FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- UVA is making its first trip to Provo, Utah, since 1999, a 45-40 win over BYU. The 1999 game with the Cougars also serves as the Cavaliers' last win west of the Mississippi River.
- Ian Frye's 42-yard game-winning field goal against No. 21 Louisville is the third-longest game-winning field goal in UVA history.
- UVA's 13 takeaways and eight fumble recoveries place the Cavaliers No. 1 in the nation in each category.
- Kevin Parks is No. 8 in the nation among active players with 2,647 career rushing yards.
- Ten of UVA's 2014 opponents played in a bowl game last year. This is the second straight year UVA has had a tough schedule. UVA in 2013 and Florida State in 2002 are the only teams in college football history to play 11 teams during the regular season that would go on to play in a bowl game.

#BYUvsUVA AT A GLANCE

VIRGINIA MAKES FIRST TRIP TO PROVO SINCE 1999

- Virginia hits the open road for the first time in 2014 and returns to Provo, Utah, for the first time since the Cavaliers escaped with a 45-40 triumph in 1999.

CAVALIERS PLAYING THEIR THIRD TOP-25 TEAM

- UVA is the only team in the nation to play three ranked schools from the *Associated Press* poll in the first four weeks.
- By playing No. 21 BYU on Saturday, UVA becomes one of two teams in the nation that is facing three Top-25 teams from either the *Associated Press* or Coaches poll in the first four weeks..
- UVA has previously played No. 7 UCLA (Aug. 30) and No. 21 Louisville (Sept. 13).
- East Carolina is the only other team, as they are facing their third ranked team this week too. ECU makes the list with three opponents ranked in the Coaches poll, playing No. 21 South Carolina (Sept. 6), No. 19 Virginia Tech (Sept. 13) and hosting No. 25 North Carolina on Saturday.
- UVA also faced Richmond on Sept. 6 when the Spiders were ranked No. 17 in the FCS rankings.

NOTING VIRGINIA IN ROAD OPENERS

- UVA is 43-76-3 all-time in road openers.
- After last season's 14-3 setback at Pitt, UVA has lost seven of its last eight road openers.
- The lone victory during the stretch was a 34-31 triumph in Bloomington, Ind., when UVA picked up the road victory over the Indiana Hoosiers.
- The last victory in a road opener at Indiana also serves as the last time UVA played its road opener against a non-conference opponent.
- This is Virginia's first road opener against a ranked team since UVA played its first road contest of the 2010 season at then-No. 16 USC on Sept. 10, 2010. Prior to the USC game in 2010, the previous road opener against a ranked opponent for the Cavaliers was 2002 at then-No. 5 Florida State on Aug. 31.

Requested defensive players and defensive coaches will be available for telephone interviews Tuesday, while offensive players and offensive coaches will be available Wednesday.

No player or coach interviews will be arranged after Wednesday during game week.

Coach London will hold his postgame press conference in the media room, while requested players and assistant coaches will be brought to the media room to meet with media representatives after London. UVa athletics media relations personnel will take player requests during the fourth quarter of each game.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WAH

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

VIRGINIA VS. BYU

- Virginia owns a 3-1 edge in the all-time series with BYU, which dates back to the 1987 All American Bowl in Birmingham, Ala. Saturday's game is the finale of a home-and-home contract.
- BYU's lone win vs. UVA (Sept. 2, 2000) opened up the 2000 season and was the dedication game at the newly expanded Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium. BYU won in overtime, 38-35.
- The 2000 meeting featured two coaching greats – Virginia's George Welsh and BYU's LaVell Edwards, who amassed 446 career head coaching wins between the two of them. Ironically each man retired from coaching following the 2000 season. Entering 2014 season, Welsh's 189 career victories place him No. 31 all-time at the FBS level and Edwards' 257 wins place him No. 7 all-time.
- The 2013 meeting with BYU marked the first Independent team UVA had faced since hosting Navy on Sept. 10, 1994.
- BYU was in the WAC when these programs first met in the 1987 All American Bowl and the Mountain West Conference during the 1999 and 2000 meetings.
- UVA and BYU also have two more meetings scheduled: Sept. 7, 2019 (Charlottesville) and Sept. 19, 2020 (Provo).

- Kevin Parks ran 13 yards for a touchdown with 2:36 to play after a tipped ball led to an interception, a lateral and 33-yard return as Virginia beat BYU 19-16 in a wild, rain-drenched season-opener that had a 2-hour weather delay.
- Anthony Harris made 11 tackles, had one sack, blocked a punt and recorded the key interception that set up the game-winning score by Parks. Harris was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in UVA's 19-16 win over BYU.
- The game was delayed and the stadium was cleared for 2 hours, nine minutes at the end of the first quarter when lightning was reported in the area. The storm eventually brought a heavy downpour, too.

NOTABLES FROM THE BYU SERIES

- The 1987 All American Bowl was billed as a high scoring, offensive shootout between Virginia QB Scott Secules, the ACC's top-rated passer, and BYU's Sean Covey. Instead the Cavaliers relied on a conservative run-oriented attack and several big defensive stands to defeat pass-happy BYU, 22-16, at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala.
- BYU's Covey threw for 394 yards on 37-of-61 passing with one INT and one TD, while Secules was 10-of-19 for 162 yards and one TD pass. Secules rushed for another score.
- In the 1999 trip, UVA's first to Provo, Utah, the Cavaliers outran No. 17 BYU 45-40 behind 210 rushing yards and two TDs by future NFL standout Thomas Jones.
- Dan Ellis threw for 190 yards and three TDs as UVA jumped out to a 21-0 first quarter lead.
- BYU made the contest interesting with the game's only score of the fourth quarter when an errant 19-yard pass by BYU QB Kevin Feterik caromed off a UVA defender in the end zone and into the hands of Carlos Nuno for a TD with 10:54 to play. Feterik was later intercepted on a fourth-and-goal pass by UVA safety Jerton Evans with 1:37 left to preserve the victory.
- Owen Pochman's 26-yard field goal in overtime lifted BYU to a 38-35 win over UVA, in Charlottesville to kickoff the 2000 season.
- BYU rallied from 21-0 deficit at halftime to force overtime. BYU's Bret Engemann was 34-of-41 for 447 passing yards. He completed two TD passes in the final 8:11 of the second half, including a six-yard scoring strike to WR Margin Hooks with 50 seconds remaining to erase a 14-point fourth-quarter Cavalier lead.

