### FOR FOURTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR, COUGARS VEGAS BOUND



After its third straight 10-2 regular season record, No. 16 BYU has accepted an invitation to play Arizona in Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl XVII on Saturday, Dec. 20. The invitation marks the fourth straight appearance for the Cougars in Las Vegas and the team's 27th overall bowl appearance since the 1974 season. The Wildcats, who earned their invitation by defeating arch-rival Arizona State, will play in the state of Nevada for the first time since traveling to Reno in 1924 and make their first postseason appearance since winning the 1998 Holiday Bowl. The MWC and Pac-10 have met the last six seasons in the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, with the MWC winning four times.

Game time is scheduled for 5 p.m. (PT) and will be broadcast nationally on ESPN.

### THE BYU-ARIZONA SERIES



The 2008 Las Vegas Bowl will mark the 22nd meeting between these two teams. BYU and Arizona first met in 1936 in Tucson with the Wildcats running to a 32-6 victory. The Cougars won the first meeting in Provo back in the 1967 season, 17-14. Arizona owns an 11-9-1 advantage in the series, including a 16-13 victory in Tucson to open the 2006 season, while BYU returned the favor in 2007 with a 20-7 win in LaVell Edwards Stadium. Both members of the old Western Athletic Conference, the two teams met every year from 1962 through 1977. During that time, Arizona won nine of the 16 games. Dec. 20 will mark the first time these two teams will meet at a neutral site.

### WHAT THE GAME MEANS

- A win against Arizona would give the Cougars their third straight bowl win, including their 10th bowl victory overall.

- A win against Arizona would mark the first time BYU has won three straight bowl appearances.

- A win over Arizona would secure the third straight season BYU has finished the season ranked among the nation's top-25 programs. After a 38-8 win over Oregon in the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl, the Cougars finished the season ranked 15th in the USA Today Coaches Poll and 16th in the Associated Press Top-25. The 2007 season ended with BYU ranked 14th in both polls following its nail-biting 17-16 win over UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl. The 1990-92 seasons marked the last time BYU finished the year ranked in the top-25 in three consecutive seasons.

- A victory over Arizona would give the Cougars a 5-1 record over teams from the Pac-10 over the past two seasons. Since 2007 BYU has posted a 4-1 record against the likes of Arizona (1-0), UCLA (2-1) and Washington (1-0). Interestingly, the Cougars have outscored Pac-10 opponents 141-77 in the previous five match-ups.

BECOMING BOWL ELIGIBLE

With a win against New Mexico on Oct. 11, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season and qualified to participate in their fourth straight bowl game for the first time since 1994 season.

ANOTHER 10-WIN SEASON

The Cougars' 38-24 victory over Air Force on Nov. 15 improved the team's record to 10-2 on the season, marking the third-straight 10-win season and the 14th since the 1979 campaign.

RACKING UP THE WEEKLY AWARDS

Based on their performances since the beginning of the season, the Cougars continue to accumulate weekly awards on both the Mountain West Conference and national level.

NATIONAL RANKINGS

For the first time since 1997, BYU kicked off the season ranked among the nation's top-25 programs in both the USA Today Coaches' Poll (No. 17), and the Associated Press Top 25 (No. 16).

COMPETING AS A RANKED TEAM

After their loss at Utah, the Cougars are 148-43 when nationally ranked in the Top 25. A ranked BYU team has won 17 of its last 19 games, dating back to 2006.

YEARLY RANKED

This season BYU became one of only nine schools nationally to be ranked in the top 25 of the final BCS standings each of the past three seasons.

CONSISTENT WINS

Over the past three seasons only five teams have won more games than the Cougars. With BYU's 32-6 three-year record, only Boise State (35-3), Florida (34-6), Oklahoma (34-7), Ohio State (33-5) and USC (33-5) have more victories over the past three seasons.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 326.4 pounds and average 6-feet-6. The front five will be going up against an Arizona defensive front that measures an average 6-feet-2, 259 pounds.

VERSUS THE PAC-10

After its 59-0 victory over UCLA on Sept. 13, 2008, BYU is now 5-1 in the last six meetings with Pac-10 opponents, including back-to-back wins against Washington and UCLA.

The 59-0 final score between BYU and UCLA marked a new BYU record-high lead over a Pac-10 opponent. The Cougars' largest lead prior to that game was 31-0 against Oregon in the fourth quarter of the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl.



