COUGARS, HORNED FROGS TO BATTLE ON THURSDAY NIGHT

Riding a five-game win streak, including a 35-16 win over Colorado State on Saturday, the league-leading Cougars will play host to TCU (5-4, 2-3) on Thursday, Nov. 8, beginning at 7 p.m. (MT). The game will be broadcast live nationally on Versus. With Saturday's win over CSU, BYU (6-2, 4-0) remains atop the Mountain West Conference with a perfect 4-0 record. The Cougars have won a MWC record 12 straight league games, dating back to a 31-17 road victory over No. 15 TCU last season. It is the longest conference win streak for the Cougars since winning 12 straight from November 20, 1982 to October 19, 1985. Head coach Bronco Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU history to qualify for three straight bowl games in his first three years with the victory against CSU. TCU (5-4, 2-3) is coming off a 37-0 victory over New Mexico. Game time is scheduled for 7 p.m. (MT) and will be broadcast nationally on VERSUS.

THE BYU-TCU SERIES



BYU and TCU have met six times over the past 20 years with the Cougars holding a 4-2 record over the Horned Frogs. As MWC opponents, the teams are 1-1 against each other. TCU won the first ever game against BYU, 33-12, in 1987. Back then, the Horned Frogs played in the Southwest Conference while the Cougars competed in the WAC. The following year, BYU exacted revenge with a 31-18 victory at Cougar Stadium. Interestingly, last season's 31-17 win against then-No. 15 ranked TCU in Fort Worth, Texas, began BYU's current 13-game winning streak against the MWC and was the Cougars' first road win over a nationally-ranked opponent since September 20, 1997 (at Arizona State).

BROADCAST INFORMATION



Thursday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on VERSUS. Joe Beninati will call the action, Glenn Parker will lend analysis and Tim Neverett will report from the sidelines. Beninati has worked for over a decade as the play-by-play announcer for the Washington Capitals. The Capital Region Emmy Award winning broadcaster has also called action for the NBA, WNBA, Major League Baseball and college football. Parker is a former NFL offensive lineman who has been an analyst for the NFL Network show PLAYBOOK and the main college football analyst for CSTV. Neverett, a 22-year sports broadcaster, can be heard on ESPN radio in Denver and covers the Colorado Rockies as well as other sports in the Rocky Mountain region.

A LOOK BACK: BYU 35-Colorado State 16



BYU (6-2, 4-0) became bowl-eligible for its third straight year under the reign of head coach Bronco Mendenhall with a 35-16 win against Colorado State (1-8, 1-5). Freshman running back Harvey Unga's 51 rushing yards moved him into the top spot on the list of BYU's all-time freshman rushing leaders, surpassing Ronney Jenkins' previous record of 733 yards. Sophomore quarterback Max Hall led the Cougars completing 22-of-30 passes for 355 yards and three touchdowns. Hall connected with Austin Collie for a total of 111 yards. Collie's second 100-yard game this season. BYU had a second 100-yard receiver in Unga, who racked up 110 yards.

WHAT THE GAME MEANS

A win against TCU would give the Cougars their seventh victory of the season, including their sixth straight. Since 1932, the Cougars have recorded 29 seasons with at least seven wins.

A victory would also give the Cougars a 5-0 league record, extending the team's MWC record win streak to 13 straight, marking the longest conference win streak for the Cougars since winning 13 straight from November 15, 1983 to October 19, 1985. That 13-game streak was actually part of a school-record, 25-game league win streak that dated from October 2, 1982 until October 19, 1985.

A loss against TCU would drop the Cougars' advantage in the league standings to just one game over Air Force, Utah and New Mexico. The Cougars need to win two of the remaining four game in order to clinch at least a share of the MWC title. With three wins in the remaining four games, the Cougars would win their league-best fourth MWC title, including their second straight.

A win on Thursday against TCU would mark the 11th straight win at Edwards Stadium -- the longest home win streak since winning 17 straight from October 7, 1989 to November 23, 1991. BYU is 13-3 in Provo during the Bronco Mendenhall era.

BOWL ELIGIBLE

With a win against Colorado State, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season and have qualified to participate in their third straight bowl game for the first time since the 1994 season. BYU has not played in three straight bowl games since playing in the 1992 Aloha Bowl, the 1993 Holiday Bowl and the 1994 Copper Bowl. From 1978 through 1994, the Cougars participated in a school record 17 straight bowl games.