RARE TRIP WEST OF THE MISSISSIPPI FOR THE CAVALIERS

- This is only the 17th game played west of the Mississippi River in UVA school history.
- Virginia is 4-12 in games played west of the Mississippi.
- UVA's last venture west was a 27-7 loss at then-No. 17 TCU in 2012; the Cavaliers' last win west of the Mississippi was a 45-40 win at Brigham Young on Sept. 25, 1999.
- At approximately 2,100 miles from Charlottesville, this game is also the fourth-longest trip in school history.
- The longest is a journey of approximately 4,800 miles for the 2000 O'ahu Bowl in Honolulu, while the second longest was the trip to Seattle in 1976 (approximately 2,800 miles). UVA's 2010 trip to USC is the third-longest trip at roughly 2,500 miles.
- This is the first of five straight years that UVA will play a regular season game west of the Mississippi River
- Virginia returns to California to open the 2015 season at UCLA on Sept. 5, 2015. UVA will also travel to west to play Oregon (2016), Boise State (2017) and Stanford (2018).

SHADOWING BYU'S VAN NOY

- UVA's Max Valles came to UVA as a tight end in 2013 and when camp started moved to defensive end. A few weeks later he made the move to linebacker.
- Not expected to play much as a true freshman, Valles was tasked as playing former BYU All-American Kyle Van Noy on the scout team in advance of UVA's 2013 season opener with the Cougars.
- Valles impressed the coaching staff and was named UVA's scout team player of the week. He didn't make his collegiate debut until UVA's third game against VMI, appearing on seven plays. He made first collegiate start a week later at Pitt and had five tackles and 2.5 sacks. Valles has been on the field ever since.

BYU CONNECTIONS

- UVA offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild knows BYU well, facing the Cougars as the quarterback at Colorado State from 1978-80. Fairchild was a second-team All-WAC quarterback in 1980 behind BYU's Jim McMahon.
- Fairchild also faced BYU 16 times during his coaching stops at Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State and now Virginia.
- UVA associate head coach for offense and tight ends coach Tom O'Brien first faced BYU as a collegiate coach in the Inaugural Holiday Bowl in 1978 when he was at Navy as the offensive tackles and tight end coach. It was O'Brien's first bowl game as a collegiate coach. Navy won 23-16.
- O'Brien was also part of the UVA staff during the 1987 All American Bowl as the offensive line coach. O'Brien defeated BYU in 2005 and 2006 as the head coach at Boston College.
- UVA offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim faced BYU while playing on the offensive line at the Air Force Academy.
- Wachenheim also faced BYU seven times during his coaching stops at Air Force, Rice, Utah State and now Virginia.
- UVA special teams coordinator and running backs coach Larry Lewis has faced BYU six times as a collegiate coach during stops at Colorado State, Washington State and now Virginia.

CAVALIERS MAKING COLLEGIATE DEBUTS IN 2014

- Eleven Cavaliers have made their collegiate debuts so far in 2014, including true freshmen Quin Blanding, Andrew Brown, Doni Dowling and Jamil Kamara.
- Seven Cavaliers made their collegiate debuts against UCLA, while four Cavaliers debuted against Richmond.
- Under Mike London 40 true freshmen have played. The breakdown year-by-year: 2010 (3), 2011 (12), 2012 (9), 2013 (12) and 2014 (4).
- Other collegiate debuts in 2014: Jack English, Kirk Garner, Micah Kiser, Andre Levrone, Jack McDonald, Tyler Shirley and Wilfred Wahee.
- Five Cavaliers also made their first career starts against the Bruins: (Offense) Ryan Doull (LG), Greyson Lambert (QB), Michael Mooney (LT), Canaan Severin (WR); (Defense) Quin Blanding (FS).
- Sadiq Olanrewaju (LT) made his first collegiate start against No. 21 Louisville.

UVA AND LONDON VS. TOP 25 TEAMS

- UVA's win over No. 21 Louisville snapped the Cavaliers' five-game losing streak under head coach Mike London to ranked teams.
- UVA is now 4-7 all-time against ranked opponents under Mike London.

UVA LIMITS THE LOUISVILLE OFFENSE

- Virginia limited Louisville to seven first-half points, marking the Cardinals' lowest scoring opening half since tallying three first-half points at Rutgers on Nov. 29, 2012.
- After the Cardinals marched down and scored a touchdown on their first drive of the game, the Cavaliers limited Louisville to 88 total yards over its next 11 drives, including only four total yards in the third quarter alone. The Cardinals only averaged 2.1 yards per play during those 11 drives.
- Louisville then went 108 yards on 17 plays (6.35 yards per play) on back-to-back fourth quarter drives to take the lead, 21-20. The Cardinals' final offensive drive after the two touchdowns was for -10 yards.
- UVA limited Louisville to 282 total yards, the lowest amount by the Cardinals since Sept. 29, 2012 vs. Southern Miss (269).