**TRAILING AT THE HALF**

For only the third time this season and second consecutive game, the Cougars found themselves down at the halfway mark--entering the locker room behind the Utes 27-17. The Cougars last trailed 14-10 heading into the break at Air Force, as well as 23-0 at TCU. BYU is 1-2 when down at halftime.

**KEEPING UP IN THE CLASSROOM**



Academically, only Penn State (4) placed more student-athletes on the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America First Team than BYU as starters David Oswald (offensive tackle), Matt Bauman (linebacker) and Kellen Fowler (safety)

each earned the high honor. Dating back to 1966, 28 BYU football players have received Academic All-America honors but never before have the Cougars had three members earn first-team accolades during the same season.

**CONSECUTIVE STARTS**

The Utah game marked senior offensive lineman Dallas Reynolds' 50th straight career start. During that streak, Reynolds has started at every position on the offensive line, including tackle, guard and center. Reynolds' younger brother Matt started at left tackle in the 2008 season opener. His father, Lance, is the associate head coach for the Cougars. Reynolds is currently tied at first for the most consecutive starts by an active Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A) player. Reynolds has started in every game of his BYU career, beginning with the Cougars' 20-3 loss to Boston College on Sep. 3, 2005.

**THANK YOU SENIORS!**

BYU's seniors had a strong showing against SDSU, playing in their last home game in LaVell Edwards Stadium. Linebacker and team captain David Nixon led the defense with a career-high 14 tackles. Running back Fui Vakapuna recorded the first touchdown of the game on a seven-yard run. BYU's first score of the second half came on a three-yard run by Wayne Latu, and wide receiver Michael Reed finished the game with a season-high 95-yards receiving.

**22 SENIORS RECOGNIZED**

Playing their last game in LaVell Edwards Stadium, 22 seniors were recognized at the start of the SDSU game, a group that included members of the 2003 recruiting class, walk-ons and junior college transfers. This group of veterans have played an integral part of BYU's three undefeated seasons at home. Those recognized were:

**FUMBLE RECOVERIES**

Freshman defensive back Blake Morgan forced a fumble early in the third quarter against Air Force, which was recovered by freshman linebacker Spencer Hadley, his second recovery this season. BYU capitalized on the turnover, with Harvey Unga scampering into the endzone for a one-yard touchdown run, giving BYU a 24-14 lead. Morgan made the trip to Air Force in place of junior linebacker Shawn Doman.

**TURNOVERS TRANSLATING TO POINTS**

The Cougars last forced two Air Force turnovers, including Spencer Hadley's fumble recovery and Brandon Howard's 4th-quarter interception. In 11 games this season BYU has forced 27 turnovers, converting 18 of those into points. Of those 18 turnovers, 15 have resulted in touchdowns (105 points) for the Cougars.

**HE WHO SCORES FIRST...**

Louie Sakoda's 37-yard field goal for Utah with 9:48 remaining in the first quarter marked the fourth time this season BYU has failed to score first. The Cougars previously gave up touchdowns to New Mexico, TCU and CSU and are now 2-2 when giving up the first points of the game. BYU has scored first in eight games this season, marking 30 times in the last 37 games. The Cougars are 28-2 in those 30 games.

**COIN TOSS**

The Utah game marked the seventh time this season BYU won the opening coin toss, with the Cougars electing to defer to the second half. BYU is now 5-2 when winning the opening toss.

**IT'S BEEN A WHILE**

BYU has been unable to return a kickoff for a touchdown for 130 consecutive games. Mike Rigell was the last Cougar to accomplish the feat, turning in a 96-yard touchdown in a 31-9 victory at Hawaii on October 17, 1998.

**DON'T LOOK BACK**

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 33-4 when leading at halftime and 32-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

**DOUBLE TIME**

The Air Force game marked the second time this season both wide receiver Austin Collie and tight end Dennis Pitta finished the game surpassing 100-yards receiving, with 130 and 113 yards, respectively. The last time the duo accomplished this feat was on Nov. 1 at CSU. In that game Pitta recorded 175 yards, while Collie followed with 156 yards.

