COUGARS SET TO BATTLE BRONCOS

After taking on No. 1 ranked USC at LaVell Edwards Stadium, BYU will face another highly ranked non-conference opponent Friday, Sept. 24 when they travel to Boise to take on No. 21 Boise State. The Broncos are currently 3-0 after defeating UTEP 47-31 last week, while BYU is 1-2 after losing to the Trojans. Boise State holds a 1-0 edge in the all-time series. The Broncos beat the Cougars last year 50-12 behind the passing of Ryan Dinwiddie, who threw for two touchdowns and ran for another.

RECORD VS. TEAMS CURRENTLY IN THE WAC

The Cougars hold a 64-23-3 (.736) record against teams currently in the Western Athletic Conference. Out of the 10 teams that comprise the WAC, BYU has played all of them except coach Gary Crowton's old team, Louisiana Tech. The Cougars competed in the WAC from 1962 until 1998 when BYU and seven other members of the WAC formed the Mountain West Conference. Nineteen of BYU's 21 conference championships came while they were still competing in the WAC with the first coming in 1965 and the last coming in 1996.

THE GEM STATE

Despite its proximity to the Gem State, BYU has only played four games in the state of Idaho, posting a 2-1-1 record. BYU hasn't played in Idaho since a 34-0 loss to the University of Idaho in 1954. The Cougars have three players on their roster that are from Idaho: linebacker Dan Bates (Boise), running back Nathan Meikle (Idaho Falls) and offensive lineman Scott Tidwell (Nampa). Other Cougars with ties to Idaho are Bryce Mahuika (mission in Pocatello) and John Denney, Jonny Harline Cameron Jensen and Scott Tidwell who all played at Ricks College. Some of the Cougars' greatest players have hailed from Idaho, including Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck, Academic All-American Jared Lee and current Indianapolis Colt Rob Morris.

ELECTION YEAR RECORD

Since 1972, BYU has posted a 78-24 (.765) record during election years. Some of the most significant moments have occurred while republicans and democrats are fighting for a seat in the oval office. During the 1972 presidential election, LaVell Edwards took over as BYU's head coach. In 1976, BYU was invited to its first bowl game, the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State. The 1980 presidential election year brought the Cougars their first bowl victory and a 12-1 record. BYU won the national championship in 1984, and in 1996, the Cougars posted 14 victories and earned their first trip to a New Year's Day bowl game.

The following BYU coaches will be working from the sidelines for the Boise State game: Gary Crowton (head coach), Todd Bradford (wide receivers), Bronco Mendenhall (defensive coordinator and safeties), Paul Tidwell (special teams coordinator), Jeff Grimes (offensive line) and Steve Kafusi (defensive line). The remaining assistant coaches, including Lance Reynolds (running backs), Mike Empey (tight ends), Barry Lamb (linebackers) and Brian Mitchell (cornerbacks), will coach from the booth.

WATCH OUT FOR THESE GUYS

Four members of the 2004 BYU football team—Aaron Francisco, Brady Poppinga, Daniel Coats and Matt Payne—have been selected to various “watch lists” for post-season awards.

Aaron Francisco, 6-2, 215, Safety: Aaron Francisco has been selected to the Thorpe Award “watch list,” which honors the nation’s top defensive back. Francisco is a three-year starter, who led BYU in tackles and interceptions as a junior and was second in tackles as a sophomore. Last year he earned first-team All-MWC honors and was an honorable mention selection as a sophomore. Francisco is second on the team in tackles with 26, including two tackles for loss and one sack. His best game of the season came against No. 1 ranked USC, when he amassed 16 tackles, eight solo and eight assisted

Brady Poppinga, 6-3, 257, Defensive End: Brady Poppinga has been selected to the Bronko Nagurski Award “watch list.” The award honors the nation’s top defensive player. Poppinga earned first-team All-MWC honors last season after ranking among the league leaders in tackles with 55 for the season, including 34 solo take downs and a team-leading six sacks. Poppinga ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 20, including four tackles for a loss and a team-leading two sacks. Against Notre Dame, Poppinga was a one-man wrecking crew, leading the team in tackles with twelve while recording one sack on Irish quarterback Brady Quinn for a loss of 10 yards.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 250, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been named to the John Mackey Award “watch list.” The John Mackey Award is given annually to the nation’s top tight end. Last season as a freshman, Coats recorded 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns, while earning freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News. On the season, Coats has hauled in six passes for 66 yards. He is fourth in the team in receptions and leads Cougar tight ends in both receptions and yards.

