The 2003 BYU Football Media Guide has been designed to provide local, regional and national media with useful information about the BYU football program, its history and tradition. We trust many of your questions will be answered within the pages of this publication.

Should you require additional information, such as photographs, videotapes or additional media guides, please contact the BYU athletic media relation's office at (801) 422-8949. We sincerely appreciate your coverage of BYU football and look forward to working with you this season.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

All requests for credentials to cover BYU football should be sent on company letterhead to: Jeff Reynolds, Associate Director; Athletic Media Relations; 30 SFH; Provo, UT 84602. Fax requests may be sent to (801) 422-0633.

All single-game credential requests should be received no later than one week prior to the date of the game. Requests received later than noon on the day prior to the game will not be accepted. Credentials for working media, including print and electronic (radio & television) media outlets are restricted in accordance with BYU, Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules and guidelines. It is our intention to ensure proper, professional use is made of the space available for credentialed media.

Credentials, complete with parking pass (if requested), will be mailed to the requesting individual or organization if time permits, or sent to the visiting school's sports information director for distribution. Otherwise, all credentials will be available at the Media Will-Call window, located at the ticket office west of the stadium.

PRESS BOX

Working press box credentials shall be issued only to accredited newspapers, radio and television reporters only. Requests from other media sources shall be evaluated on a game-by-game basis. Reporters representing newspapers with next-day editions, daily editions, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts and television and radio stations covering for nightly news shall be given priority. Spouses, dates, children and other non-working persons will not be credentialed and are not allowed in the working media areas during the game as dictated by NCAA guidelines.

Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre- and post-game coverage. Credentials must be displayed at all times. Pregame interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstances. Properly credentialed media representatives shall be allowed field access with four minutes remaining on the game clock. Interviews with players and/or coaches may not be conducted until the NCAA-mandated 10-minute cooling off period has expired. Individuals or organizations violating this policy may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium

PHOTOGRAPHY

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and television reporters/camera operators on assignment. Television organizations shall be restricted to one camera operator and one reporter on the field at all times, except by prior approval from the BYU athletic media relations office. Freelance and amateur photographers not on assignment are not eligible for sideline credentials, except by prior approval from the BYU Athletic Media Relations office.

All Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules shall be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yardlines. Sideline supervisors will patrol both sidelines to make certain all rules are enforced. Live or taped pregame interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstance. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium. For additional questions regarding photography guidelines, please contact University photographer Mark Philbrick at (801) 422-7322.

MEDIA SERVICES

The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, situated on the west side of LaVell Edwards Stadium. Access to the press loge may be obtained via the north or south elevator.

The BYU athletic media relations staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs and media guides for both BYU and the visiting team prior to the game. Additional information, such as lineup and roster or jersey changes will be distributed as the information becomes available. An official statistical package complete with individual and team stats, play-by-play, scoring summaries, quotes, end-of-quarter stats and defensive stats will be distributed following the game. "Quickie Stats" will be available during timeouts and at the end of each quarter.

With four minutes remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU head coach Gary Crowton and selected players will be available in the media room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling-off period. The BYU locker room is closed to all media. The media room is located next to the BYU locker room under the southeast corner of east grandstands. Quotes from both coaches and selected players will be available in the finals stats package.

Several courtesy telephones (with campus extensions) will be available in the working area of the press box, while a limited number of phones will be available in the media room. All phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Phone lines can be purchased for your organization's exclusive use on a season-long basis. Collect or credit card calls can be made from each of these telephones.

PARKING

LaVell Edwards Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

INTERVIEWS

During the season, all player and coach interviews must be scheduled through Jeff Reynolds in the athletic media relations office at (801) 422-4909. Interview requests must be made 24 hours in advance. Interviews with players and coaches are permitted on Monday through Wednesday only. Practices will be closed to media on Thursday and Friday prior to a Saturday game. Interview schedules and media access will be altered for Thursday and Friday games. During practice, Coach Crowton will be available for brief interviews during the team's warm-up period. Crowton, as well as other members of the coaching staff and players will be available for interviews following practice. Generally, players will not be available for interviews prior to practice. Telephone interviews, for out-of-town media can be arranged through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with players on the day prior to the game, as well as game day, are not permitted. No player interviews will be conducted during regular class hours.

WEEKLY MWC TELECONFERENCE

A teleconference, featuring the head coach from each Mountain West Conference school, will be conducted each week during the season. For more information, including times and schedules, visit the official Mountain West Conference website at www.themwc.com. Media outlets may also contact Bob Burda at the MWC office for additional information.

WEB SITES

To have access to athletes, coaches, practice, games, etc., Internet sites must be held to the same professional standards required of traditional media. Web site personnel must show caution, restraint and good judgement in covering potential student-athletes and the recruiting process. Proper judgement

and an understanding of NCAA rules must be displayed at all times. Initial access will be provided for weekly interviews on a limited basis and reviewed regularly. Additional access may be granted to web sites that display professionalism over a period of time. Access will be determined on a case-by-case basis depending upon space and availability. Failure to adhere to the standards and regular media policies established by the BYU media relations office may result in the loss of privileges. Live, real-time updates will not be permitted.

SPORTS RADIO

All interviews must be arranged through the media relations office. The media relations office will not facilitate the broadcast of live guests during regular class hours. All interviews for sports talk radio must be conducted with players after practice or during the weekly media luncheon. Radio stations will be responsible for attending practices and for providing their own equipment (i.e. tape, digital recorders, telephones, etc). All sports talk radio stations will be issued one credential per home game.

WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON

Each Tuesday, Coach Crowton and selected players will be available for interview purposes from noon until 1 p.m. All live electronic interviews, during the luncheon, must be arranged in advance with the Athletic Media Relations office. The luncheon is for credentialed media only. When availability permits, a teleconference connection will be established with the head coach of the Cougars' next opponent. Media may participate in a 10-15 minute interview session with the opposing coach. The weekly luncheon will be catered by a local restaurant and will be conducted in the Cougar Room at LaVell Edwards Stadium.

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NATIONAL & REGIONAL TV

On February 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc., signed a seven-year contract with the Mountain West Conference, giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to football and men's basketball beginning with the 1999-2000 academic year. ESPN will also televise the Mountain West Conference Women's Basketball Championship game and one regular season game on the network.

An average of 21 football games will be televised per year, three of which will be broadcast on Thursday nights. Last season, ESPN televised five BYU football games.

LOCAL TELEVISION BROADCASTS

KSL has been televising BYU football games since 1984. Now KSL-TV has pioneered a new and unique sports production entity — Bonneville SportsWest Productions. SportsWest broadcasts are produced by an award winning team and serve as the benchmark for the market and beyond.

SportsWest has an agreement with BYU for local market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events that have not been acquired by ESPN.

KSL television (Channel 5) also host the weekly "Gary Crowton Show" every Sunday night at 11:15 p.m.

RADIO

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar

Sports Network is 50,000-watt KSL Newsradio 1160 in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 3rd season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as the sideline/locker-room reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 22-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts, and contributes to KSL's extensive midweek and gameday coverage.

Record-setting BYU wide receiver Andy Boyce returns for his second sea-

son on the sidelines. Boyce, who doubles as KSL's Director of BYU Sports Sales, played alongside Ty Detmer as a Cougar wideout, setting a single-season receiving yards mark in 1990 that still stands.

Bill Riley is back for his third season as studio host of BYU's pregame, halftime and postgame coverage. Riley, who anchors "Sports Final" nightly on KSL, also hosts the midweek "Gary Crowton Show" (Wednesday's 7 p.m.).

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 18th season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

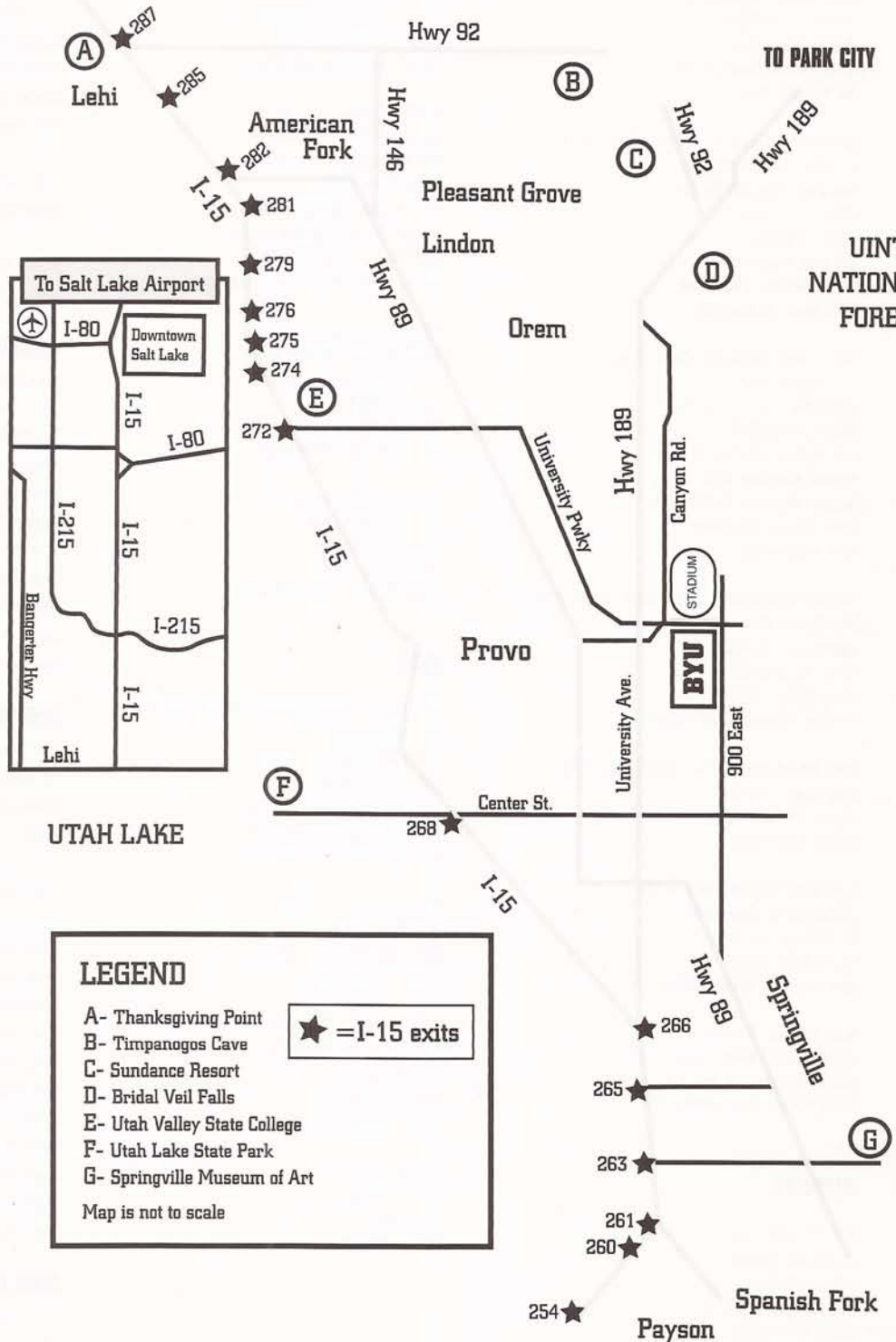


Provo is also a major gateway to six national parks, seven National Monuments, two National Recreational areas, six National Forests and 44 State Parks.

★ = I-15 exits

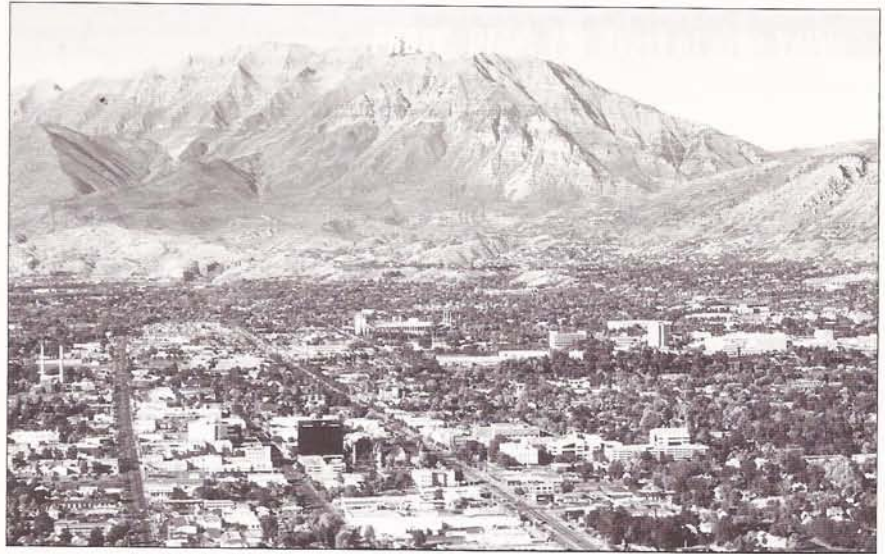

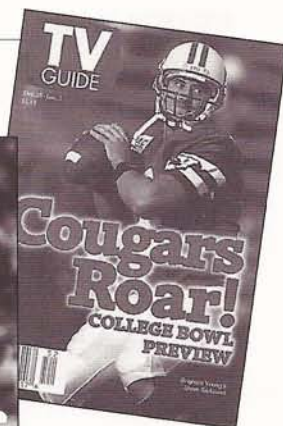

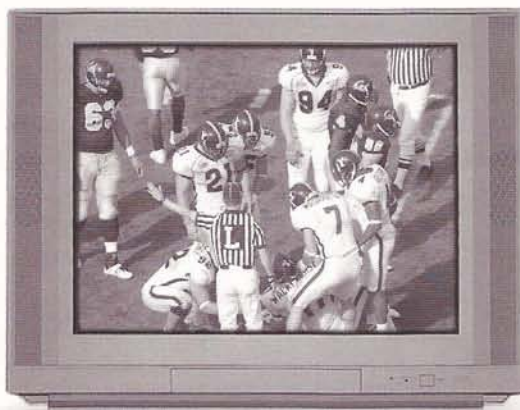
MEDIA ATTENTION

From national publications to live television broadcasts, BYU football is one of the more visible programs in the country. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 50-33-2 record while playing in front of a national audience, including a 23-15 mark on ABC and a 27-21-2 mark on ESPN. Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average of three times per season. The Cougars have played at least five games on national T.V. over seven different seasons, including the 2002, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1988 and 1985 seasons. Since 1980, BYU has played in at least one nationally-televised game per season. On Sept. 1, 1984, Robbie Bosco (right) led BYU to a 20-14 victory over Pitt in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast. Last year BYU played two ESPN games (Colorado State, Syracuse), two ESPN2 match-ups (Air Force and Hawaii), and one ABC game (Georgia Tech).

2003 SEASON PREVIEW

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2003

It hasn't happened around these parts very often. In fact, it hadn't happened at BYU since before head coach Gary Crowton had learned to drive. Interestingly, the Cougars' new defensive coordinator, Bronco Mendenhall, had just started elementary school the last time Cougar faithful endured a similar case of the blues.

Not since a U.S. postage stamp cost just \$.08 had BYU suffered more losses than victories in a single season. Not even a single player on last year's roster can remember the last time the Cougars endured a losing season—none of them had been born.

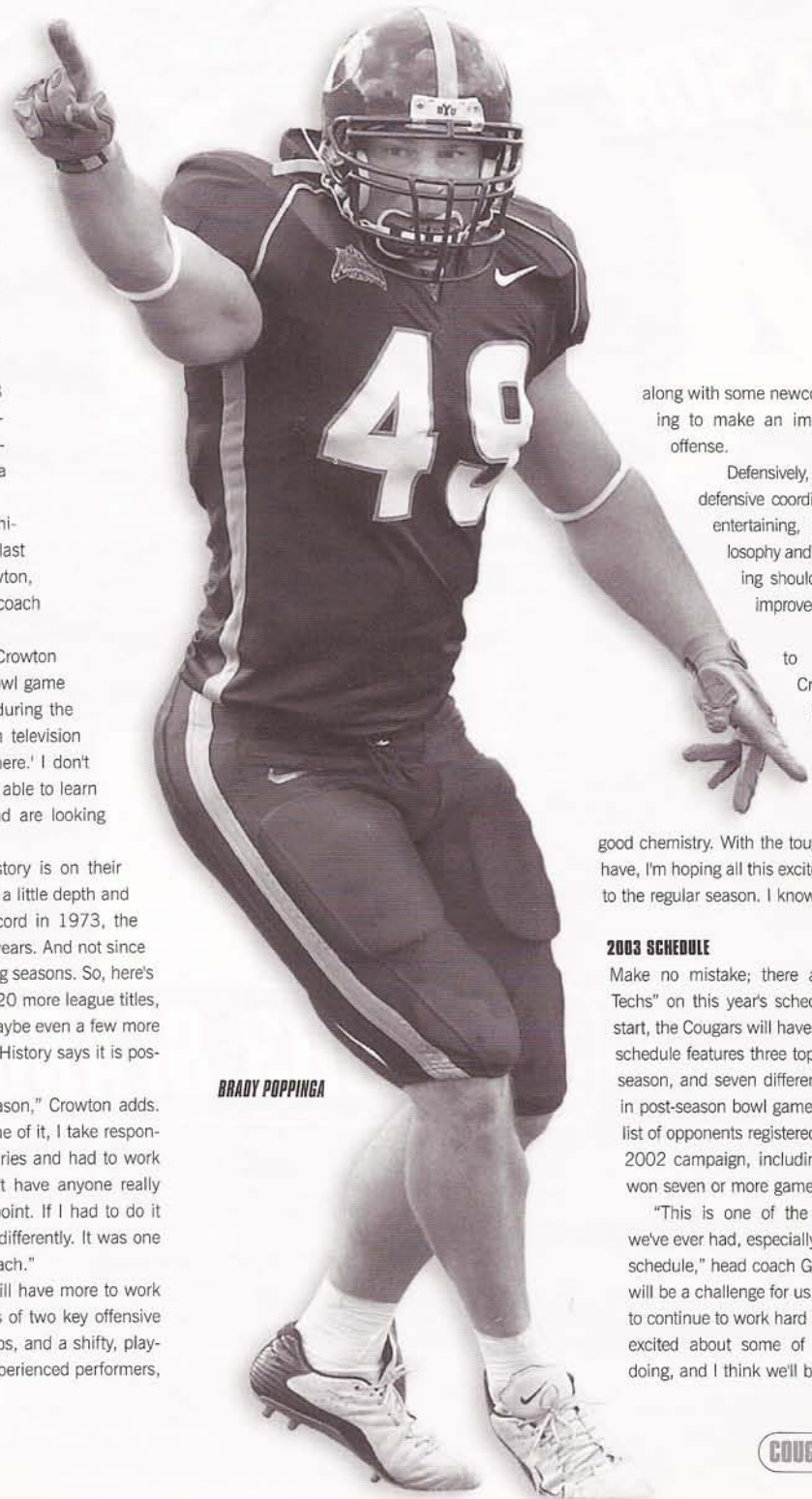
1973, the year before Atari came out with a hi-tech, home video game called "Pong", marked the last time BYU posted a losing record. Ironically, like Crowton, it was also LaVell Edward's second year as the head coach in Provo.

"You don't like to dwell on those things," Crowton says. "Winning just five games and not going to a bowl game is unacceptable. It's just unacceptable. I sat home during the bowl season and watched all those bowl games on television thinking, 'There's no reason why we shouldn't be there.' I don't want to go through that again. I think we have been able to learn from our mistakes. We've made some changes, and are looking ahead to next season."

Luckily for Crowton and Cougar faithful, history is on their side, not to mention some outstanding recruiting and a little depth and experience to boot. After Edwards posted a 5-6 record in 1973, the Cougars didn't have another losing campaign for 29 years. And not since 1970 and 1971 has BYU suffered back-to-back losing seasons. So, here's to 29 more winning seasons, 23 more bowl games, 20 more league titles, another National Championship, and who knows, maybe even a few more Heisman, Doak Walker and Outland award winners. History says it is possible, and no one around here doubts history.

"I've had a lot of time to think about last season," Crowton adds. "There were a lot of factors that came in to play. Some of it, I take responsibility for. However, we had to battle some key injuries and had to work with some youth and inexperience. We really didn't have anyone really ready to run the offense, from an experience standpoint. If I had to do it over again, I would probably do some things a little differently. It was one of the hardest situations I have ever been in as a coach."

Entering his third season at BYU, Crowton will have more to work with. While the Cougars will be without the services of two key offensive linemen, two tight ends now in NFL preseason camps, and a shifty, play-making receiver, they do return a nucleus of solid, experienced performers,

along with some newcomers who are looking to make an immediate impact on offense.

Defensively, a new, high-energy defensive coordinator, along with an entertaining, pursuit-oriented philosophy and all 11 starters returning should make for a much-improved defensive unit.

"I think we're going to be pretty good," Crowton added. "We have a better idea of our personnel, we have new coaches, new energy and some good chemistry. With the tough schedule that we have, I'm hoping all this excitement will carry over to the regular season. I know this, it will be fun."

2003 SCHEDULE

Make no mistake; there are no "Bo Diddley Techs" on this year's schedule. Right from the start, the Cougars will have their hands full. The schedule features three top-25 teams from last season, and seven different teams that played in post-season bowl games. Overall, the 2003 list of opponents registered 83 wins during the 2002 campaign, including seven teams that won seven or more games.

"This is one of the toughest schedules we've ever had, especially the non-conference schedule," head coach Gary Crowton said. "It will be a challenge for us. We're going to have to continue to work hard and be prepared. I'm excited about some of the things we'll be doing, and I think we'll be ready to go."

BYU will look to avenge last season's loss at Georgia Tech when the Ramblin' Wreck comes to town for the 2003 season-opener on Thursday, Aug. 28.

One week later, BYU will travel to the L.A. Coliseum--one of the most historic sporting venues in the country. The Cougars will take on USC in the first-ever meeting between the two schools. The Trojans, with Heisman Trophy winner Carson Palmer, defeated seven different top-25 teams during the 2002 season, including a 38-17 victory over Iowa in the Orange Bowl. The Trojans finished the 2002 season as the fourth-ranked team in the country.

Perhaps the highlight of the 2003 schedule will be a Nov. 15 trip to South Bend, Ind., to take on Notre Dame. The Fighting Irish finished the 2002 season with a 10-3 record, a No. 17 national ranking and an appearance in the Gator Bowl. This season's contest will mark the first of three games scheduled between the two schools over the next three years. The Fighting Irish own a 2-1 record over BYU, dating back to the first meeting in 1992. However, the last time the two teams met (Oct. 15, 1994) the Cougars came away with a memorable, 21-14, victory in South Bend.

In other non-conference action, the Cougars will host Stanford on Sept. 20 for the first-ever meeting between the two schools, and Boise State will travel to Provo for a nationally televised contest in late October. The Broncos finished the 2002 season with an impressive 12-1 record, including a 34-16 win over Iowa State in their third Humanitarian Bowl victory over the past four seasons. BSU finished the season ranked No. 12.

The MWC season will kickoff on Saturday, Sept. 13 in Albuquerque, as the Cougars travel to New Mexico for their first of four league road games. After a non-conference tilt against Stanford, BYU will host Air Force on Sept. 27. The following week, the Cougars will travel to San Diego State for a night game against the Aztecs.

The MWC season will round out with a Thursday-night, nationally televised game in Provo against Colorado State, road games at Wyoming and UNLV, and the regular-season finale against in-state rival Utah on Saturday, Nov. 22.

"We have a very tough schedule," Crowton said. "The concern I have is that we play two very tough teams early. I'm not afraid of those teams; however, I'm concerned that we go in and play those team, get a little beat up,

then have to play a league game in the third week of the season. We want to make sure we grow and get better through the first two games, and not get in a situation where we're forced to play guys without much experience as we get in to conference play. It is a great schedule though. It's a very aggressive schedule, and I think we will be able to do well."

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS

Last season, the Cougars began the season with relatively little experience at the quarterback position. Bret Engemann, who started a handful of games in 2000, was named the starter, but had missed the entire 2001 season after recovering from shoulder surgery. Redshirt freshman Matt Berry had just returned from a mission, sophomore Todd Mortensen had very little experience, and Lance Pendleton was a relative unknown.

After taking over starting duties seven games in to the 2002 season, and finishing the season as the top quarterback, Crowton said the starting job is Berry's to lose. In seven games last season, Berry recorded 1,309 yards and had a team-leading seven touchdowns completions.

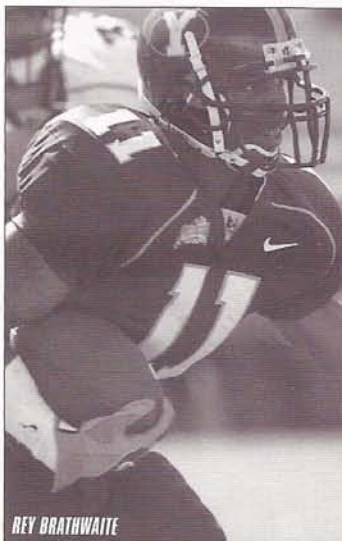
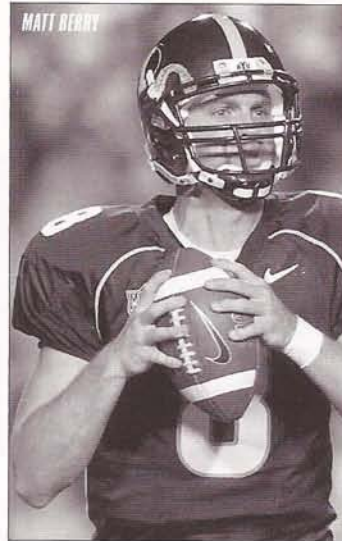
"Matt will be the starting quarterback as we enter camp," Crowton said. "I think Matt showed some great things as a young quarterback. He had a good spring, and with a year under his belt, I think he'll do well. He's been working hard and is anxious to get out there."

Berry will be pressured right from the start. Freshman John Beck returned from a Church mission shortly after the 2002 season, and has been working hard to earn a shot. Beck performed well during spring drills, and in one scrimmage went 6-for-6 for 157 yards and three touchdowns.

"John Beck is a pretty good player," Crowton said. "With our second team, during spring drills, John was able to move the ball, and get in the end-zone. He has a lively arm, and has shown some mobility. He's a football junkie and I like that. He will be putting a big push on Matt."

Mortensen, now a junior, will also be competing for playing time. He has seen action as a backup over the past two seasons, including five appearances last season.

"Todd is a very intelligent per-

son," Crowton said. "He is always prepared and is one of the hardest working guys out there. He's a guy you love to have around as a coach. You know if you go to him, he's going to go in and get the job done. He'll certainly be in the mix."

After making a valuable contribution last season, Pendleton returns for his sophomore season. The 6-0, 185-pound play-maker was a "situational" contributor last season, playing in 10 different games throughout the season. Not only did Pendleton complete over 51 percent of his pass attempts, but he also finished as the Cougars' third-leading rusher. Crowton said because of the depth at quarterback, and with Pendleton's athletic ability, the coaching staff is considering switching Pendleton to receiver or defensive back.

"We're not sure what we'll do at this point," Crowton said. "Lance is very athletic, and we would like to find a way to use his skills a little more. We'll be addressing that a little later. Right now, he's in the mix at quarterback."

RUNNING BACKS

Marcus Whalen. Marcus Whalen. Marcus Whalen. The 5-11, 210-pound junior returns to the starting lineup after posting a team-best 918 yards last season, averaging over five yards per carry. If not slowed by injury, Whalen would have coasted to a 1,000-yard season. Not only will Whalen be the starting running back, he will also be a player to watch for All-MWC honors.

"Marcus is a solid, physical player," Crowton said. "He has the ability to be one of the top backs in the Mountain West Conference. He showed some good things last year, and if he stays healthy, will have an even better season."

The Cougars' second-leading rusher, Curtis Brown, is likely to redshirt the 2003 season, leaving the door wide open for Naufahu Tahī to make his much anticipated return. Tahī led the Cougars in 1999 with

yards and has recently returned from a two-year Church mission.

Crowton anticipates Thomas Stancil, a redshirt freshman Bakersfield, Calif., and Reynaldo Brathwaite, a junior from Spring Valley, Calif., will also see significant playing time this season.

"Tahī had a good spring," Crowton said. "He is in shape

(after his mission) and is a very physical runner. He's playing well and will be able to help us out. Stancil and Brathwaite are very fast, and very shifty. I'm excited about them. I thought they had a nice spring. They will be able to help us out, and add a great deal of depth for us at running back."

In a bit of a switch for the Cougars this season, Crowton said he would look to use a fullback in situations where he has usually used a three tight-end formation. Tafui Vakapuna, a redshirt freshman is expected to carry the load at fullback. Senior Kyle Wilson, who has shown incredible strength and power, will also be competing for playing time at fullback.

"Fui is playing very well. He's very physical," Crowton said. "He's good at catching the ball out of the backfield, and is a good blocker. Kyle Wilson is also another guy who will see some time at that position. He's very physical and is a smart player. We're looking at doing more things with the fullback position instead of using three tightends."

RECEIVERS

The question offensive coaches have had to ask is, "How do you replace a play-maker like Reno Mahe?" During spring drills, Crowton said he may have an answer.

"Chris Hale is a home-run waiting to happen," he said. "I have been very impressed with Chris. He has good hands and gives us more speed on the outside."

Hale, who BYU fans will remember as the mild-mannered, sure-handed freshman who caught the game-winning touchdown reception against Washington in 1999, is back

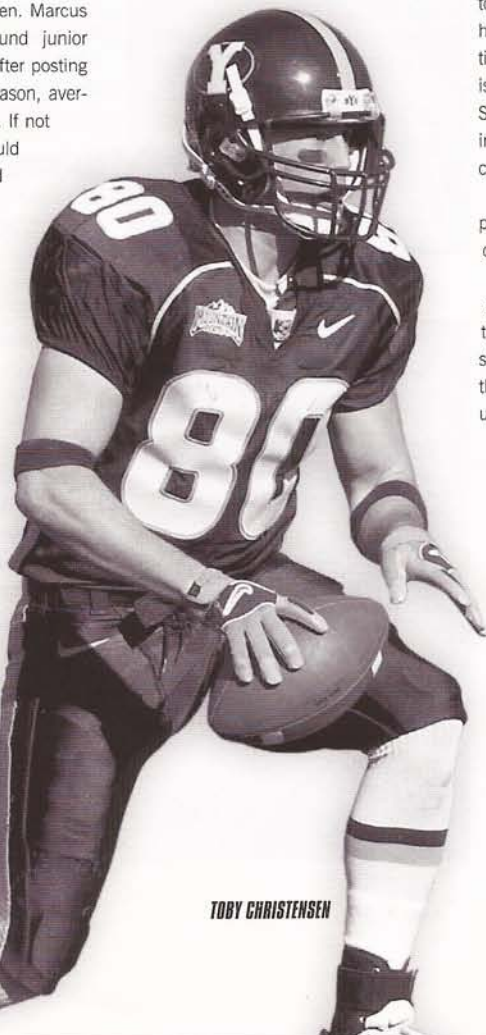
from a Church mission and looks to have picked up even more speed. He will be joined on the outside by Rod Wilkerson. The 6-2, 190-pound junior ranked fourth on the BYU roster last season with 27 receptions for 371 yards.

"I think we are going to be very solid, and very disciplined at receiver," Crowton said. "We need guys to step up and make some plays once they catch the ball."

Toby Christensen returns for his final season at BYU, and is slated as one of three starting receivers. Christensen ranked third among all receivers last season, registering 30 receptions for 346 yards as a junior. Jason Kukahiko, who made great strides near the end of the 2002 season, is another tall, sure-handed, athletic receiver who will see plenty of playing time.

The Cougars will also look to junior David Christensen for his play-making ability. The 5-0, 187-pound receiver was slowed during spring ball with a dislocated shoulder, and had surgery to repair the injury. Coaches expected Christensen to be ready to go during fall camp. Ryan Slater, another junior is noted as being a sure-handed, physical receiver who will see significant playing time this season. After showing signs of great things to come as a true freshman back in 1999, Bristol Olomua has returned from a Church mission and is expected to make a definite contribution.

"Toby Christensen had a very good spring, and is a sure-handed, well disciplined receiver," Crowton said. "He has a lot of experience, and we'll be counting on him this year. David Christensen had a nice spring before he got hurt, and I think Ryan Slater has also done a nice job for us. He's very physical and has done some real good things. I was also impressed

with Bristol Olomua during spring ball. He's a big receiver and we're excited about his potential."

Under the direction of new receivers coach, Todd Bradford, there are some young receivers to also keep an eye on. Sophomore Breyon Jones garnered the attention of the coaching staff during spring drills, along with redshirt freshman Brett Cooper. Walk-on sophomore Matt Smith had an impressive spring season and is certain to see action during the coming season. Other receivers expected to compete for playing time include Cody Fonnesbeck, Joe Omer and Mark Hansen.

TIGHT ENDS

Replacing tight ends Spencer Nead and Gabe Reid, who are both working out in NFL camps, has been a bit of a concern for BYU coaches. That concern spurred Crowton to move a growing Daniel Coates from wide out to tight end. Coates entered fall camp last season as a 6-foot-2, 200-pound true freshman. After a redshirt season, and an increase of some 40 pounds, Coates will be competing for a starting job at tight end.

"At tight end, we lost two very good tight ends," Crowton said. "I don't think it is a big surprise, but Daniel Coates has been doing a great job. He blocks well and has done a nice job learning the tight end position."

Senior Just Jory, who redshirted the 2002 season, will also see plenty of action at tight end, and will be battling Coates for the starting job. Aisaac Aiono, who was one of the Cougars' well-used tight ends last season, returns for his sophomore season and will see significant action this season.

"Jory is doing a nice job," Crowton said. "He's a very dependable player and will do a good job. Aiono was one of three different tight ends we used a lot last year. He'll bring some experience to the position. I feel very confident with these three. They're all solid players and all have good hands. We're a little youthful at tight end, but I have been very encouraged by what



I have seen so far."

Other tight ends who will be competing for playing time include junior Andy Hadfield, freshman transfer Phillip Niu and redshirt freshman Jeremy Gillespie.

OFFENSIVE LINE

If the offensive line can overcome the effects of youth, they will be able to rely on some big, physical players who just keep coming and coming. Depth will be the key factor.

"We're looking at having two freshmen starting on the offensive line," Crowton said. "And with a couple other young guys, including Ofa Mohetau, who was one of the top offensive line recruits in the country, we'll be a little youthful; however, we're going to have some depth, which is something we just didn't have last year."

Junior Brandon Stephens (6-6, 285), who switched from the defensive line last season and saw playing time at tackle, is slated as the starter at right tackle this season. He will be backed up by freshmen Gary McGiven (6-3, 295) and Paul Fisher (6-7, 305).

At right guard, Crowton has tabbed redshirt freshman Jake Kuresa (6-4, 330) as the starter. He will be backed up by

Brian Sanders (6-3, 340) and freshman David Sollami (6-3, 280).

The Cougars return a healthy senior lineman in Scott Jackson (6-5, 300), who started all 12 games at center last season. As the most experienced lineman, Jackson will be called upon to anchor the offensive line, and provide leadership for a young supporting cast.

"Last year Scott was a little gimpy going into the season," Crowton said. "He started the year only eight months out from having ACL surgery. The year before, he had a broken ankle. This year he is solid. He's strong, experienced and looks like he's ready to go."

Jackson will be backed up by junior Hanale Vincent (6-5, 315) and sophomore Rob Robinson (6-5, 280).

"Hanale has done a nice job at center," Crowton said. "He will be able to provide some key depth for us at center."

At right guard, the Cougars return senior Quinn Christensen (6-6, 300), who saw significant playing time last season. He will be backed up by converted defensive lineman Scott Young. Crowton said Mohetau will also figure in to the mix, but would wait on making any decisions.

"We've moved Scott Young over from the defensive line," Crowton said. "I

was hoping to redshirt him, but it looks like he's getting ready to play. I think he has done a nice job making the switch. He's big, strong, and very physical. Quinn Christensen is who we are going with at this point, but Ofa is a guy who could come in and challenge for playing time. I feel like he is good enough to play as a true freshman, but we'll have to see how quickly he can adapt to the new environment, the team, the offense, the speed of the game, and if the other guys are playing well, with good chemistry, we may not have to play him right away. But, that won't be determined until probably the end of fall camp."

At left tackle, Eddie Keele (6-5, 300), who recently returned from a Church mission, has been listed as the starter. Freshman Scott Fisher (6-7, 300) will challenge for playing time at left tackle, along with junior Cade McMullin (6-4, 295).

"Just looking at this group, with two freshmen starting, and possibly a third with Ofa, we're pretty youthful," Crowton said. "But, I think this group is pretty talented. As long as we can stay healthy, and take advantage of the depth at certain positions, I think we'll be all right."

DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE

At the conclusion of spring ball, two of the three starting positions seemed fairly secure, however some key injuries during spring ball prevented defensive coaches from shoring up a starting lineup. Junior Brady Poppinga, who posted a team-lead-



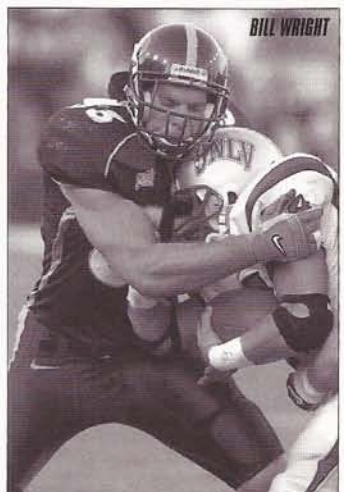

ing eight sacks last season, is secure at right end. However, junior Nate Kolbaba had a solid spring and will be competing for playing time.

At left end, senior Bill Wright has beefed up and successfully made the move from linebacker to defensive end. Following spring ball, Crowton said Wright is likely to enter the season as the starter at left end. He will be challenged by junior John Denney, who started seven games at left tackle last season.

Sophomore C.J. Ah You and senior Ryan Gunderson will also challenge for starting jobs at defensive end. Crowton indicated Shaun Nua is likely to redshirt the 2003 season.

At the nose tackle position, injuries

during spring ball left coaches looking to fall camp to shore things up. With key players out due to injury, several young players were able to step up and showed they deserved consideration for playing time.

Players who will be battling for the starting job at nose tackle include Manaia Brown (6-4, 310), Justin Carlson (6-3, 240), Daniel Marquardt (6-2, 300), Moa Peaua (6-0, 280) and Ifo Pili (6-3, 310).

While the starting defensive line will sort itself out, one thing is certain, depth will be on the Cougars side this season.

"I was impressed during spring practice with some of the younger guys who were able to step up and show they deserved to play," Crowton said. "Guys like Justin Carlson and Nate Kolbaba had a great spring season. Carlson has a motor that is always running, and Kolbaba made some nice plays. We are going to have the luxury of trying to select starters from a group of guys who could all start. I think we'll see a lot of these guys during the season, but because some of them were injured during spring ball, we didn't get a good look at some of these guys."

LINEBACKERS

The heart of the BYU defense will be the deep, quick and senior-laden linebacking corp. All three starters are back, and with the return of a couple missionaries as well as developing, young players, the Cougars will be in good shape at linebacker.

Mike Tanner, who recorded 57 tackles, including 21 solos, took over the starting roll at middle linebacker seven games into the 2002 season. The 6-1, 235-pound senior has been slated as the starter entering fall camp. His back up will be a pair of recently returned missionaries in K.C. Bills (6-1, 220) and Lawrence Cowan (6-3, 235). Senior Ammon Mauga is also expected to see time at middle linebacker.

Colby Bockwoldt, a 6-2, 230-pound senior will hold down right-side

linebacking duties. Bockwoldt, who runs a legit 4.5 in the 40, was the team's third leading tackler last season, recording 51 solo tackles and 34 assisted takedowns. Sophomore Bryant Atkinson (6-3, 225) and senior Brent Carlson (5-11, 238) will also be competing for playing time.

At the left side linebacker position, senior Levi Madarieta was listed as the starter following spring drills, however senior Paul Walkenhorst, who figures to be in the mix, missed spring drills while recovering from a knee injury. Senior Nick DiPadova (6-0, 205) will also compete for playing time.

"We have some depth at

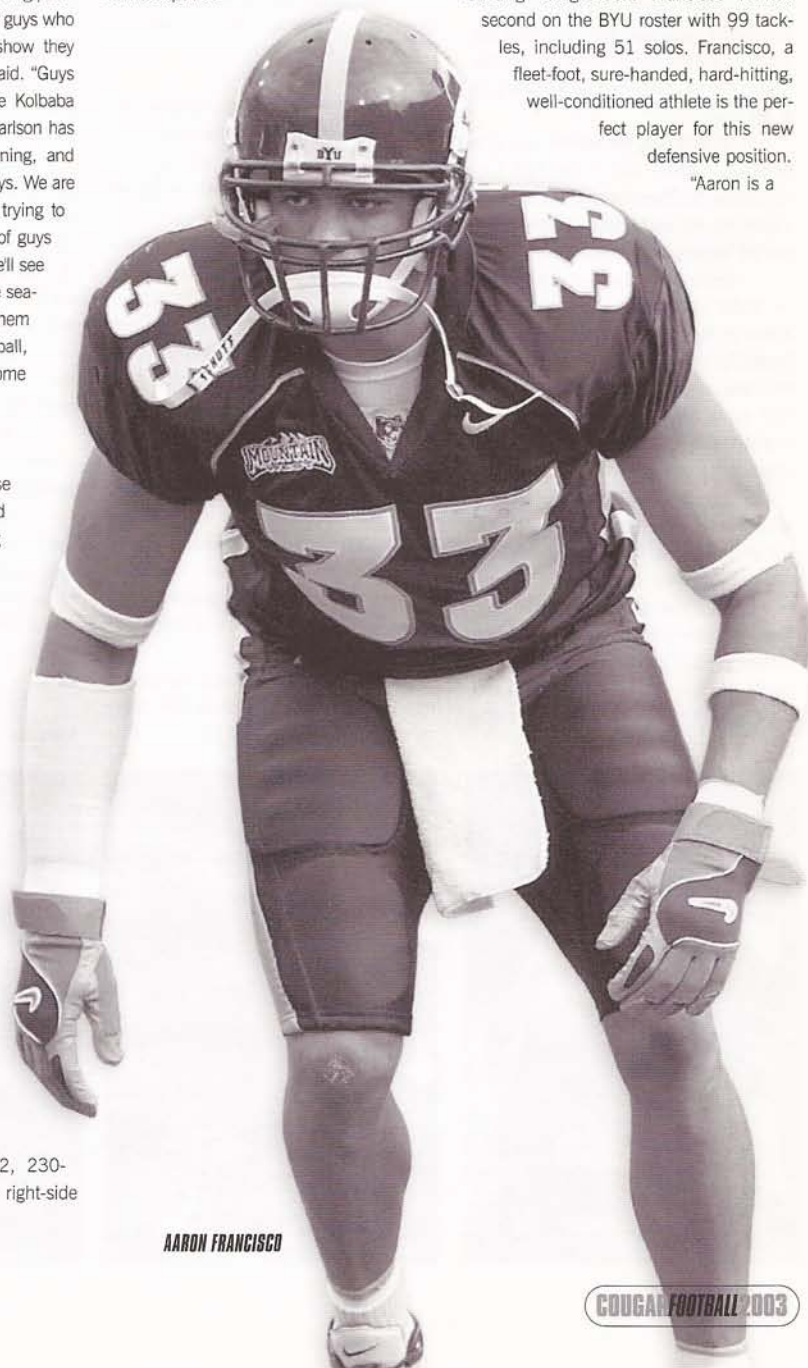

SAFETIES

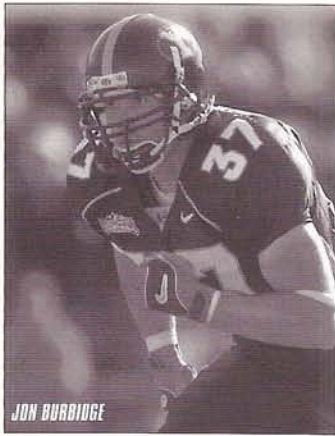
As part of the new 3-3-5 defensive scheme, the BYU secondary will feature three safeties, including two Katbacks and a Cougarback.

