## COUGARS HOST HAWAII; FIRST TIME SINCE 1997

Fresh off a decisive 42-21 victory over Big East power Syracuse, BYU will play host to Hawaii on Friday, Sept. 6. Game time is slated for 5 p.m. (MDT) and will be broadcast live to a national television audience on ESPN. The game will mark the first meeting between the two teams in Provo since the 1997 season. Hawaii ended the Cougars' 12-game win streak last season, knocking off BYU in Honolulu, 72-45. Since the two teams first met in Provo back in 1951, the Cougars have posted a 7-0 home record against the Warriors. Overall, BYU owns an 18-8 record over Hawaii, dating back to 1930. Despite last season's set-back, the Cougars have won six of the last seven meetings between the two schools.

## SCOUTING THE WARRIORS

Hawai'i will enter Friday's game against BYU following a season-opening victory in Honolulu over Division-IAA opponent Eastern Illinois, 61-36. UH quarterback Timmy Chang completed 19-of-30 (.633) attempts for 374 yards, while Chad Owens recorded a team-high five receptions for 56 yards. Mike Bass posted a team-leading 35 yards rushing on just four carries. All totaled, the Warriors' run-and-shoot offense produced 578 yards of total offense. Defensively, the Warriors struggled to contain the EIU offense, giving up 475 yards of total offense, including 156 yards rushing and 319 yards passing. The UH defense forced three Eastern Illinois turnovers, including two interceptions and one fumble. Interestingly, the Panthers produced 28 first downs to the Warriors' 23, out-rushed UH, 156 to 125, recorded 94 offensive plays to Hawai'i's 63 and controlled time of possession, 37:40 to 22:20. Hawai'i finished the 2001 season with a 9-3 record, including home victories over nationally ranked Fresno State and BYU. Offensively, the Warriors return five starters from last season's team, while the defense returns eight starters.

## WHEN LAST THEY MET (Hawai'i 72, BYU 45; Dec. 8, 2001)

Late-game heroics had become a staple for the BYU football team, but late in the season, and having just been snubbed by the BCS, the Cougars ran out of tricks against the Warriors. Led by special teams play and an aerial assault, Hawaii knocked off previously unbeaten BYU 72-45 in the Dec. 8, 2001 matchup in Honolulu. Hawaii jumped out to an early lead behind two kick returns for touchdowns by Chad Owens, all in the first quarter. Owens took the opening kick all the way to the BYU 32-yard-line, returned a punt 74 yards for a touchdown and for an encore, returned a kickoff the length of the field for a touchdown. BYU lost six fumbles and threw one interception, and it seemed the turnovers would come just when things were looking good for the Cougars. Almost all hopes were dashed for the Cougars by the end of the third quarter, when Hawaii receiver Ashley Lelie caught an 80-yard touchdown pass to take a commanding 58-31 lead. Both teams scored two touchdowns in the final quarter, but despite scoring 45 points, the Cougars were unable to put a dent in the Warriors' lead. The two teams combined for an amazing 1,258 yards of total offense. Despite the loss, Reno Mahe provided an amazing performance, lining up in the backfield and as a receiver. Fighting a hip pointer and an injured knee, Mahe had 14 receptions for 184 yards and two touchdowns. In addition, Mahe rushed for 69 yards on eight carries.

## COUGS SUCCESSFUL IN PAYBACK OPPORTUNITIES

Since 1980, BYU has had 61 different opportunities to repay an opponent for a previous loss. When the Cougars face an opponent, having lost in the previous meeting, they have recorded a 40-21 (.656) record. Since Nov. 7, 1998, BYU has not lost to an opponent in a payback situation, posting a perfect 14-0 record. ## CROWTON HITS MINI-MILESTONE

BYU head coach Gary Crowton, now in his second season at BYU -- his fifth as a college head coach -- will be coaching in his 50th career game on Friday (vs. Hawai'i). Crowton has produced a 34-15 (.694) record in five seasons as a head coach. In his first year at BYU, Crowton led the Cougars to a 12-2 season, marking a five game improvement over the Cougars' 6-6 record in 2000. With a five-game improvement, Crowton's success ranked fifth overall in the nation, and tops among first-year coaches.

Wrubell's broadcast partner is former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons, entering his 21st season as game analyst. Lyons, a math teacher at Olympus High School, also contributes to KSL's comprehensive pregame and postgame shows.

