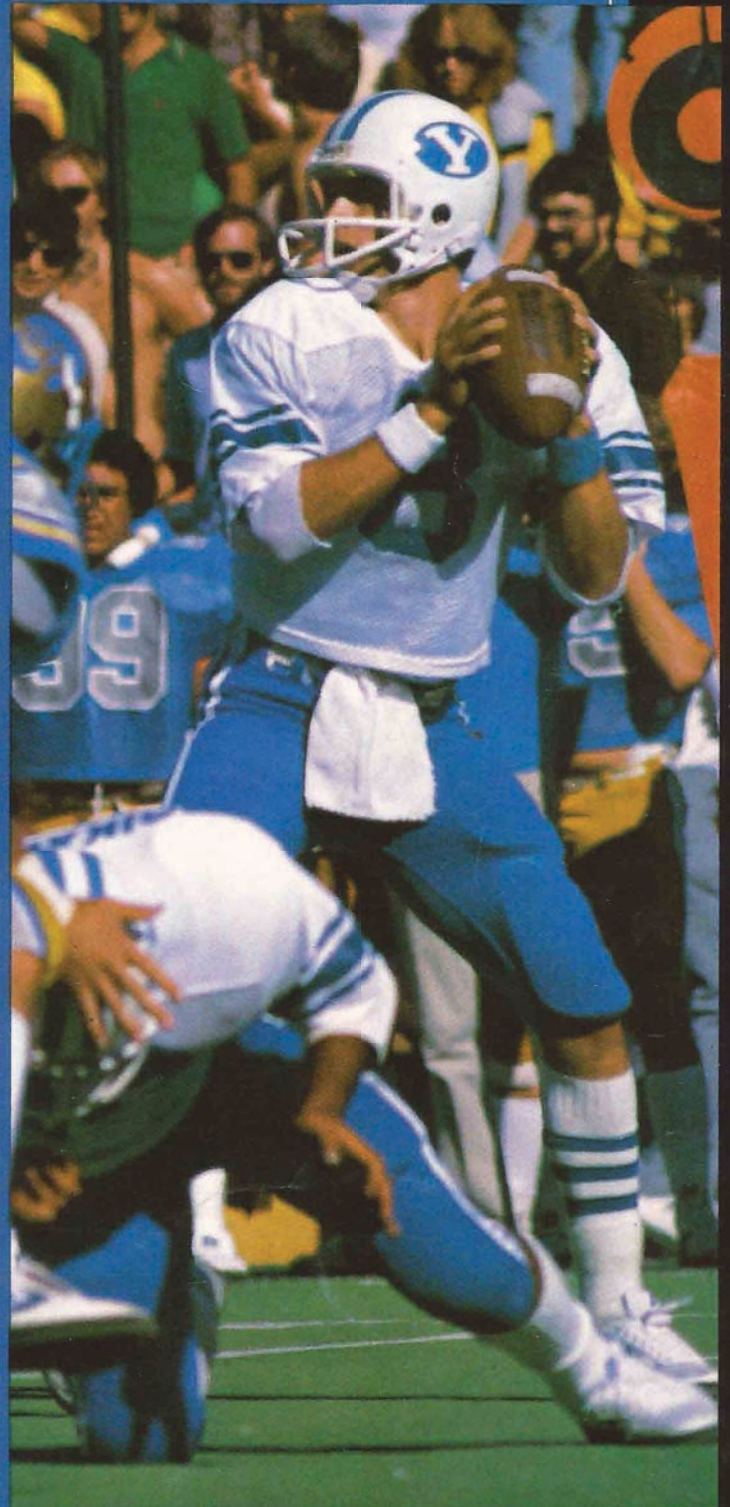

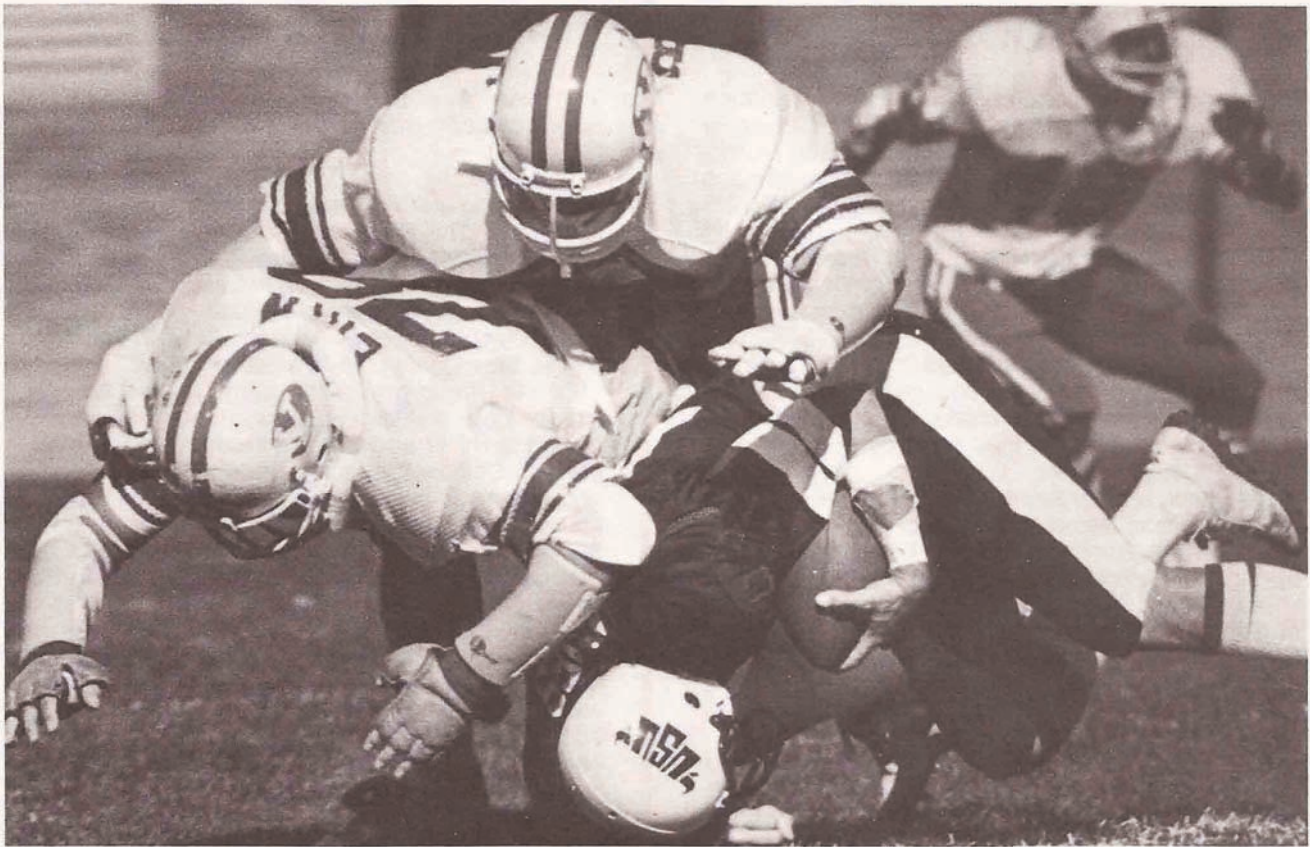

# About Brigham Young University

Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet

the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

## First 20 Years

# Western Athletic Conference

They celebrated the 20th birthday of the Western Athletic Conference this summer, which is another way of saying the nation's most geographically spread league has come of age. Initially, when the league came into being July 1, 1962, there were six charter members. Today the WAC extends from Laramie, Wyo., to El Paso, Tex., to San Diego, Calif., to Honolulu, Hawaii. Moreover, today's league now has nine members.

The biggest change in the makeup of the league came in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-Ten. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene. Then Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force entered the WAC in July of 1980.

One of the rewards of being in the WAC is the league's affiliation with the Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The league winner receives an automatic bid to the post-season bowl against a ranking at-large team.

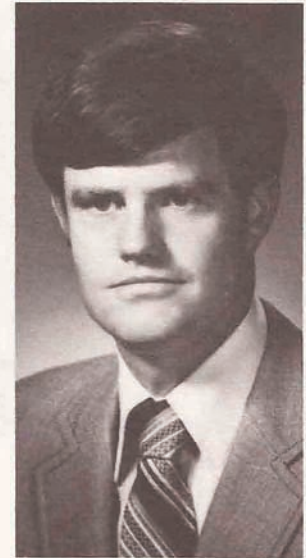
Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his cur-

rent position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

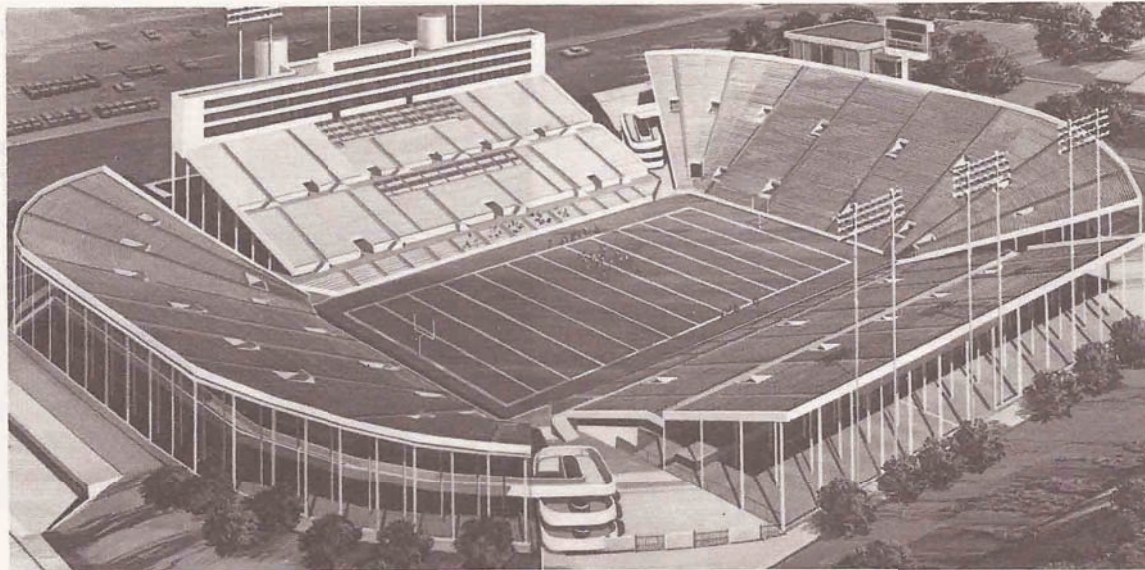

## Stadium Expansion

An expanded football stadium—one judged to be among the finest in this part of the country—will be part of the Cougars' 1982 football season. The enlarged facility will nearly double the permanent seating capacity, increasing the stadium seating to approximately 65,000 seats.