FOUR STRAIGHT SELLOUTS

The Colorado State game marked the fourth consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium and the first time since the 1999 season the Cougars have had four sellouts during the same season. Since 1999, the Cougars are 11-4 in games with a sell-out crowd.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Cougars' game at UNLV marked the fifth time during the Bronco Mendenhall era the Cougars have had back-to-back road games during the regular season. In 2005, BYU played at San Diego State and at New Mexico in back-to-back weeks and at UNLV and Wyoming. Last season, the Cougars played at Air Force, followed by a game at Colorado State the following week. The Cougars are 4-1 in the second of two-straight road games.

OFF TO A QUICK START

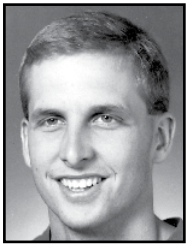
For the first time since the 2004 season when BYU edged Notre Dame, 20-17, at LaVell Edwards Stadium, the Cougars won its season opener, 20-7, against Arizona. The Cougars lost at home to Boston College to start the 2005 campaign before dropping a 16-13 decision to Arizona on a last-second field goal to start the 2006 season. BYU won four straight season-openers from 2001-2004. Overall, the Cougars have won five of their last six home-openers. Bronco Mendenhall is 1-2 in season-opening games, including a mark of 1-1 in Provo.

COUGARS CONTINUE TO WIN

With a 35-16 victory over Colorado State, the Cougars have won 16 of their last 18 games, dating back to last season. BYU is currently on a five-game win streak, including a 19-point win over CSU, a 35-point victory over Eastern Washington, a 25-point win over Air Force, and road wins over New Mexico and UNLV.



RETIRING No. 14



Two of college football's all-time greatest quarterbacks, Gifford Nielsen and Ty Detmer, were honored together on Saturday, Sept. 1 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The No. 14 jersey, worn by both Nielsen and Detmer, was retired during halftime of the Cougars' season-opener against Arizona.

Throughout the history of BYU football, dating back to 1922, only three jerseys have ever been retired. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie's No. 40 jersey, along with Marion Probert's No. 81 jersey and Steve Young's No. 8 jersey all hang from the pressbox at Edwards Stadium.

Nielsen, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, passed for over 5,800 yards and collected 55 touchdowns throughout his career. Earning All-America honors in 1976, Nielsen led the NCAA in touchdown completions, ranked second in total offense and helped the Cougars to their first-ever national ranking. After what appeared to be a career-ending injury during his senior season, Nielsen went on to play six years for the Houston Oilers and remains the last quarterback to lead the team to the AFC finals. Nielsen and his wife, Wendy, are the parents of six children and reside in Houston.

Detmer, the winner of the 1990 Heisman Trophy, set nearly every passing record ever imagined during his time in Provo. A two-time Davey O'Brien Award winner, Detmer set 62 records during his career at BYU, including the NCAA record for career passing yards with 15,031. He was a consensus All-American in 1990 as the nation's leading passer and earned his second consensus All-American title in 1991 after leading the nation in total offense. He still holds the NCAA record for career touchdown completions with 121. Detmer played 14 seasons in the NFL and currently resides with his wife, Kim, and four daughters in Austin, Texas.

A BYU COACHING FIRST

With a 35-16 win over Colorado State, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season, qualifying for their third straight bowl game. BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU history to qualify for three straight bowl games in his first three years. Mendenhall currently ranks second behind LaVell Edwards with the most post-season appearances in BYU football history.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME TO START THE SEASON

Dating back to the Cougars first season in 1922, BYU has posted a record of 29-11-1 when opening the season in Provo -- that's a winning percentage of 72 percent! In overall home-openers, the Cougars are 52-29-1 (64 percent) since 1922. Interestingly, BYU's longest home-opening win streak covers 10 seasons, dating from 1930 through 1939. Since 1998, the Cougars have posted a record of 8-2 (.777) in home-opening games.

RUSHING DOMINANCE

Entering Saturday's game against TCU, the Cougars own a record of 236-40-1 when rushing for 100 (or more) yards since the 1972 season. The Tulsa game marked only the fifth time since 1991 that the Cougars had gained over 150 yards rushing in a game and lost. (BYU is 75-5 since 1991 when rushing for 150 or more yards.) During the Bronco Mendenhall era, the Cougars are 20-3 when rushing for 100 or more yards and 14-2 when rushing for 200 or more yards.

