


HORNS PLAY HOST TO BYU SATURDAY: After a convincing season-opening victory over North Texas in the debut of first-year head coach Charlie Strong, the Longhorns will face BYU in Austin on Saturday (6:30 p.m. Central). The teams have met just four times, though two of those have occurred in the last three years. Texas downed the Cougars, 17-16 in Austin in 2011, but BYU knocked off the Longhorns, 40-21, in Provo, Utah, last season behind the rushing of QB Taysom Hill and RB Jamaal Williams.

TEXAS OPENS 2014 WITH WIN: The defense accounted for four interceptions and allowed just 94 yards of total offense, leading the Longhorns to a 38-7 victory over North Texas Saturday. WR John Harris set career highs with seven receptions and 110 yards, and Texas used a balanced offensive attack to control the game. David Ash was 19 of 34 for 190 yards and a TD, while running backs Johnathan Gray and Malcolm Brown (two TD's) contributed 84 and 65 rushing yards, respectively.

TEXAS BEGINS STRONG ERA: Texas has opened its 122nd season in program history and first under the guidance of Charlie Strong who was hired in January as the school's 29th head coach, but just sixth in the last 58 years. Strong spent the past four seasons as Louisville head coach, re-energizing a program that had a 15-21 record in the three years prior to his arrival. He posted a 37-15 record, which included a pair of Big East Conference Championships (2011, 2012). Strong was named Big East Coach of the Year in both 2010 and 2012, and led the Cardinals to four bowl appearances with three wins. Over the past two years, Louisville was the nation's fourth-winningest program, posting a 23-3 record (88.5 percent). Prior to his stint at Louisville, Strong was a

long-time successful defensive coordinator, spending four years at South Carolina (1999-2002) and seven at Florida (2003-09).

STARTERS RETURNING: Texas welcomes back starters at 12 positions, including five on offense and seven on defense. There are 12 offensive players who started a game in 2013 back for 2014, while the defense includes 13 players with at least one start last season.

STARTERS LOST: Texas is replacing 10 offensive and defensive starters, as well as its punter and place-kicker. Eight of those 10 starters earned All-Big 12 honors last season and two - DE Jackson Jeffcoat and PK/P Anthony Fera - were consensus All-Americans. The group of 10 starters accounted for 421 games played, including 297 career starts. Those totals do not include Fera, who served double duty last season as the place-kicker and punter. He was a finalist for the Lou Groza Award and Jeffcoat captured the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end in the nation.

STREAKS, TRENDS AND MILESTONES:

- Texas won its 15th straight season-opening game by defeating North Texas on Saturday. UT improved to 102-17-3 (.848) all-time in season openers. The Longhorns are 80-7-2 (.910) when opening the year at home.
- Texas has won all 10 meetings with North Texas and outscored the Mean Green 186-14 over the last four games.
- Dominic Espinosa made his 40th straight start at center which leads the team. DE Cedric Reed leads the defense with 20 consecutive starts.
- For just the 14th time on UT record, the Longhorns held an opponent to under 100 yards of total offense when they limited North Texas to just 94 (79 rushing, 15 passing). The 94 yards yielded rank No. 13 on the UT single-game list and it marked the first time since Oct. 29, 2011 that the Longhorns held an opponent under 100 yards. Texas was one of just three schools in the FBS to allow that few yards in week one (also Pittsburgh, 57, and Louisiana-Monroe, 94). The 15 passing yards surrendered to UNT rank No. 9 on the UT single-game list.

- Senior LB Demarco Cobbs recorded his first career interception in the fourth quarter vs. North Texas, returning it 28 yards for a touchdown. DT Chris Whaley had UT's last interception return for a score (31 yards) in the 2013 Oklahoma game.
- Jaxon Shipley needs 24 more receiving yards to become the eighth player in UT history with 2,000 in his career.

