Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Monsen, Electronic Media Coordinator. No player interviews will be given the day before or the day of a game.

Big Five Huddle

Coach Edwards and two football players attend the Big Five Huddle at noon each Tuesday. The coach and players will be available for interviews immediately after the luncheon.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photography credentials should be made no later than one week prior to the game. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college football. No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, BYU, Provo, UT 84602. Fax (801) 378-3520.

Press Box Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics. A press box public address announcer will keep the media informed of play-by-play information, records broken and other interesting information. A meal will be served before each home game.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own phones.

Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-2609.

Post Game Interviews

The BYU Sports Information staff will accompany the media to the locker room. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

Coach LaVell Edwards will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

Photo Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover college football. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will supervise the distribution of photo vests at the game.

Photographers on the sidelines must wear the required vest at all times.

Television photographers and still cameramen are not allowed on the sidelines between the 25-yard lines. Please use north elevator to access press box. Pick up photo vests at the press box and return them after the game.

Stadium Location, Media Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium near the ticket booth. Media parking passes must be requested. The press box is

accessible via elevators located on the west side of Cougar Stadium.

Fan Hotline

BYU fans can get up-to-date Cougar sports information each day by calling 378-TEAM. The hotline is sponsored by the BYU Cougar Club and features scores and statistics from previous athletic events and information about upcoming events.

Additional Information

Entering the playing field without proper credentials is a violation of Conference and Stadium rules. Offenders will be ejected, fined, and subject to prosecution.

Smoking is not permitted in the seating areas of the Stadium. Alcoholic beverages, glass bottles, large food and beverage containers, any item deemed dangerous by management cannot be brought into Cougar Stadium.

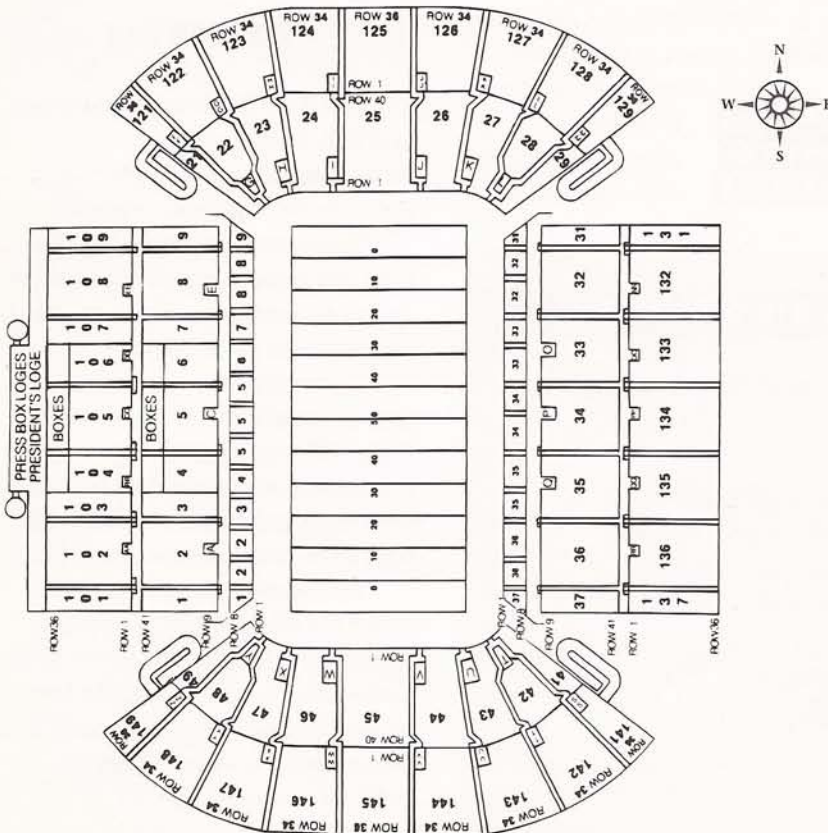

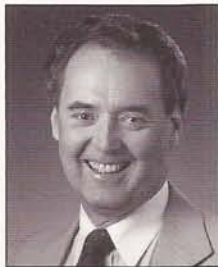
RADIO

Play-by-play announcer Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 45 years of experience, is entering his 32nd season as the voice of the Cougars.

An Ogden High School and University of Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcasted Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965.

Marc Lyons, a BYU quarterback from 1967-69 and former coach at Olympus High School in Salt Lake City does the commentary. Assisting with the broadcasts will be Kent Rupe and Greg Wrubell.

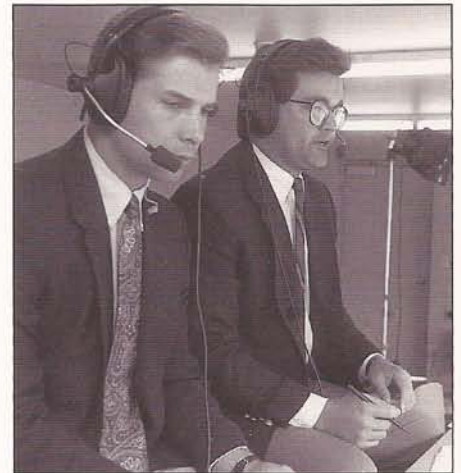
An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western United States.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by the major cable networks. KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals. It has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment.

In cooperation with KBYU, the Blue & White Network syndicates BYU football games to broadcast



and cable stations in 44 states — unprecedented for any university.



KSL-TV, the NBC affiliate in Salt Lake City, has been televising BYU football games on a regular basis since 1984.



Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of Kansas St., provides play-by-play for the fans. Blaine Fowler, a former BYU quarterback, provides the color commentary for telecasts.

KSL AND BYU

The BYU Athletic Department and KSL Radio and Television have an agreement to market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events.

The agreement is designed to help advertisers reach BYU's large sports audience via electronic media and in-arena promotions.

Under the arrangement, sponsors may contact a single source, KSL/BYU Sports. Advertisers may purchase packages which include television and radio exposure, as well as in-arena exposure.

The agreement between KSL and BYU affects local broadcast rights only. BYU is a member of the Collegiate Football USA and honors all contractual obligations with that organization and the Western Athletic Conference.

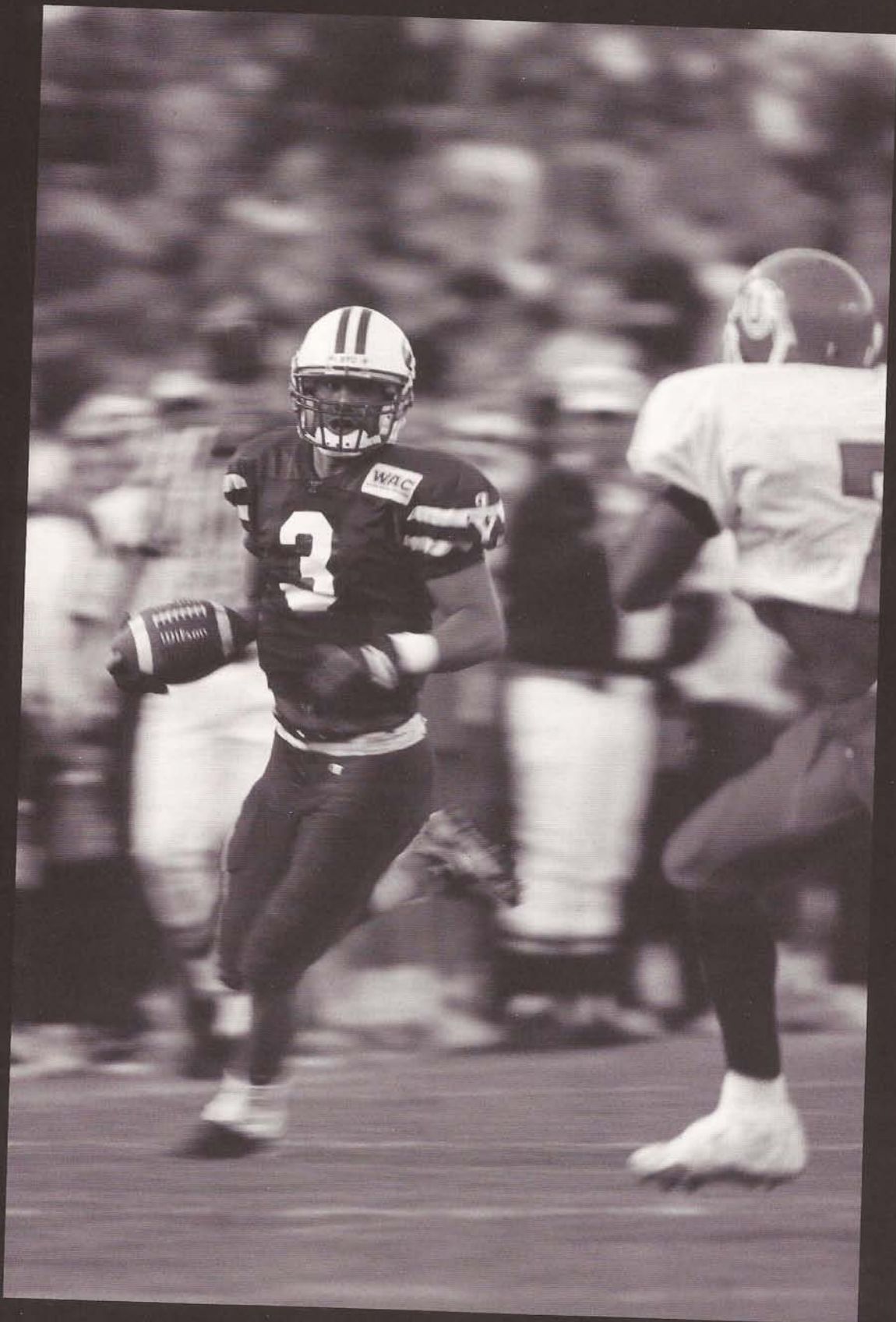

Fueling up for a Record Year

Another high-octane BYU passing attack and an improved defense fuel optimism for a possible NCAA-record 15 football games this season.

The August 24 Pigskin Classic against Texas A&M in Provo is the earliest start in NCAA history. If defending Western Athletic Conference champion BYU makes it to the first-ever league playoffs at Las Vegas on December 7 and advances to a post-season bowl, it makes for a 15-game season.

The 1996 season unveils the newly expanded, 16-team Western Athletic Conference. BYU, a league charter member, welcomes newcomers TCU, SMU, Rice, Tulsa, to the Mountain Division of the WAC along with mainstays Utah, UTEP, and New Mexico (San Jose State, and UNLV will be members of the Pacific Division).

LaVell Edwards, the fourth-winningest active coach in the NCAA with a 214-80-3 record, returns for his 25th season at the helm and is under a new multi-year contract.

Last year the Cougars had the fifth-best passing attack in the nation (315.4 yards per game), yet

had a string of 17 consecutive post-season bowl appearances snapped with last season's 7-4 record.

With 44 lettermen returning along with seven starters on both offense and defense returning, BYU looks to have the experience to improve upon last year's performance.

"We have the right people coming back at the right positions that count," said Honorable Mention All-American tight end Chad Lewis. "Our secondary will be the best we have had in years--maybe ever. We have an experienced quarterback, receivers and tight ends returning. We are rebuilding the offensive line and the defensive line, but we are solid at linebacker and have an All-American punt returner as an added weapon in the backfield running pass patterns."

Among the top returnees are senior return specialist James Dye, who is switching from defensive back to wide receiver. Dye led the nation last season in punt returns with a 21.9 average and was the WAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

"He is the best in the country, perhaps the best I've ever seen," said LaVell Edwards. "He is exciting when he gets his hands on the ball. He can really make things happen."

Other returning All-WAC performers include tight end Lewis, middle linebacker Shay Muirbrook and offensive guard Larry Moore. Lewis teams with fellow senior Itula Mili to form one of the best one-two

tight end combos in the nation.

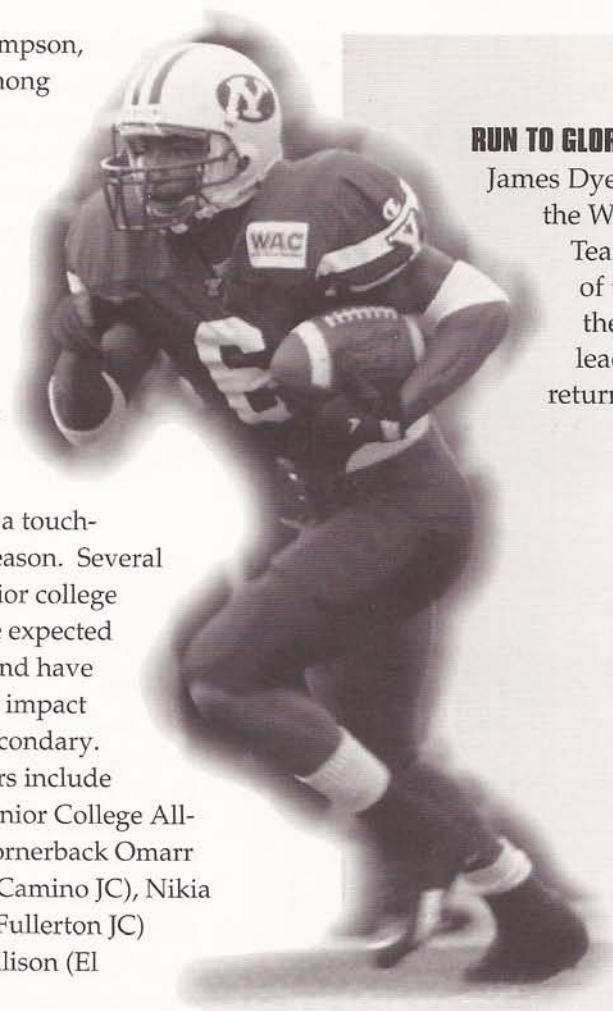
BYU also returns a pair of talented second team All-WAC performers in quarterback Steve Sarkisian and cornerback Tim McTyer. Sarkisian, who was an Honorable Mention UPI All-American last year, ranked third in NCAA total offense at 297.27 and set a NCAA single-game pass efficiency record, completing 31 of 34 passes (91.2 percent) against Fresno State. Sarkisian threw for 20 touchdowns last season, and Lewis and Mili accounted for over a quarter of his 250 completions and 3,437 yards.

"Lewis and Mili are among the best we've had and we are strong at linebacker," Edwards said. "We are inexperienced in our offensive and defensive lines. We recruited well to fill some of our weaknesses."

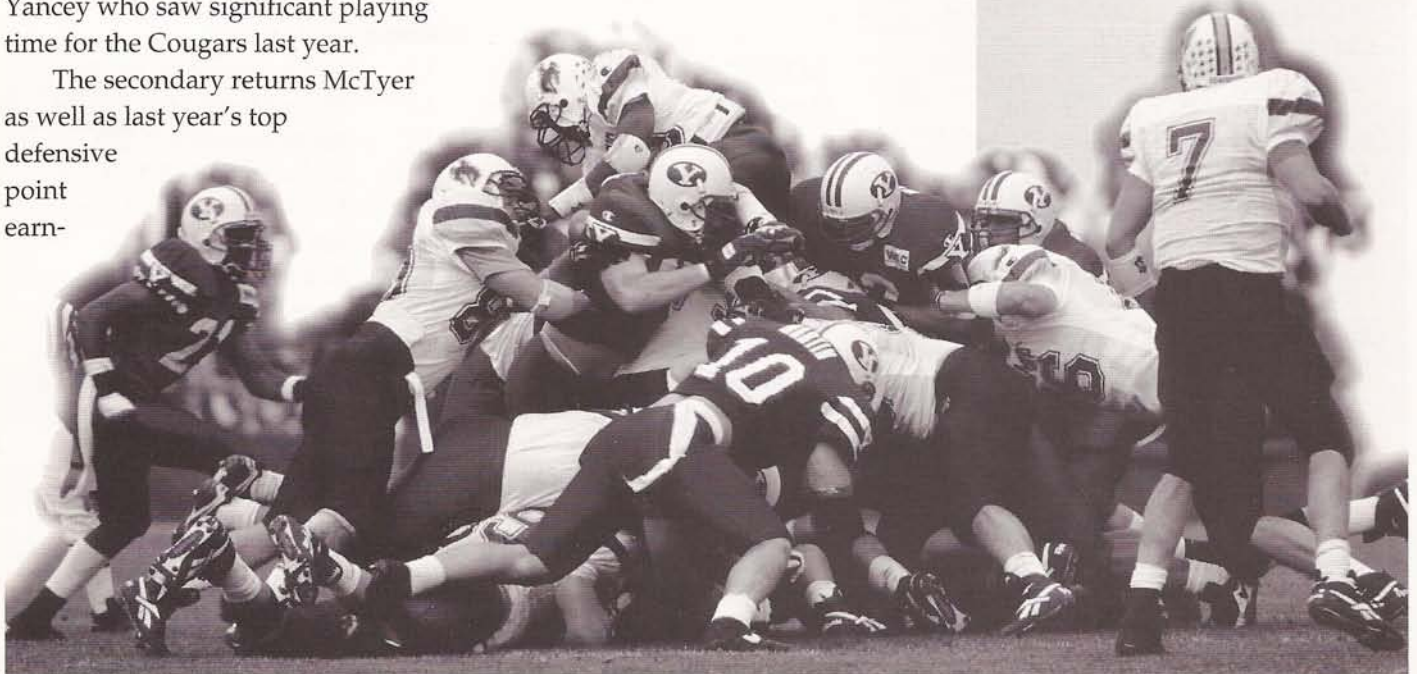
BYU's defense returns a bevy of experienced players. Muirbrook and fellow returning linebackers Brad Martin and Dennis Simmons will anchor a defense looking to stop opponents in their tracks. The defensive line returns tackle Henry Bloomfield, end Ed Kehl and Daren Yancey who saw significant playing time for the Cougars last year.

The secondary returns McTyer as well as last year's top defensive point earner,

Eddie Sampson, who was among the nation's leaders in interceptions most of the season and finished with five picks. McTyer had a 60-yard pass interception for a touchdown last season. Several talented junior college transfers are expected to come in and have a significant impact on BYU's secondary. These players include first team Junior College All-American cornerback Omarr Morgan (El Camino JC), Nikia McKinney (Fullerton JC) and Chris Ellison (El Camino JC).

On offense, BYU's Sarkisian-led passing attack will have a lot of weapons at its disposal. Along with Lewis, Mili, and Dye, the Cougars return seniors Mark Atuaia at running back and Kaipo McGuire at wide receiver. The Cougars will also be counting on the services of K.O. Kealaluhi, who averaged over 17 yards per catch last season, and punter Alan Boardman.

The Texas A&M game gives the Cougars seven home dates for the first time in school history. Besides the Pigskin Classic match up, BYU will face several challenges on the road this year. On September 14, BYU faces a tough non-conference opponent, University of Washington, and then finishes off its schedule with tests at Hawaii and Utah.

1996 recruiting class

With BYU coaches home during the holidays for the first time in 17 years, they were able to focus their attention on signing a class of recruits some experts have called the best in BYU history.

BYU coaches are excited about the abundance of talent joining the roster this fall. "It (the class of 1996) potentially may be the best we've had," says defensive line coach Tom Ramage.

Recruiting publications across the country are ranking BYU's class of 1996 as undoubtably the best in the WAC and among the top 25 in the nation. What makes this recruiting class stand out among other successful years is its speed. Leading the way is record-breaking running back Ronney Jenkins who clocked a 4.3 in the 40 yard dash and who also rushed for 619 yards in one game last year. Will Snowden, a *Blue Chip Illustrated* Dream Team running back, two-time junior college All-American defensive back Omarr Morgan, track star Markis Ervin from Texas and one of the top junior college running backs in the nation—Brian McKenzie—give the Cougars the speed needed to return to their Western Athletic Conference dominance.

"We're creating a situation where we're trying to improve our athletic ability," said recruiting coordinator Chris Pella. "This class has that. This is one of our better speed groups."