THE 200-YARD MARK

After racking up 221 yards rushing against Eastern Washington, BYU has won 59 straight games when rushing for 200 or more yards in a game, dating back to the 1985 season. The Cougars' last loss when rushing for 200 or more yards in a game came on October 26, 1985 (vs. UTEP).

SEASON TICKET HOLDERS ARE FULLY INVESTED

BYU has sold over 53,500 season tickets for the 2007 season -- that's an increase of 7,900 over last year's total of 45,600. Interestingly, nearly 84 percent of the Edwards Stadium capacity will be occupied by season-ticket holders during the season.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 318.4 pounds and average 6-feet-5. The front five will be going up against a TCU defensive front that measures an average 6-feet-2, 265 pounds. Defensively, the Cougars' front three average 6-feet-2, 270 pounds, while the Horned Frogs' offensive line tips the scales at an average 6-feet-5, 296 pounds per man.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME



Currently BYU has four former players and a head coach enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Ind. Legendary coach LaVell Edwards was inducted in 2004 after serving 29 seasons as head coach, posting an amazing record of 257-101-3. Steve Young was inducted in 2001 with Jim McMahon, Marc Wilson and Gifford Nielsen earning Hall of Fame status in 1998, 1996 and 1994, respectively. With a long

history of successful quarterbacks making their way to the College Football Hall of Fame, it seems only a matter of time before Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer receives an invitation to South Bend. BYU has produced more than just top-ranked quarterbacks over the years. Defensive lineman Jason Buck, offensive lineman Mo Elewonibi, offensive lineman Nick Eyre, running back Eldon Fortie, defensive back Kyle Morrell, punter Pat Thompson and tight ends Chris Smith and Gordon Hudson are also candidates for the Hall of Fame.

FOLLOWING A BOWL VICTORY...

In seasons following a BYU bowl victory, the Cougars have compiled a combined record of 67-21 (.761), averaging 9.4 wins per season. Of BYU's seven previous post-bowl victory teams, all but two teams have returned to a bowl game the following season.

"FAN" TASTIC FANS

Over 350,000 (363,146) fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2006 season, averaging 60,542 fans per game. BYU finished ranked fourth overall in the west behind USC (91,480), UCLA (64,955), California (64,318). BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU has led the MWC in home attendance in all eight years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds. Through three home games, the Cougars are averaging 64,516 fans per game -- that's 101% of the stadium's 64,045 capacity.



HOMELAND SECURITY

The victory over Colorado State ran BYU's consecutive home winning streak to 10 games, dating back to last season. Over that span, the Cougars have beaten their opponents by an average of 30.3 points per game. During that stretch, BYU is allowing just 10.8 points per game. The Cougars have allowed seven points or less in seven of the last 10 home games. In the first four games this season, the Cougars have outscored opponents by an average 23 points per game and have allowed just nine points per game. BYU's current win streak is the longest since posting a 17-game home win streak from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME

A 35-16 victory over Colorado State marked the 10th straight victory at Edwards Stadium – the longest home win streak since winning 10 straight from October 26, 2000 to September 6, 2002. BYU is 13-3 in Provo during the Bronco Mendenhall era. In addition, the Cougars are 7-1 in games in Provo following a road game under Mendenhall.

SCORING DOMINANCE

Not only did BYU lead the nation in home scoring margin in 2006, the Cougars also led the nation in overall scoring margin, defeating opponents by an average 22.1 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars have outscored opponents by an average 5.0 points per game.

BEST HOME TEAM IN THE COUNTRY — PERIOD.

The Cougars finished the 2006 regular season as the most dominant home team in the nation. In posting a perfect 6-0 record in Edwards Stadium, BYU defeated its opponents by an average 35.2 points per game. LSU finished second in home scoring margin, averaging a 31.2-point margin in 2006.

QUARTER REPORT

An Oct. 20 win against Eastern Washington marked the first second-half shut out the BYU defense has recorded this season. All totaled, BYU has recorded 14 shutout quarters on the season, including three scoreless quarters against Arizona, Air Force and Eastern Washington. BYU has outscored its opponents in every quarter. The Cougars have outscored their opponents 49-27 in the first quarter, 81-46 in the second, 65-35 in the third and 52-48 in the fourth quarter.

