COUGARS TRAVEL TO STANFORD FOR FIRST ROAD GAME

After defeating Notre Dame in a close game at LaVell Edwards Stadium to open the season, BYU is traveling to Palo Alto, Calif. to take on the Stanford Cardinal. Last season Stanford defeated BYU 18-14 in a game that BYU held a lead until late in the game. Stanford scored nine points in the fourth quarter to earn the narrow victory. This is only the second meeting between these two programs, and the first time BYU has traveled to Palo Alto.

FIVE OF FIRST SIX GAMES ON NATIONAL TELEVISION

The Cougars will play in five nationally televised games during the 2004 season. BYU opened the season on Saturday, Sept. 4 against Notre Dame on ESPN, marking the 10th straight season the Cougars have opened the season playing on either ESPN, ESPN2 or ABC. On Sept. 11, BYU will participate in the first Division I-A football game broadcast on CSTV. The Cougars will host defending National Champion USC on Sept. 18 in a nationally broadcast game on ESPN, beginning at 8 p.m. (MT). The following week, BYU will travel to Boise State for a second straight nationally televised game on ESPN. On Oct. 8, the Cougars will host UNLV for a prime time, MWC match-up on ESPN2.

ROAD OPENERS

During the Gary Crowton era, the Cougars are 1-2 in road opening games; however, the two losses have been closely contested games. Last season, BYU opened on the road against eventual National Champion USC. After falling behind 21-0 in the first quarter, the Cougars made a game of it, pulling to within three in the fourth quarter before the Trojans added two late touchdowns to account for the final score. In 2002, BYU traveled to Reno, Nev. to take on Nevada. The Cougars lost a close game, 31-28. In Crowton's first year at BYU, the Cougars also traveled to the Bay Area to take on Cal, with BYU winning 44-16.

GOING BACK TO CALI

When the Cougars travel to Palo Alto to take on Stanford, it will be their 57th trip to the state of California. BYU has an overall record of 24-29-3 (.453), including bowl games, in California. BYU's first game in the state of California came in 1926 when the Cougars dueled to a 0-0 tie with UC Davis. Last year, BYU posted a 1-1 record in the state of California, losing to USC 35-18 and defeating San Diego State 44-36. Also, BYU has 23 players on its roster that hail from California—the second most of any state behind Utah. Joe Griffin, a junior college transfer wide receiver who is redshirting this year, is from East Palo Alto and went to high school at Palo Alto High School. Other Cougars with ties to the Bay Area are Kayle Buchanan (San Jose), Gary and Greg Lovely (Los Altos Hills), Junior Kato (Daly City) and David Sollami (Daly City).

UP OR DOWN

The following BYU coaches will be working from the sidelines for the Notre Dame game: Gary Crowton (head coach), Todd Bradford (wide receivers), Bronco Mendenhall (defensive coordinator and safeties), Paul Tidwell (special teams coordinator), Jeff Grimes (offensive line) and Steve Kafusi (defensive line. The remaining assistant coaches, including Lance Reynolds (running backs), Mike Empey (tight ends), Barry Lamb (linebackers) and Brian Mitchell (cornerbacks) will coach from the booth.

WATCH OUT FOR THESE GUYS

Four members of the 2004 BYU football team—Aaron Francisco, Brady Poppinga, Daniel Coats and Matt Payne—have been selected to various “watch lists” for post-season awards.

Aaron Francisco, 6-2, 215, Safety: Aaron Francisco has been selected to the Thorpe Award “watch list,” which honors the nation’s top defensive back. Francisco is a three-year starter, who led BYU in tackles and interceptions as a junior and was second in tackles as a sophomore. Last year he earned first-team All-MWC honors and was an honorable mention selection as a sophomore. In the first game of the season against Notre Dame, Francisco finished the game with six tackles, including one for a loss of six yards.

