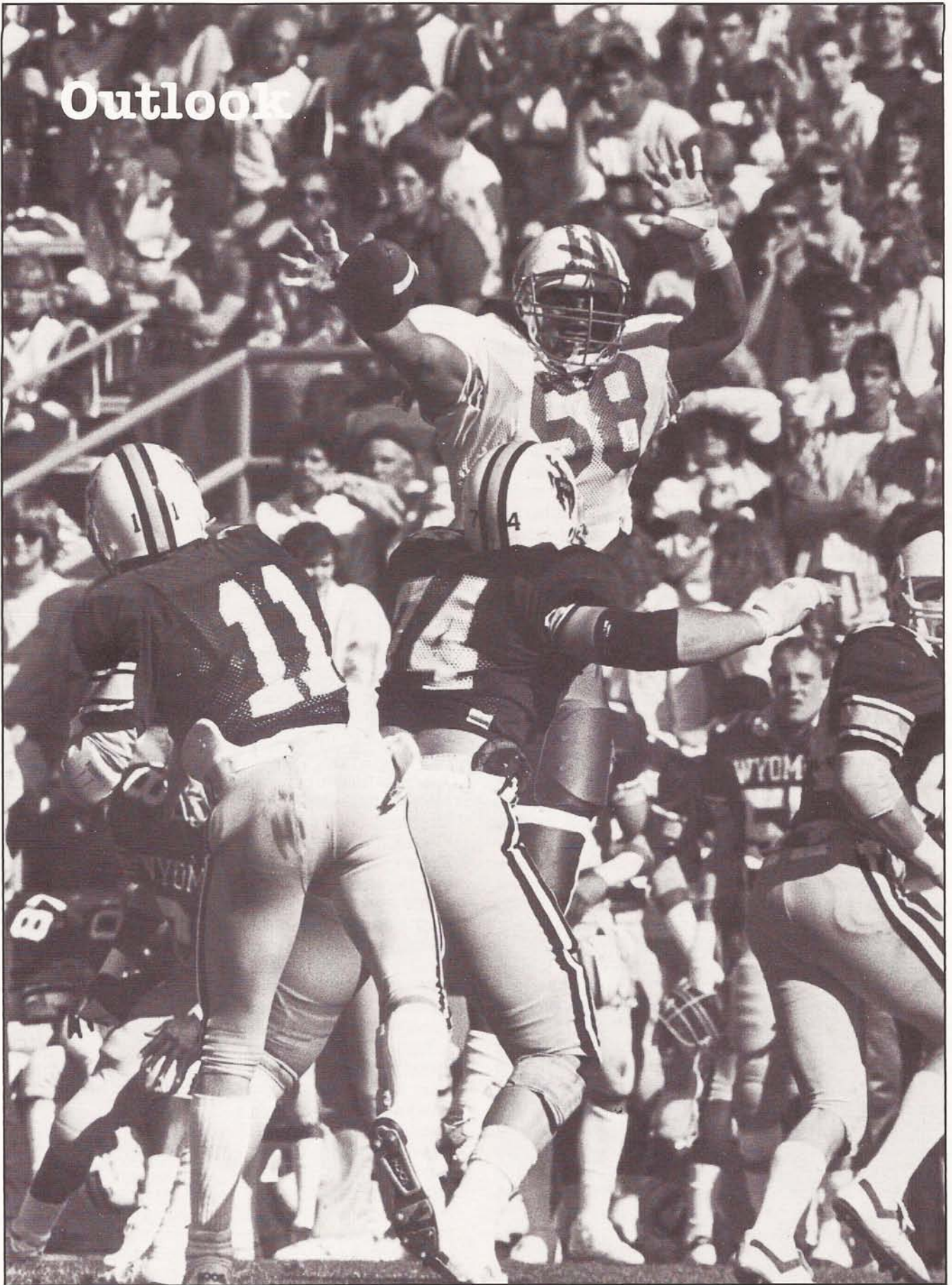

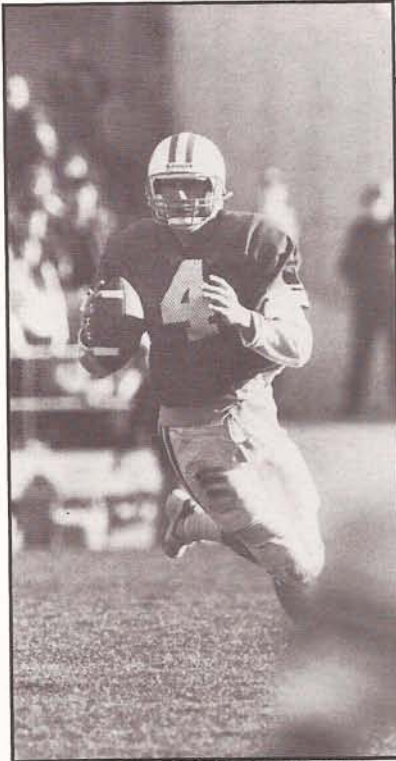

Rebuilding years have been a rarity for Brigham Young University's football program over the last decade. When graduation wreaked havoc with the depth chart, somehow, somewhere, Coach LaVell Edwards managed to find adequate--if not superior--replacements year after year. The result of that consistency was the winningest football program (.861) in the country from 1976 to 1985.

Last year, however, the odds caught the Cougars. And for the first time since 1976, BYU will not be

defending a Western Athletic Conference crown to start the 1987 season.

On paper, the 1987 Cougars aren't as overwhelming as some of their earlier editions. Many will be tempted to use the word "rebuilding" when referring to this year's squad. After all, 10 starters and 24 lettermen won't be coming back. High-profile names like Jason Buck, Shawn Knight, Mark Bellini, Lakei Heimuli, Robert Parker, Trevor Molini and Jeff Wilcox will be missing from this year's roster.

But, like years past, LaVell has a stable of outstanding athletes waiting to prove their abilities. Most of the "re-tooling" will come in the defensive line, the secondary and the offensive backfield. And, once again, competition for the quarterback position should be keen. The strengths appear to be in the linebacking corps, in the receiving corps and in the offensive line.

Here is a position-by-position look at the Cougars as they begin fall workouts:

Quarterback: Junior **Bob Jensen** has received the starting nod going into fall practice. He played well during spring practice and has two starts under his belt (Air Force and UCLA last season). His best outing was against Air Force, when he passed for 258 yards and did a lot of damage scrambling. Jensen has a strong arm and is an excellent athlete (4.7 40-yard dash).

Senior **Mike Young** appeared in several games last year and produced impressive stats in those outings. He is the younger brother of former Cougar All-American Steve Young, and a fine athlete. He also played well in spring practice and is the No. 2 QB going into fall. **Sean Covey's** stock went up during spring practice. He red-shirted last season after returning from a mission. A sophomore this year, Covey looks to have a promising career. He completed 135 passes in 241 attempts for

1,537 yards while playing with the Cougar jayvee squad in 1983.

Sophomore **Ralph Martini** is a likely redshirt candidate after switching back to QB last spring. He played tight end with the varsity in 1986. Freshman **Ty Detmer** comes to Provo after an all-star career in San Antonio, Texas, where he is the all-time prep passing king.

Running Back: Graduation claimed the three top rushers from a year ago. Fullback Lakei Heimuli, the Cougars' all-time leading rusher, started at halfback the last three years. His departure, along with the graduation of Robert Parker and Bruce Hansen, means new faces will be plentiful in the Cougar backfield.

Entering spring ball, a bevy of underclassmen were competing for the two running back slots. Redshirt freshman **Matt Bellini** was moved to running back from wide receiver in spring drills and was impressive. Others in the hunt for playing time include sophomores **Mike Salido**, **Fred Whittingham** and **Stacey Corley**. Also, junior **Alema Harrington**, who redshirted last year after surgery, will be high on the list.

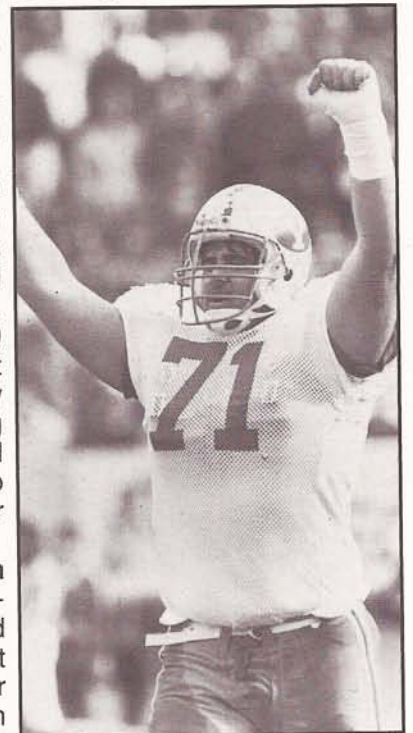
A key for the Cougars could be the recuperation of **Tom Tuipulotu**, who was slated to start for BYU last fall before he injured a knee in spring practice and had to miss the entire 1986 campaign and 1987 spring drills. Another key will be **Mike O'Brien**, who had a good year as a kick-return man last year.

Wide Receiver: Despite the graduation of Mark Bellini, the Cougars appear strong in the receiving department.

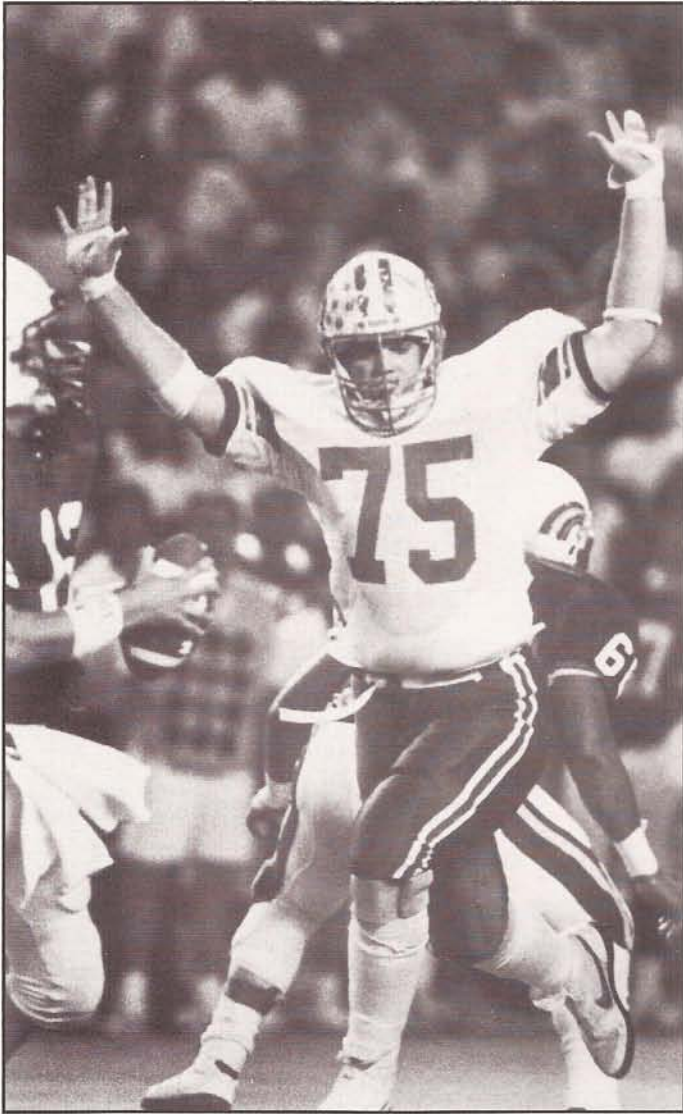
Returning starter **David Miles** will anchor the group. He'll be joined in the rotation by senior **Rich Zayas** and juniors **Chuck Cutler** and **Garen Jeppesen**. Zayas averaged 22.0 yards per catch last year, and Cutler saw quite a bit of playing time. Both Zayas and Miles will be deep threats with their speed.

Tight End: **Darren Handley** was a part-time starter and caught 11 passes last year. JC transfer **Travis McBeth** had an impressive spring game and should contribute immediately to the varsity.

Offensive Line: Last year's youth and inexperience on the offensive line may be a blessing this year. Four of the five starters return from '86. Center **Brian**

Rodoni should be one of the best in the league, as should guard **John Borgia**, a three-year letterman and All-WAC second-team choice last year. **Brian White** and **John Hunter** both were part-time starters a year ago. Junior **Warren Wheat** was a starting tackle during most of spring practice. Junior College transfers **Greg Hunter** and **Phil Nauahi**, walkon **Robert Saunooke**, senior **Doug Rawlinson**, junior **Dean Lott**, and redshirt freshman **Neal Fort** will be battling for playing time.

Defensive Line: A strength last year, the D-line is somewhat of a question mark this season. It is hard to replace players like Shawn Knight and Jason Buck, both first-round picks in the NFL draft. Fortunately, **Dave Futrell**, a second-team All-WAC selection, returns at nose guard to anchor the line. Futrell had 35 unassisted tackles, three tackles for loss, 8.5 sacks and four quarterback hurries last year. He could be one of the best in the nation this year. **Steve Kaufusi**, an outside linebacker and part-time defensive lineman last year, likely will be moved to tackle. **Jay Huckaby**, a reserve the last couple of years, will battle for a starting job, along with redshirt sophomore **Craig Patterson**. Junior **Tim Knight** will be pushing Futrell at nose guard, along

with **Mark Smith**. Former linebacker **Tim Clark** was a force at tackle in spring drills and could see lots of playing time this fall.

Two Southern Methodist transfers, **David Bryan** and **Dominik Unger**, could have immediate impact on the Cougar D-line. Bryan, a junior, was slated to start for the Mustangs this year, and Unger would have seen lots of playing time.

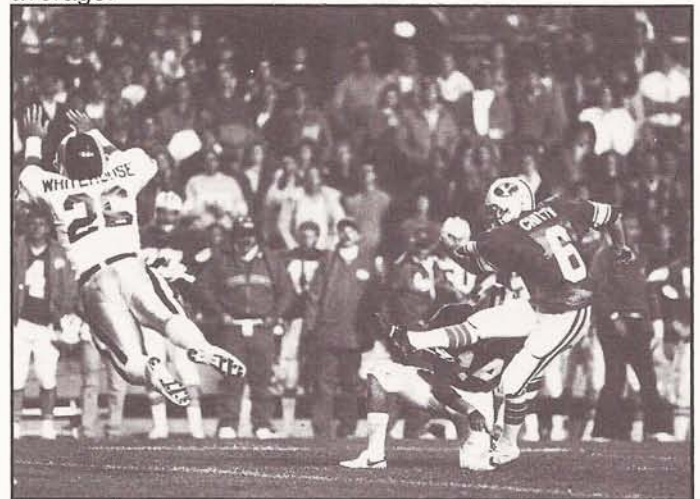
Outside Linebacker: Returning starters **Thor Salanoa** and **Richard Hobbs** will make this one of the strongest areas on the team. Salanoa was second-team All-WAC last year, and Hobbs had several outstanding games. JC transfer **Chad Robinson**, sophomore **Duane Johnson**, junior **Marc Neal** and former QB **John McDougall** will be in the hunt for playing time.

