TONIGHT'S GAME CLIMAXES WEEKLONG FESTIVAL OF EVENTS

Tonight's exciting football game, Holiday Bowl 7, climaxes a busy week of Holiday Bowl events.

In the years since the first Holiday Bowl, the list of associated activities has increased dramatically, as the Bowl has become a holiday season fixture in San Diego.

"The Holiday Bowl has become an important event for San Diegans, and the involvement of the community has grown through these other Holiday Bowl week activities," said 1984 Holiday Bowl president Jim Kuhn. "We're extremely pleased with the interest shown in the entire Holiday Bowl Week and all of the various activities."

The newest event on the Holiday

Bowl calendar was the Holiday
Bowl Gymnastics Classic, which
took place last weekend. This was
a United States Gymnastics
Federation sanctioned age group
competition for elite level and
Class I women gymnasts, which
took place at the Women's Gym at
San Diego State University. The
top 10 finishers in each event on
Saturday advanced to Sunday's
exciting finals.

Also taking place last Saturday was the Holiday Bowl/Frontier
Airlines 10K Run, which started and finished at San Diego Jack
Murphy Stadium. The race featured the champion male and female cross country runners from each member school of the Western
Athletic Conference, and top

runners from the San Diego area.
The race benefited the YMCA.
The Holiday Bowl Music Festival.

featuring the finest high school bands from throughout the Western United States, started on Wednesday with field competition at San Diego State's Aztec Bowl. Earlier today, the bands paraded through Balboa Park. A grand entry march prior to tonight's game and combined band rendition of the national anthem will climax this activity, now in its second year.


Yesterday at the noon hour, the players and coaches from both teams gathered with nearly 2,000 fans for the Holiday Bowl Kickoff Luncheon, sponsored annually by the San Diego Kiwanis Club at the Town and Country Hotel in Mission Valley.

Last night, The Sheraton Harbor Island Hotel was the site of the Holiday Bowl Poinsettia Ball. The black tie gathering enjoyed gourmet dining and a fabulous performance by the Air Force Academy's stage show troupe, Moods in Blue. This was the fourth year that the musical group has dazzled the Poinsettia Ball audience.

Another highlight of last night's Ball was the crowning of the 1984 Holiday Bowl Queen, Candi Marchese, by Sharlene Wells, the 1983 Holiday Bowl Queen and reigning Miss America.

The only Holiday Bowl Week event remaining on the schedule after tonight's game will be the traditional San Diego Bay Holiday Parade of Lights. Brightly lighted and decorated boats parade along the Embarcadero from Seaport Village to Shelter Island. Holiday Bowl officials will assist in judging the annual competition for best decorated boats.

That event will complete the Holiday Bowl Festival for another year. Next year, there will be another exciting football game . . . and even more Holiday Bowl Festival events.



FABULOUS FINISHES — THE STORY OF "AMERICA'S MOST EXCITING BOWL GAME"

If there is one lesson that fans have learned from the first six Holiday Bowl football games, it is "don't leave early."

The Holiday Bowl has earned its reputation as America's Most Exciting Bowl Game with a series of wide-open, exciting games... most of which have gone to the final seconds before a decision has been reached.

Included in the first six Holiday Bowls is the 1980 game, Holiday Bowl III, between Brigham Young University and Southern Methodist, which is one of the classic comeback performances of all time.

All but one of the first six Holiday Bowl games has been a down-tothe-wire thriller. Let's take a look at six years of Holiday Bowl history, and some of the fourth quarter heroics that have taken place.

HOLIDAY BOWL I — 1978 Navy 23, Brigham Young 16

This game established the comeback pattern that was to become the Holiday Bowl trademark.

Brigham Young jumped off to a 9-3 halftime lead, and an early third

period touchdown by the Cougars gave BYU a seemingly comfortable 16-3 lead.

Navy scored a touchdown late in the third period, and drove for a field goal early in the final period to close the gap to 16-13. Then Navy quarterback Bob Leszczynski and wide receiver Phil McConkey hooked up on a 65-yard touchdown pass — still a Holiday Bowl record for longest completion — to put the Midshipmen ahead for the first time, 20-16.