Brady Poppinga, 6-3, 257, Defensive End: Brady Poppinga has been selected to the Bronko Nagurski Award “watch list.” The award honors the nation’s top defensive player. Poppinga earned first-team All-MWC honors last season after ranking among the league leaders in tackles with 55 for the season, including 34 solo take downs and a team-leading six sacks. Against Notre Dame, Poppinga was a one-man wrecking crew, leading the team in tackles with twelve while recording one sack on Irish quarterback Brady Quinn for a loss of 10 yards.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 250, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been named to the John Mackey Award “watch list.” The John Mackey Award is given annually to the nation’s top tight end. Last season as a freshman, Coats recorded 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns, while earning freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News. Coats caught two passes in the season opening game against the Irish—both for 16 yards.

Matt Payne, 6-4, 234, Punter/Kicker: Matt Payne has been selected to the Lou Groza Award “watch list” and is expected to be named to the Ray Guy Award “watch list.” The Groza Award is given annually to the nation’s best place kicker, while the Ray Guy Award is given to the nation’s best punter. Payne is a three-year starter as both a punter and kicker. As a sophomore in 2002, Payne was second in the nation in punting with a 47.6 yard-per-punt average, earning an honorable mention All-America nod. Last year, Payne was selected to both the Lou Groza and Ray Guy “watch lists.” Payne punted nine times against the Irish, pinning them inside their 20 six times. He also kicked two field goals—a 44- and a 53-yarder.

Every team on BYU's schedule in 2004 was on its schedule in 2003. The only opponent missing from BYU's non conference schedule in 2003 is Georgia Tech. Last season the Cougars finished 1-4 in non-conference games with its only victory coming against the Yellow Jackets. The last time there was so little change in BYU's schedule was 1993. In 1992 the Cougars faced off against UCLA, Utah State, Notre Dame and Penn State in their non-conference schedule and played all four of those teams again in 1993.

Matt Payne is just one of 10 players in the country who punts, handles kickoff duties and kicks extra-point and field goals. THE GRANITE STATE

Both BYU head coach Gary Crowton and Stanford head coach Buddy Teevins have ties to the football hotbed of New Hampshire. Crowton was the offensive coordinator at the University of New Hampshire located in Durham from 1988-1990. Coach Teevins graduated from Dartmouth, which is located in Hanover, in 1979 and was the head coach there from 1987-1991. New Hampshire and Dartmouth squared off once during the two coaches' tenures, a 21-21 tie in 1990.

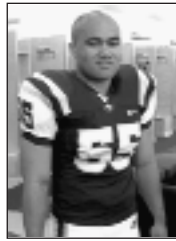

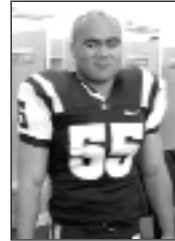


GRIDDERS GET NEW, COMFORTABLE UNIFORMS

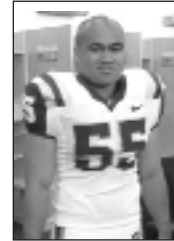
In an effort to provide the BYU football team different uniform combinations for both home and road games, BYU and Nike have been hard at work to produce a new look for the 2004 football season. The new uniforms feature traditional stripes over the shoulder pads and include subtle design changes that will allow the team to wear different combinations at home and on the road. The Cougars will now have the option of wearing all blue uniforms at home or a blue jersey with white pants. When playing on the road, the team will have the option of wearing an all white uniform or a white jersey with blue pants. In a process that has taken more than 18 months, BYU Equipment Manager Mick Hill said the new uniforms feature a style that will be more form fitting and comfortable for the players to wear. In addition, the new uniforms are made with a light-weight material that will prevent the uniform from becoming weighted down with perspiration or water.



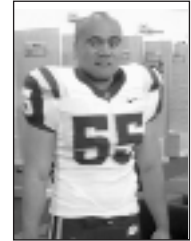

OH BROTHER WHERE ART THOU?

