MEDIA SERVICES

COVERING THE COUGARS

The 2000 BYU Football Media Guide has been designed to provide local, regional and national media with useful information about the BYU football team, its history and tradition. We trust many of your questions will be answered within the pages of this guide.

Should you require additional information, such as pictures, video tapes or additional media guides, please contact the BYU athletic media relations office at (801) 378-4911.

We sincerely appreciate your coverage of BYU football and look forward to working with you.

Credential Requests

All requests for credentials to cover BYU Football should be sent on company letterhead to: Jeff Reynolds, Associate Director, Athletic Media Relations, 30 Smith Fieldhouse Provo, UT 84602. Fax requests may be sent to (801) 378-3520.

It is recommended all single-game credential requests be received no later than one week prior to the date of the game. Requests received later than noon on the day prior to the game will not be accepted. Credentials for working media, including print and electronic (radio & television only) media outlets are restricted in accordance with BYU, Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules and guidelines. It is our intention to ensure proper, professional use is made of the space available for credentialed media.

Credentials, complete with parking pass, will be mailed to the requesting individual or organization if time permits or sent to the visiting school's sports information director for distribution.

Press Box

Working press box credentials shall be issued only to accredited newspapers, radio and television reporters only. Request from

other media sources shall be evaluated on a game-by-game basis. Reporters representing papers with next-day editions, daily editions, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts and television and radio stations covering for nightly news shall be given priority. Spouses, dates, children and other non-working persons will not be credentialed and are not allowed in the working media areas during the game as dictated by NCAA guidelines.

Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre-and post-game coverage. Credentials must be displayed at all times. Pregame interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstance. Properly credentialed media representatives shall be allowed field access with 4:00 remaining on the game clock. Interviews with players and/or coaches may not be conducted until the NCAA-mandated 10-minute cooling off period has expired. Individuals or organizations violating this policy may be required to surrender their credentials and removed from the stadium.

Photography

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and television reporters/camera operators on assignment. Television organizations shall be restricted to one camera operator and one reporter on the field at all times, except by prior approval from the BYU athletic media relations office. Freelance and amateur photographers, not on assignment, are not eligible for sideline credentials, except by prior approval from the BYU athletic media relations office.

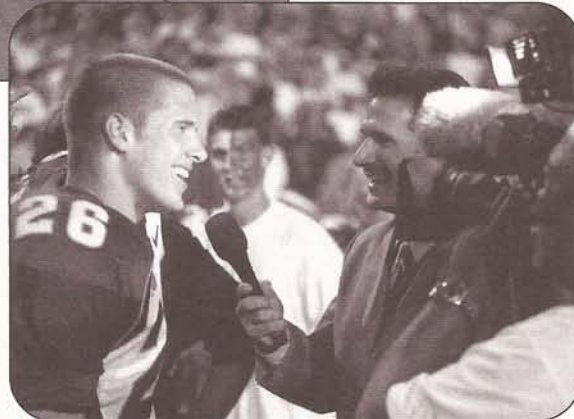
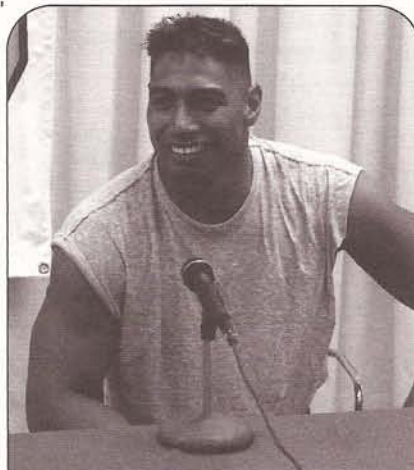
Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre-and post-game coverage. All Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules shall be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yardlines. Sideline supervisors will patrol both sidelines to make certain all rules are enforced. Live or taped pregame interviews with players and/or

coaches will not be permitted under any circumstance. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and removed from the stadium.. Media Services

The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, on the west side of Cougar Stadium. Access to the press box may be obtained via the north or south elevator.

relations staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs and media guides for both BYU and the visiting team prior to the game. Additional information, such as lineup, roster or jersey changes will be distributed as the information becomes available. An official statistical package complete with individual and team stats, play-by-play, scoring summaries, quotes, end-of-quarter stats and defensive stats will be distributed following the game. "Quickie stats" will be available during timeouts and at the end of each quarter.

With 4:00 remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU head coach LaVell Edwards and selected players will be available in the media room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period. The BYU locker room is closed to media. The newly constructed media room is located next to the BYU locker room under the southeast corner of the grandstands. Quotes from both coaches and selected players will be available in the final stats package.

Several courtesy telephones (with campus extensions) will be available in the working area of the press box, while a limited number of phones will be available in the new media room. All phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Collect or credit card calls can be made from each of these telephones.

Parking

Cougar Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2 immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

Interviews

During the season, all player and coaches interviews must be scheduled through Jeff Reynolds in the athletic media relations office at (801) 378-4909. Interview requests must be made 24 hours in advance. Players and coaches are generally available prior to and immediately following practice.

Telephone interviews can be arranged for out-of-town media through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with players on the day prior to the game, as well as game day, are not permitted.

Interviews with Coach Edwards can generally be scheduled daily from 10-11 a.m. In addition, Coach Edwards is available for interviews following practice.

Big Five Huddle

The Big Five Huddle will be held each Tuesday at 11:30 a.m., beginning August 31, at the Green Street Social Club in Trolley Square (700 East 500 South) in Salt Lake City. The weekly gathering will include players and coach-

es from each of the five universities in the state of Utah, including Coach Edwards and selected players. KFAN Radio and Green Street will serve as this year's official sponsors.

Weekly MWC Teleconference

A weekly teleconference, featuring the head coaches from each Mountain West Conference school, will be conducted beginning the first week of September. Fax on Demand

Updated rosters, team and individual stats, schedule/results, game notes and other information is available to media via the Mountain West Conference fax-on-demand system. Please contact the athletic media relations office for additional information regarding the fax-on-

demand system. Fax-on-demand is a service provided by the Mountain West Conference and is intended for media only.

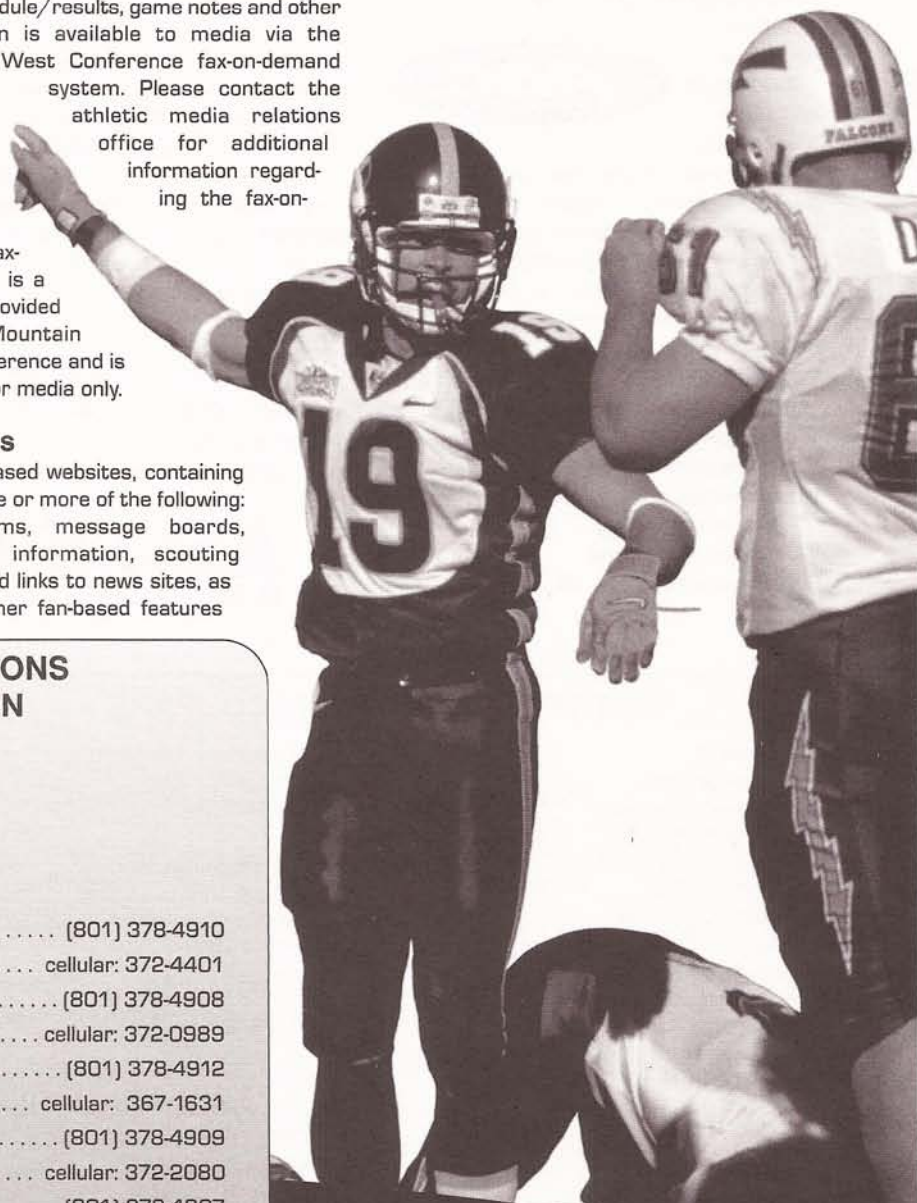
Websites

NATIONAL & REGIONAL TV

On February 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc., signed a seven-year contract with the Mountain West Conference, giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to football and men's basketball beginning with the 1999-2000 academic year. ESPN will also televise the Mountain West Conference Women's



Basketball Championship game and one regular season game on the network.

An average of 21 football games will be televised per year, three of which will be broadcast on Thursday nights.

BYU opens the 2000 Season on ABC as they take on



defending national champion Florida State in the Pigskin Classic in Jacksonville, Florida. The Cougars will play six nationally televised games and one ABC regional game at Virginia on Sept. 2. Four games will air on ESPN (Mississippi State, Wyoming, Colorado State, Utah) and one game (Syracuse on October 30) will air on ESPN2. Three of the ESPN games will be Thursday evening games. BYU played two consecutive Thursday evening games to start the 1999 season defeating Washington Sept. 9 and Colorado State on Sept. 16.

BYU and SportsWest have an agreement to local market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events that have not been acquired by ESPN.

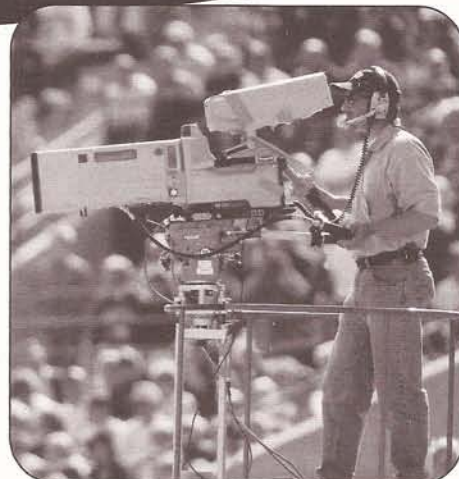

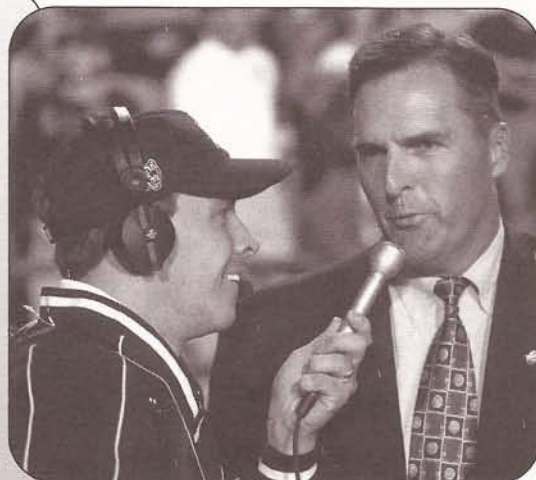

2000 SEASON

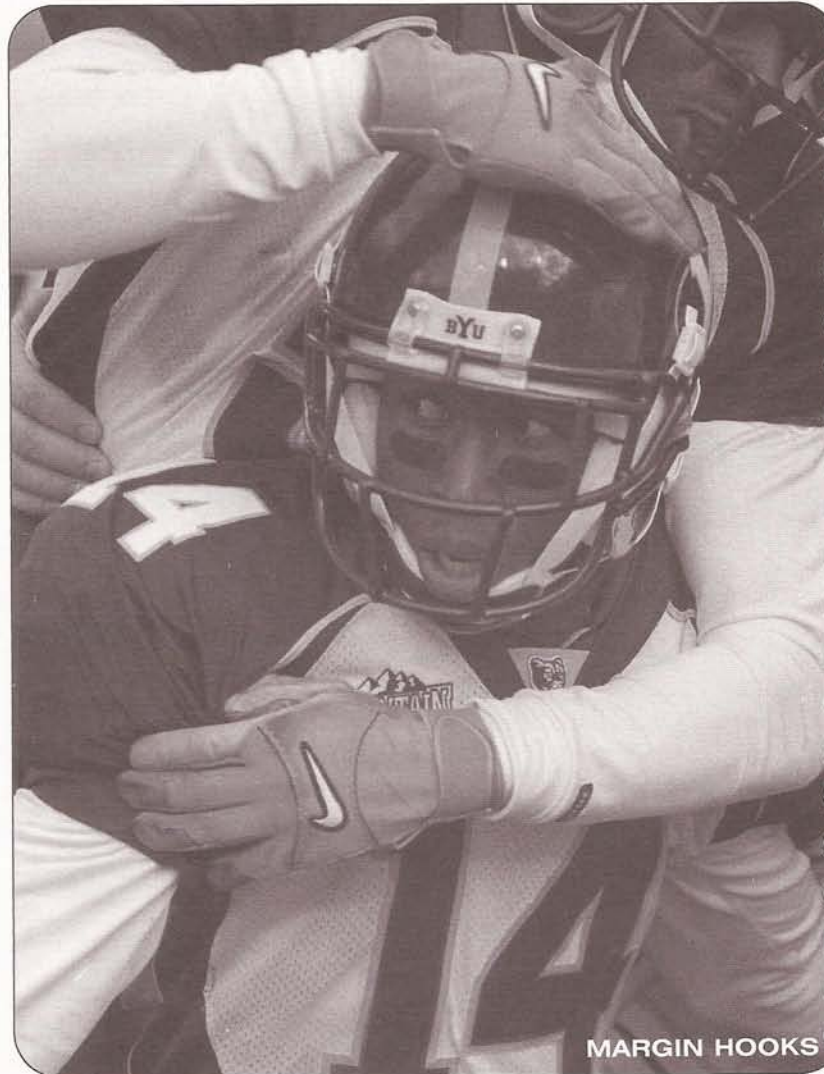
BYU FOOTBALL 2000



Entering his 29th season as head coach at BYU, 69-year-old LaVell Edwards is facing perhaps the most challenging seasons of his career.

However, with 27 winning seasons, 20 conference titles, 22 bowl appearances and a National Championship under his belt, why would he ever think of stopping or slowing down now? As far as Edwards is concerned, more glory lies ahead.

"This is certainly one of the most challenging and exciting schedules

we've had since I've been at BYU," Edwards says. "In addition to a tough Conference schedule, we'll be playing several of the top teams in the country and traveling to the East Coast three different times. With a schedule like this, we've certainly got our work cut out for us, but we're really looking forward to it."

During the 2000 season, the Cougars will travel nearly 11,000 miles with three trips to the East Coast, in addition to their Conference road schedule. Throughout the year, BYU will travel to Jacksonville, Fla. [vs. Florida State], Virginia, Air Force, Syracuse, Colorado State and Utah. All totaled, BYU will compete against six different teams, which participated in bowl games during the 1999 season, including Florida State which defeating Virginia Tech in the Sugar Bowl to win the National Championship. Overall, BYU's list of opponents combined for 82 wins last season, including Mississippi State, which posted a 10-2 mark, capped by a 17-7 Peach Bowl victory over Clemson.

COACHING CHANGES

For the first time since Brian Mitchell took over as the cornerbacks coach in 1995, BYU underwent changes to the coaching staff during the offseason. Long-time assistant coach Lance Reynolds will begin his first season as the offensive coordinator, after serving 17 seasons as an offensive assistant. Former lineman Mike Empey also joined the staff and will be responsible for coaching the offensive tackles and tight ends.

"Lance has been an integral part of our coaching staff for the past 17 years and we're very pleased to have Mike join our program," Edwards says. "Both Lance and Mike have taken advantage of their respective coaching assignments, which have

prepared them for their new responsibilities. I feel extremely confident in their abilities and know they will do a great job. So far, things seem to be working out well."

Defensive coordinator Ken Schmidt was elevated to assistant head coach and will continue his duties as the defensive coordinator. Tom Ramage will continue coaching the defensive line and special teams, while Brian Mitchell will continue working with the corners and Barry Lamb with the safeties. In addition to his duties as the team's recruiting coordinator, Chris Pella will begin the 2000 season working with the receivers and kickers, while Robbie Bosco will work with the quarterbacks. Reynolds will instruct the running backs, while Roger French will work primarily with the interior offensive linemen.

QUARTERBACKS

In addition to making changes in the coaching staff, the Cougars will also make a change at quarterback this season. Lost to graduation is All-Conference performer Kevin Feterik, who led the Cougars with 3,554 yards passing and 25 TD completions. BYU will look to one of three possible replacements for the three-year starter, including Bret Engemann, Charlie Peterson and Brandon Doman.

"I feel really good about all three quarterbacks," Edwards says. "They all played well during the spring, and

are only getting better. The only thing we lack in this area will be experience. The three of them have worked hard in every aspect and all have good arms. I really think we will be fine at quarterback."

Engemann returned to the BYU camp last fall as a true freshman after serving an LDS Church mission. The 6-4, 220-pound slinger played in six games on the season, including an appearance in the Motor City Bowl. Engemann completed 3-of-4 passes for 13 yards during the regular season and was credited with 6-of-11 attempts for 45 yards during the Cougars' postseason bowl appearance. Engemann, who has been noted for his size and impressive arm strength, chalked up 248 yards passing during the Blue/White spring game, completing 12-of-23 passes, including two touchdowns. Charlie Peterson, a 6-2, 190-pound junior made two brief appearances during the 1999 campaign, producing six yards on one rushing attempt. During the Motor City Bowl, Peterson gained an additional four yards rushing and completed 4-of-7 passes for 50 yards. During the spring game, Peterson accounted for 250 yards passing on 18-of-30 attempts, including one touchdown strike and one interception. Doman also saw limited action at quarterback in 1999, but was used as a receiver in key situations. Doman threw just two passes on the season, but was credited with five carries for

32 yards and nine receptions for 83 yards. During the Blue/White game, Doman completed 13-of-23 attempts for 122 yards.

"Through the spring, one guy would take a step up, then another would, then the next," Edwards says. "My gut feeling is we'll need more than one of them during the season. But, eventually, one will emerge."

RUNNING BACKS

After offseason surgery on his knee and shoulder, the Cougars are expecting the return of Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year and *Sporting News* Freshman All-American Luke Staley at running back. Staley was the nation's leading freshman in 1999, averaging 9.75 points per game. The 6-2, 210-pound bruiser played in just eight regular-season games, scoring at least one touchdown in each appearance. Staley tallied 432 yards and 10 rushing touchdowns and added 339 receiving yards, including two touchdown receptions.

"Things are a little iffy at running back right now with the uncertainty of Luke's condition," Edwards says. "If Luke comes back totally healed from both surgeries, that will be a big plus."

The Cougars' leading rusher from the 1999 season, Fahu Tahī, will sit out the 2000 season to serve an LDS Church mission. Tahī led BYU with 445 yards on 102 carries as a freshman, scoring two touchdowns. Senior fullback Kalani Sitake will return in 2000 after breaking his ankle in last year's game at Wyoming. Sitake had 124 yards receiving and 109 yards rushing for the Cougars as a junior and played a key roll in pass protection.

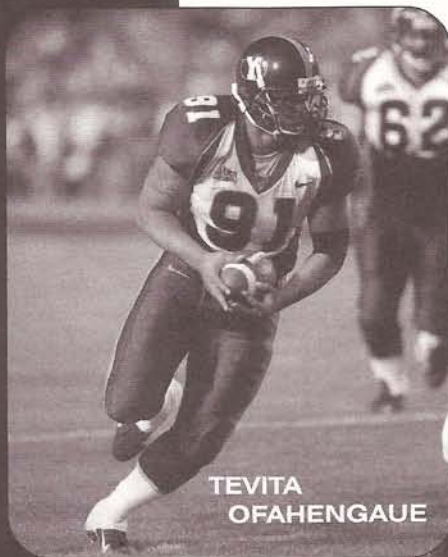

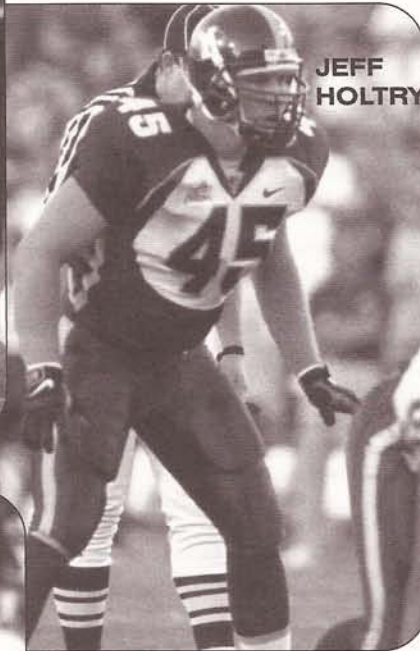

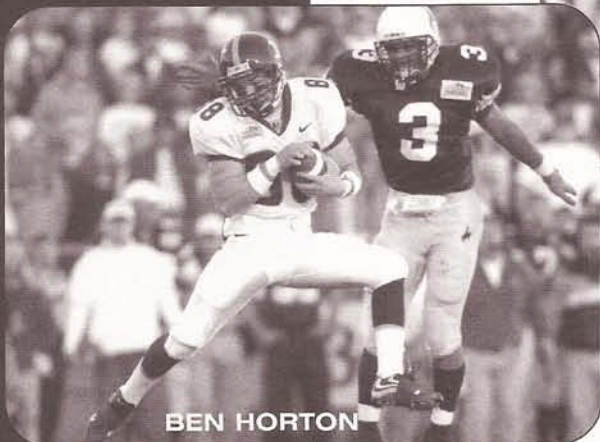

"Kalani's return will be a big plus. If he can come back and contribute the way he was before he got hurt, we'll be fine," Edwards says.

BYU will also look for contributions from incoming freshman Marcus Whalen, as well as junior college transfer Brian McDonald. McDonald rushed for over 2,000 yards at Cerritos JC, including 1,032 yards and nine touchdowns as a sophomore. Whalen produced over 1,900 yards and 19 touchdowns as a senior at Thomas Stone High School.

"Hopefully these guys can come in here and contribute like Luke and Fahu did a year ago," Edwards says. "A lot of it will depend on just how healthy Luke and Kalani will be and how far along these new guys are when they get here."

Other players expected to contribute at the running back and full back positions this season are Mike Nielson, a transfer from Utah State, Will Snowden, Paul Peterson and Ned Stearns. All four players made significant contributions during the spring and should expect to see an increasing amount of playing time during the 2000 season.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Returning for the Cougars on the offensive line will be senior tackle Ford Poston, senior guard Kam Valgardson, junior center Jason Scukanec, junior tackle Aaron McCubbins, sophomore guard Isaac Herring and sophomore tackle Dustin Rykert. All six saw significant playing time at their respective positions during the 1999 season and are expected to play a valuable role in beefing up the Cougars' pass protection efforts this season. Added to the mix are junior guard Teag Whiting, who redshirted the 1999 season after transferring from Ricks College, and returning missionaries Scott Jackson and Ben Archibald. Both Jackson, a 6-4, 270-pound redshirt freshman, and Archibald, a 6-4, 280-pound sophomore, gained valuable experience by participating in spring drills.

"I think our offensive line will be improved," Edwards says. "With the development of Isaac [Herring] and Dustin [Rykert], combined with the experience of some of our returning players and a couple returning missionaries, we should be fine. I've been impressed with their improvement over the spring and feel we're on the right track with this group."

RECEIVERS

The experienced BYU receiving corps will be headlined this season by All-America and Biletnikoff Award candidate Margin Hooks. The 6-0, 190-pound receiver led the Cougars last season with a career high 1,067 yards on 60 receptions. The All-MWC first-team performer also recorded seven

touchdown receptions, including a season-high 77-yard TD reception against Utah in the Cougars' final regular-season game. Hooks has accumulated 2,123 yards receiving over his career and needs just 944 yards to become the Cougars' all-time leading receiver.

"Margin is very talented," Edwards says. "He brings so many different things to this team. His speed, ability, leadership and experience will all play a very valuable role for us this year."

The Cougars also return seniors Ben Horton and Jonathan Pittman. Pittman ranked second behind Hooks with 478 yards and four TDs in 1999, while Horton added 472 yards and two touchdowns. The trio of Hooks, Horton and Pittman produced over 2,000 of the Cougars' 3,500 receiving yards.

"Pittman and Horton played well for us last year," Edwards says. "Pittman came in here from junior college with some pretty high expectations. Both he and Ben were a significant part of our offense last year and will make us that much better with their added experience."

Mike Rigell, who spent last season at Foothill JC, returns to the BYU lineup and will add speed and experience to the talented corps of receivers. BYU will also look to junior receiver Soren Halladay, who missed all of last season with a knee injury, as well as returning missionaries Toby Christensen, Jason Kukahiko and David Christensen.

"There's no doubt we will be experienced at wide receiver," Edwards says. "Adding Rigell to the list, as well as the guys coming back from missions, I think we're going to be pretty good."

TIGHT ENDS

Senior Tevita Ofahengaue leads a group of tight ends who are expected to play an integral part in the revitalized BYU offense. Ofahengaue played in all 11 regular-season games for the Cougars, recording 284 yards on 21 receptions. Ofahengaue also produced two touchdowns for the Cougars, while junior Doug Jolley chalked up 65 yards on six receptions, including three TDs. Gabriel Reid,

brother of NFL player Spencer Reid, is also expected to make a significant contribution at tight end this season.

"Our tight ends are very good," Edwards says. "We have three guys in here who can play. They all have great speed and are all getting better at blocking. I think we are going to be pretty solid."

DEFENSIVE LINE

Ranked as one of the top defensive lines in the Mountain West Conference last season, the BYU defensive front is expected to be even better in 2000. Tackles Chris Hoke and Hans Olsen return in the middle, with Setema Gali, Jr. listed as one of two starters at the end. Hoke and Olsen combined for 84 tackles last season, including 19 tackles for a combined loss of 90 yards. Gali produced 39 tackles for the Cougars, including seven sacks. All totaled, the three returning starters accounted for 16 of BYU's 35 sacks on the season. Chris Watkins, a 6-2, 285-pound sophomore is also expected to see action at the tackle position during the 2000 season, as well as 6-1, 275-pound Jimmy Betham.

"With all those guys, we will be able to rotate around at tackle," Edwards says. "Each of them have a lot of experience and are good players. The only thing is, we really don't have a lot of depth. If we can stay away from injury, we will be solid there."

Brett Keisel, a speedy 6-6, 260-pound junior returns to the BYU roster after spending a year at the junior-college ranks and is expected to fill the gap left by the graduating Byron Frisch. Keisel made an immediate impact on the defensive line during spring drills, recording two sacks, two

pass breakups and two hurries during the annual Blue/White spring game. Keisel will be joined by Ryan Denney, a 6-7, 270-pound junior who gained valuable playing time at defensive end last season. Denney, Keisel and Gali are expected to share equal time at defensive end.