BYU has also signed what many scouts are calling the best quarterback class in the country in Blue Chip All-Americans, Bret Engemann and Kevin Feterik. Both have

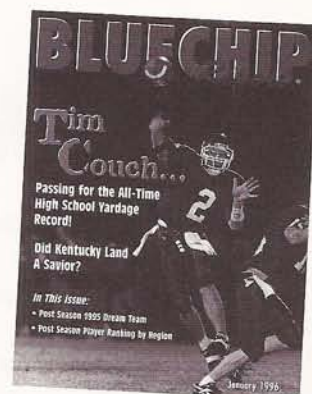
had outstanding high school careers and will be counted on to continue the tradition at BYU's "Quarterback Factory."

Joining McKenzie, Jenkins and Snowden in by far the best running-back recruiting class in BYU history are California products Brock Diediker and Andrew Ord. Running back coach Lance Reynolds couldn't be more pleased with this year's success.

"I'm excited about getting them here in the fall," Reynolds said. "We've never signed so many highly touted running backs in one year. As far as receiving national attention and national honors, this group is the best ever. Of course, they still have to prove it on the field."

The Cougars will also have the services of four of the best prep lineman in the country this year. The list includes Chris Watkins of Arizona, Hans Olsen of Idaho, Ben Archibald of Oregon and Larry Moeaki of Illinois.

BYU's national recruiting base covers the entire country. While the Cougars signed just one player from the state of Utah (Engemann), BYU nabbed 10 players from California, three each from Colorado and Texas and two from Arizona. In fact, BYU signed players from 11 states and from every U.S. time zone from Hawaii to Connecticut.

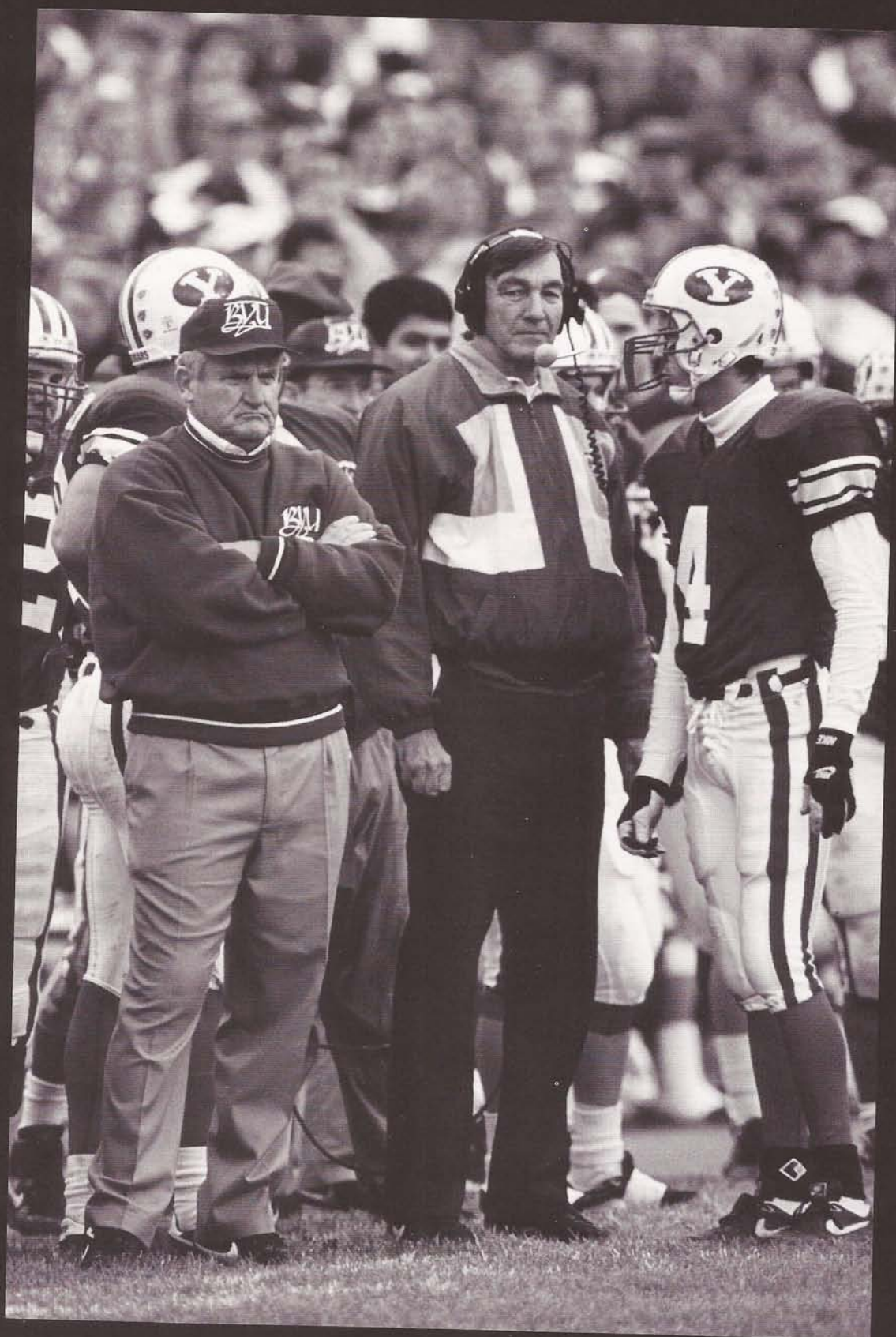

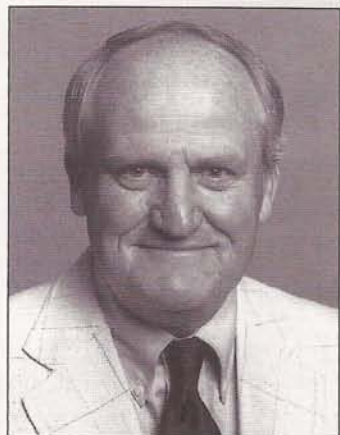

Since LaVell Edwards took over the BYU football program in 1972 the Cougars have won 214 games, captured 17 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 19 bowl games (17 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the BYU football program has risen to national prominence. Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history.

Six times in his 23 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83, '84 and '90), the 64-year-old Edwards has been selected

WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). In addition to the many coaching honors, Edwards has coached the East-West Shrine game four times, the Hula Bowl three times, the Blue-Gray Classic twice, the Japan Bowl twice and the Coaches' All-America Game.

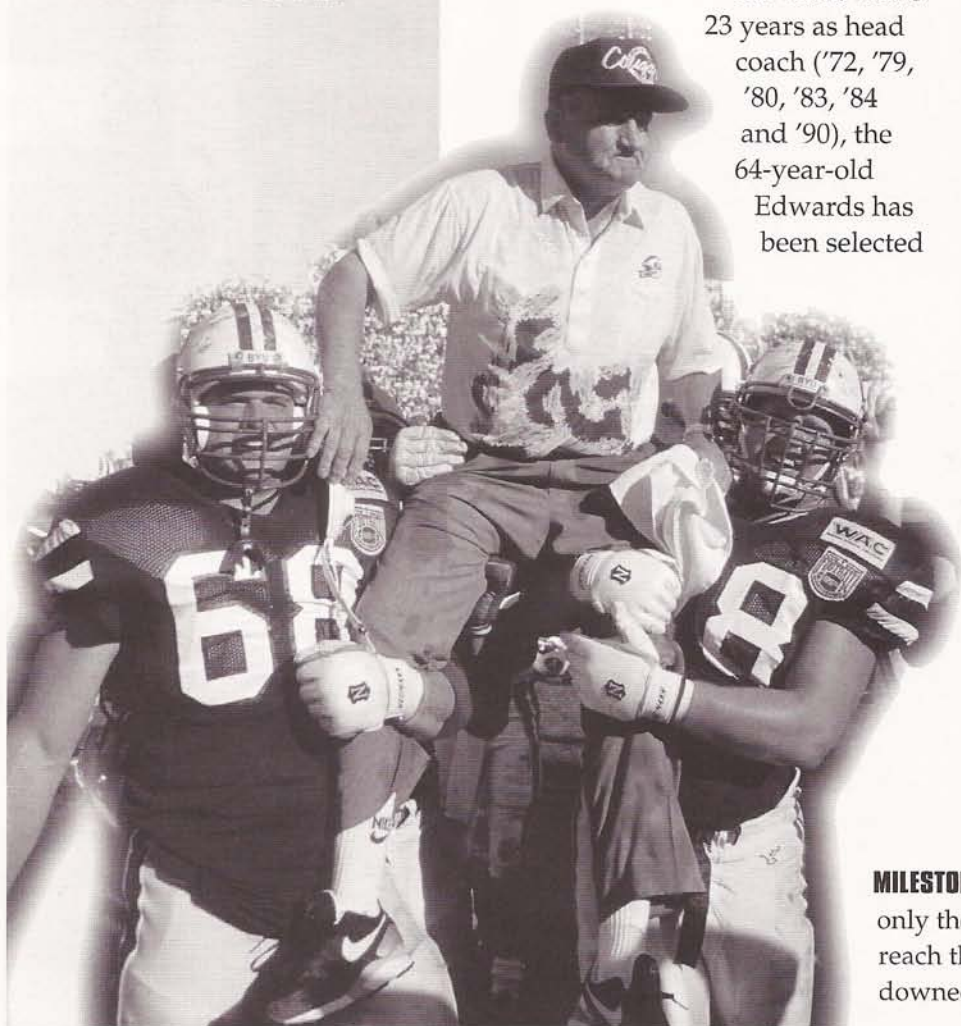
Edwards won the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington D.C., after guiding the Cougars to a national championship in 1984.

In 1988, he completed a one-year term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

Edwards received the Dale Rex Memorial Award in 1974 as the Utahn who has contributed the most to amateur athletics in the state and he has also been Utah's Sportsman of the Year. In 1993, Edwards was named to Utah State's All-Century Team.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a husband, father, grandfather, church leader, author,

teacher and doctor of education.

His 214 victories rank fourth among the nation's active college coaches. Under Edwards, BYU averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, he passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Edwards was born Oct. 11, 1930 in Provo. He was an all-state football player at Lincoln High in nearby Orem, Utah in 1946 and 1947. Edward's football ambitions took him to Utah State where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the team as a center and linebacker. He earned all-league honors as a center in 1950 and 1951.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey from Big Piney, Wyo. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service teams: Fort Lee, Va. in 1952, and Fort Mead, Md. in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

Edwards became head coach at Granite High in Salt Lake City where he coached from 1954-61 before joining the BYU staff in

1962. Ten years later he was named Tommy Hudspeth's successor as head coach.

The football philosophy practiced by Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79, '80, '81).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah in 1960 and an Ed.D. from BYU in 1978.

His wife, Patti, completed her degree in American Studies at BYU in 1994 and has written sports columns for the Provo Daily Herald. They have three married children: Ann E. Cannon (Salt Lake City), a writer; John (Bountiful, Utah), a doctor; and Jim (Henderson, Nevada), a lawyer. They have 12 grandchildren.

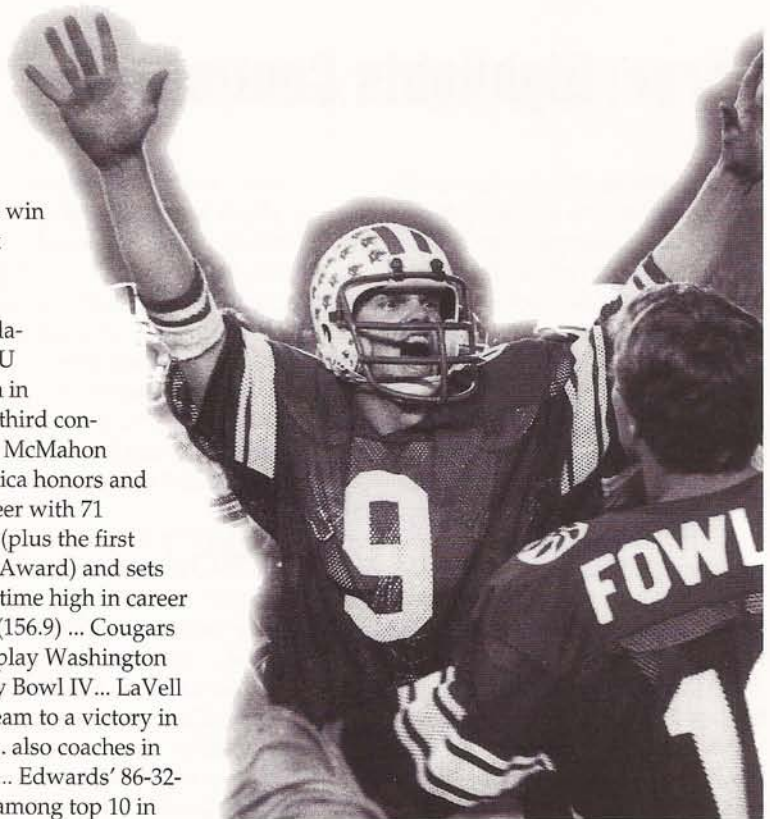

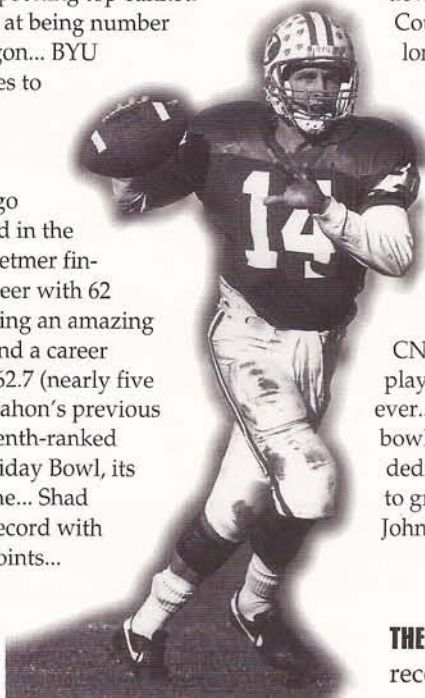


NUMERO UNO: Edwards is named 1984 coach of the year by most organizations after guiding BYU to its first National Championship in football.

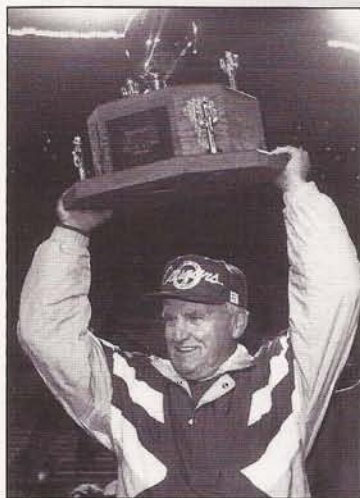

In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10 NCAA records and was a second team All-America.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and has a master's degree in physical education.

Bosco and his wife Karen Holt have five children. He was inducted into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame in June 1995.

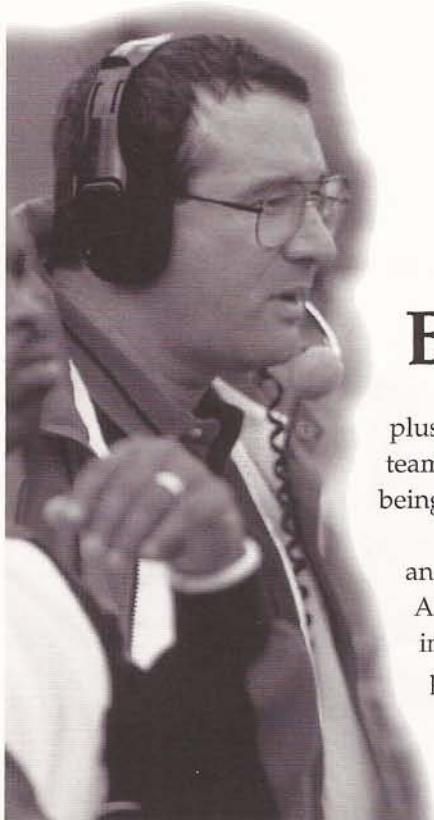
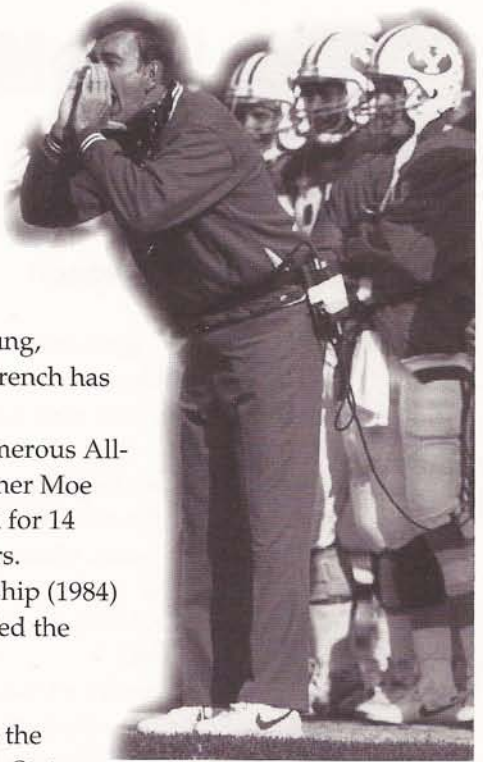

During the past 15 years of Jim McMahon, Steve Young, Robbie Bosco, Ty Detmer and John Walsh, Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense as the offensive coordinator.

French, 59, joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi. Before coming to BYU, French coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included the offensive line and receivers.

Since French came to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set an NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing eight times and total offense three times.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota, graduating in 1958. He obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. 3rd Season



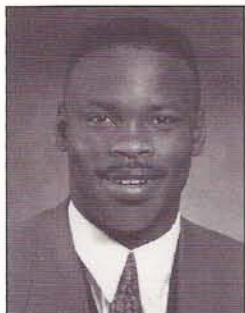
Barry Lamb joined the BYU staff in 1994 and works with the safeties, nickel and dime positions.

Mitchell was born in Indianapolis and raised in Texas. He and his wife, Carri, have two daughters.



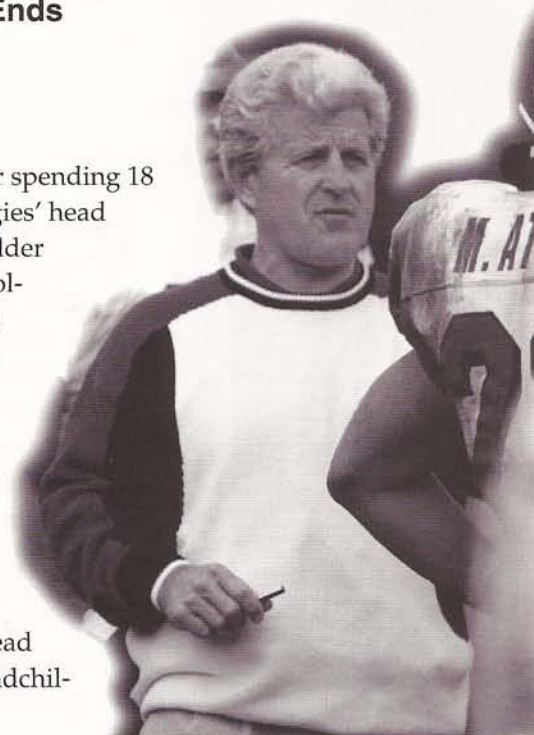
Chris Pella

Tom Ramage, 60, joined the BYU staff 22 years ago after coaching high school, junior college and at a four-year school. Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in rushing defense.

He came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, winning All-Skyline and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he was an assistant four years and obtained his M.S. degree (1962).