VIRGINIA HAS FORCED 13 TURNOVERS THROUGH THREE GAMES

- UVA leads the nation with 13 forced turnovers through three games.
- Virginia's 13 takeaways are the most by the Cavaliers through the first three games of a season since 13 to start the 2002 campaign.
- UVA's 13 takeaways this season have turned into 44 points, while the Cavaliers had 21 takeaways for 13 points last season. Seven of those 13 points came in the 2013 season opener against BYU.
- UVA has scored a touchdown or field goal on eight possessions following an opponent's turnover. One additional drive ended with UVA taking a knee to end the first half of the Richmond game.

CAVALIERS SNAP NINE-GAME ACC LOSING STREAK WITH WIN AGAINST LOUISVILLE

- UVA's 23-21 win over No. 21 Louisville snapped a 10-game ACC losing streak that lasted 672 days, dating back to Nov. 10, 2012 (Miami).
- UVA opens ACC play 1-0 for the first time since the 2009 season.

VIRGINIA KEEPING OPPONENTS OUT OF THE ENDZONE ON OFFENSE

- The Cavaliers defense yielded two offensive touchdowns through its first two games for the first time since the 1998 season (allowed two vs. Maryland in second game after shutting out Auburn in the first game).
- UVA allowed a rushing touchdown to UCLA quarterback Brett Hundley and a rushing touchdown to Richmond quarterback Michael Rocco; both came in the third quarter.
- Louisville scored three offensive touchdowns against UVA.

FORCING TURNOVERS AGAINST RICHMOND

- Virginia had seven takeaways against the Spiders. The seven forced turnovers is the most by a UVA team since the Cavaliers also notched seven vs. South Carolina (Sept. 7, 2002).

CAVALIERS COMPETING AS POST GRADUATE STUDENTS

- There are 11 Cavaliers that are graduate students at UVA this fall.
- UVA is No. 4 in the nation with 11 college graduates on its roster.
- (LS) Jeb Byrne, (ILB) Henry Coley, (OG) Conner Davis, (DE) Cameron Fitch, (DT) Greg Gallop, (WR) Miles Gooch, (DE) Stephen Lawe, (TB) Khalek Shepherd, (TE) Zachary Swanson, (P/PK) Alec Vozenilek, (OG) Cody Wallace hold their undergraduate degrees.
- All 11 walked "The Lawn" May 2014 as graduates of UVA.

CAVALIERS SNAP 10-GAME LOSING STREAK WITH WIN AGAINST RICHMOND

- UVa's 45-13 win over Richmond snapped a 10-game losing streak that lasted 350 days, dating back to Sept. 28, 2013.
- It was UVa's longest losing streak since losing 10 games over the 1980-81 seasons.

SEASON CAPTAINS FOR 2014

- Seniors Henry Coley, Anthony Harris, Kevin Parks and sophomore Greyson Lambert have been selected by their peers as captains of the 2014 football season. Alec Vozenilek was added by Coach London in late Aug.

I RUN TRACK AND DO FIELD EVENTS TOO

- CB DreQuan Hoskey (hurdles), DE Trent Corney (thrower), RB Taquan Mizzell (sprinter) and RB Khalek Shepherd (sprinter) all were members of the UVa track & field team in 2014.
- Hoskey earned All-ACC honors in the 60 meter hurdles during the 2014 Indoor Track & Field season. Hoskey ran the program's second-fastest time and placed second in the ACC Championship race.
- Redshirt freshman Daniel Hamm came to UVa to run track. He also walked on to the football team as a tailback. Due to a football injury that allowed Hamm to earn a medical hardship during the 2013 season, the running back did not run track in 2014 at UVa.
- Hoskey also ran track at Virginia in 2010 and 2013 and competed at the ACC and NCAA Championships.

JACOB RAINEY IS A STUDENT ASSISTANT

- Jacob Rainey, a sophomore, will assist offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild with the quarterbacks as a student assistant.
- Jacob Rainey, a quarterback from Woodberry Forest in Virginia, had his right leg amputated after a freak injury in a scrimmage in 2011.
- Rainey suffered a dislocated right knee, but while he was hospitalized the news got far worse. An artery in his lower right leg had been severed, cutting off circulation. Over the next week, Rainey underwent four surgeries as doctors tried to save his leg. They were unsuccessful.
- A week after Rainey was tackled on a routine play, doctors amputated his right leg above the knee.
- As word of Rainey's ordeal spread, he was inundated with letters and gifts from well-wishers, including Alabama football coach Nick Saban, Green Bay Packers linebacker Clay Matthews and current New England Patriot Tim Tebow, who was quarterback for the Denver Broncos at the time.
- Tebow reached out to Rainey and wanted to meet in person. On Dec. 24, Rainey, along with his father and older brother, attended the Broncos' game in Buffalo as Tebow's guests.
- Rainey's experience and inspiring story was documented an episode of ESPN's series E:60.
- The Woodberry Forest quarterback returned to the field in 2012 and played with a prosthetic leg, throwing two touchdowns on nine passes.
- UVa WR Canaan Severin changed his number prior to this season from 84 to 9 in honor of his friend. Rainey wore number 9 at Woodberry Forest.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 439 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 248-180-12.

OPPONENTS STRUGGLE TO GET A TACKLE FOR LOSS ON RUSHES

- UVa appears to be a tad sluggish with the rush, averaging 3.3 yards per carry through three games.
- While the push may not be where they want it to be, what the offensive line is doing is keeping opponents out of the backfield.
- On designed rushes, UVa has only been tackled in the backfield three times for a loss of eight total yards.
- Khalek Shepherd and Matt Johns each were stopped for a loss of one yard against then-No. 7 UCLA. A blitz by then-No. 21 Louisville stopped Kevin Parks for a loss of six yards.