"Our defensive line will be very quick," Edwards says. "I think the addition of Brett Keisel will help pick up the slack of losing Byron Frisch. Adding Keisel in with Gali and Denney will give us three very quick and very good football players."

LINEBACKERS

At first glance, the BYU linebacker roster looks packed with size, speed, experience and all the ability necessary to fill the void left by All-American Rob Morris. However, due to some key injuries during last season and the spring, the Cougar coaching staff has been left to take a wait-and-see approach to the season.

Justin Ena seems to be a sure-thing at the strong side backer position. Ena, a second-team All-Mountain West performer last year produced 49 tackles as a freshman and has continued his dominance through the spring. Isaac Kelley was credited with 34 tackles last season and is expected to make an impact at the weak-side position as a junior. Perhaps the biggest question mark surrounds senior middle linebacker Josh Lowe. A tremendous athlete who registered 46 tackles last

season, Lowe began spring practice in rare form, but was forced to hang up the pads after suffering from herniated discs in his lower back. Following an offseason of rigorous rehabilitation, the BYU coaching staff remains optimistic regarding Lowe's return. Jeff Holtry, who is recovering from a torn ACL, is expected to be back and playing at 100 percent before practice begins in August and should see time at middle linebacker. Holtry, a transfer from Michigan, gained valuable experience at middle linebacker last season after Morris was sidelined with a groin injury.

"If we can get all our guys back, we will be solid at linebacker," Edwards says. "Ena, Lowe, Holtry and Kelly are all solid players, who bring a great deal of experience to our defense. If healthy, all four will contribute at linebacker. We'll just have to wait and see what happens."

The Cougars will also look to develop the skills of a couple young players in Colby Bockwoldt, Mike Tanner and Ammon Mauga. Bockwoldt, a 6-1, 210-pound redshirt freshman is a little on the light side, but can run well and is very competitive. Mauga, a 6-0, 215-pound redshirt freshman, Paul Walkenhorst, a 6-5, 230-pound freshman, and Tanner, a 6-1, 240-pound freshman, should each compete for playing time during the season.

"The combination of getting our guys healthy and the development of these

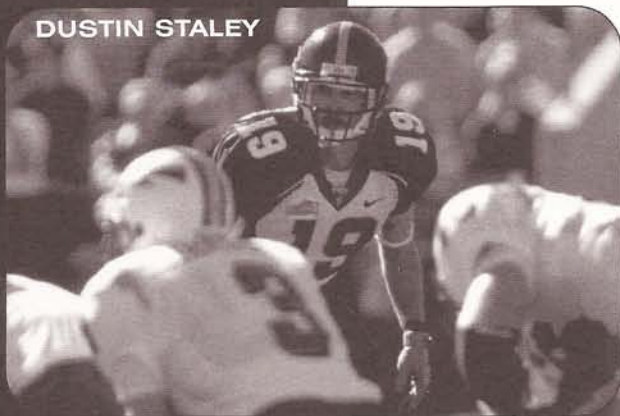

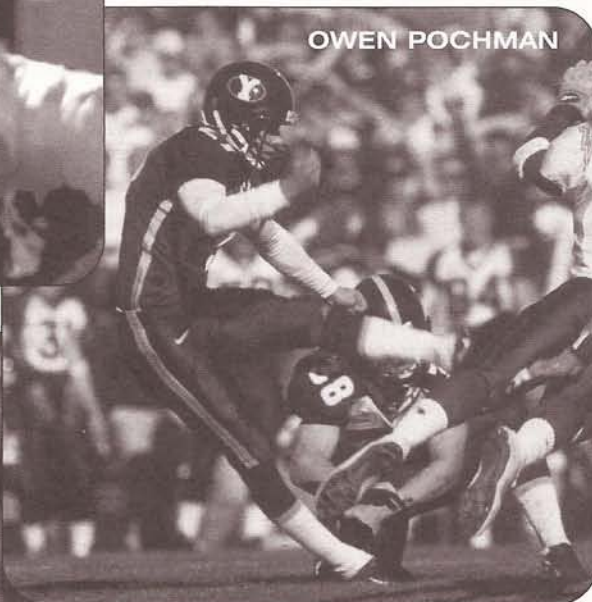

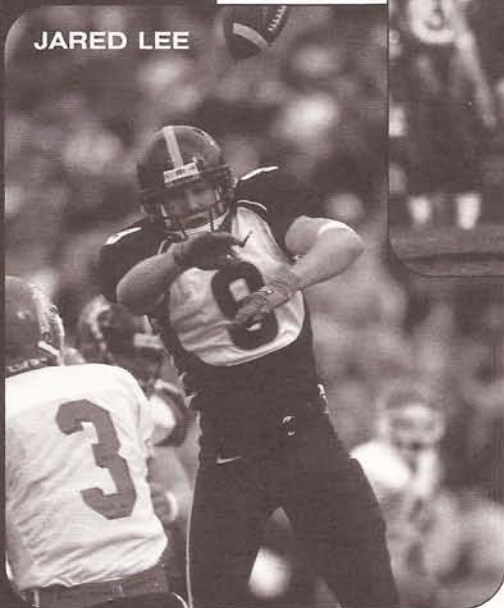

young guys, could make this a pretty good group of players," Edwards says.

SAFETIES

Headlining the safeties will be senior Jared Lee. Perhaps the most underrated defensive player in the entire Mountain West Conference, Lee led the Cougars with 96 tackles last season, including an impressive 67 solo takedowns. The 6-0, 210-pound senior was equally impressive in pass defense, recording a team-leading four interceptions and eight pass break-ups.

"Jared is in a league of his own," Edwards says. "He is an outstanding football player and should have been All-Conference last year - there's no doubt. What else can you say about him?"

At the other safety position, senior Elan Edwards and sophomore Dustin Staley produced a combined 68 tackles last season and are both expected to contribute to the Cougar secondary in 2000. The Cougars will also return senior Tyson Smith, who started three games last year, but left the team during mid-season. Other players expected to add to the Cougars'

depth are 6-1, 195-pound sophomore Michael Madsen and 6-0, 195-pound redshirt freshman Kurt Elliott.

CORNERBACKS

Gone are Brian Gray and Heshimu Robertson. Also, Jernaro Gilford is expected to miss the season. BYU will have to hope history has a way of repeating itself. In the past, the Cougars have dipped in to the JUCO ranks and have come up with the likes of Omarr Morgan, Tim McTyer and Gray, just to name a few. This year, the Cougars will look to junior college transfers Derrus Wilson and Danny Phillips to fill an immediate need at corner. In addition, 5-7, 160-pound Michael Lafitte, who has been in the program for a year after transferring from Phoenix JC, is expected to compete for playing time at corner.

Wilson, a 5-9, 180-pound transfer from Blinn JC, was a first team all-district performer, recording 27 tackles and 11 pass break-ups. Phillips, a 6-1, 190-pound transfer from Cerritos JC, was an All-Mission (Northern Division) Conference selection and finished his sophomore season with 33 tackles, including 19 solo takedowns. As a freshman, Phillips posted 37 tackles.

It is expected BYU will convert incoming freshman Isiah Joiner from running back to cornerback. At Sealy High School, Joiner ran for over 2,000 yards as a senior.

"If we get lucky with Derrus and Danny, like we have in the past with a few guys who have come in here and contributed from the start, we should

be solid at cornerback," Edwards says.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Anchoring the special teams is senior kicker Owen Pochman. The 6-0, 180-pound left-footer holds the BYU career scoring record and posted some impressive stats as a junior. An All-America and Lou Groza Award candidate as a senior, Pochman has produced 38 field goals over the past two seasons, including an impressive 20-of-26 field goals from 40-49 yards.

"Owen is pretty much in a class by himself," Edwards says. "There is no doubt he is an All-America candidate."

With the graduation of punter Jesse Sowards, the Cougars will look to either Aaron Edmonds or Matt Payne to take over punting duties. Edmonds, a 5-11, 185-pound JUCO transfer from Ricks College averaged 38.7 yards per punt during the Blue/White game in the spring, while Payne, a 6-4, 215-pound freshman, registered a 43.7 average during the annual spring scrimmage.

"Both punters are doing a nice job," Edwards says. "Edmonds is real fluid in his motion and kicks well. Payne, I think, has a chance to be a good kicker down the road. He hasn't quite got his leg back after serving a mission. Hopefully he'll be ready to go this fall. I'm certain one of those two guys will be punting for us this fall."

Rigell will step in to return punts and kicks, while Paul Peterson is expected to team up with Rigell on kick returns. Holtry has been listed as the starting deep snapper, while Rykert has been penciled in as the backup.

"Jeff is an outstanding deep snapper, as well as Dustin," Edwards says. "Doug Harding did a nice job for us for a couple years and I think either one of these guys will have the ability to pick up where Doug left off."

'Righteous Rookies' play like seasoned veterans

PROVO— They don't look like freshmen and they don't play like freshmen. That's how BYU quarterback Kevin Feterik describes teammates Luke Staley, Fahu Tahī and Chris Hale. "They're awesome," Feterik said of the newcomers who've stepped right into the offense and helped the Cougars to victories over Washington and Colorado State. The trio, dubbed by the BYU media relations office as the "Righteous Rookies," haven't taken LaVell Edwards by surprise. The coach has used freshmen players before—though, admittedly, not three as extensively straight out of high school. "These guys saw openings and took advantage of it," said Edwards. "And they pleased they did."

2000 RULES CHANGES

THE NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The NCAA Football Rules Committee has approved rules changes for the 2000 season designed to protect defensive players from potentially harmful blocks and to curb offenses from gaining an advantage over defenses through the use of substitution practices.

One of the approved changes expands the definition of an illegal block to include any high-low or low-high combination block by any two offensive players when the initial contact clearly occurs beyond the neutral zone. Previously, such a block could have been considered legal if the contacts were simultaneous.

The committee also approved changes regarding blocking below the waist by offensive players set wide in a formation or in motion. Previously, offensive players positioned more than seven yards in any direction from the middle offensive lineman at the snap, or in motion toward the ball at the snap, were prohibited from blocking below the waist toward the original position of the ball, commonly referred to as a crack-back block, behind the neutral zone and within five yards beyond the neutral zone.

Now, the prohibition includes offensive players in motion in any direction, and the area in which such a block is illegal increased to include the neutral zone and 10 yards beyond.

"These two changes are evidence of the importance the committee, and the NCAA as a whole, places on student-athlete safety," Ault said. "Defensive players often do not see opponents preparing to deliver these kinds of blocks, which can leave them in a most vulnerable position."

Offensive teams, while in the process of substitution or simulated substitution, are now prohibited from rushing quickly to the line of scrimmage and snapping the ball with the obvious attempt to create a defensive disadvantage.

The first time officials detect such an action, play will be stopped when the ball is snapped and the offending team will be penalized five yards for delay of game. In addition, the head coach will be warned that any further use of the tactic will result in a stoppage of play and a 15-yard penalty for unsportsmanlike conduct.

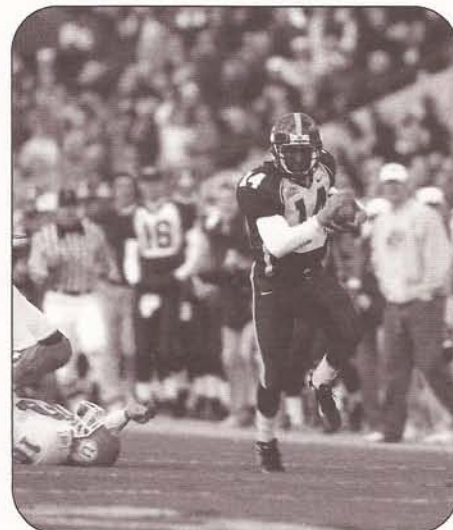
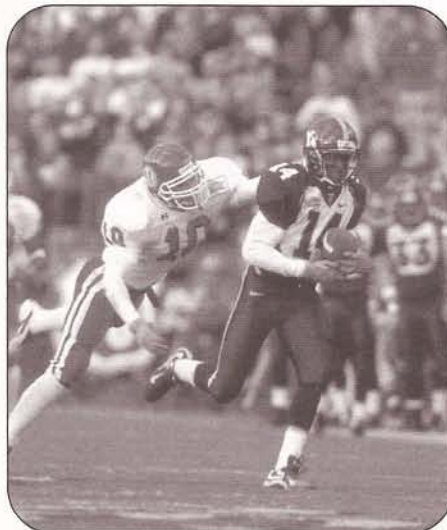
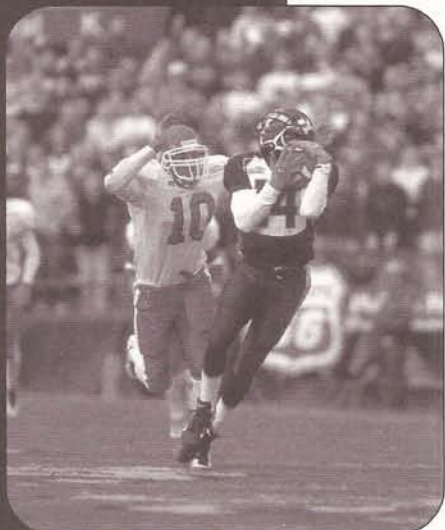
"More offenses are utilizing multiple substitutions, and those substitutes are coming onto the field just before the snap, which is not within the spirit of the rules," Ault said. "Defenses were at a distinct disadvantage because they had little opportunity to make necessary adjustments.

"We anticipate that having the possibility of being penalized will encourage offenses to abide by the spirit of the rules and eliminate such last-second personnel changes."

Among the other rules approved by the committee are:

- Allowing any two defensive players to wear a 4-inch by 12-inch white towel without markings attached to the front belt.
- Prohibiting a defensive player(s) aligned in a stationary position within one yard of the line of scrimmage from making quick and abrupt actions that are not part of normal player movement in an obvious attempt to cause an offensive player(s) to foul.
- Allowing a passer who is five or more yards toward the sideline from the original position of the ball at the snap to throw the ball so that it lands beyond the neutral zone to avoid loss of yardage without penalty.

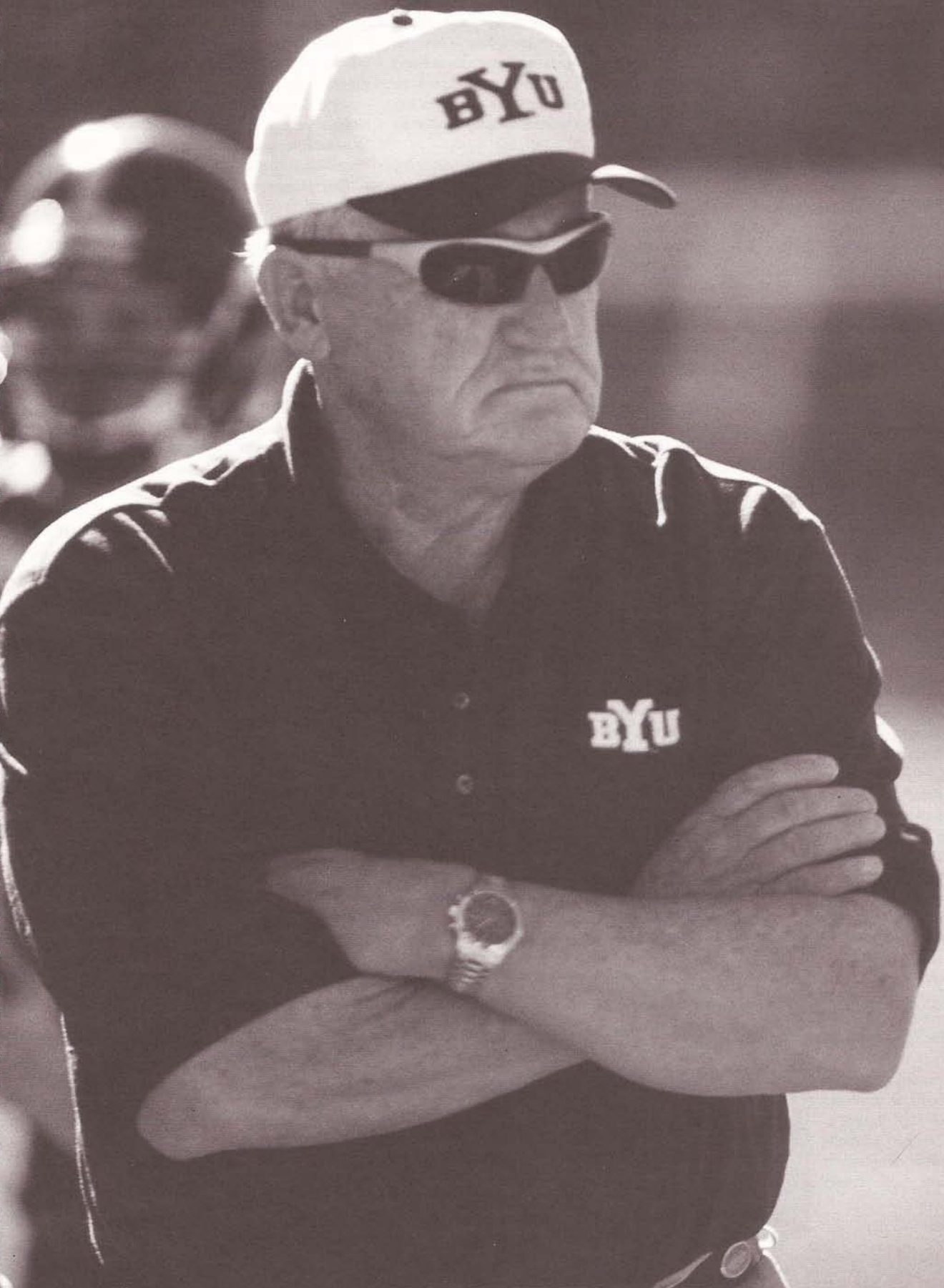

In 1972, LaVell Edwards assumed command of one of

the nation's many mediocre college football programs. In the pre-Edwards era, the Cougars had played to a 173-232-23 (.431) record in 47 seasons, with only one conference title and no bowl appearances to show for a program that had begun back in 1922. Undaunted by the formidable rebuilding task that lay ahead, Edwards wasted little time in transforming BYU into a national power. The Cougars made up for lost time in the next 28 seasons under Edwards, winning 20 conference titles and appearing in 22 bowl games.

Now, 13 top-25 finishes later, including four top-ten seasons, Edwards has earned his spot as one of the great college football coaches in the history of the sport. He heads into the 2000 season with the third most wins (251) and third-best winning percentage (.723) among active coaches, and currently sits in the No. 7 position on the all-time wins list, needing just five wins to pass Tom Osborne for No. 6. He was named National Coach of the Year in 1979 and in 1984, when he led BYU to the National Championship.

Born October 11, 1930, just five miles down the road from BYU in Orem, Edwards was the eighth of 14 children. Beginning as early as eight years old, Edwards would stop at nearby Lincoln High School to watch coach Sanky Dixon run practice. Edwards went on to play at Lincoln, where he starred at center and linebacker, earning all-state honors and winning a state title in 1948.

Colleges took notice of Edwards' success, and BYU and Utah State eventually came knocking. BYU was the early favorite, the place where he had always anticipated going. But after a trip to Logan, Edwards chose to play for the Aggies, largely to avoid having to milk the family cows. Four years and three head coaches later, Edwards graduated from Utah State and served a two-year commitment in the U.S. Army as a second lieutenant.

Edwards' coaching career began inauspiciously as the head coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. Although Edwards had been a graduate assistant at Utah State and had briefly

coached an armed forces team at Fort Mead, Granite was his first real opportunity to put his coaching mind to the test. In eight seasons at the helm, Granite never once had a winning record behind Edwards and the single wing offense. He did, however, bring respect to Granite, which, as the smallest school in the area, had traditionally been an easy win for its opponents.

His relative success did not go unnoticed by new BYU head coach and fellow single wing proponent Hal Mitchell, who hired Edwards onto his staff in 1962 as a prep mentor, coaching the defensive line. He eventually worked his way up to defensive coordinator under coach Tom Hudspeth, before earning the head coaching position in 1972.

LaVell took over a program that had registered a 5-38-4 series against in-state rival Utah. He has transformed the program's overall record into a winning mark and closed the gap on Utah to 26-45-4. The Utah State series was 27-17-3 for the Aggies, but is now reversed in BYU's favor at 37-33-3. Included in that impressive turnaround were victories over

perennial powerhouses Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Texas, Texas A&M, Penn State and of course, the 1990 victory over defending National Champion and top-ranked Miami (Fla.) in Cougar Stadium. Edwards has a 141-33 record in at home.

The Cougars' surprising move into the nation's college football elite culminated in a National Championship under Edwards in 1984. The title was the first for the program, following a 13-0 season and a Holiday Bowl win over Michigan.

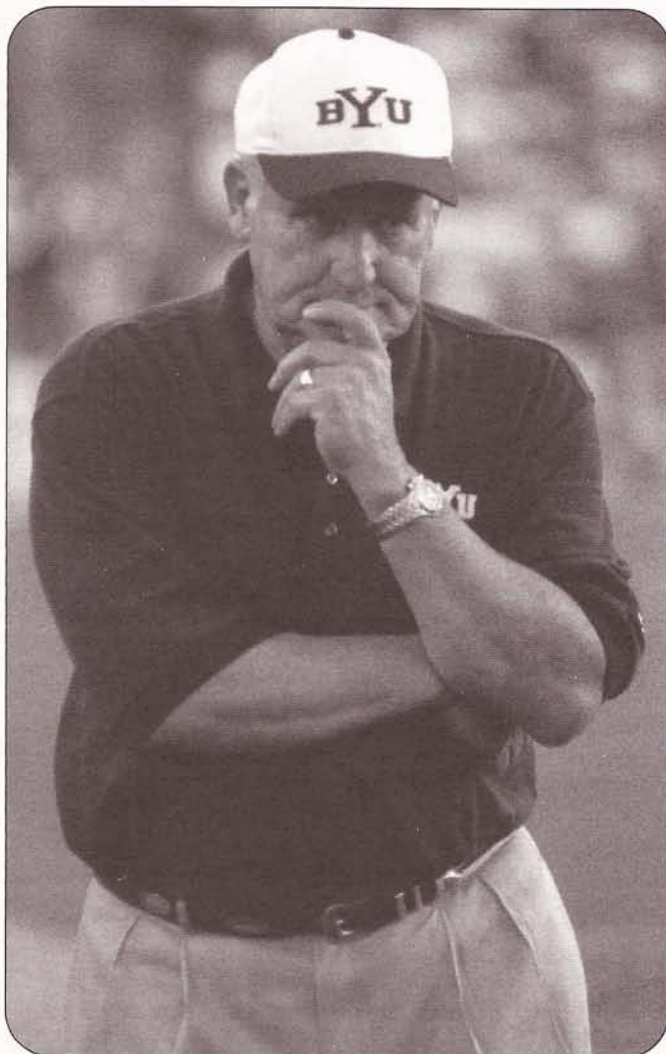
Quarterbacks have thrown over 11,000 passes for Edwards, connecting on over 635 touchdowns. The passing game has racked up 100,267 yards in 28 seasons, coming to a total of about 57 miles gained through the air. The innovative offensive schemes have produced a series of NCAA record-setting quarterbacks, including 1990 Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer and NFL Super Bowl winners Jim McMahon and Steve Young. After a 20-0 loss to Arizona State on Sept. 27, 1975, the Cougars have posted an NCAA-record 312 consecutive games without being shutout.

Maintaining a perpetually stacked stable of talented quarterbacks throughout his tenure in Provo, Edwards earned BYU a national reputation as the "Quarterback Factory." He has coached 33 All-Americans, a Heisman Trophy winner, and nine NFL first-round draft picks. His players have also won four Davey O'Brien Awards and two Outland Trophies, while three former Edwards' pupils are in the College Football Hall of Fame.

The legendary coach is responsible for the expansion of Cougar Stadium, a 65,000-seat monument to his accomplishments. The stadium and Edwards' ingenuity have brought phenomenal success to BYU, as well as a host of national television appearances on a variety of networks.

LaVell is the architect of "Air Edwards," a passing attack that has revolutionized offenses in college football. In August, 1972, when the WAC Skywriter Tour came to Provo, Edwards was the laughing stalk of the media. It was a time when teams like Oklahoma, Notre Dame and Alabama were running the ball on virtually every down, using the pass merely as a surprise mechanism to keep defenses guessing.

Edwards knew that, to keep BYU competitive without big-name recruits, he would have to be innovative. The hiring of Dewey Warren, a former





Tennessee QB, onto Edwards' staff, was the beginning of the famous air attack that would become the staple of BYU's offense for the next 28-plus seasons. Doug Scovil revised the passing game after his 1977 arrival, bringing a pro-style scheme from the Cincinnati Bengals, where he worked with Bill Walsh.

The offensive principles that earned BYU a National Championship were also used by Walsh to make the San Francisco 49ers an NFL dynasty.

Arguably Provo's most recognized name and face, Edwards' image is featured on highway billboards throughout northern Utah. His voice can be heard on a variety of radio advertisements, and Edwards' acting skills have been put to the test in television commercials and short promotional videos.

Behind the scenes, people know Edwards is a decent golfer (his handicap is eight and was once down to a four), but they may not know he also enjoys gardening and reading.

He and his wife, Patti, are the parents of three children. Their daughter, Ann, is a writer, and their sons, Jim and John, are an attorney and an orthopedic surgeon, respectively.

An oft-asked question is how much longer will the 69-year-old Edwards continue to coach. He enters the 2000 season in the first year of a five-year contract extension, signed during the 1999 campaign. He continues to reaffirm, as long as he enjoys the challenge of putting a team together, he will remain at the helm.

"I think he's one of those people who are the foundation of college football. That's in terms of what he stands for, who he is, the consistency with how he's done his job. He's one of those guys you say, 'Hey, the game is better because he's in it.'"

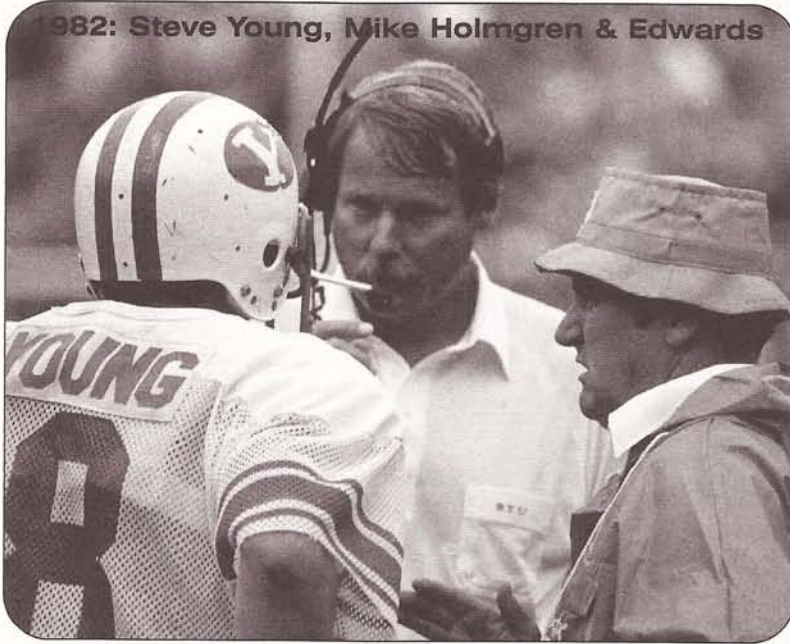

Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl versus Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 10th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top line-backer... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

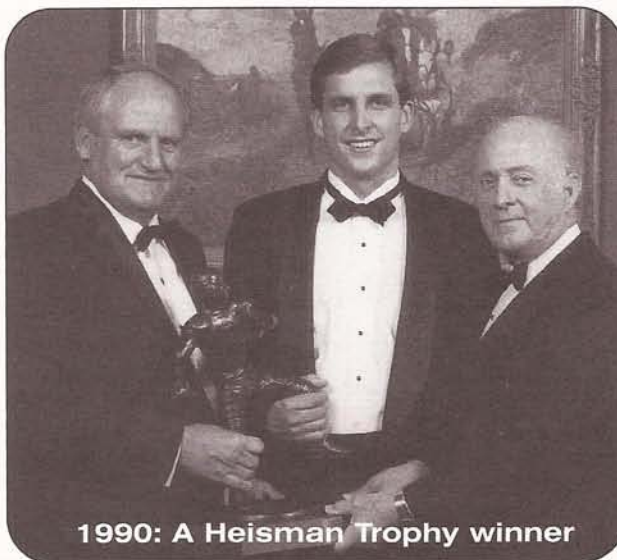
1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-America... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-America teams ... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...also wins the Davey O'Brien Award...finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-America and has more receptions yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a

first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games

Brigham Young University was founded in 1875 and is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Competition for admission is stiff. In 1998, the average freshman admitted had a 3.71 GPA and a 27.2 composite score on the ACT. According to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, in its annual ranking of colleges and universities enrolling freshmen Merit Scholars named each year, BYU ranked 12th in the nation with its admittance of 119 freshmen Merit Scholars in 1997. The attention to academics doesn't end after admission to the university. BYU is one of the leaders in students who are awarded National Science Foundation fellowships – eight students received awards in 1998. BYU also claims six Rhodes scholars, two Mellon Fellows, several law clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court and a Marshall scholar.