A late field goal and some stubborn defense that held off a last-minute BYU threat saved the game for Navy, and put the word "comeback" into the Holiday Bowl vocabulary.

HOLIDAY BOWL II — 1979 Indiana 38, Brigham Young 37

Brigham Young took a perfect 11-0 record into Holiday Bowl II, but was frustrated again by fourth quarter heroics.

The Cougars of BYU and visiting Hoosiers put on a big offensive display throughout this back-andforth game. Indiana held a 21-17 halftime lead, but BYU rallied to take a 34-31 lead heading into the

fourth quarter.

Brent Johnson's third field goal of the game gave BYU a 37-31 lead, which they held deep into the fourth quarter. Indiana's Tim Wilbur turned the game around, however, with a 62-yard punt return touchdown that tied the score at 37-37. Kevin Kellogg's pressure PAT put Indiana ahead, 38-37, with little time left.

BYU made a furious comeback attempt, and drove down the field. With only six seconds left on the clock, BYU's Johnson attempted a 27-yard field goal which sailed wide — preserving Indiana's comefrom-behind victory.

HOLIDAY BOWL III — 1980 Brigham Young 46, Southern Methodist 45

This game has been called one of the most exciting college games ever played, and certainly rates as one of the most spectacular comebacks ever recorded.

The game matched the strong rushing attack of the SMU Mustangs, headed by Eric Dickerson and Craig James, against the passing of BYU's Jim McMahon.

For three quarters, SMU appeared to be too strong for the Cougars, and held a 38-19 lead heading into the final period. The teams traded fourth period touchdowns, and SMU held a comfortable 20-point lead, 45-25, with only 3:58 to play. That's when the fans started to leave the stadium, and when the fun started for BYU.

McMahon led the Cougars to a quick touchdown, cutting the lead to 45-31. A successful on-side kick and three-play touchdown drive cut the lead to 45-39 with 1:57 left to play.

BYU had no time outs remaining, and when SMU recovered the onside kick attempt, things looked dim for the Cougars.

SMU failed to make a first down in its attempt to run out the clock, and the Mustangs were forced to punt the ball away with less than 30 seconds left to play. BYU's Bill Schoepflin blocked the punt, and the Cougars recovered at the SMU 41 with only 18 seconds remaining, and no way to stop the clock with time outs.

Two incomplete passes into the end zone reduced the clock to three seconds, and McMahon launched a long, high bomb into the end zone on the game's final play. BYU's Clay Brown went high into the air and literally wrestled the ball away from three SMU defenders for the game-tying touchdown. With no time left on the clock, sophomore kicker Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to give BYU a 46-45 win.

HOLIDAY BOWL IV — 1981 Brigham Young 38, Washington State 36

The fourth Holiday Bowl matched BYU against a Washington State team that had contended for Pacific 10 championship honors until the final weekend of the season. BYU, led by quarterback Jim McMahon, jumped off to a 24-7 lead at the half. A 35-yard interception return for a touchdown gave the Cougars a 31-7 lead just one minute into the second half, and the game looked like a runaway for BYU.

Washington State's powerful running attack started to click, however, and scrambling quarterback Ricky Turner led WSU on three touchdown drives in the third quarter to cut the BYU lead to

31-28, with the entire fourth quarter to play.

McMahon padded the lead by taking BYU on a quick touchdown drive that culminated with a score on the first play of the fourth quarter to make the score 38-28.

WSU rallied for a score with just over five minutes left to play, and a two-point conversion cut the score to 38-36.

The pivotal play of the game took place with just over two minutes to play and BYU facing a key third down and one situation. McMahon fumbled the snap from center, but recovered the ball and turned the near-disaster into a five-yard gain and a game-clinching first down.

HOLIDAY BOWL V — 1982 Ohio State 47, Brigham Young 17

The fifth Holiday Bowl matched BYU against the Buckeyes from Ohio State, and proved to be a long evening for the Cougars. Ohio State entered the game in a surly mood. Although they had beaten Big Ten arch-rival Michigan several weeks earlier, Michigan had earned the Rose Bowl bid by virtue of a better league percentage, and the Buckeyes were anxious to prove they were best.

The first half was played fairly evenly, with Ohio State holding a 17-10 lead at the intermission. The Buckeyes, behind the strong running of Tim Spencer, broke the game open with 17 points in the third quarter.

