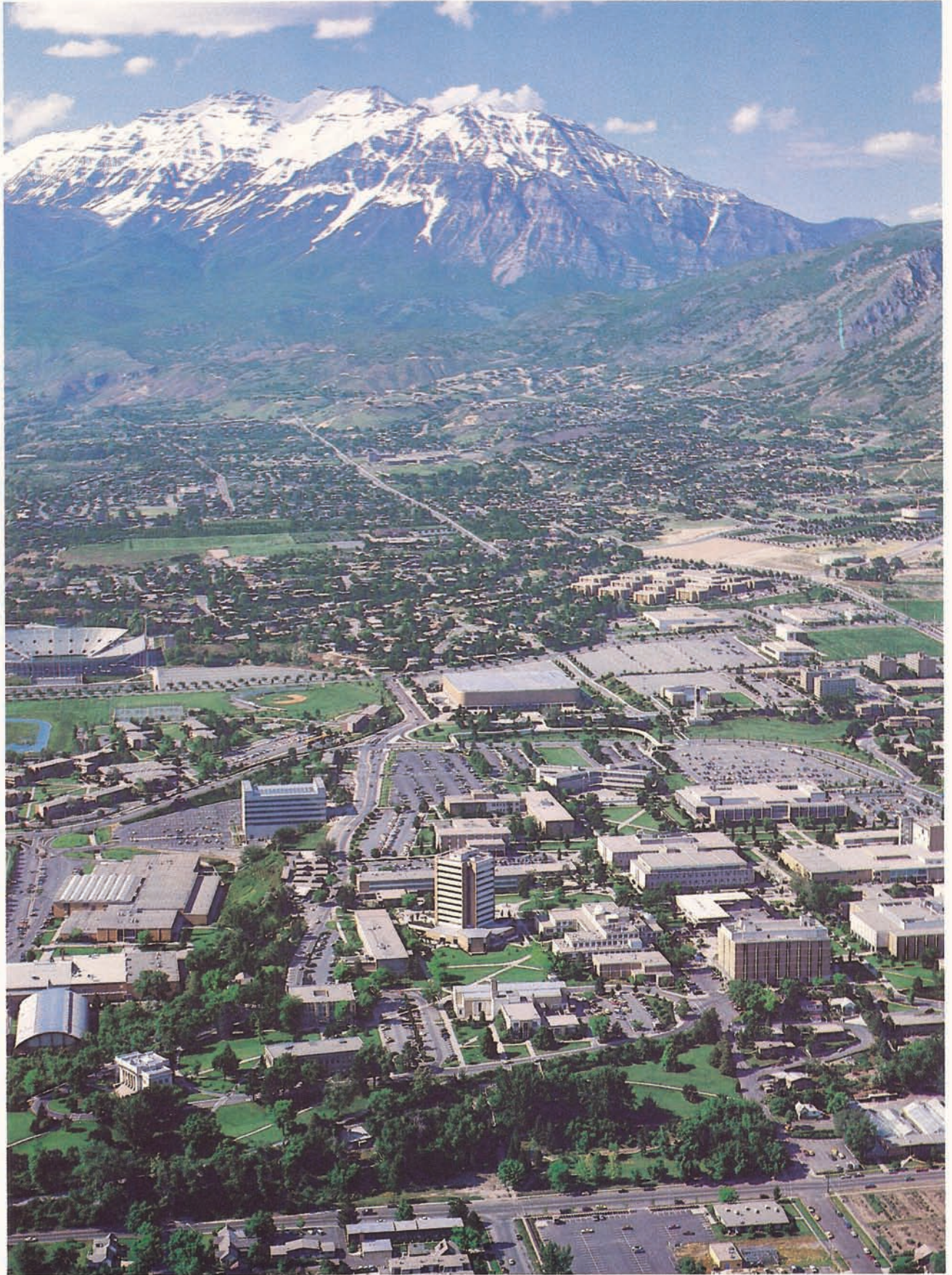

1991-92 Season Outlook

Things worked out so well a year ago with only one starter back, Coach Roger Reid and his staff decided to try the same thing again.