In 1999, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the J. Reuben Clark School 29th among the top 50 law schools in the nation. In 1999 and 1998, *Business Week* ranked BYU's Marriott School of Management among the top 50 business schools in the nation. Other Marriott School programs receiving national rankings were the undergraduate and graduate accounting programs, which were ranked third and second in the nation in the Public Accounting Report's Annual Survey of Accounting Professors.

Brigham Young University is the largest private university in the nation and is located about 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah. The 631-acre campus is located at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. Utah Valley, with a population of over 333,000 offers BYU a beautiful setting with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the northeast and 23 mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

BYU students come from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and more than 100 countries. Forty-eight percent are men, 52 percent are women, and 77 percent of the student body is single. Ninety-nine percent of the students are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Eighty-one percent of the men and 15 percent of the women have served full-time missions for the LDS Church.

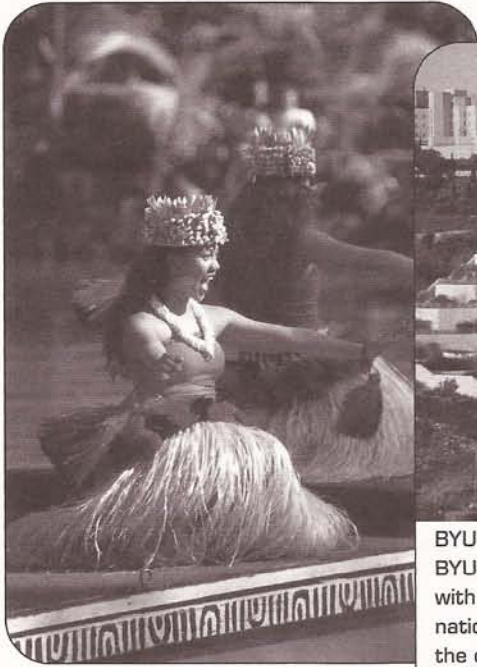

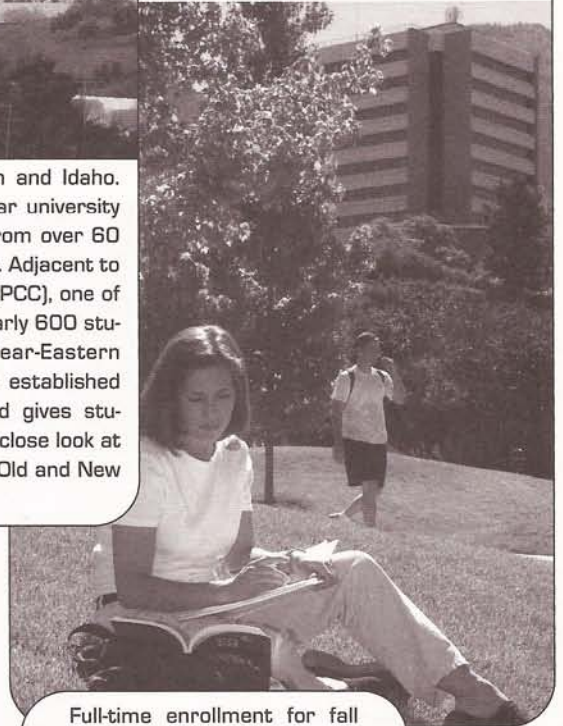




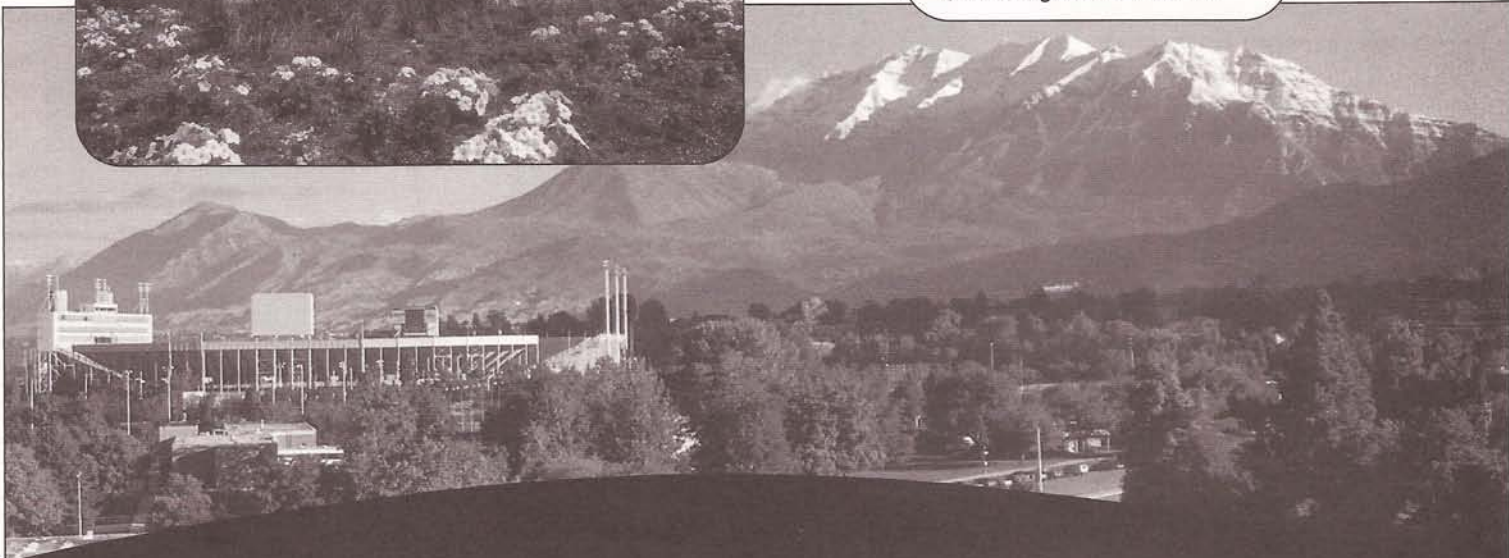
BYU has campuses in Hawaii and Jerusalem and Idaho. BYU's Hawaii campus is a respected four-year university with an enrollment of over 2,000 students from over 60 nations and is located on Hawaii's north shore. Adjacent to the campus is the Polynesian Culture Center (PCC), one of Hawaii's top attractions. The PCC employs nearly 600 students. The BYU Jerusalem Center for Near-Eastern

Studies was established in 1987 and gives students an up-close look at sites of the Old and New Testament.

In 1999, a 234,000-square-foot underground addition was added to the Harold B. Lee Library. The five-floor library has two floors underground, provides seating for 4,000 and houses more than three million volumes, including an extensive collection of pamphlets and titles on microfilm as well as genealogical library and a vast array of audio and visual materials.



Full-time enrollment for fall semester 1999 totalled 28,255 with another 4,476 part-time day students and 1,072 evening school students. Of the full-time day students, 26,473 are undergraduates and 1,782 are graduate students.

BYU is owned and operated by the Church of Jesus

Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. The program follows the biblical pattern of sending out missionaries two by two.

Missions

The Church operates more than 330 missions in the world. Each is presided over by a mission president called from the ranks of Church membership to serve for three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

Missionaries

Currently, approximately 60,000 Latter-day Saints are serving proselytizing missions around the world. Approximately 75 percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26 and holding the priesthood office of "elder." Yet substantial numbers of single women (18 percent) and older couples (7 percent) also serve proselytizing missions. These missionaries work long hours, seven days a week for two years (elders) or 18 months (women and couples), teaching the restored gospel and its ordinances and engaging in community service.

In addition, nearly 5,000 individuals (including couples) are now serving Church service missions. Nutritionists or doctors serve in developing countries where the Church's expanding health services program emphasizes preventive care. Craftsmen, artisans, and construction supervisors train and direct local members in building projects. Agricultural experts train people to produce food more effectively and economically. Other assignments include education, family history research, and leadership training.

The missionaries or their families donate money to the Church equal to the average

cost of a missionary's expenses. After their missions, missionaries return to schooling, vocations, or family.

Missionary Training Center

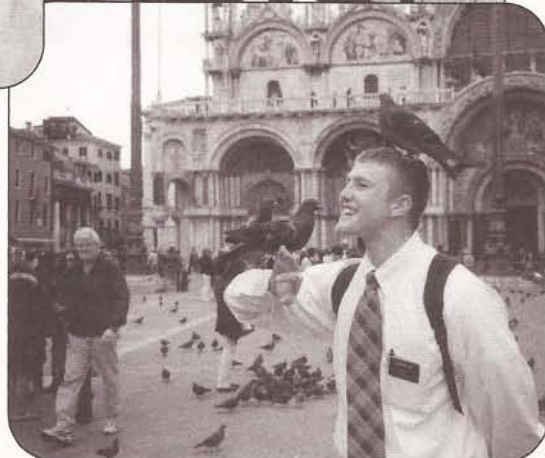
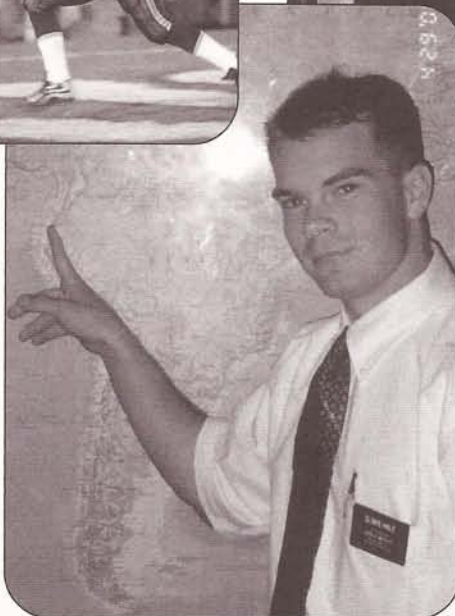
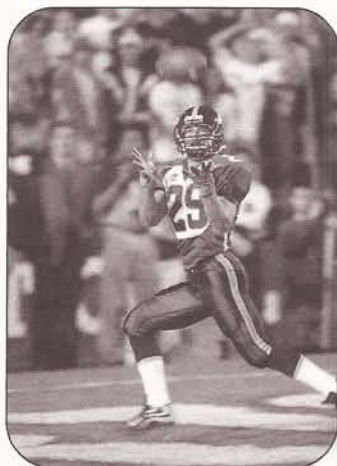
Each missionary, when first called, is assigned to one of 16 missionary training centers around the world. Those required to learn another language spend eight weeks in training before traveling to their assigned mission. If the missionaries

do not need to learn a new language, they attend only two or three weeks of basic orientation.

Preparation

Aside from their brief training in a missionary training center, missionaries receive little formal training for their ministry. Those who are raised in the Church benefit from the extensive efforts contributed by Church auxiliaries and from gospel training in the home. For the many thousands of missionaries who have

converted to the faith in late teen or early adult years, preparation comes primarily from personal study and conviction.



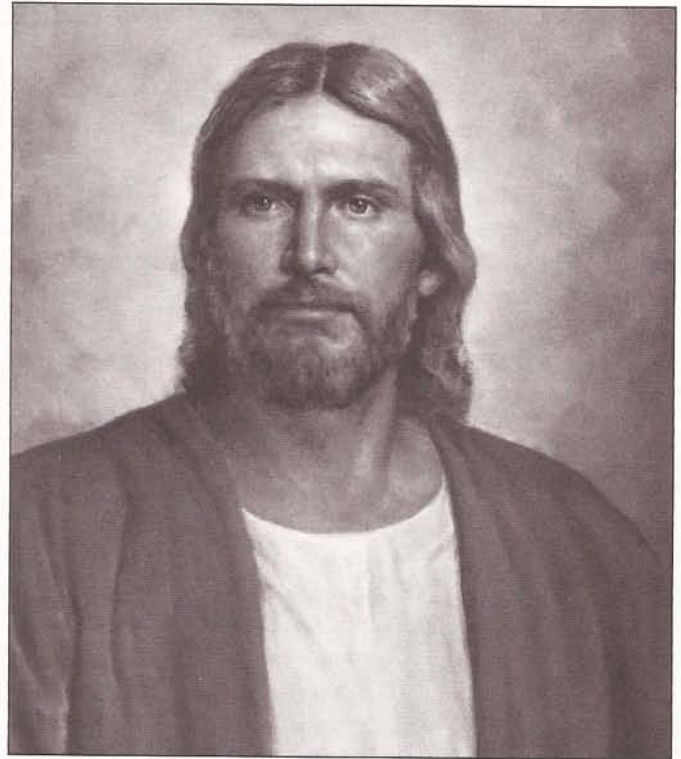

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, directed by Jesus Christ through living prophets and apostles, carries forth the work of the Master, teaching the restored doctrines and administering, with full authority, the valid ordinances of salvation.

An important component of Christ's mortal ministry on the earth was establishing a formal organization, a church. To the Apostles, Christ gave the charge and the authority to carry on the work of his ministry after his Crucifixion. Among their primary responsibilities were preaching the gospel, administering essential ordinances of salvation to those who believed, and authoritatively declaring the true and valid doctrines of the kingdom of God.

Within the first century A.D., however, the Apostles were killed, the doctrines were changed, and the truth was abandoned. A resultant spiritual darkness covered the earth for centuries until one morning in the spring of 1820 when God the Father and his Son, Jesus Christ, appeared to a young boy named Joseph Smith and initiated a restoration of all the truths, powers, and priesthood authority of the ancient Church. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on 6 April 1830 with six members. Today congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With more than 10 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

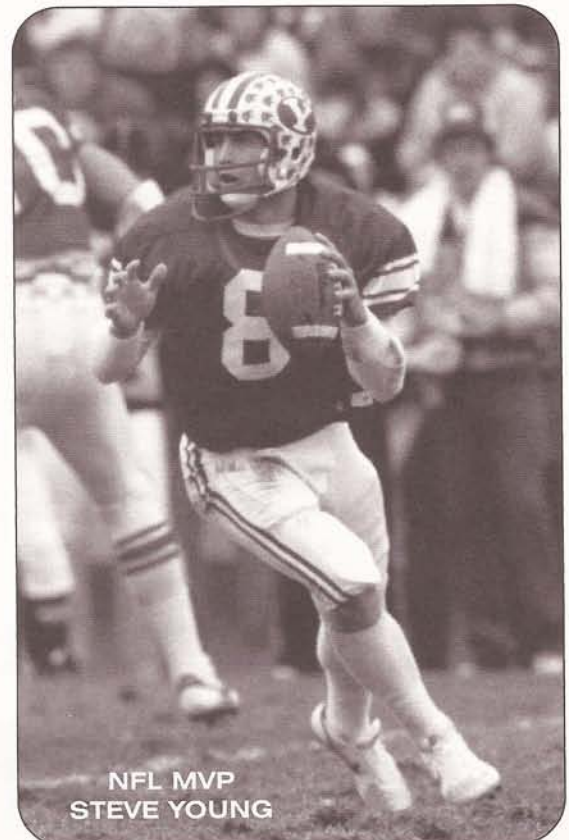

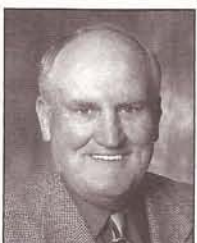

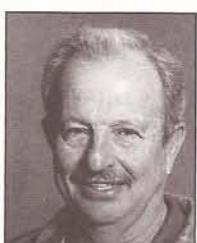

COUGAR STADIUM

65,000 STRONG

Cougar Stadium, with its 65,000-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards, and immaculate press boxes, is home to legendary BYU football.

Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 25 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.

The Field

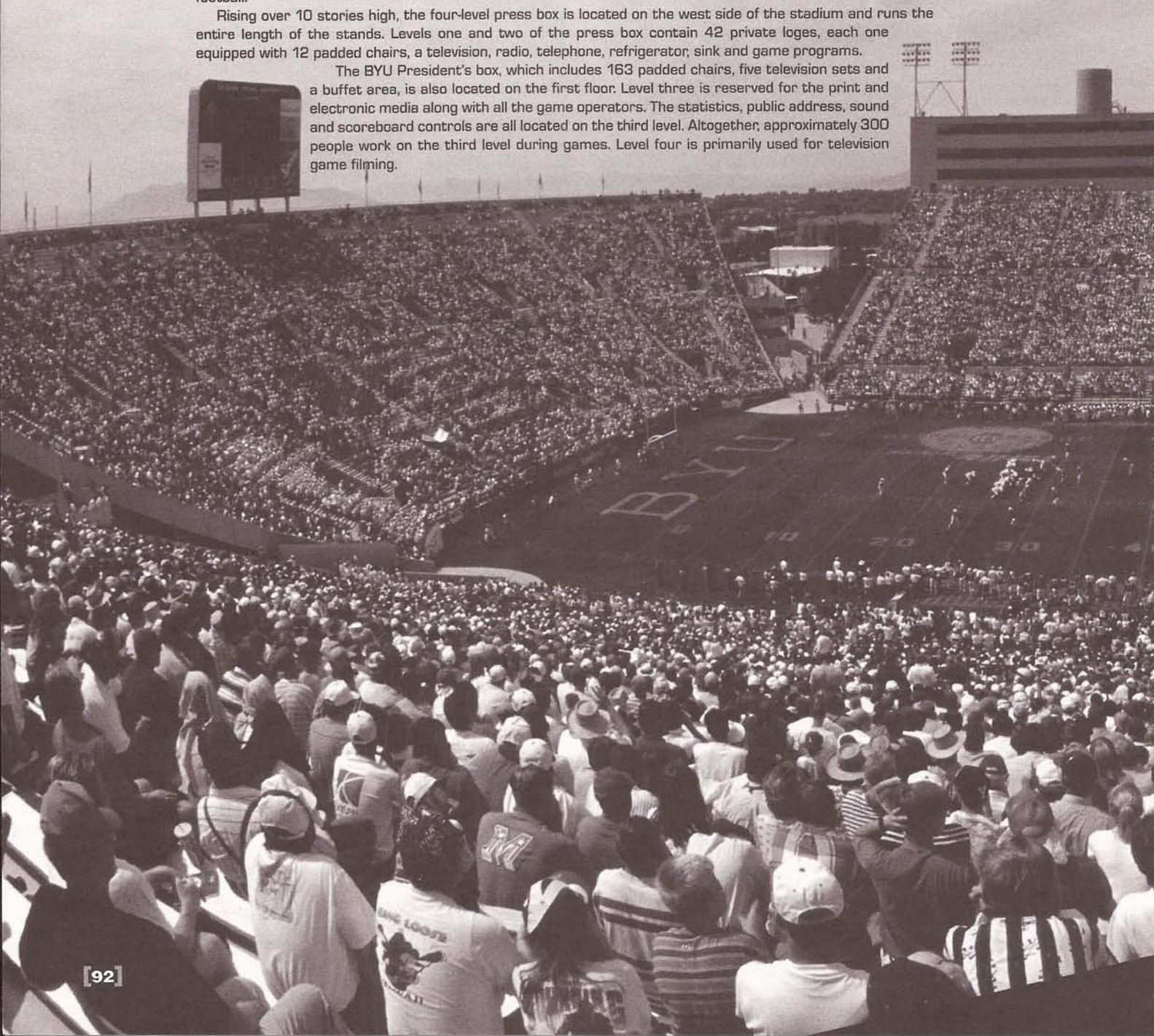
The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

Press Box

In 1982, 1988 and 1997 the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding press box working area." The Cougar Stadium press box has been named the "Provo Marriott" by the media who cover BYU football.

Rising over 10 stories high, the four-level press box is located on the west side of the stadium and runs the entire length of the stands. Levels one and two of the press box contain 42 private loges, each one equipped with 12 padded chairs, a television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, sink and game programs.

The BYU President's box, which includes 163 padded chairs, five television sets and a buffet area, is also located on the first floor. Level three is reserved for the print and electronic media along with all the game operators. The statistics, public address, sound and scoreboard controls are all located on the third level. Altogether, approximately 300 people work on the third level during games. Level four is primarily used for television game filming.

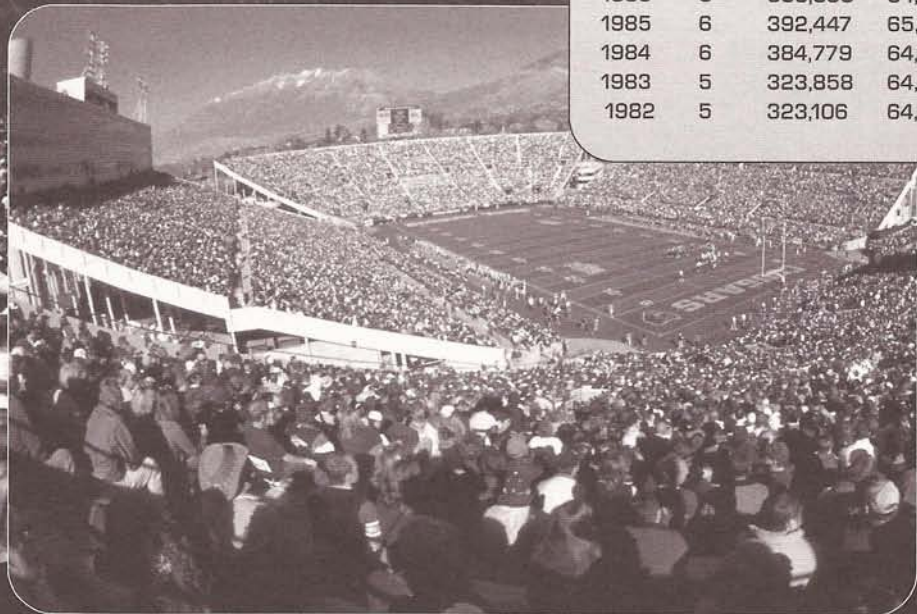
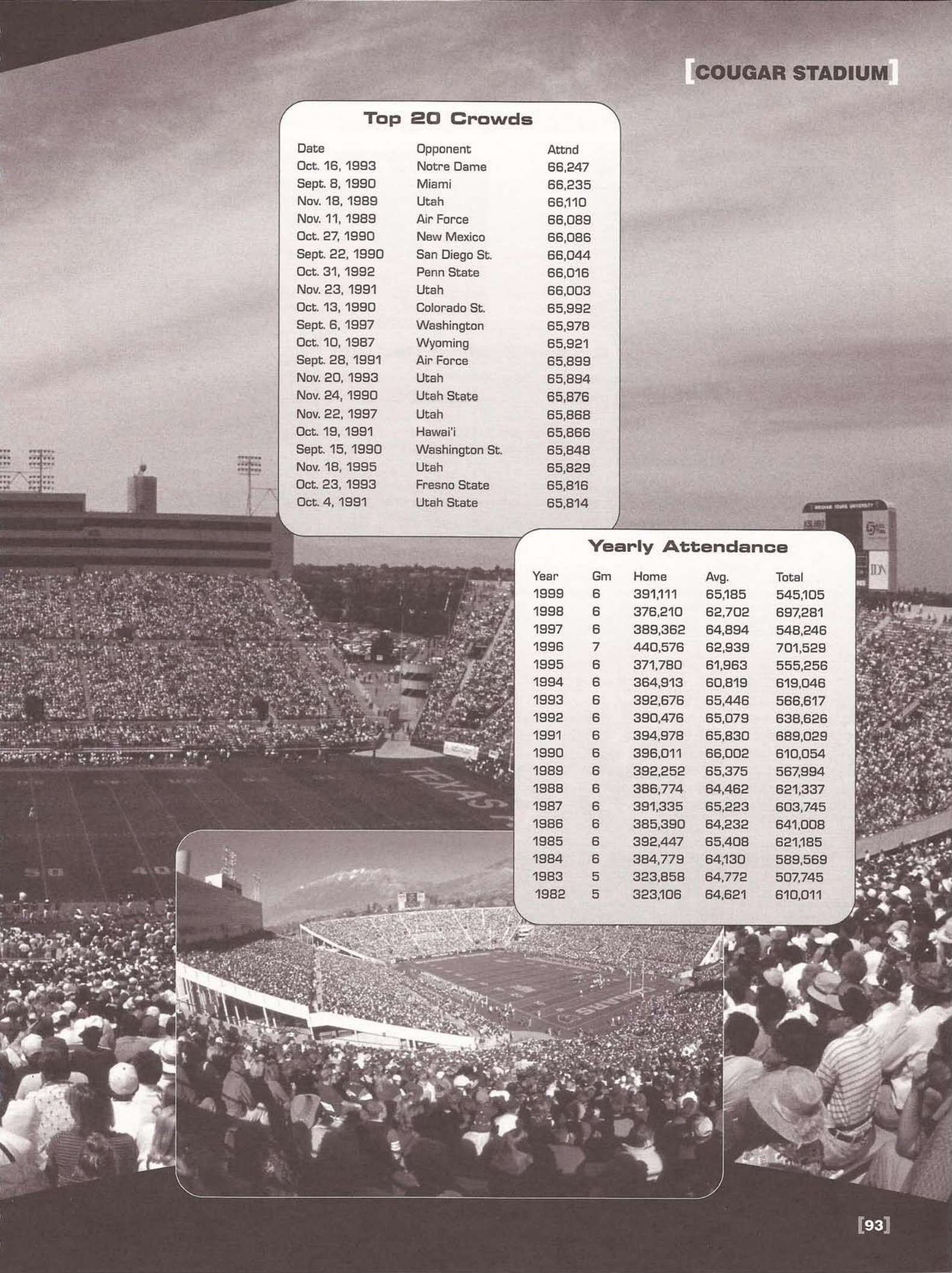

The Field

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

The Early Years

BYU football hasn't always had the luxury of Cougar Stadium. When BYU began its football program in 1896, pasture lands and city parks were the playing fields. In the early 1900's, a rocky field was cleared and a grandstand erected where the Joseph Smith Building now stands.

In 1928, the next Cougar playing field was built where the Stephen L. Richards Building now stands. By using the hillside for seating, the spectator accommodation was increased from a few hundred to five thousand.

As BYU football increased in popularity, the university was forced to find yet another location for a new stadium. Groundbreaking for the current Cougar Stadium commenced in October, 1963. The initial seating capacity was set at 28,812 but soon increased to 35,000.

Last Expansion

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships).

The stadium expansions increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reported at the time as "the largest gathering ever in Utah history."

Video Scoreboard

In 1996, a 23 x 31 foot video scoreboard wall, showing both live action and instant replays, was added above the stands by the south end zone.

A new animation board and sound system was also added to the scoreboard above the north stands.

