



Under Rockwood's tutelage, a long list of All-American soccer players has emerged from BYU's program. These athletes include Katie Larkin, Aleisha Rose, Shauna Rohbock, Maren Hendershot, Sara Reading, Andrea Willis and Staci Reynolds. Rohbock, Hendershot, Reading and Reynolds each went on to play in the Women's United Soccer Association.

Prior to becoming the head coach, Rockwood led BYU's highly successful club soccer team for seven years. In that time she amassed an overall record of 128-25-9, and the final two years she took her teams to the Western National Collegiate Club soccer Association (NCCSA) title and placed second in the NCCSA National Championships.

The Lake Oswego, Ore. native was a four-sport athlete in high school playing soccer, softball, basketball and track. After one year at Ricks College (now BYU-Idaho) on a basketball scholarship, she transferred to BYU where she became a four-year starter at center midfield on the Cougars' club soccer team and graduated in finance, business management. Rockwood has also coached the Utah ODP, youth club programs and the high school level.

#### 2010 Season Review

The nationally-recognized BYU women's soccer team finished their 11-year stay in the Mountain West Conference by securing the Championship title with four All-tournament players and the tournament MVP. In her 16th season at the helm of the women's soccer program, head coach Jennifer Rockwood had again lined up a tough schedule for the Cougars. The team would face five Top-25 teams, seven tough conference opponents and five teams that saw action in this year's NCAA Women's College Cup.

The Cougars finished ranked No. 17 in the Soccer Times poll with a 16-3-3 record after going 5-1-1 in conference play and securing their seventh Mountain West Conference Championship title

A tough regular season schedule highlighted this year's team with four Top 25-ranked opponents and four teams that made an appearance in the postseason NCAA tournament.

The Cougars started the season with back-to-back shutouts against Long Beach State and Cal State Fullerton, a feat they haven't repeated since the 2005 season. Following the two shutouts, the Cougars added six more unbeaten games to secure an 8-game unbeaten streak to start the season. Included in that streak were wins over then-ranked No. 14 Northwestern and No. 21 Washington State.

BYU's first loss of the season came at No. 20 Texas in a 0-1 close game. Two more wins over Utah State and Idaho State in non-conference play rounded out the regular season.

The Cougars had already scored 25 goals entering this year's conference play. Last year BYU had netted 17 goals when they were preparing for league action. Payne received two more honors after her outstanding freshman season. From Soccer America, she was named to the All-Freshman Team for 2009 and from TopDrawerSoccer, she was named to the Freshman Team of the Season.

Lisonbee was named to TopDrawerSoccer's Freshman Second team of the Season with Willis being named to the Honorable Mention Team of the Season.

The conference race would prove to be more of a challenge than last year with San Diego State and New Mexico working hard to keep up with the Cougars. To kick off league play, a 4-1 victory over the Wyoming Cowgirls let the conference know that BYU meant business this season.

Two more victories over Air Force and TCU set the stage for a match-up between the then No. 25-ranked New Mexico Lobos and No. 8-ranked Cougars in Albuquerque. A double overtime 0-1 loss for BYU was just their second drop of the season.

After their first four conference games, the Cougars were tied with San Diego State for second place in the MWC race with New Mexico leading the pack. The Cougars rounded out the rest of conference action with a tie against UNLV, a shutout win over San Diego State and a 2-1 win at Utah.

Unfortunately for BYU, their one loss to New Mexico was just enough to keep them from the regular season conference title as they received second place after the first-ranked Lobos.

Earning themselves an automatic bid into the NCAA Women's College Cup, the Cougars only had to wait to see who their opponent would be and where they would play. They soon learned they would be heading right back to California to play UCLA in Bruin territory for the first round of the tournament.

The Cougars made their sixth straight NCAA tournament appearance, 13th overall, in California.

The Bruins and Cougars proved to be fairly evenly matched teams and played a close game that ended regulation in a 0-0 final.