FIRST-AND-GOAL:

- The UNT offense never advanced to the red zone and did not convert a third-down opportunity until early in the fourth quarter of Saturday's game. The Mean Green were unable to convert their first nine attempts and ended the game 3-for-15. Last season, UNT ranked No. 20 in the FBS in third-down conversions (47 percent).
- The Texas defense forced North Texas into four interceptions, the most since the 2009 Oklahoma State game (Oct. 31). The Longhorns totaled 10 interceptions during the 2013 season. Dylan Haines, Jordan Hicks, Adrian Colbert and Demarco Cobbs each recorded his first career interception.
- UNT averaged 1.8 yards on 43 rushing attempts and its longest play was 8 yards.

DISRUPTIVE DEFENSE

No team in the nation was more disruptive to the opponents' passing attack than Texas was in week one. The Longhorns held North Texas to three completions on 17 passing attempts while picking off Mean Green quarterbacks Josh Greer and Andrew McNulty a combined four times. UNT finished the game with just 15 passing yards, the eighth fewest allowed by Texas in school history. Those numbers yielded a -22.0 team passing efficiency rating for UT, the best mark in the country. Last season, the Mean Green had a passing efficiency rating of 133.51, which ranked a respectable No. 55 in the FBS.

CHARLIE STRONG (Central Arkansas '82): Strong, in his first season at UT, has compiled a 38-16 (.704) career record. He spent the previous four years as head coach at Louisville, leading the Cardinals to two Big East Championships and four bowl appearances. A two-time Big East Coach of the Year, Strong spent 11 seasons as a defensive coordinator (1999-02 at South Carolina; 2003-09 at Florida).

BRONCO MENDENHALL (Oregon State '88): Now in his 10th season as head coach at BYU, Mendenhall has restored the Cougars' reputation as one of the nation's top college football programs. Mendenhall has guided his teams to nine straight bowl appearances, two outright conference championships, and regular national top-25 rankings.

- Two players on both offense (RT Marcus Hutchins, WR John Harris) and defense (DE Shiro Davis, S Adrian Colbert) started for the time in their careers in the North Texas game.
- Five true freshmen saw action vs. North Texas: TE Andrew Beck, WR Armanti Foreman, RB D'Onta Foreman, DB Jason Hall and WR Lorenzo Joe. Other players who saw their first career action included CB Antwuan Davis, LB Naashon Hughes, DE Logan Mills, DB Dylan Haines, FB Dominic Cruciani and OL Jake Raulerson.

DIRECTING THE OFFENSE: David Ash is being relied upon to direct the offense with the hope to replicate a 2012 season which saw him start in 12 of 13 games and finish 15th in the FBS in completion percentage (67.3). Ash played in just three games last year, missing the final 10 to injury and earning a medical redshirt. He's one of the most experienced quarterbacks in the Big 12 having played in 29 games with 22 starts. He ranks eighth on the UT career passing yards list (4,728). In the season opener, Ash went 19 of 34 for 190 yards, one passing TD and one rushing TD. In all, he directed five scoring drives.

NEW LOOK ON THE OFFENSIVE LINE: With three starters lost from last year, the Longhorns have a somewhat different look to the offensive line this year. Texas isn't, however, without experience. Senior center Dominic Espinosa has started 40 straight games though he left the North Texas game with an ankle injury. Junior Kennedy Estelle made eight starts a year ago and opened the UNT game at left tackle. Two players who made one start each last year - junior Sedrick Flowers and sophomore Kent Perkins - replaced Trey Hopkins and Mason Walters as the starting guards. Marcus Hutchins, who came over from the defensive line during preseason camp, started the UNT game at right tackle.

ONE-TWO **PUNCH** THE **BACKFIELD:** Senior Malcolm Brown and junior Johnathan Gray form one of the most talented - and productive - running back duos in the country. Brown and Gray are one of just six twosomes in the nation to return after each rushing for more than 750 yards last season. Brown rushed for 904 yards and nine touchdowns while averaging 105.1 rushing yards over the last eight games. Gray is fully recovered from a torn Achilles that caused him to miss the final four games last season. Gray averaged 4.9 yards per carry on 159 attempts, finishing the season with 780 yards on the ground. Both are threats to catch the ball out of the backfield: Brown had 17 catches for 195 yards and Gray had 15 catches for 61 yards. In the opener, the pair combined for 147 yards on the ground (Gray - 82, Brown - 65), while Brown scored two touchdowns and Gray had a game-high 42-yard run. Behind Brown and Gray, the Longhorns will be youthful with just two scholarship running backs on the roster: true freshmen Donald Catalon and D'Onta Foreman. Seeing his first collegiate action vs. UNT, Foreman rushed twice for 37 yards including a long of 34.

