ANOTHER REVENGE OPPORTUNITY

After a successful Mountain West Conference opener that saw BYU end the nation's longest active winning streak by beating TCU, 31-17, the Cougars have another MWC revenge opportunity when they welcome San Diego State to LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU--1-1 in revenge games this season --lost to the Aztecs 31-10 last year.

LAST WEEK RECAP

It was a day of streak-breaking for BYU as the Cougars (3-2, 1-0 MWC) broke TCU's nation's longest winning streak (13) while breaking their own losing streak against ranked opponents (13). BYU upset No. 15 TCU (3-1, 0-1), 31-17 on Thursday.

John Beck, who played injured, came up huge for BYU completing 23-of-37 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns. The Cougars did not turn the ball over on the day.

Also among the TCU streaks that BYU broke was consecutive MWC games won. The Horned Frogs were handed their first defeat since joining the MWC last year.

SERIES INFORMATION



BYU has fared well against San Diego State in the overall series. The Cougars have won 22 of the 30 games the two teams have played. There was also one tie in the series. BYU has also dominated the series in Provo, posting a 13-2 record against San Diego State. The last time the Aztecs beat the Cougars at home was in 2000 on a last-second field goal. One of the most memorable games the two teams played was the only tie in the series. In 1991, the two teams set a record for

combined score in a tie playing to a 52-52 draw.

2006 SCHEDULE SET

Due in part to the Mountain West Conference's new contract with CSTV and the development of The mtn. network, the Cougars already have game times and television programming plans completed for each of their 12 games. Two of BYU's first three games were televised nationally, including a season-opening trip Sept. 2 to Arizona (TBS) and a split national broadcast at Boston College (ESPN2). In addition to BYU's debut on VERSUS, the Cougars will also play two games on CSTV and one on VERSUS, including another Thursday night game and the remainder of their schedule (four games) will be played on The mtn.

QUARTER-BY-QUARTER

BYU outscored TCU in three of four quarters on Thursday. (The two teams each scored seven points in the third quarter.) On the season, BYU has outscored its opponents (during regulation) in 15 of 20 quarters.

COUGARS ON NATIONAL TELEVISION

Two of BYU's first three games were broadcast nationally. All totaled, the Cougars have a total of five nationally televised games. The season opener at Arizona marked the second time BYU has played on TBS. The Cougars rematch against Boston College was seen on a split national basis on ESPN 2. After playing TCU on VERSUS, BYU will play three additional MWC opponents on CSTV and VERSUS in front of a national audience: Air Force (Oct. 28, VERSUS) Wyoming (Nov. 9, CSTV) and rival Utah (Nov. 25, CSTV).

THE RANKED TEAMS

BYU's 31-17 victory over TCU was the first against a ranked opponent since beating No. 23 Colorado State, 34-13, on Sept. 16, 1999. Previous to the victory over TCU, the Cougars were 0-12 against ranked opponents, including a record of 0-3 at Edwards Stadium. Interestingly, BYU's victory over TCU was the first on the road against a ranked opponent since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on Sept. 20, 1997.

BOWL MOMENTUM

BYU is coming off its 24th bowl appearance. In seasons following a trip to a bowl game, the Cougars have recorded a combined record of 202-82-2 (.709). Of the 23 seasons following a bowl game, the Cougars have averaged nearly nine (8.8) wins per season. BYU has had only one losing season following a trip to a bowl game. (In 2002, BYU went 5-7 after playing in the Liberty Bowl in 2001.)

"FAN"TASTIC FANS

Nearly 350,000 fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2005 season, averaging 58,204 fans per game. BYU finished ranked seventh overall in the west behind USC (90,812), Washington (64,326), UCLA (64,218), Arizona State (61,157), California (60,377) and Oregon (58,434). Since the inception of the BCS, BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all seven years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-seven crowds.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,000-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats. In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding pressbox working area."

"SENIOR"-LADEN SQUAD

Seven players on BYU's active roster are or will be turning 25 during the upcoming season. Backup quarterback Jason Beck, who turned 26 in April, is BYU's oldest player. Jared McLaughlin, at 26, is the oldest kicker in the nation.

EVERY FIVE YEARS...

BYU is on a five-year cycle of fielding top-10 teams. Five years ago, the Cougars started the 2001 campaign 12-0 in Gary Crowton's first season. The BYU squad averaged 44.1 points per game and was ranked as high as eight going into the Hawai'i game.