HIGH ON A MOUNTAIN TOP

With a 35-16 win over Colorado State, the Cougars remain atop the MWC with a 4-0 record. BYU has won a MWC record 12 straight league games, dating back to a 31-17, road victory over No. 15 TCU last season. The streak includes a record nine straight road victories against league opponents. The Cougars' 12-game league win streak is the longest since winning 25 straight October 2, 1982 to October 19, 1985. BYU owns a league-best 42-20 record against Mountain West opponents since the league began in 1999. The Cougars are the only team to record two different undefeated league seasons in the eight years since the beginning of the Mountain West Conference. BYU became the first undefeated MWC team with a 7-0 league record in 2001 and went undefeated again last season with a perfect 8-0 record against Mountain West opponents.



HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL

Bronco Mendenhall enters his third season as head coach at BYU. In his first season (2005), Mendenhall took a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and compiled a 6-5 regular-season record, a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference standings and earned a trip to a bowl game for the first time in three seasons.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted a 10-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC—this time, as conference champions.

Along the way, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.54 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.46 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.7 points per game. The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging 1.08 turnovers per game. BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.69 points per game -- the lowest per-game average for the Cougars since the 1985 season.

BYU outscored its opponents during the season by an average 36.7 to 14.69 (+22.01). More impressively, the Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo last season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006. Not only did BYU win each of its home games, it did so in record fashion. Not only did the 2006 Cougars finish the season as the most dominate team in the nation, but also they finished as the most dominate home team in BYU Football history. BYU averaged 47.2 points per game at LaVell Edwards Stadium while holding opponents to just 12.0 points per contest. The +35.16 margin not only led the nation in home scoring margin, but also set a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979. LSU finished the season behind the Cougars in 2006, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin.

In his first season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing.

During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the

secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons.

During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Mark Weber (last name is pronounced WEB-er) has been selected to coach the Cougars' offensive line. During his coaching career, including stops at Fresno State, UCLA, UNLV, Nevada and Oregon State, Weber has mentored several All-America, all-conference and NFL-caliber players.

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff has four members who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played at Philadelphia.

Interviews with players and coaches may be conducted after daily practice sessions. Generally, practices are open to media on Mon., Tues. and Wed. only. Player interviews with out-of-town media may be scheduled through the BYU Media Relations office.

WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON MONDAYS AT LEGENDS GRILLE

Head coach Bronco Mendenhall and selected players will participate in the weekly football media breakfast. The weekly event will be held on Mondays throughout the season, beginning at 9:30 a.m. on the second floor of Legends Grille in the Student Athlete Building.

MWC HIGHLIGHT SATELLITE FEED

The Mountain West Conference will provide a weekly satellite feed during the 2007 football season. The feed will include team-by-team highlights from the previous week's games and coach/player interviews.

INTERCEPTION NOTES

Senior defensive back Ben Criddle grabbed his second interception of the season when he picked off CSU's Caleb Hanie midway through the first quarter. All totaled the Cougars have recorded 10 interceptions on the year, including at least one pick in seven consecutive games.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are 28 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 12 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Bulgaria, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Madagascar, Mexico, Sweden and the United States.



RETURNED MISSIONARIES

Of the 105 players on the Fall Camp roster, over 70 have served a church missions in a total of 19 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, Samoa, Spain, Taiwan, Uruguay and Venezuela. Current members of the team have served missions in 16 different states within the United States, and members of the team who have previously served church missions speak a total of six different foreign languages, including Chinese, German, Japanese, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish. Current offensive lineman RJ Willing served his mission in Albuquerque.

WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. Mormon missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world.

Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language.

Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea.

A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize.

Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.

TEAM CAPTAINS

Seniors Bryan Kehl, Kelly Poppinga, Matt Allen and Sete Aulai have been selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2007 football season. Kehl and Poppinga are top linebackers for the Cougars, while Allen is a veteran wide receiver and Aulai is the team's starting center.

Collectively, the group has racked up 123 games of experience, including Kehl who has played in 43 career games and Allen who has played in 39. Aulai started and played in 12 games during the 2006 season, while Poppinga saw action in all 13 games for the Cougars last season.

