0 points and 3.2 rebounds on 62.5 percent shooting, the third-best field goal percentage in a season in BYU history. Utah Valley transfer Richard Harward gives BYU experience and a big body in the post. The 6-11, 255-pound junior is eligible after sitting out last season. He had a breakout sophomore season playing for Pope in 2018-19, when he averaged 6.9 points and 4.9 rebounds and shot 63.8 percent.

Purdue transfer and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award watch list member Matt Haarms comes to BYU after playing three years at Purdue, where is fourth all-time in career blocks and sixth in field goal percentage. Last season he posted averages of 8.6 points, 4.6 rebounds and 2.0 blocks. During his sophomore campaign, Haarms averaged 9.4 points and 5.4 boards while leading the Big Ten in blocks at 2.1 per game. He helped the Boilermakers finish 26-10 and advance to the Elite Eight of the 2019 NCAA Tournament. Unfortunately, Gavin Baxter, a 2017-18 All-WCC Freshman Team honoree will miss the 2020-21 season with an ACL injury suffered in the second game of the year versus New Orleans.

BY THE NUMBERS IN 2019-20

- 6** The number of consecutive games BYU made 10-plus 3-pointers in 2019-20 on two occasions (11/27 to 12/14 and Jan. 25 to Feb. 13), a school record for consecutive games with double-digit 3s. The previous record was three.
- 9** The number of consecutive games BYU shot 50.0 percent-plus from the field in 2019-20 (1/11/20 to 2/9/20), tied for the longest streak in team history. The previous record was set in the final nine games of the 1988-89 season.
- 15** Including the 2019-20 season, BYU has posted a winning on-court record in 15-straight seasons (officially 12—all but one win in 2015-16 and 2016-17 were vacated by the NCAA). The Cougars won 20-plus games in 14 of those seasons and 19 in the other.
- 16** The number of games BYU made double-digit 3-pointers in 2019-20, a Cougar record for games in a season with double-digit 3s. The 2015-16 team had 13 games with double-digit 3-pointers. The 2010-11 and 2014-15 teams reached the mark 12 times and the 2007-08 team made 10-plus 3s 11 times.
- 18/19** BYU's final ranking in 2019-20. It marked the first time BYU was ranked during the regular season and finished a season ranked in the top 25 since the 2010-11 season. Mark Pope became the first BYU coach to finish in the top 25 during his first season.
- 24** BYU's win total in 2019-20, Mark Pope's first season at the helm. The 24 wins mark the most by a BYU head coach in his first season.
- 48.6** Alex Barcello's 3-point field goal percentage in 2019-20, fourth all-time in 3-point field goal percentage (minimum 35 attempts) in a single season in BYU history.