Plans to expand the stadium reached fruition less than a year ago, and the groundbreaking for expansion was held after the Cougars' final home game of the season. A crowd of 47,163, the largest crowd ever assembled in Utah sports history, was on hand to see BYU win its sixth consecutive WAC championship with a 56-28 win over Utah.

Immediately after the game, crews from Clegg Construction Co., Inc., began moving the first of an estimated 40,000 cubic yards of earth. The track surrounding the field was removed, and the floor of the stadium lowered another six feet.

In addition to the new seating sections resulting from the lowering of the field, new seating sections were added in the north and south end zones, each accommodating approximately 15,000 more seats.

Final approval of the full-scale expansion was announced Feb. 9, 1982, by President Jeffrey R. Holland. Layton Construction Co., of Salt Lake City began work immediately under a \$12.4 million contract which calls for completion of the project in time for the season opener against Air Force Academy (Sept. 25).

Plans for the expansion were drawn up by Fowler, Ferguson, Kingston and Ruben Architects, Inc., of Salt Lake City.

Major improvements have been added to the west side of the stadium, extending and enlarging the executive box, press box, and loges. Two elevators will service that general area.

More detailed information on the press box will be available at a later time.

## Former Stadium Sites

Pasture lands and city parks were used for football playing fields around the turn of the century, before a fatality brought an end to the sport as a school-sponsored activity. But in 1922, when it was brought back as an intercollegiate sport, the old wooden stands on upper campus (where the Joseph Smith Building now stands) served as spectator seats.

In 1927 the field where the Richards Building is now located was made into a stadium. Cement stands were built on the hillside, but seating was restricted to less than 10,000. The current stadium was constructed during the 1963-64 school year, and seating was increased on that site to 26,800. Later it was expanded to 30,000, then 33,000 with temporary bleachers.

# The Cougar Club

Along with BYU's rise to prominence in the world of college athletics has come a wave of enthusiasm among Cougar fans. And perhaps the best indication of "Cougarmania" is the BYU Cougar Club.

According to Executive Director Dale R. McCann, membership in the Cougar Club has multiplied by 400 percent over the past seven years, with the total number of boosters now exceeding 2,000 members.

"The contributions we receive," says McCann, "range from a \$50 associate member (age 25 and under) to the lifetime Golden Cougar (\$15,000 contributed over a three-year period). Resident membership is \$150 annually, and we have several classifications between resident member and the lifetime Golden Cougar."

In return, the contributor 1) has the satisfaction of knowing the contribution is building the program, directly supporting recruitment, and aiding significantly in funding the broadcast of road football and basketball games; 2) is the recipient of a Cougar Club medallion mounted on a walnut shield; 3) is given preferred parking for all BYU home games, with special passes for Golden and Silver Cougars; 4) is given priority seating consideration on season football tickets; 5) receives an official football and basketball press guide; 6) is invited with a partner to the annual Cougar Club banquet; 7) receives the twice-monthly sports newsletter, *Cougar Close-Up*; and 8) can take the contribution as a tax deduction on state and federal returns.

## Trophies, Traditions

Prior to the start of each home football game, (1) a public prayer is offered, and (2) the crowd observes the *Lighting of the Y*. For the latter, a few moments are used to recognize a person who has contributed to either campus or community life (not necessarily athletic-related). That person then lights the Y monument at the north end of the field.

As for trophies, the most prominent award is the Beehive Boot, a 100-year-old pioneer boot that is given to one of four in-state schools (BYU, Utah, Utah State and Weber State) who fares the best that particular season in in-state football competition. The trophy carries the name of Steve Smilanich, former native Utah sports writer and editor for United Press International in this area.

When BYU and Utah State meet on the football field, the trophy is the Old Wagon Wheel. This trophy was introduced in 1948 by the Blue Key service chapters at the two schools. It is a four-foot high, steel-rimmed wooden wheel off a covered wagon. The winning team retains it for a year.

## KSL Broadcasts

For more than a quarter of a century, BYU fans in the intermountain west and other parts of the country have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL radio (1160 on the dial), located in Salt Lake City, Utah.

"The Voice of the Cougars" has been play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 31 years' experience behind him. A University of Utah graduate, James entered broadcasting in 1950. For six years he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been at the microphone calling BYU games for the past 16 years.

Live broadcasts of football games can be heard on the following stations of the KSL-Cougar Network: KID (590 AM) Idaho Falls, Idaho; KNAQ (92.1 FM) Rupert, Idaho; KART (1400 AM) Jerome, Idaho; KXTC (1340 AM) Nampa-Boise, Idaho; KUTA (790 AM) Blanding, Utah, daytime games only; KZEZ (93.5 FM) St. George, Utah; KRWN (92.9 FM) Farmington, N.M.; and KSSK (590 AM) Honolulu, Hawaii.

With an FM sideband, games can be picked up in the following areas: WRFM (105 FM), New York, New York; WCLR (101.9 FM), Chicago, Illinois; KBIG (104.3 FM), Los Angeles, Calif. (note: Cox Cable subscribers in San Diego, Calif., can tune in on 99.3 FM for KBIG's signal); KOIT (96.5 FM), San Francisco, Calif.; KSEA (100.7 FM), Seattle, Wash.; KMBR (99.7 FM), Kansas City; KAFM (92.5 FM), Dallas, Texas.





# The Outlook

## Keep the Ball Moving

Deeply rooted in the passing game, and with a stubborn defense to augment it, Brigham Young University's '82 team will generally mirror past clubs brought together by LaVell Edwards and his staff.

There will be some differences, of course. All-American quarterback Jim McMahon won't be around to set more NCAA records, and several four-year lettermen like receiver Danny Plater have also departed. But the Cougars will have more than 40 lettermen—including 14 starters—from last year's 11-2 team back in the fold.

The most asked question regarding this fall's team is, "Who's going to replace Jim McMahon?"

At the end of spring practice the answer was **Steve Young**, the 6-2, 190-pound junior from Connecticut, who started two games last season while McMahon was recovering from an injury. Young, a southpaw, is also a fine runner, having been an option-QB in high school. Playing in a reserve role as he did last year, Steve passed for 731 yards (.500) and five touchdowns. He also averaged 4.4 yards per carry in rushing, so there should be no question about Young's ability to perform. Steve will be backed up by junior Eric Krzmarzick and sophomore **Robbie Bosco**.

Less conspicuous questions, but factors of major importance center around the offensive line that protects the Cougar passers, the running backs who catch passes too, and the BYU defense; the latter being the group that wins games, in Edwards' estimation.

To help protect the passers and also block for the

runners, the Cougars have center **Bart Oates** (an All-America candidate), guard **Lloyd Eldredge** and some reserves who had a good spring. The line also has **Gordon Hudson**, a tight end, who led the team in pass receiving last year as a sophomore.

Both of last year's running backs, **Scott Pettis** and **Waymon Hamilton**, are back. And both will likely be prime targets in BYU's passing game. Hamilton shares the school's scoring record (96 points) for one season, and Pettis was the team's leading rusher last year.

Defensively, the talent seems well spread. Three of last year's four down linemen are back, as are linebackers **Todd Shell** and **David Aupiu**. **Tom Holmoe**, a three-year starter, is back at one cornerback spot. There are indications that the replacements in most positions will be adequate.

Among the returning lettermen are last year's punter, **Mike Mees**, and veteran placekicker **Kurt Gunther**. The two should add stability to the Cougar's kicking game.

To help provide depth and balance, the Cougars can turn to several redshirts and other players who have returned from church missions. There may also be a player or two among the freshmen who can provide help.

"Our experience should be a big plus for us this year," says Coach Edwards. "We have seasoned players in most of our positions, so I feel good about that part of our club. We just hope the chemistry is right."

## Stats Leaders Returning

The leading rusher, the leading scorer, the leading receiver and the team's number one punter from last season will all be returning this fall. Tailback Scott Pettis and fullback Waymon Hamilton were ranked one and two in rushing in '81. Hamilton, only a junior, led the team in scoring with 96 points, thus tying the school record for most points in a season. Place kicker Kurt Gunther was only nine points behind Hamilton with 87 points.

Tight end Gordon Hudson, who set two NCAA records last year, topped the Cougar receivers with 67 receptions for 960 yards and 10 touchdowns. Hudson is only a junior.

## Always Room for QBs

While good quarterbacks have figured prominently in BYU's football successes, not all of them end up handing off the ball or passing. There are no fewer than seven former high school quarterbacks now playing in other positions on this year's team: defensive backs Tom Holmoe, Kevin Walker, Kyle Morrell, John Mannion, Mark Allen and Kurt Gouveia, along with punter Mike Mees. Mannion, by the way, has a brother, Pace, who is a starter on University of Utah's basketball team.

## Academically Speaking

There is a side to college football—academics—that is frequently overlooked. Many of the Cougar players have distinguished themselves in the classroom as well as on the playing field.

