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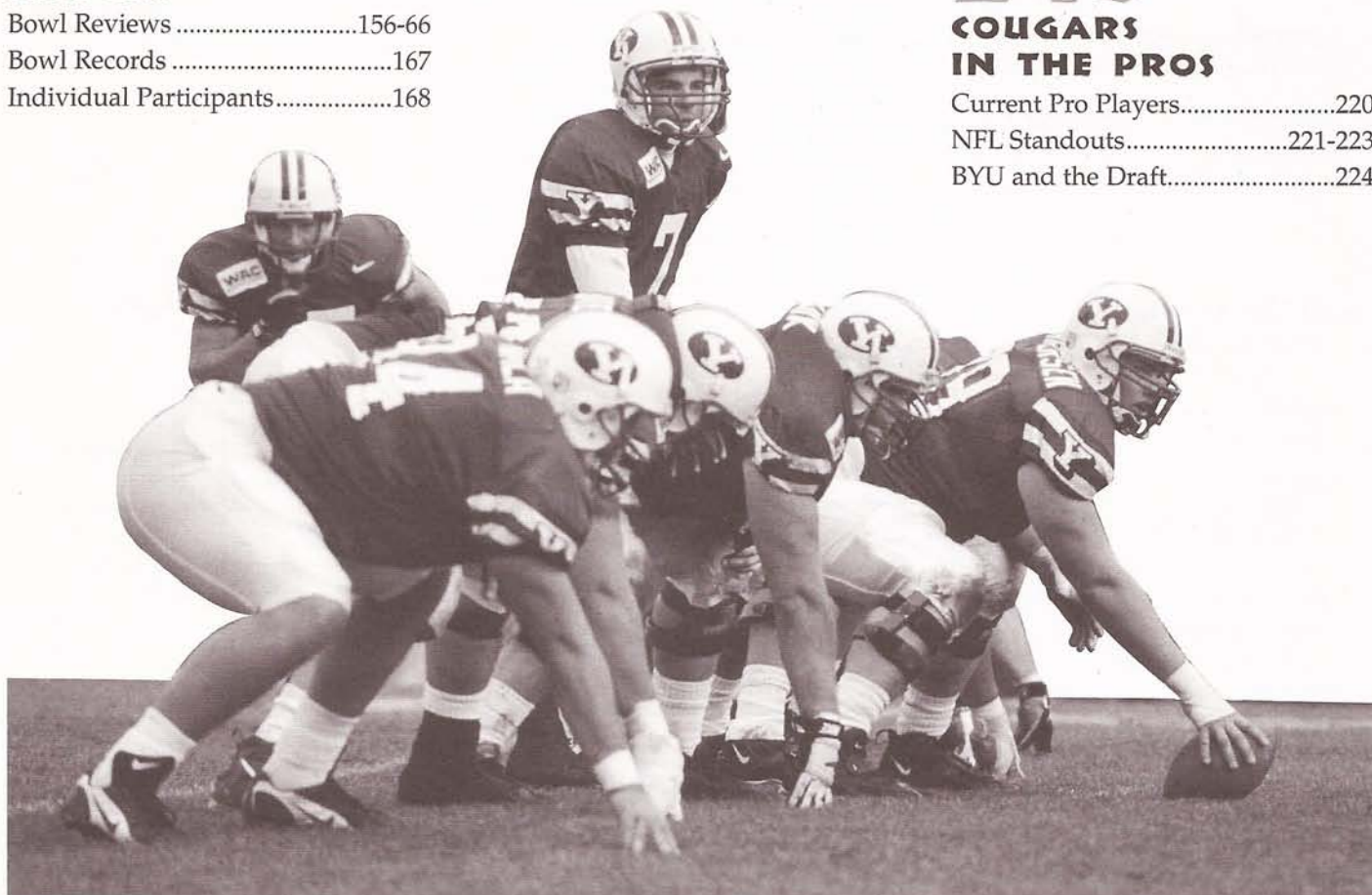
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MEDIA SERVICES

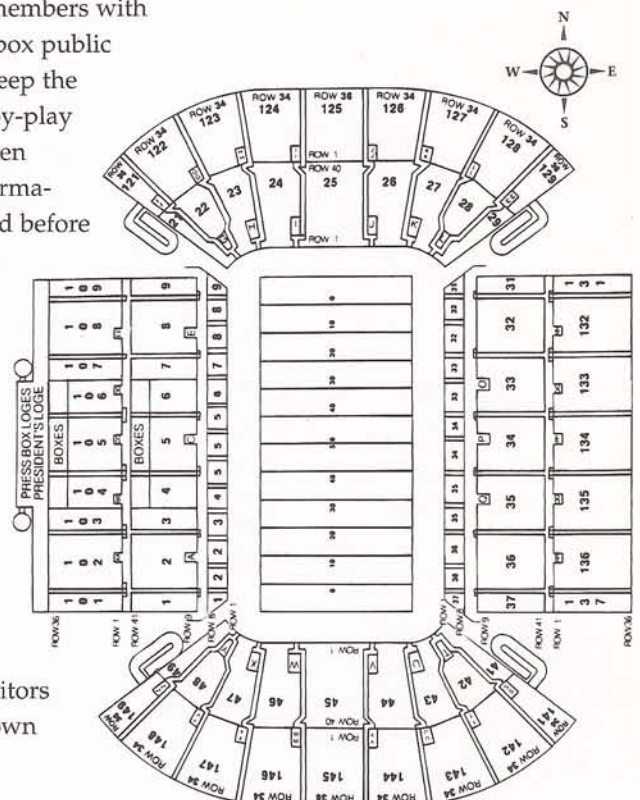

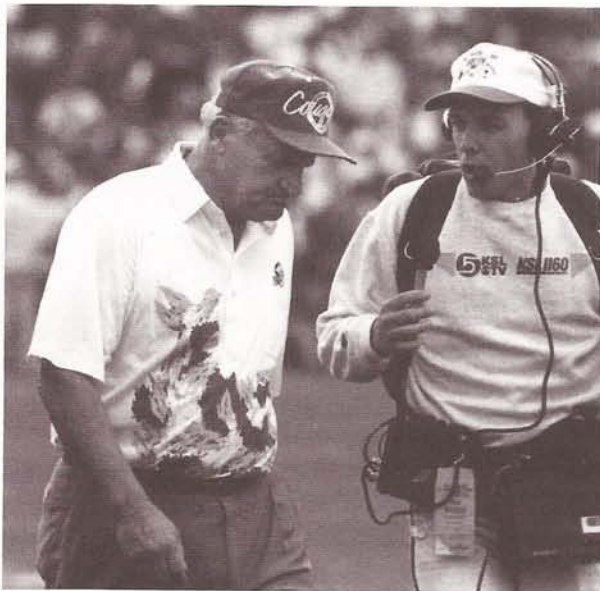
POST GAME INTERVIEWS

The BYU Sports Information staff will accompany the media to the locker room area. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

The BYU locker room is closed to the media. Coach LaVell Edwards and requested players will speak to the media in an interview room after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

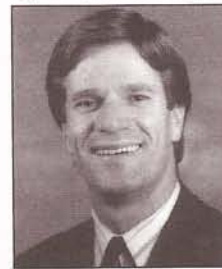

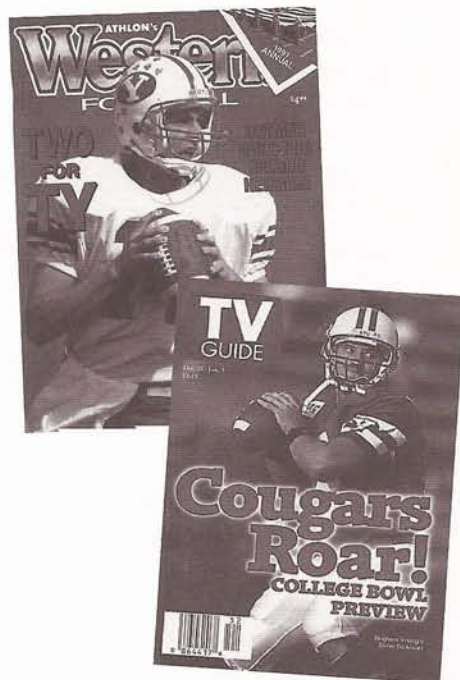

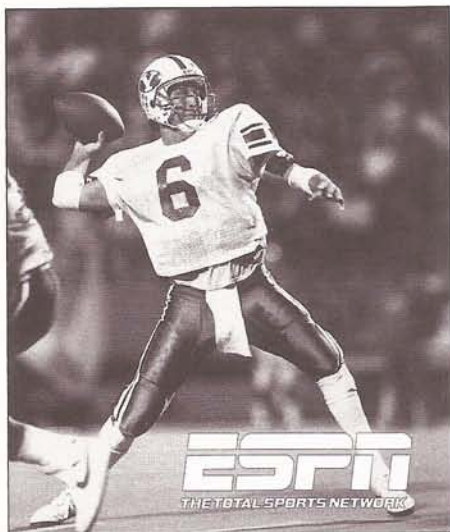

Season OUTLOOK

RETOOLED AND READY FOR BATTLE

As BYU Coach LaVell Edwards enters the twilight of his coaching career, there are no indications that his zeal is less than it was during any of his 234 victories over the past 26 seasons.

There is a recommitment to pass-happy offense which returns six starters and there is a talent-laden defense that has nine returning starters from the past two seasons.

The 1998 team gives Edwards plenty of reasons to smile and improve over last year's 6-5 record, even though the opening games against Alabama,

Arizona State and Washington will test the Cougars mettle.

Two touted juniors anchor the lines and Edwards pronounces his defensive front as better and his receivers as speedier. Those juniors are All-America candidates **John Tait**, a 6-7, 305-pound All-Western Athletic Conference tackle who is a starter for the third year on the O-line, and defensive end **Byron Frisch**, who is 6-5, 260 pounds.

QUARTERBACKS

Of course, everyone wants to know about the quarterback position. Coach Edwards says, "there is no clear-cut choice." Junior **Kevin Feterik** started seven games and threw for 11 touchdowns to tally a pass efficiency rating of 144.1. The 6-0 lefty has recovered from his broken ankle which sidelined him for three games midseason.

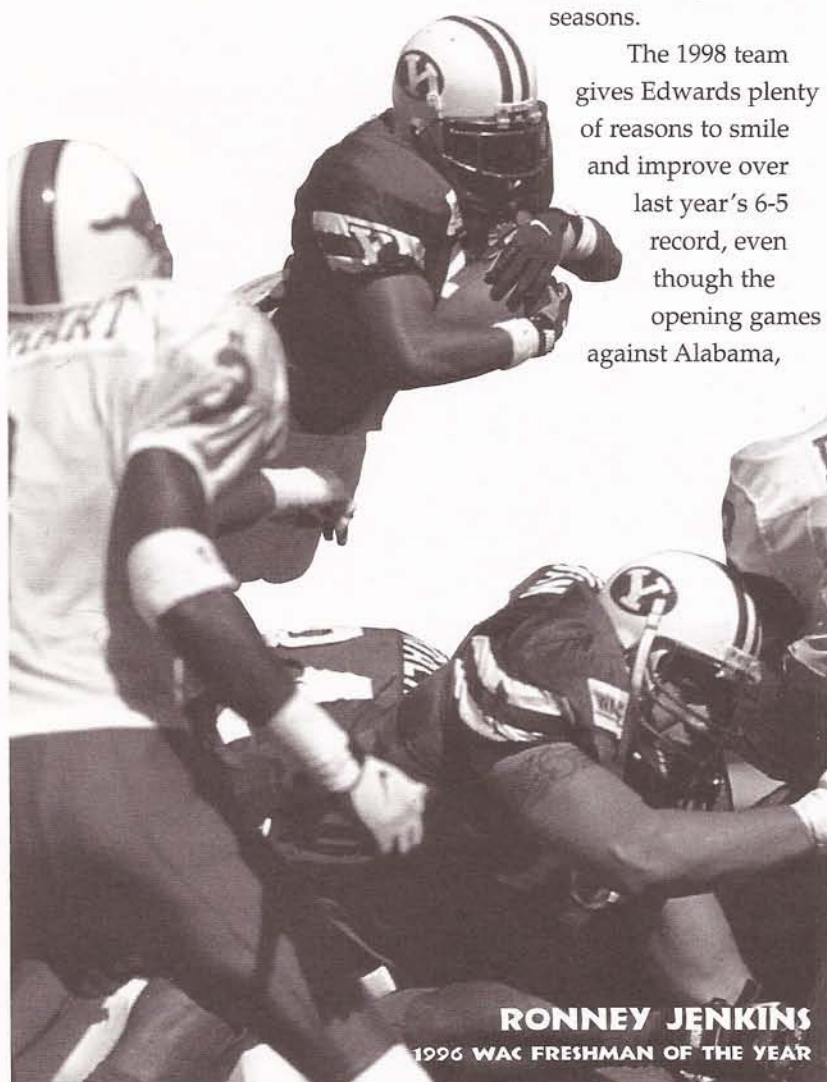
"Had Kevin been healthy we would have won a few more games last season as he was just coming on," said Edwards. "I cannot see us getting through this season without using both of them."

The other quarterback is Washington sophomore **Drew Miller**, who started three games last season.

"Drew is the first true freshman to have started a game for us," said Edwards. "I feel good about both our quarterbacks."

RUNNING BACKS

Regardless of who is at the helm, everyone has to feel good about the return of fleet **Ronney Jenkins**, who was Western Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year in 1996. Jenkins, a sophomore who essentially redshirt-

ed last season, rushed for 733 yards, 11 TDs, and had two games netting over 100 yards. Jenkins is the man who set a national prep record rushing for 619 yards in one game.

"The key again is going to be **Kalani Sitake**," said Edwards of the Cougar rushing stable. "It will be crucial for us to have him, but it takes time to recover from an injury like he had." Sitake, a 6-0, 250 pound sophomore, got a medical redshirt following back surgery after starting the first three games of 1997.

RECEIVERS

Last year former fullback Dustin Johnson was juggled between the backfield and tight end, but this year Edwards is optimistic about consistency at the tight end spot.

"I feel much better than I did prior to spring practice because of the emergence of **Tevita Ofehengaue** and **Carlos Nuño**," said Edwards.

Ofehengaue, a 6-2 sophomore, played behind departed All-American Itula Mili in high school. Ofehengaue walked on the team last season and opened a lot of eyes in spring drills, as did Nuño, a 6-4 junior, who switched from defensive end.

Increased speed at wide receiver may be manifest by junior college transfer **Jonathan Pittman**, a junior college All-American. Sophomores **Margin Hooks** and **Ben Horton** had good springs at wide-out, as did redshirt freshman **Mike Rigell**.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Aside from Tait on the offensive line, the other returning veteran is **Joe Wong**, a 6-6, 315-pound senior who started at guard last year for the Cougars and was a starting tackle as a freshman at Hawai'i. Wong moved to tackle when Eric Bateman declared early for the NFL draft. Squadmen **Matt Johnson**, a 6-4, 325-pound redshirt transfer, and **Jimmy Richards**, 6-3, 305-pound sophomore, have been in the system, but lack game experience at guard and center, respectively. The other starting spot on

the O-line could be manned by **John Skiba**, 6-2, 285 pounds, one of three new juco linemen.

DEFENSIVE LINE

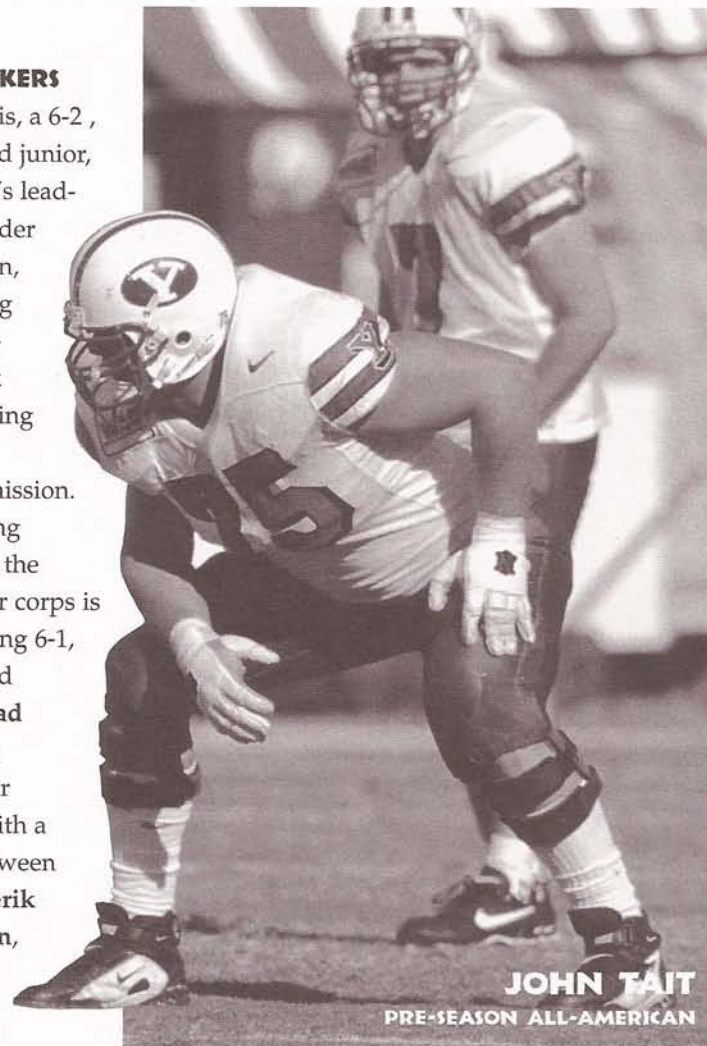
Frisch, a second-team All-WAC performer last season, leads the defensive line which returns all of its starters for the second year in a row. Three seniors line up along that front four with Frisch; **Ed Kehl**, 6-4, 300; **Daren Yancey**, 6-6, 285; and **Issiah Magalei**, 6-2, 285. Behind them are four talented, young underclassmen who have all redshirted, **Hance Olsen**, **Chris Hoke**, **Ifo Pili**, and **Setema Gali**.

"We have an improved defensive team. The quickness and speed are better on our front than it has been in some time," said Edwards. "And that includes our linebackers, where **Rob Morris** is going to get nothing but better."

LINEBACKERS

Morris, a 6-2, 250-pound junior, was BYU's leading defender last season, converting from running back after serving an LDS Church mission.

Joining Morris in the linebacker corps is hard-hitting 6-1, 240-pound senior **Brad Martin**, a multi-year starter, with a battle between senior **Derik Stevenson**, the 6-4, 240-

pound star of special teams, and 6-3, 245-pound redshirt freshman **Justin Ena** for the other spot. Backing up at middle linebacker is steady senior **Jeff Ellis**.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

"We need some people to come through in our secondary, but we do have a lot of experience at safety," said Edwards.

Senior strong safety **Chris Ellison** was a starter throughout the 15-game 1996 season, but was injured (ACL) in the first game of 1997

and was granted a medical redshirt. He is backed by **Tyler Nelson**, who started most of last year and had two interceptions in the final game against Utah. The corners could be first year transfers **Hashi Robertson** and **Brian Gray** or last year's transfer **Jack Williams**. Gray was not in camp during the spring.

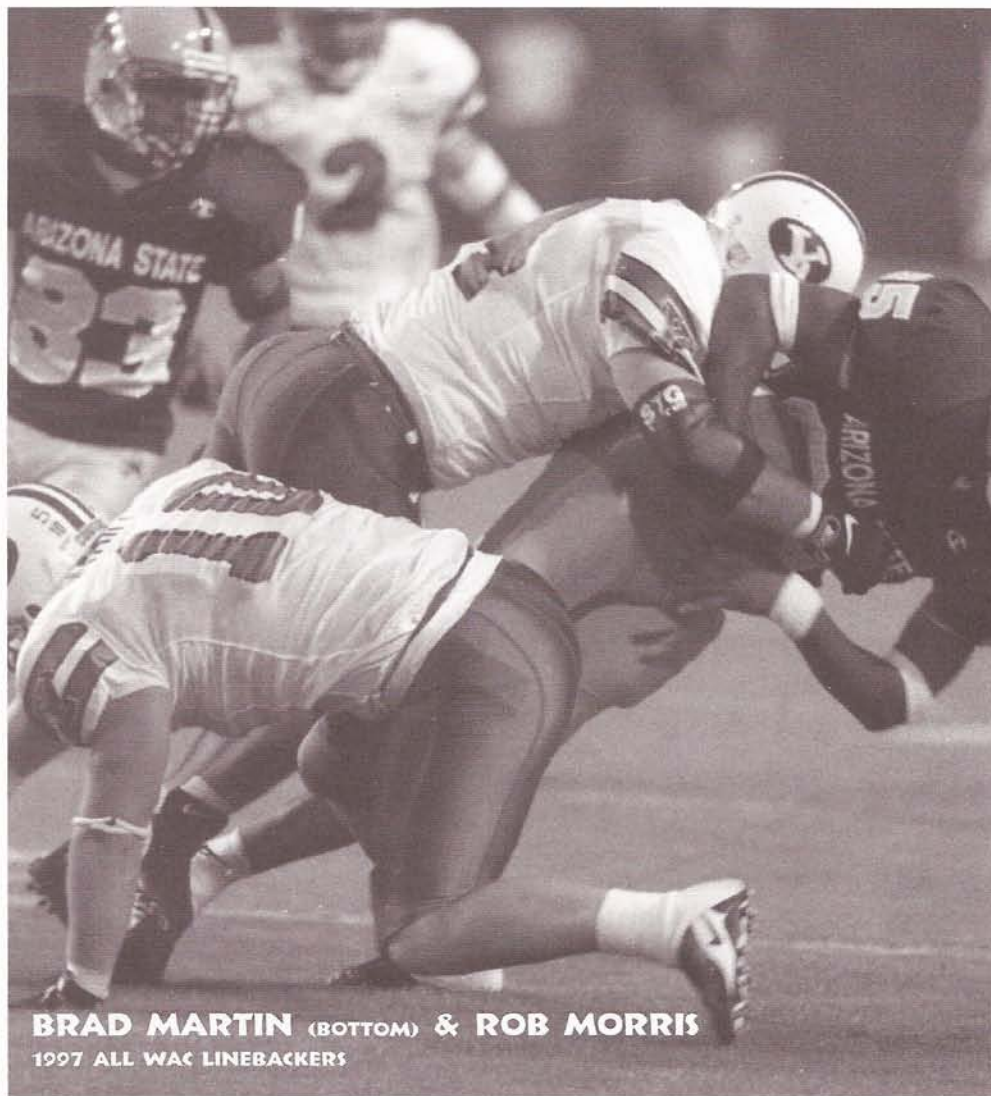
SPECIAL TEAMS

Our kicking game is solid," said Edwards. "**Owen Pochman** is very accurate."

Pochman, a sophomore, was second-team All-WAC, and was 29 of 30 in PATs last season and nine of 15 in field goals. At punter the Cougars have either senior **J.D. Hartsfield** or junior **Jesse Sowards**, who is also the holder for Pochman.