Matt Payne, 6-4, 234, Punter/Kicker: Matt Payne has been selected to the Lou Groza Award and Ray Guy Award “watch lists.” The Groza Award is given annually to the nation’s best place kicker, while the Ray Guy Award is given to the nation’s best punter. Payne is a three-year starter as both a punter and kicker. As a sophomore in 2002, Payne was second in the nation in punting with a 47.6 yard-per-punt average, earning an honorable mention All-America nod. Last year, Payne was selected to both the Lou Groza and Ray Guy “watch lists.” Payne punted nine times against the Irish, pinning them inside their 20 six times. He also kicked two field goals—a 44- and a 53-yarder. Payne followed up his excellent performance against the Irish with a solid day against Stanford, punting the ball four times for 180 yards which averages out to 45 yards a kick. In the third game of the season, Payne punted eight times for 386 yards (48.3), including a MWC record 79-yard punt, which is also the second longest punt in BYU’s history. He also kicked a 46-yard field goal that gave BYU an early 3-0 lead.

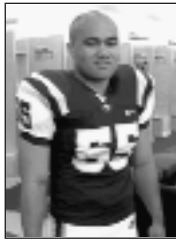

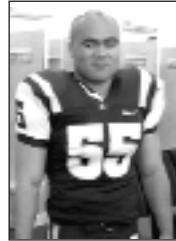


GRIDDERS GET NEW, COMFORTABLE UNIFORMS

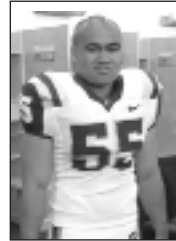
In an effort to provide the BYU football team different uniform combinations for both home and road games, BYU and Nike have been hard at work to produce a new look for the 2004 football season. The new uniforms feature traditional stripes over the shoulder pads and include subtle design changes that will allow the team to wear different combinations at home and on the road. The Cougars will now have the option of wearing all blue uniforms at home or a blue jersey with white pants. When playing on the road, the team will have the option of wearing an all white uniform or a white jersey with blue pants. In a process that has taken more than 18 months, BYU Equipment Manager Mick Hill said the new uniforms feature a style that will be more form fitting and comfortable for the players to wear. In addition, the new uniforms are made with a light-weight material that will prevent the uniform from becoming weighted down with perspiration or water.

EARLY LEADS

Following Matt Payne's 46-yard field goal against USC, BYU had scored first in all three of its games this year. Running back Fahu Tahi scored the Cougars' first points against both Notre Dame and Stanford. On the season, BYU has outscored its opponents 20-7 in the first quarter, while its opponents have outscored the Cougars 41-0 in the fourth.

1984 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP HONORED AT FIRST HOME GAME



Marking the 20th anniversary of the Cougars' 1984 National Championship the team was this year's sole induction into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame. The induction ceremony took place Friday evening, Sept. 3, at the Wilkinson Center Ballroom. The team was honored the next day at Lavell Edwards Stadium during the BYU-Notre Dame game in pre-game and halftime ceremonies. Only two other Cougar teams have been inducted into the Hall of Fame: the 1951 NIT Championship Basketball team and the 1966 NIT Championship Basketball team. Cosmo, the Cougarettes and the BYU Marching Band played a part in the game-day festivities. There was also an informal golf tournament Friday afternoon where some of the players participated as celebrity guests. In addition to the celebration in the stadium, a lithograph has been commissioned in honor of the '84 team.

1,984 numbered lithographs will be available for purchase. The artwork will feature individually autographed pictures of the 24 starters, including Vai Sikahema and Lee Johnson, along with a team picture and a picture of coach LaVell Edwards.

Familiar players like Glen Kozlowski, Vai Sikahema, Lee Johnson, Mark Bellini and Kelly Smith put Provo on the map in the world of college football. All-Americans like Robbie Bosco, Kyle Morrell, David Mills, Leon White and Marv Allen helped make the team a threat on both sides of the ball. In total, 15 players from the 1984 squad were drafted by 12 different NFL teams. Now, these players—hopefully all 120 of them—will be returning to LaVell Edwards Stadium to be recognized by their alma mater on the 20th anniversary of their epic season. After a perfect 12-0 season, the Cougars went on to defeat Michigan in the Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium. Robbie Bosco's heroic return from an early, second-quarter knee injury, along with a circus catch from Kelly Smith, was only part of the 13-game saga. Many fans remember the famous goal-line stand against Hawaii where Kyle Morrell soared over the offensive line to sack the Warrior quarterback and in the process kept their season unblemished.