The Cougars have four sets of brothers on the roster this year, wide receivers Austin and Zac Collie, junior college transfers Gary and Greg Lovely, defensive linemen Michael and Daniel Marquardt, and Quinn and David Gooch. The Collie's father, Scott, also played football at BYU from 1979 to 1982 and later for the Hamilton Tigercats of the CFL. The Gooches' father, Gary, also has ties to BYU. Gary Gooch suited up for the Cougar basketball team from 1958 to 1959. Later in the season Todd Watkins will meet up with his brother Travis, an offensive lineman at USC, on Sept. 18 when the Trojans travel to Provo to take on the Cougars.

1984 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP HONORED AT FIRST HOME GAME



Marking the 20th anniversary of the Cougars' 1984 National Championship the team will be this year's sole induction into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame. The induction ceremony will take place Friday evening, Sept. 3, at the Wilkinson Center Ballroom. The team will be honored the next day at Lavell Edwards Stadium during the BYU-Notre Dame game in pre-game and halftime ceremonies. Only two other Cougar teams have been inducted into the Hall of Fame: the 1951 NIT Championship Basketball team and the 1966 NIT Championship Basketball team. Cosmo, the Cougarettes and the BYU Marching Band will each play a part in the game-day festivities. There will also be an informal golf tournament Friday afternoon where some of the players will play as celebrity guests. In addition to the celebration in the stadium, a lithograph has been commissioned in honor of the '84 team.

1,984 numbered lithographs will be available for purchase. The artwork will feature individually autographed pictures of the 24 starters, including Vai Sikahema and Lee Johnson, along with a team picture and a picture of coach LaVell Edwards.

Familiar players like Glen Kozlowski, Vai Sikahema, Lee Johnson, Mark Bellini and Kelly Smith put Provo on the map in the world of college football. All-Americans like Robbie Bosco, Kyle Morrell, David Mills, Leon White and Marv Allen helped make the team a threat on both sides of the ball. In total, 15 players from the 1984 squad were drafted by 12 different NFL teams. Now, these players—hopefully all 120 of them—will be returning to LaVell Edwards Stadium to be recognized by their alma mater on the 20th anniversary of their epic season. After a perfect 12-0 season, the Cougars went on to defeat Michigan in the Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium. Robbie Bosco's heroic return from an early, second-quarter knee injury, along with a circus catch from Kelly Smith, was only part of the 13-game saga. Many fans remember the famous goal-line stand against Hawaii where Kyle Morrell soared over the offensive line to sack the Warrior quarterback and in the process kept their season unblemished.

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is 50,000-watt KSL Newsradio 1160 in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 4th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as

the sideline/lockerroom reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 23-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts and contributes to KSL's extensive midweek and game day coverage.

In his third season on the sidelines is Bill Riley. Riley also hosts the weekly "Gary Crowton Show" Wednesday's at 7 p.m. and "Coordinators' Corner" with Lance Reynolds and Bronco Mendenhall Thursday's at 7 p.m. Riley also hosts College Football Roundtable on Monday's at 7 p.m.

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 19th season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

KSL's game day coverage begins two hours prior to kickoff with the "Cougar Countdown Show." The "Cougar Pregame Scoreboard Show" starts the broadcast's second hour, with the "Cougar Pregame Coach's Show" 35 minutes prior to kickoff, followed by the "Cougar Kickoff Show."

After the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," followed by the "Cougar Lockerroom Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show," "IFA Country Store Replay," and "Cougar Call-In Show."

EDWARDS SELECTED TO HALL OF FAME



The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame has announced the 2004 College Football Hall of Fame Division I-A Class. Former BYU head football coach LaVell Edwards is among the list of 14 inductees to this year's class. A coaching icon, whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU—a tenure that ranks fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 21 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17 straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At the helm, Edwards compiled a program best .716 win percentage, coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans—not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL. BYU's success didn't come without personal reward for Edwards either. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1985. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. Edwards becomes the fifth person affiliated with BYU football to be inducted in to the College Football Hall of Fame. It is no surprise that the four BYU players who are currently enshrined in the Hall of Fame often credit Edwards for their success. BYU's other College Football Hall of Famers include Steve Young (Class of 2001), Jim McMahon (Class of 1998), Marc Wilson (Class of 1996), Gifford Nielsen (Class of 1994). Edwards, who will turn 74 in October, recently returned from an LDS Church mission to New York City. Along with his wife, Patti, the Edwards' served as public affairs missionaries for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Northeastern United States, as well as Eastern Canada. The Edwards have been married for nearly 53 years and have three children, Ann, John and Jim. The Edwards have 14 grandchildren.