With only Steve Schreiner returning for last season, BYU was runner-up to nationally ranked Utah in the Western Athletic Conference and went on to beat the Utes in winning the WAC Tournament for the first time ever. The Cougars proved they were for real with a 13-point victory over Virginia the NCAA first round.

That makes a conference championship and a tournament title for Coach Reid's first two teams--both picked to finish in the second division of the league. His staff's winning percentage in WAC games is the best ever in the league.

This time around, point guard Nathan Call is the only starter returning. Shawn Bradley, the 7-6 center who set a freshman record for blocked shots (5.2), is in Australia on a church mission.

Kenneth Roberts also is in Australia on an LDS mission while Schreiner, an All-WAC first teamer, and Scott Moon graduated. Jeff Campbell went on a mission to East Germany.

So the bench is back but not the starting experience.

"It goes without saying the jobs are wide open," says Coach Reid, who has lost 35 pounds while recovering from double hip replacement surgery in April of 1990.

"We've got our hands full to get a team ready for the conference season. This is a hungry team--one with lofty goals. But it's not a veteran club. With our multiple offensive and defensive system, it takes awhile to get adapted.

"Still, we're hoping there's some carry over for players returning from a team which went to the NCAA Tournament. This could be a good team as the season progresses. But we're definitely a group of unknown qualities."

To fill the void, the Cougars need help from junior college transfers Nick Sanderson, a 6-4 guard from College of the Canyons, and from Kevin Nixon, a 6-8 forward with uncanny three-point shooting ability.

Last year he played for Roger's brother, Duke, at Utah Valley Community College in nearby Orem after seeing a lot of playing time as a freshman at Northwestern.

The other obvious bright spot is 6-4 senior guard Mark Heslop, also an excellent shooter from outside. Another guard, 6-1 senior Mark

Santiago, averaged 10 minutes a game last year in spelling Call.

Inside, the logical starter is Gary Trost, who made the All-WAC Tournament Team, and who was playing as well as anyone at the end of the season when Bradley got in foul trouble.

"But he'll be in a different role this time," says Reid of his 6-10 junior center. "It remains to be seen how he'll play as a starter versus coming off the bench."

The other forward spot is up for grabs. Junior Jared Miller, 6-8, played well last year before undergoing knee surgery midway through the season. Robert Jones, a 6-6 senior, and David Astle, a 6-9 junior, return but saw only limited action a year ago.

And waiting in the wings are three freshmen hoping for things to work out like they did for Roberts last year. Shane Knight is a 6-9 redshirt with a good shooting touch.

Russell Larson is 6-10 but is experiencing college ball for the first time after going on a mission right out of high school. And Justin Weidauer, 6-7, was Utah's top prep player a year ago.

Conference-wise, Coach Reid calls Utah "a legitimate top 10 team" and Wyoming a "top 20 team." Top to bottom he sees the WAC as strong as ever with San Diego State rating a "darkhorse" designation.

"Schedule-wise, we're similar to last year. We have a challenge with the first three games on the road and have another nationally ranked team (Michigan) in a prestigious holiday tournament (the Red Lobster in Orlando with Florida and Virginia Tech)."

On paper, it's a tough road for the Cougars but Reid is quietly confident about the trip. Two years ago, he won a share of the title without a starter over 6-7 and last year started two freshmen in placing second.

Coach Reid also believes strongly in a direct correlation between winning on the floor and academics. In that regard, this team could carry on the first two years' success with Andy Toolson, GTE Academic All-America, and Academic All-WAC players Schreiner, Heslop, Moon, Toolson and Kevin Santiago.

Schreiner also won an NCAA post-graduate scholarship. The two-year grade point average for all players is close to 3.0.

Head Coach Roger Reid

Roger Reid will be trying to prove himself all over again for the third season. It's just his nature--a fiesty scrapper who never learned what it's like to give less than 100 percent.