Edwards cited defensive corner **Doug Henstrom** and wide receiver **Horton** as having good spring practices. Among those who made position switches during the spring are **Nuno** to tight end, **Johnson** to guard, **Richards** to center, and redshirt freshman **Isaac Kelly** from quarterback to linebacker.

Edwards' hospitalization for blocked carotid arteries last December has not changed his mind about coaching. He sees his Cougars as being in the WAC Pacific Division hunt with Utah and San Diego State, while Colorado State, Air Force and Wyoming are favorites in the WAC Mountain Division.

The Future Looks **BRIGHT**

COMBINING OLD STRENGTH WITH NEW TALENT

With its latest recruiting efforts, BYU hopes to rejuvenate an offense that struggled at times during the 1997 season. Offensive players dominate the Cougars' most recent recruiting class with only six of the 24 recruits slated to play defense.

Prep Star Magazine ranked BYU's recruiting efforts second in the WAC, a result that pleased Coach LaVell Edwards.

"We feel good about this group which has been one of our better classes," Edwards said. "We filled our needs and improved overall speed. We are very pleased and did a nice in-state job."

Though Edwards was satisfied with in-state recruiting efforts, the majority of BYU's signees came from California. The state contributed eight of BYU's 24 recruits, compared to only five from Utah. Two players were signed from Florida, and one was signed from each of nine other states.

Three Prep Star All-Americans highlight BYU's freshman recruiting class. The class is

led by QB Kevin Gilbride (6-2, 180), LB Moa Peaua (6-1, 235), TE Nate Wentz (6-7, 230) and Utah's 1997 state MVP, RB Junior Mahe (5-11, 180).

Gilbride, whose father is the head coach of the San Diego Chargers, "fits the BYU offense perfectly," according to *SUPERPREP Magazine*. Though he probably won't see time this year, he could be a key acquisition for the future.

Peaua was the top player in the state of Nevada in 1997, and Wentz was ranked as the No. 6 tight end prospect in the Western Region following his senior year. Both players should contribute significantly for the Cougars in the future.

In addition to their high school recruits, the Cougars acquired three of the top-100 junior college transfers of 1997. WR Jonathan Pittman (6-0, 170), OL John Skiba (6-2, 285), and DB Hashi Robertson (5-9, 180) will be welcomed additions to a Cougar team that lost 28 lettermen from last season.

EDWARDS ENTERS 27TH SEASON AT THE BYU HELM

Since LaVell Edwards took over the BYU football program in 1972 the Cougars have won 234 games, captured 18 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 20 bowl games (17 in a row). Honors and

recognition have rolled in as the BYU football program has

risen to national prominence. Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history.

Seven times in his 25 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83, '84, '90 and '96), the 65-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District

Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). In addition to

the many coaching honors, Edwards has coached the East-West Shrine game four times, the Hula Bowl three times, the Blue-Gray Classic twice, the Japan Bowl twice and the Coaches' All-America Game.

Edwards won the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington D.C., after guiding the Cougars to a national championship in 1984.

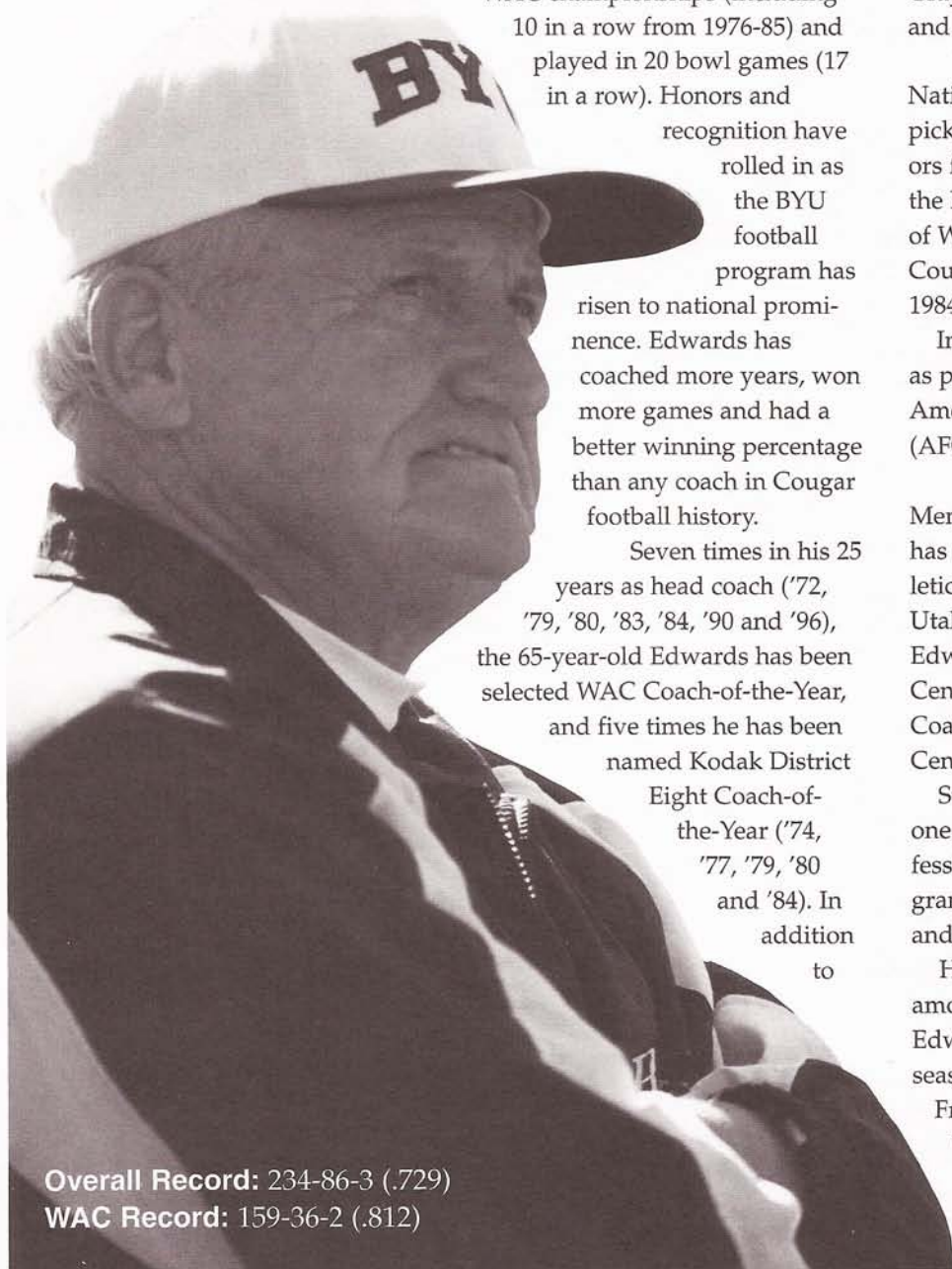
In 1988, he completed a one-year term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

Edwards received the Dale Rex Memorial Award in 1974 as the Utahn who has contributed the most to amateur athletics in the state and he has also been Utah's Sportsman of the Year. In 1993, Edwards was named to Utah State's All-Century Team and was named Utah's Coach of the Century at the Utah Centennial sports ceremonies in 1996.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a husband, father, grandfather, church leader, author, teacher and doctor of education.

His 234 victories ranks eighth all-time among NCAA Division I coaches. Under Edwards, BYU averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, he passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Edwards was born in Provo, Utah. He was an all-state football player at Lincoln High in nearby Orem, Utah

in 1946 and 1947. Edward's football ambitions took him to Utah State where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the team as a center and linebacker. He earned all-league honors as a center in 1950 and 1951.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey from Big Piney, Wyo. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service teams: Fort Lee, Va. in 1952, and Fort Meade, Md. in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

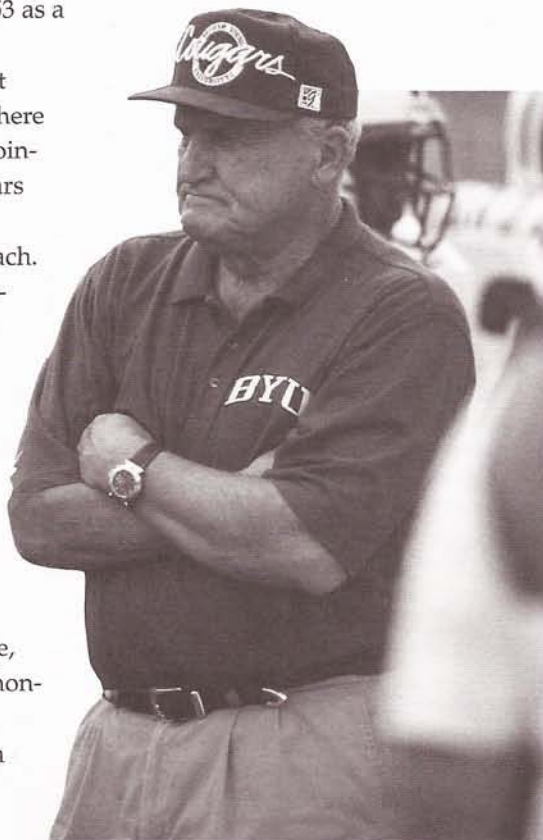
Edwards became head coach at Granite High in Salt Lake City where he coached from 1954-61 before joining the BYU staff in 1962. Ten years later he was named Tommy Hudspeth's successor as head coach.

The football philosophy practiced by Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79, '80, '81).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah in 1960 and an Ed.D. from BYU in 1978.

His wife, Patti, completed

her degree in American Studies at BYU in 1994 and has written sports columns for the Provo Daily Herald. They have three married children: Ann E. Cannon (Salt Lake City), a writer; John (Bountiful, Utah), a doctor; and Jim (Henderson, Nevada), a lawyer. They have 12 grandchildren.

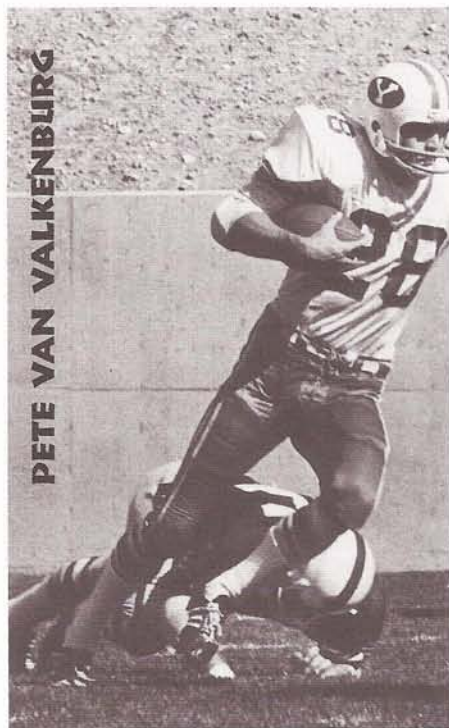

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January... had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962... halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title beating out All-Americans Greg Pruitt and Otis Armstrong with a 138.6 yards-per-game average... the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

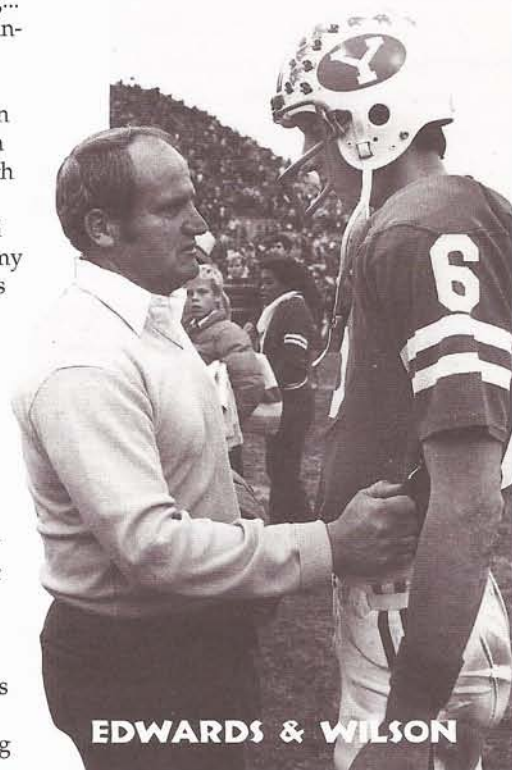
1975 A year of adjustment: the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games... Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory... Nielsen sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing... becomes starter... Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense... Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American... BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over... by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage... Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing

(341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)... BYU's 341.6 yards passing per game was third highest in NCAA history, and 41 TDs was second... IF YOU BUILD IT♦♦♦ BYU opened the 1982 season in newly expanded Cougar Stadium which seats 65,000 people — nearly doubling the capacity of the old stadium (35,000).

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon and play senior Wilson... Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins ... Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)... finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit... Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)... Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)... BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season... LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award... Cougars win WAC and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... 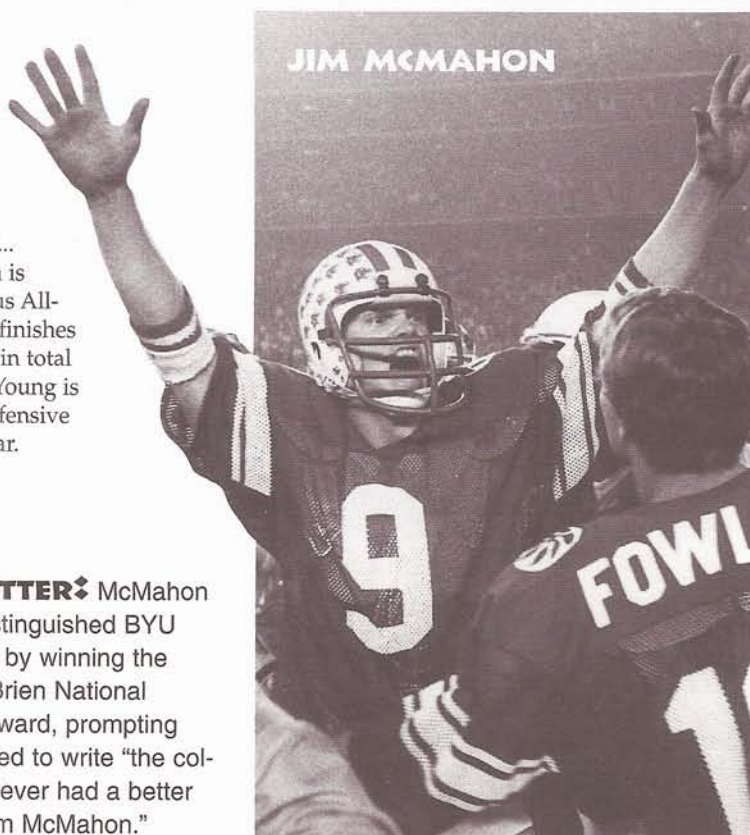

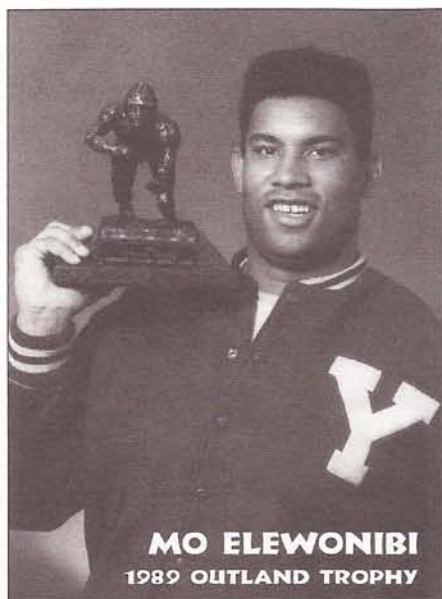

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... 1996 BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory of Kansas State...BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since 1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game...the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points

allowed (18.7)...James Dye leads the WAC and finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

1997BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

Roger French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi. Before coming to BYU, French coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included the offensive line and receivers.

Since French arrived at BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set an NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). Led by the likes of Jim McMahon, Steve Young, Ty Detmer and Steve Sarkisian, the Cougar offense has led the nation in passing eight times and in total offense three times. In 1996, Coach French received the top assistant coach award from the All-American Football Foundation at the VII Annual Banquet of Champions in Las Vegas, Nev.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota where he graduated in 1958. He later obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-America linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro football. French and his wife, Dody, have two daughters and six grandchildren.

He married former BYU All-America volleyball player and Hall of Famer Karen Curtis. They have three sons.

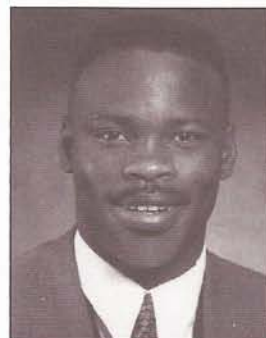

Lobendahn works with the offensive line.



From its modest beginning in 1875 to its current 631-acre campus located at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, Brigham Young University has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education over the past 123 years.

Originally established as the Brigham Young Academy on Oct. 16, 1875, BYU began with an enrollment of 29 elementary school students. Sponsored by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, the academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903 and is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university. With an enrollment of 29,011 full-time students, BYU is now the nation's largest private university.

A STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as 78 percent of the 1,460 faculty members hold doctoral degrees and the university is accredited by more than 100 educational, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue

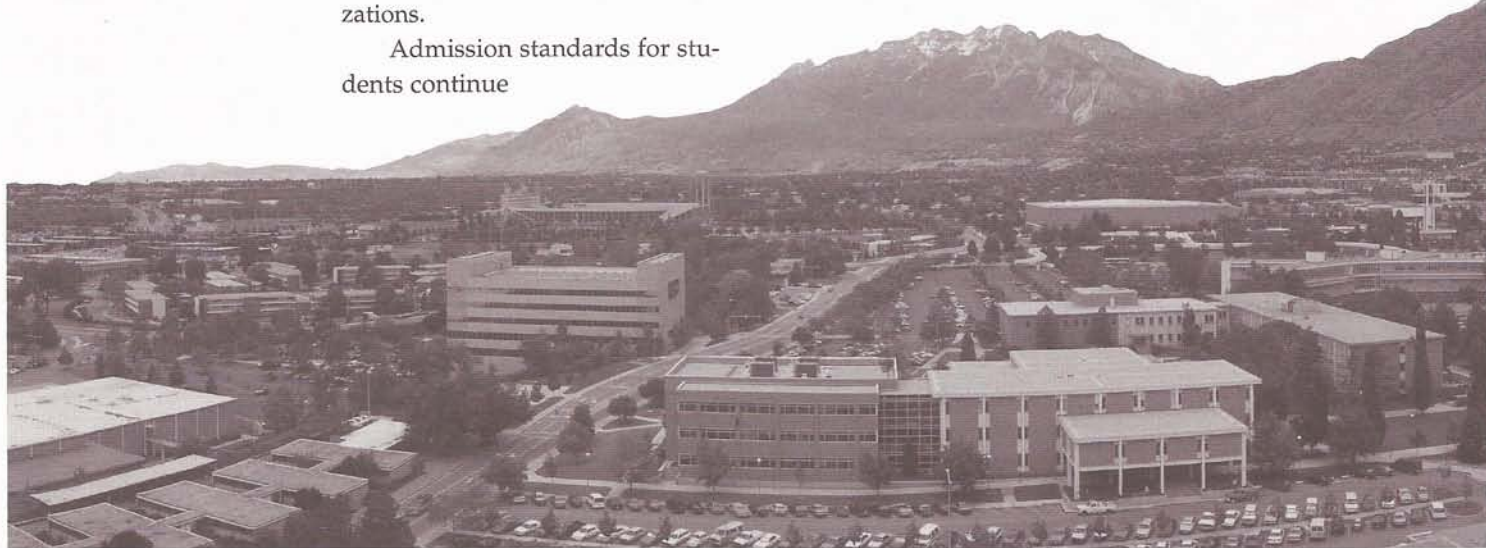
to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen in 1997 is 27, and the grade point average for new students is 3.7. BYU is ranked 11th in the nation for the number of National Merit Scholars in attendance.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Currently, BYU offers bachelor's degrees in 166 academic programs, master's degrees in 71, and doctorates in 33. Courses are available from 60 departments in 11 colleges, two areas of general undergraduate education, two professional schools, and graduate studies.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court. *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the school 33rd among the top 50 law schools in the nation in March 1997.

Other highly respected programs include the Marriott School of Management,

with its third-ranked accountancy department and highly rated MBA program, BYU's computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, and BYU's engineering programs.

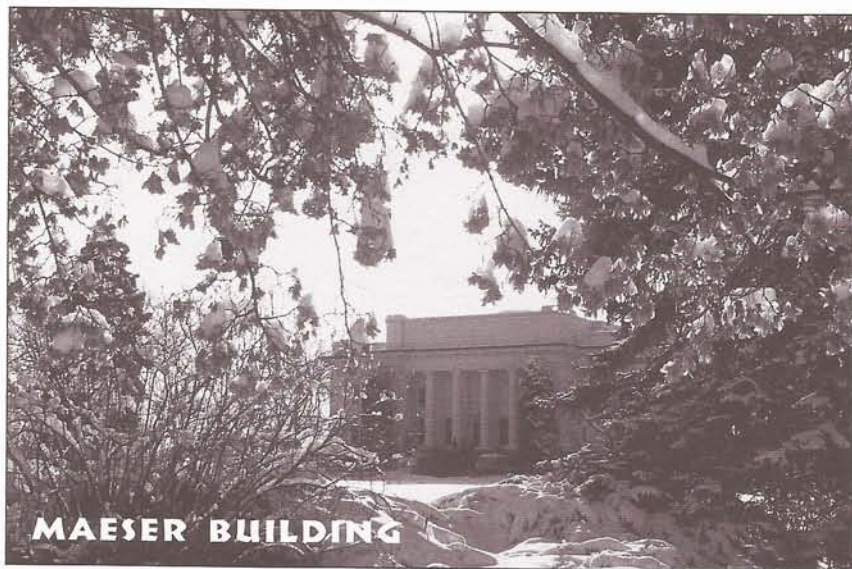
The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings.

FACILITIES

The campus is clean and well-kept with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Harold B. Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcast Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new Museum of Art was completed in 1994.

The campus is currently undergoing many construction projects including creation of a new health center and a 235,000 square-foot expansion of the Lee Library. Completion of the library is estimated for Spring 1999 with renovations scheduled to be finished in Dec. 1999.