Bill Riley, now in his second year as an on-air personality at KSL will join the broadcast team from the sidelines. Riley, who anchors "Sports Final" nightly on KSL, also hosts the midweek "Gary Crowton Show" and "Coordinators Corner".

KSL Chief Engineer John Dehnel begins his 17th season on the BYU broadcast crew, while longtime spotter Doug Martin and veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky round out KSL's lineup in the booth.

Following the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," "Cougar Lockerroom Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show," "Cougar Replay" and "Cougar Call-In Show."

## COUGARS SPEED PAST ORANGEMEN, 42-21

The Cougars avenged their loss of two years ago and proved that they once again will be a team to contend with, beating Syracuse 42-21 on Aug. 29 in front of a sell-out crowd at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The Cougars managed to rack up 615 yards of total offense against the Orangemen, over 50 yards more than their average from last year that made BYU the NCAA leader in offense. Junior quarterback Bret Engemann threw for a total of 386 yards on 35-54 passing, with three touchdowns and one interception. He proved that he can also run the ball by posting 50 yards rushing on eight carries, and scoring a three-yard rushing touchdown to put the Cougars up 27-21 in the second quarter. Sophomore running back Marcus Whalen stepped up to fill the hole left by 2001 Doak Walker Award winner Luke Staley, BYU's all-time single season rushing leader. Whalen carried the ball 19 times for 152 yards and one touchdown. Ten different BYU receivers recorded 397 total yards for the night, including junior Toby Christensen with six receptions for 98 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore David Christensen pulled in five passes for 74 yards and one touchdown, and senior Reno Mahe was unusually quiet with four receptions for 35 yards. BYU tight ends also had a strong showing in the first game of the season, combining for 11 receptions and 131 yards. Spencer "The Teton Terror" Nead recorded eight receptions for 80 yards, while senior Gabe Reid caught four passes for 29 yards and sophomore Aissac Aiono caught two for 24 yards. The Cougar defense held the Orangemen to 326 yards on 8-24 passing, with two interceptions and three sacks, for a loss of 13 yards. Senior defensive end Jeff Cowart recorded one sack and his first career interception, and sophomore Brady Poppinga had one sack and three tackles for a total loss of 12 yards.

## ENGEMANN NAMED MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Nearly two years after being sidelined with a shoulder injury, junior quarterback Bret Engemann made his return to the field. In his first start since Sept. 30, 2000, Engemann led BYU to a season-opening victory, recording three touchdown completions and running for another in the Cougars' 42-21 victory over Syracuse. Engemann completed a career-high 35-of-54 (.648) attempts for 386 yards, marking the second 300-yard game of his career. In his come-back performance against the Orangemen, Engemann was responsible for four touchdowns on the evening, including a career-high three TD completions and a three-yard run. The 6-foot-5 Provo, Utah, native started things off with an 11-for-15 (.733) performance in the first quarter, racking up 111 yards and a six-yard touchdown strike to Andrew Ord. In the second quarter, Engemann racked up another 105 yards, 10 more completions, and a two-yard pass to Toby Christensen to put the Cougars up 14-7. During the second quarter, he also engineered a school-record 99-yard scoring drive to give BYU a 21-7 lead with 4:53 remaining in the first half. After the half, Engemann kept up his blistering assault on the Syracuse defense, posting 12 more completions on 15 attempts (.800) for 80 more yards. After the Orangemen had tied the score at 21-21, Engemann led the Cougars on a 10-play, 92-yard drive and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a three-yard run. Holding to a narrow six-point lead in the fourth quarter, Engemann found David Christensen down the sideline for a 50-yard touchdown strike, giving BYU a 33-21 advantage with 6:33 remaining. On the night, Engemann produced scoring drives of 99, 92, 80, 73 and 71 yards.

## ATTENDANCE FIGURE RANKS NATIONALLY

Thursday's season-opener against Syracuse drew a capacity crowd of 65,612 fans at LaVell Edwards Stadium, marking the 56th sellout at the stadium (since it was expanded in 1982.) Thursday's crowd also marked the 15th largest gathering in the nation, spanning the first full weekend of college football. Michigan hosted a national leading 111,491 fans in the Wolverine's season-opener against Washington. Interestingly, BYU ranked 12th nationally in accumulated capacity. Edwards Stadium was filled to 100.94 percent of its capacity.