DID YOU KNOW?

North Texas ran just one offensive play in Texas territory during in the first half Saturday and it resulted in a turnover. On second-and-5 from the UT 48 late in the second quarter, Andrew McNulty's pass was picked off by Adrian Colbert. UNT had 31 total yards (on 27 plays) in the first half.

CATCHING ON: With the departure of Mike Davis, who ended his career fourth in UT history in both receptions (200) and receiving yards (2,753), Texas did not have much returning production beyond senior Jaxon Shipley and junior Marcus Johnson. Shipley has posted 165 receptions (seventh on the UT career list) in his career after catching six for 43 yards in the opener. Behind Shipley, Johnson is the leading returning receiver in terms of yardage, having caught 22 passes for 350 yards (15.9 ypc) last year. Harris displayed big-play ability in 2013 when he averaged 28.2 yards on five catches, including a pair of touchdowns, and was the breakout player vs. UNT as he posted career highs in receptions (seven) and yards (110) while also catching a TD. Head coach Charlie Strong praised Harris for having an excellent preseason camp. Jacorey Warrick made his first career catches (two for 30 yards) vs. UNT. Junior Daje Johnson figures to be a factor after posting 24 receptions for 178 yards last season. He has big-play ability with five career plays of 45 or more yards, but missed the opener due to suspension. True freshmen Armanti Foreman and Lorenzo Joe saw action vs. UNT.

LOOKING FOR AN INCREASED ROLE:

Texas has three tight ends on the roster with extended playing time. Seniors Greg Daniels and Geoff Swaim were the starters last season, including five games together. While Daniels and Swaim were a key in the running game last season, the duo combined for just six catches. M.J. McFarland, the No. 3 tight end, did not have a reception in his 11 games. Last season at Louisville, Charlie Strong's offense had two tight ends - Gerald Christian (28) and Ryan Hubbell (14) - combine for 42 catches. During 2012, Hubbell (14) and Nate Nord (13) combined for 27 receptions. That same season, McFarland (8) and Daniels (5) were more involved in the UT passing game, combining for 13 catches. Daniels is out of action with a knee injury so freshman Andrew Beck was moved to tight end in the preseason. McFarland posted two catches for 7 yards in the opener as Texas started the game in a two-tight end set with McFarland and Swaim.

IN THE TRENCHES: The Longhorns will rely on a stout and experienced defensive line. Senior Cedric Reed and junior Shiro Davis are the starting ends while senior Desmond Jackson and junior Malcom Brown occupy the tackle positions. The quartet made their presence known from the onset of the opener vs. UNT, setting the tone and helping Texas allow just 40 yards of total offense in the first three quarters. The Longhorns have depth on the line as evidenced by reserves DT Hassan Ridgeway making two sacks and DT Alex Norman making one. In addition to those two, DE Caleb Bluiett, DE Bryce Cottrell and DT Paul Boyette Jr. saw action.

• A first-team All-Big 12 selection in 2013, Reed is a disruptive force who has started in 20 straight games. The senior forced five fumbles and recorded 19 tackles for loss and 10 sacks last year. His 79 tackles were third on the team and are tops among returning players. Davis, a junior, made his first career start vs. UNT. He saw action in all 13 games last season and made 15 tackles, four of them for a loss. Jackson and Brown bring plenty of experience to the middle of the line. Combined, the two have played in 66 games and started in 28. Jackson recorded a careerhigh 39 tackles last year, along with a pair of sacks and five tackles for loss. Brown, meanwhile, finished the season tied for third in PBUs (5), third in tackles for loss (12) and seventh in tackles (68).