Other Events

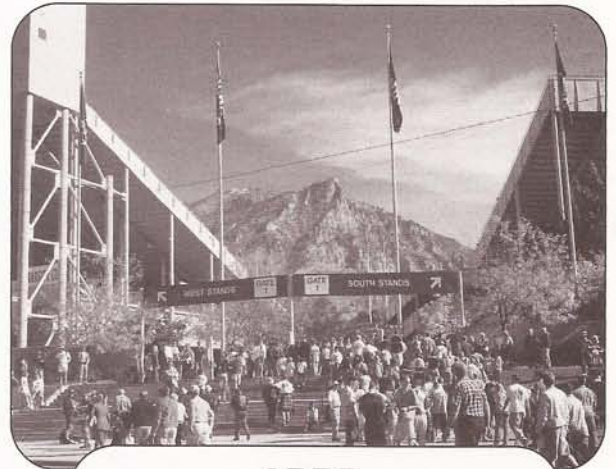
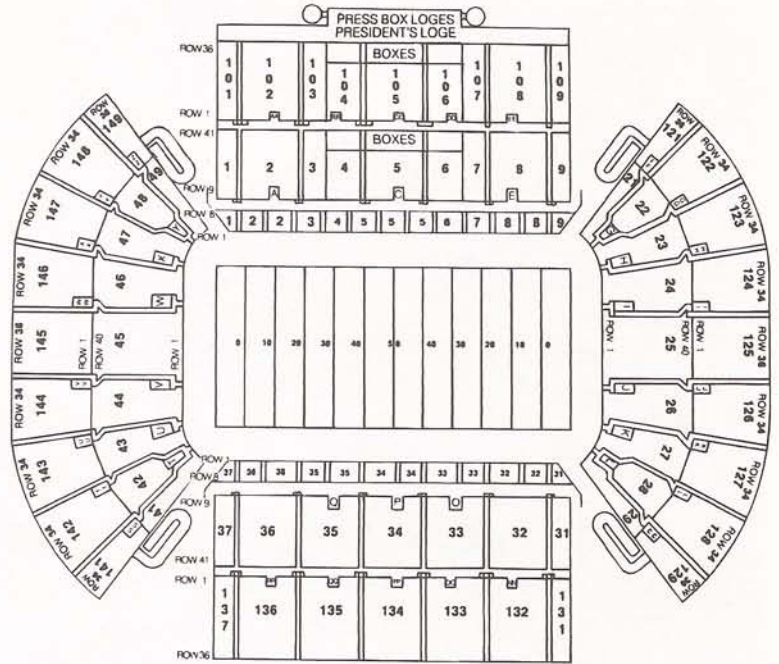
Besides the regular season football games, Cougar Stadium is also used for a variety of other purposes. Music concerts have been hosted there as well as the annual "Stadium of Fire," the July 4th Spectacular held as part of America's Freedom Festival.

High school playoff games and "the Rocky Mountain Band Competition" also include some of the competition on the field every year.

BYU Hall of Fame

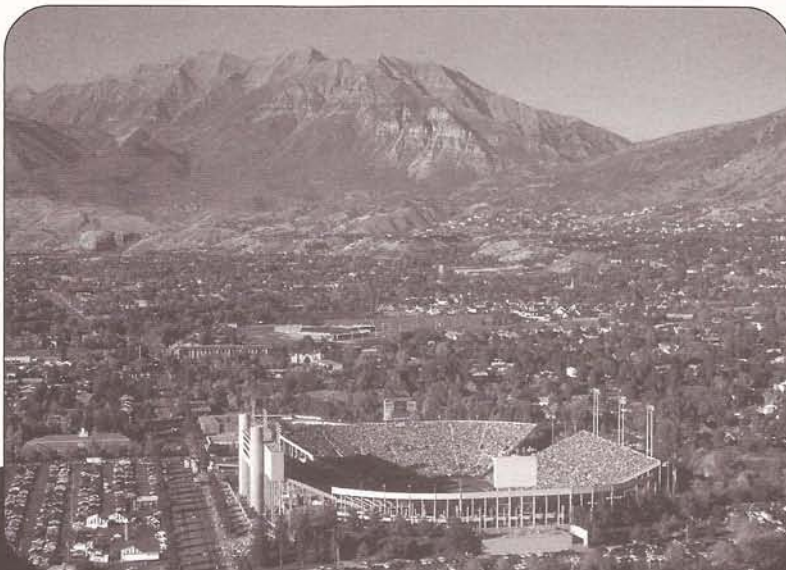
The BYU Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room is located in Cougar Stadium. The room is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets during the year.

In addition to the many office areas, Cougar Stadium stores campus surplus furniture, maintenance vehicles and one of North America's largest Jurassic dinosaur collections.



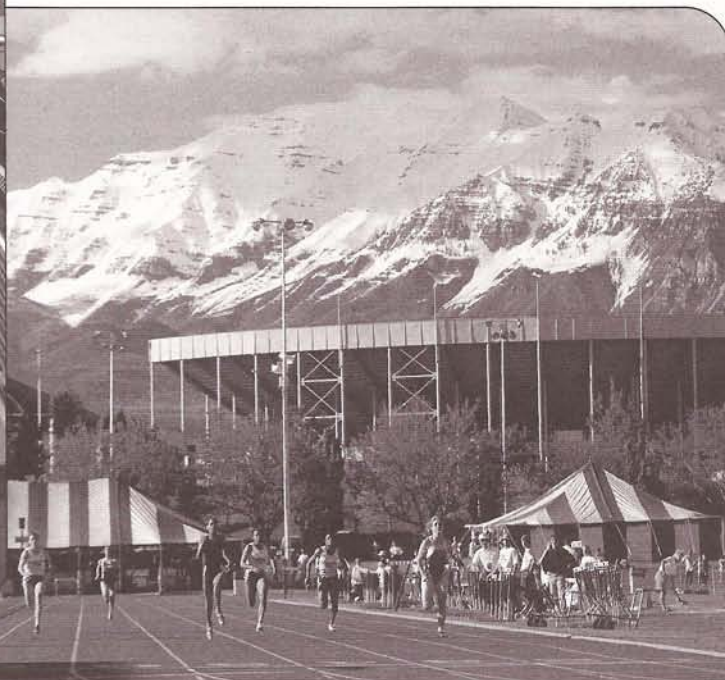
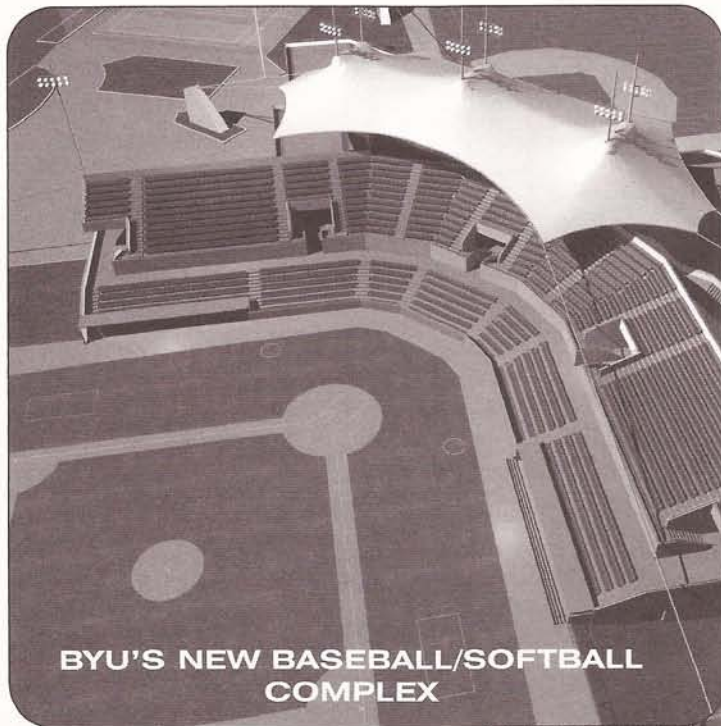

BUILDING CHAMPIONS



BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. A compact design allows spectators to watch both running and field events at the same time. The NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships were held at BYU in 1967, 1975, 1982 and 1989.

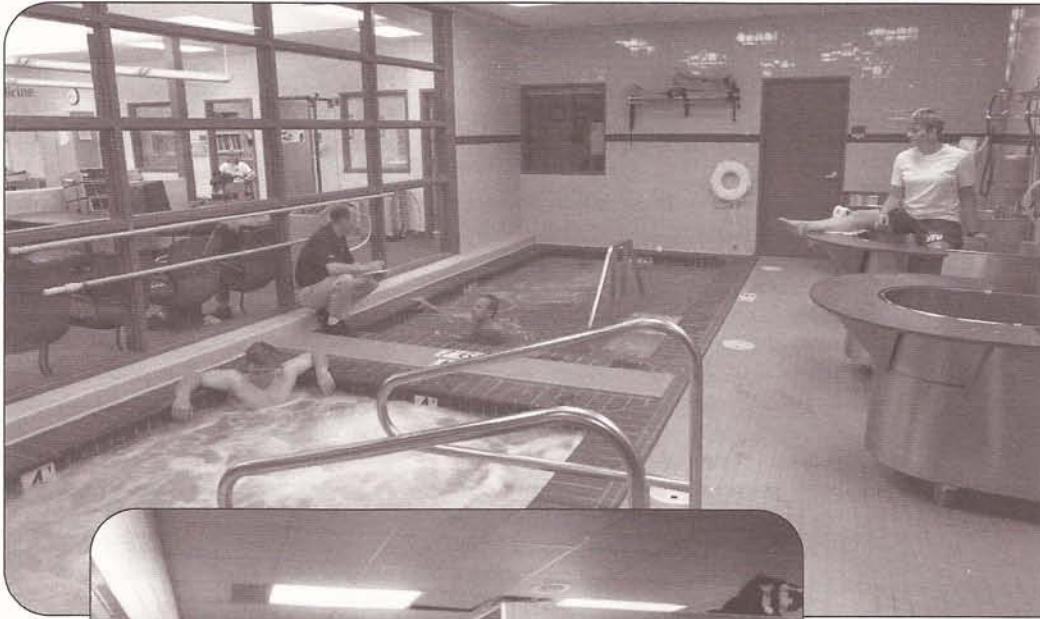


Adjacent to BYU's recently remodeled outdoor tennis complex is BYU's South Field—home of BYU's men's and women's soccer teams—and the Smith Fieldhouse. The Smith Fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport, including a one-fifth mile rubberized track that surrounds three basketball courts and an artificial turf practice area.



BYU's 23,000 seat Marriott Center is one of the largest on-campus basketball arenas in the country. NBA players such as Danny Ainge, Shawn Bradley and Michael Smith once called this home.

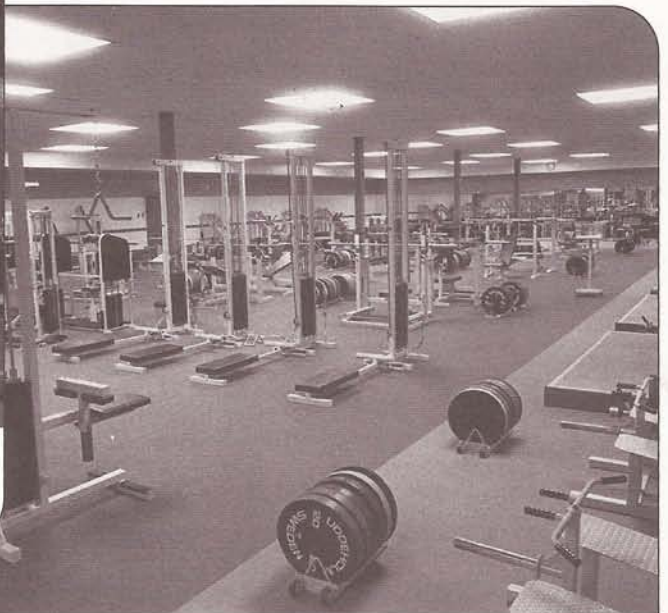
[ATHLETIC FACILITIES]



BYU's athletic training staff is responsible for the care of student-athletes from the time they arrive on campus, aiding in the prevention of injuries. When student-athletes do get injured, they are treated by one of the nation's most qualified athletic training staffs. The staff includes certified athletic trainers, a sports physical therapist, a team physician, team orthopedic surgeons and a wide variety of other medical specialists. BYU athletic trainers are concerned with much more than just improvement in the weight room. They are committed to improving the athletes' overall fitness and health.

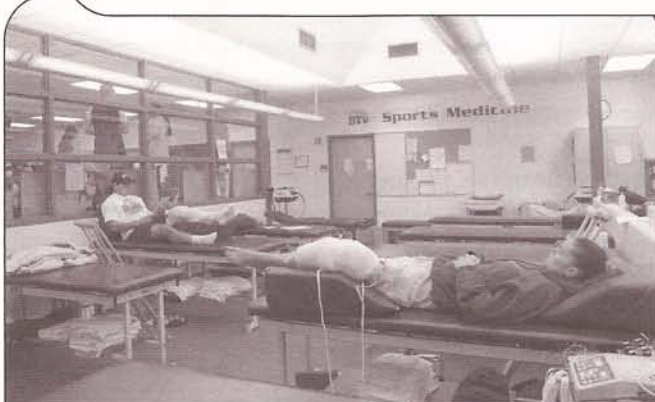


A \$3.5 million expansion to the team's locker room and athletic training facilities in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was finished in March of 1996.

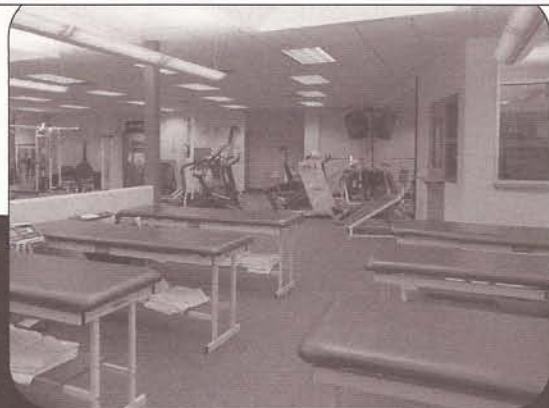


Success begins with training and BYU has a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning center with nearly 10,000 feet of working space that ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations to accommodate both female and male athletes.

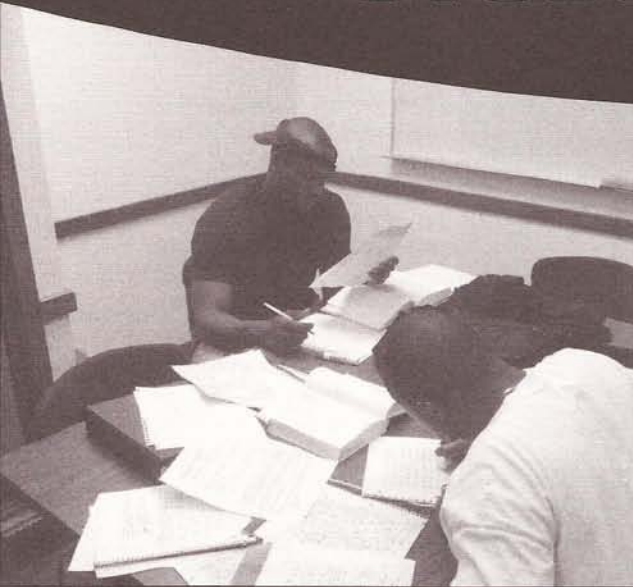
A well-structured strength and conditioning program is playing an increasingly vital role in the success of collegiate basketball programs.



The primary goal of the BYU program is to keep athletes healthy and prepared for competition by reducing their susceptibility to injury. BYU's strength and conditioning staff has experienced excellent results through its computer analyzed combination of a strict weight and conditioning program, a carefully planned diet and sufficient rest.



STUDENT ATHLETE CENTER



BYU has long been known for its ability to continually produce athletes who not only compete well on the athletic field, but also in the classroom.

To continue assisting with this legacy of student academic achievement, BYU recently created the Student Athlete Center.

The Student Athlete Center was established to provide additional resources for BYU athletes and offer support on academic, social and citizenship issues. The Center enables students to be successful in academic pursuits and personal development both on and off the field.

The purpose of the new athletic support facility is to help student-athletes succeed in the BYU environment. The Center is designed to foster the growth and maintenance of social networks consisting of friends and mentors that will help athletes throughout their college careers and beyond.

"In coming to BYU, many of our athletes leave behind a whole support system of family, friends and church leaders," said BYU Advancement Vice President Fred Skousen. "Our purpose in establishing this Center is to help our student-athletes, especially those not of the LDS [Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day-Saints] faith, to succeed in the BYU environment."

Former athlete and coach, Paul Warner, is the director for the new Student Athlete Center. Warner, who received a doctorate in educational administration from BYU and is also a former LDS seminary teacher, will serve as chaplain for non-LDS students. The

support received from his efforts and the center is hoped to be comparatively similar to the kind of support LDS athletes obtain from their church leaders.

"I am pleased to have this opportunity and look forward to working with our students in creating a home base where their needs can be met in a supportive environment," said Warner.

In efforts to help ease the transition into campus life, the Center is designed to work with athletes as soon as they commit to BYU. The facility will offer guidance on academic issues, housing, Honor Code compliance and other personal issues.

"If we can build connections early on, I am sure we can help ease the transition into campus life for our student athletes," said Warner.

The Student Athlete Center, which was created April 1, 1999, represents an expansion of the University's previous Academic Advisement Center. Although academic advisement is still included, a variety of other services have been added.

Some of the services provided by the Student Athlete Center are: individual counseling, special religious classes for non-LDS athletes, opportunities for community involvement and service, association with the advisory council (which consists of former BYU athletes), employment placement, meeting athletes on recruiting visits, and the NCAA approved CHAMPS/Life Skills program consisting in part of career education and development.

SERVICES PROVIDED

The Student Athlete Center provides the following services to student-athletes:

1. Individual tutoring. The mentor/tutor program provides one-on-one academic assistance designed to facilitate the development of the student-athlete's academic success skills.
2. Teaching assistant sessions for many classes.
3. Computer lab privileges for student-athletes on scholarship. Lap-top computers are available for road trips.
4. Personal and career counseling.
5. Sports psychology services.
6. Referrals to connect student-athletes with learning disabilities to the Services with Disabilities office.
7. Contemporary issues class (Health 201) for freshmen and transfer student-athletes. Some of the topics discussed include: academic success strategies, substance abuse and violence, women's issues, nutrition, gambling, media relations, agents, eating disorders, NCAA eligibility rules, and career planning and placement.
8. Academic Success Strategy Workshops are presented during the first few weeks of every semester. Topics include: Time Management, Note Taking, Effective Textbook Reading, Test Taking, and Stress Management.

Warner said that one of the major focuses of the Center is to help network with other BYU departments and work in coordination with their existing services. BYU's counseling center, multi-cultural center, career advisement center, and BYUSA are among some of the departments mentioned.

The Student Athlete Center is located in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse.

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities across America. Brigham Young University is one of the elite institutions that annually earns praise for its achievements in the classroom and on the field of play.

Academic Advisement

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office at BYU, located in the Student Athlete Center, was established to provide the student-athlete with solid academic counsel while participating in intercollegiate athletics.

Purpose and Objective

The single most important goal of this office is to ensure student-athletes who leave BYU obtain a bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study.

To achieve this goal, the Athletics Academic Advisement Office provides a comprehensive support program, which enables the student-athlete to make use of all the resources at the University to make academic progress and to graduate.

The role of the advisor includes close monitoring of academic problems, instituting and organizing educational programs, setting up the tutors as needed, and coordinating support services with other academic and non-academic units to insure and academic success of all the student-athletes.

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program

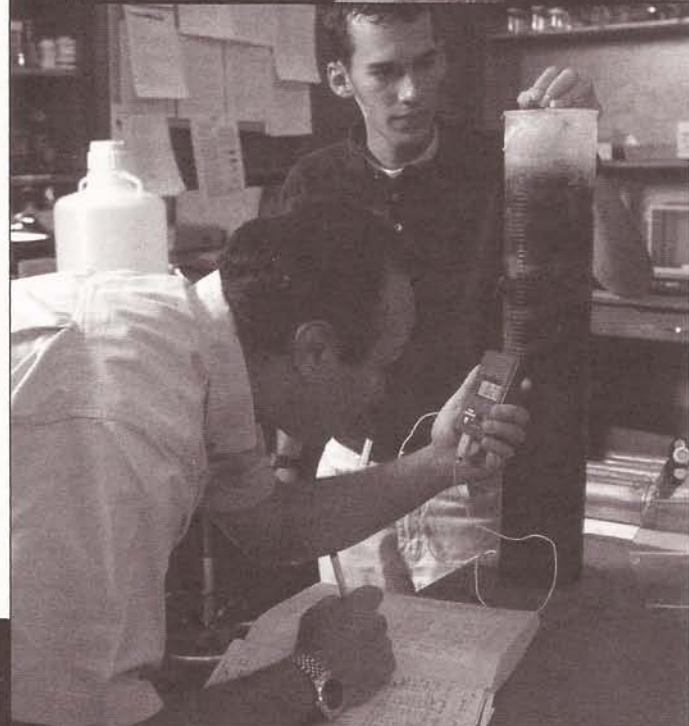
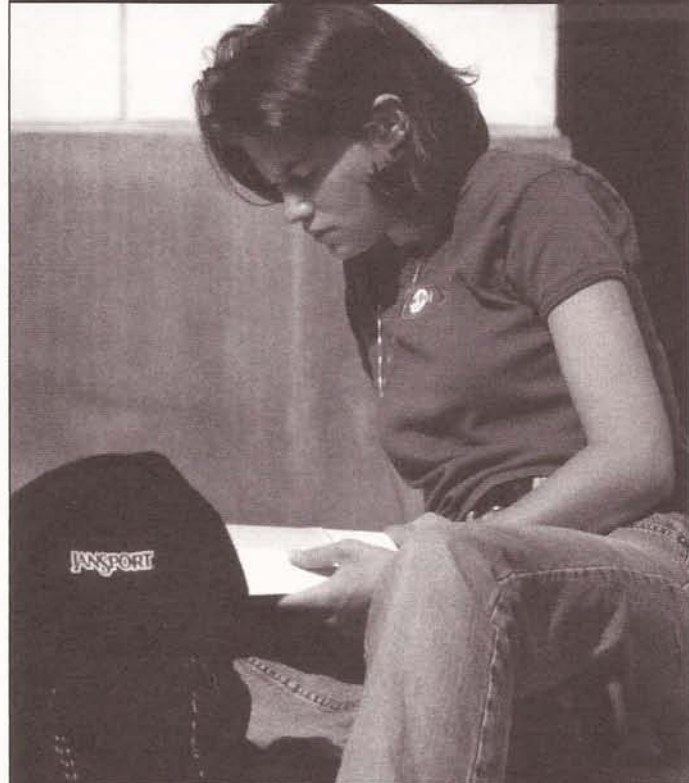
Beginning fall 1998, the Athletic Department became a member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. CHAMPS is an acronym for "Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success." The CHAMPS/Life Skills program is designed to address the "total development" of the student-athlete. There are five vital components to the CHAMPS/Life Skills program including commitment to academics, athletics, personal development, service, and career.

Recognition

BYU athletes who achieve a 3.2 grade point average or higher during either fall or winter semester are honored at the Annual Athletics Academic Honor Banquet sponsored by the Cougar Club.

This past year, nearly 50 percent of BYU's student-athletes qualified as Academic Athletes.

The average GPA among this year's Academic Athletes was an impressive 3.53 - a reflection of the high academic achievement of BYU athletes. The cumulative GPA of all BYU student-athletes is over 3.0.



Paul WARNER

Paul Warner was appointed director of the new Student Athlete Center in March

1999. Warner had previously served as director of Student Leadership Services at BYU. As director of the Student Athlete Center, Warner serves as chaplain for non-LDS student athletes. He is also a member of the Provo City Council.

Warner began his career with the LDS Seminary and Institute Department, teaching seminary in Ogden, Utah. He has been director of the Long Beach State LDS Institute in California, supervisor of

seminaries in Utah Valley and director of teacher preparation for the Seminary Department at BYU. He has been a manager of training for the LDS Church and an associate director of BYU Development.

Warner is a member of the Association of Mormon Counselors and Psychotherapists and is a senior professional in the Society of Human Resource Management. He received his doctorate in educational administration from BYU in 1974. He received a master's in recreation management/community school in 1968 and a bachelor's in history and political science in 1965 from BYU.

He married Karen Kuehne and they have three sons and three daughters. They have 14 grandchildren.

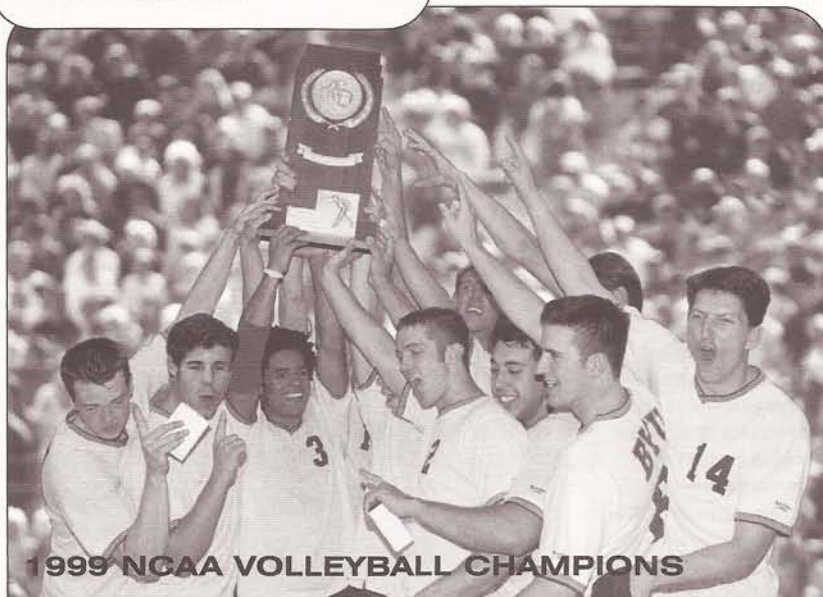

1997 & 1999 NCAA CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONS

BYU's Women's Cross Country Team has been dominating over the years. Winning every conference championship since the program began and finishing in the top five at nationals the past five years, BYU has consistently set the standard in long-distance running. In 1997 and 1999 BYU claimed the National Championship and finished runner-up in 1998.



1999 NCAA VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONS

BYU's 1999 National Championship Volleyball team became only the second team outside of California to ever win a men's volleyball title. The Cougars finished off their amazing 30-1 season with a 3-0 drubbing of Long Beach State in UCLA's Pauley Pavilion on May 8.



Football fans in Provo will forever remember BYU's national championship year. In 1984 Edwards and his Cougars went 13-0 posting wins over Pittsburgh, Baylor, Air Force and Michigan in the Holiday Bowl. BYU had 13 opportunities to lose that year, but came away victors each time.

On January 3, 1985, BYU was voted as the top college football team in the nation in both the AP and UPI polls. This mountainous climb to the top typified BYU's winning attitude and laid the foundation of success for decades to come.



BYU's women's soccer program has quickly become one of the premier programs in the nation producing numerous All-Americans and ranking consistently among the top-20.

