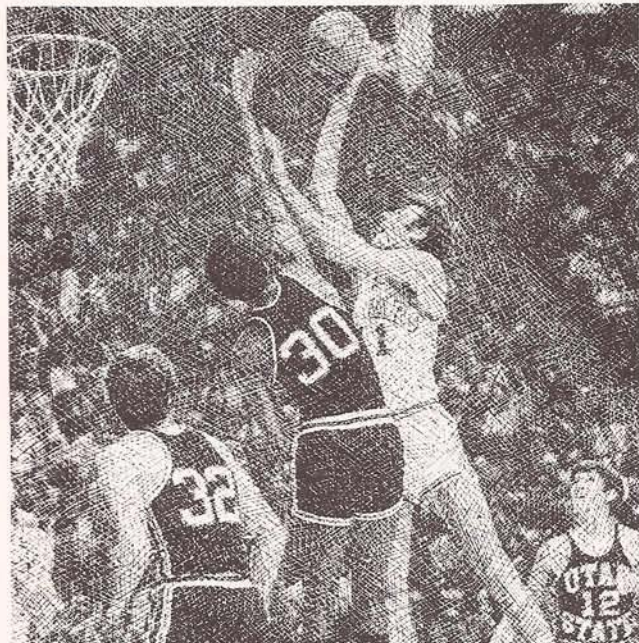

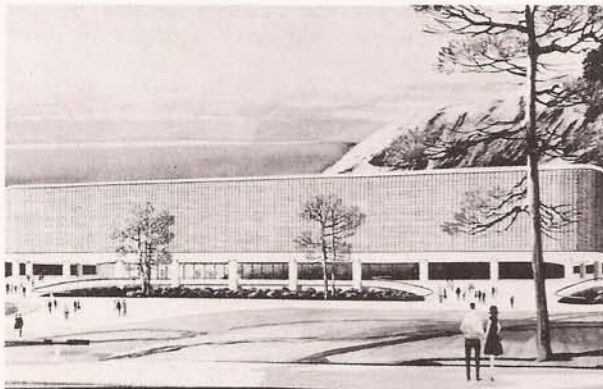

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activities center



Win or lose, the 1971-72 basketball season at Brigham Young University will be a history-making one. It will be remembered as the year the Cougars moved into a new home, the J. Willard Marriott Activities Center. A multipurpose facility (concerts, forums, stage productions, as well as basketball games) is located on the north end of campus, just east of the football stadium.

The new rectangular-shaped facility, which is still under construction at this writing, will be the new home floor for Cougar basketball teams, beginning with the Time Zone Tournament on Dec. 3-4. BYU has invited three teams from other time zones to take part in the opening series: St. Joseph's (Pa.), Kansas State, and Pacific. It will also be the site of the NCAA's Far West basketball playoffs March 16-18, 1972.

When completed, the building will be the largest arena of its kind in the United States, covering about three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet, and will enclose 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height will be ten stories.

Exact seating capacity has not been determined. But the final figure is expected to be between 22-23,000. Included in this figure are more than 10,000 chair seats which will be located on the south side of the floor which runs east-west. The balance of the seating will be bleacher seats. About half of the seating in the building will be below the concourse level, and the remainder above the concourse level.

Entry to the building will be from the four corners where there will be 18 doors for quick entrance on the concourse level. Entrance to the main seating areas will be through 22 portals.

Perhaps the best illustration of the building size is found in the roof. The steel superstructure was put together on ground level, then lifted into place with the use of hydraulic jacks on 38 upright steel columns. The superstructure weighed 4 million pounds,

and it took more than two weeks to raise the roof into place. It was one of the largest undertakings of its kind attempted in the United States.

With the roof in place, the earth inside the building was removed for the sublevel section of the building. Earth movers went down a depth of 35-40 feet.

It is also worth noting that 80 percent of the steel in the building was furnished by U.S. Steel's Geneva Works, which is located just a few miles from the BYU campus.



While the Marriott Activities Center is generally associated with basketball, it should be pointed out that it will be used for a wide variety of cultural events. It is equipped with facilities for such events as pageants, folk dance festival, musicals, spectaculars, extravaganzas, devotionals, forums, commencement exercises, assemblies, and other major events at the University.

One of the advantages of the Marriott Activities Center will be the parking areas in the vicinity of the building. Along with present parking facilities east of the BYU Stadium, north of the Smoot Building and general campus area, there will be an estimated 5,000 parking spaces within 1,500 feet of the new center.

Giant ramps leading to the concourse level of the building will carry the pedestrian flow over one main traffic artery on campus and under another, providing comfortable access to the Center.

The general contractors of the Center, Tolboe Construction Company of Salt Lake City, has been



racing against the clock to get it ready for the December opening. The contract was let in December of 1969, and construction began the following month. But bad weather at a critical stage of building caused a delay of several weeks. As a result, the builders have had to make special efforts to get the building sufficiently along for basketball this season.

Consequently, officials overseeing the project urge the public not to expect too much too soon.

"We have done all we can to get the building ready for the opener," said Sam Brewster, director of the Physical Plant at BYU. "But the public shouldn't expect to find a finished building with completely balanced sound, acoustics and air condition systems at the first event."

Mr. Brewster added that a building that size normally needs nine months to allow for the proper balancing of the complex and intricate systems included in the construction.

Basketball-wise, the building will have four dressing rooms (which will help for tournaments), offices for the coaches, film and classroom, and many other facilities especially designed for the team.

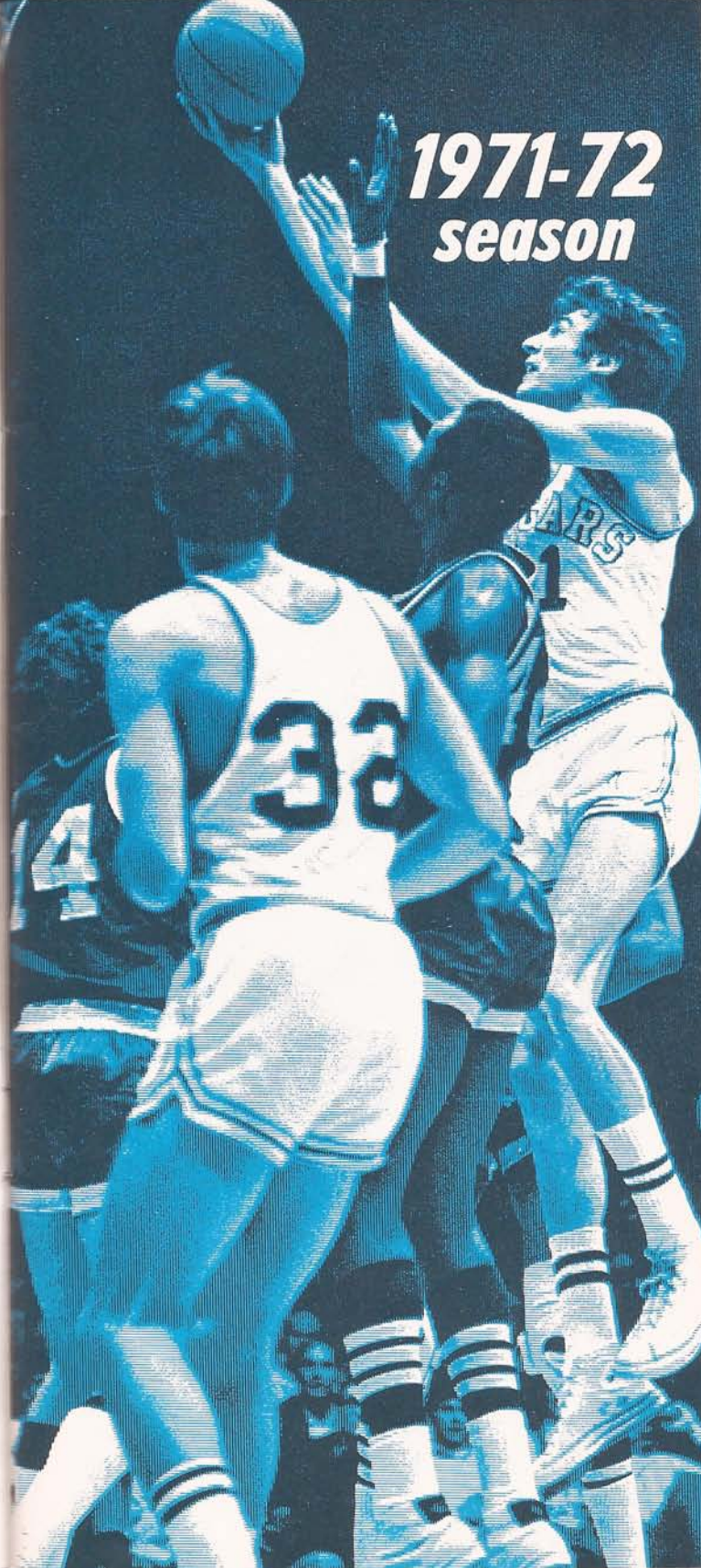


The new campus facility will be named after J. Willard Marriott, prominent LDS Church leader and restaurateur. Mr. Marriott, who is founder and chairman of the board of the Hot Shoppes, Marriott Motor Hotels, and who has extensive industrial and airline food catering services, has donated in excess of a million dollars toward the huge sports and assembly building.

In addition, more than a million dollars is being contributed by the public and supporters of the University. Under the chairmanship of Dr. DaCosta Clark, Provo, a fund raising committee has obtained more than a million dollars to help finance the building. The faculty and staff at the University alone have contributed or pledged one-quarter million dollars. The drive, which was similar to ones used to help finance the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and the BYU Stadium, has been most successful.

As for the old Smith Fieldhouse (1951-71), it is desperately needed for academic and intramural purposes. It will be used for physical education and other types of instruction, and to accommodate the nation's largest intramural program. The Smith Fieldhouse, which has a 10,200 seating capacity, was the scene of BYU's home basketball games for 20 years (1951-1971), all during the tenure of head coach Stan Watts.

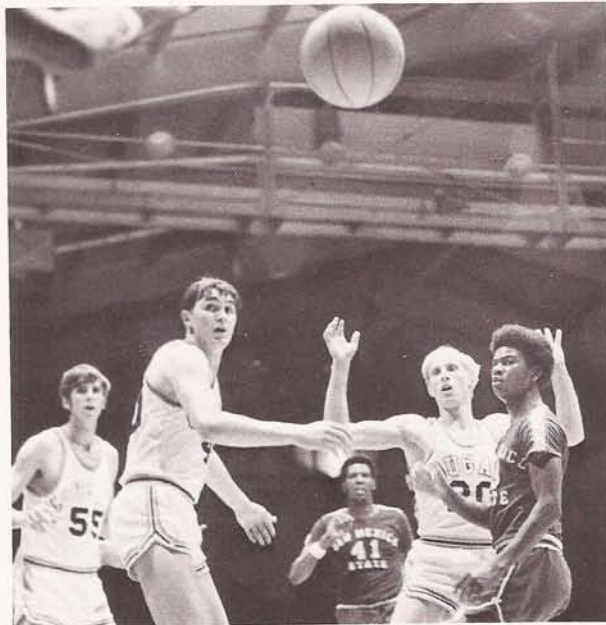

outlook

Even the most pessimistic in the Cougar basketball camp will admit that 1971-72 could be a very big year for BYU basketball, win or lose. After all, eight members from last year's WAC championship team are returning, the list of varsity candidates is the largest in recent years, and the Cougars will move into a new facility that looms as big as BYU's hopes for the season.

But the whole scene, believe it or not, will be approached with a little anxiety. First, it is obvious that the defending champions in the WAC will be everybody's target this winter. Then, too, despite the presence of some new, young talent, Stan and his assistants are concerned about replacements for two departed starters. The team is anxious to come up with the best combination, the best team alignment possible for the season ahead.

When these concerns are isolated for closer examination, it would appear the Cougars have room



to worry. Despite the fact that BYU was WAC champion in '71, the team is not loaded with experienced players. Nine of the 19 players reporting are sophomores, and there are only three seniors on the squad. The main concern, however, is one of replacements for two starters, Steve Kelly and Jim Miller. Kelly, the rubbery 6-5 forward scored more than 500 points last year, and the defensive play on the guard line won't be the same without solemn Jim Miller.

When it's all added up, however, it must be said that these items should be offset by the incoming numbers of players, inexperienced as they may be.

coach stan watts



THE MENTOR IS BACK. . . after a very serious operation toward the end of last season we are happy to announce that Stan is back. Happy, healthy, strong and ready to go.

Entering his 23rd year as the Cougar head mentor, Coach Stan Watts will again direct the BYU basketball program and also head up the athletic department as Chairman of the BYU Department of Athletics—a job that he has done for the past two years.

No stranger to administration, Stan has served as acting chairman of the department, was assistant chairman at the time of his appointment, and has served a term as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1969-70), and still sits on the board.

In his 23 years as head mentor of the Cougar teams, Coach Stan has shaped BYU into a basketball empire, while establishing himself as one of the all-time winningest coaches.

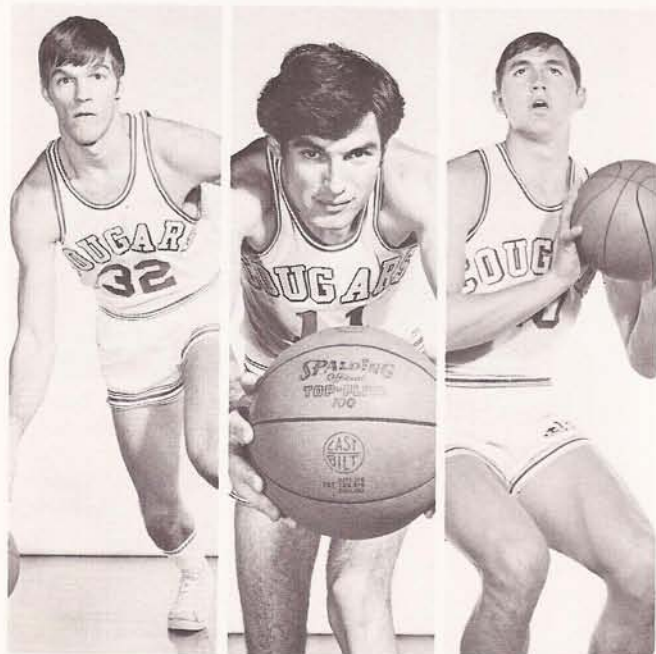
Stan is one of the top 20 basketball coaches in the nation, and his record speaks for itself. After two decades with the Cougar varsity, Watts and his teams have netted two NIT championships (1951 and 1966) and seven conference championships; not to mention 410 victories against 235 defeats while playing some of the best competition in collegiate basketball.

Fortunately for the Cats, the guard line will be deeper this time around. Bernie Fryer, the club's number one scorer, will be joined by a raft of good sophomores, a transfer and a returning letterman, Dave Bailey. Best bet to anchor the vacant position is Belmont Anderson, an agile, smooth-moving sophomore who averaged 17.7 points per game. Last year's frosh also had two great guards in Doug Richards (16.8) and Grig Clawson (13.5).

True, the forward line won't be the same without Kelly, but there are four lettermen, a transfer and two sophomores listed at that position. A two-year regular, Phil Tollestrup (11.5 points per game) is back. Finnish star Kalevi Sarkalahti (6-8) is back as a junior, along with Clyde Baker (6-7) and Craig Jorgensen (6-8). The transfer is Brian Ambrozich (6-6) from Gold West J.C., who averaged 19 rebounds per game last year.

On paper the center position looks formidable. Kresimir Cosic, the 6-11 Yugoslavian who made All-WAC as a sophomore, seems to get better with each game. He led the team in rebounding (12.6) and ended with a 15.0 average, not to mention a bundle of assists. Jay Bunker (6-8) can play either forward or center. In addition, the Cougars have two sophomores, Fred Petty (6-11) and Steve Lackey (7-0), for backup help. Lackey and Petty both need experience. Lackey had a 16.4 scoring average and an 8.5 rebounding average with the frosh.

On paper it looks good. But transferring it from there to the playing floor may be something else again.

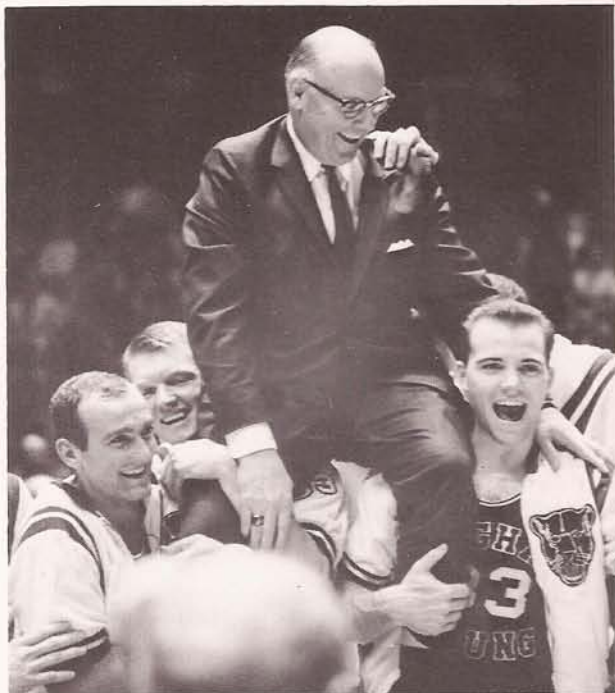

Against WAC competition, considered among the country's best conferences, Stan has a 57-41 record, for a .582 percentage, which is among the top in the WAC. El Paso holds a slight edge after two years of competition with a 19-9 record, and a .679 percentage.

To know the man and his accomplishments, one must go back to 1949, the year he took over at BYU. The Cougars were regarded as a good basketball school at the time, but it wasn't until Stan took the helm that they won a national tournament. His colorful, fast-break basketball shaped a basketball tradition that is known far and wide today.

In 1951 Stan opened the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse, and now 20 years later, Stan will open the new Marriott Activities Center.



TOURS

Part of the fame abroad has come as a result of the team's several tours. While Watts has been the head coach, the Cougars have made three extended tours overseas. The first trip was made in 1950, the year the Cougars toured South America, came back and won the NIT. BYU returned to Central and South America in 1965, playing some of the best teams to be found in the Latin American countries. The summer of 1967 found the team making an extended tour through the Orient-Pacific. Consequently, the BYU Cougar (or Puma, as it is known in South America) is often identified by fans on foreign courts.

Stan grew up in Murray, a small community just outside of Salt Lake City. An all-around athlete at Murray High, he attended Weber State before enrolling at BYU for junior and senior years. Stan won honors in three sports with the Cougars and graduated in 1938.

Continuing his endeavors along the athletic lines, Stan began his coaching career at Millard High, where he was head coach in three sports. From Millard he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He returned to the high school ranks in 1945 as head coach at Jordan High. Two years later he joined the staff as an assistant coach at BYU. In his early years at BYU he served as head baseball coach, assistant football coach, and track coach. When the basketball post opened at BYU in 1949, Stan was everyone's choice.

SCHEDULE

Stan handpicks his own schedule, and year after year his teams have faced the elite in collegiate basketball. In addition, his teams have played in practically all major tournaments in the country.

Besides coaching, Watts has done very well as a lecturer and author. His book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball," has sold well since its publication in 1959. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and periodicals on the subject of basketball.

Stan and his wife, the former Emily Kelly have been married more than 30 years. They have four children: Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones), Susan (Mrs. Richard Coon), Judy, and Howard.

In his eighth year as Coach Watts' right-hand man, Alan "Pete" Witbeck starts the 1971-72 basketball campaign with hopes of helping the Cougars to another successful season.

Hired initially as a scout for the varsity, Pete joined the BYU faculty in the College of Physical Education in 1955, after obtaining his master's degree from BYU.

Witbeck began scouting for Coach Watts in the late 50s, and was soon after named freshman basketball coach. For several years the frosh teams, under Witbeck, enjoyed unusual success. His last three freshman teams had a combined record of 38-3. His 1964 squad included such players as Craig Raymond, Neil Roberts, Gary Hill, and Jim Jimas, and they averaged 109 points in winning all 14 games.

The following year found Pete joining the Cougar varsity as assistant coach. He thus has moved up the coaching ladder very rapidly and is highly respected in the profession.

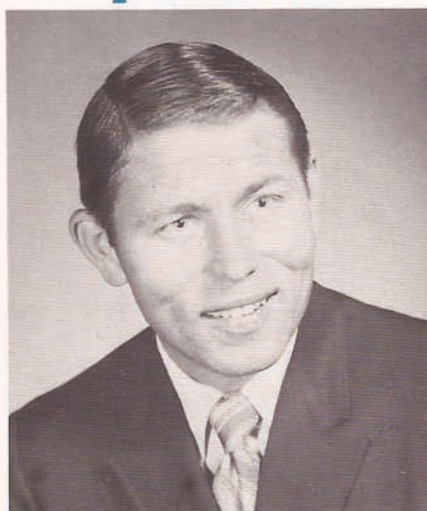
Serving as top recruiter and scout, amongst his other duties, Pete works at his assignments. In 1965 he traveled about 100,000 miles, scouting and recruiting, including a 25,000-mile expedition into South and Central America with the Cougars. Pete improved on that mark in 1967, covering 30,000 miles while touring the Orient-Pacific with the varsity.

As an outstanding paddleball player, Witbeck is able to stay in good condition throughout the year.

A native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, Witbeck was a distance runner for the Cougar track teams of 1950-52. He lettered for three years in the mile and two-mile.

Coach Witbeck is married to the former Kathy Marshall, and they have two children: Jill (10) and Von (3).

potter



The 1971-72 basketball season finds Glenn Potter in his second year at Cougarville.

Hired last year to fill the role as a defensive specialist, Glenn did just that—and with great results.

In his first year at BYU, Potter concentrated his efforts on the Cougar's defensive game, as well as scouting, recruiting, and other general duties of an assistant.

Coach Potter came to BYU from Nebraska where he served as assistant to head coach Joe Cipriano since 1963.

Glenn and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as an assistant at Idaho while working on his master's degree in secondary education.

Upon arrival at the University of Nebraska in '63, as an assistant, Potter helped shape Nebraska into a winning team (something they had not had there for thirteen years). During the past five seasons, the Cornhuskers set a respectable 80-46 win-loss record.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, graduating in 1960. After completing his eligibility, he coached for one season of freshman basketball at Idaho.

For two years Potter served in the U.S. Army. There he coached the 1962-63 Ft. Hood (Tex.) team to an outstanding 56-10 season.

Glenn is married to the former Mary Beckstead, and they have four children: Lori (10), Steven (8), Jennifer (6), and Cindy (3).

leishman



Although just two seasons behind him, already freshman coach Courtney Leishman has established himself in the winning tradition.

In his first two seasons as the head frosh mentor Leishman has an impressive record of 27 wins against only nine losses.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High in Idaho. During his three-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small student body.

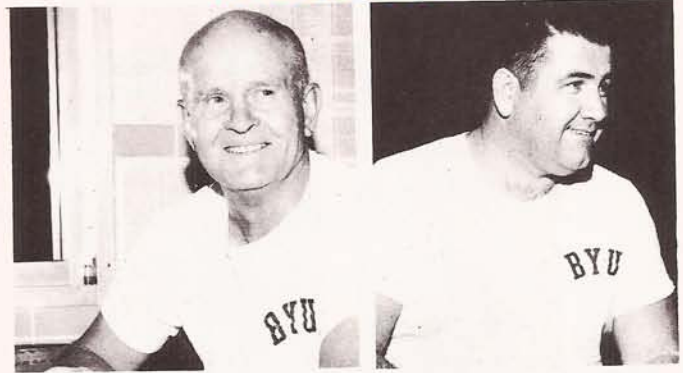
With Leishman at the helm in 1963, BY High won the state class "B" championship, posting a 10-0 record on a regional level and a 22-2 overall mark. His overall basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

Courtney's responsibilities with the freshmen are great, as the strength of the varsity in years to come depends largely on the strengths of the frosh.

Leishman was recently called as a church bishop of the BYU 16th Ward.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1950. He is married to the former Virginia "Pat" Humphreys, and they have three children: Kathy Lee (13), Jearlene (10), and Mike (4).

DR. DALLIN H. OAKS, President

Brigham Young University's new president is 39-year-old Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who assumed office Aug. 1, 1971. President Oaks, former professor of law at University of Chicago, replaces Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who served as president of BYU for a period of 20 years (1951-1971).

President Oaks was born in Provo, Utah (Aug. 12, 1932) a son of the late Dr. Lloyd E. Oaks and Stella H. Oaks. He graduated from BYU in 1954 with high honors, receiving the B.A. degree in accounting and economics. At University of Chicago Law School he received the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1957, graduating cum laude, second in a class of 86, and was named to the Order of the Coif. He was also editor-in-chief of the University's Law Review in 1956-57.

He began an illustrious legal career as law clerk to the Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. A year later he entered private law practice in Chicago (Kirtland, Ellis, Hodson, Chaffetz and Masters). In 1961 he became associate professor of law at Chicago University, and was associate dean from May 1962 to January 1963, serving as dean during the last three months of this period. He was also Assistant States Attorney of Cook County (1964) and visiting professor of law at University of Michigan Law School (1968).

From January through June 1970 he was on leave of absence to serve as legal and research adviser to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention. He became executive director of the American Bar Foundation (1970).

President Oaks has been co-editor, co-author, or

author of four books dealing with subjects of church and state, trust law, operation of criminal courts in Chicago. He has also authored about 30 articles in leading periodicals and other magazines.