DEPTH AT LINEBACKER: Texas has depth at linebacker, where five players that started in at least one game last season return. Senior Steve Edmond, an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection last year, anchors the middle, while senior Jordan Hicks and junior Peter Jinkens start at the outside positions. Dalton Santos (seven starts) and Timothy Cole (one) also bring starting experience from last season, while Demarco Cobbs (six starts) and Tevin Jackson (two) have starting experience from 2012. Edmond, who has made 22 career starts, recorded 73 tackles last year. Hicks is returning from an Achilles injury that caused him to miss the final 10 games a season ago, but hopes to return to the form that saw him make 41 tackles in the first four contests of 2013. Jinkens started in six games last year, playing his best in the final two when he made a combined 21 tackles. Redshirt freshman Naashon Hughes also figures to enter the mix for playing time. Hicks and Cobbs had excellent season debuts as each made an interception, with Cobbs returning his 28 yards for a touchdown, and finished with five tackles apiece.

PLAYMAKERS IN THE SECONDARY:

With experienced playmakers Quandre Diggs, Duke Thomas and Mykkele Thompson, the Longhorns have a wellequipped secondary and proved that by allowing just 15 passing yards in week one vs. UNT. Diggs, a three-year starter, and Thomas, a junior who started 10 games a year ago, will man the cornerback positions. With 37 career starts under his belt, Diggs is the most experienced player on defense and second-most on the team (Dominic Espinosa - 40 starts). Manning one of the safety positions will be Thompson, a senior who has seen action in 39 career games including 19 starts. The last starting spot in the secondary was won by Adrian Colbert in the opener vs. UNT, while freshman Jason Hall and sophomore Dylan Haines also saw time. The Longhorns were without Josh Turner for at least the opener due to suspension. He played in 12 games (three starts) last season and posted 37 tackles. Colbert, who had six special teams tackles in 2013, had an interception vs. the Mean Green as did Haines. Sophomore Bryson Echols as well as redshirt freshman Antwuan Davis saw time at cornerback in the opener.

REPLACING THE KICKERS: Texas had to replace its punter and place-kicker this season. Anthony Fera served a dual role last year and turned in one of the best performances in school history. Fera was a finalist for the 2013 Lou Groza Award after connecting on 20 of 22 field goals, including a streak of 15 consecutive that matched Phil Dawson's school record (1996-97). His 90.9 percent field-goal accuracy ranks second on the UT all-time single-season list. He also averaged 40.7 yards on 75 punts. Junior Nick Rose took over as the place-kicker after serving as the kickoff specialist each of the last two years and connected on 1 of 2 field goals vs. UNT (missed from 38, made from 34). Senior William Russ took over as the No. 1 punter. In his first action as a punter, Russ averaged 38.2 yards on five punts placing two inside the opponents 20-yard line.

DID YOU KNOW?

DE Cedric Reed was among select company nationally last season. He was one of only two defensive players in the FBS with at least 5.0 sacks, four pass breakups and five forced fumbles. Reed had 10.0 sacks, four PBUs and five forced fumbles. He ranked tied for 18th nationally in sacks (0.77 per game) and tied for fifth in forced fumbles (0.38 pg). Khalil Mack of Buffalo was the other player. He had 10.5 sacks, seven pass breakups and five forced fumbles. Mack ended up being selected with the fifth overall pick in the 2014 NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

PRESEASON NATIONAL AWARD WATCH LISTS: Texas is well represented on the preseason watch lists for national awards. The Horns have nine players represented a total of 23 times on 13 award lists.

STRONG IMPROVEMENT

A long-time defensive coordinator, Charlie Strong's teams pride themselves on being tough, physical and sound defensively. During his four years (2010-13) as Louisville head coach, the team improved in a number of categories culinating with last year's top-rated defense in the FBS. The Cardinals were in the top 25 nationally in total defense in each of Strong's four seasons. In the three years prior to his arrival, the Cardinals never finished higher than No. 65 in the FBS in total defense.

Strong's offenses, meanwhile, also showed great improvement during his tenure at Louisville. The year prior to Strong's arrival, the Cardinals ranked 91st nationally in total offense (334.1 yards/game), but improved their ranking by 20 spots in year one and checked in at 28th in the country last year (460.8 yards/game). Louisville was one of the most efficient third down teams in the nation last year while ranking 25th in scoring, its highest ranking since 2007.