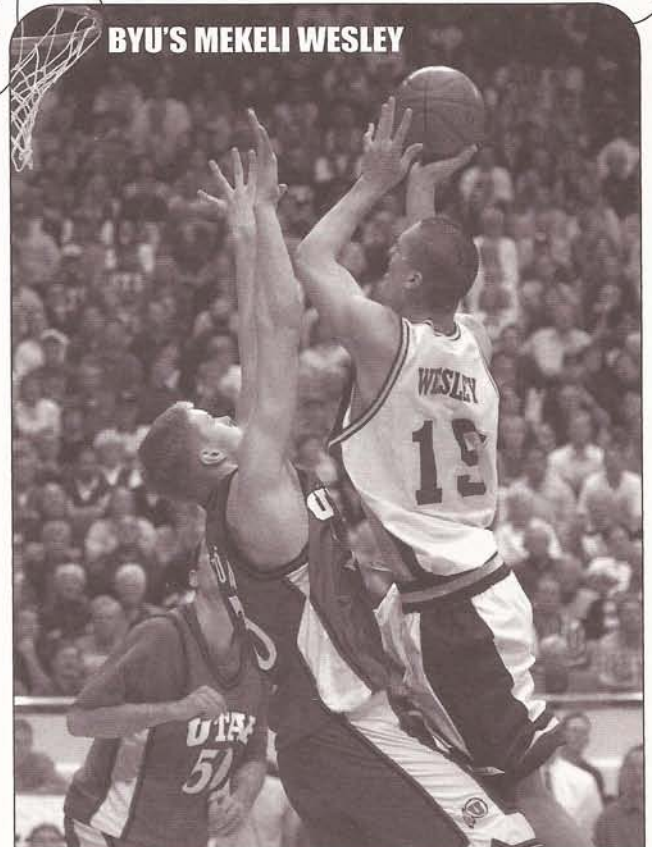
From 1962 to 1999 BYU dominated the Western Athletic Conference winning more championships than any other WAC School. In fact, during the last three decades, the Cougars won 60 percent of the WAC Championships—more than all other conference competitors combined. Included in these team titles, BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

In 1998-99, seven BYU teams finished their respective seasons ranked among the nation's Top 10 and three other teams placed in the top 25 nationally. While consistently placing among the nation's top teams, Brigham Young University has also captured six national championships.

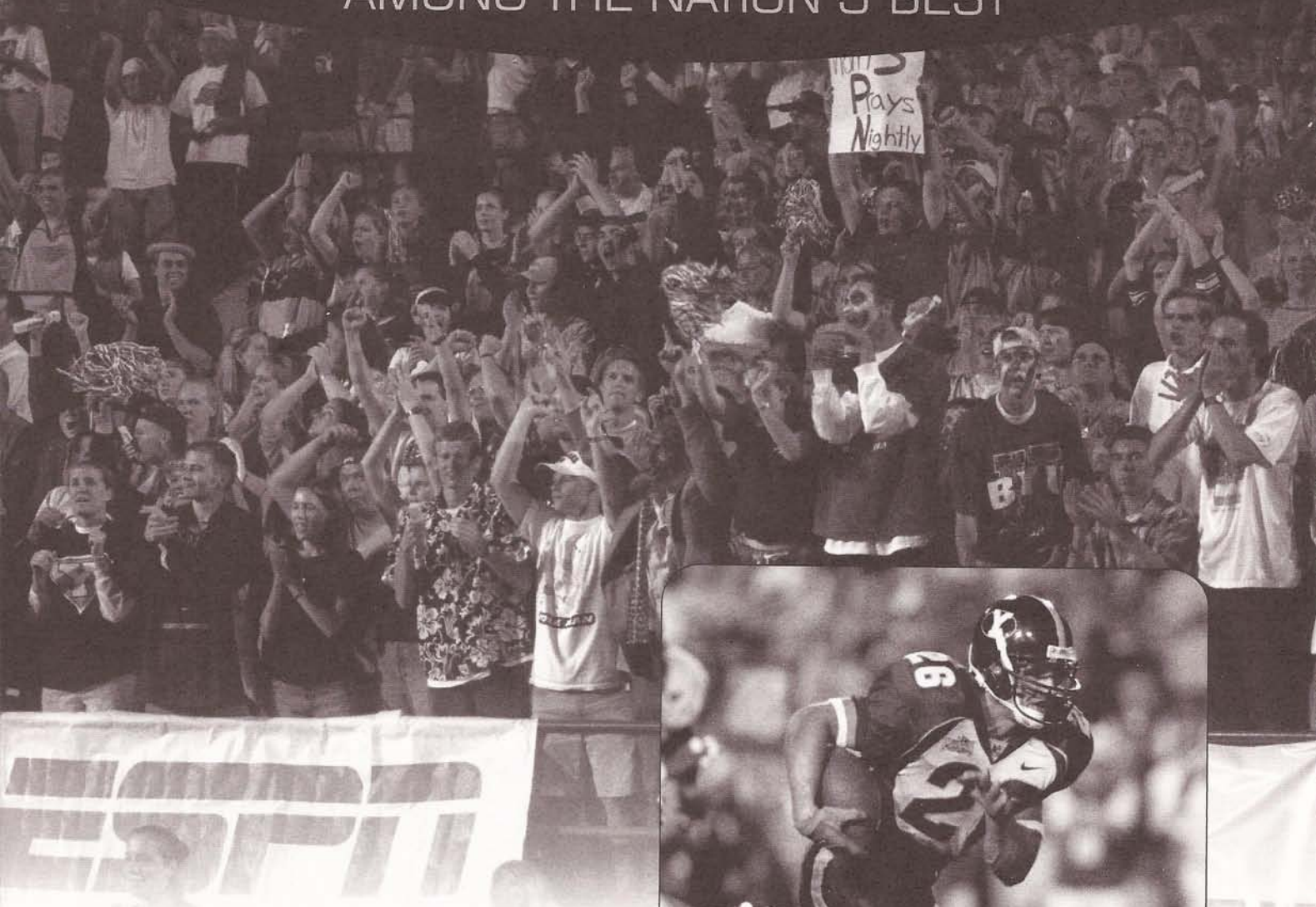

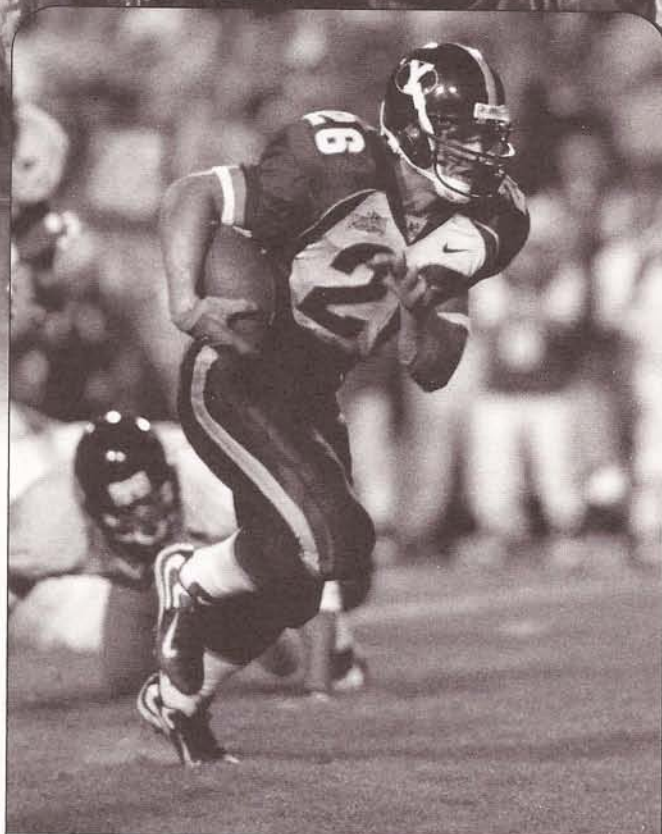
Pride of the Mountain West

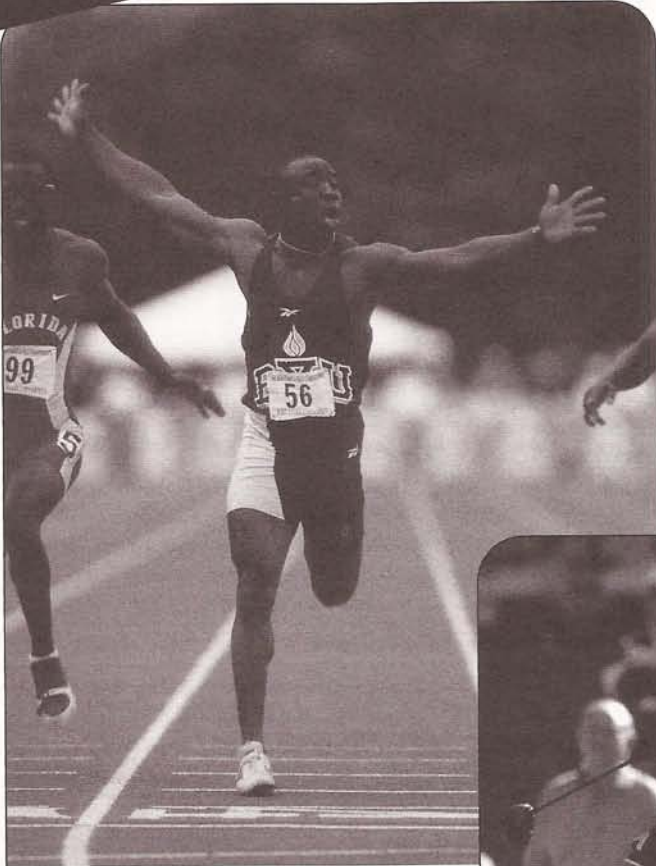

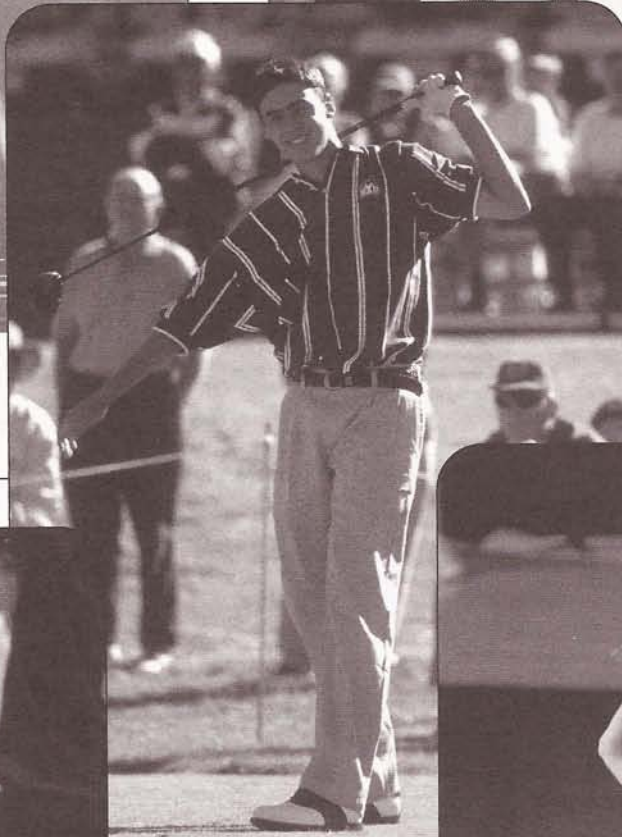

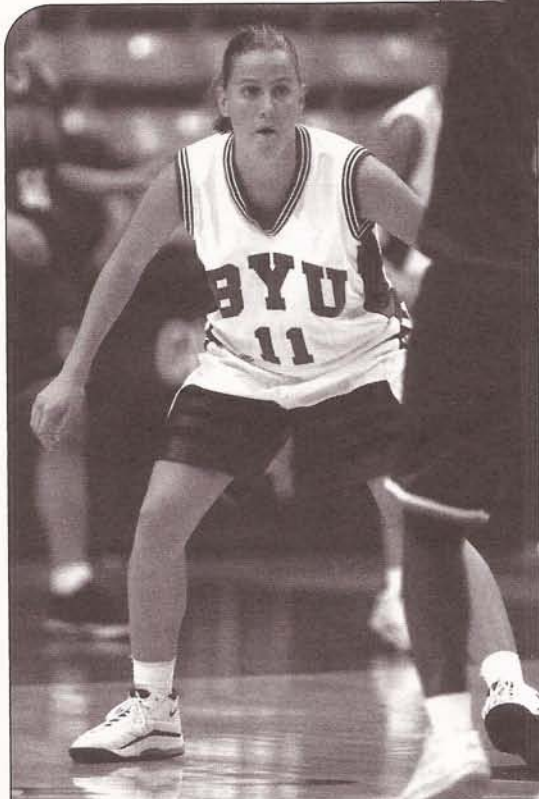
BYU was home to the fastest collegiate athlete in America. In 1998 and 1999 Leonard Myles-Mills ran away with the 100-meter championship.



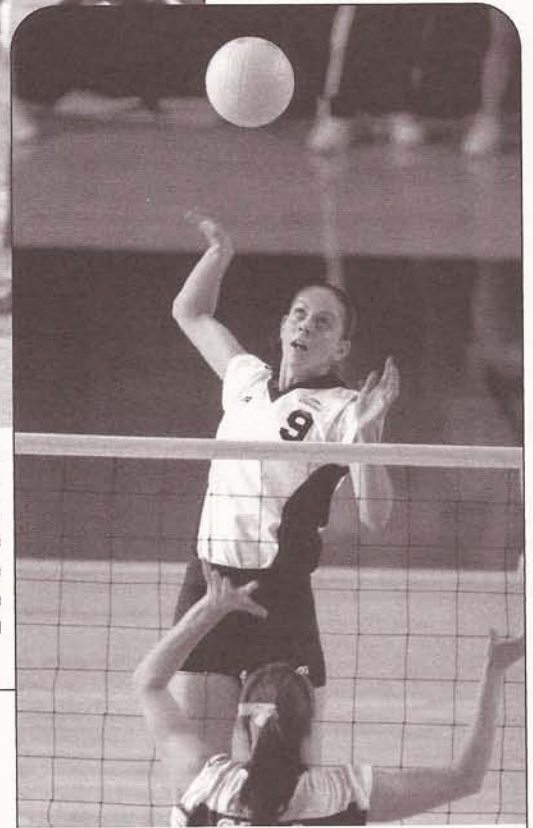

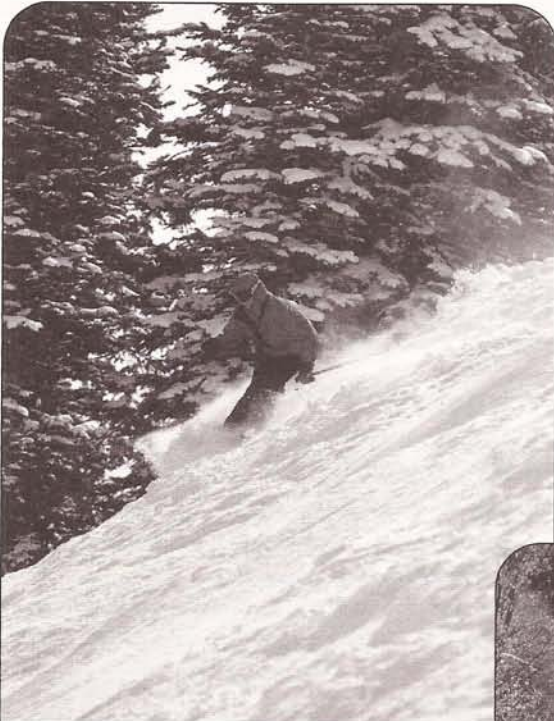
UTAH VALLEY

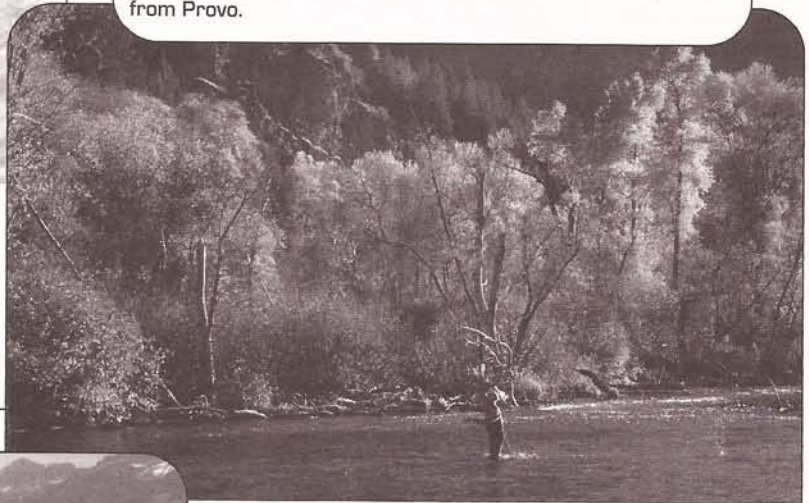




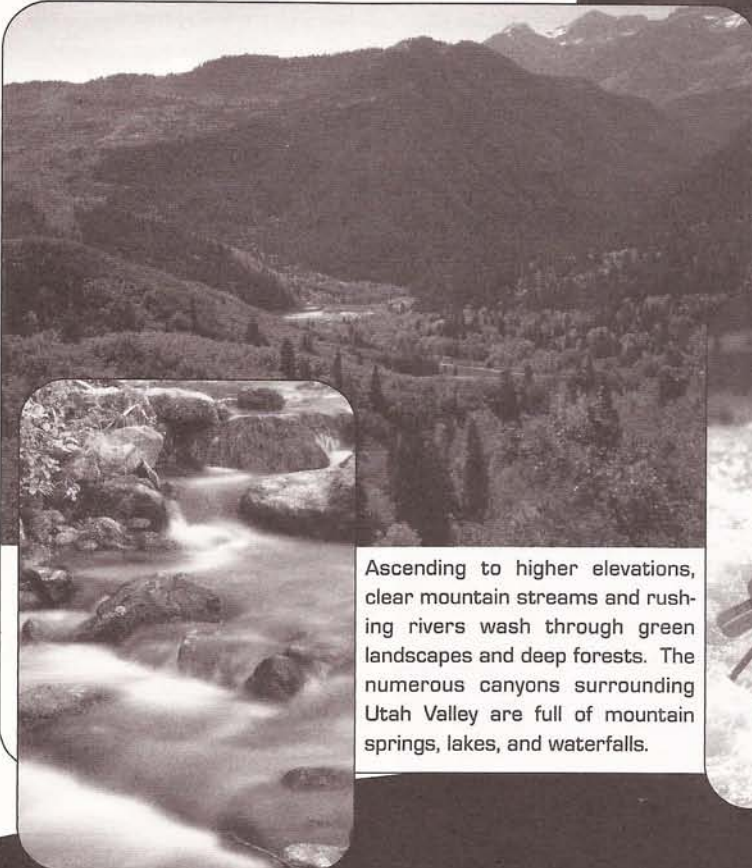

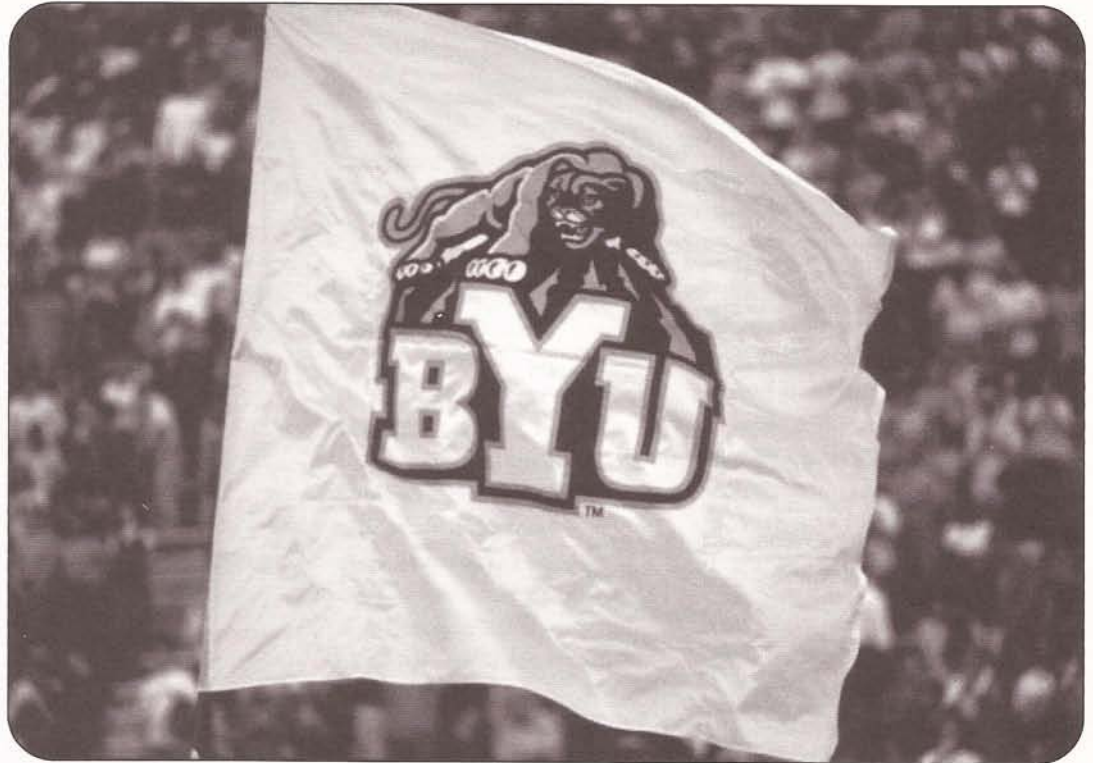

Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1975. Since then, more than 140 former athletes and administrators have received this prestigious honor.

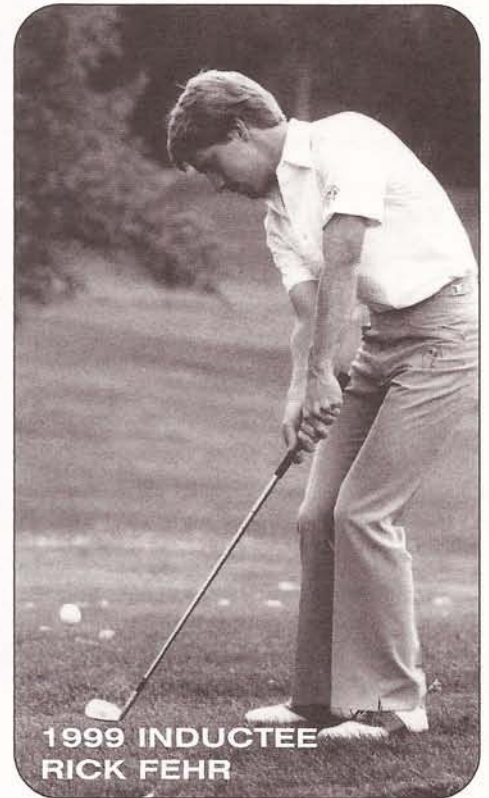

Each inductee is honored with their picture and accomplishments in The Hall of Fame Gallery located in the Cougar Club Stadium Room.

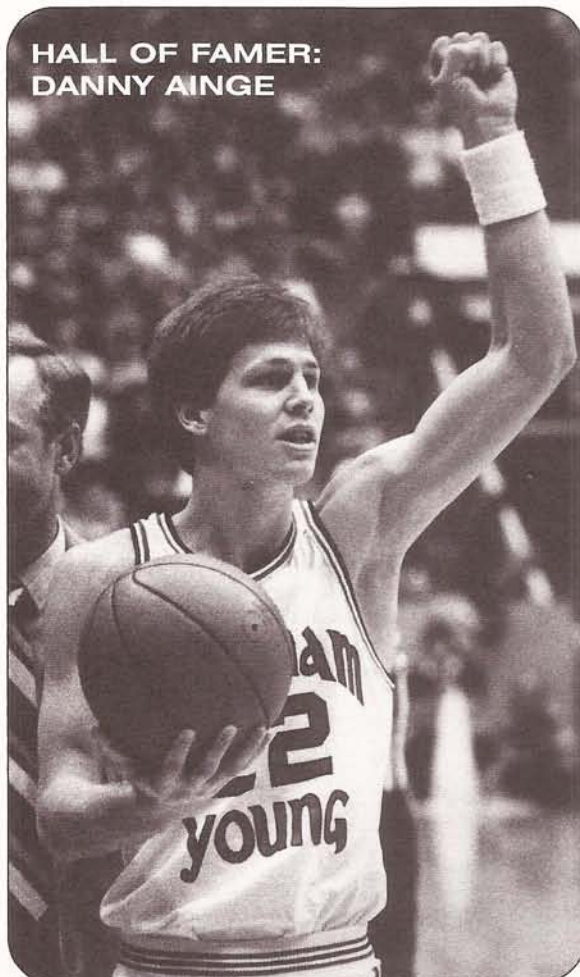

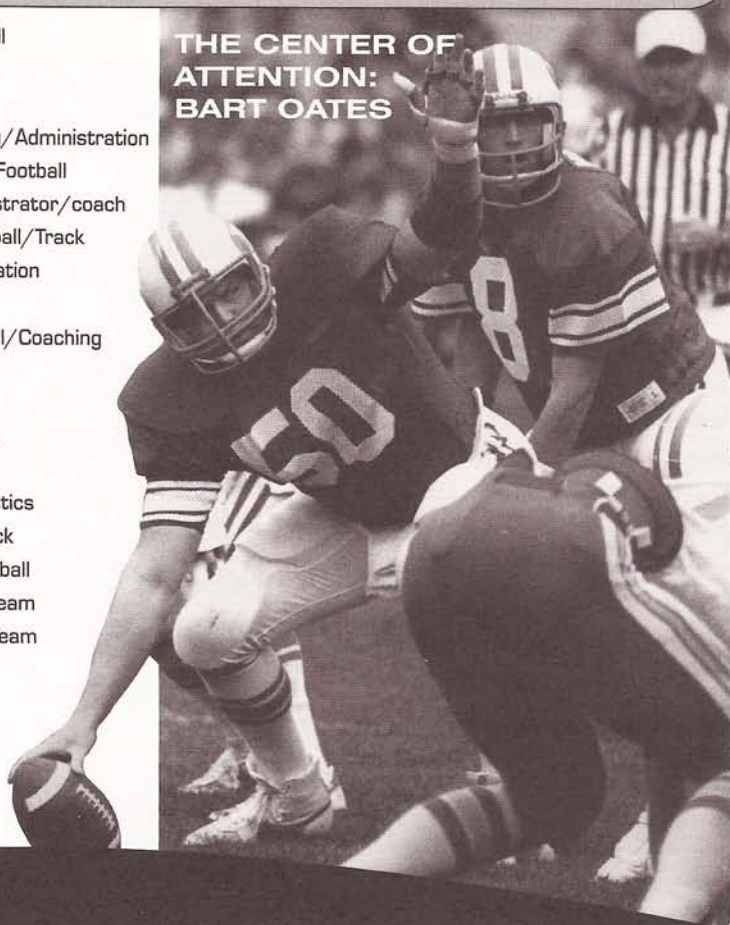

MERRILL J. BATEMAN

President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, has had numerous academic, commercial, government, and church administrative roles throughout Asia, Africa, England, and the United States.

He officially began his BYU Presidential duties on January 1, 1996. Bateman, 62, serves simultaneously as a member of the First Quorum of the

Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He succeeded the late Rex E. Lee, who served as president for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described Bateman as "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."

Before receiving his call to be a general authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc. in England and the United States ('71-75).

Born in Lehi, Utah, and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa Honor Societies in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow from 1960 to 1961 and a Danforth Fellow from 1960 to 1964.

Early in his career, Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at



the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964 to 1967) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967 to 1971). He was also a lecturer at the University of Ghana in 1963.

Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high counselor, stake president, regional representative, and as

Presiding Bishop he testified before the U.S. Senate Finance Committee. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

He is married to Marilyn Scholes (pronounced SKOLS) Bateman, and they are the parents of seven children-four boys and three girls. They also have 23 grandchildren.