After becoming the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989, he promptly went out and won 21 games (21-9, 11-5) with a 6-7 center.

He took a team picked sixth and tied for the Western Athletic Conference title. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of the Year.

His team set a school record for three-point shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 to watch a 15-0 season.

Only an errant alley-oop shot in the final seconds kept the Cougars from upsetting heavily favored Clemson in the NCAA Tournament.

And, if all that wasn't enough, Coach Reid and his able assistants had one of the country's top recruiting classes, led by 7-6 Shawn Bradley.

Bradley was named to the nation's All-Freshman Team and set a frosh record for blocked shots with 5.2. He was MVP of the WAC Tournament, which BYU won for the first time ever.

Coach Reid's team--picked fifth in the WAC--finished second (21-13, 11-5) and then defeated Virginia in the NCAA Tournament.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978 after five losing seasons. His first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four titles.

The 44-year-old Reid worked under Frank Arnold five seasons and six under Ladell Andersen.

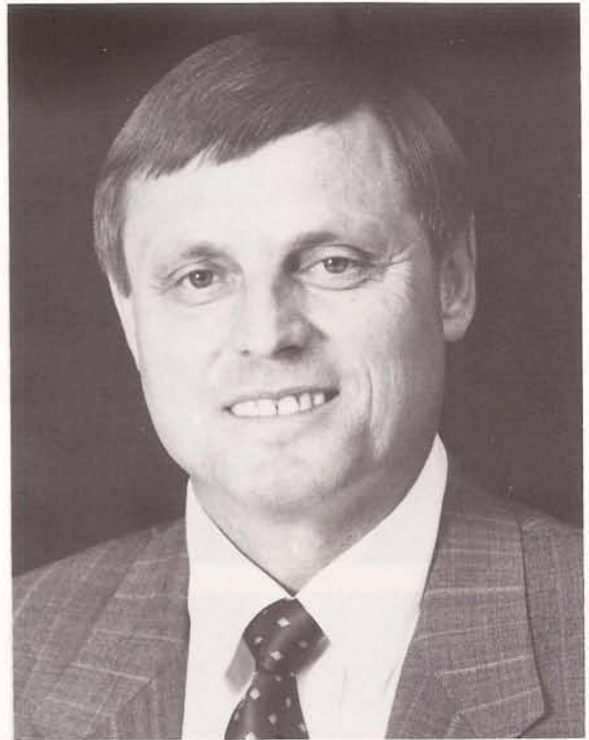
He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics in Australia. Roger is on the NABC committee to plan the national convention as well as on the Awards Committee.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High School, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU (1964) and played freshman basketball and baseball.

In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbon College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and was named a JC All-American.

Reid moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference champion-



ship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves systems, advancing to AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield (Utah) High School. He took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. His Clearfield record was 60-24.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have three sons and a daughter: Randy, 20, who redshirted in 1990 and is on a church mission in New Jersey; Robbie, 17, a basketball star at Spanish Fork High; Darren, 12; and Kelli Ann, 10.

He has served as first counselor in an LDS Church bishopric and also functioned on a stake high council.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced and since then has lost 35 pounds.

Assistant Coach Tony Ingle

Tony L. Ingle came to the Cougars in 1989 after a year at Alabama-Huntsville and says there is only one reason he gave up a head coaching job to be an assistant--Roger Reid.

"There is nobody else I could be an assistant coach for on the collegiate level. Roger and I have the same values. I understand where he's coming from and he understands where I am coming from. I really put a lot of faith in Roger and the BYU program."

Their friendship started in Atlanta at the NCAA Regional in 1981, when they met the day Danny Ainge made the winning basket against Notre Dame.

Ingle was born June 11, 1952, in Dalton, Georgia. He graduated from North Whitfield High School there.

At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards.

The 1971-72 team won 34 straight games and was ranked as high as second in the NJCAA polls. The 1972-73 team was ranked as high as fifth. In those two years his teams had a 61-10 record.