HOLIDAY BOWL VI — 1983 Brigham Young 21, Missouri 17

Last year's Holiday Bowl game matched Steve Young and BYU's incredible offense against the tough Missouri Tigers from the Big Eight Conference.

Young and the Cougars had run up an amazing offensive record during the season, leading the nation and setting NCAA records in numerous passing and total offense categories.

This game, however, started off as more of a defensive battle. Missouri led, 10-7, at the half as Young had trouble getting his passing attack moving against the Tigers. A third period touchdown gave BYU a 14-10 lead heading into the final period as neither team took a definite advantage.

Missouri started to assert itself in the fourth quarter. Eric Drain scored on a two-yard plunge early in the final period to give Missouri a 17-14 advantage. The Tigers drove deep into BYU territory late in the quarter and seemed ready to put the game out of reach.

Faced with a fourth-and-one situation on the BYU seven yard line, the Tigers elected to go for the first down and were stopped short on a key defensive play for the Cougars.


BYU took over the ball on its own seven with 3:57 left to play, and Young started his team on the comeback trail. Two key completions to Mike Eddo helped BYU move the ball into Missouri territory and set up the two gamewinning plays.

With fourth down and 10 yards to go on the Missouri 25, and half a minute to play, Young completed a pressure pass to Waymon Hamilton for 11 yards and a first down at the Missouri 14.

With only 23 seconds to play, Young took the snap from center and handed the ball to running back Eddie Stinnet, who was sweeping toward the right side. Stinnet started the run, then pulled up and lofted a high pass back across the field toward Young. The pass barely cleared the fingertips of Missouri's Bobby Bell on its way to Young, who grabbed it and eluded two defenders on his way into the end zone for the winning touchdown.

It was another fitting climax for the Holiday Bowl — where Fabulous Finishes have become the rule rather than the exception.

This year's game? Who knows what will happen. Just don't leave early, no matter what the score might be.

SAN DIEGO JACK MURPHY STADIUM



Tonight's Holiday Bowl crowd will establish a new attendance high for the seven-year-old bowl game . . . because of the excitement generated by the game, and because of the completion of the expansion program at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium.

The 17-year-old Stadium has undergone a program which has increased its capacity for football from just under 53,000 fans to 60,100.

The Stadium stands on a 166acre site less than a mile from the Mission San Diego de Alcala - the

birthplace of California - which was established in 1769 by Father Junipero Serra.

The Stadium was approved by the voters of San Diego by an overwhelming majority in the November election of 1965, and groundbreaking was December 24,

The \$27.75 million facility was dedicated on August 20, 1967, as the San Diego Chargers and Detroit Lions met in a National Football League pre-season game. The Stadium was re-named in honor of Jack Murphy, late sports

editor of the San Diego Union, on December 22, 1980.

It is 109 feet from the field level to the highest seating row, and 146 feet from the field level to the top of the light ring.

Stadium lighting is accomplished through 365 incandescent fixtures (5.000 watt) and 800 metallic arc fixtures (1,000 watt).

Here are some of the important stadium facilities:

FIRST AID - Emergency assistance is available by contacting the nearest usher or security person. The main first aid center is located on the Plaza Level at Gate F.

LOST AND FOUND - The security office and lost and found are located on the Plaza Level near Gate F.

PARKING — There are 17,000 marked parking stalls and 250 bus spaces. There are also 100 handicapped parking spaces available in the front row of the stadium parking lot.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE — There are 53 concession stands throughout the Stadium, along with a Hofbrau and an open garden restaurant located at Aisle 21 on the Upper Level.

FIELD ADMITTANCE - Only team personnel, media and stadium employees are authorized to be on the field at any time; anyone going on the field without proper authorization is subject to expulsion from the Stadium and prosecution.



UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler, the dean of Big Ten coaches, has earned the right to be called one of college football's all-time great coaches.

He smiles in a humble way when he is described in that manner, and he would be the first to tell you that he isn't the reason for the high level of success that the Michigan football program has achieved. He would speak in glowing terms of his coaching staff and of the fine student-athletes he has had the opportunity to coach. His loyalty to Michigan is matched only by the success he has achieved at the Ann Arbor campus. One can't deny that he has been the major reason for the success of the Michigan football program in the last sixteen seasons.

