## BYU HOSTS SOUTHERN UTAH FRIDAY IN SEASON OPENER

BYU opens the 2003-04 regular season Friday when it hosts the Southern Utah University Thunderbirds at 7 p.m. MST in the Marriott Center. The game is not being televised. The radio broadcast can be heard on KSL Newsradio 1160 and the Cougar Sports Network, beginning at 6 p.m. MST with a one-hour pregame show. KSL's Greg Wrubell will call the play-by-play action with Mark Durrant providing analysis. ### COUGAR CAPSULE

The Cougars are the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West Conference this year, returning four starters from last year's 23-9 co-championship team that advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Four-year starter Mark Bigelow and fellow senior Rafael Araujo are both named to the Preseason All-MWC Team and are MWC Player of the Year candidates. Bigelow is the team's top returning scorer at 13.9 ppg while Araujo pulled down a team-best 8.9 rebounds last year. Senior guard Kevin Woodberry and junior forward Jared Jensen also return as starters for BYU coach Steve Cleveland.

SOUTHERN UTAH UNIVERSITY THUNDERBIRDS

In the first game for both teams, Southern Utah University looks to start the season off right after going 11-17 overall and 5-9 in the Mid-Continental Conference last season, including a 2-11 record on the road. Although the Thunderbirds lost three starters and seven lettermen, including second-leading scorer and Mid-Continental Conference assists leader Jay Collins as well as leading rebounder Donnie Jackson and field goal percentage leader Kevin Henry, all four of their remaining lettermen started at some point last season and will be counted on to lead the team. David Palmer, a 6-foot-7 senior forward is back after starting all but two games last season, earning a spot on the Mid-Con's all-tournament team last year, and leading the team in scoring (11.7 ppg), points (327), field goals, field goal attempts (114-242) and in 3-pointers and 3-point attempts (58-127). Palmer also finished second in rebounding, averaging 4.5 boards per game. SUU also returns 6-foot-3 sophomore guard Rand Janes, 6-foot-9 sophomore center Lubor Olsosovsky, and 6-foot-8 senior center Robbie Warren, who finished second on the team in field goal percentage (.549) and third in offensive rebounds per game (1.0) and blocks (13). Coach Bill Evans looks forward to the return of Jason Baker after red-shirting last season. Baker is the only remaining player from SUU's 2000-01 Mid-Con Championship and NCAA Tournament team. The Thunderbirds also enjoyed the offseason, landing one of the best recruiting classes in recent years. The team will welcome JC all-American forward DeAngelo Newsom (6-foot-5 junior) who averaged 17.3 points per game and 8.6 rebounds per game at Northwest College as well as center Vaughn Schouten (6-foot-9 sophomore) who was Utah Valley State College's most improved player, and guards Tim Gainey (6-foot-6 junior), Jeff Martini (6-foot-2 junior), and Dallas Rensch (6-foot-3 freshman).

LAST YEAR - HOT-SHOOTING COUGARS CRUISE TO VICTORY

All 12 BYU players scored Saturday night, as the Cougars (9-2) cruised to their 41st consecutive home victory by beating Southern Utah University, 93-60. With the loss, SUU falls to 5-5 on the season. Forward Mark Bigelow scored 14 points, including four three-pointers. Bigelow passed former Cougar Terrell Lyday for second all-time in three-pointers made with 130. He trails assistant coach Andy Toolson by 11 treys. Bigelow also passed the 1,000-point mark for his career and now has 1,009. He is the 34th Cougar and only the ninth junior to reach the 1,000-point milestone. As a team, BYU shot 14-24 (58.8 percent) from behind the arc while setting a new school record for most three-pointers made in a single game on a Ricky Bower trey with 1:49 to go. With Southern Utah playing a match-up zone, seven different Cougars hit a trey in the contest, with six players scoring their only field goals from behind the arc. The Cougars used team-basketball to bury the T-Birds early with 25 of the team's 29 field goals coming off an assist from a teammate. BYU shot 58 percent for the game and held SUU to 43.2 percent. In the first half, BYU capitalized on nine Southern Utah turnovers and only lost one. The T-Birds surrendered 16 points off those turnovers enabling the Cougars to build a 12-point halftime lead. BYU continued to look for center Rafael Araujo, fresh off his career night versus San Francisco. The big man scored 13 of his game-high 17 points before the half. He also grabbed seven rebounds in just 24 minutes. BYU did not allow one T-Bird player to score in double figures. Kevin Henry, Al Williams, and Robbie Warren scored nine points apiece.

BYU SET THREE-POINT RECORD IN WIN OVER SOUTHERN UTAH

The Cougars set a new school record for three-pointers made in a game, going 14-24 (.583) vs. Southern Utah's match-up zone. Seven BYU players made a trey with six players' only field goals being triples.