**PAPER OR PLASTIC**

Junior linebacker Matt Ah You's sack against Utah's Brian Johnson in the second quarter marked a career first. Through 12 games this season the Cougar defense has recorded 21 sacks. Junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen's sack against CSU's Billy Farris in the fourth quarter gave him 21.5 career sacks, breaking the previous MWC record of 20.5 he shared with New Mexico's Michael Tuohy, TCU's Chase Ortiz and former Cougar Brady Poppinga. Jorgensen added a second sack and forced a fumble with just 22 seconds remaining to help secure the win and bring his career sack total to 22.5. He recorded four sacks his freshman season in 2006, 13.5 his sophomore season and five to date in 2008.

**FIRST HALF DOMINANCE**

The Cougars held a lead at halftime against San Diego State, for the first time since the New Mexico game on Oct. 11. It marks the 17th time in the past 24 games BYU has held the lead at intermission. The Cougars have held their opponent to seven or fewer points in the opening half six times in 12 games this season. BYU is undefeated in those six games.

**50-YARD CATCHES BOOKEND REED'S CAREER**

Playing in the final home game of his BYU career, senior wide receiver Michael Reed caught a career-long 56-yard pass from quarterback Max Hall late in the second quarter of the SDSU game, setting up a six-yard touchdown reception by tight end Andrew George on the following play. Reed's previous career-long reception was during his freshman season in 2005 when he caught a 50-yard pass from John Beck in the Air Force game. That catch contributed to Reed's first 100-yard receiving game this season with 103 yards. His other 100-yard game came in 2007 when he racked up a career-high 132 yards in BYU's 55-47 loss to Tulsa.



EDWARDS' STADIUM STREAK NOW SPANS THREE SEASONS-SETS PROGRAM RECORD

With BYU's 41-12 win over SDSU, the Cougars have not lost in Edwards Stadium since a 41-34 overtime thriller to Utah on November 19, 2005. BYU has won 18 straight home games, dating back to September 9, 2006—setting a new BYU record. Over that span, the Cougars have beaten their opponents by an average of 27.8 points per game and have allowed just 11.3 points per game. The Cougars won 17 consecutive home games 16 seasons ago from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991. Since the stadium was built in 1964, BYU has gone undefeated at home 14 times:

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats.

"FAN" TASTIC FANS

The 64,107 fans in attendance for the Cougars' 42-19 win over SDSU marked the 12th consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium. The current streak marks the longest streak of consecutive sellouts since the 1990-92 seasons. Over 380,000 (384,613) fans have attended the Cougars' six home games at Edwards Stadium this season, averaging 64,102 fans per game. The last time the stadium was not sold out was against New Mexico on Nov. 18, 2006 when 63,814 fans were in attendance—231 short of a sellout.

HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

Since it was built in 1964, the Cougars have fielded several dominating teams. This season, BYU averaged 41.33 points per game at home while limiting its opponents to just 11.17. The margin of difference had the Cougars beating their opponents by an average of 30.16 points. The 35.16-point differential in 2006 was a BYU record in scoring margin in the stadium's 42-year history (and the program's 84-year history):

## QUARTER REPORT

The Cougar defense held Utah scoreless in the third quarter. All totaled, the BYU has recorded 21 shutout quarters thru 11 games of the season, including two complete shutout wins over UCLA and Wyoming. The Cougars has outscored or tied their opponents in every quarter except 12 in 2008.

## GOING FOR TWO

Against UNLV the Cougars were successful on their only 2-point conversion attempt of the season. Harvey Unga caught a pass from Max Hall in the endzone following a Dennis Pitta touchdown, putting BYU up 42-35 with 1:46 remaining in the game. The last time the Cougars attempted and were successful on a two-point conversion was during the 17-10 victory over Utah in 2007.

## PLAYING UNDER THE LIGHTS

After its loss to TCU, BYU now holds a 1-1 record when playing night games. The Cougars' game against Utah State (W, 34-14) marked BYU's first night game of the 2008 season.

## BLOCK PARTY

Senior linebacker David Nixon kept the Falcons off the scoreboard late in the first quarter after blocking a 54-yard field goal attempt by Lou Groza Award candidate Ryan Harrison.

As a team, BYU has blocked five kicks this season, surpassing the three blocks recorded in 2007. Along with Nixon, Bryan Kariya blocked a punt against UNLV, Jan Jorgensen blocked a potentially game-tying PAT at Washington, Russell Tialavea blocked a UCLA field goal attempt and Michael Alisa blocked a kick against New Mexico. The last time BYU recorded five or more blocked kicks in a season was back in 1998 (6).