Among the national academic honors awarded to BYU gridders are three first-team Academic All-Americans selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America; two NCAA Top Five winners; four NCAA Post-Graduate Scholars; and a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete.

The past two seasons BYU has had a first-team Academic All-American. In 1981 wide receiver **Dan Plater**, a pre-med major, earned the honor. And in 1980 running back **Scott Phillips**, a pre-law major, was voted to the first team.

The first Cougar to attain first-team Academic All-America honors was running back **Steve Stratton**, a physical therapy major in 1973.

The NCAA Top Five Award winners from football were quarterbacks **Gifford Nielsen** in 1977 and **Marc Wilson** in 1979. Nielsen, a public relations and communications sponsor, responded for the scholar athletes at the NCAA convention and was selected as an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholar. Wilson, an economics major, also was an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholar winner.

BYU has had one other athlete win the NCAA Top Five Award—basketball player **Danny Ainge** in 1981.

Joining Nielsen and Wilson as NCAA-Post Graduate Scholars from BYU are offensive center **Orrin Olsen**, a business management major in 1975. And quarterback **Virgil Carter**, a statistics major, was an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholar in addition to being named second team Academic All-America for two years. Of the 11 BYU NCAA Post-Graduate scholars, four have come from the football team.

Offensive guard **Steve Miller** was the National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete in 1976. Miller, a pre-med major, was selected as second team Academic All-America.

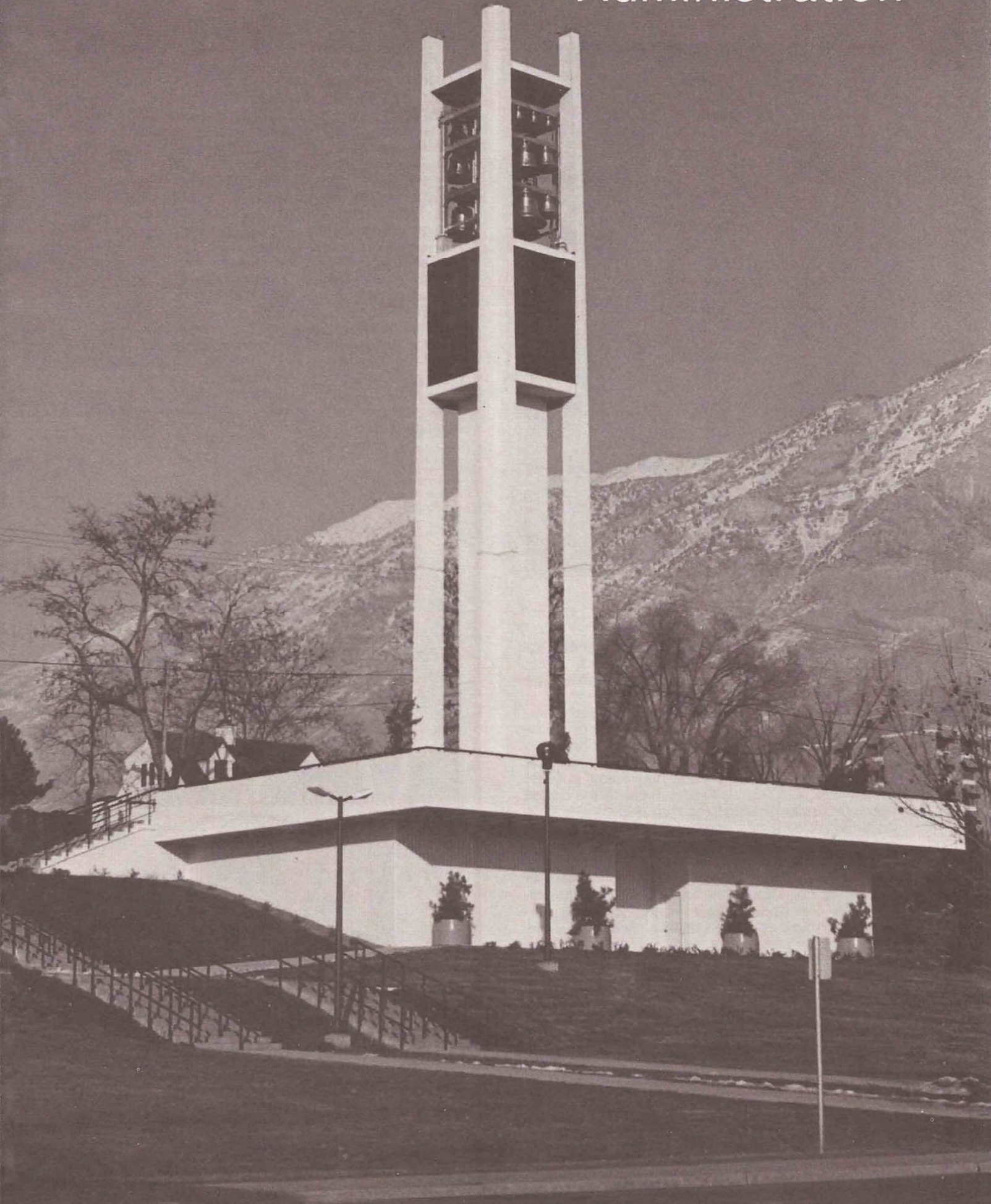
Among the other BYU football players who earned some national recognition academically were running back **Dan Taylor** (1972-73), a pre-dentistry major who was twice second team Academic All-America; and in 1966 BYU had offensive guard **Paul Ehrmann** and halfback **Casey Boyett** on third team Academic All-America.

## President Jeffrey R. Holland



Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland, the ninth president of Brigham Young University, took office Aug. 1, 1980, succeeding Dr. Dallin H. Oaks who now serves as a justice on the Utah Supreme Court.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. He served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain from 1960–62. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior

to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Co., the LDS Hospital and Intermountain Health Care, Inc., the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii, Commercial Security Bankcorporation and Commercial Security Bank. He also is a director of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU).

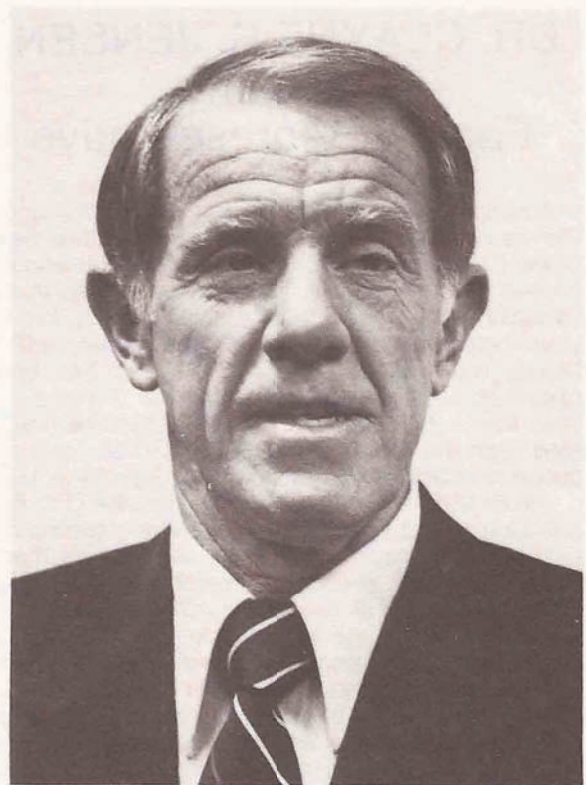
He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.





## GLEN TUCKETT Athletic Director

The Cougars' athletic director likes to think the past few years will be typical of things to come in the future at BYU . . . the Mountain Cats have won the conference athletic supremacy title five of the six years Tuckett has served as the athletic director . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . Tuckett is a native of Murray, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete at Murray High . . . he entered professional baseball after graduation, but continued his studies at the University of Utah where he obtained his B.S. degree in 1953 . . . Glen spent nine seasons in professional baseball . . . he launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached football, basketball, and baseball . . . in 1959 he joined the staff at BYU . . . he served as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years . . . his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three conference championships, and two NCAA District 7 crowns . . . his teams went to College World Series in Omaha twice . . . one of the high points of his career came in 1974 when he was chosen as coach of the United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tourney's 27 year history . . . Tuckett was the 1977 president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches . . . in January of 1979 he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame . . . at the time of retirement, he was the 9th winningest baseball coach in the NCAA . . . was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment . . .

## Head Coach LaVell Edwards 86-32-1 Record 11th Year (Utah State '52)

**Best time to call Coach Edwards:  
10 a.m.**

For a decade LaVell Edwards has been the driving force behind BYU's powerful passing offense, preceded by a decade as the Cougar defensive specialist on the BYU staff.

Edwards begins his 11th year as head coach with an enviable 86-32-1 (.727) record, six consecutive Western Athletic Conference Championships, two straight Holiday Bowl titles, and currently ranked sixth among the nation's top 20 football coaches.

The 52-year-old Edwards is a 1952 graduate of Utah State, but has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960), and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978).

In 1981-82 the coach-churchman-husband-father-grandfather-author-teacher-doctor and dean of WAC coaches was the head coach at the Hula and Japan Bowls, won the BYU Alumni distinguished Service Award, was named Outstanding Man-of-the-Year by the Provo American Freedom Festival, and guided BYU to an 11-2 record.

The Cougars are often nationally ranked, under Edwards' guidance and BYU has led the nation in passing (1976, 1977, 1979, 1980, 1981), scoring (1979), and total offense (1979, 1980).

Since becoming BYU's head coach in 1972, after joining the cougar staff in 1962, Edwards has led BYU to six bowl appearances—the Fiesta Bowl (1974), the Tangerine Bowl (1976), and four appearances in the Holiday Bowl (1978-81).

The Orem, Utah native was raised on a farm along with 12 brothers and sisters not far from BYU's stadium.

In 1979, LaVell was recognized as national coach-of-the-year by two organizations: the Bobby Dodd Award Board and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame.

