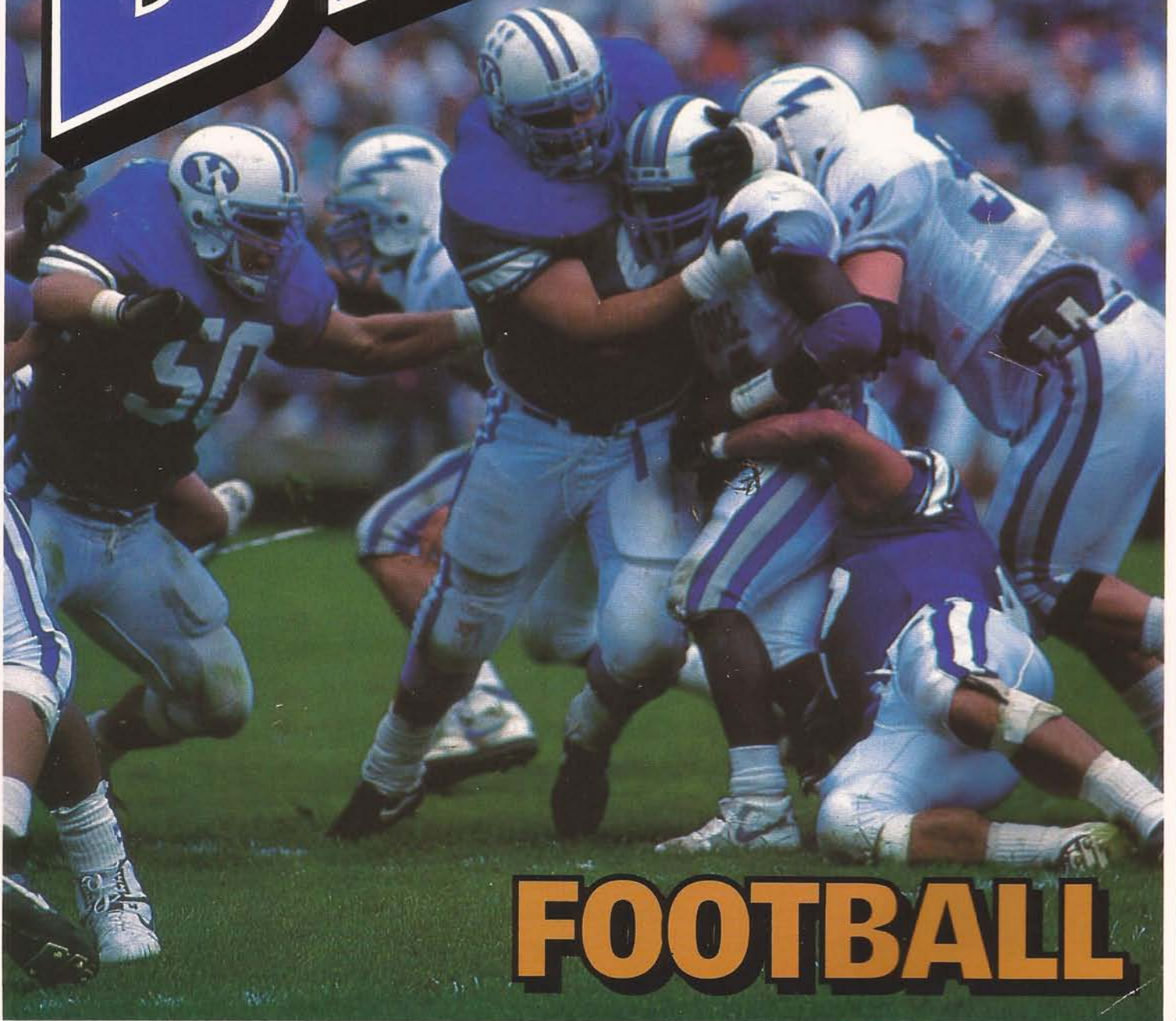
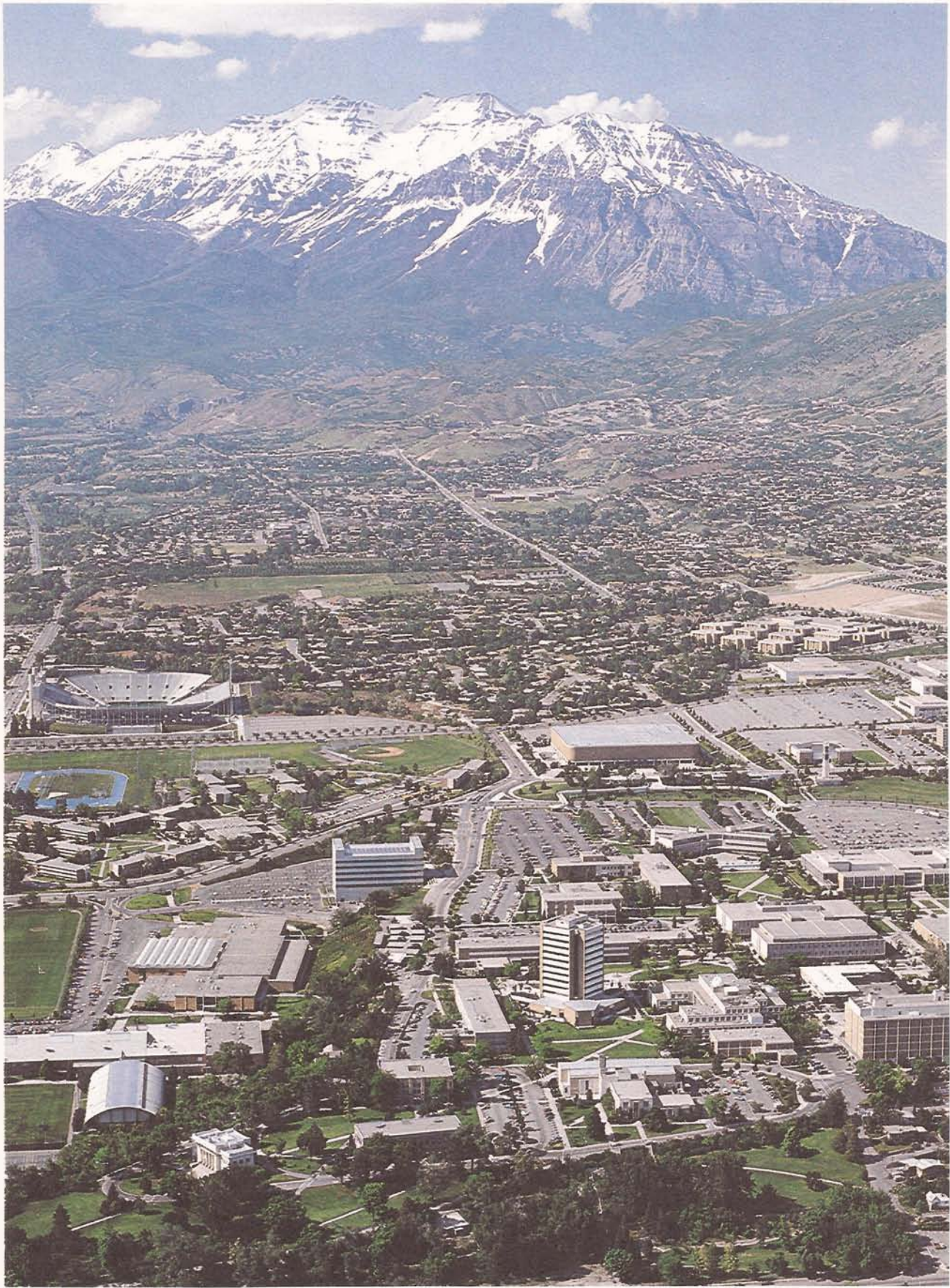

1992 Outlook

LaVell Edwards begins his 31st year at BYU and his 21st as head coach with enough holes to fill that he says, "This will probably be the first year in a long time we aren't favored to win the conference."

Edwards says he would rather have last year's mind-boggling September schedule (Florida State, UCLA, Penn State and Air Force) than this year's start, which has the Cougars playing two Western Athletic Conference games in six days. There are three league contests the first month--two of them on the road.

UCLA, Penn State and traditional rival Utah State remain on the schedule and Notre Dame replaces Florida State. The addition of Fresno State to the WAC means BYU won't be playing Colorado State.

Instead, the Cougars face the nation's leader in total offense, Fresno State. Coach Jim Sweeney is seventh in victories among active coaches.

BYU has won three straight WAC titles and 13 of the last 16. The Cougars tied Big Ten runnerup Iowa at the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl, their 14th straight post-season appearance and 16th in Coach Edwards' 20 seasons.

The Cougars are unbeaten in the last 10 games and Coach Edwards has won more games (97) in the last 10 years than anyone except Nebraska's Tom Osborne (102).

BYU's staff enters the 1992 season happy about spring progress and excited about the prospects despite having to function without the most prolific passer in college history.