BREAKING DOWN THE 2014 SCHED-

ULE: UT will play eight of its 12 games this season against teams that reached a bowl game in 2013. Those eight bowl teams all registered at least eight wins. Last season, Texas played nine teams that were in bowl games in 2012. UT only leaves the state of Texas three times in 2014, but the schedule is one of the more challenging in recent history. All three nonconference opponents - North Texas, BYU and UCLA - reached bowl games. The Longhorns are one of only two Big 12 teams without an FCS foe on the schedule. After playing its first two games at home against UNT and BYU, the Longhorns will play in AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, for the second time in their history, facing UCLA on Sept. 13. The previous time was the 2009 Big 12 Championship win vs. Nebraska.

PRODUCING STRONG TEAMS

Featuring an explosive offense and stingy defense, Charlie Strong's Louisville squad ended 2013 ranked 15th in both the USA Today Coaches and Associated Press polls after compiling a 12-1 record, including a 7-1 mark in the American Athletic Conference. The Cardinals capped the year with a dominating 36-9 win over Miami (Fla.) in the Russell Athletic Bowl. The Cardinals led the nation in nine team categories: total defense (251.5 yards per game), rushing defense (80.7 ypg), thirddown conversion defense (26.7 percent), sacks (3.31 per game), fewest passes intercepted (4), fewest turnovers lost (10), fewest first downs allowed (183), completion percentage (70.8) and punt-return defense (1.15 yards per return). Not surprisingly, last year's team produced a number of NFL-caliber players. In fact, the Cardinals had three first round picks in the 2014 NFL Draft and four selected in the top 75, both tied for first in the nation.

LOOKING TO BOUNCE BACK: Dating back to the 2011 Holiday Bowl, David Ash had steadily improved until his head injury ultimately ended his 2013 season after just three games. Over his last 17 starts (13-4 record), Ash has completed 300 of 462 passes (64.9 percent) for 3,791 yards (223.0 per game) with 28 TDs and 10 interceptions. During 2012, Ash ranked 15th in the FBS in completion percentage (67.3) and 21st in passing efficiency (153.3 rating). His effectiveness was even more apparent at the end of games as he ranked second in the nation in passing efficiency (203.40) during the fourth quarter, according to cfbstats.com. He completed 36 of 48 passes (75 percent) for 498 yards with six TD passes and no interceptions in the final quarter. He led the Longhorns to game-winning drives in the final 3:00 against a pair of ranked opponents - Oklahoma State and Oregon State. Ash was a preseason 2013 All-Big 12 pick and member of the watch lists for the 2013 Maxwell, Davey O'Brien, Manning and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose awards. Despite missing the final 10 games of last season, the redshirt junior ranks eighth in career passing yards.

TALENTED BACKFIELD: Texas should have depth and versatility in the running game, with Johnathan Gray and Malcolm Brown returning and each receiving a heavy workload last year. That duo combined for 1,684 rushing yards (Brown - 904; Gray - 780), though the depth was dealt a blow when Gray suffered a seasonending Achilles injury at West Virginia.

• Gray had been the top back in 2013, ranking third in the Big 12 and 47th nationally with 86.7 rushing yards per game at the time of his injury. Gray was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week on Sept. 23 after a career-best performance in the 31-21 win over Kansas State. In that game, Gray set career highs with 141 rushing yards and 28 attempts, while matching a career best with a pair of touchdowns. His TD runs came from 21 yards out in the second quarter and 15 yards in the third quarter. Of his rushing yards, 102 came in the second and third quarters as the Horns dealt with losing starting quarterback David Ash and maintained their doubledigit lead in the game. Gray also became the 49th player in UT history to reach the 1,000 career rushing yard mark against the Wildcats (currently 1,481).

- Brown came on strong after battling an ankle injury early in the season. Over the last eight games, Brown averaged 23.9 carries and 105.1 yards per game, hitting the 100-yard mark five times. He improved down the stretch, averaging 129.7 yards over the last three games of the season and ended the year with 1,970 career rushing yards which ranks 17th in school history.
- The running game was instrumental in Texas' win over Oklahoma as the Longhorns piled up 255 yards on 60 rushes. Gray had 123 yards on a career-high 29 attempts while Brown had 120 yards on 23 attempts. They became the first Longhorn duo to rush for 100-plus yards in the same game in the 108-year history of the Texas-Oklahoma series.

