### THE BYU-UCLA SERIES



Beating the Bruins has been something the Cougars have struggled with over the years. Entering the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, the Bruins enjoyed a 7-1 advantage over BYU, dating back to 1983. In fact, it had been 24 years since the Cougars had defeated UCLA. BYU's 17-16 bowl victory ended the Bruins' seven-game win streak over the Cougars and marked the first BYU victory since the 1983 season. The victory also avenged an early 2007 season loss to the Bruins -- one of only two losses the team suffered all year. The

two teams will meet again on Saturday in Provo and will mark the third meeting between the two teams in a span of 370 days.

- Oct. 1, 1983 -- BYU 37, UCLA 35 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Steve Young threw 25-36 for 270 yards and two touchdowns.
- Sep. 7, 1985 -- UCLA 27, BYU 24 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah. BYU failed to hold on to a 3-point halftime lead, allowing 11 fourth quarter points.
- Dec. 30, 1986 -- UCLA 31, BYU 10 at Anaheim Stadium in Anaheim, Calif. The Bruins won their second straight game over the Cougars in the two teams' first Freedom Bowl appearances.
- Sep. 7, 1991 -- BYU 23, UCLA 27 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. UCLA TB Kevin Williams rushed for 132 yards on 13 carries, including the game-winning TD.
- Sep. 19, 1992 -- UCLA 17, BYU 10 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah. Daron Washington, another Bruin TB, scored two rushing touchdowns in this narrow UCLA win.
- Oct. 9, 1993 -- BYU 14, UCLA 68 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Bruins Derek Ayers (174 yards) and James Milliner (113 yards) rushed for a combined 287 yards, while the UCLA defense had 11 sacks on the day.
- Sep. 9, 1995 -- UCLA 23, BYU 9 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah. BYU QB Steve Sarkisian's 305 passing yards were not enough to overcome a 17-point UCLA third quarter outburst that put the game away.
- Sep. 8, 2007 -- BYU 17, UCLA 27 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Despite racking up 435 yards of total offense, including 391 yards passing, BYU saw its 11-game winning streak come to an end, as No. 13 UCLA beat the Cougars 27-17 in front of 72,986 fans.
- Dec. 22, 2007 -- BYU 17, UCLA 16 at the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl. BYU avenged its loss to the Bruins earlier in the season by defeating them 17-16 in the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl. The victory was reached in dramatic fashion--a block on UCLA's potential game-winning field goal attempt.

### VERSUS THE PAC-10

A 28-27 victory over Washington last week improved BYU's record against Pac-10 opponents to 4-2 over the past three seasons. Throughout the 2006-08 seasons, the Cougars are 1-1 against Arizona, 1-1 against UCLA, 1-0 against Oregon and 1-0 against the Huskies. Interestingly, BYU has outscored Pac-10 opponents 148-120 over the past six match-ups.

ON THE TUBE



Saturday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on VERSUS. Joe Beninati will call the action, Glenn Parker will lend analysis and Tim Neverett will report from the sidelines. Beninati has worked for over a decade as the play-by-play announcer for the Washington Capitals. The Capital Region Emmy Award winning broadcaster has also called action for the NBA, WNBA, Major League Baseball and college football. Parker is a former NFL offensive lineman who, in his 12-year career, played for the Kansas City Chiefs, the New York Giants and the Buffalo Bills. Parker has been an analyst for the NFL Network show PLAYBOOK and the main college football analyst for CSTV. Neverett, a 22-year sports broadcaster, can be heard on ESPN radio in Denver and covers the Colorado Rockies as well as other sports in the Rocky Mountain region. He has covered three Olympics, and worked with both ESPN and ESPN2 covering various events. He has also worked in Las Vegas, covering UNLV football and baseball and hosting the Tim Neverett Show on SportsRadio 1460 and ESPN Radio 920 and in New England as host of the nationally distributed The Sports Final radio program. Neverett is also one of the top play-by-play announcers on The mtn. VERSUS will televise 19 college football games this fall with a schedule that includes nine games in the Mountain West Conference as well as five games from each the Pac-10 and Big 12 conferences.

