Members of the print media requesting interviews should contact Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Director. Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Monsen, Electronic Media Coordinator. No player interviews will be given the day before or the day of a game.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press and photography credentials should be made no later than three days prior to the game. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college basketball.

No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, BYU, Provo, UT 84602.

Press Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics at the end of each half.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the press work room adjacent to the court on the southwest corner.

Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own phones.

Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-3675. Game boxes are available on faxback (770) 399-3066, pass code 922#, cell #2413.

Post Game Interviews

Coach Roger Reid will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

Photo Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover BYU basketball. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will instruct photographers where they can shoot during the game.

Marriott Center, Media Parking

The Marriott Center is located on the BYU campus at the corner of 450 East and 1650 North (University Parkway) in Provo. Press parking is available in Lot #1, immediately north of the Marriott Center. Media parking passes must be requested. To reach the press room, use the north entrance (main ticket office) of the Marriott Center. Take the elevator to the first level and follow the hallway to the right. The press room is located on the southwest corner near the visitor's locker room.

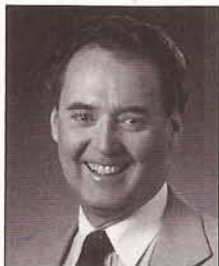
RADIO

For more than 44 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio, located in Salt Lake City.



Play-by-play announcer Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 45 years of experience, is entering his 32nd season as the voice of the Cougars.

An Ogden High School and University of Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcasted Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965.

Paul Ruffner, a BYU basketball standout from 1968-70 does the commentary. Ruffner was a second team All-WAC center in 1968. Assisting with the broadcasts will be Kent Rupe and Greg Wrubell.

TELEVISION

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar basketball. All home games are televised on a tape delay basis by Channel 11 KBYU.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western United States.



KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by the major cable networks. KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals. It has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment.

In cooperation with KBYU, the Blue & White Sports Network syndicates BYU basketball games to broadcast and cable stations in 44 states — unprecedented for any university.



KSL-TV, the NBC affiliate in Salt Lake City, has been televising BYU basketball games on a regular basis since 1984.

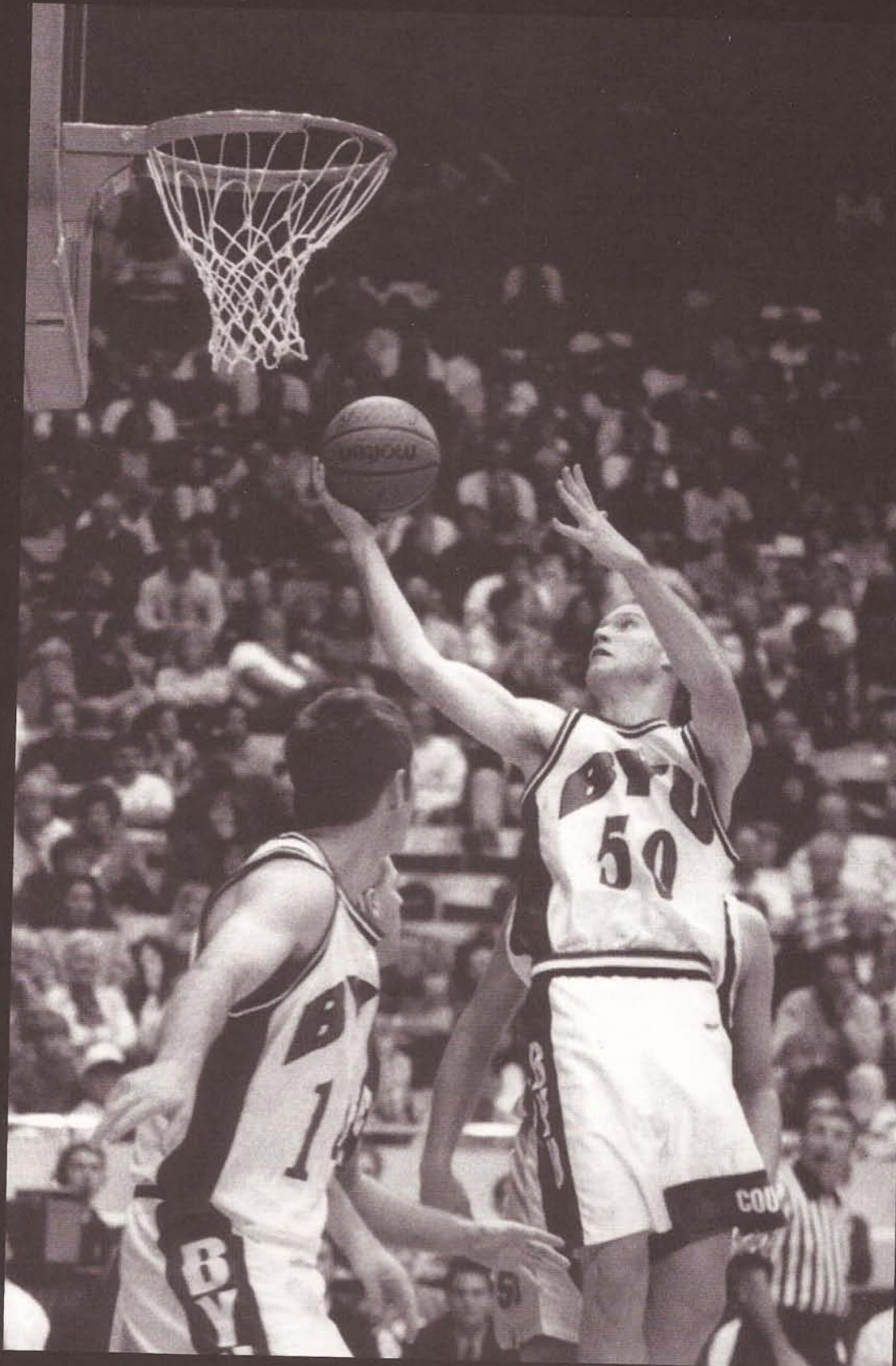

New Look: Same Winning Style

Seven incoming freshmen provide the biggest influx of new talent in the eight years Roger Reid has served as BYU's head coach.

For the second year in a row, the Cougars graduate two starters. And again, two key players opted for LDS

Church missions, as BYU lost seven lettermen from the 1995-96 squad.

Gone via graduation are starters Kenneth Roberts and Randy Reid. Roberts was a first-team All-Western Athletic Conference performer while Reid was named to the All-WAC

Defensive Team. Departed for missions are freshman guards Todd Christensen (Chile) and Nathan Cooper (Portugal).

"We had one of the better recruiting years we've had in many years and have gotten some national recognition for this group," says Reid. "We're going to be a very inexperienced team. With the losses we have, there might be a more veteran team in the mission field, but eventually all those players will be back.

"Every position is wide open. We have some freshmen who will push people who got playing time last year. We really don't know what to expect."

Justin Weidauer, a 6-7 junior, leads the five lettermen returning from last year's 15-13 squad which posted a 9-9 record for fifth place in the WAC, finished third in the NCAA free throws at 76.5 percent and missed qualifying for a post-season tournament for the first time since Reid took the helm.

The unexpected departure of senior Bryon Ruffner, 6-6, puts a damper on BYU's 1996-97 season.

Ruffner was named to the WAC All-Newcomer team in 1995-96 and led BYU in scoring for most of the season. He finished the year with an 18.8 scoring average, second best on the team, and 6.0 in rebounds.

With Ruffner's departure, Weidauer will be called on to score more than he had to last year.

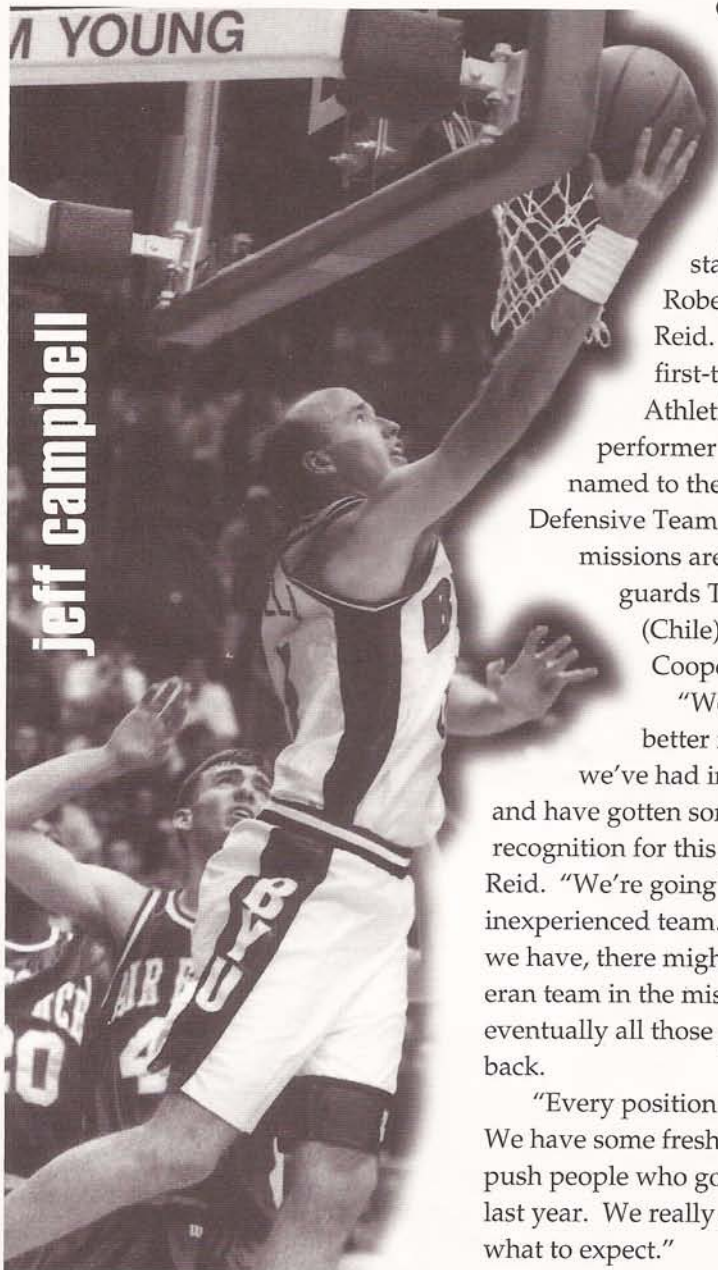
"Everyone's roles will change from last year," said Weidauer. "We will have quite a few freshman that will see some playing time."

"Weidauer is a tough player and had a very good year coming off a redshirt season," says Reid. "We expect a solid year from him."

One of the big question marks as the Cougars enter the season is 'who will assume the leadership position at the guard spot.

"With Randy leaving after four stalwart years, the inexperience at the guard position is very critical," says Reid. "It is not an easy chore to have freshmen come in and run the team, but with time we will be able to do a great job."

One of the forwards spots will be filled by Weidauer, who was the

team's leading rebounder with a 7.3 average last season and was the fifth-leading scorer at 8.5 points. He pulled down 15 rebounds at eighth-ranked Mississippi State last season.

Senior Jeff Campbell, a 6-9 forward/center, is the other returning starter, averaging 9.4 points, the fourth best on the squad, and had 3.8 rebounds last season.

"Jeff has done a nice job the past few years and might see some time at the five position with the departure of Roberts," says Reid. "Center is an unknown for us and will be tough to fill. We will also look to Jarkko (Ahlbom) and David Anderson for help in this area."

Journeymen who could contribute are juniors Grant Berges, a 6-8 guard/forward who started the first two games last season, Jarkko Ahlbom, a 6-10 junior center from Finland and Lance Archibald a 6-3 sophomore from Potomac, Maryland.

The newcomers are freshmen David Anderson a 7-0, 245-pound, center from Lamar, Colo., Matt Montague a 6-1, 185-pound guard from Louisville, Ky., Eric Nielsen a 6-8, 205-pound forward from Fremont, Calif., Scott Sonnenberg a 5-11, 165-pound guard from Warrenville, Ill., Michael Tompson a 6-8, 215-pound forward from Nelson, New Zealand via Minn., Michael Vranes a 6-3, 168-pound guard from Taylorsville, Utah, Robbie Yates a 6-2, 170-pound guard from Salt Lake City, Utah and Nick Taggart a 6-8 Freshman from Raleigh, N.C. Also signed was David Nielsen a 6-4, 200-pound guard from Salt Lake City, Utah who is going on a mission out of high school.

Yates is just returning from serv-

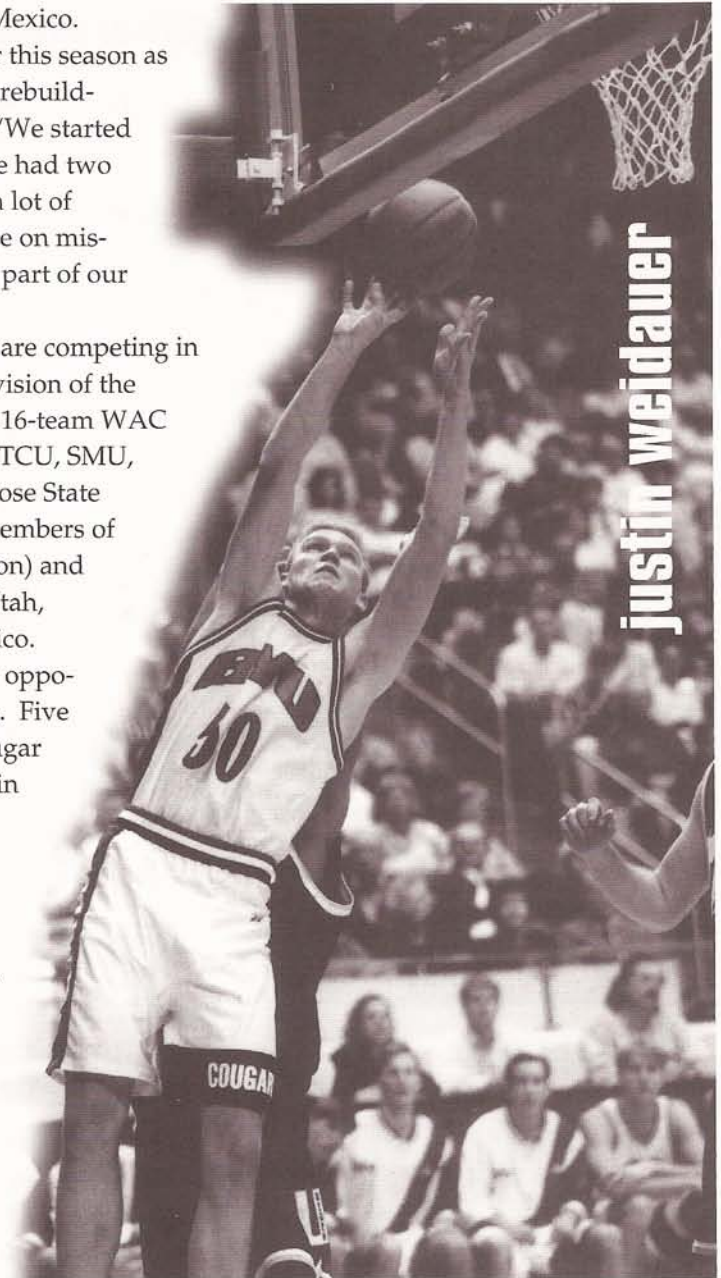
ing a mission to Mexico.

"We consider this season as phase two of our rebuilding," says Reid. "We started it last year, yet we had two key people with a lot of playing time leave on missions — that was part of our rebuilding.

The Cougars are competing in the Mountain Division of the newly-expanded 16-team WAC with newcomers TCU, SMU, Rice, Tulsa (San Jose State and UNLV are members of the Pacific Division) and quad members Utah, UTEP, New Mexico. BYU's cross-over opponent is Wyoming. Five teams on the Cougar schedule played in the NCAA post-season tournament last season: Georgia, Penn State, Utah, Tulsa and New Mexico, while Washington was in the NIT field.