## PRESEASON INJURY BUG BITES COUGARS

Even before the 2002 season began, the Cougars lost three players to season-ending injuries. Redshirt freshman C.J. AhYou was lost on the first day of Fall Camp, suffering a torn ACL. AhYou, who was slated to start at defensive end missed the majority of last season also with a torn ACL. Just under two weeks prior to the Cougars' season-opener, senior offensive tackle Ben Archibald was lost for the season after suffering a mid-shaft compound fracture. Archibald, an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate, is expected to apply for a sixth-year following the 2002 season. Reserve senior cornerback Todd Barker injured his surgically-repaired shoulder and will be unable to return for his final season at BYU. In the Cougars' first game of the season, head trainer George Curtis reported there were no injuries that would prevent a player from playing in Friday's game against Hawai'i. Starting safety Michael Madsen suffered a shoulder subluxation, but will play on Friday.

## THE CROWTON FILE



In 2001, Gary Crowton, a native of Orem, Utah, took over a BYU program that had been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards (257-101-3; .716). In his first season, Crowton guided the Cougars to an impressive 12-2 season, climbed as high as No. 9 in the national polls, lead the nation in scoring and yards-per-game average, won the MWC title and earned a trip to the 2001 Liberty Bowl.

Crowton, 45, came to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to serving two seasons as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997. Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50-or-more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60-or-more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season. Under Crowton, Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including a school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school-record 4,943 yards passing.

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under Edwards at BYU. While at BYU he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer, Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985. From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois for one season, before taking over as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire.



In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterbacks coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton, who is the first-ever head football coach at BYU to serve an LDS Church mission, is married to the former Maren Peterson of Bountiful, Utah. The couple was married in 1985 and have seven children.

## IT'S NO COINCIDENCE

While at Louisiana Tech, Gary Crowton recorded three straight seasons with a scoring average of 33 points per game or better. In 1996, the Crowton-led Bulldogs averaged 36.4 points per game, but dropped off to a mere 33.1 points per game in 1997. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs published a 41.1 points-per-game average. During the 2001 season, his first year at BYU, Crowton and the Cougars lead the nation with an amazing 46.7 points per game average.

## CROWTON NOTABLES

- Crowton is the first coach in BYU history to win more than seven games in his first season.
- In only his fourth year as a Division-IA coach, Crowton recorded his 30th career victory — a 56-34 victory over Sonny Lubick and the Colorado State Rams.
- In his fifth season as a collegiate head coach, Crowton will coach in his 50th career game on Friday, sept. 6 (vs. Hawaii).
- Head coach Gary Crowton became only the second coach in BYU football history to win 12 games in a single season after defeating Mississippi State, 41-38, during the 2001 season. LaVell Edwards accomplished the feat three different times during his 29-year career, including a 14-win season during the 1996 campaign. Crowton's previous single-season best win total was 9-2 at Louisiana Tech during the 1997 season.

## 28 STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS AND COUNTING

Following a 63-33 win over Air Force on Oct. 20, 2001, the Cougars claimed their 28th straight non-losing season. BYU has not had a losing campaign since posting a 5-6 mark in 1973—former head coach LaVell Edward's second season as head coach. The Cougars' streak of 28 straight seasons ranks 11th all-time at the NCAA Division I-A level and is currently the third longest non-losing streak in the nation. (Nebraska ranks No. 1 with 40 straight seasons without a losing campaign.)

## COUGARS RECORD NINTH STRAIGHT HOME VICTORY

With a 42-21 victory over Syracuse on Aug. 29, the Cougars extended their home win streak to nine straight games. The current home win streak dates back to a 19-7 win over Wyoming on Oct. 26, 2000. During that span, BYU has outscored its opponents 46.3-22.8, averaging a 23.5 margin of victory. Since BYU's football stadium was renamed LaVell Edwards Stadium on Nov. 18, 2001, the Cougars have never lost a game in Provo.

## HOME SWEET HOME

With a perfect 6-0 record in Provo last season, the Cougars have recorded 12 undefeated home seasons since the 1967 campaign. In fact, since the stadium was expanded to 65,000, the Cougars have posted eight different seasons without losing a game in Provo. The 2001 perfect home season marked the first since 1998.