Three times (1972, 1979, and 1980) he has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and four times he has been Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year (1974, 1977, 1979, and 1980). He has also coached in post-season action at the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine Game and the Coaches' All-America game.

A graduate of Lincoln High School in Orem, Edwards attended Utah State where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies. At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams, Fott Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

His first coaching job was secured at Granite High School in Salt Lake City where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. LaVell succeeded Tommy Hudspeth as the head coach in 1972.

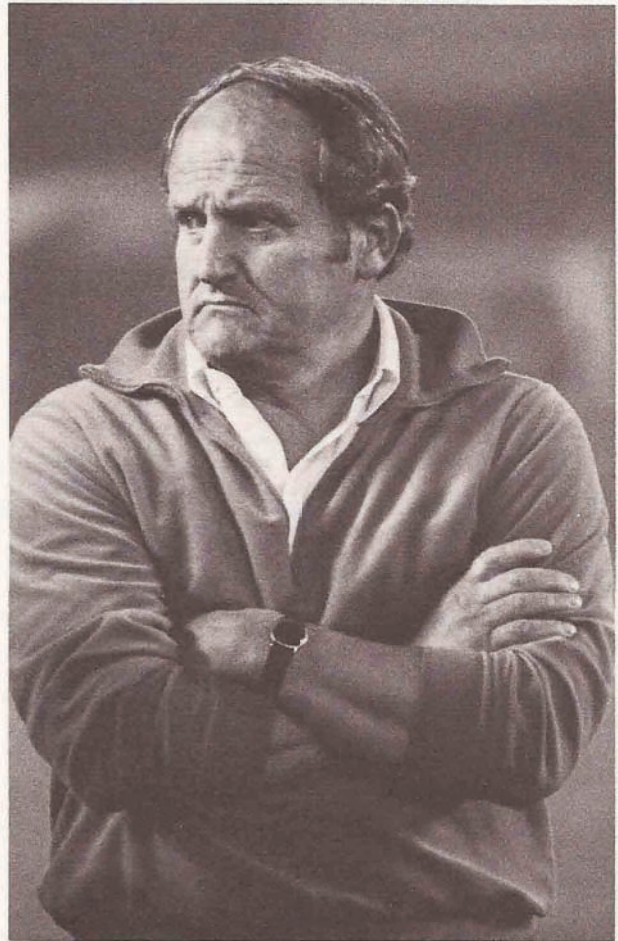


"It's almost as if Brigham Young sat there waiting patiently for one of its own to come out of the church and assume his responsibility," wrote Furman Bisher of the Atlanta Constitution concerning LaVell's appointment as head coach.

He has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history, ranking only behind Frank Kush (Arizona State) in winning percentage and games won in the WAC.

Edwards is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife, Patti, writes a sports column throughout the year for the *Provo Daily Herald*.

Born Oct. 11, 1930, in Provo, Utah . . . attended schools in nearby Orem . . . was all-state at Lincoln High School (now Orem High) in 1946 and 1947 . . . three-year regular at center . . . also lettered two years each in basketball and track . . . enrolled at Utah State in 1948, played center and linebacker . . . three-year letterman as center for the Aggies . . . was captain and all-conference for two years (1950-51) . . . played service ball for the Army (1952-54) at Fort Lee, Va. . . was player-coach for 6-3 team at Fort Meade, Maryland . . . returned to Utah and joined staff at Granite High in Salt Lake City (1954), serving as head football coach, wrestling coach, golf coach for a period of eight years . . . also tennis and basketball (1954-55) for two seasons . . . he joined the BYU staff in 1962 . . . in 1979 he was selected as the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year and Churchmen's Hall of Fame coach for 1979 . . . ten seasons at BYU . . . his teams have completed an overall record of 86-32-1 (7-4 in 1972, 5-6 in 1973, 7-4-1 in 1974, 6-5 in 1975, 9-2 in 1976, 9-2 in 1977, 9-4 in 1978, 11-1 in 1979, and 12-1 in 1980) . . . in 1974 he was recipient of the coveted Dale Rex Memorial Trophy and was also honored as the Utah Sportsman of the Year . . . LaVell obtained his M.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1960, and he received his Ed.D. from BYU in 1978 . . . married former Patti Louise Covey of Big Piney, Wyoming, and they have three children: Ann, now married; John, 23, who competes in track; and James, 20, now serving on a mission in Sweden after completing a year of BYU football . . . LaVell is one of the better golfers among the nation's football coaches, also gardens . . . phone 375-0487.



## LaVell Says . . .

A *Sports Illustrated* article described Edwards as a "large, lumpy chap, secretly something of a poet and a romantic." Edwards talked with a columnist at the *Provo Daily Herald* to find out what that meant. He was told, "It means you're a fat daydreamer." The columnist was Pat Edwards, LaVell's wife.

A media personality in San Diego introduced LaVell at a Holiday Bowl luncheon by saying, "Here is the best-known person in Utah since Donnie and Marie." LaVell responded: "Donnie and Marie who?"

# Highlights of LaVell's Career

1972—LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January . . . a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . Halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards per game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973—In LaVell's second season the Cougars begin to move offensively . . . Quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing, and number three in total offense . . . teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards, eight TDs) . . . as a team the Cougars are second in the nation in passing, eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record in most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974—Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . Individually, Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (to Steve Bartkowski of California, this time) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on all-time list (behind Roger Staubach, Jerry Rhome and Jesse Freitas . . . his career percentage is .607 . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title.

1975—A year of adjustment, the Cougars faltered through the first part of the season, then won six of last eight games on the schedule . . . Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, came off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark come-from-behind victory . . . Giff set WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . was starter thereafter . . . Nielsen finished the year 13th in NCAA passing, Cougars were 10th as a team in passing.

1976—Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . But he was second in total offense behind Tommy Kramer (Rice) . . . As a team, the Cougars were first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 in passing and 31.9 scoring) Nielsen voted first-team All-America.

1977—Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the season the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . had one or the other been able to play a whole season, they might have captured passing and total offense titles . . . Even so, Wilson finished eighth in passing and third in total offense (behind Doug Williams and Guy Benjamin) . . . as a team the Cougars led the nation in passing (341.6), were second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) in final NCAA figures . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game was third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . surprisingly, the Cougars also topped the nation in "take-aways" with a total of 56 defensive (interceptions and opponents' fumbles recovered) takes.

1978—Both Wilson and sophomore quarterback Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share Q.B. duties . . . Wilson was injured in third game of season . . . Although neither is mentioned in NCAA statistics, the Cougars are 8th in passing, fourth in NCAA fumble recoveries . . . Cougars finish with WAC title, third straight 9-2 season and a bowl bid to Holiday I.

1979—With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from (Wilson in 1977, McMahon in 1978), the Cougars elect to redshirt junior McMahon in favor of senior Wilson . . . Although the decision wasn't made until just before the Texas A&M game (opener) because of Marc's illness (ruptured appendix), Wilson helps engineer upset that starts Cougars on 11-game win streak . . . Marc leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in passing efficiency (147.1) . . . Wilson finishes senior year as consensus All-America with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . As a team the Cougars

lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars were 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU was first Division I team to pass for more than 4,000 yards in season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.

1980—For the second year in a row the Cougars post an 11-win season. Also, for the second consecutive season BYU leads the nation in three major statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8). Quarterback Jim McMahon, who was named to the Kodak All-America (the football coaches), had an amazing season, to say the least. Jim became the first NCAA Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards (4,571 to be exact), and he set or tied a total of 26 NCAA records, most of them total offense and passing. Among the marks: the highest passing efficiency ever (a 176.9 that topped the previous high of 172.6 by Jerry Rhome in 1964) which was nearly 27 points ahead of the second-place finisher. McMahon also led the nation in total offense (385.6 yards per game, compared to 277.0 for runner-up Mark Herrmann). However, the Cougars had a poor start, losing to New Mexico (25-21) in the season opener. This particular game was listed by one national publication as one of eight major upsets of the 1980 season. But the BYU mounted a comeback that put the club among the nation's top twenty by the end of the season.

1981—Another 11-win season for the Cougars, who finished with a 10-2 record, seventh WAC championship and 38-36 win over Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Cougars ranked eighth in wire service poll before 17-game win streak came to an end . . . BYU led nation in passing for the third consecutive year, also tops in NCAA scoring for third consecutive year . . . McMahon claims All-America honors, finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus Davey O'Brien Trophy) and sets all-time high in career passing efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coached the West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coached in the Japan Bowl . . . at the end of the season, Edwards career coaching record (87-32-1) was ranked among the top ten in the nation.

## LaVell Says . . .

"I'm a firm believer in hard work to reach the desired goals. But I also believe football should be fun; a sport the players, as well as the fans, should enjoy. It doesn't have to be regimentation or drudgery. The outgrowth of football should be good, positive values that will benefit a player for the remainder of his life."

\* \* \*

LaVell joined the BYU staff in 1962, "because they were one of the last teams to run the single wing, and I think I was the last living Mormon who knew anything about that offense."

\* \* \*

Said Edwards before his team won Holiday Bowl III: "I could just see my epitaph. It will read: 'He won a thousand games, but he couldn't win a bowl game.'"

\* \* \*

Edwards' reasons for not attending BYU as a student. "If I'd gone to BYU I would have had to live at home. And if I'd been living at home, my job would have been milking the cows. I was sick of milking those two darned cows."