Ty Detmer, the 1990 Heisman Trophy winner, set 59 NCAA records and tied three others in becoming the first player to surpass 12,000 yards passing. He finished his incredible career with 15,031 yards passing, two Davey O'Brien Awards, a huddle full of first-team All-America honors and broke the career passing efficiency rating by nearly six points (162.7-156.9).

While mild-mannered Detmer roared to life on the field and was the heart and soul of the team, Coach Edwards also lost the top rusher and second leading receiver, Peter Tuipulotu.

"Peter provided a lot of leadership off the field, especially for the younger players," the coach says. "Everyone in the program looked up to him."

The Cougars also lost three offensive linemen, three linebackers, three defensive backs and a three-position player in Earl Kauffman, who kicked off for four years, punted for three seasons and did the place kicking for two years.

Here's a closer look at the Cougars:

Offense

Backfield

Five sophomores battled for Detmer's place in the spring. The frontrunners were last year's backup, John Walsh, and Texas transfer Steve Clements. Walsh has a strong arm and knows the system better. Clements, a lefthander who broke Detmer's high school records, scrambles well to buy time to find receivers.

They will resume their battle in the fall with Ryan Hancock, Brock Spencer, Tom Young and incoming blue chipper Paul Shoemaker. The Cougars are dropping the junior varsity program, which traditionally has been used to alternate young quarterbacks.

"I wish there was a way we could manufacture experience," explains Coach Edwards. "Walsh threw only 16 passes. Clements red-shirted and then sat out. Hancock and Spencer had a little JV time and then redshirted. Young went on a two-year mission and then redshirted.

The running game should be as good as it's ever been. Halfback Jamal Willis, who played a lot as a freshman, might be the school's most electrifying runner ever.

At fullback, BYU brings in the junior college player of the year in Kalin Hall from Dixie College. He'll be vying with Hema Heimuli for the starting role. Heimuli was highly recruited before serving a church mission and then tore an Achilles' tendon last fall. But he put on pads for the final two weeks of spring practice and looked very good.

The top six could include Steve Christensen at halfback and frosh T.D. Biegel at fullback. Biegel redshirted before going on a church mission.

Receivers

The wide receiver group returns intact for the first time in many years. Eric Drage led the team with 1,018 yards and 10 touchdowns and should be a big-play man again. Micah Matsuzaki had nearly 1,000 yards in his sophomore and junior seasons.

Nati Valdez, who holds the national prep record for touchdown passes, is back for his senior season after missing much of last year with injuries.

Bryce Doman, who started as a freshman and then broke his collar bone against Penn State last year, was granted a medical hardship. Tyler Anderson, who stepped in after Doman's injury, is a sprinter on the track team. Otis Sterling was the receiving star of the spring scrimmages.

At tight end, Byron Rex had a strong second half of the season to earn All-WAC honors. He finished with 547 yards. Backup Itula Mili went on a church mission so the Cougars will look at redshirt freshmen Terence Saluone and Todd Jorgensen, who both are coming off injuries.

Offensive Line

The offensive line, the key to the passing game, probably will spend a lot more time run blocking this year than in the past. Center Garry Pay is the only player back who started every game but a number of reserves played a lot.

There's a lot of talent and good foot speed although the second unit is mostly freshmen. The tackles--6-8, 320 Scott Brumfield and 6-6, 310 Eli Herring-- are huge. Brumfield, a JC All-American has been hampered by wrist and ankle injuries but had a good spring. Herring started seven games as well as the bowl game.

One guard, 6-6, 280 Mike Empey, started three games at tackle last year and the newcomer, 6-5, 260 Evan Pilgrim established himself in spring drills. Redshirt Tim Hanshaw could see action at both guard and tackle.

Bryan May, Tom Ladd and Garrett Tujague are the losses along with 370-pound crowd favorite Mike Jenkins, who also lined up as a fullback in some goal-line situations.

Defense

Defensive Line

Two freshmen and a sophomore started a year ago and their experience should make them an even better unit for 1992. Tackle Randy Brock was a first-teamer on *The Football News*

All-Freshman Team. The other frosh tackle, Greg Pitts, should be a good one with seniors Brad Hunter and Doug Stone also getting time.

Lenny Gomes returns at nose guard, where Scott Sralla also saw a lot of playing time as a freshman.

Linebackers

Three-year starter Rocky Biegel and two-year standouts Scott Giles and Jared Leavitt are gone but there's still a lot of optimism.

Inside backer Shad Hansen set a school record (325) for defensive points after being in on 193 tackles. Behind him is Ted Dawson, who played on special teams the two years prior to his mission.

Nathan Hall, a transfer from Ricks College, is battling letterman Mike Hoggan on one side while lettermen Todd Herget and Bill Bryant look good on the other side. Bryant got hurt in the spring so Herget got the nod with the first team and was the top player in scrimmages.

Kevin Nicoll, who played a lot as an outside backer last season, will line up more as a defensive end in the Cougars' revised 3-4 scheme. Travis Hall, a redshirt sophomore, and Ricks transfer Brian Hughes are other prospects.

Defensive Backs

The secondary is a question mark simply because junior college corners, Vic Tarleton and Franz Cowart, weren't available for spring drills. Without them the only definite starter is Patrick Mitchell, who was pressed into service late in his frosh year. Behind him are Jeff Lindstrom and Ron Simpson--products of the JV program. Courtney Overstreet, who redshirted last year, is another possibility but did not play in the spring.

Derwin Gray, with nine interceptions in the past two years, makes his third start at weakside safety. He was third in defensive points as a sophomore and fourth as a junior. Behind him are returned missionary Jon Pollock and former quarterback Garth Fennegan.

Gone are three-year starters Tony Crutchfield at one corner and Josh Arnold, the MVP of the Holiday Bowl, at strong safety. The Cougars are counting on Cowart or Tarleton for the cornerback slot and former running back Brad Clark at safety. Clark also returned punts and kickoffs last season.

Transfer Casey Mazzotta also is available at safety along with redshirt Frank Christianson and former linebacker Brent McCollum.

Kicking Game

Letterman Joe Herrick, Ricks transfer Truman Child and Brad Hunter competed for punting duties in the spring. Dale Mayfield did much of the placekicking in the spring and David Lauder, who comes in this fall from Ricks, could be a factor.

Besides Clark, there are Micah Matsuzaki and Kapi Sihakema available to return punts. Eric Mortensen, who had the most kickoff returns, is gone but Clark and Jamal Willis were right behind in number of returns. Bruce Jenne will be doing the deep snapping for the third year and Eric Drage probably will take over for Joe Evans as the holder.

LaVell Edwards, Head Coach

When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 183 games, 14 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976–85) and played in 16 bowl games (including a current streak of 14 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. In 1979, he won the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Award.

Six times in his 20 years as head coach, the 61-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year. The post-season games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (three times), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

In 1988, LaVell completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a husband, father, grandfather, church leader, author, teacher and doctor of education.

LaVell's winning percentage (.744) ranks third among the nation's active college coaches. Under Edwards, BYU averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

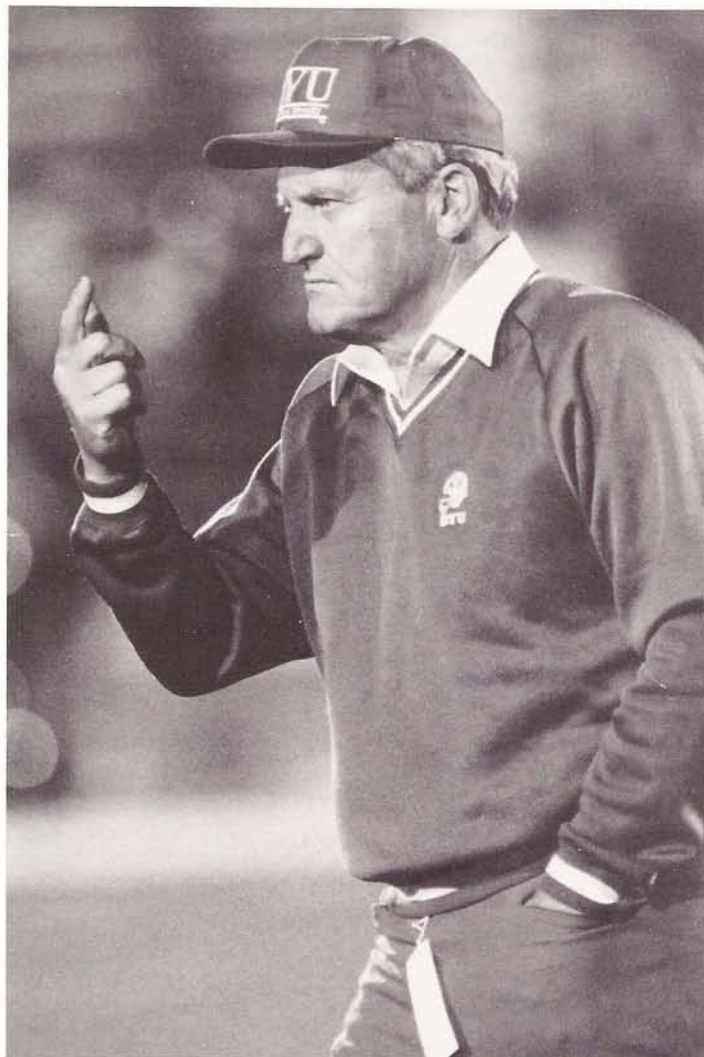
From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954–61 before joining the BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach, succeeding Tommy Hudspeth.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times, in total offense five times and in scoring.