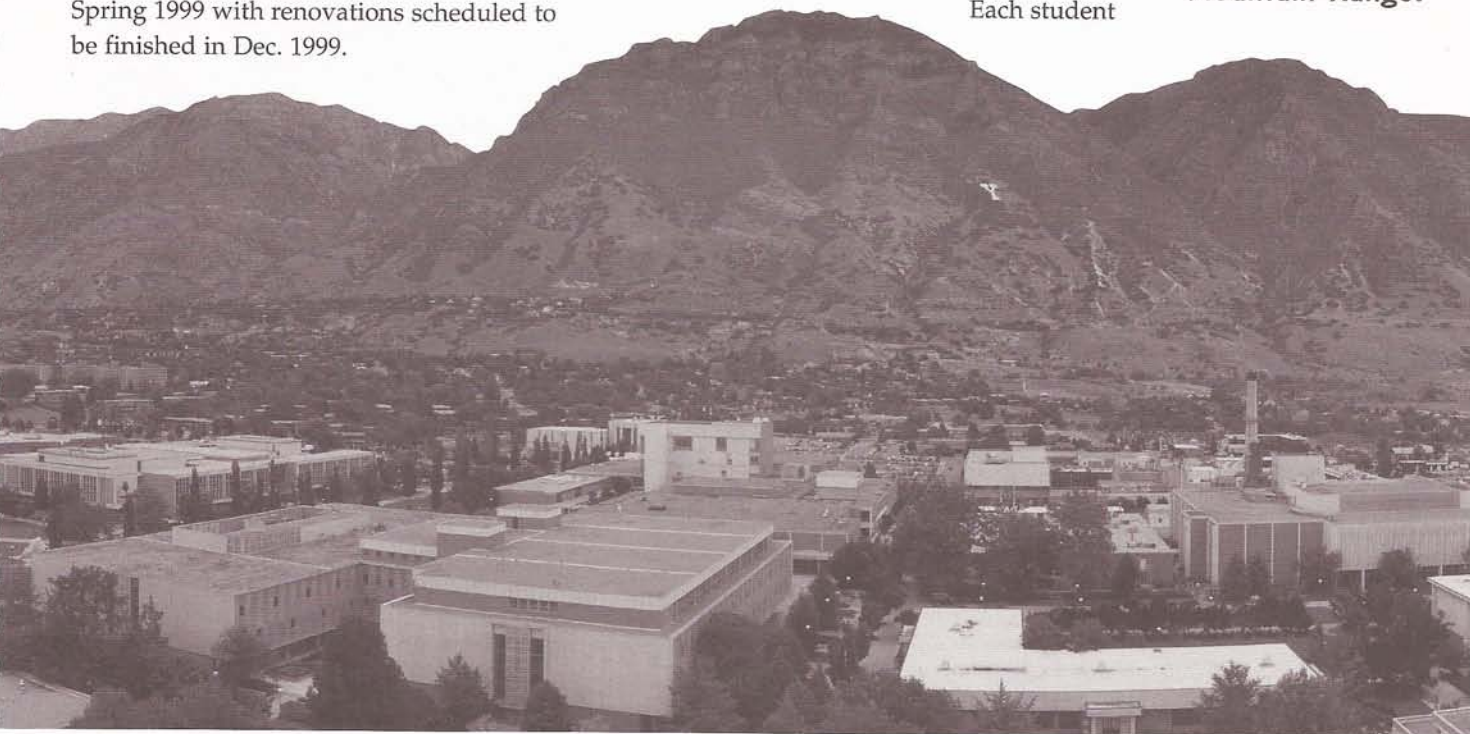
The library addition and remodeled building will provide the infrastructure for electronic information services that will be an essential part of a BYU education in the next century.

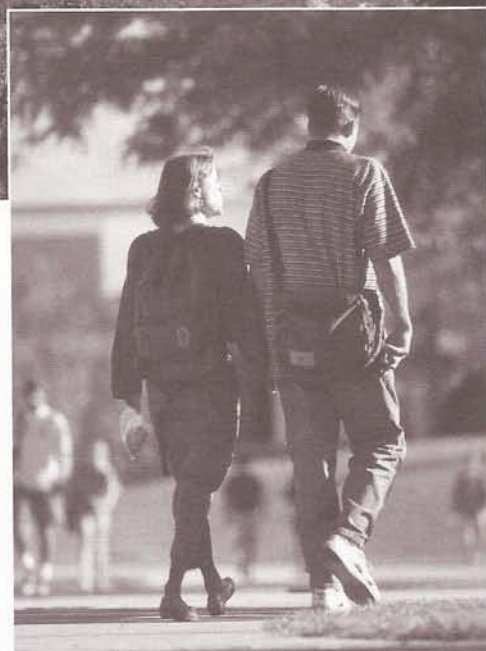

signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste — all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is LDS, over 25 other denominations are represented at BYU. Admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nearly 22 percent of the student body is married, and the 28,300 students represent every state in the United States (32 percent from Utah) and more than 100 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, many having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church.

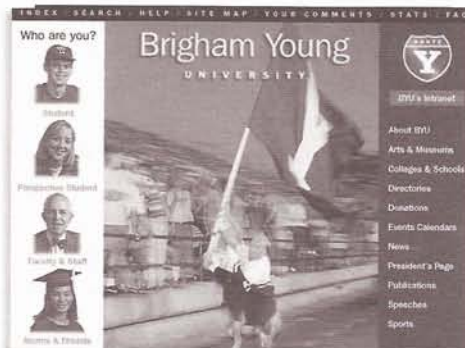


One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God.

A BEAUTIFUL SETTING

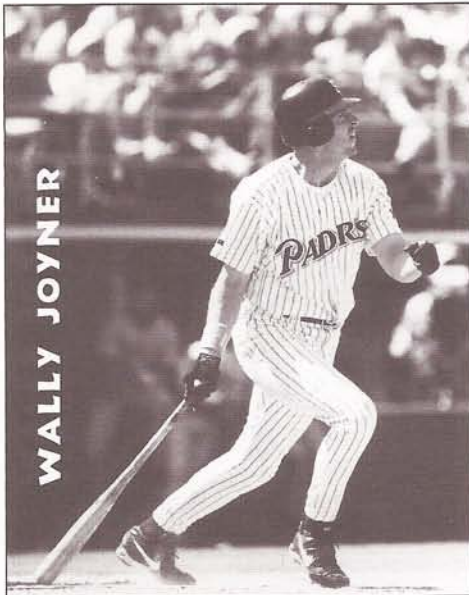

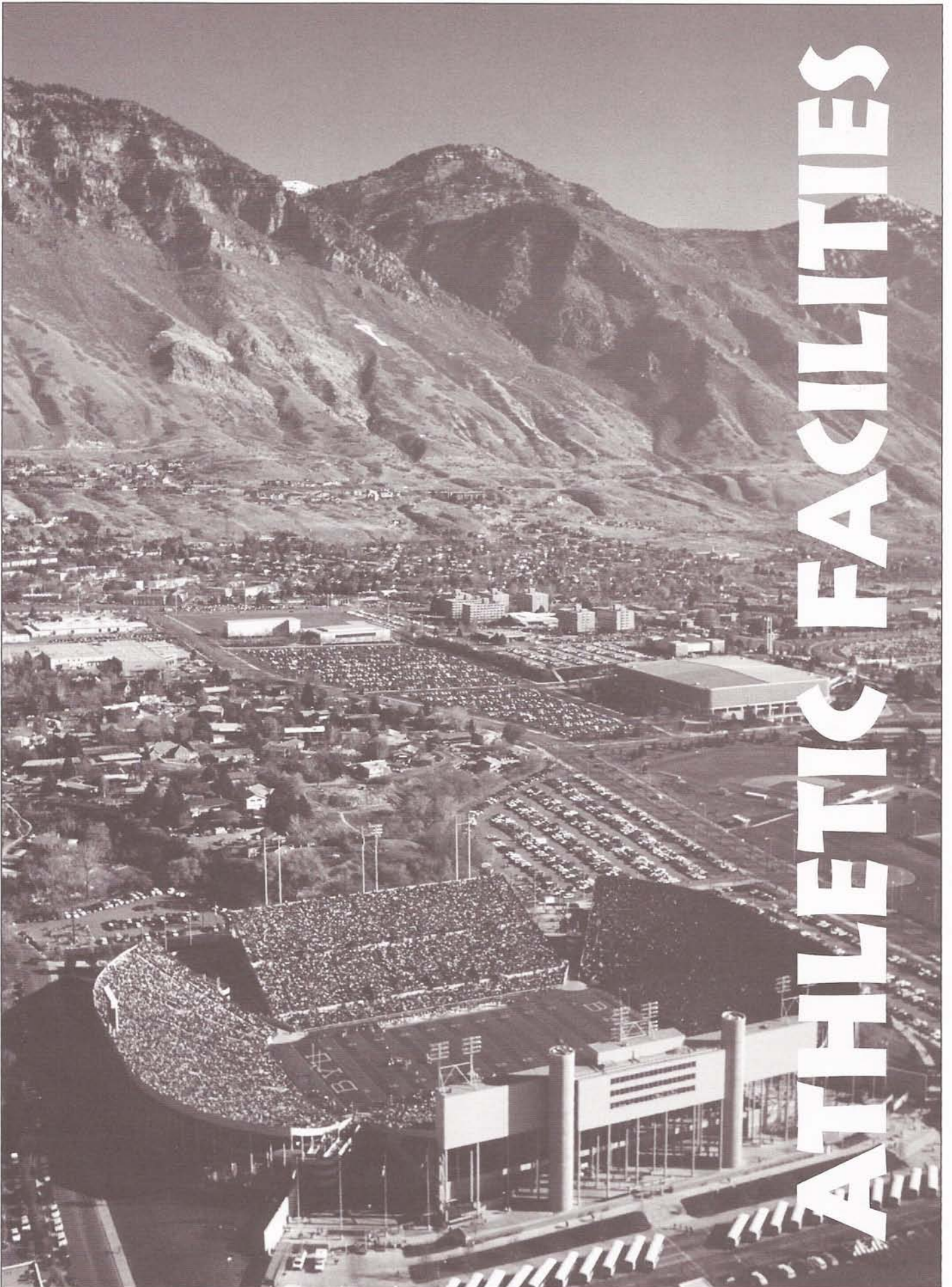

Much of the success of the BYU athletic program can be attributed to the top-notch facilities available to athletes on campus.

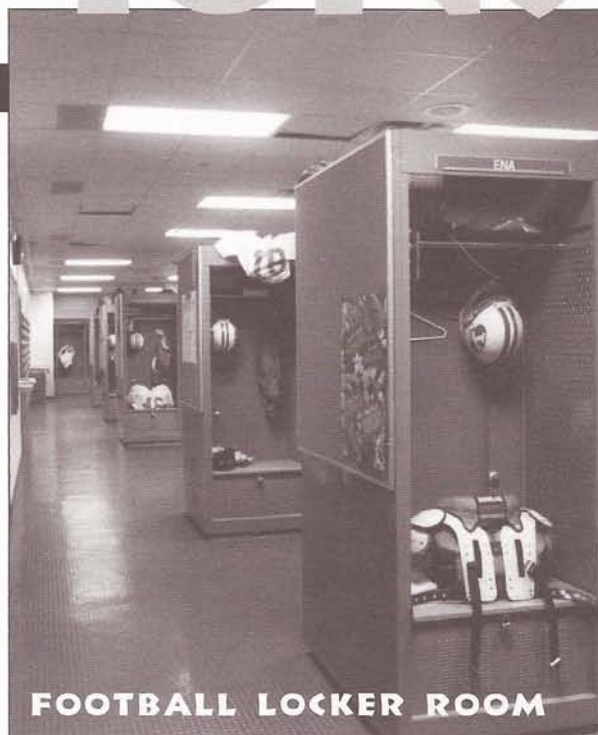
STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Success begins with training, and BYU has a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning center with nearly 10,000 feet of working space that ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations to accommodate both female and male athletes.

A well-structured strength and conditioning program is playing an increasingly vital role in the success of collegiate football programs.

PLAYING FACILITIES

The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Broadcasters and sports writers from around the country are inevitably impressed with the magnificent view of Mt. Timpanogos and the Wasatch Mountain Range that can be seen



FOOTBALL LOCKER ROOM

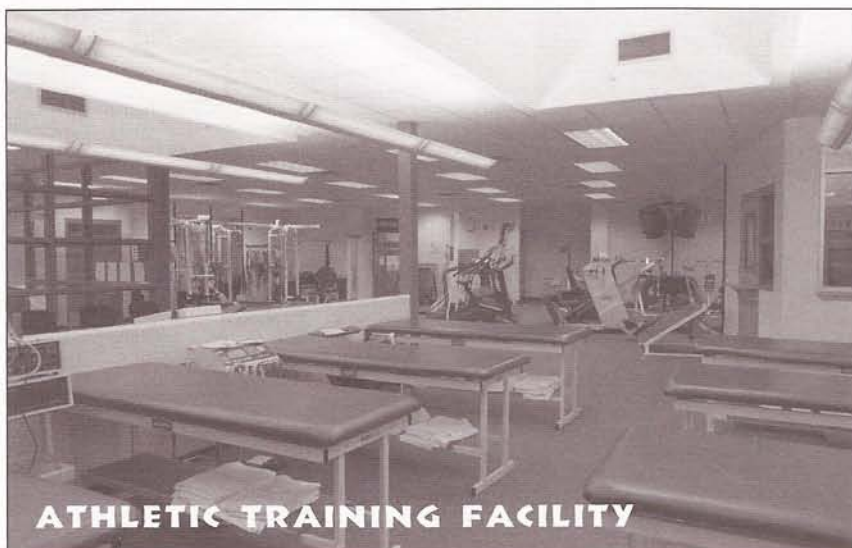
from the stadium press box. In 1996, a 23 x 31 foot video wall that shows instant replays during football games was added to the south end zone of Cougar Stadium.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, one of the largest on-campus basketball arenas in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

The baseball field and the outdoor track facilities are also rated among the nation's finest. BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. A compact design allows spectators to watch both running and field events at the same time. The NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships were held at BYU in 1982 and 1989.

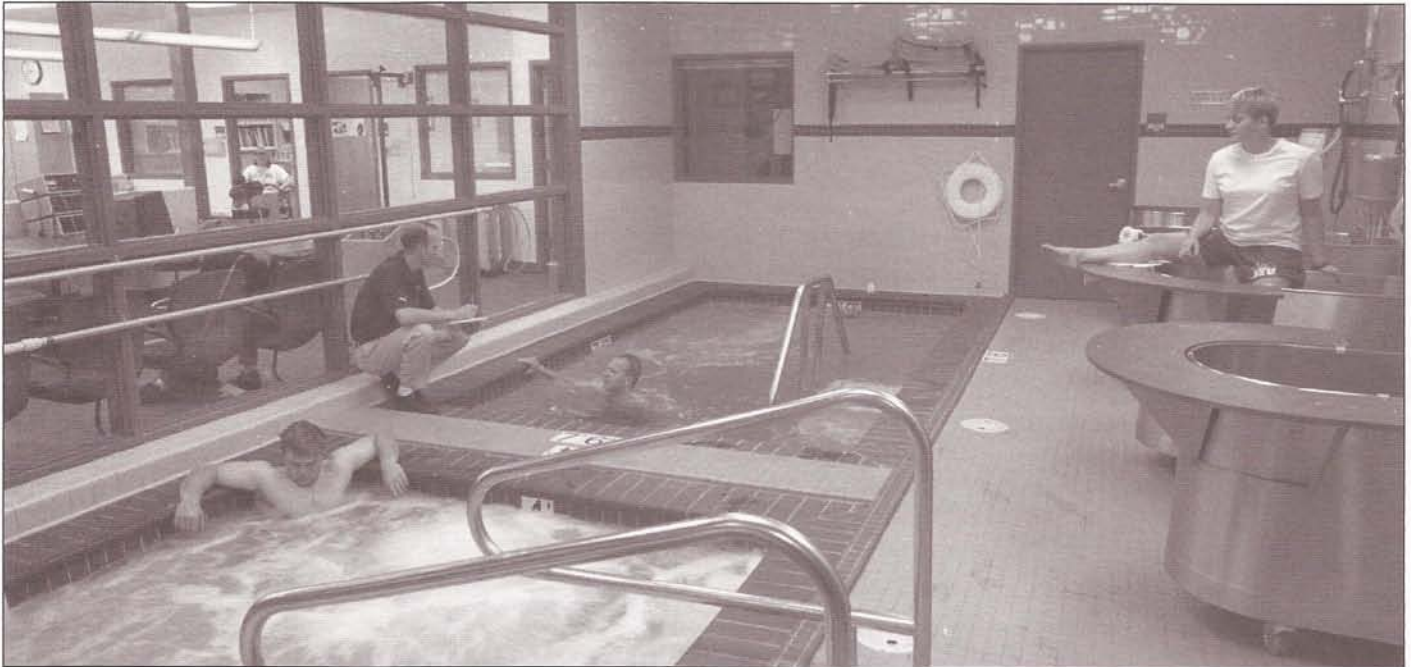
Located just east of the track stadium is the BYU baseball diamond with a seating capacity of up to 4,000.

locker room and athletic training facilities in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was finished in March of 1996.

The Smith Fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport and includes a one-fifth mile rubberized track that surrounds three basketball courts and an artificial turf practice area.

INDIVIDUAL ATTENTION

BYU's athletic training staff is responsible for the care of student-athletes from the time they arrive on campus, aiding in the prevention of injuries.

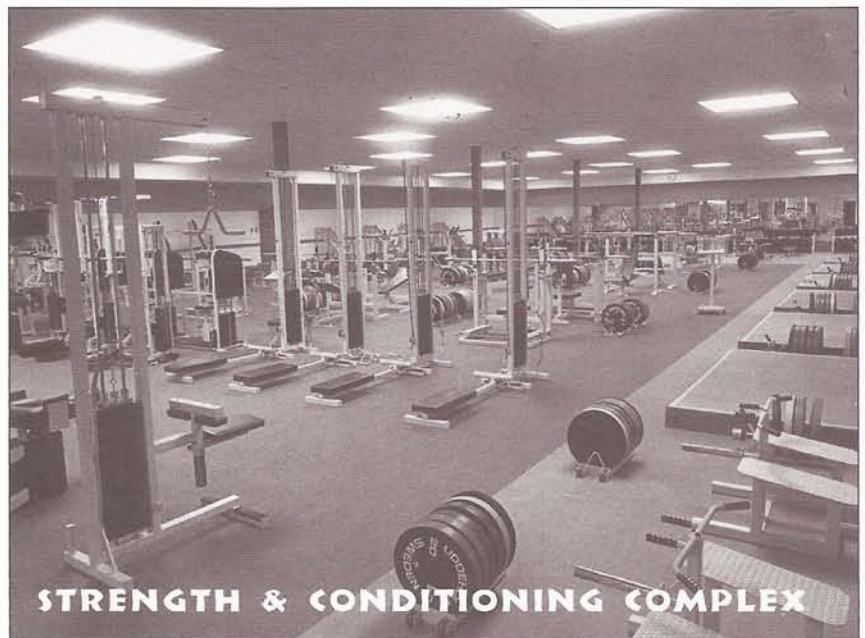
When student-athletes do get injured, they are treated by one of the nation's most qualified athletic training staffs. The staff includes certified athletic trainers, a sports physical therapist, a team physician, team orthopedic surgeons and a wide variety of other medical specialists.

BYU athletic trainers are concerned with much more than just improvement in the weight room. They are committed to improving the athletes' overall fitness and health.

The primary goal of the BYU program is to keep athletes healthy and prepared for competition by reducing their susceptibility to injury. BYU's strength and conditioning staff has experienced excellent results through its computer analyzed combination

of a strict weight and conditioning program, a carefully planned diet and sufficient rest.

A well-balanced diet is important to keeping student-athletes healthy throughout the year. BYU's training table has long been praised as one of the finest in the nation. BYU players are treated to a variety of nutritious meals that are planned by professionals in the fields of institution management and food and nutrition dietetics.

When BYU launched its football program at the turn of the century, pasture lands and city parks were used for football playing fields. Now, the 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium is home to BYU football, and since its expansion in 1982, ranks consistently among the nation's top-25 in attendance every year.

In 1996, BYU added a 23 x 31 foot video wall in the south end zone that shows live action and instant replays during football games. A new 17 x 25 animation board and sound system was also added to the north stands.

Fan support at home has enabled BYU

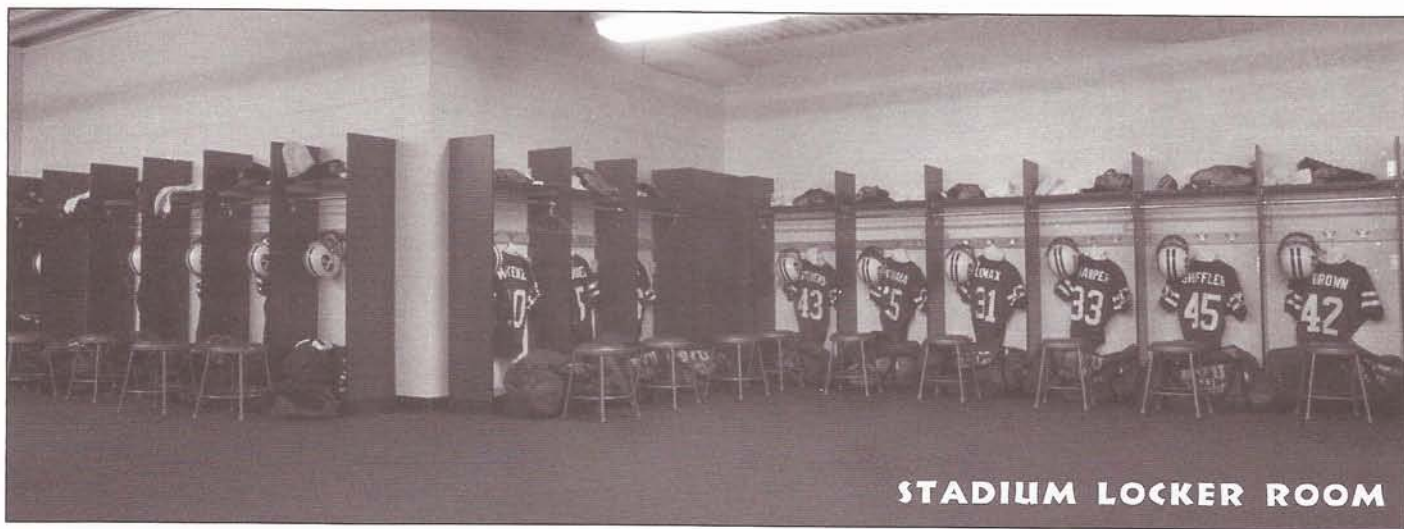
to schedule home and away contests with the likes of Notre Dame, Penn State, Washington and UCLA. Since the expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the finest football facilities in the country.

Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a grass playing surface deemed one of the best in the country and a four-level press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."

The press box has been nicknamed the "Provo Marriott" by the media who cover

BYU football. It runs the entire length of the west stands, rising more than 10 stories high. It also contains 42 lockers which each seat up to 12 people, on the first two levels.

"Almost anyone that goes in for the first time will say that it is the finest press box they've ever seen," said BYU's former electronic media director Jay Monsen.

"I've been to places like USC, Nebraska and Oregon and I haven't seen anything that compares," said promotions director Dave Champlin.

The third level is reserved for working media and the fourth level is for television coverage and game filming. Press box access is aided by three elevators standing 144 feet (approximately 14 stories).

BYU's first stadium was a 10,000-seat hillside facility where the Richards Building now stands. A 30,000-seat stadium at the present location opened in 1964 but as many as 47,000 crammed into the stands and the grassy hill above the north end zone. Interest in BYU football grew more and more with each year and each WAC championship. In the year before its expansion, the 35,000-seat Cougar stadium averaged over 40,000 a game in attendance.