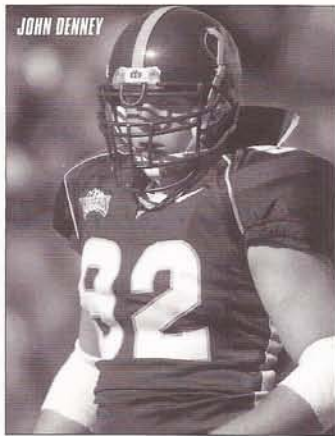
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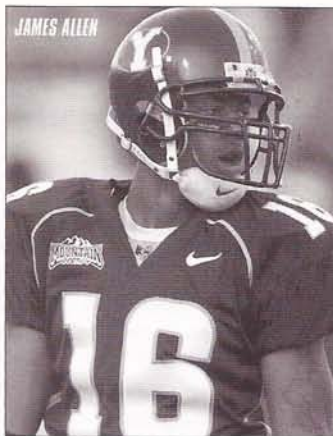

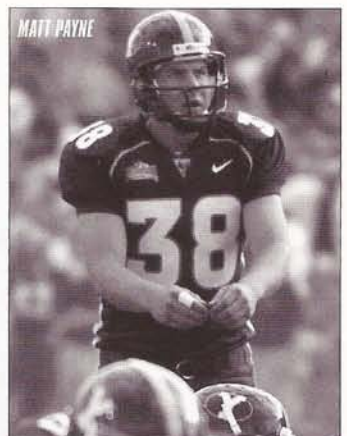

A host of players gained valuable experience during spring ball and are expected to contribute at safety, including junior Jared Meibos (5-11, 208), senior Josh Brandon (6-0, 190), sophomore Ed Kinsey (5-9, 170) and freshman Adam Nelson (6-2, 180). Coaches expect James Allen to contribute as well. Allen, a 5-10, 170-pound junior saw limited action during spring drills due to a re-aggravated ankle injury.

CORNERBACKS

Cougar fans should rest easy this season. All-MWC performer Jernaro Gilford is

back, and he's healthy. Back for his senior season, Gilford had an outstanding spring, and did not miss a down.

"It will be good to have Jernaro back," Crowton said. "He's back and he's healthy. He didn't miss a play or a single drill during spring ball. Jernaro is a very good player. He's big, physical and knows how to play his position. It will be good to have him back this year."

Seniors Chad Barney and Brandon Heaney will also compete for a starting position. While Barney had a solid spring, Heaney saw limited action after recovering from shoulder surgery. Due to Gilford's injury, both Barney and Heaney started at cornerback last season.

Junior Micah Alba (5-8, 165) and sophomore Nate Soleberg (6-0, 170) each showed improved development during spring drills, and are expected to compete for playing time.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Junior Matt Payne is BYU's "Mr. Special Teams." Payne returns as the team's leading punter and kicker. He earned an hon-

orable mention All-America citation and twice earned Mountain West Player-of-the-Week honors for his outstanding performances last season. He will enter the season as one of the top punters in the nation -- a sure candidate for the Ray Guy award, as well as All-America honors.

"It's nice going in to the season not worrying about our kicking game, or our punter," Crowton said. "Matt is a very good punter. He is especially good at getting the ball inside the 20-yard-line."

Junior Tyson Dunham begins his second season with the Cougars, and will challenge Payne for punting duties. Trent Williams has recently returned from a Church mission, and will work to see playing time at kicker.

John Denney has been listed as the first-string deep snapper, while David Christensen has been tabbed as the team's top punt returner. Christensen, along with Brathwaite and Stencil will compete for kick-return duties.

2003's "QUALITY" RECRUITING CLASS

The 2003 recruiting class, which is made up of four top offensive line recruits, two highly recruited defensive linemen, two linebackers, tight ends and defensive backs, as well as a skilled, long-range field goal kicker, constitutes Crowton's third recruiting class since taking over the BYU program in December, 2000.

"Most of our recruiting was geared towards the front seven on both sides of the ball," Crowton said. "We had some key positions to fill, and build for the future. I think we were able to sign some guys who will be able to make an immediate impact in some of those positions."

Regarded by many recruiting services as the top offensive line class in the country, the Cougars signed the No. 1 offensive line prospect in the nation, Ofa Moheatau (Eules, Texas). Moheatau turned down impressive offers from the likes of Miami (Fla.), Texas and Arizona State to play for the Cougars next season. Equally impressive in the eyes of BYU recruiters, *SuperPrep* All-Region performers Dallas Reynolds (Provo, Utah), Jason Spredon,

(West Valley City, Utah) and R.J. Willing (Kahuku, Hawaii) also signed letters to play for the Cougars. All three players had offers from Pac-10 and Big-12 programs.

"Offensively, we needed to get offensive linemen in the program that we can work with and build up. Ofa is, in our opinion, along with many others, the best run blocker in the country," Crowton said. "I am also excited about the local kids we signed. Dallas Reynolds, Jason Spredon,

and also R.J. Willing are going to be a great group for us. They have got good size, they are athletic, and they are all good kids. These guys are already at a different level coming into the college game.

Brian Soi, a high school All-American, and a highly regarded defensive line prospect from Provo's Timpview High School, will join Brett Denney, a defensive standout from Thornton, Colo., along with BYU's defensive line.

"Defensively, Brian Soi has a chance to play early," Crowton said. "He could have an impact on this program very early."

Crowton said he was also pleased to receive letters from linebackers Matt Ah You (Cedar Hills, Utah) and David Nixon (College Station, Texas).

"David is a very talented player," Crowton said. "I like him and think he will help our program because he moves well, runs well and has a good sense for the ball. Matt is very physical and can hit."

Including JUCO transfer Walt Williams, the Cougars signed defensive

back Aaron Attig from Moapa Valley High School in Moapa Valley, Nevada.

"We needed to address some current, as well as future needs at defensive back. I think these two guys will help us a great deal. Walt Williams is a good player and he is worth waiting for. He has a unique situation."

Crowton also said tight end Dan Van Sweden, who helped lead Northridge High School to a third straight 5A state championship, will be a welcome addition, along with Phillip Niu, who originally signed with Colorado State before serving a two-year Church mission.

And, as if one Payne wasn't enough, the Cougars added all-state kicker Mitch Payne, who is the younger brother of current BYU kicker/punter Matt Payne. Mitch averaged nearly 42 yards per punt and hit 11 field goals, including two 53-yarders during his senior campaign.

BYU HEAD COACH: GARY CROWTON

Entering his third season as the head coach at BYU, Gary Crowton is looking to put last season's 5-7 record behind him and focusing on getting back to his usual winning ways. In five seasons as a head coach, Crowton has posted a 38-17 (.691) career mark, including a 12-2 record in 2001 – his first season at BYU.

After his first year as head coach at BYU, Crowton constructed the nation's top-rated offense, and posted a 12-2 record, including 10 straight victories to start his BYU career. For his efforts, he was named the MWC Coach of the Year as the Cougars won their first-ever, outright MWC championship.

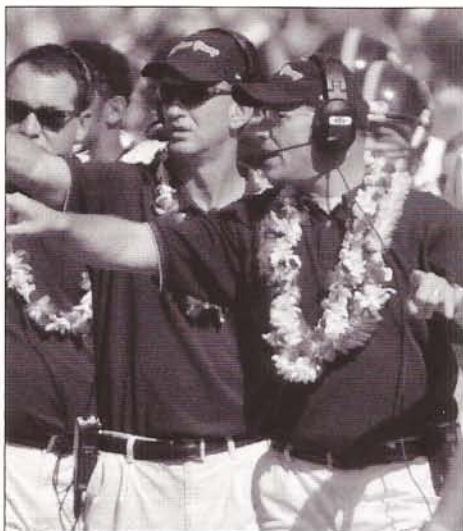
Crowton, the former offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears and previous head coach at Louisiana Tech, was introduced by Brigham Young University President Merrill J. Bateman in December, 2000 as the 13th head football coach at BYU.

Crowton, a native of Orem, Utah, took over a BYU program that had been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards. Edwards took over the program in 1972, coaching the Cougars to a 257-101-3 (.716) record over 29 seasons.

Crowton, 45, came to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to serving as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997.

"Gary is a very articulate, hard-working football coach and will do a great job," Edwards said. "He has an excellent understanding of the game. From the opportunities I have had to work with Gary, I've always known he had the potential to be a very good coach. Everyone he's worked with has given him a glowing report."

Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50-or-more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60-or-more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season.



Gary Crowton's powerful offense averaged an amazing 46.7 points per game and 543 yards per game to lead the nation in scoring and total offense in 2001.

Under Crowton, NFL first-round draft pick Troy Edwards recorded a Tech-record 280 receptions and 4,352 yards receiving. Over a span of 34 games, Crowton's offense at Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school record 4,943 yards passing.

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under Edwards at BYU. While at BYU, he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer, Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985.

From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois, where he directed the Leathernecks' passing game for a single season. In 1988, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, where the Wildcats were the top-rated passing team in the Yankee Conference from 1988-90.

In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterback coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton was an all-league quarterback at Orem High School before earning All-American honors at Snow College. Crowton transferred to Colorado State, where he finished his career. Following an LDS Church mission to South Korea, Crowton attended Idaho State, where he ran track for the Bengals. After returning to BYU in 1982, Crowton earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983.

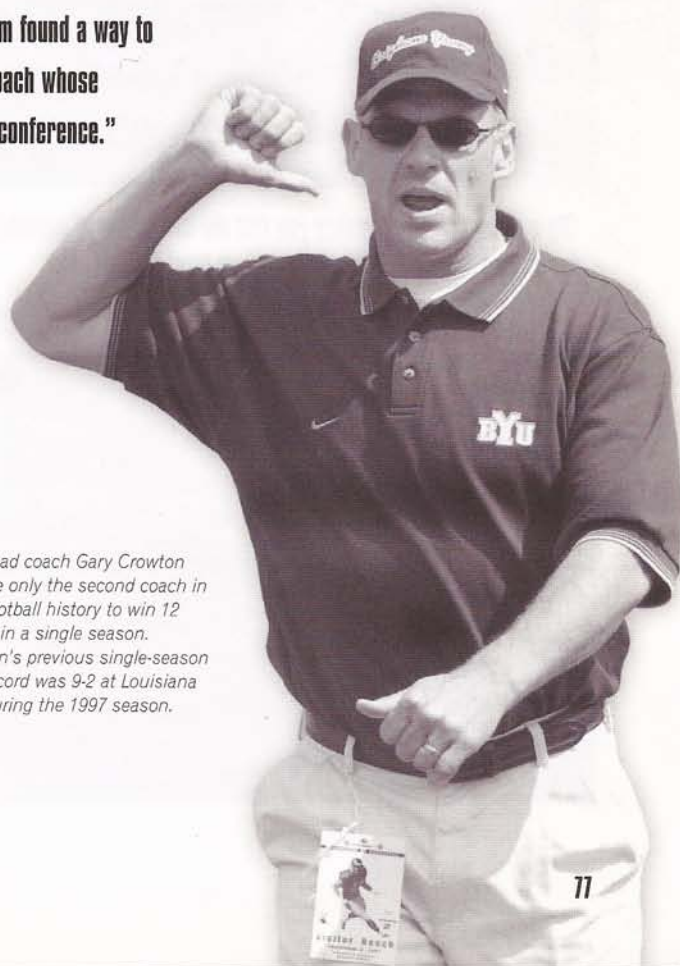
Crowton, who is the first-ever head football coach at BYU to serve an LDS Church mission, is married to the former Maren Peterson of Bountiful, Utah. The couple was married on August 3, 1985. The Crowtons have seven children, including Dane (15), Tara (14), Jenessa (11), Quinn (8), Mikauli (6) Toriana (2) and Macloud (infant).

"The most important things in my life are my family and my church," Crowton said.

"It is a great feeling to know no matter what happens on the field, I will always have my family to be there, and it's always a nice feeling to go home to my family."

"Talk all you want about inheriting great tradition. Crowton took over what was a very average bunch and turned it into a Top 10 team that leads the nation in scoring average and total offense. Even on off days (there were few), Crowton's team found a way to win and continue its magical run. He is a solid coach whose offense has just begun to show its power in this conference."

The fourth quarter is winding down. BYU has the ball, but Mississippi State has the lead as Luke Staley takes the hand-off and runs off-tackle right. The defense is expecting Staley to carry the ball and reacts to his every move. There's a linebacker waiting for him as he turns the corner at the line of scrimmage. The rest of the defense is closing in. With no where to go, Staley lowers his shoulder and meets the linebacker head on. They rise like two waves crashing against each other. For a split second it seems like a standstill, then the linebacker buckles and falls backwards as Staley plows ahead. Four yards later, after the defensive end and corner that he carried on his back are off of him, Staley picks himself up off the linebacker and jogs back to the huddle. Staley won the battle and BYU is four yards closer to winning the war.

In war, only the strong survive. While Head Coach Gary Crowton creates the battle plan, it's up to Jay Omer to make sure the troops are strong enough to carry it out. Brought on by Crowton shortly after the head coach's hiring, Omer brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to the Cougar training program that BYU's athletes and coaches have bought into.



2001 Doak Walker Award Winner Luke Staley and many others have maximized their athletic potential under the direction of head strength conditioning coach Jay Omer.

"I've had nothing but high praise from every athlete I've spoken to about Jay," said BYU athletic director Val Hale. "The athletes have responded to him and his program."

"It's the most excited and committed I've seen my players in the weight room since I've been here," said Cougar basketball coach Steve Cleveland.

"He's loyal, he cares and he works very hard," said Crowton. "His only concern is to see the players improve themselves, see the team get to it's potential and see us win games. That's it."

As director of strength and conditioning, Omer is responsible for the development and implementation of training programs for athletes in all of BYU's 21 intercollegiate sports. Conditioning encompasses all facets of physical performance. From speed and quickness, to cardiovascular endurance and brute strength, Omer creates programs designed to increase them all. Training programs are sport-specific and position-specific within each sport, allowing athletes to focus on what they need to succeed in their individual competitive endeavors.

In no sport is the need for strength more evident than in football. Each game, each play can be decided by who tires first. Week in and week out, players give and take a beating and are expected to come back for more of the same the next week. Less than a year after his arrival, Omer's subjects were seeing huge returns on their investment.

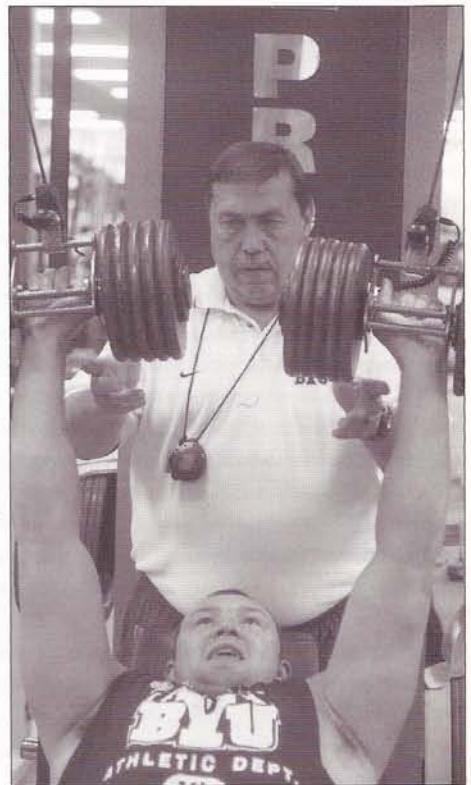
Most players had increased their personal lifts 15-25 percent. Mike Tanner, a linebacker who was bench-pressing 330 pounds when Omer arrived, was lifting 400 at summer's end.

Conditioning also increases the production of athletes as it helps to prevent injury. In 2000, the BYU football team was riddled with injuries as they went through four games over a 19-day period. Although football is a contact sport where injuries are common, proper conditioning can help to avoid major injuries and reduce the recovery time of minor injuries. An athlete in top condition tends to recover faster and be better able to withstand the rigors of physical activity.

Not only does the conditioning program improve each player as an individual, but it also improves the team as a whole.

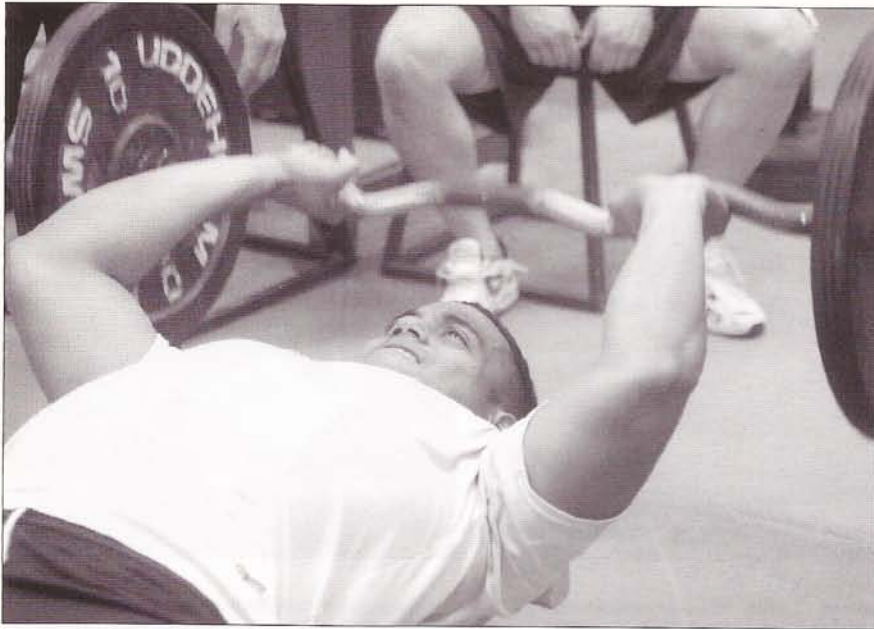
Working and sweating with each other in the weight room helps bring the players together. Seeing each person sacrifice and succeed in the off-season builds a camaraderie that carries over to the field as players work to make each other and the team better.

"He (Omer) has brought us a feeling of team chemistry, working out together and being accountable," said Teag Whiting, an offensive lineman.



"He's the most different kind of coach I've ever been around in my life. He gets you to do stuff. He never yells, he never berates you or is demeaning in any way. There's just a presence about him that gets you to do it. It's like he's a Vulcan or Yoda or something. You find yourself doing it, you find yourself pushing yourself and you don't know why. The results BYU players have realized have come from dedication and sacrifice. It's a time-consuming and often painful process in which athletes push themselves to higher levels of performance, and Omer is there to watch over them the whole time.

"The man is a sadist," said offensive guard Jason Scukanec, "[but] you find yourself doing it, you find yourself pushing yourself and you don't know why. You don't want to disappoint him because it means something to you and your teammates."

Each fall when the Cougars take the field, they carry with them the hopes of BYU fans across the nation. With each passing week and every win those hopes get bigger and weigh more on the players. Arriving at the gym before most people are out of bed and staying until long after most people have gone home for the night, Jay Omer takes those hopes very seriously. It's his job to make sure the players are strong enough to carry those hopes to one more victory, one more title, one more bowl.

The toughest challenges a BYU football player will face while in college may not line up across from him in a different color jersey. Splitting their time between the classroom, the weight room, the training room and the field can make academic success a more difficult challenge than any they will face on the field.

The BYU student athlete is not alone in his quest for academic excellence. As a team surrounds him in the field to help him reach another championship, a different team is in place to help him attain his academic goals.

E. J. Caffaro, brought on by Head Coach Gary Crowton shortly after his own arrival, is the new director of the Student Athlete Academic Center and is in charge of monitoring players' success in the classroom and their progress toward graduation. "Coach" is more than just a title for Caffaro as he earned the honorific outside of his current position. He has coached football and basketball for the past 15 years at Snow College and Ricks College before coming to BYU.

"Coach Crowton wanted someone in this position that had been a coach previously," said Caffaro. "A coach can better understand the players, what they go through day to day and how to deal with them."

Caffaro is assisted by Academic Coach Jim Hamblin, another former football coach. Both serve as mentors to the players and are active participants in their academic careers from the time they arrive.

"We talk schedules with the freshmen and try to get them in to certain classes to help get them acclimated to the

workload," said Caffaro. "We want to emphasize good structure and support in their academics."

As mentors, they monitor players' progress from registration through finals. They have access to players' grades and, should signs of problems arise, they try to solve them before they become serious. Tutors are available through the Student Athlete Center at any time yet the athlete must take the initiative to arrange it. Should an athlete's GPA fall below 2.5, Caffaro and the other mentors will take a more active role in that athlete's academics by placing the athlete on study table.

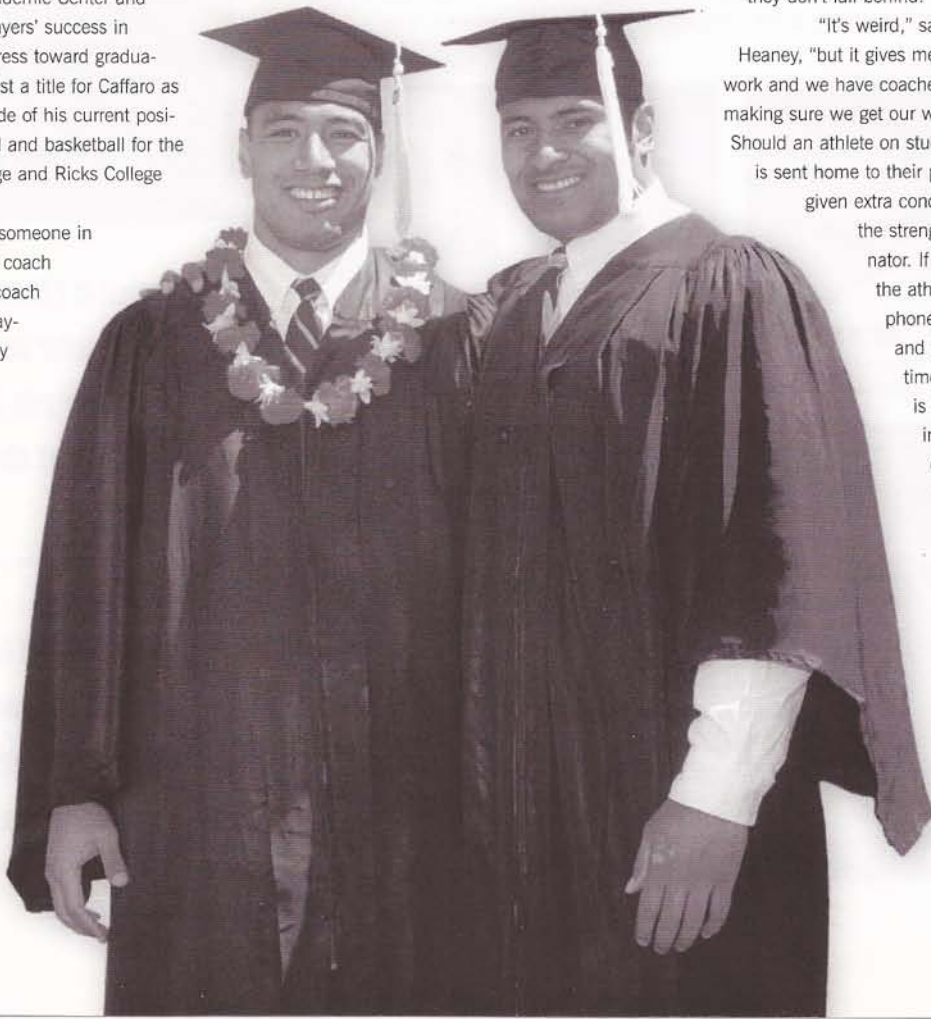
Once on the study table program, an athlete will be under a rigorous system of checks and balances to insure that they are getting their class work taken care of. Caffaro and the other mentors take it upon themselves to arrange tutors for athletes on study table and follow up with the tutors to make sure the work is getting done.

Each Monday morning, all study table athletes meet at 7 a.m. to plan their week, giving time for classes, workouts, team meetings and homework. It also requires athletes to attend study hall between four to six hours a week. In addition, runners are sent to classes to make sure the athletes are attending so they don't fall behind.

"It's weird," said defensive back Brandon Heaney, "but it gives me a set time to do my homework and we have coaches in there watching and making sure we get our work done."

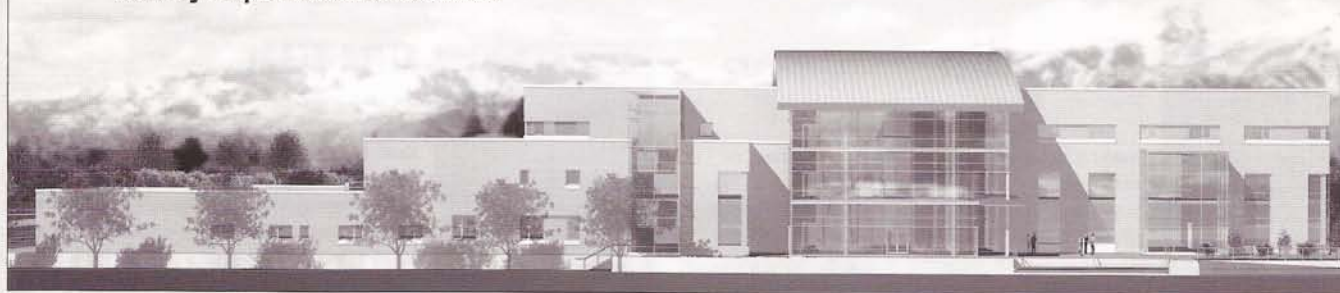
Should an athlete on study table miss a class, a letter is sent home to their parents while the athlete is given extra conditioning time with Jay Omer, the strength and conditioning coordinator. If a second class is missed, the athlete's parents will receive a phone call from the football office and the athlete is given more time with Omer. If a third class is missed, the athlete is called in for a private interview with coach Crowton where they will discuss the athlete's future at BYU.

Although many find it "weird" they also find it a strong motivation to get

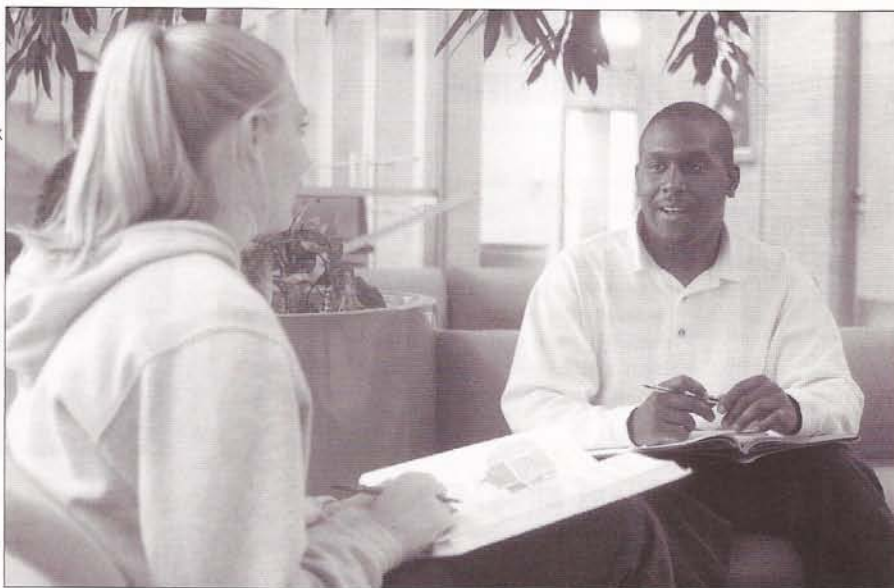
their academics in order. Half of the athletes on study table make their way off it after just one semester. Helping them get there is coach Caffaro.

"Coach Caffaro sincerely cares about each of us and is willing to do anything to help us succeed," said starting cornerback Jemaro Gilford.

The success of the study table program can be seen in the team GPA, which has gone up steadily each semester since it was started. At the end of fall semester 2001, the team GPA was nearing 3.0.

Looking at a list of graduating seniors also demonstrates BYU's commitment to academic excellence and the graduation of its players. Sixteen of 23 seniors from BYU's 2001-2002 squad will have graduated by April, 2002 in fields such as accounting, communications, economics, finance, health sciences, history, management and psychology.

The future will see BYU's student athletes reach new levels of success as work has begun on a new Academic Center for student athletes—BYU's Student Athlete Center (Opens Nov. 2003).



BYU's name resonates from east to west, thanks in no small part to the efforts of more than 600 student-athletes competing at the highest levels. This success, however, isn't limited to the field of play. During the 2000-2001 academic year, BYU student-athletes earned a cumulative grade point average of 2.95. A total of 163 student-athletes were named Academic All-Conference and 17 were named Academic All-America.



JIM HAMBLIN

Former BYU graduate assistant football coach Jim Hamblin joined the Student Athlete Academic Center staff in fall 2002 as academic coach for the football team. BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of more than 110,000 situated 4,500 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. Surrounded by mountains, Provo is at the heart of Utah Valley with a combined population of more than 377,000. Utah Valley is framed by the 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west and 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east.

OUTSTANDING STUDENT BODY

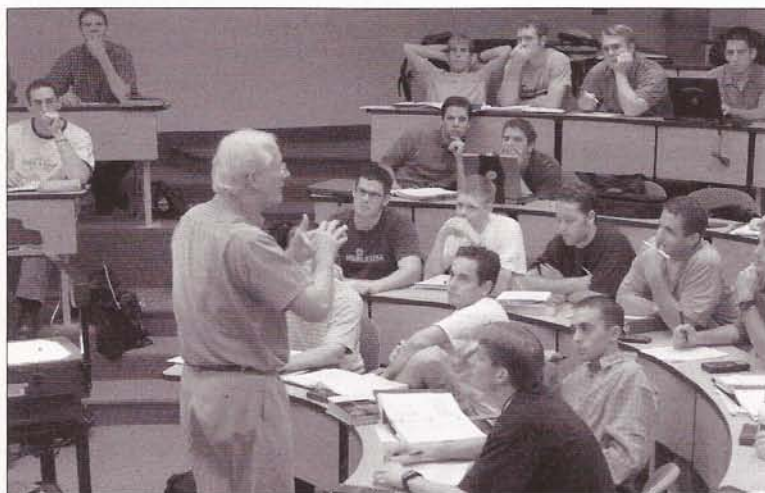
BYU students arrive with superb preparation. The entering class has an average high school GPA of 3.76 (on a 4.0 scale) and an average ACT score that ranks in the 89th percentile nationally. The university consistently places in the top 20 for enrollment of National Merit Scholars. In addition to their academic excellence, students bring and share high values and ideals. Students come to BYU from all 50 states and more than 130 countries, bringing many international cultures and experiences to the campus.

Nearly half of these scholars have lived outside the United States, and three-fourths are fluent in at least two languages. INTERNATIONAL CENTER OF LEARNING

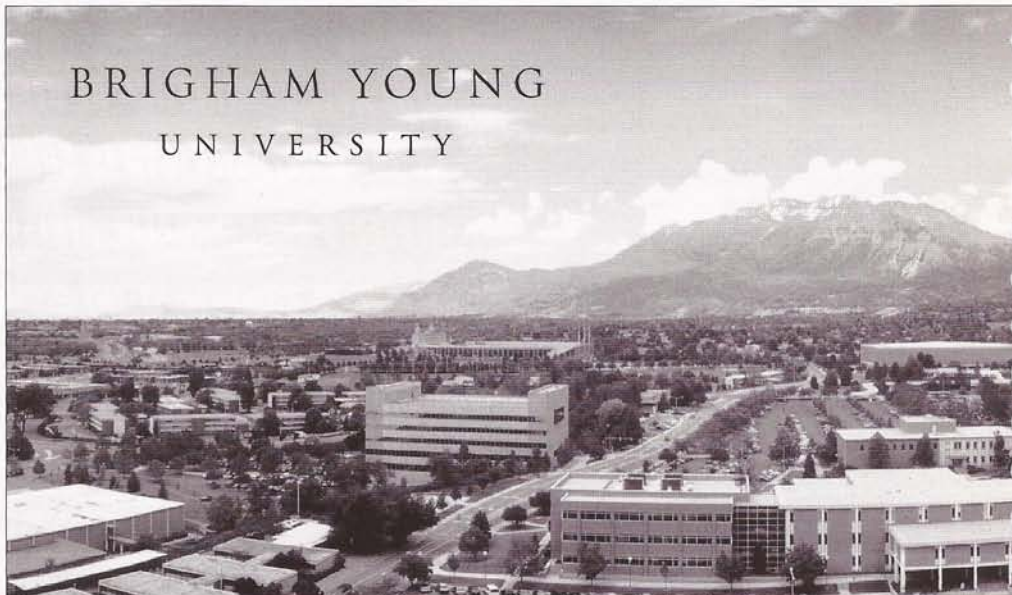

NATIONAL RANKINGS AND RECOGNITION

U.S. News and World Report gave BYU high marks in several categories in its 2002 "America's Best Colleges" issue, ranking BYU in the second tier in the category of "Best National Universities," 30th in the "Great Schools at Great Prices" among national universities with doctoral programs and among the top 10 with the least student-incurred debt.

In U.S. News and World Report's "Best Graduate Schools" issue, BYU's Marriott School of Management ranked 29th in the nation, while in the "America's Best Colleges" issue the School's business program ranked 38th. In The Wall Street Journal's 2002 ranking of top business schools worldwide, BYU's business school moved from 41st to 38th. When U. S. News and World Report ranked national graduate programs in March 2002, the J. Reuben Clark Law School was ranked 37th among the top 50 law schools in the nation.

BYU College of Nursing graduates are consistently among the top 10 percent in the country with student pass rate in the National Council Licensure Examination to become registered nurses, according to the NCLEX Report. Six BYU students were recently awarded scholarship money by the National Science Foundation. According to NSF, BYU ranks 29th out of more than 2,000 universities in the number of graduate students who go on to receive science and engineering doctorates.

TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANTAGE: BYU'S "WIRED" CAMPUS

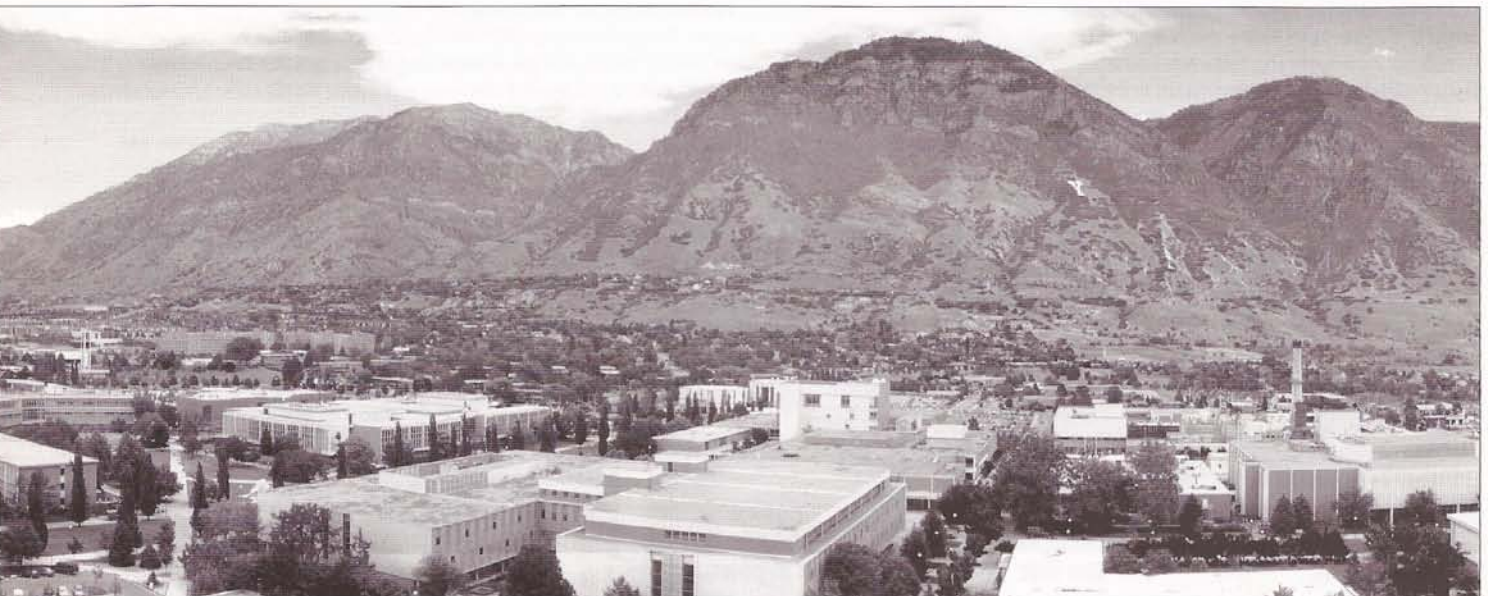
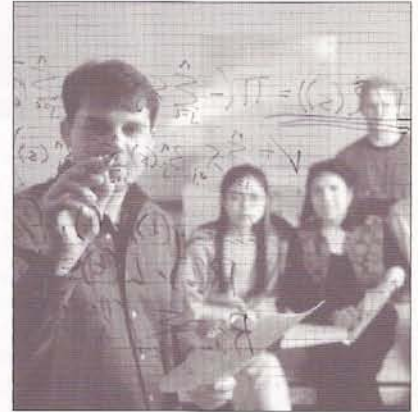
Ranked among the top 50 of Yahoo! Internet Life's "America's Most Wired Colleges," BYU has 100 percent of its dorms and 60 percent of its classrooms wired for the Internet. BYU students have access to a wide range of technology products, services and support through the use of on-campus Ethernet connections and Technology Enhanced Classrooms (TEC Rooms). The law and business schools require students to own laptops. Prospective and current students have access to electronic application for admission, on-line transcripts, registration, and course schedules. BYU's supercomputing facility houses four supercomputers with a total of 460 processors, 456 gigabytes of memory and 22 terabytes of hard disk storage space. About 90 faculty members and 250 students using the supercomputers can process in days what would have previously taken a year. Funded by the university and donors, BYU's supercomputers are available at no cost to students and faculty members campus wide for projects such as 3-D visualization, molecular modeling, linguistics modeling, satellite visualization and medical imaging. The university also has a million-dollar virtual reality theater to enhance the output of much of the work done on supercomputers.

HONOR CODE

BYU exists to provide a university education in an atmosphere consistent with the principles of the Church of Jesus Christ. This environment is preserved through adherence to a code of conduct called the Honor Code that reflects those ideals.

Initiated by students in 1949, the Honor Code emphasizes being honest, living a chaste and virtuous life, abstaining from alcohol and tobacco, using clean language and other values encompassed in the doctrines of the Church. The code is supplemented by additional guidelines on dress, grooming and housing. Students and faculty are attracted by the opportunity to study and work among those who share their faith and standards. In a survey of BYU alumni, 74 percent cited their desire to "obtain a spiritual, religiously based education" as a very important or extremely important factor in their decision to attend BYU.

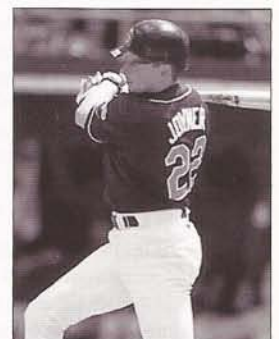

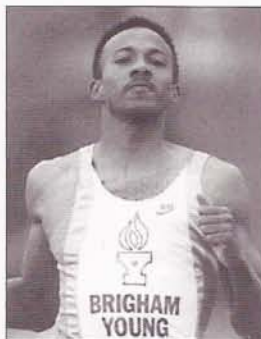

MISSIONARIES

BYU is owned and operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. The program follows the biblical pattern of sending out missionaries two by two.

Currently, approximately 61,000 Latter-day Saints are serving proselytizing missions around the world. Approximately 75 percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. Yet substantial numbers of single women (18 percent) and older couples (7 percent) also serve proselytizing missions. These missionaries serve for two years

(men) or 18 months (women and couples), teaching the restored gospel and its ordinances and engaging in community service.

The missionaries or their families donate money to the Church equal to the average cost of a missionary's expenses. After their missions, missionaries return to schooling, vocations or family.

CHURCH BELIEFS

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With more than 11 mil-

lion members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is Christian but is neither Catholic nor Protestant. Rather, it is a restoration of the original church established by Jesus Christ.

The Book of Mormon: Another Testament of Jesus Christ is regarded as divinely inspired scripture, as is the Holy Bible. Both volumes are used by Latter-day Saints side by side. For more information on the beliefs of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, visit www.mormon.org.

In November 2003 BYU Football will move into its new home in BYU's new Student Athlete Center. This new complex will give BYU some of the best athletic facilities in the nation

"We have known for a long time that in order to maintain and continue our athletic success, we must provide the very best resources and facilities for our student-athletes. BYU's new athletic complex will achieve that objective," BYU's former President Merrill J. Bateman said.

Every detail was taken into consideration with this center. For example, the film room is built with a stadium seating structure, and the first two rows will have "extra-large" seats for linemen.

The weight room is two stories and has windows built all around to provide a view of the practice field. The locker room, patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles' is 75 yards long. There is a rehabilitation room, and three whirlpools will adorn the complex. There will be a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the off-season and a special office for NFL scouts.

Speaking of the new restaurant in the Student Athlete Center, Legends, BYU Men's Athletics Director Val Hale said.

"It will have the feel of a sports bar with lots of seating and plenty of huge plasma televisions," said Hale. "It will be the new hangout in Provo, where fans can come and enjoy the restaurant," Hale said.