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of

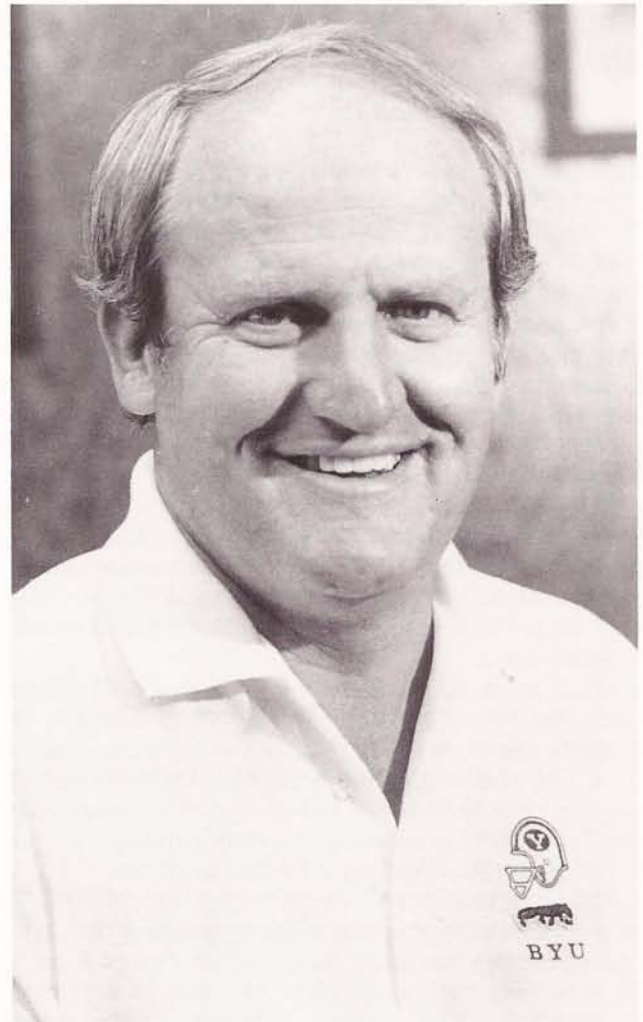


Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. His wife, Pat, is completing her degree at BYU. They have three married children: Ann Edwards Cannon, a writer, Salt Lake City; John, a doctor, Birmingham; and Jim, a lawyer, Las Vegas.

LaVell's Career Highlights

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January . . . had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . halfback **Pete VanValkenburg** wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively . . . quarterback **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense . . . teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . **Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory . . . Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . becomes starter . . . Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . Giff finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense . . . Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring) . . . Nielsen voted first team All-American . . . Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense . . . Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game is third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . Cougars top the nation in "takeaways" with a total of 56 defensive takes (fumbles recovered or interceptions) . . . Cougars tie for first in WAC and make post-season trip to Japan.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore quarterback **Jim McMahon** see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties . . . Wilson is injured in the third game of the year . . . neither quarterback is mentioned in NCAA stats, but Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries . . . Cougars win WAC and play in first Holiday Bowl against Navy.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt **McMahon** in favor of senior **Wilson** . . . Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener

and go on to record 11 straight wins . . . Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1) . . . finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU becomes first division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season . . . also, BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8) . . . Quarterback **Jim McMahon** is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle **Nick Eyre** . . . McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571) . . . he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing . . . his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever . . . he also led the nation in total offense (385.6) . . . after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight . . . Cougars win WAC again and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars . . . have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas . . . BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year . . . **McMahon** earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coaches in the Japan Bowl . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game . . . loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . **Gordon Hudson** is named consensus All-America . . . BYU finishes third nationally in total offense . . . **Steve Young** is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season . . . Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team . . . quarterback **Steve Young** and tight end **Gordon Hudson** both named consensus All-Americans . . . after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games . . . once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring . . . Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards-per-game . . . BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI . . . Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season . . . win streak is extended to 24 games . . . quarterback **Robbie Bosco** leads the nation in passing and finishes second to **Doug Flutie** in pass efficiency (151.8) . . . defensive back **Kyle Morrell** named first team All-America . . . team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5) . . . defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense . . . another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the **Kickoff Classic** . . . defensive tackle **Jason Buck** is named third team All-America and WAC defensive player-of-the-year . . . **Mark Bellini** earns second-team All-America honors . . . team ties with Air Force for the WAC championship . . . quarterback **Robbie Bosco** finishes the season ranked second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency . . . he finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting . . . BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall . . . Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes **Frank Kush** as the winningest coach in WAC football history . . . **Jason Buck** becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American . . . **Shawn Knight** is also named to several All-American teams . . . **Lakei Heimuli** comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards . . . Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but still post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU leads the nation with 50 turnovers (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with **Troy Long** getting the most defensive points . . . Cougars rebound to rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense . . . after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games . . . young backfield shows promise of things to come in getting within a two-point conversion of another WAC title . . . **Chuck Cutler** begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer . . . **Leonard Chitty** sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34) . . . 1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race . . . Punter **Pat Thompson** named All-America and

Cougars play second-ranked Miami on even terms for three quarters . . . **Bob Davis** is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker . . . 11th straight bowl trip is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top in the WAC winning the conference title for the first time since 1986 . . . Offensive lineman **Mohammed Elewonibi** becomes the second BYU player to win the Outland Trophy in the past four years and is named consensus All-America . . . **Bob Davis** and **Chris Smith** are also named to several All-America teams . . . **Freddie Whittingham** is named to the first team Academic All-America team . . . Sophomore quarterback **Ty Detmer** breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others . . . Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance, but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 **Ty Detmer**, a consensus first team All-America, becomes the first player in the Intermountain area to win the Heisman Trophy. He finishes the year with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever, and increases his NCAA records to 47 . . . **Chris Smith** is also consensus All-America and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history . . . **Andy Boyce** gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU . . . **Matt Bellini** breaks the career record for catches with 204 . . . The Cougars shock the nation by **upsetting top-ranked Miami** but lose a shot at a number-one ranking with a loss at Oregon . . . **BYU wins the WAC** and goes to its 13th straight **bowl game**.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as **Ty Detmer** finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and career passing efficiency at 162.7 (nearly five points past Jim McMahon's previous record) . . . **BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa**, 13-13, in its 14th straight bowl game . . . **Shad Hansen** sets a school record with 325 defensive points . . . **Peter Tuipulotu** winds up with the all-time best career rushing average (5.5) . . . **BYU** plays top-ranked Florida State in the Pigskin Classic and third-ranked Penn State (in front of a record crowd of 96,304).

Assistant Coaches

Claude Bassett (BYU '78) Inside Linebackers



Claude Bassett enters his 10th year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after working as a graduate assistant with the Cougars for two years.

Prior to coming to BYU, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under Coach Jesse Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and

coached at Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School and Shasta College in Redding, Calif. He participated in football and baseball.

Before transferring to BYU (where he graduated in 1978), he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson of Orem, and they have four children: Jed, Annette, Camille and Rebecca.

Robbie Bosco (BYU '86) Offensive Assistant



Robbie Bosco begins his third year as a full-time assistant after being a graduate assistant in 1989. The Roseville, Calif., native is best known for leading BYU to the national championship in 1984, when he guided the Cougars to a 13-0 record, led the nation in passing and was second in voting for the Davey O'Brien Award.

In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10 NCAA records at BYU and was a second team All-America.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and has a master's degree in physical education. He is married to Karen Holt and they have two children, Amber and Karissa.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Quarterbacks, Receivers



Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for the past 15 seasons. He coaches the receivers and the quarterbacks and is the coach who calls BYU's plays.

Prior to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, he spent two years as a graduate assistant. Chow graduated from Punahou High ('64) in Honolulu, where he was named "Athlete of the Year."

He then attended the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard. He graduated in 1968.

A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children: Carter, Maile, Cameron and Chandler.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) Asst. Head Coach, Secondary



After an outstanding career at BYU and a seven-year stint in pro football, Dick Felt returned in 1967 to become a coach.

This is his 25th year on the staff. After returning from heart surgery at the start of the 1990 season, Felt's responsibilities continue to be with the defensive backs. He was BYU's defensive coordinator from 1982-90.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He won all-conference honors as a senior.

After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was a first lieutenant.

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson of Boise, Idaho, and they have four children: Karen, Curtis, Kristie and Nancy.

Roger French (Minnesota '58) Offensive Coord., Off. Line



Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past 12 years, during which time the Cougars have traditionally led the nation in passing and total offense.