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is 50,000-watt KSL Newsradio 1160 in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 4th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as

the sideline/lockerroom reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 23-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts and contributes to KSL's extensive midweek and game day coverage.

In his third season on the sidelines is Bill Riley. Riley also hosts the weekly "Gary Crowton Show" Wednesday's at 7 p.m. and "Coordinators' Corner" with Lance Reynolds and Bronco Mendenhall Thursday's at 7 p.m. Riley also hosts College Football Roundtable on Monday's at 7 p.m.

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 19th season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

KSL's game day coverage begins two hours prior to kickoff with the "Cougar Countdown Show." The "Cougar Pregame Scoreboard Show" starts the broadcast's second hour, with the "Cougar Pregame Coach's Show" 35 minutes prior to kickoff, followed by the "Cougar Kickoff Show."

After the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," followed by the "Cougar Lockerroom Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show," "IFA Country Store Replay," and "Cougar Call-In Show."

EDWARDS SELECTED TO HALL OF FAME



The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame has announced the 2004 College Football Hall of Fame Division I-A Class. Former BYU head football coach LaVell Edwards is among the list of 14 inductees to this year's class. A coaching icon, whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU—a tenure that ranks fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 21 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17 straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At the helm, Edwards compiled a program best .716 win percentage, coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans—not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL. BYU's success didn't come without personal reward for Edwards either. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1985. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. Edwards becomes the fifth person affiliated with BYU football to be inducted in to the College Football Hall of Fame. It is no surprise that the four BYU players who are currently enshrined in the Hall of Fame often credit Edwards for their success. BYU's other College Football Hall of Famers include Steve Young (Class of 2001), Jim McMahon (Class of 1998), Marc Wilson (Class of 1996), Gifford Nielsen (Class of 1994). Edwards, who will turn 74 in October, recently returned from an LDS Church mission to New York City. Along with his wife, Patti, the Edwards' served as public affairs missionaries for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Northeastern United States, as well as Eastern Canada. The Edwards have been married for nearly 53 years and have three children, Ann, John and Jim. The Edwards have 14 grandchildren.

RECORD WATCH

After kicking two field goals and two extra points against Notre Dame, senior kicker Matt Payne moved past Jamal Willis and Kurt Gunther into third place on BYU's all-time scoring list. One of Payne's field goals was a 53-yarder that matched his career-high that was set in 2003 against USC. In the history of Cougar football there have only been four kicks of 53 yards or more. Matt Payne has two of those kicks. During his sophomore and junior campaigns, he led the team in scoring. Now that Payne has passed Gunther and Willis his climb will be a little steeper. After scoring four points against USC he needs 37 more points to catch Luke Staley, who is currently second on BYU's all-time scoring list. Safety Aaron Francisco currently has 268 career tackles. He trails former Cougar and current Indianapolis Colts linebacker Rob Morris by 77 tackles for ninth place on BYU's all-time career tackle list. The others are Matt Prater (UCF), Brian Huffman (Northwestern), Andrew Wellock (Eastern Michigan), Tony Yelk (Iowa State), Rhys Lloyd (Minnesota), Ian O'Connor (Marshall), Mike Barrow (Idaho) and John Deraney (N.C. State) and D.J. Fitzpatrick (Notre Dame)



Head Coach Gary Crowton

Gary Crowton, entering his fourth season as the head coach at BYU, has guided the Cougars to a 21-17 record since arriving in Provo. This season Crowton will lead the Cougars against top teams such as Notre Dame, Stanford, USC and Boise State, as well as a tough league schedule.

In December 2000, Crowton took over a BYU program that had been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards, who posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over 29 seasons.

In his first season as head coach at BYU, Crowton constructed the nation's top-rated offense, posting a

12-2 record, including 10 straight victories to start his BYU career. For his efforts, he was named the MWC Coach of the Year as the Cougars won their first-ever, outright MWC championship.

Crowton, 47, came to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to serving as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997.

Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50 or more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60 or more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season.

Under Crowton, NFL first-round draft pick Troy Edwards recorded a Tech-record 280 receptions and 4,352 yards receiving. Over a span of 34 games, Crowton's offense at Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school record 4,943 yards passing.

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under Edwards at BYU. While at BYU, he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985.

From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois, where he directed the Leathernecks' passing game for a single season. In 1988, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, where the Wildcats were the top-rated passing team in the Yankee Conference from 1988-90.