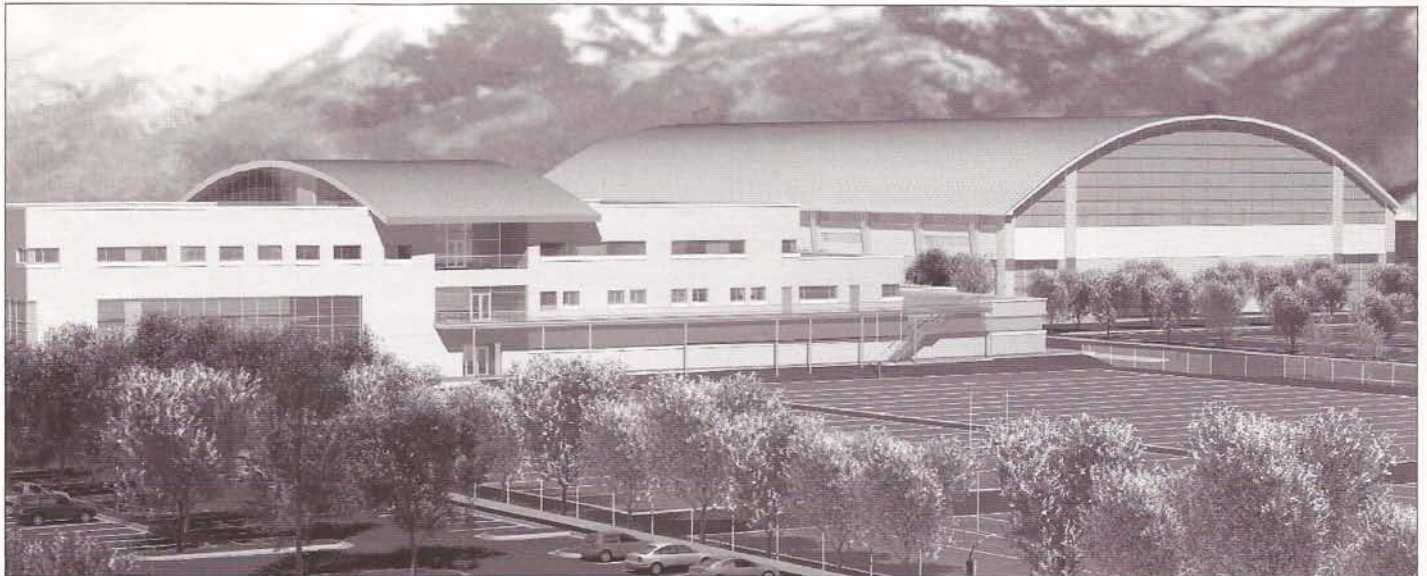
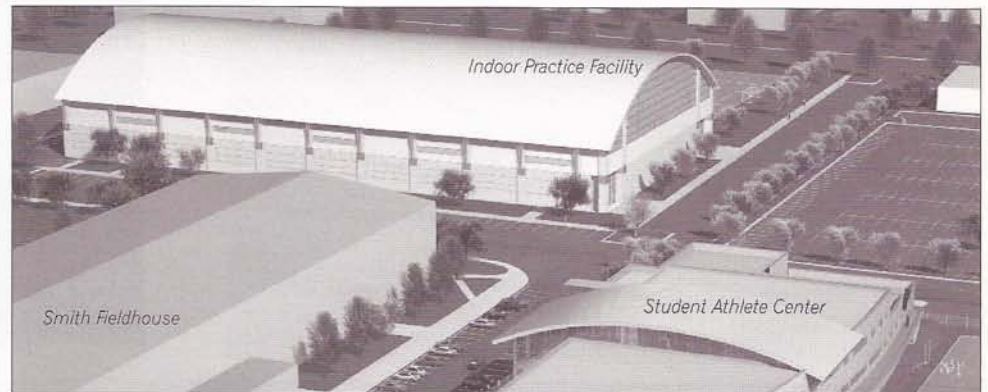

The indoor practice facility features a FieldTurf playing surface that is approximately 420 feet wide by 220 feet deep.

The roof at its highest point inside is 93 feet, sloping to 55 feet on the ends. There are four video platforms located 40 feet above the playing surface.

AT 106,000 SQUARE FEET, THE INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY IS BIG ENOUGH TO HOUSE TWO 747 JET AIRLINERS SIDE-BY-SIDE. IT IS 422 FEET LONG, 222 FEET WIDE AND 93 FEET HIGH AT ITS APEX OF THE CURVED-STEEL ROOF.

BYU's new Indoor Practice Facility will be among the best and the biggest in the nation. The Indoor Practice Facility is tall enough that it already serves as a Provo landmark. It will hold two artificial turf fields — a 50-yard field that will run east-west and another 50-yard field that will run north-south.

"The Student-Athlete Center and the Indoor Practice Facility will be second to none in helping students achieve excellence in academics and athletics," said BYU head football coach Gary Crowton. "In addition, these two facilities will serve as a valuable recruiting tool. We promised last year's recruiting class, which was one of the school's best ever, that we would have the facility built soon. That had a significant impact on our ability to sign several of the players. I believe this complex will allow our program to continue to recruit at the highest level."

UPGRADED BYU FOOTBALL LOCKER ROOM

In the past few years, the BYU football program has experienced some major changes - new colors, new uniforms, new coaches, a new offense and now new lockers. The LaVell Edwards Stadium home locker room recently had 84 new hardwood oak lockers installed. The new lockers replaced the old ones that had been there since 1982, when the stadium was renovated.

"The installation of the lockers is being funded primarily by former football players," said Val Hale, BYU men's athletics director. "This is something we have done to let the former players help contribute to the program."

In the new lockers, a plaque will be placed with the team logo, the jersey number of the player using the locker that year and the saying "Worn by Champions - Wear it with Pride." Also, a list of names of those who have worn that particular number in the past and have contributed money to the new lockers will appear on the plaque.

"One of the real benefits of this is that it bonds the past to the present," Hale said. "Every time a player puts on his jersey from now on, he will think of the players from the past who have worn that number. There is an affinity between them because they have worn the same number."

Hale said the idea for the new lockers came from head coach Gary Crowton.

"Gary did this at Louisiana Tech when he was head coach," Hale said. "They were able to generate enough money from former player contributions to not only fund the project, but also put some towards the football program."

Mick Hill, BYU football equipment manager for the last 20 years, said new lockers have been needed for a long time.

"The old lockers were not even really lockers," Hill said. "They were more like open stalls with dividers between them. There was really no place to put anything."

The new lockers are bigger and have a footlocker in which players will be able to store their belongings and will also serve as the player's seat. Adorning the walls of the locker room are pictures of past All-conference and All-

American players. The room also features a big screen T.V. and lounging area.

"We want the locker room to be something nice," Hale said. "We want it to be something where coaches and players can go and prepare for the games."

So far, more than 120 former players have contributed to the lockers, Hale said.

"Each time we send out a letter to the former players, we get a large group to contribute," he said. "Eventually, I would love to see every player donate. It is neat to see them want to help out."

PICTURE PERFECT

With its 64,000-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 25 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.

THE FIELD


The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

THE EARLY YEARS

BYU football hasn't always had the luxury of Cougar Stadium. When BYU began its football program in 1896, pasture lands and city parks were the playing fields. In the early 1900s, a rocky field was cleared and a grandstand erected where the Joseph Smith Building now stands. In 1928, the next Cougar playing field was built where the Stephen L. Richards Building now stands. By using the hillside for seating, the spectator accommodation was increased from a few hundred to five thousand. As BYU football increased in popularity, the university was forced to find yet another location for a new stadium. Groundbreaking for the current Cougar Stadium commenced in October 1963. The initial seating capacity was set at 28,812 but soon increased to 35,000.

LAST EXPANSION

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships). The stadium expansions increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reportedly "the largest gathering ever in Utah history" at the time.

PRESS BOX

In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding press box working area." The Cougar Stadium press box has been named the "Provo Marriott" by the media who cover BYU football. Rising over 10 stories high, the four-level press box is located on the west side of the stadium and runs the entire length of the stands. Levels one and two of the press box contain 42 private loges, each equipped with 12 padded chairs, a television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, sink and game programs. The BYU President's box, which includes 163 padded chairs, five television sets and a buffet area, is also located on the first floor. Level three is reserved for the print and electronic media along with all the game operators. The statistics, public address, sound and scoreboard controls are all located on the third level. Altogether, approximately 300 people work on the third level during games. Level four is primarily used for television game filming.

VIDEO SCOREBOARD

In 1996, a 23 x 31 foot video scoreboard wall, showing both live action and instant replays, was added above the stands by the south end zone. A new animation board and sound system was also added to the scoreboard above the north stands.

OTHER EVENTS

Besides the regular season football games, Cougar Stadium is also used for a variety of other purposes. Music concerts have been hosted there as well as the annual "Stadium of Fire," the July 4th Spectacular held as part of America's Freedom Festival. High school playoff games and "the Rocky Mountain Band Competition" are also held on the field every year.

COUGAR ROOM

The BYU Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room is located in Cougar Stadium. The room is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meet-

ings and banquets during the year. In addition to the many office areas, Cougar Stadium stores campus surplus furniture and maintenance vehicles.

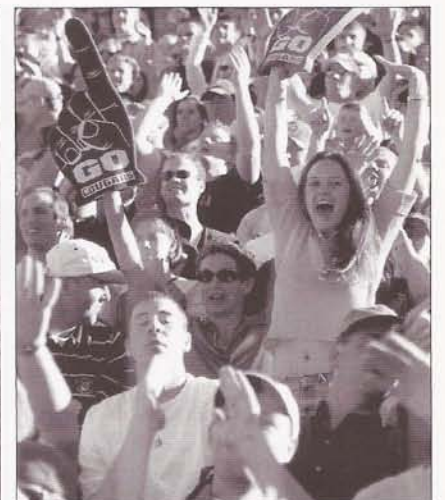

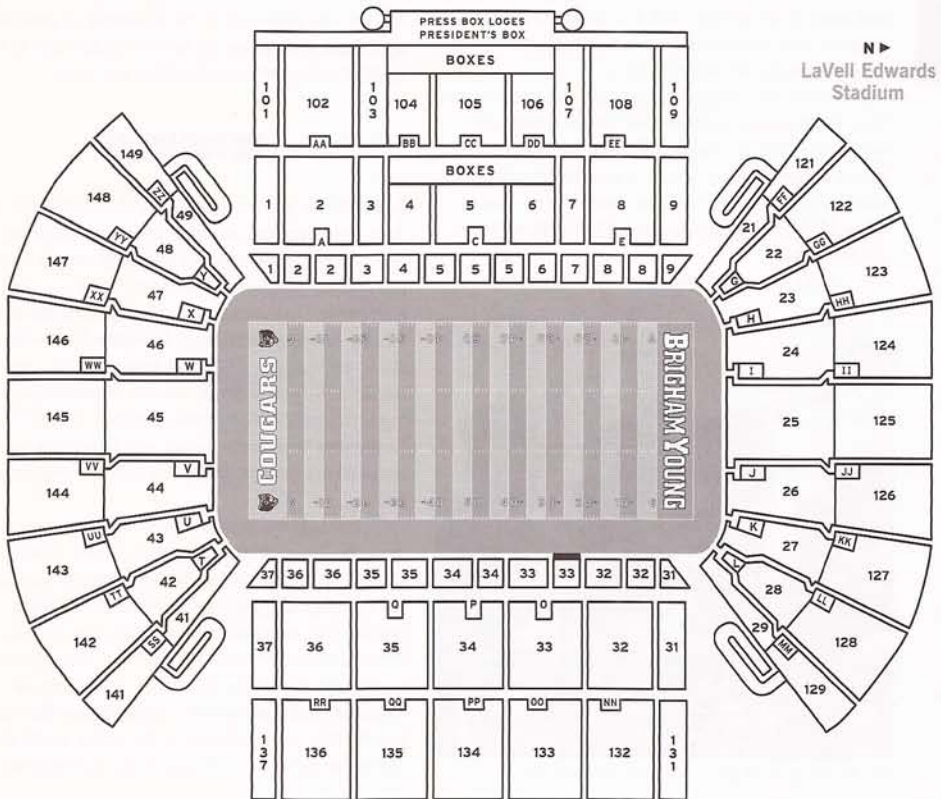

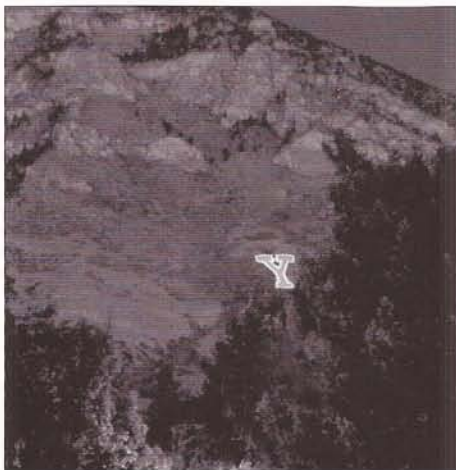

Y MOUNTAIN

Preparations for placing the initials BYU on the mountainside began in April of 1906 when president George H. Brimhall commissioned surveyors for the letters "B," "Y" and "U." The letter "Y" was first laid out to insure that the initials were properly centered on the mountain. Beginning in the early morning, students formed a line that zigzagged up the mountain. Standing eight feet apart, each student would carry a load up to the next and then return for another.

The project, which many expected to be completed by 10 a.m., lasted until 4 p.m. and only the "Y" was covered. After such a laborious day of work, plans to fill in the other two letters were scrapped. Covered with a thin layer of lime powder, the letter was in need of constant repair. Hoping to make it more permanent, a layer

of rock was added in 1907. The next year, 20,000 pounds of sand and cement were carried up the mountain to form a three-foot high wall around the letter to hold it together. Several years later the letter underwent a facelift as the blocks, or serifs, were added to it to give it its current appearance.

A nationally recognized symbol of BYU, Y Mountain is a featured shot of almost every Cougar game broadcast on television. Located about half a mile east of campus and halfway up the mountain, the "Y" looks out over the valley and is one of its most prominent features.

BYU MARCHING BAND

The ground shakes beneath them as 225 players in blue and white storm the field at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The crowd cheers them on as they demonstrate the talents they've practiced throughout the week to get ready for the game. It's the "Power of the Wasatch"—not the football team, the BYU marching band.

An essential piece of the pageantry, tradition and atmosphere of BYU athletics, the BYU marching band takes its name from the stretch of Rocky Mountains that provides the beautiful backdrop for BYU's campus. The music of BYU's band has echoed off those mountains since 1908 when it first took the field under the direction of Robert Sauer, composer of the famous tune "When It's Springtime in the Rockies." The band has since evolved into the precision spectacle it is today.

The success of BYU's football team has allowed the marching band to gain national exposure. Playing at least at every home game and two away games each year, the "Power of the Wasatch" is almost guaranteed another performance as they've accompanied the Cougars to 19 bowl appearances in the past 23 years.

COSMO

The cougar, chosen as BYU's mascot by former coach Eugene L. Roberts in the early 1920s, has undergone a tremendous evolution since its inception to become what is now known as the feline phenomenon of Cosmo the Cougar. Beginning in 1924 when BYU purchased a pair of cougar cubs for 50 cents each to excite BYU fans at athletic events, live cougars prowled the sidelines of BYU games on a regular basis through the late 40s and on special occasions through the 60s.

The original cubs were housed on the south side of campus until 1929 when they managed to break out of their cage, kill two dogs and began stalking livestock on nearby farms. Both were recaptured later the same day. Three weeks later, one cougar died and the other was taken to the old Salt Lake Zoo. BYU procured its mascots from nearby zoos and local bounty hunters but never owned its own cougars again.

Cosmo the Cougar, the brainchild of pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson, made his first official appearance before BYU fans on October 15, 1953. At a cost of 73 dollars for the costume, Daniel T. Gallego, Stevenson's roommate, became the first man under the fur. The name given the big cat was derived from BYU's diverse student body.

"BYU was a very international, cosmopolitan

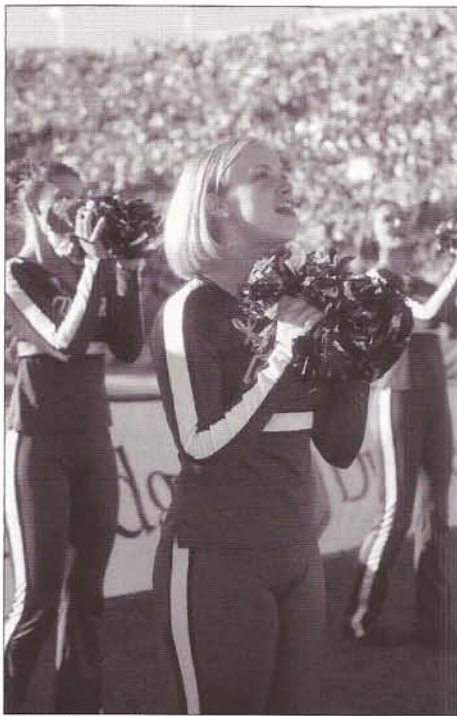
school and that is where we got the name Cosmo," said Gallego.

Nearing a half-century of service to the BYU community, Cosmo has become an icon of Cougar sports to fans and foes across the country. Through Cosmo's Kids Club and Cosmo's Corner, he is helping raise another generation of BYU fans. Prowling the sidelines for the Cougars, his antics add to the experience of game day at BYU. Cosmo brings out the best of Cougar spirit in fans at athletic competitions both home and away.

THE COUGARETTES

One of BYU's lesser-known jewels, the Cougarettes are more than a sideline attraction at football games and other athletic events. Named one of the top 25 dance teams in the nation by Dance Spirit Magazine, the Cougarettes have earned national respect on the dance floor by claiming the National Collegiate Dance Team title in 1997, 1998, 1999 and again in 2001. They missed a five-year reign as national champions by a mere .02 points, placing them second in 2000. The Cougarettes have been credited with raising the level of competitive collegiate dance to a new and respected level.

Much to the relief of dance teams at other colleges, the Cougarettes opted out of national competition in 2002, choosing instead to perform at the Salt Lake City Olympics in front of an international audience. Beginning in early November of 2002, the dancers endured months of three-and four-hour practice sessions to get ready for the Olympic games where they performed at almost every major indoor and outdoor venue. Despite their hectic schedule in the weeks before and during the Olympics, national competition organizers

were still asking the Cougarettes to reconsider.

"The directors wanted us there," said Jodi Maxfield, a former Cougarette who now works as artistic director for the Cougarettes, "but told us that we made a lot of teams really happy by not showing up."

Established in 1946, the Cougarettes became a part of BYU's athletic tradition in 2000 when they began working with the cheer squad at football and basketball games to enhance the overall game-day experience at BYU. Each year, more than 100 girls try out for this elite team of entertainers. Once pared down to 16 dancers, give or take one or two, the Cougarettes tackle a rigorous practice regimen that not only consists of choreographing their routines but also includes strength and flexibility training to prepare them for their performances at games, concerts and other special presentations.

An exciting and talented part of the pageantry that surrounds BYU's athletic success, the Cougarettes have reached an unprecedented level of achievement in their own field and are more than happy to bring their talents to the playing field for the Cougars.

THE BEEHIVE BOOT

First instituted in 1971, the Beehive Boot is the symbol of gridiron supremacy in the state of Utah. The idea for the rotating trophy originated with Dave Shulthess, former Sports Information Director (SID) of BYU, and was agreed upon by SIDs from Utah, Utah State and Weber State. As the trophy would represent dominance within the confines of the Beehive State, it was decided that the trophy should be symbolic of the people Utah was built by—the Mormon pioneers.

Finding a suitable pioneer boot for use as a trophy proved to be a difficult task. As pioneers wore their boots until there simply wasn't much left of them, there weren't many pioneer boots lying around. After an arduous search that included numerous personal calls and radio announcements, Tom Beasley, an antique dealer

living in Cache Valley donated a pair of boots for use as the trophy. Estimated to be 100 or more years old, the Beehive Boot is an authentic piece of Utah History.

Awarded to the team with the best record against in-state opponents, the Beehive Boot lived its first four years at Utah State University. BYU then began a dominant run as it ascended into the realms of football's elite, claiming the Boot 19 times in the past 27 years. Utah and Utah State are tied for second having won the boot six times each. The longest streak in the history of the Beehive Boot is a five-year span from 1983 to 1987 by BYU. After a two-year stint in Provo, the Boot currently resides in Salt Lake. The Cougar look to bring it back home this season.

If Utah's teams should end the season with identical records against in-state opponents, a winner is chosen by vote of the in-state media who covered the

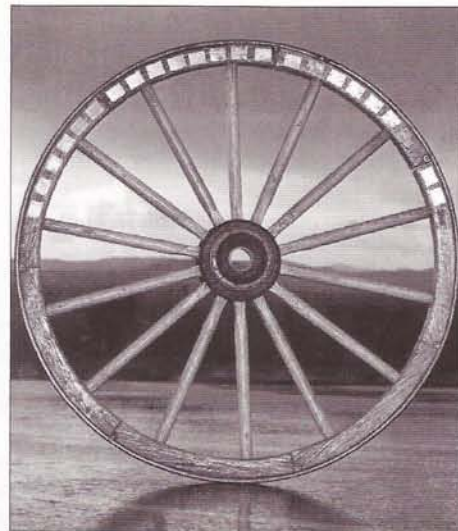
schools' games. This situation has occurred twice in the history of the boot (1973 and 1997) and Utah State was given the trophy each time.

The trophy became a memorial to Steve Smilanich, a former sports writer for United Press International, in 1979. A native Utahan, Smilanich was killed in an automobile accident in New York City in 1970. Prior to his death, he was the national college sports editor and assistant sports editor for UPI.

THE OLD WAGON WHEEL

The Latter-day Saints crossed the plains in the mid 1800's, many of them atop covered wagons that rolled creakily across the dry grass. Today a wagon's wheel continues to travel to and from Provo. It doesn't carry people; it carries the pride of the Cougar and Aggie faithful.

The Old Wagon Wheel became a part of the BYU-Utah State rivalry in 1948. Awarded by the Blue Key fraternities of the two schools, the Aggies took it home for the first year after 20-7 defeat of the Cougars. Since 1948, the wheel has covered many a mile between the two schools as their rivalry has grown.

Although Utah State dominated the early years of the wheel's existence, taking 18 of the first 27 victories where the wheel was at stake, the tables have been turned in recent decades as the BYU football team has taken its place among college football's elite. The series now stands 30-21 in favor of the Cougars.

Winning the wheel on the field is only a small part of the battle between the two schools. Although not practiced anymore, the more entertaining tradition surrounding the wheel is its theft. In years past, the losing school has often sought to reclaim the trophy through less than legal means. Despite being done in the "all in good fun" spirit, this tradition has had its share of problems. The wheel has disappeared for years at a time after being taken by parties with no affiliation to either school.

The Wheel currently resides in the Marriott Center at BYU where the Cougars are working to make it a permanent resident.

COUGAR FIGHT SONG

Penned in 1932 by Clyde D. Sandgren, "The Cougar Song" is the anthem of BYU sports. Sung after each touchdown and field goal at football games, its words can frequently be heard ringing out across Utah Valley on Saturday afternoons in the fall. Traditionally, fans remain seated through the verse and then stand, chant and shout through the chorus. Carried by 64,000 voices "The Cougar Song" can be an intimidating musical number to an opposing team as LaVell Edwards Stadium thunders to its tune.

Although written and composed in 1932, the song was not copyrighted and presented to the University until 1947. In addition to "The Cougar Song" Sandgren wrote and composed "The Old 'Y' Bell" which was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower that housed the Victory Bell before it was moved its current location outside the Marriott Center.

A 1937 graduate of BYU, Sandgren went on to obtain a law degree from St. John's University. He then became a partner of the New York law firm Burroughs and Brown until 1947 when he decided to return to his native Provo to establish his own law practice. Sandgren later served as general counsel and vice president of BYU. Although he passed away in 1989, Sandgren's memory lives on through the voices of Cougar fans across the nation.

THE VICTORY BELL

The original Y bell traveled across the plains with the early pioneers of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was used to call meetings among the saints and to announce any deaths in the community. Donated to the Brigham Young Academy in 1875, it was used to begin and dismiss classes until it was destroyed in a fire in 1884. The Academy went without a bell for the next 28 years, using instead a variety of instruments as a class bell.

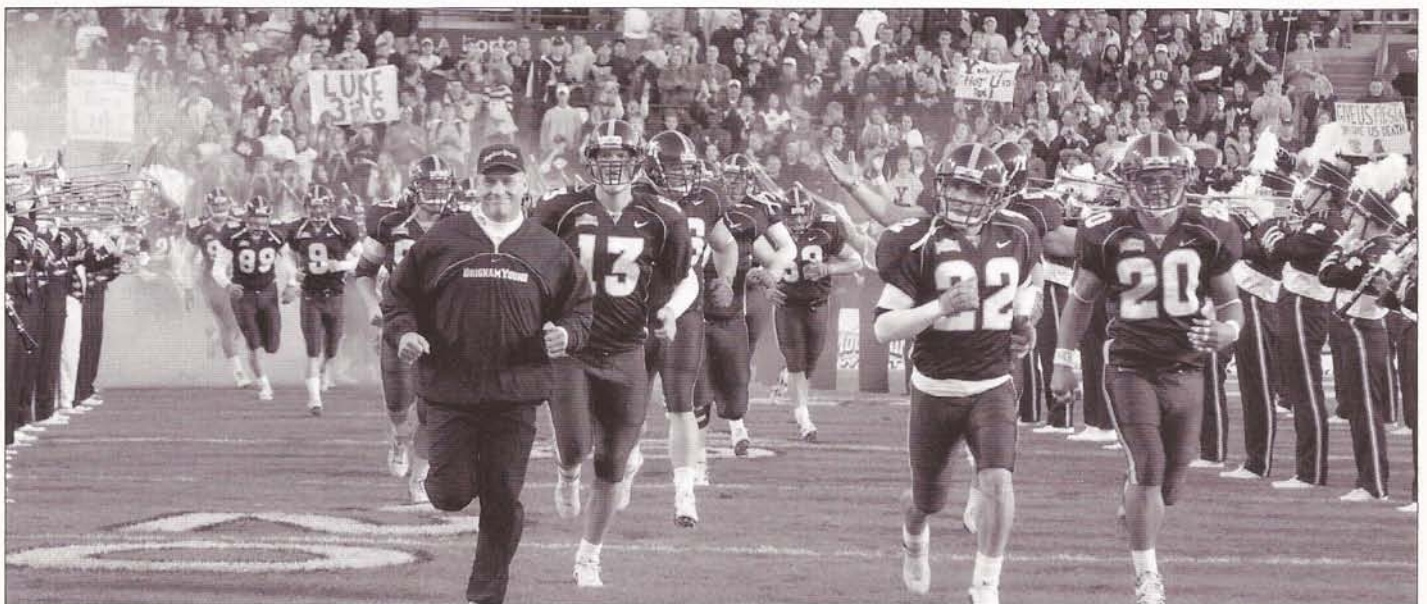
Rung after each BYU victory, the bell was quieted in 1949 after a basketball win over rival Utah. Several overzealous students climbed the tower and vigorously beat upon the bell until it cracked. Repaired with a bronze patch in 1954 by Frank Hemingway, the bell was removed from the education building and mounted on a trailer so it could travel with BYU's teams to away games.

Its mobility proved its downfall as it was stolen in 1958 to be found six months later in a Springville field. The theft prompted the construction of a bell tower on BYU's upper-campus overlooking the Smith Fieldhouse.

Dedicated in 1959, the tower served well until 1973 when the bell fell while ringing in the dedication of the Marriott Center. The supporting yoke above the bell was broken and the bell shattered. The bell was soon repaired by Ray Mortenson of the BYU Maintenance shop using electric welding—miraculously maintaining its previous tone—and was remounted in the tower.

In 1978, the bell was moved to its current home on the southwest corner of the Marriott Center. The open arch tower was designed by BYU landscape architect Boyd Dawler and is made of the same cast stone as the exterior pillars of the Marriott Center. Although the old bell tower above the Smith Fieldhouse no longer stands, the massive steel I-beams that supported the tower have now been converted into the strongest park benches in the Intermountain West.

Over the years the ringing of the bell has come to represent honor, achievement and spirit, and has inspired several poems and songs from BYU faculty and alumni. Clyde D. Sandgren, who composed the Cougar Fight Song, penned a verse that was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower. As BYU victories have become more and more commonplace in recent decades, the ringing of the "Y bell" after each win has renamed it the "Victory Bell."





In 1995, a group of former BYU athletes met in Provo to pursue the dream of uniting their colleagues into an organization dedicated to preserving the camaraderie they enjoyed as varsity athletes.

Rondo Fehlberg, Athletic Director at BYU from 1994 through 1999, shared his vision of what a Varsity Club could be with Gifford Nielsen, former BYU All-America, Dick Felt, Football Coach, and selected coaches and athletes. Their efforts were organized by Rex Pugmire of the Alumni Association with the establishment of a governing board, by laws and club objectives. They also hoped to create a vehicle for giving something meaningful back to BYU.

Out of this dream was born the BYU Varsity Club. In the summer of 1999, the Varsity Club became a Friendship Arm of the Cougar Club, operating under the auspices of the Athletic Department.

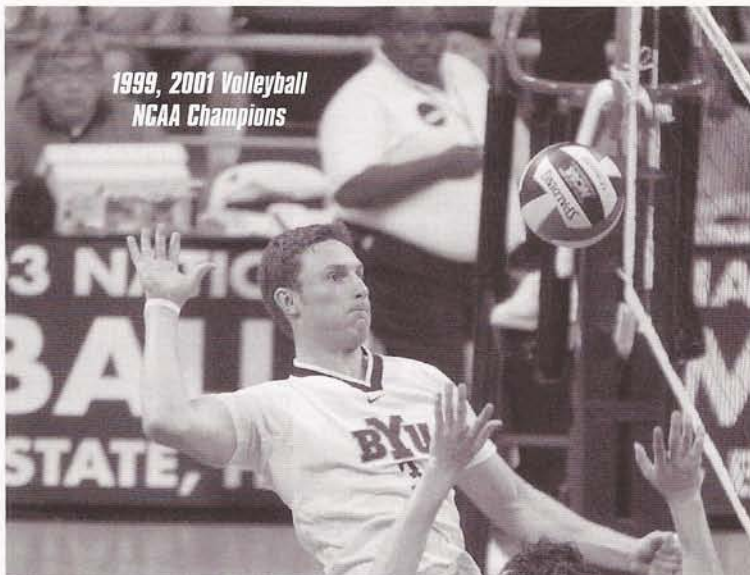

PRIDE OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

In the four-year history of the MWC, the Cougars have won 45 of 76 conference championships—nearly 60 percent of all championships awarded by the conference. In 2000-2001, BYU won all but three conference championships (16 of 19). From 1962 to 1999, BYU dominated the Western Athletic Conference, winning more championships than any other WAC School. In fact, during the last three decades, the Cougars won 60 percent of the WAC Championships—more than all other conference competitors combined. Included in these team titles, BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983. In 2002-2003, eight BYU teams claimed MWC Championships and four teams claimed regular-season titles.



Kip Kangogo was the 2003 MWC Indoor Champion in the Mile and the 3,000-Meter Run, the 2003 MWC Indoor Track Outstanding Male Performer and 2002 MWC Cross Country Champion.



Travis Hansen led BYU to its second MWC basketball title in three years and its second NCAA appearance in three years as well. Hansen was drafted by the Atlanta Hawks in the 2003 NBA draft.



Sophomore Kassi Andersen turned in the third fastest women's steeplechase time in U.S. history (9:44.95), and eclipsed BYU's Michaela Manova's 2002 NCAA Meet record by a second to claim the national title.



BYU's men's volleyball team was a couple kills short of claiming its third national championship since 1999 as the Cougars fell in five games at the NCCA championship match in 2003.



An amazing slugger, junior outfielder Oli Keohohou was named NFCA First-team All-American for the third consecutive season in 2003.



The women's soccer team won its fourth straight conference championship, qualifying for the NCAA Tournament for the sixth consecutive season. 2001 MWC tournament MVP Lydia Ojuka returns to lead the Cougars in 2003.



BYU's women's basketball played in its fourth consecutive MWC Championship game and earned its second consecutive NCAA berth. In 2002, the Cougars advanced to the Sweet 16.



For the fourth consecutive year BYU's men's and women's swimming and diving teams earned MWC Championships while the men's team finished 22nd at the NCAA Championships in 2003.

A mountain biker's dream come true, Moab is paradise for fat-tire bikers. Just a three-hour drive from Provo, Moab is an old mining town that neighbors Arches National Park, one of six national parks and seven national monuments within a half-day drive from Provo. Ascending to higher elevations, clear mountain streams and rushing rivers wash through green landscapes and deep forests. The numerous canyons surrounding Utah Valley are full of mountain springs, lakes and waterfalls.

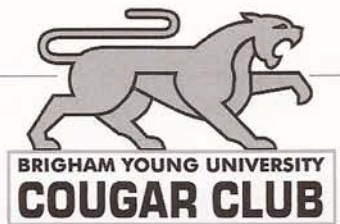
With a population over 350,000 people, Utah County offers all the conveniences of a major metropolitan community. Just 40 minutes south of Salt Lake City, host of the 2002 Winter Olympics, Provo also offers various recreational activities. Known for its incredible skiing and central location to 15 national parks and monuments, Utah County attracts visitors from around the world.

The Utah Valley metropolitan communities of Provo and Orem are home to a growing high-tech mecca, including the world headquarters for many computer and technology corporations. The Provo/Orem area boasts one of the highest standards of living in the country and has been rated by several experts as one of the top areas to

live in the United States. In a 2001 FBI report, the Provo/Orem metropolitan area had the second lowest violent crime rate in the nation. Utah Valley is an excellent educational environment with high-quality health care, a below average crime rate and rich cultural and recreational opportunities for its citizens. In fact, in May 2003 *Forbes* rated Provo as the sixth best city in the country for businesses and careers. The Utah Valley area has also been ranked among the top 20 places to live in the nation (according to *Money Magazine*) for the past five years. In September 1991, the magazine rated the area no. 1 on its list of the top 300 places in the nation to live. *Fortune* magazine also considers to be the "third high-tech cluster in the U.S."

The Sundance Institute located in Provo Canyon offers locals and visitors an opportunity to experience some of the region's artistic culture. Every year, some 20,000 people attend Robert Redford's Sundance Film Festival. Several films that premiered at the festival have been the recipients of Oscar, Emmy and International Film Festival awards. Sundance offers year-round activities that can be enjoyed by everyone, including its ski resort, summer outdoor theater, fine dining and shopping.

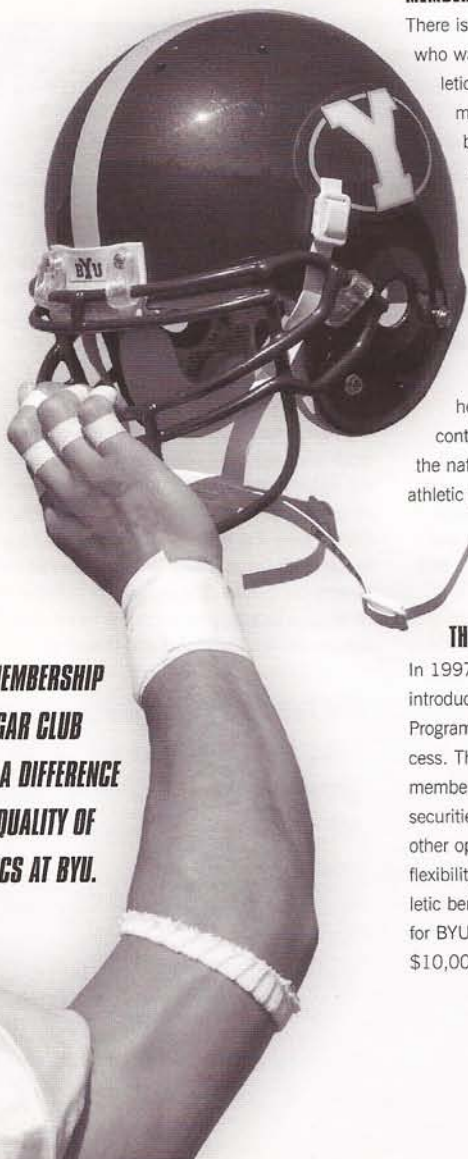
Utah Valley is a major gateway to six national parks, seven National Monuments, two National Recreational areas, six National Forests and 44 State Parks.

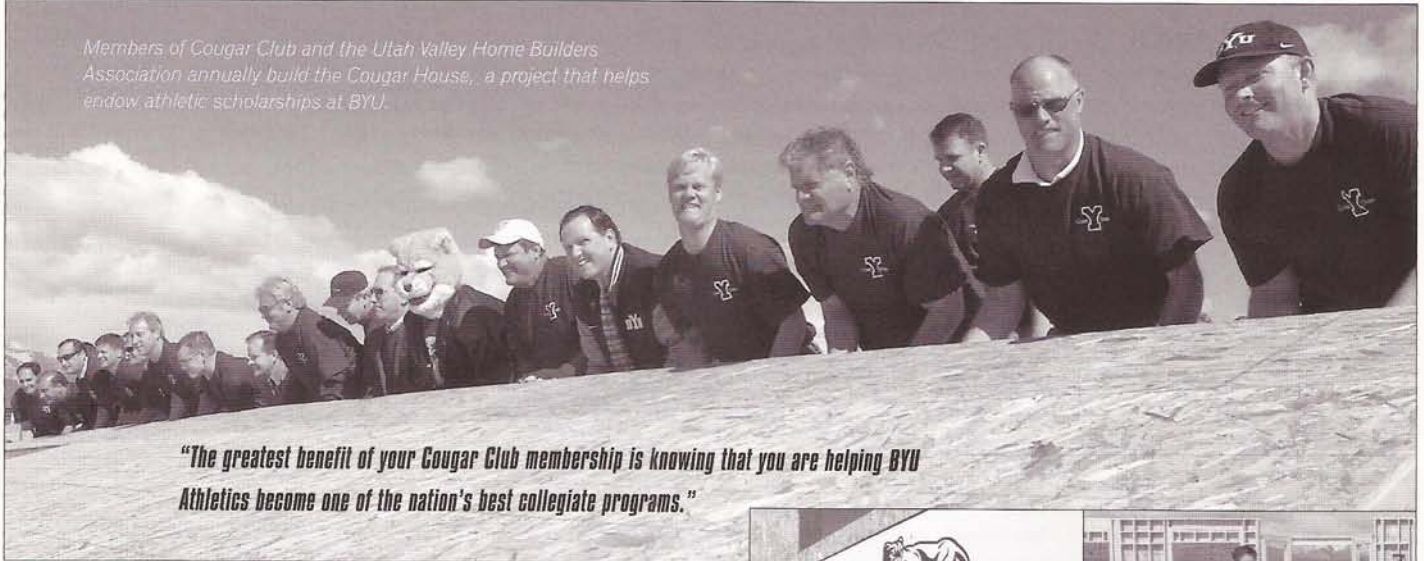

BYU athletic hall of fame

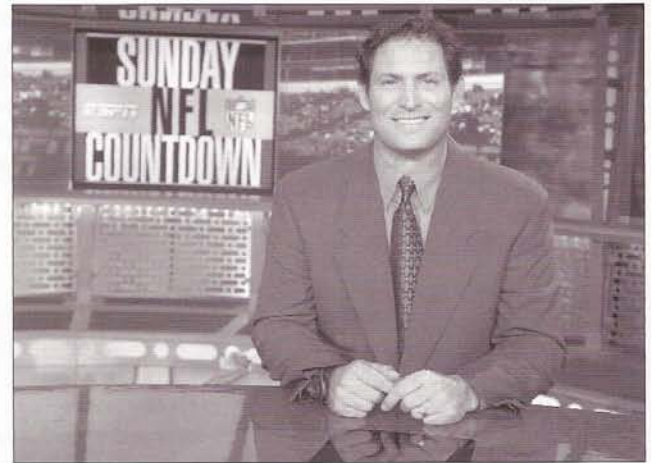

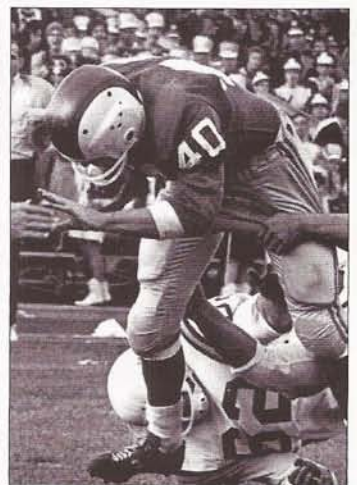

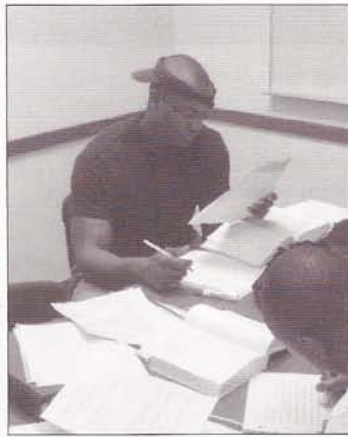

student athlete academic center

BYU student-athletes are seeking to excel academically, athletically, and are preparing for life after they graduate. The transition into university life can be challenging for any student. This is especially true for student-athletes who are expected to be good students and outstanding athletes. They are also under obligation to understand and comply with a variety of NCAA rules and regulations in order to be eligible to compete. The Student Athlete Academic Center was created to provide a place where student-athletes can receive support and resources as they pursue their goals.



One of the main priorities of the center is to assist student-athletes as they transition into the BYU culture and the world of college athletics. Student-athletes are assigned an academic advisor to help them register for classes and monitor their progress toward graduation. The advisor is the contact person for student-athletes who have academic or eligibility questions and concerns. The advisor also helps student-athletes make connections with other campus resources such as the Counseling and Career Center, Multicultural Student Services, University Accessibility Center, and College Advisement Centers.

ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

The main focus of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to help student-athletes graduate on time. To achieve this goal, academic advisement is provided to all student-athletes. Advisors are available to help students-athletes register for classes, monitor athletic eligibility, secure tutorial help, and provide on-going support and encouragement. The academic advisors assist student-athletes by having them set weekly and semester goals, teaching them time management and academic success strategies, and helping them communicate effectively with their professors. Advisors also assist the coaching staff in monitoring the day-to-day progress of student-athletes who struggle academically.

TUTORING

Personal tutors are provided for athletes through the Student Athlete Academic Center with funds made available by the Cougar Club. Tutors are hired to tutor multiple subjects. To obtain a tutor, student-athletes may contact their academic advisor.

MENTORS

Mentors are available for any student-athlete through the Student Athlete Center. Incoming freshmen will be assigned a mentor for their first semester. Mentors are

most often fifth-year student-athletes or graduate students. Mentors provide time management help, study skills, test taking tips, help adjusting to college, etc. To obtain a mentor, see the academic advisor assigned to your team.

COMPUTER LABS AND LAPTOP COMPUTERS

The computer lab is located in the Student Athlete Academic Center and is an Access Point Lab available for all students. Athletes can utilize the computers for research and writing papers. E-mailing and surfing the Internet is not considered legitimate study hall time, but is permissible when not in study hall. Laptop computers are

available on a first-come first-serve basis. The computers are equipped with the basic word processing programs: Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. Internet is not accessible on these computers. Computers can be checked out before away games and should be checked in upon the athletes return.