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Ramage has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

15th Season**

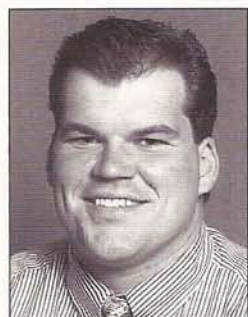

2nd Season**

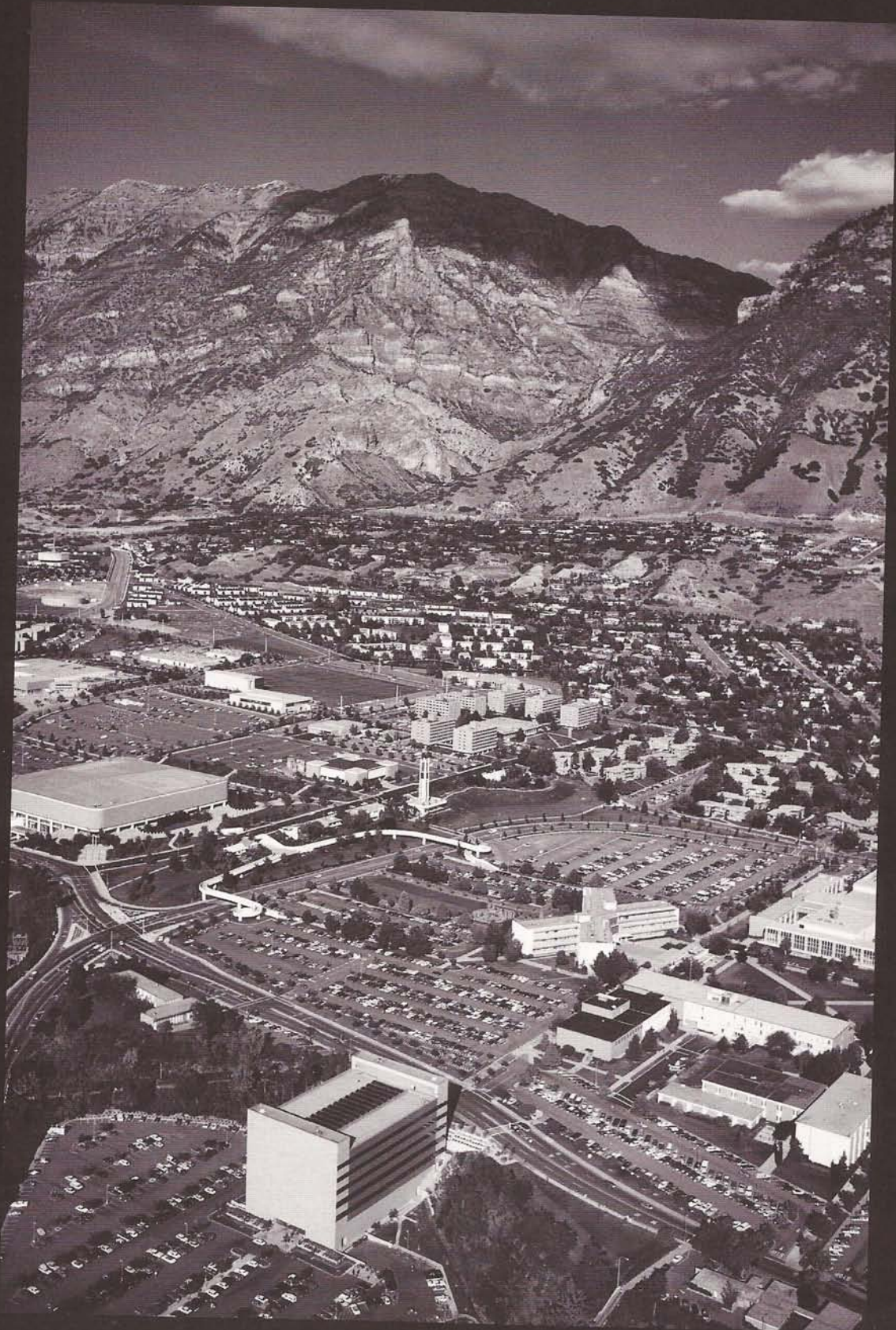
Nathan Gibbs, 25, enters his second season as a coach after lettering three years on the offensive line.

Brigham Young University, founded in 1875, is a private church-sponsored institution that has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly as the Brigham Young Academy with an enrollment of 29 elementary school students. Sponsored by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, BYU is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with an enrollment of 28,249 full-time students, making it the nation's largest private university.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as 78 percent of the 1,460 faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 educational, business, professional and government organizations.

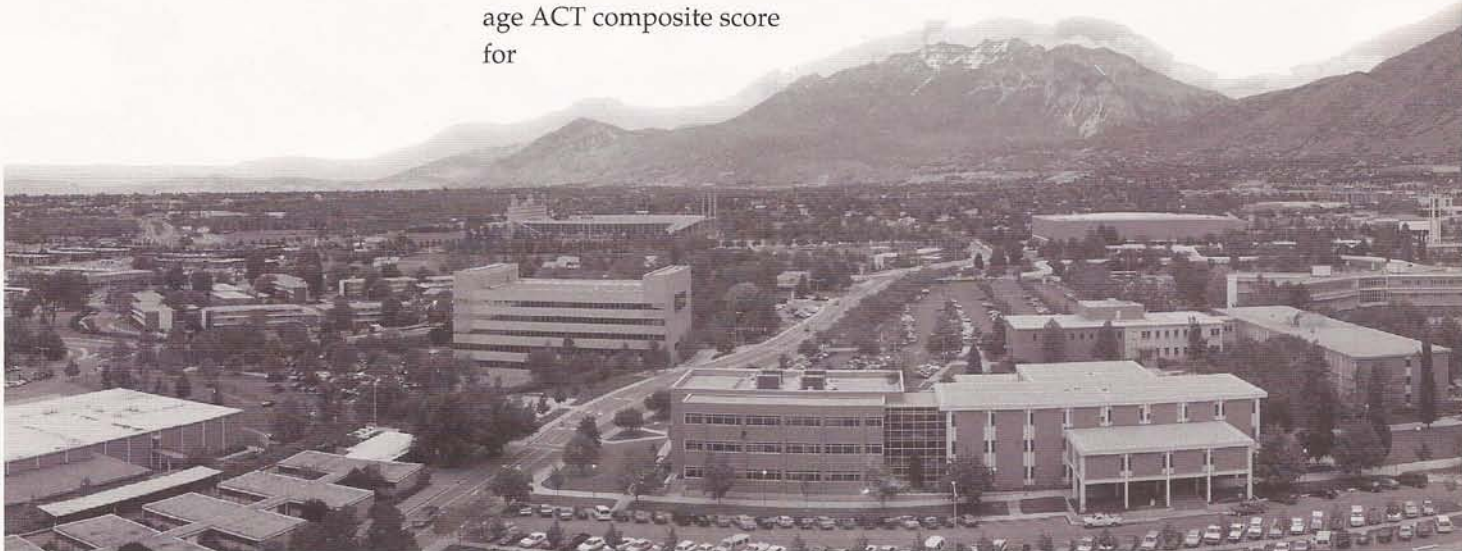
Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for

entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. BYU is ranked 10th in the nation for the number of National Merit Scholars in attendance.

BYU offers bachelor's degrees in 166 academic programs, master's degrees in 71, and doctorates in 33. Courses are available from 60 departments in 11 colleges, two areas of general undergraduate education, two professional schools, and graduate studies.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the Marriott School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program, BYU's computer-aided design/computer-aided

manufacturing program, and BYU's engineering programs.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcast Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new Museum of Art was recently completed.

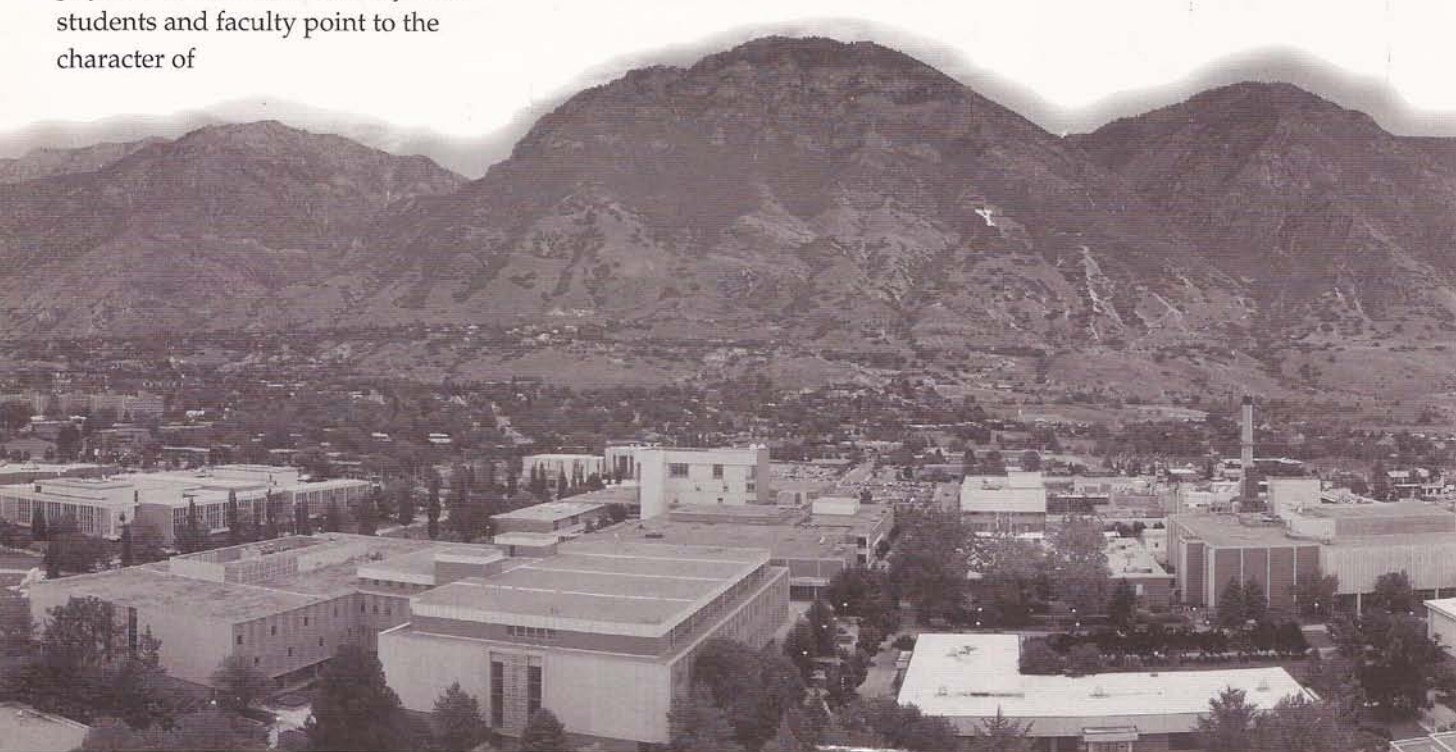
Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of

its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, many having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church.

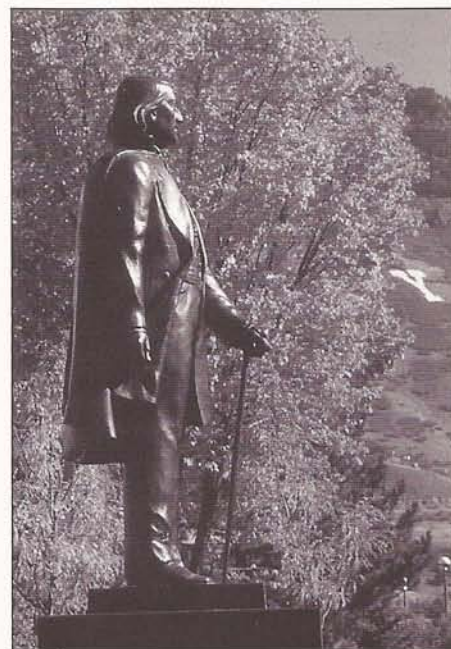
When Brigham Young Academy was established on October 16, 1875, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God.

The academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903. BYU is now a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its name-

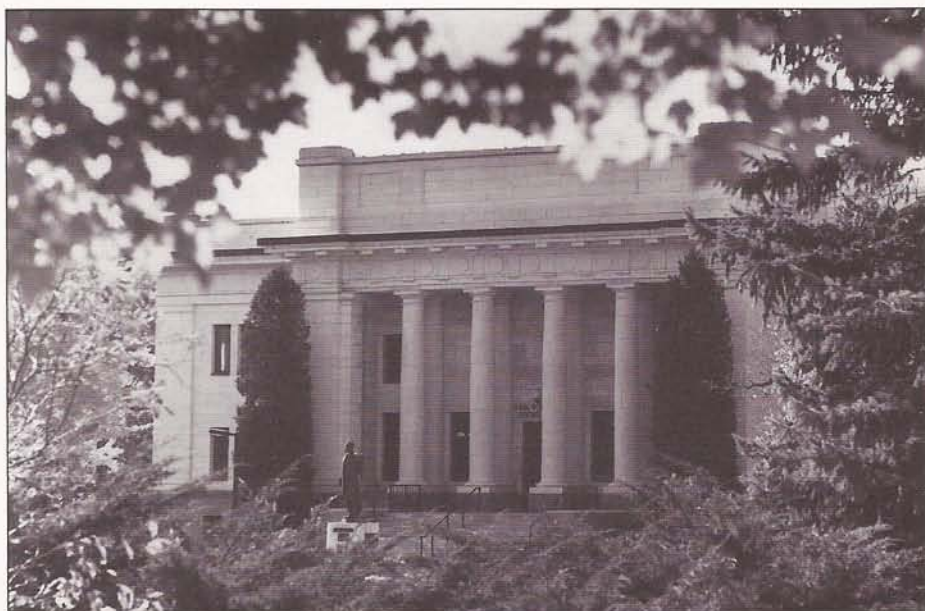
sake.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 98,000 in a valley of 303,000, and is



situated 4,560 feet above sea level.

The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos north of the campus and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

Two of Utah County's mountain

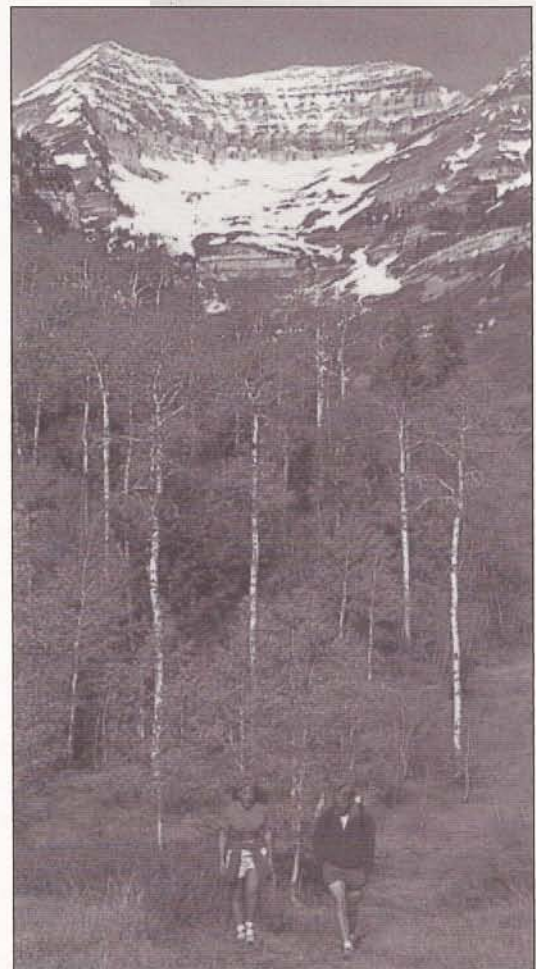

Central Location

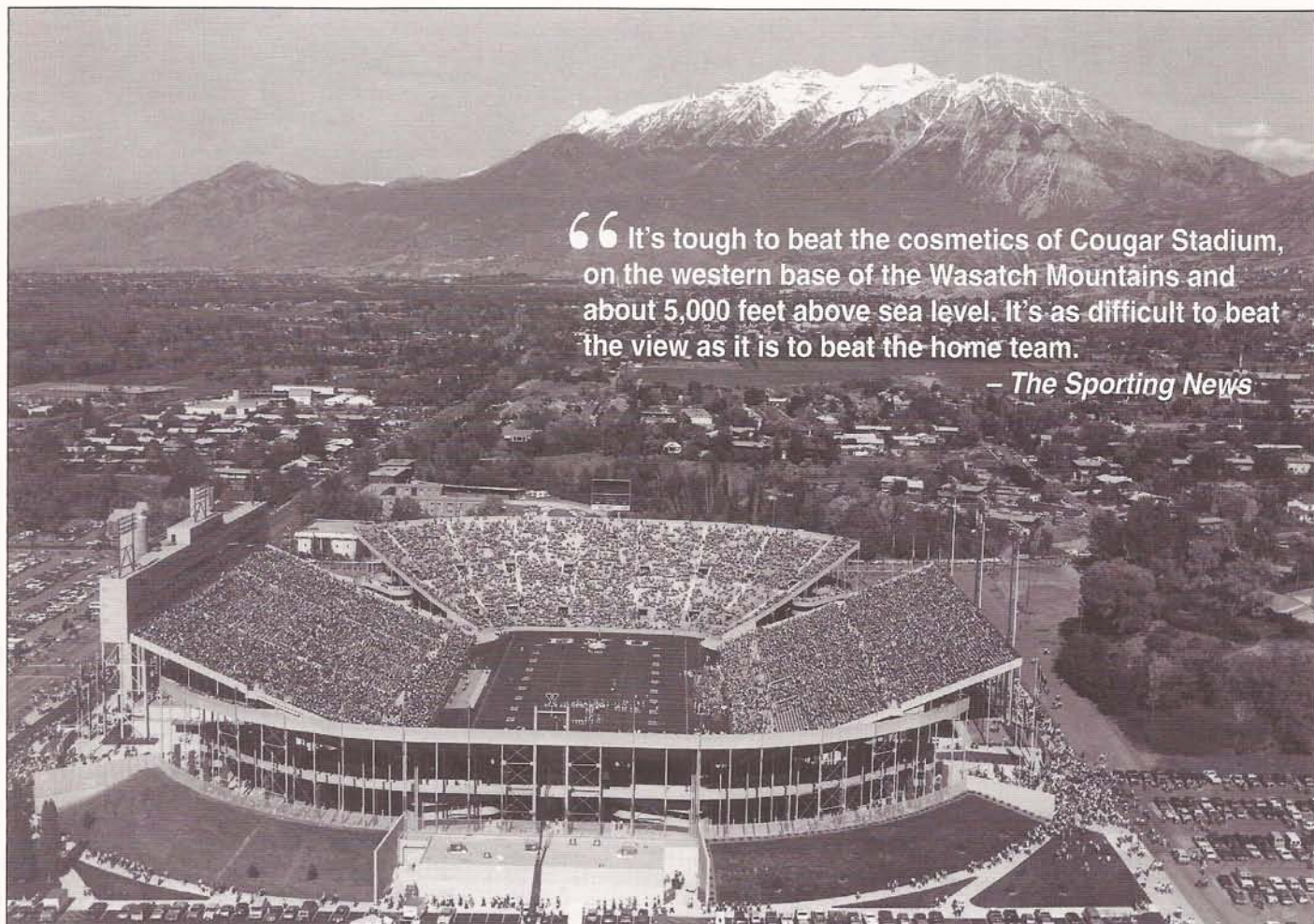

When BYU launched its football program at the turn of the century, pasture lands and city parks were used for football playing fields. Now, the 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium is home to BYU football, and since its expansion in 1982, ranks consistently among the nation’s top-25 in attendance every year.

New to the south end zone of Cougar Stadium this year is a 23 x 31 foot video wall that will show instant replays during football games. A new 17 x 25 animation board and sound system will be located above the north stands.

Fan support at home has enabled BYU to schedule home and away contests with the likes of Notre Dame, Penn State and UCLA. Since the

expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the finest football facilities in the country.

Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a grass playing surface deemed one of the best in the country and a four-level press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers of America cited BYU for its “Outstanding Press Box Working Area.”

The press box has been nicknamed the “Provo Marriott” by the media who cover BYU football. It runs the entire length of the west stands, rising more than 10 stories high. It also contains 42 loges which each seat up to 12 people, on the first two levels.

“Almost anyone that goes in for

the first time will say that it is the finest press box they've ever seen," said BYU's electronic media director Jay Monsen.

"I've been to places like USC, Nebraska and Oregon and I haven't seen anything that compares," said promotions director Dave Champlin.

The third level is reserved for working media and the fourth level is for television coverage and game filming. Press box access is aided by three elevators standing 144 feet (approximately 14 stories).