"We are always excited about a new season," says Reid. "We are looking forward to the new WAC alignment."

Reid has logged a 151-71 (.680) record with six 20-win seasons in his seven years at the helm. He has a 83-37 WAC record, which is the best in league history at .692, five NCAA berths, an NIT berth, three WAC regular-season titles and two league post-season crowns.

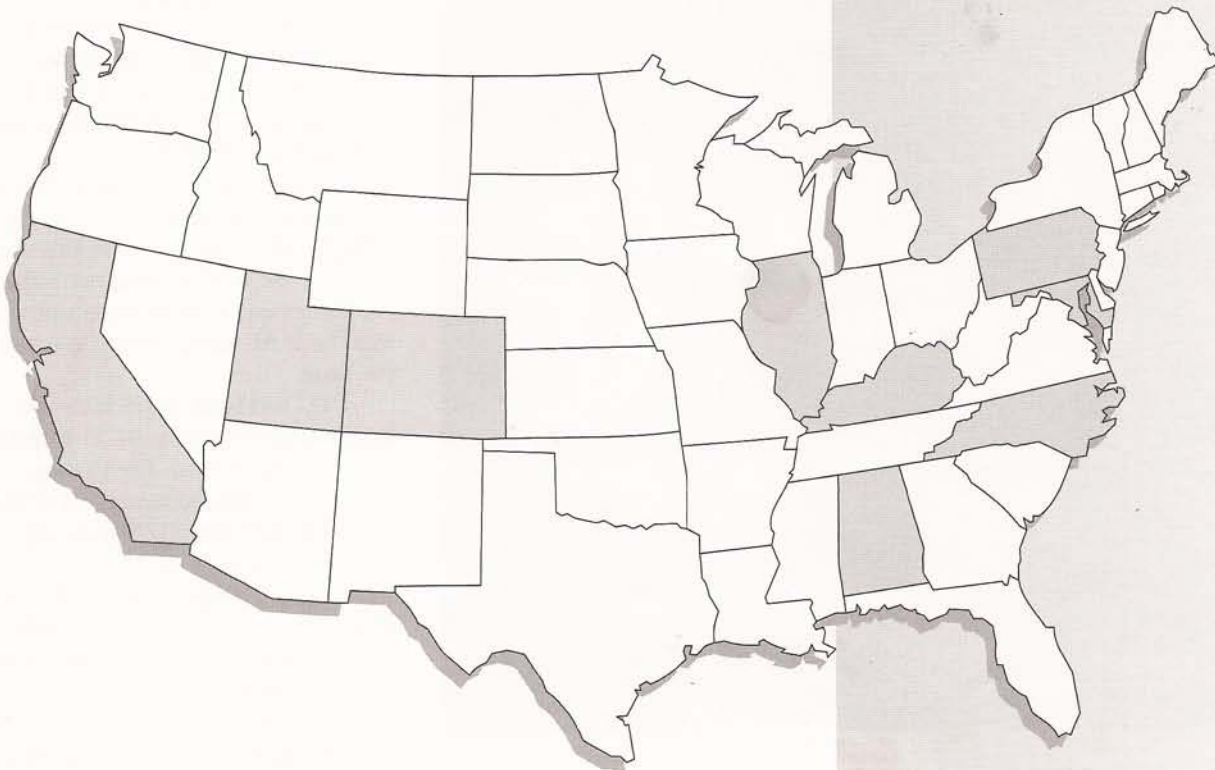

In his seven seasons as head coach, Roger Reid has achieved six 20-win seasons on his way to recording the best winning percentages in the history of the Western Athletic Conference at 83-37 (.692).

During his head coaching career at BYU, Reid has averaged 22 victories per season, won three WAC titles and two WAC Tournaments.

He's taken BYU to five NCAA Tournaments and to an NIT berth.

This year marks his biggest rebuilding job yet but time and victories have proven Reid will keep succeeding despite the name changes and players coming and going for missionary work.

The energetic, ultra-positive former pro baseball player became the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989.

During his first season at the helm

(1989-90), Reid won 21 games with a 6-7 center and tied for the WAC title (21-9) with a team picked to finish sixth in the preseason polls. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of the Year by both the coaches and media.

His team set a school record for three-point shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 fans who witnessed a remarkable 15-0 home record.

The following year, Reid's team featured Shawn Bradley, who was named to the nation's All-Freshman Team and set a frosh record for blocked shots with 5.2. Bradley was MVP of the 1990-91 WAC Tournament, which BYU won for the first time ever.

Coach Reid's Cougars--picked fifth in the WAC--finished second and then defeated Virginia in the NCAA Tournament in going 21-13.

Bradley had been expected to return from a church mission for the 1993-94 season but chose instead to enter the NBA draft, where he was the number-two selection.

During Reid's third year, BYU finished with an amazing 25-7 record, tying for the regular season title and winning the WAC tournament again. For the second time in three years Reid was the WAC and District Coach of the Year.

BYU had back-to-back 25-win as Reid's 1992-93 team went 25-9 and tied for the WAC crown. The Cougars advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament before losing to the Kansas Jayhawks.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978 --when the Cougars were coming off five consecutive losing seasons. Since his arrival in Provo, Reid has been a part of 366 Cougar victories, 17 winning

seasons, 11 NCAA Tournament appearances and seven WAC Championships. During his first year as an assistant, BYU improved its 12-18 record from the previous year to 20-8 and won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four WAC titles.

Reid began his coaching career at BYU working as a graduate assistant under Frank Arnold for a few months before working five seasons as an assistant coach.

Reid was responsible for BYU's defensive schemes during his six years as an assistant under Ladell Andersen. In his 11 years as an assistant at BYU, Reid helped coordinate BYU's recruiting efforts.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics in Australia for three weeks.

Reid is on the Collegiate Committee of USA Basketball and is on the NABC Legislation Committee, serving as liaison between the board of directors and the WAC coaches.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game.

Reid enrolled at BYU in 1964 and played freshman basketball and base-

ball. In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbon College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both sports. He was the team's MVP in baseball and named a Junior College All-American.

Reid moved to Weber State and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. He also was all-conference in baseball two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves farm systems, advancing to AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as the basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High.

In 1974, he moved to Clearfield (Utah) High and took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years and was 60-24.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have five children: Randy, who started four years for the Cougars; Robbie, currently on a church mission in Greece; David, who died in 1980; Darren; and Kelli.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced and in the summer of 1995 had ankle surgery.

Tony Ingle



Tony Ingle is BYU's veteran assistant who gave up a Division II head coaching job at the University of Alabama at Huntsville to join Roger Reid's coaching staff for the 1989-90 season.

Since coming to BYU, Ingle has been instrumental in the Cougar's three WAC titles and two WAC Tournament Championships. In addition to coaching and motivating, Ingle has been heavily involved in recruiting and is a popular public speaker.

"We're lucky to have Tony," says coach Reid. "It's hard to believe someone can be so humorous and yet so serious and knowledgeable about basketball."

Ingle grew up in Dalton, Ga., and graduated from North Whitfield High. At Dalton Junior College he was elected student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards. In two years, his team won 61 games and finished tenth and 11th in the NJCAA respectively.

At Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain two years. He received a physical education degree in 1976 and a master's degree from North Georgia in 1980.

He was an assistant one year at Northwest Whitfield and was head coach at Southeast Whitfield. For seven seasons at Cherokee High in Canton, Ga., he was 107-47 and played for the 4A state title in 1981-82. In 1982, Ingle was named the *Atlanta Journal Constitution* AAAA Coach of the Year.

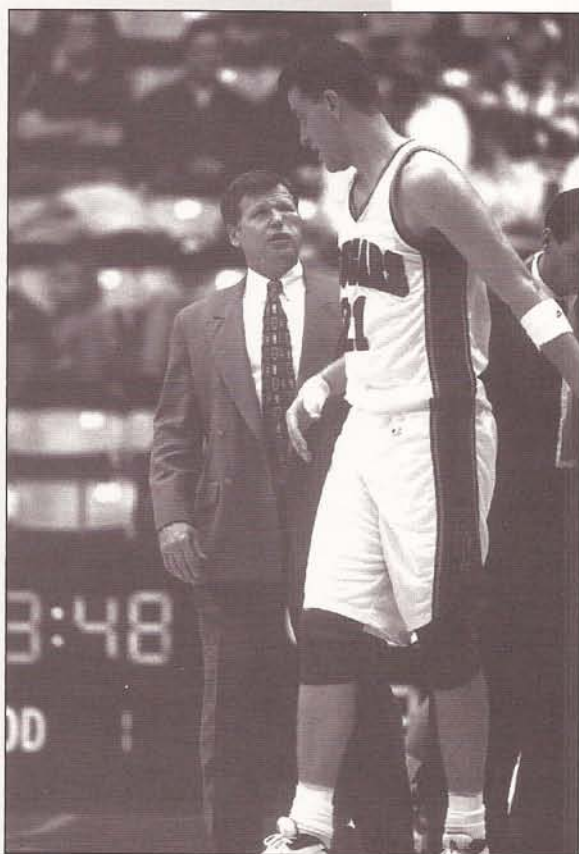
In three years (1985-88) as head coach at Gordon College in Barnesville, Ga., his teams were 60-33, going to the state playoffs each year and playing for the region 17 championship in 1988.

After being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club Junior College Coach of the Year in 1988, Ingle was hired as the head coach at the University of Alabama at Huntsville. In one year he led the Chargers to more victories than UAH had won in the two previous years combined and established a solid foundation for the program's future.

Ingle has directed dozens of basketball camps and worked at the BYU camp several times prior to becoming a Cougar coach.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (20), who plays basketball at Gardner — Webb University in Boiling Springs, N.C.; Sunshine (18), Golden (15), Tony, Jr. (14) and Israel (12).

For several years, the children performed basketball dribbling and ball-handling routines as the "Little Nuggets" and were named the third best halftime show in the NBA. They also produced a half-hour video tape (*Dribbling to Dreams*) on basketball skills.



Lynn Archibald

Lynn Archibald enters his third season as an assistant coach for the Cougars.

Archibald, who played collegiately at Utah State, joined BYU's staff two years ago and has already made a big impact for the Cougars, especially in the area of recruiting. Archibald coordinates the recruiting efforts for BYU and was instrumental in helping the Cougars land one of the top recruiting classes in the nation last year.

Archibald came to BYU from Arizona State University where as an assistant he helped the Sun Devils to a record five straight postseason appearances. He has also served as head coach at the University of Utah and Idaho State.

"I want to have the most competent staff I can," says Coach Roger Reid. "We were fortunate to get Lynn. I've always been impressed with his work ethic and his outstanding recruiting ability. Plus, he's been a head coach and understands both roles. He brings outstanding experience in every aspect of basketball to BYU."

At Idaho State, he had a 69-68 record after being the youngest head coach in the NCAA. In six years at Utah he was 98-85, won a Western Athletic Conference title, received two NCAA bids and played in two National Invitational Tournaments.

"Arch is a class guy," said Arizona State Coach Bill Frieder. "He'd be a great addition to any program. I'm sorry to see him make the change but I can understand it."

At ASU, Archibald directed much of his attention to directing the Sun Devils' up-tempo offense, which was among the school's best in points scored and in three-point shooting.

Archibald was born in Logan and lived in Oregon and California. He graduated from Torrance High. He played at Utah State his freshman year and El Camino Junior College his sophomore year.

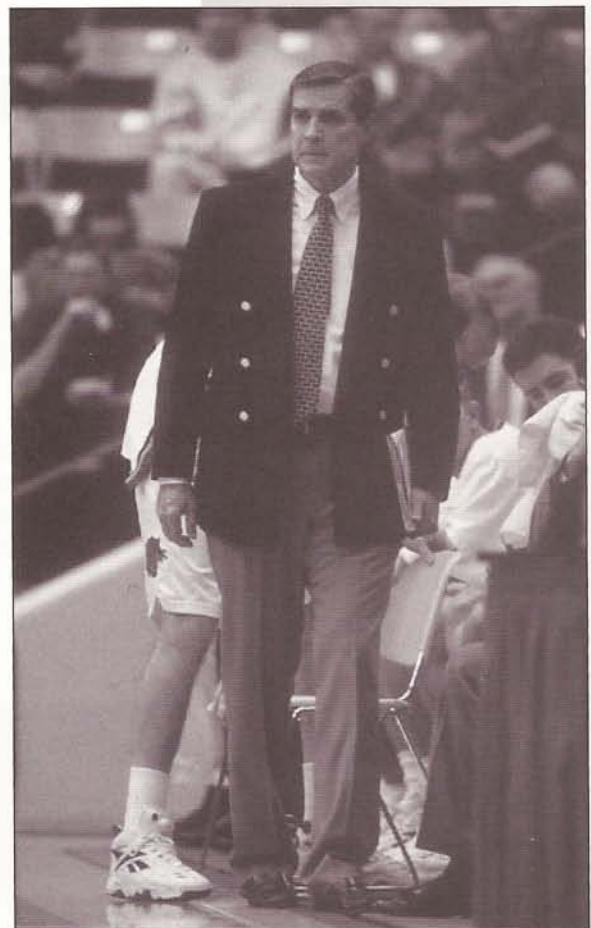
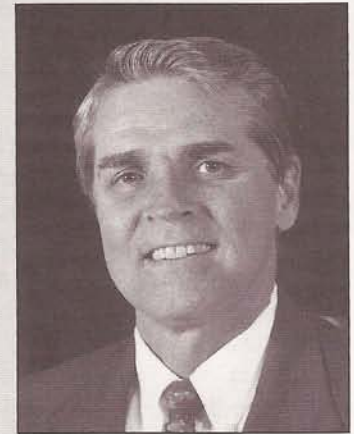
He transferred to Fresno State, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in 1968.

The next year he was head coach at Sierra Vista High in Baldwin Park, Calif., and then head coach two years at Los Amigos High in Fountain Valley, Calif.

During the 1971-72 season Archibald was an assistant at Long Beach State and spent a year at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, where he obtained a master's degree.

It was on to Nevada-Las Vegas for three seasons and to Southern California for one. He was head coach at Idaho State for five years (1978-82), an assistant at Utah in 1983 and then head coach.

He and his wife, Anne, have been married 28 years and have three children: Damon (24) graduated from Boise State and is currently employed in Montana; Lee Anne (22) graduated from BYU in journalism and is a personal assistant to David Letterman in New York City; and Beau (19) a 6-7 freshman basketball player at Washington State.

He has written two books on his experiences at BYU. The long-time LDS bishop and his wife, Hannah, have three daughters and a son in addition to seven foster children.



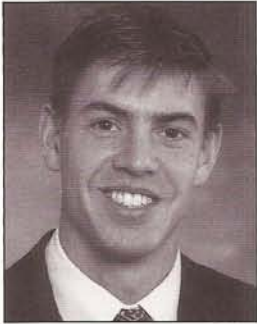

1995-96 in Review

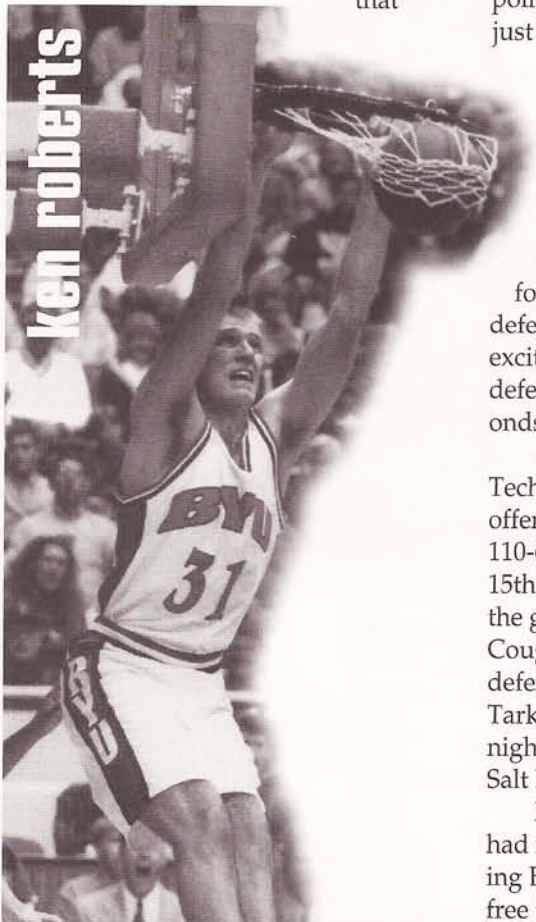


1995-96 season review

The 1995-96 basketball season saw the closing chapters of two prolific basketball careers—Ken Roberts and Randy Reid. Roberts ended his career as BYU's seventh leading scorer (1,652 points), third all-time in free throws made and attempted, and eighth in field goals made and field goal percentage. Twice Roberts was named to the All-WAC first team and was voted top WAC rebounder by his peers. "No one has more respect for him than I do," said Utah head coach Rick Majerus of Roberts. "He's always there when it counts."