## BYU IN SEASON OPENERS

This year's season-opener (vs. Syracuse) marked the third time in the past four years the Cougars have opened the season in Provo, including a 1999 victory against Washington (35-28) and a 2001 triumph over Tulane (70-35). Overall, the Cougars are **47-28-2** (.623) in season-openers, dating back to the 1922 season. When playing in the season-opener in Provo, BYU has posted a **26-10-1** (.716) all-time record. With the 42-21 victory over Syracuse, BYU is **11-11-1** all-time against teams from current BCS institutions in season-opening games. The Cougars have won four of their last five season-opening home games, including three straight wins (1999, 2001, 2002).

## PAPER OR PLASTIC

In the first game of the 2002 season (vs. Syracuse), the Cougars allowed just one sack, while producing three sacks against the Syracuse offense for a combined loss of 13 yards. Last season, the BYU offense gave up 24 sacks, averaging 1.8 sacks per game. Defensively, BYU recorded 25 sacks, averaging 1.9 sacks per game.

## THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

Against Syracuse, BYU converted 11-of-18 (.611) third-down attempts, including five-straight conversions on the Cougars' first drive of the game. All totaled BYU reeled off seven straight third-down conversions before the Orangemen were able to stop BYU on a third-and-22 attempt early in the second quarter.

## DRIVIN' THE DISTANCE

On Aug. 29, the Cougars drove 99 yards (vs. Syracuse) to set a BYU record for the longest scoring drive in school history. The drive, which lasted nine plays and took 2:59, was highlighted by a 58-yard run by sophomore running back Marcus Whalen. Against the Orangemen, the Cougars racked up drives of 99, 92, 80, 73 and 71 yards. During the 2001 season, BYU produced 20 different 80-yard drives. In the first game of the 2002 season, the Cougars produced two 90-yard scoring drives, equaling last year's entire season total.

## COMMON OPPONENTS

BYU and Hawai'i will face two common opponents during the 2002 season, including Nevada and San Diego State. The Cougars will travel to Nevada on Sept. 14, while the Warriors will face the Wolfpack at Aloha Stadium on Oct. 12. BYU will also take on San Diego State on Nov. 2, while the Warriors will take on SDSU in the regular-season finale in Honolulu on Dec. 7. Last season, BYU and Hawaii also had two common opponents. The Cougars were 2-0 against those teams (win against Nevada; win against Air Force), while the Warriors were 1-1 (loss at Nevada; win against Air Force).

## THE TETON TERROR

Known over the past 20+ years for its All-American quarterbacks, BYU is quickly becoming known for its outstanding tight ends. Senior tight end Spencer Nead is making a solid case to join the ranks of BYU's long line of outstanding tight ends, including Gordon Hudson, Chad Lewis, Itula Mili and Doug Jolley. Nead started the 2002 campaign with a career-high 80-yard performance. Nead was one of three different receivers with five receptions on the night. All totaled three different BYU tight ends, including Gabe Reid and Aisaac Aiono accounted for 133 yards on 11 receptions.

## BYU AND THE NCAA

During the 2001 season, BYU averaged a nation-leading 46.8 points per game. That scoring average was the highest in the NCAA since Kansas State posted an average 48.0 points per game during the 1998 season. BYU also led the nation in total offense, averaging 542.9 yards per game. Junior running back Luke Staley led the nation with an average 15.45 points per game. Staley scored 28 TDs on the season, including 24 rushing touchdowns. Staley also ranked third with a 143.82 yards-per-game average.

## THE STREAK IS STILL ALIVE ... 339 GAMES AND COUNTING

With Andrew Ord's 6-yard touchdown reception vs. Syracuse in the Cougars' 2002 season-opener, BYU extended its NCAA record streak to 339 games without being shut out. BYU was last shut out during the 1975 season (Sept. 27, 1975 vs. Arizona State.) The Cougars don't have a single person on their 2002 roster that was alive the last time BYU was shut out.

## BYU BREAKS 12-YEAR-OLD NCAA RECORD

During the 2001 season, BYU racked up a total of 7,057 yards of total offense, becoming the first team to ever eclipse the 7,000-yard mark. The Cougars eclipsed a 12-year-old mark set by Houston during the 1989 season. The "other" Cougars posted 6,874 yards during the 1989 campaign. With 615 yards of total offense in the season-opener (vs. Syracuse), the Cougars are on pace to record 7,380 yards this season.