Aulai is a 2006 Mountain West Conference second-team performer and has been tapped as an honors candidate for the 2007 season. Aulai allowed just one sack as a junior and did not allow a single sack against MWC opponents last season. Allen is an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer who graduated with a degree in exercise science earlier this month. Allen racked up 420 yards receiving, averaging 32 yards per game. Kehl is also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer. He ranked third on the BYU roster last season with 70 tackles, including eight tackles for a combined loss of 33 yards. Poppinga, also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer and recent BYU graduate, totaled 36 tackles during his junior season, posting two sacks and two interceptions.

CONSECUTIVE SELLOUTS

The Cougars' 35-16 victory over Colorado State marked the fourth consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium and the first time since the 1999 season the Cougars have had at least four sell-outs during one season. A crowd of 64,525 attended the Cougars' season-opening victory over Arizona on September 1, while attendance for Saturday's game against Air Force was listed at 64,502. The attendance against EWU was listed at 64,522, while 64,411 attended the CSU game. Since 1999, the Cougars are 11-4 in games with a sell-out crowd. Following is a look at the 15 sellouts since the 1999 season.

FIRST-HALF DOMINANCE

The Cougars held a 21-3 lead at halftime against CSU, marking the seventh time in eight games this season BYU has held the lead at intermission. The Rams' three points is the fewest BYU has allowed this year since its first-half shutout against Air Force. It also marks the fourth time in eight games that the Cougars have held their opponent to seven or fewer points in the opening half. The 18-point lead marked the largest half-time lead of the season. The Cougars have led at halftime in 20 of the last 21 games. During those 20 games, the team is 17-3.

ROOKIE QB'S AND BOWL GAMES

Sophomore quarterback Max Hall made his collegiate debut on September 1 against Arizona. Hall threw 26-of-39 for 288 yards and two touchdowns. The game marked Hall's first game in over four seasons. Hall is the first BYU quarterback to start the season without any previous Division-I experience since Steve Sarkisian started in 1995. Hall will also look to become the first quarterback since Brandon Doman to lead the Cougars to a bowl game in his first season as the regular starter. Since John Walsh led BYU to a Holiday Bowl appearance in 1993, Doman is the only quarterback to lead the Cougars to a bowl game in his first season as a regular starter.

"MAX" IMUM EFFORT

BYU quarterback Max Hall completed 22-of-30 passes for 355 yards and three touchdowns against Colorado State. It is Hall's third-career game with 350 or more yards passing and his best performance pass percentage-wise (73 percent). Additionally, Saturday's game against CSU is the first game since the season-opener against Arizona in which Hall did not throw an interception. On the season, Hall has completed 60.2 percent of his attempts (189-314) and is averaging a league-leading 310.6 yards per game. Hall is on pace to pass for over 3,700 yards on the season and rank among the top-10 single-season performances in BYU football history. Hall's three touchdown completions against Colorado State gives him 17 on the season.

FIRST BLOOD

Michael Reed's 9-yard touchdown reception from Max Hall gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead with 8:57 remaining in the first quarter against Colorado State. BYU has scored first in 18 of the last 20 games. BYU is 16-2 in those 18 games.

MARGIN OF VICTORY

Max Hall barreled into the end zone for a two-yard touchdown run with 3:14 remaining in the third quarter against Eastern Washington to put the Cougars ahead 35-7. The 28-point margin marked the largest lead BYU has had at any point this season, and the largest margin since a 29-yard touchdown pass from Hall to Unga gave the Cougars a 24-0 lead over Air Force. The game's final score of 42-7 marked BYU's largest margin of victory of the season.



SEEING PITTA FROM THE POCKET

Sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta caught five receptions for 114 yards last month against Air Force and racked up 113 receiving yards against Tulsa. The last BYU player to have two consecutive games with 100+ yards receiving was Jonny Harline in 2006. Harline totaled 118 yards against Utah and racked up 181 receiving yards the following game against Oregon in the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl. Pitta was credited with four receptions for 70 yards in the Cougars' 35-16 victory over Colorado State. So far this season, Max Hall and Dennis Pitta have teamed up on 36 balls for a team-leading 547 yards. Pitta is averaging over 68.4 yards receiving per game. With both Pitta and Hall being only sophomores, they are on pace to become BYU's all-time leading quarterback-receiver duo. Currently, Ty Detmer and tight end Chris Smith own that distinction with 2,221 yards between 1988 and 1990.