2008 BROADCAST PLANS

Ten of BYU's 12 games this season will be broadcast to a national audience on The Mtn., VERSUS and CBS College Sports Network. The Cougars will have seven games televised on The Mtn., including the season opener against Northern Iowa and the closing game against in-state rival the University of Utah. Direct TV launched The Mtn. nationally on Aug. 27, 2008, giving fans from across the country ultimate access to Mountain West Conference sports. VERSUS will carry the UCLA and TCU games, and CBS-CS will televise the Cougars' trip to Air Force on Nov. 15. BYU's game at Washington will be shown regionally on FOX Sports Net.

A LOOK BACK: BYU 28-WASHINGTON 27



BYU extended its nation-leading win streak to 12 games on Saturday after a narrow 28-27 victory over the Washington Huskies. Junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen blocked the potentially game-tying extra point by Washington kicker Ryan Perkins with two seconds remaining on the game clock to secure the Cougars' victory. Junior quarterback Max Hall led the Cougars by completing 30-of-41 passes for 338 yards and three touchdowns. For the second week in a row, junior tight end Dennis Pitta was the game's leading receiver, pulling down 10 catches for 148 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore running back Harvey Unga recorded his first 100-yard rushing game of the 2008 season, with 136 yards on the ground against the Huskies. The win marked BYU's first non-conference road win since Oct. 4, 2002 when the Cougars defeated Utah State 35-34.

RACKING UP THE WEEKLY AWARDS

Based on their performances over the past two weeks, Cougars are beginning to accumulate weekly awards on both the Mountain West Conference and national level.

BRIGHAM YOUNG-UCLA TIES

UCLA's current offensive coordinator, Norm Chow, spent 27 years (1973-99) at BYU. At various times, he was the Cougars' assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, co-offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach, receivers coach, recruiting coordinator and graduate assistant (1973 and 1974). The Cougars posted a 244-91-3 record during Chow's time in Provo, appeared in 22 bowls and saw 21 offensive players earn All-America honors. In 12 of his 18 years as offensive coordinator at BYU, Chow led the offense to a place in the NCAA's top 10 in total offense. Chow was with former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards for all but two (1972 & 2000) of Edwards' 29 years at BYU.

Bruin quarterback Ben Olson spent the 2002 season as a Cougar at BYU before transferring to UCLA following an LDS mission.

BYU's current roster features 20 players from the state of California -- four of those attending the same high school as players on the UCLA roster. All-American candidate Austin Collie and UCLA tight end Ryan Moya both hail from Oak Ridge HS in El Dorado Hills. Bruin tight end Cory Harkey and Cougar Steven Thomas both attended Chino Hills High School, while BYU's Bernard Afutiti shares the same alma mater as UCLA's defensive end David Carter (Kaiser HS). Freshman linebacker Daniel Sorensen signed with BYU following his graduation from Colton HS, the same school defensive end Damien Holmes left to go to UCLA.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME TO START THE SEASON

Dating back to the Cougars' first season in 1922, BYU has posted a record of 31-11-1 when opening the season in Provo -- that's a winning percentage of 73.3 percent! Interestingly, BYU's longest home-opening win streak is 10 seasons, dating from 1930 through 1939. Overall BYU has won six of its last seven home-openers.

SEASON OPENERS

The Cougars opened with a win for only the second consecutive season as BYU defeated Northern Iowa 41-17 at home in LaVell Edwards Stadium. In 2007, BYU edged Arizona, 20-7. Since 1922, the Cougars have posted a 48-35-2 record in season-opening games.

HAVE BAGS; WILL TRAVEL

Interestingly, Hall of Fame Coach LaVell Edwards opened the season in Provo only nine times during his 29-year career. From 1978 to 1995, BYU opened the season on the road in 16 of 18 seasons. He was 5-4 in season-openers at Cougar Stadium.

EDWARDS' STADIUM STREAK NOW SPANS THREE SEASONS

With BYU's 42-17 win over Northern Iowa on Saturday, Aug. 30, the Cougars have not lost in Edwards Stadium since November 19, 2005. BYU has won 13 straight home games, dating back to September 9, 2006. The last time the Cougars won 13 consecutive home games was 16 seasons ago when the team won 17 in a row from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991.