Expansion included lowering the field eight feet, taking out the track (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships), adding end zone seating and box seats along the west stands. Over 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the

expansion effort, which is enough to build a sidewalk from BYU to the University of Utah and then some.

Each end zone structure contains 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats 15,000 people. Concession and dining areas are on the ground level under the end zone seats.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing of two inches of rain in one hour. Under the grass, there are six inches of gravel and 12 inches of sand mixed with loam and the sod. An automatic sensor system regulates the moisture content of the field by turning on sprinklers when they are needed. A light snow can be washed off the field via the sprinkling system.

Besides fall and spring football, the stadium is used for the July 4th Spectacular, "Stadium of Fire", part of America's Freedom Festival.

The stadium houses the Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room, which is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets during the year.

In addition to office areas, the stadium has a great deal of storage space, including one of North America's largest Jurassic dinosaur collections.

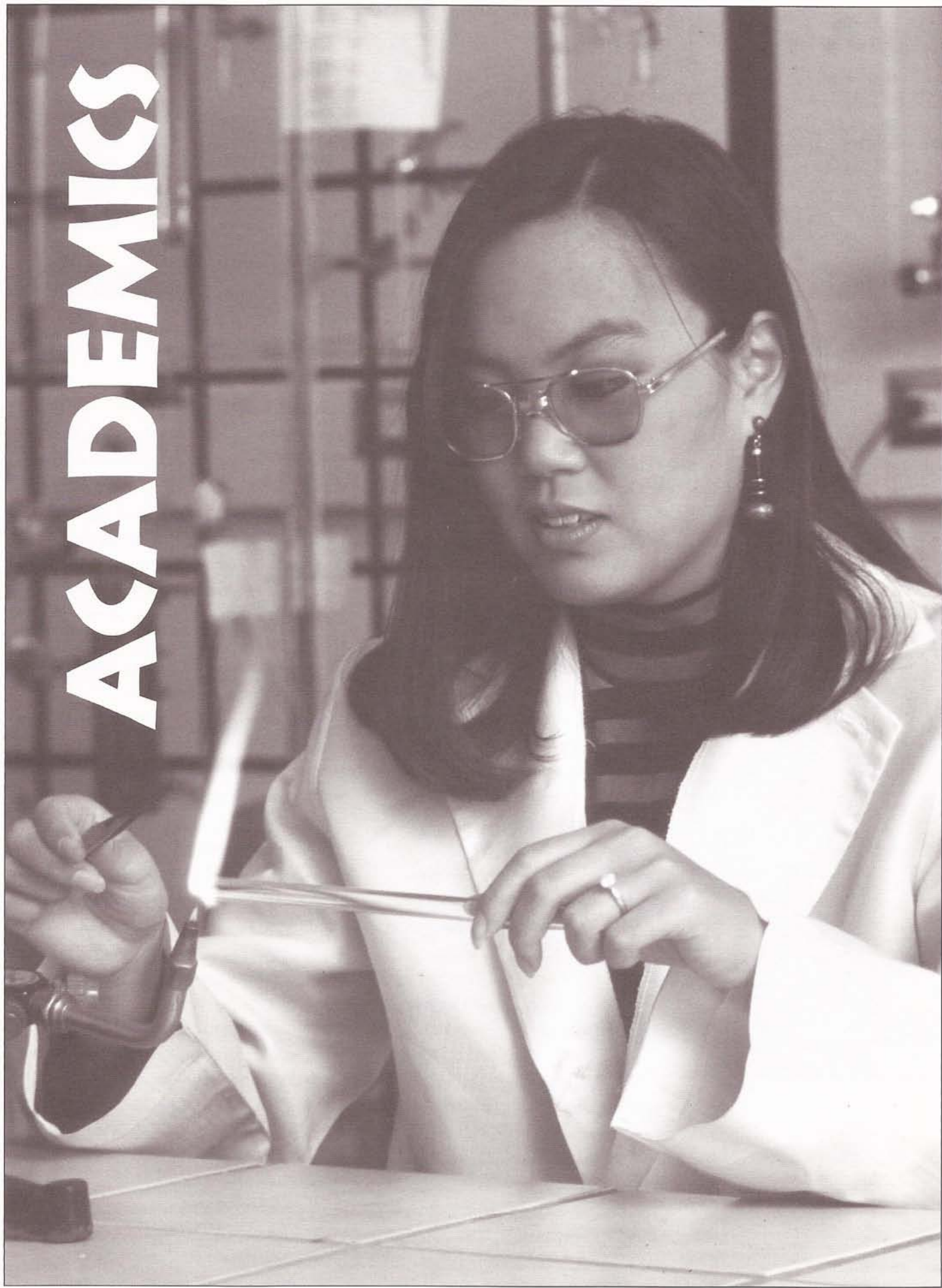

A Degree for A LIFETIME

ATHLETIC & ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities across America. Brigham Young University is one of the elite institutions that annually earns praise for its achievements in the classroom and on the field of play.

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office at BYU was established to provide the student-athlete with solid academic counsel while participating in inter-collegiate athletics.

PURPOSE & OBJECTIVE

The single most important goal of this office is to ensure student-athletes who leave BYU obtain a bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study.

To achieve this goal, Assistant Athletic Director Jim Kimmel and his staff at the Athletic Academic Advisement Office provide a comprehensive support service program which enables the student-athlete to make use of all the

resources at the University to make academic progress and to graduate.

The role of the advisor includes close monitoring of academic problems, instituting and organizing educational programs, and coordinating support services with other academic and non-academic units to help in the

retention and academic success of the student athlete.

SERVICES PROVIDED

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office provides the following services to student-athletes:

1. Academic Success Strategy Workshops are presented during the first few weeks of every semester. Topics include: Time Management, Note Taking, Effective Textbook Reading, Test Taking, and Stress Management.

2. Individual tutoring for student-athletes receiving scholarships.

The mentor/tutor program provides one-on-one academic assistance designed to facilitate the development of the student-athlete's academic success skills.

3. Teaching assistant sessions available for all student-athletes.

4. Computer lab privileges available for student-athletes on scholarship. Lap-top computers are available to check out for road trips.

5. Personal and Career Counseling.

6. Sports Psychology services.

7. Referrals to connect student-athletes with learning disabilities to the Services for Students with Disabilities office.

8. Contemporary issues class (Health 201) for Freshman and transfer student-athletes. Topics discussed include: substance abuse and violence, women's issues, nutrition, gambling, media relations, agents, eating disorders, NCAA eligibility rules, and academic issues.

NCAA CHAMPS

LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

Beginning this fall, the Athletic Department will become a member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. CHAMPS is an acronym for "Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success." The CHAMPS/Life Skills program is designed to address the "total development" of the student-athlete. There are five vital components to the CHAMPS/Life Skills program including commitment to academics, athletics, personal development, service, and career. "We are enthusiastic about what this program has to offer our student-athletes," Kimmel said.



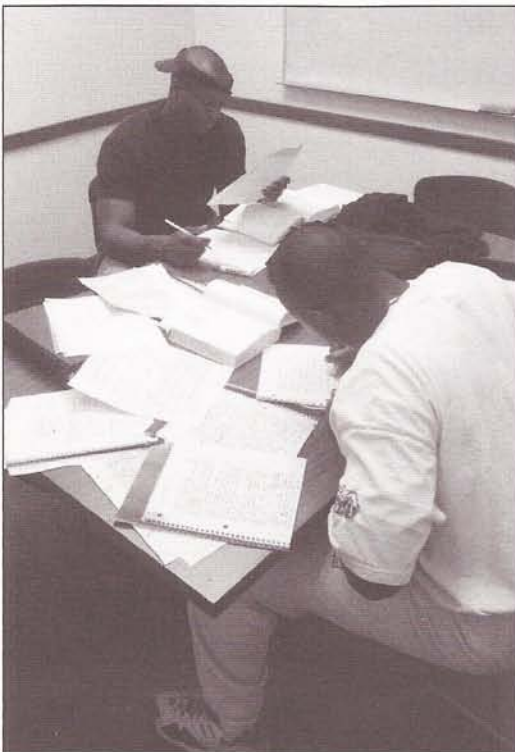
RECOGNITION

This past year, 68 percent of BYU's 472 athletes qualified as Academic Athletes, the

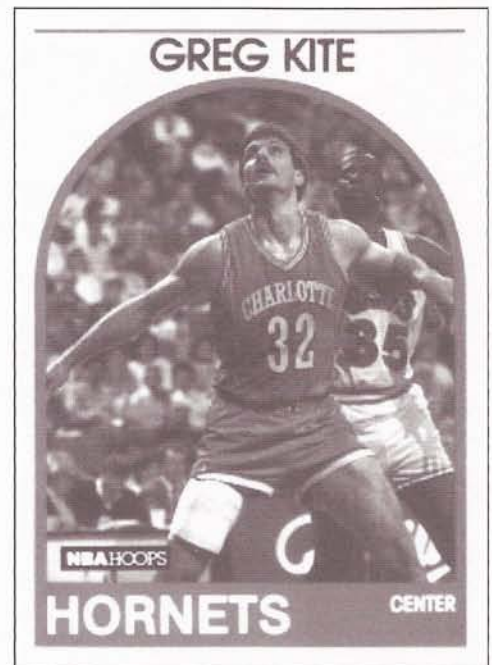
highest percentage in the program's eleven-year history.

The average GPA among this year's Academic Athletes was an impressive 3.6 — a reflection of the high academic achievement of BYU athletes.

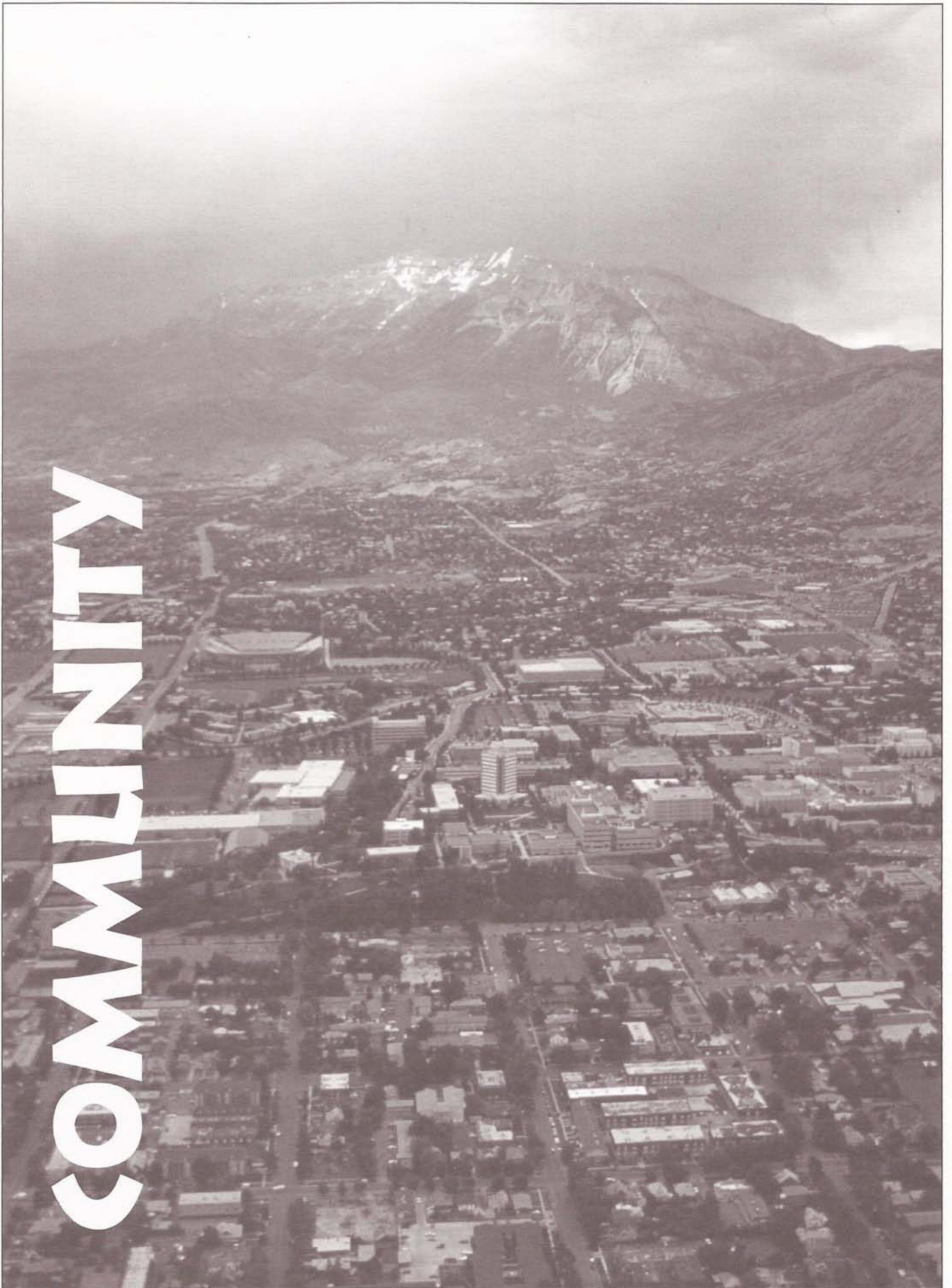

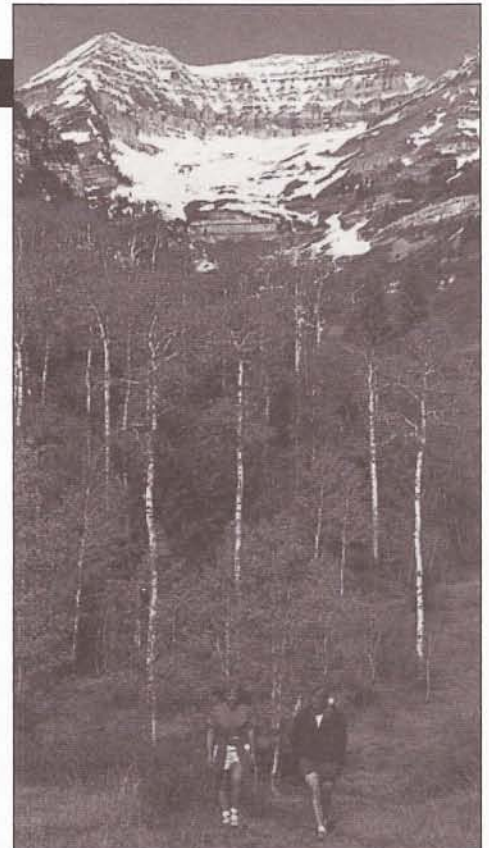

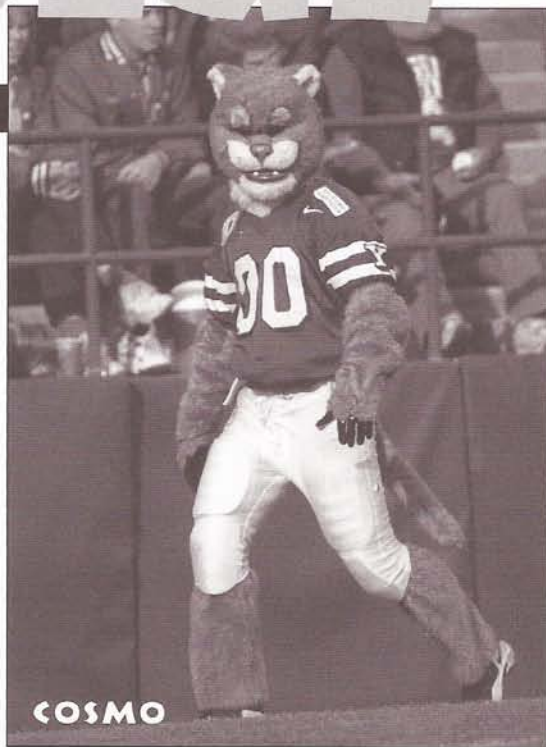
RISE AND SHOUT THE COUGARS ARE OUT...

BYU football officially began in 1922 under the direction of head coach Alvin Twitchell. Today, more than seven decades later, spirited Cougar fans nationwide and from all over the state of Utah continue their strong support of the mighty blue and white. BYU consistently ranks nationally in the top 25 in football and has one of the nation's premier booster organizations — The Cougar Club.

"Y" MOUNTAIN

The most visible symbol of BYU spirit is found high in the mountains east of Brigham Young University. The enormous block letter "Y" measures 465 feet high and is acclaimed as the largest sign in the country — larger than the letters spelling "HOLLYWOOD" and larger than any neon sign on Times Square.

The 32,847 square foot structure dates back to 1906 when a drafting professor and several students made plans to put a large block BYU on the mountain. The student body formed an assembly line passing sand, rocks and lime up the side of the mountain for an entire day. The task became arduous and the idea of putting a



"B" and "U" on either side of the "Y" was abandoned.

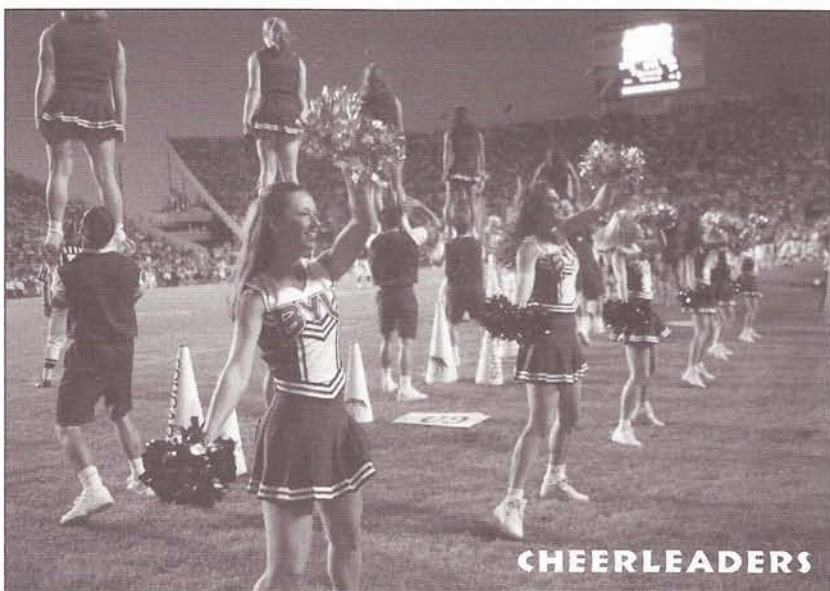
For decades the "Y" was whitewashed annually by students to show school spirit. In 1978, the face of the Y was coated with gunite—a mixture of sand and white cement—and painted with 155 gallons of paint which was transported by helicopter.

In 1924, BYU began lighting the "Y" during homecoming, graduation and other special events.

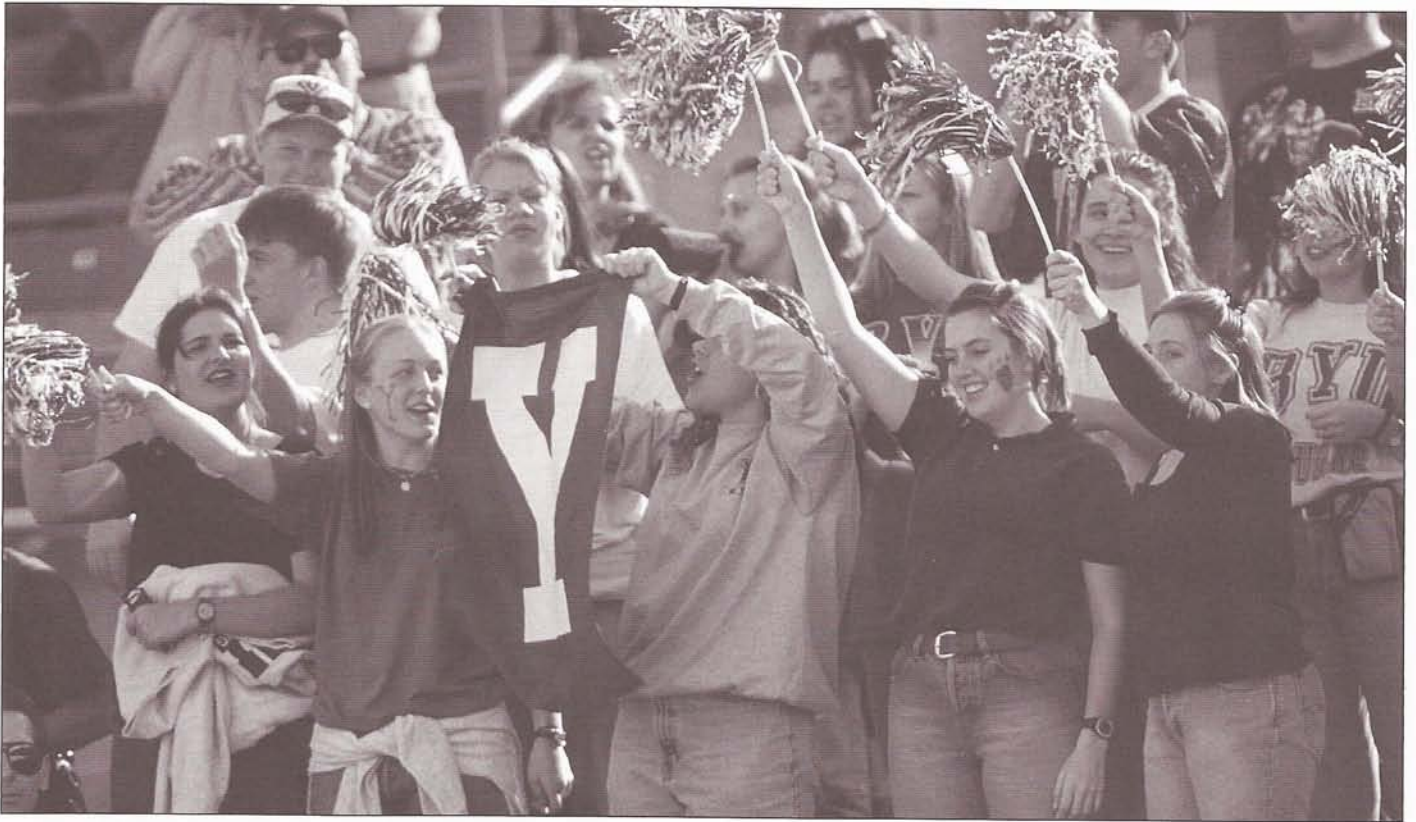
COSMO THE COUGAR

Another generator of BYU spirit is BYU's mascot, Cosmo the Cougar. Cosmo's story began on Oct. 1, 1923 when Coach Eugene L. Roberts used the cougar to describe his athletes. At that time, the cougar, a native Utah animal, was looked upon very favorably because of its powerful, agile and wise nature.