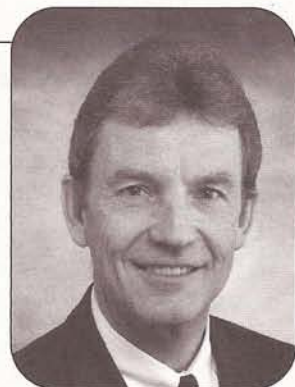

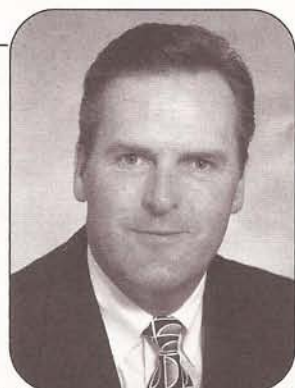

Hale was an all-region football player and all-state track athlete at Orem (Utah) High School. He played one year of junior varsity football at BYU in 1975

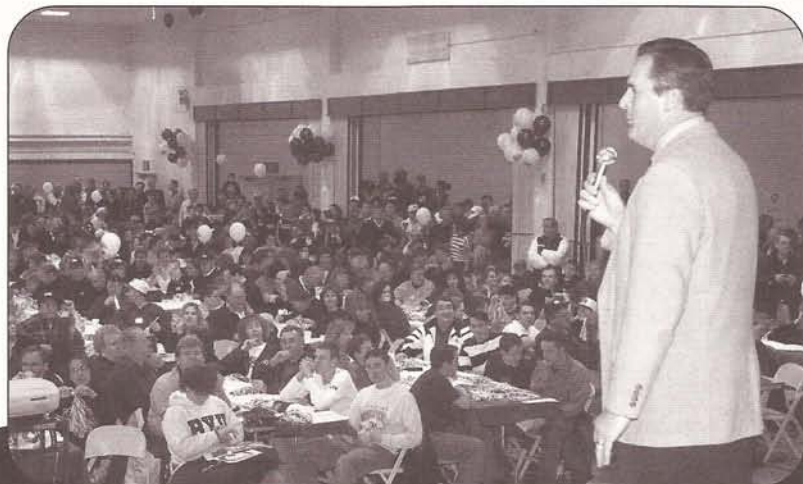
before serving an LDS Church mission to Chile from 1976-78.

In 1995, Elaine Michaelis added the responsibility of Director of Women's Athletics to her task of guiding one of the top volleyball teams in the nation. In her 38th year at the helm of BYU's women's volleyball program, Michaelis is No. 2 all-time in career victories with more than 800 wins. She is also the only BYU coach to have taken a team to an NCAA Final Four. She has coached her teams to 10 top 5 finishes and 18 top 10 national finishes. Her best finishes were second place in 1973, fourth place in

1978, and an NCAA semifinal appearance in 1993. She has taken her teams to the NCAA tournament 14 times — placing 17th twice, 9th four times, 5th six times, and 3rd once. Michaelis earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from BYU and has the rank of full athletic professional. In 1994 she was a recipient of the Dale Rex Award given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah. 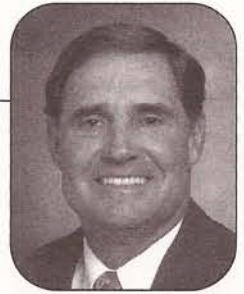

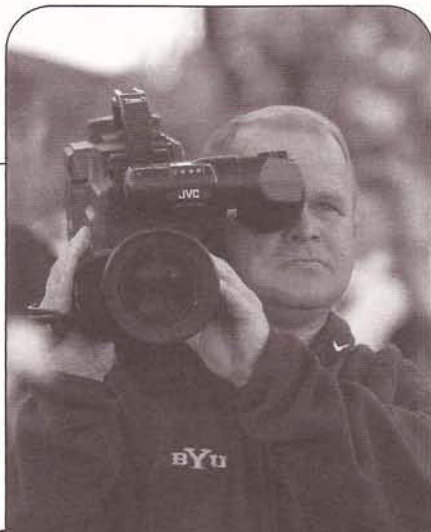

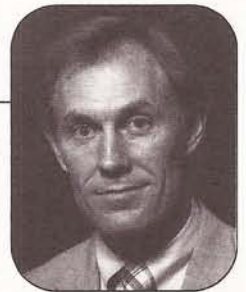

W E L C O M E T O T H E MOUNTAIN WEST

**On May 26, 1998,
the newest NCAA
Division I-A confer-
ence was conceived.**

The Mountain West Conference, which officially commenced operation just more than a year later, on July 1, 1999, is comprised of the Air Force Academy, Brigham Young University, Colorado State University, University of New Mexico, San Diego State University, UNLV, University of Utah and University of Wyoming. Though in its infancy as a conference, the history of its members indicates the fledgling Mountain West Conference will experience immediate national success.

In 1999, MWC teams will face opponents from every major football conference, including five nonconference games featuring Pac-10 schools. BYU will host Washington (Sept. 9) a week before Air Force travels to Seattle to play the Huskies (Sept. 18) in a rematch of the 1998 Oahu Bowl, where Air Force was victorious, 45-25. In other Mountain West

Conference/Pac-10 action, Utah travels to Washington State (Sept. 4), San Diego State plays at USC (Sept. 18), and BYU hosts California (Oct. 9). The 1999 slate also has Mountain West Conference teams playing six nonconference teams that participated in bowl games last year. Wyoming kicks off the season in Knoxville, Tenn., against the defending national champion Tennessee Volunteers. Tennessee was just one of two Division I teams that posted a better winning percentage than 1998 WAC champion Air Force (12-1) did last year. In the final 1998 polls, Air Force finished in the top 15 of both major polls, ranking No. 10 in the USA Today/ESPN poll and No. 13 in the Associated Press poll. The Seattle Times computer rankings listed Air Force (16th), Wyoming (34th), and Colorado State (38th).

The eight MWC schools, all former members of the Western Athletic Conference, brought a tremendous amount of firepower with them in their move to a new conference. The 1998-99 WAC champions in football (Air

Force) and men's basketball (Utah) are members of the new Mountain West Conference. The Utah men's basketball team, which won five straight WAC titles culminating in last year's undefeated league slate, was the 1998 NCAA runner-up. Utah, along with New Mexico, has qualified for the NCAA Tournament each of the past five years. On the gridiron, Mountain West Conference teams accounted for three of the WAC's four bowl appearances last year (Air Force, BYU and San Diego State).

In addition to the success in football and men's basketball, MWC teams produced similar results in other sports. Brigham Young won both the men's and women's WAC cross country and track championships in 1998-99, as well as the men's golf title. Colorado State became the first WAC women's basketball team ever to advance to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen (1999) after winning the WAC regular season title with 14-0 mark and ranking as high as No. 4 in both national polls. San Diego State's women's soccer team captured the 1998 WAC title and advanced, along with BYU, to the third round of the NCAA Tournament. The 1998 NCAA

San Diego State, Wally Joyner from BYU, and Matt Williams, Todd Stottlemire, Brian Boehringer, T.J Mathews, Eric Ludwick and Donovan Osborne all call UNLV their alma mater. In the 1990s, baseball teams from BYU (1990, 94), San Diego State (1990-91) and UNLV (1996) have all seen the postseason. In swimming and diving, Colorado State alum Amy Van Dyken captured an NCAA record in the 50-yard freestyle and four Olympic gold medals in 1996. On the team side, Brigham Young's women's team won five conference titles during the 1990s, while Utah's men's team captured six league championships. BYU's men's team has finished in the top 30 at the NCAA Championships the past two years. In 1999, BYU and UNLV both had individuals place in the top 16 at the NAAs.

In addition to the 19 MWC-sponsored sports, several universities sponsor other intercollegiate programs with success. The most notable of the group is Utah's skiing and women's gymnastics programs, which each have been crowned National Champions 10 times during this century. In 1999, BYU's men's volleyball team captured the NCAA crown for the first time in school history.

Ironically, half of the MWC schools were charter members of the WAC when it was founded in 1962: Utah, BYU, New Mexico and Wyoming. Colorado State (1968) and San Diego State (1978) both competed as WAC members for at least two decades, while Air Force (1980) was also a long-standing member of its former conference. UNLV was the most recent addition, joining the group in 1996.

The split from the former 16-team WAC, means the Mountain West Conference is no longer spread across nine states and five time zones. It has maintained its geographical diversity though, as it extends from the 7,000-

foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea level metropolis of San Diego. Some of the most beautiful geography in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the unparalleled Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). Las Vegas, the fastest growing city in the West, adds a desert to the mix. San Diego offers balmy weather and a Pacific Ocean locale and New Mexico lends a southwestern flavor.

The Mountain West Conference headquarters is located in Colorado Springs, Colo., and is under the guidance of commissioner Craig Thompson. One of Thompson's first priorities was to secure a television contract for the conference. On February 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc. and the Mountain West Conference announced a seven-year agreement giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to MWC football and men's basketball, beginning in the 1999-2000 academic year. On May 20, 1999, the MWC revealed its plans to send its regular season champion to the AXA/Equitable Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn., to play the champion of Conference USA. The Mountain West Conference has also secured a three-year deal with the city of Las Vegas, which sends a second selection to the Las Vegas Bowl and sets Las Vegas as the site for the men's and women's basketball championships.

men's golf champion UNLV, finished in second behind BYU at the 1999 WAC championships and advanced to the NCAA Finals along with the Cougars, Colorado State and San Diego State.

MWC women's volleyball teams have also garnered much success over the years. Five of the institutions (BYU, CSU, New Mexico, San Diego State and Wyoming) have competed in the NCAA Tournament at least twice this decade, while BYU has advanced to the NCAA Regional Finals each of the last three years. In tennis, UNLV captured a men's individual and doubles National Championship in 1998 and sent the Rebel team along with San Diego State and New Mexico to NCAA Regionals in 1999. On the women's side, five MWC teams (BYU, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV and Utah) have qualified for NCAA Regionals the last three years, including New Mexico and San Diego State in 1999. UNLV and Utah have had the most success in softball among MWC universities, making 12 postseason appearances between the two during the 1990s. UNLV advanced to the Women's College World Series in 1990, 1991 and 1995, while Utah made its lone WCWS appearances this decade in 1994.

Other MWC championship sports have turned out all-star athletes over the years. Current major-league baseball players Tony Gwynn, Mark Grace, Travis Lee and Jeff Barry all hail from

B E E H I V E S T A T E RIVALRY

It all started on October 14, 1922. Well, according to BYU, anyway. Utah claims the first meeting between the schools was on April 6, 1896, when BYU was still Brigham Young Academy.

It's just one of many things the two schools don't agree on. The Academy played Utah six times between 1896 and 1898, before Provo could officially boast its own full-fledged university. Each team won three games.

The Cougars and the Utes have built a strong tradition of intense competition in the 75 years of the rivalry. With the exception of the war years from 1943-45, the two schools have faced each other every year since 1922.

The Utes dominated the series early on, avoiding defeat until 1942, when the Cougars finally won, 12-7, in Salt Lake City behind Coach Floyd Millet. The success was short-lived, however, as it took BYU another 16 years to win another contest, 14-7, again in Salt Lake City in 1958. In all, Utah won 32 of the first 40 contests, four of which were ties.

In 1965, the momentum began to turn in BYU's favor. The Cougars took three in a row from the Utes from 1965-67, and although Utah won the next four, the competition had become much more interesting.

In 1972, the series took on an entirely different feeling with the arrival of LaVell Edwards as BYU's new head coach. He took on a program that had gone 5-38-4 (149) against its fiercest rival and proceeded to post a 21-6 (.778) record against Utah in 27 years, including wins in 15 of his first 16 meetings with the Utes. In the Edwards era, the Cougars outscored the Utes an average of 35.6 to 20.7 per contest. Coach Edwards' career has included winning streaks of nine (1979-87) and six (1972-77) games against Utah.

The annual showdown generates considerable interest throughout the state, making it a virtual certainty that

whatever stadium the teams play in will be sold out well in advance. In all, seven of Utah's top ten home crowds before the expansion of Rice Stadium were for games against BYU.

Meanwhile, 40 miles south in Provo, the grudge match has accounted for five of the 20 largest crowds in the history of Cougar Stadium.

One of the more memorable moments in the rivalry was the 1989 contest in which the Cougars punted the Utes, 70-31, in Provo. It was a game in which the home team scored touchdowns in each of its first seven possessions and in all eight with Ty Detmer as quarterback. In a move of mercy, Detmer was replaced by backup Sean Covey late in the second quarter.

Then there were the infamous back-to-back, 34-31, losses at the hands of the Utes in 1993 and '94, giving rebirth to a rivalry that had become ridiculously lopsided in the 80s and early 90s. In all, the Utes won three in a row (1993-95) under coach Ron McBride.

The Cougars responded to the new aggression in 1996 with a dominating, 37-17, victory in Salt Lake City. BYU employed an extremely unconventional approach, gaining 376 yards in 63 attempts on the ground and attempting only 12 passes.

In 1998, a well-placed ESPN microphone picked up an audible "clank" as the potentially game-winning kick

bounced off the right goal post, allowing BYU to escape with a, 26-24, victory — despite Ron McBride's sideline prayer, as captured on national television.

BYU let the Utes back into the game after having seemingly put the game away in the fourth quarter, allowing Utah to set up a 32-yard field goal to win the game. BYU fans gave credit to divine intervention as the chip shot mysteriously hooked to the right at the last possible moment.

Provo has been much more friendly to the Cougars over the years, as BYU has posted a 12-14-1 record overall at home but has only managed a 14-30-3 record on the road against the Utes. Lately home field advantage seems to have become less of a factor, as the Utes have won three straight at Cougar Stadium and the Cougars have taken two in a row in Salt Lake City.

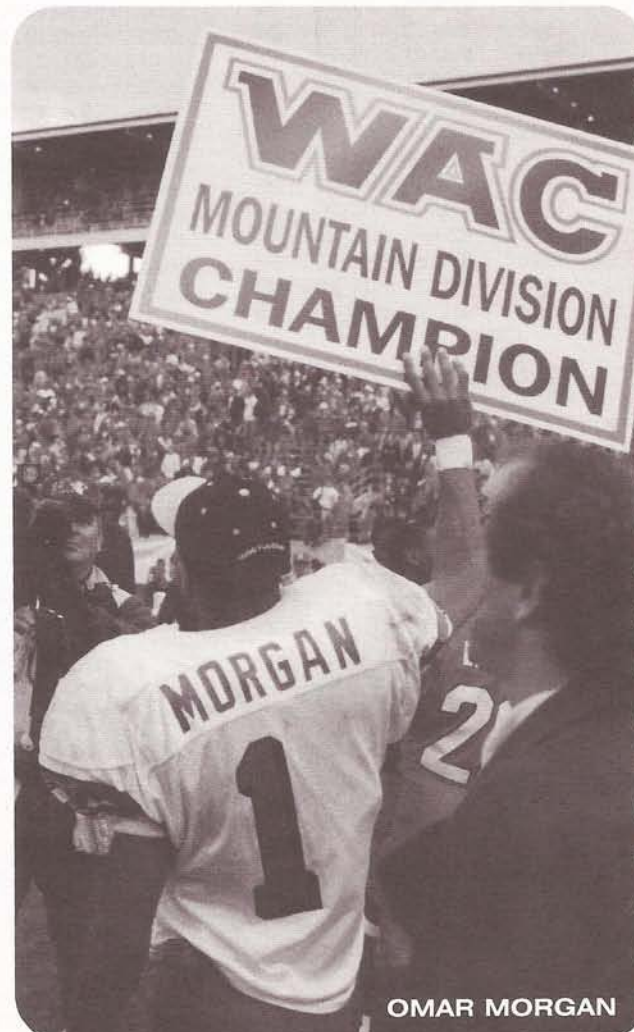

BYU'S FOOTBALL





At one time, having a top program — not to mention winning a national championship — seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 34 years ago the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title, and the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season. In 1972, however, BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year and things have not been the same since.

In the past 28 years, the Cougars have won 251 games and been to 22 bowl games (including 17 in a row at one

point). BYU has won the WAC title 18 times under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-1985.

Coach Edwards led his team to a national championship (1984), and was national coach of the year two times, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and two Outland Trophy winners.

Things were not always so rosy, however. Football had its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU consistently finds itself among the national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU in 1896, but was discontinued after three seasons because of the administration's concern over the violent nature of the sport. The game returned to campus in 1922, and since then BYU has played 75 seasons (football was not played for three seasons during World War II). BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have propelled BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. The list reads like a who's who of college football signal callers: Virgil Carter (1964-66), Gary Sheide (1973-74), Gifford Nielsen (1975-77), Marc Wilson (1977, 1979-80), Jim McMahon (1978, 1980-81), Steve Young (1982-83), Robbie Bosco (1984-85), Ty Detmer (1988-91) and Steve Sarkisian (1995-96) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Detmer finished his incredible career by throwing for 15,031 yards—the first player ever to

go over 12,000 yards passing.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco, Detmer and Sarkisian were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, some impressive running backs have also hit the field for the Cougars. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62) won All-American honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71) led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did

such a good job catching the football, that he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading career rusher in 1994 and Brian McKenzie moved into the No. 6 spot all-time in just two seasons (1996-97) at BYU.

Eric Drage (1990-93) became the receiving leader, breaking yardage and touchdown receiving records set by Phil Odle (1965-67).

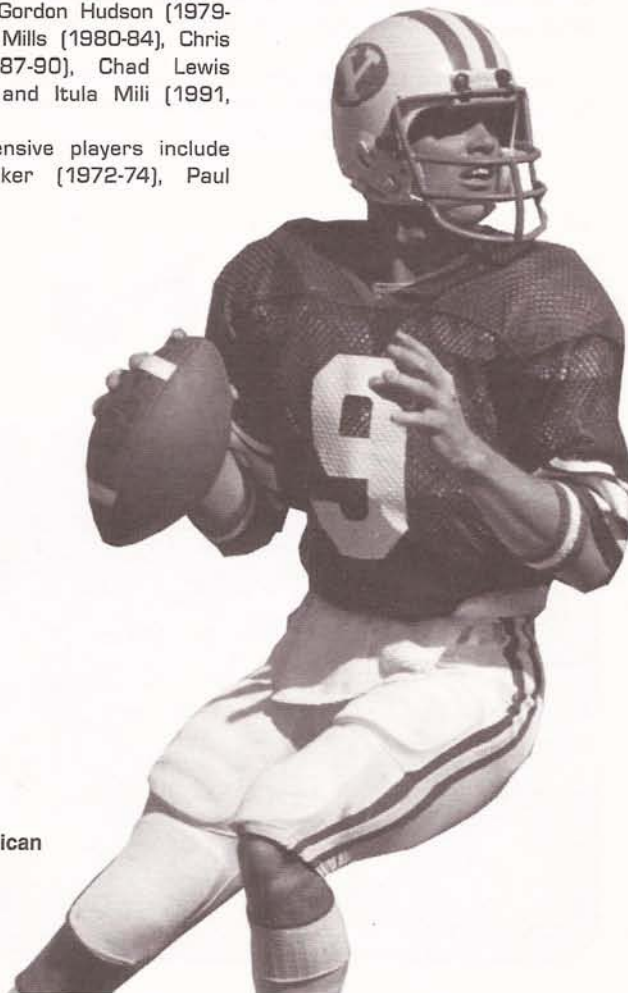
A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82), Trevor Matich (1979-84), Scott Brumfield (1991-92), Evan Pilgrim (1992-94), Larry Moore (1995-96), John Tait (1996-98) and Joe Wong (1997-98).

BYU has also had a bevy of talent at tight end including Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), Chris Smith (1987-90), Chad Lewis (1993-96) and Itula Mili (1991, 1994-96).

Top Defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul

Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84), Leon White (1982-85), Kurt Gouveia (1983-85), Jason Buck (1985-86) the recipient of the 1986 Outland Trophy, Derwin Gray (1989-92), Shay Muirbrook (1993-96), Tim McTyer (1995-96) and Omarr Morgan (1996-97).

At various times in the past 30 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns, and James Dye (1995-96) led the nation in punt returns with a 21.9 average in 1995.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today, and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawai'i, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to offensive lineman Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

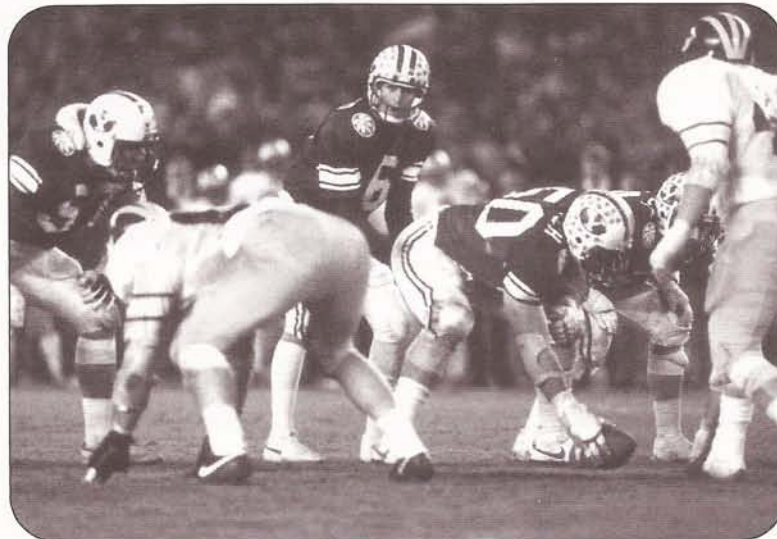

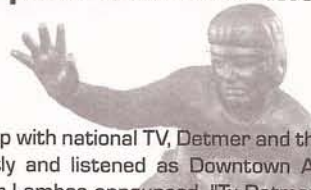

Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

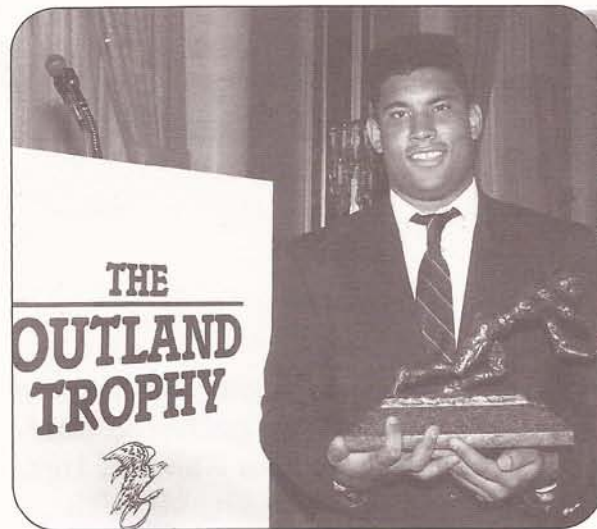
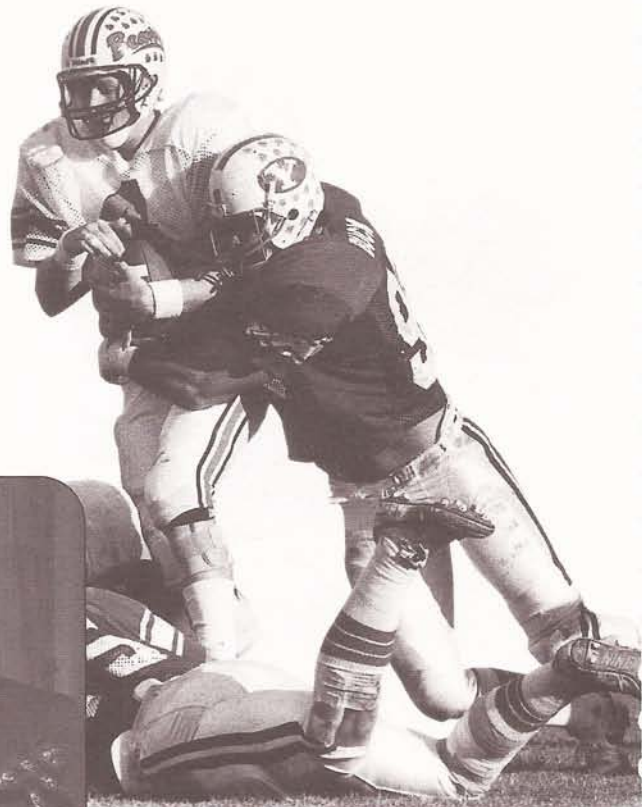
Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor is awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU."

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of Cougar Stadium.

Buck, a 6-6, 270, senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

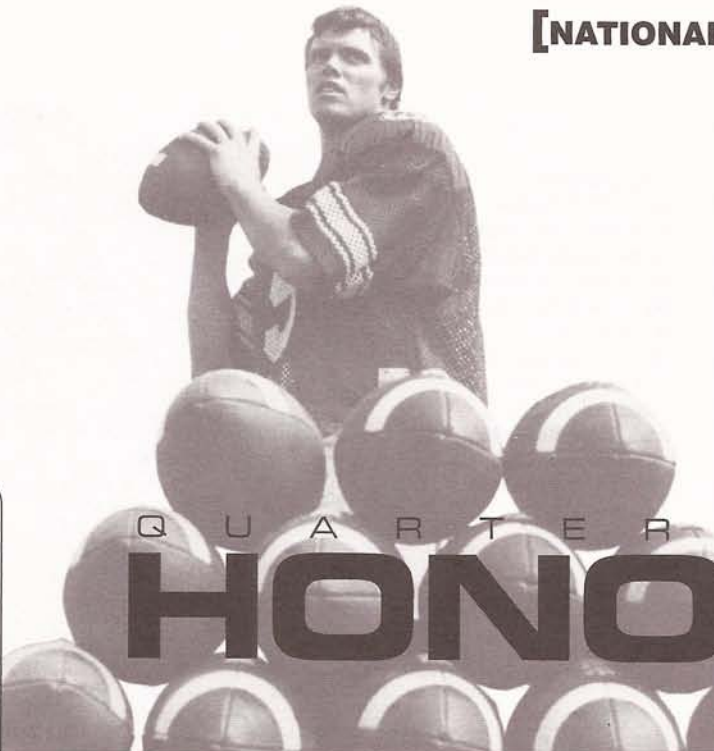
Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

Mount Mohammed, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "MoO" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

The Davey O'Brien Award

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback.

In 16 years, BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school.

In addition to winners McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Ty Detmer (1990 & '91), Robbie Bosco finished runner-up in 1984 and Steve Sarkisian finished third in 1996.

Others who have won the award include: Todd Blackledge (1982), Doug Flutie (1984), Chuck Long (1985), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Dan McPherson (1987), Troy Aikman (1988), Andre Ware (1989), Gino Torretta (1992), Charlie Ward (1993), Kerry Collins (1994) and Danny Wuerffel (1995 & '96).



Sammy Baugh Trophy - College Passer of the Year

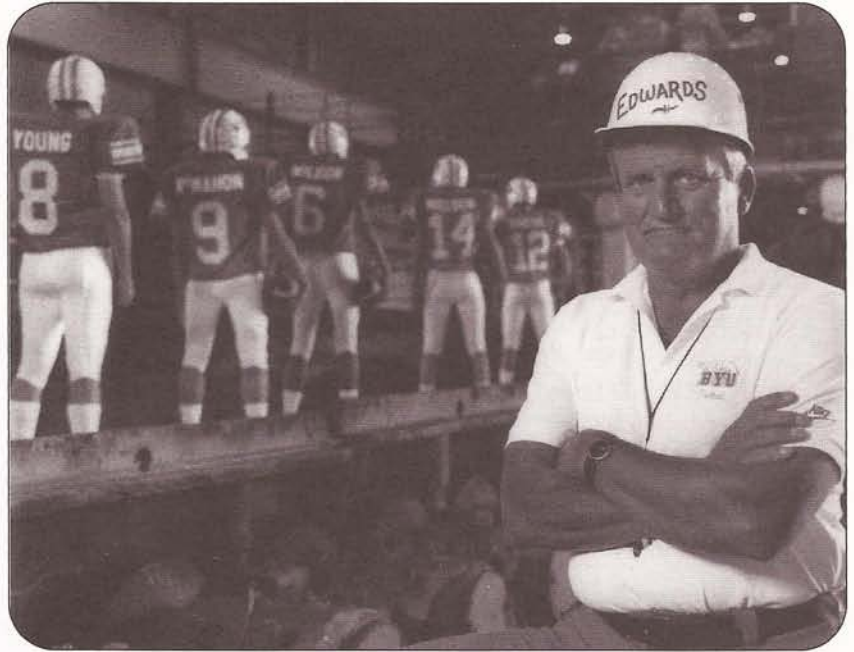
On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year.