ACTIVE WINNING STREAKS

BYU currently owns the longest active winning streak among FBS (Division I-A) teams, having won 12 consecutive games. The Cougars have put together their longest win streak since winning 12 straight games during the 2001 season. The top, current winning streaks in the NCAA are as follows:

## UNDEFEATED AT HOME

BYU finished the 2007 season with a perfect 6-0 record at home, for the second consecutive year. The last time BYU had a perfect record at home for two straight seasons was in 1990-1991. Since the stadium was built in 1964, BYU has gone undefeated at home 14 times:

**UTAH STATE** - BYU's final non-conference game will be against in-state rival Utah State on Oct. 3. The Cougars hold a 41-33-3 lead in the series, which dates back to 1922. BYU's 38-0 win against the Aggies in 2006 marked the Cougars' first shutout win since 1999.

## CELEBRATING IN SEATTLE

Saturday's victory over Washington marked the first-ever win against the Huskies in Seattle. Previously, the Cougars had posted a 0-3 record, including a 20-10 loss the last time the two teams met in Seattle during the 1998 season.

## RECORD AT HALFTIME

BYU evened the score at 14-14 against the Huskies with 4:18 to go in the second quarter, preventing the Cougars' first half-time scoring deficit since trailing UCLA 20-3 at halftime last season. BYU has not trailed at the half in 13 straight games, dating back to September 8, 2007 (at UCLA.)

## NON-CONFERENCE ROAD DROUGHT OVER

Saturday's victory over Washington marked the first non-conference road victory for the Cougars since beating Utah State, 35-34, in Logan on October 4, 2002. The win over UW ends a streak of nine straight losses that spanned nearly six years.

## COIN TOSS

For the second week in a row, BYU won the opening coin toss. Unlike last week against Northern Iowa, however, the Cougars elected to receive the opening kickoff. The Cougars are 2-0 when winning the opening coin toss.

## NATIONAL RANKINGS

For the first time since 1997, BYU kicked off the season ranked among the nation's top-25 programs in both the USA Today Coaches Poll (No. 17), and the Associated Press Top-25 (No. 16). This marked the Cougars' highest preseason ranking since picked No. 16 in 1990. BYU finished the 2007 season ranked as high as No. 14 with an 11-2 record, including a 17-16 victory over UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl.

## COUGARS CONTINUE TO WIN

BYU has won 24 of its last 28 games, dating back to the 2006 season. During that season, the Cougars finished 11-2, followed by another 11-2 season in 2007, and they are off to a 2-0 start this season. BYU's 2-0 record this season marks its best start since the 2002 season. In 2002, the Cougars beat Syracuse, 42-21, and Hawaii, 35-32, to get off to a 2-0 start.

## ANOTHER SELLOUT

The 64,108 fans in attendance for the Cougars' 41-17 win over Northern Iowa marked the seventh consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium. The current streak marks the longest streak of consecutive sellouts since the 1991-92 seasons.

## HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

Since it was built in 1964, the Cougars have fielded several dominating teams. Last season, BYU averaged 28.67 points per game at home while limiting its opponents to just 11.33. The margin of difference had the Cougars beating their opponents by an average of 17.33 points. The 35.16-point differential in 2006 was a BYU record in scoring margin in the stadium's 42-year history (and the program's 84-year history):

PITTA POWER

Averaging 180.5 yards per game, junior tight end Dennis Pitta continued to dominating the receiving game -- recording 148 yards with 10 catches against Washington. One week prior, Pitta's performance against Northern Iowa (213 yards, 11 catches) equaled the 10th highest performance in BYU history, tying Eric Drage's mark set against Air Force back in 1993. He also set the MWC record for receiving yards by a tight end with his performance, breaking Jonny Harline's record of 181 yards against Oregon in the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl. Pitta's performance against Northern Iowa also marked the top receiving performance during the opening week of the 2008 season. The Mackey Award and All-America candidate not only led all receivers, nationally, but also he was the top-ranked tight in the country by 90 yards. Pitta, a 6-foot-5, 250-pound native of Moorpark, Calif., is a 2008 Mackey Award and All-America candidate.

FOLLOWING A BOWL VICTORY...

In seasons following a BYU bowl victory, the Cougars have compiled a combined record of 77-23 (.758), averaging 9.6 wins per season. Of BYU's eight previous post-bowl victory teams, all but two teams have returned to a bowl game the following season.