ESPINOSA BACK TO LEAD O-LINE:

The Longhorns will have a revamped offensive line in 2014. They entered last season with all five starters back from 2012, but four members of that group - LT Donald Hawkins, LG Trey Hopkins, RG Mason Walters and RT Josh Cochran - have departed. Fortunately, C Dominic Espinosa, who was started all 40 games the last three-plus seasons, is back to spearhead that unit. Espinosa is listed on the pre-

season watch lists for the Lombardi Award, Rimington Trophy and Outland Trophy. Despite losing starters on the offensive line, the Longhorns do have players with some experience. Junior Kennedy Estelle took over as the starting right tackle in the fourth game last year due to Cochran's shoulder injury which eventually forced him to retire. In addition, Sedrick Flowers and Kent Perkins each started one game and saw action as reserves.

MODEL OF CONSISTENCY: Jaxon Shipley, now a senior, has been one of the most consistent performers since he arrived on campus for the 2011 season. Shipley has caught at least one pass in 36 of his 37 career games played, including one in each of his first 33, a streak that was snapped against Texas Tech last season. He also has three or more catches in 29 games and at least five in 13 of the last 18 games. His streak of 33 straight games with a reception was the third longest in school history, just ahead of his older brother Jordan.

AMONG THE CAREER TOP 10 IN **RECEIVING:** Texas had two of the top receivers in school history on last year's roster and retained one of them. Mike Davis ended his career ranked fourth in career receptions, fourth in receiving yards and fifth in TDs, but Jaxon Shipley is back for his senior season. Shipley cracked the top 10 in career receptions in the 2013 Ole Miss game and the top 10 in career receiving yards in the Oklahoma game. He is now seventh in career receptions (165) and eighth in receiving yards (1,976). Shipley led the team in receptions (56) and was second in receiving yards (589) last season. He was on the watch list for the 2013 Biletnikoff Award and is poised to be one of the top threats nationally this season.

EXPERIENCED DIGGS BACK TO LEAD SECONDARY: A two-time All-Big 12 selection (2011, 2013), Quandre Diggs is one of the most experienced and accomplished players on the team. A three-year starter, Diggs' 32 career pass breakups and eight interceptions are the most on the current roster, while he needs just four more pass breakups to break into the UT career top 10 list. The senior has been named to the preseason watch lists for the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy, along with the Jim Thorpe Award honoring the best defensive back in college

football. Diggs has excelled in each of his three seasons at Texas. In 2011, he posted one of the top freshman seasons in school history for a defensive back. He was named the 2011 Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year and was a FWAA Freshman All-American. He tied the school record for interceptions by a freshman, matching Chris Carter's mark of four in 1993. Diggs also had 15 pass breakups to rank second most on the UT freshman list behind Earl Thomas' 17 in 2008. In 2012, Diggs led the team in both interceptions (four) and pass breakups (seven). His last interception of the season was his most important one. His third-quarter pick of Oregon State's Cody Vaz set up a touchdown which helped turn the momentum in the Longhorns as they posted a 31-27 win in the Valero Alamo Bowl. Diggs ended 2012 tied for 39th in the FBS in interceptions (0.31 per game). Last year, he posted 58 tackles and a team-high 10 pass breakups.

REED TAKES OVER LEAD ROLE AT DEFENSIVE END: After forming one of the best defensive end duos in the country with teammate Jackson Jeffcoat last year, Cedric Reed has moved into the lead role at that position as a senior. A first team All-Big 12 selection last year, Reed is on the preseason watch lists for the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy, which honor the top defensive player in the nation, and the Rotary Lombardi Award, presented to the top lineman. Reed ranked second on the team behind Jeffcoat last

year in both sacks (10.0) and tackles for loss (19), while his 79 tackles were third most on the team. Reed ranked third in the Big 12 and tied for 18th in the FBS in sacks (0.77 per game), and tied for second in the league and tied for fifth in the nation in forced fumbles (0.38 pg).

ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP SACK PRODUCERS: Cedric Reed was one of the top sack producing defenders in the natio last season. Reed's 10 sacks a year ago rank tied for sixth-best nationally among returning players.

CLOGGING UP THE MIDDLE: After a breakout sophomore season in which he started all 13 games, defensive tackle Malcom Brown is back to lead the middle of the defensive line. Brown was instrumental in a Texas run defense that surrendered just 137.6 yards per game on the ground in conference play, a mark that ranked fourth, but was just 10 yards more than No. 1 ranked TCU (127.8). Brown finished the 2013 season ranked tied for third on the team in PBUs (5), third in tackles for loss (12), third in QB pressures (6) and seventh in tackles (68). He is on the preseason watch lists for the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy, and the Outland Trophy which honors the nation's top interior lineman. He is joined by senior Desmond Jackson who played in all 13 games last year, including three starts, and tallied 39 tackles, five TFL, two sacks and three pressures.

<u>Injured Reserve</u> Aaron Ross, Baltimore Ravens (CB) LINEBACKER STABILITY: Texas spent much of last season shuffling players at the linebacker position but looks for stability at that position in 2014 with several key players set to return. Dalton Santos and Steve Edmond are the top returnees in terms of tackles, finishing with 74 and 73 tackles respectively last year. Also returning is Jordan Hicks, who recorded 41 tackles in four games before suffering a ruptured left Achilles tendon during the Kansas State game that caused him to miss the remainder of the season. That marked the second straight year the linebacking corps lost Hicks to a season-ending injury early in the year; he played in just three games in 2012 before missing the next 10 with a hip injury. Edmond, a two-time All-Big 12 choice (2012, 2013), has made 23 starts over the last two-plus seasons and has 195 career tackles which is third among active players. He has six career double-digit tackle games. Santos, meanwhile, played in all 13 games including seven starts last season. He finished fourth on the team with 10 tackles for loss. The Longhorns also return Peter Jinkens, who played in all 13 games with six starts a year ago. Jinkens finished the season with 49 tackles, including 21 in the last two games.

BROTHERLY TIES: The Texas football team has a family feel to it. The Longhorns have four sets of brothers on the current roster and five other players whose brother was a member of the program. Running back D'Onta Foreman and wide receiver Armanti Foreman are freshmen. Freshman offensive lineman Elijah Rodriguez and his brother Daniel, a sophomore, joined the team this summer. Camhron Hughes is a sophomore offensive lineman, and his brother, Naashon, is a redshirt freshman linebacker. Dakota Haines is a senior wide receiver and Dylan Haines is a sophomore safety. In addition, FB Dominic Cruciani (Michael - 2009-12), Quandre Diggs (Quentin Jammer - 1997-98, 2000-01), Jaxon Shipley (Jordan - 2006-09), Chris Terry (Brad - 2011-12) and Kevin Vaccaro (Kenny - 2009-12) all have brothers who played at Texas.

USE OF AUDIO/VIDEO IN COVERAGE

Any accredited media entity collecting "video or audio materials" (film, traditional video or audio, digital video or audio, photos, etc.) from University of Texas Athletics events (games, practices, post-practice/post-game interviews and press conferences) may use that material only for traditional television newscasts, web-based or print coverage (see note below regarding policy on game video on web), or other electronic transmission as approved by The University in writing, with a limitation of up to three (3) minutes in length from any single event. That three (3)-minute package may contain no more than two (2) minutes of game highlights. Its usage must be only as sup-

porting video/audio for a reported story and not simply as rebroadcast/streamed highlights or interview sessions. Accredited media entities may not offer any live video, audio or other coverage of the event (or tape delay rebroadcast coverage in its entirety) without the advance written permission of The University of Texas athletics department. Video is for news usage only and may not be sponsored or sold. This policy includes all games, matches, practices and events involving any of Texas' athletics programs. It includes all media events — press conferences, pre/post-practice interviews and pre/post-game interviews. Policy permits entities to use up to two (2) minutes of video on air (whether taken from the network feed or shot themselves) or on the entity's website. Reports and features must be filed postgame and not during the game. If a game/event is contracted to a network television partner, all highlights may remain on a website no longer than 48 hours following the game/event's conclusion. Highlights may not be used via social media platforms except as a link back to the website/ URL hosting the highlights.