Inside Linebackers: Several players with starting experience return to make this another strong area for BYU. **Regan Hansen** and **J.C. VonColln** started at one time or another last season. VonColln was named to the All-WAC second team last year but did not play spring ball. Senior **Brad Cahoon** played a lot toward the end of the season, and sophomores **Bob Davis** and **Eddie Green** are fine athletes who may contribute this year.

Cornerbacks: All-WAC cornerback **Rodney Thomas** is a two-year starter and should be one of the best in the West. Redshirt junior **Rodney Rice** will compete for the other corner along with JC transfer **Kirk Davis**. **Darrian Lambert** lettered last year and should give the cornerback position added competition.

Safeties: Junior **Troy Long** is a two-year letterman and started several games at strong safety last year. **Courtney Rogers** and **Norman Dixon** will push him for playing time. At weak safety junior **Scott Peterson** and **Troy Fuller** will fight for the starting job.

Special Teams: Second-team All-WAC kicker **Leonard Chitty** was one of the bright spots last year. He made 16 of 21 field goals, including seven of seven from 40-49 yards. **Chris Germann** handled kickoff duties and long field goal attempts. Junior **Pat Thompson** returns to handle the punting chores. He averaged 41.5 yards per kick in '86. **Mike O'Brien** will be back this fall to handle return duties. He had 50 punt returns last year with an 8.8-yard-per-return average.

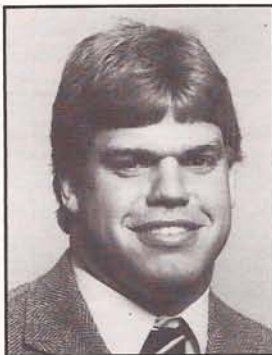

Yet his accomplishments often went unnoticed because he was sandwiched between Jason Buck and Shawn Knight, a couple of linemen who earned All-America recognition.

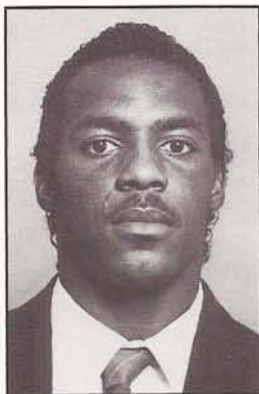
This year, however, Futrell will anchor the Cougar defensive line. He earned second team All-WAC honors last year and should be one of the premier noseguards in the country this season.

Defensive Back

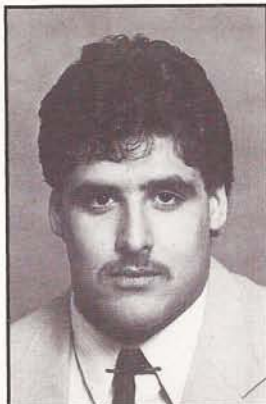

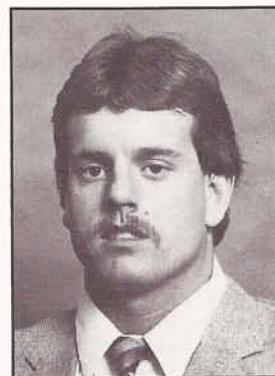


standing BYU offensive lineman in five of the games.

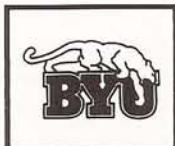


Leonard Chitty

When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

Prior to '72, BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 137 games, 11 WAC championships (including 10 in a row before last year) and with last year's Freedom Bowl, has played in 11 bowl games. Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

Five times in his fifteen years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83 and '84), the 56-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

This year, LaVell is serving as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He is the 64th president in the association's history.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way, picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C.

Such accolades are justly deserved for the coach-churchman-husband-father-grandfather-author-teacher-doctor, who is respected as one of the great minds in the coaching profession.

LaVell's winning percentage (.753) ranks fifth among the nation's active college coaches. And under Edwards, BYU has averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. Last season, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in nearby Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Orem and attended Utah State in Logan, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach Tommy Hudspeth's successor.

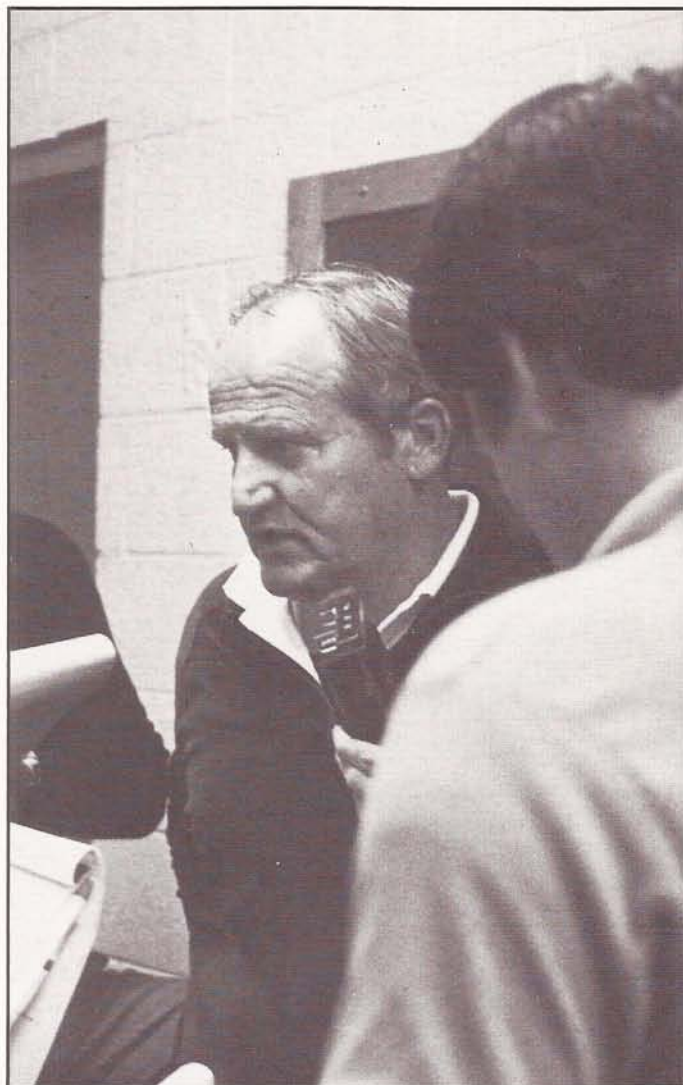
The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. He is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife, Patti, writes an occasional column for the Provo Daily Herald.

Born Oct. 11, 1930, in Provo, Utah...attended schools in nearby Orem...was all-state at Lincoln High School (now Orem High) in 1946 and 1947...three-year regular at center...also lettered two years each in basketball and track...enrolled at Utah State in 1948, played center and linebacker...three-year letterman as center for the Aggies...was captain and all-conference for two years (1950-51)...played service ball for the Army (1952-54) at Fort Lee, VA...was player-coach for 6-3 team at Fort Meade, Md...returned to Utah and joined staff at Granite High in Salt Lake City (1954), serving as head football coach, wrestling coach and golf coach for a period of eight years...also tennis and basketball for two seasons (1954-55)...joined the BYU staff in 1962...selected as the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year and Churchmen's Hall of Fame Coach in 1979...selected NCAA Coach-of-the-Year in 1984 by Football Coaches, Football Writers and the Washington, D.C., Pigskin Club...led BYU to National Championship in 1984...14 seasons as BYU's head coach...teams have completed an overall record of 137-45-1...(7-4 in 1972; 5-6 in 1973; 7-4-1 in 1974; 6-5 in 1975; 9-2 in 1976; 9-2 in 1977; 9-4 in 1978; 11-1 in 1979; 12-1 in 1980; 11-2 in 1981; 8-4 in 1982; 11-1 in 1983; 13-0 in 1984; 11-3 in 1985; and 8-5 in 1986)...in 1974 he received the coveted Dale Rex Memorial Trophy and was honored as Utah Sportsman of the Year...obtained an M.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1960 and an Ed.D. from BYU in 1978...married the former Patti Louise Covey of Big Piney, Wyoming, and they have three children; Ann, now married; John, former member of BYU's track team (800 Meters); and James, a former wide receiver for the Cougars...LaVell is one of the better golfers among the nation's football coaches...also enjoys gardening.

LaVell's Career Highlights

1972 **LaVell Edwards**, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January...a member of the BYU staff since 1962...halfback **Pete VanValkenburg** wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average...the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively...quarterback **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense...teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards)...Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense...Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense...**Gary Sheide** is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California)...Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list...Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games...**Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory...Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game...becomes starter thereafter...Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 **Gifford Nielsen** places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place...Giff finishes second to **Tommy Kramer** (Rice) in total offense...Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring)...Nielsen voted first team All-American...Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 **Gifford Nielsen** unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over...by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage...Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense...Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)...BYU's 341.6 yards per game is third highest in history, and 41 TDs second...Cougars topped the nation in "takeaways" with a total of 56 defensive takes (fumbles recovered or interceptions). Cougars tie for first in WAC and make post-season trip to Japan.

1978 Both **Marc Wilson** and sophomore quarterback **Jim McMahon** see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties...Wilson is injured in the third game of the year...neither quarterback is mentioned in NCAA stats, but Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries...Cougars win WAC and play in first Holiday Bowl against Navy.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt **McMahon** in favor of senior **Wilson**...Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins...Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)...finishes the year as **consensus All-American** with 10 NCAA records to his credit...Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)...also, the Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)...BYU becomes first division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season...LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award...Cougars win WAC again and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season...also, BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)...Quarterback **Jim McMahon** is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle **Nick Eyre**...McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)...he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing...his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever...he also led the nation in total offense (385.6)...after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight...Cougars win WAC again and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars...have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas...BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year...**McMahon** earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ...LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl...also coaches in the Japan Bowl...Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV...Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

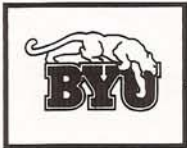
1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game...lose home opener to Air Force (39-38) but come back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V...**Gordon Hudson** is named consensus All-America...BYU finishes third nationally in total offense...**Steve Young** is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season...Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team...quarterback **Steve Young** and tight end **Gordon Hudson** both named consensus All-Americans...after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring...Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards-per-game...BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI...Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season...win streak is extended to 24 games...quarterback **Robbie Bosco** leads the nation in passing and finishes second to **Doug Flutie** in pass efficiency (151.8)...defensive back **Kyle Morrell** named first team All-America...team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)...defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense...another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII...Edwards named NCAA coach-of-the-year by most organizations.

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the **Kickoff Classic**...defensive tackle **Jason Buck** is named third team All-America and WAC defensive player-of-the-year...**Mark Bellini** earns second-team All-America honors...a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship...quarterback **Robbie Bosco** finishes the season ranked second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency...he finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting...BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall...Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes **Frank Kush** as the winningest coach in WAC football history...**Jason Buck** becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American...**Shawn Knight** is also named to several All-American teams...**Lakei Heimuli** comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards...Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but still post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior College in Redding.

Before transferring to BYU, he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson of Orem, and they have four children; Jed, 8; Annette, 7; Camille, 6; and Rebecca, 3.

Norman Chow (Utah '68) **Quarterbacks and Receivers**

Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for the past 12 seasons. He coaches the receivers and the quarterbacks and is the coach who calls BYU's plays from the press box. For several years, Chow coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts.



Previous to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, Chow coached for two years as a graduate assistant. He graduated from Punahou High, Honolulu, Haw., ('64) being named "Athlete of the Year." He then attended the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-

American honors as an offensive guard. A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waiialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children: Carter, 13; Maile, 11; Cameron, 7; and Chandler, 2.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) **Asst. Head Coach, Def. Coordinator**

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a seven-year stint in professional football, Dick Felt returned to his alma mater in 1967 to become a coach. This is his 21st year on the staff. Felt's current responsibilities are: assistant head coach, defensive coordinator, and defensive back coach.



Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He

won all-conference honors as a senior. After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was a first lieutenant. Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson of Boise, Idaho, and they have four children: Karen, Curtis, Kristie and Nancy.

Roger French (Minnesota '56) **Off. Coordinator, Head Offensive Line**

Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past seven years, during which time the Cougars have traditionally led the nation in passing and total offense. He is beginning his eighth year as assistant coach in charge of the offensive line. French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen.



Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities as Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line

coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State. Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also have

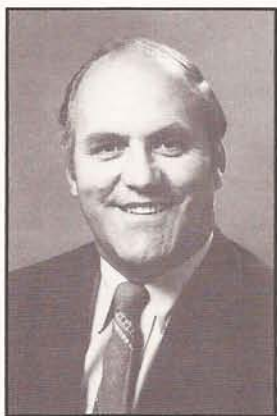
led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last four years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played some pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball. French received the Admirals Trophy at the Holiday Bowl in 1984 on the U.S.S. Kitty Hawk.

Roger and his wife, Dody, have two daughters, Kathy and Gail.

Mel Jay Olson (BYU '70) **Academic Coordinator, Offensive Line**

Mel Olson left his mark as a center playing for BYU in the '60s before joining the BYU coaching ranks 18 years ago. He works with the offensive line but mainly concentrates on the centers. He worked closely with Trevor Match and Bart Oates, former BYU centers who now play in the NFL. He also serves the team as academic coordinator. While coaching the jayvees several years ago, his teams were undefeated three times.



Born Jan. 20, 1945, in Afton, Wyo., Mel was an all-state fullback and linebacker at Star Valley High for two years (1962-63). He was a member of BYU's first WAC championship

team (1965) before accepting a mission call to Texas (1967-69). Returning to BYU he earned All-WAC and All-America honors his senior year. He was voted to the second team on the 15-year All-WAC football team.

Mel earned his Ed.D. at BYU in 1980, majoring in physical education and minoring in health education. His dissertation was "The Construction and Evaluation of a Coaching Education Curriculum."

