SHORT TURNAROUND

Mountain West Conference play begins for what will prove to be an important matchup as BYU takes on reigning MWC Champion TCU. The game is the first MWC game for each school and features the preseason MWC poll's top two teams. The Cougars play their first Thursday night game of the year having a five-day turnaround after beating Utah State, 38-0, Saturday. TCU enjoyed a bye week to prepare for the Cougars after defeating Texas Tech, 12-3, Sept. 16.

LAST WEEK RECAP

BYU improved to 2-2 on the season with a shut-out victory over Utah State (0-4) on Saturday at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The 38-0 victory over the Aggies marked the first time BYU has recorded a shutout since beating UNLV, 29-0, in 1999.

"I'm excited for the victory over Utah State," said BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall. "It is good to see players on both sides representing the state. I have a lot of respect for Coach Guy and the job that he is doing at Utah State."

With starting quarterback John Beck sitting out to nurse an ankle, backup Jason Beck (no relation) stepped in and held his own in his first career start. The senior completed 20 of 28 passes, throwing for 305 yards, one touchdown and an interception.

Utah State had no answer for BYU running back Fui Vakapuna, who gave another strong performance rushing for 73 yards on 13 carries and scoring three touchdowns.

SERIES INFORMATION



The Cougars and the Horned Frogs have played five previous games with BYU owning a 3-2 advantage in the series. TCU won last year's matchup in a 51-50 overtime thriller in Provo. The game ended on a controversial call at the goal line.

BYU and TCU are conference opponents once again after the Horned Frogs joined the MWC at the beginning of the 2005 football season. Previously, BYU and TCU played together in the expanded WAC. During their years together in the expanded WAC, The Cougars beat the Horned Frogs in 1996 and 1997. The last time the two teams played in Fort Worth was in 1996, when BYU won 45-21 and went on to a 14-1 season and Cotton Bowl victory.

2006 SCHEDULE SET

Due in part to the Mountain West Conference's new contract with CSTV and the development of The mtn. network, the Cougars already have game times and television programming plans completed for each of their 12 games. Two of BYU's first three games were televised nationally, including a season-opening trip Sept. 2 to Arizona (TBS) and a split national broadcast at Boston College (ESPN2). The Cougars will also play two games each on CSTV and Versus, including a pair of Thursday night games and the remainder of their schedule (four games) will be played on The mtn.



COUGARS ON NATIONAL TELEVISION

Two of BYU's first three games were broadcast nationally. All totaled, the Cougars have a total of five nationally televised games. The season opener at Arizona marked the second time BYU has played on TBS. The Cougars rematch against Boston College was seen on a split national basis on ESPN 2. BYU will then play four MWC opponents on CSTV and Versus in front of a national audience: TCU (Sept. 28, Versus), Air Force (Oct. 28, Versus) Wyoming (Nov. 9, CSTV) and rival Utah (Nov. 25, CSTV).

THE RANKED TEAMS

Including this seasons' narrow defeat to No. 23 Boston College, BYU has not defeated a ranked opponent since beating No. 23 Colorado State, 34-13, on Sept. 16, 1999. Since that victory over the Rams, the Cougars are 0-12 against ranked opponents, including a record of 0-3 at Edwards Stadium. Interestingly, BYU has not defeated a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on Sept. 20, 1997.

BOWL MOMENTUM

BYU is coming off its 24th bowl appearance. In seasons following a trip to a bowl game, the Cougars have recorded a combined record of 202-82-2 (.709). Of the 23 seasons following a bowl game, the Cougars have averaged nearly nine (8.8) wins per season. BYU has had only one losing season following a trip to a bowl game. (In 2002, BYU went 5-7 after playing in the Liberty Bowl in 2001.)

"FAN" TASTIC FANS

Nearly 350,000 fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2005 season, averaging 58,204 fans per game. BYU finished ranked seventh overall in the west behind USC (90,812), Washington (64,326), UCLA (64,218), Arizona State (61,157), California (60,377) and Oregon (58,434). Since the inception of the BCS, BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all seven years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-seven crowds.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,000-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats. In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding pressbox working area."