French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State.

Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last seven years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Roger and his wife, Dody, have two daughters, Kathy and Gail.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruit. Coord., Kickers, TEs



Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker, setting a

school record with nine PATs against New Mexico State.

After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder.

Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children: Brian, Jake and Nicole.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) Def. Line, Spec. Teams Coord.



Tom Ramage has perhaps the most varied football coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff 19 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Ramage came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head

coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as an assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For four years, Tom was line coach of the Aggies under Tony Knap.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children: John, Lorrie; Rochelle; Sherrie; Dedra; and Cory.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs



For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after a successful coaching jobs at Snow College and Ricks College.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High. He played both offensive tackle and guard at BYU before serving an LDS mission to Seattle.

When he returned for his final two years, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and

played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. After graduating in 1970, he played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Lance and his wife, Leslie, have five children: Brittany, Lance Jr., Dallas, Matthew and Houston.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Defensive Coord., OLBs



Ken Schmidt took over the title of defensive coordinator last season after serving in that role during 1990 while Dick Felt underwent heart surgery.

Ken came to BYU in 1982 after successful high school and junior college coaching.

A Murray, Utah, native, Schmidt enrolled at the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He graduated in 1964 and obtained his M.S. degree from Utah in 1969.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68). Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships between 1968-79.

In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Idaho). The Vikings won the conference championship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. In 1981, Ricks defeated Arizona Western in the Valley of the Sun Bowl.

Ken and his wife, the former Yvonne Youngberg of Murray, have five children: Ryan, Craig, Jason, Shauna and Chad.



Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. Earlier this year, BYU joined the top 10 rankings for National Merit Scholars in attendance.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

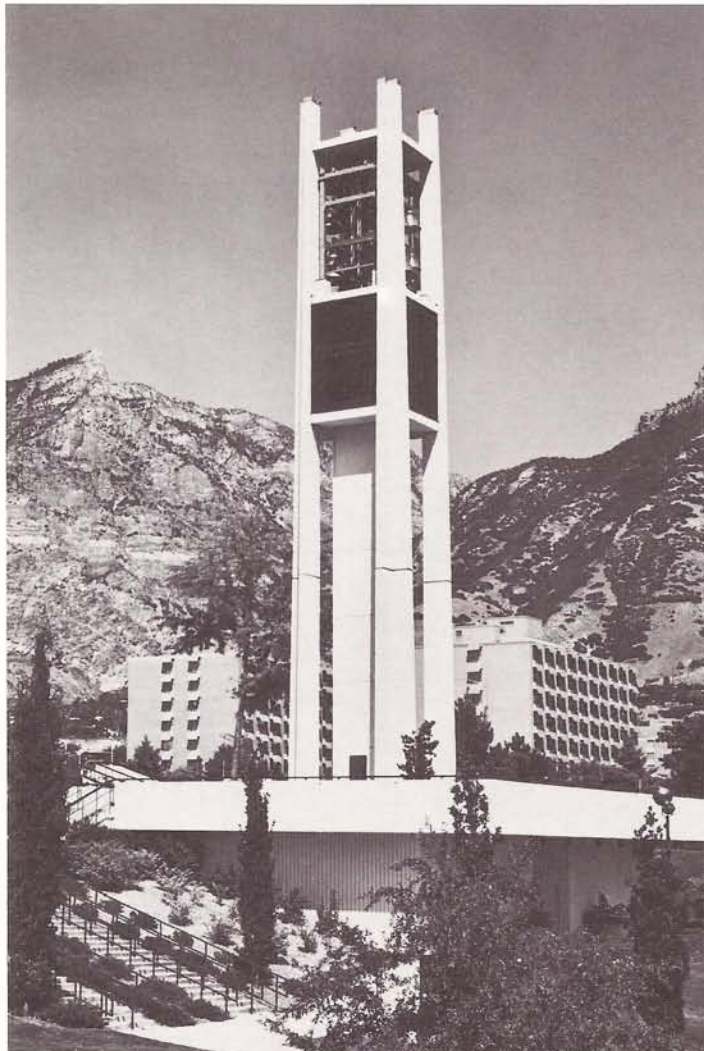
Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public

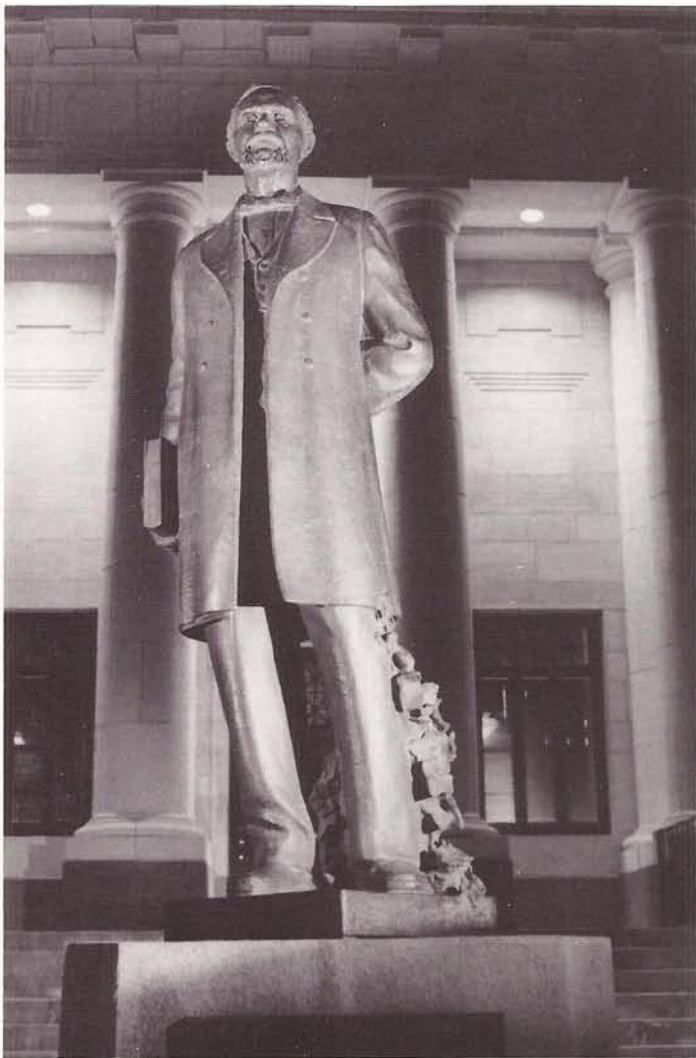


Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new art museum is nearly complete.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Israel, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.



Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

The university traces its roots to Utah's rich pioneer heritage. In establishing the original school on October 16, 1875—first known as Brigham Young Academy—on a little over one acre of land in what is today downtown Provo, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures. No longer an obscure primary school in a little pioneer town, BYU is a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God. Despite steady growth during those early years, the fledgling institution was nearly overcome by a series of setbacks, including persistent financial problems and the destruction by fire of the school's original building in 1884. The campus eventually moved to a new location on Provo's University Avenue, where new facilities were completed in 1891.

As its high school and college curriculum improved and strengthened, the academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903. In 1909, under the administration of George H. Brimhall, work began on the Maeser Memorial Building, the first of many structures on "Temple Hill," the university's present site. Throughout the administrations of Franklin S. Harris and Howard H. McDonald, the university gradually increased its enrollment and facilities.

President Ernest L. Wilkinson, who began his tenure in 1951, oversaw the university's greatest era of physical growth, greatly increasing both the number of buildings and the size of the student body. He also inaugurated the school's first doctoral program in 1957. President Dallin H. Oaks' administration, begun in 1971, saw a deepening and refining of the scholastic mission of BYU, which by then had an enrollment of 26,000. His commitment to academics continued during the administrations of Presidents Jeffrey R. Holland and Rex E. Lee as the university maintains its quest to provide excellent instruction in a gospel-centered atmosphere.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 87,000 in a valley of 275,000, is situated 4,560 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.





President Rex E. Lee

Perhaps the best example of President Rex E. Lee's national reputation came in 1991 when he was asked to chair a committee to review the NCAA's rules enforcement and infractions process. Among those serving under him is Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice of the United States.

Lee, 57, a former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989. He was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–1976, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division.

Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law



Institute. In late April, 1990, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.

The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School

teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Lee married Janet Griffin in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple in 1959. They have seven children and six grandchildren.

R. J. Snow, Student Life Vice President

R. J. Snow is in his third year as Student Life Vice President at BYU. He accepted the position after returning from the South Africa Johannesburg Mission where he served as mission president from 1987–1990.

Before his mission call, Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984–1987. Prior to that, he served for nearly a decade as the vice president of university and student relations at the University of Utah.

He also served as director of the Robert H. Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Snow received his associate of science degree from Dixie College in 1957. He then enrolled at the University of Utah where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Snow continued his education at Northwestern, where he completed his doctoral degree (1965) in political science.



In 1967, Snow moved to California where he served on the political science faculty for the University of California, Santa Barbara, until 1973.