He is married to the former Susan Taylor of Provo. They have five children: Michael, 16; Kristen, 14; Melissa, 12; Tresa, 9; and Chad, 5.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) **Recruiting Coordinator, Kicking**



Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity last year after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85. Pella is responsible for coaching the kickers, the tight ends and coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-

American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker. He set a school record with nine PATs in a game vs. New Mexico State. After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder. Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl. He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children; Brian, Jake and Nicole.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) **Defensive Line, Special Teams**



Tom Ramage has, perhaps, the most varied football coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff 15 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks. He is in charge of the defensive line and is special teams coordinator. Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Tom came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For the next four years, Tom was line coach of the Aggies under Tony Knap.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children: John, an assistant coach at Utah State; Lorrie; Rochelle; Sherrie; Dedra; and Cory.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs



During the past decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He is responsible for BYU's running backs. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after successful coaching jobs at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.) and Snow College (Ephraim, Utah). He was assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Ricks.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High School. He played offensive tackle and

guard at BYU before leaving on an LDS mission to Seattle, Wash., after his sophomore year. When he returned, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. He played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Lance and his wife, Leslie, have four children; Brittany, 10; Lance Jr., 7; Dallas, 3; and Matthew, 1.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Outside Linebackers



Ken Schmidt's name is well recognized in Utah coaching circles. He joined the Cougars in 1982 after a successful high school and junior college coaching career. He is responsible for coaching the outside linebackers.

A Murray, Utah, native, Schmidt enrolled in the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He was graduated in 1964 and obtained his M.S. degree from Utah in

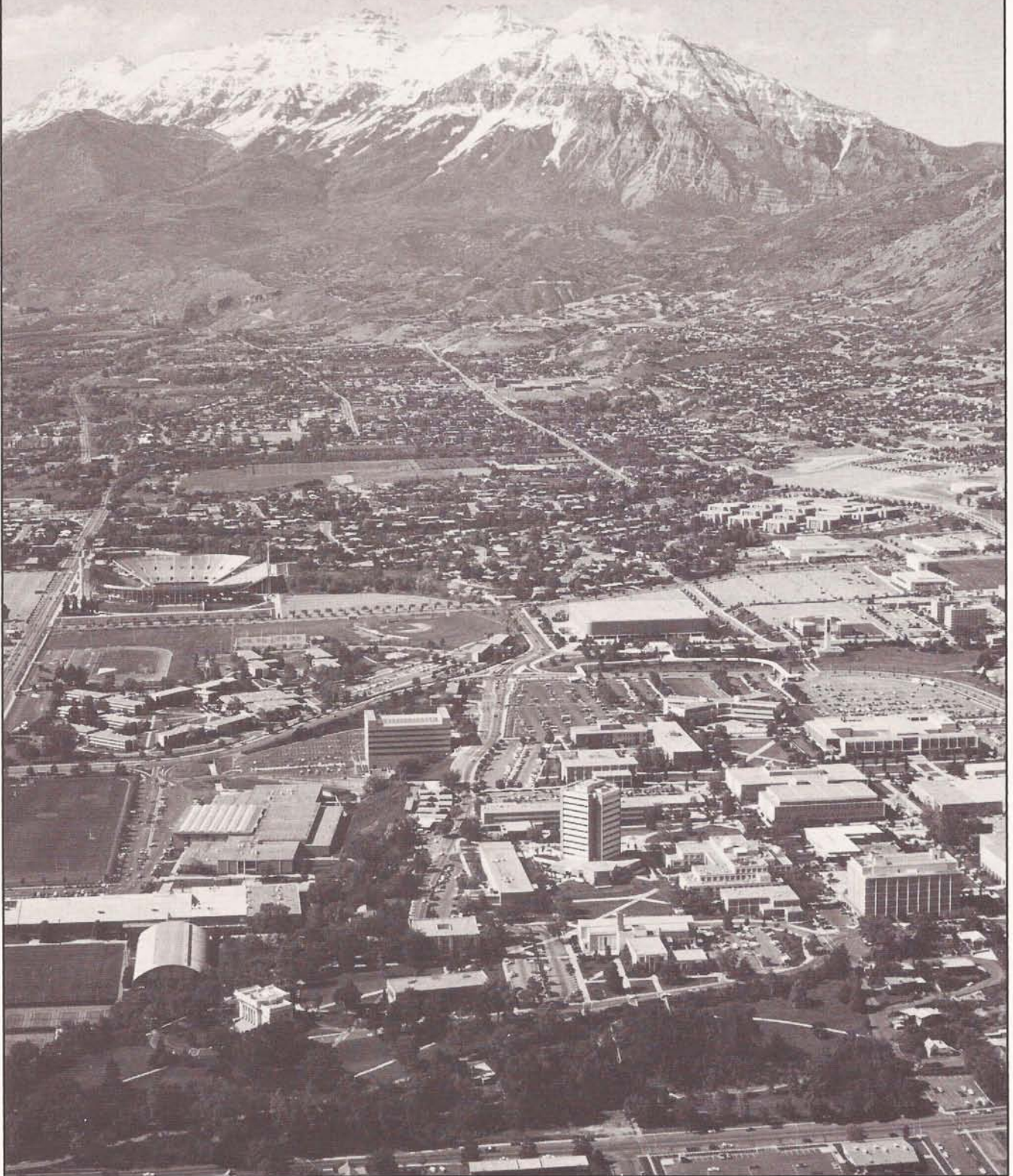
1969. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68). Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships during his stay (1968-79). In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.). The Vikings won the conference championship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. 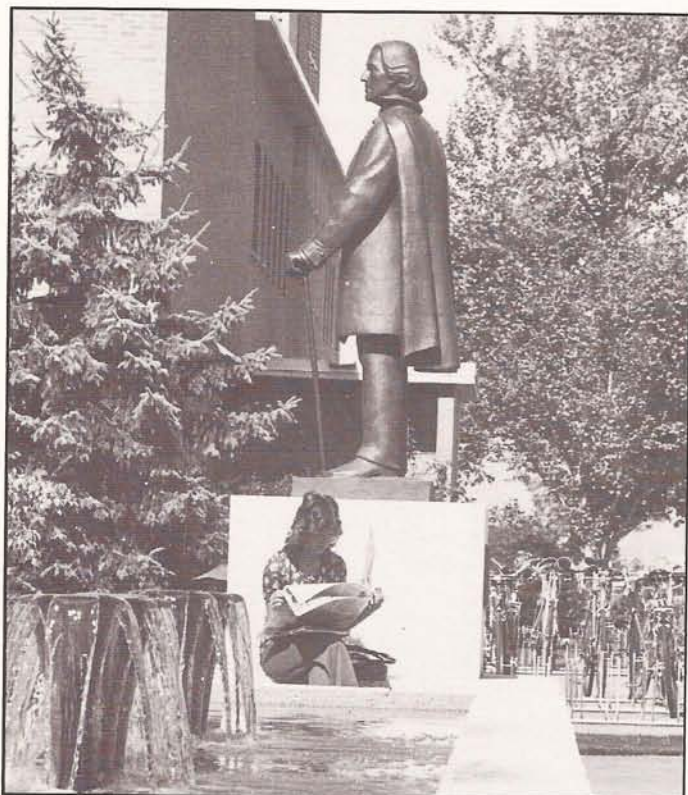

University Administration





Brigham Young University



Brigham Young founded BYU in 1875. Now it is the largest private university in the country.

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. More than three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23.5, compared to the national average of 18.8. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School, founded just 13 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with four of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its sixth-ranked school of accountancy and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; and the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

BYU's music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with an unusually extensive course offering, and its large number of faculty researching family issues.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and has a rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing and mathematics, arts and sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture alongside the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 26 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (about one-third from Utah) and about 90 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.



Athletic Department



BYU's Marriott Center is the second-largest on-campus basketball arena in the country.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the academic programs and BYU, the Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

A poll published by The Knoxville Journal lists the top overall athletic programs in the country each year. BYU has finished in the top-20 11 of the last 16 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-five five times. In the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars have won the all-sports supremacy title nine straight years.

The University's athletic program boasts 11 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and wrestling.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team has won 19 WAC division titles in 20 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful, 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the fields north of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout

stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse. Construction was begun this past summer on a 9,350 square-foot weight room which will be one of the finest in the country when it is completed this winter.

The Fieldhouse, a multisport complex, contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, soccer, track and golf teams for indoor practice.

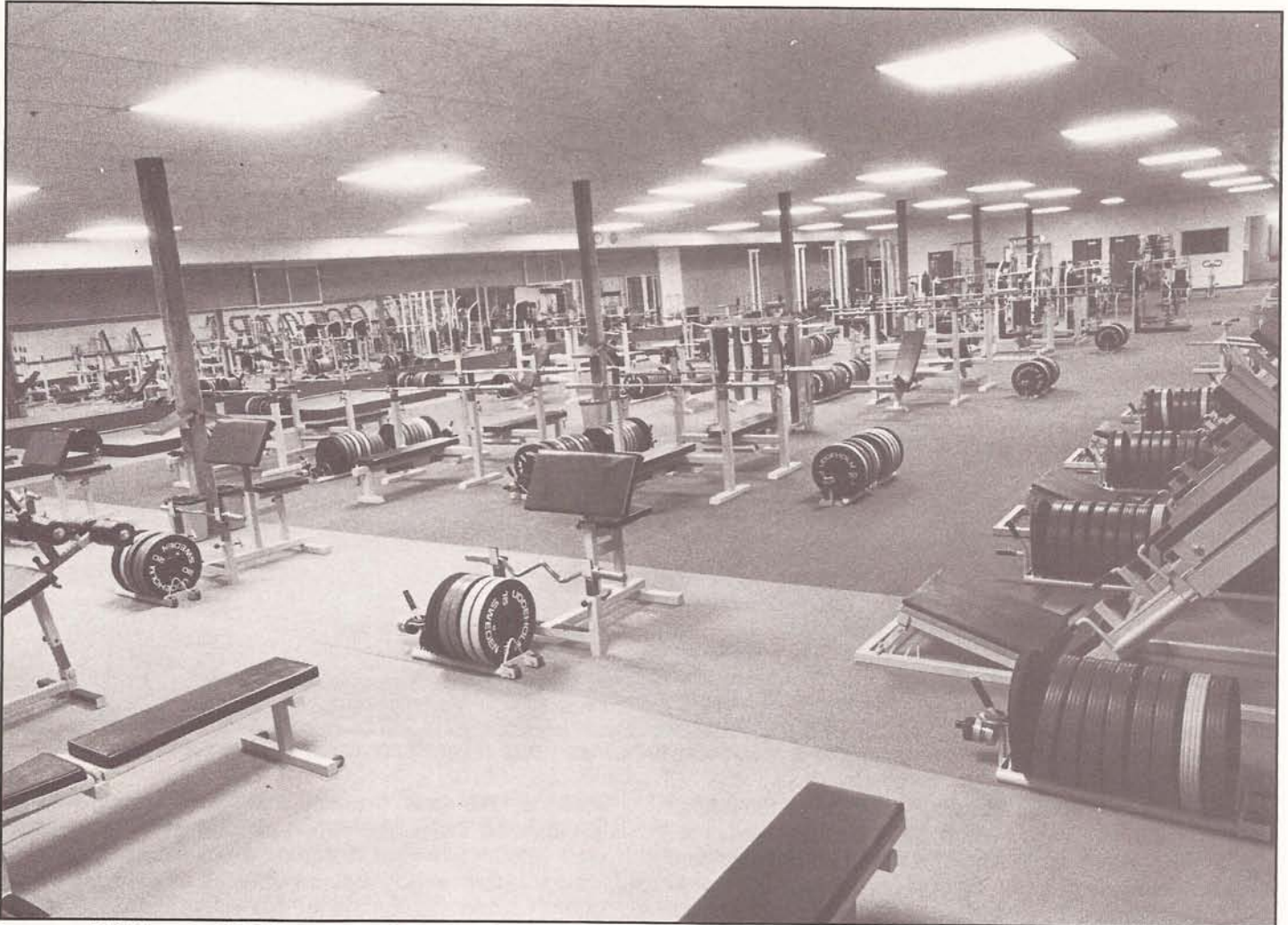
Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest on-campus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. It was the site of the 1982 NCAA track and field championships. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated, electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.



Strength and Conditioning Center



BYU's new 94,000 square-foot strength and conditioning center is one of the best in the country.

BYU football players returning to campus for the 1987 season found a much-welcomed surprise waiting outside the locker room--a new conditioning facility which ranks among the best in the country.

The 94,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers. In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.

Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at Georgia, Alabama, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Southern California, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.

Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes who tried the new facility shortly after it opened during the summer raved about how much more fun to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the new facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they encountered during visits to other universities. Even coaches of sports where athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the new facility will be of benefit. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.

President Jeffrey R. Holland



In his seven years as president of Brigham Young University, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland has made "excellence" his byword for all areas of the university.

"We cannot do everything at BYU," President Holland has said. "But what we choose to do, we intend to do superbly well."

That same philosophy carries

over to athletics at BYU. "It (athletics) has a legitimate place, and, like everything else in the college experience, if it's going to be done, it should be done well," he says.

During his term as president, Dr. Holland has played an instrumental role in the University's "Excellence in the Eighties" fund-raising campaign, which raised more than \$115 million in its first five years. The university hopes to raise another \$100 million by the end of the decade.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a standout performer on the Dixie High School basketball and football teams. He later became captain of the conference-champion Dixie College basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960-62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years--1835 to 1883."

Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs, which reached more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor or director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 70 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

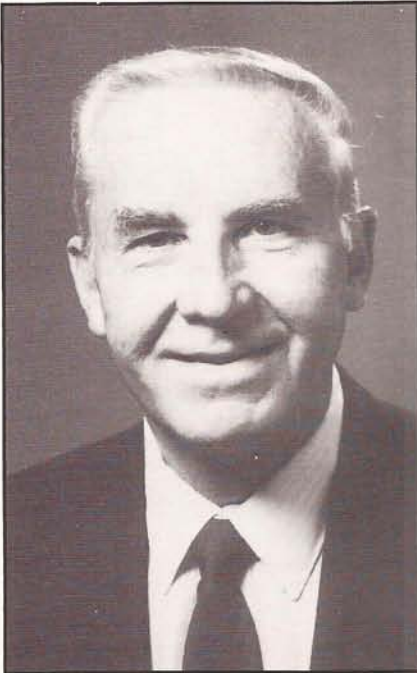
In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company and Commercial Security Bancorporation in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He also serves as president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU). Until last winter, he represented the Western Athletic Conference as a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) Presidents' Commission.

President Holland is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Patricia Terry of St. George, Utah. They are the parents of three children, Matthew, Mary Alice and David.



Dr. Clayne R. Jensen



Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 14th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean.