"SENIOR"-LADEN SQUAD

Seven players on BYU's active roster are or will be turning 25 during the upcoming season. Backup quarterback Jason Beck, who turned 26 in April, is BYU's oldest player. Jared McLaughlin, at 26, is the oldest kicker in the nation.

EVERY FIVE YEARS...

BYU is on a five-year cycle of fielding top-10 teams. Five years ago, the Cougars started the 2001 campaign 12-0 in Gary Crowton's first season. The BYU squad averaged 44.1 points per game and was ranked as high as eight going into the Hawai'i game.

Five years prior, the 1996 Cougars team, led by quarterback Steve Sarkisian went 14-1. BYU set NCAA records for wins (14) and games played (15) in a season. The Cougars 14-1 record ended in a WAC Championship and a Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State. After BYU's Cotton Bowl victory, the Cougars finished the season ranked No. 5.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

BYU has gone 96 games without scoring a touchdown on a kick return, which ranks the Cougars 10th in the nation in time between touchdown returns. The Cougars have also gone 108 games without returning a punt for a touchdown.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's offensive line checks in at an average 6-foot-4, 316.8 pounds. The Cougars' front line will be going up against a TCU defensive front that averages just over 6-foot-3, 273 pounds. (Advantage: BYU +43.8 pounds per man.) BYU's defensive line weighs in at 6-foot-2, 271.3 pounds TCU's offensive line averages 6-foot-4, 284 pounds. (Advantage: TCU +12.7 pounds per man.)

YOUNG GUN

While Mendenhall has 16 years of assistant coaching experience, he is now in his second year as a head coach for the first time in his career. Despite his extensive experience, he is the eighth youngest coach in NCAA Division I-A football at the age of 40.

LET CONFERENCE PLAY BEGIN

BYU finished its pre-season schedule and can now turn its attention to MWC play. The Cougars, who enjoyed two blowout victories and suffered two narrow defeats in pre-MWC play, finished their non-conference schedule with the victory over Utah State. BYU's eight remaining games are against MWC opponents. BYU last had a similar set up--finishing its non-conference schedule before playing out its MWC schedule--in 2004.



BRONCO MENDENHALL



Bronco Mendenhall enters his second season as the head football coach at Brigham Young University. In his first year at the helm, he guided the Cougars to their first winning season and first bowl appearance since 2001. BYU finished the 2005 regular season at 6-5 and lost to California, 35-28, in the Las Vegas Bowl.

During the 2005 season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing. This season, Mendenhall will lead the Cougars against non-conference opponents Arizona, Tulsa, Boston College and Utah State, as well as a competitive conference schedule.

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including the past two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach at Brigham Young University on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall becomes the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (40)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country--has served the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the

1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter, Breaker and Raeder.

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff leads the Mountain West Conference with five members of its coaching staff who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played at Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. Quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman was drafted by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002 and also played with the Washington Redskins. Jeff Grimes and Steve Kaufusi also have NFL experience.

DEFENSIVE NUMBERS GAME

Prior to Spring practice, Bronco Mendenhall announced BYU would be implementing a 3-4 defensive scheme to replace the 3-3-5.

"We feel like we've assembled the best coaching staff possible," Mendenhall said. "After reviewing our defensive personnel, there are players on our team who we can design scheme elements around to make sure we get our best 11 football players on the field. We believe the coaching assignment changes are in direct alignment with the strengths of our returning defensive personnel."

While the Cougars will be going away from the 3-3-5 scheme, Mendenhall said the principles of the new scheme will not change.

"The principles are very similar to what we have already done," he said. "We will continue to emphasize pursuit and gang tackling."

SOMEBODY'S WATCHING YOU...