Transferring to Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain for two years. He received a degree in physical education (1976) with a minor in biology and in 1980 earned a master's degree (P.E.) at North Georgia College.

He returned to his old high school in Dalton in 1976 as an assistant. By then it had been renamed Northwest Whitfield.

Ingle went to Southeast Whitfield for a year as head coach before moving to Cherokee High (Canton, Ga.), where he was 107-47 in seven seasons from 1978-85. He was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985-88) as head coach at Gordon Junior College (Barnesville, Ga.), he was 60-33. His teams scored more than 100 points 23 times and made the state playoffs each year.

After going 18-11, 21-10 and 21-12 and being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club JC Coach of the Year in 1988, he moved to Alabama-Huntsville.

His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.



Coach Ingle

Ingle has directed two dozen basketball camps in recent years and had worked at the BYU camp several times prior to becoming a Cougar coach.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (16), Sunshine (13), Golden (10), Tony, Jr. (9), and Israel (7). The Ingles live in Spanish Fork.

The children have performed basketball dribbling and ball-handling routines as the "Little Nuggets" at halftime shows for a number of NBA games. They also have a half-hour video tape (Dribbling to Dreams) on basketball skills.

"The Little Nuggets have retired," Tony explains about his family's entertainment activities. "The demands of recruiting and of our schedule made it too hard to be flying around the country doing halftimes."

A comedian who could rival successful nightclub performers if he weren't so committed to coaching, Ingle jokes about a lot of things but he's serious about the Little Nuggets--and about BYU's recruiting.

Assistant Coach Charles Bradley

It's no wonder Charles Bradley was such a hit his first two seasons at BYU. It was like he always had been a part of Cougar basketball.

The former first-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics played four years at Wyoming (1977-81), coached a year for the Cowboys (1986-87) and coached two years at San Diego State (1987-89).

Add several years helping at the BYU's summer basketball camps and Bradley feels right at home in the Marriott Center.

"We have one of the fine basketball coaches in the area in Charles Bradley," says Coach Roger Reid. "He's a great addition to our program and he understands what it takes. Charles is a great asset to Cougar basketball."

Charles W. Bradley was born May 16, 1959, in Havre de Grace, Maryland, and graduated from Edgewood (Maryland) High in 1977.

By his senior year at Wyoming in 1981 he was 6-5, 215, pounds and earned All-America and

Academic All-America honors. He was MVP at the Pizza Hut All-Star Game after earning All-WAC honors three times.

A four-year starter who averaged 17 points and shot 53 percent from the field, Bradley earned a B.A. degree in elementary education in 1981 and received a teacher's certificate but went on to professional basketball instead.

He spent two years with the Boston Celtics and one with the Seattle Supersonics. He also spent some time with the Wyoming Wildcatters (Casper) of the Continental Basketball Association.

Charles and his wife, Suzanne, settled in Denver after their marriage in 1984 and he coached the freshman team at Mullen High School for a year and was involved in sales and marketing for Pizza Hut.

In 1986, Jim Brandenburg hired Bradley as an assistant at Wyoming. The Cowboys won the WAC Tournament and had an overall 24-10 record. They defeated Virginia and UCLA before bowing to top-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas in NCAA regional action.

Bradley went to San Diego State with Brandenburg in 1987 and his recruits helped turn a 5-25 team to one which went 12-17 and upset nationally ranked BYU.

When Coach Reid was appointed, he contacted Bradley about becoming the first assistant ever to coach at three WAC schools.

"I've always been impressed by the BYU players, fans and people in the community," says Bradley. "The University has a great basketball tradition and I enjoy working with Coach Reid and Coach Ingle."

Charles' older brother, Dudley, starred at North Carolina and played for the Atlanta Hawks.

The Bradleys have three daughters: Taryn, 5, Alexa, 3 and Brynn, who will be one in January. They reside in Orem.