He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for seven years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelors and masters degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine

Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, and Noteworthy Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).



Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director



Wherever Glen Tuckett has traveled, he has left a positive mark in athletics at both the local and national levels.

A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. Following prep school, he went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and was selected to the Western International League all-star team in

1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.

In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach and head baseball coach. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award which is given annually to the outstanding professor at BYU.

Because of his background in athletics and recruiting, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator for the broadcast of BYU football and basketball with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tournament's 27-year history.

In July 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 11 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

Nationally, Tuckett has served on many prestigious committees. He was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979.

He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee, the College Football Association Television Committee and is presently the chair of the Collegiate Football Association Long Range Planning Committee.

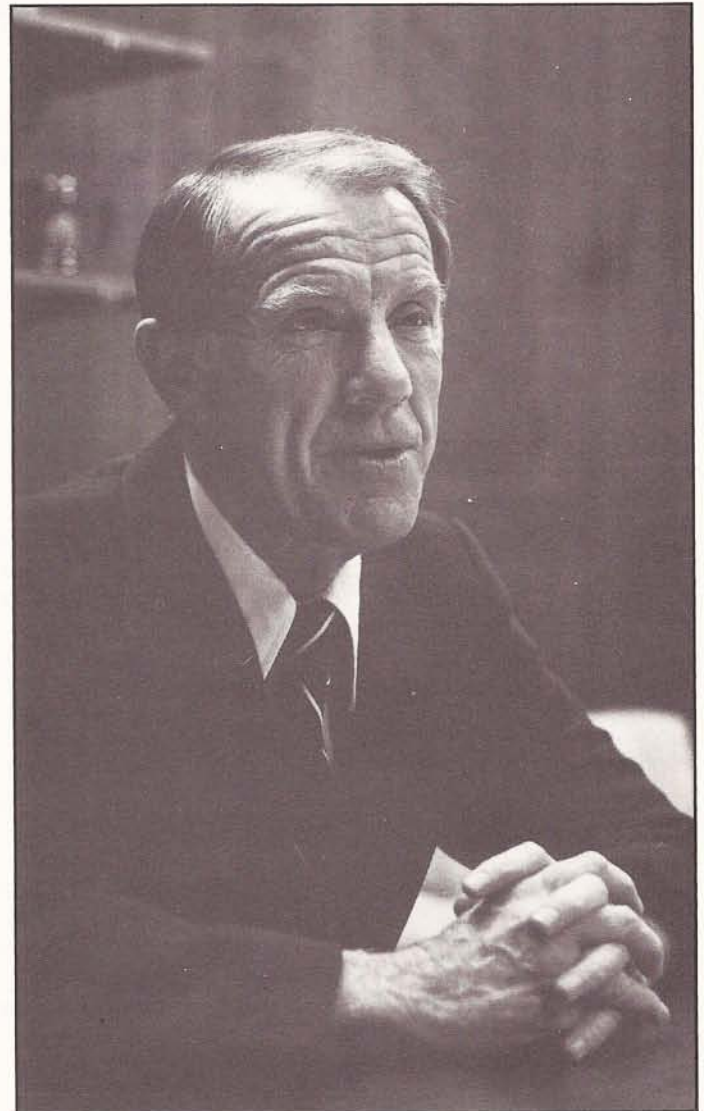
This past year Tuckett was placed on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee which is studying the possibility of a national championship playoff for NCAA Division I football.

Tuckett has received several honors for the hours of service he has put in to BYU, the community and the nation. In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame for his successful coaching career at BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

As well as influencing the lives of several athletes, Tuckett has also been able to touch the lives of members of the community through public speaking. He has become one of the more popular public speakers for business, public and church groups.

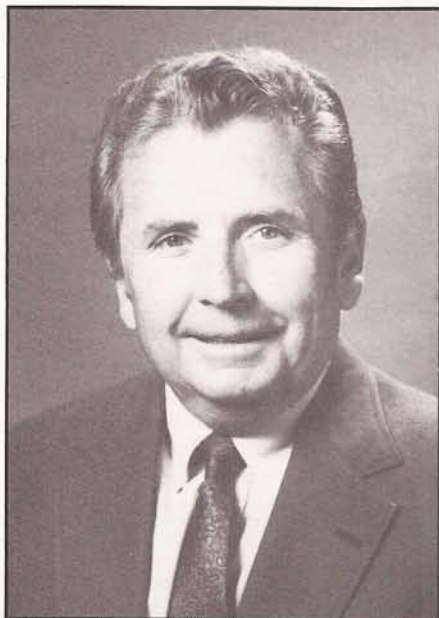
He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Pete Witbeck Associate Athletic Director



Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for the past 38 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on

the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

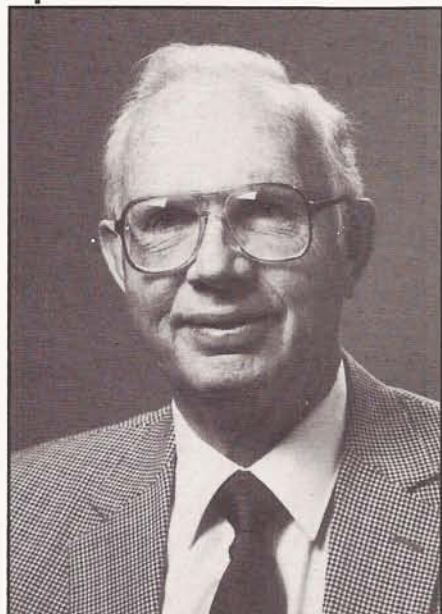
After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. His duties included coordinating the offense and heading up scouting and recruiting efforts. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of ten Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. He held that position until Watts retired from basketball in 1972 to become athletic director.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference.

The University's first full-time sports information director came aboard 35 years ago at a time when the size of the student body was relatively small and the school's athletic program very active but modest.

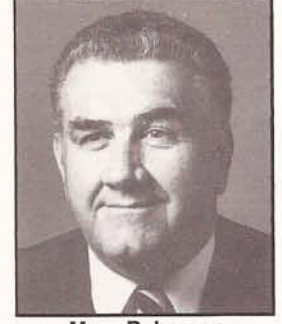

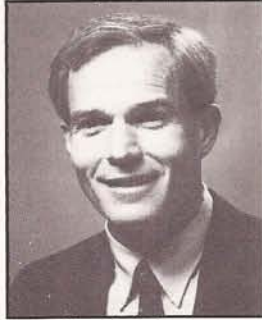

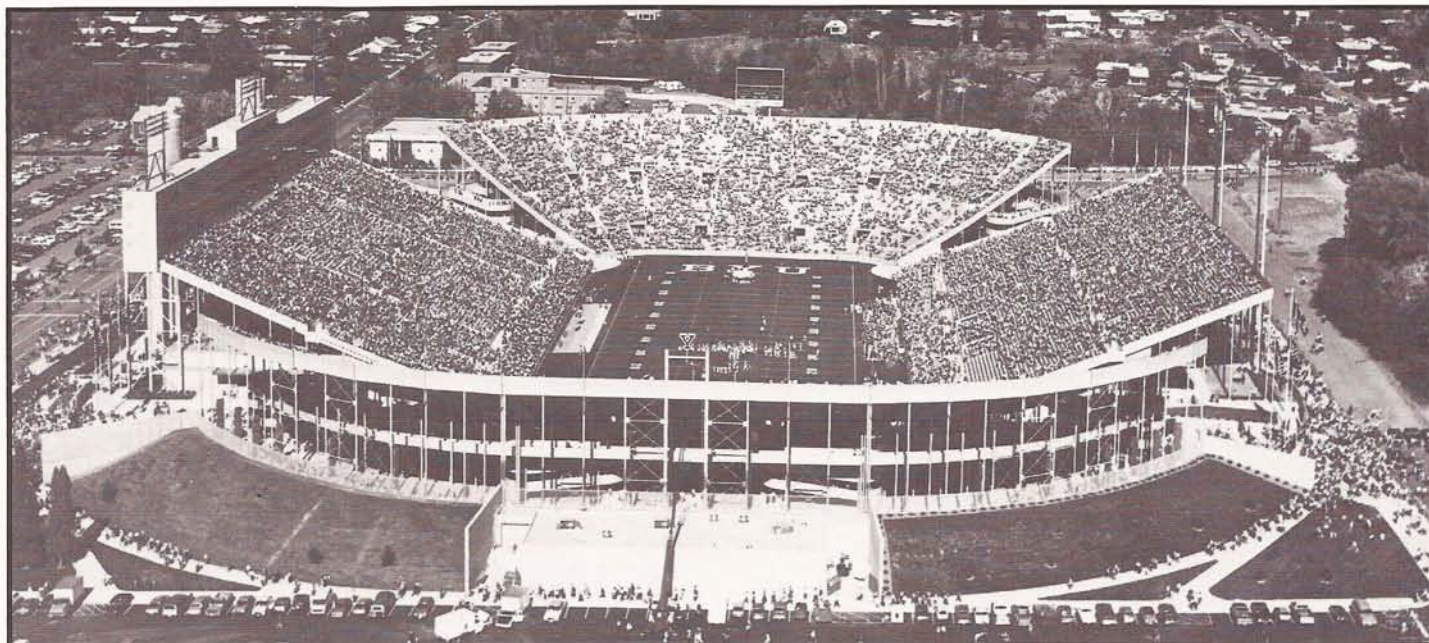

Cougar Stadium



Cougar Stadium seats 65,000 fans and is the fourth-largest university-owned stadium in the West.

When BYU expanded its football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, it marked the beginning of a new era for the Cougar football program.

In each of its first five seasons, the stadium has been sold out with season tickets. Last year 386,274 fans watched the Cougars play at home, an average of 64,379 per game. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in football attendance every year since the expansion. In 1986, the Cougars ranked 20th in attendance. Arizona State was the only Western school that drew larger crowds than the Cougars.

The fan support has helped BYU schedule home-and-home non-league games with teams like UCLA, Washington, Temple, Pittsburgh, Texas and others.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to 1982, the stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 crammed into the facility to see a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box and adding box seating in the West stands.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains about 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing up to 13 inches of rainfall per hour.

Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and rises over 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for working media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Three elevators transport guests to the press box.

In 1982, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."

The single-game attendance record is 65,508, set in 1984 against Utah State. Cougar Stadium is the 24th largest on-campus football facility in the country and is the fourth largest university-owned stadium in the West (Stanford, California and ASU seat more).

Western Athletic Conference

Only in its 25th year, the Western Athletic Conference is leaving its mark on collegiate football. In 1984, Brigham Young University won the National Championship. Two teams finished the regular season ranked in the top 10 in 1985, and last year, for the fifth year in a row, two WAC teams were invited to bowl games.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds its distinct personality to the overall flavor of the conference.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. However, on the same day they departed, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the rewards of WAC membership has been the league's affiliation with the Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The conference football champion receives an automatic bid to the post-season game against an at-large team. Every third year, however, the Holiday Bowl is free to invite two at-large teams instead of the conference champion.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league. Jeff Hurd is in charge of conference relations. Mark Hollis serves as administrative assistant, and Dee Ann Menzies is legislative assistant.

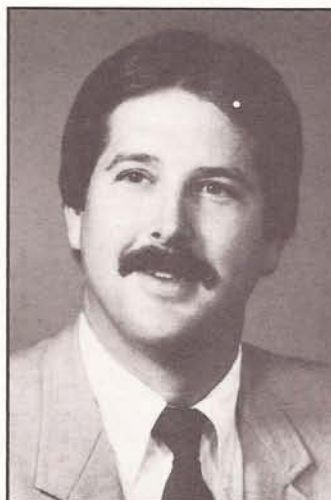

Outlook: Going into spring drills, Coach Mike Gottfried's main concern was finding a quarterback.

Three players, Sal Genilla, Joe Felitsky and Larry Wanke were battling for John Congemi's position. Last year, Felitsky served as the backup to Congemi for most of the season while Genilla started the nationally-televised Miami game.

Ironically, Gottfried faced the same situation last year, and Congemi came in to become the second leading all-time passer in Pitt history.

Passing isn't the only offense weapon at Pitt, however. Leading rusher Craig Heyward returns to the Panther arsenal, and if his efforts against one of the leading defenses in the nation, Miami, are any indication (254 rushing yards, Sports Illustrated Player of the Week), then Heyward may be headed for a banner season in 1987.

Heyward will rack up the yardage behind an outstanding line in the Eastern football mold. OG Mark Steposki was an honorable mention All-America in 1986, and has been touted as the next great to come from the offensive lineman factory at Pitt.

Defensively, Gottfried feels very good about his secondary. SS Billy Owens had 106 tackles last year and returned two interceptions for touchdowns. FS Teryl Austin was fifth in the nation in pickoffs with seven.

Gottfried's areas of concern, in addition to the quarterback situation, are speed at receiver, linebackers, defensive line and overall depth.

This year, the Panthers will play traditional rivals Notre Dame and Penn State at home.

Series Notes: In one of BYU's first trips ever to the Eastern United States, the Cougars beat Pittsburgh 20-14 in Pitt Stadium to open the 1984 season. It was the only time the two teams have met on the gridiron.

Pitt came into the game ranked third in the nation, but BYU grabbed early momentum by stopping the Panthers with a second quarter goal line stand. A Lee Johnson field goal gave the Cougars a 3-0 halftime lead.

Pitt roared back in the third quarter with two interceptions, one a 78-yard TD return to take the lead going into the fourth quarter 14-9.

The final period was all BYU as Robbie Bosco, making his first start, hit Adam Haysbert on a 50-yard scoring strike, to give the Cougars the lead, and the BYU defense held on to preserved the victory.

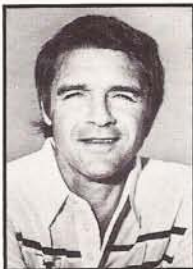
The Cougar win was one of the biggest season-opening wins in BYU football history and gave the team the confidence and momentum it needed to roll to a 13-0 finish and the national championship.

Outlook: Thin but talented, rejuvenated and excited...such is the picture of the 1987 Texas Longhorns, the first edition for new head coach David McWilliams.

McWilliams will rely on an offense laden with experience in the "skill" positions and a defense that is experienced but lacking in depth. And, unlike previous Texas teams, the Longhorns will come out throwin' the ball this year. They have theartil-

ery in quarterback Bret Stafford, who has set 12 Longhorn passing records. The senior threw for over 2,000 yards last year. In the backfield with him will be three-year letter winners Darron Norris, Eric Metcalf and Charles Hunter.

One question mark is the offensive line. Veteran guard Paul Jetton will anchor the line, along with Alan Champagne, Ed Cunningham and Charles Seafous.