The following achievements need to only be listed to see that Bo is indeed one of the finest coaches in the nation.

MALLORY — QUIET BUT AGGRESSIVE

Mike Mallory is the quiet type. Michigan's co-captain and leading tackler for the past two seasons, he's not one to make mention of such accolades. If he talks at all, it might be about family, or loyalty or pride. Then it might take two minutes, maybe less.

If there were ever a leader by speaking for him for quite a while tackles, good for 10th on Michigan's all-time list. He still has a year to play, too.

Mallory finds himself in a rather odd situation, in that the academic for his last season of football after already serving as a "senior" captain.

capped off this banner year with Michigan's Most Valuable Player award.

"The award means a great deal to me." Mallory said. "It is a great honor to be able to make a contribution to your team. I'm thinking about next year, how I have to get better and improve. There is room for improvement. As long as the team does well, I'm not concerned about the personal things.'

The "personal things" keep coming his way, though - tributes to, if not proof of, his excellence. Mallory was also given the Ernest T. Siegler award by the M Club of Chicago for being the outstanding Wolverine athlete from the Chicago area this year. Mallory is from nearby DeKalb, Illinois.

Mallory's mind is now on the Holiday Bowl and number one Brigham Young . . . and on vindication for a Michigan season that, at 6-5, was the most mediocre in recent memory. The failures of the season weigh heavily on Mallory's mind, but his pride in the positive moments lingers, too.

"We didn't accomplish a lot of the things that we set out to do at the beginning of the season," he said. "But we did have some great moments, like beating Miami (then rated number one) and Illinois. Those were big wins for us and with a strong performance in the Ohio State game, I hope we can carry that over to the Holiday Bowl."

A coach's kid, Mallory was on the go during his growing-up years as the family moved wherever father Bill was coaching. Now the head coach at Indiana, Bill was involved in a strange situation with sons Mike and Doug, a defensive back at Michigan.

It was a mother's nightmare, with a husband coaching one team against the team two sons play for. Michigan beat Indiana, 14-6, in Bloomington and Mike had nine tackles and one of his two pass interceptions of the season.

Mallory said his highlight of 1984, however, was beating Illinois. He played an outstanding game, making 14 tackles.

"That was a great game," Mallory recalls, "It felt good because they beat us last year and that was a big loss for us. To come back and beat them was very satisfying."

Unfortunately for the Wolverines, the Illinois game provided one of the relatively few highlights this season. For an intensely competitive guy like Mallory, there was little consolation.

"Hopefully we can learn from it," Mallory said. "If we can treat it like a character-builder, maybe we can come back. We have to work very hard, though. It's not a fun way to learn something."

Mallory sees the opportunity that Michigan's last game of 1984 offers. Playing a top-rated team like Brigham Young is more than he and the Wolverines ever expected.

"This is a great opportunity for us, and something we are looking forward to with great anticipation," said Mallory.

There's plenty of motivation for both Brigham Young University and University of Michigan in tonight's Seventh Holiday Bowl football game.

BYU carries an undefeated record (12-0) and the #1 Ranking in the football polls into the game. A Cougar victory would go a long way toward assuring them the "National Championship."

They'll be motivated to win, and to try and win as impressively as possible, to assure that the coaches and writers who will eventually decide the top-ranked team won't overlook them in the final polling.

For the Wolverines of Michigan, the Holiday Bowl presents an opportunity to end a difficult and disappointing season on a satisfying note. A victory over the #1 rated Cougars would make the season for Michigan.

While the BYU passing attack didn't run up the mind-boggling statistics that last year's juggernaut recorded, there was consistency. Robbie Bosco was over 200 yards passing in all 12 games this season, and BYU extended its record for consecutive games throwing a touchdown pass to 38.

On the other side of the line of scrimmage, the BYU defense played an important role in several victories. The experienced defense, led by All-American Kyle Morrell, allowed over 15 points only twice in 12 games.