Reid finished his career number four all-time in assists, sixth in free throws made, third in free throw percentage, first in three point attempts. As a capstone to his career he was named to the All-WAC Defensive Team.

"Randy Reid is a tremendous star," said Fresno State's Jerry Tarkanian. "He's one of the few guys that



Dominick (Young) had a hard time stopping. He's a heckuva player."

Under the leadership of Reid and Roberts, along with BYU's new star Bryon Ruffner, the Cougars put together a solid season. At the beginning of the 1995-96 season, the Cougars had several questions to be answered, mainly, who would fill the gapping wholes left in the Cougar line-up with the departure of Robbie Reid, Russell Larson, and Shane Knight. BYU didn't have to wait long for its questions to be answered.

In its first game of the season, BYU's Bryon Ruffner, a transfer from Utah Valley State College, led the Cougars to a 15-point victory over Boise State by pouring in 28 points. At eighth-ranked Mississippi State, BYU saw the emergence of true freshman point guard Todd Christensen, who just missed a three-point shot in the final seconds to put the game into overtime.

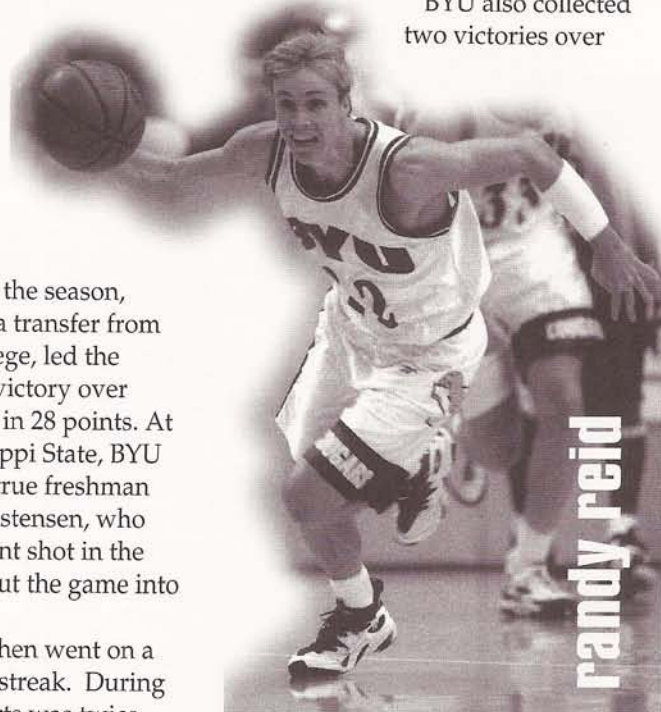
The Cougars then went on a four-game win streak. During that span, Roberts was twice named WAC player of the Week and BYU won the Cougar Classic for the fifth consecutive year by defeating Louisiana Tech 74-64. In an exciting in-state match-up, BYU defeated Weber State in the final seconds at the Marriott Center 91-86.

After losing on the road to Texas Tech, the Cougars had their highest offensive total of the season during a 110-69 whipping of Morgan State. At 15th-ranked Utah, BYU led much of the game, but rebounds cost the Cougars the contest. Changing defenses helped BYU beat a talented Tarkanian-led Fresno State team two nights after the Bulldogs upset Utah in Salt Lake City.

In WAC competition the Cougars had many exciting moments, including Bryon Ruffner's game-winning free throw with three seconds left at

Hawai'i. After trailing Wyoming by 12 points in Provo, BYU went on a 12-0 run in the final minutes of the first half as Ken Roberts' season-high 32 points helped the Cougars to victory. BYU defeated the Air Force Academy for the 15th consecutive time, the longest current streak by any team in the WAC.

BYU also collected two victories over



UTEP. At UTEP, the Cougars sank 34 of 42 free throws to win 90-82. At Wyoming, BYU showed why it finished the season as the nation's third-ranked free throw shooting team as the Cougars made 18 consecutive free throws to win one of the most physical games of the year.

BYU led New Mexico, a top-25 finisher, by nine points at halftime in Provo, then shot 30 percent from the field in the second half letting the upset fall through their hands.

Behind the abilities of Roberts, Reid and Ruffner, BYU's high powered offense ranked 16th in the nation in scoring and attracted the largest attendance in the Western Athletic Conference. BYU averaged over 17,961 fans over 15 home games including a 22,849 sellout on March 2 against Utah.

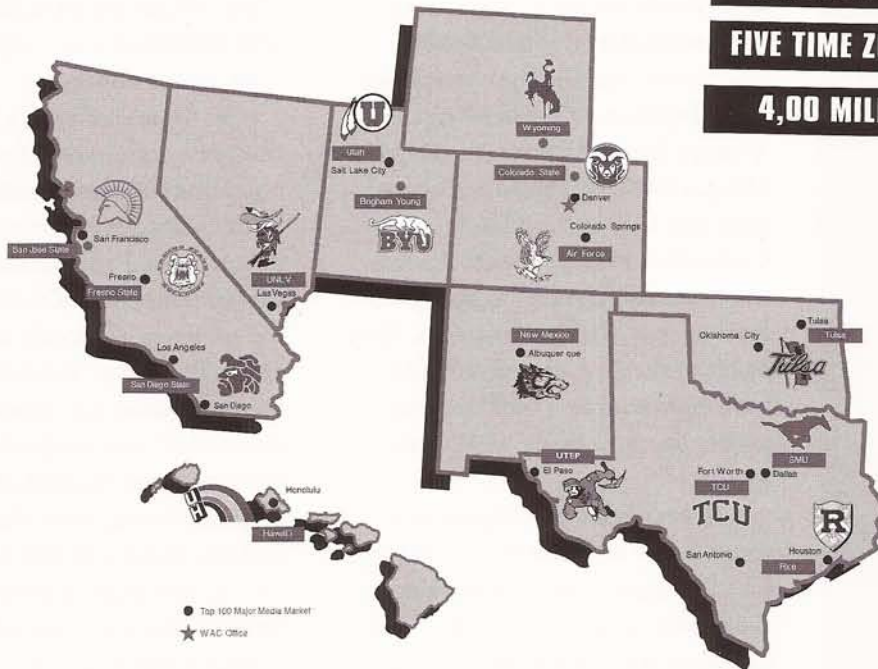

Meet The New WAC

The Western Athletic Conference enters a new era in 1996, becoming the nation's largest NCAA Division I-A conference. With the addition of UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa, WAC membership now stands at 16 institutions.

Beginning with the 1996-97 season, the WAC has adopted a divisional format for scheduling in which quadrants will be utilized to form two eight-team divisions (Pacific and Mountain) in the four primary team sports. The quadrants will rotate every year in men's and women's basketball and volleyball, and every other year in football, in order to promote a full-conference concept.

Compared to many of the nation's Division I conferences, the WAC is still in its youth. Its history traces back to 1962, when the original six-team league was created. The concept of a WAC began in 1958 when Brigham Young's Edwin Kimball, Leo Harris of Oregon and Roy S. Keen of Oregon State met During the NCAA Convention in New York to discuss the "ideal conference" because problems existed in their alignments. They believed such a conference should have eight members with approximately the same goals, ideals and resources.

Although the meeting did not result in any action, it established an idea that again was discussed two years later at the 1960 NCAA Convention in New York. There, Dick Clausen, athletic director at Arizona, and Pete McDavid, athletic director at New Mexico, organized a meeting which included representatives of

Oregon State, Oregon, Washington State, Brigham Young, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Arizona State. Glenn "Red" Jacoby of Wyoming also was to be invited to the meeting, but could not be located on short notice.

BYU's Dr. Kimball was elected the chairman of the group. Over the next two years plans were formulated as the faculty representatives and presidents became involved with the athletic directors in the deliberations.

While membership structure was debated, three of the group members — Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State — decided to re-align with the other Pacific Coast institutions, and the remaining university representatives were left to fill the openings. Although Wyoming, New Mexico State and Utah State applied, only Wyoming was accepted as the final charter member.

By the end of 1961, a working draft of a constitution, by-laws and operating code was drafted by Thomas Hall, the faculty representative at Arizona, and Paul Brechler, the WAC's first commissioner. On July 27, 1962, the conference officially was organized by the Presidents' Council when the original charter was signed, and the name WAC was adopted. Charter members were Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference; the others were members of the Skyline.

The WAC began operation with the 1962-63 academic year, and several changes have occurred since. UTEP and Colorado State became members

in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. Since that time, membership additions include San Diego State (July 1978), Hawai'i (July 1979), the United States Air Force Academy (July 1980), and Fresno State (July 1992).

Paul Brechler was the WAC commissioner from 1962-68, Wiles Hallock from 1968-71, Stan Bates from 1971-80, Dr. Joe Kearney from 1980 to 1994 and Karl Benson 1994 to the present.

The WAC began competition with 10 sports, including football, basketball, track and field, baseball, wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and gymnastics. The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title. New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series, and less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy.

Presently the WAC crowns team and individual champions

in 21 sports -- 11 men's and 10 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and wrestling. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Before July 1, 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name. With the addition of Air Force and Hawai'i women's programs as well as the six new members in 1996, all of the institutions' men's and women's teams will compete in the WAC for the first time.

The WAC office has been located in the Denver area since the conference's inception with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.



SIX YEARS OF HIGHLIGHTS

1989-90 Picked sixth, BYU ties for WAC title (21-9, 11-5). Roger Reid named WAC and District Coach of the Year. BYU finishes the year 15-0 at home.

1990-91 Team wins 21 games for second straight year (21-13, 11-5 in WAC). BYU beats eighth-ranked Utah to win the WAC Tournament. Shawn Bradley breaks national freshman blocked shots record with 177.

1991-92 The Cougars win the regular season (25-7, 12-4 in WAC) and the WAC Tournament. Reid named WAC and district coach of the year. Russell Larson named WAC Freshman of the Year.

1992-93 BYU gets its second-straight 25-win season (25-9). The Cougars repeat as WAC champions (15-3) with a league record 12 straight wins. In his first four seasons Reid is fourth on the WAC's list of titles won.

1993-94 BYU comes within a basket of the regular-season WAC title (22-10, 12-6). The Cougars play in the championship game of the WAC Tournament for the third time in four years.

1994-95 Reid leads BYU to its sixth-straight 20-plus winning season (22-10, 13-5) and has best winning percentage in WAC history (.725). The Cougars play in their sixth straight post-season tournament. BYU goes unbeaten at home to go 55-4 in last 59 games.

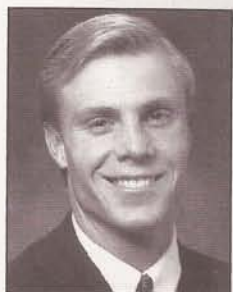

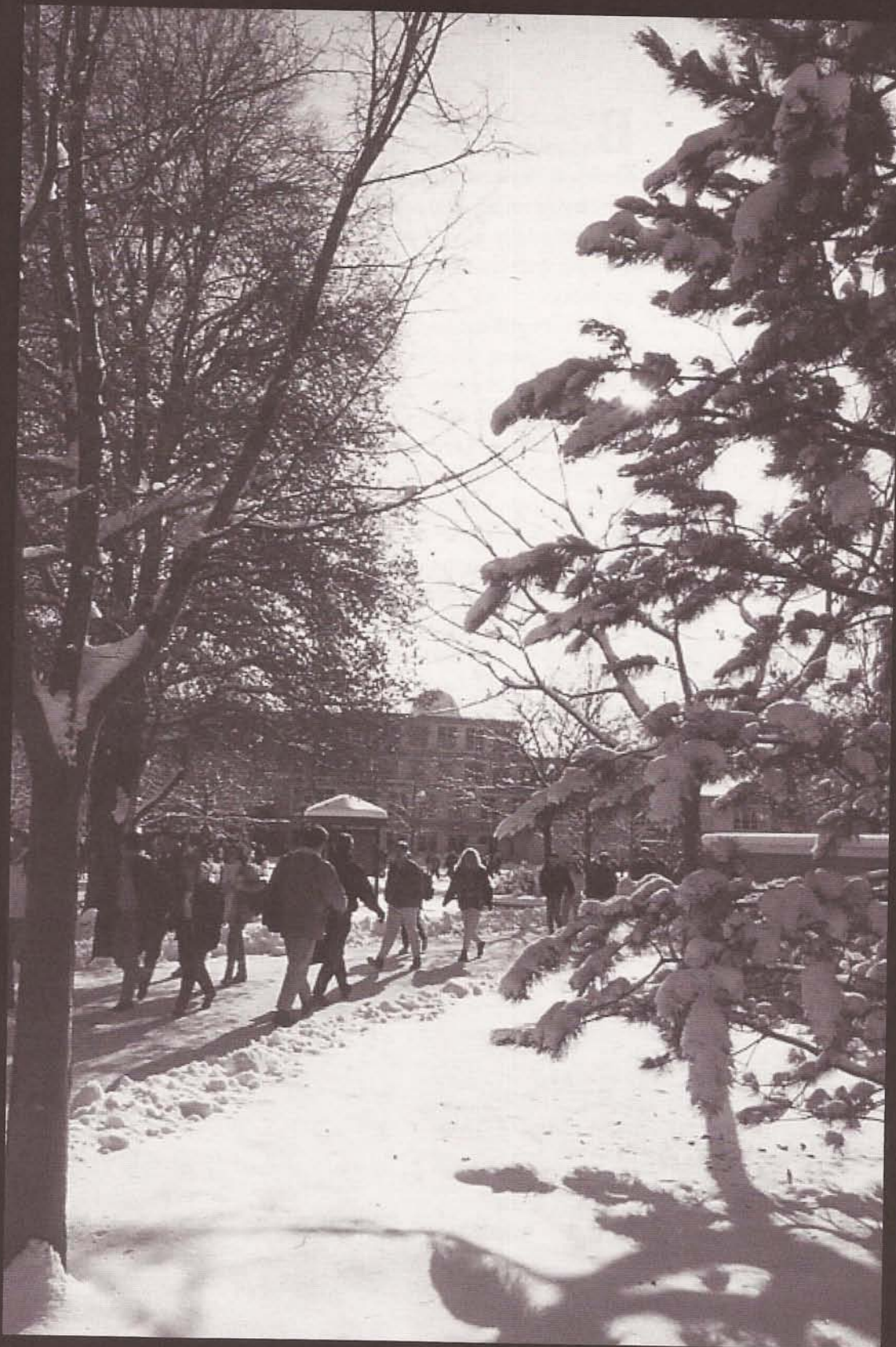

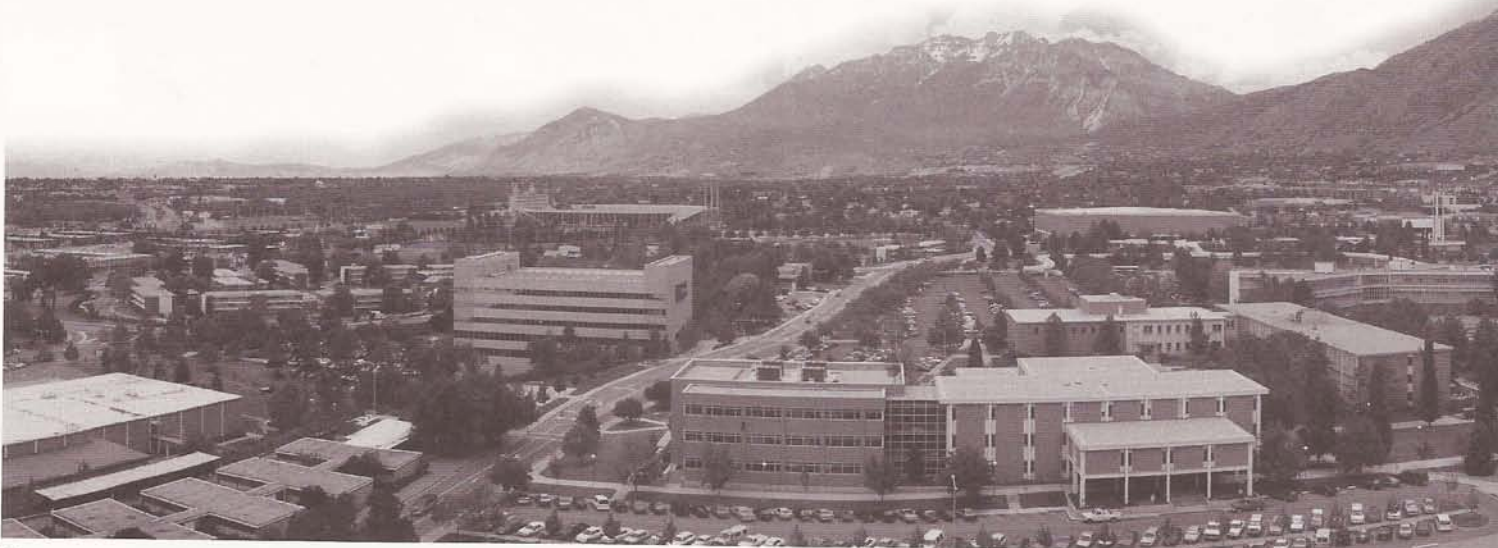
Academic excellence is increasingly evident as 78 percent of the 1,460 faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 educational, business,

posite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. BYU is ranked 10th in the nation for the number of National Merit Scholars in attendance.

BYU offers bachelor's degrees in 166 academic programs, master's degrees in 71, and doctorates in 33. Courses are available from 60 departments in 11 colleges, two areas of general undergraduate education, two professional schools, and graduate studies.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the Marriott School of



manufacturing program, and BYU's engineering programs.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcast Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new Museum of Art was recently completed.

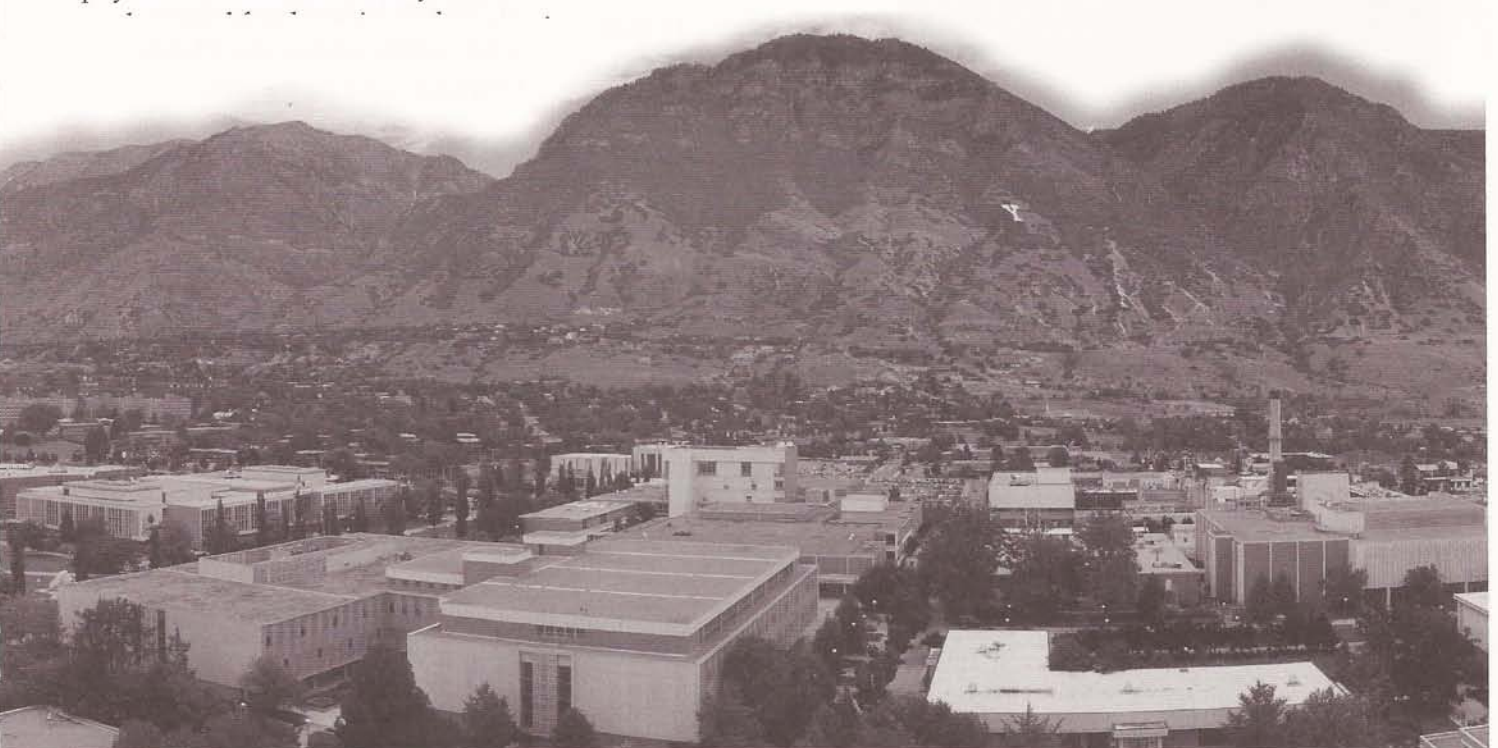
Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU

character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, many having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church.

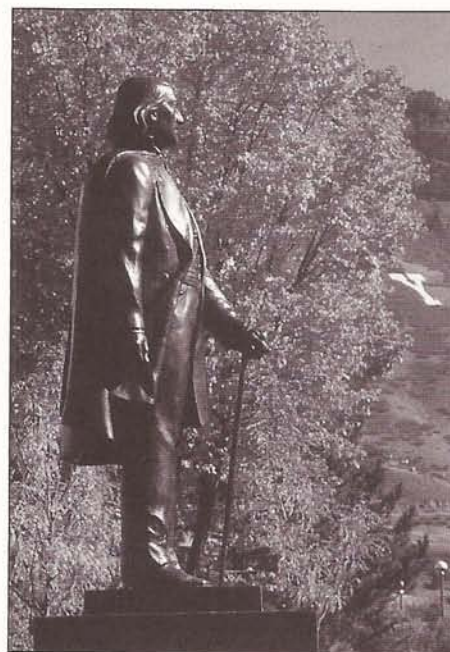

When Brigham Young Academy was established on October 16, 1875, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God.

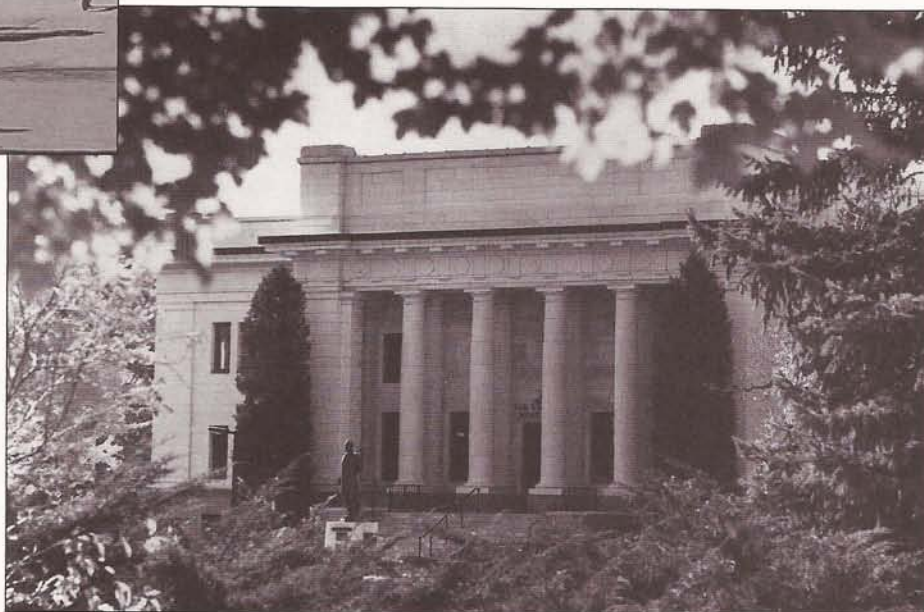
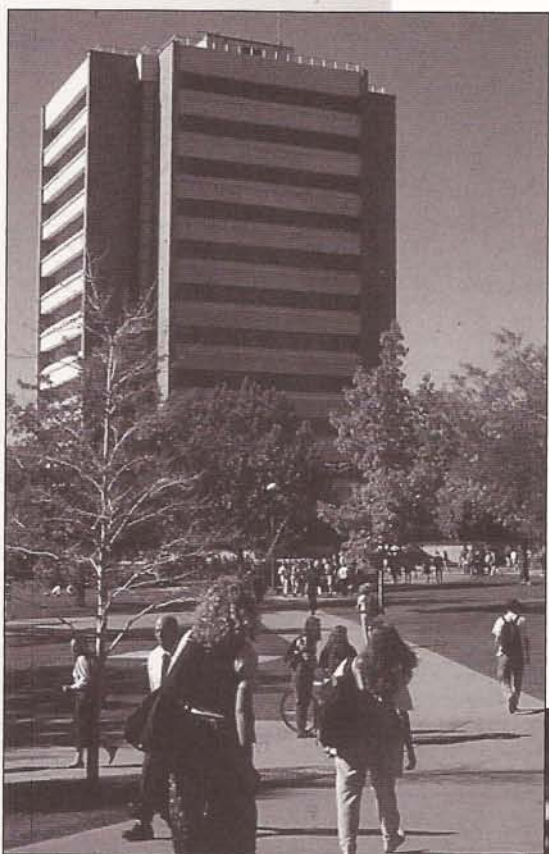
The academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903. BYU is now a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in



Provo, Utah, a city of 98,000 in a valley of 303,000, and is situated 4,560 feet above sea level.

The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos north of the campus and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

The Community

The Utah County metropolitan communities of Provo and Orem are home to a growing high tech mecca featuring world headquarters for computer firms Novell, Inc., and Corel Draw's WordPerfect. The Provo/ Orem area boasts one of the highest standards of living in the country along with an excellent educational environment, high quality health care, a lower than average crime rate and rich cultural and recreational opportunities for its citizens. Two of Utah County's mountain



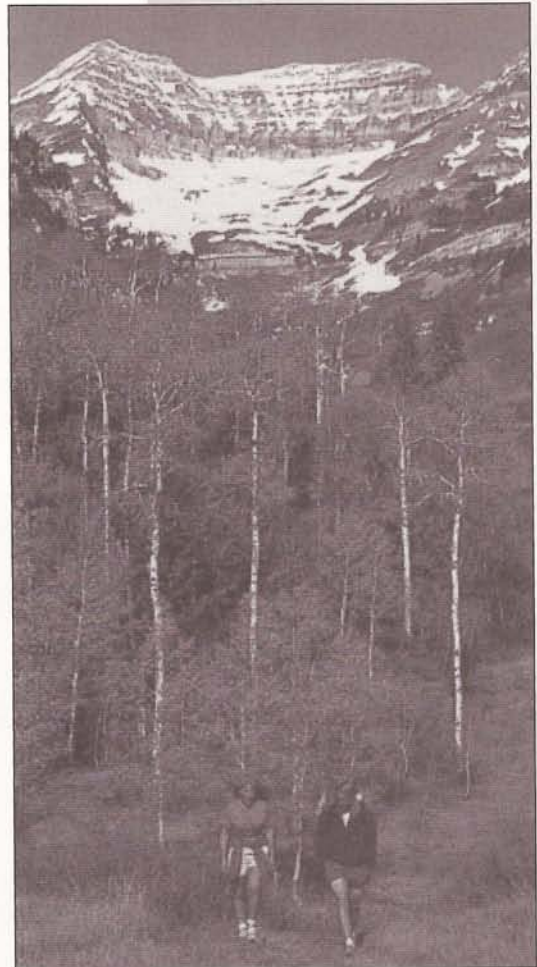

American Fork Canyon's sheer cliff walls rising thousands of feet leave visitors in awe as they hike to Timpanogos Cave National Monument.

Central Location

Just 45 minutes from Salt Lake City and Park City and 30 minutes from the picturesque Heber Valley, Utah County is the perfect place for a vacation or business trip. Six spectacular national parks and monuments are all within a half day's drive, and the state's major ski resorts are a short drive away.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has built a legacy of success.

In 1991, *USA TODAY* ranked the BYU men's sports program 18th in the nation and the women's sports program ninth. In 1994, the first annual Sears Directors Cup sponsored by *USA TODAY* and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics placed BYU's sports programs at 22nd in the nation. The 1995 fall standings for the Cup found BYU ranked No. 15.

The University sponsors 20 NCAA-sanctioned varsity sports and captured men's national championships in football (1984), outdoor track (1970), and golf (1981). Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top 20 several times — reaching the Elite Eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981.

In 1995-96 BYU had four teams finish their respective seasons ranked among the nation's top 10 (men's and women's cross country, women's tennis and

women's gymnastics), and three other teams ranked in the top 20 (women's volleyball, women's indoor track and men's gymnastics).

Since the inception of the Western Athletic Conference in

July 1962, BYU has won more championships than any other member. In fact, during the last three decades, the Cougars have won 60 percent of the WAC championships. Included in these team titles are 10 consecutive football championships from 1976 through 1985. BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

In addition, three former Cougar athletes walked away with four medals during the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, with Frank Fredericks capturing silver medals in the 100 and 200 meter runs, the late Oluyemi Kayode winning a silver medal in the 4x 100 relay, and Christy Opara Thompson receiving a bronze in the 4x 100 relays.

Like every success story, the tradition of winning at BYU had a slow start and a humble beginnings.

The Early Years

A chronicle of the late 1890s recorded the first intercollegiate event on campus. It was a two-sport meeting between Brigham Young Academy and Utah on May 18, 1895 in Provo. There was track in the morning and a baseball game in the afternoon. The locals fared very well in track and field. However, the baseball game ended in a tie when a protested call climaxed into a wild fistfight.

In a time period when the school leaders were fighting to keep the doors open at the University it became difficult to support physical contests that could lead to inflamed feelings, surly language, and possible bodily injury. In the year following the fight in Provo, the Academy's football team engaged Utah in a contest in Salt Lake City where a vicious fight erupted between the rival fans, and it didn't end until a squad of policemen arrived. Final score: BYU 8, Utah 6.

Because of in-state fatalities from football, Karl G. Maeser, then superintendent of church schools, voted for a suspension of the game, which remained in effect until 1922. In 1921, a year before football returned to BYU, the following was printed in the *Banyan*: "Next year the varsity football begins. . . . The red-blooded action demanded by the game has aroused our ambitions. Football has come to stay."

It may have taken longer than expected—like 40 or 50 years—but the Cougars finally reached that plateau. But the longer the haul, the sharper the appreciation. And it was a long haul.

In the first year of "the return" in 1922, the Cougars played six games, scored a total of 10 points for the season, and were shut out in four contests. But things would improve.