Defensively, a lot of players with experience return. Linebacker Britt Hager leads that group. Starting tackles Steve Llewellyn and Ken Hackemack are solid players, but there is little depth behind them. In the secondary, John Hagy, Gerard Senegal, James Lott and Tony Griffin are scheduled to see most of the playing time. Punter Alexis Waits was one of the nation's best last year and returns for his sophomore season. Texas returns 44 lettermen, 13 of whom started the final game of last season.

Series Notes: This will be the first meeting between the Longhorns and the Cougars. Texas is one of three schools on BYU's 1987 schedule (Pitt and TCU are the others) to have won a National Championship in football. The Longhorns were consensus national champions in 1963 and 1969. They were UPI's national champion in 1970.

Texas is also one of four teams on the '87 schedule to feature a new head coach (New Mexico, Wyoming and Hawaii are the others).

BYU is 3-2 against teams from the Southwest Conference and 24-11-1 against teams from the state of Texas. BYU's last meeting with a Southwest Conference foe came in 1984 when the Cougars defeated Baylor 47-13.

Outlook: The Horned Frogs could be a surprise team in the always-tough Southwest Conference this year since Head Coach Jim Wacker will welcome back 28 players that have started four or more games at TCU. In addition, Wacker has a multiple-game starter back at every position, so the Frogs shouldn't be short on experience anywhere.

The bad news may be that the starters are coming back off of a 3-8 team which lost eight of its last nine contests and avoided the SWC cellar only by beating Houston 30-14.

Bright spots for Wacker and his staff will be in the offensive backfield where outstanding running back Tony Jeffery returns. Last year against Tulane, Jeffery rushed for 343 yards and set single-game NCAA marks for most yards rushing in a season-opener, most yards rushed for in a half (270) and highest average gain per carry (21.4).

Quarterback David Rascoe also returns, and should he falter, '85 starting QB Scott Ankrom will be ready. Ankrom is one of 24 Horned Frogs that were redshirted last year.

Defensively, LB Scott Harris and AE Tracy Simien will lead the TCU charge. Harris register 50 unassisted tackles to Simien's 42, and both assisted in over 40 others. DE Ron Lewis was the sack leader in '86 (2.5), and he will be back also.

The Frog kicking attack is excellent. Place kicker Lee Newman set school records for most FGs in a season (16), most points kicking (77) and best FG% (.842, 16-19). Newman was also a perfect 29-29 on PATs. Punter Chris Becker set school marks for highest punting average (46.1) and highest net average (40.8). He also had the SWC's longest punts off the season last year, a 77-yarder vs. Baylor and a 73-yarder vs. Texas Tech.

Series Notes: The Cougars and Horned Frogs have never met on the gridiron prior to this year. Against the tradition-rich Southwest Conference teams, BYU is 3-2, with wins over Baylor, SMU and Texas A&M and losses to Baylor and Texas Tech.

In games played against teams from Texas, the Cougars are 23-11 (SWC, Fort Hood, N. Texas State, UTEP and West Texas State). BYU has never played two teams from the SWC in the same season until this year.

The closest that BYU has come to playing in Fort Worth was a 1971 contest against N. Texas State in Dallas.

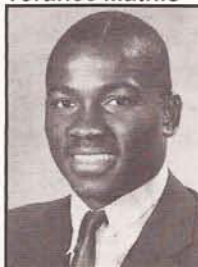

Outlook: In his first year at New Mexico, Head Coach Mike Sheppard will welcome back 15 players who started at one time or another last

year for the 4-8 Lobos. Added to that crop of returnees will be 18 junior college transfers who should be ready to step in and play right away.

Heading the list of Lobo veterans is Terance Mathis. A first-team all-WAC selection at wide receiver, Mathis set a new school record with 10 touchdown receptions. A main cog in last year's run-and-shoot offense, the WAC's leader in total yardage, Mathis is also the top returning rusher and passer.

In '87, most of the passing chores should be handled by one of four JC transfers who Sheppard has brought in to challenge for the quarterback position. Sheppard says that the pass will be the big weapon in the Lobo arsenal, so the winner of the quarterback battle will shoulder a heavy burden.

At running back, New Mexico loses one of the WAC's leading rushers, Kevin Burgess, but returns Shane Hall and Vaughn Simmons who both saw action last year.

On the offensive line, the Lobos look strong with three starters returning. Word is, however, that starting guard Brian McCabe will be switched to defensive tackle in '87.

Another switch sends former defensive tackle David Ziegler to tight end.

On defense, New Mexico brings back nine players who saw action as a starter in '86 to man the 3-4 set. Heading the list will be LB Art Martinez, DT Orlando Leavell, LB Phillip Vaughan, SS Don Carpenter and FS Marcel Weise.

Sheppard, who was at Long Beach State last year, has brought in Ed Lambert as offensive coordinator and Jack Stanton as defensive coordinator. Former BYU standout Danny Plater coaches the receivers.

Series Notes: This is the 37th meeting between the two teams, and BYU holds a large lead in the rivalry. The matchup, however, is one of the most storied, with great games and accompanying strange circumstances along the way.

In 1964, New Mexico ruined BYU's inaugural appearance in Cougar Stadium, winning 26-14.

A year later, BYU clinched its first-ever WAC championship with a win over the Lobos 42-8. Sadly, the win was marked by tragedy as a plane carrying 13 passengers (mostly Cougar fans) from Salt Lake to Albuquerque crashed at the Point-of-the-Mountain on the morning of the game.

In 1973, Jay Miller set an NCAA record that still stands with 22 receptions against New Mexico in a 56-21 Cougar romp during LaVell Edwards's second year as BYU's head coach.

In 1980, BYU lost its season opener in New Mexico's University Stadium 25-21 as Jim McMahon was frustrated by a fierce Lobo blitz. It was to be the Cougars' only loss of the season as they went on to a 12-1 finish and number 11 and 12 rankings in the national polls.

Last year's game was also a classic in the BYU-UNM mold. A Lobo missed extra point and a two late BYU touchdown drives resulted in a tense 31-30 victory for the Cougars.

Outlook: The Aggies, under second-year coach Chuck Shelton, hope to improve on last year's 3-8 mark with a vastly improved offense, a defense with promise and a kicking game with exciting potential.

The 1986 Aggies averaged just 192 yards per game, but three-fifths of the starting offensive line returns, as do both receivers, the starting tight end and running back. Defensively, the secondary could be one of the best in the PCAA. All four

starters return from last year. Key names on defense include 310-lb. hulkster Gary Hulse, safety Darrin Long, safety Pondre Davis, Tony Brown and Chad Troxclair. In the kicking department, Herick Mandel was the all-PCAA punter last year with a 42.9-yard average per punt. Dene Garner, an outstanding placekicker, will return to put points on the board via long distance.

The QB race mainly features JC transfers. Russ Widerburg, Brent Snyder and Eric Chaudron are the frontrunners for the position. Their development could be a key for the Aggie offense. Demetrius Brown returns after averaging

Series Notes: The Cougar-Aggie series dates back to 1922, when BYU officially began playing football. Utah State dominated early on, and the Aggies still hold a five-game lead in the series. The teams have been involved in some great games in recent years. In 1983, Steve Young scored a touchdown in the closing seconds to preserve a 38-34 BYU victory. The Aggies pulled a 20-17 upset in Logan in 1982. The 1980 game was responsible for several records that still stand. BYU won 70-46 in a regionally televised shootout. The Aggies have given the Cougars more trouble than any other team during LaVell Edwards' tenure. LaVell's alma mater has defeated his team five times since 1972. But the Aggies have failed to score a point the last two meetings with the Cougars. They lost 44-0 in 1985 and 52-0 in 1986.

Outlook: Last year, Wyoming was one of the most improved teams in the WAC going from 3-8 in 1985 to a competitive 6-6 in '86. Head Coach Dennis Erickson installed an offense called the "Air Express" and redshirted 35 players in his first season as the Cowboy mentor to prepare for what looked like a promising future.

Soon after the season ended, however, Erickson left town for Washington State, and as has been the case quite frequently in recent years, the Pokes were forced to look for a new head man.

The search didn't take long and didn't cover many miles this time though because Wyoming named athletic director Paul Roach to the head coaching position in January.

Roach, a mastermind behind the great Cowboy teams of the 60s, has never been a head coach at the college level, but he won't enter the Wyoming situation with an empty stable. A host of starters, and the 35 redshirts point to what could be one of the better seasons in years for the Pokes.

Three quarterbacks who have started at one time or another for Wyoming will be on the Cowboy roster this year, with the edge going to Craig Burnett. A junior college transfer, Burnett had one of the finest single seasons in Cowboy history last year despite playing in only four games. He already ranks 20th on the Wyoming career passing list.

Flanker Anthony Sargent, the WAC's Newcomer of the Year last year, is Wyo's big play man. Last year, Sargent caught eight TD passes and returned punts and kickoffs for the Pokes.

Galand Thaxton leads the eight starters who return for the Cowboy stop corps. An all-WAC selection in 1986, Thaxton leads a linebacking group which is being touted as one of the best in the West this year.

Series Notes: In BYU football's first year of existence, 1922, the Cougars played the Wyoming Cowboys twice winning 7-0 and losing 13-0. The two games marked a good beginning to what has become a topsy-turvy matchup.

In 56 contests, BYU owns a slim 28-26-2 lead in the series. The rivalry has been marked by eras of dominance.

In the early years of the BYU-Wyo game, BYU staked a lead in the series only to see the Cowboys roar back after World War II. The Pokes won all but three games in the 50s and 60s, and two of the others were ties. As Wyoming won WAC championships in '66, '67 and '68, the Cougars tried to figure a way to get back in the rivalry.

With the appointment of LaVell Edwards to head coach, the matchup swung the other way. Since LaVell took over in 1972, BYU has dominated 12-3 and posted the largest margin of victory in the series, 59-0 in 1985.

Still, it hasn't always been easy, even under the Edwards regime. In 1976, Wyoming beat the Cougars 34-29 to share the WAC title with BYU, and in one of the most memorable BYU-Wyo games, BYU had to come from behind late in the fourth quarter to beat the Cowboys 41-38 in 1984.

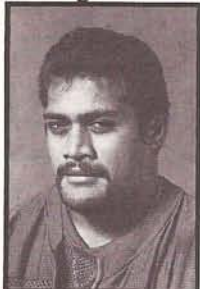

Outlook: Bob Wagner, Hawaii's first-year head coach, had his work cut out for him in 1987. He and his staff welcome back only 10 starters from last year's 7-5 outfit. In addition, the Rainbows are installing a new offense--the run and shoot. Known for the miles of yardage it racks up, the run and shoot is one of the most effective, and complicated, offenses in the game today.

With the graduation of Gregg Tipton, the Rainbows are looking for Warren Jones, an '86 redshirt, to trigger the run and shoot from the quarterback position. Jones will be pressed by Walter Briggs. Hawaii looks good at the running back and receiving positions, but with the run and shoot they may need more depth. The coaching staff is concerned with the offensive line. Amosa Amosa will move to center and second-team all-WAC tackle Mark Nua may move to guard to shore up holes left by graduation.

Defensively, the Rainbows are, "long on talent but short on experience." Hawaii returns two starters from one of the best defenses in the country last year. Last year, the Warriors' opponents averaged less than 300 yards per game on offense, and for much of the year Hawaii was near the top of the NCAA's total defense category. Perhaps the biggest reason behind Hawaii's defensive success in 1986, defensive tackle Al Noga returns for what promises to be a honor-filled campaign in 1987. Noga, a first-team All-America selection, is being billed for the Outland and Lombardi Trophies. ESPN commentator Pat McInally, who saw Noga against Michigan in the season finale, said, "(He's) the best defensive lineman I've seen all year."

Last year, Hawaii got off to a fast start, winning three of the first four games. This year, with Cal-Fullerton, Wisconsin, UTEP and Yale on tap for the first four contests, the Rainbows may again have some time to get rolling before the heavyweights come to town.

Series Notes: BYU and Hawaii have met 13 times with BYU holding a 9-4 edge in the series. Since the Islanders joined the conference in 1979, BYU has a perfect 7-0 record.

Hawaii victories in the series came in 1930, 1950, 1960 and 1974. Since 1978, the teams have played every year with the exception of 1985.

Despite BYU's offensive proficiency, the recent UH-BYU rivalry has produced many plays for defensive highlight films. In 1984, Cougar safety Kyle Morrell went over the top to stop Hawaii QB Raphael Cherry short of the goalline to preserve an 18-13 Cougar victory. The next year, BYU linebacker Kurt Gouveia put two hits on Rainbow wide receiver Walter Murray that Cougar fans still talk about.

Perhaps the best defensive gem of all, however, was saved for last year when the Cougars and Bows butted heads for 60 minutes and only 13 points were scored. In the second half, BYU's offense didn't complete a pass, but the defense rallied and held off the Rainbows at the goal line to end the game with a 10-3 Cougar win.

As usual, the contest will be played in Hawaii. The Rainbows aren't scheduled to visit Provo until 1990.

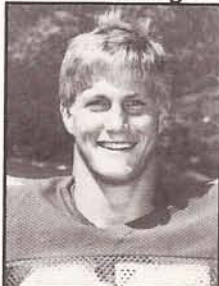

Outlook: Coach Fisher DeBerry labels 1987 as a rebuilding year at the Air Force Academy. The Falcons lose nine starters on offense, five starters on defense and one of the nation's top punters (Mark Simon).

DeBerry will field a young Falcon team and hopes that in 1987, Air Force will mature more as they go along than last year's 6-5 edition, the first Falcon team to stay home at bowl time in five years.

Leading the Air Force effort will be defensive tackle Chad Hennings. An all-WAC selection last year, Hennings is being touted by the people at Air Force as a pre-season All-America. Hennings stands second on the Falcon all-time list for career tackles for losses and needs just 16 more to become the Academy leader.

Nose tackle John Steed is a top returnee, and Air Force has the luxury of two outstanding place kickers, Chris Blassy and Mike Johnson. Johnson was one of the nation's leading kickers until an injury against Colorado State sidelined him and Blassy took over.

Offensively, DeBerry welcomes back his starting quarterback, James Tomallo, but even Tomallo's position is not secure. Dee Dowis, a sophomore who came off the bench against BYU, has, "the potential to become the finest wishbone quarterback that we've had at the Academy," says DeBerry.

Frank Martini, brother of BYU's Ralph Martini, is back at tight end and is an outstanding blocker. Albert Booker and Greg Johnson are running backs with game experience and great potential.