In 1925, a BYU alumnus contacted Coach Roberts informing him of a mother cougar and three kittens that had been captured. Two of these kittens were brought to Provo and kept as mascots. But problems resulted from keeping live cougars for mascots, so in 1953 pep chair-

man Dwayne Stevenson came up with a new version of the cougar mascot — Cosmo had arrived. The acrobatic and high-spirited animal has helped cheer the Cougars to victory ever since.

Over the years Cosmo has undergone a series of changes. The 1997 version of Cosmo underwent major “Cosmotic” surgery and a new-and-improved version was introduced to Cougar faithful at the football season opener against Washington.

THE CHEERLEADERS

Imagine an athletic team consisting of both women and men athletes who practice three hours a day, three days a week for the sole purpose of enhancing the efforts of other athletic teams. There is only one team that fits this description—the BYU Cheer Squad. It is the responsibility of this team to lead cheers and unify the crowd at BYU’s athletic events, and has been ever since the first pass was thrown and the first basket was made.

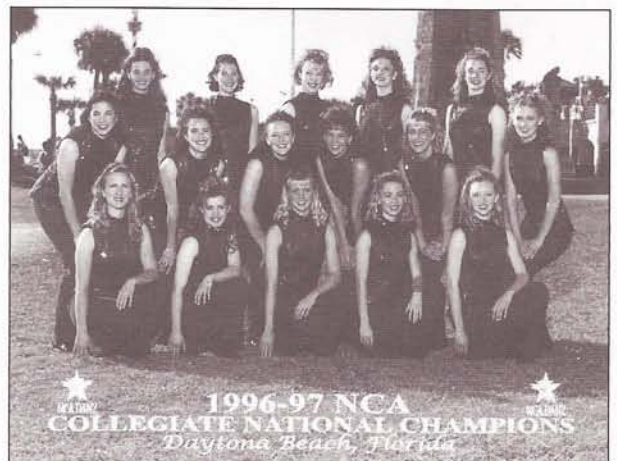
They backflipped and cheered their way to a second place finish in their national competition on March 26, 1997. Basketball season is another time to shine, as they dance during time outs.

COUGARETTES

Brigham Young University’s precision dance team, the Cougarettes, won the National Cheerleading Championship at the NCAA Collegiate Dance Competition in Daytona Beach, Fla., on April 4, 1997.

To be a member of the BYU Cougarettes precision dance squad not only takes experience, education and motivation, it takes dedication and technique.

The Cougarettes were organized in 1946 as a spirit group. Their mission was to support athletics on campus. Throughout the past 51 years, the Cougarettes have undergone a series of changes, moving from a marching drill team to a precision jazz dance team. They often perform at BYU halftimes.

BYU ATHLETICS

FROM HUMBLE BEGINNINGS...

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has built a legacy of success.

In 1991, *USA TODAY* ranked the BYU men's sports program 18th in the nation and the women's sports program ninth. This past year (1997-98) the Cougars finished 18th in the nation in the annual Sears Directors Cup sponsored by *USA TODAY* and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

The University sponsors 20 NCAA-sanctioned varsity sports and captured men's national championships in football (1984), outdoor track (1970), and golf (1981) as well as a women's national title in cross country (1997). Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top 20 numerous times — reaching the Elite Eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981.

In 1997-98, BYU had six teams finish their respective seasons ranked among the

nation's top 10 (women's cross country, men's gymnastics, women's tennis, women's outdoor track, men's and women's volleyball), and seven others finished ranked in the top 25 (women's gymnastics, women's swimming, women's indoor track, women's soccer, men's golf, men's outdoor track, men's cross country).

Since the inception of the Western Athletic Conference in July 1962, BYU has won more championships than any other member. In fact, during the last three decades, the Cougars have won 60 percent of the WAC championships. Included in these team titles are 10 consecutive football championships from 1976 through 1985. BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

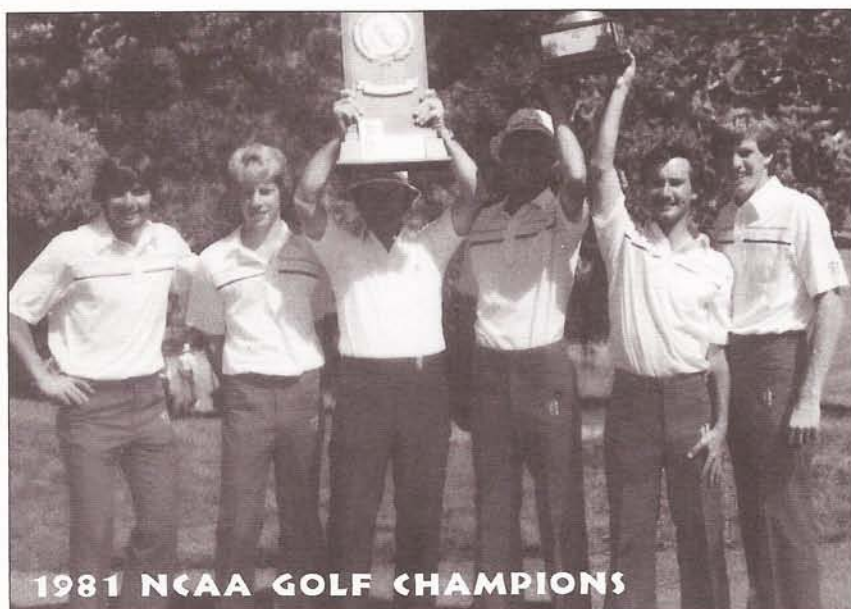
In addition, three former Cougar athletes walked away with four medals during the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, with Frank Fredericks capturing silver medals in the 100 and 200 meter runs, the late Oluyemi Kayode winning a silver medal in the 4x100 relay, and Christy Opara Thompson receiving a bronze in the 4x100 relays. Fredericks also added silver medals in the 100 and 200 at the Atlanta Olympics in 1996.

Like every success story, the tradition of winning at BYU had a slow start and a humble beginning.

THE EARLY YEARS

A chronicle of the late 1890s recorded the first intercollegiate event on campus. It was a two-sport meeting between Brigham Young Academy and Utah on May 18, 1895 in Provo. There was track in the morning and a baseball game in the afternoon. The locals fared very well in track and field. However, the baseball game ended in a tie when a protested call climaxed into a wild fistfight.

Keith Clearwater, Rick Fehr, Coach Tucker, David DeSantis, Dick Zokol and Rick Fehr won the 1981 NCAA Golf Championship.

In a time period when the school leaders were fighting to keep the doors open at the University it became difficult to support physical contests that could lead to inflamed feelings, surly language, and possible bodily injury. In the year following the fight in Provo, the Academy's football team engaged Utah in a contest in Salt Lake City where a vicious fight erupted between the rival fans, and it didn't end until a squad of policemen arrived. Final score: BYU 8, Utah 6.

Because of in-state fatalities from football, Karl G. Maeser, then superintendent of church schools, voted for a suspension of the game, which remained in effect until 1922. In 1921, a year before football returned to BYU, the following was printed in the *Banyan*: "Next year the varsity football begins. . . The red-blooded action demanded by the game has aroused our ambitions. Football has come to stay."

It may have taken longer than expected—like 40 or 50 years—but the Cougars finally reached that plateau. But the longer the haul, the sharper the appreciation. And it was a long haul.

In the first year of "the return" in 1922, the Cougars played six games, scored a total of 10 points for the season, and were shut out in four contests. But things would improve.

The first athlete to bring national and international attention to the school was Alma Richards, a slender, all-around athlete from Parowan, Utah. A high jumper and track athlete, Richards captured a gold medal in the Summer Olympics at Stockholm, Sweden, in 1912. Indeed, Richards was an athlete of such quality that he was favorably compared with legendary Jim Thorpe, who won a gold medal in the decathlon at Stockholm. A few years later at the World's Fair in San Francisco, Alma won the decathlon with 1,000 more points than Thorpe had scored at Stockholm.

That same year another BYU athlete, Clint Larsen, high jumped 6-7, a mark that surpassed the world record. Both Richards and Larsen were coached by the legendary E.L. Roberts, who coached every competitive men's sport at BYU.

BASKETBALL TAKES CENTER STAGE

Another coach who made a tremendous impact on BYU athletics was Stan Watts. Watts took over an improving basketball program in 1948 and with the help of players like Joe Richey, Harold Christensen, Dean Larsen, Terry Tebbs, Tom Steinke, John Fairchild, and Kresimir Cosic, he would win eight conference titles, two NIT championships, and escort the team on three major tours abroad.

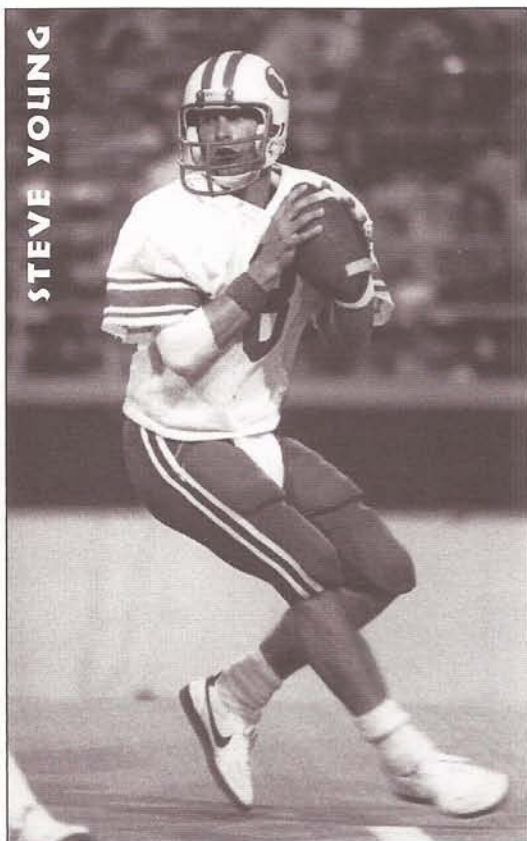
Led by Watts and 6'0 forward Roland Minson, the Cougars defeated St. Louis, Seton Hall and Dayton for the 1951 NIT Championship. At that time winning the NIT was like winning the NCAA tournament today. By winning the championship, BYU was forever put on the map and received a lot of attention in the national media. One

newspaper account read that the Cougars had "stolen away the hearts of the [Madison Square] Garden fans with their fight, sportsmanship and clean play."

Fifteen years later, in 1966, BYU returned again to Madison Square Garden under Watts and claimed its second NIT title. For many fans these were the real "glory days" of basketball. But there was more to come.

BYU outgrew the 10,000-seat George Albert Smith Fieldhouse, and in 1971, the Cougars moved into the Marriott Center—the largest on-campus facility in the nation at the time. With a capacity of 23,000, there was some concern about filling the new arena. In

the first year it was open, the Cougars posted a 12-0 record at home and averaged 21,818 fans per game. The stars of the '70s, '80s, and early '90s included Cosic (All-American his senior year), Danny Ainge (winner of the Eastman and Wooden Awards as college basketball's top player), who led BYU to the Elite Eight in the NCAA tournament, Devin Durrant, Michael Smith, Andy Toolson, Fred Roberts, Greg Kite, Steve Trumbo and Shawn Bradley.



FOOTBALL COMES OF AGE

It was Virgil Carter in the 1960's who helped bring BYU football into the national spotlight. Behind the leadership of Carter and coach Tommy Hudspeth the Cougars won the school's first ever WAC championship in 1965. The next year Carter was selected as an All-American and became the first of a long line of outstanding quarterbacks at BYU.

The real coming of age for BYU football began in 1972 when LaVell Edwards became head coach. The quiet man from neighboring Orem, who, as a kid, used to dream of coaching while watching BYU practice, built a football dynasty that has become one of the most successful college football programs in the past 20 years.

In the 25 years Edwards has guided BYU, the Cougars have won outright or shared 18 WAC Championships. They have made 20 bowl appearances—17 of them consecutively—a national championship, and awards too numerous to mention. The team's passing game is regarded as one of the best and most consistent in college, and has produced numerous All-Americans and a Heisman Trophy winner.

Football fans in Provo will forever remember BYU's national championship year. In 1984 Edwards and his Cougars went 13-0 posting wins over Pittsburgh, Baylor, Air Force and Michigan in the Holiday Bowl. BYU had 13 opportunities to lose that year, but came away victors each time.

On January 3, 1985, BYU was voted as the top college football team in the nation in both the AP and UPI polls. This mountainous climb to the top typified BYU's winning attitude and laid the foundation of success for decades to come.

BUILDING THE LEGACY

The COUGAR CLUB

BUILDING BYU'S ATHLETIC LEGACY

Since 1964 the Cougar Club's fund-raising efforts have helped BYU build one of America's strongest collegiate athletic programs. Currently, the donations and support of nearly 4,000 Cougar Club members nationwide contribute to the success of BYU's teams. The mission of the Cougar Club is to promote athletic excellence, sportsmanship and integrity among the student athletes at Brigham Young University, both on and off the field of play.

"The Cougar Club has been on the front lines of athletic fund raising for more than three decades now," said athletic director Rondo Fehlberg. "Many of the great things we have done, like the 1984 National Football Championship and our 1996 Cotton Bowl victory, have been made possible by the contributions of Cougar Club members."

A VITAL ROLE

The Cougar Club provides essential funding to both men's and women's athletics, in addition to sponsoring programs that build athletic loyalty among Cougar fans, BYU alumni and other friends of the university. Such programs include the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame, football and basketball previews, pre-game activities before each home football game, monthly luncheons with coaches and players, satellite and replay broadcasts of home football and basketball games, club chapters in geographic areas of major support and more than 450 satellite representatives throughout the United States and Canada.

By funding all of BYU's athletic recruiting, the Cougar Club has helped attract some of the world's premier athletes to Provo, while sending BYU coaches on local, national and international recruiting trips to find athletes like former Cougars Danny Ainge, Steve Young, Wally Joyner, Johnny Miller and Frank Fredericks.

"The Cougar Club has been the financial support for our recruiting," said women's athletic director and head volleyball coach Elaine Michaelis. "We've been able to go and get athletes wherever we find them."

MEMBERSHIP LEVELS

There is a membership level in Cougar Club for every fan who wants BYU Athletics to continue to be successful. Individuals and businesses annually make tax-deductible Cougar Club contributions of between \$50 and \$5,000, based on their financial ability and on the athletics benefits they desire to receive.

To acknowledge the generosity of club members, the athletic department makes a number of benefits available to club members, including exclusive seating, free reserved parking, pre-game meetings before each home football game, free monthly luncheons with BYU coaches and athletes, athletic publications and the opportunity to purchase post-season tickets before the general public.

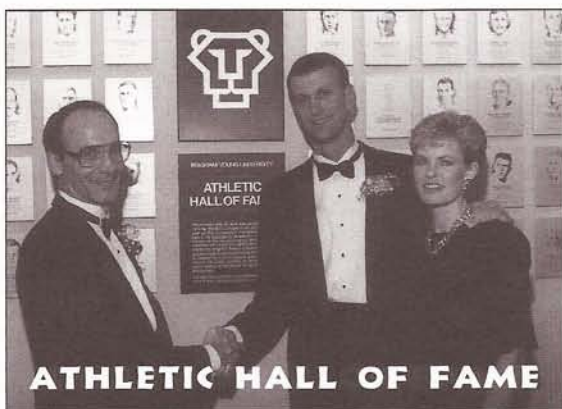

PEOPLE & PROGRAMS

The Cougar Club is committed to helping BYU athletes succeed in competition and in the classroom. The effectiveness of the club's efforts is reflected by the number of club members who also have close ties to the athletic program — coaches, former athletes and the parents of athletes who are currently competing for the university.

Among the club's many programs to encourage academic excellence, the Cougar Club sponsors the Annual Academic Athlete Banquet to honor all BYU student-athletes who earn a GPA of 3.2 or higher. Since the program started in 1986, the number of athletes qualifying for the award has more than doubled—an incredible 67 percent of varsity athletes qualified in 1997-98.

Cougar Club also sponsors BYU's academic tutoring program for student-athletes and has created a half-million dollar endow-

ment to provide post-eligibility scholarships to assist current and former athletes to finish their degrees.

EVENTS

For the enjoyment of club members and athletic department personnel, the Cougar Club annually sponsors more than 30 events, such as the Pigskin Family Picnic (Blue & White Game), the "Meet the Football Team" Watermelon Bust, the men's basketball Varsity Preview, the Reception for Female Athletes and monthly luncheons for the club's Salt Lake City and Utah County Chapters.

Other Cougar Club chapters that hold events of their own and cheer for the Cougars when they are on the road are currently organized in San Diego, Ventura and Fresno, Calif.; Las Vegas, Nev.; New Mexico; Hawai'i and Colorado with area representatives in many other areas of alumni concentration.

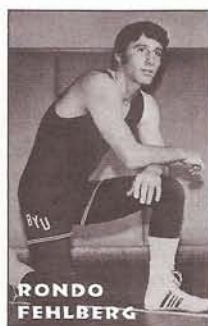

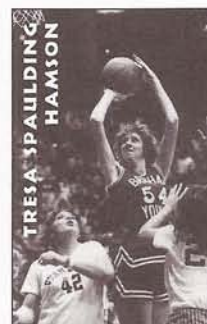

Merrill J.

BATEMAN



UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, officially began his duties on January 1, 1996.

Bateman, currently a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, succeeded President Rex E. Lee, who served as president for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described President Bateman as, "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."



Prior to assuming the presidency of BYU, President Bateman was the Presiding Bishop of the LDS church.

Bateman brings a strong background of administrative and academic experience to his new position. Before receiving his call to be a General Authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc., in England and the United States (1971-1975).

Born in Lehi, Utah and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, 1960-61, and a Danforth Fellow, 1960-64.

Early in his career, President Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964-67) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967-71). He was also a lecturer in economics at the University of Ghana in 1963.

President Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high councilor, stake president and regional representative. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

He is married to Marilyn Scholes Bateman and they are the parents of seven children; four boys and three girls. They also have 20 grandchildren.

Dr. K. Fred Skousen begins his first year as Advancement Vice President of Brigham Young University. Dr. Skousen is the author or co-author of more than 50 articles, research reports, and books, including: *An Introduction to the SEC*, *Intermediate Accounting*, *Accounting: Concepts and Applications*, and *Financial Accounting*.

Fred and his wife, Julie, have five sons, one daughter, and nine grandchildren.

Rondo FEHLBERG

DIRECTOR OF MEN'S ATHLETICS

Rondo Fehlberg has served as BYU's athletic director for the past three years and has brought new excitement to the athletic program.

Prior to his appointment in 1995, Fehlberg spent 16 years as an attorney and executive in the oil business. Most recently, he was vice president of International New Ventures at Pennzoil with responsibilities for development and maintenance of long-term business relationships in the international business community, especially the former Soviet Union.

A native of Worland, Wyo., Fehlberg received a B.A. degree from BYU in 1976. He served an LDS mission in Germany (1974-75) and later attended BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he received a Juris Doctor degree in 1979.

While in law school, he assisted in coaching the wrestling team. He was a three-time WAC

champion and had a career record of 74-11-1, including 34 pins.

Fehlberg compiled a 23-2 record as a senior at 150 pounds and placed fifth at the 1972 NCAA Championships. His gutsy performance earned him All-America status and helped him win BYU's Competitor Award. In 1987, he was inducted into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1982, Fehlberg went to work for Standard Oil of Ohio in Denver and later in Houston and London following Standard Oil's 1987 merger with British Petroleum.

Fehlberg served as a consultant to the 1994 World Cup Organizing Committee and is a member of the Strategic Planning Committee for NCAA Division I Athletic Directors.

Fehlberg married Mary Bloxham of Pinedale, Wyo., and they have five sons and a daughter.

Elaine MICHAELIS



DIR. OF WOMEN'S ATHLETICS

In 1995, Elaine Michaelis added the responsibility of Women's Athletic Director to her task of guiding one of the top volleyball teams in the nation.

In her 36th year at the helm of BYU's women's volleyball program, Michaelis, one of the top 5 winningest women's volleyball coaches in the nation with a record of 753-194-5 (.794), is the only BYU coach to have taken a team to an NCAA Final Four. She has coached her teams to 10 top 5 finishes and 18 top 10 national finishes.

Her best finishes were second place in 1973, fourth place in 1978, and an NCAA semifinal appearance in 1993. She has taken her teams to the NCAA tournament 13 times — placing 17th twice, 9th four times, 5th five times, and 3rd once.

Michaelis earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from BYU and has the rank of full athletic professional. In 1994 she was a recipient of the Dale Rex Award given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah. She was only the second woman to ever receive the award in its 49-year history.

She has also served as director of women's intramural and extramural programs at BYU for 10 years.

Pete WITBECK



SENIOR ASSOCIATE A.D.

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU for 49 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner.

He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff. In 1957, Witbeck was named the freshman basketball coach. During the next six years, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing just three times his last three seasons.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshman teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck has received the Dale Rex Memorial Award, given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980. He also is a member of the Raymond Hall of Fame and Utah Oldtime Athletes' Hall of Fame.

Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' assistant. During the next 10 years, the team won five WAC titles and was nationally ranked.

He has been in the athletic director's office since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC. In addition, he has administrative responsibilities for several Olympic sports.

Witbeck married Kathy Pickering and they have three children.

Meet THE WAC

NCAA'S LARGEST DIVISION 1-A CONFERENCE

The Western Athletic Conference begins its third year as the nation's largest NCAA Division I-A conference under uncertain circumstances. On June 2, 1998, BYU and seven other institutions announced their plans to leave the WAC in 1999.

BYU, UNLV, Wyoming, Air Force, Colorado State, San Diego State, New Mexico and the University of Utah announced their intentions to withdraw from the WAC and create a new conference beginning in June 1999. This news comes only two years after the WAC expanded to 16 institutions with the addition of UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa in 1996.



history traces back to 1962, when the original six-team league was created. The concept of a WAC began in 1958 when Brigham Young's Edwin Kimball, Leo Harris of Oregon and Roy S. Keen of Oregon State met during the NCAA Convention in

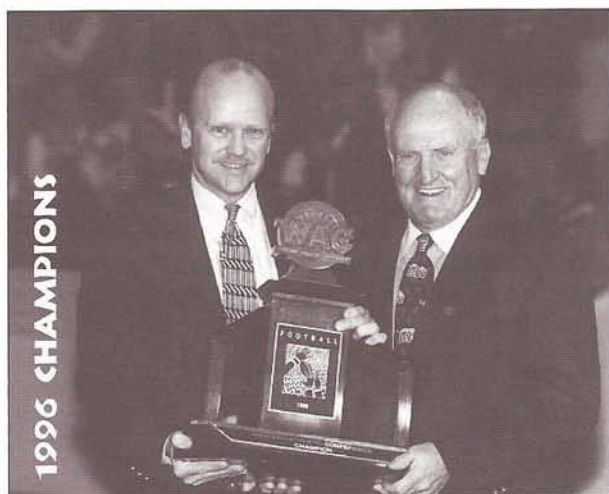
New York to discuss the "ideal conference" because problems existed in their alignments. They believed such a conference should have eight members with approximately the same goals, ideals and resources.