HOMELAND SECURITY

The Cougars' victory over Northern Iowa on Aug. 30, 2008 increased BYU's consecutive home winning streak to 13 games, dating back to the 2006 season. Over that span, the Cougars have beaten their opponents by an average of 26.1 points per game and have allowed just 11.6 points per game. The Cougars have allowed seven points or less in six of the last 13 home games. In six home games in 2007, the Cougars outscored opponents by an average 17.3 points per game and allowed an average of just 11.3 points per game. BYU's current win streak is the longest since posting a 17-game home win streak from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991.

"FAN" TASTIC FANS

Over 350,000 (386,980) fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2007 season, averaging 64,497 fans per game. BYU finished ranked fourth overall in the west behind USC (87,476), UCLA (76,379) and Washington (67,732). BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU has led the MWC in home attendance in all nine years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats.

CURRENTLY SERVING MISSIONS...

There are 45 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 13 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Korea, Madagascar, Mexico, Russia, Sweden and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions speak a total of nine different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, German, Japanese, Malagasy, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish.

SERVED MISSIONS...

Of the 105 players on the Fall Camp roster, 75 have served a church mission (71 percent). Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 14 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Puerto Rico, United States and Uruguay. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 16 different states, including Alaska, California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, New Mexico, New York, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Washington. Current members of the BYU football team who have previously served church missions speak a total of nine different foreign languages, including Chinese, French, German, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.

WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. "Mormon" missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world. Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language. Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea. A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize. Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.



## TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 326.4 pounds and average 6-feet-6. The front five will be going up against a Washington defensive front that measures an average 6-feet-5, 270 pounds. Defensively, the Cougars' front three average 6-feet-3, 278 pounds, while the Washington offensive line tips the scales at an average 6-feet-5, 305 pounds per man.

## PAPER OR PLASTIC

Four Cougars recorded sacks against Washington's Jake Locker on Saturday, including, Matt Bauman, David Nixon, Ian Dulan and Coleby Clawson. Junior Jan Jorgensen, the returning MWC sack leader (14), was credited with a sack for an eight-yard loss in the season opener against Northern Iowa.

## A BYU COACHING FIRST

With a 35-16 win over Colorado State on Nov. 3, 2007, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season, qualifying for their third straight bowl game. BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU history to qualify for three straight bowl games in his first three years. Mendenhall currently ranks second behind LaVell Edwards with the most post-season appearances in BYU football history.

## HALL OF MAX

After going 34-of-41 for 486 yards and two touchdowns last week against Northern Iowa, Heisman Trophy candidate Max Hall turned in another standout performance in the Cougars' 28-27 victory over Washington. Hall completed 30-of-41 attempts for 338 yards and three touchdowns, including a 15-yard game-winning pass to Dennis Pitta with 3:31 left in the game. On the season, Hall is averaging 401 yards passing per game and is completing 78 percent of his attempts. During the opening drive of the game, Hall led the Cougars on a 9-play drive, for 76 yards. During the drive he was 6-for-6 for 80 yards, including a 38-yard touchdown pass to Austin Collie for the early 7-0 lead.

## TEAM CAPTAINS

Seniors Travis Bright and David Nixon, along with juniors Max Hall and Jan Jorgensen have been selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2008 football season.

Collectively the captains have 103 games of experience, with all four starting each game last season. Hall ended the 2007 season as the nation's top sophomore quarterback, passing for 3,848 yards. Bright, an offensive lineman, was part of an offensive unit that led the MWC and ranked 14th nationally in passing offense, averaging 298.4 yards per game. Over the course of the 2007 season, defensive lineman Jorgensen recorded 14 sacks for a combined loss of 115 yards, producing at least one sack in seven straight games. At linebacker, Nixon was credited with a career-high 66 tackles on the season, including a career-best 38 solo tackles.

Their accomplishments extend off the field as well, with each player earning 2007 Academic All-Mountain West Conference honors.

## FLAG BEARER



BYU has a tradition of selecting a player before each game to run the team flag onto the field. In 2008, the team implemented a new tradition—an alumni flag. The team selects a former Cougar to carry out the alumni flag, along with the chosen current player who runs out with the current team flag. Both flags are white with a blue "Y" logo. The team flag has been signed by each member of the team, while the alumni flag has been signed by former BYU players. Their signatures reflect their commitment

to uphold the tradition, spirit and honor of the BYU football program and to be a flag bearer of the University.