Series Notes: BYU leads the series 8-1 and has won the last four meetings. Air Force joined the WAC in 1981 and BYU has beaten the Falcons five out of six times since then.

The rivalry, however, is alive since Air Force has consistently been one of the WAC's better teams in the last few years. In both 1985 and 1986, bowl berths have been decided in the Cougar-Falcon matchup.

In 1985, Air Force brought a 10-0 record and No. 4 national ranking to Provo, only to be beaten by BYU 28-21.

Last year, the WAC championship had already been won by San Diego State when BYU and Air Force met on national television, but the two teams were still fighting for a bowl bid. BYU's defense stymied the Falcons, and a previously dormant Cougar offense found new life under QB Bob Jensen as BYU won 23-3 and went on to the Freedom Bowl.

The only Falcon win in the series came in 1982 at BYU in the inaugural game of BYU's expanded stadium.

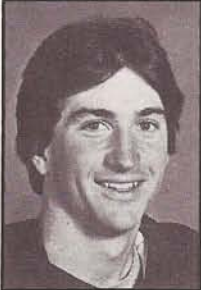

Outlook: Last year was a fairy-tale year for the Aztecs of San Diego State. In his first season at San Diego State, Head Coach Denny Stolz led his squad to SDSU's first-ever WAC championship and in the process, ended a 10-year BYU stranglehold on the title.

Along the way, the Aztecs posted their best record since 1979, made their first bowl appearance since 1969 and had the biggest attendance increase in the country. The question this year is will the good times continue to roll?

Stolz seems to think so, but others have some doubts. Several of SDSU's fifth-year seniors who played such an important role on last year's team are gone, and the Aztecs may be forced to scramble to find replacements. This is true especially on the potent Aztec offense where only three starters return.

One of those starters, however, is QB Todd Santos, and if Santos can have the kind of year which many expect of him, he alone may be able to make the newcomers look good. This year, Santos should pass BYU's Jim McMahon as the WAC's all-time passing leader, and with some luck, could break the NCAA yardage mark. He is being touted as a pre-season Heisman Trophy candidate.

Defensively, three starters return in the secondary and two of them, FS Harold Hicks and Mario Mitchell are being promoted as pre-season All-Americans. Mitchell was an honorable mention All-America last year and was selected to the second-team all-WAC team.

Stolz and his staff's recruiting efforts have been praised, and 16 junior college transfers will join the fold. SDSU will play PAC-10 opponents in three of its four non-conference games.

Series Notes: Last year's game promises to heat up what hasn't been much of a rivalry in the past. Before 1986, the Aztecs had won only two of 12 games, one in 1947, the other in 1970. The rest of the contests have been BYU blowouts, including a 63-14 Cougar victory in 1979 over one of the better SDSU teams.

Perhaps the most notable aspect of the series has been the outstanding quarterbacks who have played in the contests. Of the top 16 QBs yardage-wise in WAC history, 10 of them play or have played for BYU or San Diego State. In addition to Todd Santos, BYU has had to face Aztec QBs Matt Kofler and Mark McKay in WAC play.

The Aztecs joined the WAC in 1978, so BYU faced Aztec QB Brian Sipe in non-WAC play.

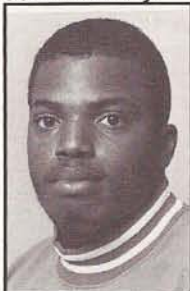

Outlook: Four wins does not a championship season make, but at UTEP it could mean the beginning of a turnaround. Last year, for the first time since 1974, the Miners were able to win four games in a

season, and they came close to winning at least three more. Head Coach Bob Stull, an expert at program building, might have the UTEP program headed in the right direction.

This year, Stull and his staff welcome back 15 starters, and adds to that group one of the best-ever recruiting classes at UTEP. The Miners have six home games in 1987, the most in a few seasons, and if fans show up at the Sun Bowl like they did last year, UTEP will have plenty of crowd support.

Offensively, UTEP is led by honorable mention all-America running back John Harvey leads the crop, and the Miners boast four players who caught 30 or more passes in 1986. A quarterback, however, must emerge from the list of five candidates. JC transfer Pat Hegarty, a passing wizard at Saddleback JC, could get the nod.

Defensively, the Miners return six starters, but Stull has shown knows that there are big holes to fill. LB Doug Morgan, DE Joe Terry and interception leaders DB Terry Walker and DB Richie Wright are the mainstays. Terry may be moved from his end position to help the weak linebacking corps.

The kicking game is solid with punter Arnie Adkison and two place kickers, Hugo Castellanos and Chris Jacke, returning. Look for Jacke to redshirt leaving Castellanos, the fifth-year senior, to handle all of the place kicking in 1987. Last year Castellanos hit 6-9 FGs and 17-18 PATs

Things are definitely looking up in Minerland, and now that the Miners have shown that they can be competitive, it remains to be seen if they find another good quarterback, get some consistency and take more steps toward being a contender.

Series Notes: The BYU-UTEP series started in 1946, the two teams met again in 1948 and 1949 and then the rivalry was discontinued until 1964. BYU holds an 18-6-1 advantage in the matchup.

Miner victories came in 1948, 1949, 1967, 1968, 1970 and 1985. The two teams tied in 1964.

The 1985 UTEP win has gone down as one of the greatest upsets in college football history and proves the old adage that on any given day, one team can beat another. BYU was the defending national champion, had a 6-1 record and a 25-game WAC winning streak going into El Paso. The Miners had a streak of their own, seven consecutive losses, and had been embarrassed the week before by Kent State 51-24.

The Cougars came up empty on two first-and-goal situations, the BYU passing attack was error-prone, and UTEP returned an interception 100 yards for a TD as the Miners won 23-16.

Though the '85 contest was one of the blackest days in Cougar football history, BYU has had some light days against the Miners too. Four times against UTEP, BYU has racked up over 60 points in a game, and the all-time BYU high output of 83 points came against the Miners in 1980. The 83 points is also the most ever given up by a UTEP team.

Outlook: After a disappointing 2-9 season last year, the Utes have high hopes of rebounding in 1987. Those hopes are somewhat tempered, however, because of the departure of players like quarterback Larry Egger, wide receiver Loren Richey and U-back Craig McEwen. Several new faces will dot

the lineup, and those players will have to produce to get the Utes back into contention for the WAC title. The biggest question mark is at quarterback, where Egger was a standout for the past two seasons. Battling for the vacated position are Chris Mendonca, who played sparingly last season, and freshman redshirt Scott Mitchell, who had All-America billing out of high school.

Eddie Johnson, a running back, is one of the premier rushers in the WAC and in the country. He rushed for 1,046 yards and was named first team All-WAC. Joining Johnson in the backfield will be returning fullback Bryan Bero. The offensive line will be young and inexperienced and could be a key to the Utes' success.

Defensively, the Utes have had troubles in recent years. This season, they are switching to a 4-3 defense. Returning linemen Bob Jenkins and Tika Manu will give Utah some valuable experience. Perhaps the most solid area for the Utes is the secondary, where three of four starters return, along with several other players who started part time in 1986. The kicking chores will be handled by Scott Lieber, who was 4-9 in field goals after Andre Guardi was injured last season.

The Utes will have a tough conference schedule in 1987. They must play San Diego State, Air Force, Hawaii, Colorado State and Brigham Young on the road. Their non-conference games are against Wisconsin, Idaho State, Boise State and Utah State.

Series Notes: What was one of the most lopsided series in college football 20 years ago has started to even out. The Utes still command a whopping 39-19-4 lead, but the Cougars have won eight in a row and 14 of the 15 games played between the schools since LaVell Edwards has been BYU's head coach. The Cougars usually declared a "moral" victory if they stayed within a touchdown or two of the Utes in the early part of the rivalry. In 1938 BYU managed a tie, and they pulled off their first win in 1942. Utah built up a 38-5-4 lead in the series until 1972, at which time Coach Edwards started to swing the pendulum the other way. Last year, BYU jumped to a large lead and let the Utes climb back into the game in the last quarter.

Outlook: A 6-5 season usually isn't cause for rejoicing, but Colorado State fans cheered plenty over last year's successes. Among other things, the Rams defeated in-state rival Colorado, defeated BYU and came within a single point of defeating WAC champion San Diego State.

While some think the Ram football program may have turned the corner, Coach Leon Fuller may be more cautious with his enthusiasm, especially when viewing the losses from that 6-5 team. Gone is Steve Bartalo, the WAC's all-time leading rusher and the workhorse for the Rams for the last four seasons. Also departed is All-WAC QB Kelly Stouffer. Those two were main cogs in the Ram offense. In all, 17 starters graduated, leaving several big holes to fill.

Leading the Rams this season will be offensive tackle Doug Fiala and second team All-WAC safety Ron Cortell. Strengths appear to be at the wide outs, the offensive line and the linebackers. Three of the top receivers, Todd Tyrell, J.D. Brookhart and Sanjay Beach, return to provide ample depth at wide receiver. However, the problem may be finding a QB who can get them the ball. Stouffer threw all but six passes for the Rams last season. The heir apparent for the job, Tim Pedersen, threw only two passes last season, and both were intercepted. He'll be pushed for the job by a couple of freshmen and junior college transfers. Another inexperienced area is running back. Bartalo was Mr. Everything for the Rams last year. Scott Whitehouse was the number three rusher on the squad last season with only five carries.

Defensively, the Rams have experience at the ends with seniors Clint Hjelm and Doug Wills. Also, linebackers Don Sowell and Gary Thompson have plenty of experience. The secondary, led by Cortell, appears to be solid.

Series Notes: Few matchups in college football have been as even as the BYU-CSU series. With the Rams' 24-20 come-from-behind victory over BYU last year, the series became deadlocked at 23-23-3. Actually, the Cougars have dominated in recent years. In LaVell Edwards' 15 seasons as head coach, the Cougars own an 11-3-1 record against the Rams. Last season's BYU loss to CSU was the first in a decade. The teams have met 18 times since CSU joined the WAC in 1967. BYU owns a 13-4-1 lead during that time. The series dates back to 1922, when BYU first began keeping records of its intercollegiate football program.

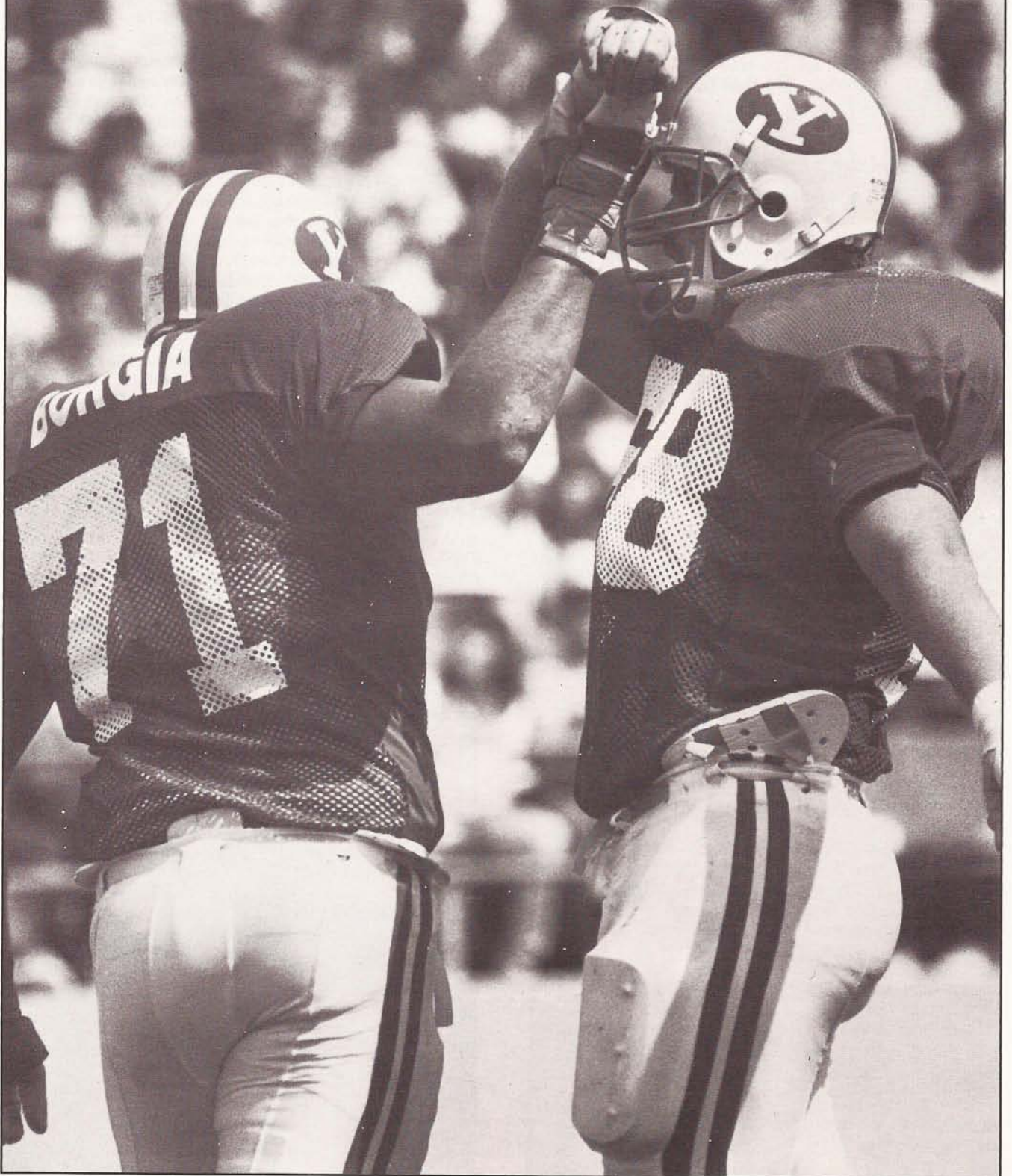

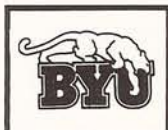

Game-by-Game Summary

Two consecutive interceptions on BYU's initial drives got Steve Lindsley off to a shaky debut, and the Cougars had another first quarter miscue when Bruce Hansen was stripped of the ball on an interception-fumble. But Lindsley, who often operated out of the shotgun, finished the day better than any of the more heralded QBs in their first BYU starts. Kicker Leonard Chitty broke the ice in the second quarter with a 49-yard field goal, and with 12 seconds left in the half BYU scored again on a drive where Lindsley was seven for seven in passing. In less than the first two minutes of the second half, BYU scored quickly thanks to a tightrope 36-yard interception returned for a touchdown by Rodney Thomas and a Bruce Hansen pass reception and rush in a three-play series for a TD. Running back Robert Parker scored two TDs. Defensive linemen Shawn Knight and Dave Futrell led an assault which smothered the Aggies. Three QB's each drove BYU to score. Starting safety Corey Rasmussen was injured. BYU moved up from a 16th tie in UPI to a ninth-place tie and from 18th in AP's pre-season poll to 11th. BYU now 1-0.