FRESHMEN SHINE AMONG UVA RECEIVING CORPS

- Redshirt freshman Andre Levrone and true freshman Doni Dowling made their collegiate debuts in solid fashion against No. 7 UCLA.
- The duo caught eight combined balls for 100 combined yards and one touchdown.
- Dowling caught five balls for 25 yards, while Levrone recorded three receptions for 75 yards and one touchdown.
- Dowling's five receptions are the most by a UVa true freshman receiver in a debut since 1972. That was the first season in which freshmen were eligible to play varsity football. The NCAA had historically prohibited freshmen from varsity competition, except during the US involvement in World War II.
- Dowling's effort passed teammate Darius Jennings' four catches in the senior's 2011 debut against William & Mary.

- Outside of established senior WR Darius Jennings, the bulk of the noise made in preseason camp by the receiving corps has been made by either the young, inexperienced or tall receivers. Some are all three.
- Kyle Dockins, Miles Gooch, Keeon Johnson and Canaan Severin all register at 6-2 or taller and expect to be primary targets in the UVa offense.
- The quartet enters 2014 with 37 combined career catches between them, 20 of which belong to Johnson's stellar freshman campaign in 2013.
- Added to the deep mix will be three wide receivers making collegiate debuts in 2014. True freshmen Jamil Kamara (6-2) and Doni Dowling (6-1) will find time in the mix, as will redshirt freshman Andre Levrone (6-2).

BLANDING ONE OF NATION'S TOP DEF. FROSH.

- Quin Blanding has 25 tackles on the season, which places the true freshman No. 2 in the nation for tackles among freshmen.
- New Mexico State's Derek Ibekwe (LB) leads the nation's freshmen with 32 tackles.

FORCING AND RECOVERING FUMBLES

- UVa's defense has recovered eight fumbles by opponents through three games.
- Of the eight fumbles UVa has recovered, five were lost by the opponent's quarterback. All five came in the first two games (UCLA & Richmond).

FIVE DIFFERENT CAVALIERS HAVE INTS

- Virginia has five interceptions from five different Cavaliers.
- Only Ole Miss and Notre Dame have more individuals with at least one interception. The Rebels and Irish have six different individuals with at least one interception.
- UVa is No. 6 in the nation with five interceptions.

BLANDING GETS FIRST INTERCEPTION

- UVa free safety Quin Blanding recorded the first interception of his career against Richmond.
- Blanding's pick was the first of the year for UVa. The last time a true freshman made the first interception of the year for Virginia was 2011 when Demetrious Nicholson snatched one against William & Mary.
- Not only did both Blanding and Nicholson both go to Bayside High School in Virginia Beach, but are the last two true freshmen to start a season opener for Virginia.
- LB Daquan Romero and CB Tim Harris also recorded their first career interceptions against the Spiders.

DEFENSE STUFFS UCLA AFTER FIRST DOWN

- UVa yielded 175 yards to the Bruins on first down in the season opener.
- However, No. 7 UCLA only managed 183 combined yards on second, third and fourth down against the Cavaliers.
- That comes out to an average of 5.8 yards per first down play and 4.2 yards average for second, third and fourth down combined. UCLA was 0-2 on fourth down chances.

DEFENSE PRESSURES VAUNTED UCLA OFFENSE

- UVa sacked UCLA quarterback Brett Hundley five times and recorded 11 tackles for a loss.
- TCU and Baylor are the only football programs during the opening weekend of college football to amass more tackles for loss. TCU had 14.0 and Baylor had 13.0.
- Baylor, FIU and Louisiana-Monroe are the only programs during the opening weekend of college football to record more sacks than the Cavaliers. Baylor had 8.0, while FIU and Louisiana-Monroe had 6.0.

FRESHMAN QUIN BLANDING GETS THE STARTING NOD AT FREE SAFETY

- Freshman Quin Blanding made his collegiate debut against UCLA.
- Blanding started at free safety and was the first UVa true freshman to start a season opener at one of the two safety positions since Tony Blount did so on Sept. 11, 1976.
- Blount played strong safety for the Cavaliers in a road opener at Washington, Virginia's first-ever game against a Pac-12 school. At the time of the 1976 game it was the Pac-8 Conference.
- Blanding is the first true freshman Cavalier at any position to start a season opener since fellow UVa teammate Demetrious Nicholson did so in 2011. Nicholson and Blanding are both graduates of Bayside High School in Virginia Beach.
- Blount was a four-year letterwinner (1976-79) and starter for the Cavaliers. Current UVa defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta was Blount's backup at one point.

DEPTH ON THE DEFENSIVE LINE

- UVa may have no seniors starting on the defensive line in 2014, but they have a lot of depth and experience.
- David Dean, Eli Harold, Mike Moore and Donte Wilkins have all started games for the Cavaliers.
- The likes of Andrew Brown, Trent Corney and Kwontie Moore will see time to give rest to the unit as a whole.
- This wasn't always the case, guys like Harold (806 plays) and Dean (719 plays) saw significant time in 2013.

UVA RETURNS EXPERIENCE IN THE SECONDARY

- UVa opened the 2014 season with 112 career starts among its returning defensive backs, which was the most in the nation amongst teams that run schemes with four defensive backs.
- Demetrious Nicholson leads the group with 30 career starts. He started the first 30 games of his collegiate career before being hurt in game five last season against Ball State and did not play the rest of the season.
- All-American Anthony Harris is second among returning defensive backs entering the season with 23 career starts.
- 2014 is a stark difference over 2012 when UVa was one of the four schools in the nation without a senior in the secondary and started four sophomores for most games, sometimes throwing a freshmen into the mix. 2012 sophomores Anthony Harris (12), DreQuan Hoskey (10) and Brandon Phelps (12) started the majority of the games, while 2012 freshman Maurice Canady (2) also started two games. Now they make up one of the nation's most experienced defensive backfields.