BYU's first stadium was a 10,000-seat hillside facility where the Richards Building now stands. A 30,000-seat stadium at the present location opened in 1964 but as many as 47,000 crammed into the stands and the grassy hill above the north end-zone. Interest in BYU football grew more and more with each year and each WAC championship. In the year before its expansion, the 35,000-seat Cougar stadium averaged over 40,000 a game in attendance.

Expansion included lowering the field eight feet, taking out the track (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships), adding end zone seating and

box seats along the west stands. Over 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort, which is enough to build a sidewalk from BYU to the University of Utah and then some.

Each end zone structure contains 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats 15,000 people. Concession and areas are on the ground level under the end zone seats.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing of two inches of rain per hour. Under the grass, there are six inches of gravel and 12 inches of sand mixed with loam and the sod. An automatic sensor system regulates the moisture content of the field by turning on sprinklers when they are needed. A light snow can be washed off the field via the sprinkling system.

Besides fall and spring football, the stadium is used for the July 4th Spectacular — Stadium of Fire — part of America's Freedom Festival.

The stadium houses the Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room, which is

used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets during the year.

In addition to office areas, the stadium has a great deal of storage space, including one of North America's largest Jurassic dinosaur collections.

From Humble Beginnings

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has built a legacy of success.

In 1991, *USA TODAY* ranked the BYU men's sports program 18th in the nation and the women's sports program ninth. In 1994, the first annual Sears Directors Cup sponsored by *USA TODAY* and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics placed BYU's sports programs at 22nd in the nation. The 1995 fall standings for the Cup found BYU ranked No. 15.

The University sponsors 20 NCAA-sanctioned varsity sports and captured men's national championships in football (1984), outdoor track (1970), and golf (1981). Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top 20 several times — reaching the Elite Eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981.

In 1995-96 BYU had four teams finish their respective seasons ranked among the nation's top 10 (men's and women's cross country, women's tennis and women's gymnastics), and three other teams ranked in the top 20 (women's volleyball, women's indoor track and men's gymnastics).

Since the inception of the Western Athletic Conference in

July 1962, BYU has won more championships than any other member. In fact, during the last three decades, the Cougars have won 60 percent of the WAC championships. Included in these team titles are 10 consecutive football championships from 1976 through 1985. BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

In addition, three former Cougar athletes walked away with four medals during the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, with Frank Fredericks capturing silver medals in the 100 and 200 meter runs, the late Oluyemi Kayode winning a silver medal in the 4x 100 relay, and Christy Opara Thompson receiving a bronze in the 4x 100 relays.

Like every success story, the tradition of winning at BYU had a slow start and a humble beginnings.

The Early Years

A chronicle of the late 1890s recorded the first intercollegiate event on campus. It was a two-sport meeting between Brigham Young Academy and Utah on May 18, 1895 in Provo. There was track in the morning and a baseball game in the afternoon. The locals fared very well in track and field. However, the baseball game ended in a tie when a protested call climaxed into a wild fistfight.

In a time period when the school leaders were fighting to keep the doors open at the University it became difficult to support physical contests that could lead to inflamed feelings, surly language, and possible bodily injury. In the year following the fight in Provo, the Academy's football team engaged Utah in a contest in Salt Lake City where a vicious fight erupted between the rival fans, and it didn't end until a squad of policemen arrived. Final score: BYU 8, Utah 6.

Because of in-state fatalities from football, Karl G. Maeser, then superintendent of church schools, voted for a suspension of the game, which remained in effect until 1922. In 1921, a year before football returned to BYU, the following was printed in the *Banyan*: "Next year the varsity football begins. . . . The red-blooded action demanded by the game has aroused our ambitions. Football has come to stay."

It may have taken longer than expected—like 40 or 50 years—but the Cougars finally reached that plateau. But the longer the haul, the sharper the appreciation. And it was a long haul.

In the first year of "the return" in 1922, the Cougars played six games, scored a total of 10 points for the season, and were shut out in four contests. But things would improve.

The first athlete to bring national and international attention to the school was Alma Richards, a slender,

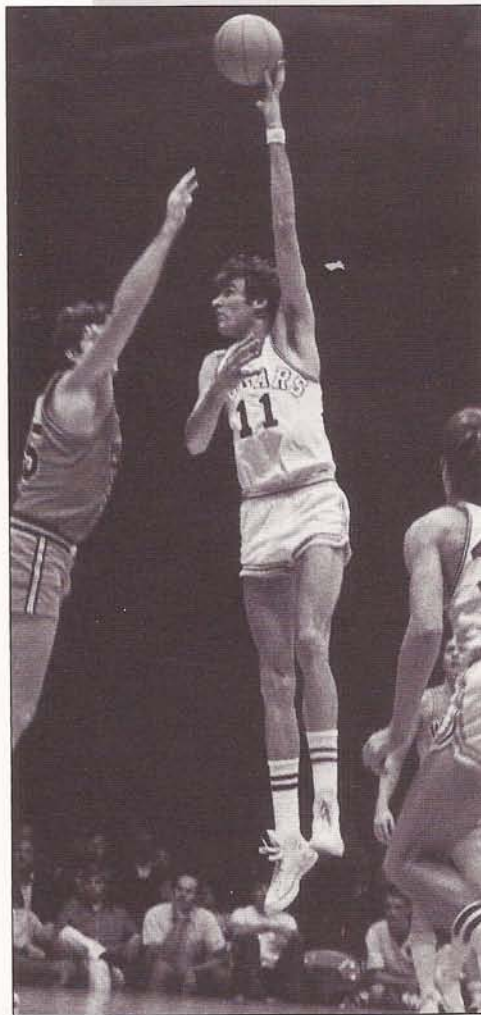
all-around athlete from Parowan, Utah. A high jumper and track athlete, Richards captured a gold medal in the Summer Olympics at Stockholm, Sweden, in 1912. Indeed, Richards was an athlete of such quality that he was favorably compared with legendary Jim Thorpe, who won a gold medal in the decathlon at Stockholm. A few years later at the World's Fair in San Francisco, Alma won the decathlon with 1,000 more points than Thorpe had scored at Stockholm.

That same year another BYU athlete, Clint Larsen, high jumped 6-7, a mark that surpassed the world record. Both Richards and Larsen were coached by the legendary E.L. Roberts, who coached every competitive men's sport at BYU.

Basketball Takes Center Stage

Another coach who made a tremendous impact on BYU athletics was Stan Watts. Watts took over an improving basketball program in 1948 and with the help of players like Joe Richey, Harold Christensen, Dean Larsen, Terry Tebbs, Tom Steinke, John Fairchild, and Kresimir Cosic, he would win eight conference titles, two NIT championships, and escort the team on three major tours abroad. He coached from 1948-72 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. in 1986.

Led by Watts and 6'0 forward Roland Minson, the Cougars defeated St. Louis, Seton Hall and Dayton for the 1951 NIT Championship. At that time winning the NIT was like winning the NCAA tournament today. By winning the championship, BYU was forever put on the map and received a

lot of attention in the national media. One newspaper account read that the

Cougars had "stolen away the hearts of the [Madison Square] Garden fans with their fight, sportsmanship and clean play."

Fifteen years later in 1966 BYU returned again to Madison Square Garden under

Watts and claimed its second NIT title. For many fans these were the real "glory days" of basketball. But there was more to come.

BYU outgrew the 10,000-seat George Albert Smith Fieldhouse, and in 1971, the Cougars moved into the Marriott Center, the largest on-campus facility in the nation at the time. With a capacity of 23,000, there was some concern about filling the new arena. In the

first year it was open, the Cougars posted a 12-0 record at home and averaged 21,818 fans per game. The stars of the '70s, '80s, and early '90s included Cosic (All-American his senior year), Danny Ainge

(winner of the Eastman and Wooden Awards as college basketball's top player, who also led BYU to the Elite Eight in the NCAA tournament), Devin Durrant, Michael Smith, Andy Toolson, Fred Roberts, Greg Kite, Steve Trumbo and Shawn Bradley.

Football Comes of Age

It was Virgil Carter in the 1960's who helped bring BYU football into the national spotlight. Behind the leadership of Carter and coach Tommy Hudspeth the Cougars won the school's first ever WAC championship in 1965. The next year Carter was selected as an All-American and became the first of a long line of outstanding quarterbacks at BYU.

The real coming of age for BYU football began in 1972 when LaVell Edwards became head coach. The quiet man from neighboring Orem, who, as a kid, used to dream of coaching while watching BYU practice, built a football dynasty that has become one of the most successful college football programs in the last 20 years.

In the 24 years he has guided BYU, the Cougars have won outright or shared 17 WAC Championships. They have made 19 bowl appearances—17 of them consecutively—a national championship, and awards too numerous to mention. The team's passing game is regarded as the best and most consistent in college, almost to the point of being an art form. Edwards and his pass-happy offense have produced numerous All-Americans and a Heisman Trophy winner.

Football fans in Provo will forever remember BYU's national championship year. In 1984 Edwards and his Cougars went 13-0 posting wins over Pittsburgh, Baylor, Air Force and Michigan in the Holiday Bowl. BYU had 13 opportunities to lose that year, but came away victors each time.

On January 3, 1985, BYU was voted as the top college football team in the nation in both the AP and UPI polls. This mountainous climb to the top typified BYU's winning attitude and laid the foundation of success for decades to come.

True Blue **BYU**

BYU football began on April 6, 1896 — 100 years ago. Today, spirited Cougar fans nationwide continue their strong support of the mighty blue and white. BYU consistently ranks nationally in the top 25 in football and basketball attendance and has one of the nation's premier booster organizations — The Cougar Club.

"Y" Mountain

The most visible symbol of BYU spirit is found high in the mountains east of Brigham Young University. The enormous block letter "Y" measures 465 feet high and is acclaimed as the largest sign in the country — larger than the letters spelling "HOLLYWOOD," and any neon sign on Times Square.

The 32,847 square foot structure dates back to 1906 when a drafting professor and several students made plans to put a large block BYU on the mountain. The student body formed an assembly line passing sand, rocks and lime up the side of the mountain for an entire day. The task became arduous and the idea of putting a "B" and "U" on either side of the "Y" was abandoned.

For decades the "Y" was whitewashed annually by students to show school spirit. In 1978, the face of the Y was coated with gunite, a mixture of sand and white cement, and is painted with 155 gallons of paint, which is transported by helicopter.

In 1924 BYU began lighting the "Y" during homecoming, graduation and other special events. The "Y" is now lit by 1,000 25-watt bulbs and a generator.

Cosmo the Cougar

Another generator of BYU spirit is BYU's mascot, Cosmo the Cougar. Cosmo's story begins on October 1, 1923 when Coach Eugene L. Roberts used the cougar to describe his athletes. At that time the cougar, a native Utah animal, was looked upon very favorably because of its powerful, agile and wise nature.

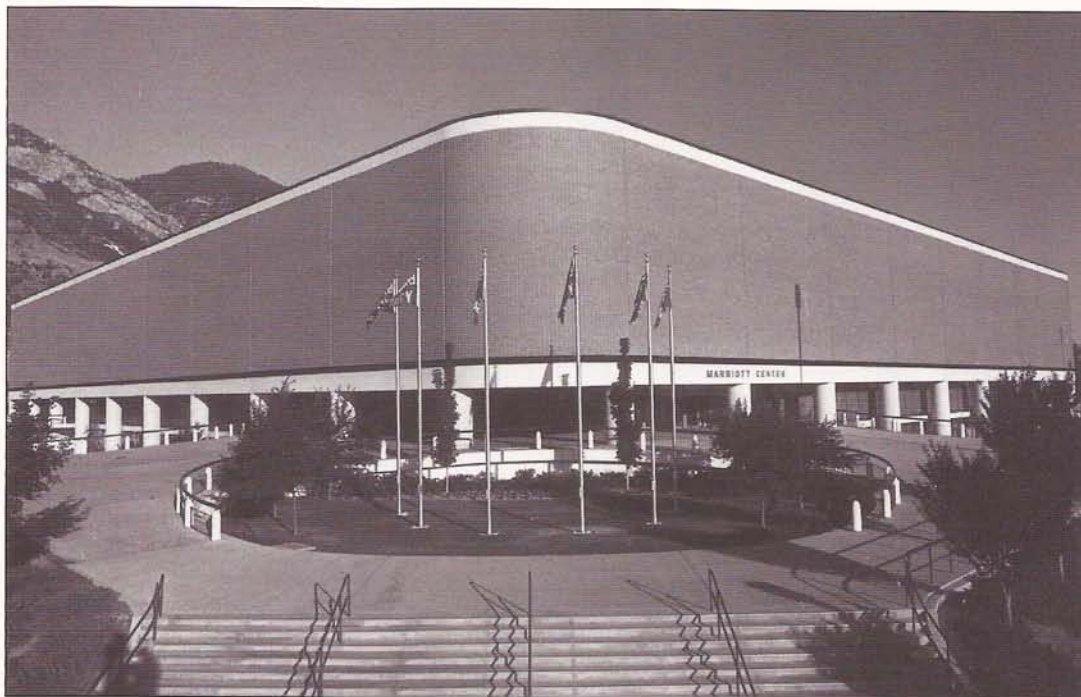
In 1925 a BYU alumnus contacted Coach Roberts informing him of a mother cougar and three kittens that had been captured. Two of these kittens were brought to Provo and kept as mascots. Soon problems resulted from keeping live cougars for mascots, so in 1953 pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson came up with a new version of the cougar mascot. Cosmo had arrived at BYU, and the acrobatic and high-spirited animal has helped cheer the Cougars to victory ever since.



Y SPIRIT: The block Y (bottom left) overlooks the campus at BYU, while Cosmo (below) leads the cheers at a home football game.



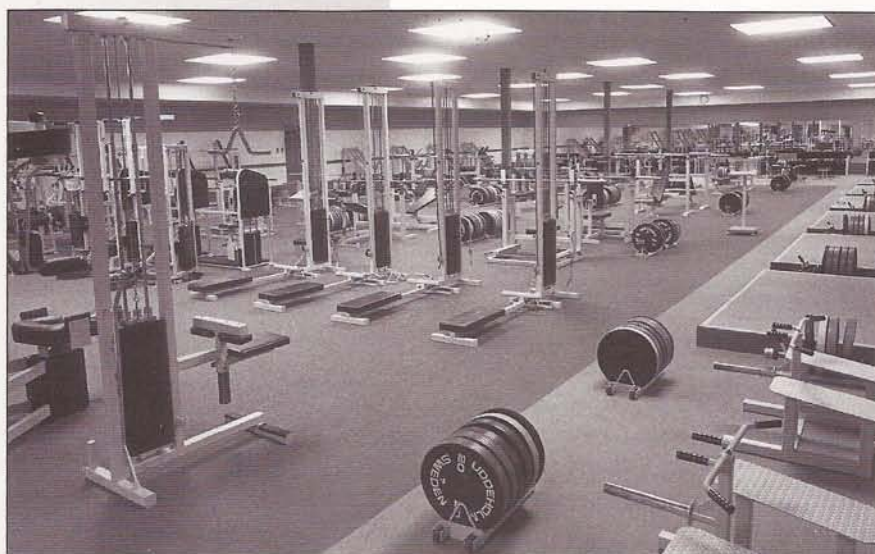

Much of the success of the BYU Athletic program can be attributed to the top-notch facilities available to athletes on campus.

Success begins with training and BYU has a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning center with nearly 10,000 feet of working space that ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations to accommodate both female and male athletes.



The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Broadcasters and sports writers from around the country are inevitably impressed with the magnificent view of Mt. Timpanogos and the Wasatch Mountain Range that can be seen from the stadium press box. New to the south end zone of Cougar Stadium this year is a 23 x 31 foot video wall that shows instant replays during football games.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, one of the largest on-campus basketball arenas in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

The baseball field and the outdoor track facilities are also rated among the nation's finest. BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. A compact design allows spectators to watch both running and field events at the same time. The NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships were held at BYU in 1982 and 1989.

Located just east of the track stadium is the BYU baseball diamond with a seating capacity of up to 4,000.

A \$3.5 million expansion to the team's locker room and athletic training facilities in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was finished in March of 1996. The Smith

Helping BYU Athletes Succeed

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office at BYU was established to provide the student-athlete with solid academic counsel which will help each athlete complete an education while participating in intercollegiate athletics.

The single most important goal of this office is to ensure student-athletes who leave BYU after four or more years complete a baccalaureate degree in their chosen field of study.

To achieve this goal, the Athletics Academic Advisement Office provides a comprehensive support service program which enables the student-athlete to make

use of all the resources at the University and to make academic progress towards graduation.

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office personnel stress to student-athletes the importance of taking advantage of athletic scholarships by educating themselves and setting the stage for their life's work.

The role of the advisor includes close monitoring of academic problems, instituting and organizing educational programs, and coordi-



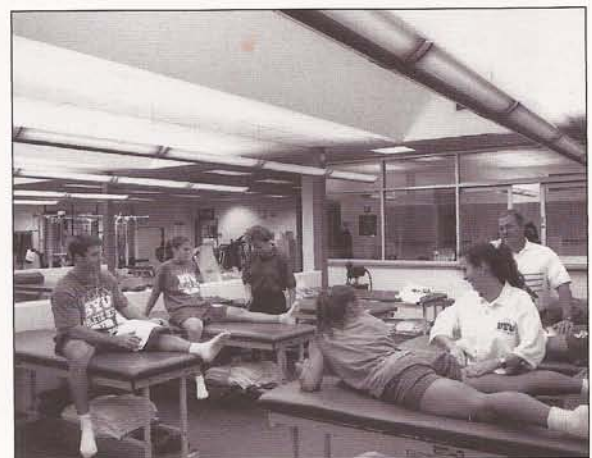
SUCCESS: Athletic Academic Advisors gather with some of the 85 student-athletes who received diplomas during the 1995-96 academic year.

nating support services with other academic and non-academic units to help in the retention and academic success of the student athlete.



Fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport and includes a one-fifth mile rubberized track that surrounds three basketball courts and an artificial turf practice area.

If injuries occur, athletes are provided with excellent sports medicine facilities and a large staff of professional and student trainers. A well-equipped computer lab, study hall and academic advisement center are available for student athletes to aid in their studies.



university president

Merrill J. Bateman



President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, officially began his duties on January 1, 1996.

Bateman, currently a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, succeeded President Rex E. Lee, who served as president for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described President Bateman as, "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."

Prior to assuming the presidency of BYU, President Bateman was the Presiding Bishop of the LDS church.

Bateman brings a strong back-

ground of administrative and academic experience to his new position. Before receiving his call to be a General Authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc., in England and the United States (1971-1975).

Born in Lehi, Utah and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, 1960-61, and a Danforth Fellow, 1960-64.

Early in his career, President Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964-67) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967-71). He was also a lecturer in economics at the University of Ghana in 1963.

President Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high councilor, stake president and regional representative. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

He is married to Marilyn Scholes Bateman and they are the parents of seven children; four boys and three girls. They also have 20 grandchildren.

R.J. Snow



Advancement Vice President

Dr. R.J. Snow, who is responsible for intercollegiate athletics, enters his third year as Advancement Vice President for Brigham Young University after a four-year term as Student Life Vice President.

Dr. Snow came to BYU in 1990 from Johannesburg, South Africa, where he was the mission president for three years. Before his mission call, Dr. Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984-87. He previously had been Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs at the University of Utah for more than a decade.

He also served as Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Dr. Snow moved to Washington, D.C. at age 13 and attended junior high and high school there, returning to Utah to attend Dixie College, receiving

an A.S. degree in 1957.

He served a mission in France and then enrolled at Utah, where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Dr. Snow continued his graduate education at Northwestern, where he completed master of arts (1965) and doctoral degrees (1967) in political science. He also completed post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

In 1967, Dr. Snow moved to Santa Barbara, Calif., where he was on the political science faculty at UCSB until 1973. During his tenure, he directed the University of California's Education Abroad Program for two years at the University of Bordeaux and the University of Pau in southwest France.

Dr. Snow has been very active in civic and community service, having been on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as a board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service with more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations includes board membership of the Salt Lake and Provo United Way, Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association. He was recently appointed to the *Deseret News* Board of Directors.