Five years prior, the 1996 Cougars team, led by quarterback Steve Sarkisian went 14-1. BYU set NCAA records for wins (14) and games played (15) in a season. The Cougars 14-1 record ended in a WAC Championship and a Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State. After BYU's Cotton Bowl victory, the Cougars finished the season ranked No. 5.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

BYU has gone 97 games without scoring a touchdown on a kick return, which ranks the Cougars 10th in the nation in time between touchdown returns. The Cougars have also gone 109 games without returning a punt for a touchdown.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's offensive line checks in at an average 6-foot-4, 316.8 pounds. The Cougars' front line will be going up against a SDSU defensive front that averages just over 6-foot-3, 283.75 pounds. (Advantage: BYU +33.05 pounds per man.) BYU's defensive line weighs in at 6-foot-2, 271.3 pounds SDSU's offensive line averages 6-foot-6, 305 pounds. (Advantage: SDSU +33.7 pounds per man.)

YOUNG GUN

While Mendenhall has 16 years of assistant coaching experience, he is now in his second year as a head coach for the first time in his career. Despite his extensive experience, he is the eighth youngest coach in NCAA Division I-A football at the age of 40.

BYU's seven remaining games are against MWC opponents. BYU last had a similar set up--finishing its non-conference schedule before playing out its MWC schedulue--in 2004.

BRONCO MENDENHALL



Bronco Mendenhall enters his second season as the head football coach at Brigham Young University. In his first year at the helm, he guided the Cougars to their first winning season and first bowl appearance since 2001. BYU finished the 2005 regular season at 6-5 and lost to California, 35-28, in the Las Vegas Bowl.

During the 2005 season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory

days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing. This season, Mendenhall will lead the Cougars against non-conference opponents Arizona, Tulsa, Boston College and Utah State, as well as a competitive conference schedule.

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including the past two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach at Brigham Young University on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall becomes the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (40)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country--has served the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the

1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter, Breaker and Raeder.

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff leads the Mountain West Conference with five members of its coaching staff who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played at Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. Quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman was drafted by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002 and also played with the Washington Redskins. Jeff Grimes and Steve Kaufusi also have NFL experience.

DEFENSIVE NUMBERS GAME

Prior to Spring practice, Bronco Mendenhall announced BYU would be implementing a 3-4 defensive scheme to replace the 3-3-5.

"We feel like we've assembled the best coaching staff possible," Mendenhall said. "After reviewing our defensive personnel, there are players on our team who we can design scheme elements around to make sure we get our best 11 football players on the field. We believe the coaching assignment changes are in direct alignment with the strengths of our returning defensive personnel."

While the Cougars will be going away from the 3-3-5 scheme, Mendenhall said the principles of the new scheme will not change.

"The principles are very similar to what we have already done," he said. "We will continue to emphasize pursuit and gang tackling."

SOMEBODY'S WATCHING YOU...

Six members of the 2006 BYU football team - John Beck, Curtis Brown, Jonny Harline, Daniel Coats, Cameron Jensen and Jake Kuresa - have been named to various "watch lists" for postseason awards.

John Beck, 6-2, 216, Quarterback: John Beck has been selected to the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, the Johnny Unitas Award and the Sammy Baugh Award watch lists. Beck started all 12 games his junior year and threw for 3,709 yards and 27 touchdowns. He averaged an MWC-best 309.1 yards per game which was fifth nationally. Beck earned first-team All-MWC honors as a junior.

Curtis Brown, 6-0, 203, Running Back: Curtis Brown is the all-time leader at BYU for 100-yard rushing games (12). Brown rushed for 1,123 yards and scored a team-high 16 touchdowns last season. He needs just 759 yards rushing as a senior to break the school career rushing record. Brown was also second on the team in receptions with 53.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 263, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He played in all 12 games for BYU as a junior. BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall said Coats' hard work in the offseason made him stand out in Fall Camp. As a freshman in 2003, Coats earned freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Jake Kuresa, 6-4, 330, Offensive Line: Jake Kuresa has been named to the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists. He has started every game (35) in his threeyear career. As a freshman, he played both guard and tackle and played exclusively at tackle as a sophomore and junior. Kuresa earned second team All-MWC honors as a junior. Kuresa helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 33.0 points per game, second in the MWC, and 462.4 total yards per game, second in the MWC and 13th in the nation, including 152.3 yards rushing and 310.1 yards passing in 2005.

Cameron Jensen, 6-2, 247, Linebacker: Cameron Jensen has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award watch lists. He started 11 of 12 games in 2005 and led the team in total tackles with 84, solo tackles with 44 and assisted tackles with 40. He had four pass break-ups and six tackles for a loss.