## A WINNING TRADITION

Over the past two decades, BYU has consistently ranked as one of the nation's top winning programs. During the 1990s, BYU ranked 16th nationally with an 86-39-2 record (.685). In the 80s, the Cougars won 102 of 128 games to rank third nationally. Since the 2000 season, BYU has posted an impressive 19-8 (.704) mark, including a 12-2 record during the 2001 campaign.

## FUTURE FACTS

- BYU will play at USC and Notre Dame in 2003. The Cougars' home schedule will include games against Boise State, Georgia Tech and Stanford.
- The Cougars will have as many as 15 of 22 starters returning for the 2003 season, including 10 defensive starters.

## 2001 COUGARS CLAIM SECOND MWC TITLE

BYU captured its second MWC championship in the past three years after a thrilling come-from-behind win (24-21) over Utah on Saturday, Nov. 17, 2001. The victory marked the first outright title for the Cougars since the 1996 season and became the first-ever MWC team to win the league title with a perfect 7-0 record. Since winning its first conference title in 1965, BYU has won a total of 21 league titles, including 10 straight championships from 1976-1985. Of the 21 conference titles, BYU has won the championship outright 13 times.

## OVERTIME FACTS

Since the NCAA instituted overtime in 1996, the Cougars have played four overtime games, posting a perfect 4-0 record. Of the 31 teams which have played four or more overtime games, the Cougars are the only team to post a perfect 4-0 record. Interestingly, the Cougars have never played an overtime game in Provo. ## ROSTER BREAKDOWN

Of all the members of the BYU roster, 70 players have served a full-time, two-year mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (63.3 percent). 96 players on this year's roster are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (87.3 percent). Interestingly, 43 different players are married (40.9 percent). Of the 43 married players, there are eight couples with children and five couples expecting children in the near future. Reserve offensive lineman Nike Mali leads the group with two children, while receiver Reno Mahe has a son and is expecting a daughter in November. The average of the Cougars' 22 starters is 22 years old.

## AMONG THE TOP

Over the past three seasons, BYU ranks 18th nationally with an overall record of 27-12 record (.692). Miami (Fla.) leads the group with a combined record of 33-5 (.868) during that span.

## JV NOTES

The BYU-JV squad saw its first action of the season, knocking off top-ranked Dixie State College on Aug. 30, 21-14. Dixie, ranked No. 1 in the preseason NJCAA polls, got off to a 6-0 lead before the Cougars scored 14 unanswered points before halftime. The Rebels tied things up in the third quarter after Christian Smith latched on to a three-yard pass from Casey Rehrer. Redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Berry led BYU's second-half effort, recording 144 yards on 12-of-23 passing. Berry completed a 39-yard strike to Kish Beverley with 4:50 remaining in the fourth quarter, giving the Cougars the game-winning touchdown. Sophomore quarterback Todd Mortensen handled the quarterback duties in the first half, completing 6-of-15 attempts for 137 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore receiver Jason Kukahiko led BYU with nine receptions for 120 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore Curtis Holder and junior Steve Later combined for 81 yards rushing on 12 carries. Sophomore defensive back Jared Meibos recorded a team-high 11 tackles on the night, including two for a combined loss of 12 yards. The BYU defense ended any chance for a Dixie scoring drive during the game's final series, recording back-to-back-to-back sacks. On the night, the Cougars recorded nine sacks for a total loss of 62 yards. True freshman Bryan Kehl and sophomore Chris Stevens each recorded three sacks.

## TURNIN' IT UP FIELD

In the Cougars' season-opener against Syracuse, quarterbacks Bret Engemann and Lance Pendleton combined for 397 yards passing. Of the 397 yards, BYU receivers were responsible for 175 yards after the reception. Sophomore receiver David Christensen led all receivers with an average 9.4 yards after each of his five receptions. ## GILFORD AMONG NATIONAL INTERCEPTION LEADERS

Cornerback Jernaro Gilford currently ranks 12th among active players with seven career interceptions. Louisville's Anthony Floyd leads with 17. Gilford recorded a career-high six interceptions last season, marking the most interceptions in a single season since Jason Walker picked off six in 1998. Gilford has been slowed by a knee injury and did not play in the season-opener against Syracuse. His status vs. Hawaii has not been determined.