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The BYU Athletics Department is an active participant in the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The services provided by the Student Athlete Center target each of the five commitments of the CHAMPS/Life Skills program.

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A primary goal of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to ensure that every student-athlete graduates with a bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study. To achieve this goal, the Center provides a team advisor as part of the comprehensive academic support program. Each athlete has regular visits with his/her team advisor who assists with registration and monitors progress toward graduation. Tutoring is also available for every student-athlete. The Student Athlete Academic Center is conveniently located in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and will be moving into the new Student Athlete Center upon its completion in November 2003.

COMMITMENT TO ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The Student Athlete Center employs a sport psychologist to provide performance enhancement interventions for BYU teams, coaches and student-athletes. These interventions include: increasing awareness for sport performance, goal-setting, arousal regulation through relaxation and energizing techniques, imagery training, confidence building through self-talk strategies, developing pre-competition plans, concentration (focusing) training and team-building interventions. The overall objective of these types of interventions is to assist individual student-athletes and athletic teams to perform at consistently high levels. Personal counseling is also available through the sport psychologist as needed.



lege athletics into the world of work. These services are available through individual consultation, workshops, computer programs and University courses. Career exploration and career transition classes are highly recommended to all student-athletes. Internship and employment opportunities are also made available through the Career Network, which is made up of Varsity Club and Cougar Club members.

COMMITMENT TO SERVICE

A vital part of Brigham Young University's involvement in the CHAMPS/Life Skills program includes a commitment to service. The CHAMPS program supports the philosophy that all student-athletes have inherit talents that allow them to excel in athletics and in life. Athletes provide valuable role models and have many unique opportunities to serve their campus and surrounding communities. The Student Athlete Academic Center coordinates service opportunities networking with schools, churches, and community events. Many requests for service projects are received throughout the year. Student-athletes are expected to be involved in at least three hours of community service per semester. Student-athletes enjoy the opportunity to be involved in serving and find these opportunities fun and rewarding.

Cecil O. Samuelson began his work as the 12th president of Brigham Young University on May 1, 2003.

Dr. Samuelson is a Salt Lake City native who has served at the University of Utah as professor of medicine, dean of the School of Medicine and vice president of health sciences. Prior to his call as a full-time General Authority of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he was senior vice president of Intermountain Health Care. He holds a bachelor of science degree, a master's degree in educational psychology and a medical degree from the University of Utah.

He fulfilled his residency and held a fellowship in rheumatic and genetic diseases at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, North Carolina. He has received numerous scholastic honors and is the author or co-author of 48 original publications, eight books or chapters of books and 13 abstracts. He also has served as a director, officer, or member of several national medical and hospital organizations.

Dr. Samuelson was called in 1994 to serve the Church of Jesus Christ as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy. At the time of his assignment to BYU, he was a member of the Presidency of the Seventy. He has served the Church also as a regional representative, stake president, stake high councilor, branch president and missionary. He has served as president of two areas of the Church, the Utah North Area and the Europe North Area.

He and his wife, Sharon Giauque Samuelson, have five children and three grandchildren. Formal investiture of President Samuelson is scheduled for September 9, 2003.

VAL HALE
Director of Men's Athletics

In his fourth year as BYU's athletic director, Val Hale has overseen one of the most aggressive building and fund-raising efforts in the school's history. The most recent projects he has supervised are the long-awaited Indoor Practice Facility and the Student Athlete Academic Center (ready for occupancy later this fall), the new Club Seats at Edwards Stadium and an improved golf practice facility at Riverside Country Club. Three years ago, BYU opened Miller Park, a show-case facility for the baseball and softball teams.

Prior to his appointment in 1999, Hale served ten years as an associate athletic director for external affairs. He had the responsibility of overseeing the athletic media relations operation and promotional/marketing efforts.

Hale has been assistant director of BYU Development, where he supervised and managed fund-raising efforts in several clubs. He was promotions and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982-87.

Hale has been active in church and civic responsibilities. He recently completed a term as president of the Utah Chapter of the National Football Foundation and the College Hall of Fame, Inc., and was a founding board member of the Utah Tipoff Club. In addition, he serves on the executive committee of the Utah Sports Commission. Hale is chair of the NCAA men's golf committee.

Hale was an all-region football player and all-state track athlete at Orem (Utah) High School. He played one year of junior varsity football at BYU in 1975 before serving an LDS Church mission to Chile from 1976-78. Hale was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981. He received his M.A. degree from BYU in communications in 1987. He married the former Nancy Allred, and they have three children: Chris, Brandon and Rachel. Chris is a wide receiver on the BYU football team.



ELAINE MICHAELIS
Director of Women's Athletics

Elaine Michaelis enters her ninth year overseeing BYU's 11 women's intercollegiate sports as director of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics. Consistently ranked among the top 10 women's programs in the country, BYU's women's teams won four Mountain West Conference titles last year while four placed second and two finished third. Six teams advanced to NCAA play, with cross country achieving its fourth national championship in the last six years.

In May 2002, Michaelis retired as BYU's women's volleyball coach after 40 years at the helm. She retired as the all-time leader in victories among female coaches in collegiate volleyball at any level (887-225-5 record in 33 seasons since records were kept in 1969) and ranks second overall in all-time Division I women's volleyball wins. Michaelis never suffered a losing season after completing her 28th consecutive 20-win campaign last year. Her teams qualified for 30 of the 33 national tournaments, including 20 of 21 NCAA tournaments, and claimed 23 conference titles.

An eight-time conference coach of the year, Michaelis was also honored with numerous national and regional awards, including the 2002 United States Olympic Committee National Coach of the Year - Volleyball, 2001 USA Volleyball All-Time Great Coach Award, 1996 AVCA Founders Award, 1996 NCAA District 7 Coach of the Year, 1993 U.S. Volleyball Award and 1987 Tachikara Northwest Region Division I Coach of the Year. She was inducted into the Utah Summer Games Hall of Fame in 1987 and the Hall of Fame of the Utah Network for Women and Girls in Sport in 1990. In 1993, she was one of three honorees of the Salt Lake City Old Time Coaches Association and was the 1994 recipient of the Dale Rex Memorial Award.

Michaelis also coached basketball, softball and field hockey at BYU and served as director of the women's intramural and extramural programs for 10 years. She has been part of BYU's women's athletics program since she was a student participating in volleyball, basketball and softball from 1956-60. She earned a B.S. degree and an M.S. degree from BYU and holds the rank of associate professor of physical education and full athletic professional.

2003 OPPONENTS



In the four-year history of the Mountain West Conference, the Cougars have won 45 of 76 conference championships. That's nearly 60 percent of all championships awarded in the eight-member conference.

"We're grateful our teams have performed so well, but frankly, we expect each of them to win the conference championship every year. When we don't win, we're very disappointed. It's a source of pride. We expect to win, and we truly believe we can."

The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — met in Denver and decided to form the MWC.

The cornerstone of the conference's formation was the maintenance of long standing athletic rivalries among its member institutions. Hence the Mountain West Conference was formed. Located in Colorado Springs, Colo., when the MWC's doors opened for business the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN giving the broadcaster exclusive national television rights to MWC football and men's basketball; and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl.

The Conference officially began operations on July 1, 1999. Prior to opening its doors an executive committee was established and named Craig Thompson commissioner. Thompson had less than one-year to name the new league, settle on a city to serve as the league's headquarters, find a television partner, arrange for bowl tie-ins, hire staff, and develop a logo.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful geography in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the unparalleled Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,000 feet) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West), the balmy weather and Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State and the southwestern flavor of New Mexico.

IN THE BEGINNING

BYU claimed half of the conference championships awarded in the league's first year in 1999-2000. The Cougars won nine of the 18 conference championships, shared in the football and women's soccer titles, owned the regular-season volleyball title and finished 18th in the final Sears Director Cup standings.

The BYU women's cross country team also captured the MWC's first national championship.

Utah, BYU and Colorado State tied for the first MWC football championship and all three were invited to bowl games. Utah claimed the league's first bowl victory, defeating WAC co-champion Fresno

State (17-16) in the Las Vegas Bowl. Colorado State played Southern Mississippi in the Liberty Bowl and BYU played Marshall in the Motor City Bowl.

The league saw three football teams compete in bowl games, four men's and four women's basketball teams play in the postseason, and a total of 22 teams receive at-large invitations to NCAA championships, including five of the eight men's golf programs. Individual honors also abounded for Mountain West institutions as 60 student-athletes earned All-America status and two individuals won national titles.

Off the field the Mountain West Conference was granted automatic qualification to NCAA championship tournaments for its league champions beginning with the 2000-01 season. At the conclusion of the Board of Directors meetings, the MWC announced its acceptance of an invitation to participate in discussions related to the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) for the next six years.

THE 2000-01 SEASON

BYU claimed 16 of the 18 MWC championships (men's cross country, women's cross country, women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's swimming and diving, women's swimming and diving, men's

indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field, men's basketball, men's tennis, women's tennis, men's golf, softball, baseball, men's outdoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field). The Cougars finished the season ranked 17th in the final Sears Directors Cup standings.

The league's football success continued at the professional level as former student-athletes Mike Anderson (Utah) and Brian Urlacher (New Mexico) earned NFL Offensive and Defensive Rookie of the Year honors, respectively, for the 2000 season.

In basketball the MWC qualified 9 of 15 eligible teams for post-season play. Four of seven eligible men's teams advanced into the post-season (BYU-NCAA, Utah-NIT, Wyoming-NIT, New Mexico-NIT) and five of eight women's teams (Colorado State-NCAA, Utah-NCAA, New Mexico-WNIT, BYU-WNIT, UNLV-WNIT), with New Mexico losing in the finals of the WNIT.

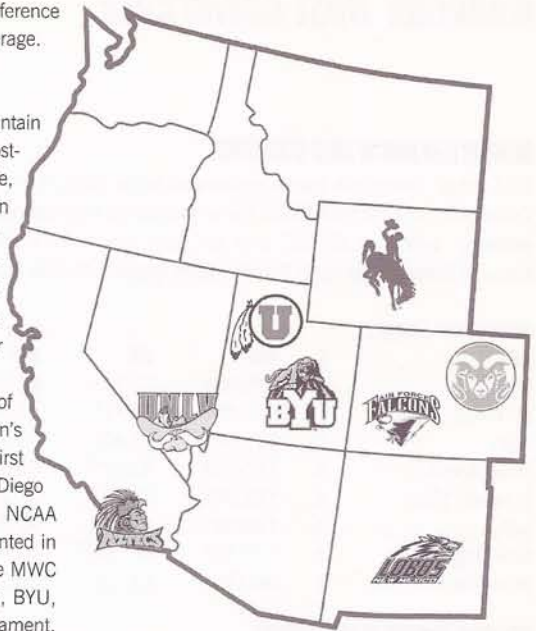
The MWC sent 31 teams and 30 individuals on to NCAA post-season action. Thirty-eight student-athletes from member institutions were named first-team All-America. Mountain West Conference student-athletes Scott Becker (Air Force) and Jared Lee (BYU) claimed two of the six Division I-A postgraduate scholarships presented by the National Football Foundation

and College Hall of Fame. A total of 594 student-athletes were All-Academic Mountain West Conference for maintaining a 3.0 or better grade point average.

THE 2001-02 SEASON

For the third consecutive season the Mountain West Conference sent three football teams to post-season bowl games. In winning the MWC title, BYU became the first team to go undefeated in conference play. The Cougars finished the season with a 12-2 mark and a Top 25 final ranking. BYU's Luke Staley became the conference's second consensus All-America and the first national award winner, claiming the Doak Walker Award as the country's top running back.

The Mountain West Conference was one of two conferences to send 75 percent of its men's basketball teams to post-season play. For the first time in conference history three teams (San Diego State, Wyoming, Utah) played in the NCAA Tournament. The conference was also represented in the NIT with UNLV, BYU and New Mexico. The MWC sent half of its women's teams (Colorado State, BYU, UNLV and New Mexico) to the NCAA Tournament, with BYU advancing to the Sweet 16.



The BYU women's cross country team added another National Championship to the conference trophy case with its second title in three years.

Again this season the Mountain West Conference was well represented at NCAA Championship competition, sending 37 teams and 75 individuals to compete for national titles. The MWC saw 62 of its student-athletes garner All-America distinction, including 36 first-team honorees. Academically, 814 student-athletes were Academic All-Mountain West and Utah's Teren Jameson and Shannon Bowles were named Male and Female Student-Athletes of the Year. The NCAA also awarded postgraduate scholarships to Jameson (Utah), John Hedengren (BYU) and Nina Puikkonen (BYU).

THE 2002-03 SEASON

For the second consecutive year the Mountain West sent three-quarters of its men's basketball teams into post-season play, the only conference to do so for two straight years. It also marked the second year the league sent three teams to the NCAA Championship Tournament (Colorado State, BYU, Utah). On the women's side, the MWC also sent three teams to NAAs (New Mexico, BYU, Utah), with New Mexico advancing to the Sweet 16.

The BYU women's cross country program claimed its third NCAA title in four years. For the fourth straight year five of the eight men's golf teams were selected to participate in NCAA regional competition, with New Mexico, San Diego State and UNLV advancing to the finals.

Including its automatic qualifications in 10 of its 19 championship sports, the MWC sent 29 teams to NCAA Championship competition, and for the first time received additional at-large berths in women's soccer and women's tennis. Individually, 107 Mountain West student-athletes received invitations to NAAs, with the men's tennis doubles team of San Diego State's Oliver Maiberger and Ryan Redondo, advancing to the national finals.

COUGARS LEAD MWC IN HOME ATTENDANCE

BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all four years of the league's existence, averaging 62,107 fans per game since the 1999 season. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-seven crowds.

MWC ATTENDANCE

Mountain West member institutions combined to set a conference home attendance record in 2002, surpassing the 1.5 million mark for the first time in the league's four-year history (1,544,788). The figure does not include the 72,898 that attended the Wyoming/Tennessee game in Nashville, although the game technically counted as a Wyoming home game.

BOWL SUPPORT

Since partnering with the Mountain West Conference prior to the start of the 1999 season, the Las Vegas Bowl has set attendance records three of the four years. This year's figure of 30,324 ranks as the second-highest all-time. The bowl set attendance records in 2001 (30,894), 2000 (29,113) and 1999 (28,227). The AXA Liberty Bowl has enjoyed six consecutive years of attendance over 50,000.

BOWL RECORD

For the fourth consecutive season the MWC sent three teams to bowl games. Since 1999, the Mountain West has gone 6-6 in the post-season. Its .500 win percentage is tied for fifth with the SEC among the 11 Division I-A conferences since the formation of the MWC. Six of the eight member institutions have represented the league in bowl games.

In the ever-changing world of intercollegiate athletics, Craig Thompson is poised to make sure the Mountain West Conference assumes its proper place within the Division I-A ranks. As the MWC embarks on its fifth season of athletic competition, Thompson enters his sixth year as the league's commissioner. There is no more important issue facing the Mountain West than gaining unconditional access to college football's lucrative Bowl Championship Series. Thompson is determined to use all available resources to make inroads in the current BCS structure and give the MWC its rightful place at the BCS table when the current contract expires.

The Mountain West Conference continues to gain notoriety. Through its first four seasons, the MWC has participated in 12 bowl games. Six of the conference's eight teams have made bowl trips. The Mountain West was the only conference playing multiple bowl games in the 2000 season to go undefeated, as MWC teams posted a 3-0 mark.

Prior to his current role, Thompson served as the commissioner of the Sun Belt Conference for nearly 12 years and as the only commissioner of the American South Conference prior to the unprecedented merger of the two leagues in 1991.

Thompson continues to be active on the national level in intercollegiate athletics, holding many prestigious NCAA posts. He currently serves on the Men's Basketball Issues Committee. In June 1995, Thompson was selected to serve on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and was appointed Chair of the committee in July 1999. During his career, Thompson has served as a member of the Executive Committee and the Director's Cup Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), as well as the governing NCAA Council and various Council subcommittees.

MOUNTAIN WEST BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Mountain West Conference has multi-year agreements with three postseason football bowl games (Liberty Bowl, Las Vegas Bowl and San Francisco Bowl). The 2003 campaign will mark the MWC's fifth season of competition.

The MWC had previously extended its relationships with the AXA Liberty Bowl and the Las Vegas Bowl, and last season signed a new agreement with the San Francisco Bowl. The AXA Liberty Bowl features the only guaranteed champion-vs.-champion match up outside the BCS system, matching the MWC champion against the winner of Conference USA. The Las Vegas Bowl pairs teams from the Mountain West and the PAC-10 conferences, while the Mountain West opponent in the San Francisco Bowl will be from the Big East. The Liberty and Las Vegas Bowls will be televised on ESPN while the San Francisco Bowl will air on ESPN2.

"I think people from the South and from the Midwest ought to see this. This is a big-time football rivalry." — Bill Curry ESPN College Football Analyst

It all started on October 14, 1922. Well, according to BYU, anyway. Utah claims the first meeting between the schools was on April 6, 1896, when BYU was still Brigham Young Academy.

It's just one of many things the two schools don't agree on. The Academy played Utah six times between 1896 and 1898, before Provo could officially boast its own full-fledged university. Each team won three games.

The Cougars and the Utes have built a strong tradition of intense competition in the 78 years of the rivalry. With the exception of the war years from 1943-45, the two schools have faced each other every year since 1922.

The Utes dominated the series early on, avoiding defeat until 1942, when the Cougars finally won, 12-7, in Salt Lake City behind Coach Floyd Millet. The success was short-lived, however, as it took BYU another 16 years to win another contest, 14-7, again in Salt Lake City in 1958. In all, Utah won 34 of the first 40 contests, four of which were ties.

In 1965, the momentum began to turn in BYU's favor. The Cougars took three in a row from the Utes from 1965-67, and although Utah won the next four, the competition had become much more interesting.

In 1972, the series took on an entirely different feeling with the arrival of LaVell Edwards as BYU's new head coach. He took on a program that had gone 5-38-4 (.149) against its fiercest rival and proceeded to post a 22-7 (.757) record against Utah in 29 years, including wins in 15 of his first 16 meetings with the Utes. In the Edwards era, the Cougars outscored the Utes an average of 34.9 to 20.9 per contest. Coach Edwards' career has included winning streaks of nine (1979-87) and six (1972-77) games against Utah.

The annual showdown generates considerable interest throughout the state, making it a virtual certainty that whatever stadium the teams play in will be sold out well in advance. In all, seven of Utah's top ten home crowds

before the expansion of Rice Stadium were for games against BYU.

Meanwhile, 45 miles south in Provo, the grudge match has accounted for five of the 20 largest crowds in the history of Cougar Stadium.

One of the more memorable moments in the rivalry was the 1989 contest in which the Cougars pasted the Utes, 70-31, in Provo. It was a game in which the home team scored touchdowns in each of its first seven possessions and in all eight with Ty Detmer as quarterback. In a move of mercy, Detmer was replaced by backup Sean Covey late in the second quarter.

Then there were the infamous back-to-back, 34-31, losses at the hands of the Utes in 1993 and '94, giving rebirth to a rivalry that had become ridiculously lopsided in the 80s and early 90s. In all, the Utes won three in a row (1993-95) under coach Ron McBride.

The Cougars responded to the new aggression in 1996 with a dominating, 37-17, victory in Salt Lake City. BYU employed an extremely unconventional approach, gaining 376 yards in 63 attempts on the ground and attempting only 12 passes.

In 1998, a well-placed ESPN microphone picked up an audible "clank" as the potential game-winning kick bounced off the right goal post, allowing BYU to escape with a, 26-24, victory — despite Ron McBride's sideline prayer, as captured on national television.

BYU let the Utes back into the game after having seemingly put the game away in the fourth quarter, allowing Utah to set up a 32-yard field goal to win the game. BYU fans gave credit to divine intervention as the chip shot mysteriously hooked to the right at the last possible moment.

In 2000 LaVell Edwards worked his magic for the last time as Brandon Doman's touchdown with 23 seconds remaining finished an amazing last minute comeback to send the legendary BYU coach out a winner.

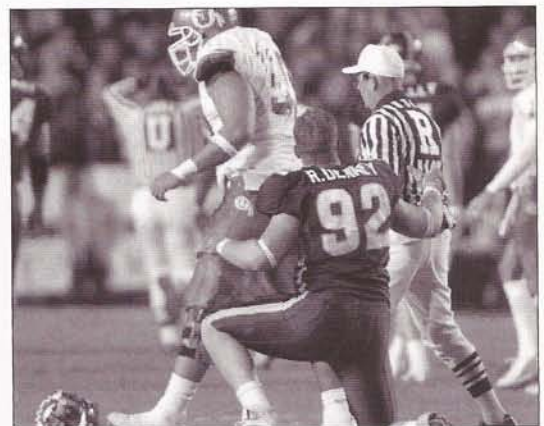

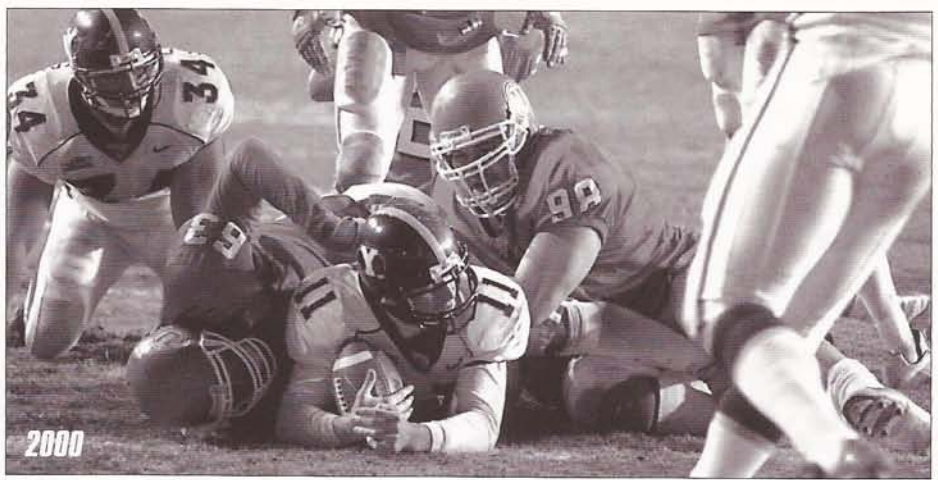

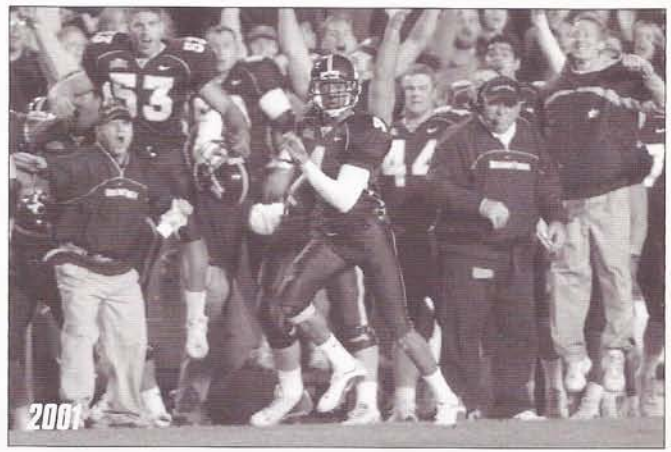


In 2000 the Cougars led throughout the game only to fall behind 26-27 on a Matt Nickel TD reception with 2 minutes to play. Behind the heart of Brandon Doman and a little fate, BYU converted on a 4th down conversion with less than a minute to play. Then Doman connected with senior Jonathan Pittman along the sideline before Luke Staley took the ball inside Utah's 10-yard line. From there Doman scored with 23 seconds remaining on a quarterback sweep right to give BYU the miraculous come-from-behind victory (photo above).

Provo has been much more friendly to the Cougars over the years, as BYU has posted a 13-15-1 record overall at home but has only managed a 15-31-3 record on the road against the Utes. Lately home field advantage seems to have become less of a factor, as the Utes won three straight at Edwards Stadium (1995, '97, '99) and the Cougars won three in a row in Salt Lake City (1996, 1998, 2000).

In 2001, BYU changed the trend in a miraculous, come-from-behind victory in Provo. With less than four minutes left in the game and down 11 points, BYU's hopes for a perfect season seemed dim. But Luke Staley scored two touchdowns in just over two minutes apart to erase the deficit and give the Cougars the 24-21 victory. The game was far from over after Staley's 30-yard touchdown. Lance Rice led Utah on a final drive in the last minute. Rice converted a key fourth-and-10 with a trick play, advancing the ball to the BYU 30-yard line. But on the very next play, Jernaro Gilford stepped in front of a Rice pass and intercepted the ball to seal the game (photo right).

Last season Utah beat the Cougars for the first time since 1994 in Salt Lake. The 13-6 Ute victory was not without controversy. BYU quarterback Lance Pendleton was stripped of the football on the goal line, but replays later showed that his knee was down before the strip (photo top left).

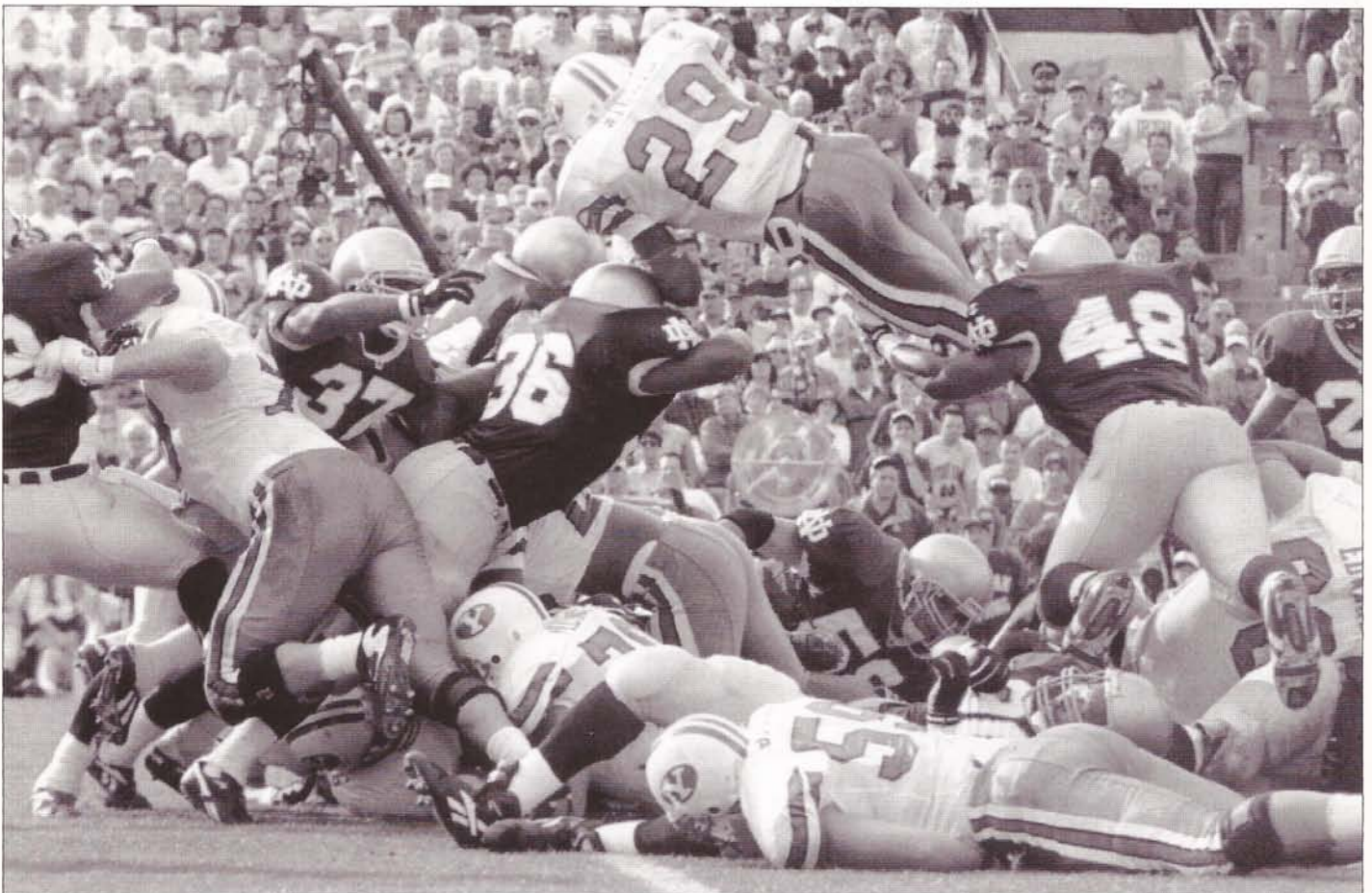

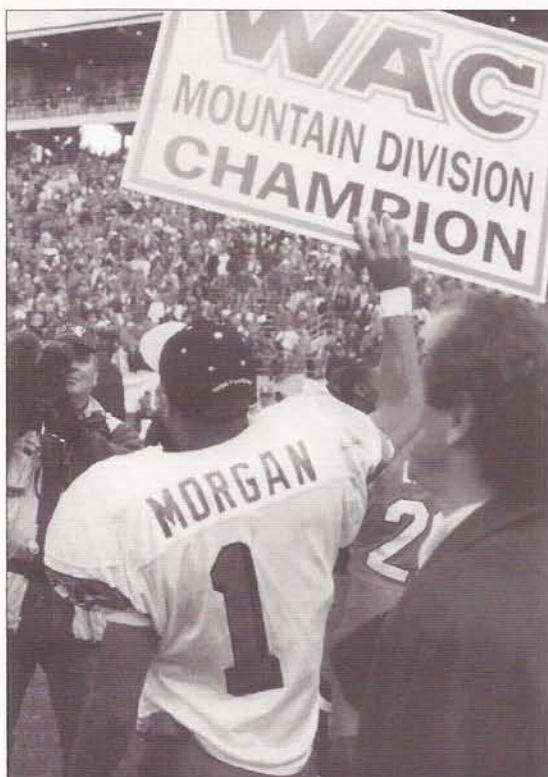

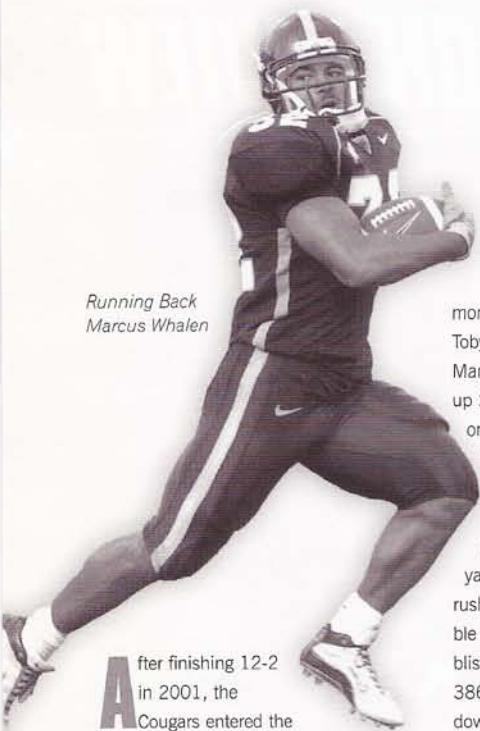

RECAPPING THE 2002 SEASON

After finishing 12-2 in 2001, the Cougars entered the 2002 season with high expectations; however, those expectations were overshadowed with a heavy dose of reality. BYU started the 2002 season looking to replace the likes of Heisman candidate and NFL draft pick Brandon Doman, in addition to Doak Walker winner and NFL draftee Luke Staley. The Cougars would also be without the services of Ryan Denney, Brett Keisel and Doug Jolley, who had all exhausted their eligibility and were now playing in the NFL.

Beginning with the very first day of Fall Camp, the season got off to a difficult start. The Cougars lost projected defensive starter C.J. Ah You to a knee injury. Thirteen days before the season-opener, All-America candidate Ben Archibald suffered a season-ending leg injury. Before his injury Archibald had been a Lombardi and an Outland Trophy candidate.

With two crucial mishaps from Fall Camp in the books, the Cougars entered their season-opener against Syracuse with Bret Engemann as the starting signal caller. Engemann was out for revenge against a team that ended his 2000 season by injuring his shoulder.

Engemann got off to a quick start, leading the Cougars 69 yards down field, culminating in a 6-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Ord. Syracuse tied the game at 7-7, scoring on a 17-yard run after a BYU fumble. BYU added two

more touchdowns, a 2-yard reception by Toby Christensen and a 1-yard run by Marcus Whalen, in the half to put them up 21-14. Whalen's touchdown came on a 99-yard scoring drive. The

Cougars went on to win the game 42-21, and it appeared that most of their questions were answered. BYU finished the game with 615 yards total offense (397 passing, 218 rushing). Engemann looked like a capable replacement for Brandon Doman, blistering the Orangemen secondary for 386 yards passing and three touchdowns. For his efforts Engemann was named MWC player-of-the-week. It also looked like the Cougars weren't missing a step with Whalen, who finished with 152 yards rushing and one touchdown.

In the second game of the season BYU had another chance to avenge a disappointing loss. During the 2001 season, the Rainbow Warriors ended BYU's 14 game winning streak with a 72-45 victory in Hawaii. The Cougars struggled early in the game as Hawaii jumped out to a 10-point lead in the first quarter. BYU closed the gap to 17-14 on touchdowns by Whalen and Toby Christensen. The second half opened with BYU scoring two touchdowns on runs by Lance Pendleton (12-yards) and Whalen (4-yards), putting the Cougars up 28-17. The Rainbow Warriors scored one minute into the fourth to cut the lead to 28-24. Pendleton would add another touchdown on a two-yard run to extend the Cougar lead to 35-24 with 2:36 to play. Hawaii would close the lead to 35-32 after a touchdown and two-point conversion, but would get no closer as BYU improved its record to 2-0. The victory put the Cougars into the ESPN/USA Today top 25, garnering a ranking of 24. Marcus Whalen had another excellent game rushing the ball,

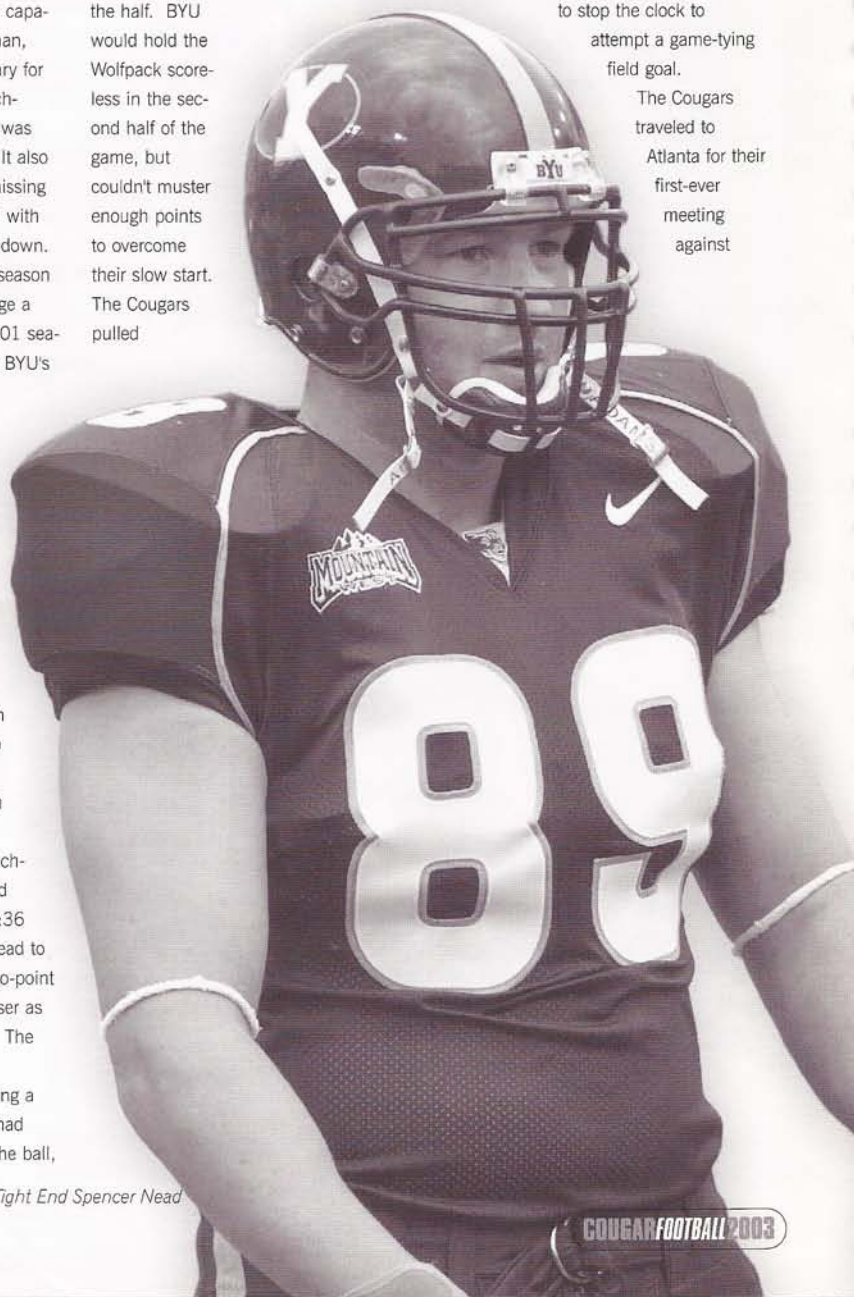
finishing with 141 yards rushing and two touchdowns.

After two impressive performances to start the season the Cougars took their show on the road and looked to add another victory against the University of Nevada, a team that had never beaten BYU. The Cougars struggled early in the game, falling behind 31-14 at the half. BYU would hold the Wolfpack scoreless in the second half of the game, but couldn't muster enough points to overcome their slow start. The Cougars pulled

to within a field goal at 31-28 after scoring two touchdowns in the third quarter by Whalen (30-yard run) and Gabe Reid (9-yard pass from Pendleton). BYU stopped Nevada on a fourth-and-one attempt with just under two minutes to play, giving the Cougars one last chance to score. Starting on its own one-yard

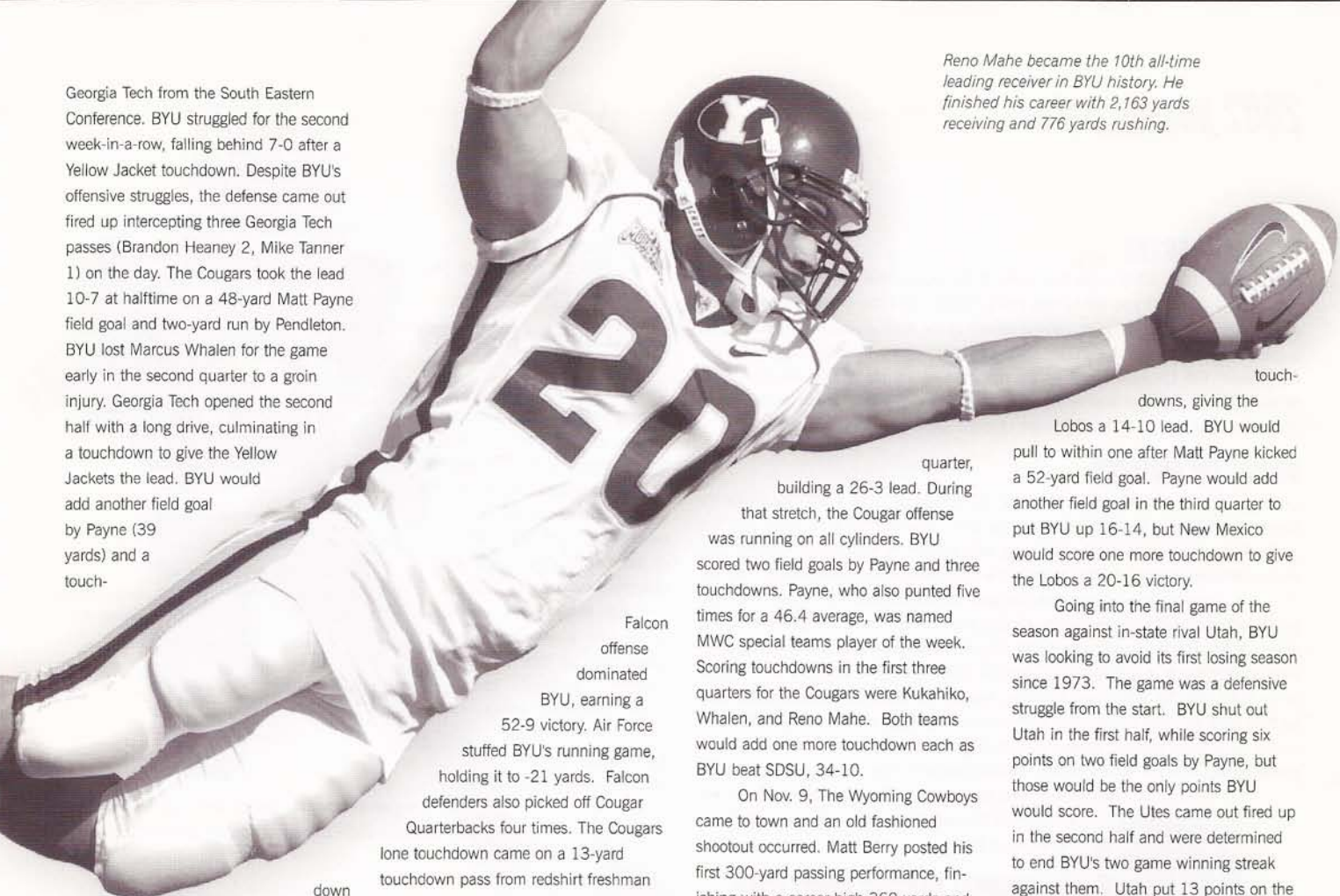
line, BYU was able to drive to the Nevada 38, but were unable to stop the clock to attempt a game-tying field goal.

The Cougars traveled to Atlanta for their first-ever meeting against

Georgia Tech from the South Eastern Conference. BYU struggled for the second week-in-a-row, falling behind 7-0 after a Yellow Jacket touchdown. Despite BYU's offensive struggles, the defense came out fired up intercepting three Georgia Tech passes (Brandon Heaney 2, Mike Tanner 1) on the day. The Cougars took the lead 10-7 at halftime on a 48-yard Matt Payne field goal and two-yard run by Pendleton. BYU lost Marcus Whalen for the game early in the second quarter to a groin injury. Georgia Tech opened the second half with a long drive, culminating in a touchdown to give the Yellow Jackets the lead. BYU would add another field goal by Payne (39 yards) and a touch-

down by Reno Mahe from Pendleton (conversion failed) to take a 19-14 lead. But the Cougars would not score again, losing 28-19. Pendleton had a good game in relief of Engemann, passing for 182 yards and rushing for 44.