## CONSECUTIVE STARTS

His father, Lance, is the associate head coach for the Cougars. Reynolds is currently tied at second for the most consecutive starts by an active Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A) player. Reynolds has started in every game of his BYU career, beginning with the Cougars' 20-3 loss to Boston College on Sep. 3, 2005.

## PAT BLOCK LONG TIME COMING

Junior defensive lineman's block on Washington's PAT attempt to tie the game last week broke a BYU drought that lasted close to 10 years. The last time a Cougar blocked a PAT attempt was Derik Stevenson's block against Air Force on December 5, 1998.

## DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 28-4 when leading at halftime and 27-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

## FIRST HALF DOMINANCE

The Cougars held a 27-3 lead at halftime against Northern Iowa, marking the 13th time in the past 14 games BYU has held the lead at intermission. The Cougars have held their opponent to seven or fewer points in the opening half eight times in 14 games. BYU has led at halftime in 26 of the last 27 games. During those 26 games, the team is 23-3.

## MOVING THE CHAINS

BYU's ability to convert on third down played a key role in the 28-27 victory over Washington. The Cougars were 12-of-14 on third-down conversions, including 4-of-4 in the second half of the game.

## UNGA PASSES CENTURY MARK

With 14:21 left in the fourth quarter, sophomore Harvey Unga turned in a 15-yard run to move him past the 100-yard mark for the game. Unga had a BYU record seven, 100-yard games as a freshman last season. Unga finished the game with 23 carries for a game-high 136 yards rushing. Unga also had five completions for 39 yards and one touchdown against the Huskies.



## IT'S BEEN A WHILE

BYU has been unable to return a kickoff for a touchdown for 120 consecutive games. Mike Rigell was the last Cougar to accomplish the feat, turning in a 96-yard touchdown in a 31-9 victory at Hawaii on October 17, 1998.

## MOST PLAYS IN A SCORING DRIVE

BYU evened the score at 14-14 against Washington with 4:18 remaining in the first half on a 14-play, 71-yard drive. The drive marked the most plays in a scoring drive this season. The previous season-high was a nine-play scoring drive on the opening series of the game.

## BALL HOGS

The Cougars used 6:11 minutes off the clock during their second-quarter scoring drive against Washington, marking the longest scoring drive of the season (in terms of time off the clock.) On the day, On the day, BYU had x scoring drives over five minutes. Last week, vs. Northern Iowa, the Cougars didn't have a single scoring drive that lasted over 2:50.

## TOUCHDOWN, VAKAPUNA

Senior fullback Fui Vakapuna scored his first touchdown of the season against Washington with 4:17 left in the third quarter to equal the score at 21. His first carry of the game marked an 11-yard touchdown run that capped a 7-play, 63-yard drive. The carry marked his first touchdown run since the 12:17 mark of the fourth quarter at San Diego State last season. Vakapuna had only two rushing touchdowns during his junior season and eight as a sophomore.

## LOSING THE LEAD

After the Cougars scored on the opening drive of the game at Washington, the Huskies came back to score 14 straight points, marking the first time BYU has given up a lead since UCLA took a 3-0 advantage in the first quarter of the Las Vegas Bowl. (BYU won the game 17-16.)

## BEST IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

## HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



After only his third season as the head coach at Brigham Young, Bronco Mendenhall has taken a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and has turned it back into the Mountain West Conference's premier football program, and is steadily rebuilding the national prominence the Cougars once enjoyed. After posting a 6-6 record in 2005, Mendenhall's Cougars have won 22 of their last 26 games over the past two seasons, including a 17-16 victory over UCLA in the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl.

In his first season, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl -- the team's first post-season bowl appearance in three seasons. Since then, he has coached the Cougars to back-to-back, 11-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents. Under his direction, the Cougars have not lost a league game--at home or on the road--in two years and has finished the regular-season ranked among the nation's top-20 programs in the Bowl Championship Series standings.