He married Marilyn Melville and they are the parents of four children and have one grandchild.

Rondo Fehlbberg



Athletic Director and Asst. Advancement V.P.

In his first year as athletic director, Rondo Fehlbberg has brought new energy and vision to BYU athletics.

Prior to his appointment in 1995, the former BYU All-American wrestler spent 16 years

as an attorney and executive in the oil business. Most recently, he was vice president of International New Ventures at Pennzoil with responsibilities for development and maintenance of long-term business relationships in the international business community, especially the former Soviet Union.

A native of Worland, Wyo., Fehlbberg received a B.A. degree from BYU in 1976. He served an LDS mission in Germany (1974-75) before attending BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he received a Juris Doctor degree in 1979.

While attending law school, he assisted in coaching the wrestling team. He was a three-time WAC champion and had a career record of 74-11-1, including 34 pins.

Fehlbberg is a true competitor. He compiled a 23-2 record as a senior at 150 pounds and placed fifth at the 1972 NCAA Championships. His gutsy performance earned him All-America status and helped him win BYU's Competitor Award. In 1987, he was inducted into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Three other brothers—Wayne, Reed and Paul—also wrestled for the Cougars. Reed was a 1994 inductee into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1979, Fehlbberg joined the law firm of Davis, Graham & Stubbs in Denver. In 1982 he went to work for Standard Oil of Ohio in Denver and later in Houston. Following Standard Oil's 1987 merger with British Petroleum, he moved to London for three years as part of the new management team.

Fehlbberg married Mary Bloxham of Pinedale, Wyo., and they have five sons and a daughter.

Fehlbberg was instrumental in bringing the Pigskin Classic to Provo this fall. He has also been a big boost to the recruiting efforts at BYU.

In her 34th year at the helm of BYU's women's volleyball program,

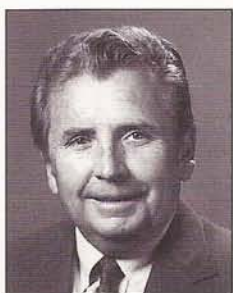

Her best finishes were second place in 1973, fourth place in 1978, and an NCAA semifinal appearance in 1993. She has taken her teams to the NCAA tournament 13 times--placing 17th twice, 9th four times, 5th four times, and 3rd once.

Michaelis earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from BYU and has the rank of full athletic professional. In 1994 she was a recipient of the Dale Rex Award given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah. She was only the second woman to ever receive the award in its 49-year history.

She has also served as director of women's intramural and extramural programs at BYU for 10 years.

Pete Witbeck



Associate Athletic Director

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU for 47 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner.

He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff. In 1957, Witbeck was named the freshman basketball coach. During the next six years, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing just

three times his last three seasons.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshman teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck has received the Dale Rex Memorial Award, given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah.

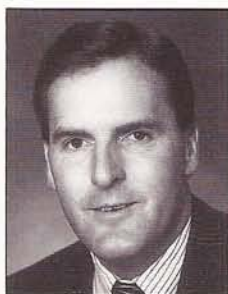

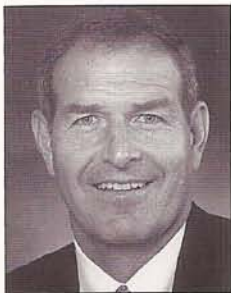
Assistant AD for Finance

President Rex E. Lee

It wasn't unusual for Rex E. Lee, as the president of BYU, to give the Cougar football team a pep talk before games. But Lee's brief speech to the Cougars before their game against Hawaii on Oct. 28, 1995 was different than the rest.

"It was probably his shortest pep talk ever, but probably his most effective," said athletic director Rondo Fehlberg.

Said Cougar coach LaVell Edwards, "It was a very special and touching moment for all of us."

What Lee said to the team that October morning was unimportant. What impressed the players and coaches was that he cared enough to be there at all. Lee had just been released after spending several days in the hospital with pneumonia.

Duly inspired, BYU played its best game of the year, downing the Rainbow Warriors 41-7 at Cougar Stadium.

"You could say we won one for the Rexer," said quarterback Steve Sarkisian following the game.

Lee, after years of battling health problems, died on March 11, 1996 at 61.

He will be remembered for many things—arguing an unprecedented 59 cases before the Supreme Court, serving more than six years as the president of the nation's largest private university, being the founding dean of BYU's J. Reuben Clark law School and being a devoted teacher, church leader and family man among countless other accomplishments.

He was also a major supporter—and fan—of BYU athletics.

"He had extraordinarily high expectations for BYU's sports teams,

but he loved, accepted and supported us unconditionally whether we met his expectations or not," said Fehlberg.

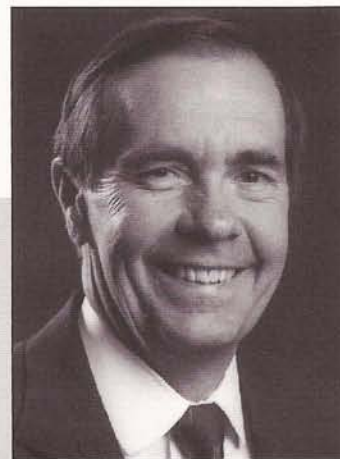
Said Edwards, "(President Lee) was actively interested in what we were doing. He was a real fan, by his own admission, of athletics and especially BYU athletics."

Despite his busy schedule and health problems, Lee would make it a point to attend BYU sports events whenever possible. He also served as the chair of a special NCAA committee to review rules enforcement and the infractions process.

"He was a brilliant man and had an enormous number of interests, but BYU athletics went beyond being just another interest to being a passion with him," said Fehlberg.

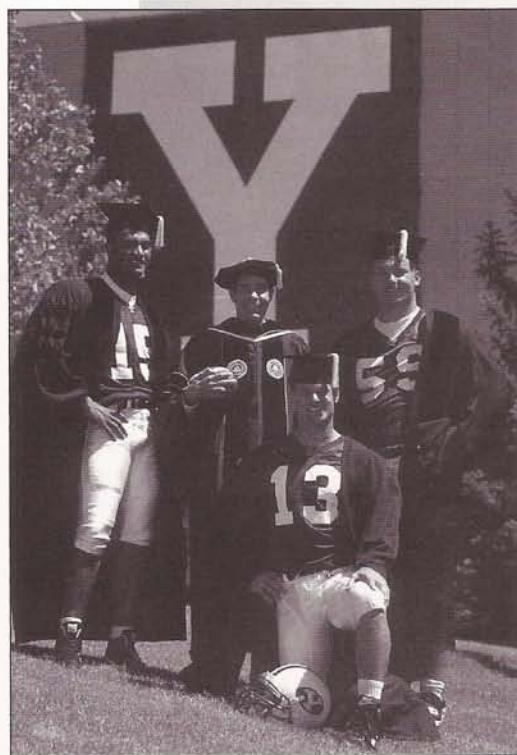
Edwards and his wife Patti's friendship with Lee and his wife Janet predated Lee's appointment as BYU's president in 1989. The two couples and other friends occasionally went on vacations together.

"He was fun to be around because he was so upbeat all the time," said Edwards. "Even with the cancer and his other health problems he always had a positive attitude. He was so bright and had so many varying interests that I could sit around for hours just listening to him."

The Cougar Club

Since 1964 the Cougar Club has been helping BYU student-athletes reach their full athletic and academic potential. With over 3,500 members nationwide, the Cougar Club is the largest support group of its kind in the Western Athletic Conference and one of the nation's premier booster organizations.

The Cougar Club annually raises funds that support recruiting for both men's and women's sports. The club also sponsors enhancement programs which make BYU's athletic department consistently one of the best in the nation.

For more than 20 years Dale McCann has been the executive director of the Cougar Club and has played a significant role in the organization's tremendous growth and stability.

Programs

The Cougar Club supports a number of important programs and scholarships that help enhance BYU athletics.

Each year the Cougar Club sponsors all of BYU's athletic recruiting, bringing some of the best athletes from across the country to Provo, Utah, and allowing BYU coaches to make national and international recruiting trips.

"The Cougar Club has been the financial support for our recruiting," said women's athletic director Elaine Michaelis. "We've been able to go and get athletes wherever we find them."

Once athletes commit to attend Brigham Young University, the club encourages each of them to achieve their athletic and scholastic potential. Funding from the Cougar Club sponsors academic tutoring for athletes and the academic advisement center. Recently, the Cougar Club also established a half million dollar endowment that provides post-eligibility scholarships for athletes.

"Right now, we have a lot of athletes whose eligibility runs out when they are 10-20 hours away from graduating, but they have no money to continue at school," McCann said. "The endowment will keep them here another semester or two to let them finish their degree. The scholarships also let players take lighter class loads while they are competing; instead of burning out or playing poorly, athletes can pick up a class or two in the spring and summer and still graduate on time. Athletes are better able to excel academically and athletically because of this program."

The Cougar Club also sponsors the Blue and White Network, which produces live satellite broadcasts of BYU sporting events nationwide, as well as local football and basketball replays and radio broadcasts of BYU baseball, basketball and volleyball.

"We are promoting BYU as a nationally recognizable program, not one just for Utah County," McCann said. "I think we've separated ourselves from other programs in Utah

because of our television. Notre Dame has a better TV network, but no one has better access to reach all of their alumni in so many ways. You can live in Kansas or Oregon or Virginia and still watch almost all of BYU's games."

Events

Annual Cougar Club events are enjoyed by club members and athletic personnel alike. Each year the club sponsors the Pigskin Family Picnic, the "Meet the Football Team" watermelon bust, the men's basketball Varsity Preview, monthly luncheons for the Salt Lake and Utah County chapters, and a reception for women athletes each September.

Those athletes who earn a 3.2 GPA or better in a calendar year are honored at the annual Athletic Awards Banquet. The Cougar Club also sponsors the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame and the Dale Rex Memorial Award.

Before each BYU home football game, club members enjoy a preview of the upcoming contest and a delicious buffet at Cougar Club Pre-game Briefings in the Cougar Room. When the Cougars play on the road, Cougar Club members enjoy discount accommodations and exciting tour packages co-sponsored by the Cougar Club and the BYU Alumni Association.

Benefits

Cougar Club membership provides priority seating for football and basketball games as well as bowl ticket priority. Members also receive a membership plaque or desk memento, a bi-weekly newsletter and other sports publications, parking passes for sporting events at Cougar Stadium and the Marriott Center, as well as special club travel opportunities. Club memberships are available at many contribution levels, starting as low as \$100 a year.

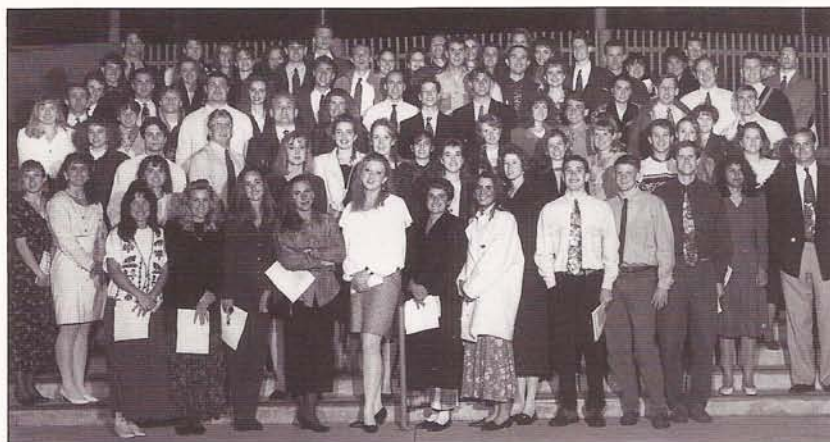
Dale R. McCann, a graduate of BYU's Marriott

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE: Last year, 67 percent of BYU's student-athletes qualified as Cougar Club Academic Athletes.

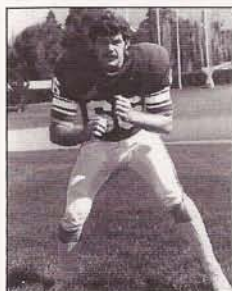

Meet The New WAC

The Western Athletic Conference enters a new era in 1996, becoming the nation's largest NCAA Division I-A conference. With the addition of UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa, WAC membership now stands at 16 institutions.

Beginning with the 1996-97 season, the WAC has adopted a divisional format for scheduling in which quadrants will be utilized to form two eight-team divisions (Pacific and Mountain) in the four primary team sports. The quadrants will rotate every year in men's and women's basketball and volleyball, and every other year in football, in order to promote a full-conference concept.

Compared to many of the nation's Division I conferences, the WAC is still in its youth. Its history traces back to 1962, when the original six-team league was created. The concept of a WAC began in 1958 when Brigham Young's Edwin Kimball, Leo Harris of Oregon and Roy S. Keen of Oregon State met During the NCAA Convention in New York to discuss the "ideal conference" because problems existed in their alignments. They believed such a conference should have eight members with approximately the same goals, ideals and resources.

Although the meeting did not result in any action, it established an idea that again was discussed two years later at the 1960 NCAA Convention in New York. There, Dick Clausen, athletic director at Arizona, and Pete McDavid, athletic director at New Mexico, organized a meeting which included representatives of

Oregon State, Oregon, Washington State, Brigham Young, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Arizona State. Glenn "Red" Jacoby of Wyoming also was to be invited to the meeting, but could not be located on short notice.

BYU's Dr. Kimball was elected the chairman of the group. Over the next two years plans were formulated as the faculty representatives and presidents became involved with the athletic directors in the deliberations.

While membership structure was debated, three of the group members — Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State — decided to re-align with the other Pacific Coast institutions, and the remaining university representatives were left to fill the openings. Although Wyoming, New Mexico State and Utah State applied, only Wyoming was accepted as the final charter member.

By the end of 1961, a working draft of a constitution, by-laws and operating code was drafted by Thomas Hall, the faculty representative at Arizona, and Paul Brechler, the WAC's first commissioner. On July 27, 1962, the conference officially was organized by the Presidents' Council when the original charter was signed, and the name WAC was adopted. Charter members were Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference; the others were members of the Skyline.

The WAC began operation with the 1962-63 academic year, and several changes have occurred since. UTEP and Colorado State became members

in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. Since that time, membership additions include San Diego State (July 1978), Hawai'i (July 1979), the United States Air Force Academy (July 1980), and Fresno State (July 1992).

Paul Brechler was the WAC commissioner from 1962-68, Wiles Hallock from 1968-71, Stan Bates from 1971-80, Dr. Joe Kearney from 1980 to 1994 and Karl Benson 1994 to the present.

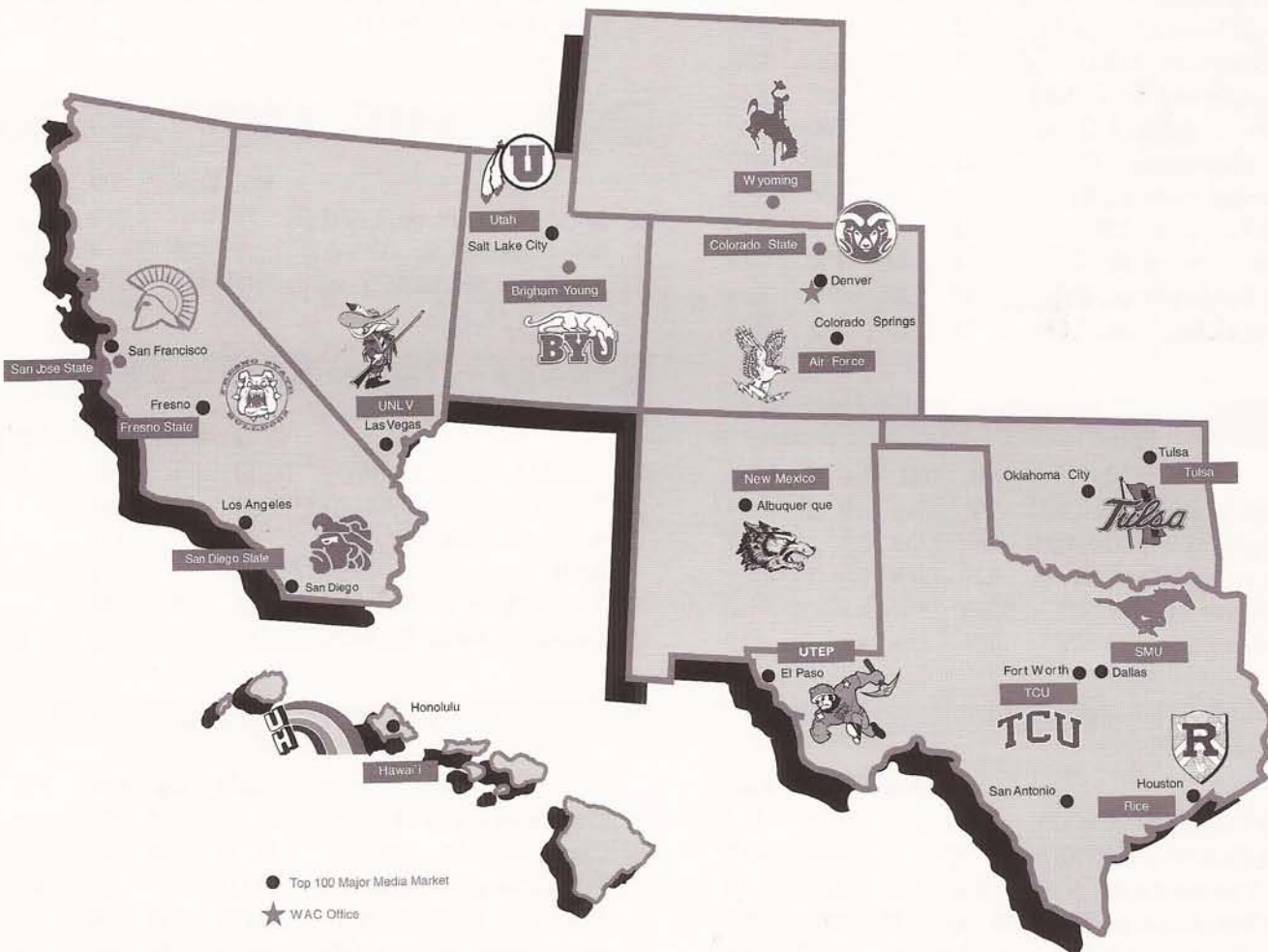
The WAC began competition with 10 sports, including football, basketball, track and field, baseball, wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and gymnastics. The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title. New

Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series, and less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy.

Presently the WAC crown team and individual champions in 21 sports-11 men's and 10 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and wrestling. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Before July 1, 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name. With the addition of Air Force and Hawai'i women's programs as well as the six new members in 1996, all of the institutions' men's and women's teams will compete in the WAC for the first time.

The WAC office has been located in the Denver area since the conference's inception with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

football history

A Historical View

At one time, having a top program—not to mention winning a national championship—seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 31 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season. It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 214 games and been to 19 bowl games (including 17 in a row). Seventeen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-1985.

Coach Edwards has led his team to a national championship (1984), has been national coach of the year, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and coached two Outland Trophy winners in the past 15 years. Things weren't always so rosy, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU consistently finds itself among the national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU in 1896, but was discontinued because of the administration's concern over the violent nature of the sport. The game returned to campus in 1922, and since then BYU has played 70 seasons

(minus three seasons during World War II). BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. Virgil Carter (1966), Gary Sheide (1974), Gifford Nielsen (1976), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Robbie Bosco (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. And Ty Detmer (1988-91) finished his incredible career by throwing for 15,031 yards—the first player ever to go over 12,000 yards passing.