The Cougars were licking their wounds after two straight losses on the road, when they traveled to Logan to face in-state rival Utah State. The Cougars started the game slow like their previous two games, falling behind 34-7 at the half, but BYU wouldn't quit. Behind the running of true freshman Curtis Brown, playing for the injured Marcus Whalen, the Cougars mounted an improbable comeback. Brown rushed for 217 yards and three touchdowns, including two of BYU's four second half touchdowns. For his effort Brown was named MWC player of the week. Brett Engemann also turned in a stellar performance, passing for 294 yards and two touchdowns, a 17-yarder to Jason Kukahiko and the 18-yard-game-winner to Gabe Reid as BYU defeated USU, 35-34.

BYU traveled to Air Force for its fourth straight game on the road and its first conference game. The game started well for the Cougars as Matt Payne kicked a 35-yard field goal, giving BYU the only lead it would have the entire day. The

Falcon offense dominated BYU, earning a 52-9 victory. Air Force stuffed BYU's running game, holding it to -21 yards. Falcon defenders also picked off Cougar Quarterbacks four times. The Cougars lone touchdown came on a 13-yard touchdown pass from redshirt freshman Matt Berry to Reid.

Before the game against UNLV, coach Gary Crowton named Matt Berry as the starting quarterback. The Cougars fell behind early 3-0 after a Rebel field goal. BYU would answer with a field goal of its own to tie the game, 3-3. But BYU couldn't get its offense going in the second half as UNLV put up 21 unanswered points, winning 24-3. With the loss the Cougar's record fell to 3-4.

The Cougars headed to Fort Collins for their third conference game, looking for their first conference win. Colorado State defenders held BYU to just 213 total yards and forced four turnovers-three fumbles and one interception. The Cougars' lone touchdown came on a one-yard run by Berry, but it wasn't enough as Colorado State racked up 490 yards and 37 points. The Rams beat BYU, 37-10.

After opening the conference schedule 0-3, BYU looked to get back on track against San Diego State. BYU got off to a quick start, scoring ten points in the first quarter. It was only the third time this season BYU scored in the first quarter. The Cougar defense came up big, holding the Aztecs to 246 yards-180 short of their average. Brady Poppinga, a sophomore defensive end, led the defense with three sacks on the day. BYU held San Diego State scoreless until 4:11 of the third

quarter, building a 26-3 lead. During that stretch, the Cougar offense was running on all cylinders. BYU scored two field goals by Payne and three touchdowns. Payne, who also punted five times for a 46.4 average, was named MWC special teams player of the week. Scoring touchdowns in the first three quarters for the Cougars were Kukahiko, Whalen, and Reno Mahe. Both teams would add one more touchdown each as BYU beat SDSU, 34-10.

On Nov. 9, The Wyoming Cowboys came to town and an old fashioned shootout occurred. Matt Berry posted his first 300-yard passing performance, finishing with a career-high 360 yards and three touchdowns. BYU's first quarter struggles continued, as the Cougars were shut out in the first quarter. BYU fell behind 7-0 but quickly recovered, reeling off two straight touchdowns to take a 14-7 lead. Scoring for the Cougars were Whalen and Spencer Nead. The Cougars and Cowboys each scored one more touchdown in the first half, bringing the score to 21-14 at halftime. Wyoming started the second half with a field goal to cut BYU's lead to 21-17. BYU scored next on a 21-yard pass from Berry to Andrew Ord. Wyoming fought back to take the lead, 31-28, after scoring two touchdowns, the first coming on a 100-yard interception return for a touchdown. With their backs, against the wall the Cougar's fought back to earn a 35-31 victory after Berry threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Reid.

When BYU faced New Mexico on Nov. 16, the Cougars needed to win their final two games to secure an invitation to a bowl game. The Cougars came out of the gate fired up, scoring 10 points in the first quarter. BYU's first touchdown came on an 80-yard interception return by John Burbidge. The interception return was followed up by a 32-yard field goal by Matt Payne. The New Mexico offense got going in the second quarter scoring two

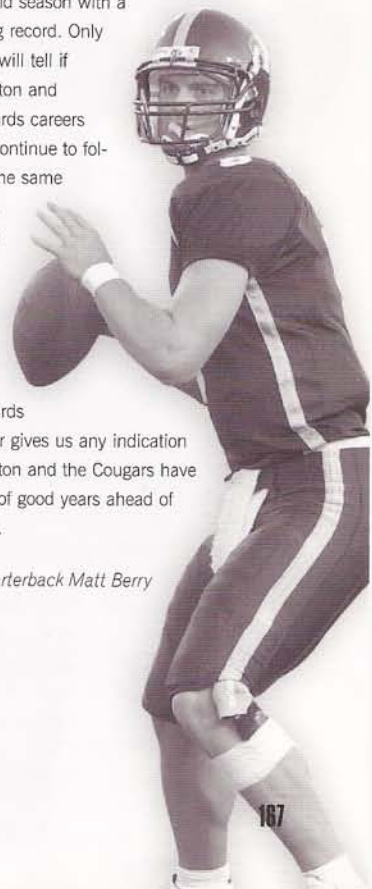
touchdowns, giving the Lobos a 14-10 lead. BYU would pull to within one after Matt Payne kicked a 52-yard field goal. Payne would add another field goal in the third quarter to put BYU up 16-14, but New Mexico would score one more touchdown to give the Lobos a 20-16 victory.

Going into the final game of the season against in-state rival Utah, BYU was looking to avoid its first losing season since 1973. The game was a defensive struggle from the start. BYU shut out Utah in the first half, while scoring six points on two field goals by Payne, but those would be the only points BYU would score. The Utes came out fired up in the second half and were determined to end BYU's two game winning streak against them. Utah put 13 points on the board and finished with a 13-6 victory.

Year-two of the Crowton era was a rocky one. BYU finished the season 5-7, 2-5 in conference play. The same thing happened almost thirty years ago, when LaVell Edwards finished his second season with a losing record. Only time will tell if Crowton and Edwards careers will continue to follow the same path, but if

Edwards career gives us any indication Crowton and the Cougars have a lot of good years ahead of them.

THE END OF AN ERA

After losing to Utah 13-6 in the final game of the season, the Cougars finished 2002 with a 5-7 record. It was BYU's first losing season since the Cougars posted a 5-6 mark in 1973—LaVell Edwards second season at the helm. Following a 63-33 victory over Air Force on Oct. 20, 2001, the Cougars claimed their 28th straight non-losing season. The Cougars' streak of 28 straight seasons ranks 11th all-time at the NCAA Division 1-A level and was the third longest non-losing streak in the nation. (Nebraska ranks No. 1 with 40 straight seasons without a losing campaign.)

DRIVIN' THE DISTANCE

On Aug. 29, the Cougars drove 99 yards (vs. Syracuse) to tie a BYU record for the longest scoring drive in school history. The drive, which lasted nine plays and took 2:59 off the clock, was highlighted by a 58-yard run by sophomore running back Marcus Whalen. Against the Orangemen, the Cougars racked up drives of 99, 92, 80, 73 and 71 yards. Against Hawaii, the Cougars posted long-distance drives of 65, 80 and a game-high 95-yard drive in the third quarter that produced the go-ahead touchdown. At Nevada, BYU posted its fourth 90-yard drive of the season, recording a 92-yard scoring march in just five plays. At Utah State, the trend continued with scoring drives of 82, 80, 70 (twice) and 53 yards. Against San Diego State, the Cougars posted their ninth 80-yard scoring drive of the season. During the 2001 season, BYU produced 20 different 80-yard drives. In the first game of the 2002 season, the Cougars produced two 90-yard scoring drives, equaling the prior year's entire season total. On the season, BYU recorded four 90-yard scoring drives and 10 different 80-yard drives. BYU opponents scored on 8 drives of 80 yards or more.

NATIONAL RANKING SHORT LIVED

Following the Cougars' 35-32 victory over Hawaii on

Sept. 6, BYU climbed from among the un-ranked to No. 24 in the Sept. 8th USA Today/ESPN Coaches' Poll. After a 31-28 loss at Nevada, the Cougars fell from the top-25. BYU has been ranked in the top-20 or top-25 polls in 23 of the last 27 seasons. The only years in which BYU has never been ranked during the season (since 1976) were 1978, 1987, 1998 and 2000. The prior season BYU broke into the top-25 on Sept. 9, following a 44-16 win at Cal. The Cougars climbed as high as No. 7 in the USA Today/Coaches' Poll and No. 8 in the AP Top-25 poll. The Falcons represented the first ranked team BYU faced last season, and the first game against a ranked opponent since taking on No. 22 Louisville on Dec. 31 in the 2001 Liberty Bowl.

"34" – THE MAGIC NUMBER

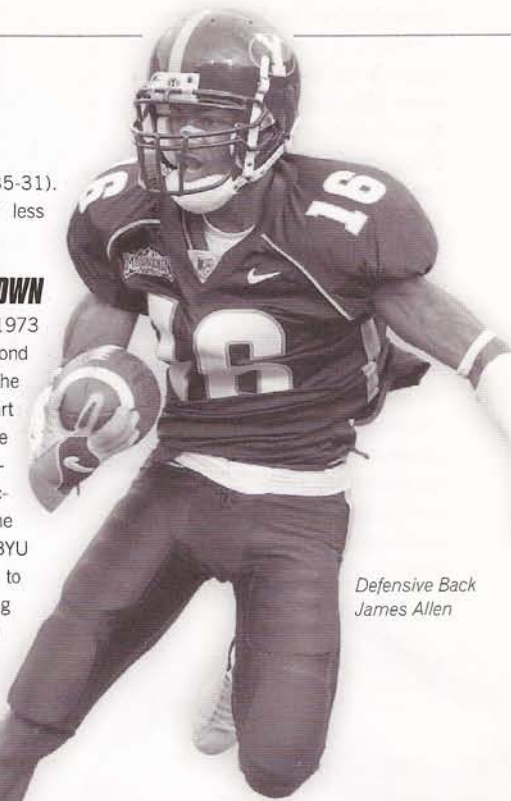
When the Cougars scored 34 or more points, they posted a perfect 5-0 record in 2002. BYU registered wins over Syracuse (42-21), Hawaii (35-32), Utah State (35-34), San Diego State

(34-10) and Wyoming (35-31). When BYU scored 28 or less points, the Cougars were 0-7.

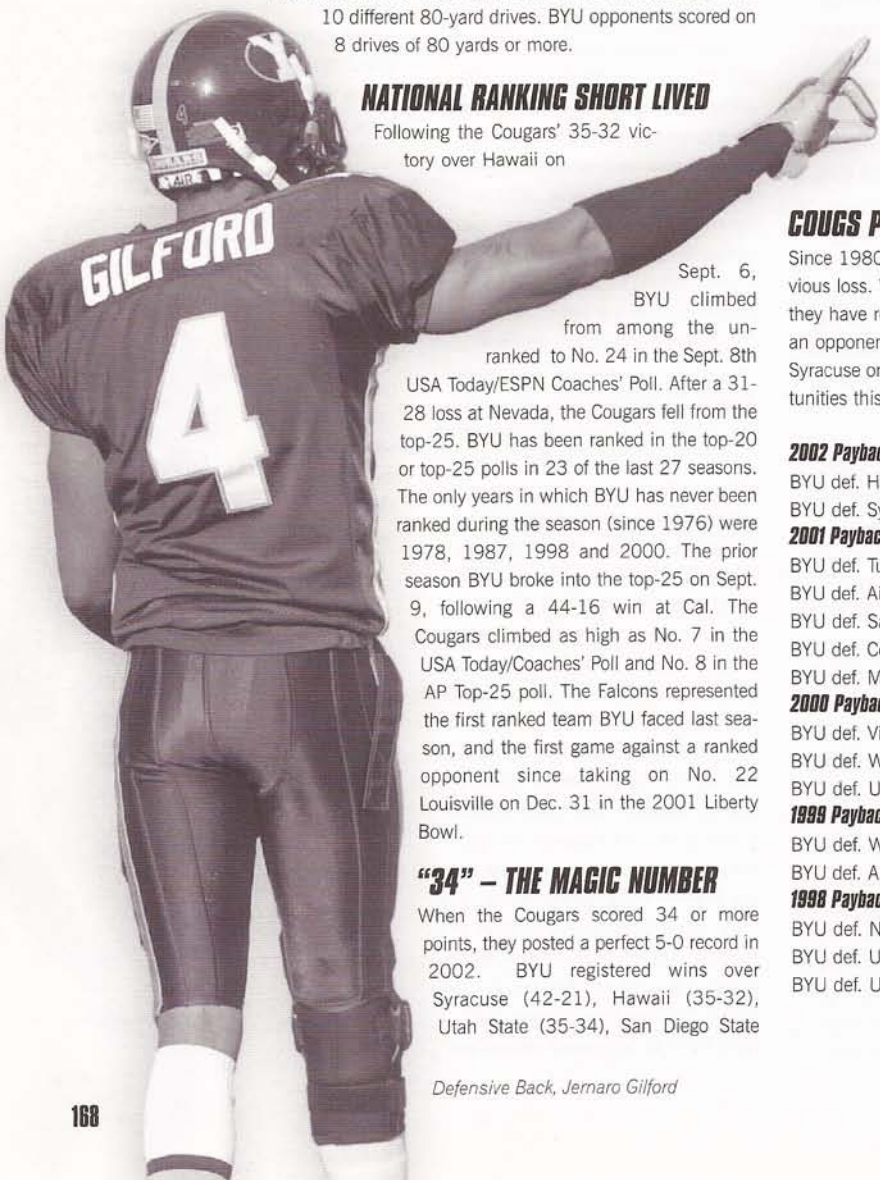
IN A LEAGUE OF THEIR OWN

For the first time since the 1973 season – LaVell Edwards' second season as head coach – the Cougars got off to an 0-3 start in league play. As in 1973, the Cougars snapped the three-game losing streak with a victory in the fourth league game of the season. (In 1973, BYU defeated New Mexico, 56-21 to end the three game losing skid.) With a win over San Diego State on Nov. 2, the Cougars avoided the longest conference losing streak since 1968. With a 2-5 record in conference games, the

Cougars finished the season with their worst league loss total since losing four league games in 1997.

COUGS PERFECT IN PAYBACK OPPORTUNITIES

Since 1980, BYU has had 62 different opportunities to repay an opponent for a previous loss. When the Cougars face an opponent, having lost in the previous meeting, they have recorded a 41-21 (.661) record. Since Nov. 7, 1998, BYU has not lost to an opponent in a payback situation, posting a perfect 15-0 record. BYU knocked off Syracuse on Aug. 29, then held off Hawaii on Sept. 6 for two straight payback opportunities this season.

THE STREAK IS STILL ALIVE...350 GAMES AND COUNTING

With Matt Payne's field goal in the first quarter against Utah, BYU extended its NCAA record streak to 350 games without being shutout. BYU was last shutout during the 1975 season (Sept. 27, 1975 vs. Arizona State.) The Cougars didn't have a single person on their 2002 roster that was alive the last time BYU was shut out.

THE UPPER-CLASSMAN DIFFERENCE

Since the 1990 season, when BYU starts the season with a junior or senior quarterback, the Cougars have posted a 72.8 winning percentage. In that same time frame, when BYU starts the season with an under-classman, the Cougars win just 54.1 percent of their games. Since the 1990 campaign, BYU has only started an under classman in three different seasons, including 1992, 1993 and 2000.

FOURTH AND GO FOR IT

Including a season-low one fourth down attempt at Colorado State, BYU was 17-of-42 (.405) on fourth-down attempts in 2002. Against Wyoming, BYU converted a crucial fourth-down attempt late in the game, and two plays later, scored the game-winning touchdown. BYU recorded a season high 4 fourth-down conversions against Utah State. Against Nevada, the Cougars were a perfect 3-3 on fourth-down attempts. In a 16-20 loss against New Mexico, BYU converted one of three fourth-down attempts, including a fourth-and-three from the Cougars' own 36 yard line. Punter Matt Payne kept the ball and ran up the middle for a 28-yard gain. The successful conversion led to a 52-yard field goal. On the season, BYU averaged 1.4 fourth-down conversions on 3.5 attempts per game.

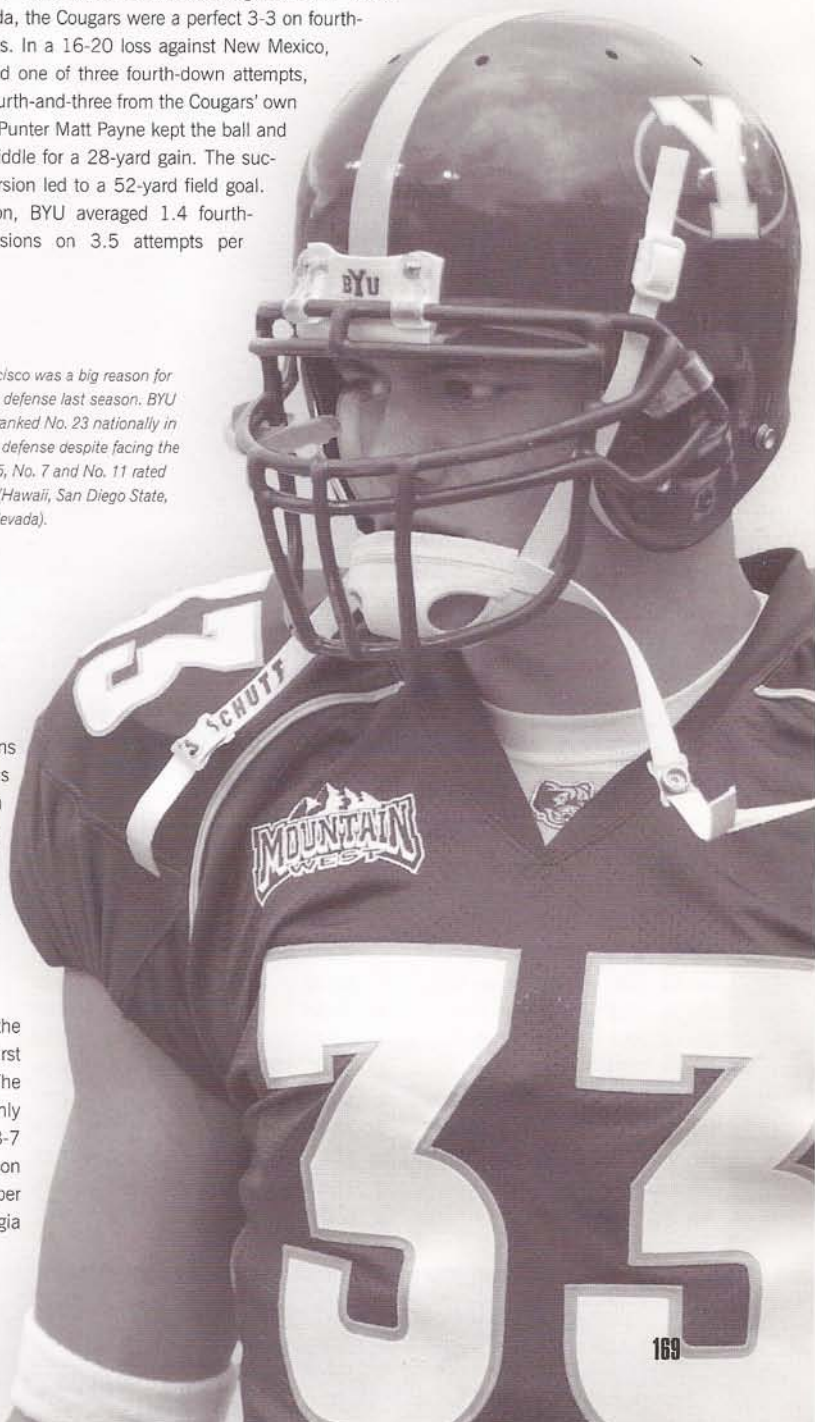
Safety Aaron Francisco was a big reason for BYU's tough pass defense last season. BYU finished the year ranked No. 23 nationally in passing efficiency defense despite facing the NCAA No. 2, No. 5, No. 7 and No. 11 rated passing offenses (Hawaii, San Diego State, Utah State, and Nevada).

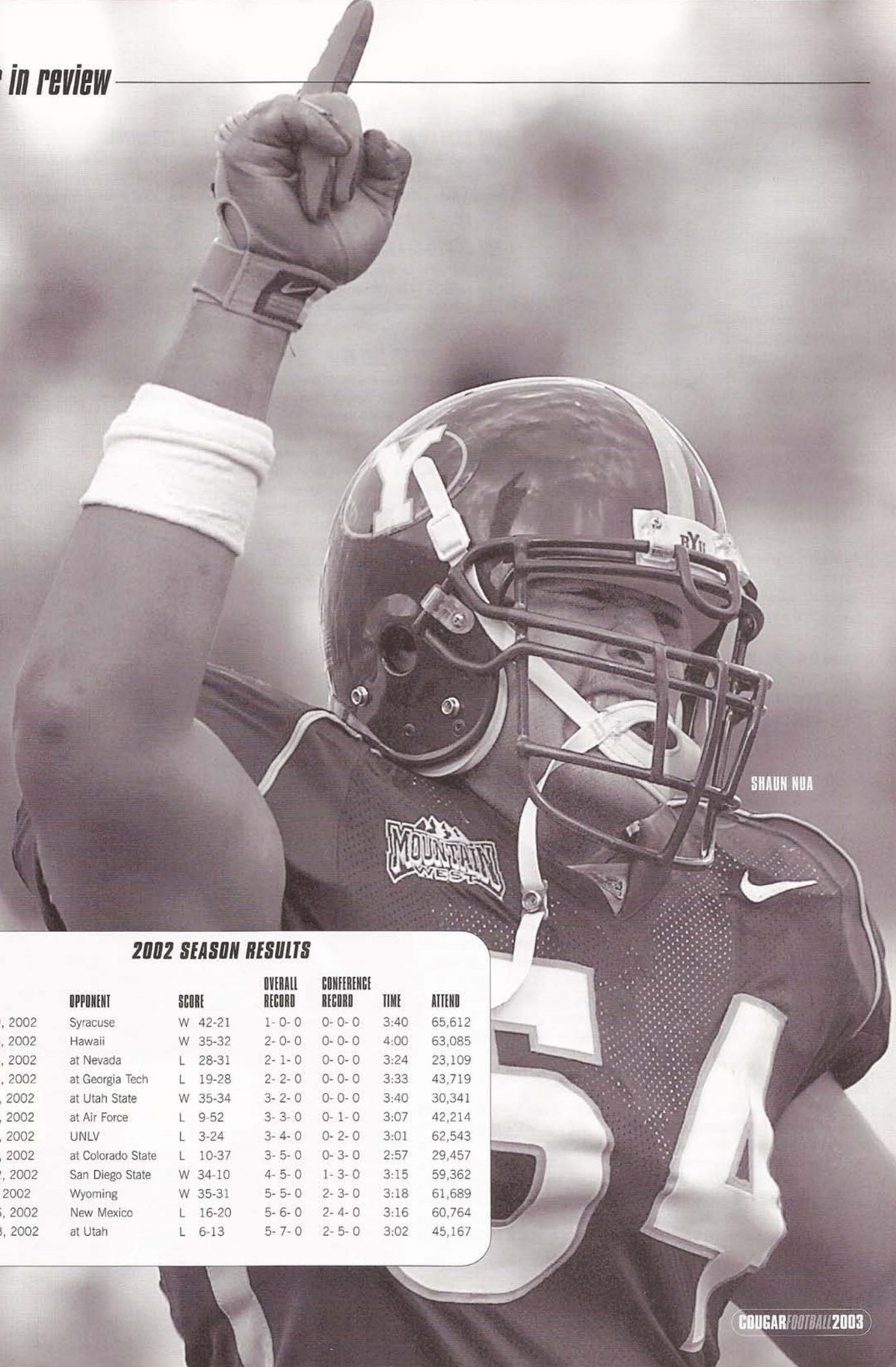
ATTENDANCE FIGURE RANKS NATIONALLY

The Cougars' season-opener against Syracuse drew a capacity crowd of 65,612 fans at LaVell Edwards Stadium, marking the 56th sellout at the stadium (since it was expanded in 1982.) That crowd also marked the 15th largest gathering in the nation on opening weekend. Michigan hosted a national leading 111,491 fans in the Wolverine's season-opener victory against Washington. Interestingly, BYU ranked 12th nationally in accumulated capacity. Edwards Stadium was filled to 100.94 percent of its capacity. In the first two home games last season, the Cougars averaged a 64,349 fans per game.

ROAD WOES

After losing four straight road games, dating back to the Cougar's loss at Hawaii the previous season, BYU defeated Utah State in Logan on Friday, Oct. 4 to record its first road win since upending Mississippi State in Starkville, Miss., on Dec 1, 2001. The Nov. 23 game at Utah marked the Cougars' fifth road loss of the season, against only one victory – a 35-34 come-from-behind thriller at Utah State. The Cougars are 8-7 overall on the road during the Gary Crowton era, and 4-3 against MWC opponents on the road. When on the road BYU has been outscored by an average of 14.7 points per game. BYU finished the season 1-5 on the road with losses coming to Nevada, Georgia Tech, Air Force, Colorado State and Utah.

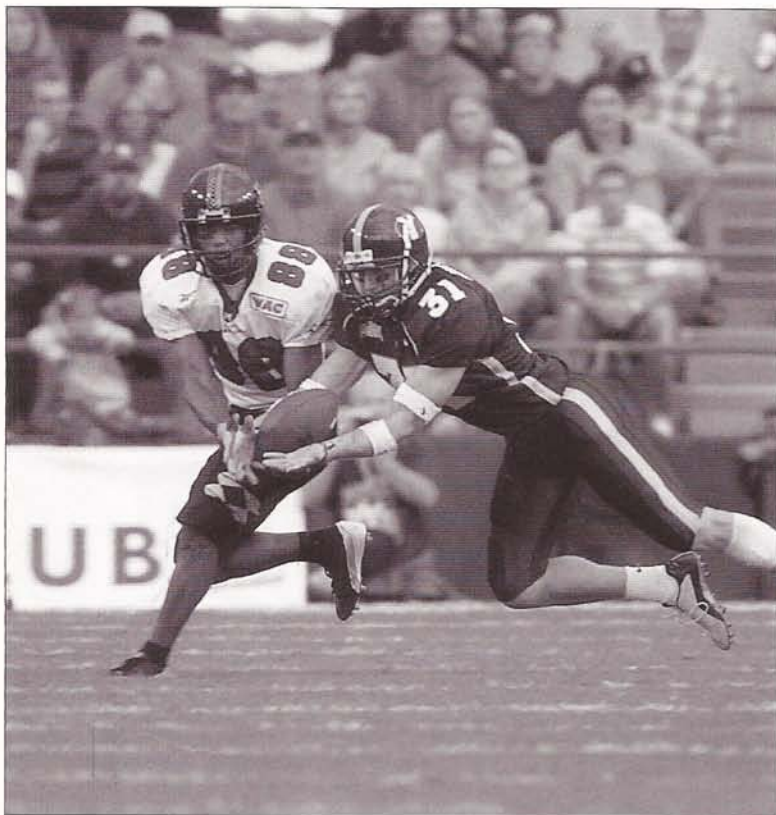
BYU VS. SYRACUSE GAME RECAP

In the first game of the 2002 season, the Cougars defeated Syracuse 42-21. By the end of game, the BYU offense racked up 615 yards of total offense. Quarterback Bret Engemann threw for 386 yards on 35-54 passing, with three touchdowns and one interception. He even proved he could run the ball by posting 50 yards on the ground on eight carries, and scoring a three-yard rushing touchdown to put the Cougars up 27-21. Sophomore running back Marcus Whalen carried the ball 19 times for a total of 152 yards rushing and one touchdown. BYU recorded 397 total receiving yards with 10 different receivers.

On the first possession of the game, Engemann drove the Cougar offense 69 yards in 10 plays to score the first touchdown of the game, a six-yard pass to senior wide receiver Andrew Ord. BYU held Syracuse on their next possession, but Mahe fumbled the punt and seven seconds later Syracuse tied the game at 7-7. The Cougars scored two more touchdowns to go up 21-14 at half time, including a 99 yard drive in nine plays for a touchdown off of a one-yard run by Whalen, tying the longest touchdown scoring drive in school history. The Cougars never looked back as they rolled to the convincing 42-21 win.

BYU VS. HAWAII GAME RECAP

BYU mounted a 35-32 come-from-behind victory to give head coach Gary Crowton a win in his 50th career game as a head coach. Bret Engemann threw for 226 yards on 21-46 passing and one touchdown, but the Cougars had trouble moving the ball totaling 394 yards of total offense on the night. Marcus Whalen ran for 141 yards on the night, with a career-high 30 carries and two touchdowns. A bright spot for the Cougars offense came in the second quarter when Bret Engemann, behind the running of Marcus Whalen, drove the Cougars down the field 65 yards for the first BYU touchdown of the game to bring the Cougars within three at 7-10. The Warriors answered to take the lead at 17-7. Before the end of the half, the Cougars mounted a drive which saw Engemann go 4-6 for 56 yards, rush for 12 more yards and top it off with a touchdown pass to wide receiver Toby Christensen and bring the Cougars within three at halftime.

The third quarter belonged to the Cougars as they shutout Hawaii, took a 28-17 lead, and never looked back. The Cougar defense posted two interceptions in the quarter, including the second pick of the night for walk-on BYU cornerback Kip Nielson. BYU finished the night with four picks on the Warriors. Reserve quarterback Lance Pendleton scored the final touchdown for BYU on the night and the second touchdown of his career to put the Cougars up 35-24. The Cougars then held out for the 35-32 win.

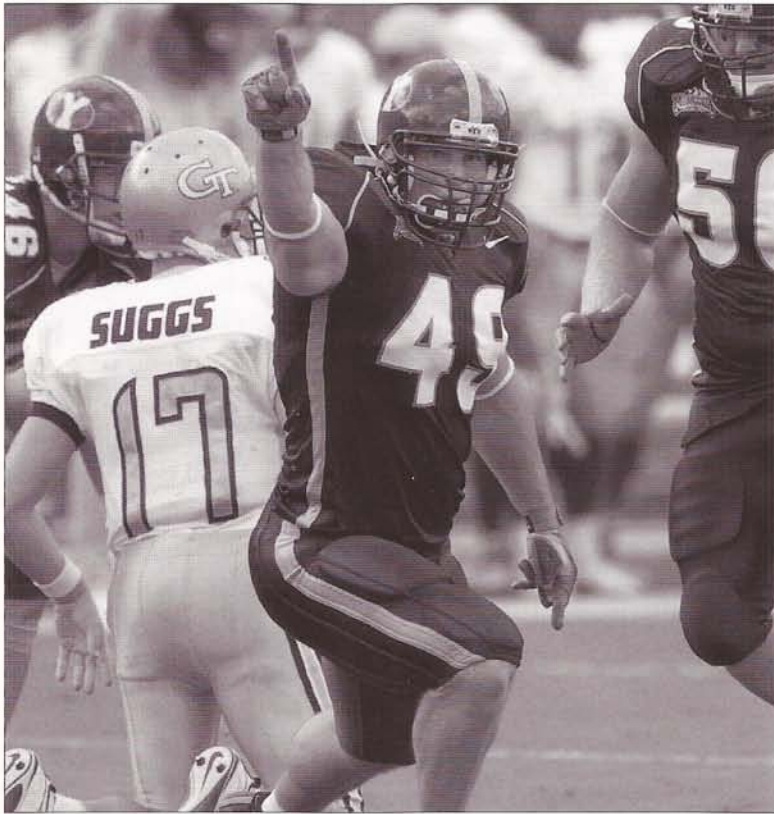
BYU VS. NEVADA GAME RECAP

After their win over Hawaii the Cougars broke the top-25 at No. 24, as the team traveled to Reno to face the Nevada Wolfpack. Despite being shutout in the second half of play, Nevada captured its first-ever win over BYU, defeating the Cougars 31-28. The BYU offense got on the scoreboard in the second quarter with a 31-yard touchdown pass from Bret Engemann to Rod Wilkerson. Nevada answered with a 15-yard touchdown pass from Threadgill to Dan Bythwood to extend the Wolfpack's lead to 17-7. Nevada fumbled on their next possession and Brady Poppinga recovered the football that lead to a Reno Mahe TD. But the Wolfpack tacked on two more touchdowns late in the second quarter, giving Nevada a 31-14 lead at the half.

After a rough first half Engemann was replaced by Lance Pendleton at quarterback. Pendleton promptly led the Cougars on a six-play, 48-yard scoring drive, capped by a Marcus Whalen 30-yard touchdown run to put the Cougars back in the game. Whalen finished the game with 135 yards on 14 carries, marking his third straight 100-yard game. The defense held Nevada on the next series and moved the ball down field 62 yards in five plays, concluding with a nine-yard touchdown pass from Pendleton to Gabe Reid to cut the Nevada lead to just 31-28. BYU had the ball with just under 2:00 remaining, and 99 yards away from the endzone, the Cougars managed to move the ball up to the Nevada 38-yard line. The team tried to get one more play in before a game-tying field goal attempt, but the Cougars were unable to stop the clock.

BYU VS. GEORGIA TECH GAME RECAP

The Cougars felt the sting of the Yellow Jackets as Georgia Tech defeated BYU at Bobby Dodd Stadium by a score of 28-19. Quarterback Bret Engemann had a tough time getting things going in the first half of play. He was 11-of-18 for 92 yards, was sacked twice, threw two interceptions and fumbled in just the first quarter. Lance Pendleton came in at quarterback after the first drive of the second quarter. Pendleton finished the game 17-of-39 for 274 yards passing, 44 yards rushing on 12 carries, two touchdowns, and one interception. BYU got on the scoreboard after linebacker Mike Tanner grabbed the first interception of his career in the second quarter that led to a Matt Payne field goal and brought the score to 7-3. On the next offensive drive, Pendleton drove the Cougars 59 yards in nine plays and finished it off by taking the ball in himself from one yard out to give BYU the lead, 10-7, going into half time.

On their first possession of the half, Georgia Tech drove 62 yards in 10 plays capped by a one-yard run by freshman Ajenivi Eziemefe to give the Yellow Jackets the lead 14-10. BYU went up 19-14 after a 39-yard Payne field goal and a 17-yard touchdown pass from Pendleton to Mahe. The Cougars then attempted a two-point conversion, but the screen pass to Mahe was stopped behind the line of scrimmage. The Cougars would not score again as the Yellow Jackets would record two more touchdowns. BYU had one last chance to score but Pendleton threw his only interception of the game in the closing minutes of the game, ensuring a Yellow Jacket victory.

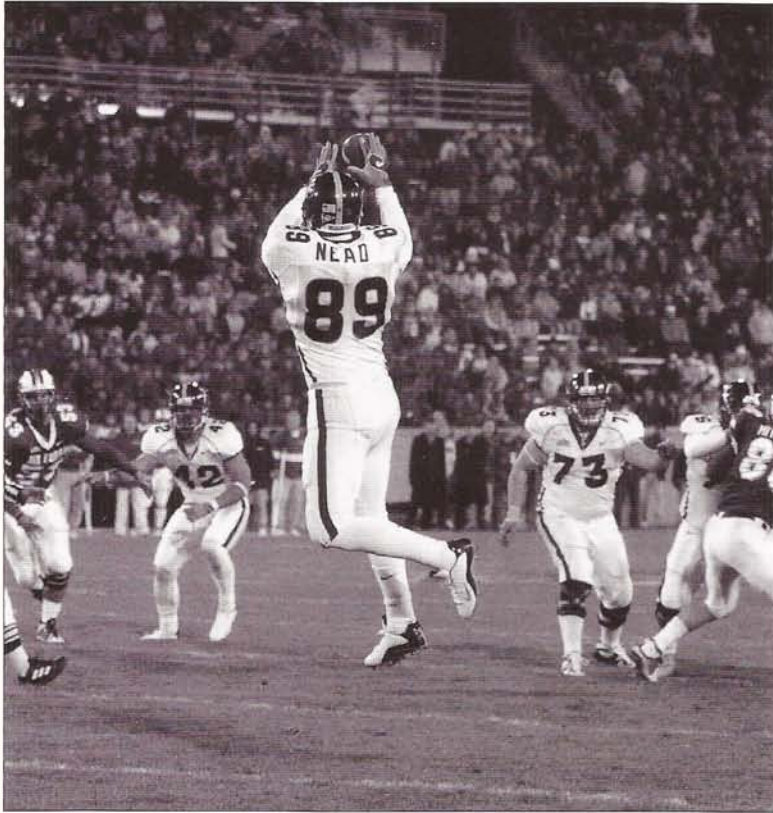
BYU VS. UTAH STATE GAME RECAP

After trailing by 27 points at the half, BYU mounted a 28-point second half to produce the largest come-from-behind win in school history. In his first career start, running back Curtis Brown reeled off 217 yards on 33 carries, averaging 6.6 yards per carry. Brown tallied three touchdown runs, including a 32-yard touchdown run with 5:55 remaining in the third quarter to pull the Cougars to within 13 points. He also added 49 yards on four receptions to help BYU to the 35-34 win over Utah State.

To end the first half, things went from bad to worse for the Cougars. Trailing 27-7, and with just four seconds remaining in the half, USU's Jerome Dennis intercepted Engemann's errant pass and returned it 75 yards for the touchdown. At halftime BYU was down 34-7, marking the team's largest halftime deficit since the 1990 Holiday Bowl against Texas A&M, 37-7. Everything changed for the Cougars in the second half as the offense found its rhythm, and the defense shut down the Aggie offense, marking the second, second-half shutout for the Cougars of the season. Mahe pulled in five receptions for 102 yards and rushed four times for 30 yards on the night. BYU took the opening drive of the second half 70 yards, scoring on Brown's one-yard run. Four minutes later, Brown scored again on a 32-yard run, cutting the USU lead to 34-21. The biggest catch of the night came with 6:46 left in the game when Engemann found tight end Gabe Reid in the end zone on an 18-yard pass, capping the seven play, 82-yard game-winning drive.

BYU VS. AIR FORCE GAME RECAP

Air Force quarterback Chance Harridge ran for 104 yards on 22 carries, scoring four touchdowns to lead the Falcons to a 52-9 victory over BYU, avenging last season's 63-33 loss in Provo. On the night, Engemann finished with 10-of-22 completions for 143 yards and two interceptions. Mortensen was 6-for-15 for 70 yards, and also had two interceptions. Berry was 6-for-8 for 95 yards and had one touchdown completion.

The Cougars started things off with a 35-yard Matt Payne field goal, capping a 10 play, 62 yard drive to start the game. The Falcons came storming back, running the ball 12 times for 80 yards, including a one-yard run for a touchdown by Harridge. After BYU went three-and-out on the very next series, Air Force came back with nine more running plays to reel off 67 more yards. Harridge scored his second touchdown of the night, keeping the option for a four-yard run. The Falcons gave BYU a dose of its own medicine, executing the on-side kick. (Last season, after the Cougars scored on the opening drive, BYU used an on-side kick to take a quick 14-0 lead.) The Falcon's continued to dominate throughout the first half and didn't let up in the second half either. Down 45-3, redshirt freshman Matt Berry connected with tight end Gabe Reid on a 13-yard touchdown completion for the Cougars' only touchdown of the game.

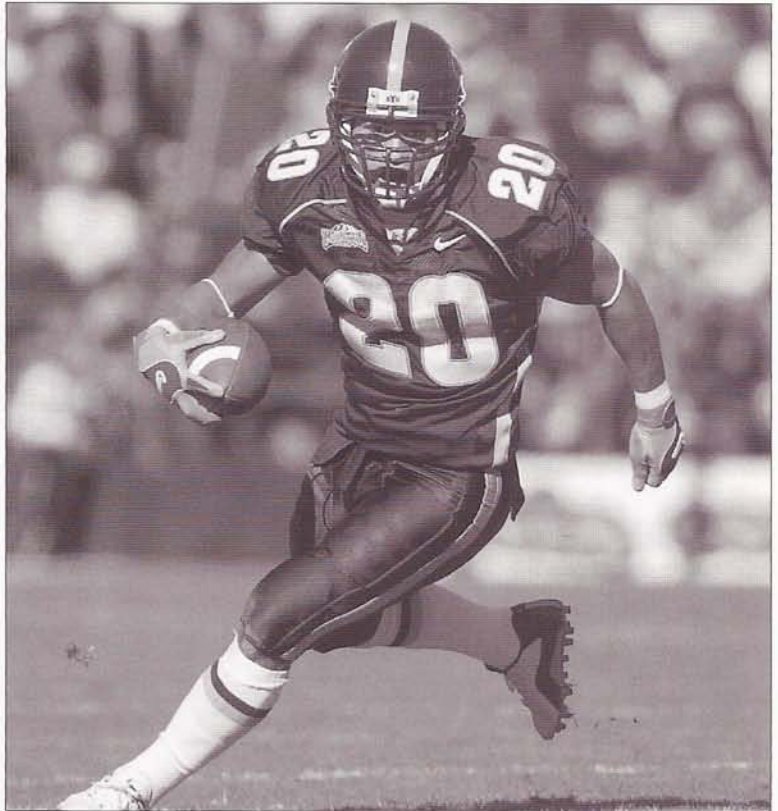

Senior wide receiver Reno Mahe recorded his fifth 100-yard game of his career, racking up 124 yards on 8 receptions, a 15.5-yard average. Despite his individual efforts the Cougars dropped their first loss at home in 10 games and the first loss in newly-renamed Lavell Edwards Stadium.

BYU VS. UNLV GAME RECAP

The Cougars put their 10-game home win streak on the line as they set out to take on the Rebels of UNLV at LaVell Edwards Stadium. Despite being tied at 3-3 at half-time, UNLV scored 21 unanswered points in the second half to pull away from BYU and record only its second-ever victory over the Cougars, 24-3. The UNLV defense held firm all night, holding BYU to just three points on the night. The Cougars' point production marked the lowest point total at home since being shutout against New Mexico back in 1971, over 31 years ago.

In his first start as a Cougar, redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Berry completed 14-of-27 attempts for 186 yards, one interception, and no touchdowns. The Cougar offense managed 408 yards of total offense, compared to UNLV's 319 total yards. Wide receiver Reno Mahe recorded his fifth 100-yard game of his career, racking up 124 yards on 8 receptions, a 15.5-yard average. It was Mahe's second 100-yard receiving game of the season. Running back Marcus Whalen ran for over 100 yards, totaling 105 yards on the night on 22 carries. It was the fourth time that he had rushed for more than 100 yards on the season, and in his career. UNLV senior quarterback Jason Thomas led the Rebel attack with 139 yards passing, connecting on 10-of-13 attempts.

BYU VS. COLORADO STATE GAME RECAP

BYU went into Colorado State still looking for the team's first Mountain West Conference win of the season, the Cougars would have to wait for another day to get that victory as the Rams came away with the win 37-10. While the Rams recorded over 490 yards of total offense, the inexperienced Cougars were held to just 213 total offensive yards. In only his second career start, quarterback Matt Berry connected on 17-of-26 passes for 148 yards, and rushed for the Cougars' only touchdown of the game. Berry was 7-of-7 at the half and connected on 13-of-15 through the third quarter. Marcus Whalen, the Cougars' leading rusher, carried the ball 18 times for 77 yards, including a 39-yard run that helped set up the touchdown in the second quarter.