Charles currently serves on the NABC Assistant Coaches' Committee. He also is an avid jogger and biker in the Provo area and enjoys golf.

Other Assistants

Jeff Reinert, who has spent the last two seasons as a graduate assistant at Nebraska, is the Cougars' new part-time coach.

A native of Bellingham, Wash., Jeff played two seasons at New Mexico (1980-82) and then transferred to Gonzaga, where he was a teammate of John Stockton of the Utah Jazz.

Reinert received a degree in physical education in 1985 and played and coached two seasons in the Queensland State League.

He was an assistant two years at Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa, and also served as the school's intramural director and women's golf coach. He received a master's degree in educational administration from Drake in 1988.

Jeff produced three books while at Nebraska--one on Cornhusker basketball and two on recruiting. He is doing class work at BYU towards a doctorate in administration.

Like his predecessor, John Hansen (now fulltime at NuSkin), Jeff will coordinate scouting, the computer system and the junior varsity team.

T.J. Byrne returned to BYU in 1989 after two years as the head trainer and assistant professor at Portland State.

A native of Boise, Idaho, he obtained a B.S. degree from Boise State in 1980 and an M.A. from BYU in 1983. After serving as a graduate assistant trainer at BYU, he spent four years as the trainer at Pepperdine.

He moved to Portland to get more football experience. He helps with football for the Cougars but his primary responsibility is basketball.

T.J. and his wife, Mary, have two boys, Brian, 8, and Tommy, 7; and a daughter, Haley, who will be one in December. They live in Lindon.

Floyd Johnson has been BYU's equipment manager for more than 35 years.

"Brother Johnson" also directs the Athletic Speakers Bureau and does teaching and coun-

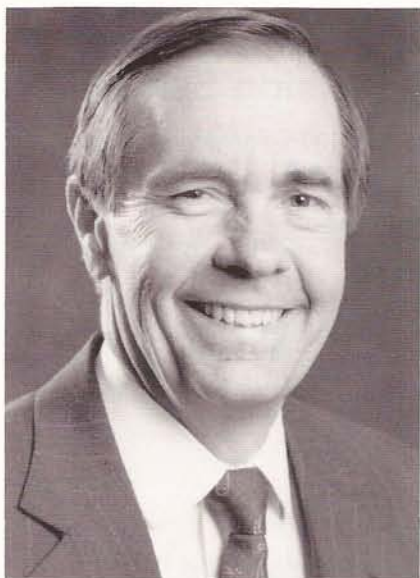

President Rex E. Lee



Perhaps the best example of President Rex E. Lee's national reputation came earlier this year to chair a committee to review the NCAA's rules enforcement and infractions process. Among those serving under him is Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice of the United States.

Lee, 56, a former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989. He was the

founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–1976, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division.

Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with

the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law Institute. In late April, 1990, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living law-yers to have reached that milestone.

The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Lee married Janet Griffin in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple in 1959. They have seven children and five grandchildren.

R. J. Snow, Student Life Vice President



R. J. Snow is currently serving in his second year as Student Life Vice President at BYU. He accepted the position after returning from the South Africa Johannesburg Mission where he served as mission president from 1987–1990.

Before his mission call, Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984–1987. Prior to that, he served for nearly a decade

as the vice president of university and student relations at the University of Utah.

He also served as director of the Robert H. Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Snow received his associate of science degree from Dixie College in 1957. He then enrolled at the University of Utah where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and masters of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Snow continued his education at Northwestern University

where he completed his doctoral degree (1965) in political science.

In 1967, Snow moved to California where he served on the political science faculty for the University of California, Santa Barbara, until 1973.

Snow has also completed post-doctoral work at the University of Oregon, Harvard University and has worked with the University of Pau and the University of Bordeaux as part of a UC Santa Barbara study abroad program.

Snow has been very active in civic and community service having served on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as board member of the Utah Symphony and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service on more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations include board membership of the Salt Lake United Way, and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

Born in Cedar City as Reuben Joseph Snow on October 15, 1937, he and his family moved to St. George when he was six months old. In 1962, he married the former Marilyn Melville in the St. George Temple. They have four children.