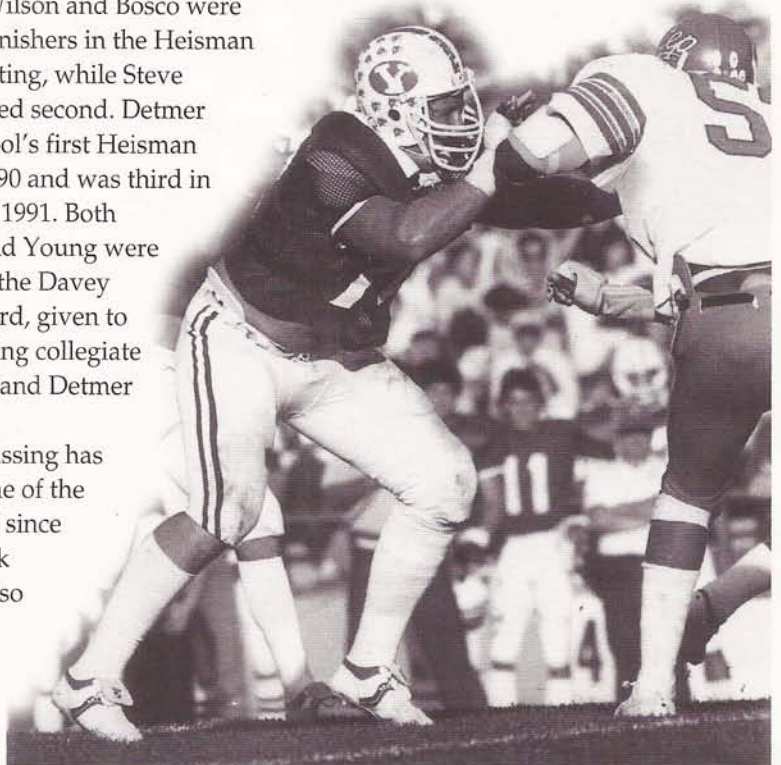
Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco and Detmer were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also

have been some impressive running backs. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62) won All-American honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71) led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did such a good job catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading rusher in 1994 and is currently with the San Francisco 49ers.

Eric Drage (1990-93) became the receiving leader three years ago, breaking yardage and touchdown receiving records set by Phil Odle (1965-67).

TO EYRE IS HUMAN: In 1981, Offensive lineman Nick Eyre became the second Cougar to be named a consensus All-American.



A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82), Trevor Matich (1979-84) and Evan Pilgrim (1992-94).

BYU has also had a bevy of talent

at tight end; most recently Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), and Chris Smith (1987-90).

Top Defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84), Leon White (1982-85), Kurt Gouveia (1983-85), Jason Buck (1985-86) the recipient of the 1986 Outland Trophy and Derwin Gray (1989-92).

At various times in the past 30 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set and NCAA record for most punt returns. And James Dye (1995) led the nation in punt returns with a 21.9 average.

1984 National Champions

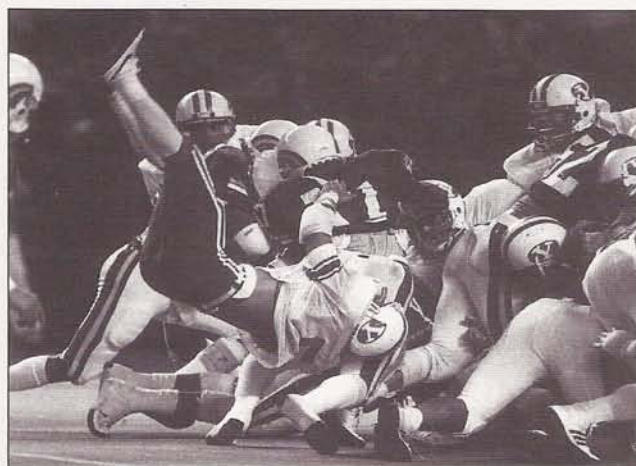
Gold national championship rings adorn the finger of each Cougar on the 1984 BYU team for posting a perfect 13-0 season.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today, and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and visited President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal line stand (see photo) at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With the TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned, taped to play shotgun in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a number one team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to the gimp-kneed offensive lineman Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah when



Nebraska lost to Oklahoma and Navy upset unbeaten, second-ranked South Carolina.

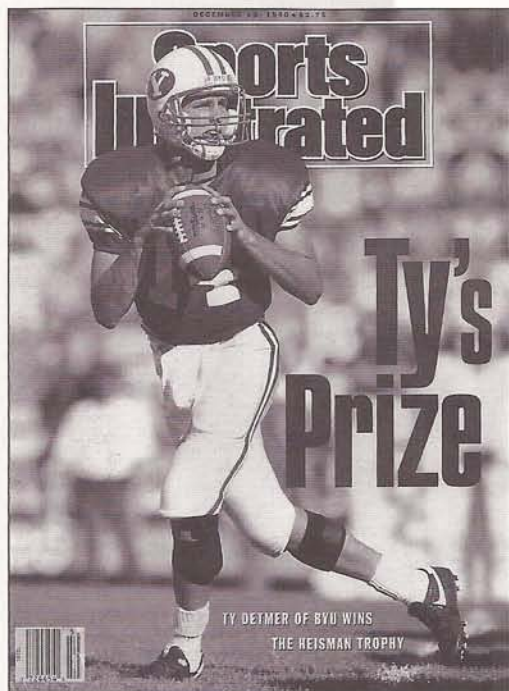
The Cougars rose from unranked to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU, 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a number one vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule, like Oklahoma's Barry Switzer and NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell.

Fifteen players off that BYU team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the number-one spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawai'i.

Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor is awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1 ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Tex., guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record from 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points ahead of Notre Dame's Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Ty finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players,

like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU.

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of the Football Stadium.

Outland Trophy Winners

BYU is one of 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270, senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, had 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in

the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

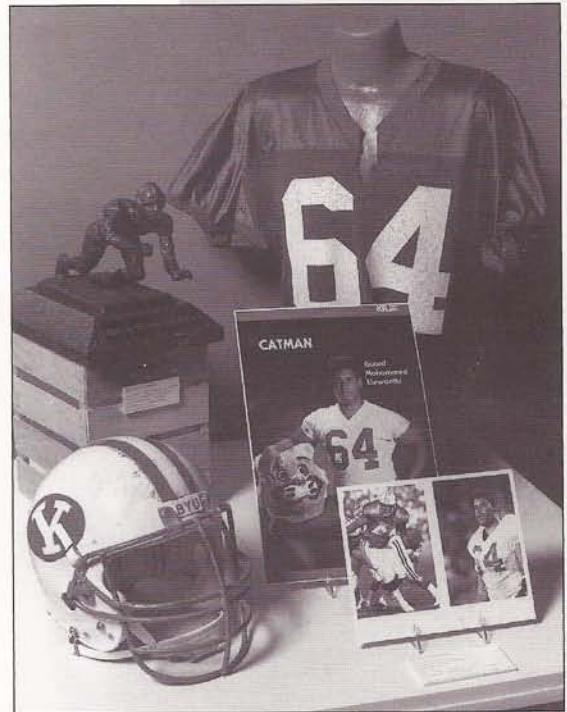
"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland trophy was a dream come true."

Mount Mohammed, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school at Snow Junior College. "Mo" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

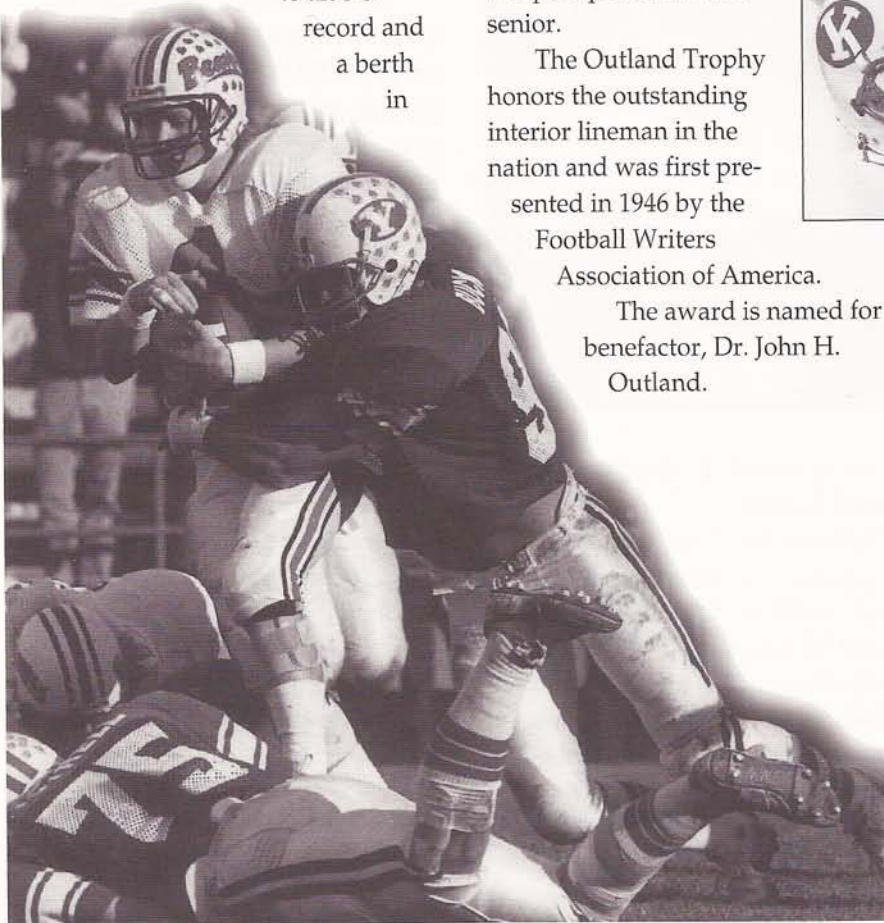
The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers

Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

Just A Passing Fancy

Manufacturing plants across the world work hard to produce products that please the customer and succeed in the market. At BYU, the product is quarterbacks, and they have been entertaining Cougar football fans for over 20 years.

Ever since Gary Sheide in 1973, BYU and head coach LaVell Edwards have been producing an assembly line of outstanding quarterbacks in Provo that have earned unprecedented suc-

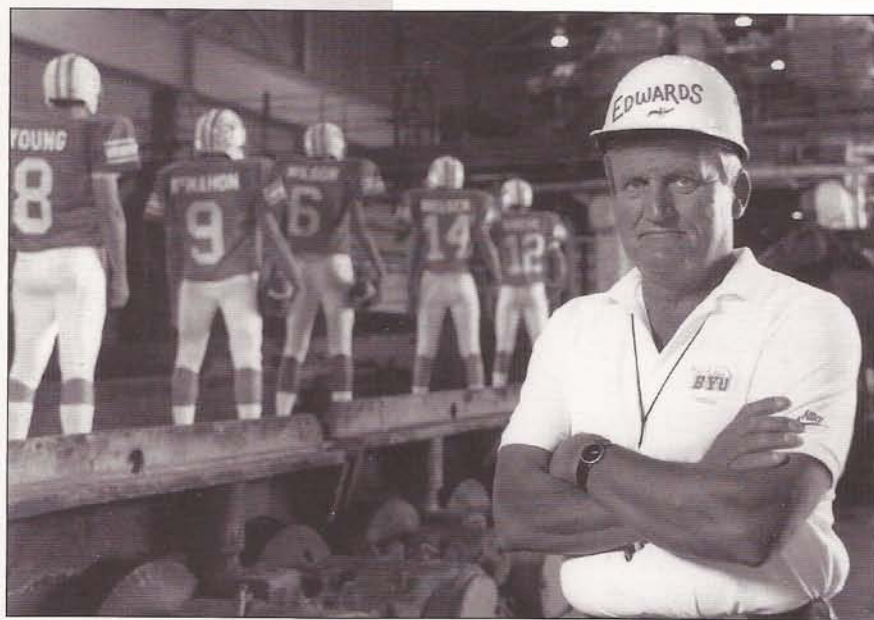
and Marc Wilson have both been inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 12 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other team) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Five out of the top six career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 24 years Edwards has coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times.

When Edwards arrived at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was just a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC championship 17 times, played in 19 post-season bowl games and won a national championship.

Getting a Call From the Hall

Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc. The first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least 10 years and be a former first-team All-American selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletics directors, conference and bowl officials, and media representatives.

Gifford Nielsen

Quarterback, 1975-77 • Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended, when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over the three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.



Marc Wilson

Quarterback, 1976-79 • Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson, earned consensus All-American honors in 1979 and will be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards and seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU he set ten NCAA records. The 6'5", 204 pound quarterback, ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year,

Wilson finished third in the Heisman ballot, led his team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Most Valuable Offensive Player.

A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife Colleen live in Woodinville, Washington with their four children.

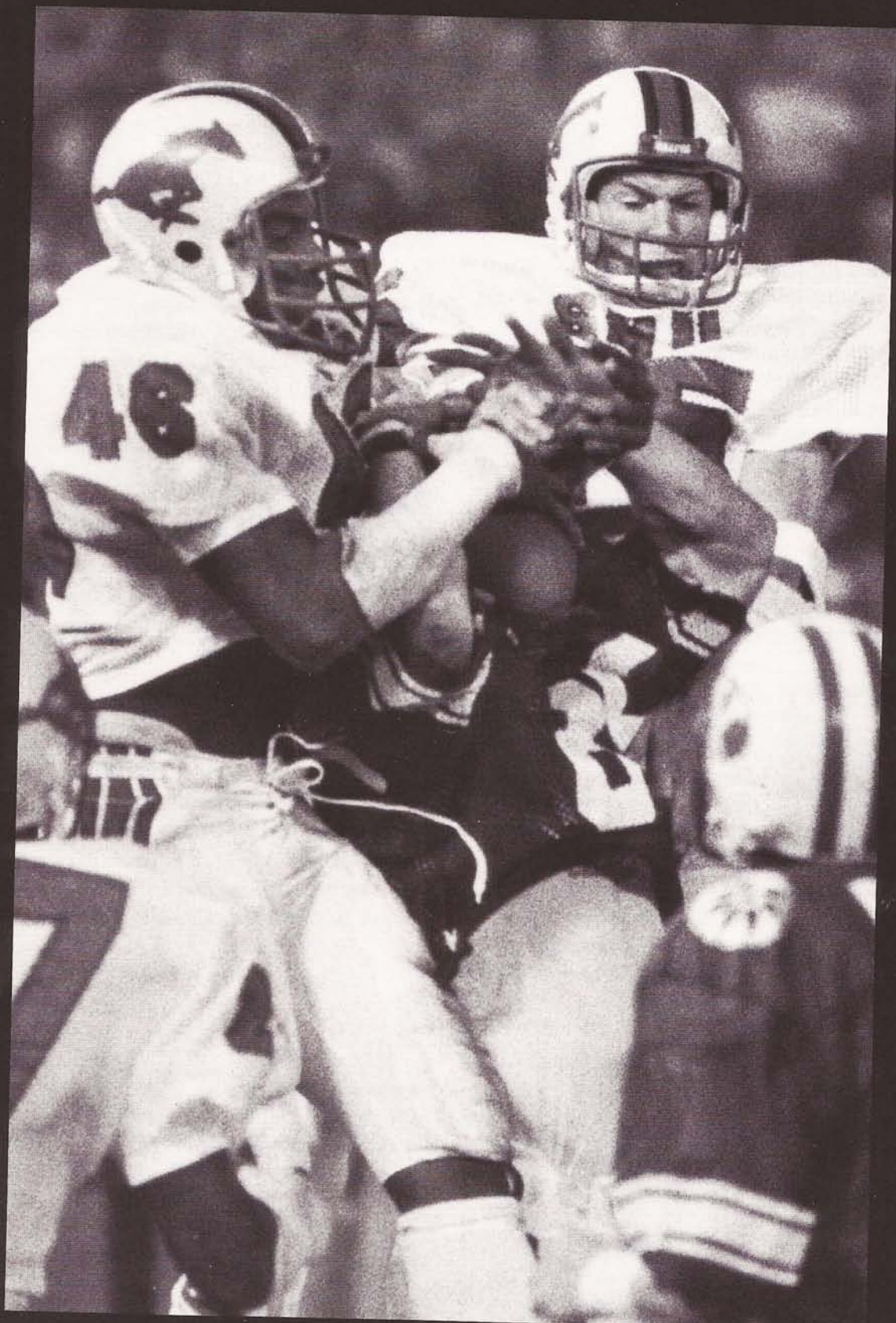

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878.



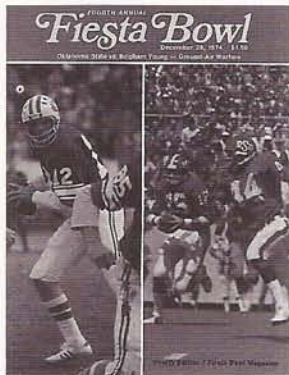
The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage.

OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

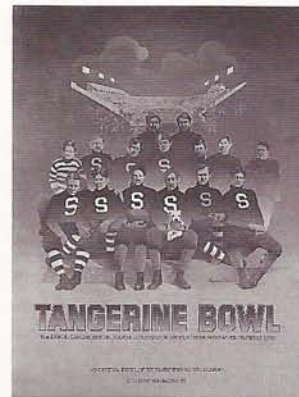

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the

Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys.

BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402.



BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while

Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula.

Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.



Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

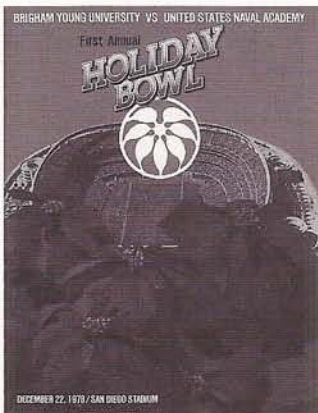
Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead.

Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation.

Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana.

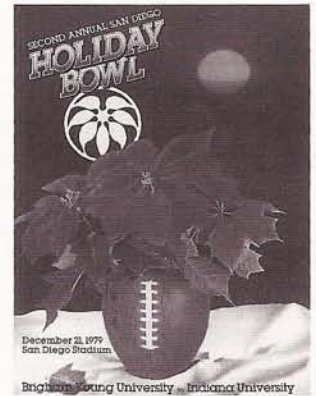
The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half.

BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37.

With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration.

SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard

run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most

exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33.

Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last

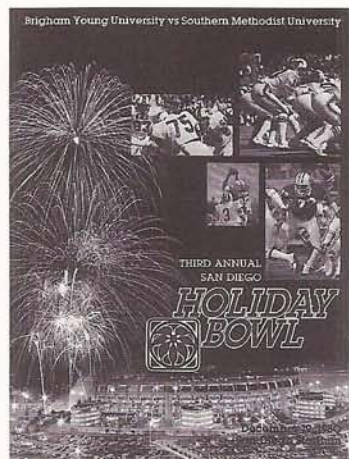
touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered Brent Johnson on-side-kick at mid-field.

SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left.

McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419.

BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge.

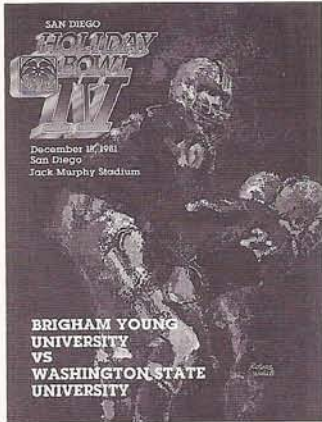
As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground.

Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79.

Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference

actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

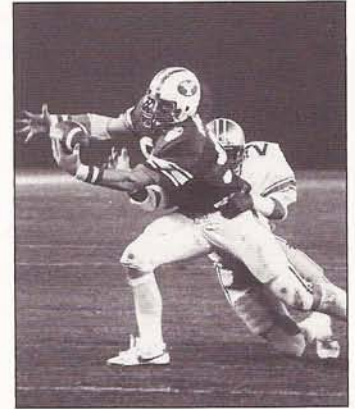

The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime.

Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good.

Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points.

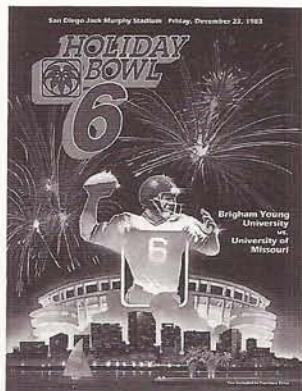
Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain.

A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young.

The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and ramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win. The win gave BYU four bowl victories in five years between 1980-84.