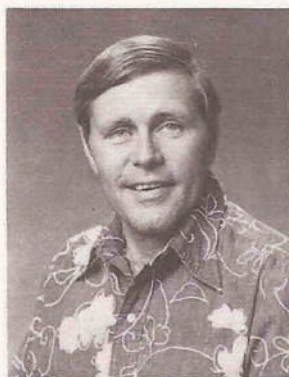

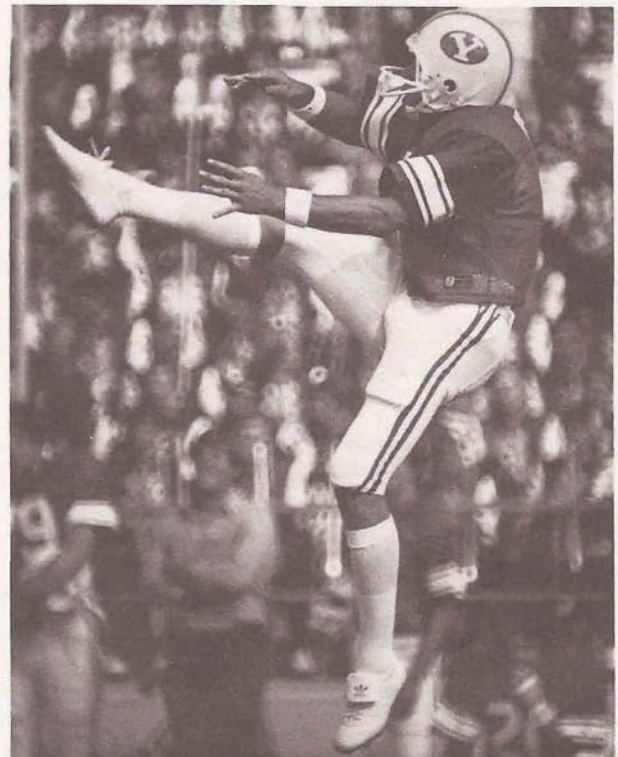

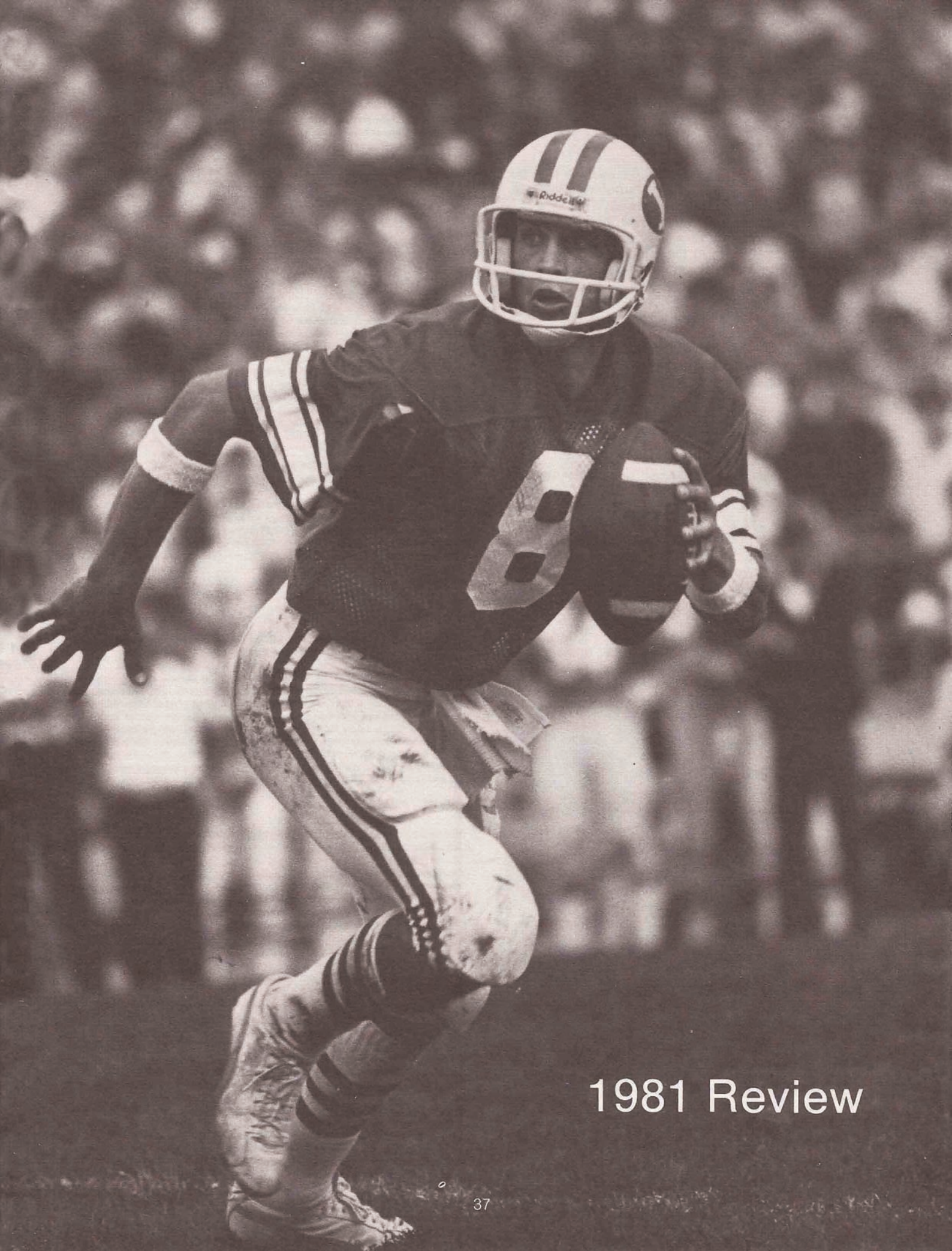

# Last Season in Review

## 'Coaster Ride Ends at Holiday IV

More than anything else, the '81 season can be likened to a rollercoaster ride. Fortunately, however, there were a lot more ups than downs.

The regular season ended at 10-2, and the Mountain Cats added one more win (28-36) with a victory over Washington State in the Holiday Bowl. And at one time during the '81 campaign, BYU was ranked as high as 8th in one of the wire service polls.

One streak that was kept alive was BYU's string of six WAC championships, plus four straight Holiday Bowls.

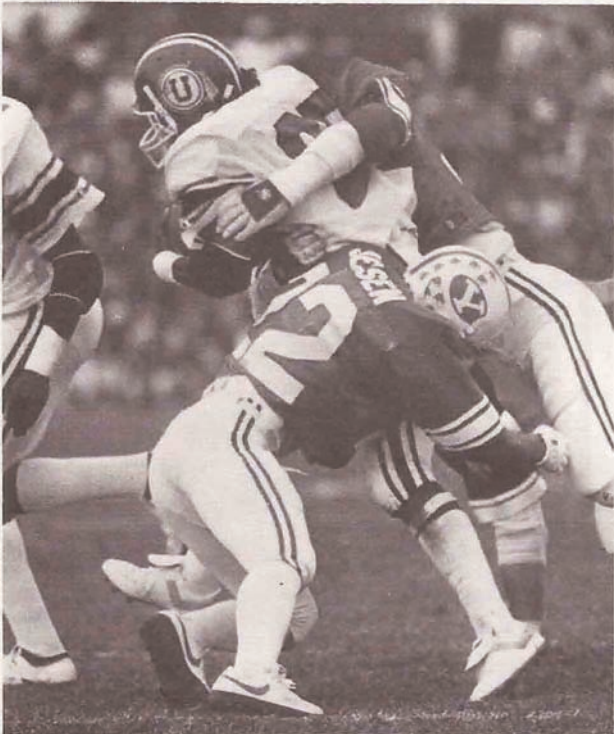
As for the lows, Nevada-Las Vegas stopped BYU's win streak at 17 at midseason, and Wyoming ran over Cougar defenses in a snowstorm at Laramie for the only other loss last season.

If you are impressed with statistics, the Cougars again led the nation in pass offense (356.9 yards per game), and were also first in country in scoring (38.7 points per game).

As for individual performances, what more can be said about the honors won by Jim McMahon: 70 NCAA records (36 passing, 34 total offense), all-time leader in NCAA passing efficiency (156.9 for his career), national leader in passing and total offense, consensus All-American selection and winner of the first Davey O'Brien Award.

Danny Plater, the Cougar wide receiver who was the MVP offensive player in the East-West game, was first-team Academic All-America (3.66 premed).

All things considered—individually and collectively—it was one of the finest years in the school's history.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 31, LONG BEACH STATE 8

Sept. 5—afternoon game (87 degrees, clear) in Anaheim Stadium, Anaheim, California (20,953)

Of the 31 points BYU put on the board, the defense scored 12 via Todd Shell's interception return and Tom Holmoe's blocked punt. Three interceptions and one fumble recovery also were credited to the BYU defense. The offense seemed to find the groove early, with quarterback Jim McMahon throwing for 403 yards in the first three quarters. The receivers were sensational with a total of eight Cougars catching passes from McMahon and backup quarterback Steve Young. However, BYU threw zero touchdown passes to end a 30-game consecutive streak of throwing a touchdown pass. BYU now 1-0 and ranked 15th by AP and 19th by UPI.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 45, AIR FORCE ACADEMY 21

Sept. 12—afternoon game (76 degrees, clear) in Cougar Stadium (38,712)

The Falcons used a three-man front line with eight defensive backs placed at various locations on the field to stop a flu-ridden Jim McMahon. The ploy worked—in a way. McMahon's longest pass of the day was 25 yards, and he only passed for 226 yards to end his consecutive 300-yard passing streak at 12 games. The running backs, however, caught 20 passes between them. And while the BYU offense was adapting to the Falcon "secret weapon," the Cougar defense was playing flawlessly. Air Force only achieved one first down in the first half and a total of 38 yards offense. Only a punt return of 75 yards by Mike Kirby put Air Force on the scoreboard in the first half. BYU now 2-0 and ranked 13th in both polls.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 65, TEXAS-EL PASO 8

Sept. 19—night game (80 degrees, fair) in the Sun Bowl (19,400)