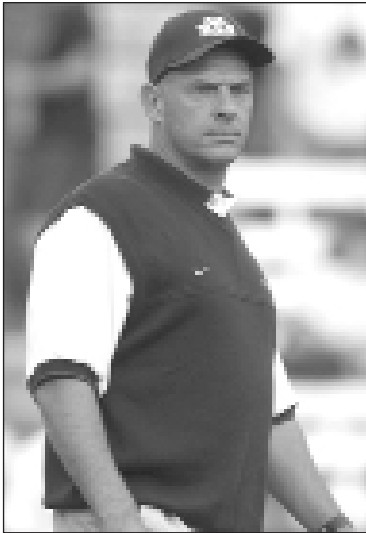
RECORD WATCH

After kicking two field goals and two extra points against Notre Dame, senior kicker Matt Payne moved past Jamal Willis and Kurt Gunther into third place on BYU's all-time scoring list. One of Payne's field goals was a 53-yarder that matched his career-high that was set in 2003 against USC. In the history of Cougar football there have only been four kicks of 53-yards or more. Matt Payne has two of those kicks During his sophomore and junior campaigns he led the team in scoring. Now that Payne has passed Gunther and Willis his climb will be a little steeper as he needs to score 45 more points to catch Luke Staley, who is currently second on BYU's all-time scoring list. Safety Aaron Francisco currently has 248 career tackles. He trails former Cougar and current Indianapolis Colts linebacker Rob Morris by 97 tackles for ninth place on BYU's all-time career tackle list. JUST KICKIN' IT

Matt Payne had a stellar day against Notre Dame in the Cougars' first game. Payne, who led the nation in net punting as a sophomore, punted nine times for an average of 46.8 yards per punt. Only two of Payne's punts were returned and six were downed inside the 20 and four inside the 10, leaving him with a net average of 45.6 yards per punt. As mentioned above, he also kicked two-field goals, one of which tied his career-long of 53 yards set last year against USC. For his efforts, Payne was named the Russell Athletic ESPN Player of the Game.



Head Coach Gary Crowton

Gary Crowton, entering his fourth season as the head coach at BYU, has guided the Cougars to a 21-17 record since arriving in Provo. This season Crowton will lead the Cougars against top teams such as Notre Dame, Stanford, USC and Boise State, as well as a tough league schedule.

In December 2000, Crowton took over a BYU program that had been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards, who posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over 29 seasons.

In his first season as head coach at BYU, Crowton constructed the nation's top-rated offense, posting a

12-2 record, including 10 straight victories to start his BYU career. For his efforts, he was named the MWC Coach of the Year as the Cougars won their first-ever, outright MWC championship.

Crowton, 47, came to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to serving as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997.

Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50 or more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60 or more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season.

Under Crowton, NFL first-round draft pick Troy Edwards recorded a Tech-record 280 receptions and 4,352 yards receiving. Over a span of 34 games, Crowton's offense at Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school record 4,943 yards passing.

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under Edwards at BYU. While at BYU, he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985.

From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois, where he directed the Leathernecks' passing game for a single season. In 1988, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, where the Wildcats were the top-rated passing team in the Yankee Conference from 1988-90.

In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterback coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton was an all-league quarterback at Orem High School before earning All-American honors at Snow College. Crowton transferred to Colorado State, where he finished his career. Following an LDS Church mission to South Korea, Crowton attended Idaho State, where he ran track for the Bengals. After returning to BYU in 1982, Crowton earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983.

Crowton, who is the first-ever head football coach at BYU to serve an LDS Church mission, is married to the former Maren Peterson of Bountiful, Utah. The couple was married on August 3, 1985. The Crowtons have seven children, Dane (18), Tara (16), Jenessa (13), Quinn (10), Mikauli (8) Toriana (4) and Macloud (2).