Snow has also completed post-doctoral work at the University of Oregon, Harvard University and has worked with the University of Pau and the University of Bordeaux as part of a UC Santa Barbara study abroad program.

Snow has been very active in civic and community service having served on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as board member of the Utah Symphony and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service on more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations include board membership of the Salt Lake United Way, and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

Born in Cedar City as Reuben Joseph Snow on Oct. 15, 1937, he and his family moved to St. George when he was six months old. In 1962, he married the former Marilyn Melville in the St. George Temple. They have four children, two of them married.

Faculty Representative, Athletic Director

Clayne R. Jensen, Associate Vice President

Dr. Clayne Jensen served 18 years as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompassed BYU athletics.

In the summer of 1991, he was elevated to a new post of Associate Vice President-Student Life. He oversees men's and women's athletics and has been the Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976.



A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen was a Professor and Associate Dean seven years and chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board nine years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at

Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award.

He is author or co-author of 17 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields.

The former dean served as U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has served on numerous committees of the NCAA, and is a former member of the governing council of that organization. Also, he is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, Noteworthy Americans and 2000 Outstanding Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and was selected to the Western International League all-star team in 1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.

In 1959 he became head baseball and an assistant football coach at BYU. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award. A popular speaker, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 U.S. team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in 27 years.



In 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 13 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

He was president of the Association of Baseball Coaches (1977) and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame (1979).

He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee and the College Football Association Television Committee. Tuckett serves on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee and has been on the NCAA Baseball Tournament Committee.

In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame and also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



Athletic Personnel

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics for 43 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team.

While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and was nationally ranked.

He has been the right hand to the athletic director since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, an elementary school principal. They have three children.



Mike King, Asst. AD-Finance

Mike King has been the Cougars' business manager for 13 years and became an assistant AD in 1989. He came to BYU from BYU-Hawaii, where he was controller and director of financial services.

King was athletic business manager at Idaho State from 1974-78 and managed the ISU Minidome from 1970-74. He received a B.A. degree at Idaho State in 1970. Mike, an LDS bishop at BYU, is married to the former Jeannette Bertoch, and they have four children.



Val Hale, Asst. AD-Public Relations

Val Hale is in his fourth year as assistant to the athletic director for public and media relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the Sports Information operation and coordinating public relations, marketing and promotional efforts.

Hale has been assistant director of BYU Development, where he supervised and managed fund-raising efforts in several clubs and academic areas. He was promotions and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982 through 1987.

He was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981 and received his M.A. degree in communications in 1987. Val and his wife, the former Nancy Allred, have three children. He serves as an LDS bishop in Orem.

Strength and Conditioning Center

BYU's conditioning facility ranks among the best in the country.

With nearly 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers.

In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.

Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at other major football powers, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

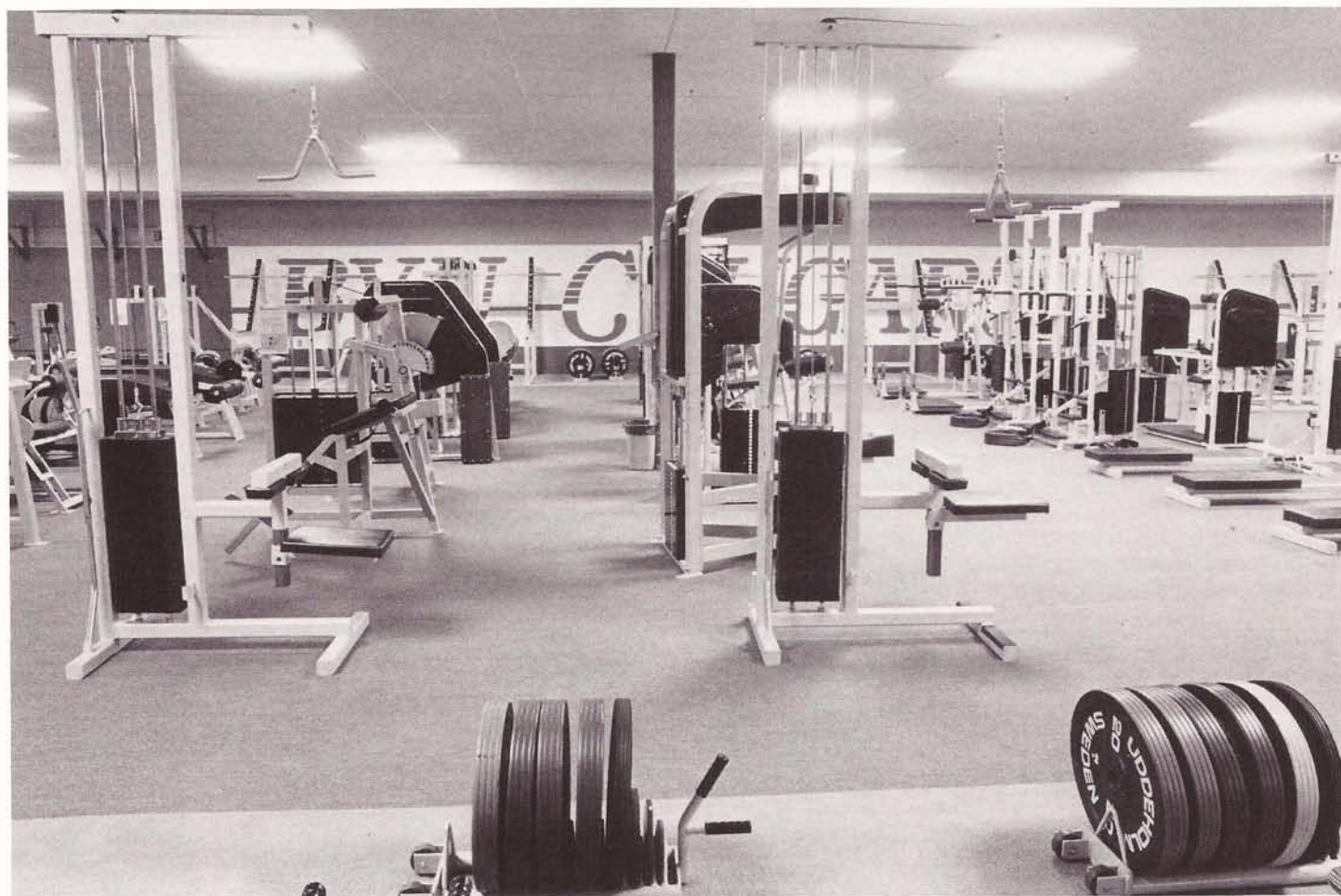
Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.

Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes rave about how much more fun it is to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they have encountered during visits to other universities.

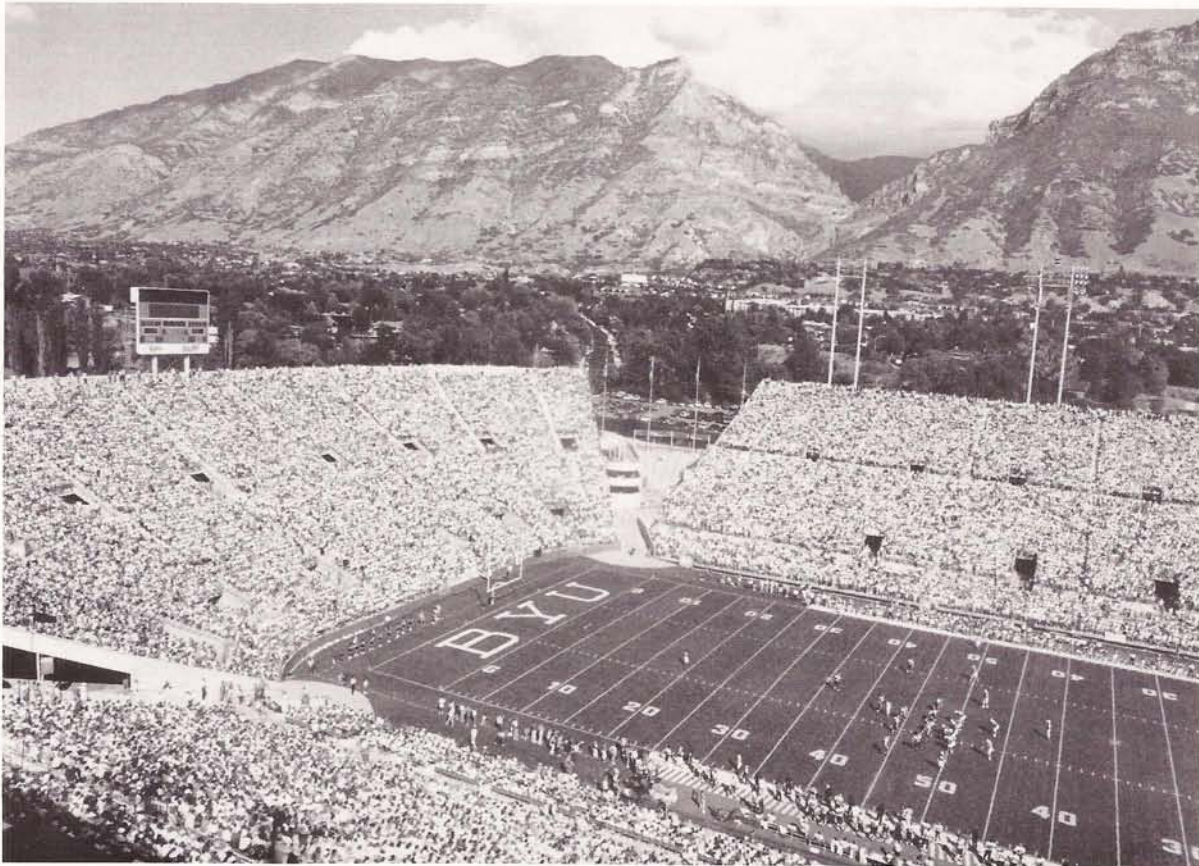
Even coaches of sports whose athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the strength and conditioning complex is beneficial. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.