## PULLING OUT THE CLOSE ONES

After a close 45-42 victory over the CSU Rams, the Cougars have won eight consecutive games decided by seven points or fewer, including back-to-back nailbiters against UNLV and CSU this season.

## UNGA SURPASSES 2,000 CAREER YARDS

With his 116 yards rushing against Utah, sophomore running back Harvey Unga now has 1,082 yards on the season, surpassing the 2,000-yard career mark with 2,319. Unga racked up 1,227 yards on the ground in his freshman season and 10 before redshirting the 2006 season.

## LONGEST MARCH DOWNFIELD

BYU's first touchdown drive against New Mexico of 95 yards marked the longest of the 2008 season in terms of yardage. The drive which lasted 5:04 minutes, ended with a one-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Max Hall to tight end Andrew George. The Cougars' longest drive in terms of time off the clock was in the second-quarter of the UCLA game. The 13-play drive of 48 yards took 6:43 minutes off the game clock.

## FUMBLES FOR THE SCORE

In the first quarter against Utah State on Oct. 3, sophomore defensive back Brandon Bradley recovered the first fumble of his career, returning it for a 38-yard touchdown. The touchdown marked the second straight game the Cougars scored off a fumble recovery, as fellow defensive back Scott Johnson returned a loose ball for a touchdown in BYU's 44-0 victory over Wyoming on Sept. 20.

## LARGEST LOSS SINCE 2005

For a team that averaged 37.8 points coming into the TCU game, the Cougars suffered their worst loss since a 49-23 loss at Notre Dame in 2005. TCU's 32 points marked a season-high for BYU opponents, who before Thursday, averaged only 10.2 points per game.

## NATION'S LONGEST WINNING STREAK ENDS

With their 32-7 loss to TCU on Thursday, the Cougars' 16-game winning streak ended. Before today, BYU's last loss came on Sept. 15, 2007 at Tulsa. The Cougars lost that matchup 55-47.

## UNANSWERED POINTS

The Cougars put together a run of 137 unanswered points over the span of three games before the Utah State Aggies scored a touchdown with 13:47 remaining in the fourth quarter. The stretch consisted of shutout wins over UCLA and Wyoming, 59-0 and 44-0, respectively, as well as a 24-0 lead heading into the fourth quarter against Utah State. Over that time BYU held its opponents scoreless in 11 straight quarters.

## RUNNING IT BACK...

Austin Collier's 75-yard kickoff return on BYU's opening drive against UNLV marked a season-long for the Cougars. The previous team-high was O'Neill Chamber's 51-yard return against Northern Iowa. The last time BYU had a kickoff return for more than 75 yards was Nate Meikle's 84-yard return against Wyoming on Nov. 9, 2006.

## PROTECTING THE "BLUEZONE"

Despite its relative youth, the Cougar defense successfully kept its opponents from scoring a single touchdown in three of the first seven games of the season. Both UCLA and Wyoming were held scoreless through four quarters apiece, while New Mexico forced to settle for a single field goal.

## CURRENTLY SERVING MISSIONS...

There are 45 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 13 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Korea, Madagascar, Mexico, Russia, Sweden and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions speak a total of nine different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, German, Japanese, Malagasy, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish.

## SERVED MISSIONS...

Of the 105 players on the team roster, 60 have served a church mission (57 percent). Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 14 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Puerto Rico, United States and Uruguay. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 16 different states, including Alaska, California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, New Mexico, New York, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Washington. Current members of the BYU football team who have previously served church missions speak a total of nine different foreign languages, including Chinese, French, German, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.

## WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. "Mormon" missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world. Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their



area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language. Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea. A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize. Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.

### TEAM CAPTAINS

Seniors Travis Bright and David Nixon, along with juniors Max Hall and Jan Jorgensen were selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2008 football season.

Collectively the captains have 151 games of experience, with all four starting each game for the past two seasons. Hall ended the 2007 season as the nation's top sophomore quarterback, passing for 3,848 yards. Bright, an offensive lineman, was part of an offensive unit that led the MWC and ranked 14th nationally in passing offense, averaging 298.4 yards per game. Over the course of the 2007 season, defensive lineman Jorgensen recorded 14 sacks for a combined loss of 115 yards, producing at least one sack in seven straight games. At linebacker, Nixon was credited with a career-high 66 tackles on the season, including a career-best 38 solo tackles.