Six members of the 2006 BYU football team - John Beck, Curtis Brown, Jonny Harline, Daniel Coats, Cameron Jensen and Jake Kuresa - have been named to various "watch lists" for postseason awards.

John Beck, 6-2, 216, Quarterback: John Beck has been selected to the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, the Johnny Unitas Award and the Sammy Baugh Award watch lists. Beck started all 12 games his junior year and threw for 3,709 yards and 27 touchdowns. He averaged an MWC-best 309.1 yards per game which was fifth nationally. Beck earned first-team All-MWC honors as a junior.

Curtis Brown, 6-0, 203, Running Back: Curtis Brown is the all-time leader at BYU for 100-yard rushing games (12). Brown rushed for 1,123 yards and scored a team-high 16 touchdowns last season. He needs just 759 yards rushing as a senior to break the school career rushing record. Brown was also second on the team in receptions with 53.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 263, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He played in all 12 games for BYU as a junior. BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall said Coats' hard work in the offseason made him stand out in Fall Camp. As a freshman in 2003, Coats earned freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Jake Kuresa, 6-4, 330, Offensive Line: Jake Kuresa has been named to the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists. He has started every game (35) in his three-year career. As a freshman, he played both guard and tackle and played exclusively at tackle as a sophomore and junior. Kuresa earned second team All-MWC honors as a junior. Kuresa helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 33.0 points per game, second in the MWC, and 462.4 total yards per game, second in the MWC and 13th in the nation, including 152.3 yards rushing and 310.1 yards passing in 2005.

Cameron Jensen, 6-2, 247, Linebacker: Cameron Jensen has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award watch lists. He started 11 of 12 games in 2005 and led the team in total tackles with 84, solo tackles with 44 and assisted tackles with 40. He had four pass break-ups and six tackles for a loss.

Jonny Harline, 6-4, 238, Tight End: Jonny Harline (pronounced has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He started every game in 2005 and led the team in receptions (63) and yards (853). He leads all returning tight ends nationally in receptions and yards.

FOLLOWING A .500 SEASON

BYU posted a 6-6 (.500) record last year. The last time BYU finished .500 on a season was LaVell Edwards' final season. In the 2000 season, the Cougars won its final two games to salvage a 6-6 record and a .500 season for their departing legendary coach. BYU followed the 2000 campaign with its memorable 2001 season where the Cougars reeled off 12 consecutive wins to start the season. BYU ended the year 12-2 and MWC Champions.

IT'S AUTOMATIC ... ALMOST

BYU, known traditionally for its high-octane offenses, rarely gets shutout. Until the Cougar's 3-0 loss to the University of Utah to end the 2003 season, BYU had scored in 361-consecutive games, which remains an NCAA record, dating back to the 1975 season. The Cougars started a new streak in 2004, and have scored in every game, extending their streak to 25 games. Since October 3, 1975, BYU has scored in 388 of 389 games.

John Beck and Curtis Brown became the first Cougar duo to pass for over 3,000 yards and rush for over 1,000 yards in the same season since 2001. The last time two players combined to reach that mark were Brandon Doman and Luke Staley in 2001. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints operates more than 330 missions around the world with approximately 56,000 missionaries.

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

Fui Vakapuna-RB

Vakapuna had an impressive spring just three months after returning home from his church mission. The 6-0, 229-pound bruising running back rushed for 34 yards on just four carries (8.5 yards per carry). Vakapuna is a powerful runner that will compliment All-MWC performer Curtis Brown in the BYU backfield. Prior to his mission, Vakapuna played one season for the Cougars. In 2003, Vakapuna rushed for 157 yards on 30 carries, good for 5.23 yards per carry. In addition to his punishing style of running, Vakapuna was clocked at 4.4 in the 40-yard dash while still in high school.

David Nixon-LB

Another recently returned missionary, Nixon led BYU tacklers in the annual Blue-White game. Nixon recorded four tackles and a sack for the defense. Prior to his mission in Ecuador, Nixon played one season for the Cougars in 2003. As a true freshman, Nixon played in all 12 games. He was tied for fourth on the team with 57 tackles and second in tackles for loss with 11. Nixon recorded career highs of 12 tackles and two sacks against Colorado State.