In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterback coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton was an all-league quarterback at Orem High School before earning All-American honors at Snow College. Crowton transferred to Colorado State, where he finished his career. Following an LDS Church mission to South Korea, Crowton attended Idaho State, where he ran track for the Bengals. After returning to BYU in 1982, Crowton earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983.

Crowton, who is the first-ever head football coach at BYU to serve an LDS Church mission, is married to the former Maren Peterson of Bountiful, Utah. The couple was married on August 3, 1985. The Crowtons have seven children, Dane (18), Tara (16), Jenessa (13), Quinn (10), Mikauli (8) Toriana (4) and Macloud (2).

COUGARS FACE TOUGH SCHEDULE

BYU is scheduled to play the ninth toughest non conference schedule based on opponents' winning percentage last season. The Cougars non conference schedule includes Notre Dame, Stanford, co-National Champion and preseason No. 1 USC and Boise State who combined for a 34-16 record in 2003. The overall record of BYU's opponents including Mountain West Conference in 2003 teams was 82-54 (.603). Five of the Cougars' 11 opponents went to a bowl game last year. The teams finished with a 3-2 bowl record, including USC's victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl that earned the Trojans a share of the National Title. Following the third week of the season, BYU's opponents are 18-12 (.600), with their non-conference opponents posting a 10-1 (.909) record through Sept. 18. TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's projected starting offensive line averages an enormous 6-foot-4 and 312 pounds. They will face a Boise State defensive line that averages 6-foot-2 and 261 pounds. When the Broncos has the ball, Cougar defensive linemen that average 6-foot-4 and 293 pounds will face a Boise State front five that are listed at 6-foot-3 and 288 pounds.

SWEET REVENGE

Since 1999, BYU holds a 7-3 (.700) record in payback games against non conference opponents. Last year the Cougars defeated Georgia Tech in BYU's home opener 24-13 after losing to the Yellow Jackets 28-19 the previous year. This year BYU will have four payback opportunities on its non-conference schedule. The Cougars defeated Notre Dame 20-17, lost to Stanford 37-10 and lost to USC 42-10. PAYNE EARNS SECOND MWC PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONOR

For the second time in the past three weeks, BYU punter Matt Payne has been named the Mountain West Conference Special Teams Player of the Week. Payne, who currently holds 13 different Mountain West Conference special teams records, connected on a 46-yard field goal with 10:30 remaining in the second quarter to give the Cougars an early 3-0 lead in Saturday's contest against No. 1 USC. Payne's field goal, his fourth straight of the season, came after the BYU defense had held the Trojans scoreless throughout the first quarter—the first time USC had been shutout in the opening quarter since the 2002 season. The Lou Groza Award candidate also added an extra point in the third quarter to pick up his 253rd career point, ranking third on BYU's all-time scoring list. On the season, Payne has connected on four-of-four field goal attempts—all over 40 yards. Payne has also connected on 27 straight point-after attempts, dating back to Nov. 2, 2002. He leads the Cougars with 16 points on the season.

Payne, a 6-foot-4, 238-pound senior from North Ogden, Utah, was also credited with eight punts for 386 yards, averaging 48.3 yards per punt against the Trojans. The Ray Guy Award candidate connected on a career-long 79-yard punt in the second half, marking the longest punt in Mountain West Conference history. Payne's 79-yard bomb was one yard shy of Lee Johnson's 21-year-old school record. On the season, Payne leads the MWC with an average of 47.0 yards per punt, ranking third nationally. He has produced a 44.3 yard net average, which also ranks third in the nation. Of his eight punts, only two were returned for a total of seven yards—a net punting average of 47.4 yards on the night. Two of his eight punts were downed inside the 20 yard line, while he had one touchback and one fair catch called. On the season, Payne has had 9-of-20 punts downed inside the 20-yardline, while only five of his punts have been returned for an average of only 5.4 yards per return. It is the fifth time in his career he has been named the league's top special teams player of the week.

LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON

Running backs coach Lance Reynolds is one of the few coaches in the country who have the opportunity to coach along side their sons at the collegiate level. Lance's son, Lance Jr., is the starting center for the Cougars this year. The younger Lance is a converted linebacker, who had to pack on about 40 pounds to play offensive line. The elder Reynolds is a former all-conference offensive lineman for the Cougars and is entering his 22nd year coaching at BYU. Lance Jr. is just the first in a long line of Reynolds boys that could play at BYU for their father. Lance's son Dallas signed a letter of intent in 2003 to play for BYU, but is currently serving an LDS church mission in Seattle, Wash. When the Cougars face off against USC this weekend, it will not only be a match-up between two college football teams, but also of two brothers. BYU wide receiver Todd Watkins will face off against his brother Travis, a Trojan offensive lineman. Besides the Watkins connection, BYU also boasts four sets of brothers on this year's roster: wide receivers Austin and Zac Collie, junior college transfers Gary and Greg Lovely, defensive linemen Michael and Daniel Marquardt, and Quinn and David Gooch. The Collies' father, Scott, also played football at BYU from 1979 to 1982 and later for the Hamilton Tercats of the CFL. The Gooches' father, Gary, also has ties to BYU. Gary Gooch suited up for the Cougar basketball team from 1958 to 1959.

PACKING THE HOUSE

Through two home games, BYU is averaging 64,359 fans per game, which is 28th best in the nation. Against Notre Dame, the Cougars packed in 65,251 fans into the stands, the most to watch a game at LaVell Edwards stadium since the Legacy seating was added in 2003. BYU's game against Notre Dame was the 47th largest crowd to watch an NCAA football game this year, while the Cougars' game against USC was the 52nd largest.

STREAKS

Boise State has won 19 straight WAC games, but BYU holds the record for consecutive WAC games won. The Cougars won 25 straight WAC games from 1982 to 1985. The Broncos also hold the nation's longest winning streak, winning 14 straight games. The Cougars' longest winning streak is 25 games set between 1983 and 1985.

A FAMILY AFFAIR

Of the 105 players who participated in fall camp, 35 are married. The 35 married players have a total of eight children. Included among the nine children are new additions to Manaia Brown's, Brady Poppinga's and Jason Kukahiko's families. Brown's wife Tupusina gave birth to Manaia Vaega Vaifoa on Aug. 9, while Poppinga's wife Brooke gave birth to their new daughter, Jasmine Rene, on Aug. 12. There will be two more additions to the Cougar family later this fall. Kukahiko's wife Kristin gave birth to the couple's first child Kate Anna on Sept. 7. Defensive back Brett Cooper and his wife, Diana, are expecting their first child in October.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The Cougars have experienced athletic success on a national level. Since 1970 when BYU captured its first NCAA title, the Cougars have won ten national championships, including four in cross-country and three in men's volleyball since 1997. BYU also won the national championship in football in 1984. BYU has also ranked high in the NACDA Director's cup, an award given to the nation's best athletic program. LAST WEEK: BYU VS. USC

BYU suffered a 42-10 setback last Saturday against the returning national champion and No. 1 ranked USC. BYU's defense held the Trojans scoreless in the first quarter, while the Cougar offense got on the board first with a 46-yard second-quarter field goal by Matt Payne. Then the USC offense started to roll, reeling off 21 straight points to take a 21-3 lead into halftime. The Cougars scored again on their first play of the third quarter on a 69-yard pass from John Beck to Todd Watkins. The reception was Watkins' first touchdown reception at BYU. The Cougars trailed USC by 11 points going into the final quarter before the Trojans put the game away with 21 fourth-quarter points to earn the victory.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

BYU currently ranks 100th in the nation in total offense with 278 yards per game. The Cougars will face a Bronco defense that ranks 44th in the nation. BYU is averaging 248 passing yards a game, which ranks 31st in the country, while Boise State's pass defense ranks 88th in the nation, yielding 246 yards a game. BYU ranks 116 out of 117 teams in rushing offense, racking up just 30 yards per contest, while the Broncos rank 15th in the nation in rush defense, giving up only 78 yards a game. Cougar wide receiver Todd Watkins ranks 16th in the nation and second in the MWC in receiving yards per game with a 99.33 average

DEFENSIVE NOTES

The Cougars defense, which ranks 80th in the nation, will face the nation's fourth best offense yardage-wise and the nation's top scoring team that averages 55 points a game. The Broncos' passing attack ranks seventh in the nation, averaging 318 yards per game, while their running game averages 225 yards per game. BYU ranks 101st in pass defense and 50th against the rush.

On the other side of the ball, BYU's defense allowed the Irish offense to enter the red zone once, holding them to a 21-yard field goal by D.J. Fitzpatrick. Against the Cardinal, BYU entered the red zone three times, scoring twice, while Stanford entered four times, scoring on three of the possessions. In the third game of the season BYU scored on its only trip inside the 20, while the Trojans scored on three of their five attempts. Below are the Cougars' red zone statistics for the 2004 season:
