














BYU STANDOUT

GERALD MEYER, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 245, 20, Junior, Walnut Creek, California. Few, if any, linemen to play at BYU have had better sophomore seasons than did Gerald Meyer in 1968. The Cougars' big defensive tackle did an outstanding job in his first year on the line, and his performance during spring practice indicated he could become the best BYU has ever had. Besides being massive and mobile, Meyer is seldom out-smarted by opponents. He is one reason why the Cougars' defensive unit was able to limit opponents to an average of 2.9 yards per carry during the '68 season. Last fall Meyer was in on 90 tackles (unassisted and assisted), and recovered two fumbles. As a result of his play Jerry won two major football awards (KSL, Downtown Coaches).

THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the world. 

TOMMY HUDSPETH



In the five years that Tommy Hudspeth has been at the helm of the Cougars he has experienced about everything on the scale of highs and lows. His teams have had 2-8 seasons and 8-2 campaigns, plus the inbetweens. As the former Kansan begins his sixth year, his record with the Cougars stands at 25-24-1, which puts his average over the .500 mark.

But when it comes to describing the 38-year old mentor, the word average doesn't fit any part of him. Most of his playing and coaching career has been made up of highs, and the few lows he has weathered have

added much to his professional background.

Tom, for instance, has been credited with shaping the Cougars into a winner. Prior to the time that Hudspeth came onto the scene (1964), the Cougars had endured some frustrating seasons. In his first year BYU fought for time as Tom laid the ground work for the future. The first year ended in a 3-6-1 record. The next year found Hudspeth and his staff taking a team that was everybody's choice for last place and guiding it to a conference championship, the first football title in the school's history.

Adding and refining along the way, Hudspeth's third season at BYU produced an 8-2 season record, the finest mark in a span of 45 years of football at

BYU. In 1967 the Cougars came up with their third consecutive winning season (6-4). But a stack of misfortunes were piled atop the '68 campaign, and the record dipped to 2-8, the low ebb in Hudspeth's play-

ing and coaching career.

Winning is part of Tom's makeup, but his other contributions have been equally important. His brand of football is one of the most colorful and exciting to be seen aywhere. His teams generate a wide-open type of offense that fans thrive on, as indicated by the attendance figures for the past five seasons. Home attendance zoomed to 26,357 at home three years ago, and averaged 23,000 in the past two years.

Hudspeth's teams have also registered high in both offense and defense. In 1966 the Cougars were ranked second in the nation in total offense, and the following season were listed sixth nationally among the major schools. Recent teams have been among the foremost

in the nation in rushing defense.

Born in Cherryvale, Kansas, Tom attended school in Afton, Oklahoma, where he was an all-state quarterback. He moved from Afton to the University of Tulsa, where he captained the freshman football team. In three seasons with the Hurricane varsity, he played on both the offensive and defensive units; quarterback and defensive safety. In his three year with the Hurricane varsity the team compiled a 26-5-2 record, and in his final season he was team captain. In his senior year he set a school record with six pass interceptions, a mark that stood 14 years until Jeff Jordan (Minnesota Vikings) picked off seven in 1964.

Tom and his teammates played in the Gator Bowl

his senior year.

Following graduation, Tom launched his coaching career at Norman High School. This was interrupted by a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer. He was discharged as a first lientenant in 1955, and returned to the coaching ranks at Tulsa Central High. His team at Central posted a 6-2-1 record.

A coaching job on the college level opened up at Tulsa in 1956, and Tom joined his alma mater as freshman coach under Bobby Dobbs. He remained an assistant there from 1957 to 1960. When Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, Hudspeth, then 28, went with him as an assistant. In the three years he spent with the Stampeders they were conference contenders every season.

At age 32, after six seasons in the college and professional ranks. Tom was chosen to head the football program at BYU. Starting virtually from scratch, he moved BYU football rapidly to the forefront. The Cougars won the WAC championship in 1965, and Tom captured UPI Coach of the Year honors, and was named Coach and Athlete's Rocky Mountain

Coach of the Year.

Hudspeth's leadership qualities extend beyond the football field. In college he was president of the senior class, and he has served as a member of the high council in one of the BYU campus stakes.

In addition to his coaching duties, Tom also serves as assistant director of athletics at BYU. He has completed most of the requirements for his master's de-

gree in counseling.

Tom is married to the former Ruth Ann Sandmire, and they have three children; Max (14), Phil (11), and Melissa (3).

COACHING STAFF

LaVELL EDWARDS (Utah State '52)

As assistant head coach, LaVell Edwards enters his ninth year on the Cougar coaching staff, and will con-

tinue to work as the defensive coordinator.

It would appear that Edwards inspires his defensive unit with hard work. In 1967 the Cougars were ranked 12th in the nation in rushing defense, setting a school record by holding opponents to 87.4 yards per game. Last fall BYU held one opponent to a minus 29 yards rushing, caused a total of 23 fumbles, and generally proved to be a hard nosed bunch.

Edwards' football career commenced within the shadows of BYU. He won all-state honors as a lineman at Orem High School, which is just a few miles from the BYU campus. He attended Utah State University. where he was team captain and all-conference line-

man for two years.

Called into the service soon after graduation from USU, Edwards spent two years in the Army at Fort Mead, Maryland. In 1954 he returned to his home state to take the position as head coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. LaVell joined the BYU staff in 1961.

Lavell is married to the former Patti Covey, and they have three children-Ann (13), John (11), and

CHRIS APOSTOL (Utah State '50)

First assistant Chris Apostol, the veteran member of the staff (1959), will concentrate his efforts as coor-

dinator of the Cougar offensive attack.

Born and raised in Utah's copper-mining country, Chris won all-state honors in football at Bingham High School, where he was also student body president. He played his college ball at Utah State University under E.L. 'Dick' Romney and George Melinkovich.

Soon after graduation from Utah State in 1950. Chris joined the staff at Ogden High School. He spent nine years on the Ogden staff, and his record as head coach was 44-13-2. The last year he coached at Ogden, his team won the state class "A" championship and was 11-0 for the season. Seven of these wins were shutouts.

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children ranging in age from 18 to 9-Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt, and Kami.

DICK FELT (BYU '55)

Dick Felt moves into his second season as coach of the defensive secondary. Dick, who has impressive credentials, feels right at home in the backfield.

Prior to joining the Hudspeth staff as an assistant, Dick spent seven years in the American Football Leaque. As a defensive back, he served two years with the old New York Titans, and the balance of his pro career was spent with the Boston Patriots.

During his collegiate career at BYU, Dick was an all-conference halfback. He is considered one of BYU's

all-time greats.

A native of Lehi, Utah, he played with the Cougar varsity from 1951-54. In 1955, Dick was called on a church mission, and thereafter returned to BYU and graduated in 1958. Having accepted a commission in the U.S. Air Force, he was fortunate enough to be assigned to Boeing Air Force Base where he played ball for two years.

Dick is married to the former Dayleen Hobson, and they have three children-Karen (8), Curtis (4), and

Kristie (3).

Working with the offensive line, H.G. Linford, be-

gins his second year with the Cougars.

The former head coach at Skyline High School in Salt Lake City, he has already tasted the sweetness of success. While at Skyline, his teams lost only three games in his last four seasons. In 1967, Skyline won the state class "A" title with a 12-0 season record.

Linford graduated from Jordan High School in 1955 and four years later received his degree from

the University of Utah.

H.G. is married to the former Kathleen Clark, and they have two children—Scott (7), and Jill (4).

LES MILLER (Kansas State College '58)

Moving up from the freshman ranks where he was the head coach last season. Les Miller this year will be working with the offensive backs.

The 31-year-old coach and scout joined the BYU coaching staff in 1968. He came from Memorial High

School in Joplin, Missouri.

Born and raised in Oklahoma, Les was an all-state quarterback and an all-state basketball player. He played one year at Oklahoma State before moving to Kansas State College where he graduated in 1958. He served as assistant coach at KSC.

Les coached at several high schools in Oklahoma before entering private business. He remained active in athletics by scouting teams in the Midwest area.

J.D. HELM (Kansas '65)

The newest member of the Cougar coaching staff, J.D. Helm, will be coaching the Cougars' 1969 freshman team.

Before coming to BYU to complete his master's degree, J.D. coached football and track at Shawnee

Mission High School, in Kansas.

A native of El Dorado Springs, Missouri, J.D. participated in high school athletics then moved on to Kansas University where he participated in football and track.

He is married to the former Sarah Barker.

TRAINERS

The training chores for this year's team will be shared by Rod Kimball, veteran of 30 years with the Cougar teams, and comparative newcomer Marv Roberson.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod attended Jordan High School where he won three letters in football, two in basketball, three in baseball and one in track. He was also studentbody president there.

Rod graduated from BYU, and has spent most of his life serving the school and the LDS Church. He and his wife, LeNeve, have 12 living children.

Marv Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a large-size shot putter on the Cougar track teams several years ago. He graduated from BYU in '57, then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer for the Indians for four years.

Mary became head trainer at Foothill College in 1962. He joined the BYU staff in 1966. He is a native of Long Beach, Calif. He and his wife, Doris, have three children.

THE OUTLOOK

Like an iceberg, so much of the Cougars' current squad is unknown or hidden from view that it looms as something of a mystery. But many of its strengths and weaknesses are apparent on the surface.

Generally speaking, the Cougars are expected to be on the up-swing in '69, following a year in which they were forced to settle for a 2-8 record. The presence of optimism stems from the fact the Cougars believe that with a few changes here and there, plus some additional help, they can get the job done.

While BYU is reluctant to look back, the coming season can't be brought into proper perspective without reviewing last fall's developments. Misfortune dogged the team through a dreary season from start to finish.

In no less than three games their opponents caught, and then passed the Cougars to win in the closing minutes, or seconds, of play. Had the Cougars been able to parry these eleventh-hour thrusts, they might have finished with a 4-6, or even 5-5, record. It appeared that at critical times the Cougars lacked the depth and speed to go a full 60 minutes.

There were misfortunes of another kind, too. Besides an inordinate number of battle injuries, the Cougars lost personnel in other ways. Ed Romero, the team's leading pass receiver, was seriously injuried in an automobile accident and will miss his final season. Another starter, flankerback Ken Call, was an summer drowning victim.

It is hoped that this kind of misfortune has run its course. But the hangover from '68 may still be felt in '69.

Returning Lettermen - A total of 27 players from last year and former seasons returning, including two quarterbacks from last season. A total of 21 lettermen were lost, ten of whom were three-year lettermen. Those hard to replace include Criag Bozich, all-WAC linebacker: offensive tackles Mike Loper and Richie Lopez; fullback Dave Swanson, the leading rusher and scorer from '68; split end Eddie Romero; flankerback Ken Call.

Running Game - If the Cougars move the ball, it will likely be on the ground. The best of the ball carriers appears to be Kip Jackson, a junior who averaged 3.8 last year. Fullbacks Chris Reading, a junior, and transfer Ed Nichols will do much of the line pounding. Veteran Ron Wakley (4.6 average last year) may help here, too.

The Cougars gained more yards rushing last year than they did passing (1486 to 1398). As a team they averaged 3.0 yards per carry.

Passing Game - The number one and two passers of last year, Marc Lyons and Rick Jones, are both returning. However, the problem might be receivers. If the receivers can improve, the passing game will be more of a threat. But at this writing passing will have to take a back seat to the ground game.

Lyons, a two-year letterman, has passed for more than 2,000 yards in previous seasons, and he will be the key. Two juniors, Rick Jones and Don Griffin, figure to play behind Lyons. In any event, the aerial phase of the offense could improve with work.

Kicking Game - Even though the Cougars lost kicking specialist Steve Christensen to injuries, their overall kicking game will be one of BYU's strong points this fall.

Punter Rich Adams, who was ranked 13th in the nation and second in the WAC last fall with a 41.0 average, is back. Rich has led the team in punting for the past two years, so the Cougars are in good shape here.

As for the place kicking, sophomore Joe "The Toe" Liljenquist proved he can handle that phase of the game last spring. In fact, Joe scored 13 of the Y's 19 points against the alumni with four field goals, including a 45-yarder. Consequently, the Cougars are expected to get on the scoreboard in every game, if Joe can get in close enough.

Overall Speed - This is one area where Cougars have seemed to be lacking in recent seasons. The true speedster is missing, but several ball players will give the opposition fits. One of these is Chris Farasopoulos, a corner man on defense who will also be used on punt and kickoff returns. Generally speaking, however, the Cougars won't be a match for most of the teams they will face.

Offense - A little sluggish at times last fall, the total yardage last season was well below the Hudspeth average for the past five years. Offensive line will miss tackles Loper and Lopez, a pair of three-year veterans.

Defense - Judging from the spring game and past performances, this will be a Cougar strong point. With standouts Gerry Meyer and Jeff Slipp returning, opponents will have to work hard to make yardage through the line. Speed is missing from defensive secondary, which could make the Cougars vulnerable for good passing game featuring fleet-footed receivers.

Sophomores, Transfers - Even though the frosh went winless (0-4) last fall, there is some fine talent among the sophomores. One of the newcomers likely to be in the starting lineup is Jeff Lyman, a hard-

nosed linebacker from Salt Lake City.

A half dozen or so transfers will be available. Fullback Eddie Nichols (Mesa College), tackle Arch Mc-Gill (Cerritos), and linebacker Bill Dvorak (Mesa Col-

lege) are among the better prospects.

In summary, there is an aura of uncertainity around the Cougars. They are hard to assess, and consequently could be dangerous. The players should wear question marks on their jerseys in place of numbers. It could be that kind of season.

TOP INDIVIDUALS

JEFF SLIPP, Defensive End, 6-3, 230, Senior, Las Vegas, Nevada. Jeff has been a regular since his first game as a sophomore. He was selected as lineman of the week after the Wyoming game. Jeff led the team in defensive statistics last fall, gaining 175 points in 10 games. He was credited with 61 assisted tackles, 17 unassisted tackles, 17 tackles for a loss, four fumble recoveries, a pass deflection and a blocked kick. A

real asset to the Cougar defense.

GERALD MEYER, Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 245, Junior, Walnut Creek, California. Judged as the finest line prospect the Cougars have had in recent years, Meyer proved it last fall as a sophomore. A careful study of last fall's game films substantiated what Hudspeth and his staff knew all along—Meyer was outstanding. Besides being big and mobile, Meyer was seldom outsmarted by opponents as the Cougar defensive line had another great year. Certainly an All-American candidate.

PAUL SUTORIUS, Defensive Halfback, 6-1,170, Senior, Duarte, California. Sutorius is sure to be one of the top defensive men in the league and the region this season. He has excellent reactions and good football sense. As a sophomore he intercepted three passes, working with Bobby Roberts in the sceondary. As a junior Paul intercepted one pass, while spending most

of the season out because of an injury.

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

If any one individual can be credited as the driving force behind BYU's dramatic growth, it is Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who has served as the president of the University since 1951. It is generally accepted that no other person has played such a significant role in building the school into the institution it is today.