SHARING THE BALL

BYU totaled a season-high 25 assists vs. Southern Utah while committing a only 10 turnovers. Scoring 29 field goals against the Thunderbirds, only four BYU buckets were not set up by a teammate's pass. All 12 Cougars scored and seven made a three-pointer.

**OPENING THE SEASON**

BYU opens the season against Southern Utah for the first time. The Cougars begin their 102nd season in 2003-04. In the 101 prior seasons, BYU has opened with a win 72 times, winning its first game 71.3 percent of the time. In the Cougars' first home game of the season (not necessarily the season opener) they have won 78 times, for a .772 winning percentage. This year will be the 19th time since the Marriott Center opened for the 1971-72 season that the Cougars have opened the year at home. BYU is 13-5 in season-opening games at the Marriott Center. BYU has won its last three season-opening games in the Marriott Center since losing to Cal State Fullerton (75-67) during the 1-25 year in 1996-97. BYU is a perfect 6-0 in season openers under Steve Cleveland, including a 3-0 record in the Marriott Center, a 2-0 record on the road and 1-0 mark on a neutral floor after last season's win at the Paradise Jam in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Cleveland is 5-1 in the team's home-opening game with the lone loss coming in his first season in 1997-98. The Cougars opened that year with a win at San Diego State before returning home for a sound defeat (78-49) by Washington State.

**NONCONFERENCE VICTORY STREAK IN THE MARRIOTT CENTER**

The Cougars have defeated 34 straight non-conference opponents in the Marriott Center since starting the streak with a 61-59 win over Utah State on Jan. 2, 1999. The last non-league foe to win in Provo was the California Bears, who edged BYU 71-70 on Dec. 19, 1998.

**BYU SCHEDULE INCLUDES ACC, BIG 12, PAC-10 OPPONENTS**

Potential matchups with six nonconference opponents that made the 2003 NCAA Tournament, including teams from the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big 12 Conference and Pac-10 Conference, and 15 overall contests against teams that qualified for postseason play last year highlight the 2003-04 BYU men's basketball schedule. "We look forward to what should be a very challenging schedule with more than half our games being against teams that qualified for postseason last year," BYU coach Steve Cleveland said. "We face some very talented teams during nonconference and every game is a battle during the Mountain West season."

**BYU FINISHES EXHIBITION PLAY WITH 2-0 RECORD AFTER WIN OVER NORTHWEST SPORTS**

BYU came out strong and never trailed in a huge 104-58 exhibition victory against Northwest Sports in Provo. BYU took the opening tip-off and never looked back, leading 43-24 at the half and shooting 56.3 percent from the field overall. The Cougars spread the ball around well, with five players scoring in double figures, led by freshman Mike Rose with 17 points in his college debut. Rafael Araujo added 14, Mark Bigelow 12, Jared Jensen 12, and Mike Hall 11. Playing the point, Luiz Lemes added five assists while going a perfect 4-for-4 from the floor to add nine points. The Cougars out-rebounded Northwest with Araujo bringing down 14. Hall added seven rebounds, including four on the offensive glass, and Bigelow added six boards. Seeing his first action since wowing fans at Cougar Tipoff, Rose was the game's leading scorer and the story of the evening. Having decided to play his freshman year instead of redshirting, Rose came off the bench for a game-high 17 points, including five long-range threes from behind the international arc. The Cougars held Northwest to just 38 percent shooting, including a dismal 7 percent from beyond the arc. However, despite the impressive margin of victory, Cleveland still feels that his team needs to improve defensively. Fouls were also a problem, especially in the first half as the Cougars racked up 12 to Northwest's 4. Former University of Utah guard Marc Jackson returned to the Marriott Center playing for Northwest. Jackson scored 12 points and former BYU player Ken Roberts scored 11. Cleveland was impressed overall with his team's effort and play, especially praising his reserves. The Cougar bench contributed quality playing time as everyone who dressed out saw action. Terry Nashif dished out a game-high six assists off the bench with seven points. Said Cleveland, "We'll need everyone throughout the course of the year." Fans were treated to a show featuring a high powered offense, sparked by huge treys from Rose and dunks by Araujo and Hall that drew roars from the 7,927 fans who came out to cheer on the Cougars.