### BEST IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST



Since the Mountain West Conference was formed in 1999, BYU has posted a record of 52-22 against league opponents, marking the most wins of any other conference opponent. The Cougars have also won a league-best four MWC titles (1999, 2001, 2006 and 2007). Listed below is the all-time MWC standings:

### A BYU COACHING FIRST

With a 21-3 win over New Mexico on Oct. 11, 2008, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season, qualifying for their fourth straight bowl game. BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU history to qualify for four straight bowl games in his first four years. Mendenhall currently ranks second behind LaVell Edwards with the most postseason appearances in BYU football history.

### HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



In his fourth season as the head coach at Brigham Young, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001, Mendenhall has guided his teams to four straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and consistent national top-25 rankings.

After a 6-6 season in 2005, Mendenhall's Cougars have earned a 32-6 record over the past three seasons, including back-to-back Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl victories in 2006 and 2007. Only five teams in the last three years have won more games than BYU. Boasting a 38-12 overall record, Mendenhall has coached his team to 20 wins in the last 22 games to help the Cougars become one of only nine teams to be ranked in the final BCS standings in each of the last three seasons.

In his first season, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned



an invitation to the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl – the team's first postseason bowl appearance in three seasons. Over the next two seasons, he coached the Cougars to back-to-back 11-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents.

In 2008, BYU posted a 10-2 regular season to achieve three straight 10-win seasons for only the third time in school history. In doing so, Mendenhall's teams became the first in Cougar history to go unbeaten at home over three consecutive seasons. While defending its home turf in 2008, BYU produced many memorable moments, including a 59-0 win over 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl opponent UCLA.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall has stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo during the 2005 season, Mendenhall and the Cougars have registered perfect 6-0 records each of the past three seasons. In 2006, the Cougars finished the season as the most dominate home team in the country, and the most dominate home team in BYU football history, winning games by an average 35.16 points per game. In 2008 BYU won at home by 30.16 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars allowed just 11.3 points per game, marking the best scoring defense effort since the 1988 season when BYU held opponents to just 10.2 points per game.

The Cougars have received four straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first four teams to a bowl game. In fact, with BYU's invitation to attend the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU football history to take a team to a bowl game in three straight seasons during his first three years as a head coach.

On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach in 2005, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted an 11-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC. In dominating fashion, and with a swagger similar to that of the glory years of BYU football, the Cougars handed Oregon a 38-8 defeat in the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl.

Throughout the 2006 season, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The 2007 season started out in similar fashion, winning just one of the team's first three games; however, under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars rebounded to win the final 10 games of the season, and like the previous year, garnered the attention of local, regional and national voters. BYU finished the season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings—three places higher than the 2006 Cougars. In the final polls of the season, BYU finished ranked 14th in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll, marking the highest finish for the Cougars since finishing No. 5 following the 1996 season.

Like the 2006 season, BYU ranked among the nation's leaders in several statistical categories. The Cougars led the MWC and ranked 14th in passing offense, averaging 298.4 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked 25th in total offense, averaging 442.8 yards per game.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked 10th nationally in total defense, allowing just 307.9 yards per game. During the regular season, the Cougars did not allow a single 100-yard rusher. BYU finished the year ranked 9th nationally, allowing an average 97.5 yards rushing per game. One of Mendenhall's jobs as the head coach and defensive coordinator is to manage points. Defensively, BYU ranked 9th in the nation, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

In 2008, BYU earned a spot in the national polls each week of the season, including a ranking as high as No. 7. With two blemishes on its resume with road losses at No. 6 Utah and No. 11 TCU, BYU enters the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl ranked No. 16 in the BCS standings. Off the field, only Penn State (4) placed more student-athletes on the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America First Team than BYU in 2008. Cougar starters David Oswald (offensive tackle), Matt Bauman (linebacker) and Kellen Fowler (safety) each earned the high honor as BYU had three first-teamers for the first time during the same season.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.



Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple has three sons.

JAIME HILL NAMED DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Jaime Hill (first name pronounced high-may) has been promoted to defensive coordinator.