Athletic Department



BYU has completed 10 seasons in the expanded football stadium.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

BYU has finished in the top-20 in overall national rankings for 12 of the last 21 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-5 five times. Last year BYU had as many Western Athletic Conference titles as the other teams combined.

The University's athletic program boasts 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling and volleyball.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team won 19 WAC division titles in 20 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the field north of the George Albert Smith

Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse.

The fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams for indoor practice.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the third largest on-campus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA track and field championships were held there in 1982 and 1989. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.



Cougar Stadium

The expansion of BYU's football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982 marked a new era.

Cougar Stadium has been sold out with season tickets each of its 10 seasons. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in attendance since the expansion.

Last season BYU was 17th nationally in attendance with its 65,830 average. The record is 66,002 set during the 1990 season, which began with the single-game record of 66,235 (Miami).

Fan support has helped BYU schedule home games this year with UCLA and Penn State. Teams coming to Provo in the next three seasons include Notre Dame, Arizona State and Alabama.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."

The press box runs the entire length of the west stands, rising more than 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels.

The third level is reserved for working media and the fourth level is the television deck. Three elevators assist guests.

As constructed in 1964, the stadium seated 30,000 but as many as 47,000 crammed into the stands and hillside to see a game. Expansion included lowering the field eight feet, taking out the track, adding end zone seating and placing box seats along the west stands.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats 15,000 people. Concession and picnic areas are on the ground level.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing of two inches of rain per hour.

Besides fall and spring football, the stadium is used for the July 4th spectacular, part of Provo's Freedom Festival .

It also houses the Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room, which is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets throughout the year.

A new press interview location east of the BYU locker room is planned. It will help handle the constantly increasing demands of national visitors to BYU football games.

In addition to office areas, the stadium has a great deal of storage space and is home to popular monthly surplus sales of used equipment and furniture.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. In return, contributors receive passes for parking, football and basketball yearbooks, monthly newsletters and other benefits.

The agreement between KSL and BYU affects local broadcast rights only. BYU is a member of the CFA and will honor all contractual obligations with that organization and with the WAC.

KSL Television, the CBS affiliate in Salt Lake City, has been televising BYU football games on a regular basis since 1984. Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of the University of Kansas, provides play-by-play for the fans.

Blaine Fowler, a former BYU quarterback, provides commentary for telecasts.

The sports director is Doug Miller.

For more than 41 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 42 years' experience. An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been BYU games for 27 years.

Marc Lyons, a BYU quarterback from 1967-69 and a former coach at Olympus High in Salt Lake City, does the commentary. Assisting with the broadcasts will be Chris Tunis, Greg Wrubell and Tim Lewis.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar football. All home games are televised on a tape delay basis by Channel 11 with Jay Monsen.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS Sports, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel and local affiliates of national networks.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals for demanding standards.

Traveling with an experienced team of engineers and technicians, the KBYU truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with state-of-the-art cameras, long lenses, one-inch and 3/4-inch tape machines, video monitoring, special effects, Chyron graphics and a complete internal communication system.

Games Via Phone

For fans outside the Intermountain area who can't hear the games on KSL or one of its network stations, they can listen by telephone.

The toll-free number to reach TRZ via a Touch-tone phone in the United States or Canada is 1-800-225-5448. After giving a Visa or Mastercard number, callers will be connected to the broadcast.

Depending on how long they listen, fans are billed between 20 cents and 50 cents per minute. The cost of listening to a game for three hours is \$36.50.

Western Athletic Conference

For the fourth consecutive year, the Western Athletic Conference produced at least three bowl teams (BYU, San Diego State and Air Force). Since 1986, eight of the WAC's 10 teams have participated in at least one bowl game.

The 1992 season will be the 31st in the history of the WAC and marks the debut of Fresno State. Each WAC team will play an eight-game schedule, which also means each team will miss one WAC opponent each year.

Again in 1992, the WAC regular season champion will participate in the Thrifty Holiday Bowl. This year's game is on Wednesday, Dec. 30, most likely against the third-place finisher from the Big Ten Conference.

Founded July 1, 1962, charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference, the others members of the Skyline Conference.

Texas-El Paso and Colorado State became members in September, 1967, and the Arizona schools went to the PAC-10 on June 30, 1978. Since that time, membership additions have included San Diego State (July 1, 1978), Hawaii (July 1, 1979) and the United States Air Force Academy (July 1, 1980).

Paul Brechler was the WAC Commissioner from 1962-68; Wiles Hallock from 1968-71, Stan Bates from 1971-80, and Dr. Joe Kearney since 1980.

The WAC office is located in Littleton, Colo., in suburban Denver, and has been in that area since the league's beginning with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

Currently, the WAC sponsors 11 championships in men's sports and 10 in women's sports. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, indoor track, outdoor track, swimming and diving, tennis, and wrestling. The women have championships in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track, outdoor track, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.



WESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

On July 1, 1990, the WAC merged with the women's High Country Athletic Conference to form a single league under one administrative structure. HCAC Commissioner Margie McDonald became Deputy Commissioner of the WAC.

Jeff Hurd is Associate Commissioner while Mark Hollis and Dee Anne Menzies are Assistant Commissioners. John Adams is Supervisor of Football Officials and Guy Gibbs is Supervisor of Basketball Officials.

In 1991, the WAC had four of the top 11 passing teams in the country (BYU 2, New Mexico 7, Wyoming 8, SDSU 11) and two of the top five in rushing (Air Force 2, Hawaii 5). Air Force was third in net punting, Hawaii fourth in kickoff returns and BYU fifth in total offense.

Ty Detmer of BYU was first in total offense and second in passing efficiency. SDSU's Marshall Faulk was first in both rushing and scoring and third in all-purpose yardage. Jason Christ of Air Force was second in punting.

Hawaii's Jason Elam was third in field goals and teammate Jeff Sydnor was third in kickoff returns. Carl Winston of New Mexico and Greg Primus of Colorado State were fifth and seventh in receiving and BYU's Brad Clark was ninth in punt returns.

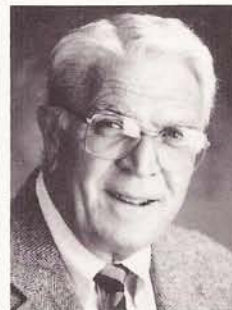

All four linebackers are in place, led by All-WAC Barron Wortham. Injuries hurt the secondary a year ago but there's experience this time out which also is true of the defensive line.

Experience is a concern on offense although UTEP returns quarterback Mike Perez. The Miners were hit hard on the offensive line and at split end but a number of quality athletes are in the program.

For a team which won only one of its final eight games, UTEP could be a surprise. The Miners tied Wyoming and won at Hawaii. The five WAC losses were by a touchdown or less.

The Miners are moving Anthony Cruz from the defensive line to the offensive line. If that works out and if slot backs Kenny Brown and Ivory Durio have good seasons, the Cougars might be glad they catch UTEP early.

BYU holds a six-game winning streak after last year's 31-29 squeaker in which Scott Giles blocked a field goal attempt in the final seconds.

The Cougars had to knock down a two-point conversion pass to preserve the win after leading 10-0.

David Lowery, who took over at quarterback in the fifth game last year, directs an offense which was sixth nationally in total offense and 11th in passing.

All-American receiver Patrick Rowe is gone but that position is loaded. Darnay Scott, sensational as a frosh, returns. Tight end Ray Rowe isn't back but three linemen return, including tackle Tony Nichols.

Eight starters return on defense and still there are only five seniors on the defensive roster. Leading the way are backs Robert Griffith and Damon Pieri.

Coach Luginbill's fourth team at SDSU figures to be the one to beat this year in the WAC. Last season, he took the Aztecs to the Freedom Bowl. Returning to a bowl without winning the league could be a challenge since the non-league foes are USC, UCLA and Miami.

Terry Donahue's 8-2-1 bowl record is the best percentage (.773) among 1-A coaches. Overall, he's the eighth winningest (.690) active coach.