COLEY & ROMERO RETURN FOR SENIOR CAMPAIGN

- Senior linebackers Henry Coley and Daquan Romero each return to starting lineup for the Cavaliers.
- Coley moved to inside linebacker in 2013 and led UVa with 91 tackles.
- He is a two-time All-ACC Academic team member, already owns a degree in African American studies and an extension of defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta.
- In 2013 Romero was second on the team with 89 tackles and No. 13 in the ACC.

BLANDING AND BROWN BEGIN UVA CAREERS

- Freshmen Quin Blanding and Andrew Brown became the first multiple five-star recruits UVa signed in one year since 2002 when the Cavaliers signed three, Ahmad Brooks, Michael Johnson and Kai Parham.
- Brooks later prepped a year at Hargrave Military and enrolled a year later.
- Brown was rated the No. 5 overall recruit in the nation and the No. 1 defensive tackle, while Blanding was rated the No. 10 overall recruit in the nation and No. 1 safety.
- Blanding and Brown join TB Taquan Mizzell as former five-star recruits on the UVa roster. Mizzell, nicknamed Smoke in high school for his elusiveness, signed in 2013 and was the first five-star recruit for the Cavaliers since Eugene Monroe in 2005.

ANDREW BROWN IS UVA'S SECOND GATORADE NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR - ATTENDS ESPYS

- UVA freshman defensive tackle was named the 2013 Gatorade High School National Player of the Year.
- Former UVA great Terry Kirby is the only other Cavalier football player to earn the award.
- The five-star recruit is the 11th Virginia athlete to earn Gatorade National Player of the Year honors in their respective sports.
- Current UVA senior women's soccer player Morgan Brian was the 2011 Gatorade National Female Athlete of the Year.
- Seven former UVA men's soccer players and one women's basketball player also won the national honor for their respective sports.
- Brown attended the 2014 ESPYS at the Nokia Theatre in Los Angeles in July.

**ANTHONY HARRIS EARNS THE GRAY-CARRINGTON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP**

- Established in 1971 in memory of Arthur P. "Pete" Gray IV and expanded in 1987 to include Edward C. Carrington Jr., this award honors two outstanding students whose achievements have served as an inspiration to others. Its one of the highest honors given to a UVA student.
- Winners exhibit traits that defined Pete Gray and Ed Carrington, including personal integrity, achievement, leadership and humility.
- Harris said what makes this award special is that it's not a sports award; its an award that the entire student body is eligible for. "To actually win meant that I accomplished not only some things on the football field, but things within the social and academic community as well," said Harris. "It is a very humbling award."

TENUTA GAVE UVA'S DEFENSE AN AGGRESSIVE MAKEOVER IN 2013 AND IT CONTINUES INTO 2014

- Virginia's associate head coach for defense and defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta is a UVA alum and has brought an aggressive makeover to the Cavaliers since he came home to Charlottesville in 2013.
- UVA over the six seasons prior to Tenuta Uava had the sixth-worst turnover margin in the nation. In 2012 UVA recorded only four interceptions, the fewest by a Virginia Cavalier team since the birth of the forward pass.
- Tenuta said prior to the 2013 season that "we want to create problems for the front five and never let the quarterback set his feet in the passing game."
- UVA over the past few seasons have been near the bottom nationally in turnover margin and sacks per game – Tenuta wants to change that.
- During Tenuta's first season at UVA the Cavaliers boasted Anthony Harris who led the nation in interceptions. Eli Harold was No. 4 in the nation among underclassmen with 8.5 sacks.
- Tenuta enters his 34th season of collegiate coaching and his 18th as a defensive coordinator. He has had stops in the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and at Notre Dame and looks to continue to create turnovers and sack numbers that have declined in recent years at UVA prior.

LOOKING BACK AT 2013: UVA ON THIRD DOWNS

- UVA closed out 2013 No. 3 in the nation as a defense forcing three and outs, posting a 6.00 three and out average per game.
- UVA's opponents went three and out 72 times over 12 games; 39.3 percent of UVA's opponents drives ended in a three and out.
- UVA was No. 2 in the ACC as Clemson was No. 2 in the nation with 6.08 three and outs per game.
- The Cavaliers improved on their 2012 numbers when they finished No. 15 in the nation in three and outs per game with a 4.58 average.
- UVA's defense in 2013 held strong on third downs.
- UVA's opponents were 58-181 (.320) on third downs.
- UVA finished 2013 ranked No. 8 in the nation on third down defense and No. 3 in the ACC.
- More on third down conversions on page 27.

HARRIS LED THE NATION IN INTS IN 2013

- Anthony Harris led the nation with eight interceptions in 2013.
- Harris set a UVA record recording at least one INT (six overall) in five straight games.
- The eight picks by Harris were four more than the entire UVA team had in 2012.
- The eight interceptions were the most by a Cavalier since Ronde Barber led the ACC with eight in 1994.
- The eight interceptions rank No. 2 all-time at UVA for most in a season.
- Harris' eight interceptions are the most by a UVA safety since Keith McMeans led the nation with nine in 1987. Harris' 2013 season is tied for No. 2 at UVA for INTs in a season with Kevin Cook (1987) and Barber.
- Harris was named a first-team All-American by Sports Illustrated and a second-team honoree by the Walter Camp Football Foundation for his 2013 efforts.

COLEY & MOORE SPEND 2013 SUMMER IN AFRICA

- Linebackers Henry Coley and Kwontie Moore took a summer class at Virginia that took them to South Africa in July 2013.
- Coley and Moore paid attention to the social, economic and environmental aspects in and throughout different regions of South Africa.
- From rural regions to industrial ones, the class conversed, ate, slept and fellowshipped with locals all over the region in order to fully immerse themselves in the culture.
- The trip included two students from South Africa, 11 UVA students and one Ohio State student.
- The group visited schools, villages and took part in intellectual sharing between the groups.
- Coley and Moore were able to do some sightseeing and visit some historical landmarks, museums and Kruger National Park.