For the Wolverines, a season that started with high hopes ended in disappointment as injuries took a

Michigan opened the season by beating defending national champion Miami of Florida, 22-14, as they intercepted six Bernie Kosar passes. The following week, the Wolverines lost to Washington, 20-11, as the Huskies took the top spot in the rankings.

Quarterback Jim Harbaugh was lost for the season in a difficult loss to Michigan State, and then the Wolverines dropped road games at Iowa, Purdue and Ohio State to finish with a 6-5 mark.



COACH LAVELL EDWARDS

When LaVell Edwards took over the reins of BYU's football program 13 years ago, not even the most optimistic fans around Provo dreamed the Cougars would accomplish what they have done under his direction.

The 53-year-old coachchurchman-husband-fathergrandfather-author-teacher-doctor has taken BYU from a team that had won the Western Athletic Conference trophy only one time in history to a team that hasn't relinquished it in nine years . . . and a team that reached Number One in the rankings in the season's final weeks and will have a strong case for the National championship with a Holiday Bowl victory tonight.

A look at the 1984 season is a good example of how LaVell, as he is called by almost everyone, has established himself as one of America's premier coaches. The Cougars finished the regular season with a 12-0 record and a first-place ranking in the polls, with the only unbeaten mark among major schools. They won their ninth consecutive WAC championship and are undefeated in 23 straight games going into tonight's action.

In 1984, Edwards' team became only the third college team ever to win 12 games in a season -Nebraska has done it twice.

The 1984 season has indeed been the culmination of a program that Edwards started at Brigham Young in 1972.

His 117-37-1 record (.755) ranks among the leaders in the nation's active coaches. BYU has won more games (63) in the past six seasons than any other Division I school in the country.

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious in that three of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorates.

The offensive philosophy Holiday Bowl 1984



practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing six times (1976, '77, '79, '80, '81 and '83), scoring (1979) and total offense (1979, '80 and '83).

In 1979, LaVell was recognized as national Coach-of-the-Year by two organizations: the Bobby Dodd Award Board and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame, Four times (1972, '79, '80 and '83) he has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and four times he has been Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-

Year (1974, '77, '79, '80). Some of the post-season bowl games he has coached include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray classic (twice), the East-West Shrine Game, the Japan Bowl and the Coaches' All-America Game.

Born in Orem, Utah, LaVell was raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Orem and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned allconference honors at center for the

At USU he met his wife-to-be. Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams, Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3

His first coaching job was secured at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. LaVell succeeded Tommy Hudspeth as head coach in 1972.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. He is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife Patti, writes an occasional column for the (Provo) Daily Herald.



THE MORRELL OF BYU'S STORY

He hates the Dallas Cowboys and the Los Angeles Dodgers but loves the New York Yankees; loves to catch fish, doesn't like to keep 'em; loves to curl up in a blanket on Thursday nights to watch Magnum P.I. and Hill Street Blues.

But come Saturday afternoon BYU weak safety Kyle Morrell turns into a menace to opposing offenses on the gridiron.

In terms of playing time, threeyear starter Kyle Morrell has probably logged more minutes career wise than any other player on this season's roster.

Morrell was one of the fortunate freshmen to earn a spot on the varsity travel squad in 1981. But the 6-2, 184 senior from Bountiful, Utah, has had a lot of difficult tests on and off the field.

Among the most publicized gridiron trials of Morrell is his painful knee injury suffered during the final game of his sophomore season at the University of Utah. And Kyle remembers being humbled at the beginning of last season when Baylor speedster Gerald MacNeil got behind him and burned the Cougars for a touchdown.

But the wiser, battle-proven Cougar co-captain should be ready to assume the all-conference honors which eluded him last season.

"Kyle is as good of defensive back as there is in the area," says BYU's LaVell Edwards. "He should have been all-conference last year."

Morrell has been saturated with athletics all of his life. His father, Mack, was an AAA baseball player and his brother, Guy, was a second-team All-WAC linebacker for Utah in the late 1970's.

Kyle developed into one of Utah's most promising prep athletes at Viewmont High.

When it came time to select a college, only BYU and Utah were interested in his football and



baseball talents. His best love for basketball would have to be relegated to the intramural and sandlot level.