With an invitation to attend the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU football history to take a team to a bowl game in three straight seasons during his first three years as a head coach. On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach in 2005, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted an 11-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC. In dominating fashion, and with a swagger similar to that of the glory years of BYU football, the Cougars handed Oregon a 38-8 defeat in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Throughout the 2006 season, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The 2007 season started out in similar fashion, winning just one of the team's first three games; however, under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars rebounded to win the final 10 games of the season, and like the previous year, garnered the attention of local, regional and national voters. BYU finished the season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings--three places higher than the 2006 Cougars. In the final polls of the season, BYU finished ranked 14th in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll, marking the highest finish for the Cougars since finishing No. 5 following the 1996 season.

Like the 2006 season, BYU ranked among the nation's leaders in several statistical categories. The Cougars led the MWC and ranked 14th in passing offense, averaging 298.4 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked 25th in total offense, averaging 442.8 yards per game.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked 10th nationally in total defense, allowing just 307.9 yards per game. During the regular season, the Cougars did not allow a single 100-yard rusher. BYU finished the year ranked 9th nationally, allowing an average 97.5 yards rushing per game. One of Mendenhall's jobs as the head coach and defensive coordinator is to manage points. Defensively, BYU ranked 9th in the nation, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall has stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo during the 2005 season, Mendenhall and the Cougars



registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006 and another perfect, 6-0 mark in 2007. In 2006, the Cougars finished the season as the most dominate home team in the country, and the most dominate home team in BYU football history, winning games by an average 35.16 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars outscored opponents at Edwards Stadium by an average 17.3 points per game. BYU allowed just 11.3 points per game, marking the best scoring defense effort since the 1988 season when BYU held opponents to just 10.2 points per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah body-builder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple has three sons.

JAIME HILL NAMED DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Jaime Hill (first name pronounced high-may) has been promoted to defensive coordinator.

The move formalizes the capacity Hill has served in over the past season. While Mendenhall will maintain play-calling responsibilities on game-day, Hill is responsible for managing the essential aspects of running the defensive unit.

"I'm very grateful for this opportunity for personal growth within this profession; especially with this great program at Brigham Young University," Hill said. "I truly believe the foundation was laid by Coach Edwards and his staff, along with the players. Coach Mendenhall's staff and players have brought back the past glory, and have created their own line of history that will be passed down. This is something we can build upon for the future, and the future looks bright."

Since arriving at BYU for the 2006 season, Hill has played a significant role in the defensive secondary's marked improvement. In the two seasons since his arrival, BYU is averaging 17 interceptions, 50.5 pass break-ups and is allowing just under 208 yards passing per game. In addition, due in part to improved coverage, sacks have also increased to an average 28 per season since Hill's arrival.

In 2007 the Cougars finished as the 10th ranked defense in the country. Rushing defense finished the season ranked 9th nationally, passing defense jumped to 32nd and the team finished ninth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

"Coach Hill has made a tremendous impact on our defense in the time he has been here and this is a way for us to recognize him for his contributions," Mendenhall said. "This promotion gives Coach Hill the formal responsibility of handling the day-to-day duties of running the defense, allowing me to focus my attention on other aspects of the program. I have a lot of respect for Coach Hill and the work he has done, and I am confident this will give our defense the opportunity to continue to improve."

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff has four members who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played at Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. ### Travis Bright-OL

Bright returns as one of several veterans on the offensive line after suffering a broken leg in BYU's 17-16 victory over UCLA in the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl. Starting all 13 games last season, Bright was part of an offensive unit that led the MWC and ranked 14th in the nation in passing offense. During the spring Bright set the BYU weight room record, benching 540 lbs. He is currently serving as one of four team captains for the 2008 season.

Payne converted 43-of-45 point-after attempts and scored a total of 73 points during the 2007 season. He recorded a season-long 42-yard field goal against Air Force and averaged 60.7 yards per kickoff.

### Michael Reed-WR

An experienced outside receiver, Reed returns to the Cougars for his senior season after logging significant playing time over the past three years. Reed had 41 catches for 449 yards and four touchdowns a year ago.

### Fui Vakapuna-RB

Slowed by injury the majority of the 2007 season, senior Vakapuna is expected to make a large contribution to the experienced BYU offense. Vakapuna is known for his ability to break tackles and run over those standing in his way. He recorded his first carry and touchdown of the 2008 season against Washington.