COUGARS FACE TOUGH SCHEDULE

BYU is scheduled to play the ninth toughest non conference schedule based on opponents' winning percentage last season. The Cougars non conference schedule includes Notre Dame, Stanford, co-National Champion and preseason No. 1 USC and Boise State who combined for a 34-16 record. The overall record of BYU's opponents including Mountain West Conference teams is 82-54 (.603). Five of the Cougars' 11 opponents went to a bowl game last year. The teams finished with a 3-2 bowl record, including USC's victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl that earned the Trojans a share of the National Title. TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's projected starting offensive line averages an enormous 6-foot-4 and 312 pounds. They will face a Cardinal defensive line that averages 6-foot-4 and 271 pounds. When Stanford has the ball, Cougar defensive linemen that average 6-foot-4 and 293 pounds will face a Cardinal front five that are listed at 6-foot-5 and 300 pounds.

SWEET REVENGE

Since 1999, BYU holds a 7-1 (.875) record in payback games against non conference opponents. Last year the Cougars defeated Georgia Tech in their home opener 24-13 after losing to the Yellow Jackets 28-19 the previous year. This year BYU will have four payback opportunities on its non conference schedule. The Cougars will look to defeat Notre Dame, a 33-14 winner in South Bend; Stanford, an 18-14 winner in Provo; USC, a 35-13 winner in Los Angeles; and Boise State, a 50-12 winner in Provo. PAYNE, POPPINGA EARN MWC PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

For their performances against Notre Dame on Sept. 4, Matt Payne and Brady Poppinga were named MWC Special Teams and Defensive Players of the Week respectively. Payne, one of just 10 players in the country who handles punting, kick-off, field-goal and extra-point duties, leads the Mountain West with a net punting average of 45.56 yards. The 6-foot-4, 234-pound Ray Guy Award candidate totaled nine punts for 421 yards, averaging 46.8 yards per punt, which ranks sixth nationally. On the night, six of Payne's nine punts landed inside the 20-yard line, while four of those six landed inside the 10-yard line. Only two punts were returned all night, one for eight yards and one for just three yards. In one of the more memorable punts in BYU football history, Payne mishandled the snap from center John Denney. In what appeared to be certain disaster, Payne recovered the snap and ran to his right to avoid the Notre Dame rush. On a full sprint--in mid-stride--Payne booted a 58-yard punt, pinning the Irish on their own 2-yard line. Payne was also credited with a 63-yard bomb that stranded Notre Dame on its own 8-yard line. While his punting alone was spectacular enough to win special teams player-of-the-week honors, Payne, who is also a Lou Groza Award candidate, scored a team high eight points in the Cougars' 20-17 victory to move into third place on BYU's all-time scoring list, passing Jamal Willis and Kurt Gunther. Payne kicked two field goals one of which was a 53-yarder that tied his career-high set last year against USC. It is the fourth time Payne has been named the Mountain West Conference Special Teams Player of the Week--his first since the 2002 season.

During the first week of Fall Camp, Poppinga was moved from his familiar position on the defensive line to outside linebacker. Against Notre Dame, he wasted little time letting everyone know he was capable of playing that position just as well as he had played at defensive end. On the very first play from scrimmage, Poppinga was credited with a tackle, stopping Notre Dame's Marcus Freeman. On the very next play, the 6-foot-3, 257-pound All-America candidate forced running back Travis Thomas to cough up the football. While Notre Dame recovered the fumble, Poppinga went on to have a stellar night, posting a career best 12 tackles, including seven solo takedowns. In fact, Poppinga led the Cougars' in a suffocating performance, holding the Irish to just 11 total yards rushing. Following the first week of the season, BYU ranks third nationally in rushing defense. During the first Notre Dame offensive series of the second quarter, the Irish appeared to be driving until Manaia Brown forced a fumble at the Notre Dame 49-yard line where Poppinga was there to recover the turnover. Nearing the 10-minute mark of the third quarter, the Irish lined up on a fourth-and-two from the BYU 28-yard line. Poppinga ended the scoring threat with his first sack of the season -- a 10-yard loss for Notre Dame. Four plays after Poppinga's sack, Berry hooked up with Collie for a 42-yard touchdown to give the Cougars a 20-3 lead with 7:47 remaining in the third quarter. On the night, Poppinga was also credited with three quarterback hurries. It is the first Player-of-the-Week citation for the Evanston, Wyo., native. Since the league was formed in 1999, the Cougars have earned player-of-the-week honors in four of the six season-opening games. It is also the third time since 1999 two BYU players have earned the weekly honor in the same week.

LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON

Running backs coach Lance Reynolds is one of the few coaches in the country who have the opportunity to coach along side their sons at the collegiate level. Lance's son, Lance Jr., is the starting center for the Cougars this year. The younger Lance is a converted linebacker, who had to pack on about 40 pounds to play offensive line. The elder Reynolds is a former all-conference offensive lineman for the Cougars and is entering his 22nd year coaching at BYU. Lance Jr. is just the first in a long line of Reynolds boys that could play at BYU for their father. Lance's son Dallas signed a letter of intent in 2003 to play for BYU, but is currently serving an LDS church mission in Seattle, Wash. Included among the eight children are new additions to Manaia Brown's and Brady Poppinga's families. Brown's wife Tupusina gave birth to Manaia Vaega Vaifoa on Aug. 9, while Poppinga's wife Brooke gave birth to their new daughter, Jasmine Rene, on Aug. 12. There will be two more additions to the Cougar family later this fall. Defensive back Brett Cooper and his wife, Diana, are expecting their first child in October, while receiver Jason Kukahiko and his wife, Kristin, are expecting their first child in early September.

TRAVEL ITINERARY

The Cougars will depart Provo at 2:45 p.m. (MT) on Friday, Sept. 10, arriving in San Jose, Calif. at 3:50 p.m. (PT). The team will headquarter at the Santa Clara Marriott. The Cougars will return to Provo immediately following Saturday's game.

HISTORIC BROADCAST

Saturday's game will mark the first-ever Division I-A college football broadcast on College Sports TV. In 1984 BYU was also involved in another historic college football broadcast. The Cougars season-opening game in 1984 against Pittsburgh was the first-ever live Division I-A college football game broadcast on ESPN. Since 1974, BYU has posted a 53-37-2 record on national television, including the Cougars' 20-17 victory over Notre Dame which appeared nationally on ESPN.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

Stanford is one of the most successful athletics departments in the country. The Cardinal have won 71 national championships since 1980—the most in the nation. The Cougars have also experienced success on a national level. Since 1970 when BYU captured its first NCAA title, the Cougars have one ten national championships, including four in cross-country and three in men's volleyball since 1997. BYU also won the national championship in football in 1984. BYU has also ranked high in the NACDA Director's cup, an award given to the nation's best athletic program. LAST WEEK: BYU VS. NOTRE DAME

Behind a stellar effort by its defense, BYU defeated Notre Dame 20-17 Sept. 4 in a sold out LaVell Edwards stadium. BYU held the Irish to just 11 yards rushing, holding Notre Dame scoreless for much of the first half. The Irish didn't score their first points of the game until the closing seconds of the first half, when the Irish kicked a field goal to pull within 10 at 13-3. The Cougars' scores in the first half came on a five yard run by Fahu Tahi that was set up by a 50-yard reception by Todd Watkins and two Matt Payne field goals of 44 and 53 yards. True freshman Austin Collie, playing in his first collegiate game, caught the Cougars next score—a 42-yard pass from Matt Berry. But the Irish wouldn't quit. Notre Dame pulled to within ten on a 54 yard touchdown pass and then to within three after a pass by Berry was returned 38 yards for a score. The two games then traded possessions, with Payne pinning the Irish deep in their own territory many times. Payne had six punts that were downed inside the 20-yard line. The Cougars were finally able to put the game on ice when Berry hit Watkins for a 37-yard completion to convert a third-and-eight with 1:38 remaining in the game. The Cougars then ran the clock out to earn the narrow victory.