Faculty Representative, Athletic Director

Clayne R. Jensen, Associate Vice President

Dr. Clayne Jensen completed his 18th year this spring as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompassed BYU athletics.

He was replaced as Dean by Elmo Roundy and elevated to a new post of Associate Vice President-Student Life. He will continue to oversee men's and women's athletics. He remains as the Faculty Athletic Representative, a position he has held since 1976.



A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen was a Professor and Associate Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for nine years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State

(1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities, and he is presently under commission to author a book on "Sports and Physical Education in the World Today."

He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 29 countries.

The former dean served as U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has served on numerous committees of the NCAA, and is a former member of the governing council of that organization. Also, he is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, Noteworthy Americans and 2000 Outstanding Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. Following prep school, he went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and was selected to the Western International League all-star team in 1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.

In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach and head baseball coach. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award.

A popular speaker, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 U.S. team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in 27 years.

In July 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest



baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 12 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

He was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979.

He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee and the College Football Association Television Committee. Tuckett serves on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee and is on the NCAA Baseball Tournament Committee.

Tuckett has received several honors for the hours of service he has put in to BYU, the community and the nation. In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame for his successful coaching career at BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Athletic Department Staff

Pete Witbeck, Associate Athletic Director

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for 42 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked



first in the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

During Witbeck's tenure, the varsity won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. Pete became the assistant to the athletic director, Stan Watts, in 1972.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference.

He and his wife, Kathy, have three children—Jill, Von and Ann.

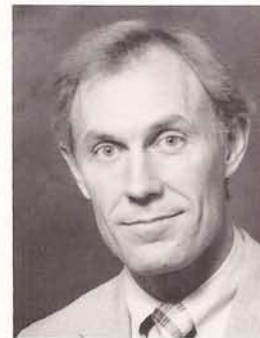

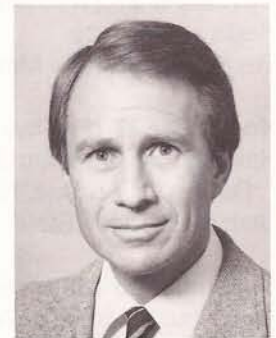

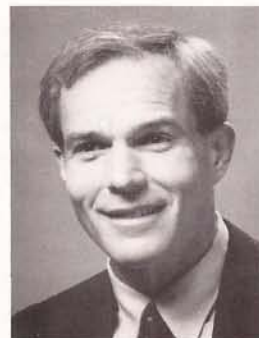

Live broadcasts of basketball games can be heard on stations in Idaho, Utah, Nevada and Arizona. In other areas, fans can access the KSL broadcast on the telephone by calling 1-800-225-5448. Although the initial call is toll-free, a Visa or Mastercard is required to be connected to the broadcast.

Cougar Club

In only 26 years, BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of over 3,700 also makes Cougar Club one of the nation's largest booster clubs and nearly twice as large as any other booster organization in the WAC.

"Most of our members are avid sports fans and die-hard Cougar supporters," explains Dale R. McCann, Cougar Club Executive Director. "However, all our members

agree that affecting the lives of young male and female athletes in a positive way is our first priority."

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and the "Varsity Preview" basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at the annual Awards Banquet and through the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. There are numerous donor levels, ranging from \$50 for Cougar "Cubs," children and teenagers, to \$1,000 for Golden Cougars. Lifetime memberships also are available.

In return, contributors receive parking passes for home games, football and basketball press guides, monthly news releases, weekly press releases (out-of-state members only), and the satisfaction of helping build athletic excellence.

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arenas.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington. Two new arenas—at Tennessee and North Carolina—also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, more than five million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked sixth nationally with an average of 18,451 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina, Louisville and UNLV drew more fans than the Cougars.