Born and raised in Ogden, Utah, Dr. Wilkinson attended Weber College before transferring to BYU. He was editor of the campus newspaper and was a formidable debater at BYU prior to his graduation in 1921. He pursued his education at George Washington Law School, graduating summa cum laude. He continued graduate work, receiving the degree of juridicial science from Harvard.

He had an illustrious career as a lawyer, and was widely respected in the field. But in 1951 he accepted a challenge in another field, education. Since his appointment, the enrollment has increased many fold, and more than 80 major, permanent buildings have been constructed on campus. In 1965, one of these buildings, the spacious new student activities building was named in his honor.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, COLLEGE DEAN

There is a reason why they call the Cougars' modern athletic complex "Milt's Miracle Mile." The tag put on the Y's extensive facilities alludes to some of the contributions made to the College of Physical Education by Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the college.

A former teacher, coach, principal and superin-

tendent of schools in Idaho. Dr. Hartvigsen came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed.D. at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State University and obtained his M.Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU, Dr. Hartvigsen has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs, which have won wide-spread commendation, are the result of his own keen planning, careful design, and forceful administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen serves as chairman of the Athletic Advisory Council, and has served on several key NCAA assignments. He was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

FLOYD MILLET, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Nobody—coach, athlete or fan—likes to win more than does Floyd Millet, the University's director of athletics since 1964. And the fact that some of the Cougars' greatest moments in sports have come within the last three years is by no means coincidental.


An all-round athlete and all-conference performer at BYU, Millet won a reputation as one of the hard-nosed set by the time he graduated in 1934. He entered coaching and obtained his M.A. degree from USC in 1939.

He served in a number of coaching capacities—football, track and basketball—and was director of athletics before resigning to enter private business. Even so, he kept a hand in athletics, serving as chairman of the athletic committee of the General Board of the YMMIA. He directed one of the largest athletic programs in the world in that capacity.

EIGHT TEAMS IN SIX STATES

This fall, when the Western Athletic Conference begins its eight year, the league will be a strong eight

member league.

Commissioner Wiles Hallock, former NCAA Director of Public Relations and Director of Special Services, begins his second year as the helm of the WAC. Hallock replaced Dr. Paul Brechler, who served as the commissioner since the WAC was founded on July 1, 1962.

July 1, 1968, is the date the Western Athletic Conference officially expanded to eight teams. New member schools are Colorado State University of Fort Collins, Colo., and University of Texas at El Paso. Charter members are Arizona State University, University of Arizona, Brigham Young University, University of New Mexico, University of Utah, and University of Wyoming.

The eight schools in the Rocky Mountain-Southwest region are spread over six states. Conference headquarters are located in Denver, Colo., with offices at 1515 Cleveland Place (Denver-Hilton).

THE STADIUM

Football fans at BYU still refer to their playing field as the "new" football stadium, and this feeling still reflects the new gridiron spirit at Cougarville.

Built in 1964, the BYU Stadium originally had a capacity of 26,812. When it was inaugurated on Oct. 2, 1964, over 33,000 fans were crammed into every possible corner to watch the Cougars play New Mexico.

The sudden rise in popularity of BYU football. coupled with BYU's first football championship in 1965. prompted University officials to authorize the addition of 4,080 new seats.

Total seating capacity is currently 30,000. With the addition of temporary bleachers in the north and south ends of the football field, total capacity will be in the neighborhood of 35,000.

The completion of the stadium is a classic example of community effort. A good part of the construction cost was gained from personal donations from students, faculty, staff, interested residents, alumni, and friends.

Ground was broken for the stadium in October 1963. A year later it was in use. Total area involved for the construction was 36.5 acres, over 20 acres of which are being used for parking .

The lighting for the stadium is the best available. The towering light standards are over 16 stories high, and when the lights are turned on, about 576,000 watts of electricity are directed to the playing field.

Surrounding the playing field is a rubberized asphalt track, recognized as one of the best in the nation. The stadium was the site of the 1966 WAC track and field championships and the 1967 NCAA track and field championships.