POST-GAME NOTES: NOTRE DAME VS. BYU

ATTENDANCE INFORMATION

Today's game is officially listed as a sell-out, marking the 57th sell-out since 1982 – the year the stadium was expanded. The Cougars have an all-time record of 44-13 (.772) in Edwards Stadium when playing in front of a sell-out crowd. The Cougars' last sell-out came on Nov. 22, 2003 against Utah. Today's game marks the second straight sell out at Edwards Stadium.

ATTENDANCE RECORD

The all-time largest crowd to witness a BYU game at Edwards Stadium was on Oct. 16, 1993 vs. Notre Dame. The current capacity of Edwards Stadium is 64,045. During the 1993 season, the stadium capacity was officially listed at 65,000.

WHAT A PAYNE

Matt Payne made a 53-yard field goal in the second quarter, tying his career-high. His other 53-yarder came against USC in 2003. There have only been four field goals of 53 yards or more in school history, Payne owning two.

MOVIN' ON UP

After making an extra point and a 44-yard field goal in the first quarter, kicker Matt Payne moved passed Jamal Willis into fourth on the all-time scoring list at BYU with 241. With a 53-yard field goal in the second quarter, he moved into third all-time with 244 points, passing Kurt Gunther.

PAYNE'S PUNTING PROWESS

Lou Groza Award candidate Matt Payne had nine punts for an average of 46.8 yards. Payne forced the Irish into terrible field position all night, with six of his punts being downed inside the 20-yard line. He also limited the Irish to only 11 return yards. The highlight of the night came in the third quarter when he dropped a snap but recovered it, avoided the Irish blitz and got the ball away to pin the Irish on their own two-yard line. Another of his punts went 63-yards and stranded the Irish on their own eight-yard line.

FIRST QUARTER SCORING

Fahu Tahī scored on a three-yard run in the first quarter. It was the first touchdown the Cougars have scored since the fourth quarter of the Notre Dame game last year. Last season, BYU scored only four touchdowns in the first quarter and averaged only 3.25 first-quarter points. After scoring 10 points in the first quarter, BYU scored more than seven points in the first quarter for the first time since November 16, 2002, when the Cougars scored 10 against New Mexico.

HALF TIME LEAD

The last time the Cougars led at the half was against San Diego State last season when BYU had a 31-24 advantage. The Cougars went on to win 44-36.

OFFENSE BACK ON TRACK

After being shutout for the first time since 1975 (a streak of 361 games) in a 3-0 loss to Utah in last year's season finale, the Cougars got back on track by scoring 20 against Notre Dame.

MOST POINTS

BYU's 20 points against Notre Dame are the most the Cougars have scored since last season's game against UNLV on Oct. 10 when they scored 27 in an overtime victory over the Rebels.

PENALTY FACTS

BYU was penalized nine times for 74 yards, not much of an improvement over last season. Last year, the Cougars averaged 7.25 penalties resulting in 63.8 yards per game.

BLOCKED PUNT

The BYU special teams unit blocked an Irish punt in the second quarter marking the first blocked punt for the Cougars since September 21, 2002, against the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets.

HOME OPENING SUCCESS

Coach Gary Crowton improved to 4-0 in home/season openers during his tenure at BYU. During his four years with the Cougars, Crowton has opened each season at home.

LONGEST TOUCHDOWN ALLOWED

The 54-yard touchdown play by the Irish was the longest scoring play allowed by the Cougar defense since Colorado State scored on a 59-yard pass completion in 2003.

IN THE RED ZONE

BYU entered the red zone one time against Notre Dame, following a 50-yard reception by Todd Watkins from John Beck. With the Cougars on the 5-yard line, running back Fahu Tahī scored on a run up the middle. On the other side of the ball, BYU's defense allowed the Irish offense to enter the red zone once, holding them to a 21-yard field goal by D.J. Fitzpatrick.