An eight-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc.,

in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

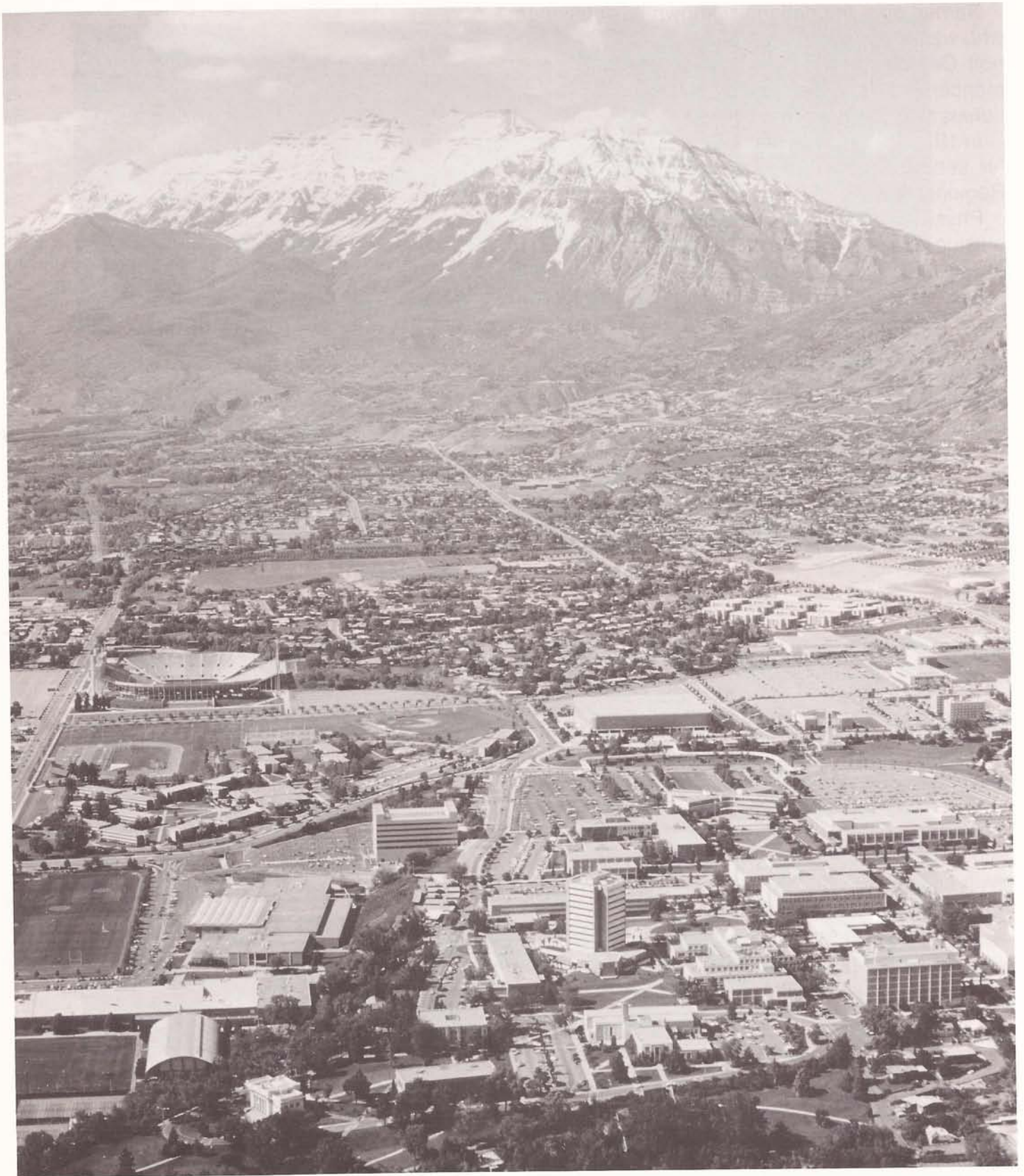

Western Athletic Conference



Now in its 30th year, the Western Athletic Conference is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of the member institutions. This school year it also includes competition for women.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks with the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked sixth nationally in per-game attendance and New Mexico was seventh.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State joined the Pac-10. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy joined in 1980. Fresno State becomes the 10th member in 1992.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Margie McDonald, formerly in charge of the High Country Athletic Conference, is the deputy commissioner. Jeff Hurd serves as associate commissioner, while Dee Anne Menzies and Mark Hollis are assistant commissioners. Dan Willis is assistant director of media relations. Guy Gibbs is supervisor of basketball officials.