McKay Jacobson-WR

Jacobson joined the Cougars for Spring practice after graduating high school in December 2005. He saw considerable time at wide receiver and as a return specialist. As a prep, Jacobson was named to the 55th annual Texas Sportswriters Association's All-State First Team while leading the state with 99 receptions for 1,631 receiving yards. Jacobson was the district champion in the 100 meter and 200 meter races as a sophomore.

Bryan Kehl-LB

Entering the 2006 season, Kehl is coming off his two most productive games at the collegiate level. In 2005, Kehl recorded a career-high nine tackles (five solo) against Utah. He followed the Utah game with a four-tackle effort in the Las Vegas Bowl against California. Kehl recorded BYU's only blocked punt of the year in the season opener against Boston College. Kehl totaled 30 tackles last season (15 solo).

Ben Criddle-DB

A walk-on, Criddle has shined in the early going. His physical play and sound tackling have him second on the team in total tackles. He also leads BYU in pass break ups, has two tackles for loss and leads the team with 17 solo tackles.

INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR

In addition to English, there are 32 BYU football players that speak a second language fluently. Senior safety Aaron Gordon leads the Cougars with five languages: English, Samoan, Tongan, Italian and Hualapai. Other languages spoken by current BYU players are Spanish, Portuguese, Japanese, Chinese, Russian and German.

FAMILY MEN

There are 28 BYU players from the fall camp roster who are married. Four current players have children.

PACKED HOUSES

The Cougars played in front of their third-consecutive sold out crowd against Arizona. BYU also played in front of sold-out crowds against Utah (home) and California (Las Vegas Bowl). The ninth-largest crowd in Arizona Stadium history (58,450) was on hand for the BYU game. The game was the first sellout for Arizona since the 2000 season. It is estimated there were between 10,000 and 15,000 BYU fans at that game.

BYU's streak of games playing in front of sold-out crowds ended against Tulsa when 56,627 fans attended the Cougars 49-24 victory over the Golden Hurricane at Edwards Stadium.

DEFENSIVE EFFORT

BYU's new look (3-4) defense held Arizona to just 253 total yards including 186 passing and 67 rushing yards.

In week two, the Cougars held Tulsa to just 303 total yards. The 303 yards is 99 fewer than Tulsa averaged in 2005 and the fewest yards Tulsa picked up since Nov. 27, 2004 when Tulsa had 284 total yards. BYU only surrendered 182 passing yards to seasoned starter Paul Smith.

Last week the Cougars had a solid defensive effort. With the exception of a 79-yard pass play, the defense yielded only 16 yards in the first quarter. The BYU "D" also had several takeaways, including one in the final minute of the game to give the Cougars the last shot to win the game in regulation.

Against Utah State, BYU's defense recorded its first shutout since 1999 when the Cougars beat UNLV 29-0. BYU's defense surrendered only 122 passing yards which is the fewest the Cougars have given up since 2003.

QUARTER-BECK NOTES

John Beck did not play against Utah State. Last week, Beck moved into fifth place on BYU's all-time passing list with 8,101 career yards, passing the likes of Steve Young (7,733) and Kevin Feterik (8,065). Having racked up 8,113 total yards over his career, Beck moved into fourth place on the Cougars' all-time total offense list, passing Kevin Feterik (7,731), John Walsh (7,736), and Robbie Bosco (8,073). With 52 touchdown completions, Beck now ranks 10th on BYU's all-time touchdown completions list. Saturday's performance marked his first 300-yard passing performance of the season and the 12th of his career.

GOOD GRIEF, CURTIS BROWN

With his 59-yard rushing performance against Utah State, Curtis Brown stayed in sixth place on BYU's all-time rushing list. Brown has 2,467 career yards and needs just 504 yards to pass Jamal Willis as BYU's all-time top rusher.