The first athlete to bring national and international attention to the school was Alma Richards, a slender,

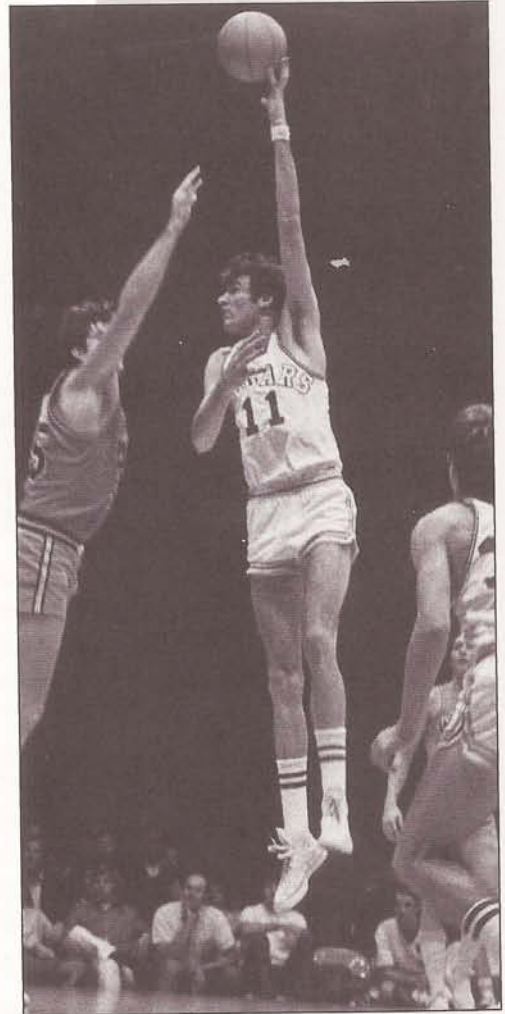
all-around athlete from Parowan, Utah. A high jumper and track athlete, Richards captured a gold medal in the Summer Olympics at Stockholm, Sweden, in 1912. Indeed, Richards was an athlete of such quality that he was favorably compared with legendary Jim Thorpe, who won a gold medal in the decathlon at Stockholm. A few years later at the World's Fair in San Francisco, Alma won the decathlon with 1,000 more points than Thorpe had scored at Stockholm.

That same year another BYU athlete, Clint Larsen, high jumped 6-7, a mark that surpassed the world record. Both Richards and Larsen were coached by the legendary E.L. Roberts, who coached every competitive men's sport at BYU.

Basketball Takes Center Stage

Another coach who made a tremendous impact on BYU athletics was Stan Watts. Watts took over an improving basketball program in 1948 and with the help of players like Joe Richey, Harold Christensen, Dean Larsen, Terry Tebbs, Tom Steinke, John Fairchild, and Kresimir Cosic, he would win eight conference titles, two NIT championships, and escort the team on three major tours abroad. He coached from 1948-72 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. in 1986.

Led by Watts and 6'0 forward Roland Minson, the Cougars defeated St. Louis, Seton Hall and Dayton for the 1951 NIT Championship. At that time winning the NIT was like winning the NCAA tournament today. By winning the championship, BYU was forever put on the map and received a

lot of attention in the national media. One newspaper account read that the

Cougars had "stolen away the hearts of the [Madison Square] Garden fans with their fight, sportsmanship and clean play."

Fifteen years later in 1966 BYU returned again to Madison Square Garden under

Watts and claimed its second NIT title. For many fans these were the real "glory days" of basketball. But there was more to come.

BYU outgrew the 10,000-seat George Albert Smith Fieldhouse, and in 1971, the Cougars moved into the Marriott Center, the largest on-campus facility in the nation at the time. With a capacity of 23,000, there was some concern about filling the new arena. In the

first year it was open, the Cougars posted a 12-0 record at home and averaged 21,818 fans per game. The stars of the '70s, '80s, and early '90s included Cosic (All-American his senior year), Danny Ainge

(winner of the Eastman and Wooden Awards as college basketball's top player, who also led BYU to the Elite Eight in the NCAA tournament), Devin Durrant, Michael Smith, Andy Toolson, Fred Roberts, Greg Kite, Steve Trumbo and Shawn Bradley.

Football Comes of Age

It was Virgil Carter in the 1960's who helped bring BYU football into the national spotlight. Behind the leadership of Carter and coach Tommy Hudspeth the Cougars won the school's first ever WAC championship in 1965. The next year Carter was selected as an All-American and became the first of a long line of outstanding quarterbacks at BYU.

The real coming of age for BYU football began in 1972 when LaVell Edwards became head coach. The quiet man from neighboring Orem, who, as a kid, used to dream of coaching while watching BYU practice, built a football dynasty that has become one of the most successful college football programs in the last 20 years.

In the 24 years he has guided BYU, the Cougars have won outright or shared 17 WAC Championships. They have made 19 bowl appearances—17 of them consecutively—a national championship, and awards too numerous to mention. The team's passing game is regarded as the best and most consistent in college, almost to the point of being an art form. Edwards and his pass-happy offense have produced numerous All-Americans and a Heisman Trophy winner.

Football fans in Provo will forever remember BYU's national championship year. In 1984 Edwards and his Cougars went 13-0 posting wins over Pittsburgh, Baylor, Air Force and Michigan in the Holiday Bowl. BYU had 13 opportunities to lose that year, but came away victors each time.

On January 3, 1985, BYU was voted as the top college football team in the nation in both the AP and UPI polls. This mountainous climb to the top typified BYU's winning attitude and laid the foundation of success for decades to come.



True Blue **BYU**

BYU football began on April 6, 1896 — 100 years ago. Today, spirited Cougar fans nationwide continue their strong support of the mighty blue and white. BYU consistently ranks nationally in the top 25 in football and basketball attendance and has one of the nation's premier booster organizations — The Cougar Club.

"Y" Mountain

The most visible symbol of BYU spirit is found high in the mountains east of Brigham Young University. The enormous block letter "Y" measures 465 feet high and is acclaimed as the largest sign in the country — larger than the letters spelling "HOLLYWOOD," and any neon sign on Times Square.

The 32,847 square foot structure dates back to 1906 when a drafting professor and several students made plans to put a large block BYU on the mountain. The student body formed an assembly line passing sand, rocks and lime up the side of the mountain for an entire day. The task became arduous and the idea of putting a "B" and "U" on either side of the "Y" was abandoned.



For decades the "Y" was whitewashed annually by students to show school spirit. In 1978, the face of the Y was coated with gunite, a mixture of sand and white cement, and is painted with 155 gallons of paint, which is transported by helicopter.

In 1924 BYU began lighting the "Y" during homecoming, graduation and other special events. The "Y" is now lit by 1,000 25-watt bulbs and a generator.

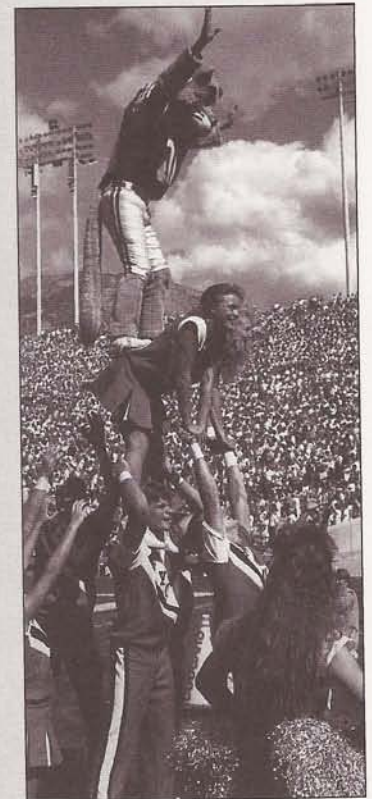
Cosmo the Cougar

Another generator of BYU spirit is BYU's mascot, Cosmo the Cougar. Cosmo's story begins on October 1, 1923 when Coach Eugene L. Roberts used the cougar to describe his athletes. At that time the cougar, a native Utah animal, was looked upon very favorably because of its powerful, agile and wise nature.

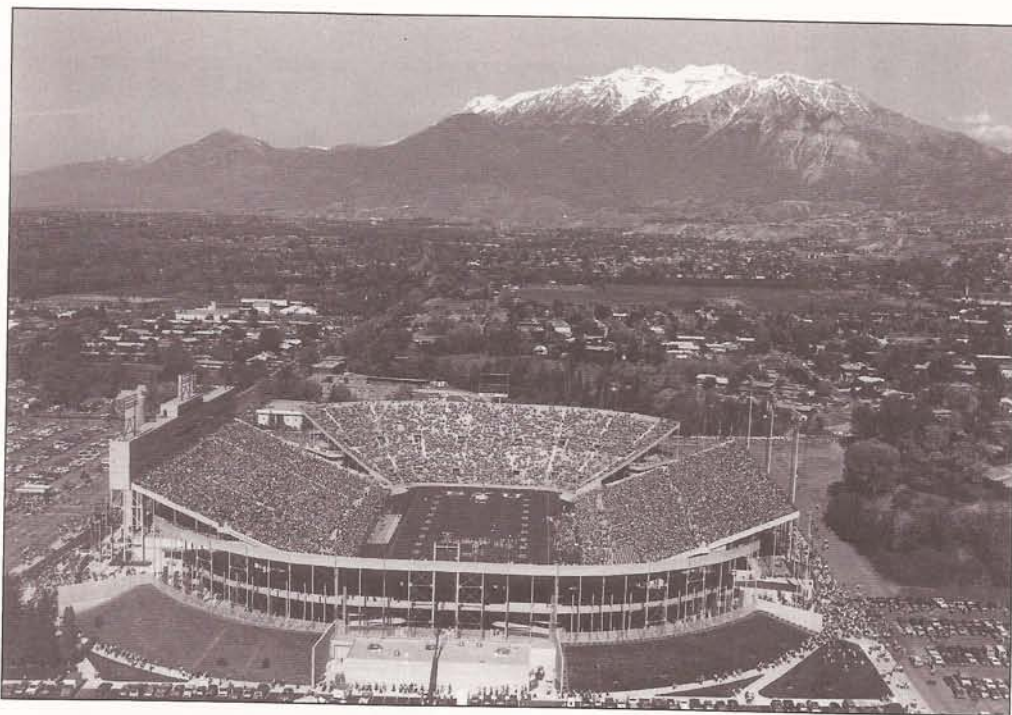
In 1925 a BYU alumnus contacted Coach Roberts informing him of a mother cougar and three kittens that had been captured. Two of these kittens were brought to Provo and kept as mascots. Soon problems resulted from keeping live cougars for mascots, so in 1953 pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson came up with a new version of the cougar mascot. Cosmo had arrived at BYU, and the acrobatic and high-spirited animal has helped cheer the Cougars to victory ever since.

Much of the success of the BYU Athletic program can be attributed to the top-notch facilities available to athletes on campus.

Success begins with training and BYU has a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning center with nearly 10,000 feet of working space that ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations to accommodate

both female and male athletes.

The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium.

Broadcasters and sports writers from around the country are inevitably impressed with the magnificent view of Mt. Timpanogos and the Wasatch Mountain Range that can be seen from the stadium press box. New to the south end zone of Cougar Stadium this year is a 23 x 31 foot video wall that shows instant replays during football games.

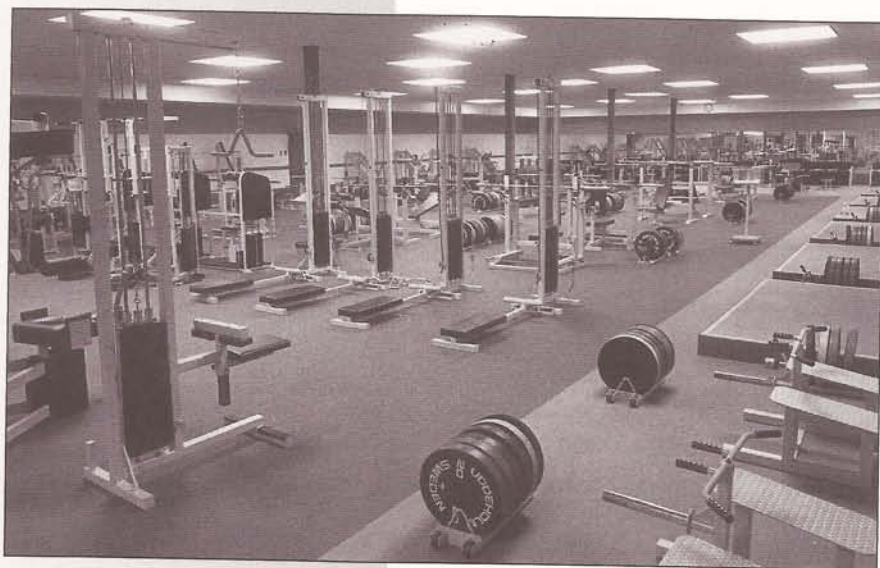
Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation.

Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, one of the largest on-campus basketball arenas in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

The baseball field and the outdoor track facilities are also rated among the nation's finest. BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. A compact design allows spectators to watch both running and field events at the same time. The NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships were held at BYU in 1982 and 1989.

Located just east of the track stadium is the BYU baseball diamond with a seating capacity of up to 4,000.

A \$3.5 million expansion to the team's locker room and athletic training facilities in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was finished in March of 1996. The Smith Fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport and includes a



Helping BYU Athletes Succeed

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office at BYU was established to provide the student-athlete with solid academic counsel which will help each athlete complete an education while participating in intercollegiate athletics.

The single most important goal of this office is to ensure student-athletes who leave BYU after four or more years complete a baccalaureate degree in their chosen field of study.

To achieve this goal, the Athletics Academic Advisement Office provides a comprehensive support service program which enables the student-athlete to make

use of all the resources at the University and to make academic progress towards graduation.

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office personnel stress to student-athletes the importance of taking advantage of athletic scholarships by educating themselves and setting the stage for their life's work.

The role of the advisor includes close monitoring of academic problems, instituting and organizing educational programs, and coordi-



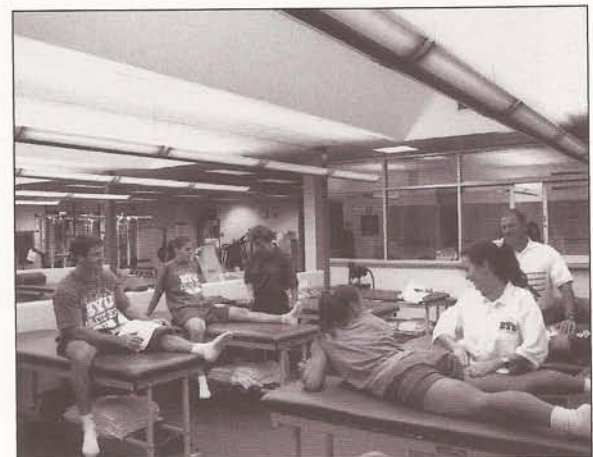
SUCCESS: Athletic Academic Advisors gather with some of the 85 student-athletes who received diplomas during the 1995-96 academic year.

nating support services with other academic and non-academic units to help in the retention and academic success of the student athlete.

If injuries occur, athletes are provided with excellent sports medicine facilities and a large staff of professional and student trainers. A well-equipped computer lab, study hall and academic advisement center are available for student athletes to aid in their studies.

Merrill J. Bateman



President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, officially began his duties on January 1, 1996.

Bateman, currently a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, succeeded President Rex E. Lee, who served as president for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described President Bateman as, "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."

Prior to assuming the presidency of BYU, President Bateman was the Presiding Bishop of the LDS church.

Bateman brings a strong back-

ground of administrative and academic experience to his new position. Before receiving his call to be a General Authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc., in England and the United States (1971-1975).

Born in Lehi, Utah and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, 1960-61, and a Danforth Fellow, 1960-64.

Early in his career, President Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964-67) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967-71). He was also a lecturer in economics at the University of Ghana in 1963.

President Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high councilor, stake president and regional representative. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

He is married to Marilyn Scholes Bateman and they are the parents of seven children; four boys and three girls. They also have 20 grandchildren.