Although the meeting did not result in any action, it established an idea that again was discussed two years later at the 1960 NCAA Convention in New York. There, Dick Clausen, athletic director at Arizona, and Pete McDavid, athletic director at New Mexico, organized a meeting which included representatives of Oregon State, Oregon, Washington State, Brigham Young, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Arizona State. Glenn "Red" Jacoby of Wyoming also was to be invited to the meeting, but could not be located on short notice.

BYU's Dr. Kimball was elected the chairman of the group. Over the next two years plans were formulated as the faculty representatives and presidents became involved with the athletic directors in the deliberations.

While membership structure was debated, three of the group members — Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State — decided to re-align with the other Pacific Coast institutions, and the remaining university representatives were left to fill the openings. Although Wyoming, New Mexico State and Utah State applied, only Wyoming was accepted as the final charter member.

By the end of 1961, a working draft of a constitution, by-laws and operating code was drafted by Thomas Hall, the faculty representative at Arizona, and Paul Brechler, the WAC's first commissioner. On July 27, 1962, the conference officially was organized by the Presidents' Council when the original charter was signed,



DIVISIONAL FORMAT

Beginning with the 1996-97 season, the WAC adopted a divisional format for scheduling in which quadrants are utilized to

form two eight-team divisions the Pacific and Mountain. The quadrants rotate every year in men's and women's basketball and volleyball, and every other year in football, in order to promote a full-conference concept.

For the 1998 football season, quadrants one and two will comprise the Mountain Division while quadrants three and four make up the Pacific Division.

HISTORY

Compared to many of the nation's Division I conferences, the WAC is still in its youth. Its

and the name WAC was adopted. Charter members were Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference; the others were members of the Skyline.

A NEW CONFERENCE

The WAC began operation with the 1962-63 academic year, and several changes have occurred since. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. Since that time, membership additions include San Diego State (July 1978), Hawai'i (July 1979), the United States Air Force Academy (July 1980), and Fresno State (July 1992).

Paul Brechler was the WAC commissioner from 1962-68, Wiles Hallock from 1968-71, Stan Bates from 1971-80, Dr. Joe Kearney from 1980 to 1994 and Karl Benson 1994 to the present.

The WAC began competition with 10 sports, including football, basketball, track and field, baseball, wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and gymnastics. The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title. New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series, and less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Presently the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 21 sports — 11 men's and 10 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and wrestling. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Before July 1, 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91

athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name. With the addition of Air Force and Hawai'i women's programs as well as the six new members in 1996, all of the institutions' men's and women's teams will compete in the WAC for the first time.

During the 1997-98 season BYU women's teams won WAC championships in cross country, volleyball, indoor track, outdoor track and tennis, while the men's teams won titles in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. The women's cross country team captured the 1997 NCAA Cross Country title.

The WAC office has been located in the Denver area since the conference's inception with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

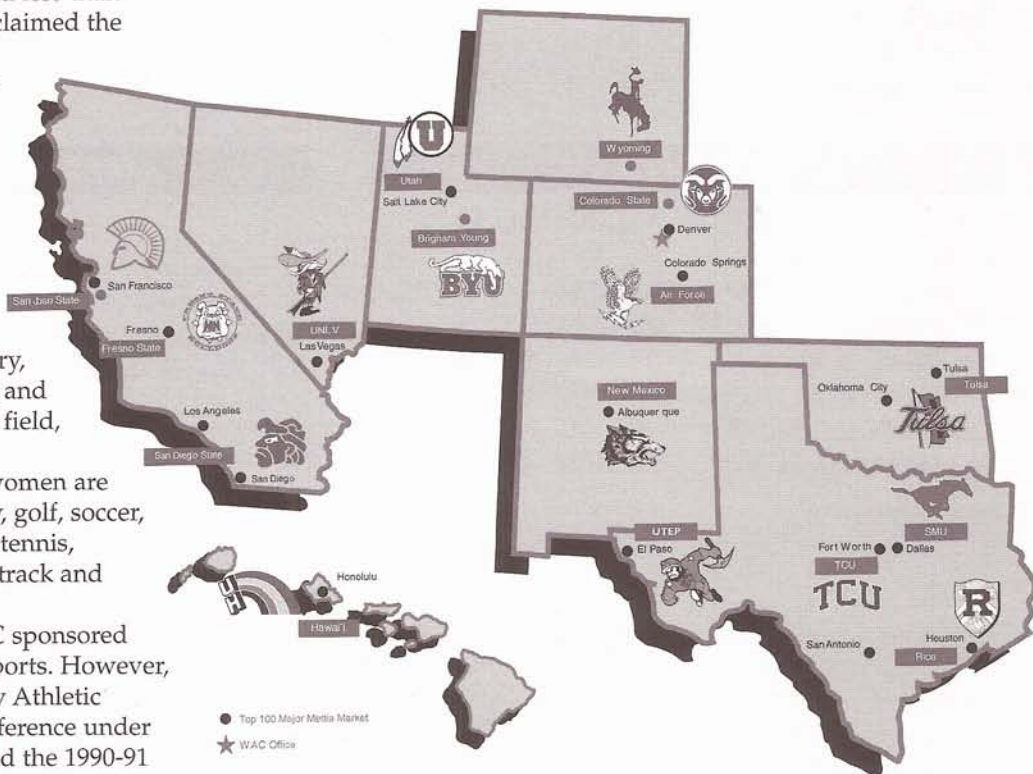

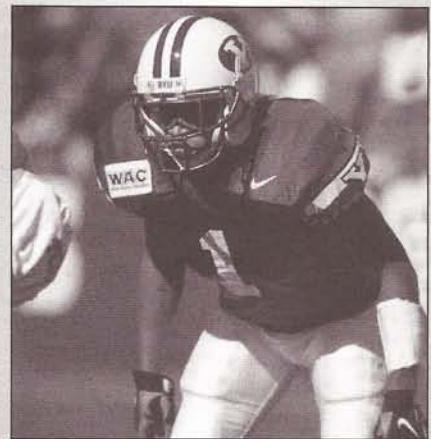

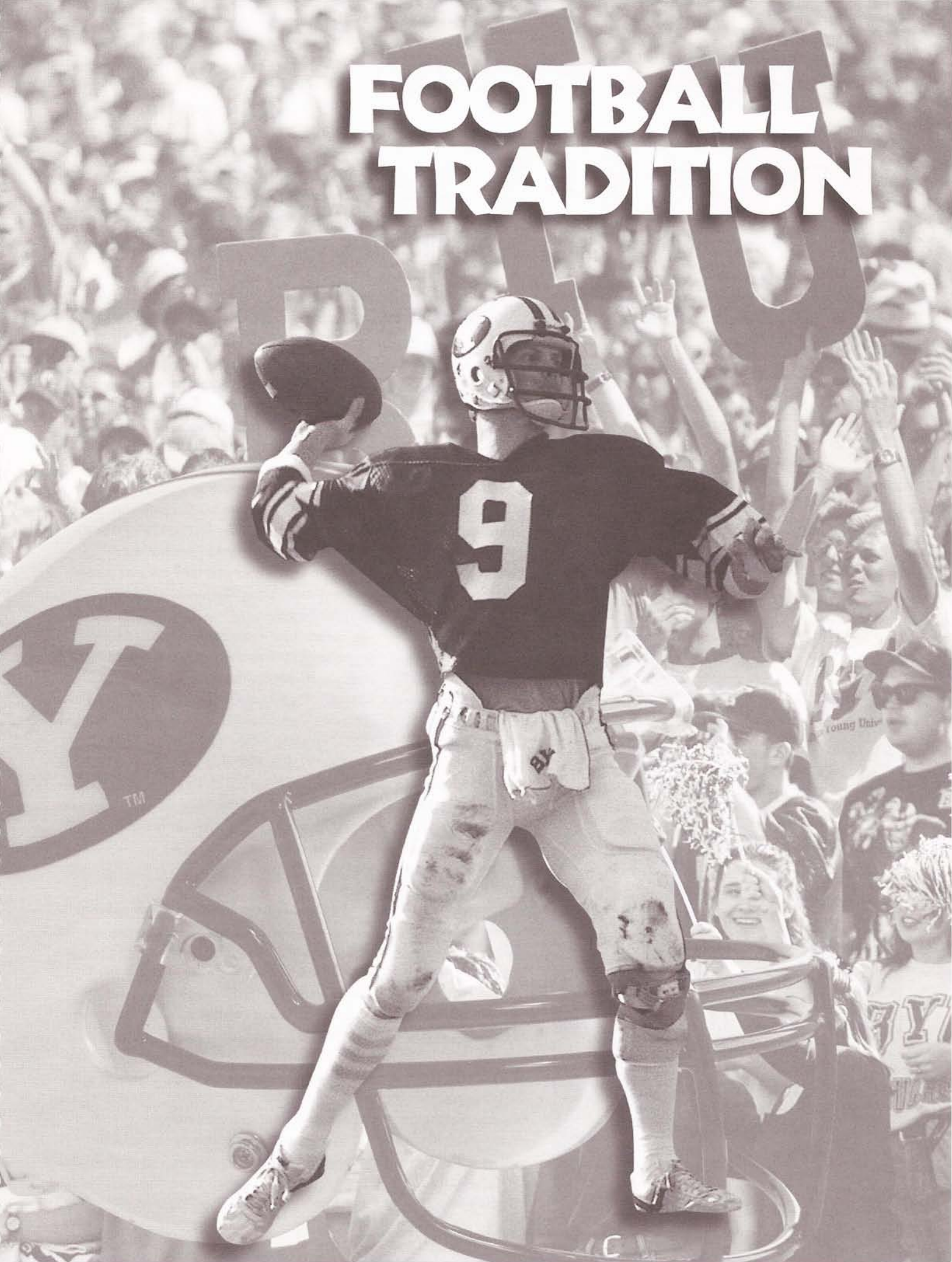

THE ROAD TO EXCELLENCE

At one time, having a top program—not to mention winning a national championship—seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 33 years ago the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title, and the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season. In 1972, however, BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year and things have not been the same since.

In the past 25 years, the Cougars have won 228 games and been to 20 bowl games (including 17 in a row). Eighteen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10

in a row from 1976-1985.

Coach Edwards has led his team to a national championship (1984), has been national coach of the year, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and coached two Outland Trophy winners in the past 15 years.

Things were not always so rosy, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one

game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU consistently finds itself among the national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU in 1896, but was discontinued because of the administration's concern over the violent nature of the sport. The game returned to campus in 1922, and since then BYU has played 71 seasons (football was not played for three seasons during World War II). BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have propelled BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. The list reads like a who's who of college football signal callers: Virgil Carter (1964-66), Gary Sheide (1973-74), Gifford Nielsen (1975-77), Marc Wilson (1977-78, 1980), Jim McMahon (1978, 1980-81), Steve Young (1982-83), Robbie Bosco (1984-85) Ty Detmer (1988-91) and Steve Sarkisian (1995-96) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Detmer finished his incredible career by throwing for 15,031 yards—the first player ever to go over 12,000 yards passing.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco, Detmer and Sarkisian were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62) won All-

American honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71) led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did such a good job catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading career rusher in 1994 and Brian McKenzie moved into the No. 6 spot alltime in just two seasons (1996-97) at BYU.

Eric Drage (1990-93) became the receiving leader, breaking yardage and touchdown receiving records set by Phil Odle (1965-67).

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates

(1977-82), Trevor Matich (1979-84) Scott Brumfield (1991-92), Evan Pilgrim (1992-94) and Larry Moore (1995-96).

BYU has also had a bevy of talent at tight end including Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), Chris Smith (1987-90), Chad Lewis (1993-96) and Itula Mili (1991, 1994-96).

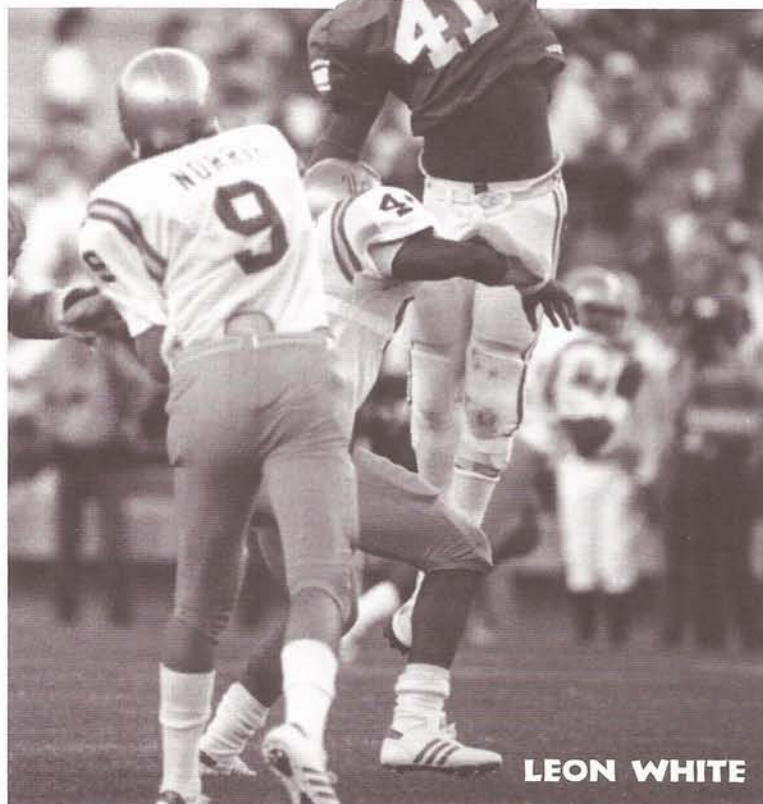
Top Defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84), Leon White (1982-85), Kurt Gouveia (1983-85), Jason

Buck (1985-86) the recipient of the 1986 Outland Trophy, Derwin Gray (1989-92), Shay Muirbrook (1993-96), Tim McTyer (1995-96) and Omarr Morgan (1996-97).

At various times in the past 30 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set and NCAA record for most punt returns, and James Dye (1995-96) led the nation in punt returns with a 21.9 average in 1995.

COUGARS WIN 1984 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Gold national championship rings adorn the finger of each Cougar on the 1984 BYU team for posting a perfect 13-0 season.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press

International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today, and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the

Year and visited President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand (see photo below) at Hawai'i, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With the TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to the gimp-kneed offensive lineman

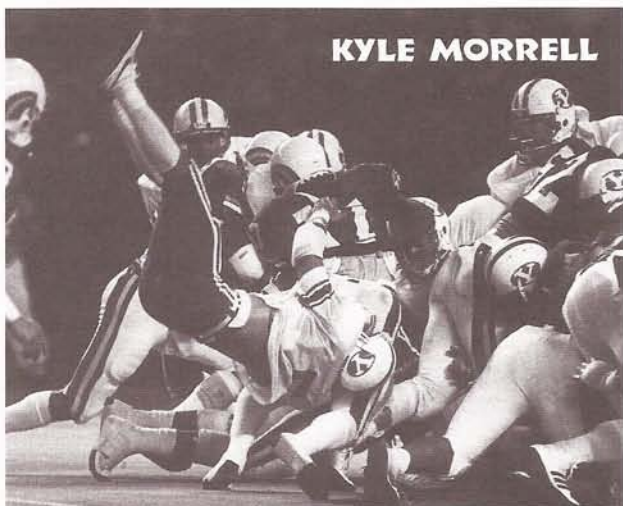
Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska lost to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from unranked to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so called experts accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule, like NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma's head coach Barry Switzer.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

A Ty for the HEISMAN

DETMER WINS BYU'S FIRST HEISMAN

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawai'i.

Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor is awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1 ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the

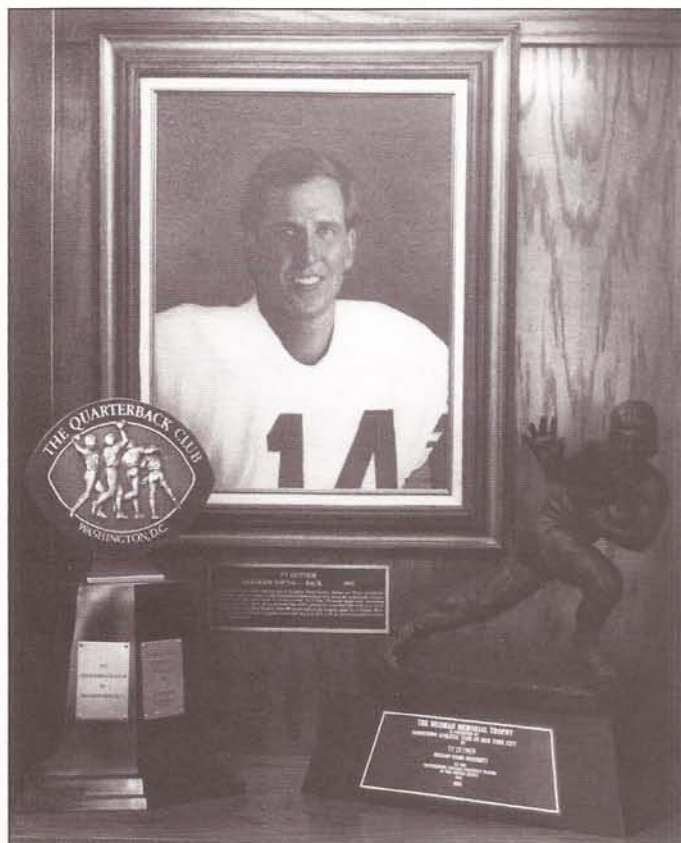
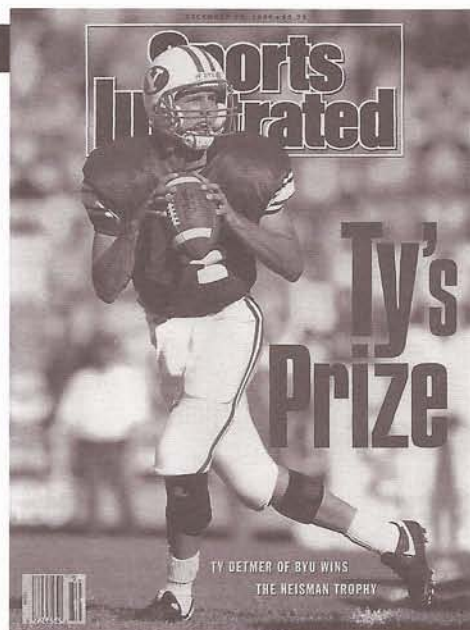
Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gun-slinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record from 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished

third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU."

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of the Football Stadium.

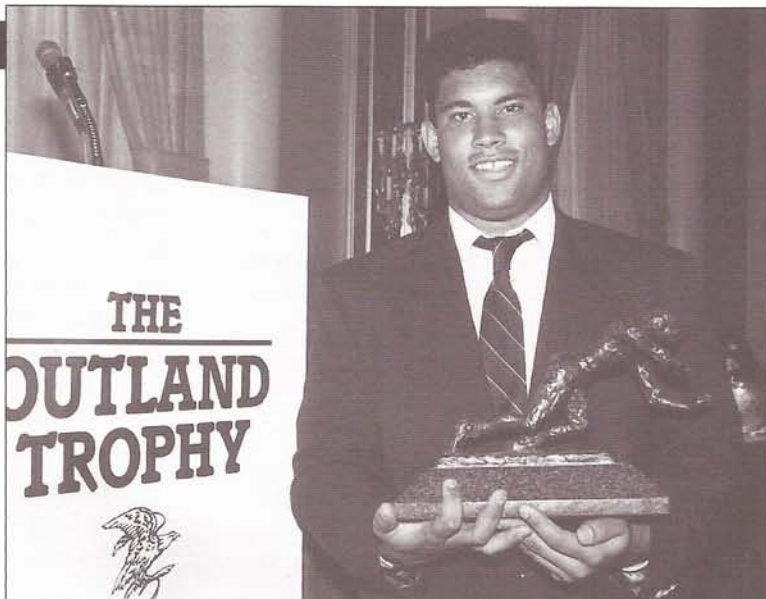

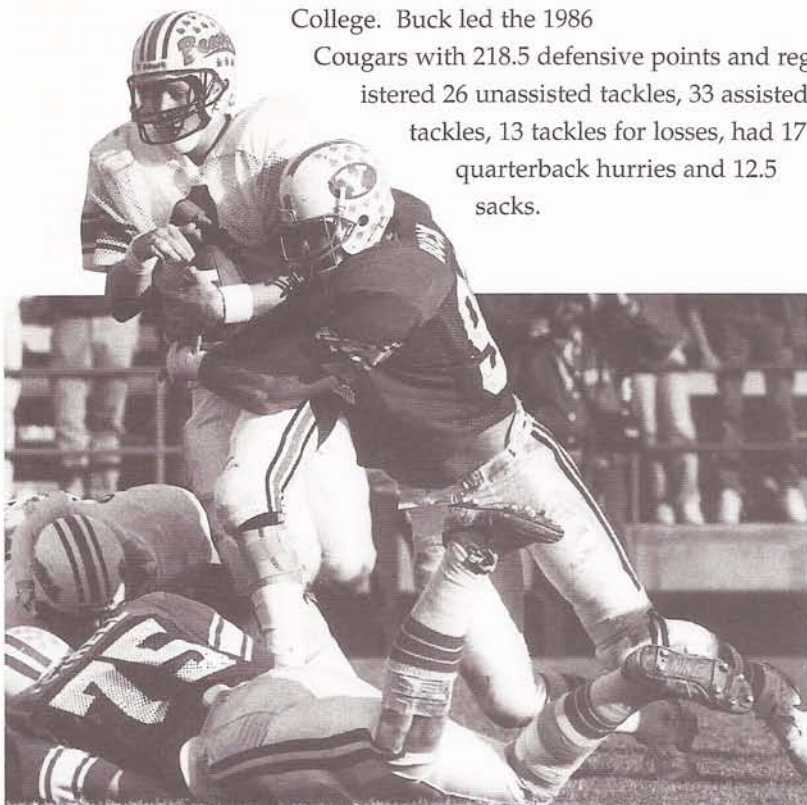
Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270, senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986

Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, had 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland trophy was a dream come true."

Mount Mohammed, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school at Snow Junior College. "Mo" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named **Jim McMahon** the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback.

In 16 years, BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school.

In addition to winners McMahon (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Ty Detmer** (1990 & '91), **Robbie Bosco** finished runner-up in 1984 and **Steve Sarkisian** finished third in 1996.

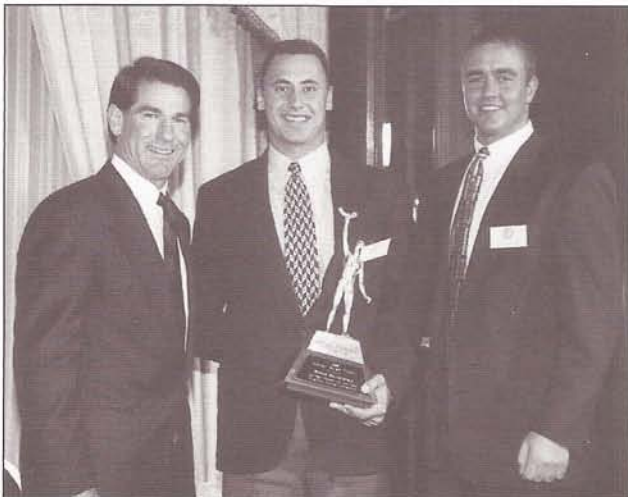

SAMMY BAUGH - COLLEGE PASSER OF THE YEAR

On February 21, 1997, **Steve Sarkisian** became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the

Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year.