Jonny Harline, **6-4**, **238**, **Tight End:** Jonny Harline (pronounced has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He started every game in 2005 and led the team in receptions (63) and yards (853). He leads all returning tight ends nationally in receptions and yards.

Until the Cougar's 3-0 loss to the University of Utah to end the 2003 season, BYU had scored in 361-consecutive games, which remains an NCAA record, dating back to the 1975 season. The Cougars started a new streak in 2004, and have scored in every game, extending their streak to 25 games. Since October 3, 1975, BYU has scored in 388 of 389 games.

In BYU history, 22 different Cougars have thrown for 300 yards in at least one game. All totaled, BYU quarterbacks have hit the 300-yard mark a combined 187 games. Senior John Beck has made a contribution of 13 games to that list. Beck entered his senior campaign with 11 300-yard games. CALLED TO SERVE

There are currently 61 returned missionaries (59 percent) on the BYU fall camp roster who have served full-time, two-year missions for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in over 25 different countries around the world. All totaled members of this year's team have served missions in Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, France, Germany, Ghana, Hong Kong, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Nicaragua, Philippines, Portugal, Russia, Samoa, Spain, Switzerland, Taiwan, Tonga, United States and Venzuela. Members of this year's team can communicate fluently in at least 10 different languages.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints operates more than 330 missions around the world with approximately 56,000 missionaries.

PLAYERS TO WATCH... Fui Vakapuna-RB

Vakapuna had an impressive spring just three months after returning home from his church mission. The 6-0, 229-pound bruising running back rushed for 34 yards on just four carries (8.5 yards per carry). Vakapuna is a powerful runner that will compliment All-MWC performer Curtis Brown in the BYU backfield. Prior to his mission, Vakapuna played one season for the Cougars. In 2003, Vakapuna rushed for 157 yards on 30 carries, good for 5.23 yeards per carry. In addition to his punishing style of running, Vakapuna was clocked at 4.4 in the 40-yard dash while still in high school.

David Nixon-LB

Another recently returned missionary, Nixon led BYU tacklers in the annual Blue-White game. Nixon recorded four tackles and a sack for the defense. Prior to his mission in Ecuador, Nixon played one season for the Cougars in 2003. As a true freshman, Nixon played in all 12 games. He was tied for fourth on the team with 57 tackles and second in tackles for loss with 11. Nixon recorded career highs of 12 tackles and two sacks agains Colorado State.

McKay Jacobson-WR

Jacobson joined the Cougars for Spring practice after graduating high school in December 2005. He saw considerable time at wide receiver and as a return specialist. As a prep, Jacobson was named to the 55th annual Texas Sportswriters Association's All-State First Team while leading the state with 99 receptions for 1,631 receiving yards. Jacobson was the district champion in the 100 meter and 200 meter races as a sophomore.

Bryan Kehl-LB

Entering the 2006 season, Kehl is coming off his two most productive games at the collegiate level. In 2005, Kehl recorded a career-high nine tackles (five solo) against Utah. He followed the Utah game with a four-tackle effort in the Las Vegas Bowl against California. Kehl recorded BYU's only blocked punt of the year in the season opener against Boston College. Kehl totaled 30 tackles last season (15 solo).

Ben Criddle-DB

A walk-on, Criddle has shined in the early going. His physical play and sound tackling have him second on the team in total tackles. He also leads BYU in pass break ups, has two tackles for loss and leads the team with 17 solo tackles.

INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR

In addition to English, there are 32 BYU football players that speak a second language fluently. Senior safety Aaron Gordon leads the Cougars with five languages: English, Samoan, Tongan, Italian and Hualapai. Other languages spoken by current BYU players are Spanish, Portuguese, Japanese, Chinese, Russian and German.

FAMILY MEN

There are 28 BYU players from the fall camp roster who are married. Four current players have children.

PACKED HOUSES

The Cougars played in front of their third-consecutive sold out crowd against Arizona. BYU also played in front of sold-out crowds against Utah (home) and California (Las Vegas Bowl). The ninth-largest crowd in Arizona Stadium history (58,450) was on hand for the BYU game. The game was the first sellout for Arizona since the 2000 season. It is estimated there were between 10,000 and 15,000 BYU fans at that game.

BYU's streak of games playing in front of sold-out crowds ended against Tulsa when 56,627 fans attended the Cougars 49-24 victory over the Golden Hurricane at Edwards Stadium.

DEFENSIVE EFFORT

BYU's new look (3-4) defense held Arizona to just 253 total yards including 186 passing and 67 rushing yards.