In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award.

Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Steve Walsh (1988), Jeff George (1989), David Klingler (1990), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994) and Danny Wuerffel (1995).

Ever since Gary Sheide in 1973, BYU and head coach LaVell Edwards have been producing an assembly line of outstanding quarterbacks in Provo that have earned unprecedented success in the market of college and professional football.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson and Jim McMahon have been inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 13 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Five of the top six career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 27 years Edwards has coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 19 times, played in 22 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

Wilson followed as a senior in 1979, then McMahon twice (1980, 1981), Young twice (1982, 1983) and finally Bosco in 1984.

Rewriting the NCAA Record Book: From Wilson in 1978 to Detmer in 1991 BYU quarterbacks broke or tied an amazing 165 NCAA records. McMahon led the way with an unheard of 70 records.

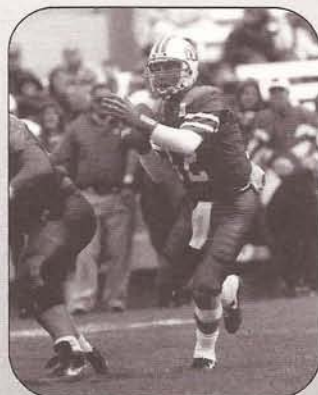
Season Passing Efficiency & Rating Records

At one time, BYU quarterbacks held season passing efficiency and rating records at all levels of competition. In 1980, Jim McMahon threw 47 touchdown passes on his way to establishing a new NCAA season passing efficiency mark at 176.9 (a record that still holds for 30-plus attempts per game). McMahon's record held up until 1995 when Danny Wuerffel of Florida set the new mark at 178.4. McMahon is currently No. 2 followed by BYU greats Ty Detmer at No. 3 (175.6) and Steve Sarkisian at No. 4 (173.6).

In 1994, future Cougar Sarkisian set a new NJCAA record at 203.8 while playing at El Camino College in Torrance, Calif. That same year, Steve Young broke the NFL mark, establishing the new record at 112.8.



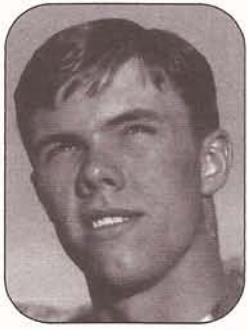

In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-American selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12 member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials, and media representatives.

Jim McMahon
Quarterback: 1978-81
Inducted: 1998

The 1998 class of players for the College Football Hall of Fame included quarterback Jim McMahon of Brigham Young University, 1977-78, 80-81.

"I am happy to be selected and think there will be additional BYU quarterbacks joining me in the future," said McMahon. "I'd do it all over again. There was no one who could stop our offense."

McMahon joins former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

"This is an honor and recognition that is richly deserved by Jim," said BYU Head Coach LaVell Edwards. "We are pleased that he was selected."

The 1998 Class was inducted December 8 at the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's 41st Annual Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City and was permanently enshrined during ceremonies at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Indiana, in the summer of 1999.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was 1981 First team All-America by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he was First team All-America by the FWAA and Second team by Associated Press and UPI.

McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year, and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) total offense (345.8) in 1981 and pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980.

He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first-team all-league.

He broke 23 school records, won the 1982 Dale Rex Award, the 1981 Cougar Club Crowd Pleaser Award, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls, and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).

His charitable work includes the Jim McMahon Foundation, Jim McMahon Golf Tournament (to benefit Ronald McDonald House), Children's Miracle Network, Juvenile Diabetes Fund, American Cancer Society, Society for the Prevention of Blindness and Think First Foundation for Children.

He will forever be known as the player who threw the Hail Mary pass to Clay Brown in the 1980 Holiday Bowl to come from 20 points behind with four minutes remaining and upset SMU, 46-45 — resulting in BYU's first bowl victory. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.

INDUCTEES

Gifford Nielsen

Quarterback: 1975-77

Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over the three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.



Marc Wilson

Quarterback: 1976-79

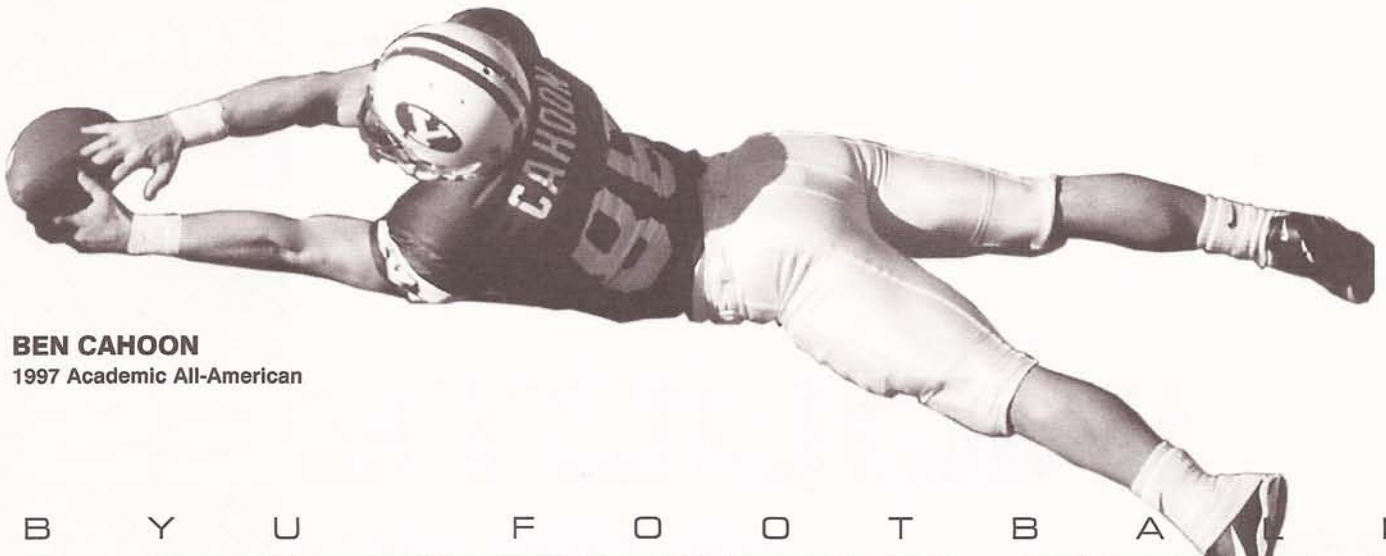
Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-American honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman ballot, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP.

A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Wash., with their four children.

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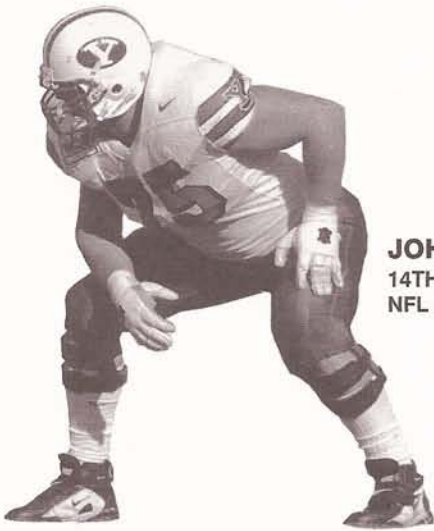

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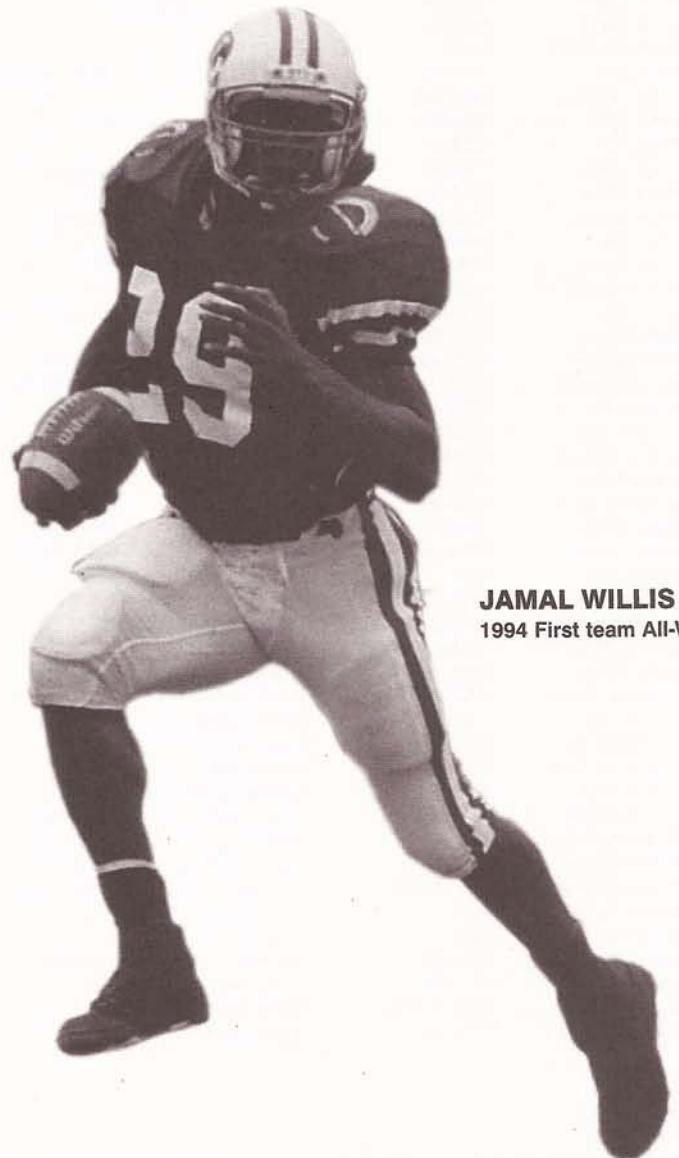

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage.

OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard half-back pass to

complete the scoring.

The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys.

BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402.

BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula.

Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead.

Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person.

McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

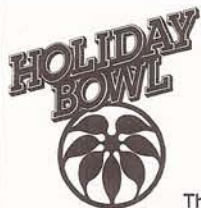

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation.

Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half.

BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson.

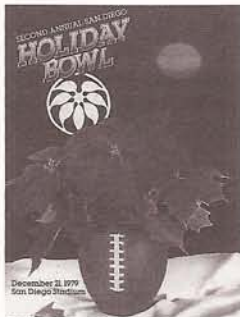
But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37.

With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense.

Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games—a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration.

SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown.

With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33.

Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touch-

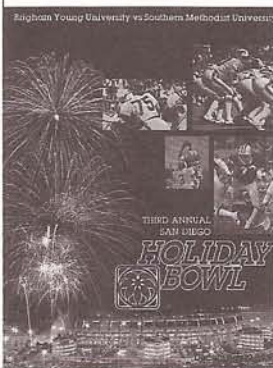
down to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield.

SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left.

McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419.

BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge.

As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for

126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground.

Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but

Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79.

Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

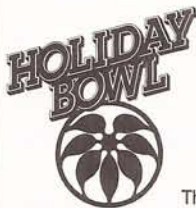

BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7.

Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime.

Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good.

BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomczak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground.

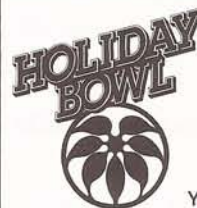

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17.

The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw

back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

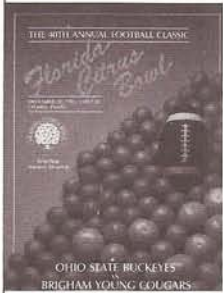
In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead.

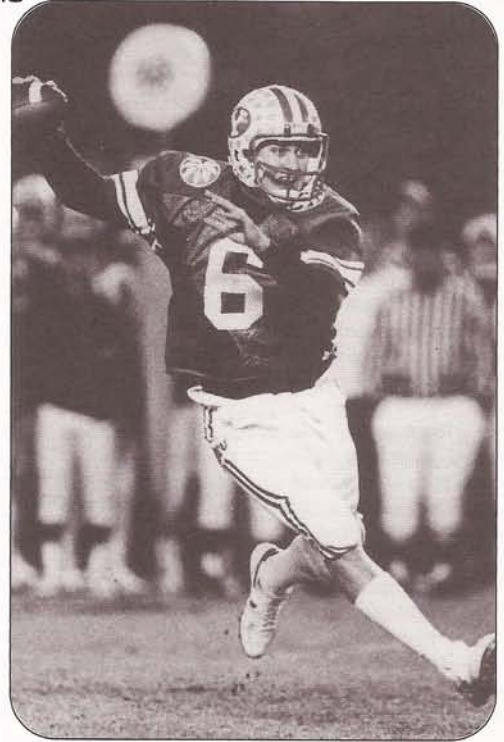
Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension—national championship luster—thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to



play.

The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

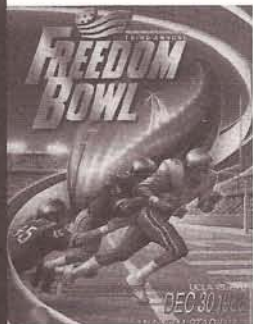

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

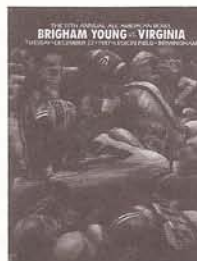
Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

But that was as close as the Cougars would get.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.



A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

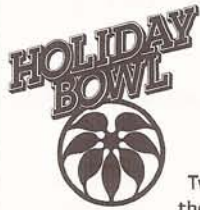

576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team.



BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points.

Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play.

Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown.

Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

The Cougars entered the game beat up. Defensive backs Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up and Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his non-throwing shoulder.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player.

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.



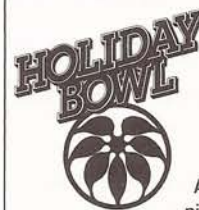

A tipped pass that was picked off in the end zone with less than 30 seconds remaining stifled BYU's hopes of knocking off seventh-ranked Iowa in the 14th annual Holiday Bowl. Quarterback Matt Rodgers led Iowa on a 74-yard scoring march on the game's opening drive. The Hawkeyes also scored on another long drive in the second quarter.

Down 13-0, BYU finally got things rolling. Starting on the BYU 22, Detmer connected on five of six passes to move the Cougars to the Iowa nine. From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6.

BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13.

Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter: Iowa missed a 40-yard field goal with 4:19 left.

On the game's final drive the Cougars moved inside the Iowa 20 with 33 seconds left to play, but Detmer's pass to tight end Byron Rex was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie.

Josh Arnold of BYU earned defensive MVP honors as BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa was 10th in both polls.

BYU got to the Ohio State six, 14, 22-yard lines in the second half without scoring. Meanwhile, Raymont Harris, OSU's senior halfback, battered the BYU defense all night long, scoring three touchdowns on his way to a record 235 yards rushing.

Despite Harris' rushing, the Cougars managed to go to the halftime break tied at 21. The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock.

The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls, quarter-

back Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and

28-yards to K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy.

KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yardline to secure the game.

Tulane would score 20 unanswered points in the first half. With just 41 seconds remaining in the half, BYU looked to put an end to the Green Wave momentum, but came up short as Feterik was sacked by Phil Henderson for a 10-yard loss to end the half.

Things didn't get much better for the Cougars in the second half, as Tulane scored its third touchdown of the game on the opening drive of the half. On its next possession, the Green Wave would strike again on a 13-yard pass from King to Jamaican Dartez to give Tulane a 34-6 lead with just over seven minutes remaining in the third quarter.

On its first drive of the final period, BYU scored for the first time since the 8:49 mark in the first half on an Aaron Cupp three-yard run.

Tulane answered with a six-play drive that covered 76 yards, giving the Green Wave a 41-13 lead with just over nine minutes remaining in the game.

Trailing by 28 midway through the fourth quarter, BYU finally crossed the Tulane 20-yard line for the first time since the first period and went on to score 14 unanswered points before time expired. Feterik completed an 18-yard pass to Cupp, while Junior Mahe capped off the BYU scoring with a three-yard plunge into the endzone.

"We tried real hard to get up for this game," BYU linebacker Rob Morris said. "It's a difficult thing...We came out, we lost the momentum, we lost confidence and we lost the game."

Feterik attempted to play in the second half, but left the game midway in the third quarter. Freshman Bret Engemann took the QB controls and connected with Tevita Ofahengaue for a first down before BYU was forced to punt. Jesse Sowards got off a 60-plus-yard punt, which upped his average to 48.3 on the afternoon.

Just before the end of the third quarter, Marshall struck a big play when Chapman rushed 87 yards for a touchdown.

Marshall was given an opportunity to score in the fourth quarter as Rogers Beckett picked off an Engemann pass and ran it back to the BYU one-yard line. Chapman, to cap off his MVP performance, scored Marshall's final touchdown.

The Cougars missed a final chance to score when Brian Gray had a clear path to the end zone, but dropped a sure interception.

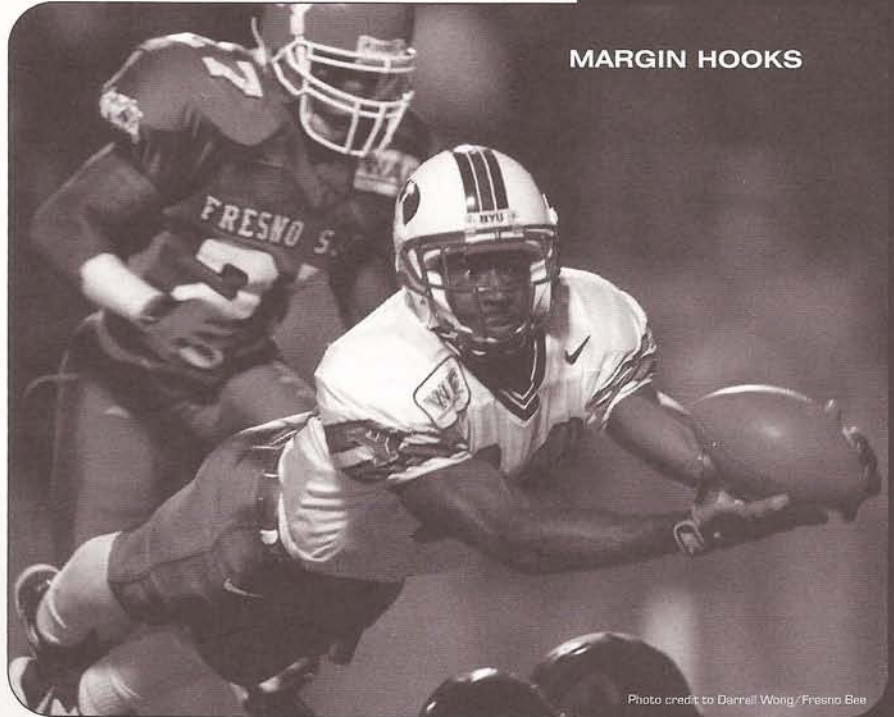

BYU FOOTBALL 2000

Even before the 1999 season began, all that seemed to surround the BYU football program was one question after another.

From "How will the Cougars fare in a new conference," to "How can BYU expect to win with such a tough schedule?" Other questions asked: "Who will fill the void of Joe Wong and first-round draft pick John Tait on the offensive line," "What are the Cougars going to do with no experience at running back," "How will Kevin Feterik handle the shotgun," and many other personnel questions. Yet, both the coaches and media surrounding the Mountain West Conference picked BYU to win the league's first-ever, regular-season title.

I N T H E LINE OF FIRE

It didn't take long for the Cougars to answer many, if not all, of the questions that surrounded BYU when the season began. Senior quarterback Kevin Feterik wasted little time, racking up 501 yards and three touchdown passes in the season-opener against Washington. For his efforts, Feterik was named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the game. Any questions about the depth of the Cougar receiving corps were answered when Feterik used 12 different receivers to complete 39-of-59 attempts, which set a Cougar Stadium record for most pass attempts. With just over a minute remaining in the game, and trailing the Huskies, 28-27, Feterik found freshman receiver Chris Hale in the endzone for a 38-yard game-winning touchdown. Little did anyone know at the time, but Hale's catch would be just one of many key plays by true freshmen on the BYU roster. Rookie running back Luke Staley scored two of the Cougars' touchdowns on the evening, while fellow freshman Fahu Tahī had a solid game, which seemed to ease many of the questions surrounding the BYU running game.

Riding the redeeming victory over the Huskies, BYU played host to Colorado State the following week in the first-ever Mountain West Conference game. The Cougars didn't waste time in letting folks around the Mountain West know they fully intended to carry their winning ways from the WAC on to the new Mountain West Conference. BYU jumped out to a 31-point lead, fueled by a trio of touchdown runs from Staley, who was celebrating his 19th birthday. The win would propel BYU into the nation's top-25, ranked 17th by the Associated Press and 19th in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches' Poll.

In week three, BYU would face a major hurdle in its quest to climb in the national rankings. Virginia came to Cougar Stadium behind the bullish rushing attack of Heisman hopeful Thomas Jones. Jones would reel off a cool 210 yards, scoring two touchdowns in the process. Despite giving up 21-unanswered points to the Cavaliers in the first quarter, BYU fought back and pulled to within five points at the end of the game. Feterik and his third straight 300-yard passing performance drove the Cougars in to scoring position, but a Jerton Evans interception with 1:37 remaining sealed the Virginia victory.

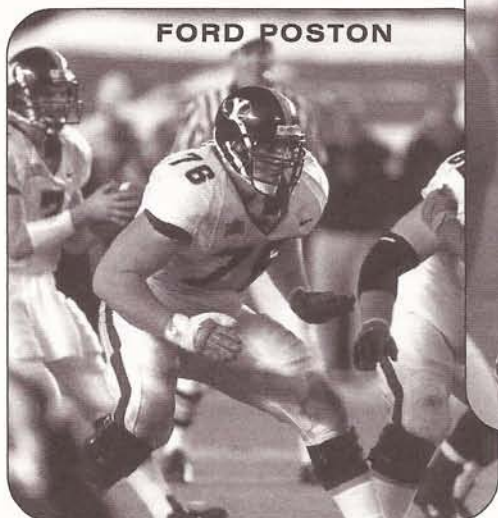
After three straight home games to open the season, BYU finally took to the road - sort of. The Cougars made the two-hour drive north to Logan where a well-prepared Utah State was waiting for the bruised and battered Cougars. Again, BYU gave up the early lead, spotting the Aggies a quick 14 points. But the Cougar defense stiffened long enough for Feterik and company to battle back and take a 31-20 lead midway through the fourth quarter. Interceptions by Jeff Holtry and Brian Gray gave BYU the momentum heading in to the final minutes. However, Utah State was not about to roll over. Two touchdowns in the final six minutes, including a four-yard pass from Jeff Crosbie to Demario Brown with just :21 remaining tied the game at 31-31. After Utah State missed a 42-yard field goal in the overtime period, All-Conference performer Owen Pochman capitalized by splitting the uprights on a 33-yard attempt to give BYU the 34-31 victory. Tahi also proved crucial in the Cougars' win, racking up a season-high 116 yards on 22 carries, while a banged-up Staley watched from the sidelines.

After being scored on early and often over the previous two games, the Cougars took matters in to their own hands by scoring 21 unanswered points against California in BYU's homecoming game in Cougar Stadium. The Golden Bears slowly started to gain on BYU, but the Cougars would have nothing to do with it. Feterik found Jonathan Pittman on a 44-yard strike in the fourth quarter and Staley added yet another rushing touchdown in the final period to give BYU a 38-28 win over its second PAC-10 foe of the season. Feterik teamed up with Margin Hooks for 108 yards, while completing 25-of-41 for a total of 414 yards on the night - his fourth 300-yard game of the season.

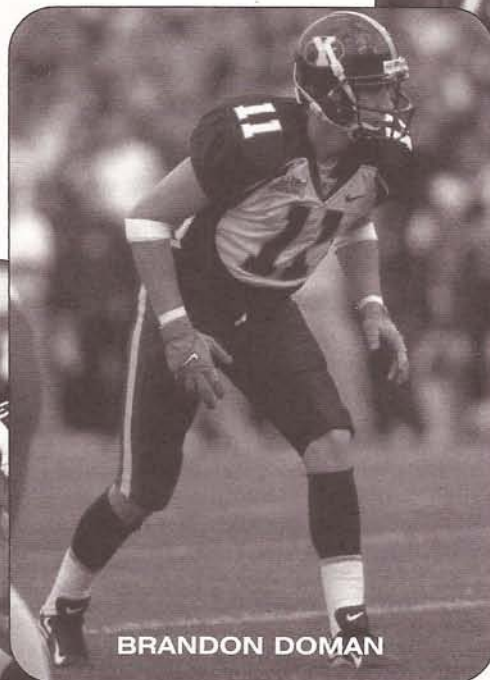
For the first time during the season, BYU took to the road for a two-game road stint. BYU first dismantled Mountain West foe New Mexico in an impressive defensive performance. The Cougar defense held the Lobos to minus-10 yards rushing on the night and limited UNM quarterback Sean Stein to just 134 yards passing. BYU registered seven sacks, including back-to-back sacks by Setema Gali, en route to a dominating 31-7 win in a rain-delayed game in Albuquerque. Against UNLV, it was much of the same. A stingy BYU defense, led by linebacker Rob Morris who had missed the previous four games with a lower abdominal strain, held the Rebels to a minus 14 yards rushing until the last play of the game when UNLV running back Joe

Haro rumbled for a 38-yard gain. The Cougars also put the clamps on the Rebels' passing game, holding two different UNLV quarterbacks to a combined 94 yards passing on the night. BYU spoiled the UNLV homecoming game with the 29-0 shutout. Tahi and Staley recorded a combined 143 rushing yards for the Cougars, while Feterik had 257 yards passing on the night, including 108 yards to Hooks. Pochman did more than his share, picking up a school-record 17 points on the night, including five straight field goals.

