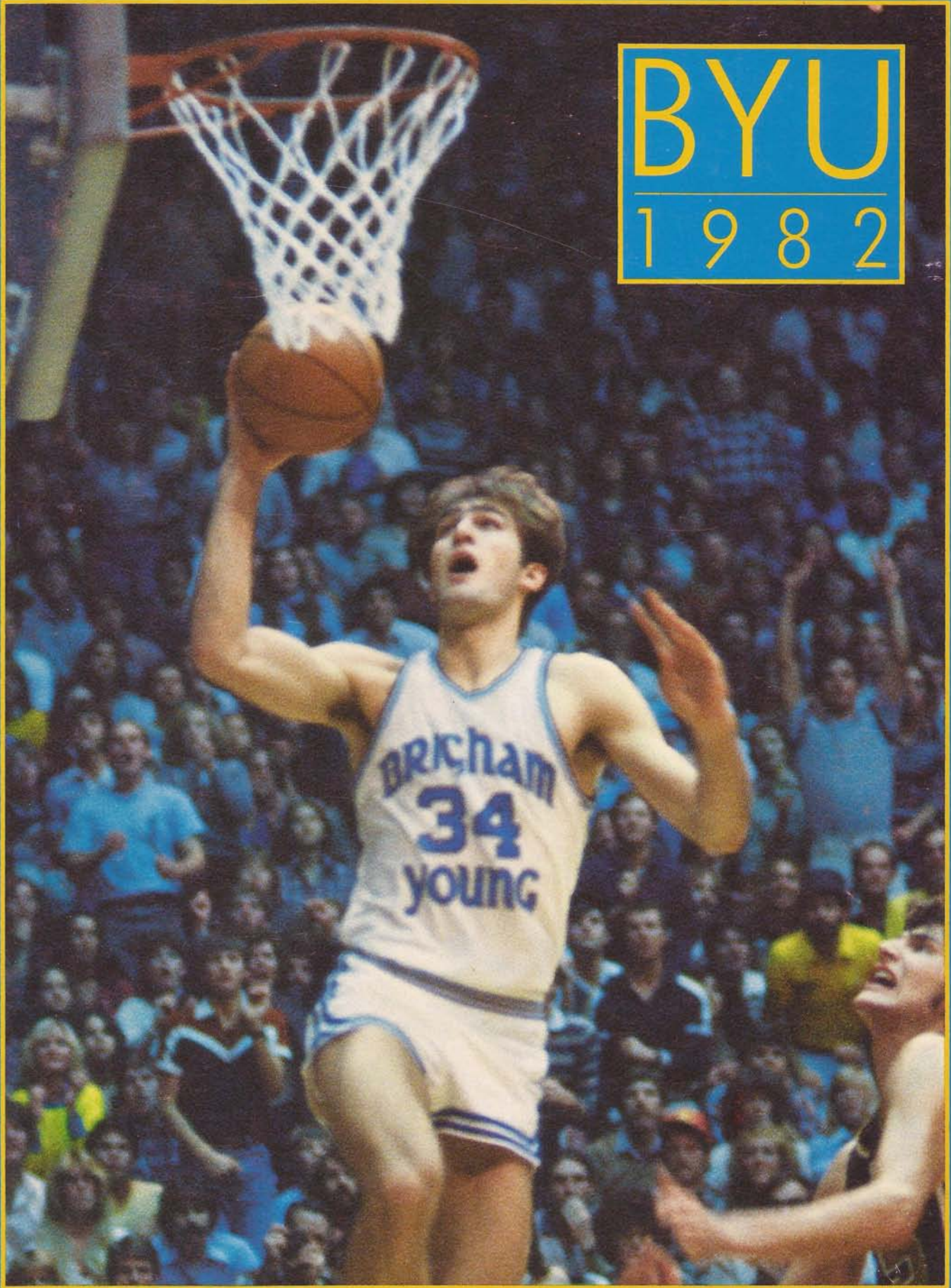

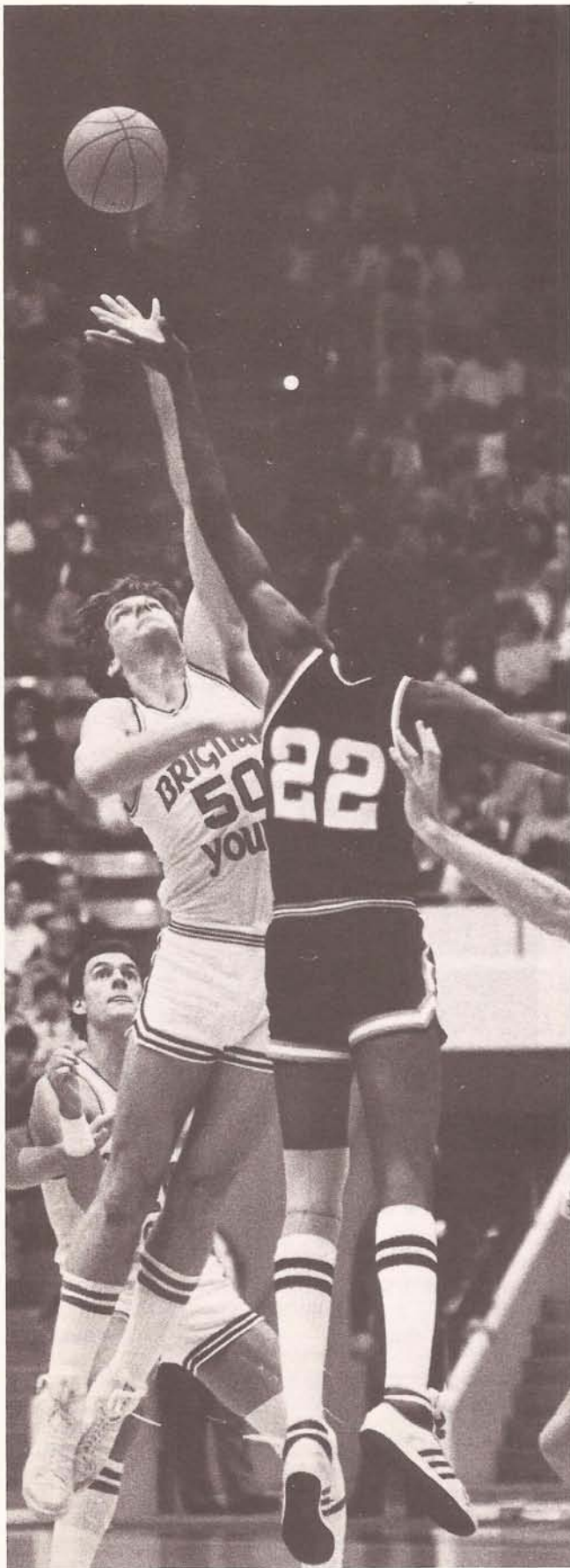

The Marriott Center

The largest on-campus arena in the nation has proven too small at times to house the enthusiastic supporters of Cougar basketball. In fact, "sold out" is a frequently used phrase in the Marriott Center Ticket Office.

Over 2,300,000 fans have enjoyed BYU's basketball games for the past 10 years in the confines of one of the best basketball arenas in the country. The Marriott Center's seating capacity is listed at 22,700, but crowds as large as 23,106 have filled the MAC to watch the Cougars' "run and gun" style of basketball.

Last year's season average of 22,506 per game was a school record, eclipsing the mark of 21,818 set during the 1971-72 season. Over 300,000 fans viewed 14 home games in 1979-80 to set a school record for total attendance.

For years, basketball has been *the* sport at BYU and in the state of Utah. In fact, Utah has led the nation in per capita attendance and the WAC is always near the top in overall attendance, topping the one million mark for the past six seasons.

In its planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus as pos-

sible; it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977 and 1979, the Marriott Center has served as the host for the NCAA Far West regional playoffs.

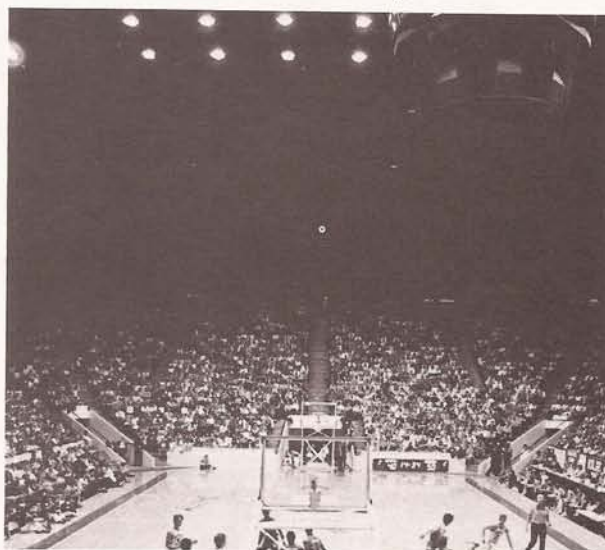
Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

Brigham Young University

Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet

the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

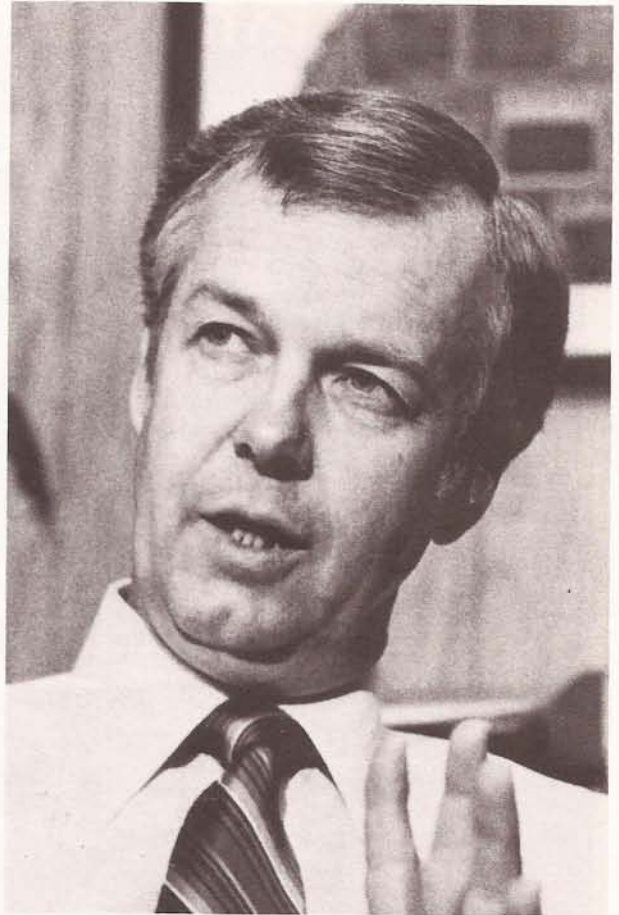
Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

Arnold Answers

Questions on 1981-82 Team



1. What will the loss of Danny Ainge mean to the BYU program?

Very obviously the loss of such a great athlete would be a negative factor for any athletic team. I have always felt, however, that once a fine athlete has an opportunity to play a significant amount of time, he will contribute to the program. That, of course, is the opportunity our young players now have with the graduation of both Danny Ainge and Steve Craig.

2. Will the experience of all of the forecourt starters returning offset the graduation of the backcourt starters?

The experience of our forecourt starters is a plus for our program. I feel we will have one of the biggest, and one of the finest frontcourts in America this year. The question is how quickly the young, inexperienced guards will develop. I expect that we may take some lumps during the December part of our schedule, but by the time the WAC season rolls around, we should be a very solid basketball team.

3. How does Fred Roberts compare with the forwards you have coached?

I have said for the last three years that Fred Roberts will be one of the very finest college forwards in America by the time he is a senior. I feel that even more strongly today. I have compared, and continue to compare him, with UCLA's former All-American, Dave Meyers. They are the same kind of player, but Fred is a little bit bigger and I feel a little better shooter. It is my candid opinion that Fred Roberts is a legitimate All-American and will be a first-round draft choice if he continues to dedicate himself to the game and work hard to improve.

4. Will BYU continue its fast moving offensive attack?

Our style of play will change very little. We will employ as best as we possibly can the fastbreak and the quick strike offensive attack. It's very probable that we will spend a little bit more time with the inside game but the guards we have this year are probably better outside shooters with better range than we had last year.

5. How do you expect the new recruits to help this year's team?

I am very pleased with our new recruits. We are sorry, of course, that Paul Drecksel had to have surgery on his back and will be out for the season. But Von Alleman, Scott Sinek and Bob Capener are all three fine prospects and we expect in time for each of them to have a very fine career at BYU.

6. Can last year's NCAA post-season experience help BYU this season?

The post-season experience should obviously help those returning players, but I cannot see where it will be of any value to our new players. Fine athletic performance, however, I feel is contagious and the confidence that our veterans obtained from the post-season play hopefully will rub off to our youngsters.

7. What are BYU's chances to regain the WAC championship, and which teams will be the contenders?

Last year the WAC conference had probably more outstanding basketball players than any other conference in America. We have lost Ainge, Vranes, Chambers, Bradley and Page who are all, in their own right, superstars. As I indicated, very few conferences had that kind of ability. I think the conference might be down a little bit as far as individual players are concerned. Overall, our conference will be much closer as far as team ability levels are concerned. I expect it to be a tighter race than ever before. Our chances are as good as anyone. I would imagine that Wyoming, New Mexico, San Diego, Hawaii and Colorado State have all made vast improvements. UTEP, Utah and BYU have probably lost the most with Air Force being a question mark to me at this particular time.

8. Which players have progressed the most in the off-season?

I would expect that our fans would see Greg Kite and Fred Roberts making the greatest improvement from the past season. They will also be quite impressed, I am sure, with Greg Ballif's playing.

9. Who do you anticipate will take over Danny Ainge's leadership role?

We have asked Fred Roberts to be our team captain this year. He is not only an outstanding basketball player, but an outstanding young man. Each player leads in a different way and Fred has always been one of our most fierce competitors. Our other players admire and respect him, and I'm sure that this competitive attitude will be contagious.

10. What effect will the off-season tournaments have on the four players who participated in them?

I would imagine that the experience Fred Roberts had in Yugoslavia and Romania will be of significant value to him. The fact that Scott Sinek spent a couple of weeks at the National Sports Festival in Syracuse certainly has to help his confidence in playing major college basketball. The experience that Greg Kite and Steve Trumbo had in Mexico City will probably not be too significant. Steve played in only one game before becoming ill. Greg, on the other hand, played about twenty-minutes a game (sharing time with USF's 7' center, Wallace Bryant). Any experience against that kind of competition has got to be considered a plus.

11. Evaluate BYU's early, strong schedule (i.e., Virginia, UCLA, Oregon St.) in relationship to the strength of the Cougars.

The early season schedule this year is probably the toughest that BYU has ever had. Our first five games are all against outstanding basketball teams who have been traditional powers. Virginia and Oregon State, of course, were both ranked number one on occasion last year. UCLA's basketball reputation needs no elaboration. Fans will remember Cal-State Fullerton's great showing in the NCAA tournament a couple of years ago. This year they have four redshirts ready to play which will make them a truly outstanding team. Las Vegas has far more talent than last year.

1981-82 Outlook

Making a fitting stand against a formidable schedule of opponents is the challenge of seventh-year BYU Coach Frank Arnold and his 1981-82 cage crew.

To tangle with the likes of Virginia, UCLA, Oregon State, Princeton, and a rigorous instate and conference schedule, Arnold has engaged the services of nine returning lettermen and three newcomers. Despite losing one of the best backcourts in collegiate basketball last year led by All-American Danny Ainge, BYU returns other proven warriors.

The starting front court from last season's 25-7 team is back for another sojourn. Senior forwards Fred Roberts, Steve Trumbo and junior center Greg Kite were tabbed as one of the biggest among collegiate ranks at 6-10, 6-8, and 6-11, respectively.

Roberts has been a three-year starter and is the only first-team All-Western Athletic Conference returnee in the league. The Utah product has traveled extensively internationally and could assume the scoring and leadership roles left open by Ainge.

Trumbo was a reserve his first two years when the Cougars failed to advance past the first round of NCAA post-season play. However, last year Trumbo was the leading rebounder for the Cougars as they advanced through the "sweet sixteen" to the "elite eight."

Kite had several games with a handful of blocked shots in each contest that testify he will again be an intimidating force. Personnel to spell Kite for rests may be a problem this year.

Four previous redshirts figure in the plans of this

year's squad, too. Greg Ballif, Mike Maxwell, Craig Christensen and Kevin Nielsen all have redshirted at one time or other, with Christensen and Nielsen also having served missions.

Ballif will have a strong opportunity to claim one of the open guard spots. The 6-3 senior has come through in the clutch in several BYU games with his long-range bombing. Ballif's running mate in the backcourt could be one of several.

If Maxwell does not respond after last year's knee surgery, then another knee patient, Craig Christensen, could step in. Both Maxwell and Christensen have not seen too much playing time in their varsity careers at BYU.

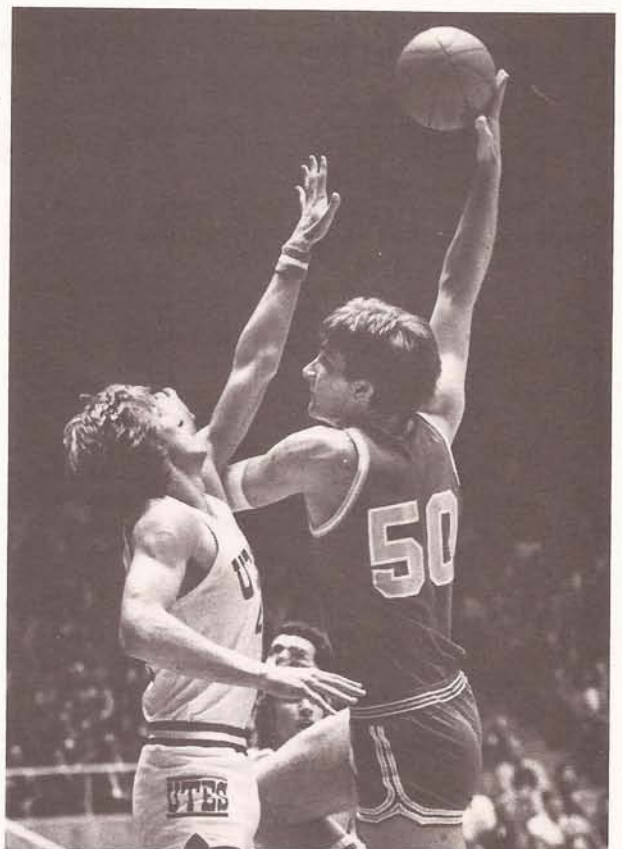
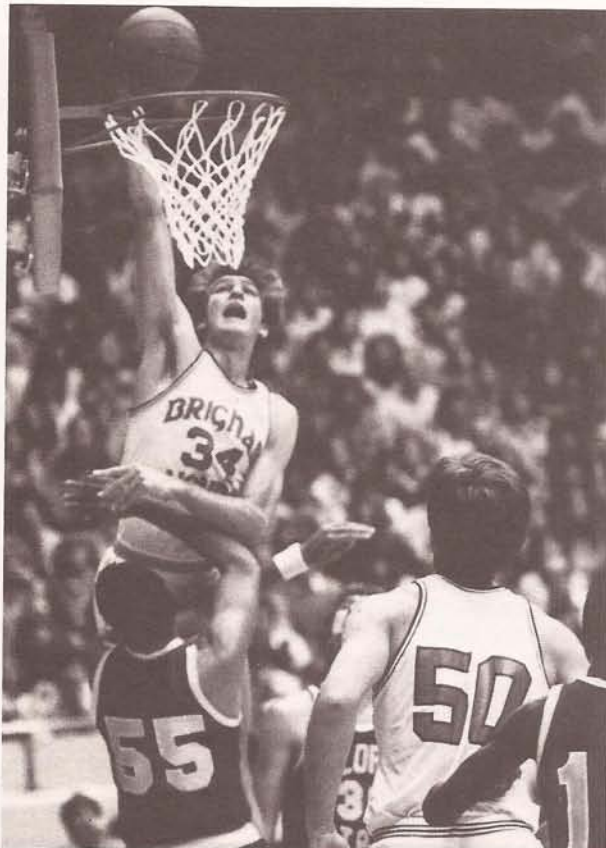
Freshmen Scott Sinek and Bob Capener are also candidates at guard.

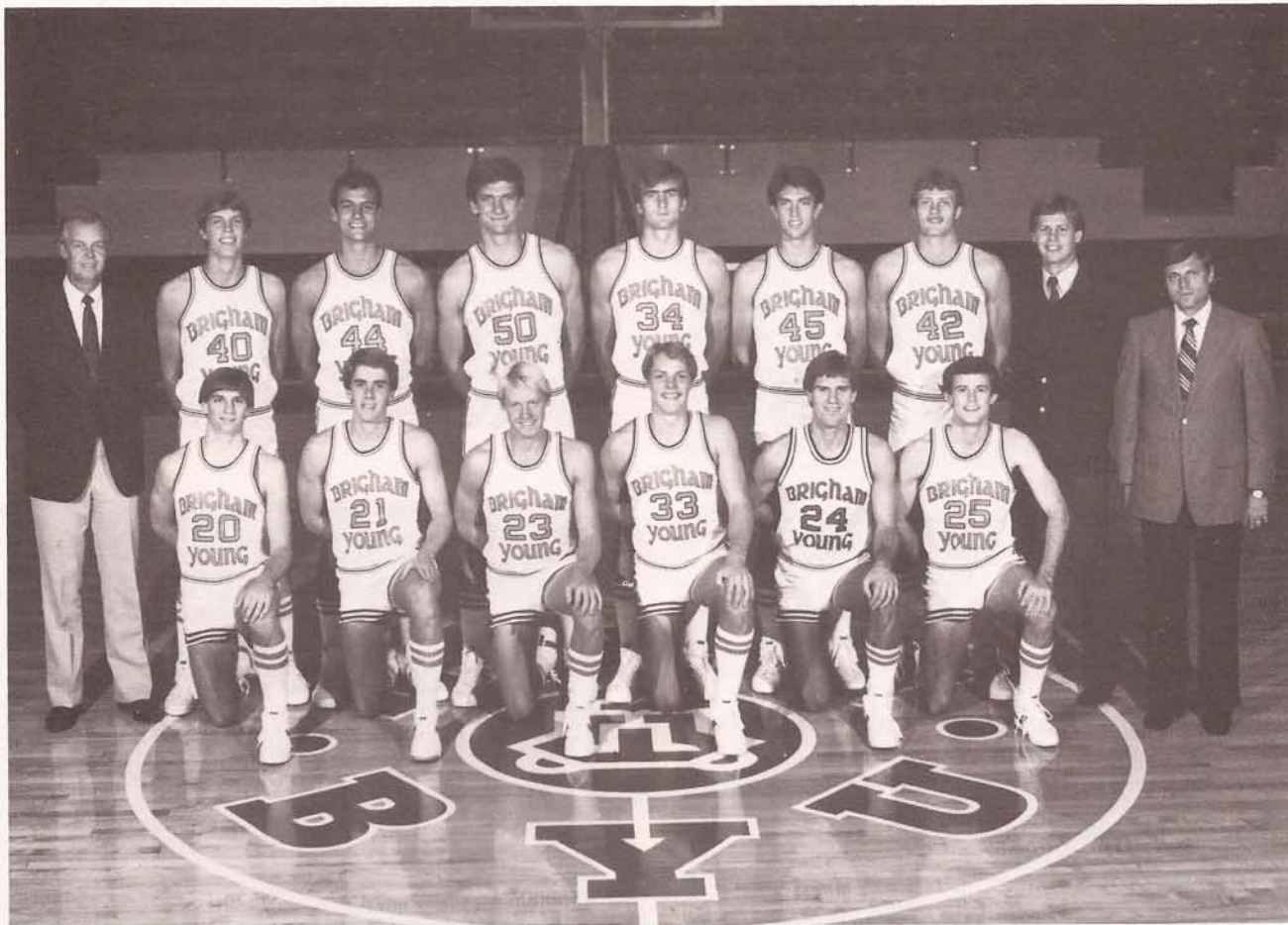
If sophomore Timo Saarelainen is ready at the conclusion of his probation period, he could figure in the guard spot.

Saarelainen and junior Gary Furniss likely will provide the best backup help in the forward slots, both having done so in an adequate role last season. Freshman Von Alleman and Nielsen also provide added depth in the front court.

The Cougars will not be participating in any holiday tournaments other than their own Cougar Classic. BYU has won five of the seven Cougar Classics.

With the BYU Marriott Center approaching another sellout season, plus three consecutive 20-win seasons, anticipation is high again.

Head Coach Frank Arnold

**105-67 Record
Seventh Year
(Idaho State '56)**

With a 105-67 record to his credit, seventh-year head coach Frank Arnold now ranks third on the list of BYU coaches with the most wins. His .610 winning percentage also ranks among the best of previous Cougar coaches.

BYU's basketball program has again risen to national prominence under Arnold's tutorship. The Cougars have amassed three consecutive 20-victory seasons and three straight trips to the NCAA tournament. Last year's squad nationally ranked all season and reached the finals of the Eastern Regionals before losing to Virginia.

Arnold, 48, was an assistant coach under John Wooden at UCLA before coming to BYU in 1976. He is well known for his technical knowledge of the game, his broad coaching background, and his dedication to the game.

His basketball knowledge has been shared in clinics conducted in such countries as China, Italy, Spain, Canada, Yugoslavia and, most recently, Venezuela. The China tour was with the U.S. All-Star team in 1979. He also conducts camps and clinics during the summer months in Provo.



Besides being a proficient coach, Arnold has authored a technical book on man-to-man defense and an autobiography entitled *Rise and Shout*. Honors given Arnold include being selected Coach-of-the-Year in the Western Athletic Conference for both 1979 and 1980 by *Basketball Weekly*. He was also selected Coach-of-the-Year by WAC coaches and athletic directors in 1980.

As an assistant at UCLA from 1971-75, Arnold was a part of three NCAA championships. While with the Bruins, he was responsible for much of the recruiting and scouting and was in charge of the junior varsity program.

Although Frank has altered some of his philosophies since coaching in the WAC, a lot of his ideas remain the same.

"I set forth three criteria for an athlete: outstanding ability, a sincere desire to get a degree, and fine citizenship."

Born October 1, 1934 in Ogden, Utah, Arnold graduated from Pocatello High School in 1952 and then graduated from Idaho State University in 1956. His first coaching job came at Payette, Idaho, in 1956-57. Arnold then accepted the head coaching job at Provo's B.Y. High in 1958 and began work on his master's degree. He obtained his master's in physical education in 1960 and coached at the BYU laboratory school through 1962.

Arnold began serving as a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon in 1962-63, working on his doctorate. He then accepted the head coaching job at Pocatello High for 1963-64.

In 1964 he took over as the head basketball coach at Clark Junior College in Vancouver, Wash., where he remained until 1966. From 1966-71, he served as an assistant basketball coach at Oregon before he began coaching at UCLA in 1971.

Elected to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Board of Directors in July 1980 and is currently acting chairman of the NABC Officials Committee. Also elected to ABA USA Men's Games Committee as one of a five-man player selection committee for all U.S. international competition (i.e. Pan American and Olympic Games). The last two summers he has participated as a member of a special sub-committee of the NCAA Recruiting Committee to review proposed recruiting legislation.

Arnold is married to the former Bee Wright of Provo. She obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees from BYU and is a former faculty member of the College of Family Living. Frank and Bee have five children: Kelley (21 and a junior at BYU), Kristyn (19 and a sophomore at BYU), Kipline (16), Gibson (13) and Kaline (9).

Now in his fourth year as a member of the Cougar basketball staff, Roger Reid, a 34-year old graduate of Weber State ('68) was named assistant coach during the 1978-79 BYU season.

Reid had coached at Clearfield High since 1974.

He is in his second year as chairman of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. This past summer he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville (Utah) High School where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South All-Star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU where he was a member of the freshman basketball team and also made the trip to Mexico City with the Cougar baseball team.

Transferring to College of Eastern Utah, Reid was selected as the MVP on the school's baseball team and twice was named to the Junior College All-America team in baseball.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years.

Reid spent four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26, and the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years.

Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, his teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons; Randy, 11; Robbie, 7; and Darren, 2.

The newest member of Frank Arnold's full-time staff is Carl "Rags" Ingersoll who was appointed to succeed Harry Anderson at the beginning of this season.

Ingersoll, 48, is a veteran of several successful high school teams in Utah prep circles. Last season he served as BYU's graduate teaching assistant.

His last post on the high school level was at Alta (Sandy, Utah) where he was head coach in 1980. However, Carl is best noted for his eight-year head coaching success at American Fork High.

In his last six years at American Fork, his teams reached the championship round four times, winning the state title twice (1979 and 1976).

Ingersoll was named the Provo Daily Herald Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1979, and also received several awards for his coaching involvement in the Utah Cerebral Palsy Charity program.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he was also an assistant football coach for several seasons.

Carl played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Carl has been involved with Cougar Basketball Camps since 1973 and has also helped in Medalist Clinics.

Carl's father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920s, and at 6-4 was the conference's tallest player.

Carl currently serves as a bishop for the LDS church.

Coach Ingersoll is married to the former Gene Oborn of Payson, Utah. They have seven children—Jeffrey, 25 (married), Jan, 23 (married), Jody, 19 (a statistician for BYU's basketball team), Julis, 18, Jillinda, 13, Jarod, 7, and Jason, 6, in addition to three grandchildren. The Ingersolls live in American Fork.



Danny Ainge

Consensus All-America and the player of the year (Eastman Award) for 1980-81 are among the many honors received by Danny Ainge, now BYU junior varsity coach.

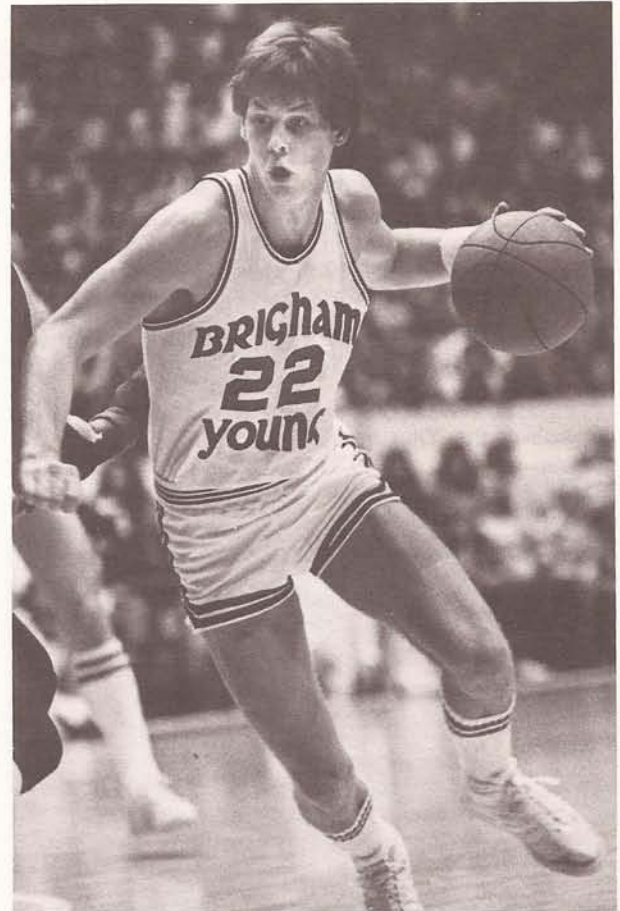
Ainge, 22, has been put in charge of reviving the Cougar junior varsity program which was disbanded following the 1977-78 season.

Ainge was named to eight first-team All-America selections last season, was a two-time first-team Academic All-America, Western Athletic Conference player of the year and a four-time All-WAC selection. He set an NCAA record with 112 consecutive games scoring in double figures and broke eight WAC records.

Ainge is the all-time WAC and BYU scorer with 2,467 points in his four-year career in Provo. While Ainge was playing for the Cougars he doubled as a professional baseball player for the Toronto Blue Jays. Now retired from the Blue Jays, Ainge was the 31st player picked (second round) in the NBA draft by the Boston Celtics.

Ainge was an all-tournament in all but one of the eight holiday tournaments he played in as a Cougar and led BYU to three straight NCAA post-season playoff appearances as well as two WAC championships.

Ainge was a prep All-American in basketball, baseball and football at North Eugene High in Eugene, Oregon. Ainge and his wife Michelle reside in Provo and have a daughter Ashlee, 2, and a newborn son Austin.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

On August 1, 1981, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland completed his first year as president of Brigham Young University. Dr. Holland replaced Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who had served in that position for nine years.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. He served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain from 1960–62. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

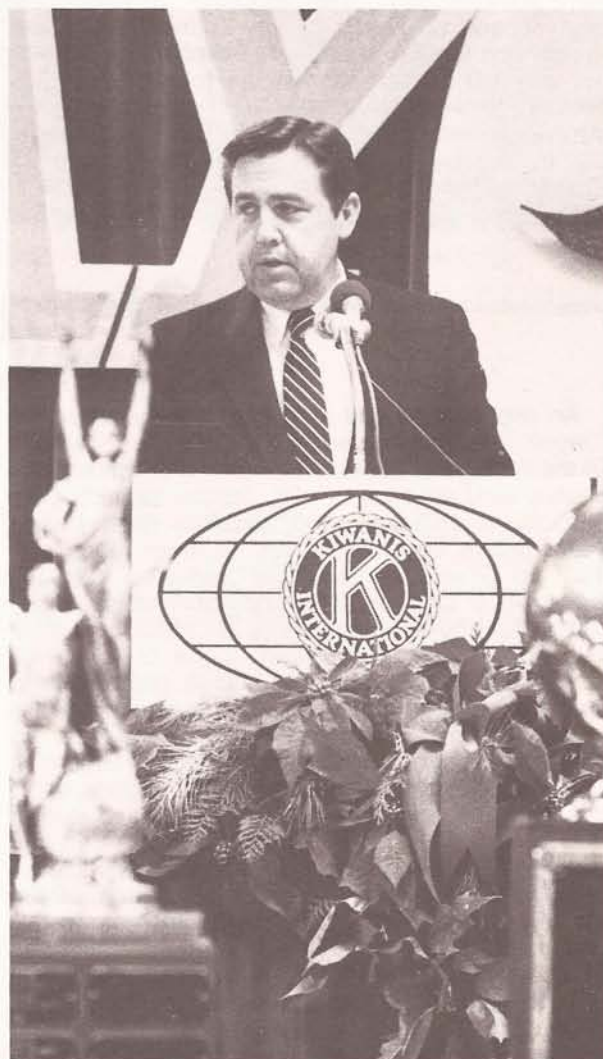
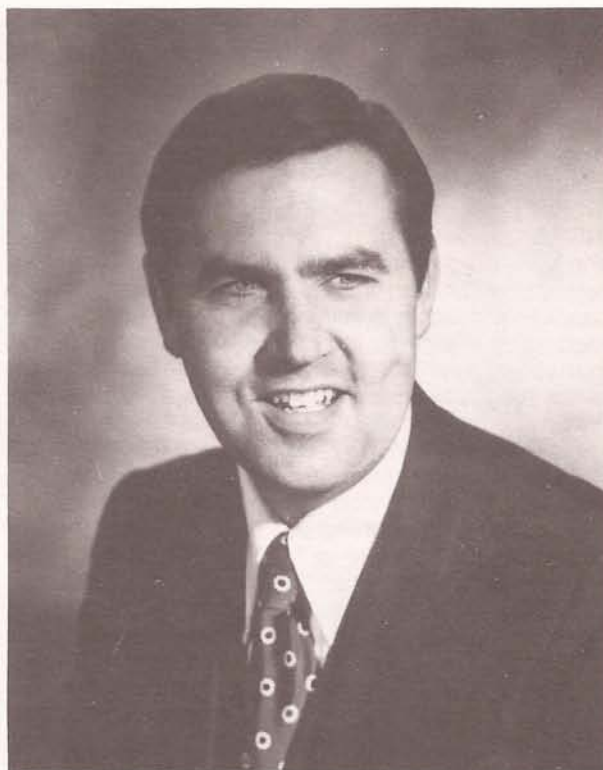
Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland is on the Advisory Board of the National Multiple Sclerosis Read-a-thon Committee and two years ago was chairman of the Scottsdale Conference on Church-Related Higher Education. He is a representative for the LDS Church to the National Congress on Church-Related Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii.

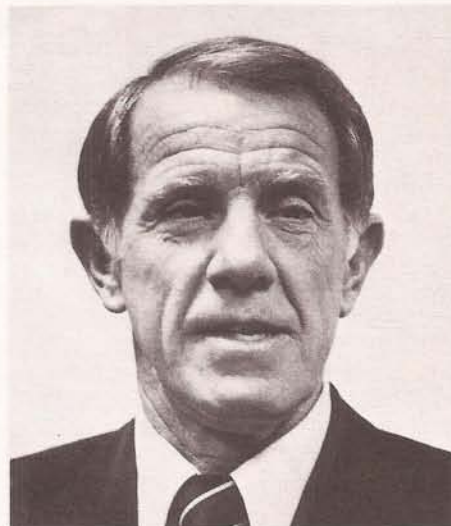
He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.

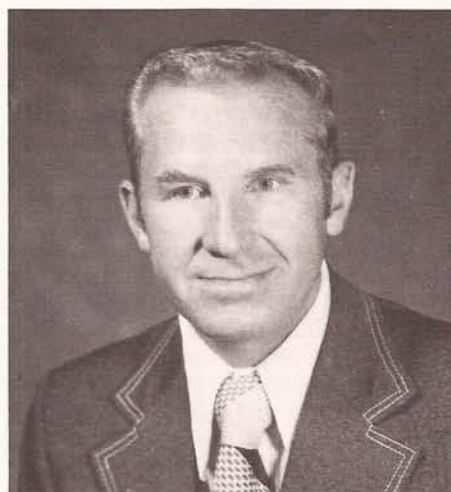

Basketball: A Cougar Tradition

The home courts: Springville Gym, Utah's Nielsen Fieldhouse, the Smith Fieldhouse and the Marriott Center.

Some of the Players: Hutchins, Minson, Nemelka, Cosic and Ainge.

Some of the Coaches: Roberts, Romney, Watts and Arnold.

Tradition echoes for the Cougars in the names of the players and coaches and places they played.

For a starting point, it is safe to say that inter-collegiate basketball, by some standards, began at BYU with the 1917-18 season. True, the school had basketball teams prior to this date under Coach E. L. Roberts. But this is the date when the BYU became a member of the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

Subsequent conference affiliations included the Mountain States and Skyline Conferences, plus the Western Athletic Conference membership which began in 1962.

Looking at the "where" aspect of the game, the Cougars played their games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus from 1918-28. For the big games, the Cougar fans used to find themselves perched in window sills, on ladders and on top of lockers along the sides of the walls. In this manner as many as 700 could be accommodated for a game. And in 1925 the Cougars boasted the tallest player in the conference, Rags Ingersoll, a 6-4 center.

In 1928 the Cougars doubled their seating capacity by moving to the Women's Gym. Changes were taking place in the game, and it was during this period that E. L. Roberts, former coach, championed the change that eventually eliminated the center jump. It was also the era when Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first ever broadcasts of a basketball game. It was also the day of the two-handed push shot. BYU also landed its first all-American, Elwood Romney.

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of Springville High School.

Built for a crowd of about 1,200, the Springville Gym, officials discovered, could actually hold 1,700.

Despite the obvious handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. It was a day when fans were treated to the play of Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; Utah State's LaDell Andersen, to mention only a few.

They all played in Springville.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars began casting about for a temporary floor to be used while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was being constructed.

The University of Utah very graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse. So for one season, 1950-51, the Cougars had a new home; on a rival's floor 45 miles north of the BYU campus.

Preseason games that year were played in the Springville Gym, but the action moved to Salt Lake City when the Skyline Conference schedule began.

Judging from the overall results, the Mountain Cats didn't suffer much as transients. They split with the Utes 2-2, in games played on the Einer Nielsen floor, captured the MSC title and went on to

win the National Invitational Tournament crown in Madison Square Garden.

Not bad for a team dubbed the Homeless Cats.

It was Coach Stan Watts' second year at the helm of Cougar basketball, and it was one of his most talented crews: Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Jerry Romney, Harold Christensen, and Joe Richey.

It should be pointed out that the Cougars were used to travel, having toured South America the summer of '50.