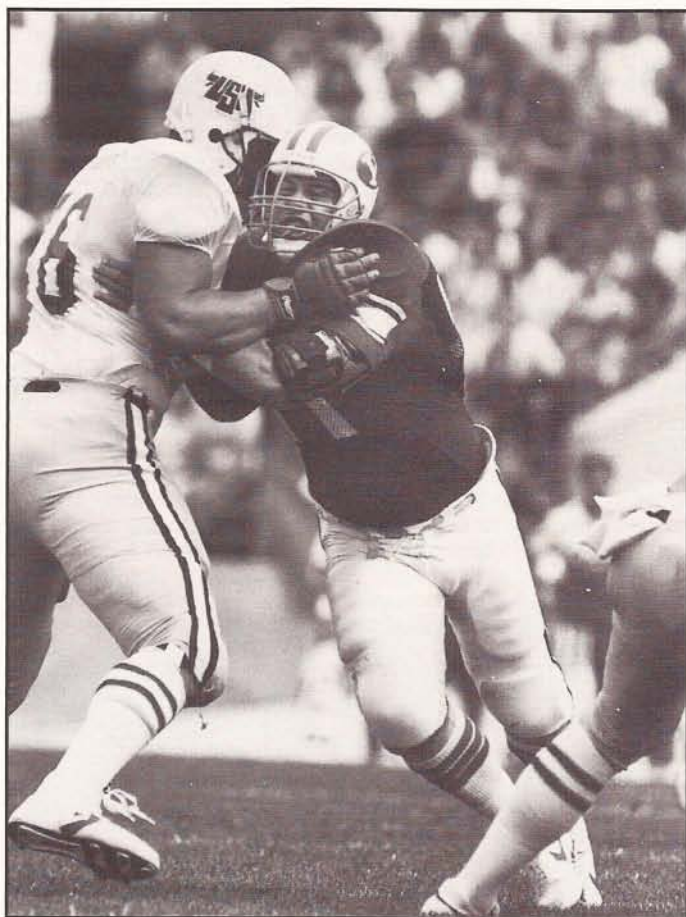

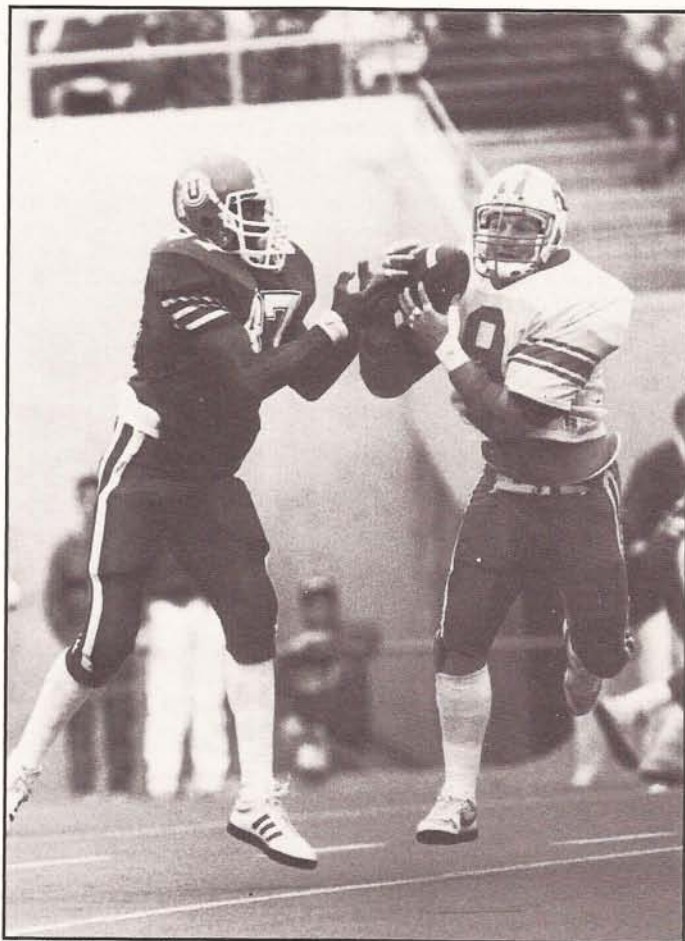

But two fumbles, a pass interception and two blocked punts kept the Cougars in a hole most of the afternoon. However, 454 yards rushing enabled BYU to secure an eighth straight victory over Utah. For the first time in modern history BYU had three rushers net over 100 yards; Lakei Heimuli had 171, Bruce Hansen 149 and Robert Parker 121. Heimuli and Parker scored a pair of TDs, while Hansen scored BYU's fifth. The Cougars dominated the lines of scrimmage and possession time. Take away four big plays by Utah, three of which were TD bombs late in the game, and the Utes figures would be less impressive. BYU now 7-3 overall and 5-1 in WAC play.

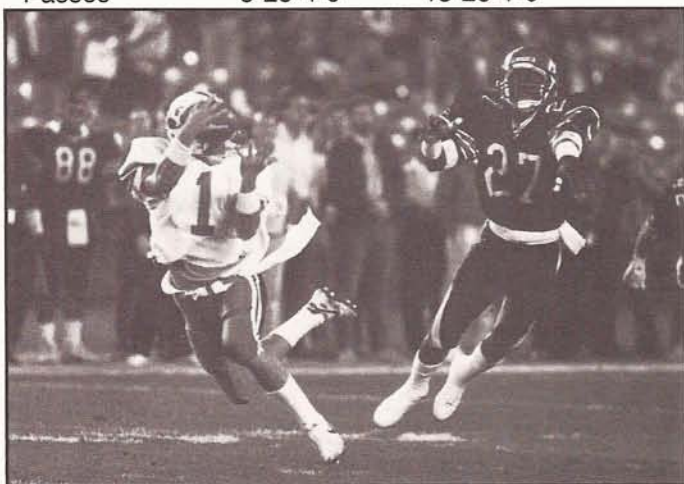

ESPN televised this defensive struggle and led off its show by announcing BYU's Jason Buck had won the Outland Trophy. Buck and the BYU defense had a spectacular game, holding SDSU to 60 yards rushing and eight sacks, three of which were by Buck. But the Aztecs' defense was equally impressive with eight sacks and limited BYU's offense to its lowest yardage in 10 years. Quarterback Bob Jensen replaced Steve Lindsley in an unsuccessful attempt to spark BYU's offense. Both teams volleyed back and forth with little advantage because of near-perfect punting games. A critical play came in the second quarter when SDSU completed a 43-yard bomb to set up its touchdown. SDSU secured the WAC crown, snapping BYU's 10-year lock on the title. BYU now 7-4 overall and 5-2 in the WAC.

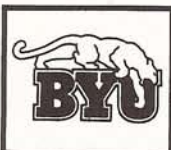
BYU's offense, which had faded during the last half of the season, returned in a big way for the nationally televised game with Air Force. The winner was assured a Freedom Bowl invitation, while the loser got to hibernate for the winter. Bob Jensen started in place of Steve Lindsley at quarterback to provide the offensive spark. Jensen completed 11 of 20 passes for 258 yards and a touchdown, and he was BYU's second-leading rusher with 87 yards. The return to the lineup of center Brian Rodoni after a nine-game absence also gave the team an emotional lift. Defensively, BYU held the Falcons to only 106 yards rushing and 53 yards passing. Linebacker Richard Hobbs was the defensive leader for the Cougars with six unassisted tackles and a sack. With 55 yards rushing in the game, Lakei Heimuli broke the school career rushing record of 2,663 yards, held previously by Jeff Blanc. Leonard Chitty's field goals of 43, 39 and 31 yards gave him 16 for the year, breaking the season record of 16, held by Dave Taylor in 1976. The big difference in the game came in the second quarter when the Air Force quarterback made a bad pitch, which BYU recovered on the Air Force 16 yard line. Four plays later, Heimuli scored on a one-yard run up the middle. On the ensuing kickoff, Tom Rotello fumbled, and BYU's Scott Peterson recovered at the 30 yard line. Four plays later, Jensen hit Heimuli with an 18-yard scoring pass. BYU places second in the WAC, while Air Force ends up third. The Cougars head to Anaheim to face UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

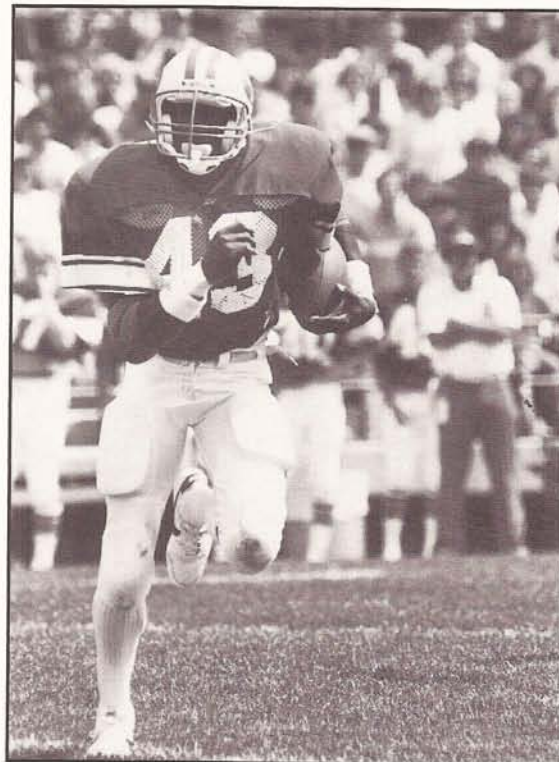

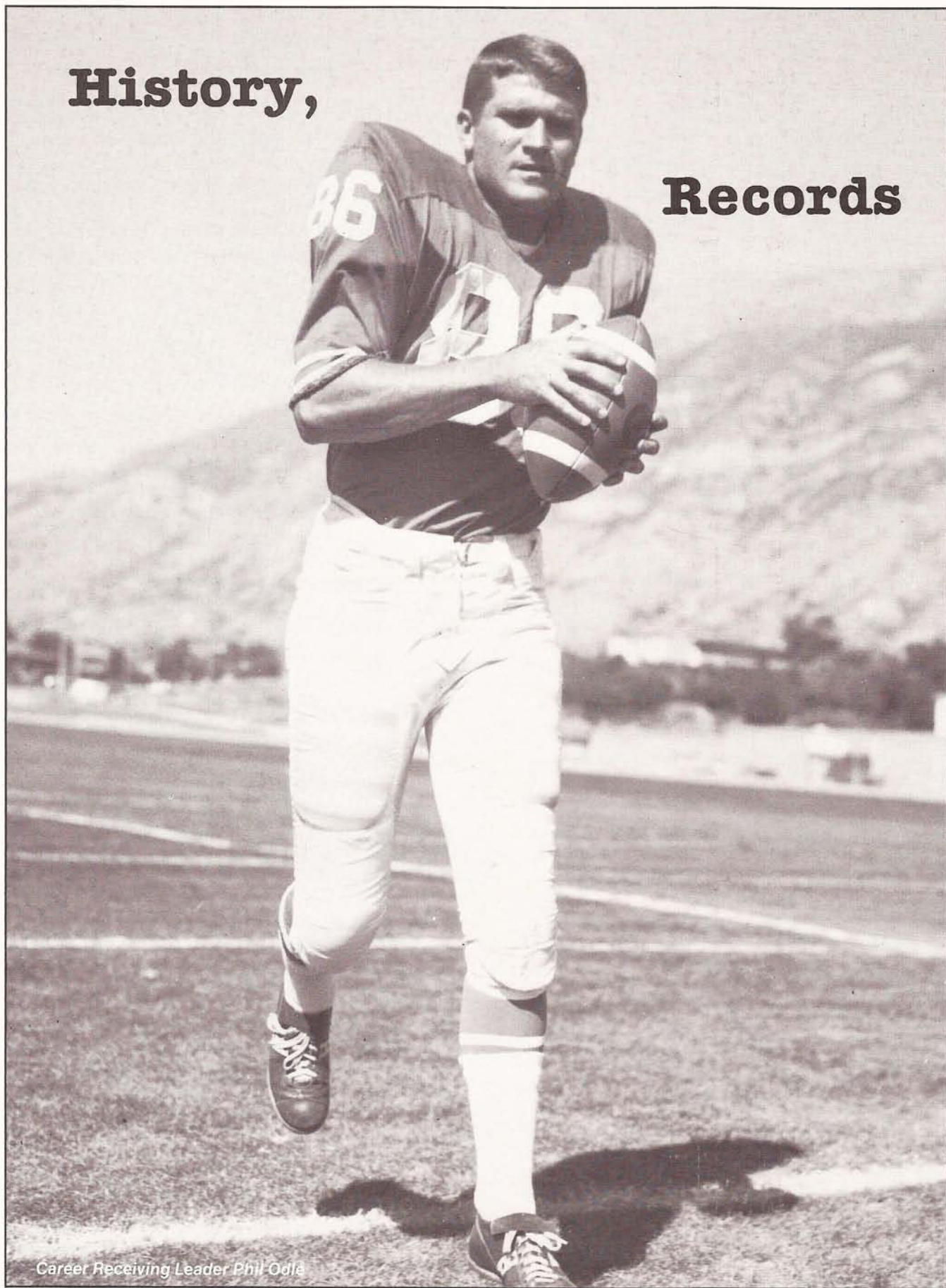

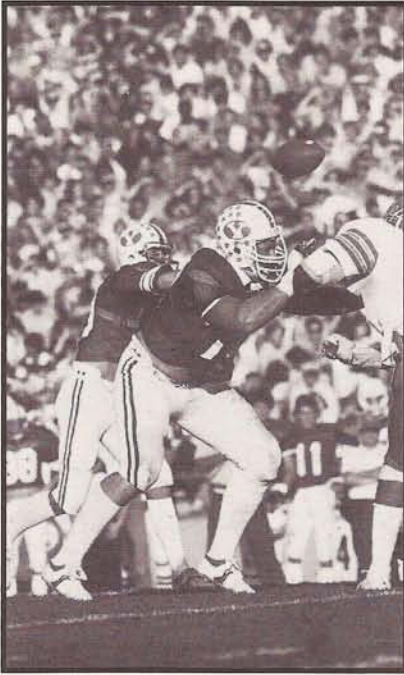

Historical View

Until the last few years, there were always those who claimed BYU could never become a legitimate national power in football. They cited drawbacks such as geographic location, lack of television exposure, weak schedules, lack of media coverage, etc.