Cougar Basketball History

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921-25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a college basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who led the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon (1937-38) and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200--although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah

graciously offered its home floor--the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but Skyline Conference action was played in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the league championship. They also won the National Invitational Tournament in New York City.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened in December of 1971 and the home attendance was more than 21,000.

This will be the 21st season in the Marriott Center, praised by visitors for its cleanliness.

Since the opening of the Marriott Center, five coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972-75), Frank Arnold (1976-83) and Ladell Andersen (1984-89).

In March, 1989, the Roger Reid era began at BYU. The long-time assistant was elevated to the top spot when Coach Andersen retired.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge and Devin Durrant. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country. And Michael Smith was the inaugural Academic Player of the Year selection by GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

In 1990, Andy Toolson was a first-team Academic All-America selection and last year Steve Schreiner won an NCAA scholarship.

The 1991 team featured 7-6 Shawn Bradley, one of the tallest players ever in college basketball. He set an NCAA record for most blocked shots by a freshman (5.2).

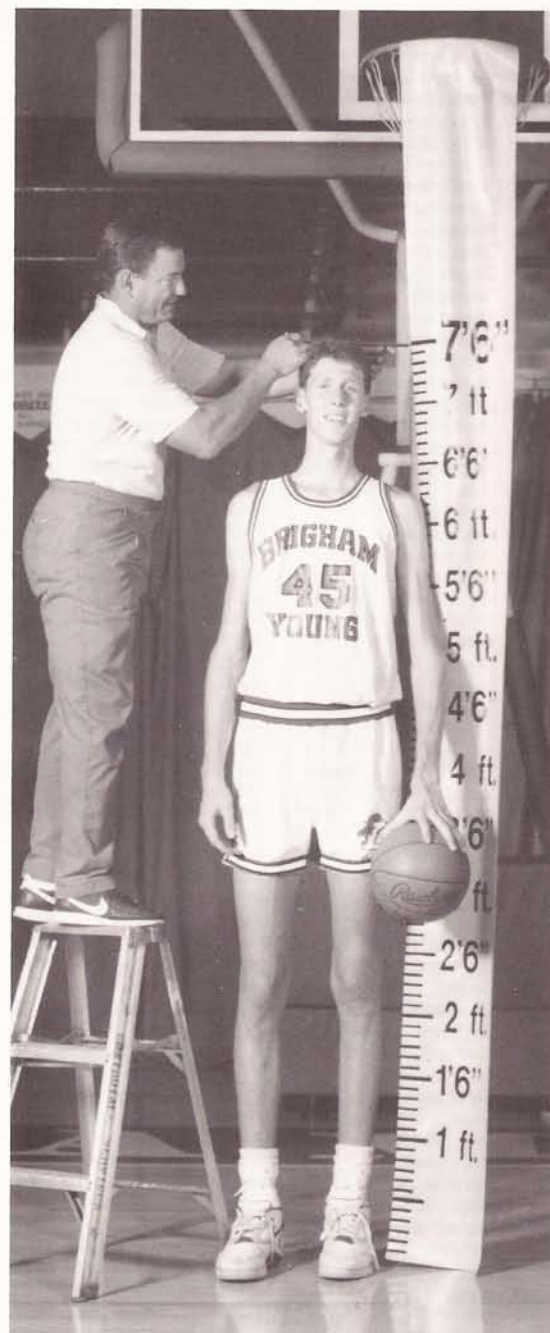