After a long wait, the Cougars finally moved into their own arena—the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse (10,200)—in December of 1951. Basketball was just into the golden era for the Cougars, and in the 20 years that followed, the BYU drew large crowds. Coach Stan Watts, who coached every one of the 246 games played there, during that period,

scheduled some of the finest teams available for the local fans.

Little wonder, then, that this period of boom is closely associated with Stan Watts. Prior to his retirement in 1972 after 23 years as head coach, Watts' teams won two National Invitational Tournament championships, plus eight conference titles.

In order to meet the growing demand of spectators, the Cougars needed a bigger facility. They got it in December of 1971, when the team opened the new Marriott Center, largest on-campus arena in the nation (just under 23,000 seats). The Cougars set attendance records that year, drawing an average of over 21,000 to home games.

Since its beginning in 1918, BYU basketball has had 11 coaches, a long list of All-Americans (data elsewhere in the guide), a record of playing some of the nation's finest, and a tradition that is still in the making.

Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference began its 20th season with the start of the 1981-82 school year. However, things have changed since its formation in 1962. On July 1, 1978, two charter members of the league, Arizona and Arizona State, left the WAC for the Pac-Ten. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene, upping the league membership to seven members. Then, the University of Hawaii became the eighth member on July 1, 1979.

Another change occurred last year. Air Force Academy entered the WAC on July 1, 1980.

The new members possess good athletic programs and represent two of the fastest growing areas in the country.

Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his cur-

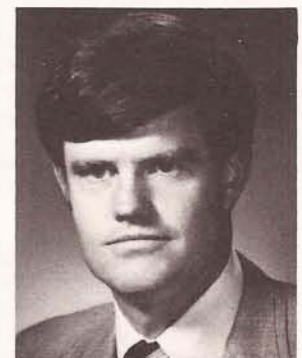
rent position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Nordy Jensen serves as director of information for the WAC and is assisted by Dee Menzies. John Adams is supervisor of football officials, and Irv Brown is supervisor of basketball officials.

1981 Basketball Season Summary

The skeptics said it couldn't be done. Not after losing three starters from the 24-5 team of 1980.

But the BYU basketball team's accomplishments in 1981 silenced the critics and became engraved in the record books for coaches and players to envy and for historians to cherish.

Despite wearing the "underdog" label against nearly one-third of their opponents, the Cougars managed to win 25 games—more than any other BYU team in history—while losing only seven.

Four losses by a total margin of nine points prevented the Cougars from having an unblemished Western Athletic Conference season and repeating as champion for the third consecutive year. As it turned out, BYU finished third in the Conference, one game behind co-champions Utah and Wyoming.

Sent to the Eastern Regionals, BYU was destined to play in arenas it had never before seen and entertain fans who knew little, if anything, about Brigham Young University.

It turned out to be a blessing in disguise. The boys from Provo toppled Ivy League champion Princeton before stunning the basketball world by giving UCLA its worst thrashing in years. A miracle basket by Danny Ainge gave the Cougars a last-second victory over Notre Dame, and it wasn't until 7-4 Ralph Sampson and Virginia came along in the finals of the Eastern Regionals that the Cougars succumbed.

Along the way, several national and regional television audiences watched BYU, led by consensus

All-American, Danny Ainge, win the big games. Newspapers heralded the team's actions on and off the court.

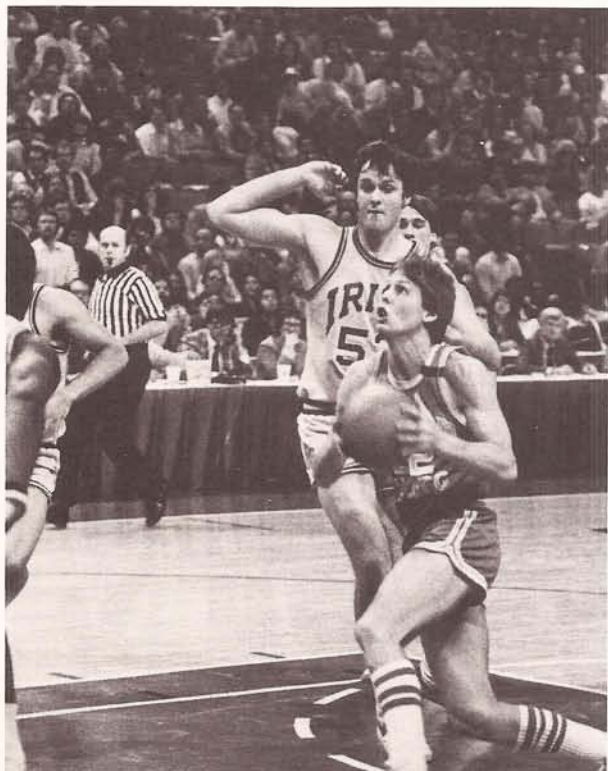
When the dust had finally cleared, BYU boasted a 16th-place national ranking and a place among the "elite eight" in the NCAA tourney. Individually, Ainge was given the Eastman and Wooden Awards as college basketball's outstanding player. He was also the ninth leading scorer in the NCAA, averaging 24.4 points per game.

Forward Fred Roberts earned All-WAC honors for his steady performance throughout the season. His average of 18.8 points per game was second best on the team. At the other forward, Steve Trumbo turned out to be a gem in the rebounding department, averaging 10.7 caroms per contest—24th best in the country. His 10.1 points per game placed him third on the scoring list.

Regulars Greg Kite, Steve Craig, Greg Ballif and Timo Saarelainen provided the depth necessary for the Cougars' success.

Early in the season, the BYU team showed promise by winning the Cougar Classic and finishing runnerup in the Volunteer Classic. Nationally ranked opponents Illinois, Utah, Wyoming, UCLA and Notre Dame fell to the Cougars during the season. Of the seven losses, five were to ranked teams and all were on the road.

Replacing All-WAC center Alan Taylor, guard Scott Runia and forward Devin Durrant were Coach Arnold's biggest worries to start the year. Kite, Trumbo and Craig filled in exceptionally.