In winning, Sarkisian joined **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983), **Robbie Bosco** (1984) and **Ty Detmer** (1991) as Cougars who have won the award.

A PASSING FANCY

Manufacturing plants across the world work hard to produce products that please the customer and succeed in the market. At BYU, the product is quarterbacks, and they have been entertaining Cougar football fans for more than 20 years.

Ever since Gary Sheide in 1973, BYU and head coach LaVell Edwards have been producing an assembly line of outstanding quarterbacks in Provo that have earned unprecedented success in the market of college and professional football.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback fac-

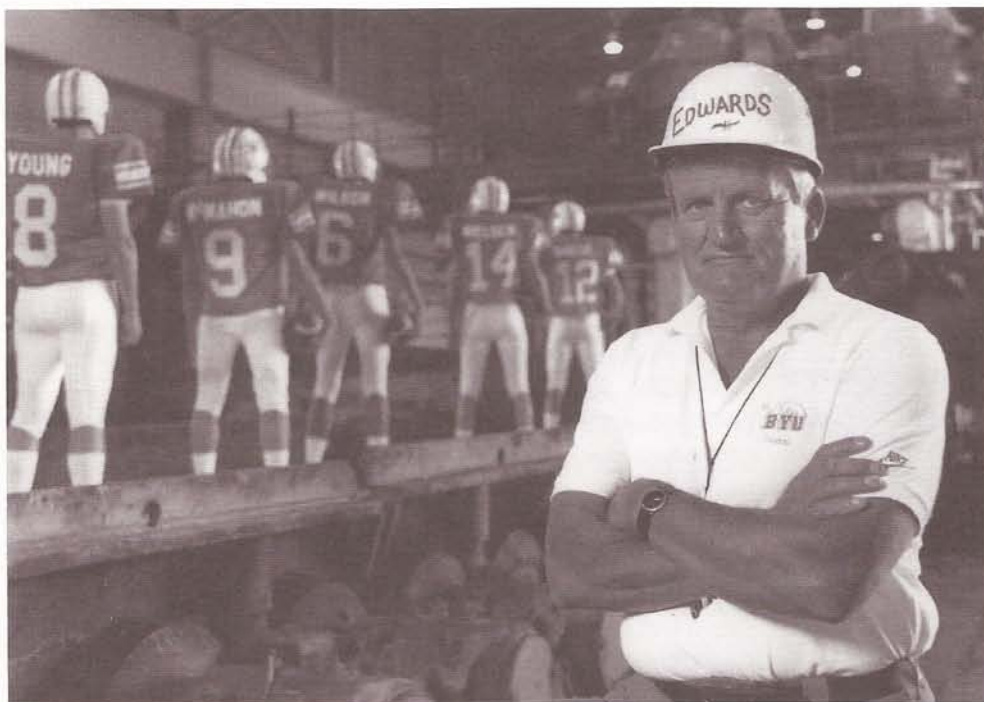
tory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson have both been inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 12 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Five out of the top six career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 25 years Edwards has coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times.

When Edwards arrived at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was just a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC championship 18 times, played in 20 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.



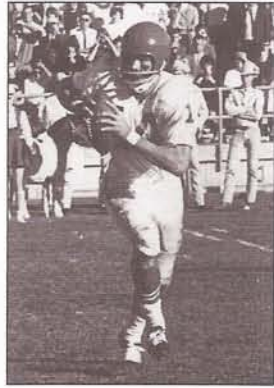

MCMAHON INDUCTED INTO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

During a press conference at the National Football Foundation's College Football Hall of Fame on April 15, 1998, Chairman Jon F. Hanson and Honors Court Chairman Gene Corrigan announced the newest class of players for the College Football Hall of Fame.

The 12-man class includes quarterback Jim McMahon of Brigham Young University, 1977-78, 80-81.

"I am happy to be selected and think there will be other BYU quarterbacks joining me in the future," said McMahon. "I'd do it all over again.

There was no one who could stop our offense."

McMahon joins former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

"This is an honor and recognition that is richly deserved by Jim," said BYU Head Coach LaVell Edwards. "We are pleased that he was selected. It is a great honor."

The 1998 Class will be inducted Tuesday, December 8, at the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's 41st Annual

Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City and will be permanently enshrined during ceremonies at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Indiana in the summer of 1999.

"We are delighted to honor these great players and have their exploits on the college gridiron live

forever in the College Football Hall of Fame," said Chairman Hanson.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was 1981 First team All-America, by the Kodak (Coaches), All-America, College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he was First team All-America by the FWAA and Second team by Associated Press and UPI.

McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981 he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year, the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.) and led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 and pass efficiency (176.9), and total offense (385.6) in 1980.

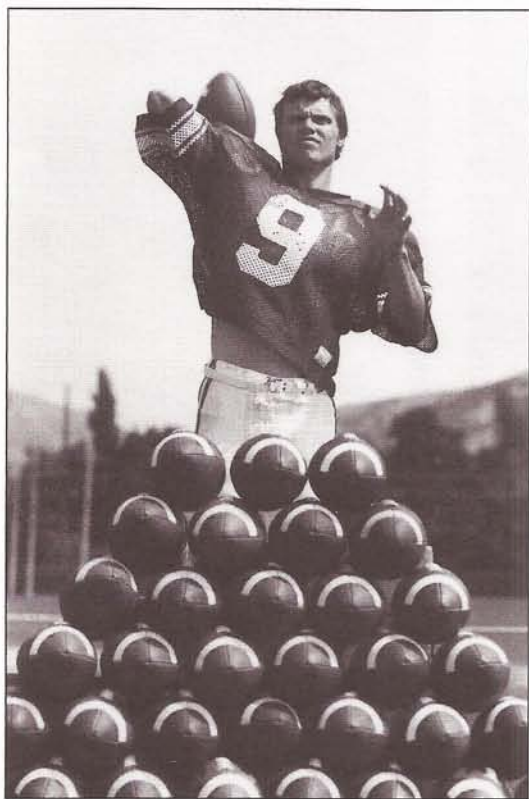
He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first-team all-league.

He broke 23 school records, won the 1982 Dale Rex Award, the 1981 Cougar Club Crowd Pleaser Award, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls, and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1986 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).

His charitable work includes the Jim McMahon Foundation; Jim McMahon Golf Tournament (to benefit Ronald McDonald House); Childrens Miracle Network; Juvenile Diabetes Fund; American Cancer Society; Society for the Prevention of Blindness; Think First Foundation for Children.

He will forever be known as the player who threw the Hail Mary pass to Clay Brown in the 1980 Holiday Bowl to come from 20 points behind with four minutes remaining and upset SMU, 46-45 — resulting in BYU's first bowl victory. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.



HALL OF FAME

Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least 10 years and a first-team All-American selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletics directors, conference and bowl officials, and media representatives.

NIELSON & WILSON INDUCTED IN 1994 & 1996

Marc WILSON

Quarterback • 1976-79 • Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson, earned consensus All-American honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback, ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman ballot, led his team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP.

A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife Colleen live in Woodinville, Wash., with their four children.



Gifford NIELSON

Quarterback • 1975-77 • Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended, when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over the three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878.

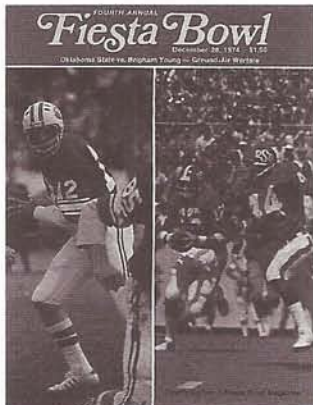
The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage.

OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.



The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys.

BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402.

BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out

on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula.

Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

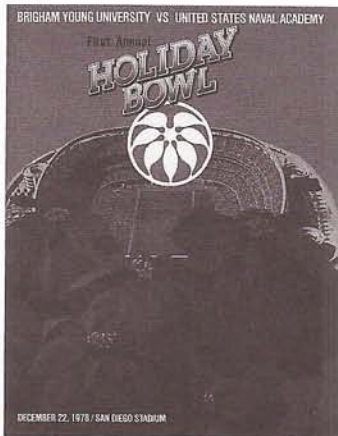

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.



Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead.

Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was

a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person.

McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation.

Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana.

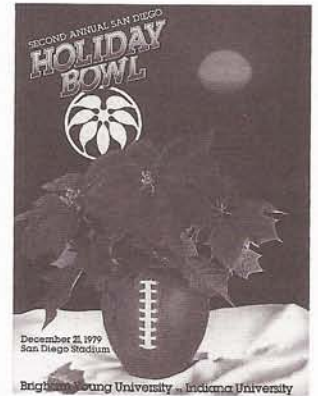
The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half.

BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson.

With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 99 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense.

Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards

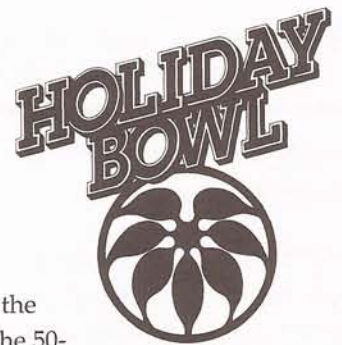

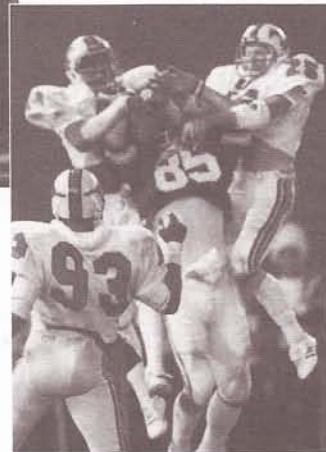

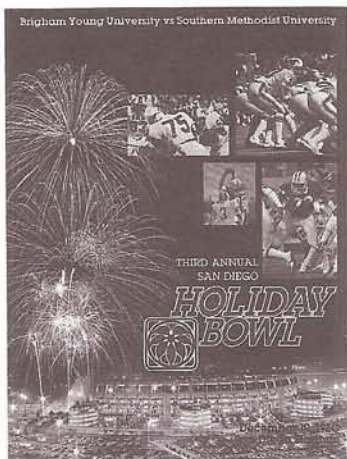
Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419.

BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge.

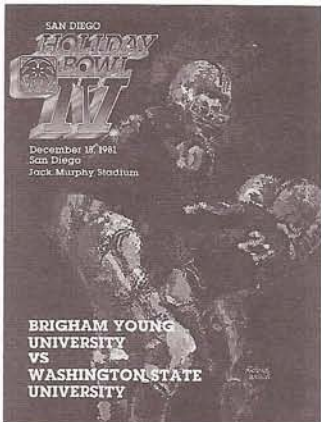
As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground.

Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82

yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79.

Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7.

Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime.

Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good.

BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomczak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground.

Ten different BYU players caught passes, led by Hudson (see photo) with seven receptions for 81 yards and Balholm with 58 yards receiving.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17.

The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.



BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game.

Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young.

The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and ramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win. The win gave BYU four bowl victories in five years between 1980-84.

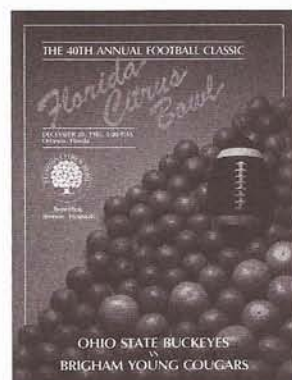
Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 half-time lead.

In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead.

Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left.

Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Matt Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

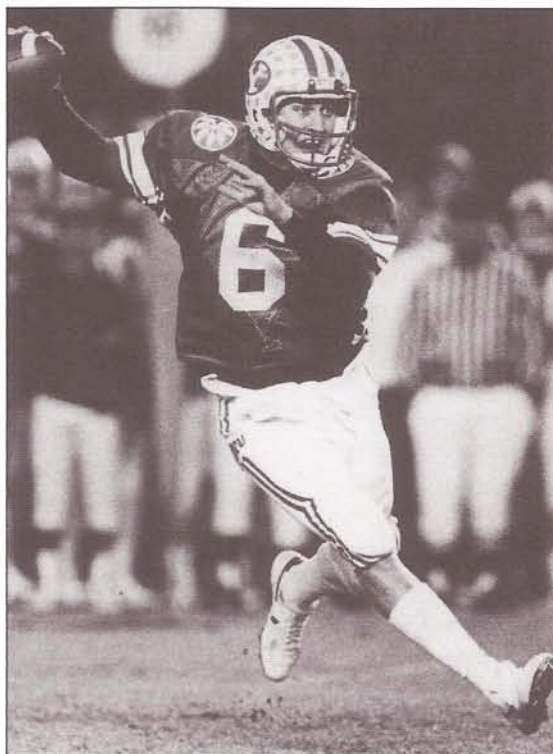
The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT

knocked the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from



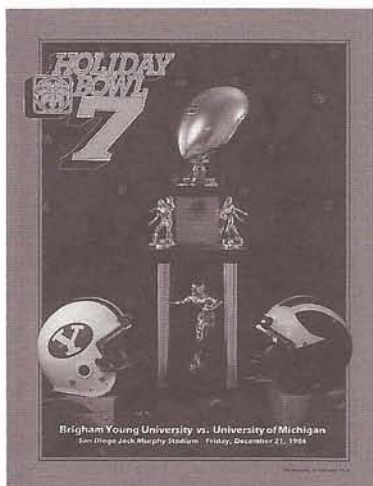

Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play.

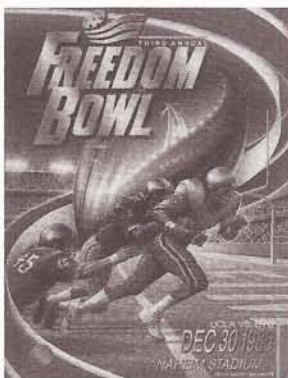
The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter as the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was all defensive as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal.

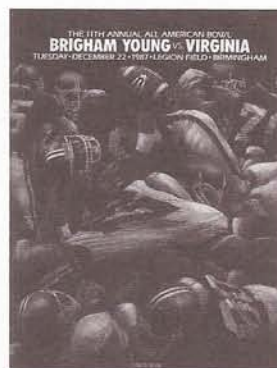
The 11th annual All American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up.

The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted



once, but BYU fell short several times.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission.



BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

But that was as close as the Cougars would get.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

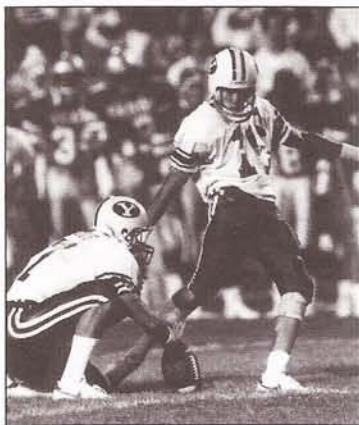

Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team.

The other co-MVP was the Nittany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards.

BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points.

Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play.

Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown.

Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter enroute to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter.



The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player.

Jamal Willis and Bryce Doman each collected 27-yard Walsh offerings and walk-on tight end Chad Lewis made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab in the corner of the end zone to bail the Cougars out of a fourth-and-eight situation.

After Harris' short touchdown run late in the third, BYU and OSU traded possessions until late into the fourth quarter. After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left.

On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior co-captain Eric Drage who ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line.

Walsh had 389 yards and fullback Kalin Hall rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Tyler Anderson returned five kicks for 145 yards, including an exciting 45-yarder. Harris and Walsh shared MVP honors.

BYU fans celebrated the New Year early as the Cougars dominated Oklahoma and ended its five-year winning drought in bowl games.

Quarterback John Walsh and the offense clicked on all cylinders and the Cougars' defense was dominating throughout the ESPN telecast.

Walsh threw a seven-yard TD pass to Bryce Doman in the first quarter and had a 25-yard pass to Mike Johnston in the second quarter.

A four-yard scoring pass to Johnston in the third quarter and a 28-yard touchdown pass to Doman in the fourth quarter vaulted Walsh's stats to 454 yards and four touchdowns on 31 of 45 passes with no interceptions against the Sooner defense which had held national champion Nebraska to 13 points.

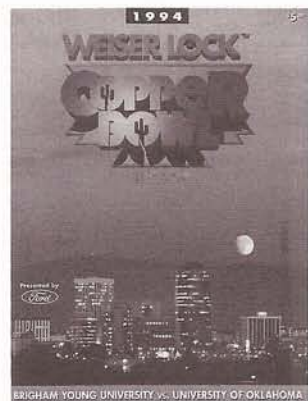
BYU's defense was dominating as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing—most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners did not cross midfield until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter.

Jamal Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU.

Guard Evan Pilgrim earned second-team All-America honors and played in the Hula Bowl along with defensive end Travis Hall. Willis and defensive end Randy Brock played

in the East-West Shrine Game.

BYU finished 10th in the CNN/*USA Today* poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.



1996 COTTON BOWL

BYU assumed the nation's longest winning streak with a come-from-behind 19-15 victory in the 61st annual Cotton Bowl. It was the first New Year's Day appearance for both 14th-ranked Kansas State and fifth-ranked BYU.

More than 40,000-purple clad Kansas State supporters out-numbered the 15,000 Cougar patrons as 71,928 fans filled the Cotton Bowl.

BYU got on the board first with a safety, then turned the ensuing punt into a field goal to lead 5-0 in the first quarter. The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock.

The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard



TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls and continual trash-talking by KSU, quarterback Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and 28-yards to

K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy.

KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yardline to secure the game.

COUGARS STRUGGLE TO OVERCOME INJURIES TO KEY PLAYERS

Last year was the epitome of an up-and-down season for the Cougars. Upsetting 14th-ranked Arizona State in the second game of the season would qualify as an "up." Finishing the season with a 6-5 record and without a trip to a bowl game was definitely a "down."

The season began with the 10th-largest Cougar Stadium crowd ever watching BYU take on the 4th-ranked Washington Huskies. Starting quarterback Paul Shoemaker took the opening kickoff and drove the Cougars 80 yards in seven plays, scoring on a keeper. But the Huskies matched that drive with a five-play 80 yard drive of their own to tie the game. Washington went on to score 35 unanswered points. There was a bright spot in the 42-20 loss for BYU, however. Kevin Feterik entered the game and played the entire

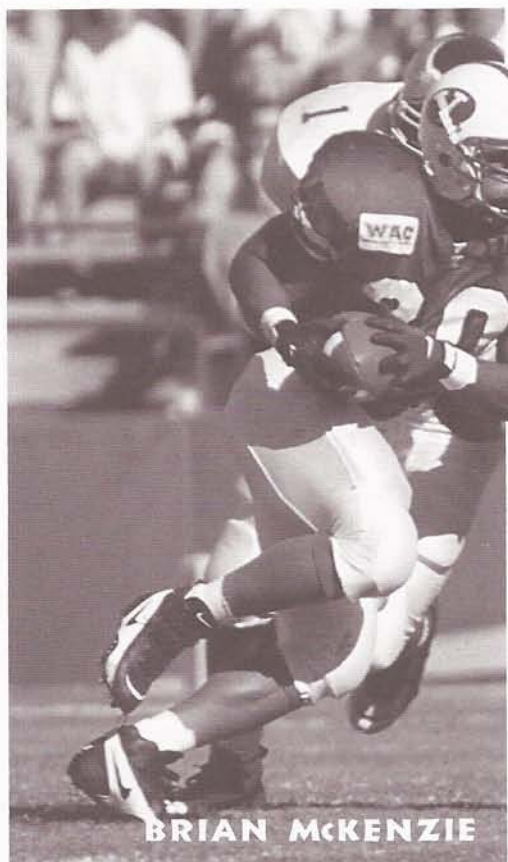
second half at quarterback, throwing for 216 yards and two touchdowns and winning the starting job for the next game--at Arizona State.

After the loss at home, no one expected BYU to rebound on the road, at raucous Sun Devil Stadium no less, but that's exactly what happened. While the Cougars had a bye week to prepare the sophomore Feterik for his starting duties, the defending PAC-10 champions were riding high after upsetting the Miami Hurricanes in Miami. The opening offensive play of the game was an omen for the Cougars as Feterik connected with Ben Cahoon for a 37-yard bomb. Cahoon

ended up with eight catches for 219 yards. Feterik went the distance, passing for 328 yards while completing 17 of 30 passes. Brian McKenzie rushed for 112 yards and had a six-yard TD on the ground against the eventual Sun Bowl champions. Defensively, end Byron Frisch led the charge, garnering two of BYU's five sacks. The victory was BYU's first in Tempe since 1965, and first over the Sun Devils since 1976.

The next week, the 23,701 fans inside the Cotton Bowl at the Texas State Fair were treated to a 19-16 BYU overtime victory over SMU. BYU's defense rose to the occasion, holding the nation's seventh-ranked rusher, Donte Womack, to 80 yards on 32 carries. SMU got two 27-yard field goals from freshman kicker Roy Rios, including the one that forced overtime with only :48 left on the game clock. BYU's sole passing TD of the game came when Feterik audibled and hit Margin Hooks in stride for a 32-yard strike late in the fourth quarter. SMU took the ball first in the overtime, scoring on a 28 yard field goal. BYU responded with three consecutive running plays to Brian McKenzie, who scored the game winner on a 15-yarder up the middle. McKenzie rushed for 98 yards in the game.

Back in Provo, the Cougars were able to rebound from tragedy at the beginning of the week with a 42-35 victory over Utah State. The week began with an auto accident which claimed the life of new team member and starting cornerback Terrence Harvey. Two other backup Cougar cornerbacks suffered injuries in that accident. Feterik injured his ankle in the third quarter and returned for a series before being replaced by Paul Shoemaker in the fourth quarter. Shoemaker started the Cougars from their seven yard line and hit Dustin Johnson for a 65-yard pass, then hit him again two plays later for an 18-yard TD. Shoemaker then drove the Cougars 69 yards on the next series for another TD. The Cougar defense had a goal-line stand to end the game as the Aggies had five opportunities inside the BYU redzone.

Heavy rain contributed to the somber mood the next week as Rice upset the division-leading Cougars in Houston, 27-14. Feterik's ankle was further injured in the game and he did not start the second half. BYU was unable to score in the second half under Shoemaker, and then freshman Drew Miller abandoned his redshirt year only to be sacked for a safety in the closing minutes of the game.

The Cougars recovered with a 17-3 homecoming victory over Hawai'i. The win tied Coach LaVell Edwards with legendary Bear Bryant for 232 victories at one school. Jaron Dabney returned six punts for 155 yards to set a new stadium record. McKenzie rushed for 120 yards and one TD. Hawai'i scored its only points in the second half. Shoemaker left in the second half with a blow to the chin which required six stitches, but eventually returned. While Shoemaker was out, Miller made his home debut.