## HOME BODIES

With six home games during the 2002 season, and two other games within the state of Utah, the Cougars will play a total of eight games in Utah. With the exception of a non-conference battle at Georgia Tech, the Cougars will also play three other road games that will require a quick, one-hour flight. In fact, BYU will not stay in Reno the night before the game. The Cougars will stay at their home headquarters (Holiday Inn) in Provo, and travel to Reno the morning of the game. Since 1980, the Cougars have posted a record of 118-25 (.825) when playing in the state of Utah, including games in Provo, Salt Lake City (UofU) and Logan (Utah State).

## PICK A RECEIVER, ANY RECEIVER

Throughout the 2001 season, the Cougars used a single-season record 20 different receivers, including a season-high 12 different receivers against Nevada. In BYU's season-opening game against Syracuse, the Cougars used a combination of 10 different receivers. Junior Toby Christensen led all pass catchers with six receptions for 98 yards. Tight end Spencer "The Teton Terror" Nead was close behind with 80 yards on five receptions. Of the 10 receivers BYU used against Syracuse, six different receivers had four or more receptions.

## UNLUCKY No. 13

Many people have long been superstitious of the number 13. Starting quarterback Bret Engemann wore the number during his sophomore campaign before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury against Syracuse. He has switched to No. 5 this season. Interestingly, 13 days prior to the season-opener (against Syracuse), senior offensive lineman Ben Archibald suffered a season-ending compound fracture in his left leg.

## BEST IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

In the three-year history of the Mountain West Conference, the Cougars have posted a 16-5 record against league opponents. The Cougars are tied with Colorado State for the best league record in the history of the MWC, however BYU has posted a 2-1 mark against Colorado State over the past three seasons, including a 56-34 win last season. ## MARGIN OF VICTORY

Throughout the 2001 season, the Cougars tallied 608 points, averaging a nation's best 46.8 points per game. BYU allowed 396 points, giving up an average 30.5 points per contest. Overall, the Cougars registered a +16.3-point margin of victory. The Cougars won four games on the season by 30 or more points, including a season-high 45-point win over Nevada on Sept. 1. The 2002 season got off to a similar start, with the Cougars posting 42 points on Syracuse. BYU outdistanced the Orangemen by 21 points.

## COUGARS SET SINGLE-SEASON SCORING RECORD

Through 13 regular-season games in 2001, BYU produced 608 points, averaging a nation's best 46.7 points per game and the best regular-season scoring average in BYU football history. The 2001 Cougars broke the 21-year-old record by just .1 point per game. The 1980 Cougars averaged 46.6 over 12 games. Army holds the NCAA scoring average record, posting 56.0 points per game during the 1944 season. Nebraska holds the NCAA record for most points scored in a single season with 624 over 12 games, set during the 1983 season. With one game of the 2002 season already in the books, the Cougars rank 22nd nationally. Cal leads the nation after posting 70 points on Baylor.

## BACK IN BLUE

During the off-season, BYU head coach Gary Crowton announced the hiring of Utah assistant coach Steve Kaufusi. Kaufusi was hired to take over the Cougars' defensive line, replacing Tom Ramage who retired after 30 seasons at BYU. Kaufusi and his brother, Rich, were Cougar defensive linemen during the 80s. Four other Kaufusi brothers played (or are playing) at Utah.

## LAVELL EDWARDS STADIUM

On November 18, 2001, Cougar Stadium was forever changed, honoring the man who built BYU's football tradition from the ground up. President of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Gordon B. Hinckley, announced the historic name change prior to Edwards' final home game (vs. New Mexico). Now known as LaVell Edwards Stadium; the stadium has been home to 119 games since it was expanded to 65,000 seats in 1982. BYU has produced a **97-22** (.815) record in the Stadium since the 1982 season, including a 37-13 victory over New Mexico in Edwards' final game in the stadium. Fittingly, Edwards retired with a perfect record (1-0) in LaVell Edwards Stadium. Since 1972, BYU has posted an impressive **139-22** (.863) record in Provo. The Cougars have won nine straight in Provo, including a stretch of eight straight games since the stadium was renamed.

## COUGARS LEAD MWC IN HOME ATTENDANCE

BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all three years of the league's existence, averaging 62,085 fans per game since the 1999 season. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-eight crowds, including Thursday's season-opener against Syracuse.