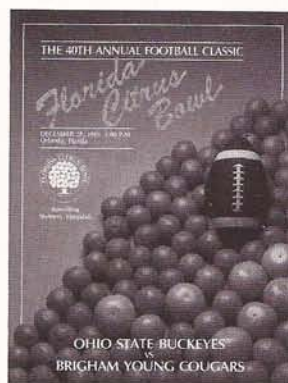

Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

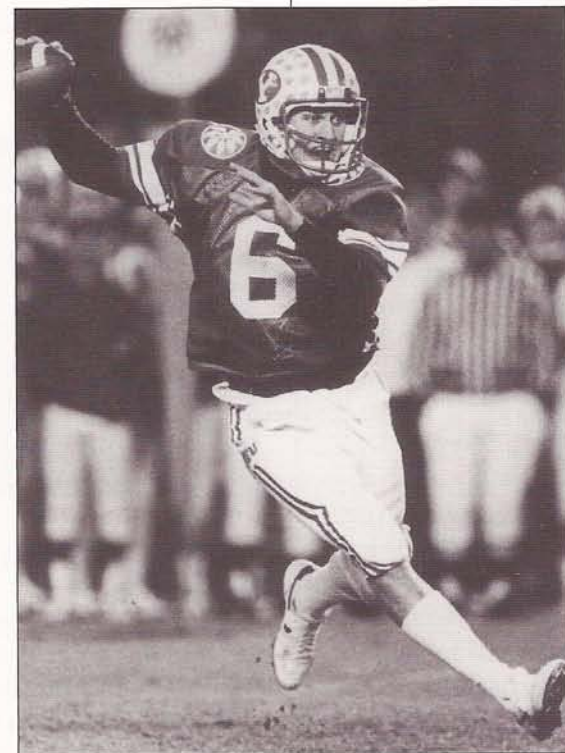


Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break.



Midway through the third

period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring

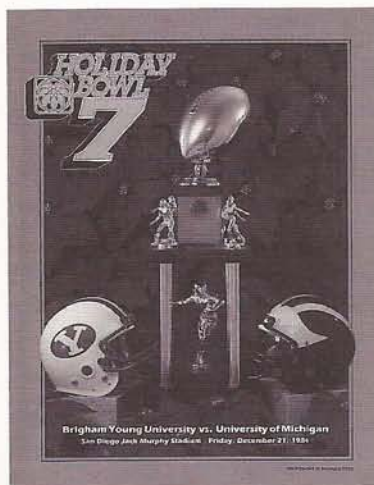
strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play.

The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go.

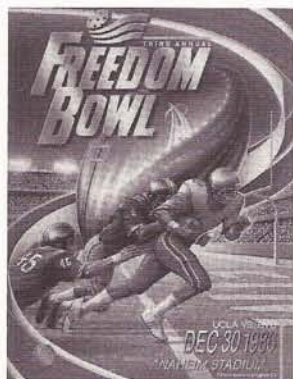
Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter as the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was all defensive as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal.

UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage.

Costly injuries to stand-outs Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

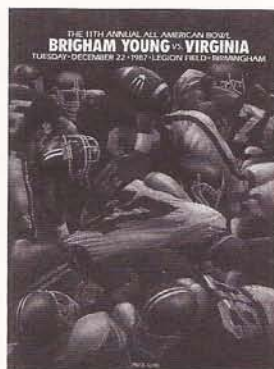

The 11th annual All American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up.

The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times.



Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

But that was as close as the Cougars would get.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

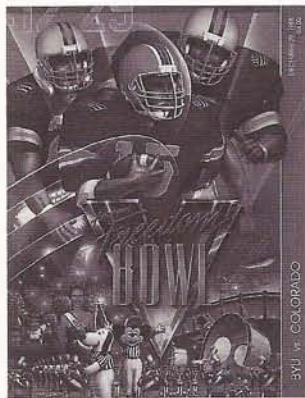

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team.

The other co-MVP was the Nittany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards.

BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points.

Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play.

Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown.

Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

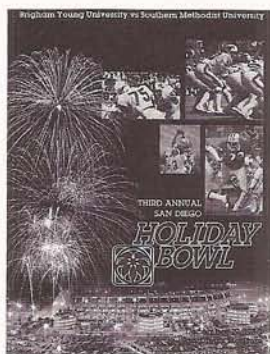
Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-America running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it belonged among the nation's elite.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

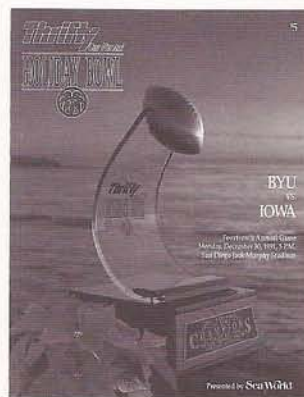

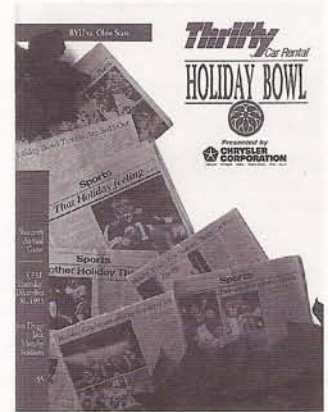

The Cougars took Big 10 Co-Champion Ohio State to the wire at the 16th annual Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl and came up just short. BYU had four downs and 32 seconds to tie or win the game from the OSU six-yard line, but four straight John Walsh passes into the end zone fell to the ground and OSU slipped away with the win.



BYU got to the Ohio State six, 14, 22-yard lines in the second half without scoring. Meanwhile, Raymont Harris, OSU's senior halfback, battered the BYU defense all night long, scoring three touchdowns on his way to a record 235 yards rushing.

Despite Harris' rushing, the Cougars managed to go to the halftime break tied at 21. Jamal Willis and Bryce Doman each collected 27-yard Walsh offerings and walk-on tight end Chad Lewis made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab in the corner of the end zone to bail the Cougars out of a fourth-and-eight situation.

On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior co-captain Eric Drage who ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line.

Walsh had 389 yards and fullback Kalin Hall rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Tyler Anderson returned five kicks for 145 yards, including an exciting 45-yarder. Harris and Walsh shared MVP honors.

BYU fans celebrated the New Year early as the Cougars dominated Oklahoma and ended its five-year winning drought in bowl games.

Quarterback John Walsh and the offense clicked on all cylinders and the Cougars' defense was dominating throughout the ESPN telecast.

Walsh threw a seven-yard TD pass to Bryce Doman in the first quarter and had a 25-yard pass to Mike Johnston in the second quarter.

A four-yard scoring pass to Johnston in the third quarter and a 28-yard touchdown pass to Doman in the fourth quarter vaulted Walsh's stats to 454 yards and four touchdowns on 31 of 45 passes with no interceptions against the Sooner defense which had held national champion Nebraska to 13 points.

BYU's defense was unstoppable as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing with most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners didn't cross midfield until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter.

Oklahoma quarterback Garrick McGee was not able to play due to a viral

infection so Terence Brown, a receiver with five

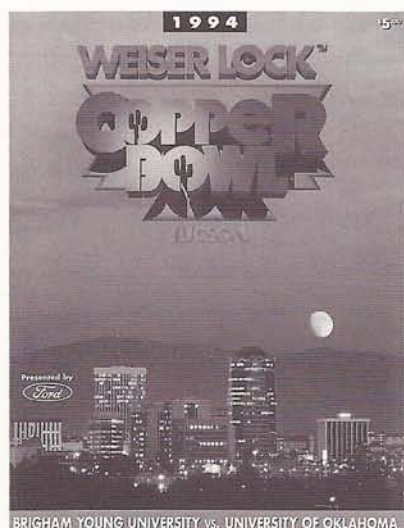
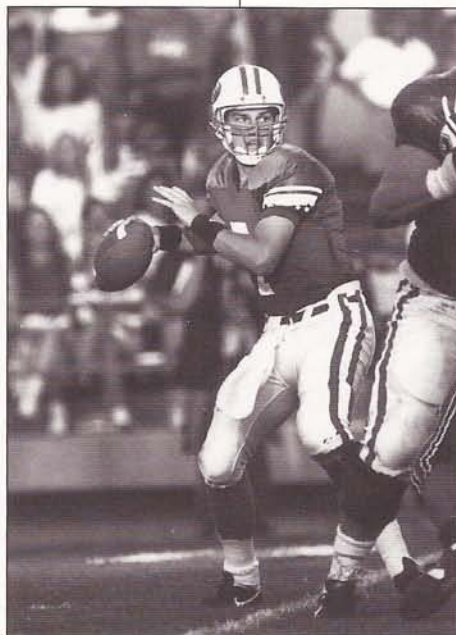
day's practice in two months, filled in as incoming coach Howard Schellenberger watched from the press box.

The Cougars went 77 yards to score on their first possession. Jamal Willis caught a 43-yard pass on a fake reverse on the first play. David Lauder added a 22-yard field goal early in the second quarter. Walsh then connected with Johnston for another TD with eight minutes remaining in the half.

Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU.

Guard Evan Pilgrim earned second-team All-America honors and played in the Hula Bowl along with defensive end Travis Hall. Willis and defensive end Randy Brock played in the East-West Game.

BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

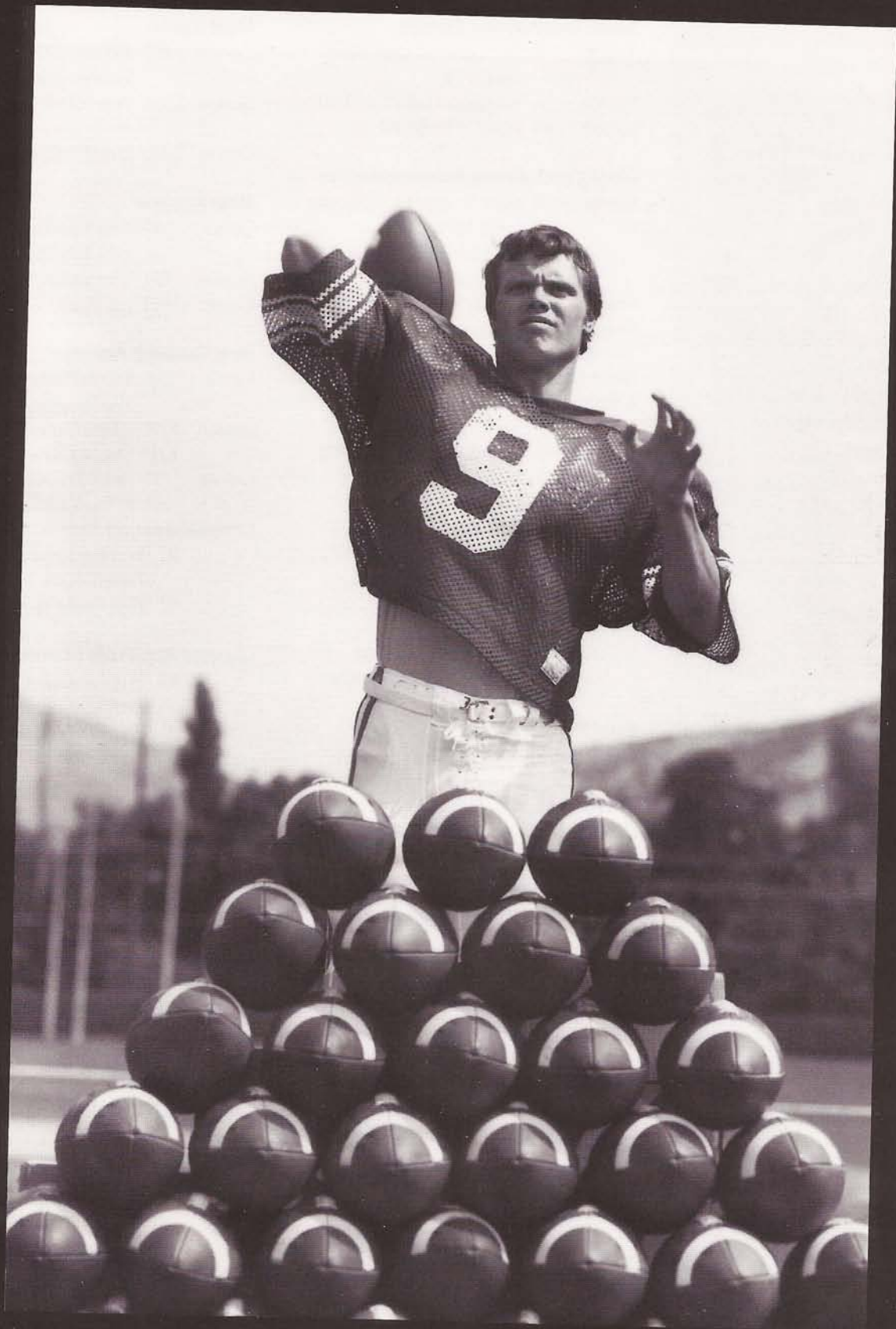

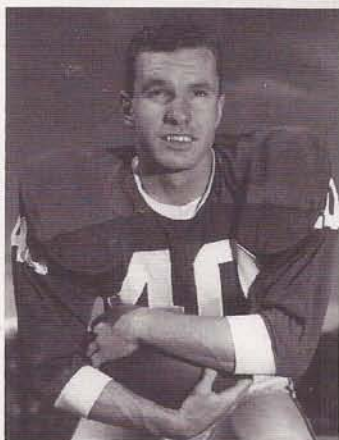

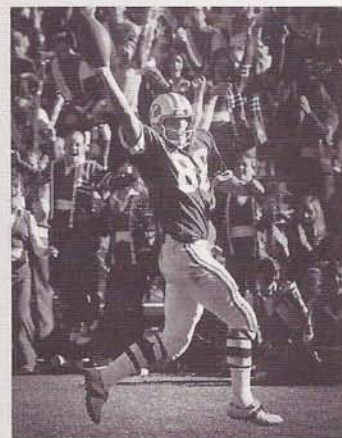

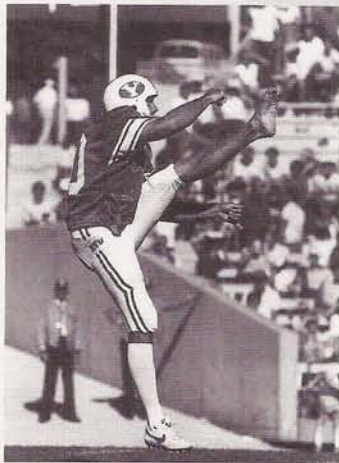

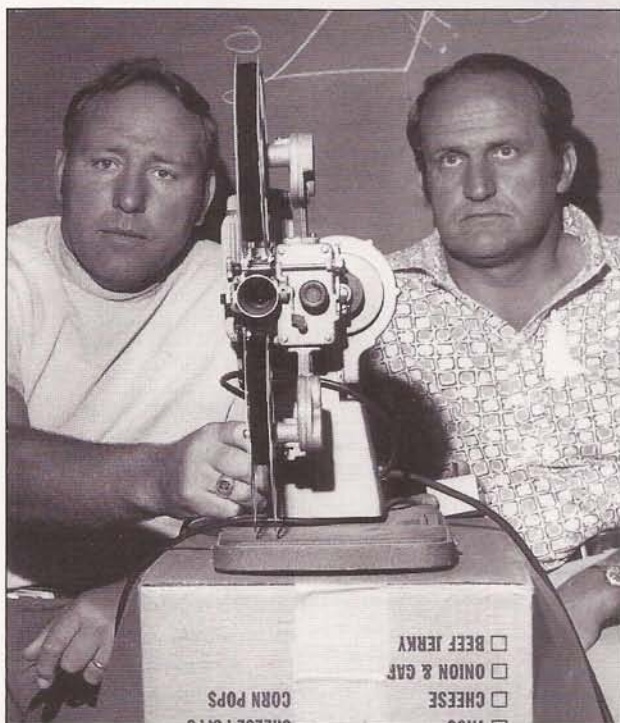

1995 in Review



1995 season review

Another tie for a Western Athletic Conference title was a good comeback for BYU, which finished with a 7-4 overall record and 6-2 in the league.

True, the incredible run of 17 consecutive bowl appearances for BYU came to an end because of costly defeats and a diluted pool of bowl sites. However, there were several high-water marks for the Cougars who had 36 returning lettermen, including nine starters.

"Ironically there were three guys we didn't have until two-a-days last year (James Dye, Tim McTyer, Larry Moore) and all three of them started and all three made all-conference," said BYU Coach LaVell Edwards. In addition to that three-some, others who had not been around for spring ball made significant contributions, including wide receiver K.O. Kealaluhi and defensive lineman Henry Bloomfield.

Foremost among the questions of Cougar faithful was whether junior college All-American quarterback Steve Sarkisian could fill the shoes of his predecessors.

At the season's end, Sarkisian more than answered the critics with an NCAA record-setting performance at Fresno State. His passing

broke the record for the minimum of 30 attempts as he completed 31 of 34 (21 consecutive in the second half) for 399 yards, and three TDs passing and one rushing TD.

That 45-28 victory at FSU put BYU in a four-way tie for first place in the WAC. For Coach Edwards, it would mark his 17th WAC title and he was given a new, multi-year contract, a first in school history.

The Cougars were ranked fifth in the NCAA in passing offense at 315.36 and second in punt returns at 18.92. Sarkisian ranked third in total offense at 297.27 and ninth in pass efficiency at 149.79. James Dye ranked first in the nation in punt returns at 21.90. Edward Sampson was 22nd at .45 interceptions per game and led the team in defensive scoring.

Dye, a junior, was selected the AT & T Long Distance National Player of the Year for Punt Returns and WAC Special Teams Player of the Year. Against San Diego State he had an 84-yd TD punt return and had a 46-yd. punt return at Colorado State. Against Wyoming Dye's 90-yard TD punt return was a Cougar Stadium record, and he also had a 39-yard kickoff return. He had a 75-yard punt return vs. Tulsa.

The Cougars pushed their on-going NCAA record to 260 games without being shutout and extended a streak of scoring a TD in 116 consecutive games.

BYU rebounded from the off-season expulsion of five players, while a depleted defensive backfield was a challenge for new cornerback coach Brian Mitchell, who was hired in July.

Injuries played a part in the 1995 season, too, especially with the loss of junior tight end Chad Lewis after seven games. Lewis was replaced in the lineup by Itula Mili, who along

1995 season review

with defensive end Mike Ulufale, had just returned from a four-game suspension.

A recap of the season began with the Air Force Academy snapping a 12-game losing streak by defeating the Cougars 38-12 at Colorado Springs before an ESPN national TV audience. The Cougars billeted in Denver, and Edwards said it was the first time he could recall a team falling asleep en route to a game with a 10:30 a.m. kickoff.

Twelfth-ranked UCLA had a battle on its hands in BYU's home opener the next week as it led the hard-hitting Cougars only 6-3 at halftime. The Bruins then had two quick-strike second-half TDs to set up a 23-9 victory.

Wearing all-blue uniforms for the first time, BYU got its initial victory with a 31-19 defeat over SDSU, exploding in the second half after going scoreless on the first six possessions. Dye's punt return for a TD, Sarkisian's audibles and Sarkisian's 18 of 19 pass completions in the second half were the difference. The Cougar defense tallied 26 tackles by their linebacker trio and another 26 by the starting secondary.

A 28-21 victory at Colorado State put BYU back in the WAC race. CSU boasted the WAC's top defense, but it was the Cougar "D" which held the Rams to a mere 14 yards rushing and avenged the league title loss at Provo in 1994.