VIRGINIA SETS RECORD FOR KICK RETURN AVG.

- UVA returned four kicks for 200 yards against Richmond, breaking the program record for average per return for a game at 50 yards per return.
- The previous record was 47.6 yards per return against North Carolina in 2004, which was five returns for 238 yards.
- Darius Jennings led UVA with 130 return yards, including the 14th longest return in program history (86 yards).
- Taquan "Smoke" Mizzell added 70 return yards on two returns.

KICK RETURN COVERAGE STARTS OUT STRONG

- UCLA averaged 24.9 yards per kick return in 2013, but Virginia held the Bruins to 49 total kick return yards over four returns, a 12.25 yards per return average.
- Wilfred Wahee led UVA with two tackles on kick-offs, his first collegiate action after sitting out 2013 with a knee injury.
- UVA did it again against Richmond, limiting the Spiders to 48 return yards on three kicks, a 16.0 yards per return average.
- Louisville did a tad better, averaging 18.0 yards per return.

KHALEK SHEPHERD EYES KR RECORD

- Senior Khalek Shepherd set a UVA season record in 2012 with 929 kick return yards.
- Shepherd currently sits No. 3 all-time at UVA with 1,468 career kick return yards and needs 176 more yards to pass No. 1 Joe Sroba (1,645).
- Shepherd is the son of former NFL wide receiver Leslie Shepherd, who spent seven seasons in the NFL with the Redskins, Browns and Dolphins after a stellar career at Temple.

IAN FRYE RETURNS HEALTHY IN 2014

- Junior PK Ian Frye returns healthy in 2014 after missing the final eight games after he sustained an injury in the Pitt game.
- Frye connected on 2-of-2 field goals and both PATs he attempted against UCLA in his first game action since Pitt (2013).
- Frye booted the third-longest game-winning field goal in program history with his 42-yarder against No. 21 Louisville.
- Frye's range can reach 50+ and owns the third-longest made field goal in program history, connecting on a 53-yard field goal as time expired in the first half against BYU.
- The kick is tied with Connor Hughes, who hit his 53-yarder in 2003 against Wake Forest.
- The program record is 56 yards by Kenny Stadlin in 1984 against Virginia Tech and matched by Rafael Garcia vs. Texas in 1995.
- Coach London put Frye on scholarship during the spring semester.

UVA DEBUTS A NEW LONG SNAPPER

- UVA debuted a new long snapper in the 2014 opener after using only two over the past seven seasons.
- From 2007-10 Danny Aiken was UVA's long snapper before moving on to the NFL. He currently is the New England Patriots' long snapper.
- Matt Fortin succeeded Aiken during for the 2011 season and held the job through 2013.
- Fortin's graduation in May has forced a competition between redshirt freshmen Alex Foertsch and Tyler Shirley for the open long snapper spot.
- Shirley won the job and made his debut against UCLA.

ALEC VOZENILEK CAN PLACE KICK IN A PINCH

- UVA punter Alec Vozenilek is an option to place kick in a pinch if needed. The precedent was set last season.
- Due to an injury to Ian Frye at Pitt in 2013, UVA's punter Alec Vozenilek filled in on field goals and PAT attempts the rest of the 2013 season.
- Vozenilek kicked his first two career field goals, making a 39-yard field goal on his first career attempt. He later made a 38-yard field goal and both his PAT attempts against Ball State.
- Vozenilek also did his normal duties of punting, booting one 56 yards and averaging 45.0 yards per punt.
- Vozenilek kicked a career-high four field goals at Maryland. His fifth attempt sailed wide right from 42 yards in the game's final seconds.

ALEC VOZENILEK IS A SEASONED PUNTER

- Alec Vozenilek returns for his final season after serving as UVA's punter the past two seasons. His punting numbers have improved over the last 27 games. Of Vozenilek's 168 career punts, 45.8 percent have gone for 50 yards, or have pinned an opponent inside the 20 yard line.
- Vozenilek booted the fifth-longest punt in the nation in 2013 with a 77-yard kick at Pitt. The punt was also the fourth longest in UVA history.
- Vozenilek has punted five balls over 50 yards and is averaging 44.2 yards per kick in 2014.

CAVALIERS IN NFL CAMPS ENTERING 2014

- There were seven seniors on UVA's roster in 2013. Five of those seniors decided to pursue a career in professional football and took part in UVA's NFL Pro Day.
- All five of UVA's participants from its NFL Pro Day in March have taken part in a camp this NFL Preseason.
- OG/C Luke Bowanko (Jaguars), OT Morgan Moses (Redskins) and DT Brent Urban (Ravens) were all drafted.
- WR Tim Smith (Browns) and DE Jake Snyder (Vikings) signed free agent contracts. Both have since been released.
- Overall, 24 former Cavaliers are currently playing in the NFL.

DID YOU KNOW?

• UVa freshman Quin Blanding was named after the folk-rock song titled "The Mighty Quinn" by his mother Cory Lee. It was the first song she heard following a checkup during her seventh month of pregnancy and the moment held significant meaning to her. At that checkup the doctor's told her they thought they saw a hole in Quin's head and that it appeared to them his cerebrum wasn't connected. Quin was born completely healthy. Cory named him Quin with one "n" instead of two in recognition of that moment during pregnancy.

• Blanding's father Kevin played football at NCAA Division II Glenville State (W.V.) for current Arizona football head coach Rich Rodriguez.