## WHAT EVER HAPPENED TO SATURDAY'S WARRIORS

Due to various scheduling issues surrounding the MWC's television contract with ESPN, as well as the Cougars' non-conference schedule, BYU will not play a Saturday home game until Oct. 19. The Cougars first two home games fall on a Thursday and Friday. After two home games, BYU takes to the road for four straight weeks and will not return back to Provo until Saturday, Oct. 19 (vs. UNLV). In addition to two non-Saturday home games, the Cougars also play on a Thursday night (at Colorado State) and on Friday (at Utah State). Overall, three of BYU's first five games will fall on either a Thursday or Friday.

## STADIUM RECORDS 56th SELLOUT

The 2002 season-opener against Syracuse marked the 56th sellout in Edwards Stadium history. BYU hosted 65,612 fans in the second straight sellout, dating back to last season's home finale against Utah. Since the stadium was expanded, 7,608,825 fans have filed into the friendly confines of Edwards Stadium.

## UP OR DOWN

During Friday's game, the following personnel will be coaching from the sidelines: Gary Crowton (head coach), Robbie Bosco (quarterbacks), Lance Reynolds (offensive line), Ken Schmidt (linebackers), Steve Kaufusi (defensive line) and Brian Mitchell (cornerbacks) and Paul Tidwell (running backs). Mike Borich (wide receivers), Mike Empey (tight ends) and Barry Lamb (safeties) will be in the pressbox.

## IN THE TRENCHES

The BYU offensive line, which includes three seniors and two juniors, weighs in at a beefy 1,525 pounds, averaging 305 pounds per man. This season's offensive line weighs an average 9.3 pounds heavier per man. The O-line will be squaring off against a Hawai'i defensive line (three juniors and one senior) that tips the scales at an average 274.5 pounds per man. On defense, the Cougars' line (one senior, two juniors and one sophomore) weighs in at 278.8 pounds per man, while the Warrior offensive line (two seniors, two juniors and one sophomore) average 311.6 pounds per man.

## ULTIMATE EXPOSURE

Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average three times per season, including a single-season record six national television appearances during the 2000 season. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 48-31-2 (.605) while playing on national television, including a 23-15 mark on ABC and a 28-18-2 (.604) mark on ESPN. Current assistant coach Robbie Bosco led the Cougars to a 20-14 win over Pittsburgh in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast in 1984. BYU was 5-2 last season when playing on national television, and are already off to a 1-0 start this season. The Cougars have three national television appearances scheduled this season (all on ESPN or ESPN2). In addition, the Cougars' Sept. 21 game at Georgia Tech will be broadcast regionally on ABC.

## COACHING; A FAMILY TRADITION

BYU safeties coach Barry Lamb is in his ninth season as a member of the coaching staff. Prior to coming to Provo, Lamb served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at San Diego State. Prior to his stint at SDSU, Lamb also coached at Idaho, UNLV, Arizona State and Oregon. His wife, Karen, was recently named the head women's volleyball coach at BYU, replacing Elaine Michaelis, who had coached the program for the past 40 years. Karen began her coaching career in 1978, serving as an assistant at BYU. After additional coaching experience at the high school and junior college ranks, Karen returned to the collegiate level with head coaching assignments at UNLV and Washington State.

## SWITCHING SIDES

For the first time in recent memory, the Cougars switched from the east sideline to the west sideline of Edwards Stadium for the 2001 season-opener against Tulane. The move proved to be successful. To start the 2002 season, Crowton again switched from the east sideline to the west sideline with the same results -- a BYU victory. Crowton has announced he will remain on the west sideline for the Hawaii game as well, but plans to move back to the east sideline when the Cougars return to Edwards Stadium. When occupying the west sideline, BYU is 2-0.

## OPPONENT FACTOR

BYU's opponents for the 2002 season had a combined 70-70 record in 2001. Four of those teams, including Syracuse, Georgia Tech, Colorado State and Utah, recorded bowl game victories last season. The Cougars open the season against two team that posted a combined 19-6 record. In fact, three of BYU's first four opponents had eight or more wins during the 2001 campaign. Following the first full week of competition, BYU opponents have posted a combined record of 7-7 on the season.

Nead is the Cougars' top returning tight end after recording 22 receptions for 266 yards as a junior last season. Nead averaged 12.1 yards per reception and scored five touchdowns.