In week two, the Cougars held Tulsa to just 303 total yards. The 303 yards is 99 fewer than Tulsa averaged in 2005 and the fewest yards Tulsa picked up since Nov. 27, 2004 when Tulsa had 284 total yards. BYU only surrendered 182 passing yards to seasoned starter Paul Smith.

Last week the Cougars had a solid defensive effort. With the exception of a 79-yard pass play, the defense yielded only 16 yards in the first quarter. The BYU "D" also had several takeaways, including one in the final minute of the game to give the Cougars the last shot to win the game in regulation.

Against Utah State, BYU's defense recorded its first shutout since 1999 when the Cougars beat UNLV 29-0. BYU's defense surrendered only 122 passing yards which is the fewest the Cougars have given up since 2003.

QUARTER-BECK NOTES

BYU quarterback John Beck completed 23-of-37 attempts for a game-high 321 yards and three touchdowns in the Cougars' 31-17 victory over No. 15 TCU. With his performance, Beck passed John Walsh (8,390) and Robbie Bosco (8,400) to move into third place on BYU's all-time career passing list. The senior quarterback has 8,422 career passing yards. In addition, with three touchdown completions on the night, Beck moved into a tie with Gifford Nielsen for seventh place on BYU's all-time touchdown completion list. Beck has 55 career touchdown passes.

GOOD GRIEF, CURTIS BROWN

Senior running back Curtis Brown carried the ball 16 times for 56 yards, moving into fourth place on BYU's all-time rushing list. Brown, who has 2,523 career rushing yards passed Pete Van Valkenburg (2,492) and Luke Staley (2,493) with his performance on Thursday.

VARIETY OF RECEIVERS

All totaled, 11 different receivers have at least one reception for the Cougars this season. Curtis Brown leads all receivers in receptions (29) and yards (316).

CAN'T MOVE THESE GUYS...OFF THE FIELD

BYU's Jake Kuresa and Dallas Reynolds have started or played significantly in every game that they have dressed in their respective careers. Kuresa, a senior, is playing right guard this year. He has started in 39 of 40 games but has played in all 40 games. Reynolds, who plays right tackle, is in his sophomore season and has started 17 consecutive contests.

Left tackle Eddie Keele had played in every game the last three years. Keele, who played left tackle started 15 consecutive games and saw action in all but two games in his collegiate career (36 of 38 total games). Keele's streak came to a premature end when he tore his ACL against Boston College.

SCORING DEFENSE

In the first five games of the 2006 season, BYU has allowed just 87 points. With an average of 17.4 points per game, the Cougars currently ranked tied for 40th in the country in scoring defense. Interestingly, the defense is off to its best start through BYU's first three games since the 1988 season. BYU's current average is the lowest scoring defense mark over the first five games of a season since allowing just 17 points per game back in 1988.

TOUCHDOWNS: TAKE YOUR PICK

In the first five games of the 2006 season, BYU has scored 19 touchdowns (one against Arizona, seven against Tulsa, two against Boston College, five against Utah State and four against TCU). All totaled, 11 different Cougars have found their way to the end zone for the eight touchdowns with only Fui Vakapuna (6), Jonny Harline (2), Matt Allen (2) Manase Tonga (2) scoring multiple touchdowns. In addition to these four, each of the following players have scored one touchdown in the early season: Daniel Coats, Curtis Brown, Zac Collie, John Beck, Harvey Unga, Justin Robinson and Michael Reed.

PLAYER AWARDS

John Beck - MWC Offensive Player of the Week (Sept. 16 vs. Boston College) Beck completed 38-of-59 passes for a season-high 436 yards in BYU's double-

overtime 30-23 loss at Boston College. He also threw one touchdown pass and added a rushing touchdown in the game. Beck's passing yardage is his highest output since posting a Mountain West record 517 yards against TCU last season.

John Beck - MWC Offensive Player of the Week (Sept. 28 vs. Boston College)

For the second time in three weeks--and the fifth time in his career--BYU quarterback John Beck has been named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week. The Davey O'Brien Award candidate helped lead the Cougars (3-2, 1-0) to a convincing 31-17 victory over 15th-ranked TCU on Thursday in Fort Worth, ending the Horned Frogs' nation's leading 13-game win streak.

The 6-foot-1, 216-pound senior completed 23-of-37 attempts for 312 yards and three touchdowns, avenging last season's 51-50 overtime loss to TCU in Provo. The victory also gave the Cougars' their first road victory over a ranked opponent since 1997--the same year Beck quarterbacked the Mountain View High School (Mesa, Ariz.) junior varsity squad as a sophomore.