Hours after BYU defeated TCU, 31-10, Horned Frog Coach Pat Sullivan announced his resignation. Miller again replaced the injured Shoemaker, this time at the half. In a strong third quarter performance, Miller threw two TD passes for 139 yards, and was nine of 13 in passing as BYU scored on each of its three drives. Cahoon caught a career-high 10 passes for the game for the Cougars. The scoring concluded in the fourth quarter with Aaron Roderick catching his second TD pass of the day.

With a chance to cement their hold on the Mountain Division, the 25th-ranked Cougars instead suffered a shocking upset to UTEP, 14-3. El Paso fans tore down the goal post, hefting the uprights over the edge of the Sun Bowl. Miller, as the first true freshman to start a game at BYU,

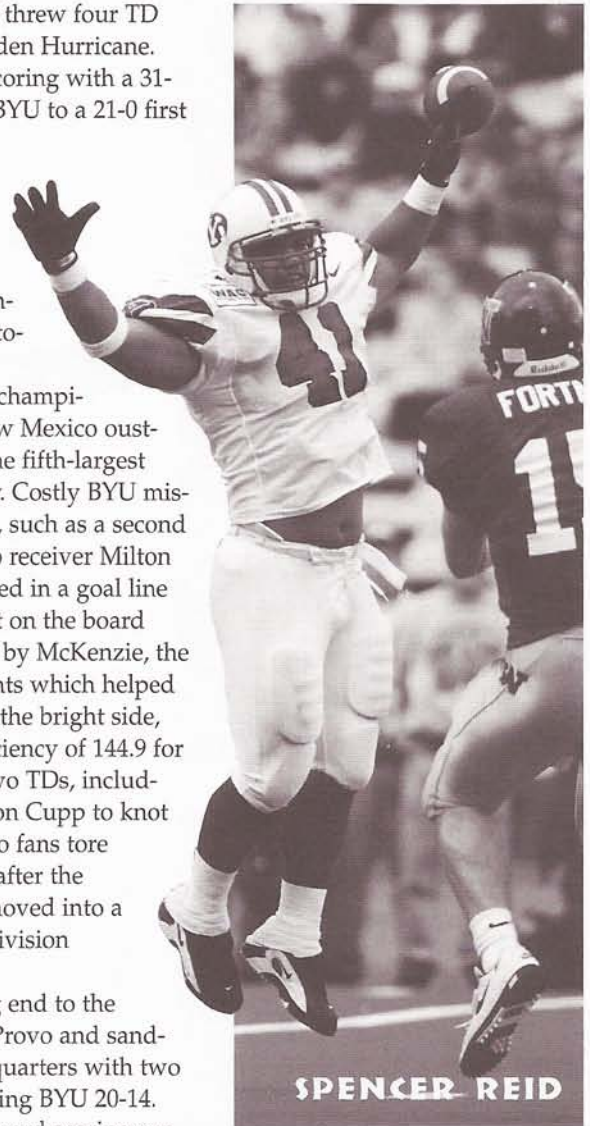
connected with Dustin Johnson on the first play of the game for 55 yards, but BYU had to settle for a 21-yard field goal by Owen Pochman. The field goal turned out to be the Cougar's only score of the game. The loss ended BYU's streak of scoring a TD in 138 straight games.

Boosted by the quick recovery of Feterik's ankle and bookend scoring by McKenzie, BYU went on to a 49-39 victory over Tulsa. Feterik returned from a three-game absence (due to a broken ankle) and threw four TD passes against the Golden Hurricane. McKenzie began the scoring with a 31-yard TD run, helping BYU to a 21-0 first quarter lead, and he scored last on a 44-yard run.

McKenzie's 187 yards rushing on 23 carries was the seventh-best total in school history.

With the division championship on the line, New Mexico ousted BYU 38-28 before the fifth-largest crowd in UNM history. Costly BYU miscues led to easy scores, such as a second quarter TD when Lobo receiver Milton Thomas was not covered in a goal line situation. BYU first got on the board with a 62-yard TD run by McKenzie, the first of his two TD jaunts which helped him net 133 yards. On the bright side, Feterik had a pass efficiency of 144.9 for the game and threw two TDs, including a 60-yarder to Aaron Cupp to knot the score at 14-all. Lobo fans tore down both goal posts after the win, as New Mexico moved into a tie for the Mountain Division lead.

In a disappointing end to the season, Utah came to Provo and sandwiched two scoreless quarters with two 10-point quarters, beating BYU 20-14. McKenzie, with a one-yard scoring run, put the Cougars on the board to end the first quarter. He scored again in the second quarter, this time on a 15-yard run that let BYU enter the locker room at the half up 14-10. Neither team could keep a drive going in the third quarter, but Utah made up for it in the last one by scoring 10 points for the win. BYU finished the season at 6-5.

Fourth-ranked Washington climbed a spot in the rankings after winning 42-20 on regional ABC-TV and ending BYU's reign as holder of the nation's longest current winning streak at 12 games. BYU took the opening kick-off and drove 80-yards, culminating in a Paul Shoemaker quarterback sneak for a touchdown. Washington scored on the next series to tie the game. Ben Cook blocked Washington's 22-yard field goal attempt, but the Huskies scored TDs on their last two possessions of the half to take a 21-7



lead. Kevin Feterik took over the quarterback reins in the second half. Washington scored a pair of third-quarter TDs thanks again to big plays by Rashaan Shehee and Jerome Pathon. Feterik, who was named ABC Player of the Game, got BYU on the board again with a 62-yard TD pass to Aaron Roderick and a 34-yard TD pass to Ben Cahoon. Although BYU netted only two yards rushing, it did out-gain Washington in passing, 306 to 288.

BYU upset 14th-ranked Arizona State, 13-10, for its first win at Tempe since 1965 and first victory since 1976 over ASU. It also marked the first time ASU had lost at home since 1995, ending a string of seven straight home victories. The victory also snapped a string of nine consecutive losses by BYU to Pac-10 teams. ASU, the defending PAC10 champion, was riding high after upsetting the Miami Hurricanes in Miami. Defensively, BYU denied ASU penetration into the redzone, although a Cougar special teams fumble of a punt return did put the Sun Devils there, which resulted in their only



TD. The opening offensive play of the game was an omen for the Cougars as Kevin Feterik, in his first start at quarterback, connected with Ben Cahoon for a 37-yard bomb. Cahoon ended up with eight catches for 219 yards. Feterik went the distance, passing for 328 yards while completing 17 of 30 passes. Brian McKenzie rushed for 112 yards and had a six-yard TD on the ground as BYU took a 7-3 lead. Defensively, end Byron Frisch led the charge, garnering two of BYU's five sacks. BYU moved up to 23rd in the Associated Press rankings and 24th in USA Today/CNN with the win.

The 23,701 fans inside the stadium at the Texas State Fair were treated to a 19-16 BYU overtime victory over SMU. BYU was only penalized once for 15 yards, the fewest in the LaVell Edwards era. There were 5,000 fans watching live in the Marriott Center basketball arena back home where the Cougars had left injured starting cornerback Jack Williams. BYU's defense rose to the occasion, holding the nation's seventh-ranked rusher Donte Womack to 80 yards on 32 carries. Because of a fumble and two interceptions, the Cougar D found its back to the wall as SMU converted these turnovers into a touch-down and a pair of field goals to force overtime. BYU got its only passing TD of the day when quarterback Kevin Feterik audibled for the only post pattern of the day and hit Margin Hooks in stride in the endzone for a 32-yard strike. Feterik audibled again in overtime as BYU used three consecutive running plays to Brian McKenzie. McKenzie rushed for 98 yards in the game.

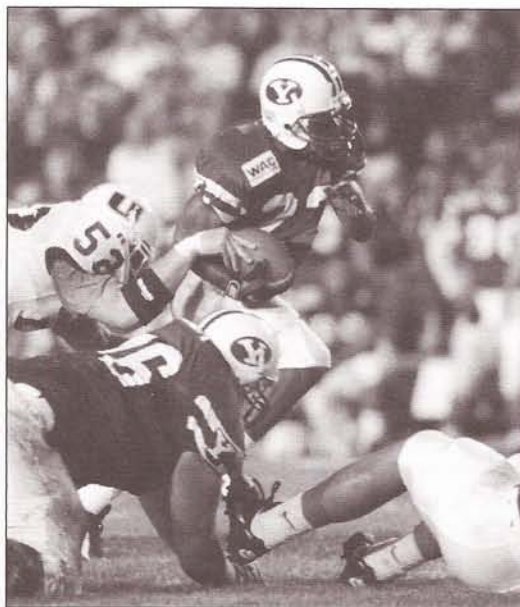

BYU rebounded from a tragic start at the beginning of the week and ended with a 42-35 victory over Utah State before a crowd of 65,754 in Provo. The week began with an auto accident which claimed the life of starting defensive corner Terrence Harvey. Two other Cougar cornerbacks suffered injuries in that accident. The team mourned with a Thursday memorial service in Cougar Stadium. During the game, three turnovers were costly to BYU: a first-quarter offensive fumble at the Cougar 17 resulted in a USU TD, a USU interception in the endzone just before halftime, and a third-quarter safety by USU. Starting quarterback Kevin Feterik injured his ankle in the third quarter and returned for a series before being replaced by Paul



Shoemaker in the fourth quarter. USU quarterback Matt Sauk, who threw a perfect slant to Nakia Jenkins for a 75-yard TD, injured his ankle in the fourth quarter. Shoemaker guided the Cougars from their seven yard line and hit Dustin Johnson for a 65-yard pass, then hit him again two plays later for an 18-yard TD. Shoemaker drove the Cougars on a 69-yard drive on the next series to another TD. The Cougar defense had a goal-line stand to end the game with the Aggies having five opportunities inside the BYU redzone.

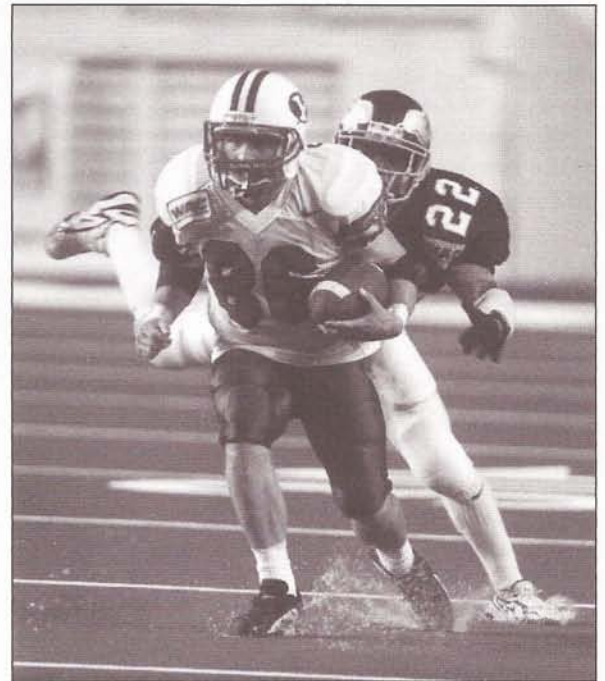

Cougar quarterback Kevin Feterik's ankle was further injured in the game and he did not start the second half. His replacement Paul Shoemaker was ineffective and freshman Drew Miller abandoned his redshirt year only to be sacked for a safety. BYU's only scoring attempt in the second half came when kicker Owen Pochman missed a 41-yard field goal. The loss ended a string of BYU winning 11 WAC games in a row, eight consecutive WAC road games, and nine consecutive road games overall.

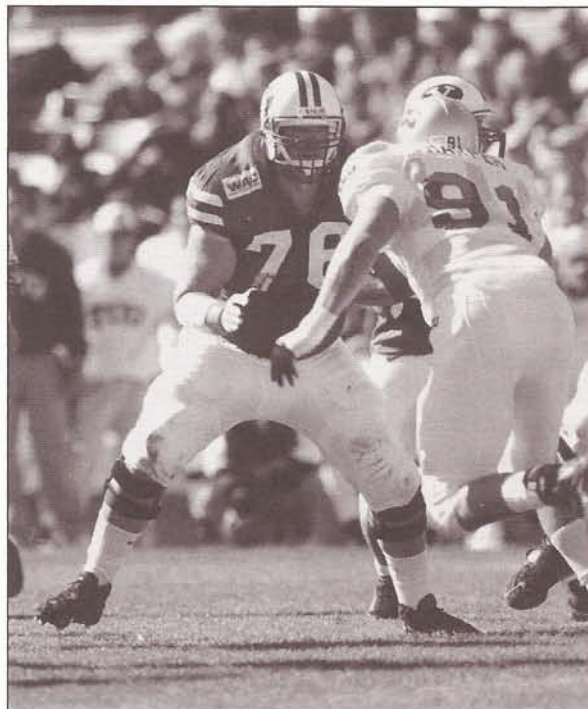

Reminiscent of UTEP's upset over 7th ranked BYU in 1985, this night it was the Miners upending the 25th-ranked Cougars, 14-3. Once again El Paso fans tore down the goal post, but this time part of the 18,630 fans hefted the uprights over the edge of the Sun Bowl. Drew Miller, the first true freshman to start a game at BYU, connected with Dustin Johnson on the first play of the game for 55 yards, but had to settle for a 21-yard field goal by Owen Pochman. UTEP missed on its first two field goal attempts before scoring a touchdown to start the second quarter. Cougar linebacker Rob Morris then had one of his game-leading 19 tackles against Rocky Perez, sending the UTEP backup freshman QB out of the game with a concussion. Miraculously, Perez returned a couple of series later. In the third quarter, UTEP linebacker Brent Henderson intercepted a tipped Miller pass and returned it 45 yards for a TD. On the next series, Miller hit Margin Hooks for a 41-yard bomb, only to have another tipped pass intercepted by the blitzing Miners on the next play. With 12 seconds left in the game, Miller connected again with Hooks on a 44-yard strike down the sidelines, but the next play was intercepted in the endzone. That ended BYU's streak of scoring a TD in the past 138 games. The Cougars had zero yards rushing offense

An early recovery by quarterback Kevin Feterik, bookend scoring by running back Brian McKenzie, and a key interception by Ben Cook led BYU to a 49-39 victory over Tulsa. Feterik, who suffered a six-stitch gash on his chin on a sack by Sean O'Boyle, returned from a three-game absence due to a broken ankle and threw four TD passes against the Golden Hurricane. McKenzie began the scoring with a 31-yard TD run and scored last on a 44-yard run. McKenzie's 187 yards rushing on 23 carries was the seventh-best total in school history. Cook's interception, his second of the season, came on Tulsa's first drive of the second half and set up Ben Cahoon's second TD catch. Tulsa had gained momentum when it scored on a TD bomb in the closing moments



of the first half, just seconds after Cahoon caught his first TD pass. BYU had jumped to a 21-0 first quarter lead, then Tulsa rallied to close the game to 28-19 at halftime.

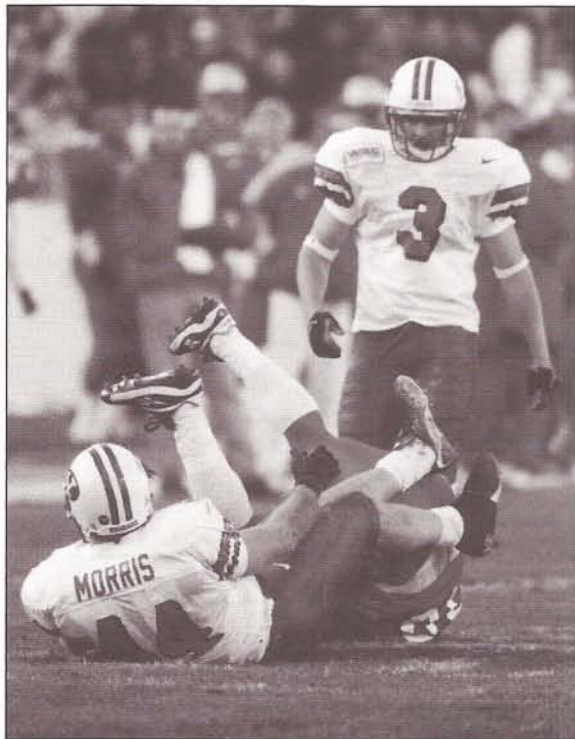

With the WAC championship on the line, the Lobos ousted BYU 38-28 before the fifth-largest crowd (30,363) in UNM history. The Lobos last beat BYU in 1980. Snow was cleared from the field and the game was played in chilly 33-degree weather.



Costly BYU miscues led to easy scores, like a second quarter TD when Lobo receiver Milton Thomas was not covered in a goal line situation. BYU first got on the board with a 62-yard TD run by Brian McKenzie, the first of his two TD jaunts which helped him net 133 yards. Cougar quarterback Kevin Feterik had a pass efficiency of 144.9 for the game and threw two TDs, including a 60-yarder to Aaron Cupp to knot the score at 14-all. Lobo fans tore down both goal posts after the win, as New Mexico moved into a tie for the Mountain Division lead.

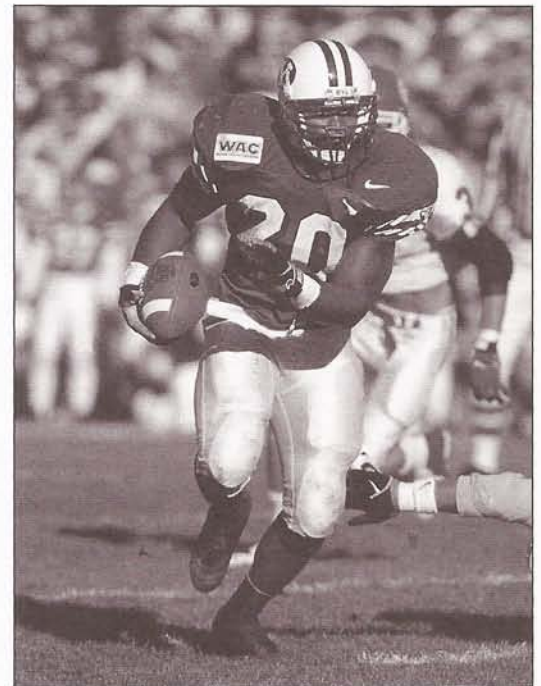

Utah came to Provo and sandwiched two scoreless quarters with two 10-point quarters, which was enough to beat BYU 20-14. Utah struck first, with Tommy Truhe hitting a 28 yard field goal and quarterback Darnell Arceneaux scoring on a four-yard keeper to put the Utes up 10-0 at Cougar Stadium. BYU's Brian McKenzie answered back with a one-yard scoring run, putting the Cougars on the board to end the first quarter. McKenzie scored again in the second quarter, this time on a 15-yard run that let BYU enter the locker room at the half up by four points, 14-10. Neither team could keep a drive going in the third quarter, but Utah made up for it in the last by again scoring 10 points for the win, again by Truhe and Arceneaux. Truhe this time was true for a 32 yarder, while Arceneaux ran it in from seven yards out. For the game, Arceneaux was 13 of 21 for 208 yards, running for 63 yards and the two touchdowns. Leading running back Chris Fuamatu Ma'afala was held to only 60 yards for the Utes. For BYU, McKenzie finished with 95 yards and two touchdowns on 26 carries, while Cougar QB Kevin Feterik completed 10 of 16 passes for 70 yards.



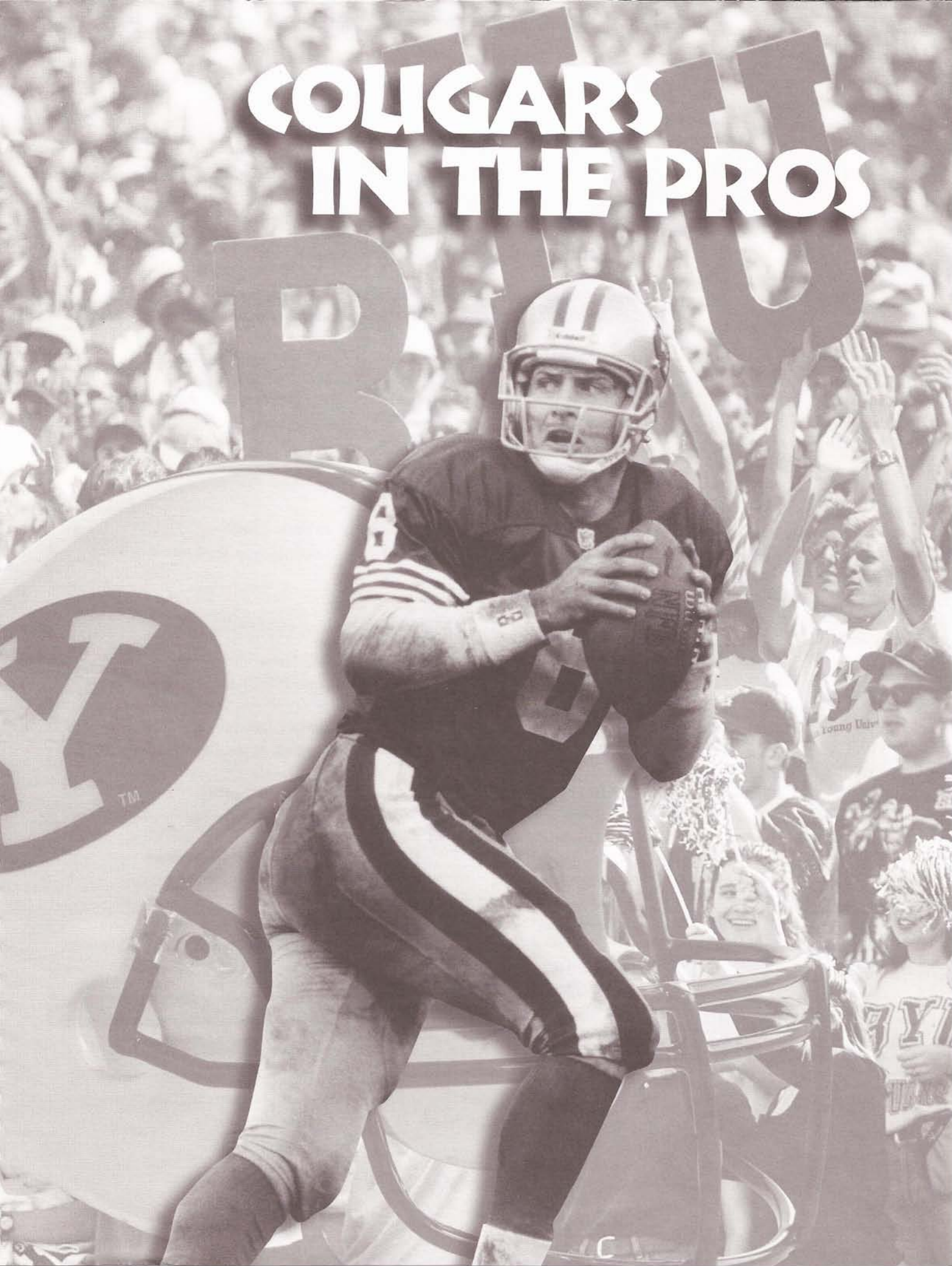