BALANCED ATTACK

The Cougars have scored 32 touchdowns on the season. Of the 32 TD's, 17 have been scored via the passing game while 15 have been scored on the ground. Running back Manase Tonga leads the team with eight rushing touchdowns while sophomore receiver Austin Collie has a team-leading five touchdown receptions. Freshman running back Harvey Unga has eight touchdowns on the season, including five rushing and three receiving.

NEAR SHUTOUTS

In three of the Cougars' eight games this season, BYU has held its opponents scoreless in three of four quarters. The Cougars held Arizona scoreless through 59 minutes. The Wildcats scored with just under a minute remaining in the game. Against Air Force, the BYU defense pitched a shutout through the better part of three quarters. The Falcons scored with 3:31 left in the third quarter, but would not score again. Interestingly, Air Force is the only team in the Mountain West Conference the Cougars have never shut out for an entire game. Shaun Carney's eight-yard touchdown run in the third quarter ended the Cougars' chances of their first-ever shutout against the Falcons. BYU has had 11 shutouts since the 1984 season. Interestingly, three of those shutouts were against New Mexico. (1984, 1988, 1992). The Cougars have only been shut out twice in the past 402 games.

ACTIVE WINNING STREAKS SNAPPED

College football's two longest active winning streaks were snapped on September 8 as Boise State fell to Washington, 10-24, and BYU lost to UCLA, 17-27. Boise State had won 14 straight prior to Saturday, and BYU's 11-game winning streak was its longest since the 2001 season.

HOME WIN STREAK CONTINUES

The Cougars' 35-16 victory over Colorado State extended BYU's home win streak to 10 straight games. The Cougars will look to win their 11th consecutive home game for the first time since winning 17 in a row from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991 when they play host to TCU on November 8.

MWC ROAD WARRIORS

BYU's victory at UNLV marked the second road win of the season and extend the Cougars' conference road win streak to nine straight MWC road victories. The current streak started with a 27-24 win at New Mexico during the 2005 season. The streak marks the most consecutive road wins in league play since the Cougars won eight straight from September 30, 1995 through September 27, 1997.

A sure-handed possession receiver, Allen is athletic and a solid route runner. He has 17 receptions for 192 yards and two touchdowns. Allen is averaging 24.0 yards per game. Allen is also a finalist for the Wuerffel Trophy, an award presented to the college football player who best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.

Austin Collie-WR

After returning from a mission in January, Collie has worked hard to return to pick up where he left off after the 2004 season. Collie is a big, physical receiver who has the ability to rack up big yards after the catch. He has been slowed by an ankle injury and saw limited action against Air Force after posting over 300 all-purpose yards against Tulsa. Collie had a game-high eight receptions for 111 yards and a touchdown against Colorado State. Collie has 30 receptions for 466 yards on the season and five touchdowns. He is averaging just over 58.2 yards per game.

Dennis Pitta-TE

Pitta also returned from a church mission during the offseason. Pitta also logged significant playing time as a true freshman in 2004. Pitta led all tight ends in receptions with 17 grabs while scoring two touchdowns during his freshman campaign. Picking up where he left off, Pitta leads the Cougars with 36 receptions for 547 yards and two touchdowns. Pitta had four receptions for 70 yards against Colorado State.

Kelly Poppinga-LB

After a successful 2006 at outside linebacker, Poppinga moved to the middle to replace three-year starter and team captain Cameron Jensen. Last season, Poppinga played in all 13 games recording 36 tackles, two sacks, 3.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions. This season Poppinga leads the roster with 60 tackles, including 26 solo takedowns. He has a 6 tackles for a combined loss of 12 yards, three pass break-ups and two hurries.

Michael Reed-WR

Another experienced big, physical outside receiver, Reed returns to the Cougars for his junior season after logging significant playing time as a freshman and sophomore. Reed had 25 catches for 339 yards and three touchdowns a year ago. An athletic receiver, Reed ranks fourth on the roster with 27 receptions for 316 yards and two touchdowns. Reed was credited with a season-high 132 yards and one touchdown against Tulsa.