Although recruited as a quarterback-defensive back, Kyle never took a snap at BYU and concentrated on defense, where he could be more aggressive. One of his more aggressive tackles is dubbed "Darth Vader" by his roommate, Jay McDonald. McDonald and Morrell share living quarters at former BYU coach Fred Whittingham's residence, but the two gridders share more than a house.

When Morrell was rehabilitating his injured knee, so was McDonald and the two established a friendship.

I'm one of those few guys who are not afraid to go 100 percent on the football field following a knee operation," says Morrell. But the memory of the knee injury is still vivid to Kyle.

"We were in a goal line defense and I was on the weak side," recalls Kyle of the 1981 BYU-Utah game. "Utah ran to the strong side and I was flowing with the ball when their tight end cracked down on me and their center blocked me up high. I knew instantly my knee was injured."

Since the injury, Kyle, has twice finished number six in defensive scoring. Also since the injury he has increased his interest off the gridiron in the sport of fishing.

This past summer marked his third year traveling with the Great Western Fly Fisherman's Club on a trip to Beaverhead Reservoir near Dillon, Montana. As a fisherman, Kyle has tangled with big brown trout, including a seven-pounder which he caught and released on the Provo River.

He leaves his brand on many offensive players on the gridiron through his hard-hitting style.

Despite this aggressiveness, Kyle has had to learn how to be patient.

"Coach Felt stresses that we need to be patient, but I was always anxious just to get playing on the field," says Kyle. "Now I know through experience that I have to be patient. At Baylor last year I was trying to help out by making a big play. Instead, I got burned for a touchdown and I learned to worry about yourself and not try to make the big play that will happen one in 100 times.

Big plays have come Morrell's way, including a pass interception in last year's Holiday Bowl against Missouri.

Off the playing field, Kyle also concentrates on classes, majoring in commercial physical education. He hopes to join his brother and father selling men's and women's clothing to retail stores.

On the playing field, he likes to yell to get teammates motivated. And, most of all, Kyle doesn't like to lose.

"He is a winner," says Dick Felt, BYU defensive co-ordinator. "He comes to play. I thought he was the best weak safety in the conference last season. He hasn't received the recognition he deserved."


Stan Bates, former Commissioner of the Western Athletic Conference, has been one of the most important individuals involved in the success of the Holiday Bowl.

The first annual winner of the R. Hastings Garland Jr. Scholarship was announced yesterday at the Holiday Bowl Kickoff Luncheon.



Holiday Bowl Honorary Chairman John Butler

John Butler has been named as Honorary Chairman of the 1984 Holiday Bowl, an honor which is given annually to a person who has contributed to the San Diego Community in a meaningful manner.

A native San Diegan who graduated from St. Augustine High School, Butler played football for three years at San Diego State (1933-34-35) and was the first Aztec player to receive national recognition when he was selected as a guard on the Associated Press Little All-American team in 1935. Butler was an All-Conference selection all three years.

He served as a naval aviator in the South Pacific for four years during World War II. Following that he attended Stanford Law School.

Butler was Deputy District Attorney in 1948-49, and was Mayor of San Diego from 1951-55. In 1955, he retired from public life and returned to private law practice.

In February of this year, Butler was inducted into the Breitbard Hall of Fame at the San Diego Hall of Champions.

Admiral's Trophy

The sixth presentation of the Admiral's Trophy, made annually to the person from each university participating in the Holiday Bowl who best exemplifies the spirit of "teamwork" as demonstrated by that person's contribution to the success of the football team during the season, was made Wednesday at the Aircraft Carrier Luncheon on the Kitty Hawk.

The creation of the Admiral's Trophy was a logical outgrowth of the close relationship the Holiday Bowl and the United States Navy have enjoyed in their common pursuit of supporting this worthwhile civic venture for the San Diego area. The large trophy is maintained in the Hall of Champions Sports Museum in Balboa Park while each recipient is awarded a replica of the trophy.

The recipient is selected by a ballot of the members of the football team under the supervision of the head coach.

Specifications provided to each coach are as follows:

"A person who, in the opinion of the players, best exemplified the spirit of unselfish dedication, inspiration, and teamwork which resulted in little acclaim for himself but contributed significantly to an outstanding season for his team."


HOLIDAY BOWL ALUMNI STAR IN PROS