ALL-PURPOSE BACK

Curtis Brown has been all over the field for BYU in their four games. In addition to leading the team in rushing yards, receptions and receiving yards, he has returned kickoffs for the Cougars. Brown currently leads all running backs nationally in receptions with six per game.

CONSECUTIVE WINS

BYU's consecutive victories over Utah State and TCU mark the first time the Cougars have won at least two in a row since last season. BYU beat UNLV Nov. 5 and Wyoming Nov. 12, 2005 on the road to become bowl eligible for the first time in three years.

BYU's longest winning streak last year was three games and they won five games during a six game stretch.

CALIFORNIANS ON THE TEAM

When the Cougars and Aztecs face off, it will mark the only game on BYU's schedule against a team from California. Aside from Utah, California is home to the largest number of BYU players on the Cougars' roster (24).

DEFENSIVE LINEMAN BLOCKING

Russell Tialavea has blocked a field goal in two games this season. Tialavea extended the game in overtime against Boston College when he busted through the line and blocked the Eagles game-winning field goal attempt. Against Utah State, Tialavea was a critical factor in BYU's first shutout since 1999 as he again broke through the line to block an Aggies field goal.

LAST TIME OUT TCU 51, BYU 50

San Diego State's Lynell Hamilton racked up 161 yards rushing with two touchdowns, leading San Diego State to a 31-10 win over BYU on Saturday. With the win, the Aztecs improve to 2-3, 1-1 on the season, while the Cougars fall to 1-3, 0-2.

"I give San Diego State credit," BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall said. "San Diego State performed well and outperformed us in every phase of the game, from beginning to end. I give their coaches and their players credit. They were the better team tonight."

A week after posting 50 points and 614 yards, the Cougars found it difficult to move the ball against the Aztecs. SDSU held the Cougars to just 305 total yards on the night, including only 44 yards rushing and 261 yards passing.

"San Diego State's defensive staff did a nice job," Mendenhall said about the Aztecs' defense. "There was a mixture in coverage and looks."

"I've got to give our guys credit for their focus," Craft said. "It's not an easy thing to have somebody sit in the shotgun and throw 40 to 50 passes like they did. It really takes a lot of energy, and we never let our focus down. We wanted to keep everything in front of us in the passing game, which we did, and punish the receivers."

Tight end Jonny Harline led the Cougars' with 123 yards on seven receptions, while Fahu Tahi had a team-high eight receptions for 80 yards. Quarterback John Beck was 25-of-49 for 261 yards, while Tahi also led the running game with just 33 yards rushing and one touchdown.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Aztecs struck first with 8:57 remaining in the first quarter when Kevin O'Connell scored on a six-yard run. O'Connell's touchdown run caped a 13-play drive that covered 80 yards.

On the Aztecs' next drive, O'Connell found receiver Jeff Webb for a 50-yard completion, setting up a SDSU field goal four plays later. The Aztecs extended their lead to 10-0 after Garrett Palmer split the up-rights on a 30-yard field goal, capping a five-play, 54-yard drive.

With 4:51 left in the second quarter, Bryan Kehl recovered an SDSU fumble at the Aztec's 40-yard line. Seven plays later, the Cougars ended their scoring drought when Jared McLaughlin nailed a 33-yard field goal with 2:49 remaining in the second quarter.

San Diego State extended its lead to 17-3 after Lynell Hamilton scored on a oneyard run with :37 remaining in the first half. The touchdown run capped a 15-play, 76-yard drive.

In the second half, the Aztecs picked up where they left off, capitalizing on a John Beck fumble at the Cougars' 32-yard line. San Diego State drove 7 plays in 2:36 to take a 24-3 lead on Brandon Bornes 4-yard touchdown run.

Faced with a first-and-30 from the BYU 34-yard line, the Cougars managed to get the offense rolling. Fahu Tahi scored on a one-yard run with 13:12 left in the fourth quarter to cap an 11-play, 61-yard drive. The touchdown was set up after Beck found tight end Jonny Harline for a 35-yard reception on fourth-and-nine from the SDSU 42-yard line.

San Diego State answered on the following drive. Hamilton, who broke loose for a 53-yard run during the drive, scored on a six-yard run with 11:12 remaining in the game to give the Aztecs a commanding 31-10 lead.

The loss marked the first time since Nov. 5, 1988 that the Cougars have lost to the Aztecs in San Diego, ending a streak of six straight games.