Harvey Unga-RB

After redshirting the 2006 season due to an injury, redshirt freshman Harvey Unga entered the season expected to make a large and immediate contribution to the BYU offense. A large, yet deceptively quick runner, Unga made his presence known from the season-opener against Arizona. Unga racked up 194 all-purpose yards in the Cougars' 20-7 victory over the Wildcats. Unga picked up 67 yards rushing and 127 yards receiving. After picking up another 71 all-purpose yards against UCLA, Unga posted 135 all-purpose yards against Tulsa, including a game-high 100 yards rushing. Against Air Force, Unga tacked on another 160 all-purpose yards to his season total. Unga ran for 111 yards and was credited with 69 yards receiving. Following another strong performance against Eastern Washington, Unga racked up 110 yards receiving and 51 yards rushing in the Cougars' 35-16 win over Colorado State. With 735 yards rushing on the season, Unga became the Cougars' all-time leading freshman running back. On the season he leads the roster with 735 yards rushing and five touchdowns and has 499 yards receiving and 3 touchdowns. Unga is averaging 91.9 yards rushing and 62.4 yards receiving on the season.

Max Hall-QB

Named the starter after spring practice heading into summer workouts, Hall is in his first of three years of eligibility. The Arizona State transfer sat out last season due to transfer rules. It was still a productive season for Hall as he had success quarterbacking the 2006 offensive scout team against a BYU defense that ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense. In just his first eight starts, Hall is making his mark on the BYU Quarterback Factory. Only Ty Detmer has posted more passing yards through eight starts in BYU football history. Hal has completed 189-of-314 attempts for 2,485 yards and 17 touchdowns. He racked up a career-high 537 yards passing and four touchdowns against Tulsa. Hall ranks among the nation's top passers with a 310.6 yards-per-game average. As a result of his performance at Tulsa, Hall holds the MWC all-time and sophomore single-game record for total offense with 548 yards, he tied the MWC sophomore single-game record with 34 completions against the Golden Hurricane, and set the all-time and sophomore single-game passing yardage record with 537 yards.

ON THE ROAD vs. RANKED OPPONENTS

The Cougars' 17-27 loss to No. 11 UCLA marked the first road game against a ranked opponent since BYU knocked off No. 15 TCU in Fort Worth last season, 31-17. The victory over the Horned Frogs gave BYU its first win over a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on September 20, 1997. BYU is now 1-13 in games against ranked opponents, dating back to the 1999 season.

OPENING-GAME SELLOUT

The Cougars saw a capacity crowd (64,045) for the season-opener against Arizona. The game marked the first home-opening sellout since the 2004 season when the Cougars opened in Provo against Notre Dame. Prior to the 2007 season-opener, BYU had had 10 opening-day sell-outs, dating back to 1982 -- the first year of the expanded stadium. The Arizona game also marked the first opening-day sell out during the Bronco Mendenhall era. It was also the first sell out since November 19, 2005 when the Cougars played host to Utah. Since 1985, the Cougars are 8-3 (.727) when playing in Provo for the home-opener in front of a sold-out stadium.

BALL HOGS

Entering Thursday's game against TCU, BYU ranked third in the nation in time of possession, averaging 33:23 minutes per game. In the Cougars' last MWC game, however, BYU owned the ball for just 28:13 compared to CSU's 31:47 total possession time. The game marked just the first time all season that the Cougars did not finish the game with a greater time of possession than their opponent. During the game the Rams had two drives that took longer than five-and-a-half minutes, while limiting BYU's longest drive to just 4:07.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 22-4 when leading at halftime and 21-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter. The loss at Tulsa marked the first time since September 16, 2006 the Cougars lost a game after holding a halftime lead. BYU led 34-31 at halftime against the Golden Hurricane; however, TU outscored the Cougars 24-13 in the second half to win the game, 55-47.

COLLIE BREAKS SCHOOL, MWC RECORDS

Against Tulsa, sophomore receiver Austin Collie was credited with 366 all-purpose yards, including 245 combined return yards and 121 receiving yards, to break Pete Van Valkenburg's 35-year-old school record. Van Valkenburg racked up 306 all-purpose yards in a 33-14 win over Wyoming on November 4, 1972. Collie's total also eclipsed Larry Ned's Mountain West Conference single-game record of 319 yards in San Diego State's October 6, 2001 victory over Eastern Illinois. Additionally, Collie's mark set the new MWC sophomore record, clipping Aaron Brown's mark of 285 yards in TCU's victory over Colorado State on November 25, 2006. Collie, a 6-foot-2, 212-pound sophomore from El Dorado Hills, Calif., also set the Mountain West Conference single-game individual and sophomore kick return yardage records with 237 yards on eight returns. Previously, Colorado State's George Hill held both records with 218 yards against Minnesota on September 10, 2005. Collie came up just three yards short of breaking Golden Richards' 36-year-old record of 247 combined return yards. Richards had 219 punt return yards and 28 kick return yards against North Texas during the 1971 season. Collie had 237 kick return yards and 8 yards on punt returns. Collie scored his first touchdown of the season with 8:19 remaining in the third quarter of the Cougars loss at UCLA, cutting the Bruins' lead to 20-10. The touchdown marked Collie's first since the 2004 season. Collie did not play in 2005 or 2006, serving a Church mission in Brazil. Collie scored again with 6:04 left in the third quarter to cut the Bruins' lead to just 20-17. Collie, a freshman All-American in 2004, caught seven balls for a game-high 79 yards and two touchdowns.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

The Cougars currently have the 12th longest streak in the nation of consecutive games without returning a kickoff for a touchdown. BYU has been unable to accomplish the feat in 113 straight games. Mike Rigell is the last Cougar to return a kickoff for a touchdown. Rigell turned in a 96-yard touchdown in a 31-9 victory at Hawaii on October 17, 1998.

YELLOW FEVER

Throughout the first eight games of the season, the Cougars have been plagued with penalties, ranking 114th with an average of 8.43 penalties per game. Of the Cougars' 59 penalties on the season, the offense has been flagged for 38 infractions while the defense has been penalized 11 times. Special teams has accounted for 10 of the Cougars' 59 penalties.

SCORING NOTES

The Cougars posted a season-high 47 points on Tulsa, marking the most points scored since beating Wyoming 55-7 on November 9, 2006. The game marked the most points BYU has scored in a losing effort since falling to TCU in overtime, 50-51, on September 24, 2005. It's also the most points scored during regulation in a losing effort since losing to Utah State, 56-58, on October 30, 1993. Interestingly, since that game in 1993, the Cougars are 31-2 in games when the team scores 45 (or more) points.

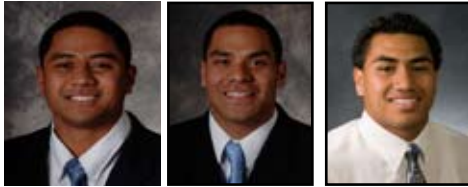

THE TONGAN TRIO



BYU's Tongan Trio, featuring running backs Manase Tonga, Fui Vakapuna and Harvey Unga, was back in action against Eastern Washington. Vakapuna broke his hand Sept. 15

against Tulsa and missed the next three weeks following surgery. The junior carried the ball 15 times for 37 yards against the Eagles. Tonga, Unga and Vakapuna have combined for 1,073 rushing yards and 690 yards receiving through the first eight games, averaging 220.4 all-purpose yards per game. The Tongan Threesome has accounted for 49 percent of the Cougars' total offense. Tonga and Unga have been credited with 83 percent of the team's total rushing yards and 28 percent of the team's receiving yardage.

UNGA MAKING CLAIM FOR TOP FRESHMAN HONORS

Freshman running back Harvey Unga rushed 11 times for 51 yards against CSU giving him a season total of 735 yards rushing on the season. Unga has now surpassed Ronney Jenkins' freshman record of 733 rushing yards. Unga was credited with 161 total yards on the day, including three receptions for 110 yards. Unga became the first running back in BYU history to turn in four 100-yard rushing games during his freshman season after racking up 145 yards rushing in the Cougars' 42-7 win over Eastern Washington. Unga was credited with 21 carries for 145 yards and one touchdown, averaging 6.9 yards per carry. Unga also totaled a team-high 57 yards receiving on four receptions, including a 22-yard touchdown to give BYU a 14-0 lead in the first quarter. Unga totaled a game-high 202 all-purpose yards, marking the second straight game he had produced over 200 all-purpose yards. Unga has a team-leading 735 yards rushing on the season, averaging 91.9 yards per game. All totaled, Unga accounts for 46 percent of BYU's total rushing attempts and 65 percent of the team's total rushing yards.