VARIETY OF RECEIVERS

All totaled, 11 different receivers have at least one reception for the Cougars this season. Curtis Brown leads all receivers in receptions (24) and yards (258).

CAN'T MOVE THESE GUYS...OFF THE FIELD

BYU's Jake Kuresa and Dallas Reynolds have started or played significantly in every game that they have dressed in their respective careers. Kuresa, a senior, is playing right guard this year. He has started in 38 of 39 games but has played in all 38 games. Reynolds, who plays right tackle, is in his sophomore season and has started 15 consecutive contests.

Left tackle Eddie Keele had played in every game the last three years. Keele, who played left tackle started 15 consecutive games and saw action in all but two games in his collegiate career (36 of 38 total games). Keele's streak came to a premature end when he tore his ACL against Boston College.

SCORING DEFENSE

In the first four games of the 2006 season, BYU has allowed just 70 points. With an average of 17.5 points per game, the Cougars currently ranked tied for 38th in the country in scoring defense. Interestingly, the defense is off to its best start through BYU's first three games since the 2003 season. BYU's current average is the lowest scoring defense mark over the first three games of a season since allowing just 12.75 points per game back in 2003.

TOUCHDOWNS: TAKE YOUR PICK

In the first three games of the 2006 season, BYU has scored 15 touchdowns (one against Arizona, seven against Tulsa, two against Boston College and five against Utah State). All totaled, 10 different Cougars have found their way to the end zone for the eight touchdowns with only Fui Vakapuna scoring multiple touchdowns (six). In addition to Vakapuna, each of the following players have scored one touchdown in the early season: Daniel Coats, Manase Tonga, Matt Allen, Curtis Brown, Zac Collie, John Beck, Harvey Unga, Justin Robinson and Jonny Harline.

PLAYER AWARDS

John Beck - MWC Offensive Player of the Week (Sept. 16 vs. Boston College)

Beck completed 38-of-59 passes for a season-high 436 yards in BYU's double-overtime 30-23 loss at Boston College. He also threw one touchdown pass and added a rushing touchdown in the game. Beck's passing yardage is his highest output since posting a Mountain West record 517 yards against TCU last season.

ALL-PURPOSE BACK

Curtis Brown has been all over the field for BYU in their four games. In addition to leading the team in rushing yards, receptions and receiving yards, he has returned kickoffs for the Cougars. Brown currently leads all running backs nationally in receptions with six per game.

SOMETHING'S GOTTA GIVE

Don't expect a repeat of last season's 51-50 shootout when BYU and TCU take the field this year. The Cougars and the Horned Frogs field scoring defenses that are in the top 40 nationally. TCU ranks sixth in the nation, giving up only 7.7 points per game while BYU ranks 38th, surrendering only 17.5 points per contest.

The most intriguing matchup of the game could be the TCU defense against the BYU offense. The Cougars, led by quarterback John Beck who torched TCU for a career-best 517 last season, are 31st in the nation in scoring offense averaging 30.75 points per game. BYU's offense also ranks 13th in total offense (442 yards per game) and fourth nationally in passing offense (317.5 yards per game).

STREAKING...

TCU is currently enjoying the nations longest winning streak, having won 13 consecutive games. The Horned Frogs' streak was extended to two games last year when they escaped Provo with a 51-50 overtime victory. Since joining the Mountain West Conference, TCU has not lost a league game, going a perfect 8-0 last season.

The Cougars will try to break TCU's winning streaks as well as break their own losing streak against top-25 teams. Interestingly, BYU's last victory over a ranked opponent was also against a MWC opponent in 1999, the MWC's inaugural season. The Cougars beat No. 24 Colorado State, 34-13, at home.

TEXANS GOING HOME

TCU is BYU's longest MWC road trip of the season. Provo is 1,359 from Fort Worth. It will be the Cougars second longest road trip of the year (Boston College). BYU's roster features six players from the state of Texas:

Of the six BYU players from Texas, four have started games this season for the Cougars: Gabriel, Jacobson, Nixon, Reed.