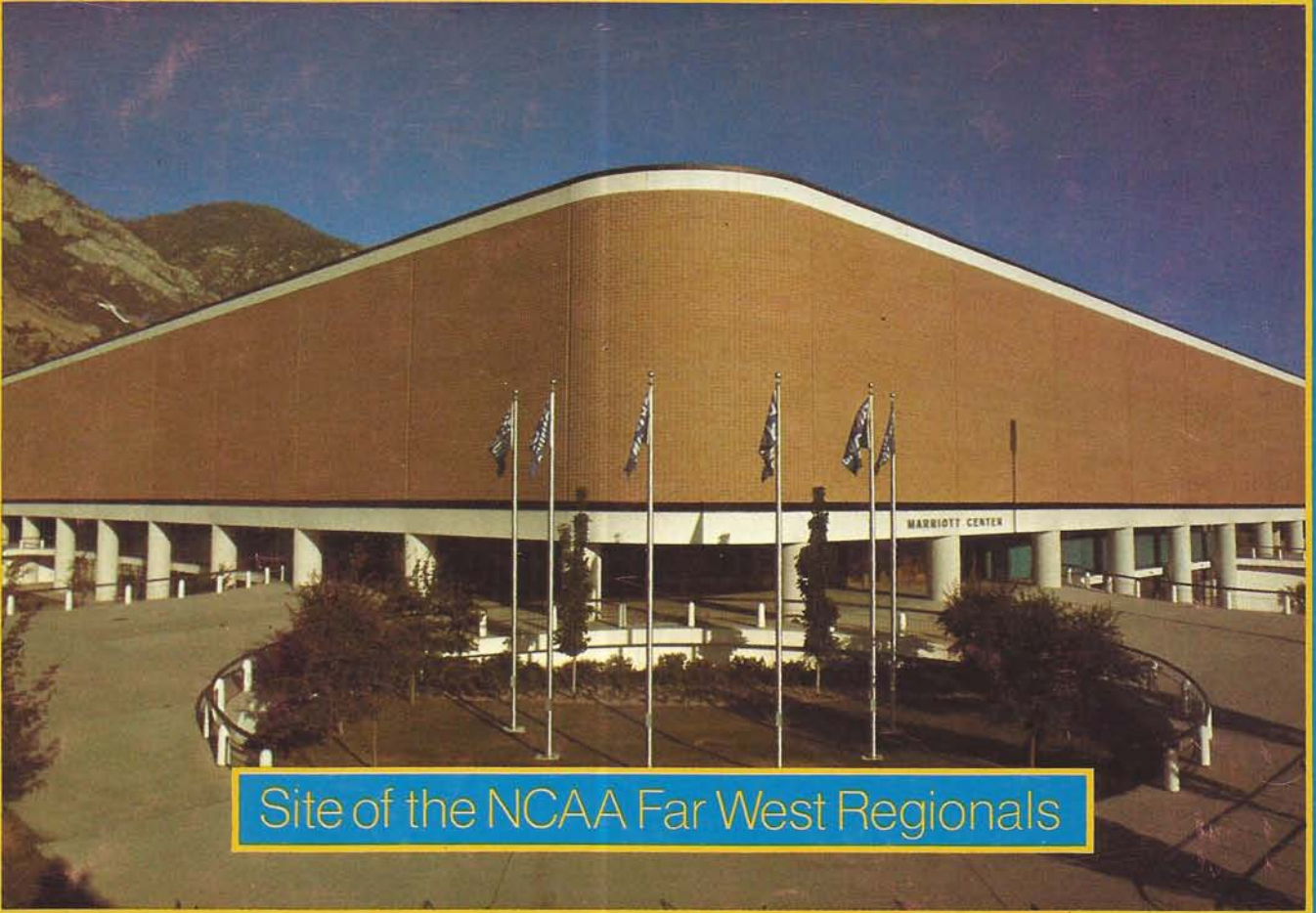
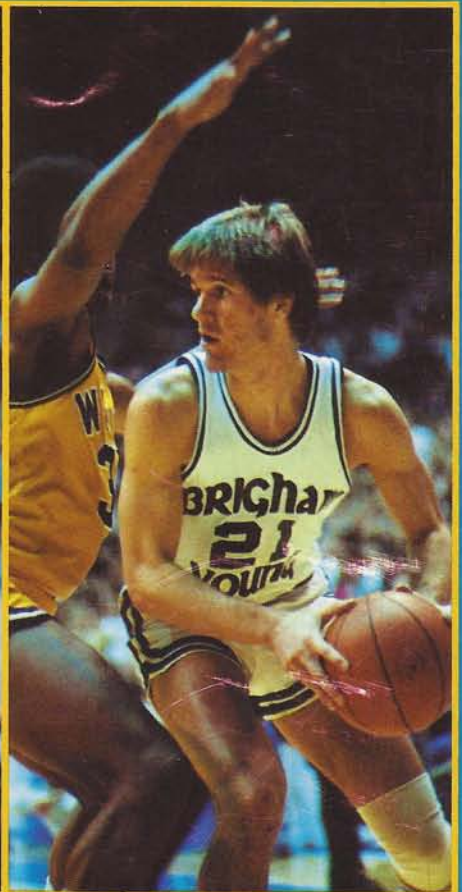
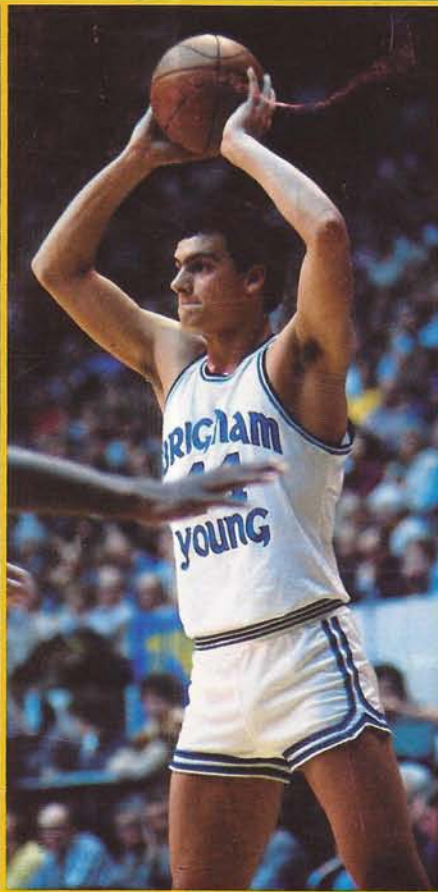
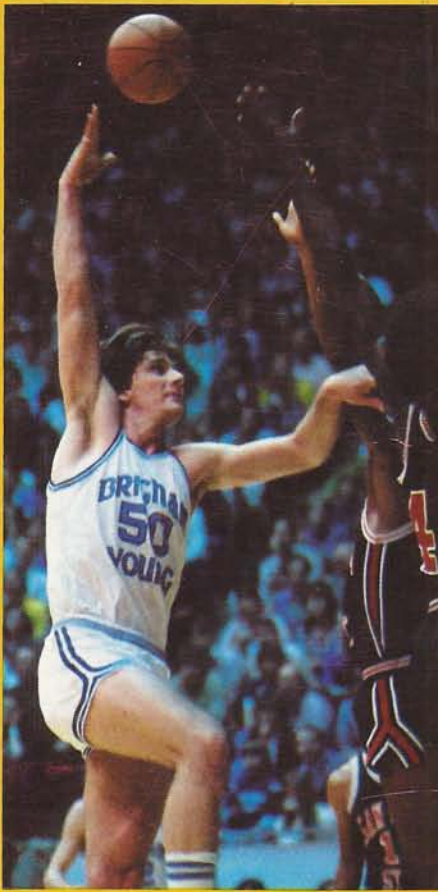
A play-by-play account will be furnished at the end of each half. Complete half-time, final, and individual statistics and other material will be offered both during and after the game.