• UVa WR Canaan Severin changed from number 84 to number 9 prior to the 2014 season in honor of UVa student assistant Jacoby Rainey. Rainey wore number 9 as the Woodberry Forest quarterback where a freak game accident forced the amputation of his leg. After the accident Rainey was featured on an episode of E60 and was a guest of then-Denver QB Tim Tebow at a game in Buffalo.

• UVa head coach Mike London's younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back for Virginia from 1992-95. Paul played a major part during UVa's NCAA record streak of 39 straight games with at least one interception. The streak ran from Nov. 6, 1993 through Nov. 29, 1996.

• UVa quarterback David Watford and current wide receivers coach Marques Hagans are first cousins and both were quarterbacks at Hampton High before enrolling at UVa.

• UVa's oldest living football alum, Dr. John Risher, turned 104 years old this year; he also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew on game day. (More on page 19).

• Paul Wisman also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew staff and has done so since 1956. His 59 straight years of work in the press box is the longest current streak in the nation (More on page 18).

• Current UVa offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim was the offensive coordinator at Liberty (2006-08) when UVa WR Dominique Terrell's older brother, Zach, was a standout All-Big South running back and slot receiver for the Flames.

• CB Demetrious Nicholson has been growing his signature dread locks since the summer of 2005, just before he entered the sixth grade.

• WR Kyle Dockins also has been growing his dread locks since the sixth grade, dating back to 2006.

• Sophomore CB Kelvin Rainey has two brothers that have played FBS football. His older brother Johnathan played at New Mexico (2008-11), while his other older brother Derrick played at Arizona (2010-13).

• Air Force Academy graduate and UVa assistant coach Scott Wachenheim was awarded his bachelor's degree by then-President Ronald Reagan.

• Graduate assistant Jacob Hodges served as a team manager for two years (2008, 2009) and then was a three-year letterwinner as UVa's holder (2010-12).

• DE Trent Corney's older brother, Taylor, won the Bronze at the 2009 Pan American Junior Championships in the Decathlon. Taylor has also been ranked in the Top 10 in the world in the Decathlon.

• Matt Johns made his collegiate debut as the UVa holder in 2013. The first time Johns made it into a college game he had to hold in the rain on Ian Frye's 53-yard field goal in the 2013 season-opening win over BYU. Frye's kick sailed through as time expired in the first half, tying the third-longest field goal in UVa history.

• P/PK Alec Vozenilek's younger brother Rob is a member of UVa's men's basketball squad. On off days from spring football, Alec drove down to Greensboro, N.C., to support his brother and watch UVa win the ACC Tournament. Alec also attended all of UVa's NCAA Tournament games in Raleigh, N.C., and at Madison Square Garden in New York City.

GREYSON LAMBERT TO MAKE FIRST CAREER START AGAINST UCLA

- On May 5 after the conclusion of spring practice, UVa head coach Mike London put Greyson Lambert atop of his post-spring depth chart at quarterback. The redshirt sophomore started his first collegiate game in the season opener against UCLA.
- Lambert is the fifth different QB to start a game during the Mike London era at Virginia.
- Of London's 51 games at UVa, 21 have been started by Michael Rocco, 12 by Marc Verica, 12 by David Watford, four by Phillip Sims and two by Lambert.
- Lambert is the eighth different UVa QB to start a game since the start of the 2007 season. Included in that group was two games started by Vic Hall and two by Peter Lalich. The other 84 games over the span of eight seasons have been started by Jameel Sewell (23), Marc Verica (22), Michael Rocco (21), David Watford (12), Phillip Sims (4) and Greyson Lambert (2).

GREYSON LAMBERT ON A SHORT LIST OF ACC QUARTERBACKS

- Greyson Lambert attempted 75 passes in his seven games off the bench in 2013.
- Despite making his first career start Saturday against UCLA, Lambert is one of the more experienced starting ACC quarterbacks from last year.
- Lambert is one six starting ACC quarterbacks in 2014 that attempted at least 50 passes last season.
- The other quarterbacks with at least 50 pass attempts in 2013 are from Clemson (Cole Stoudt), Duke (Anthony Boone), Florida State (Jameis Winston), North Carolina (Marquise Williams) and Syracuse (Terrel Hunt).

- The very first collegiate play for Johns came when he held on Ian Frye's 53-yard field goal as time expired in the second quarter against BYU in 2013. The field goal by Frye is tied for the third longest in UVa history.

WITH WATFORD ITS ALL IN THE FAMILY

- David Watford and current UVa wide receivers coach Marques Hagans are first cousins.
- Both played quarterback at Hampton High School in Hampton, Va., and Watford followed his older cousin to UVa to play quarterback.
- Hagans was the starting quarterback at UVa from 2004-05. He was wide receiver and kick returner in 2002 and 2003 when he was the back up quarterback to Matt Schaub.
- Other notable quarterbacks from the Hampton HS football family are Ronald Curry and Tyrod Taylor.

WATFORD IN THE UVa RECORD BOOK

- David Watford owns a few UVa passing records.
- Watford owns the UVa record for completions in a game with 43 against Georgia Tech last season. The mark is also an opponent record for the Yellow Jackets.
- His 61 attempts against Georgia Tech is also a UVa record for a game.
- Watford passed for 376 yards against Georgia Tech in 2013, the fourth highest passing total in UVa history.
- Watford also owns the single season UVa record for completions in a season by a sophomore with 244.
- His 427 passing attempts in 2013 are also a school record for a season.

WATFORD OWNS OVERTIME WIN FOR VIRGINIA

- David Watford led UVa to an overtime victory over Idaho in 2011.
- Coming off the bench as a true freshman, Watford completed a 27-yard pass to fellow true freshman Dominique Terrell for what ended up as the game-winning touchdown.
- The Virginia defense deflected a two-point attempt afterwards to solidify the overtime victory, 21-20.
- Watford ended the Idaho game 10-of-20 for 95 yards and the touchdown.