BYU was the first to test UTEP since the Miners changed head coaches. Coach Billy Alton held UTEP pre-game warmups away from the Sun Bowl. The Cougars reeled off 58 straight points before UTEP scored in the fourth quarter. Reserve running back Vai Sikaheima rushed for 87 yards on eight carries, most in the first half with BYU leading 48-0. Three Cougar quarterbacks were used in this game, with Jim McMahon playing the first 1½ quarters and half of the third quarter. BYU now 3-0 and ranked 11th AP, 13th UPI.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 41, COLORADO 20

Sept. 26—afternoon game (71 degrees, clear) at Folsom Field (43,259)

This was among the highest performance levels of the season, but the scrap with the Buffs left over a half-dozen starting Cougars injured. Jim McMahon, who threw for 198 yards in the first quarter, suffered a severe hyperextended knee in the early second half and would be sidelined for two games. Center Bart Oates (ankle) and strong safety Mark Brady (back) had bad injuries. Fullback Waymon Hamilton, wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, and offensive linemen Vince Stroth and Wayne Faalafua were also injured. BYU led 17-0 at halftime. Steve Young subbed for McMahon and popped a couple of long runs to lead scoring drives. BYU now 4-0 and ranked 10th in AP and 11th in UPI.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 32, UTAH STATE 26

Oct. 2—night game (73 degrees, some showers) in Cougar Stadium (41,129)

This was Steve Young's first starting assignment at quarterback, filling in for the sidelined Jim McMahon. Young, the great-great-great-grandson of Brigham Young, called a key audible in the fourth quarter which sprang fullback Waymon Hamilton loose for a 42-yard run which tied the score, 26-26. The game was tied three times, but the final deadlock was broken when Cougar linebacker Todd Shell intercepted a pass and ran 12 yards for his second touchdown of the season. Miscues on long snaps and extra points were a problem for BYU. The Cougars now 5-0 and ranked eighth in both polls, the highest ever in BYU history.

### NEVADA-LAS VEGAS 45, BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 41

Oct. 10—afternoon game (67 degrees, overcast) in Cougar Stadium (39,852)

A 17-game winning streak, the nation's longest to that point, came to an end as the Cougars were out-offended for a change. BYU played catch-up offensively, and the Cougar defense was ineffective. UNLV quarterback Sam King hit Jim Sandusky on a touchdown pass all alone in the corner of the endzone for the winning margin with 0:19 seconds left in the game. UNLV scored first on a field goal to take the lead, even though the Cougars led 34-24 at halftime. Both Mark and Steve Brady were out of the defensive backfield for BYU, and the Rebels responded to the tune of 473 yards passing. Steve Young went all the way at quarterback for BYU and tailback Scott Pettis rushed for a net of 100 yards. BYU now 5-1 and 17th in AP, 20th UPI.



**BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 27, SAN DIEGO STATE 7**  
Oct. 17—afternoon game (74 degrees, clear) at Jack Murphy Stadium (41,727). Televised regionally by ABC

Both teams were unbeaten in WAC play (2-0). The four BYU aerial strikes are vivid in this much balleyhooed offensive battle. Jim McMahon, his knee now in a brace, returned after a two-game absence. He was precise in passing to Gordon Hudson for a 67-yard gain, to Glen Kozlowski on a goal-line dive, to Dan Plater on a quick look-in, and again to Hudson for a second effort in the end zone. BYU led 21-0 at halftime against former Cougar offensive coordinator Doug Scovil. Although McMahon set two more offensive records, BYU middle linebacker led a superb defensive blitz effort. Whittingham was named *Sports Illustrated* defensive player of the week for his 18 unassisted tackles, four of which were for losses and four of which were sacks. BYU now 6-1, ranking 13th in AP and 15th in UPI.

**WYOMING 33, BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 20**  
October 24—afternoon game (32 degrees, snow, and fog) at Memorial Stadium (22,745)

This game made Wyoming a frontrunner in the WAC race, and it was one of the few times Jim McMahon played the entire game. Playing in a snowstorm, it was hard to shut down Wyoming's wishbone attack. Wyoming scored five straight touchdowns to more than wip out the 14-0 lead BYU had in the first quarter. The 63-yrd strike from McMahon to Scott Collie was one of BYU's longest of the season. McMahon switched to the shotgun late in the second half. The Phil Davis-led Cowboys rushed for 350 yards, which was the most surrendered by BYU on the ground in the season. BYU, now 6-2, dropped out of both wire polls.

**BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 31, NEW MEXICO 7**  
Oct. 31—afternoon game (46 degrees, clear) in Cougar Stadium (36,343)

Only twice in over 20 years has BYU's defense held an opponent below 100 yards total offense. New Mexico netted 94 yards total offense after taking a 7-0 lead. Jim McMahon and Dan Plater both suffered mild concussions in the game. McMahon and Plater combined for the game's only second half touchdown. Plater caught eight passes for 124 yards and won WAC player of the week honors. Defensively, Brandon Flint and Kyle Whittingham were standouts, each getting five unassisted tackles. The Cougars fumbled six times, losing all six, so it was a good thing the defense had an exceptional day. EYU now 7-2, but not listed in the rankings.

**BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 63, COLORADO STATE 14**  
Nov. 7—afternoon game (63 degrees, partly cloudy) in Hughes Stadium (17,861)

BYU cranked its offense up in high gear for the entire game to fine-tune the team for the Hawaii game. Jim McMahon completed 44 passes for an NCAA single-game record and the entire BYU offensive line graded above 90 percent efficiency. Center Bart Oates returned to the BYU oineup, and McMahon was named *Sports Illustrated* offensive player of the week, attempting 60 passes before being intercepted in the game. CSU scored all of its 14 points in the first half, but McMahon and company offset that margin with seven TD passes. BYU tight end Gordon Hudson caught 11 passes for 117 yards and three touchdowns. BYU now 8-2 and ranked 17th in UPI.

**BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 13, HAWAII 3**  
Nov. 14—mid-morning game (80 degrees, fair) in Aloha Stadium (45,355). Televised regionally by ABC

D-e-e-e-fense tarnished Hawaii's undefeated season and made the Rainbow Warriors' first-ever national ranking disappear. The Cougar defenders grounded the WAC's leading runner, Gary Allen, to a minus one-yard rushing in a rare, mid-day game at Honolulu (game-time moved up to accommodate regional television). For the second time in the season BYU had no touchdown passes. However, Cougar wide receiver Neil Balholm scored when he fell on a fullback fumble in the endzone. BYU kicker Kurt Gunther booted two field goals and one extra point to lead the team in a low-scoring affair. Following this game BYU reappeared in both wire service polls after a three-week absence, 15th UPI and 18th AP. BYU now 9-2.

**BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 56, UTAH 28**  
Nov. 21—afternoon game (47 degrees, overcast) in Cougar Stadium (47,163)

Largest crowd ever to witness a sporting event in the state of Utah watched the Utes grab a 7-0 lead on the first play from scrimmage from an 87-yard run by Del Rogers. BYU right end Gordon Hudson broke an NCAA record in this game with 259 yards receiving in addition to 13 catches for two touchdowns. Statistically, this was Jim McMahon's most perfect game with a career high 565 yards passing, four touchdowns and no interceptions. BYU locked up the WAC title and the Beehive Boot in this contest to finish 10-2 overall and 7-1 in the conference. BYU ranked 12th UPI and 14th AP.



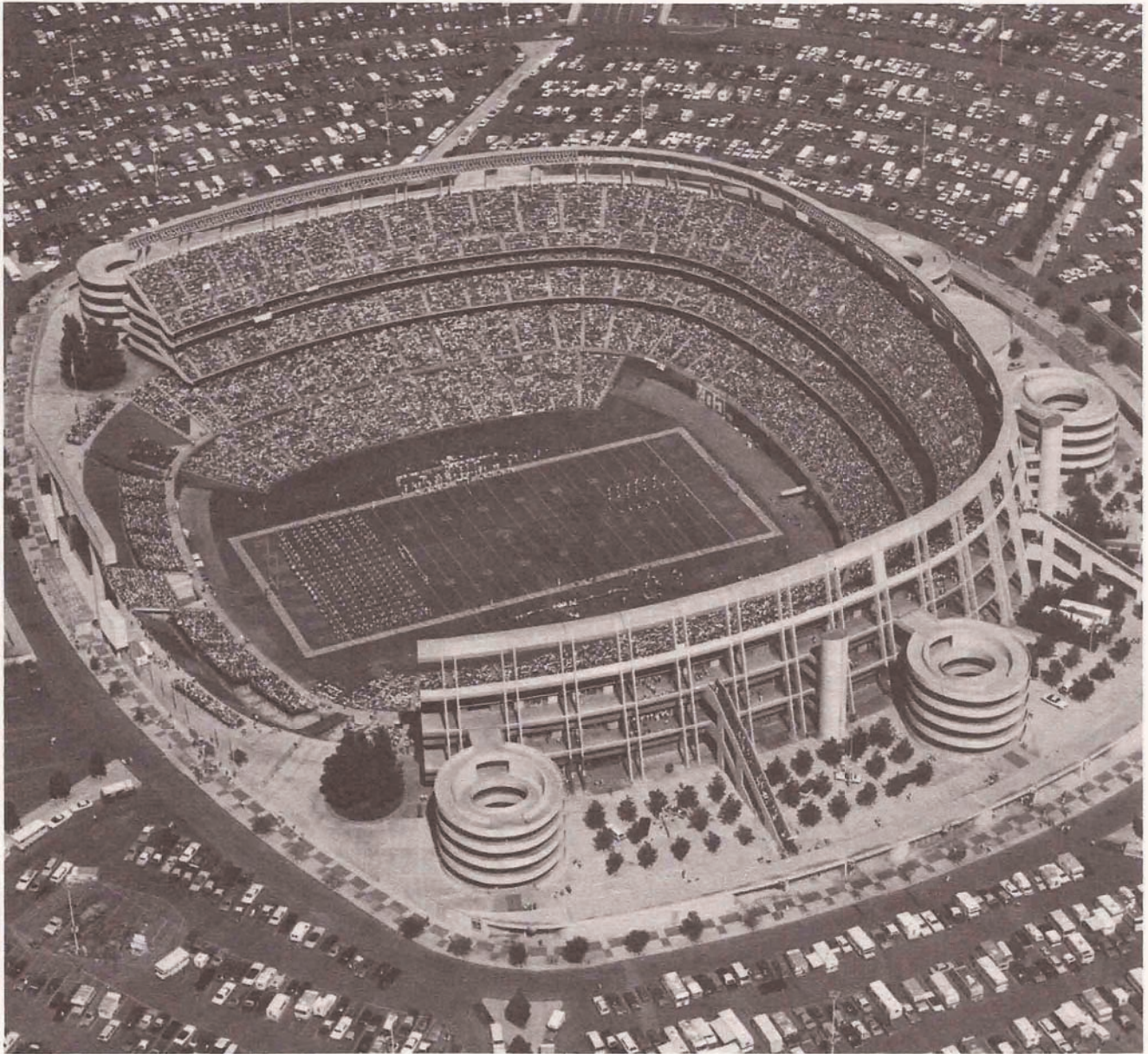

## Cats Finish High in NCAA Figures

Placing high in the national statistics is getting to be a common thing for the Cougars, and the '81 campaign was no exception. Jim McMahon, who set a total of 70 NCAA total offense and passing records, led the nation in two major categories, passing efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8 yards per game).