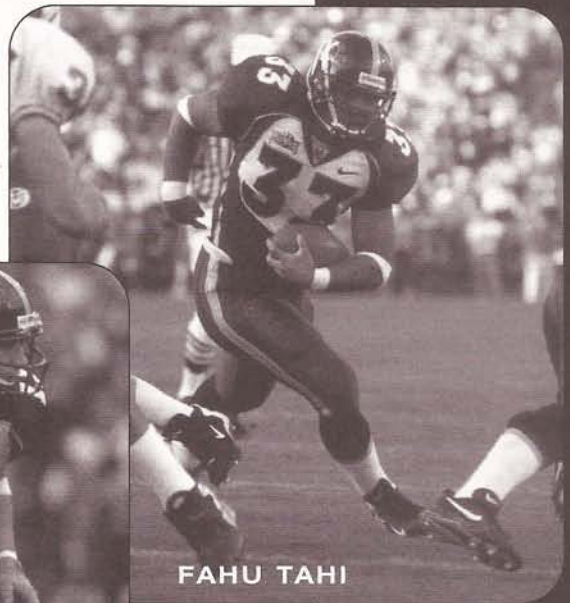
Looking for its fourth straight Conference win, the Cougars returned home to take on the Air Force Academy. Staley picked up a pair of touchdowns in the first half and Hooks collected a 57-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter to take a commanding 27-10 lead heading in to the game's final 10 minutes. With 3:30 remaining, the Falcons scored two quick touchdowns in a matter of 1:07 to pull within seven points. A Chris Hoke sack ended an Air Force drive and the game as BYU held on for the 27-20 win. Ricks College transfer Jared Lee had



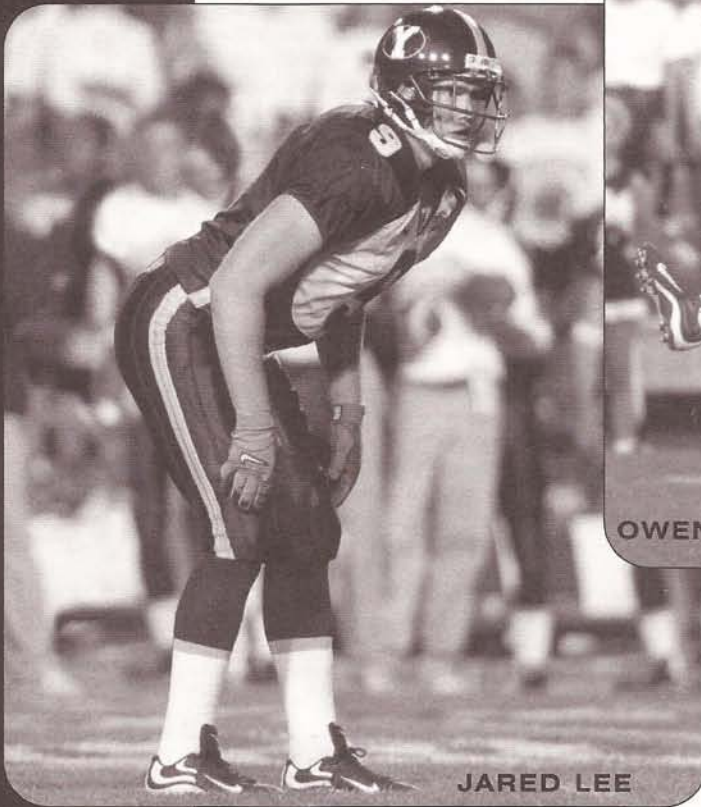

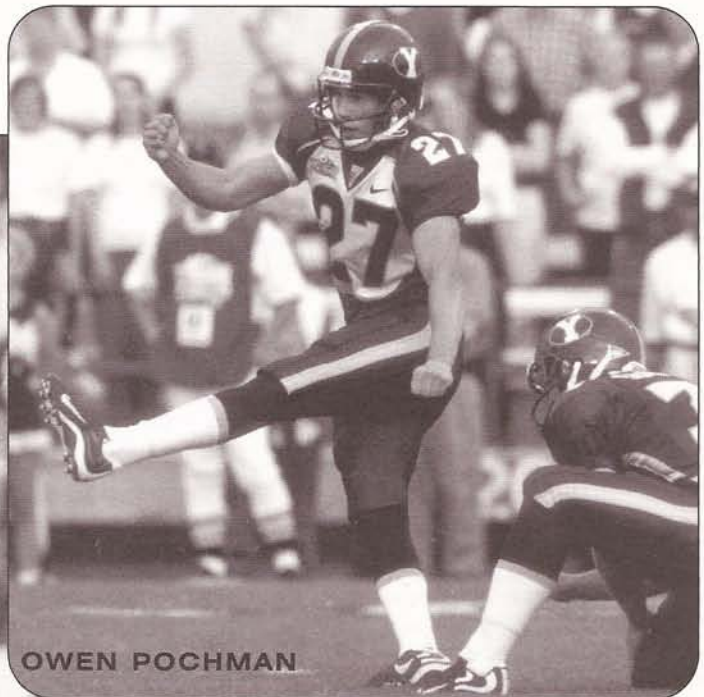

another big game, recording a season-high 16 tackles. Morris was equally impressive, picking up 12 tackles, including five unassisted takedowns.

Back on the road, the Cougars headed to San Diego State with a chance to guarantee at least a share of the Mountain West Conference title. Morris was again the story in leading BYU to a 30-7 win over the Aztecs. Morris picked up 15 tackles on the night, including 14 unassisted tackles and five takedowns for a combined loss of 30 yards. He also recovered two fumbles and forced a fumble that was picked up by junior defensive tackle Hans Olsen who rumbled, bumbled and stumbled in to the endzone, giving BYU a 20-7 lead early in the third quarter. Pochman made good on three field goal attempts on the night and the duo of Feterik to Hooks connected on a 15-yard pass in the fourth quarter to seal the 30-7 BYU victory, securing the Cougars at least a share of the first-ever Mountain West Conference title.

The Cougars' momentum would quickly come to an end when BYU traveled to Wyoming for the first time in six years. After the Cowboys controlled the momentum early, Feterik found Hooks on a 20-yard strike to tie the game at 7-7. Wyoming posted a 14-7 lead just before the half and added to it on a 45-yard field goal in the third quarter. Pochman cut the lead back to seven on a 32-yard field goal, marking a school-record 14th straight field goal. Wyoming would add 14 more points, extending its lead to 31-17. Feterik scored on a one-yard run with 4:47 left in the game, but it would not be enough as the Cowboys refused to let the Cougars celebrate an outright conference championship on their home field.

In the regular-season finale, the Cougars played host to long-time rival Utah, with both teams looking to secure a postseason bowl bid. A BYU win would secure an outright title and a Liberty Bowl berth, while a Utah win would guarantee at least a share of the Conference title and a chance to play in one of the league's two bowl tie-ins. Both Cougar and Ute fans would get their money's worth. Pochman established himself as the Cougars' all-time leading scorer with his 26-yard field goal in the first quarter, giving

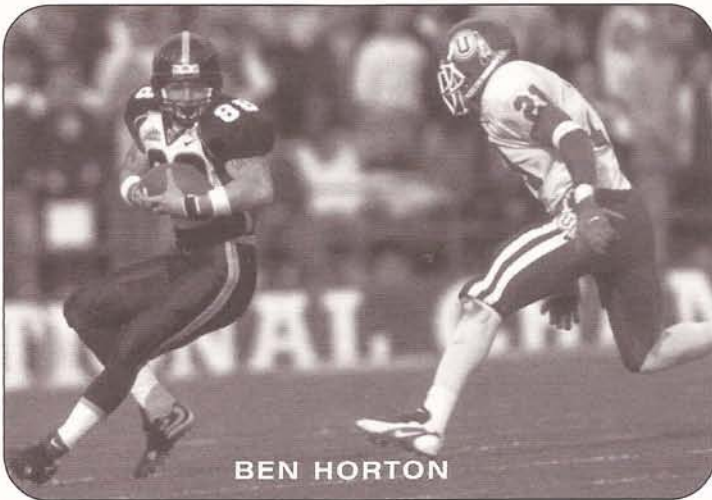
BYU a 3-0 lead early in the game. The Utes answered with two field goals of their own before the break. BYU looked to take control when Feterik hooked up with Hooks on a 77-yard touchdown pass, marking the longest pass play of the season. Wanting to get in to the act, Utah responded with a 70-yard touchdown pass of its own to put the Utes ahead to stay at 13-10. Donny Utu scored the game-winning touchdown on a four-yard strike from T.D. Croshaw with 13:08 left in the game. BYU fought back to within three points when Feterik connected with sure-handed receiver Ben Horton on a six-yard touchdown pass. The Cougars would get the ball back for one final series, but the comeback would end with Andre Dyson's second pick of the afternoon, sealing the Utah victory, 20-17. Hooks led all receivers with 139 yards, while Feterik collected his eighth 300-yard game of the season. Lee led the BYU defense with 12 tackles, while Morris added 11 takedowns.

When all was said and done, all the questions had been answered as the Cougars went on to an 8-3 regular-season record, posting their 26th straight winning season. They earned their 19th conference championship and traveled to their 22nd bowl appearance, falling to Marshall, 3-21. Like the 1998 season, 10 Cougars were named All-Conference and two players emerged as All-Americans. Now the only question that remains ... "when does next season start?"

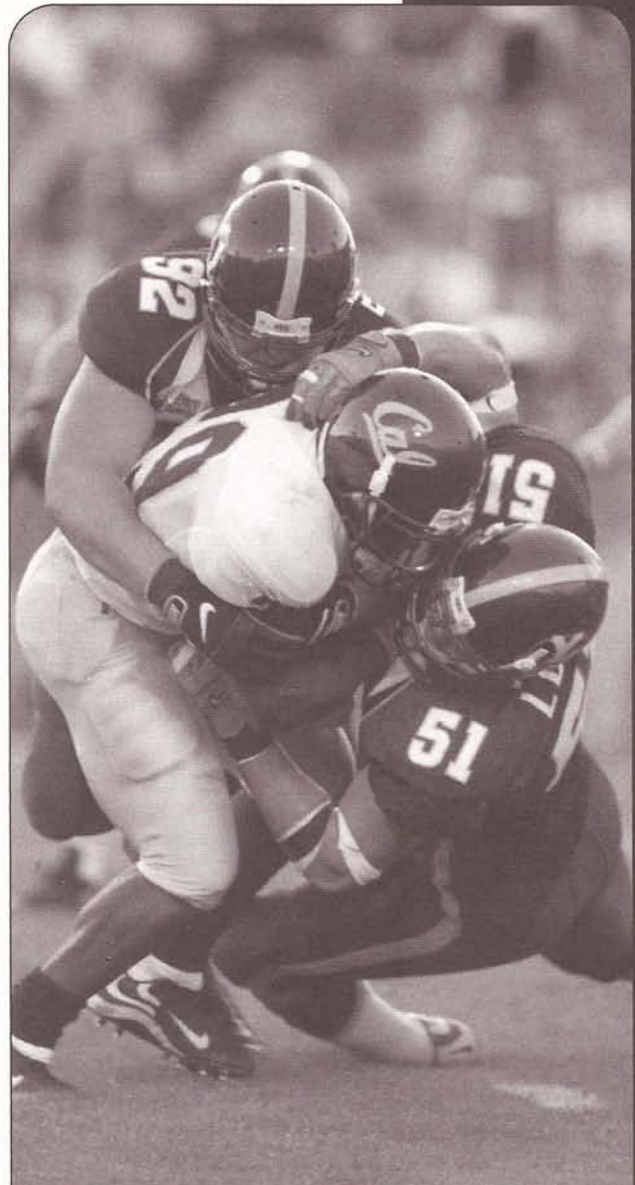

Veteran quarterback Kevin Feterik combined with some key freshmen, as well as experienced receivers, to lead BYU to a season-opening victory over Washington, 35-28.

The left-handed senior threw for a personal-best 501 yards as he completed 39-of-59 passes and three touchdowns before a national Thursday-night ESPN TV audience and 65,726 fans. Feterik had a record-setting performance, leading BYU to a Cougar Stadium record 37 first downs and 59 pass attempts.

After Washington had taken a 28-27 lead with 5:04 left in the fourth quarter, Feterik found freshman Chris Hale for his first-ever collegiate catch and the game-winning 38-yard touchdown with just 1:16 remaining. Feterik then hooked up with tight end Doug Jolley in the endzone for the two-point conversion, giving the Cougars the winning 35-28 margin.

Feterik threw his first TD to tie the game in the second quarter on a 16-yard strike to Jonathan Pittman after Washington had scored the game's first touchdown on a BYU fumble in the endzone. Midway through the second quarter, Feterik found Margin Hooks in the endzone to give the Cougars a lead they would hold until the fourth quarter. Marques Tuiasosopo sparked the Huskies in leading them to a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns, the last of which gave Washington the lead with five minutes left in the game.

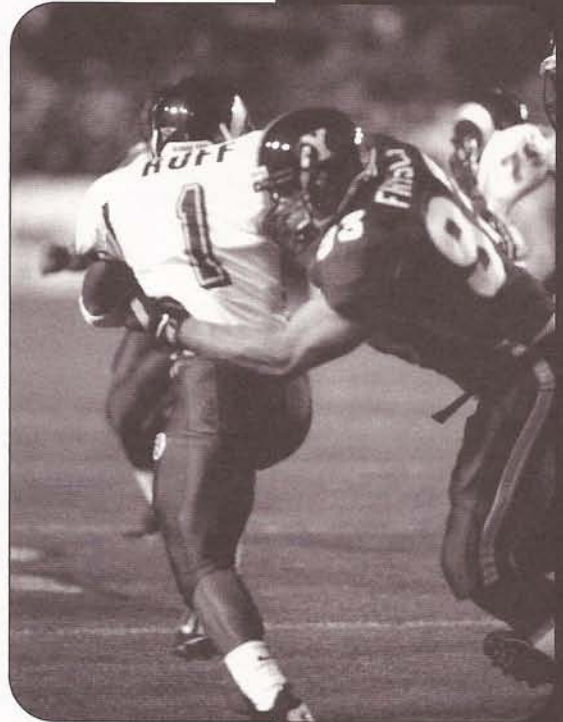
Telegraphed plays gave advance warning to BYU defenders who led the Cougars to their second straight victory of the season with a 34-13 clip over Colorado State in the inaugural game of the Mountain West Conference.

That defense enabled BYU freshman running back Luke Staley to score three touchdowns as the Cougars built up a 31-0 lead before a crowd of 63,054 and once again in front of a Thursday-night ESPN TV audience.

When BYU defensive lineman Chris Hoke recovered a Matt Newton fumble at the end of the third quarter, it led to Staley's third TD of the night and put the score at 31-0. Staley rushed for 65 yards and scored on a one-yard run in the first quarter, a seven-yard pass in the second and the five-yard run in the third - all on the true freshman's 19th birthday.

The Rams got on the scoreboard with a pair of fourth-quarter TD passes from Matt Newton, a 30-yard pass to Pete Rebstock and a 40-yard strike to Dallas Davis.

Kevin Feterik threw to 10 different BYU receivers in his 28 completions from 37 attempts for 310 yards and had no interceptions for an impressive 163.89 pass efficiency. Once again Margin Hooks led all Cougar receivers with five catches for 72 yards.

The Cougars had a final chance at the endzone with less than two minutes to go. However, with first-and-goal from the 16, BYU couldn't punch it in and Feterik's final attempt was intercepted in the endzone.

BYU's defense was hampered by the absence of Butkus Award candidate Rob Morris who was sidelined with an injury.

Too many mistakes in the first quarter cost BYU and early 21-0 lead as Virginia held on to an upset the 17th-ranked Cougars, 45-40.

BYU spotted the Cavaliers 21 first-quarter points before it could get on the scoreboard. Luke Staley scored on a two-yard run, then cracked a 45-yard run off a draw. Virginia scored its second and third TDs of the first quarter after picking off Kevin Feterik passes.

Cavalier star running back Thomas Jones netted 210 yards off 35 rushes and had two touchdowns on the ground, a 23-yard run and a 45-yard scamper.

With 1:47 before halftime, BYU cornerback Brian Gray returned a 28-yard interception for a touchdown closing the gap to 28-19. However, Virginia cornerback Tim Spruill scooped up a dropped lateral in the third and returned it 20 yards for a TD.

BYU then scored the first of three second-half TD passes with a 30-yard strike to Margin Hooks. After a Virginia 46-yard field goal, Feterik found Ben Horton for an eight-yard pass resulting in a touchdown. Virginia then scored on a five-yard pass before tight end Carlos

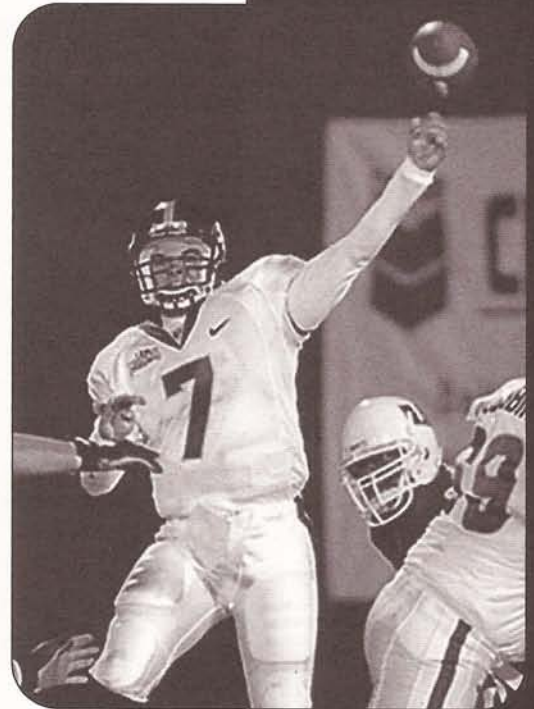
A scare finally turned in BYU's favor when junior Owen Pochman kicked a 33-yard field goal after USU had missed a 42-yard attempt in the overtime period, giving the Cougars a 34-31 win in BYU's first road game of the season.

Surprising quick strikes gave Utah State an early 14-0 first-quarter lead to the delight of the partisan crowd of 31,200 - the third-largest in Romney Stadium history. The Aggies scored when quarterback Jeff Crosbie hit Adrion Pierson for a 32-yard touchdown. Four minutes later Crosbie launched an 87-yard bomb to Aaron Jones for another score after BYU freshman Fahu Tahf fumbled on the USU 13-yard line.

The Cougars' four touchdowns all came from the arm of Kevin Feterik, who was 23-of-36 for 289 yards passing and four TDs. Two of the first three Cougar touchdowns were to reserve tight end Doug Jolley, a four-yard second-quarter score and a 5-yard toss in the third quarter to give BYU its first lead of the night, 24-20.

The first BYU touchdown came in the first quarter when Feterik beat the blitz with a 26-yard pass to Jonathan Pittman, followed by a game-tying 19-yard field goal by Owen Pochman with just 1:26 left in the first half. With no time on the clock, USU connected on a 55-yard field goal to give the Aggies the lead at halftime.

With BYU leading 31-23 and just :21 remaining in the game, Crosbie found Demario Brown for a four-yard touchdown. With the two-point conversion, the Aggies tied the game at 31-31. The game marked just the third overtime game in BYU history.

With the Cal offense gaining momentum and looking to take the lead, Heshi Robertson's fourth-quarter interception reversed the momentum, sealing a 38-28 Homecoming victory over the Golden Bears.

The Cougars took an early 21-0 lead over Cal, only to have the margin closed to 21-14 by halftime before a crowd of 65,617. Robertson's interception on the BYU six yard-line with 7:07 left in the game stopped a Bear drive and eventually led to a Luke Staley seven-yard TD run to create some breathing room at 38-21.

After winning the toss for the fifth straight time this season, BYU stopped Cal's initial drive when a 39-yard field goal was wide right. Feterik soon found Jonathan Pittman for the first of two touchdowns to him on a 41-yd strike. Feterik was 25-of-41 for 414 yards passing with four touchdowns and three interceptions. He found Tevita Ofahengaue for a 28-yd TD pass in the first quarter and Margin Hooks for a 29-

yd pass in the second. Hooks led all nine Cougar receivers with seven catches for 108 yards.

Feterik led BYU to a pair of drives which ended with a 44-yard field goal in the third and a 44-yard TD pass in the fourth. Pochman's field goal tied him with Leonard Chitty for a school-record 34 career field goals.

Cal scored two of its touchdowns off interceptions, a 19-yard snare by Deltha O'Neal and an 80-yard return by Damian Marzett. Their other TDs came off a Joe Igber 11-yard run in the second quarter and a 55-yard pass to LaShaun Ward with two seconds left in the game.

For the second straight week No. 20 BYU jumped out 21-0, and this time it ended in a 31-7 victory over Mountain West foe New Mexico. A 43-minute lightning delay after halftime dissipated the crowd of 25,301 and was the only thing that appeared to stop the Cougars who improved to 5-1 on the season.

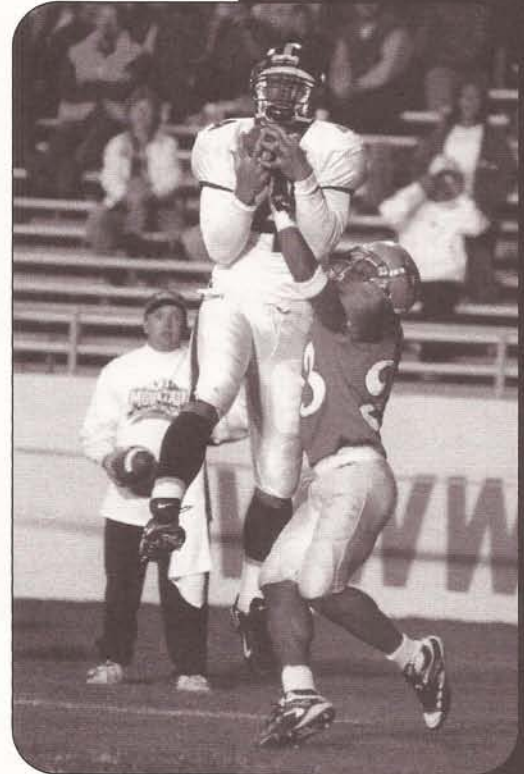
All of BYU's four touchdowns came from freshmen, including two from fullback Fahu Tahī.

In the game's first series, quarterback Kevin Feterik connected on a 36-yard pass to Margin Hooks. Hooks fumbled, but 340-pound offensive guard Matt Johnson recovered to set up Tahī's two-yard score. Feterik completed a 34-yard pass to Luke Staley on the next drive to set up Fahi's second two-yard score with 5:46 remaining in the first quarter.

The BYU defense forced the Lobos to back-to-back three-and-out series, which set up Feterik's only TD pass of the night, a four-yard toss to Bristol Olomua.

UNM's multi-purpose player Brian Urlacher caused Tahī to fumble going into the second quarter. A few plays later BYU got the ball back when Jared Lee intercepted a pass by Sean Stein, who was Feterik's high-school backup.

After the lightning delay, BYU scored its final TD as Staley raced 61 yards on the Cougars' first play of the second half. Staley ended with 69 yards rushing off eight carries and had 78 yards receiving from three catches.

Owen Pochman's five field goals led No. 19 BYU to a 29-0 shutout over Mountain West opponent UNLV. Pochman's 17-point performance was a new kicking scoring record for a game, surpassing Joe Liljenquist and Pochman's brother Ethan, who each had 16 points.

Led by returning middle line-backer Rob Morris, the Cougar defense took the fight out of UNLV. The Rebels netted just 24 yards rushing.

BYU's offense scored a first-quarter touchdown when Kevin Feterik connected on a 12-yard pass to tight end Doug Jolley. The only other TD of the night came in the fourth quarter when Luke Staley scored his team-leading ninth rushing touchdown of the season. The freshman has scored a TD in each of the six games he has played this season.

Pochman's first field goal, a 47-yarder, was set up by back-to-back runs of 17 and 18 yards by Staley. Cougar safety Tyson Smith had a 52-yard pass interception to set up Pochman's 26-yard field goal. Pochman then added a 28-yard field goal before the half ended.

Pochman added another 31-yard field goal in the third quarter and the Cougars' final score, a 30-yarder. Prior to that, Feterik fired a 48-yard pass to Margin Hooks off a play action fake and set up Staley's fourth-quarter score. Hooks led the Cougar receivers with six catches for 108 yards, while Fahu Tahī netted 89 yards rushing.

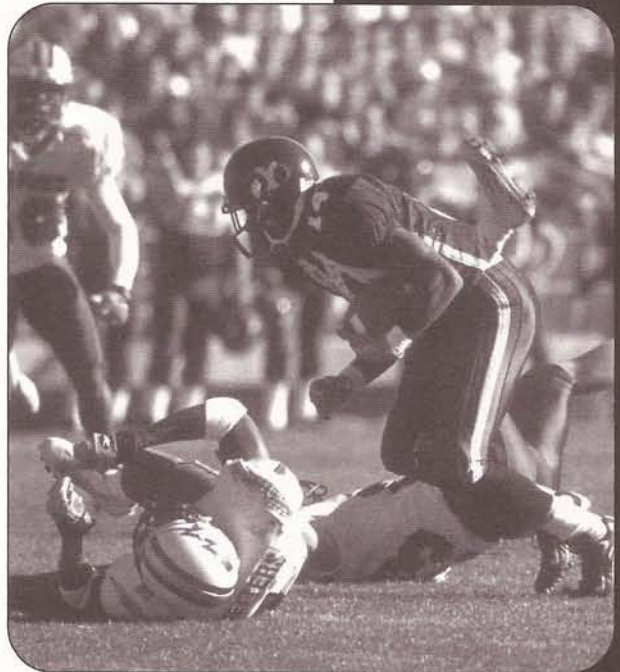
Victory 250 for Coach LaVell Edwards came off a key defensive and offensive second-half series, which propelled No. 16 BYU to a 27-20 defeat over the Air Force Academy.

Following a 17-7 lead, BYU's opening second-half possession put them in peril when AFA blocked Jesse Sowards' punt. The Falcons got the ball on BYU's seven-yard-line and had nine chances at the endzone, but had to settle for a 25-yard field goal.

BYU's offense scored a 26-yard field goal later in the third quarter when Owen Pochman booted his record-setting 10th consecutive field goal, his second of the afternoon. Pochman's streak broke the nine-goal mark set by Leonard Chitty.

Air Force recovered a Jaron Dabney fumble and two plays later, half-back Scotty McKay ran for a seven-yard touchdown. Then the Falcons recovered a perfectly-executed on-side kick. They drove to score off a 32-yard field goal by Jackson Whiting with 2:37 remaining in the game and closed the gap to 27-20.

The never-say-die Falcons had started the day with the ball, but had their initial drive thwarted when Dustin Staley intercepted Thiessen in the first quarter to the delight of 65,319 fans (the fourth sellout of the season). The Falcons netted 212 yards rushing and 109 yards passing. Staley's younger brother Luke scored BYU's other touchdowns off a 14-yard pass from Feterik and a seven-yard run, both in the second quarter.

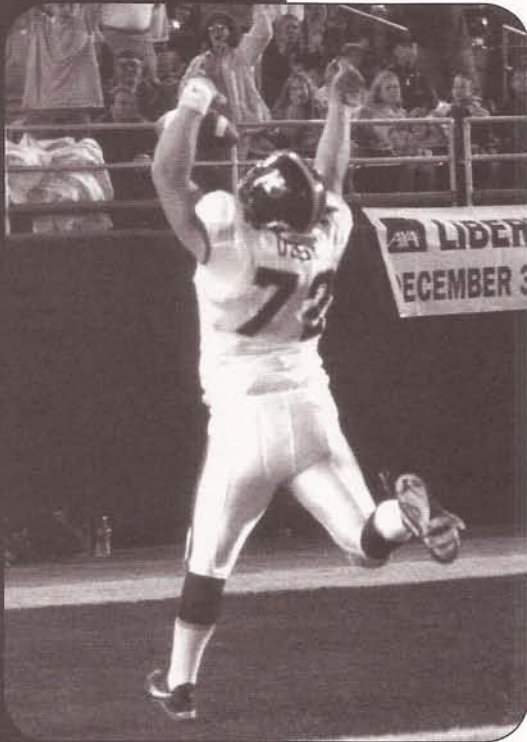

Linebacker Rob Morris lifted BYU past a slow first-half to lead the Cougars to a 30-7 victory over San Diego State. The senior recovered two fumbles and caused a third, which all but sealed the BYU victory.

Morris, teamed with Chris Hoke, caused Aztec quarterback Jack Hawley to fumble with just over 13 minutes left in the third quarter. That fumble was scooped up by Cougar defensive tackle Hans Olsen, who rambled 24 yards for his first touchdown. Olsen's TD helped increase BYU's margin to 20-7. Morris was also credited with 14 unassisted tackles, one assisted tackle, five tackles for minus 30 yards and three sacks for minus 25 yards.

Owen Pochman had three field goals on the day. The initial 23-yard field goal came at 4:58 left in the first half after BYU had failed for eight downs from first and goal situations.

After the Aztec's missed a 50-yard field goal, Pochman closed the half with a 27-yard field goal. Pochman's 42-yard field goal, his 13th consecutive of the season, came with 2:43 left in the third quarter.

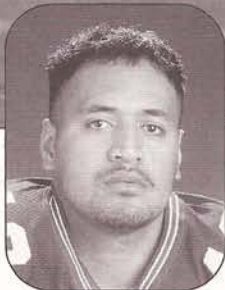