Advancement Vice President

Dr. R.J. Snow, who is responsible for intercollegiate athletics, enters his third year as Advancement Vice President for Brigham Young University after a four-year term as Student Life Vice President.

Dr. Snow came to BYU in 1990 from Johannesburg, South Africa, where he was the mission president for three years. Before his mission call, Dr. Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984-87. He previously had been Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs at the University of Utah for more than a decade.

He also served as Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Dr. Snow moved to Washington, D.C. at age 13 and attended junior high and high school there, returning to Utah to attend Dixie College, receiving

an A.S. degree in 1957.

He served a mission in France and then enrolled at Utah, where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Dr. Snow continued his graduate education at Northwestern, where he completed master of arts (1965) and doctoral degrees (1967) in political science. He also completed post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

In 1967, Dr. Snow moved to Santa Barbara, Calif., where he was on the political science faculty at UCSB until 1973. During his tenure, he directed the University of California's Education Abroad Program for two years at the University of Bordeaux and the University of Pau in southwest France.

Dr. Snow has been very active in civic and community service, having been on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as a board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service with more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations includes board membership of the Salt Lake and Provo United Way, Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association. He was recently appointed to the *Deseret News* Board of Directors.

He married Marilyn Melville and they are the parents of four children and have one grandchild.

Rondo Fehlbberg



Athletic Director and Asst. Advancement V.P.

In his first year as athletic director, Rondo Fehlbberg has brought new energy and vision to BYU athletics.

Prior to his appointment in 1995, the former BYU All-American wrestler spent 16 years

as an attorney and executive in the oil business. Most recently, he was vice president of International New Ventures at Pennzoil with responsibilities for development and maintenance of long-term business relationships in the international business community, especially the former Soviet Union.

A native of Worland, Wyo., Fehlbberg received a B.A. degree from BYU in 1976. He served an LDS mission in Germany (1974-75) before attending BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he received a Juris Doctor degree in 1979.

While attending law school, he assisted in coaching the wrestling team. He was a three-time WAC champion and had a career record of 74-11-1, including 34 pins.

Fehlbberg is a true competitor. He compiled a 23-2 record as a senior at 150 pounds and placed fifth at the 1972 NCAA Championships. His gutsy performance earned him All-America status and helped him win BYU's Competitor Award. In 1987, he was inducted into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Three other brothers—Wayne, Reed and Paul—also wrestled for the Cougars. Reed was a 1994 inductee into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1979, Fehlbberg joined the law firm of Davis, Graham & Stubbs in Denver. In 1982 he went to work for Standard Oil of Ohio in Denver and later in Houston. Following Standard Oil's 1987 merger with British Petroleum, he moved to London for three years as part of the new management team.

Fehlbberg married Mary Bloxham of Pinedale, Wyo., and they have five sons and a daughter.

Fehlbberg was instrumental in bringing the Pigskin Classic to Provo this fall. He has also been a big boost to the recruiting efforts at BYU.

Elaine Michaelis



Women's Athletic Director

In 1995, Elaine Michaelis added the responsibility of Women's Athletic Director to her task of guiding one of the top volleyball teams in the nation.

In her 34th year at the helm of BYU's women's volleyball program,

Michaelis, one of the top 5 winningest women's volleyball coaches in the nation with a record of 726-187-5, is the only BYU coach to have taken a team to an NCAA Final Four. She has coached her teams to nine top 5 finishes and 17 top 10 national finishes.

Her best finishes were second place in 1973, fourth place in 1978, and an NCAA semifinal appearance in 1993. She has taken her teams to the NCAA tournament 13 times--placing 17th twice, 9th four times, 5th four times, and 3rd once.

Michaelis earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from BYU and has the rank of full athletic professional. In 1994 she was a recipient of the Dale Rex Award given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah. She was only the second woman to ever receive the award in its 49-year history.

She has also served as director of women's intramural and extramural programs at BYU for 10 years.

Pete Witbeck



Associate Athletic Director

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU for 47 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner.

He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff. In 1957, Witbeck was named the freshman basketball coach. During the next six years, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing just

three times his last three seasons.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshman teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck has received the Dale Rex Memorial Award, given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah.

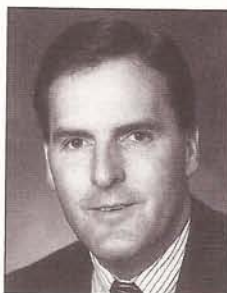
As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980. He also is a member of the Raymond Hall of Fame and Utah Oldtime Athletes' Hall of Fame.

Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During the next 10 years, the team won five WAC titles and was nationally ranked.

He has been in the athletic director's office since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

Witbeck married Kathy Pickering and they have three children.

Val Hale is in his eighth year as assistant athletic director for external relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the sports information operation and promotional/marketing efforts.

The Cougar Club

Since 1964 the Cougar Club has been helping BYU student-athletes reach their full athletic and academic potential. With over 3,500 members nationwide, the Cougar Club is the largest support group of its kind in the Western Athletic Conference and one of the nation's premier booster organizations.

The Cougar Club annually raises funds that support recruiting for both men's and women's sports. The club also sponsors enhancement programs which make BYU's athletic department consistently one of the best in the nation.

For more than 20 years Dale McCann has been the executive director of the Cougar Club and has played a significant role in the organization's tremendous growth and stability.

Programs

The Cougar Club supports a number of important programs and scholarships that help enhance BYU athletics.

Each year the Cougar Club sponsors all of BYU's athletic recruiting, bringing some of the best athletes from across the country to Provo, Utah, and allowing BYU coaches to make national and international recruiting trips.

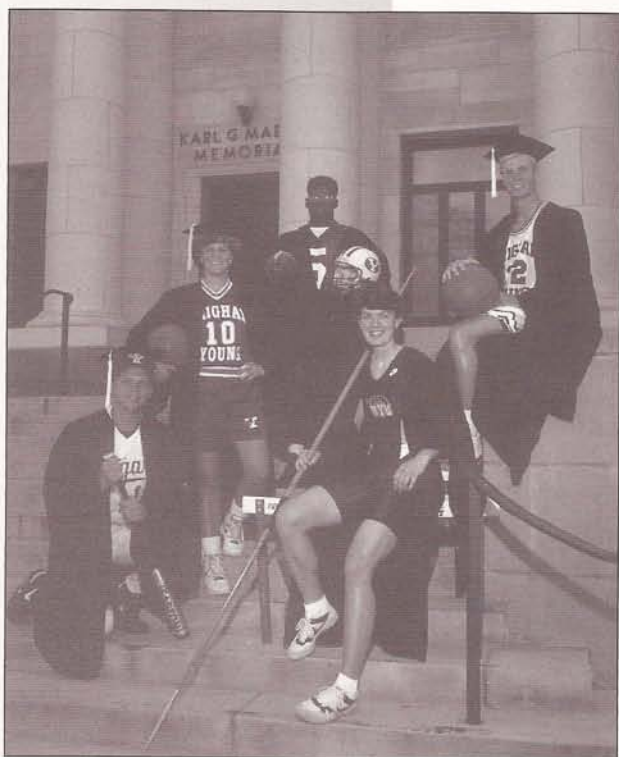
“The Cougar Club has been the financial support for our recruiting,” said women's athletic director Elaine Michaelis. “We've been able to go and get athletes wherever we find them.”

Once athletes commit to attend Brigham Young University, the club encourages each of them to achieve their athletic and scholastic potential. Funding from the Cougar Club sponsors academic tutoring for athletes and the academic advisement center. Recently, the Cougar Club also established a half million dollar endowment that provides post-eligibility scholarships for athletes.

“Right now, we have a lot of athletes whose eligibility runs out when they are 10-20 hours away from graduating, but they have no money to continue at school,” McCann said. “The endowment will keep them here another semester or two to let them finish their degree. The scholarships also let players take lighter class loads while they are competing; instead of burning out or playing poorly, athletes can pick up a class or two in the spring and summer and still graduate on time. Athletes are better able to excel academically and athletically because of this program.”

The Cougar Club also sponsors the Blue and White Network, which produces live satellite broadcasts of BYU sporting events nationwide, as well as local football and basketball replays and radio broadcasts of BYU baseball, basketball and volleyball.

“We are promoting BYU as a nationally recognizable program, not one just for Utah County,” McCann said. “I think we've separated ourselves from other programs in Utah

because of our television. Notre Dame has a better TV network, but no one has better access to reach all of their alumni in so many ways. You can live in Kansas or Oregon or Virginia and still watch almost all of BYU's games."

Events

Annual Cougar Club events are enjoyed by club members and athletic personnel alike. Each year the club sponsors the Pigskin Family Picnic, the "Meet the Football Team" watermelon bust, the men's basketball Varsity Preview, monthly luncheons for the Salt Lake and Utah County chapters, and a reception for women athletes each September.

Those athletes who earn a 3.2 GPA or better in a calendar year are honored at the annual Athletic Awards Banquet. The Cougar Club also sponsors the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame and the Dale Rex Memorial Award.

Before each BYU home football game, club members enjoy a preview of the upcoming contest and a delicious buffet at Cougar Club Pre-game Briefings in the Cougar Room. When the Cougars play on the road, Cougar Club members enjoy discount accommodations and exciting tour packages co-sponsored by the Cougar Club and the BYU Alumni Association.

Benefits

Cougar Club membership provides priority seating for football and basketball games as well as bowl ticket priority. Members also receive a membership plaque or desk memento, a bi-weekly newsletter and other sports publications, parking passes for sporting events at Cougar Stadium and the Marriott Center, as well as special club travel opportunities. Club memberships are available at many contribution levels, starting as low as \$100 a year.

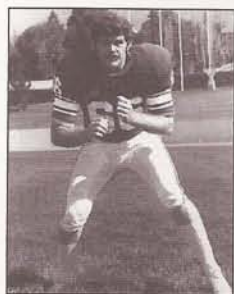

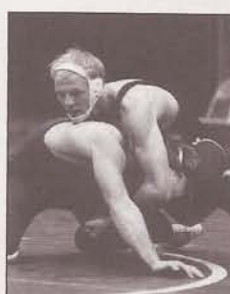

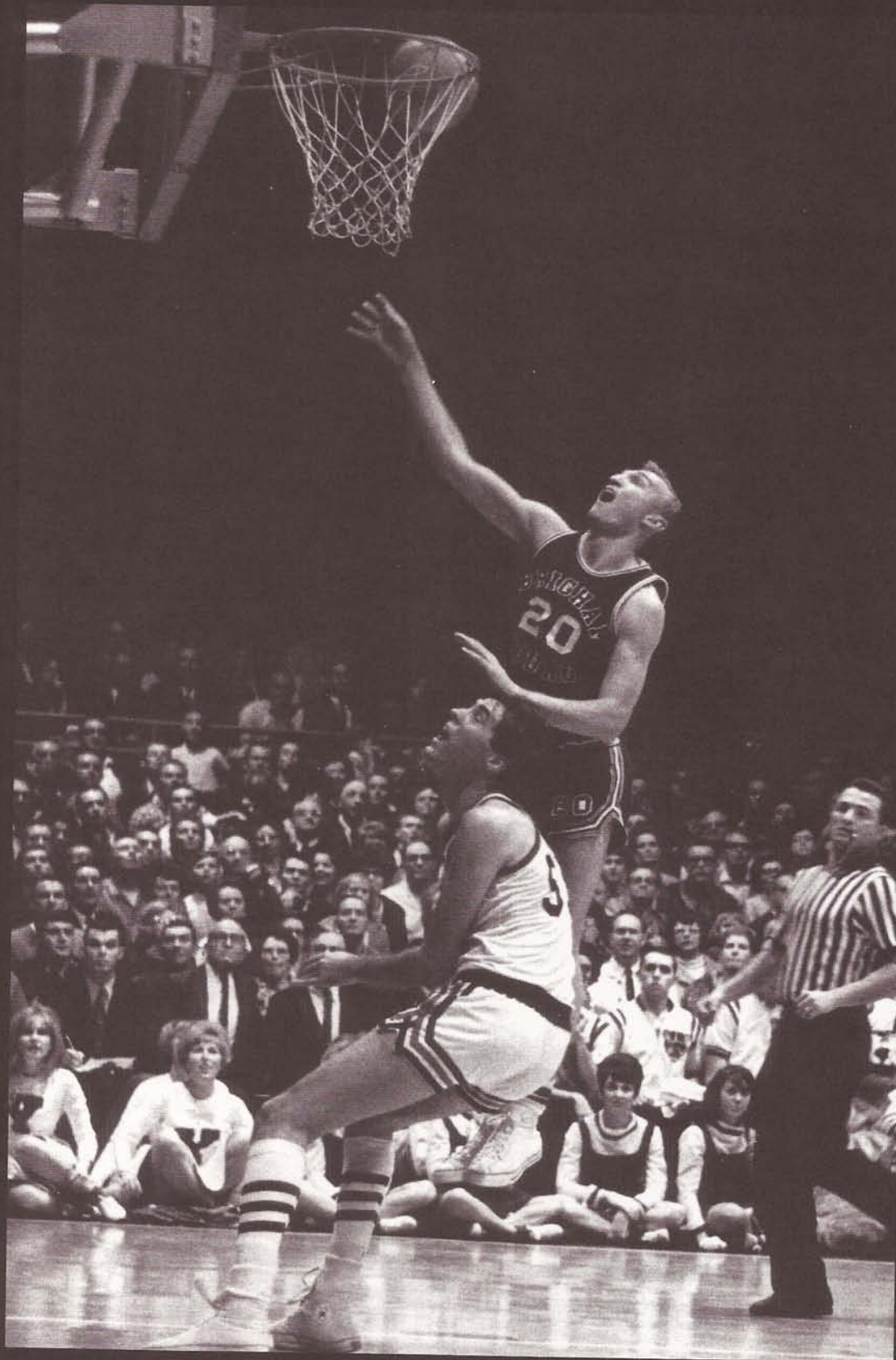

A Historical View

High above the Marriot Center floor nestled among the rafters hang a pair of signs commemorating BYU's NIT championships. These signs might go unnoticed by many young fans who don't remember the historic 1951 and 1966 championships, but today they stand as testaments of BYU's prolific basketball history.

Back in the 1950s and 1960s, the National Invitational Tournament had a different connotation than it does today. Then, it had 12 teams, not 32 and the NIT was the place to be. "That was basketball in those days," said Pete Witbeck former assistant basketball coach and current assistant athletic director. "Back then, the NIT champ was the big champion. We could have gone to either NCAA or NIT. We chose the NIT because it was more prestigious. Playing basketball at Madison Square Garden is like playing football at Notre Dame.

These days the NIT has become a tournament for teams who don't get

invited to the NCAA tournament, but those championships in 1951 and 1966 put BYU on the basketball map.

BYU basketball history apparently began in 1902 under coach E. L. Roberts when Brigham Young Academy played area high school teams and some in-state schools. Historians, however, generally recognize that intercollegiate basketball began at BYU during the 1917-18 season when the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

45 Years Ago

In 1951, BYU's legendary coaching figure Stan Watts was in his second year at the Cougar helm and had led BYU to a 24-7 record going into the NIT. Oddly enough, due to construction of the Smith Fieldhouse, the team used the University of Utah gymnasium as its home floor.

"We were together for a long period of time," said Loren C. Dunn, a for-

mer member of the 1951 championship team. "We played 10 games in Brazil before the season began. That brought us together. Every member of that team knew the other players well. It was a close playing relationship. There was a lot of integrity and character on the team. Every member of the team has gone on to lead very productive lives."

Led by six-foot forward Roland Minson, who would be the NIT MVP, the Cougars defeated St. Louis, Seton Hall and Dayton on their way to the championship.