Tight end Gordon Hudson, playing his sophomore year, was ranked fifth among NCAA pass receivers with 5.6 catches per game. Waymon Hamilton finished 13th in the country in scoring (8.0 points per game).

## The Holiday Bowl Means Excitement

One of the more attractive post-season bowls in the country, the Holiday Bowl in San Diego has earned a reputation for close, exciting games, all of them, to this date, involving the Cougars.

This year's Holiday Bowl (V) will be played at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium on Friday, Dec. 17. Kickoff is set for 6:00 p.m., pitting the champion of the Western Athletic Conference against a nationally ranked opponent.

As a result of a new television contract and ticket

price increase, team payoffs for the '82 Holiday Bowl could approach the \$400,000 range, according to word from bowl headquarters. Last year each of the participating teams received \$286,179 for playing in bowl.

In the four previous bowl games, the WAC representative has faced Navy, Indiana, Southern Methodist and Washington State. The winning margin of victory totals just 11 points, and just four points in the last three years.



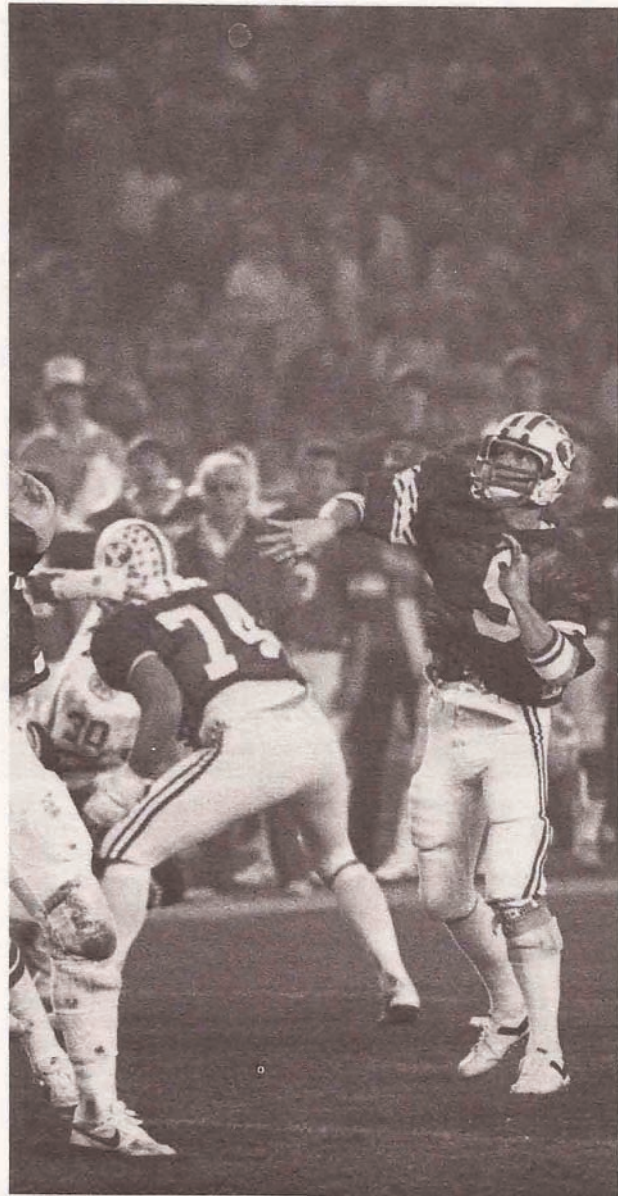
# The Cougars' Bowl History

**HOLIDAY BOWL IV, 1981**  
BYU 38, Washington State 36  
Dec. 18, San Diego, Calif.

Has there ever been a dull Holiday Bowl? Well, the 1981 edition fit the mold, and this time it found the two teams with Cougar mascots—BYU of the WAC and Washington State from the Pac-10—clawing away at each other before a crowd of 52,419. Again, it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge. But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life. In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30-seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down. Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD. WSU's first bowl appearance in over 50 years. BYU finished with an 11-2 overall record.

**HOLIDAY BOWL III, 1980**  
BYU 46, Southern Methodist 45  
Dec. 19, San Diego, Calif.

One pundit said last year's Holiday Bowl III was actually two ball games—the first a contest that lasted for most of four quarters, the other that was of four-minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56-minutes, SMU taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. In fact, the Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, the score was 45-25, SMU. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an onside kick, a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, a blocked punt by Bill Schoepflin, and finally (with three seconds left on the clock) the "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown after time had expired. That tied the score, but Kurt Gunther's extra point sent BYU fans streaming onto the field. Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 attempts for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, but one had to be there to feel the impact.

#### HOLIDAY BOWL II, 1979

Indiana 38, BYU 37 Dec. 21, San Diego, Calif.

The regular season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing, and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark. Those kinds of credentials, plus their national ranking in the polls (9th in UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season. The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead, 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the clock 69 yards to the Indiana 10-yard line. Then, with 11 seconds left on the clock, Brent Johnson missed a 17-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28-of-43 for 380 yards), and Indiana's cornerback Tim Wilber won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

#### HOLIDAY BOWL, 1978

Navy 23, BYU 16 Dec. 22, San Diego, Calif.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures (for San Diego, that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon set the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with 9-3 record, BYU with 9-4 mark.

#### TANGERINE BOWL 1976

Oklahoma State 49, BYU 21

Dec. 18, Orlando, Florida

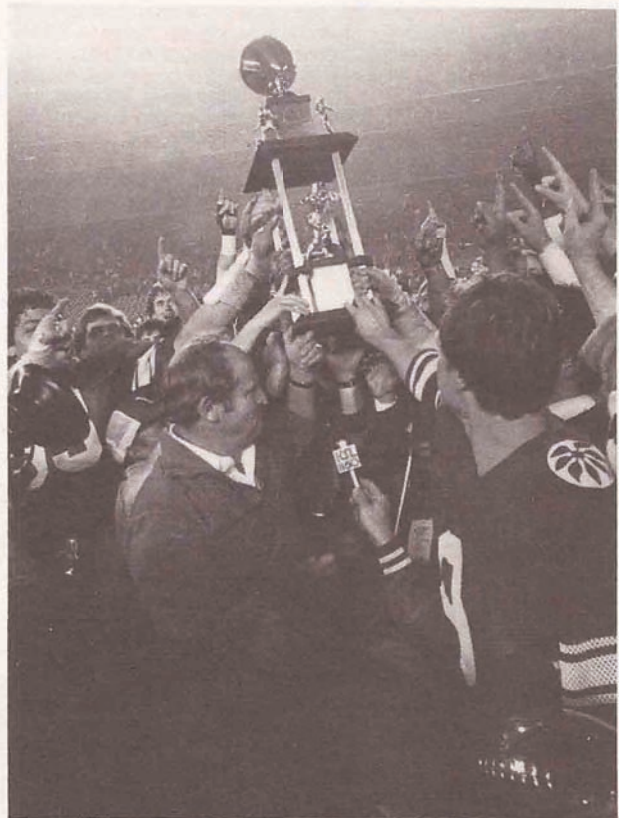
Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them. Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

#### FIESTA BOWL 1974

Oklahoma State 16, BYU 6

Dec. 28, Tempe, Arizona

Competing in their first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the half-time score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