The game at Arizona State was BYU's only contest in 27 days because of byes and marked the Cougars' first return to Tempe since 1977 when ASU left the WAC. BYU grabbed the early lead with a 51-yard TD scamper by Mark Atuaia. Penalties (10 for 109 yards) cost the Cougars at ASU as did the reversal of a key fourth-quarter goal-line stand, only to have it negated by a

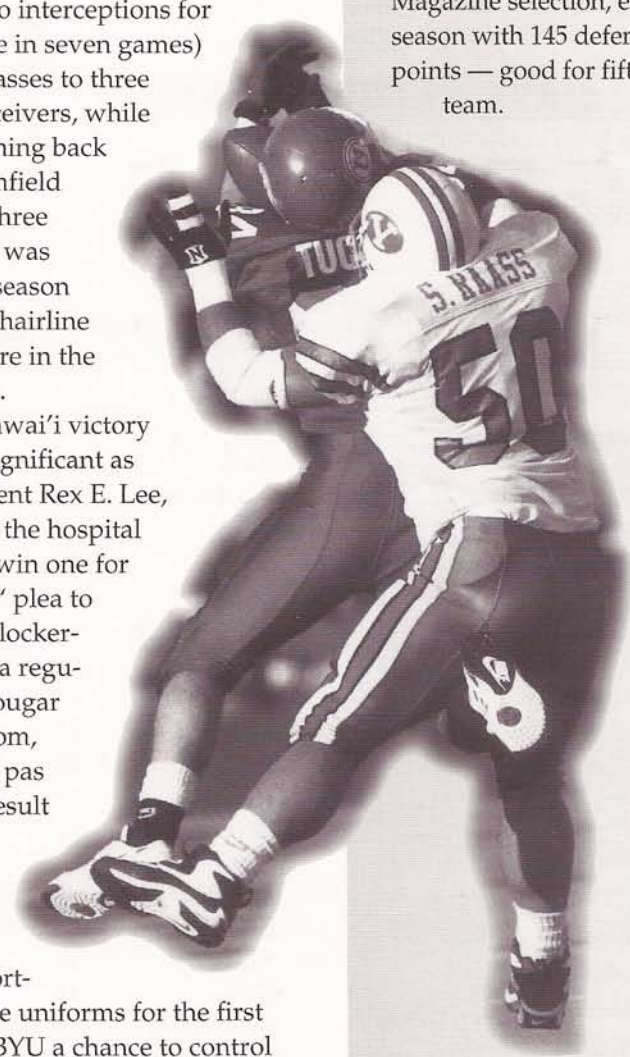
fumble on the following play in a 29-21 loss.

Four consecutive victories were then garnered by BYU over Wyoming, Hawai'i, Tulsa and New Mexico. The 23-20 victory over Wyoming broke a two-year hiatus between the two schools and put the Cougars in a first place tie in the WAC for the first time in the season.

BYU's defense, led by Shay Muirbrook and twins John and Stan Raass (each All-WAC) had a shutout going until the final two seconds of the game in a 45-7 Homecoming victory over Hawai'i in Provo. Sarkisian (no interceptions for the first time in seven games) threw TD passes to three different receivers, while reserve running back Tefua Bloomfield rushed for three TDs. Lewis was lost for the season following a hairline ankle fracture in the first quarter.

That Hawai'i victory was more significant as BYU President Rex E. Lee, came out of the hospital to make a "win one for the Gipper," plea to the Cougar locker-room. Lee, a regular in the Cougar dressing room, would later pass away as a result of cancer.

A 31-14 victory at New Mexico, sporting all-white uniforms for the first time, gave BYU a chance to control its own Holiday Bowl destiny until it disappeared with a 31-14 loss to Utah in Provo.

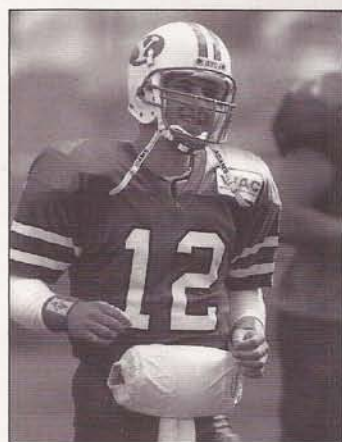

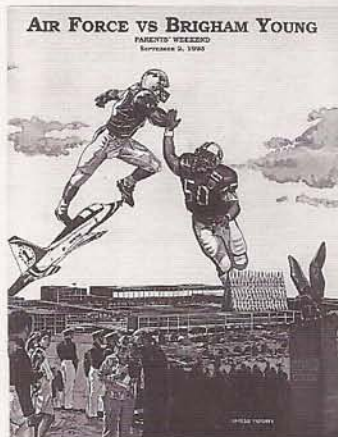

On the day that Steve Sarkisian took his first official snap as a Cougar, the Air Force Academy ended the Cougar's streak of 12-straight victories with an inspired performance on a warm Colorado Springs afternoon.

The Falcon wishbone attack gave Cougar defenders trouble all day, as the Falcon's racked up 394 rushing yards along with 129 passing yards. The warm weather—104 degrees on the field—helped to compound the problems, as several Cougars suffered cramps during the game.

Jamie Cook proved to be a bright spot on defense. The senior defensive back forced two fumbles, both of which were recovered by the Cougars, and had eight tackles. Defensive backs Tim McTyer and Eddie Sampson both had an interception on the day.

On offense, the Cougars never found a groove. In his debut, Sarkisian posted respectable numbers, but was hampered by dropped passes, two of which were in the end zone. The Cougar's finally scored with 6:14 left on a one-yard Sarkisian pass to Itula Mili in the third quarter, preserving BYU's streak of 249 games without being shut out.

The Cougar running game, which had dominated the Falcons the year before, was non-existent. BYU finished with a -29 net yards rushing. This was mostly due to four AFA sacks of Sarkisian which lost 27 yards.

Problems also arose in the kicking game, as bad snaps, fumbled holds and a blocked kick combined to stop the Cougars from scoring on a field goal or extra point for the first time since 1975.

BYU entered its home opener with one of the toughest tasks of the season -- stopping No. 10 UCLA.

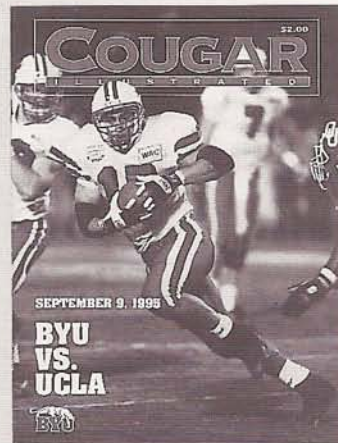

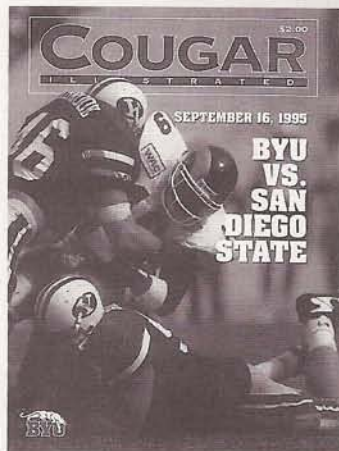

In a night match-up that promised to be explosive, it was the special teams that led the way for BYU to beat San Diego State in front of a national audience on ESPN. The Cougars wore all-blue uniforms for the first time in school history thanks to a laundry mishap.

With 8:40 left in the first quarter, SDSU boomed a 53-yard punt, which James Dye momentarily fumbled. The coverage broke down for SDSU and Dye picked up the ball and ran it up the left side for a 84-yard touchdown return.

San Diego State answered with a 69-yard, seven-play drive to score a touchdown, but missed the extra point. Turnovers, punts and missed field goals filled in the rest of the half as BYU took a 7-6 lead into the locker room.

In the third quarter the Aztecs drove down on their first possession scored, only to have the extra point blocked by Chad Lewis. BYU came right back and scored on a 42-yard Bill Hansen field goal.

In the second half Steve Sarkisian went on a streak of 14 consecutive completions and was 18 of 19. With 30 seconds gone in the fourth quarter, BYU scored on Hema Heimuli's one-yard dive and took a lead they would never relinquish.

On the following drive, Tim McTyer intercepted a Billy Blanton pass and returned it for a touchdown, giving the Cougars a 24-12 lead. SDSU moved the ball on the next drive, but Eddie Sampson picked off a pass in the endzone to kill the drive.

After a San Diego State touchdown, Sarkisian iced the game with 5:18 left on a 19-yard touchdown pass to Chad Lewis in a fourth and four situation. The 31-19 win helped to revive the WAC championship hopes, as BYU now stood 1-1 in conference play.

The Cougars came out and played a dominating game in front of a 64,680 Homecoming crowd.

BYU took the opening kick-off and drove 66 yards in nine plays for a touch-down on a 10-yard pass from Steve Sarkisian to Mike Johnston. It was only the second opening drive to score a touchdown for the Cougars in 1995.

Early in the second quarter BYU scored again on a one-yard run by Tefua Bloomfield. After recovering a Hawai'i fumble on the next possession, BYU marched back down the field and scored again on a three-yard pass from Sarkisian to Hema Heimuli. Hawai'i fumbled again on their next possession, and BYU scored once more time before halftime on a 37-yard pass play from Sarkisian to Kaipō McGuire, giving BYU a commanding 28-0 lead going into the locker room.

After stopping the Rainbow Warriors on their first drive of the second half, BYU went down the field and Bill Hansen kick a 46-yard field goal. After recovering yet another Hawai'i fumble, the Cougars scored again on a 22-yard run by Bloomfield, increasing the lead to 38-0.

BYU scored again in the fourth quarter as Bloomfield capped a Paul Shoemaker led drive with a 10-yard run. BYU almost had the shut-out, but the Rainbow Warriors scored on a 52-yard bomb down the middle with :02 seconds left. The 45-7 victory was still the largest for BYU in the series history.

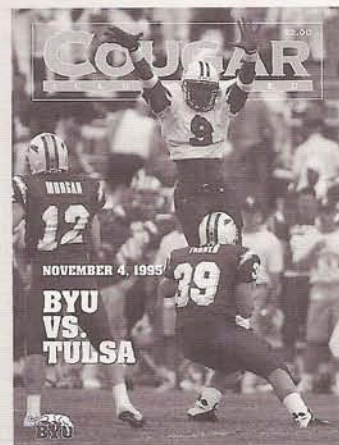
On a cool November afternoon, BYU met up with soon-to-be WAC foe Tulsa and beat the Golden Hurricane 45-35. Tulsa started off fast as tail-back Solomon White took a hand-off through the left side and didn't stop until he reached the endzone 38 yards later. But the Cougars came right back as Hema Heimuli busted through the right side for a 12-yard touchdown. The extra point was blocked, leaving Tulsa in front 7-6.

After being stopped on its next possession, Tulsa made a mistake and punted the ball to James Dye, who took the ball 75 yards to the Tulsa 10. Two plays later Heimuli was in the endzone on a four-yard plunge. Steve Sarkisian ran in the two-point conversion and put BYU up 14-7.

On the next series, White was hit by Stan Raass in the Tulsa backfield and fumbled the ball to Dermmell Reed who returned it 22 yards for the touchdown. Tulsa scored next on a fake reverse, but the Cougars came back when Sarkisian hit Mike Johnston for a 33-yard touchdown, giving BYU a 28-14 lead at half time.

After recovering an attempted on-side kick to start the second half, BYU scored on a Mark Atuaia three-yard dive that put BYU up 35-14. Tulsa struck back as Jason Jacoby returned the subsequent kick-off 100 yards to close the gap to 14 points. The Golden Hurricane then punched in a Cougar fumble to close to 35-28.

After two stalled drives, Tulsa punted the ball away from Dye and ended up with an 18-yard punt. The Cougar offense took the ball the remaining 50 yards and Sarkisian scored on a one-yard sneak. The Cougars later added a 23-yard field goal to go up 45-28, while Tulsa's final points came on an interception return.

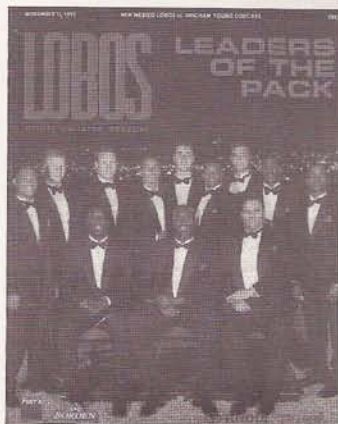

On a cool November afternoon, BYU continued its domination of WAC foe New Mexico under LaVell Edwards with a 31-14 victory. The game also marked the first time in BYU history that the team wore all-white uniforms.

The Lobos scored first on a 29-yard field goal late in the first quarter. But BYU came right back and scored on a 20-yards pass play from Steve Sarkisian to Mike Johnston, giving the Cougars a lead that they would never relinquish.

After stopping the Lobos on their next possession, BYU got the ball back on their own 30-yard line, and promptly started driving again. The drive was capped off 2:36 later with a one-yard dive by Mark Atuaia. Then the Cougars and Lobos traded field goals to end the half at 17-6.

New Mexico started quick again in the second half scoring a touchdown on their first possession. They added the two-point conversion to close to 17-14. BYU struck again in the fourth when Sarkisian hit an injured Itula Mili over the middle. Mili carried several defenders with him on his 21-yard touchdown effort.

After forcing a fumble on the subsequent possession, BYU scored again on a three-yard touchdown run by Atuaia for the final margin of 31-14.

The win helped to set up the Utah game as crucial to the WAC race.

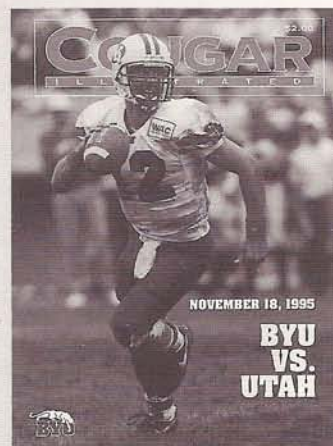
On a uncommonly warm November afternoon, the Cougars hoped to erase two years of "34-31" frustration in front of 65,829 fans and a regional ABC audience. But BYU just never got going.

Utah opened up the scoring at the start of the second quarter when Chris Ma'afala broke through the line and ran 32 yards for a touchdown. BYU came back on their next drive and scored when Bill Hansen hit a 50-yard field goal. The Utes quickly added two field goals of their own and went to the locker room with a 13-3 lead.

Utah opened up the second half with a 79-yard drive that was capped off by at 23-yard touchdown pass from Mike Fouts to Terance Keehan, putting Utah up by a 20-3 margin. The Utes added another touchdown in the quarter.

In the fourth BYU's offense woke up, scoring on a three-play 48-yard drive that took only 19 seconds. The Steve Sarkisian pass to Kaipu McGuire cut the lead to 27-11, following a two-point conversion to Jason Cooper. After Utah scored another touchdown, BYU came back late in the fourth with an 18-yard touchdown pass from Sarkisian to Hema Heimuli.

But it was too little, too late for BYU as Utah ran out the clock and left Cougar Stadium with a 34-17 victory. While a win would have secured the WAC title for BYU, the loss meant the BYU would have to win their next game and hope from some help within the WAC to earn the Holiday Bowl bid in the tie-breakers.

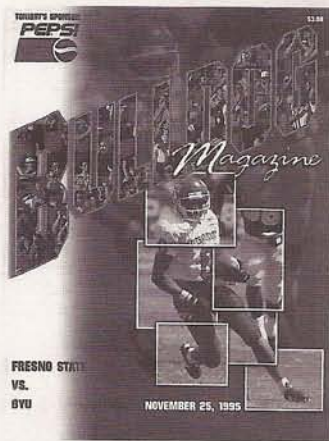

The Cougars finished their season strong with an impressive 45-28 victory over the Fresno State to earn a share of the WAC title.

The Bulldogs started out first mid-way through the first period with a 20-yard touchdown pass, but missed the extra point. But the Cougars responded immediately, scoring on a Steve Sarkisian to Mike Johnston 19-yard touchdown pass, and took a 7-6 lead. Fresno State answered with another touchdown and a two-point conversion. Late in the half BYU added on a 41-field goal by Bill Hansen to bring the half time score to 14-10.

BYU started quick in the second half as Sarkisian connected with Levi "K.O." Kealaluhi for a 30-yard touchdown, just over two and a half minutes into the quarter. Sarkisian struck again on BYU's next possession with a five-yard touchdown toss to Kaipo McGuire, giving BYU a 24-14 lead.

After the Bulldogs scored to close the lead to 24-21, the Cougars came back with another touchdown, this time on an eight-yard run by Hema Heimuli. Fresno State kept it close with another score to bring the game to 31-28, but Sarkisian struck once again, this time running it in on a shot-gun draw from 10 yards out.

Heimuli iced the game with a late touchdown run to bring the final score to 45-28. The win did give BYU a share of the WAC crown, but the four-way tie left BYU home during the bowl season for the first time in 18 years. A highlight of the game was Steve Sarkisian's performance (31-34) which set the NCAA record for passing efficiency at 91.2 percent.

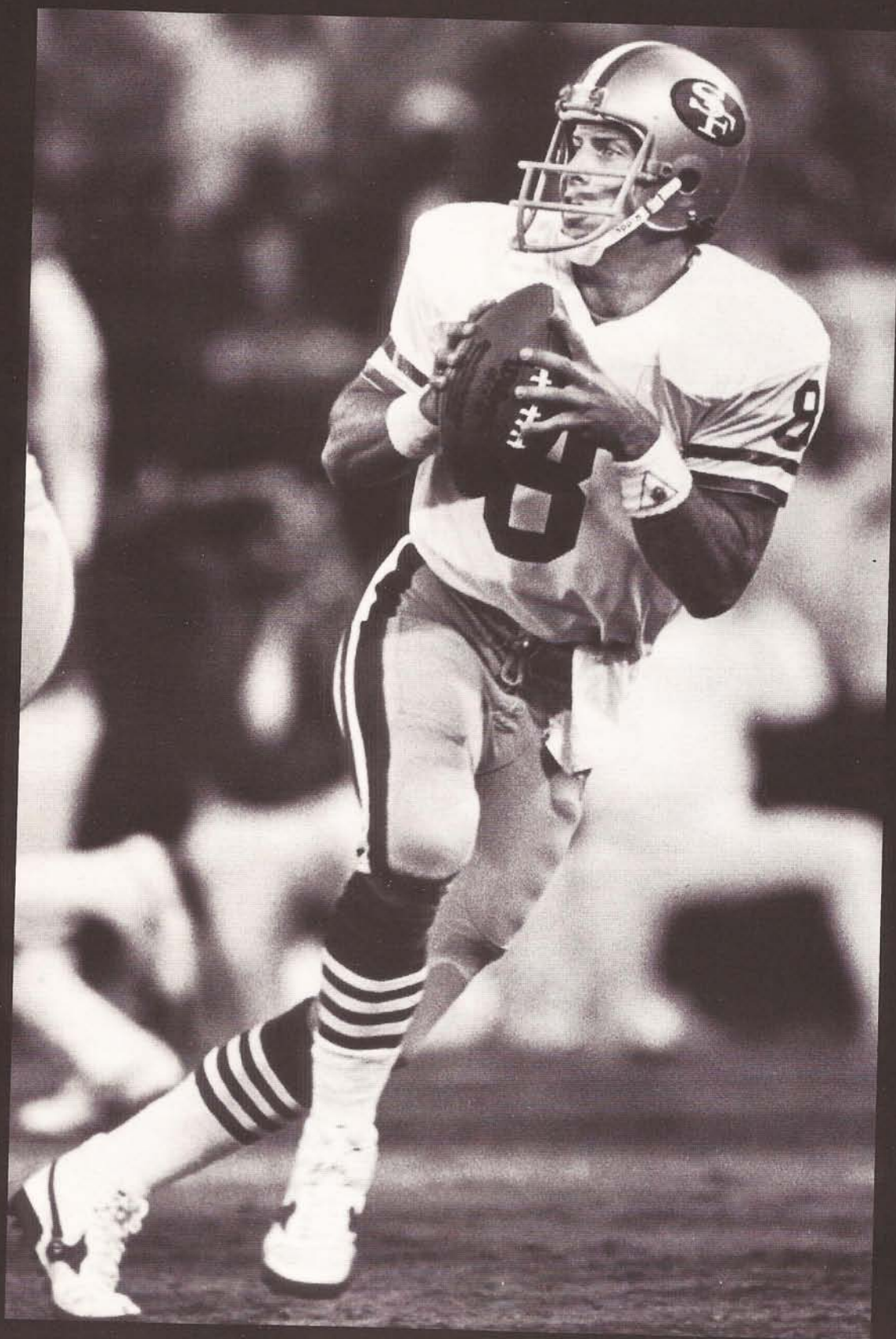