Last year at the Rose Bowl, BYU overcame a 14-3 deficit to take a 23-20 lead after three quarters. But Maddox led the Bruins to a fourth-quarter score and UCLA stopped two BYU drives.

The Cougars won the first game in the series, 37-35, in Pasadena (1983), where Casey Tiumalu rushed for 137 yards and BYU sacked quarterback Steve Bono eight times.

The 1985 game also was shown on ESPN and that time it was the Bruins' turn to win a close one, 27-24, in Provo. A 62-yard bomb late in the game ended a 25-game BYU winning streak--the nation's longest.

The third game was a rout with UCLA crushing the Cougars, 31-10, in the 1986 Freedom Bowl at Anaheim. Gaston Green rushed for 266 yards to help UCLA break open a 7-3 halftime lead.

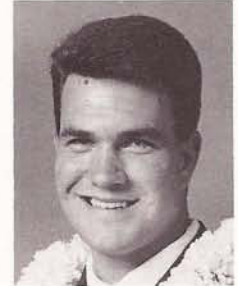
Outlook

Series Notes

In one of the rare times when BYU outgained an opponent on the ground (178-165), the Cougars stopped Hawaii last year, 35-18--the Rainbows' first trip to Provo since 1982.

The frustration of 10 straight losses to BYU was vented in 1989 and 1990, when the Rainbows romped to victories of 56-14 and 59-28.

Two years ago, the Cougars had been excited all afternoon about the WAC's first ever Heisman Trophy winner but it was Hawaii which celebrated at night. Ty Detmer finished the season with 5,188 passing yards--the most in the history of college football--but for the only time during the season he was outpassed. Gabriel threw for 359 yards compared to 319 for Detmer.

BYU had been 9-0 since Hawaii joined the WAC and the Cougars had claimed eight in a row at Honolulu, where the Rainbows had last won in 1974.

Fresno State ended a 23-year association with the Big West Conference to join the WAC on July 1. The Bulldogs won, or shared, the title the last four years.

The Bulldogs return their top four rushers and seven of the eight top receivers. Fullback Lorenzo Neal rushed for 1,417 yards (compared with 1,628 for BYU as a team).

Trent Dilfer, a 6-5, 225-pound sophomore, is the heir apparent to four-year starter Mark Barsotti at quarterback. Like BYU, Fresno State throws to its backs and tight end (Marty Thompson had eight touchdowns). The Bulldogs led the nation in scoring offense (44.2) and total offense (541.9) last year.

FSU's biggest task lies in rebuilding its defense, which lost the secondary and nine starters in all. And like BYU, the Bulldogs will go more with a 4-3 package compared to the 3-4 alignment of past teams.

The Bulldogs are led by three-year starter Zack Rix at nose guard but will depend on a number of transfers and players who have moved from offense.

FSU also lost both offensive coordinator Rich Olson (to Miami) and defensive coordinator Cliff Hysell (new head coach at Montana State).

The Cougars got within 41-39 with two minutes left to play, only to have a two-point conversion pass returned 102 yards by Andre Collins.

Receiver Scott Hufford caught only eight passes but had an incredible 41.8 yards per reception.

Series Notes

BYU has won 13 of the 14 meetings and nine straight. Air Force notched its only win (39-38) in 1982, in the first game played at the expanded stadium.

Last year, winless BYU opened the WAC by stopping unbeaten Air Force, 21-7. BYU got all its points in the first half and didn't allow the Falcons to score until less than four minutes remained.

Air Force has been to bowl games in eight of the last 10 years, missing only 1986 and 1988. In 1985, the Falcons were 10-0 and ranked fourth in the nation when they lost to the Cougars, 27-20.

Three years ago, a national television audience saw Stacey Corley return kickoffs 99 and 85 yards.

BYU was 0-17-3 before getting its first win in 1942. The Cougars then went 0-11-1 before winning in 1958 and 0-6 before winning in 1965.

BYU has won 12 of the last 13 games and 18 of 20 under LaVell Edwards. The Cougars have won three in a row since a 57-28 rout by Utah in 1988. The Utes other win over Coach Edwards was in 1978.

Last year, BYU clinched a bowl berth and the Beehive Boot by winning, 48-17, as Ty Detmer became the first player to go over 15,000 yards in a career and broke the NCAA career pass efficiency record.

BYU overcame a 10-7 first quarter deficit in 1990 to take a 35-10 halftime lead and won, 45-22. In 1989, the Cougars went up, 49-0, at halftime and won, 70-31.

Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl

The Western Athletic Conference champion plays in the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego, Calif.

This year's 15th annual Holiday Bowl, the second year of a three-year national advertising agreement with Thrifty, takes place on Wednesday, Dec. 30.

It is played at the 60,409-seat stadium which hosted the 1988 Super Bowl.

The bowl has been in existence since 1978, when Navy edged BYU, 23-16, in what was then called San Diego Stadium. The name was changed in 1981 to honor the San Diego Union sports editor who had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed in 1967. Murphy died in 1980.

In 1985, the stadium was expanded from 52,675 for football and a \$6.5 million, 300,000 pound Diamond Vision scoreboard was added with a 66 by 100-foot scoreboard and screen for replays.

WAC teams have played in the Holiday Bowl every year except 1985, when Arizona State and Arkansas played.

Since then, the bowl has resumed its tie-in with the WAC. There will be a three-year extension to the current contract, which runs through this season.

The WAC is 4-9 at the Holiday Bowl with close games generally prevailing, such as last year's 13-13 tie between the Cougars and Iowa.

An exception was the 65-14 romp by Texas A&M over BYU in 1990. Penn State scored in the final minutes of the 1989 game on a 102-yard interception and a 53-yard fumble recovery to beat BYU, 50-39.

In 1986 and 1987, Iowa defeated San Diego State (39-38) and Wyoming (20-19). Oklahoma State belted Wyoming, 62-14, in 1988.

The second year (1979), BYU lost to Indiana, 38-37. In the Miracle Bowl of 1980, BYU scored three touchdowns in the final two minutes and 33 seconds to edge Southern Methodist, 46-45.

In 1981, BYU beat Washington State, 38-36, but lost to Ohio State, 47-17, in 1982. In 1983, it was BYU 21, Missouri 17, and the Cougars defeated Michigan, 24-17, to win the national championship in 1984.

Even the non-WAC game was a squeaker with Arkansas nipping Arizona State, 18-17.

A major change in the Holiday Bowl came in 1988, when Sea World became the sponsor and the bowl name was changed to Sea World Holiday Bowl.

That relationship changed last year when negotiations for a new title sponsor were completed.

Holiday Bowl XIV, 1991

BYU 13, Iowa 13

December 30

San Diego

A tipped pass which was picked off in the endzone with less than 30 seconds remaining stifled BYU's hopes of knocking off seventh-ranked Iowa in a Holiday Bowl that will be remembered for Josh Arnold earning Defensive MVP honors.

Ty Detmer turned in another great performance in his last appearance as a Cougar, passing for 350 yards and two touchdowns against a Hawkeye defense that led the Big 10 in defense and sacks.

Iowa quarterback Matt Rodgers led the Hawkeyes on a 74-yard scoring march on the game's opening drive. The score came on a 13-yard-run by Hawkeye fullback Mike Saunders.

Iowa scored after another long drive in the second quarter. Again it was Saunders who scored, this time on a five-yard dive.

Down 13-0, BYU finally got things rolling. After an Iowa punt put the Cougars on their own 22 with 4:43 to play in the first half, Detmer connected on five of six passes to move the Cougars to the Iowa nine. From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter. BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer to Tyler Anderson touchdown pass from 29-yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13.

Each team threatened to score late in the fourth. Iowa moved the ball to the Cougar 23, but missed on a 40-yard field goal attempt with 4:19 remaining.

On the game's final drive, clutch receptions by Eric Drage, Jamal Willis and Tuipulotu helped the Cougars move inside the Iowa 20-yard-line with 33 seconds left.

Detmer scrambled left and threw a pass intended for tight end Byron Rex. The ball was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the endzone.

BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the Associated Press and the CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa finished 10th.

Holiday Bowl XIII, 1990

Texas A&M 65, BYU 14

Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-American running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it could play with the Cougars. The Aggies were able to prove that point and a lot more as they stunned the Cougars.

Going into the game, the Cougars were fighting injury problems. Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up, and Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his left shoulder.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars were able to tie the score on an eight-yard Ty Detmer to Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's right shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. After playing valiantly with one separation, this one proved to be too much. Detmer would have surgery a few days later to fix the damage.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. The fact that Texas A&M's Lewis was still in the game with eight minutes to go and a 58-14 lead caused a slight stir among Cougar fans. A bright spot for BYU was Joe Evans' first touchdown pass as a Cougar quarterback.

Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named the Offensive Player of the Game by racking up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player with six tackles, two sacks and an interception.

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by USA Today/CNN and 22nd by AP. The Cougars had been as high as fourth prior to their first loss.