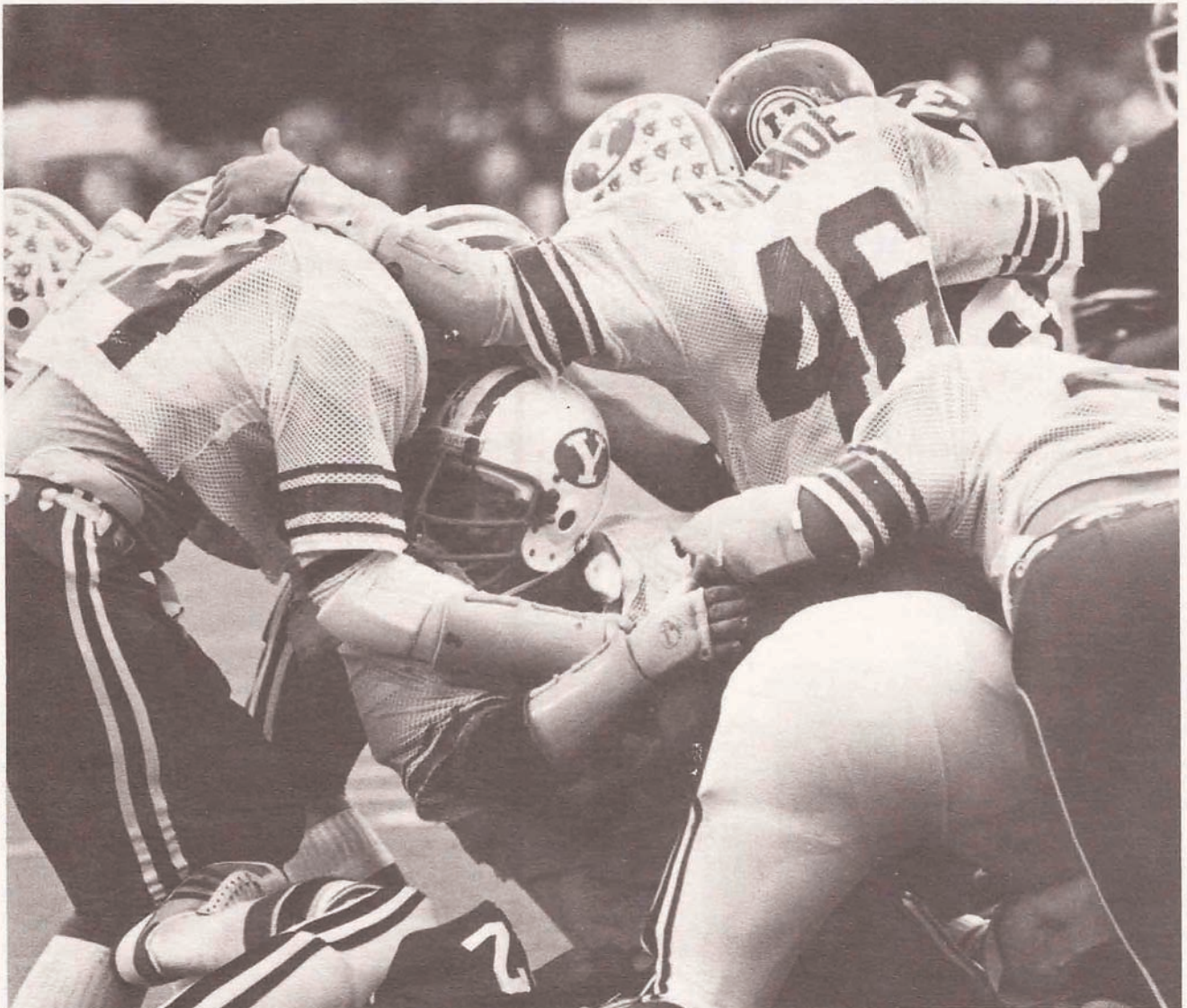

## A Historical Look

# Looking Back at 60 Years

Only a few hardy souls are still around who remember the Cougars' entry into intercollegiate football in 1922. And the change—the transition from struggling beginner to respected power—has been a dramatic one, indeed.

That first season found BYU winning only one game and scoring a total of only 10 points for the season. Sixty years later the school is one of the champions of the forward pass, leading the nation in that category for five of the past six years. Moreover, in comparison to that inaugural season, the Cougars also led the nation in scoring with 465 points in 12 games (an average of 38.7 points per game) last season.

Most of the major growth, plus the largest share of national honors, have come under the direction of Coach LaVell Edwards, whose teams have won seven WAC championships and played in six post-season bowl games.

Football had its origin at BYU near the turn of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game was brought back in 1922, and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 57 seasons of football. Joining ranks first with the old Rocky Mountain Conference, BYU teams were subsequently part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

The current winning tradition, of course, was fueled by some very skilled athletes, and most of the attention focused on the Cougars came as the result of some very competent quarterbacks, QBs like Virgil Carter (1966), Gary Sheide (1974), Gifford Nielsen (1976), Marc Wilson (1979) and Jim

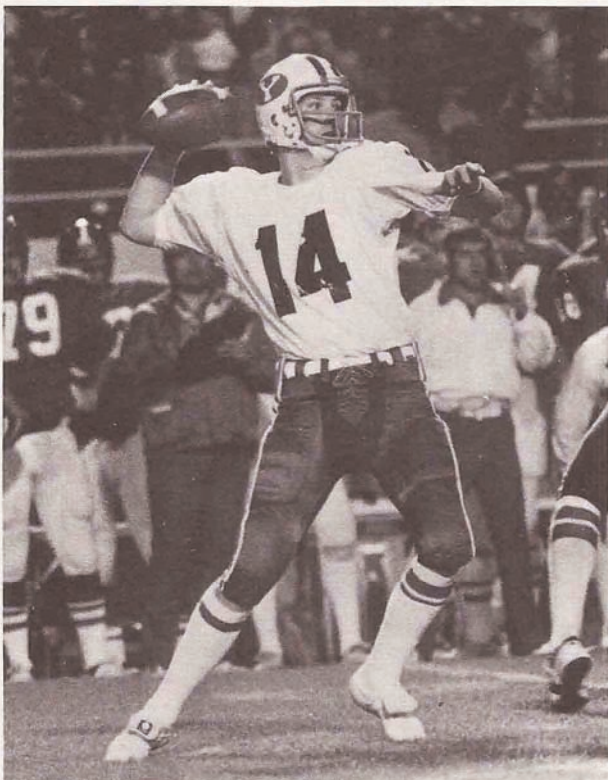
McMahon (1981). The last three were all named All-American quarterbacks, and McMahon's accomplishments include 70 NCAA records, plus the first national Davey O'Brien Award. And all three finished sixth or higher in the Heisman Trophy voting.

Four BYU quarterbacks—Sheide, Nielsen, Wilson and McMahon—are listed among the top seven leaders in NCAA history in passing efficiency.

While passing has been a big factor in the school's football program, the running game has also produced some outstanding individual performers. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961–62), a single-wing tailback who used the option to perfection, won All-America notice in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970–71) led the nation in rushing his senior year and was a second team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964–66) was the leading rusher in the Western Athletic Conference for three consecutive years. Moreover, to prove that running is an integral part of the Cougar attack, fullback Todd Christensen (1975–77) was the leading pass receiver on the BYU team for three seasons.

Offensive linemen of note include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973–75), Orrin Olsen (1972–75), and Tom Bell (1974–79), the winner of the national Swede Nelson Sportsmanship Award. Top defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972–74), Paul Linford (1972–74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975–77), Glen Titen-son (1978–80), Glen Redd (1976–80) and Kyle Whittingham (1979–81).

At various times in the last 15 years the Cougars have also had some great return specialists; Chris Farasopoulos (1968–70), the Galloping Greek, who led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records; and Golden Richards (1970–71), who is still listed as holder of five NCAA kick return records.

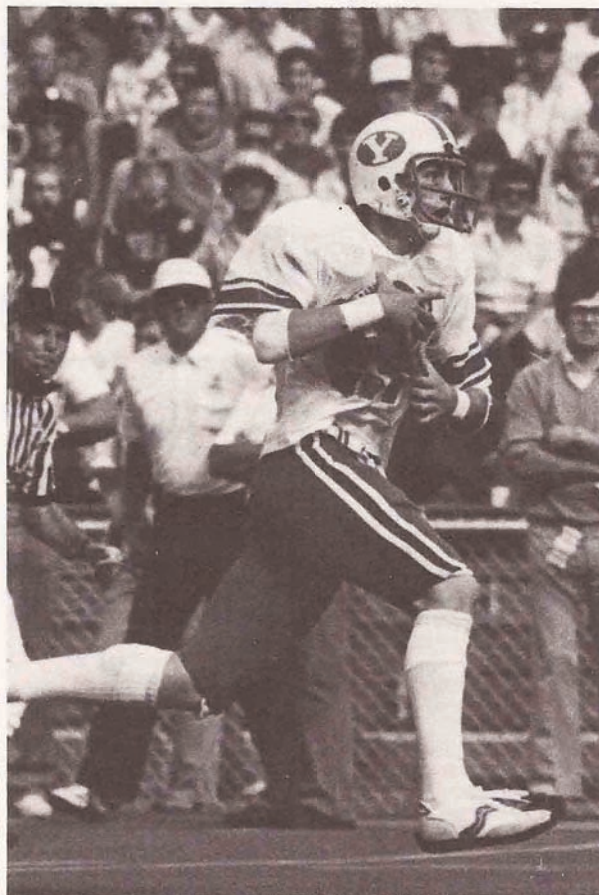

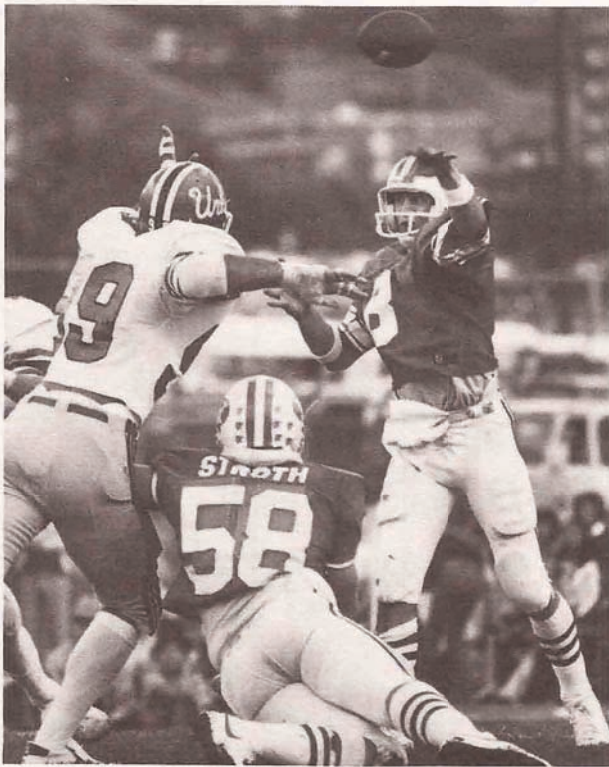