TCU has no players on its current roster from Utah and just 16 players that hail from outside of Texas.

DEFENSIVE LINEMAN BLOCKING

Russell Tialavea has blocked a field goal in each of BYU's previous two games. Tialavea extended the game in overtime against Boston College when he busted through the line and blocked the Eagles game-winning field goal attempt. Against Utah State, Tialavea was a critical factor in BYU's first shutout since 1999 as he again broke through the line to block an Aggies field goal.



LAST TIME OUT TCU 51, BYU 50

John Beck threw for a Mountain West Conference single-game record 517 yards and five touchdowns, and Todd Watkins pulled in seven catches for 176 yards and three touchdowns, but it was not enough to hold back MWC newcomer TCU as they came from 18-points behind to claim the 51-50 overtime victory.

The Horned Frogs scored four touchdowns on their final four drives of regulation to tie the score, overcoming the Cougars' 18-point lead.

With the victory, the Horned Frogs improved to 2-0 in league play, while BYU dropped to 0-1 in MWC action and 1-2 overall. 58,320 fans witnessed the 4 hour and 42 minute overtime thriller.

"I give TCU a lot of credit," BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall said. "Their football team played hard and they made one more point than we made to win the football game."

After TCU quarterback Tye Gunn went down in the third quarter, back-up Jeff Ballard came in to lead the Horned Frogs to victory. Ballard finished the game 8-of-12 for 150 yards and two touchdowns.

TCU's Cory Rodgers also played a great game for the Horned Frogs, scoring four touchdowns, including two rushing, one receiving and one on a kick return. He finished the day with nine catches for 137 yards and two rushes for five yards.

As a team, TCU had 475 yards of total offense, including 348 yard passing and 127 yards on the ground.

BYU's offense was held to 97 yard rushing but racked up an impressive 517 yards through the air for 614 total yards. Beck finished the day 30-for-51, two interceptions, a MWC record 517 yards passing and also tied the MWC record with five touchdown passes. Beck completed passes to nine different receivers. Watkins lead the way with seven catches for 176 yards and three touchdowns, tying a MWC record.

Curtis Brown played a solid game for the Cougars with 172 total yards. He pulled in a team high nine catches for 92 yards and carried the ball 23 times for 85 yards.

"I thought our offense moved the ball consistently from the beginning to the end of the game," Mendenhall said. "In overcoming adversity in critical situations, the leadership of our quarterback and the resolve of the offense was exceptional."

BYU got out to a quick start putting up 21 points in the first quarter for the first time since the Cougars beat Colorado State 56-34 in 2001. BYU scored on their first drive of the game on a 10-play 80-yard drive ending in a seven-yard strike from John Beck to Zac Collie for his first career touchdown. Beck and Collie connected for the second time with 5:30 left in the first quarter on a 37-yard touchdown pass that capped a five-play 80-yard drive putting the Cougars up 21-10.

Down 29-41 in the fourth quarter, TCU scored 14 unanswered points to take the lead, starting with a 34-yard pass from Ballard to Rogers with 6:02 remaining in the game. The second score came when Ballard hooked up with Aaron Brown for a 35-yard touchdown pass with 1:25 remaining, giving TCU its first lead of the game, 44-41.

BYU then drove the ball 69 yards in eight plays to set up 39-yard game tying field goal by Jared McLaughlin, which sent the game into overtime.

On the first play of overtime, Beck connected with Watkins for the third time of the game for a 25-yard touchdown. However, BYU fumbled the snap on the extra-point attempt and failed to convert.

TCU then put together a four-play, 25-yard drive that ended in a controversial touchdown call when TCU's Rodgers appeared to fumble the ball on the goal line. After reviewing the play, the officials stuck with the ruling on the field. TCU's Chris Manfredini put the extra point through the uprights to give TCU the victory.