CSU quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt threw for just 97 yards, but rushed for 69 yards and one touchdown, breaking a Colorado State record for most rushing yards by a quarterback in a season. CSU running back Cecil Sapp had his way with the Cougars, rushing for 164 yards on 25 carries, including a 63-yard run that took him over the 1,000 yard mark for the season. The 63-yard run that took Sapp over the top ended in a fumble recovered by BYU, stripped by Aaron Francisco and recovered by Bill Wright.

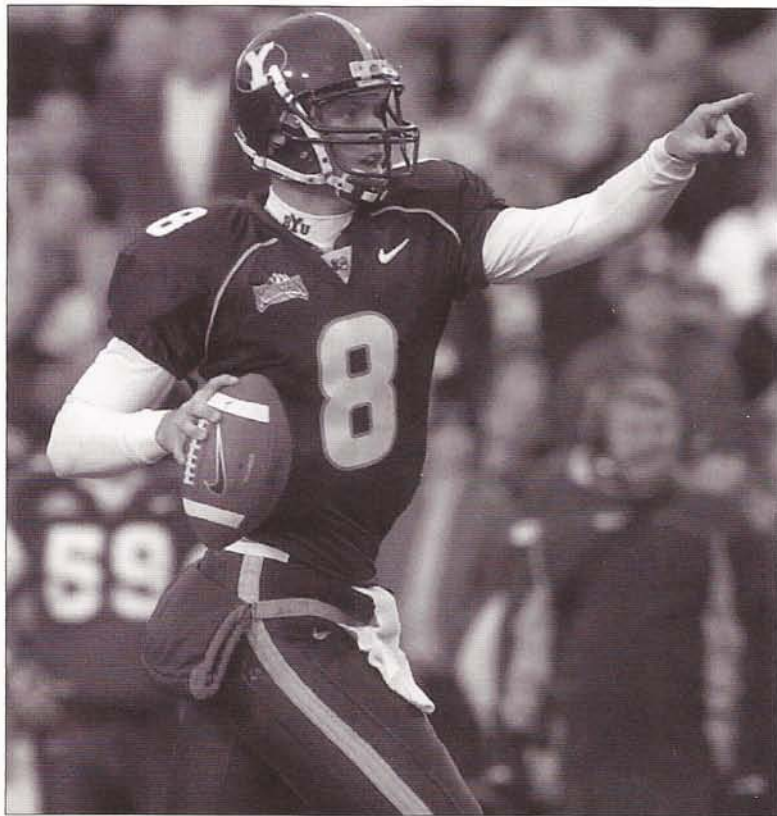
BYU VS. SAN DIEGO STATE GAME RECAP

BYU VS. WYOMING GAME RECAP

Matt Berry completed the first 300-yard game of his career on 31-of-45 passing for a career-high 360 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions as well as a Cougar win over the Cowboys 35-31. In the game, the Cowboys struck first on a three-yard touchdown run by Bramlet. The Cougar offense wasted no time evening the score at 7-7 as Berry and Whalen marched the Cougars 63 yards in 8 plays, and capped it off with a six-yard touchdown run by Whalen. Four plays later, Cougar safety Michael Madsen intercepted a Bramlet pass, setting up a Berry 15-yard touchdown strike to tight end Spencer Nead. The touchdown was Nead's first of the season and gave the Cougars a 14-7 lead. Quarterback Lance Pendleton scrambled in for a touchdown sending the Cougars into half time up 21-14.

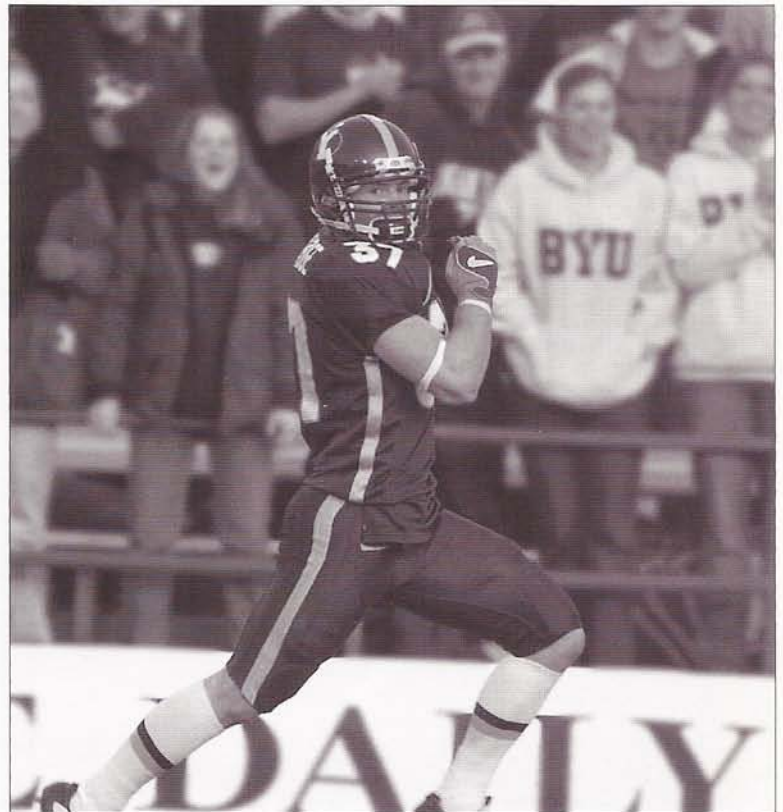

BYU VS. NEW MEXICO GAME RECAP

Credited with 13 of the Cougars' 16 points, the BYU defense had another strong outing. Jon Burbidge picked off his second pass of the year, returning it 80 yards for a touchdown to put the Cougars up 7-0. The defense also produced one sack, eight hurries, two interceptions, and forced New Mexico to go three-and-out seven different times. A fumble recovery by Mike Tanner led to a Matt Payne field goal pushing the Cougar lead to 10-0. On offense, the Cougars managed just 188 yards, including 94 yards rushing and 94 yards passing. BYU quarterback Matt Berry was an uncharacteristic 9-of-26 passing for 81 yards, two interceptions and no touchdowns. New Mexico jumped out to a 14-10 lead in the second quarter. With the clock winding down in the first half and the Cougars facing fourth and three, Payne faked a punt and took it 28 yards for a first down. The run set up Payne for a career long field goal from 52 yards out that brought BYU within one at 14-13 to end the half.

In the third, a 37-yard field goal from Payne gave the Cougars the lead at 16-14. New Mexico fired back in the fourth scoring with a two-yard run by Moore to take the lead 20-16. The Lobos decided to go for the two-point conversion and the Cougars denied Moore the end zone and held the Lobos to a four-point lead with 7:59 remaining in the game. With 2:26 remaining the Cougars had one more chance to score, but the Lobos sealed the victory on Berry's second interception of the night.

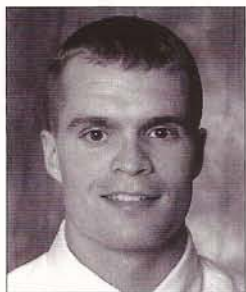

BYU VS. UTAH GAME RECAP

After 28 straight non-losing seasons, college football's third longest non-losing season streak came to an end with a 13-6 loss at Utah. With the loss, the Cougars ended the season with a 5-7 record, marking their first losing season since 1973. The Cougar offense struggled moving the ball for the second week in a row as Quarterback Matt Berry completed 12-of-21 passes for 159 yards and no touchdowns. On the Cougars' first offensive play of the game, Berry connected with wide receiver Rod Wilkerson on a 47-yard pass play that set up Payne's first field goal of the afternoon. Payne's 30-yard field goal capped a five-play, 54-yard drive, giving BYU the early 3-0 lead. A Coby Bockwoldt stop set up a 41-yard field goal attempt by Utah's Bryan Borreson, that sailed right and gave the Cougars the ball back on their own 25-yard line. Berry drove the Cougar down to the Utah 31-yard line in 11 plays and Payne increased the BYU lead to 6-0 with a 48-yard field goal. With time winding down in the second quarter, quarterback Lance Pendleton had the ball stripped from him on the goal line, replays later showed the Pendleton's knee was actually on the ground before the strip. The Utah offense finally got on the board with a 31-yard field goal on the team's first possession of the second half. The Utes scored again on Brandon Warfield's touchdown run to give Utah the 10-6 lead. The Utes drove down the field and scored another field goal to increase the Ute lead to 13-6 with 7:09 left in the game. The game ended with Bret Engemann in at quarterback with both Berry and Pendleton sidelined with injuries. Engemann kept BYU alive with a 26-yard completion to Mahe on fourth-and-8, however Engemann was sacked on fourth down. Utah took over and ran out the clock, beating the Cougars for the first time in Rice-Eccles Stadium since 1994.

BYU FOOTBALL TRADITION





During the early 1990s, Derwin Gray was a member of four WAC championship teams.

Football was introduced at BYU in 1896, but was discontinued after three seasons because of the administration's concern over the violent nature of the sport. The sport finally became an official collegiate sport in 1922 and has since grown to become one of the premier football programs in the nation.

BYU's rise to the top had a slow start, however, as the Cougars only managed 171 victories and 16 winning seasons in the first 49 years of football at the University. The Cougars didn't even claim their first Western Athletic Conference football title until 1965. But in 1972 BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach that year, and things have not been the same since. Now 80 years since 1922, BYU football is as strong as ever.

In the past 30 years, the Cougars have won 269 games and been to 23 bowl games (including 17 in a row at one point). BYU won the WAC title 18 times under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-1985. Since the creation of the Mountain West Conference in 1999, BYU has won the conference championship two out of last three years. Last season under Edwards' successor, Gary Crowton, BYU became the first team in conference history to go undefeated in league play.

Coach Edwards led his team to a national championship (1984), and was national coach of the year two times (1979, 1984), served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy winners, four Davey O'Brien Award winners and seven Sammy Baugh Trophy winners. In 2001 BYU

added another honor to its trophy case when Luke Staley won the Doak Walker Award, given to the nation's top running back.

Things were not always so rosy, however. Football had its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU consistently finds itself among the national leaders in scoring and total offense. Last season in 2001 BYU led the nation

in scoring and total offense.

Some of the more noted athletes who have propelled BYU into the national spotlight have been quarterbacks. The list reads like a who's who of college football signal callers: Virgil Carter (1964-66), Gary Sheide (1973-74), Gifford Nielsen (1975-77), Marc Wilson (1977, 1979-80), Jim McMahon (1978, 1980-81), Steve Young (1982-83), Robbie Bosco (1984-85), Ty Detmer (1988-91), Steve Sarkisian (1995-96) and Brandon Doman (1998-2001) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Detmer finished his incredible career by throwing for 15,031 yards—the first player ever to go over 12,000 yards passing.

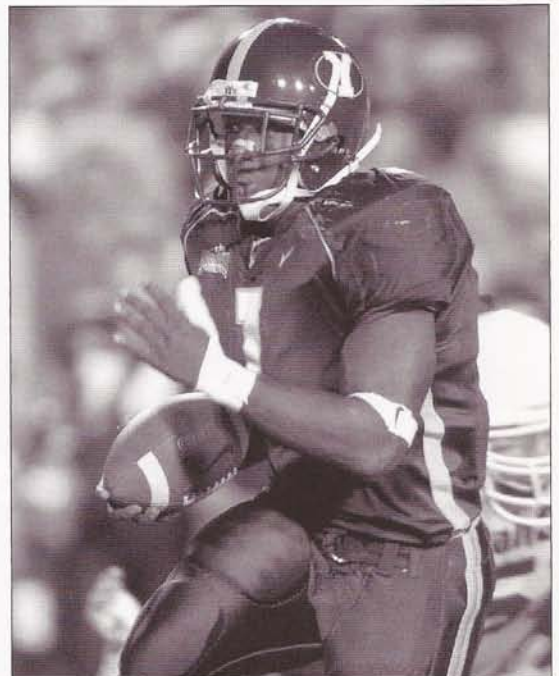
Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco, Detmer and Sarkisian were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, some impressive running backs have also hit the field for the Cougars. Luke Staley earned consensus All-American honors in 2001 and won the

Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back after leading the NCAA in scoring and averaging a whopping 8.1 yards per carry. BYU's rushing tradition began when Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62) won All-American honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71) led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did such a good job catching the football, that he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading career rusher in 1994 and Brian McKenzie moved into the No. 6 spot all-time in just two seasons (1996-97) at BYU. In two seasons at BYU the talented speedster, Ronney Jenkins, set many rushing

and scoring records in 1996 and 1998. Other great running backs at BYU include Jeff Blanc (1973-76), Eric Lane (1979-80), Casey Tiimalu (1982-83), Lakei Heimuli (1983-86), Fred Whittingham (1986-89), Peter Tuipulotu (1987, 1989-91) and Kalin Hall (1992-93).

Eric Drage (1990-93) became the receiving leader, breaking yardage and touchdown receiving records set by Phil Odle (1965-67). Other outstanding receivers that have brought honor to the Cougar blue on the playing field include Jay Miller (1972-74, 76), Todd Christensen (1974-77), Danny Plater (1978-81), Glen Kozlowski (1981, 83-85), Mark Bellini (1982, 83-84), Matt Bellini (1987-90), Andy Boyce (1988-90), K.O. Kealaluhi (1995-96), Kaipo McGuire (1993-96), Ben Cahoon (1996-97), Margin Hooks (1997-2000), and Jonathan Pittman (1999-2000).

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82), Trevor Match (1979-84), Scott Brumfield (1991-92), Evan Pilgrim (1992-94), Larry Moore (1995-96), John Tait (1996-98), Joe Wong (1997-98), Ben Archibald (2000-02) and Dustin Rykert (1999-2002).

BYU has also had a bevy of talent at tight end through the years including Brian Billick (1974-76), Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), Chris Smith (1987-90), Chad Lewis (1993-96) and Itula Mili (1991, 1994-96), Tevita Ofahengaue

(1998-2000), 2002 NFL second-round draft choice Doug Jolley, Spencer Nead (2001-02) and Gabe Reid (1999-02)

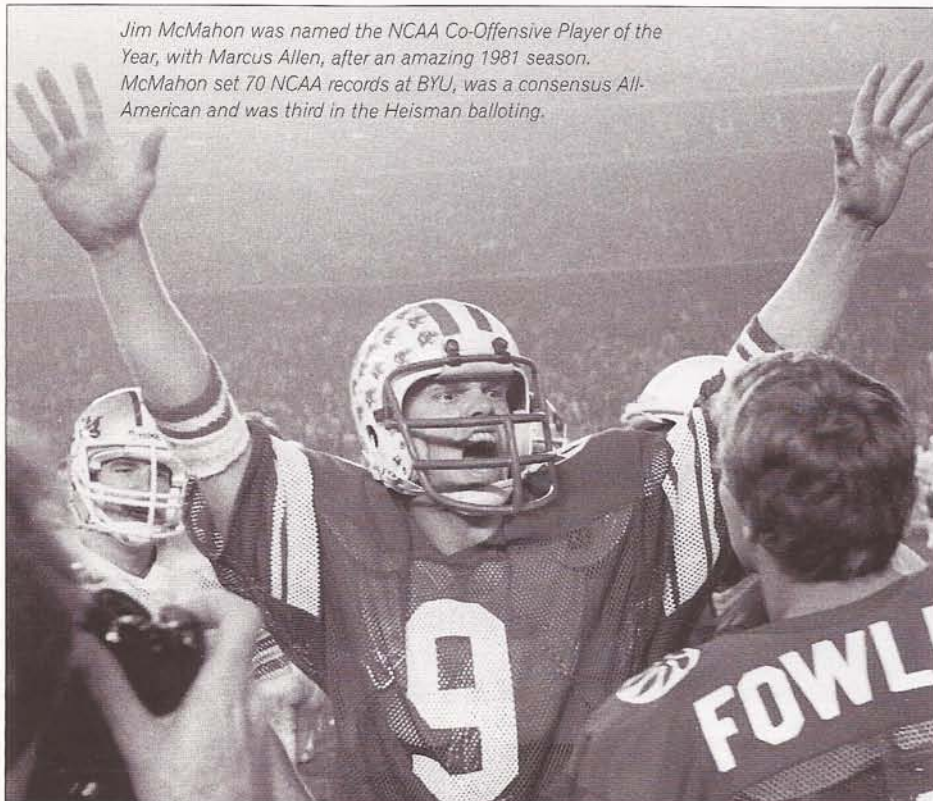
BYU has always had outstanding defenses to complement their high-powered offenses through the years. Top Defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84), Leon White (1982-85), Kurt Gouveia (1983-85), Jason Buck (1985-86), the recipient of the 1986

Outland Trophy, Travis Hall (1991-94), Byron Frisch (1996-99), Derwin Gray (1989-92), Shay Muirbrook (1993-96), Spencer Reid (1994-97), Rob Morris (1993, 1997-99), Setema Gali (1997-00), Justin Ena (1997-2001), Ryan Denney (1998-2001) and Brett Keisel (1998-2001).

In recent history BYU has also had a number of talented defensive backs including Rodney Rice 1987-88), Brian Mitchell (1987-90), Derwin Gray (1989-92), Patrick Mitchell (1991-94), Tim McTyer (1995-96), Omarr Morgan (1996-97), Brian Gray (1998-99), and Jared Lee (1999-00).

The Cougars have also had some great return specialists in recent history. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), "The Galloping Greek," led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns, and James Dye (1995-96) led the nation in punt returns with a 21.9 average in 1995.

Jim McMahon was named the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year, with Marcus Allen, after an amazing 1981 season. McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was a consensus All-American and was third in the Heisman balloting.

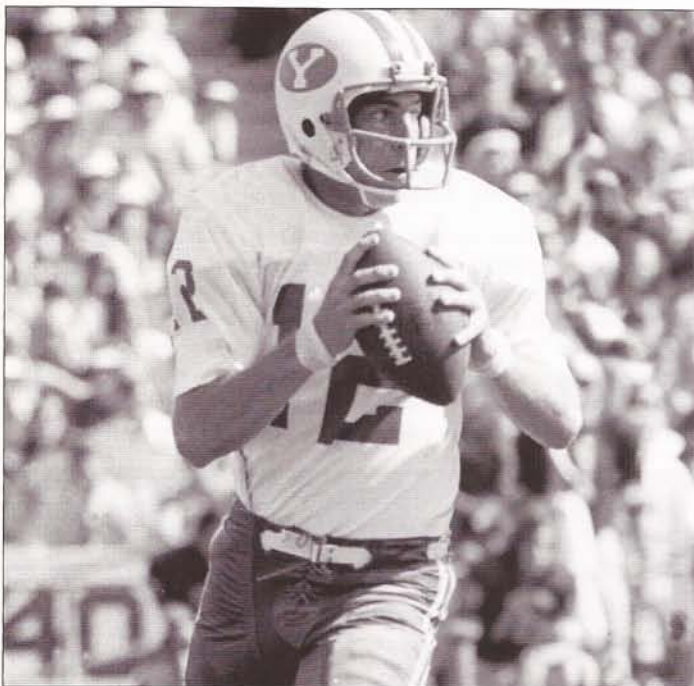
Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17 in 1983. Led by Steve Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Eddie Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left in the game.

BYU 24, ARIZONA STATE 6 **SEPT. 18, 1965**

Tommy Hudspeth's Cougars defeated Frank Kush's Sundevils, 24-6, on the way to winning BYU's first conference championship in the school's 43 years of football mediocrity. The Cougars were led by quarterback Virgil Carter and receiver Phil Odle, as they connected five times on the evening for 92 yards and a touchdown. Carter also had 83 yards on the ground. Cougar running back Jonathan Ogden added 75 yards rushing on 14 carries. BYU started the game by scoring on the first drive and the Cougars never let up, going up 24-0 before Arizona State added a fourth quarter touchdown.

BYU 21, ARIZONA STATE 18 **NOV. 9, 1974**

In only his third year, a young LaVell Edwards led the Cougars past Arizona State in what may have been a turning point in BYU football. "I'd have to say this is the biggest win I've had at BYU," said Edwards on defeating the longtime conference power in a pivotal game that would eventually put BYU in their first bowl, the Fiesta Bowl. After a 55-yard interception for a touchdown that put ASU up 18-14 late in the third quarter, Gary Sheide directed a nine-play, 80-yard drive, including a fourth down run by Jeff Blanc bouncing off defenders and fighting for the yardage. The drive was capped by a nine-yard TD pass to Tim Mahoney to give the Cougars the 21-18 lead, and eventually the win. The Cougar defense held ASU to 76 yards rushing and 108 yards passing, while Sheide racked up 223 yards of passing and two touchdowns.

BYU 23, ARIZONA 16 **SEPT. 25, 1976**

A pivotal game for both teams, the Cougars offense was slowed by a torrential rain-storm in Tucson. With neither team able to move the ball as expected, the game appeared headed for a 16-16 tie with 14 seconds left on the clock. Electing to go with one last desperation pass, quarterback Gifford Nielsen dropped back, sprung free from the grasp of two tackles and, just before he was forced out of bounds, threw the ball in the direction of George Harris, who caught the ball over the extended arms of two Arizona defenders for the winning touchdown. Despite both offenses being slowed by the rain, Nielsen hit on 18 of 28 passes for 200 yards and two touchdowns.

BYU 18, TEXAS A&M 17 **SEPT. 8, 1979**

In the first game of the 1979 season, BYU's high-powered offense met Texas A&M, complete with a Heisman Trophy candidate, a record-setting quarterback and an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate. Down 7-3 going into the second half, both teams scored third quarter touchdowns, making it 14-10, Texas A&M. In the fourth quarter, A&M scored a field goal with 6:53 remaining to go up by seven. On the first play of the next drive, Wilson threw his third interception of the game, giving A&M the ball near midfield. But, on the next series, BYU's Pulusila Filiaga recovered an Aggie fumble, giving BYU new hope. After the Aggies forced BYU to punt in three plays, the Cougars then forced the Aggies to punt after three plays, setting up the dramatic finish. On the ensuing punt, BYU's Tim Halverson blocked A&M's kick to give BYU the ball at the Texas A&M 19-yard line. Two A&M penalty's and a completed pass put the Cougars on the three-yard line. With 53 seconds left, Wilson hit Clay Brown in the end zone to pull the Cougars within one. Then, wanting to leave Texas with a win, LaVell Edwards chose to go for the two-point conversion. It paid off with Wilson hitting Mike Lacey for a diving catch to put BYU up by one. A final 51-yard field goal attempt by Texas A&M sailed wide left to give the Cougars the win, setting the stage to an 11-0 regular season finish and No. 9 national ranking.

AIR FORCE 39, BYU 38 **SEPT. 25, 1982**

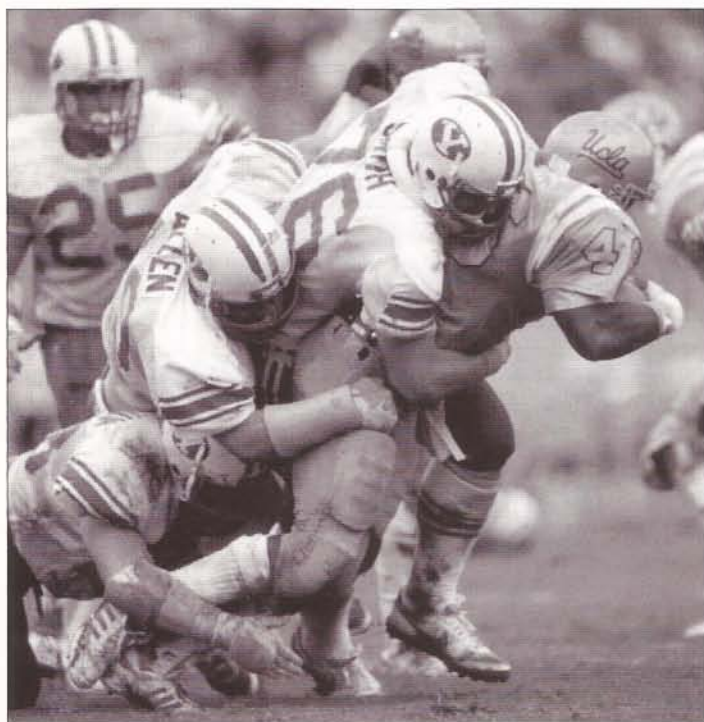
After a last-minute loss to Heisman-winner Herschel Walker and the 4th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs, the Cougars returned home -- to the newly expanded Cougar Stadium and 65,000 fans. League-leading Air Force would be the first opponent the Cougars would face in the new stadium. BYU, with Steve Young at the helm, passed for 215 yards and ran for 244, but the Air Force offense was just as potent with 489 of total offense. After the two teams battled to a 17-17 halftime tie, the Cougars came out in the third quarter and scored 14 third-quarter points to go up 31-24. In the fourth quarter, the two teams traded touchdowns, and the Cougars held on to a seven-point lead. After a BYU punt put Air Force on their own one-yard line with 1:30 left in the game, the Air Force offense put together their most important drive of the game. Then, at the BYU 37, AFA's quarterback Marty Louthan threw an interception to BYU's Marv Allen, seemingly sealing the victory. But, the Cougars were penalized for roughing the passer, giving Air Force the ball at BYU's 23 yard-line. On the next play, Air Force scored a touchdown to come within one point of the Cougars. With six seconds left in the game, a Louthan to Mike Brown two-point conversion gave the Falcons the win.

BYU 37, UCLA 35 **OCT. 1, 1983**

At the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Steve Young and the high-powered BYU offense took on UCLA, led by Steve Bono and Rick Neuheisel. BYU went up 14-0 in the first quarter before UCLA retaliated with 14 second-quarter points of their own, making it a 24-14 BYU halftime lead. UCLA came within three points after a third quarter touchdown, but the Cougars scored 13 fourth quarter points to go up 37-28. The Bruins scored a touchdown with 25 seconds left, but the Bruin on-side kick was recovered, by Kurt Gouveia to seal the win. (See photo on next page)

BYU 55, UTAH 7 **NOV. 19, 1983**

In the final game of the regular season, the Cougars welcomed Utah to the new Cougar Stadium with an impressive offensive show. Steve Young led BYU to a 35-7 halftime lead with four touchdown passes and one rushing TD by Eddie Stinnett. The Cougar defense allowed only one touchdown all day, a six-yard pass early in the second quarter. The second half was much the same, as Young threw for two more touchdowns and Stinnett rushed for one more, bringing the score to the final of 55-7 with almost four minutes remaining in the third quarter.

BYU 20, PITT 14 **SEPT. 1, 1984**

The perfect season began when BYU traveled to Pittsburgh to take on 3rd-ranked Pitt and the longest winning streak in the country. The Cougars, led by Robbie Bosco, had an 11 game winning streak themselves and were up to the challenge. BYU started out slow on offense, scoring only three first half points. But the BYU defense recorded a first-half shutout against a Pitt offense that featured freshman phenom Craig Heyward and All-American tackle Bill Fralic. The Cougars forced three punts, one interception and had two fourth-down stops on the Panthers in the first two quarters. In the second half, Pitt showed they were worthy of their pre-season ranking, scoring 14 quick points off Cougar turnovers. The first came on a 78-yard interception return by Bill Callahan and the second was a one-yard run after a tipped Bosco pass was intercepted on BYU's own 20 yard-line. The Cougar offense made up for the miscues by capitalizing on a Pitt interception, scoring a 12-yard TD run by Lakei Heimuli to bring the score to 14-9. A Lee Johnson field goal with 9:15 left in the game brought BYU within two points, while the Cougar defense continued to stifle the Pitt offense. Then, after both teams traded punts, BYU started their final drive on their own 26 yard-line with 3:05 on the clock. After moving the ball to midfield, Bosco hit Adam Haysbert on a 50-yard bomb to go ahead for good. A two-point conversion put BYU up 20-14. The Pitt offense threatened, moving to BYU's 35 yard-line before the defense stiffened and stopped a fourth-and-four to end the game and give the Cougars the win.

BYU 18, HAWAII 13 **SEPTEMBER 22, 1984**

In one of the biggest defensive stands in Cougar football history, BYU kept Hawaii out of the end zone after a first-and-goal from the two-yard-line. The defensive stand was highlighted by linebacker Kyle Morrell's leaping tackle, grabbing Hawaii running back

Raphel Cherry by the back of his neckpad and pulling him down with one arm to keep Hawaii from taking a 20-12 lead. On the very next drive, the Cougars covered 80 yards on six plays, capped by a 25-yard pass from Bosco to Glen Kozlowski for the go-ahead touchdown. The BYU defense held the Rainbow Warriors on their next two possessions to secure the win.

BYU 41, WYOMING 38 **OCTOBER 13, 1984**

In a tough conference match-up, Wyoming came to Provo trying to stop the Cougars from getting their 17th straight victory. BYU got off to a quick start with two first-quarter touchdowns to go up 14-0. Wyoming came back by scoring on a 64-yard halfback pass for a touchdown. After BYU scored again to make it 21-7, the Cowboys scored two unanswered TD's to go in at the half trailing 21-20. Wyoming continued to move the ball in the third quarter against the tough Cougar defense, scoring 18 points on three TD's and three missed two-point conversions in the quarter. But BYU traded scores with the Cowboys, scoring 12 points on two TD's and two missed two-point conversions, putting Wyoming up 38-33 going into the final quarter. With 8:43 left in the game, Bosco and the Cougars put together an 11-play 80-yard drive, completing his fifth TD pass of the game to David Mills from 14 yards out. This time, after five consecutive missed conversions by both teams, Bosco hit Kelly Smith to put BYU up for good at 41-38 and give BYU the slim victory.

BYU 24, UCLA 27 **SEPTEMBER 7, 1985**

After silencing some critics by disposing of Boston College in the Kickoff Classic, the defending national champion Cougars would face another test, the UCLA Bruins, ranked No. 2 in some preseason polls. The Bruins, led by sophomore running back Gaston Green, got on the scoreboard first with a field goal from All-American Jon Lee. The Cougars came back to tie it up with a field goal of their own. The Bruins scored again just two minutes later, this time on a 65-yard interception return by Craig Rutledge. Then the Cougars scored twice in the second quarter to go up 17-13 at the half. UCLA added two more field goals to take the lead at 19-17 with 9:01 left in the

game. It would seem as if Bosco and the Cougars were going to pull off another exciting win when the offense engineered a 14-play, 80-yard drive to go ahead 24-19 with less than three minutes remaining. But the UCLA offense was too much as they opened up the next drive with a 62-yard pass from Matt Stevens to Mike Sherrard. Five plays later the Bruins found the end zone and came away with the big win.

BYU 31, WASHINGTON 3 **SEPT. 14, 1985**

Against Washington, the 1984 runner-up in the national championship race, came to town with fans expecting another showdown like the previous week against UCLA. But the Cougars bounced back from their first loss in 26 games to pummel the Huskies, 31-3. In an less-than-typical outing for the Cougars, BYU scored four rushing TD's, two each by Vai Sikahema and Lakei Heimuli. Meanwhile the BYU defense held Washington to a single field goal. The Cougar offense racked up 460 yards, passing for 292 and rushing for 187. The defense held Washington to 205 yards through the air and 177 yards rushing, holding their top rusher to just 38 yards on 14 carries.

BYU 45, OREGON 41 **NOV. 4, 1989**

In a game that produced more yards of offense than any other game in history up to that point, the Cougars came from behind to beat the Ducks, 45-41 in a game that produced 1,276 yards of offense between the two teams. Led by sophomore Ty Detmer, BYU got down early when Oregon scored on a Derek Loville run. BYU came back with a Fred Whittingham 19-yard TD run. With a 19-14 halftime lead, Oregon came out firing in the third quarter, scoring two touchdowns in the first five minutes to go up 33-14. But on the next kickoff, Tony Crutchfield returned the kick 60 yards to the Oregon 34 yard-line and igniting the crowd and the team. BYU scored 24 consecutive points to go ahead, 38-33. Oregon responded with an 80-yard drive, capped by a 16-yard Bill Musgrave TD pass to Terry Obee, taking back the lead, 41-38. Then, with less than three minutes left in the game and the Cougars on their own five-yard-line, BYU put together a drive that ended with a 15-yard TD pass to Jeff Frandsen, putting BYU up for good, 45-41, sealing the victory.

BYU 28, (NO. 1) MIAMI 21 **SEPT. 8, 1990**

With the No. 1 team coming to town, Provo was buzzing with excitement. Cougar fans were excited because they had a Heisman candidate and a national ranking of their own (14th). The game would live up to all of the hype. Before a record crowd of 66,235 fans, Miami scored first on a seven-yard run by Stephen McGuiire. BYU tied the score in the second quarter with a 14-yard TD pass from Ty Detmer to Matt Bellini then took the lead with a 32-yard Earl Kaufmann field goal. Both teams scored again before the half and, despite four first-half turnovers, the Cougars were up 17-14. The second half started the same way the first half did -- a Miami score. This time it was a five-yard Leonard Conley run to put the Hurricanes back on top 21-17. But that was the last scoring the 'Canes would do. The Cougar defense held Miami scoreless in the final 26:48 of play. Meanwhile, Ty Detmer gave a Heisman-like effort that saw BYU score two more times. First, a 63-yard drive ended with a 29-yard Kaufmann field goal to bring BYU within one point of the Hurricanes. After the defense held Miami to no gain twice after a third-and-one, the Cougars got the ball back on Miami's 43-yard line. Nine plays later, with Detmer scrambling between two Hurricane defenders, Mike Salido broke free in the end zone where Detmer hit him for the go-ahead touchdown. A two-point conversion pass from Detmer to Andy Boyce gave the Cougars a 28-21 lead with three minutes left in the third quarter. In the final quarter, the BYU defense bent but did not break. After Miami drove 62 yards to the BYU 15, a Hurricane fumble was recovered by BYU's Alema Fitisemanu to stop the drive. Then, when a BYU fumble was recovered on BYU's 37 yard-line, Miami was threatening to score after driving to the Cougar 13-yard line. But on third-and-ten, Ervin Lee intercepted Craig Erickson's pass to stop another Miami score. One last time, with Miami at the BYU 25 and less than two minutes remaining, an Erickson pass fell incomplete to give BYU the ball and the chance to run out the clock to secure the first Cougar win over a No. 1 ranked team.

BYU 52, SAN DIEGO ST. 52 **NOV. 16, 1991**

In the highest scoring tie ever played, Ty Detmer brought the Cougars back from a 45-17 deficit with five minutes left in the third quarter to tie the score at 52 with 30 seconds remaining. The Cougars started the scoring with a 31-yard pass from Detmer to Jamal Willis. But San Diego State went on to score 35 first-half points and 10 third-quarter points to take the 45-17 lead. The Cougars then scored touchdowns on five of their next six possessions. Detmer had 599 yards of passing, hitting 10 different receivers. Aztec David Lowery had 568 yards, while Marshall Faulk added 119 yards rushing and 116 receiving. Cougar freshman Jamal Willis added 163 yards receiving, 66 yards rushing and three touchdowns.

BYU 30, PENN STATE 17 **OCT. 31, 1992**

With national power Penn State coming to Provo, Kalin Hall gained 141 yards and one touchdown on the ground to lead the Cougars to their first victory over the Nittany Lions. Penn State scored first with a 39-yard field goal from V.J. Muscillo. The Cougars came back to score 30 unanswered points, including an 80-yard bomb from Hancock to Tyler Anderson, to take a 30-7 lead going into the fourth quarter. In the final quarter, Penn State scored on a one-yard run by Richie Anderson and a five-yard pass from Kerry Collins to O.J. McDuffie to bring the final score to 30-17.

BYU 21, NOTRE DAME 14 **OCT. 15, 1994**

Prepared to avenge a 1993 loss in Cougar Stadium, BYU headed to South Bend to take on Notre Dame, the 1993 runner-up for the national championship. A 41-yard run by Randy Kinder got the Irish on the scoreboard first just 2:45 into the ball game. BYU came back with 49 and a 48-yard David Lauder field goals to bring the score to 7-6. The scoring continued in the second quarter when John Walsh hit Jamal Willis on a 19-yard touchdown pass to put BYU up 13-7. But the Fighting Irish came back with

a touchdown pass of their own – a 7-yarder from Ron Powlus to Derrick Mayes, putting Notre Dame back on top by one, 14-13 with 34 seconds left in the half. In the third quarter, after Notre Dame moved the ball to the BYU three yard-line, Powlus rolled left on a naked boot-leg, looking for the score. BYU's Jon Pollock wasn't fooled, sacking Powlus for a loss of 18 yards and forcing the Irish to attempt a field goal. But the attempt was blocked by sophomore tight end Chad Lewis, halting Notre Dame's attempt to score. The very next possession, BYU took the ball 77 yards on 13 plays, shaving over five minutes off the clock, before scoring the go-ahead touchdown on a one-yard Willis dive. A two-point conversion made the score 21-14. The rest of the final quarter saw both defenses tighten, forcing one punt, two fumbles, one missed field goal and one turnover on downs and leaving the final score 21-14, as the Cougars left with a rare win in South Bend and a 6-1 record.

BYU 41, TEXAS A&M 37 AUG. 24, 1996

To begin a season that would see the Cougars record more wins than any other school in history (14), Texas A&M would be coming to town to play in the annual Pigskin Classic. The game was indeed a classic as Steve Sarkisian threw for 536 yards and six touchdowns, leading BYU to the victory. The first TD pass was a five-yarder to Chad Lewis, made possible by a 48-yard pass play to BYU's other stand-out tight end, Itula Mili. A blocked PAT made it 6-0. The Aggies came back with a field goal and a touchdown to take a 10-6 lead after the first quarter. Another A&M field goal and touchdown made it 20-6 early in the second quarter. But the Cougars responded with a 10-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a nine-yard bootleg pass to Mili. Another drive, this time 74 yards and 10 plays, tied the score at 20 going into halftime. In the second half, both teams traded scores, but another missed PAT put the Cougars down 34-26 going into the final quarter. Early in the fourth, BYU drove 80 yards, scoring on a 12-yard pass to James Dye. A Sarkisian pass to Dustin Johnson on the two-point conversion tied the game at 34. Both defenses tightened and neither team scored until, with just 1:27 on the clock, Texas A&M kicked a 52-yard field goal to take the lead. BYU started their last drive with 1:23 but only needed 20 seconds to take the lead. An 11-yard pass, a 21-yard pass and a 46-yard touchdown pass to K.O. Kealaluhi made it 41-37. With a minute left, the Cougar defense forced an A&M fumble to seal the game.

BYU 28, WYOMING 25 OT DEC. 7, 1996

With the WAC Championship on the line, BYU and Wyoming played one of the most exciting games in the history of WAC football. The Cougars came in ranked sixth in the nation while the Cowboys were ranked 20th, both teams losing only once on the year. After Chris Ellison intercepted a Josh Wallwork pass on Wyoming's 23 yard-line, the Cougars settled for a 30-yard field goal to go up 3-0. With each team missing a field goal, the score remained 3-0 going into the second quarter. An 11-yard touchdown run by Brian McKenzie early in the second quarter put BYU up 10-0 and Ethan Pochman added another field goal with 55 seconds left in the second quarter to make it 13-0 at halftime. Wyoming wasted no time getting on the scoreboard in the second half, scoring on a Jay Jenkins 25-yard fumble recovery. Wyoming scored the next 10 points to take the lead 17-13 early in the fourth quarter. Less than two minutes later, the Cougars struck again with a 13-yard TD pass from Steve Sarkisian to Chad Lewis, reclaiming the lead at 20-17. With an offense that had gained momentum, the Cowboys came right back on the next possession to go 80 yards in just four plays, scoring a 14-yard TD pass and converting the two-point attempt. Behind 25-20, the Cougars engineered a 13-play, 70-yard drive that took over six minutes, but saw BYU come up short, failing to convert a fourth-and-goal on the Wyoming two. The Cowboys now had the task of holding on to a five-point lead for the remaining 2:57, but were backed up to their own two-yard-line. BYU's defense took advantage, forcing the

Cowboys to take a safety on fourth-and-seven. Down just three, the BYU offense started their final drive on their 40-yard line with just under two minutes remaining. Seven plays later, the Cougars were at the Wyoming three yard-line with third-and-one, but only one second remaining on the clock. Ethan Pochman came in and calmly nailed the 20-yard field goal to send the game into overtime. When BYU won the toss in overtime, they chose to defend, and defend is what they did, sacking Wyoming's Wallwork and forcing two incomplete passes before Cory Wedel missed a 47-yard field goal. With the ball on the 25 yard-line, McKenzie rushed three straight times to bring the Cougars to the 16 yard-line, where Pochman hit the biggest field goal of his career and gave BYU the 28-25 overtime win and the WAC Championship.

BYU 26, UTAH 24 **NOV. 21, 1998**

BYU went into the fourth quarter with a 20-17 lead, then built upon that with two Owen Pochman field goals to make it a 26-17 Cougar lead with under three minutes left in the game. But on the ensuing kickoff, Utah's Daniel Jones returned the kick 95 yards for the touchdown to bring the Utes within two points. On the next possession, the Utah defense forced the Cougars to punt after three unsuccessful plays, giving the Utes a chance to win the game. On their first play, Jonathan Crosswhite hit Jones for a 43-yard gain to the BYU 24 yard-line, but a celebration penalty moved the Utes back to the BYU 39. With 51 seconds remaining, Crosswhite hit Donny Utu for 11 yards, then three plays later Crosswhite hit Jones again for a nine yard gain, putting Utah on the 17 yard-line and well within range of a winning field goal. After Mike Anderson ran to the center of the field for a two-yard gain, BYU called two timeouts to try and ice the Ute kicker, Ryan Kaneshiro. Apparently, the strategy worked as Kaneshiro's 32-yard attempt hit the upright and bounced back onto the field, giving BYU the two point victory and the WAC Championship.

BYU 35, WASHINGTON 28 **SEPT. 9, 1999**

In the season-opener, Washington jumped out to a 7-0 lead when a Husky punt hit Heshi Robertson on the BYU two yard-line and bounced into the end zone. BYU came back, scoring three straight touchdowns, but missing a PAT to take a 20-7 lead in the third quarter. Both teams exchanged scores, making it a 27-14 BYU lead with one quarter to play. The missed PAT would come back to haunt the Cougars, as Washington scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns on two Cougar turnovers to take a 28-27 lead with 5:00 remaining. The Huskies forced BYU to punt, giving the Huskies the ball on their own 34 yard-line with 4:06 left in the game and a one point lead. But three straight stops by the Cougars forced Washington to punt. With 2:35 remaining, BYU started at their own 11 yard-line. A quick pass from Kevin Feterik to Carlos Nuno gained 14 yards and another 17-yard completion to freshman Luke Staley, playing in his first collegiate game, put BYU on their 42 with first-and-ten. The next three Feterik passes went incomplete, putting BYU in a fourth-and-ten hole. Feterik threw a perfect pass between two defenders and into the hands of Ben Horton for a 12-yard gain and a first down with 1:34

on the clock. A pass interference call put BYU on the Washington 38 yard-line, where Feterik threw a TD bomb that was caught by another freshman, Chris Hale, in the corner of the end zone. A two-point conversion put the Cougars up by seven with 1:16 still remaining. That time was enough for the Huskies to drive to the BYU 11 yard-line, where Marques Tuiasosopo's fourth-and-ten pass fell incomplete as time expired.