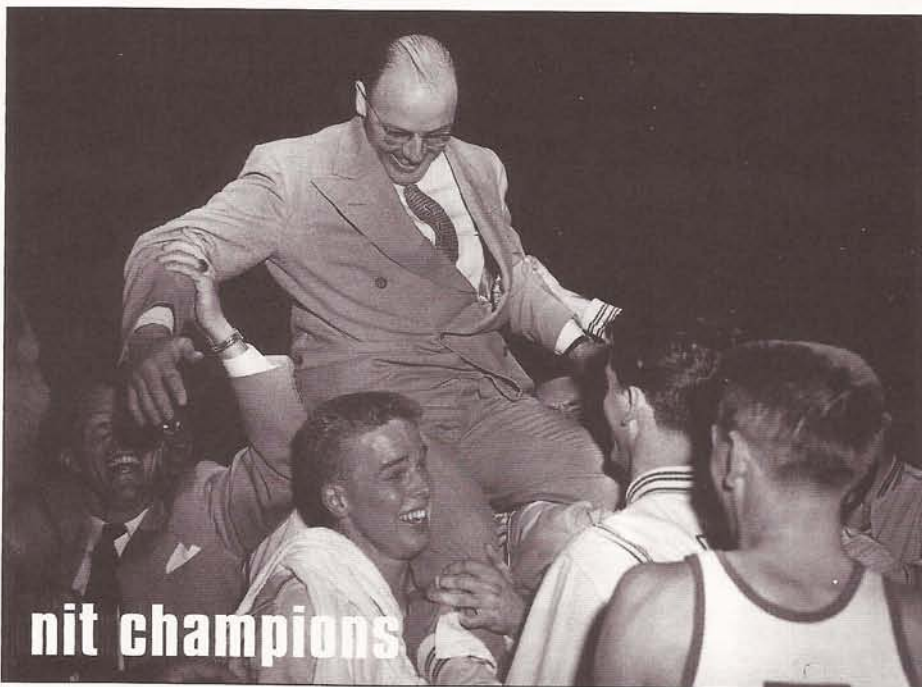
Just who were these boys from the West, anyway?

On that season's roster, BYU had 10 players from the state of Utah, two from Idaho, two from California, and one from Wyoming. One newspaper account read that the Cougars had "stolen away the hearts of the Garden fans with their fight, sportsmanship and clean play."

Former guard Harold Christensen remembers during one of the games a black player fell to the floor. "Joe Richey helped him up and they wrote it up in the New York papers," Christensen said. "It was something that wasn't done in those days."

Watts still remembers well that first title. "It meant a lot to the church and the school because it was the first national championship BYU had ever won," he said. "When you went to the movies at that time there were news shorts beforehand. After we won, news about our championship went all over the world. It's hard to measure the impact except through letters you get from fans. But I think it opened a lot of doors. We went to South America, Europe and Asia to play basketball."

"In those days the NIT tourna-

ment was as prestigious as the NCAA," Christensen said.

30 Years Ago

In 1966, BYU had a record of 17-5 when it finished its regular season and headed to the NIT. "We played three games and we were the No. 1 seed," Witbeck said. BYU beat Temple handily in the first game. In the second game, BYU played against Army and its young coach, Bobby Knight.

"Against Army in the second game we were down three at the half," Witbeck said. "We were an up-tempo, transition team, as smooth as silk. They were a team that liked to hold other teams and slow things down. We played defensive in the second half. We changed our game plan to adjust to Eastern-style of officiating. Army had taken us out of our game."

The championship game was against New York University, a school which has since given up athletics.

"They had two or three All-Americans," Witbeck said. "It was a classic game of fastbreak basketball. It was a wonderful win. They had a parade for us in Provo. It was like winning a national championship, which it was.

"I coached basketball here 20 years and that was the culmination of it. That was what it was all about," Witbeck said. "You're lucky to get it once in your life. We had our day in the sun in New York City. Fans back there are very knowledgeable. You had better play well or they'd come after you. Watts was revered in New York City."

For the championship game, President Ezra Taft Benson, who was then U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, was in attendance as well as BYU President Earnest Wilkinson. "Red Auerbach and Bob Cousy were scouting," Witbeck said. "The Who's Who of the basketball world was there."

BYU's longtime Sports Information Director Dave Schulthess remembers that game being "the ath-

letic department's first association with Howard Cosell and Frank Gifford, who talked to the team at practice. For Schulthess, winning it all stands out most. "After it was over, it was pure elation," he said. "It was a big event."

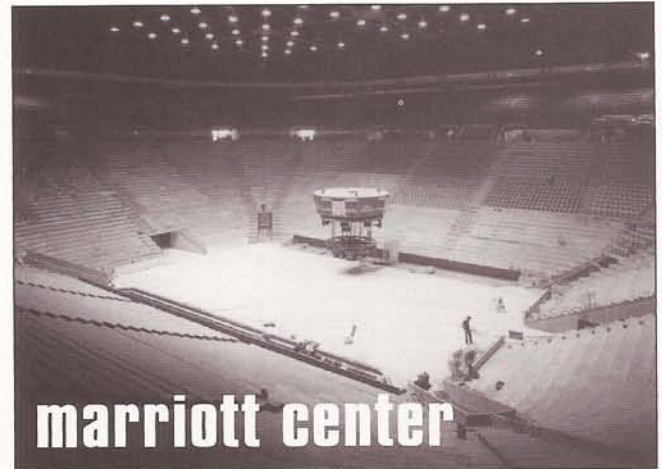
25 Years Ago

The year 1971 saw the birth of the Marriott Center. At the time it was built, and for several years after it was in use, the Marriott Center was known as the largest on-campus arena with 22,700 seats (which was the student enrollment in 1971). The Center's first game took place Dec. 3, 1971. Yet the first game did not involve BYU. That honor belongs to St. Joseph's and Pacific. Those schools played in the opening game of the BYU Classic. After that game, BYU beat Kansas State, 78-72 and edged St. Joseph's the following night, 73-72.

Not only was 1971-72 the birth of the Marriott Center, but it was also the farewell season for one of BYU's most loved and admired players — Kresimir Cosic. That season, Cosic, who was a three-time All-WAC First Team Selection, was selected as a first team All-American.

BYU went 12-0 at the Marriott Center that year, something BYU has done four times since. It's often been said, in reference to the Marriott Center, "Stan built it, Kresimir Cosic filled it and J. Willard Marriott paid for it."

Before the arena opened, BYU administrators, led by President Wilkinson, held a contest to determine the name of the arena. The prize was \$100. Soon after, however, J. Willard Marriott (Marriott Hotels) offered a donation of one million and, essentially, won the contest.



"The Marriott Center is one of the top five places to play in the country, not just because of its size, but because its facilities are fantastic," UTEP coach Don Haskins has said. "If there is a better arena, I haven't seen it."

15 Years Ago

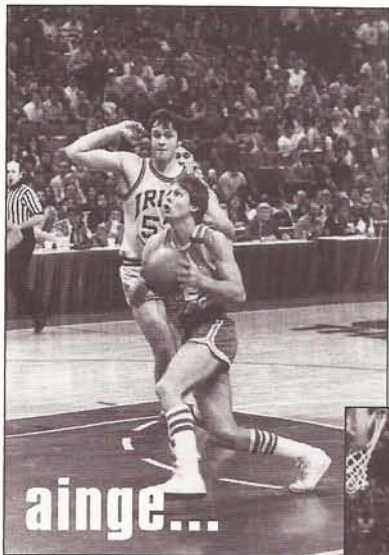
In 1981, BYU finished the regular season with a 22-6 record and finished second place in the WAC, behind Utah. However, in the regular season finale in Provo — Danny Ainge's final game at the Marriott Center — the Cougars blasted the No. 7 ranked Utes by 19 points. That set the tone for what was to come.

BYU was sent to the East Regionals in Providence, Rhode Island. At the time the NCAAs had 48 teams, instead of 64, and the higher seeded teams drew byes for the first round. The Cougars' first round victim was Princeton of the Ivy League. It was a game that that Ainge almost missed because of back spasms. He played anyway.

"I decided no pain-killers," Ainge said after the game. "If I couldn't play without them, I couldn't play. I'm not about to throw away what I already have in baseball. I felt pretty good so I said I'd try playing." Ainge not only played, he scored 21 points.

"In all honesty, two hours before the game we decided not to play Danny Ainge," coach Frank Arnold said afterwards. "He couldn't get out

of bed this morning (because of severe back spasms)...and we didn't feel there was any way possible he could play."

Next up was No. 10 UCLA. That wasn't the Bruins' seeding — that was their final national ranking. Ainge outscored UCLA in the first half en route to 37 points and a 78-53 pasting of the school where Arnold had once coached under John Wooden.

Then came the game that forever will be etched in the minds of Cougar fans. The East Regional was in Atlanta where at the Omni, BYU enjoyed a dramatic victory over Notre Dame.

With 10 seconds left in the game, forward Kelly Tripucka nailed a 16-foot jumper to give Notre Dame a 50-49 lead. With eight seconds left, BYU called time out.

"I remember Arnold trying to explain the play," said former forward Steve Trumbo, who is now an assistant coach at BYU-Hawaii. "I was looking around and the play wasn't the one designed. Danny took matters into his own hands." Ainge took the ball and deftly dribbled the length of the court and softly laid up the ball over the outstretched fingertips of Notre Dame

center Orlando Woolridge. By the time the stunned Irish could inbound the ball, time had expired.

"I made up my mind to either dribble straight for the hoop or, if covered, to stop and take the jumper and possibly draw the foul," said Ainge afterwards. I dribbled between two guys at half court and saw the clock ticking away. I just went to the hole. I figured in that situation nobody

would have the guts to step in front of me and take the charge. That was the only thing that was going to stop me.

"After Kelly (Tripucka) made that

first half (every time Ainge touched the ball, three Irish players collapsed on him). The play of guards Steve Craig and Greg Ballif and forward Fred Roberts kept the Cougars in the game.

BYU's Cinderella season ended two days later, courtesy of 7-4 Ralph Sampson and the Virginia Cavaliers. The Cougars never seemed to be in sync against Virginia. But, BYU's performance against Princeton, UCLA and Notre Dame captured the interests of many Americans, and Cougar fans still enjoy the memories of that elite eight appearance.

"That was one of the most talented teams we've had here," Reid says. "That and the 1966 team with Dick Nemelka. We had guys like Greg Kite, Danny Ainge, Steve Trumbo, Fred Roberts and Steve Craig, who may have been the best pure athlete on the team. You knew when you went into a game you had a chance to win, no matter who you were playing."

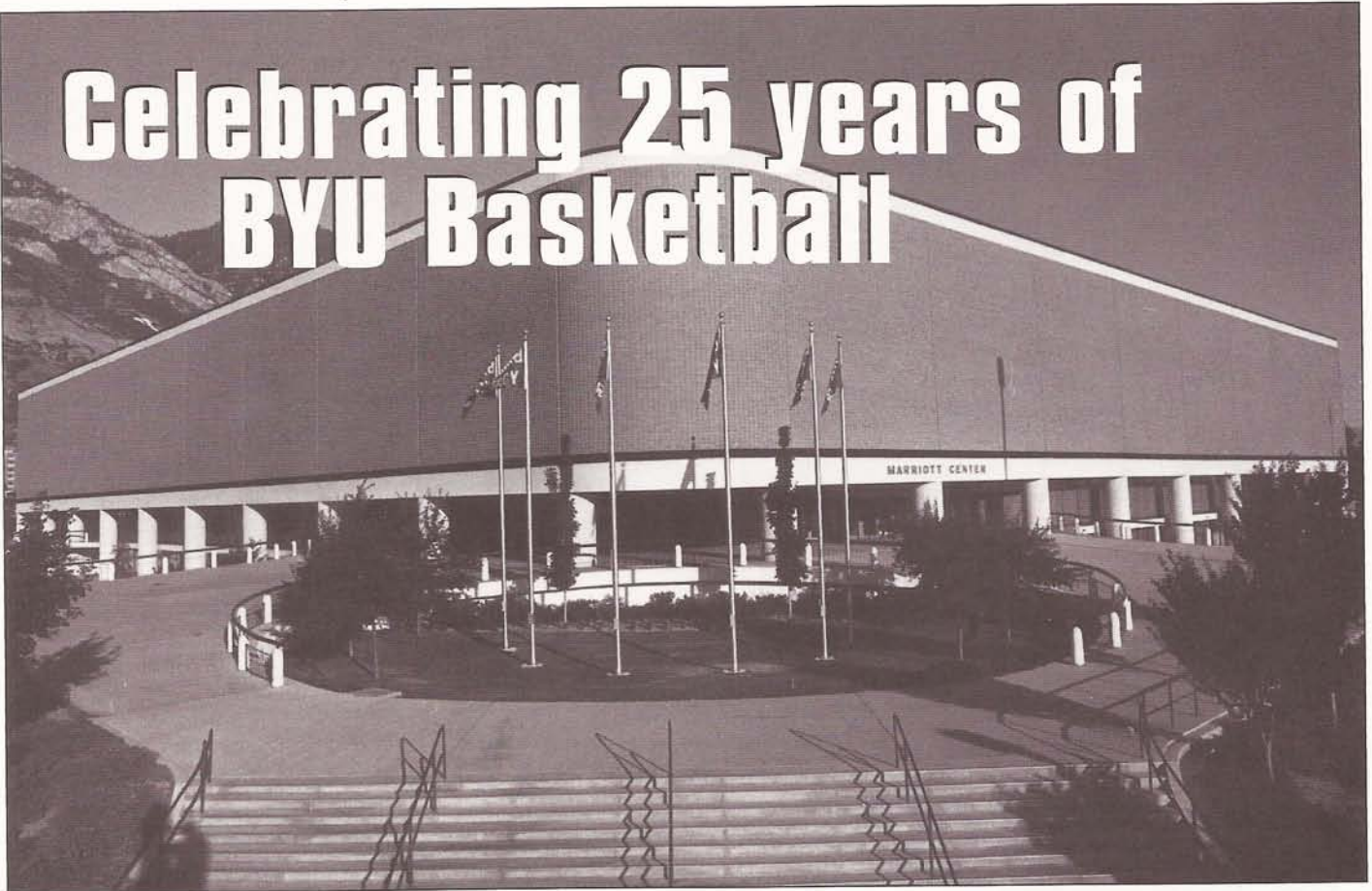
shot, I went over and sat down on the bench," Trumbo said after the game. "I had a calm feeling. I felt like we were going to win."

Ainge's heroics made front page news the next day in the sports sections of several major newspapers, including the Atlanta Constitution-Journal and The New York Daily News, with photos of the Cougar bench erupting after Ainge's shot settled into the net.

What fans generally don't remember about that game is the Cougars trailed by 10, 28-18 at halftime. Ainge didn't even have a field goal in the



Celebrating 25 years of BYU Basketball



For the past 25 years, the Marriott Center has been home to the thrills and cheers of BYU basketball. With a history full of game-winning shots, slam dunks and sellout seasons, the Marriott Center's 22,700 seats have seen plenty of excitement since its opening game on December 3, 1971.

The Center, named for successful Utah businessman J. Willard Marriott, consistently ranks in the top ten in ticket sales nationally and is one of the largest on-campus facilities nationwide. For almost every year since the Marriott Center was built, it has helped BYU lead the WAC in attendance. In 1994-95 BYU ranked fifth nationally in paid attendance behind Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina and Arkansas.

Some of the great games played in the Marriott Center include Danny Ainge and Company's 19-point shel-

lacking of the No. 7 Utah Utes in 1981 before the Cougars' run to the final eight in the NCAA Tournament. There was also Greg Ballif's heroics in a double overtime win against Utah State on January 7, 1978, where he came off the bench to hit a baseline jumper with four seconds left to send the game into the first overtime period. December 15, 1978 was another night to remember at the Marriott Center. BYU overcame Michael Brooks' 51 points to beat La Salle 108 to 106 in triple overtime. Another exciting Cougar victory came on December 6, 1994 as BYU pulled off a thrilling 74-68 overtime win against last year's NCAA elite eight team Mississippi State.