Obvious highlights were a win in BYU's first-ever meeting with a number-one team (Miami) and the first Heisman Trophy ever in the WAC.

Holiday Bowl XII, 1989

Penn State 50, BYU 39

Two very unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from toppling the East's best team, Lambert Trophy-winner Penn State. Two stunning defensive plays offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer--the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his heroics, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing Most Valuable Player honors despite being on the losing team. The other co-MVP was the Nit-tany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards and picked up some key first downs for Joe Paterno's team.

BYU, which trailed, 41-26, with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with two and a half minutes left to play. But a two-point conversion pass, which would have tied the game, was intercepted by linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards to give Penn State two points.

The Cougars tried an on-side kick but Penn State fell on the ball at the BYU 46-yard line. Two tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Bob Davis forced the Lions to punt and the Cougars got the ball at their own 12 with two minutes remaining.

Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then what most BYU fans thought was a sack by safety Gary Brown became a score for Penn State. He stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards with 45 seconds left.

The Cougars moved from their own 32 to the Penn State 40 in the final 30 seconds before time ran out.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and USA Today/CNN. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the other two polls.

A tough second-half defense, Ty Detmer coming off the bench to earn Most Valuable Player honors and two fourth-quarter field goals by Jason Chaffetz enabled the Cougars to upset Colorado.

Cool weather (42 degrees) by southern California standards didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns.

But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second. Scott Peterson made a key pass interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) although a big show failed to materialize in a matchup of the nation's top two punters. Colorado's Keith English averaged only 39 yards on two punts and BYU's Pat Thompson had four punts for a 33.5 average.

A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score and then Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter and the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

The Cougars then moved from their own four to the Colorado 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

A key performer for BYU was halfback Matt Bellini, who carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards. A sad note for the Buffs came early in 1989 when quarterback Sal Aunese was hospitalized with stomach cancer. He died during the 1989 season, when Colorado went unbeaten during the regular season and went into the Orange Bowl ranked number-one in the country.

All American Bowl, 1987

Virginia 22, BYU 16

The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s after two days of rain) and the Cougars never got warmed up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged, 22-16, in their initial game with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only had to punt once--all bowl records--but the Cougars fell just short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter as the Cavaliers took a 14-3 halftime lead.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Kyle Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, behind quarterback Scott Secules, the game MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead, 22-9, with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his wedding anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh had led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Freedom Bowl III, 1986

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10. He finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort. On the evening, Jensen completed 18 passes in 31 attempts for 124 yards with three interceptions, and Young was on target seven times in 12 attempts for 97 yards.

Florida Citrus Bowl, 1985

Ohio State 10, BYU 7

December 28

Orlando

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Big-10 Buckeyes went home the victor.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game.

The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap--an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as the Buckeyes won their seventh consecutive game.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7.

As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period,

WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down.

Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final two minutes and 33 seconds.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line.

Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record, BYU with a 9-4 mark.

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of

37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them.

Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

Oklahoma State had tied for the Big Eight title but missed out on the Orange Bowl due to the league's tie-breaking formula.

Fiesta Bowl, 1974

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

Historical View

Being recognized as one of the country's top programs--not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 27 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 183 games and been to 16 bowl games. Fourteen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85. And the Cougars won the national championship in 1984.

Things weren't always so rosy, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally among national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 68 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Robbie Bosco** (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. And **Ty Detmer** (1988-91) finished his incredible career by achieving 15,031 yards passing--the first player ever to go over 12,000.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco and Detmer were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson, Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second.

Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting last year. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs.

Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. **"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg** (1970-71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America.

Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive

years. And fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years.

Lakei Heimuli (1983-86) is the school's rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area.

Mohammed Elewonibi (1988-89) won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973-75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972-75), **Tom Bell** (1974-79), **Nick Eyre** (1977-80), **Bart Oates** (1977-82) and **Trevor Matich** (1979-84).

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978-80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979-83) **David Mills** (1980-84), **Trevor Molini** (1985-86) and **Chris Smith** (1987-90).

Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972-74), **Paul Linford** (1972-74), **Mekeli Ieremia** (1975-77), **Glen Titensor** (1978-80), **Glen Redd** (1976-80), **Kyle Whittingham** (1979-81), **Todd Shell** (1980-83), **Kyle Morrell** (1980-84) and **Jason Buck** (1985-86), the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy.

At various times in the past 25 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. **Vai Sikahema** (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns and later earned All-Pro status with the Cardinals.

Press Information

The BYU Football Media Guide is designed to provide the media with useful information about the 1992 football team. The following information also will help the media in covering the Cougars' during the Please review it.

Player Interviews

Please schedule all player and coach interviews through the Sports Information Office. To assure a better chance of obtaining the interview, please notify the Sports Information Office at least 24 hours in advance of the interview. Coach LaVell Edwards is available to media from 10-11 a.m. Members of the print media requesting interviews should contact Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Director. Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Monsen, Electronic Media Coordinator. **No player interviews will be given the day before, or on, game day.**

Big Four Huddle

Coach Edwards and two football players attend the Big Four Huddle at noon each Tuesday at the Red Lion Inn in Salt Lake City. The coach and players will be available for individual interviews immediately after the luncheon.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photography credentials should be made no later than **one week prior to the game**. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college football. No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, Brigham Young University, Provo, UT 84602. Phone (801) 378-4911.

Stadium Location, Media Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium near the ticket booth. Media parking passes must be requested. The press box is accessible via elevators located on the west side of Cougar Stadium.

Press Box Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics. A press box public address announcer will keep the media informed of play-by-play information, broken records and other interesting information. A meal will be served before each home game.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired,

visitors may wish to order their own phones. Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-2609.

Photography Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover college football. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will supervise the distribution of photo vests at the game. Photographers on the sidelines must wear the required vest at all times. Television photographers and still cameramen are not allowed on the sidelines between the 25-yard lines. Please use north elevator to access press box. Pick up photo vests at the press box and return them after the game.

Post-Game Interviews

In order to provide equal access to BYU athletes for post-game media interviews, **BYU's locker room will be closed** to all members of the media for both home and away games. Post-game interviews at home games will be conducted in the new Press Interview Room, located east of BYU's locker room (under the east stands). Interview requests should be made to members of the BYU Sports Information staff, who will accompany the media to the Press Room. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

The Press Interview Room will be equipped with an audio mixer for those desiring to record the interviews. Also, there will be sufficient lighting available for television cameras. Coach LaVell Edwards will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Media representatives can request that players be brought into the Press Room for interviews after Coach Edwards has finished speaking. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

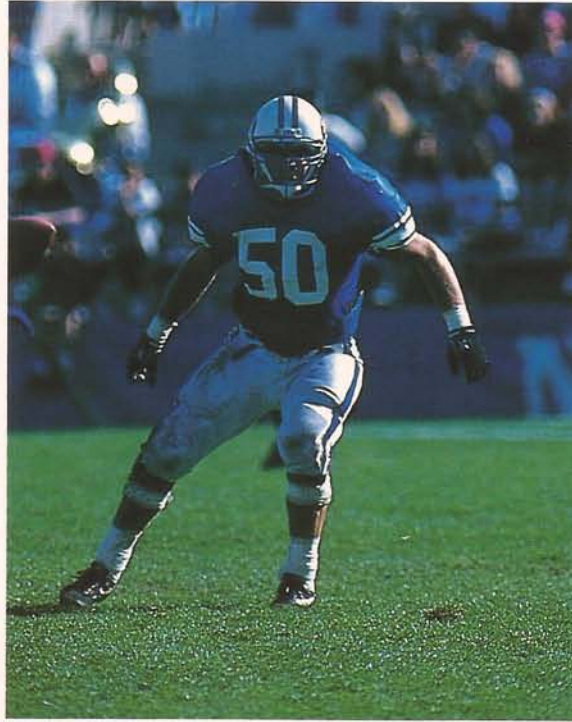
Fan Hotline

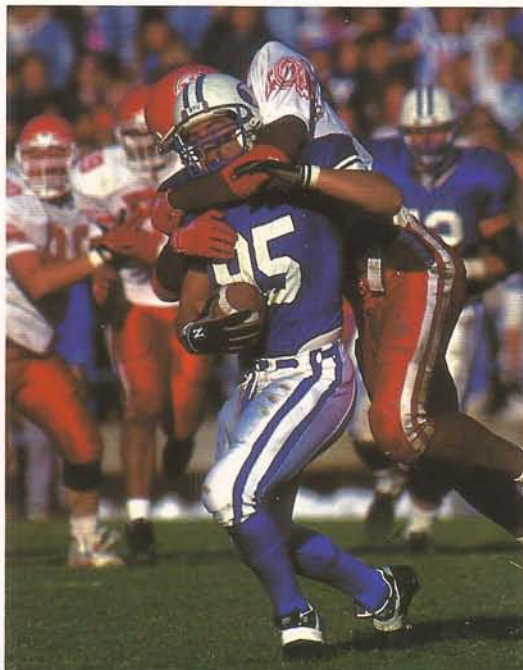