Indeed, being recognized as one of the country's top programs--not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of

the realm of possibility for the Provo, Utah, school. After all, it was little more than 20 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 137 games and been to 11 bowl games. Eleven times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85. And the Cougars won their first National Championship in 1984.

Things weren't always so rosy in BYU's program, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally one of the nation's leaders in scoring and offense.

Football was introduced at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 62 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Robbie Bosco** (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young and Bosco were named All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished

second. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. **Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie** (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. **"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg** (1970-71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America. Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive years. And fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. **Lakei Heimuli** (1983-86) is the school's career rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973-75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972-75), **Tom Bell** (1974-79), **Nick Eyre** (1977-80), **Bart Oates** (1977-82) and **Trevor Matich** (1979-84) are just a few standouts.

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978-80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979-83) **David Mills** (1980-84) and **Trevor Molini** (1985-86).

Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972-74), **Paul Linford** (1972-74), **Mekeli Ieremia** (1975-77), **Glen Titensor** (1978-80), **Glen Redd** (1976-80), **Kyle Whittingham** (1979-81), **Todd Shell** (1980-83), **Kyle Morrell** (1980-84) and **Jason Buck** (1985-86). Buck, the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy, is only the third player in the Western United States to win the award.

At various times in the last 15 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. **Vai Sihakema** (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns and later earned all-pro status with the St. Louis Cardinals.

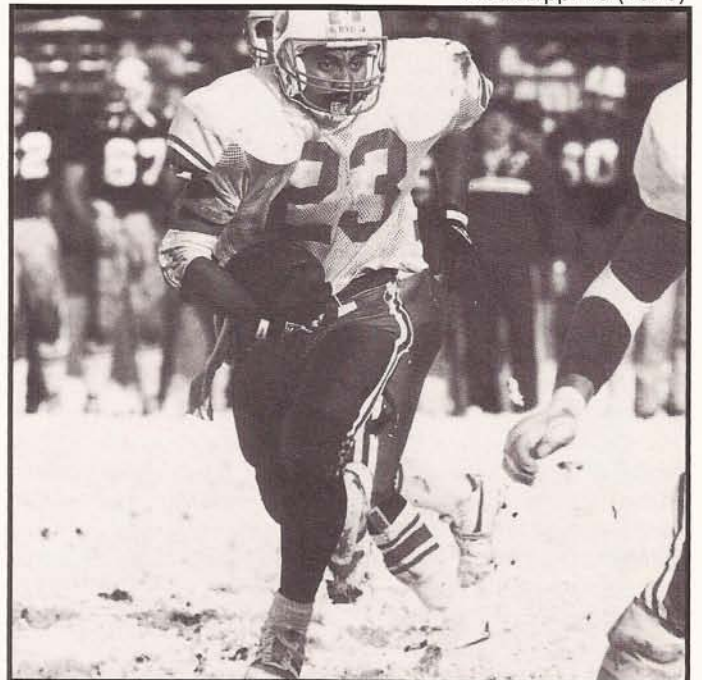

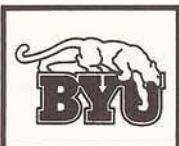

Freedom Bowl III

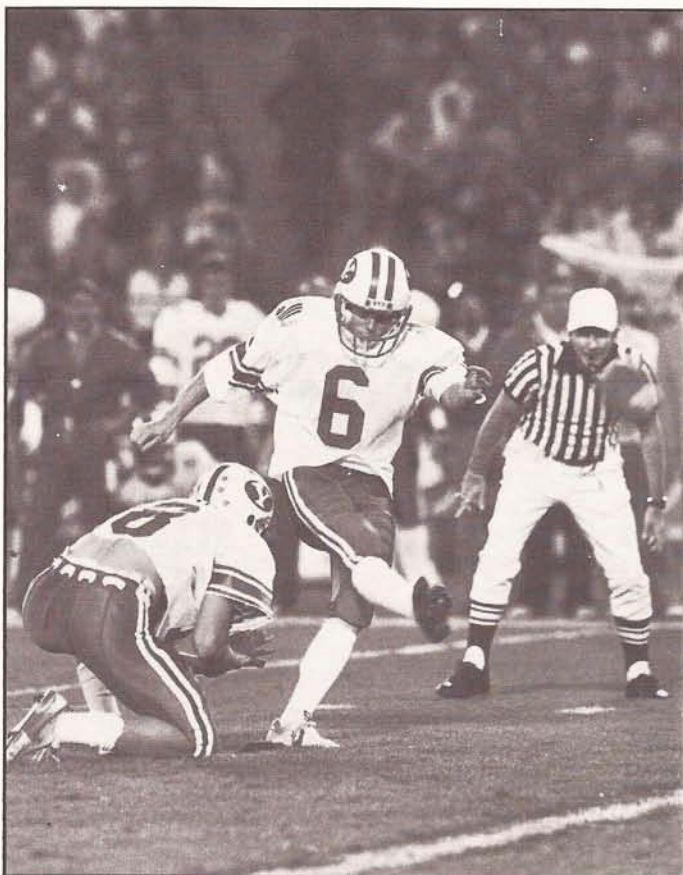
Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl in Anaheim. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.



Leonard Chitty's field goal in the first quarter accounted for all of BYU's first-half points. He also added an extra point after BYU's only touchdown.

The second quarter was scoreless, and UCLA took its 7-3 lead to the locker room as the halftime festivities began.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period to conclude the scoring in the third quarter. At that point, UCLA led 24-3 and Green was well on his way to a new record for rushing yards in a major-college bowl game (266 yards on 33 carries).

The fourth quarter was somewhat anticlimactic, but both teams managed to score a touchdown each. After a Bruin interception deep in BYU territory, Green faked a sweep, pulled up and hit Dorrell on a 13-yard scoring pass. BYU countered with a long scoring drive highlighted by two Mike Young to Chuck Cutler passes, and when Leonard Chitty tacked on the extra point after a 3-yard Bruce Hansen touchdown run with little over a minute remaining, the scoring in Freedom Bowl III was complete.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort. On the evening, Jensen completed 18 passes in 31 attempts for 124 yards with three interceptions, and Young was on target seven times in 12 attempts for 97 yards.

Florida Citrus Bowl, 1985

In what promised to be a offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

The circumstances seemed ripe for another bowl game miracle for the Cougars, but it was not to be.

Bosco was able to lead BYU on two late drives but both were stopped by Buckeye interceptions.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story.

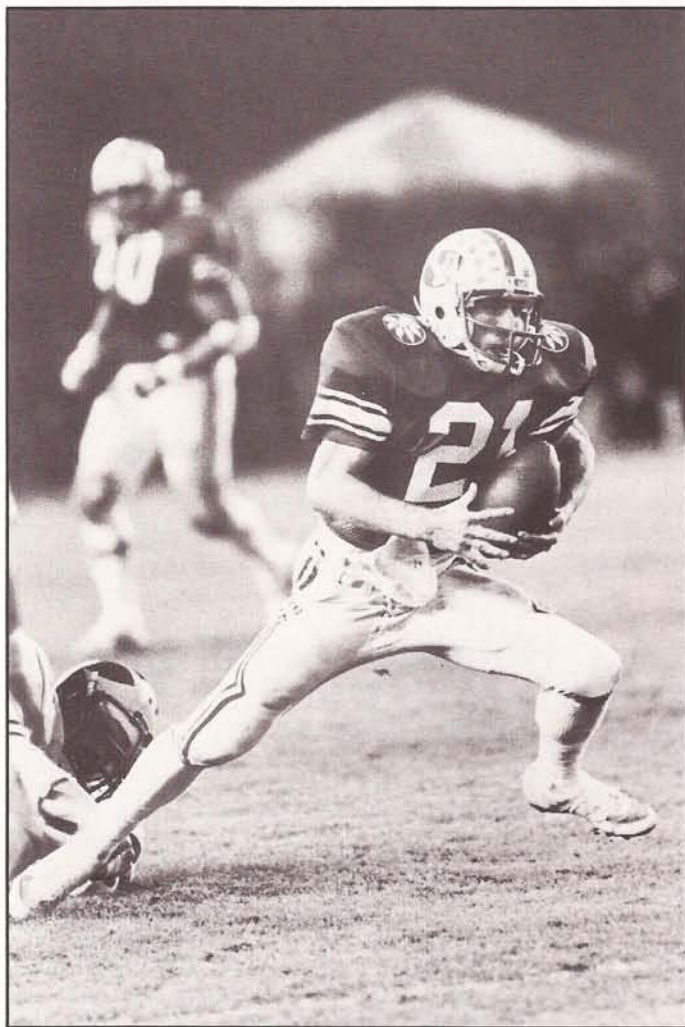
Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Big-10 Buckeyes went home the victor.

Holiday Bowl VII, 1984

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. For the game, BYU passed for 371 yards and rushed for another 112. The Cougar defense, meanwhile, held Michigan to 120 yards rushing and 80 yards passing. Attendance: 61,243.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young. For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game. The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted Missouri's desperation pass. Young finished the game 24 of 36 passing

for 314 yards and three interceptions. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries. Attendance: 51,480.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17, in a game that took the fun out of the usually raucous affair in San Diego. The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap...an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as Buckeye runners rolled up 329 yards en route to their seventh consecutive win. Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7. As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing of 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection, in the final stanza. The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge. But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life. In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down. Tight

end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

One pundit said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, the score was 45-25, SMU. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three second left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark. Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season. The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line. Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score

40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the core at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. 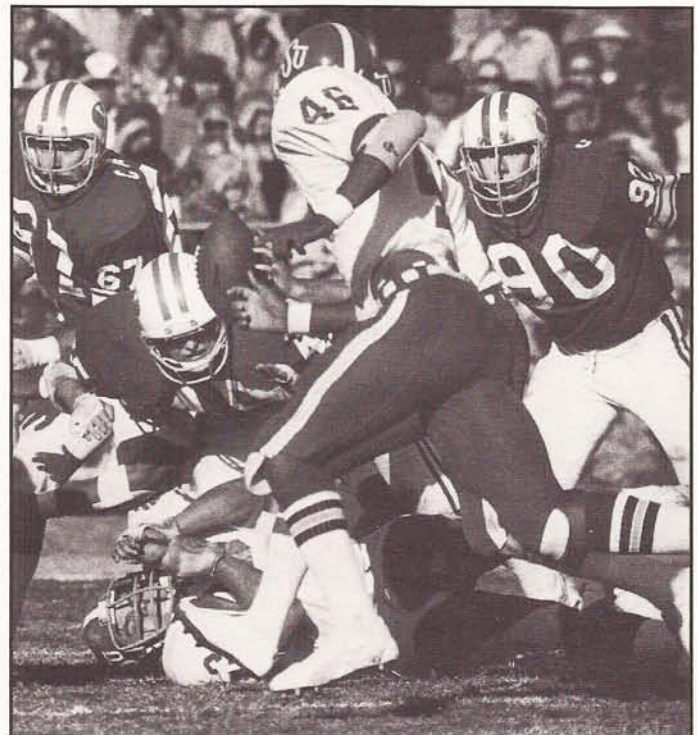

He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

KBYU TV

The tradition continues...KBYU and Cougar football. Again this year, KBYU Television will provide delayed broadcasts of all home and selected road football games. With Jay Mosen doing the play-by-play, the Channel 11 broadcasts offer the insightful analysis that viewers have come to expect.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the Western U.S. At Cougar games, KBYU regularly provides feed for visiting television stations and networks, special satellite broadcasts and Bonneville International Corporation's sports broadcasts in South America.

The KBYU remote production system includes five Ikegami HL 79E cameras; a 2 ME, 16 input Grass Valley 1680 switcher; dual channel Chyron 4100 graphics system; shotgun sideline microphones; and other equipment all operated from KBYU's 48-foot-long aluminum body remote production trailer. Using this system, KBYU is accustomed to providing tailor-made television for as many as six different clients at one time.

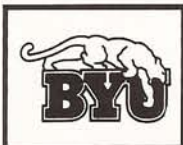

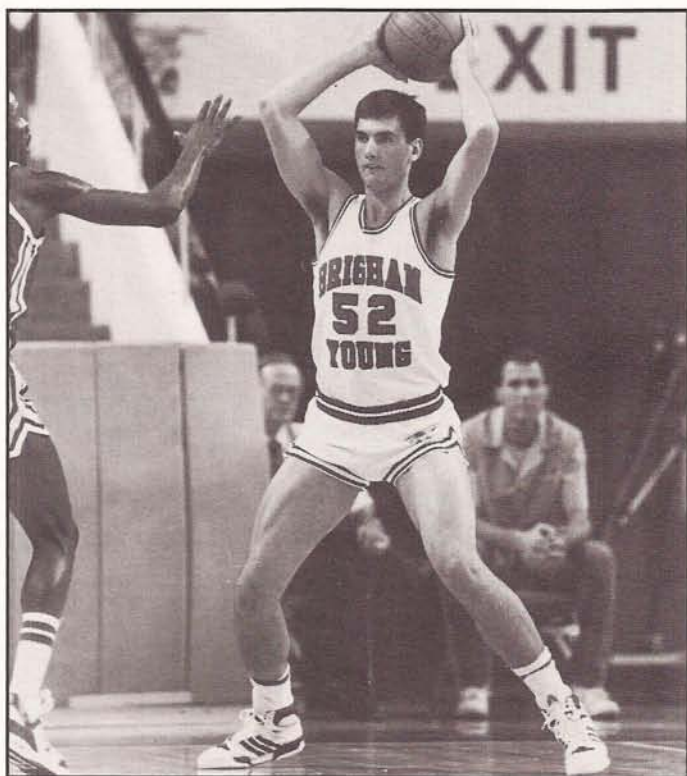

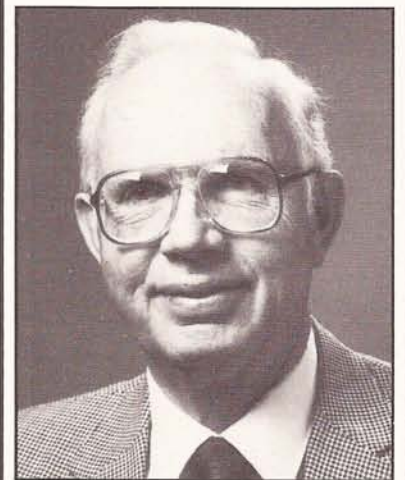

Stadium Location, Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking for the media will also be issued on request.

Press Box