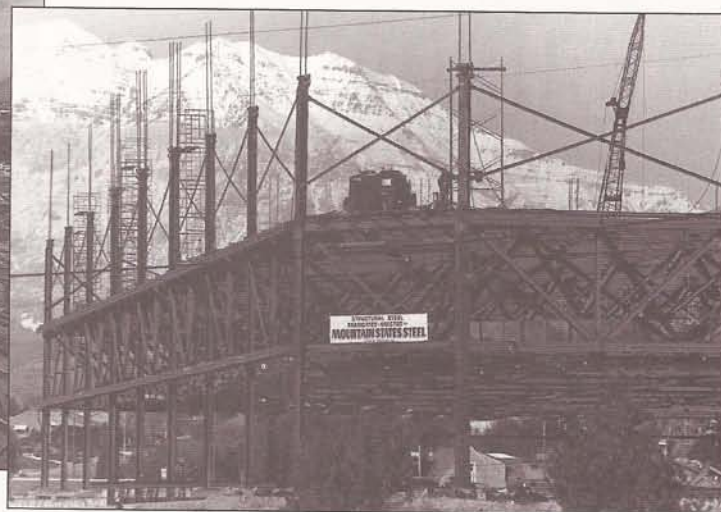
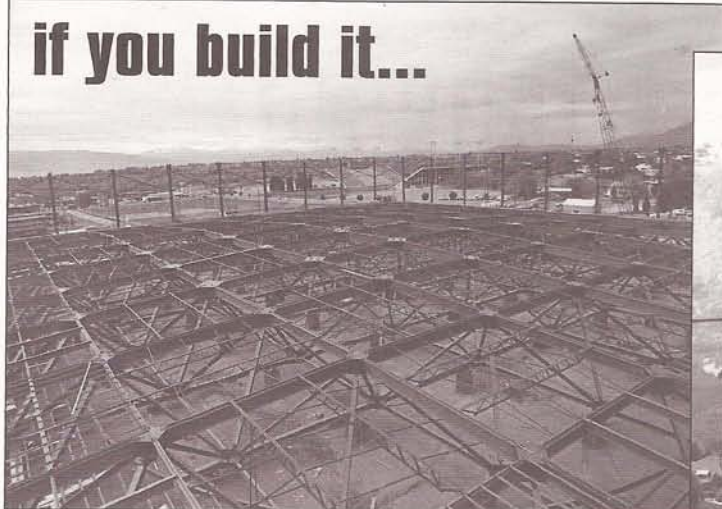
The Marriott Center covers three acres and encloses eight million cubic feet. There are approximately 10,100 chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the

seats are below the concourse level. The distance around the concourse level is a quarter of a mile. The roof, which is like two football fields being placed side-by-side, is 10 stories high and has 50,000 bolts in it. The four-million pound roof was constructed first at ground level, then raised 38 feet.

"People are always remarking how new the Marriott Center looks compared to how old it is," said Special Events Director Larry Duffin.

There are seven locker rooms, a President's room, two reception rooms, a press room, a team lounge, a weight room, a classroom, and a training room. In addition to the fans it draws for basketball, capacity crowds have filled the arena for devotionals, commencement exercises, concerts and pageants. As a sports venue it has also accommodated tennis, wrestling and volleyball matches and gymnastics meets.

"The Marriott Center is one of the top five places to play in the country, not just because of its size, but because its facilities are fantastic," UTEP coach Don Haskins has said. "If there is a better arena, I haven't seen it."

The Marriott Center ambiance is also aided by an eight-sided 26-foot

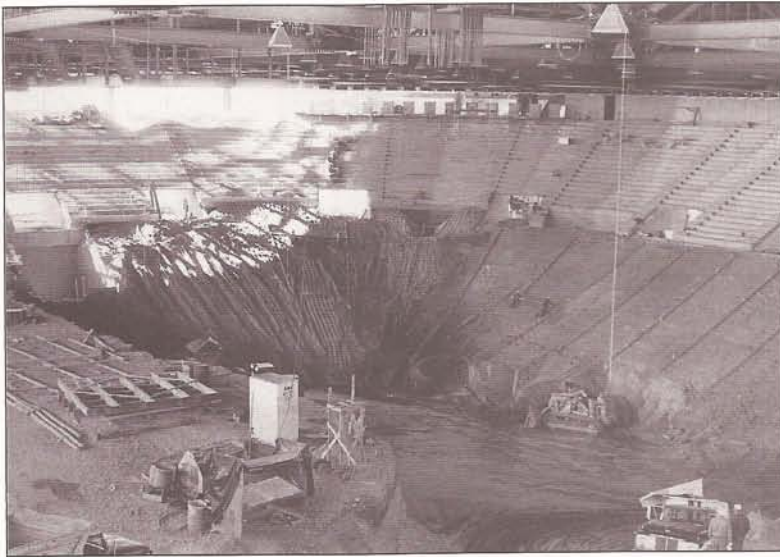
wide by 16-foot high scoreboard which features four large video walls designed to show live game action and instant replays.

Ironically, as you look back at Cougar basketball history, you see a completely different situation than exists today. For instance, in the beginnings of BYU basketball, the Cougars played their home games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the capacity was nearly double the previous facility. That year in the Women's Gym, two-handed push shots were in vogue and Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game.

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was list-



ed at 1,200, but officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together. Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball.

In 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Fieldhouse was under construction. Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse. Non-league games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, captured the league title and went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in New York City. That was only the second year for coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest.

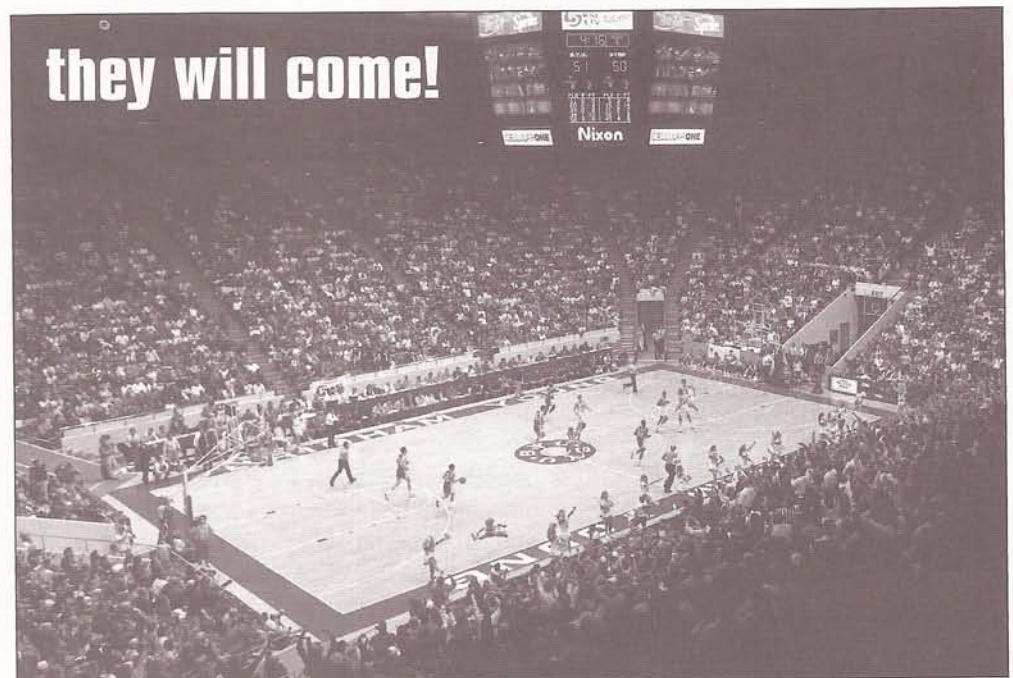
At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20

years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT title in 1966.

But as BYU began to gain national prominence, the Fieldhouse couldn't hold the growing number of Cougar faithful. The demand for more seats prompted BYU to begin planning construction of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arena.

Stan Watts



Stan Watts

1949-72

When considering the most influential individuals in BYU basketball history, Stan Watts has to be placed at the top of the list.

During his 23 years at the helm of the Cougar basketball program, Watts led his teams to two NIT National Championships (1951, 1966) and oversaw the construction of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and Marriott Center.

His nationally recognized accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on March 6, 1986, making him the first Cougar to receive the prestigious honor.

Watts finished his career after the 1971-72 season with an overall record of 372-254 (.594).

He was a member of the NCAA's Rules Committee, served as president of

the National Association of Basketball Coaches and chaired the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee in 1976. Watts also served four years as BYU's Athletic Director and spent time on the Cougar football and baseball coaching staffs.

Even more impressive than his remarkable accomplishments as a coach, is his impeccable character as a human being. He is respected by coaches, fans and players alike for his conduct both on and off the court.

"His won-loss record speaks very well for the kind of coach he was," said former player Harold Christensen, who played for Watts on the 1951 championship team. "His reputation among his fellow coaches suggests how much they respected him. He still has that and is still honored in the community in which he coached."

Always a fighter, Watts overcame a rare form of cancer in 1971 — only the fourth-known case of this type of cancer in medical history. Despite the fact that the other three individuals died, Watts refused to give up. After 14-hours of surgery and a two-month stay in the hospital, Watts returned to coach his team to a WAC Championship the following year.

Known for his fast-break style of offense, Watts remains an avid Cougar fan. He once said, "It has always been our contention that the average basketball fan likes to see fast-scoring, speedy, exciting basketball."

By looking around the Marriott Center during a Cougar game, there are hints that Watts has been there. The glass-encased exhibit in the halls outside the arena pays tribute to one of the greatest coaches and individuals ever to grace the sidelines of a BYU athletic contest — as do the two NIT Championship banners and the WAC title banners from 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971 and 1972.

"The greatest tribute I can pay to Stan Watts," said Associate Athletic Director Pete Witbeck, BYU's NCAA compliance officer and former assistant to Watts for many years, "is he's truly a man of God. He's always been a gentleman and great man. You don't see that very often."

Kresimir Cosic

When it comes to describing Kresimir Cosic, where do you start?

Few players in BYU history have been able to capture the hearts of Cougar fans like Kresimir Cosic did from 1970-73. The 6-11 center from Zadar, Yugoslavia, entertained fans during his stellar career with his enthusiastic, guard-like play.

Whether it was leading the fast-break, dribbling between his legs or shooting a sky-hook, Cosic's enthusiasm and on-court antics endeared him to almost everyone who saw him play.

During his career at BYU, Cosic used his versatile inside-outside game to lead the Cougars in scoring (23.3) and rebounding (13.0) as a junior and again as a senior (20.2 points per game). His unselfish attitude helped him to lead his team in assists.

He ranks second on BYU's all-time rebounding list with 919, an average of 11.6 per game. He was a three-time All-WAC First Team selection and an All-American his junior year. Behind the play of Cosic, the Cougars won two WAC titles and reached the NCAA Regional tournament in 1971 and 1972.

Cosic was a three-time All-WAC first team selection and earned All-American accolades following his junior season.

Upon graduation, Cosic became very much involved with basketball throughout Europe. He played on four Olympic teams with his native land of Yugoslavia, winning a gold medal in 1980 and two silver medals

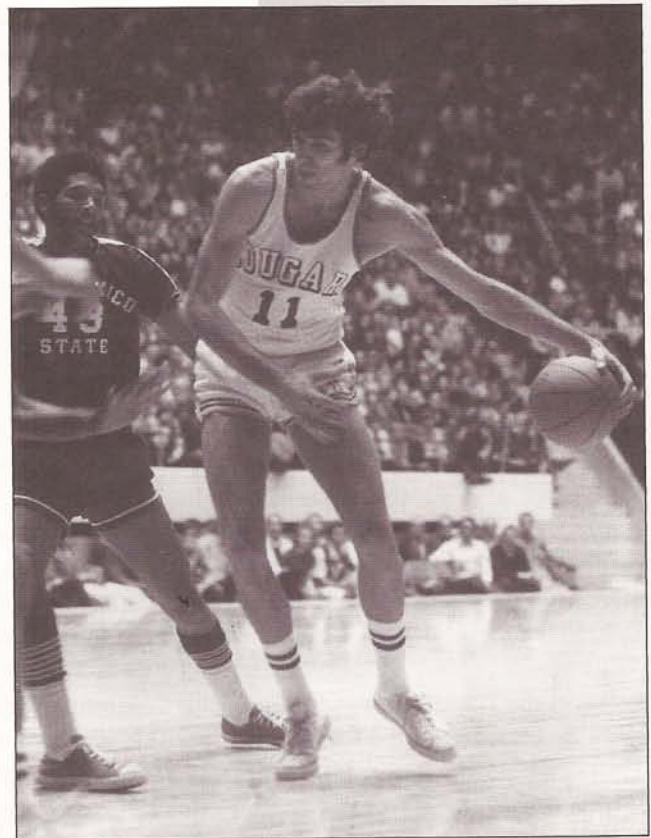
in 1968 and 1976. He ended his career as the all-time Croatian scoring leader, and went on to coach the Yugoslavian National Team for many years.

His national and international accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on May 6, 1996, making Cosic the second Cougar to receive the prestigious honor.

In September of 1992, Cosic was appointed as deputy ambassador for Croatia to the United States. He and his family lived in Washington D.C. where he performed his diplomatic duties in the same excellent manner in which he played basketball.

On May 25, 1995, Cosic lost his battle against the toughest opponent of his career; cancer. During his 46 years on earth, Cosic became one of the most influential and well-known of all European basketball players. He left behind the legacy and credit of being the individual that first introduced the American game of basketball to Europe.

Danny Ainge

1980-81 Player of the Year

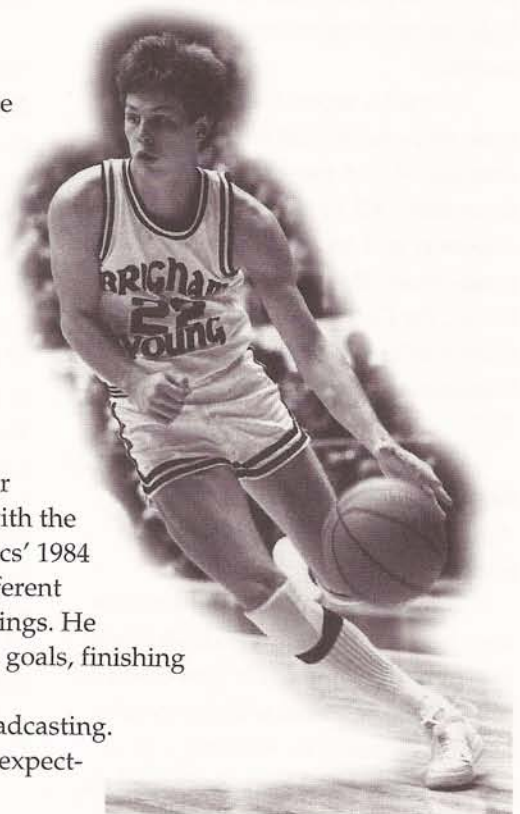
Known for his feisty, hard-nosed playing style, Danny Ainge has become one of the most famous athletes to graduate from BYU.

During his four-year career as a Cougar, Ainge was a Consensus All-American, a two-time First Team Academic All-American, the WAC Player of the Year and a four-time All-WAC selection. He set an NCAA record with 112 consecutive games scoring in double digits and broke the BYU and WAC all-time scoring records with 2,467 points.

His greatest accomplishment as a collegiate player came after he led BYU to the 1981 Eastern Regionals his senior year, and was named the Eastman Award winner as well as the John Wooden Award winner, given annually to the top collegiate basketball player in the nation.

As a two-sport star, Ainge was drafted by both the Toronto Blue Jays for baseball and the Boston Celtics for basketball. After playing four seasons with the Blue Jays, he chose to pursue an NBA career. He was a member of the Celtics' 1984 and 1986 Championship teams, and played in six NBA finals with three different teams (Boston, Portland and Phoenix). He also played for the Sacramento Kings. He became only the third player in NBA history to make 1,000 three-point field goals, finishing his 14-year career with 1,002.

After retiring in 1995, Ainge became a sports TV analyst for Turner Broadcasting. Currently, he serves as an assistant coach for the Phoenix Suns, where he is expected to take over as head coach once Cotton Fitzsimmons retires.