A LOOK BACK AT COLLEGE FOOTBALL HISTORY ON THE GROUNDS OF UVA AS THE COLONNADES AT LAMBETH FIELD CELEBRATE 101 YEARS

- The colonnades at Lambeth Field turn 101 in 2014. The playing surface at Lambeth Field hosted Virginia football from 1902 until Scott Stadium opened up in the midst of the 1931 season on Oct. 15, 1931.
- Lambeth Field is the location where the American game of football that we know today, played from youth league all the way up to the NFL, was first played.
- It all started in 1909 with the death of UVA's Archer Christian.
- Christian died in 1909 as a result of injuries sustained in a football game at Georgetown on Nov. 13, 1909. Christian's death highlighted 29 football related deaths during the 1909 season. Papers from all over the country carried the front-page headline of Christian's death.
- Former UVA President Edwin A. Alderman and the father of UV athletics, William Lambeth, went to New York City to meet with other presidents and administrators from other big time universities to discuss how they could make the game of football safer.
- At the time there was legislation happening in Washington to make it illegal to play the game of football in America.
- A new rules committee that was appointed from that meeting in New York City included Lambeth and the father of American football, Walter Camp.
- Lambeth noted to the committee, which met almost on a monthly basis, that the two deaths he had seen personally were due to exhaustion. At the time there were no substitutions, if you came out you could no longer return. The original game had a lot of pulling and pushing. Players were not considered down until they really couldn't move under the pile. Lambeth suggested that the game be split into four quarters, totaling 15 minutes a piece and that players could substitute back in. Walter Camp's notes from the committee meetings credit Lambeth, in the margins, with these changes.
- The committee asked Lambeth to take the new rules back to the University of Virginia and experiment with them during the spring of 1910.
- On the Grounds of the University of Virginia, under the watchful eye of William Lambeth, a new version of American football, divided into four quarters was played for the first time in history.
- Other notable rules that were played for the first time that spring at Lambeth Field were: seven men required on the line at the time of the snap, players could no longer push or pull the ball carrier and the forward pass could now be made across the line of scrimmage.
- Virginia football returned to its roots at Lambeth Field during camp in 2013 and 2014, taking part in various scrimmages and practices on the hallowed ground.

WISMAN AND RISHER HAVE BOTH WORKED ON UVA'S FOOTBALL STAT CREW FOR 50+ YEARS

- Paul Wisman and Dr. John Risher have each worked on the stats crew at Scott Stadium for over 50 years.
- Wisman enters his 59th consecutive season on the UVA stat crew, which is tied with Toledo's Chet Sullwold for the longest active streak in FBS football. Both men started in 1956.
- Risher began in 1963 and enters his 52nd season in a row.
- Risher used to be Wisman's primary care physician in Lynchburg before retiring. When Risher found out what Wisman did with UVA, he hounded him to plug him in with the stats crew too.
- Risher is UVA's oldest living football alum. He turned 104 on May 13 of this year. He golfed nine holes on his 100th birthday in 2010.
- Wisman has missed only one home game at Scott Stadium since he started working on the stat crew and that was the 2011 season-opening game against William & Mary.
- The William & Mary game in 2011 is the only home game Wiseman has missed for that matter at Scott Stadium since 1946.
- In April 2013, both Risher and Wisman were recipients of the "Order of the Crossed Sabre" award, which goes annually to someone who has contributed greatly to Virginia football.

Mike London enters his fifth season at Virginia with a complete roster of players he has recruited, a large number of returning letterwinners and all of his coaching coordinators from the 2013 campaign. Fresh off a recruiting class that included two top-10 prospects for the first time in the program's history, London believes the Cavaliers are in position to return to the form that saw UVa win eight

games in 2011 and compete in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Facing one of the nation's toughest schedules in 2014 will be a challenge, but the energetic London feels the Cavaliers are ready to turn the corner. With recruiting classes consistently ranked among the top-30 in the nation, Virginia is in a position to erase the memories of the 2013 campaign when it went 2-10 with a roster that featured just six seniors who played on a consistent basis. In both 2012 and 2013, the Cavaliers were among the nation's leading teams in terms of playing true freshmen.

Knowing London's backstory, it is easy to understand why he is so optimistic as well as why his players enjoy and embrace his coaching approach.

A former Richmond police detective, London's time in law enforcement dealing with the entire spectrum of human emotions and actions has provided a wealth of experience that he draws on to assist players both on and off the field. There are few stressful situations he has not faced – including having a loaded pistol pointed at him and the trigger pulled, only to have the weapon malfunction and not discharge its potentially lethal round.

London also had the remarkable opportunity to save one of his daughter's lives when he was identified as a perfect match for her rare bone marrow disorder. That opportunity is one reason why London is an advocate of servitude and makes sure his players understand and embrace the concept of giving back through a variety of community services activities. One of the most visible is the team's annual bone marrow donor registration drive as part of the national "Get in the Game, Save a Life" initiative.

London's biography includes plenty of chapters of football success on the field as well.

In the spring of 2013 OT Oday Aboushi was selected by the New York Jets to mark the 30th consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

In 2011, he led Virginia to one of its most outstanding seasons as the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. Five of his players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrius Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media.

He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He defines the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years. Those results have continued to improve and during the spring of 2013, his players once again set a high mark for its GPA.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 53-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

- In UVa game records dating back to the 1930 season, UCLA's three defensive touchdowns was a first for a Virginia opponent
- Virginia allowed a pair of interception touchdowns in the same game for the first time since 2006 (Pittsburgh, Darrelle Revis and Clint Session)
- The Cavaliers didn't allow a quarterback sack for the first time since game six of last season (Oct. 12 at Maryland)