An active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served as first counselor in the presidency of the Chicago Stake (district) and was formerly mission president in Chicago Stake.

He married June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah, and they have five children: Sharmon, Cheri, Lloyd, Dallin and TruAnn. The eldest daughter, Sharmon, is a freshman at BYU this fall.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

The key administrator and planner in BYU's recent athletic growth is Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the College of Physical Education at BYU. A powerful force in the shaping of the Cougar sports program, "Milt" has also filled a number of key administrative assignments on the national level with the NCAA. . . . born Feb. 26, 1907 in Downey, Idaho . . . graduated from Downey High . . . attended Idaho State, obtained his B.S. degree from Utah State in 1930 . . . served as coach and teacher at Grace, Idaho (1930-36), then as principal at Grace (1936-44) . . . earned his M.Ed. at Utah State (1939) . . . superintendent of Grace schools (1948-52), then superintendent of Pocatello schools (1952-54) . . . obtained Ed.D. at UCLA in 1956 . . . was appointed dean at BYU in 1956 . . . also became BYU faculty adviser (1956-62), then faculty representative (1962-) . . . was chosen professor of the year at BYU (1963) . . . has completed numerous professional appointments in professional, civic and church organizations . . . former stake president of Bannock Stake in Grace, Idaho (1944-52) . . . was also a member of three NCAA committees . . . married Virgil Burrup Mar. 27, 1928, and they have four children: Mrs. Max (Lois) Morrill, Mrs. Ted (Bonnie) Simons, Richard and Kip.

1970-71 review

There was a time in early December when it appeared the Cougars would be lucky to improve on last year's record (8-18). BYU had just finished a three-game road trip on the West Coast, and they had lost all three (to USC by 36, to Oregon State and Seattle by 19 points). But all three defeats came before the Cougars had a chance to jell and while they still looked like a sixth-place bet (WAC poll).

Then, sparked by forward Steve Kelly and guard Bernie Fryer, BYU cut loose on a five-game winning streak. The Cats beat Denver by 28, romped over Utah State by the same margin, then headed for the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu. Moving into the semi-finals of the tourney, the Cougars upset nationally ranked Villanova, 102-93, in overtime. In the finals, however, BYU lost to a strong Hawaii team, 94-90.

Returning home for the start of Western Athletic Conference wars, they defeated New Mexico on the

road, but lost a two-pointer to UTEP. Then things started to turn sour as the Cougars dropped three in a row; a two-pointer against USC at Logan, a one-pointer on a last-second desperation shot at Arizona State, and a five-pointer to Arizona. At this juncture things didn't look too bright; the squad held a so-so, 3-3 record in conference games played.

The date at that point in the season was January 30th. From that date on the Cougars, with great teamwork and a balanced attack, went on to win eight out of their last eleven games, including the WAC championship game with Utah in Salt Lake City and a first-round NCAA playoff game with Utah State at Logan, before losing to eventual NCAA



champion UCLA and Pacific in the NCAA Far Western regional playoffs in Salt Lake City. The Cougars ended a very successful season with a record 18-11.

Looking back over the season, it would be hard to single out any one player as the dominating force in the Cougars' success (though Kresimir Cosic was an all-WAC first team selection, with Bernie Fryer and Steve Kelly winning honorable mention), as the Cougars had no less than six players who scored 25 or more points in a single game at one time or another in the season.

In the absence of Coach Watts, who underwent surgery in the latter part of the season, assistants Glenn Potter and Pete Witbeck produced some effective strategy and game plans. Potter worked with defense, while Witbeck concentrated on the offense. The net result was another plus-factor in the Cougars' successful season.

Some credit should be given the Cougar bench. Although it was rather evident that the first five (Fryer, Miller, Cosic, Kelly and Tollestrup) had things pretty well nailed down, others responded well when called upon. Jay Bunker, the Cougars' "sixth man," for example, was a great backup player at center or forward. Jay, who was a 6-8 sophomore, scored 27 points and had 17 rebounds in the upset of Villanova.

This year's success is also due in part to the fact that not much was expected of the Cougars this past season. The WAC poll taken before the season got underway had BYU in sixth place. Thus their conquest of the Conference championship, their upsets of nationally-ranked teams, plus 4-1 record against in-state rivals is all the more amazing.

All-in-all, looking back, it was a good season.