The move formalizes the capacity Hill has served in over the past season. While Mendenhall will maintain play-calling responsibilities on game-day, Hill is responsible for managing the essential aspects of running the defensive unit.

"I'm very grateful for this opportunity for personal growth within this profession; especially with this great program at Brigham Young University," Hill said. "I truly believe the foundation was laid by Coach Edwards and his staff, along with the players. Coach Mendenhall's staff and players have brought back the past glory, and have created their own line of history that will be passed down. This is something we can build upon for the future, and the future looks bright."

Since arriving at BYU for the 2006 season, Hill has played a significant role in the defensive secondary's marked improvement. In the two seasons since his arrival, BYU is averaging 17 interceptions, 50.5 pass break-ups and is allowing just under 208 yards passing per game. In addition, due in part to improved coverage, sacks have also increased to an average 28 per season since Hill's arrival.

In 2007 the Cougars finished as the 10th ranked defense in the country. Rushing defense finished the season ranked 9th nationally, passing defense jumped to 32nd and the team finished ninth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

"Coach Hill has made a tremendous impact on our defense in the time he has been here and this is a way for us to recognize him for his contributions," Mendenhall said. "This promotion gives Coach Hill the formal responsibility of handling the day-to-day duties of running the defense, allowing me to focus my attention on other aspects of the program. I have a lot of respect for Coach Hill and the work he has done, and I am confident this will give our defense the opportunity to continue to improve."

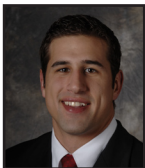

### OTHER PLAYERS TO WATCH...

#### Matt Bauman-LB

This season Bauman has stepped in to fill the leadership role left behind by graduated senior Kelly Poppinga. In 2007 Bauman was credited with a key fumble recovery in BYU's one-point bowl victory over UCLA. He also had an interception in the Cougars' win over Utah. Through the 2008 regular season, Bauman leads the team with 101 tackles. He also has two sacks for 11 yards, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

#### Coleby Clawson-LB

In his first season as a Cougar, after transferring from Snow College, Clawson has started the past 10 games in place of the injured Vic So'oto. He is second on the team in sacks with four for 29 yards. He also has a team-high three forced fumbles, along with team-leading 11.5 tackles for loss.

#### O'Neill Chambers-WR/KR

A true freshman out of Harmony, Fla., Chambers averages 23.2 yards per kick return. His longest return was for 51 yards against Northern Iowa, his first collegiate game. His 33 kick returns on the season is tied for first in both the BYU and MWC record books. With senior Michael Reed out with injury, Chambers recorded his first career start against Utah St. His first touchdown came late in the first quarter against UNLV—a 20-yard reception from Max Hall.

#### Andrew George-TE

Together with Dennis Pitta, George has continued the tradition of success found by tight ends at BYU. George recorded 200 yards on 17 receptions in 2007, including a career-high three receptions for 62 yards during the team's regular-season matchup against UCLA. The junior tight end recorded his first touchdown of the 2008 season in BYU's 28-27 win over Washington. Against New Mexico, George totaled three receptions for 22 yards, including two of the three touchdowns of the game. In the regular season he has recorded 21 receptions for 204 yards and five touchdowns.

#### Mitch Payne-K

After nursing a groin injury during the majority of last season, Payne has been healthy throughout the 2008 season. He has converted 51-of-53 point-after attempts and scored a total of 81 points so far this season. In BYU's 59-0 win over UCLA in 2008, Payne made a perfect 8-of-8 PAT attempts, tying the MWC record for most PATs made by a sophomore in a single game. He kicked a career-long 46-yard field goal against Air Force.

#### Michael Reed-WR

An experienced outside receiver, Reed is in his final season for the Cougars after logging significant playing time over the past three years. Reed had 41 catches for 449 yards and four touchdowns a year ago. Against SDSU in 2008 and in his final home game as a Cougar, Reed recorded a season-high 95 yards, including a 56-yard completion from Max Hall—a new career-high.

#### Fui Vakapuna-RB

Slowed by injury the majority of the 2007 season, senior Vakapuna made a large contribution to the experienced BYU offense in 2008. Vakapuna is known for his ability to break tackles and run over those standing in his way. He recorded his first carry and touchdown of the 2008 season against Washington. Against UNLV, Vakapuna had 9 carries for 72 yards, averaging 7.9 yards per carry.