BYU 38, VIRGINIA 35 OT **SEPT. 2, 2000**

In the first half, Cougar fans watched Virginia rack up 21 points while holding BYU to a shutout. In the second half, it seemed a different Cougar team was on the field, as quarterback Bret Engemann ended the game with 447 yards of passing, completing 34 of 41 attempts to lead the Cougars back from the 21 point deficit to a three-point

overtime win. BYU started the second-half scoring on the very first possession when an 80-yard drive was capped by a six-yard Brian McDonald TD run. A Cavalier punt gave the Cougars the ball again, again going 80 yards before McDonald scored his second touchdown of the game, this time from one yard out, making it 21-14. Virginia responded with a 28-yard touchdown pass of their own, going back up by 14. Going into the fourth quarter, a 70-yard pass from Engemann to Jonathan Pittman put BYU on the Virginia eight yard-line, where McDonald scored again on a six-yard run, and the Cougars were back within seven. BYU could not afford to exchange scores, but that is what they did, with the Cavaliers scoring in just

four plays to make it 35-21. BYU scored another TD when Engemann hit tight end Doug Jolley for a six-yard TD. This time the defense stiffened, holding Virginia on a crucial fourth-and-one, giving BYU the ball at midfield and one last chance to pull even. Eight plays later, the Cougar offense scored its sixth touchdown in seven second-half possessions when Engemann hit Margin Hooks on a six-yard TD pass for the tying score with 50 seconds left. In overtime, Tyson Smith intercepted a Dan Ellis pass to stop

Virginia's chance to score. Then, after driving from the 25 to the nine yard-line, Owen Pochman nailed a 26-yard field goal attempt to give the Cougars the dramatic win.

BYU 34, UTAH 27 NOV. 24, 2000

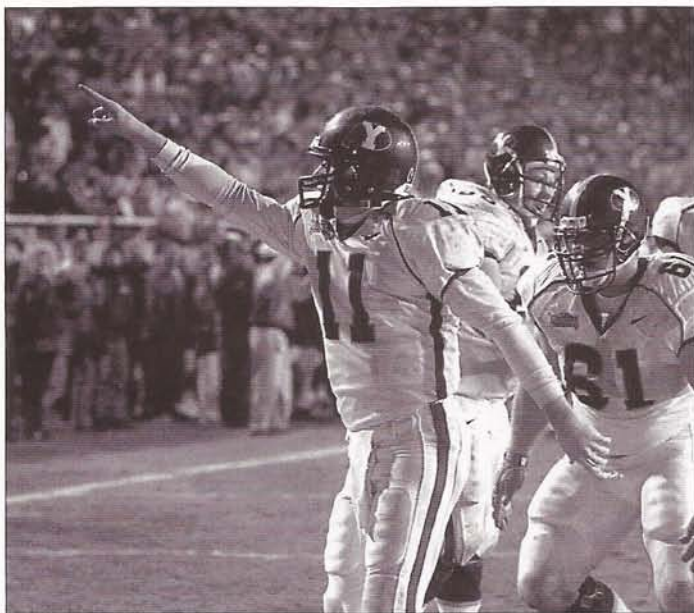
In LaVell Edwards' last game as the head coach of the Cougars, Utah got a quick 7-0 lead when Andre Dyson returned a Brandon Doman pass 24 yards for the touchdown. BYU came back, controlling the game going into the final quarter, leading 26-10. But a field goal and two TD passes gave Utah 17 unanswered points and the Utes a one-point lead with two minutes left in the game. With one last chance, Doman and the Cougar offense would try to engineer a game-winning drive. After an incomplection and a sack made it third-and-twenty, Doman completed a seven-yard pass to Luke Staley, making it fourth-and-13 with 1:04 on the clock. After a timeout, Doman took the snap, escaped one sack and, with a Ute defender chasing him towards the sideline, threw the ball downfield where Jonathan Pittman adjusted his route and made a leaping 34-yard catch at midfield. On the very next play, Doman hit Pittman again on a beautiful sideline catch for 36 yards, giving BYU the ball on the 13 yard-line. A nine-yard Staley rush set up a four-yard Doman quarterback run that gave the Cougars the come-from-behind win to finish Edwards' career. "It was a great ball game on both sides. It couldn't be a better way out," said Edwards.

Gary Crowton started his BYU coaching career with a bang as BYU defeated Tulane 70-35 for the 2001 BCA Classic Championship.



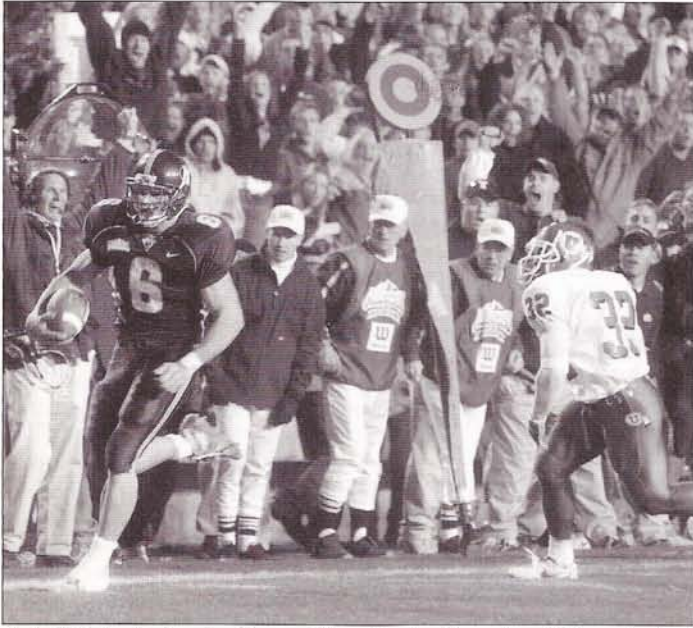
BYU 70, TULANE 35 AUG. 25, 2001

Through 29 years, the stone-faced Lavell Edwards led the BYU Cougars to 22 bowl appearances while enduring only one losing season. Having retired at the close of the 2000 season, Edwards turned over the reigns of the BYU program to Gary Crowton, leaving fans to speculate over the future of BYU football. Could Edwards' legacy be matched? Facing the Green Wave of Tulane in the BCA Classic, Crowton began his own winning campaign. After Tulane's Mewelde Moore took the third play of the game for a 75-yard touchdown, BYU unveiled an offensive attack that left Tulane's defense gasping for breath and future opponents' defensive coordinators scrambling for a solution. Junior running back Luke Staley established himself as a key component of the Cougar offense and began an All-American campaign by scoring his first three touchdowns of the sea-

son in the first quarter on runs of 2, 29 and 65 yards. The BYU passing attack came into play four seconds into the second quarter as Quarterback Brandon Doman hit tight end Spencer Nead for an eight-yard TD to break a 21-21 tie. The aerial onslaught continued as Doman connected for two more touchdowns with Gabriel Reid and again with Nead while Senior Brian McDonald found the end zone for the first time of the year. Having posted 49 first half points, BYU gave Tulane its only respite of the day as they left the field for halftime. The Cougars continued their dominating performance in the second half, pummeling Tulane's defense with three more touchdowns while allowing only one more score for the Green Wave offense. Both Staley and McDonald finished the day with 100+ yards and three touchdowns each. Doman left at the end of the third quarter with 286 passing yards for three TD's while adding 115 yards and one more TD on the ground. The Cougars ended the day with 734 total yards, 43 yards short of the school record, and more points than they had scored in over a decade. BYU's resounding 70-35 victory over Tulane sparked a 12-game winning streak that saw the Cougars break into the top 10 in the nation. The Crowton era had begun.

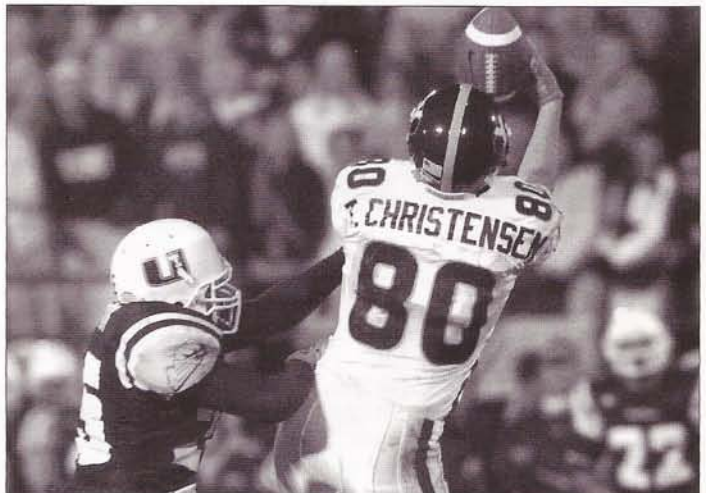
BYU 24, UTAH 21 NOV. 17, 2001

With an undefeated season, a possible BCS bowl berth and its first outright Mountain West Conference Championship in the balance, BYU faced rival Utah for the first time in Coach Gary Crowton's tenure, pitting the nation's No. 1 offense against the sixteenth-ranked defense in the nation. Someone had to give. For the first 56 minutes of the game, it looked as if BYU would. The Cougar offense struggled through the first half as quarterback Brandon Doman went 10-24 with one interception and a fumble. The Utes seemed to have solved Luke Staley as well, holding him to a meager 28 yards through the first 30 minutes. Despite being labeled the chink in BYU's armor, the Cougar defense, highlighted by defensive end Ryan Denney's 10-tackle performance, kept the game close enough for BYU to have a chance at the end. Utah held a precarious 7-3 lead as the teams left the field for halftime. Utah added to its lead on a 15-yard run by Dameon Hunter with 2:21 left in the third quarter. BYU responded two minutes later with a score of its own. Reno Mahe, who five days earlier was hospitalized to have his appendix removed, hooked up with Doman for a 23-yard TD reception in the corner of the end zone. Trailing 14-10 as the fourth quarter began, BYU needed something to happen but the Utes were ready to put the Cougars away and scored again to take a 21-10 lead with just under 10 minutes remaining. BYU and Utah traded possessions over the next six minutes as each team looked for a spark. BYU began its march towards destiny with just over four minutes remaining. After driving the ball to the seven-yard line, Doman dropped back to pass and found Staley open along the

sideline for a TD. Trailing 20-16, Crowton set up a 2-point conversion and called upon Staley again. Running a sweep left, Staley followed Teag Whiting's steamroller block into the end zone to bring the Cougars within a field goal of victory. BYU's defense rose to the occasion by holding Utah to three-and-out on their next possession to give BYU a chance at the win. With just over a minute left in the game, Doman ran an option right, drawing the defensive end and linebacker to himself. Doman pitched out to Staley who tiptoed 30 yards down the sideline for the go ahead score. Leading 24-21 after Matt Payne missed the extra point, it was up to BYU's defense to preserve the win. After using a trick play to convert on fourth-and-10, Utah found itself on the BYU 30-yard line. On the very next play, cornerback Jernaro Gilford broke in front of Utah receiver Cliff Russell to intercept a Lance Rice pass, returning it 50 yards to seal the victory. Cougar fans stormed the field, hoisting Doman and Crowton onto their shoulders. In his first year at BYU, Crowton led the Cougars to a perfect 7-0 conquest of the Mountain West Conference and BYU's first home victory over Utah in a decade.

BYU 35, UTAH STATE 34 OCT 4, 2002

BYU entered the game reeling after losing two close games to Georgia Tech and Nevada. The Cougars also came out of the gate slow against Utah State, falling behind 27-7 with 26 seconds left in the first half. On the last play of the half, Bret Engemann threw a desperation pass downfield that was intercepted by Jerome Dennis who scampered 75 yards for the score. BYU was down 34-7 at the half, a lead that seemed insurmountable, especially with how the Cougars had played of late. The Aggie offense racked up 380 yards in the first half, along with the 34 points. BYU's only touchdown came on a two-yard run by Curtis Brown in the second quarter. If the Cougars were going to win this game, it would take the largest come-from-behind victory in school history. The Cougars came out for the second half determined, driving 70 yards down the field to score on a one-yard run by Brown. Brown added his third touchdown four minutes later to cut the Aggie lead to, 34-21. Utah State missed a 47-yard field goal attempt before the Cougars put together a 14-play drive, resulting in a touchdown pulling BYU to within six points at, 34-28. On the scoring play Engemann handed the ball off to Reno Mahe, who pitched it to Toby Christensen on a reverse. Christensen then threw the ball to Jason Kukahiko for a 17-yard touchdown. The defense came up big again, forcing the Aggies to punt. BYU got the ball on its own 18-yard line. On the first play of the drive Engemann hit Mahe for a 33-yard reception, bringing the ball to mid-field. After an intentional grounding penalty and an incomplete pass, BYU was facing 3rd and fifteen from its own 46-yard line. It looked like the Aggies were going to stop the Cougars and hold on for the victory, but the Cougar offense rose to the occasion as Christensen caught a 27-yard pass from Engemann to keep the drive alive. The Cougars capped the drive three plays later when Gabe Reid caught an 18-yard touchdown pass from Engemann giving BYU its first lead of the game at 35-34. Then the BYU defense dug in, forcing the Aggies to go three and out on its next drive. The Aggies final hopes of winning the game were dashed when Brandon Heaney picked off Jose Fuentes with 56 seconds left in the game. The 35-34 victory marked BYU's largest come-from-behind win in school history.

modern cougar football history

BYU's winning tradition was built by legendary Cougar head coach LaVell Edwards. After taking over the program in 1972, Edwards erected an offensive powerhouse that rewrote the record books and established itself among the nation's elite football programs. Edwards, a two-time NCAA national coach of the year and the sixth winningest coach in NCAA history, taught his players and the nation what a passing offense truly was. The Cougar offense passed 103,562 yards (about 59 miles) throughout Edward's 29 seasons as head coach, and now BYU's football stadium is branded with a namesake worth a lifetime of amazing stories. Since 1972 the Cougars have won 21 conference championships, a national championship in 1984 and 23 postseason appearances. BYU's storied tradition continues with 2001 National Coach of the Year finalist Gary Crowton who won 12 games and a conference championship in his first season.

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January... had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962... halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title beating out All-Americans Greg Pruitt and Otis Armstrong with a 138.6 yards-per-game average... the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively... quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing and third in total offense... teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards)... Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense... Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game... running back Steve Stratton is named the first Academic All-American in school history.

1974: LaVell's first WAC Championship



1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories: seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense... Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) ... Gary's career completion percentage is fourth all-time... Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title... LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.—BYU's first bowl.

1975 A year of adjustment: the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games... Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory... Nielsen sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing... becomes starter... Cougars finish 10th nationally in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA completions per game (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense... Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American... BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over... by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage... Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)... BYU's 341.6 yards passing per game was third highest in NCAA history, and 41 TDs was second... Cougars top the nation in takeaways (fumbles recovered or interceptions) with a total of 56... Cougars tie for first in WAC and make a post-season trip to play two Japanese all-star teams.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties... Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries... Cougars win the WAC, play their final regular-season game in Yokohama, Japan, against UNLV, and meet Navy in the first Holiday Bowl.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to red-shirt McMahon and play senior Wilson... Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins ... Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)... finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit... Cougars lead the nation in four

categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)... Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)... BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season... LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award... Cougars win WAC and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... McMahon wins the first Davey O'Brien Award ... Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl... also coaches in the Japan Bowl... Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.

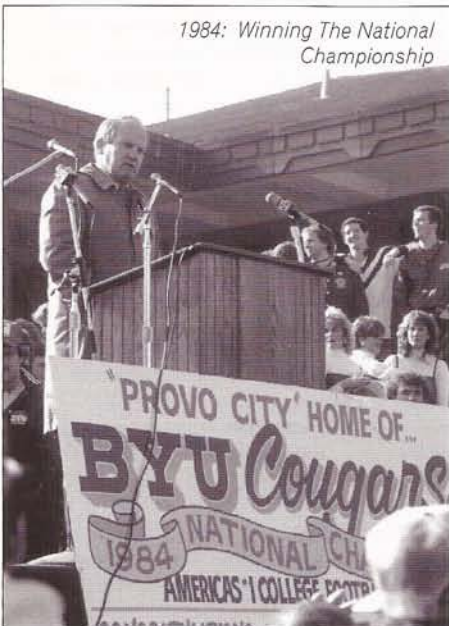
1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game... loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V... Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-America... BYU finishes third nationally in total offense... Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

1983 Another 11-win season... Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team... quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-America... after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring...



Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game... BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI... Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone... Young wins the Davey O'Brien Award and finishes runner-up for the Heisman.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season... win streak is extended to 24 games... quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)... defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-America... team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)... defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense... another WAC championship and a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII... Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations... Bosco is runner-up for the Davey O'Brien Award and third in the Heisman.



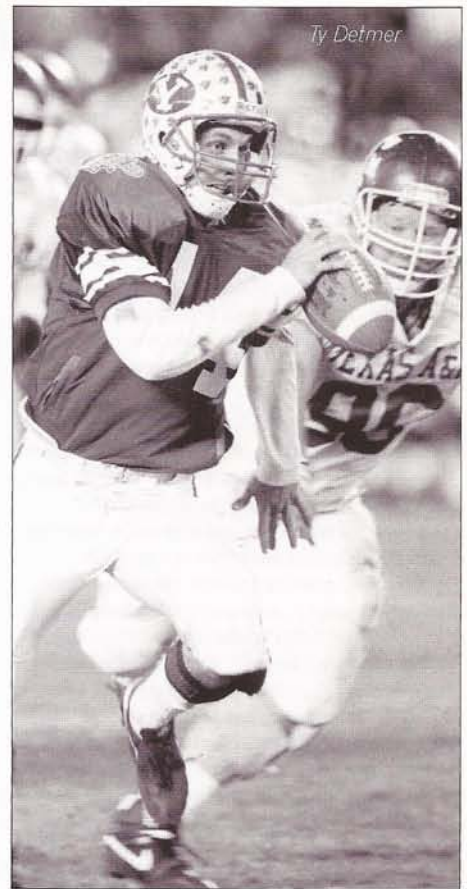
1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic... that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawaii allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season... defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-America and WAC Defensive Player of the Year... Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American... Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams... Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards... Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU defense leads the nation with 50 takeaways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points... after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games... Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl versus Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 10th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-America... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-America teams... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two



others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy... also wins the Davey O'Brien Award... finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-America and has more receptions yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

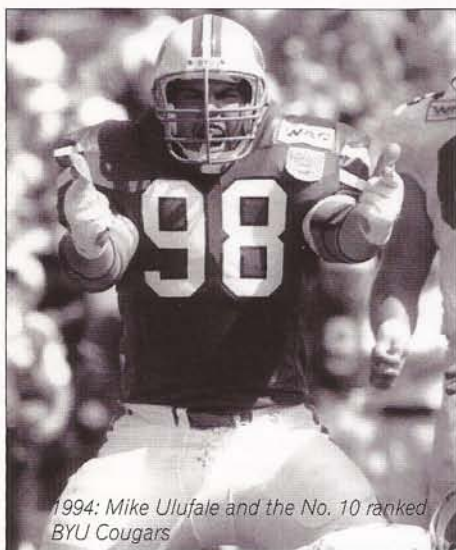
1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the

1993 BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown passes (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 50-straight games with a touchdown pass ends at CSU, but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

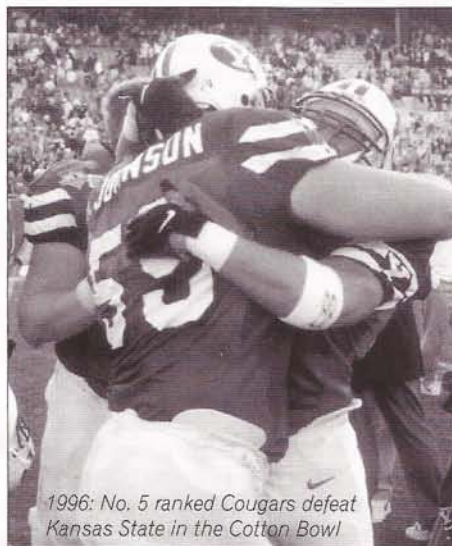

1997 BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998 BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title ... The Cougars meet Tulane in their first-ever Liberty Bowl appearance ... A six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the USA Today/CNN Coaches' Poll ... Running back Luke Staley is named

Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America status ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-from-behind victory...Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference first team... Pochman and Tevita Ofahengau are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengau being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

2001 In his first season after taking over the BYU football program Gary Crowton led the Cougars to 12 consecutive victories and an outright Mountain West Conference thanks to a dramatic come-from-behind victory over rival Utah in Provo ... Luke Staley was named a consensus All-American and became BYU's first Doak Walker Award winner for the nation's top running back ... Staley led the nation in scoring at 15.45 points per game and was third nationally in rushing at 143.82 yards per game ... The Cougars led the nation in scoring offense with 46.77 points per game and in total offense with 542.85 yards per game ... BYU was the first MWC school to go undefeated in conference games and boasted eight players being named as first-team all-

league ... Staley was named Offensive Player of the Year in the Conference and set BYU single-season records for points scored, touchdowns scored and rushing yards ... injuries took Staley out of the Cougars final two games which resulted in losses at Hawaii and in the Liberty Bowl against Louisville ... BYU climbed the national polls to as high as No. 7 on Nov. 25th and finished the season ranked No. 24 in both polls ... First-Team All-MWC defensive end Ryan Denney was named to the Academic All-American team and was drafted by in the second round by the Buffalo Bills. All-MWC tight end Doug Jolley was also selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

2002 For the first time since 1973 the Cougars finished the regular-season with a sub-.500 record. Coincidentally, the '73 season was the second under legendary coach LaVell Edwards. His replacement, Gary Crowton, just completed his second season at BYU...For the first time in the four-season history of the MWC, BYU failed to win a conference road

game, going 0-3. The Cougars combined to post a 9-2 conference road mark through the league's first three seasons...Matt Berry was the first redshirt freshman quarterback to start at BYU since Ty Detmer in 1988...Brady Poppinga led the MWC with eight sacks for minus 52 yards. He averaged 0.67 sacks per game, with all of his sacks being solo stops...BYU attempted fourth-down conversions a MWC leading 42 times this season. The Cougars converted 17 times and rank sixth in the league with a 40.5 percentage...Matt Payne led the country with a punting average of 47.6 yards...The Cougars have not been shutout in an NCAA record 350 games. BYU was last shutout during the 1975 season.

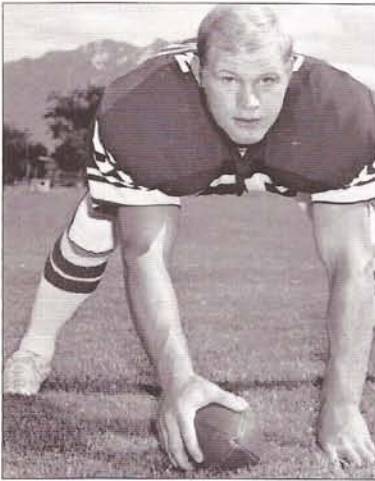

1984 National Champions:
Brigham Young University

After posting a perfect 13-0 season, the Cougars were awarded gold national championships rings after winning the 1984 National Championship.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today, and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in

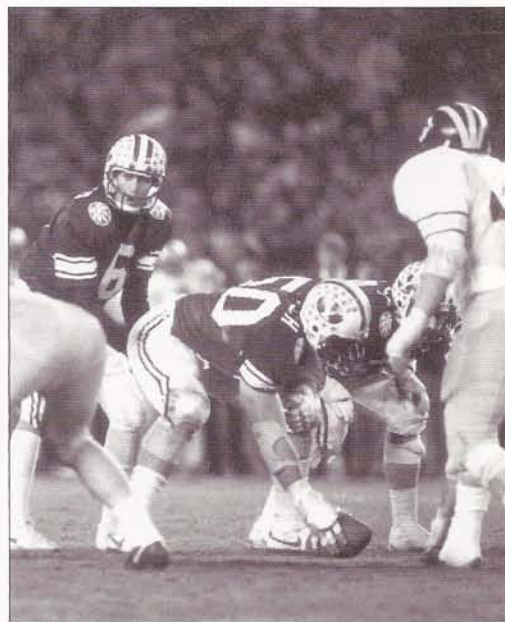
a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to offensive lineman Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

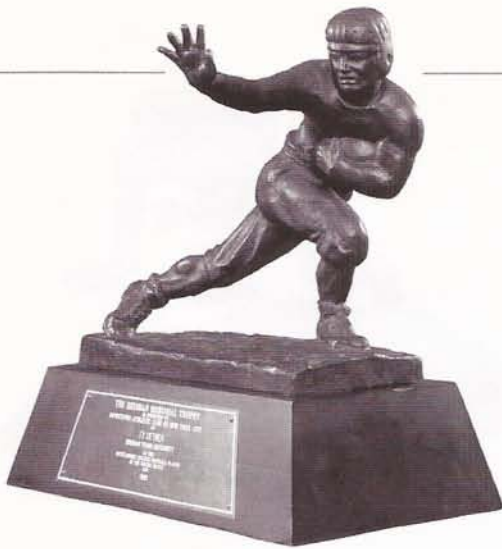
The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawaii. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

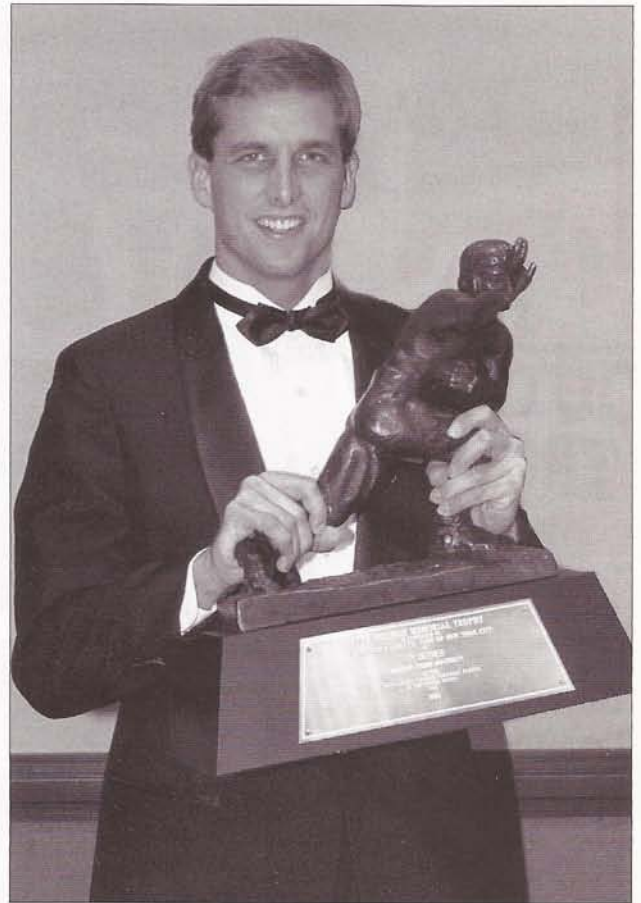
Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor is awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU."

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of Cougar Stadium.



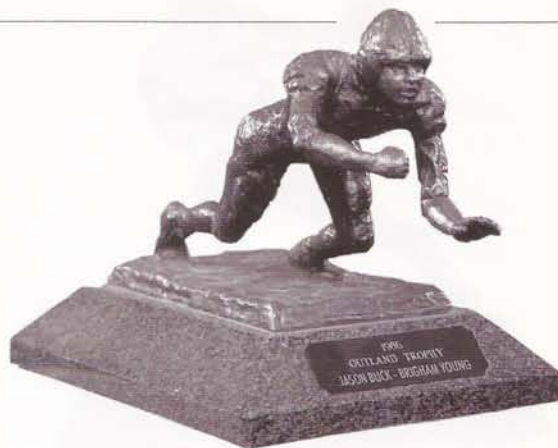
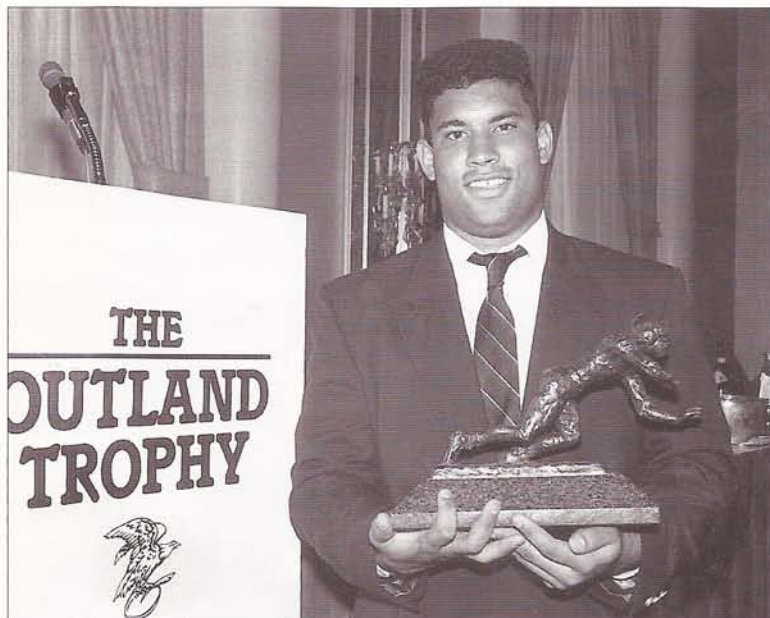

The Heisman winner started his campaign with a bang in 1990. Against defending national champion Miami in the opening game of the season, Detmer put on one of the greatest shows in BYU history. He completed 28 of 54 passes for 406 yards.



BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.



Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270, senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

Mount Mohammed, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mo" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

Two of BYU's greatest interior linemen, Mohammed Elewonibi (top left), an offensive guard, and Jason Buck (bottom left), a defensive tackle, earned the Outland Trophy Award. Elewonibi won the award in 1989 because of his outstanding protection of future Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer. In 1986, Buck, an amazing pass rusher, anchored one of BYU's strongest defensive teams ever. Both players went on to successful professional careers in the NFL.



While his teammates and coaches were watching in their hotel rooms from Hawaii, over 6,000 miles away, BYU running back Luke Staley was named the winner of the 2001 Doak Walker Award. The annual award, which was presented on the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla., is presented to college football's top running back.

"This is a great honor," Staley said. "I can't express how grateful I am for my family, my teammates, my coach - everyone who made this possible."

In addition to winning the Doak Walker Award, Staley was also named as a first-team member of the prestigious Walter Camp Foundation All-America Team. Staley is the first BYU consensus All-American since Ty Detmer was twice selected in 1990 and 1991. In addition to the Walter Camp Foundation All-American team, Staley has been named a first-team All-American by the

American Football Coaches Association, Football Writers Association of America, the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News and CNN; just to name a few.

"We're very proud of Luke and all his accomplishments," BYU head coach Gary Crowton said. "Since we started this season back in August, we have been telling these guys to work hard, stay focused and great things will happen. This award, although presented to Luke, is a tribute to the hard work and commitment each and every player and coach has made this season. Luke is probably one of the best examples we have had, in terms of working hard and staying focused. This is a great tribute for a great athlete, a great teammate and a great young man. We couldn't be more proud of him."

Staley, from Tualatin, Ore., led the nation in scoring (15.5 p/game), yards per carry (8.1 y/carry) and finished the 2001 season ranked third in the nation in rushing, averaging 143.8 yards per game. He helped pace the Cougars to a 12-2 record on the season, scoring a BYU single-season record 28 touchdowns. Staley also racked up a BYU single-season record 1,582 yards rushing on the season.

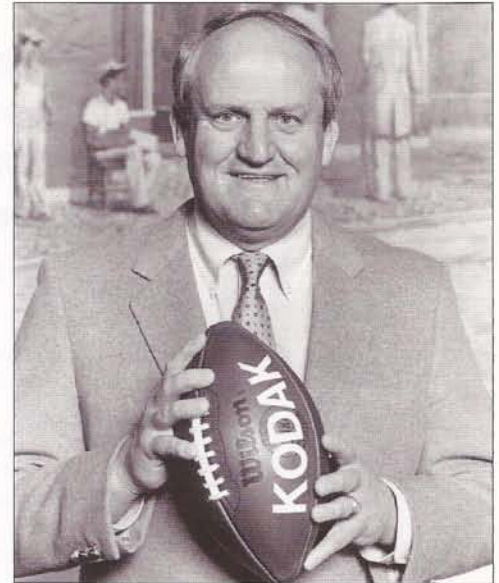
Legendary Cougar coach LaVell Edwards has twice been recognized as one the greatest coaches in college football. The sixth-winningest coach in NCAA football history earned the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 1979 and the Kodak Coach of the Year Award in 1984.

Along with his teams' successes during his coaching tenure, LaVell Edwards accumulated many personal accolades to match. Edwards' first national recognition for his coaching prowess came in 1979 when he was honored with the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award. A panel of 11 former college football coaches selected the former BYU coach. On the heels of BYU's first national championship five years later, Edwards' coaching peers honored him with what he then called his greatest personal accolade, the Kodak Coach of the Year Award.

As successful as his teams were on the field, Edwards' coaching philosophy did not reflect a win-at-all-costs mentality.

He didn't bark orders or rule the sideline with an iron fist. Generally, the assistant coaches were delegated the duty of handling the Xs and Os while he saw to the administrative tasks of the program. His personal demeanor also gave him the ability to relate well with his players whether teaching them about football or other more personal matters.

"Just seeing how he handles himself with the media and with people in general ... he's always genuine with them. He treats everybody well." Former BYU quarterback and current quarterback coach Robbie Bosco said. "Those are the things he'll leave with me, more than winning football games."

THE DAVEY O'BRIEN AWARD

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback. BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school.

In addition to winners McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Ty Detmer (1990 & '91), Robbie Bosco finished runner-up in 1984 and Steve Sarkisian finished third in 1996. Others who have won the award include: Todd Blackledge (1982), Doug Flutie (1984), Chuck Long (1985), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Dan McPherson (1987), Troy Aikman (1988), Andre Ware (1989), Gino Torretta (1992), Charlie Ward (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995 & '96), Peyton Manning (1997), Michael Bishop (1998), Joe Hamilton (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), and Eric Crouch (2001).

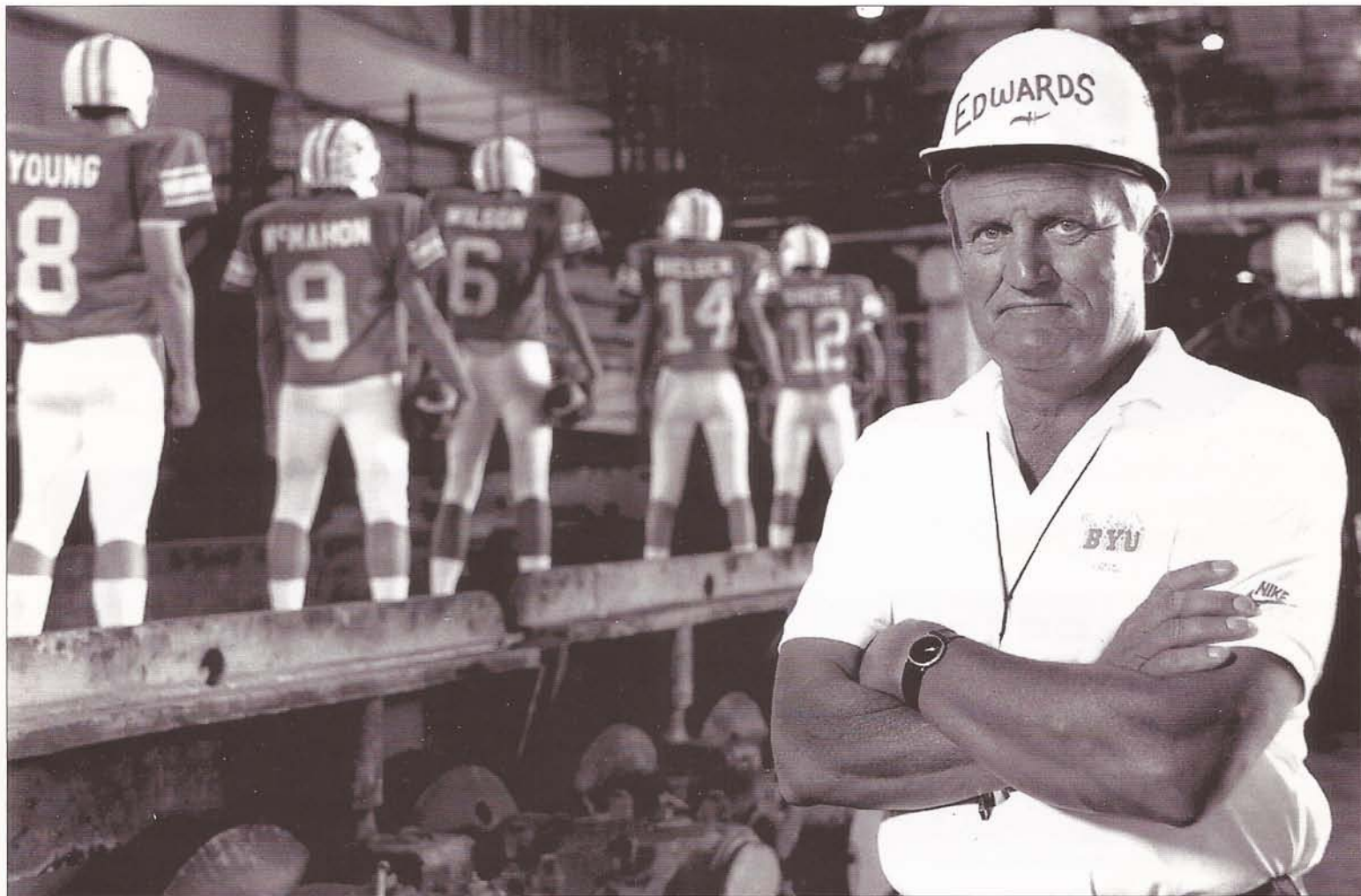

SAMMY BAUGH TROPHY COLLEGE PASSER OF THE YEAR

On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year. In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award. Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Steve Walsh (1988), Jeff George (1989), David Klingler (1990), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994) and Danny Wuerffel (1995).

Ever since Gary Sheide in 1973, BYU and LaVell Edwards produced an assembly line of outstanding quarterbacks in Provo that have earned unprecedented success in the market of college and professional football.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and

many other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 13 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top five career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 27 years Edwards has coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with

the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 19 times, played in 22 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

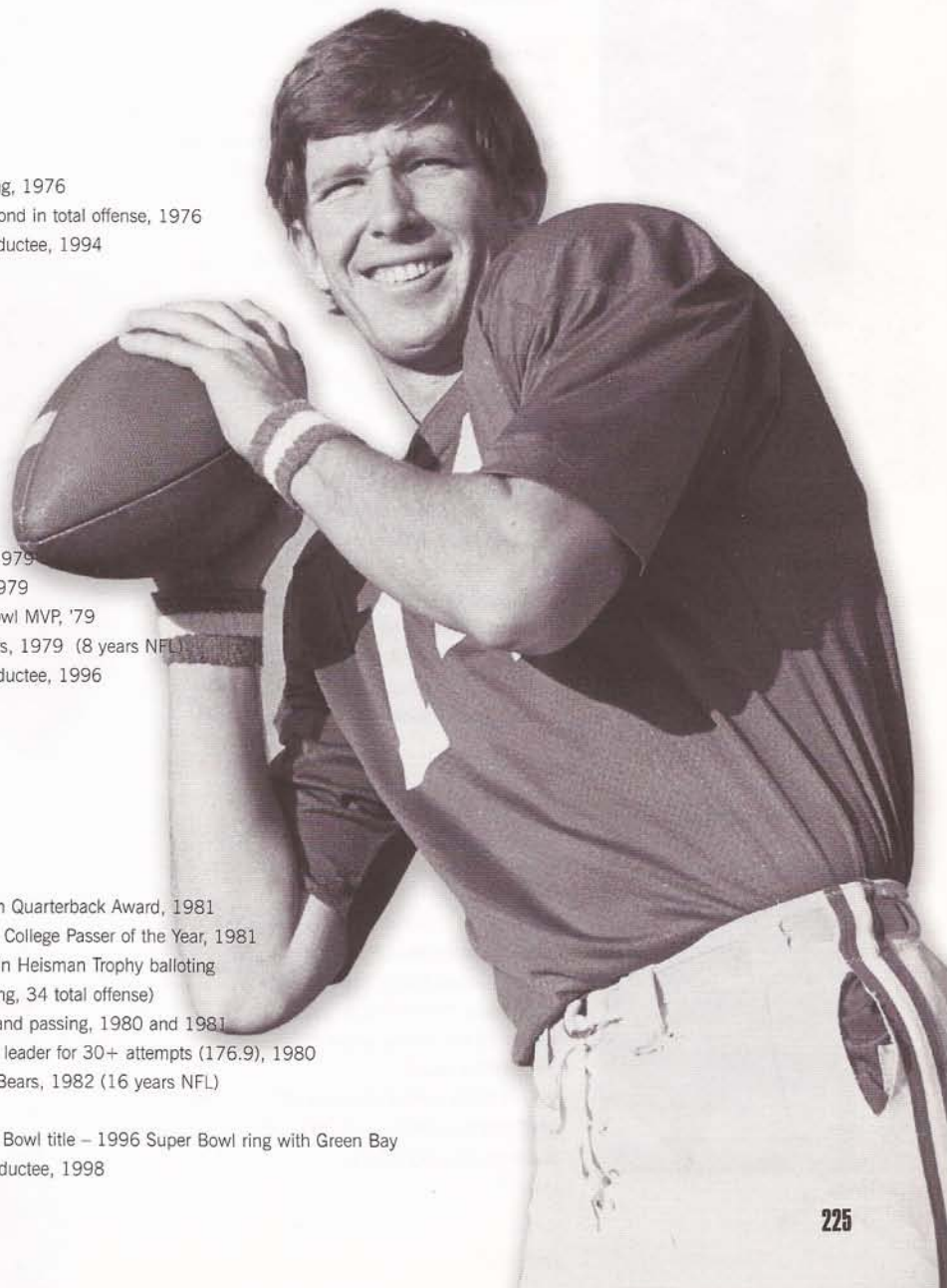

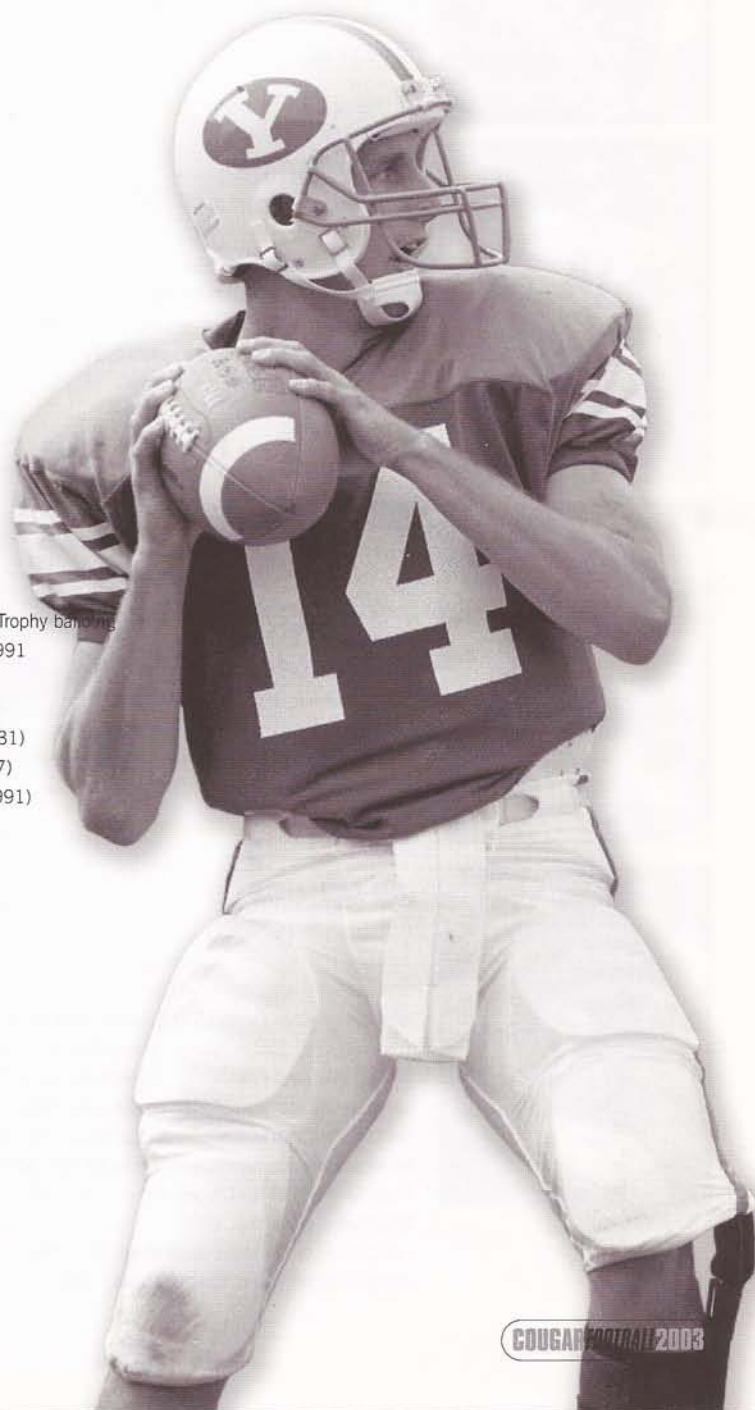

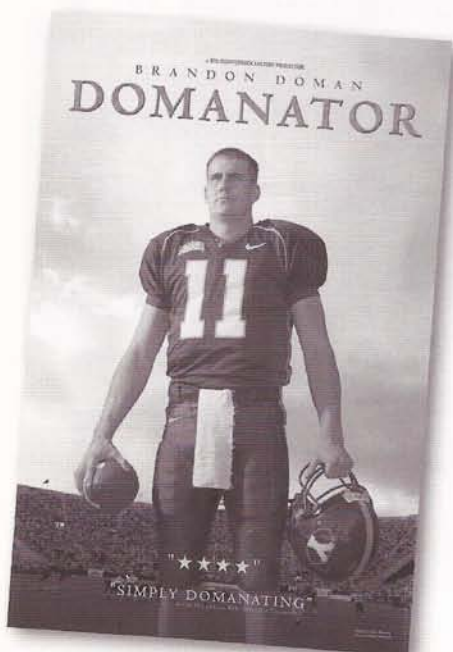

THE DOMANATOR:

After almost three years of relative anonymity on BYU's sidelines, Brandon Doman proved he could be considered among the Cougar greats. Making the most of what little opportunity given him, Doman stepped in for an injured Bret Engemann and Charlie Peterson as the third-string quarterback in 2000 and finished the year with two huge victories—one over New Mexico in Lavell Edwards' final home game, and a second in a dramatic come-from-behind victory over rival Utah to end Edwards' career. In 2001, Doman led the Cougars on an improbable run through the national rankings by winning 12 straight games to start the season. Doman won his first 14 starts, equaling a mark set by Robbie Bosco in 1984, and got the Cougars off to their best start since BYU's 1984 national championship, despite playing the majority of the year with a grade III shoulder separation in his throwing shoulder.