AUSTIN, Texas -- Texas' defense picked off four passes and allowed just 94 yards of total offense and the No. NR/24 Longhorns collected their 15th-consecutive season-opening win to begin the Charlie Strong era in style with a dominant 38-7 victory over North Texas.

Wide receiver John Harris set career highs with seven receptions and 110 yards, and Texas used a balanced offensive attack to control the game. Quarterback David Ash was 19-of-34 for 190 yards and a TD, while running backs Johnathan Gray and Malcolm Brown (two TD's) contributed 84 and 65 rushing yards, respectively, in Strong's debut as Longhorn head coach.

The Longhorn defense registered a touchdown via an interception return by linebacker Demarco Cobbs, tallied seven tackles for loss and sacked UNT quarterback Josh Greer four times while allowing just 40 yards in the first three quarters. It marked just the 14th time on UT record, an opponent has recorded less than 100 yards of total offense in a game.

Already leading 7-0, Texas took control of the game in the second quarter with a pair of scores. Hicks set up a Brown 3-yard TD plunge with an interception and Ash scored on a 1-yard run on the following possession giving the Horns a comfortable 21-0 lead late in the first half.

From the start, North Texas' offense was going nowhere against a stout Longhorn defense, as the Mean Green's first nine plays failed to gain a single yard. On the sixth play, a tipped ball over the middle was intercepted by defensive back Dylan Haines at the UNT 39. The Lago Vista, Texas, native returned the pick 21 yards, granting the Longhorns outstanding field position at the 18. Unfortunately for Texas, the Mean Green defense held firm and Nick Rose missed a 38-yard field goal try wide right.

With its defense having posted three consecutive three-and-outs, Texas nabbed a 7-0 lead with 4:06 left in the first quarter as Brown finished off a nine-play, 63-yard drive with a 1-yard plunge. The key play proved to be a third down, 27-yard completion down the right sideline to the UNT 12 from Ash to Harris. UT's offense outgained the Mean Green 103-15 in total yards during the opening stanza.

Hicks' first career interception got the Horns back in business at the UNT 31 with 9:52 remaining in the half. From there it took just two plays for Texas to reach the end zone as Ash connected with Harris for 28 yards, and Brown made it two scores on the night by driving in from 3 yards out.

Just minutes later, Gray got the Horns offense back in business again, erupting through the left side of the line on third-and-2 for a 42-yard gain down to the UNT 3. Reaching pay dirt from there wouldn't prove easy, however, as the North Texas defense held, forcing fourth down at the 1-yard line. Strong and his staff made the decision to go for the TD, and the gamble paid dividends as Ash rolled out to his right and outsprinted several Mean Green defenders to dive just inside the pylon for a 21-0 lead with 2:41 left in the first half.

Straight out of the halftime break, UT mixed the run and the pass to perfection, culminating a nine-play, 75-yard drive with an 8-yard scoring toss from Ash to Harris.

Trailing 28-0 in the fourth quarter, North Texas mounted its best drive of the contest, covering 32 yards on 11 plays over 6:29. With the Mean Green offense facing a third-and-5 at the Texas 39, defensive tackle Hassan Ridgeway broke through the line and delivered UT's third sack of the contest, dropping Greer for a 9-yard loss to force UNT's ninth punt.

Texas' shut out bid came to an end with 7:17 left in the fourth. A mishandled UT snap inside the 1-yard line was recovered in the end zone by North Texas cornerback James Jones, cutting the deficit to 28-7.

Keyed by a 34-yard run by D'Onta Foreman, Texas answered back with a 34-yard Rose field goal, marching 53 yards over eight plays while utilizing 2:51 off the clock.

The scoring wasn't yet finalized, however, as a Greer pass across the middle was tipped up in the air. Texas linebacker Cobbs picked the ball off and set sail 28 yards to pay dirt, finalizing UT's 38-7 triumph.