The Domanator racked up a slew of honors through his senior campaign, finding himself a candidate for the Heisman Trophy and a semi-finalist for the Davey O'Brien award. A unanimous First-Team Mountain West Conference selection, Doman earned BCA Classic MVP honors for his four-touchdown, 401-yard performance against Tulane. Doman finished the year ranked seventh nationally in passing efficiency and total offense by completing 64 percent of his passes for 3,542 yards, 33 touchdowns and only eight interceptions. The Domanator culminated his reign as BYU's starting quarterback with a fifth round selection by the San Francisco 49er's in the 2002 NFL draft.

SEASON PASSING EFFICIENCY & RATING RECORDS

At one time, BYU quarterbacks held season passing efficiency and rating records at all levels of competition. In 1980, Jim McMahon threw 47 touchdown passes on his way to establishing a new NCAA season passing efficiency mark at 176.9 (a record that still holds for 30-plus attempts per game). McMahon's record held up until 1995 when Danny Wuerffel of Florida set the new mark at 178.4. McMahon is currently No. 4 followed by BYU greats Ty Detmer at No. 5 (175.6) and Steve Sarkisian at No. 7 (173.6).

In 1994, future Cougar Sarkisian set a new NJCAA record at 203.8 while playing at El Camino College in Torrance, Calif. That same year, Steve Young broke the NFL mark, establishing the new record at 112.8.

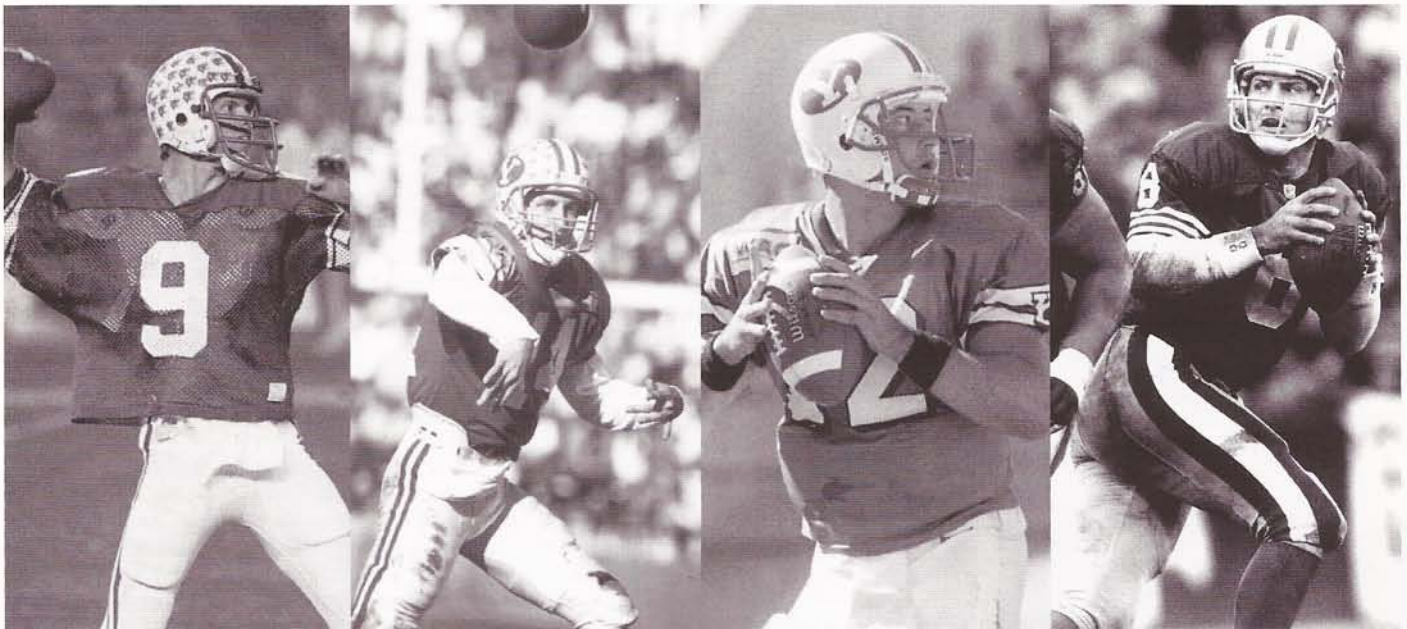

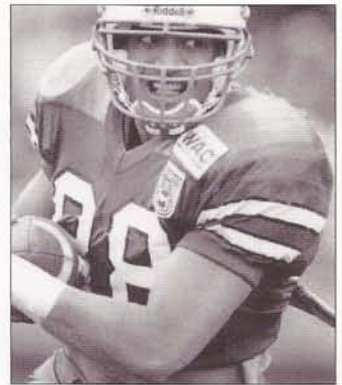

Although known as the Quarterback Factory, BYU signal callers wouldn't make the record books without someone on the receiving end of their throws. Despite being overlooked at times, the tight end position has thrived in BYU's offensive scheme.

The tight end position has been a featured position in BYU's wide-open offenses over the years. Cougar football has emerged as the home of some of the best pass-catching tight ends in NCAA history.

Starting with "Miracle Bowl" hero Clay Brown in 1980, seven BYU tight ends have earned All-American status. Since 1976, 10 Cougar tight ends have received 15 First-Team All-Conference citations. Five BYU tight ends are currently playing in the NFL. Itula Mili of the Seattle Seahawks and Chad Lewis, Pro Bowl tight end of the Philadelphia Eagles, both entered the NFL in 1997. Doug Jolley plays for the Oakland Raiders while Spencer Nead (New England) and Gabriel Reid (New York Jets) joined the NFL in 2003. Another BYU tight end, Carlos Nuno, has been playing in NFL Europe. Two former BYU tight ends Todd Christensen and Chad Lewis have been named to several Pro Bowl teams during their successful professional careers.

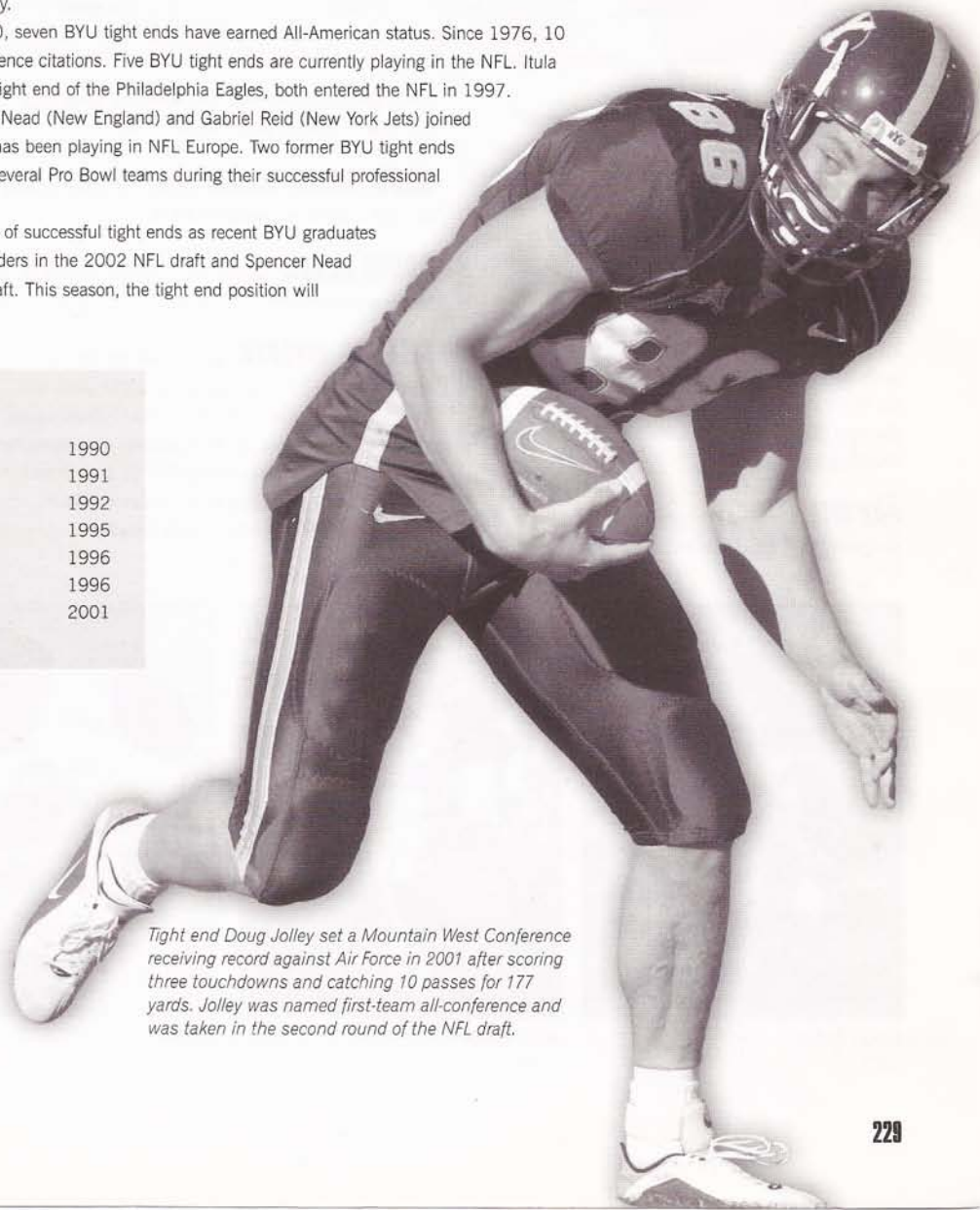
Coach Gary Crowton looks to continue BYU's tradition of successful tight ends as recent BYU graduates Doug Jolley was a second round pick of the Oakland Raiders in the 2002 NFL draft and Spencer Nead was drafted by the New England Patriots in the 2003 draft. This season, the tight end position will once again play a key role in the Cougar offense.

ELDON FORTIE- Nicknamed "The Phantom," Fortie broke 21 school records and is one of only two players in BYU football history to have his number retired. Rushed for 1,149 yards, an average of 5.8 per game, and passed for 814 yards in 1962. Holds BYU record for most rushing yards in a game (272).

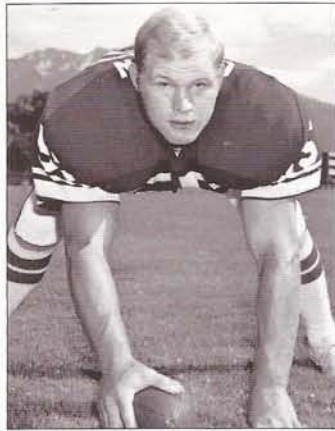

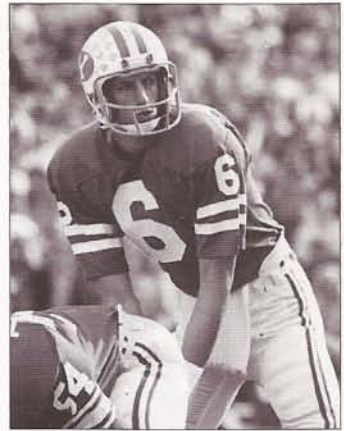

NICK EYRE- Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-America lineman. Finished third in the Outland Trophy voting. Was a three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

JIM MCMAHON- 1980 Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. GORDON HUDSON- A two-time All-American, Hudson had 67 catches for 928 yards and six touchdowns in 1982 and 44 catches for 596 yards six touchdowns in 1983. He was also a two-time first-team All-WAC selection.

STEVE YOUNG- Won Davey O'Brien Award and finished runner-up for the Heisman. BYU led nation in total offense and was second in scoring. Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game.

ROBBIE BOSCO- Led BYU to only National Championship in school history. Led nation in passing and finished runner-up in passing efficiency (151.8). Runner-up for Davey O'Brien Award and third in Heisman voting.

KYLE MORRELL- As BYU's safety Morrell was honored as the WAC Defensive Player of the Year with 70 tackles, three interceptions and one sack. MVP on Defense at 1984 Holiday Bowl. Recorded 90 tackles, 5 tackles for loss and two sacks.

MARV ALLEN- 131 tackles, four tackles for loss, four interceptions and one sack.

MARK BELLINI- Walk-on led BYU with 63 receptions for 1,008 yards, including 14 touchdowns.

JASON BUCK- Became only the third player in the Western United States to win Outland Trophy. Had 59 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks in 1986.

PAT THOMPSON- Led conference in punting with 49 punts for 2,195 yards, an average of 44.8 yards per punt. Led the nation in punting for much of the season.

MO ELEWONIBI- Didn't play football until after high school. Led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

BOB DAVIS- Had 137 tackles, including six sacks. Dick Butkus Award candidate.

CHRIS SMITH- 1989 Led team with 60 catches for 1,090 yards, including five touchdowns. 1990 Set NCAA record for tight end with 1,154 yards receiving. Caught 67 passes and scored two touchdowns.



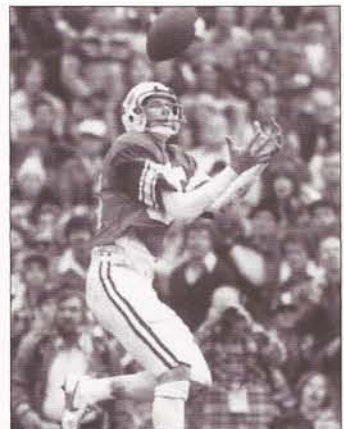

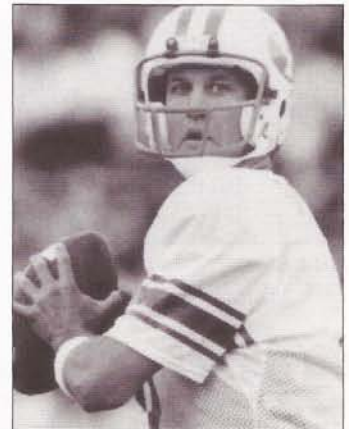

TY DETMER- 1990, 1991 First collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Passed for 5,188 yards and 41 touchdowns. Member of the NCAA All-Decade team. Still holds 58 NCAA records. His career record of 15,031 yards passing is nearly 4,000 yards more than anyone else in Division I history.

Quarterback: 1982-83

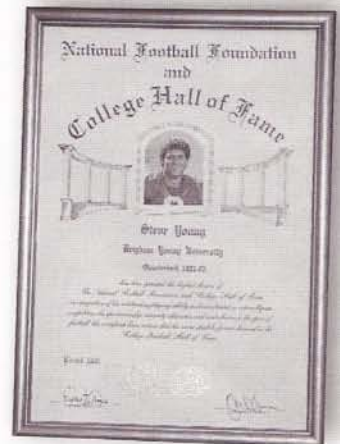
The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Chairman Jon F. Hanson and Honors Chairman Gene Gorrigan today announced the names of the 2001 Division IA College Football Hall of Fame inductees. Among the 15 former collegiate players and three head coaches was BYU All-American and NFL MVP Steve Young.

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Steve Young was consistently at the top of all the nation's statistical categories for quarterbacks en route to setting 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player-of-the-Year honors.

In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306-of-429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to their second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, along with 3,802 yards passing, 4,246 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. Few rival Young's career totals. He completed 592-of-907 attempts for a .652 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and his 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games is among college football's all-time greatest career numbers.

A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community -- a tradition he maintains today with the successful Forever Young Foundation.

Young recently retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49ers to the Super Bowl Championship in 1995, earning most-valuable-player honors. Young is the fourth BYU quarterback to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Gifford Nielsen was inducted in 1994, Marc Wilson was selected in 1996 and Jim McMahon was honored by the Hall in 1998.





JIM MCMAHON

Quarterback: 1978-81
Inducted: 1998

In 1998 Jim McMahon (1977-78, 80-81) joined former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was 1981 First Team All-America by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he earned First team All-America by the FWAA. McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year, and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 as well as pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first team all-league. He broke 23 school records, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls, and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).



MARC WILSON

Quarterback: 1976-79
Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-American honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP.

A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Wash., with their four children.



GIFFORD NIELSEN

Quarterback: 1975-77
Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over the three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

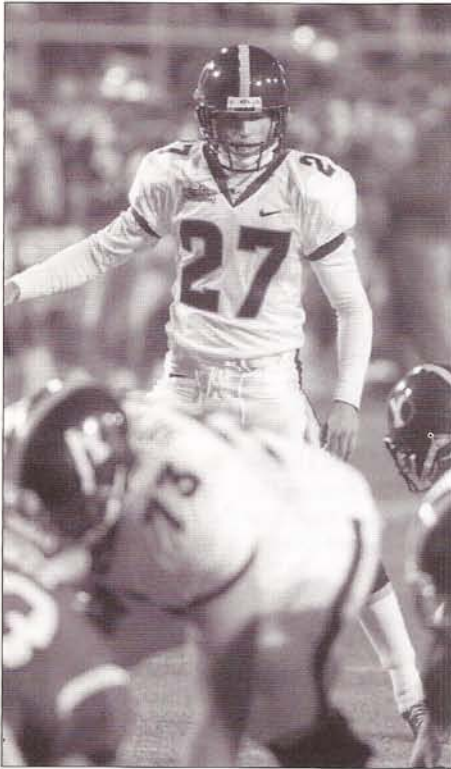

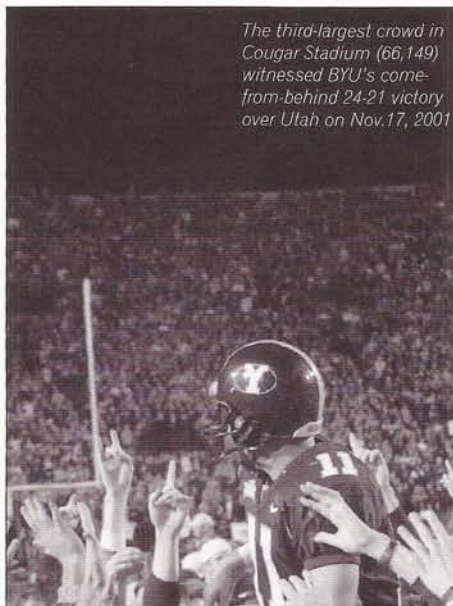

GAME SUMMARY:

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

GAME SUMMARY:

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys. BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402. BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula. Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

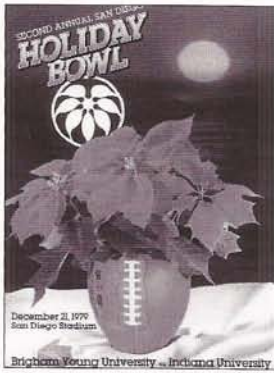

GAME SUMMARY:

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead. Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

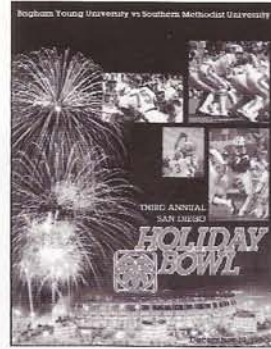

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation. Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana. The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense. Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

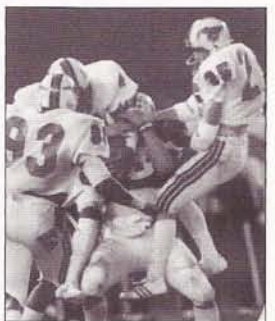

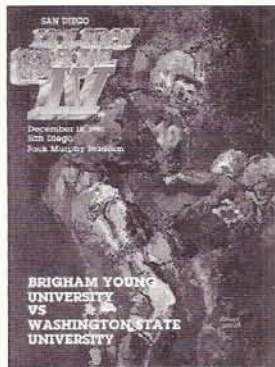

GAME SUMMARY:

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration. SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33. Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield. SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left. McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge. As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground. Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79. Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

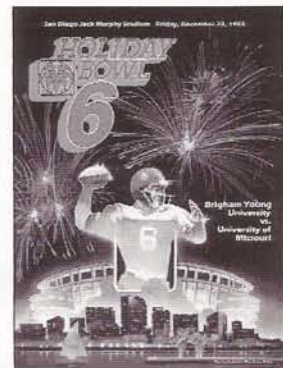

GAME SUMMARY:

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17. BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7. Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime. Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good. BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomzak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground. Ten different BYU players caught passes, led by Hudson with seven receptions for 81 yards and Balholm with 58 yards receiving.

GAME SUMMARY:

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

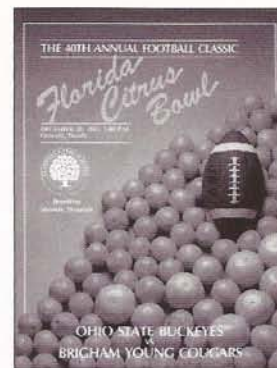

GAME SUMMARY:

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension—national championship luster—thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive. The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break. Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go. Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

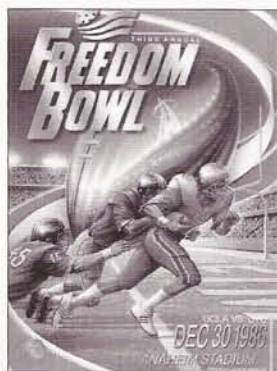

GAME SUMMARY:

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge. Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 half-time lead. In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead. Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Mark Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

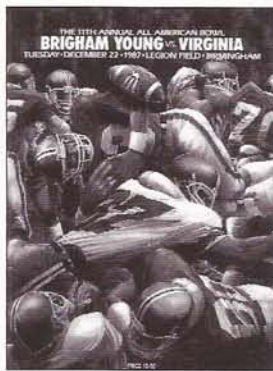

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24. The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries. The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

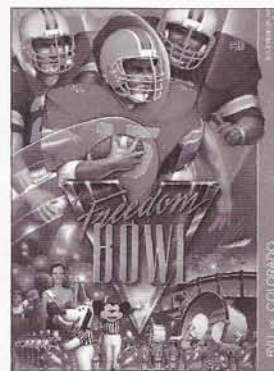

The 11th annual All-American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up. The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times. Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission. BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampers eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter. Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining. But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal. It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7. A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter. BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory. Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

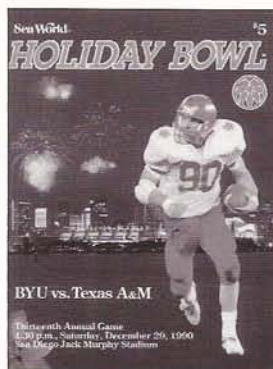

GAME SUMMARY:

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game. For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team. BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points. Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown. Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117. Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

Defensive backs Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up and Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his non-throwing shoulder. The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead. With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player. BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

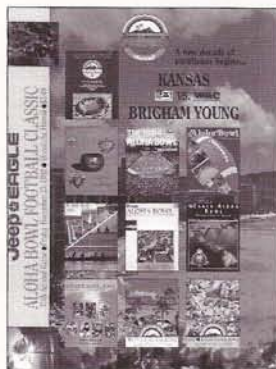

BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13. Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter. Iowa missed a 40-yard field goal with 4:19 left. On the game's final drive the Cougars moved inside the Iowa 20 with 33 seconds left to play, but Detmer's pass to tight end Byron Rex was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie. 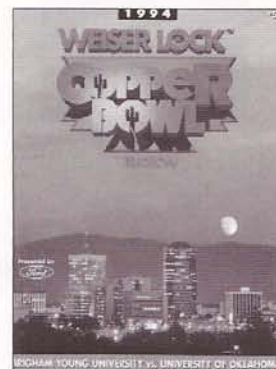

After Harris' short touchdown run late in the third, BYU and OSU traded possessions until late into the fourth quarter. After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left. On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior co-captain Eric Drage who ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line. 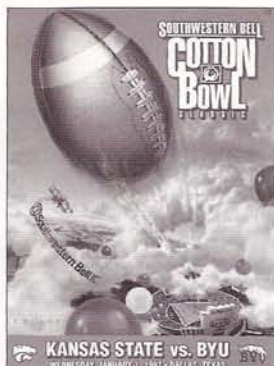

BYU's defense was dominating as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing—most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners did not cross mid-field until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter. Jamal Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU. Guard Evan Pilgrim earned second-team All-America honors and played in the Hula Bowl along with defensive end Travis Hall. Willis and defensive end Randy Brock played in the East-West Shrine Game. BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock. The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls, quarterback Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and 28-yards to K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy. KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yardline to secure the game.

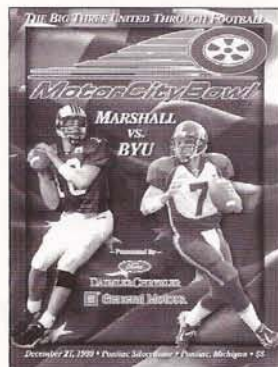

On its first drive of the final period, BYU scored for the first time since the 8:49 mark in the first half on an Aaron Cupp three-yard run. However, the Cougars couldn't capitalize inside the red zone and Feterik suffered a collarbone injury off a blind-side corner blitz. Pochman, who had connected on 18 of 25 attempts in the regular season, missed wide left on his field goal attempt. Feterik attempted to play in the second half, but left the game midway in the third quarter when Freshman Bret Engemann took the QB controls. Just before the end of the third quarter, Marshall struck a big play when Chapman rushed 87 yards for a touchdown. Marshall was given an opportunity to score in the fourth quarter as Rogers Beckett picked off an Engemann pass and ran it back to the BYU one-yard line. Chapman, to cap off his MVP performance, scored Marshall's final touchdown. The Cougars missed a final chance to score when Brian Gray had a clear path to the end zone, but dropped a sure interception.

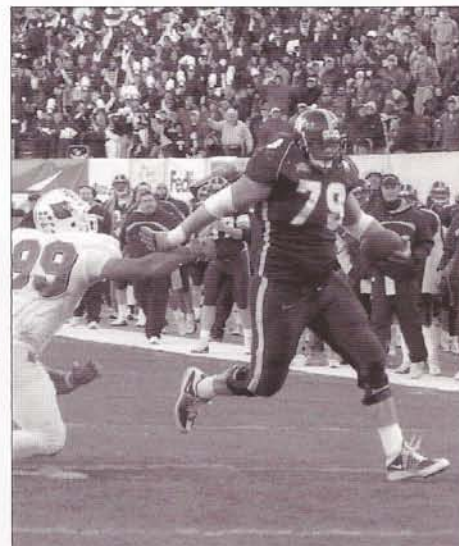

GAME SUMMARY:

The Cougars ended the 2001 season facing off against Conference USA Champion Louisville, who, like BYU, was recognized for its offensive accomplishments during the 2001 campaign. The Cardinals, led by quarterback Dave Ragone, took an early lead, scoring on a one-yard dive by Henry Miller that was set up by Zek Parker's 70-yard return of the opening kickoff. The remainder of the quarter featured tough defensive play as both teams struggled to get anything going offensively. Midway through the second quarter the Cougar offense came alive, driving to the Louisville 10-yard line before dipping into Gary Crowton's bag of tricks. Quarterback Brandon Doman dropped back and rolled right as if to pass, then turned to his left and threw the ball to Dustin Rykert on a tackle-eligible play. All 6-foot-7, 305 pounds of offensive tackle outran the Cardinal defense to the corner and rumbled 10 yards to the end zone to tie the game 7-7. Just before the half Crowton's daring play calling, which had paid off all year long, proved costly for the Cougars when a fake punt just before halftime was stuffed at the line of scrimmage and gave the Cardinals the ball at the BYU 40. Louisville just managed to take a 14-7 lead into the break, scoring with only 14 seconds left. Hoping to get back into the game in the second period, the Cougars' offense continued struggling and only managed a 29-yard field goal with just over seven minutes remaining in the third quarter. Louisville contained the Cougar attack for the remainder of the game while reaching the end zone twice more themselves. Although Louisville went on to win 28-10, BYU's defense played one of its best games of the season, holding the Cardinal's high-powered offense to 228 yards passing and only 58 yards rushing. Despite losing to end the season, Crowton's first campaign can be called nothing short of a success as he took BYU to a 12-2 mark that opened eyes across the country and raised expectations for the future.

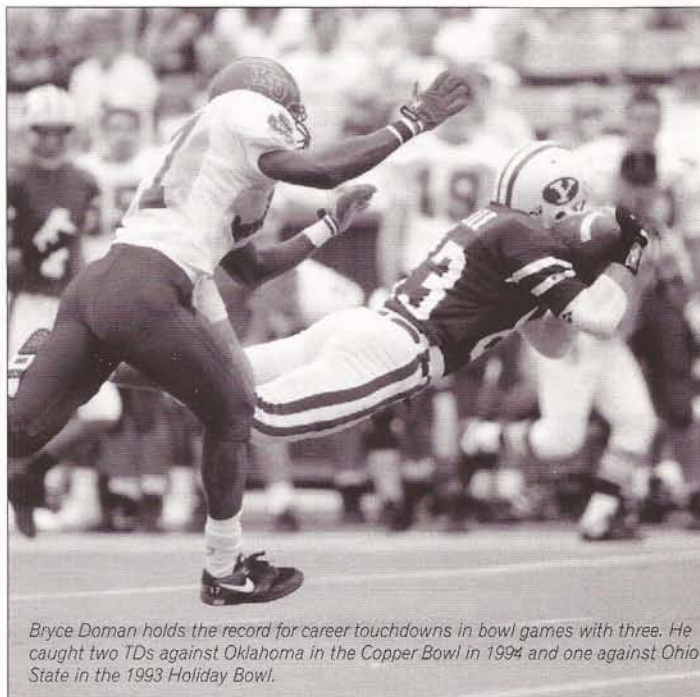

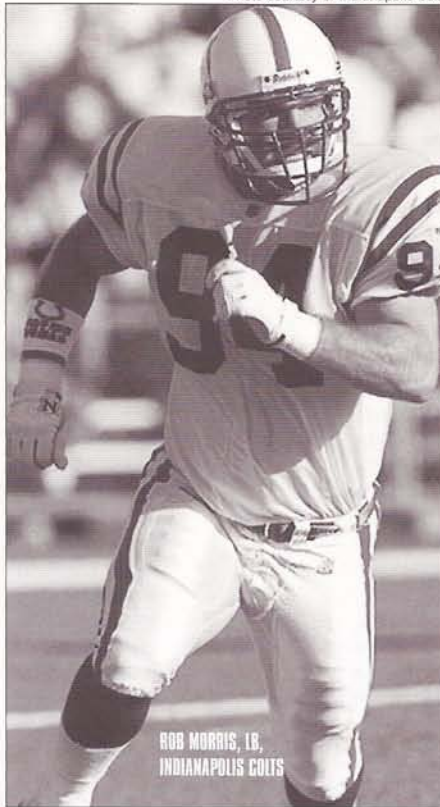

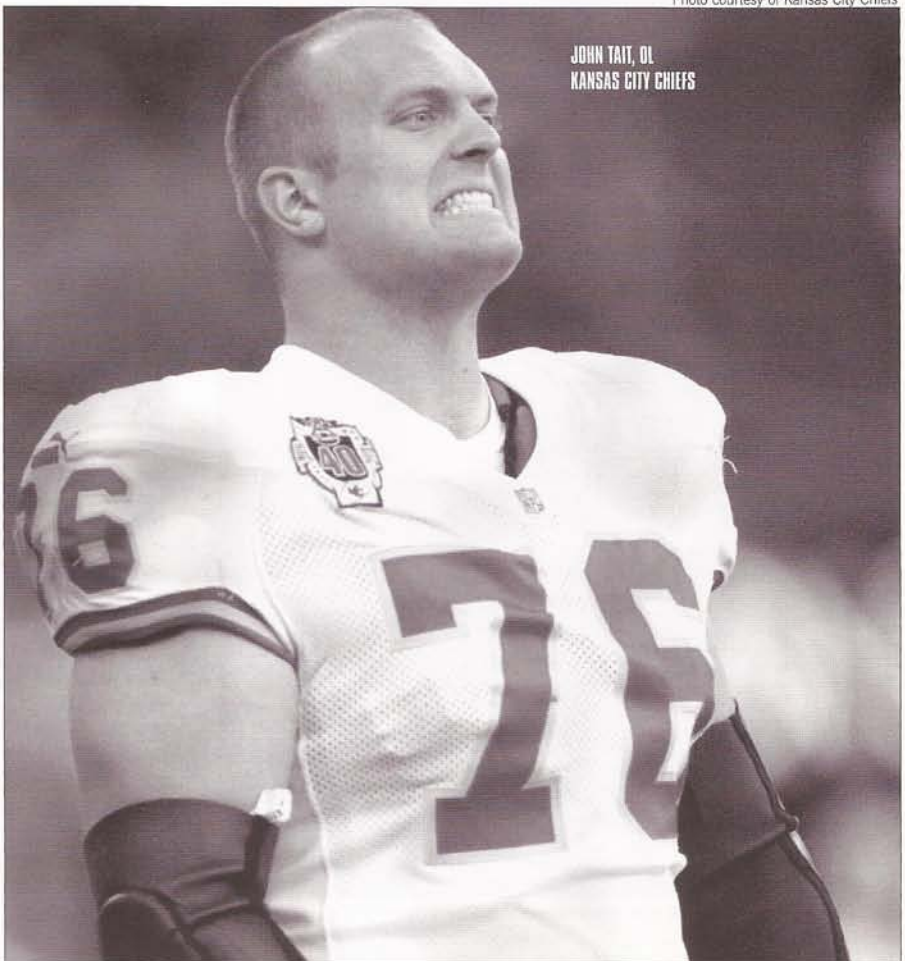

Former BYU assistant coach under LaVell Edwards, Mike Holmgren, has also won a world championship when he led his Green Bay Packers to the 1997 Super Bowl title.



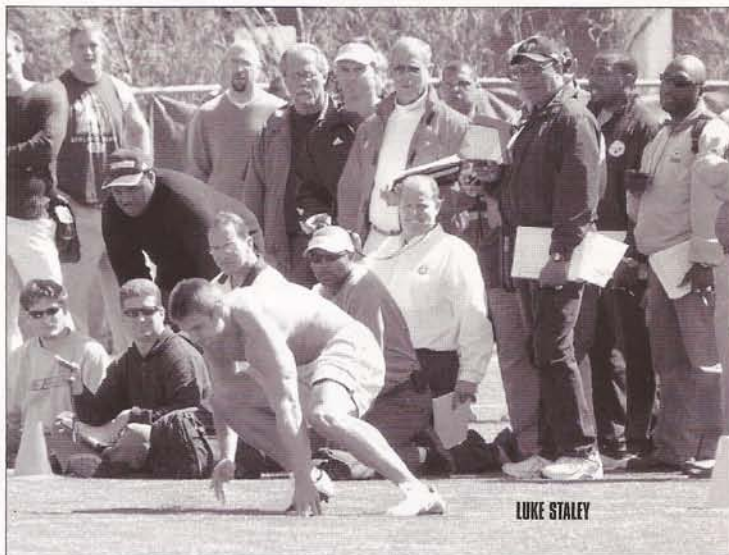

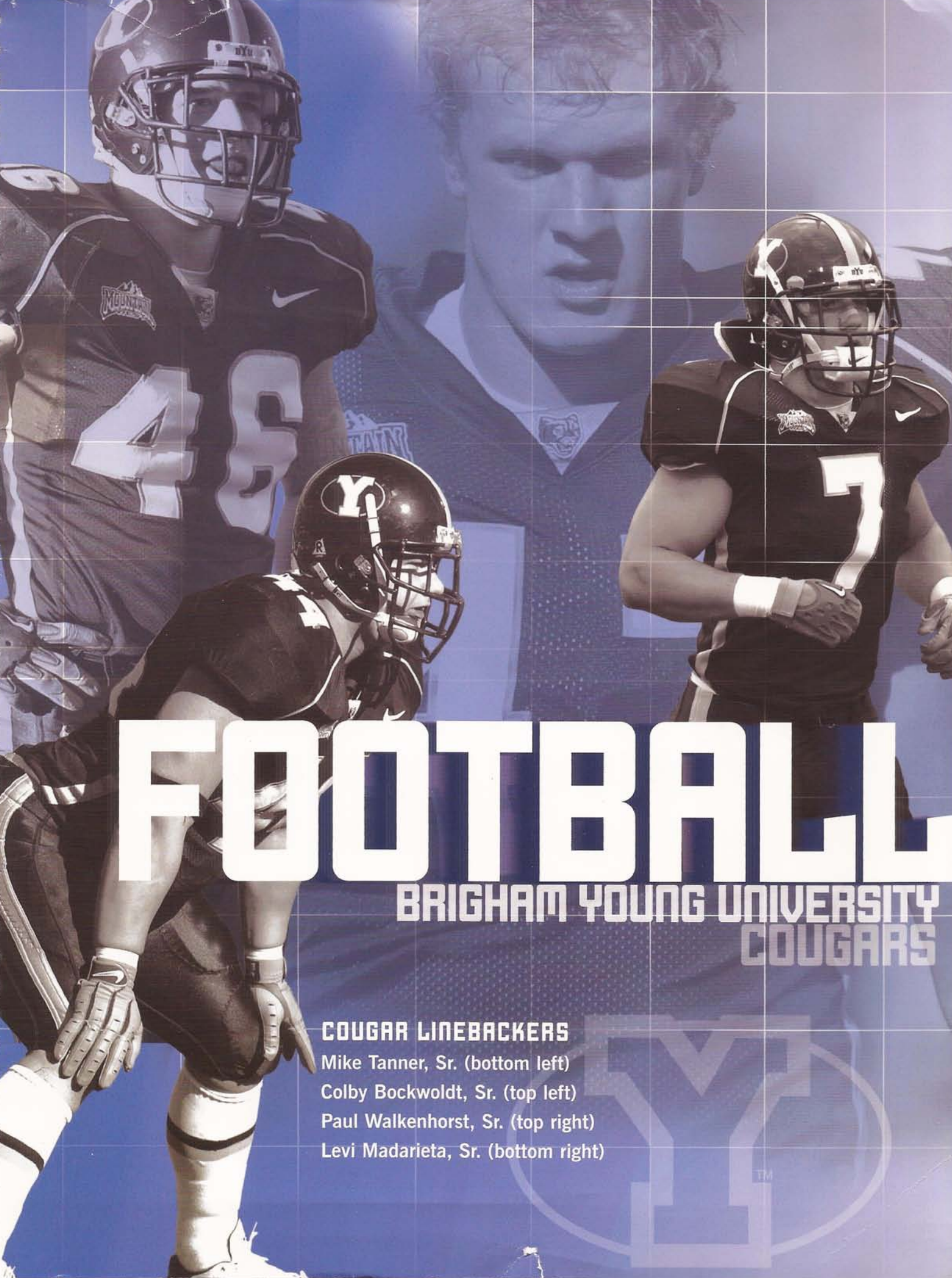