**LEMES HITS GAME-WINNER IN EXHIBITION VICTORY**

Luiz Lemes hit a jump shot with 17 seconds left in the game to put the Cougars up, 73-72, and Mark Bigelow hit two free throws to ice the game as the Cougars defeated EA Sports, 75-72, at the Marriott Center. The Cougars got off to a slow start, falling behind by five points early at 18-13, but fought back to tie the game at 32 at halftime. The game went back and forth all night with neither team leading by more than seven points. BYU started to pull away from EA Sports with just under four minutes to play, building a seven-point lead at 68-61, but EA Sports fought back to take the lead at 72-71, before Lemes hit the game-winner. Rafael Araujo led four Cougars in double figures, scoring 21 points and grabbing 12 rebounds. While having a tough shooting night (5-16), senior Mark Bigelow still added 14 points. BYU coach Steve Cleveland said he was really pleased with the play of Araujo and Lemes, and how Araujo has matured since last year. "I was most pleased with the way Rafael and Luiz played," Cleveland said. "They are really consistent. That is how they have been practicing. We need to get everybody to play at that level." Lemes (10 points) also scoring in double figures for BYU along with Mike Hall (12 points). Cleveland said Hall played well for his first game. "Mike played better in the second half," Cleveland said. "He stopped thinking about things and just started playing."

"David is an intelligent and strong low-post player who will have an immediate impact on our program," Cleveland said. "He is an aggressive rebounder and has a solid understanding of offensive low-post play. I'm excited about coaching David and helping him reach his full potential as a player."

**ABOUT CUMMARD ...**

"Lee is a versatile athlete who possesses outstanding offensive skills," Cleveland said. "He has great instincts on the floor and plays with a real passion for the game. I love his confidence and aggression level. Lee is a special player who will have a major role in our program."

**ABOUT MILES ...**

"Chris is an excellent defender and has developed into an outstanding shot-blocker," Cleveland said. "He runs the floor as well as any big man I've coached. Chris has shown real improvement with his offensive skill development and will be a major contributor in the program."

**ABOUT PLAISTED ...**

"I love Trent's ability to put the ball on the floor and attack the basket," Cleveland said. "He's left handed and very crafty around the basket. Trent will play on the perimeter and continue to develop his outside shooting skills. Trent is 6-foot-10 with great feet and has the potential to be an outstanding defender."

**BYU LANDS TOP-20 RECRUITING CLASS**

Four highly regarded high school recruits signed a letter-of-intent to play basketball at BYU during the November signing period. Rated one of the top-20 recruiting classes nationally and the third-best class in the West, BYU received official commitments from top prospects David Burgess (Irvine, Calif.), Lee Cummard (Mesa, Ariz.), Chris Miles (Provo, Utah) and Trent Plaisted (San Antonio, Texas).

**DAVID BURGESS**

Burgess is a 6-foot-10, 260-pound center considered one of the best big men in the country. He was the only high school player to compete on the USA Basketball World Championships Team that finished 7-1, losing only to eventual champion Australia, and went 5-0 to win the 2003 Global Games in Dallas. Burgess averaged 16.4 points, 12.4 rebounds and 2.6 blocks last year as a junior at Woodbridge High School in Irvine, Calif., leading the team to a 21-6 record. During the season, he recorded game highs of 31 points, 20 rebounds, eight assists, four steals and nine blocks. A Street & Smith All-America High Honorable Mention pick, Burgess was a 2003 All-CIF First Team selection and garnered 2003 league MVP and all-county honors. He was all-league and All-CIF as a sophomore while averaging 12 points, 10 rebounds and 2.5 blocks. Entering his senior season, he already has helped Woodbridge claim two CIF championships and one state crown. He played for the Southern California All-Stars during the summer and was an all-star and the leading rebounder at the adidas ABCD Camp. Among the many schools that recruited Burgess were Gonzaga, Louisville, Florida, UCLA, Kansas, Kentucky, Washington State and Utah.

**LEE CUMMARD**

Cummard is considered one of the top shooting guards in the West and has been rated the No. 1 prospect by some recruiting experts. The 6-foot-6, 175-pound wing player averaged 17 points and six rebounds as a junior last year at Mesa (Ariz.) High School while leading the Jackrabbits to the state tournament quarterfinals before a double-overtime loss. A good athlete with a natural feel for the game, he has all-around abilities and good leadership qualities. SI/CNN calls the versatile Cummard the fifth-best small forward in the West. Known as a fierce competitor, Cummard has good ball-handling skills, excellent shooting range and the toughness to rebound and finish in traffic. A Street & Smith All-America Honorable Mention, he was a member of the East Valley All-Region First Team as a junior after earning second-team honors as a sophomore. He was recruited by Arizona State, UCLA, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford, Iowa State, Utah State, Utah, New Mexico, Miami, Gonzaga, Oklahoma State, San Diego State and Texas Tech.

**CHRIS MILES**

Miles is Utah's reigning 4A State MVP and 4A State Tournament MVP out of Timpview High School in Provo. The local standout averaged 11 points, eight rebounds and five blocks for a balanced Thunderbird team that won the state title in 2003 and is ranked No. 25 in the nation entering this season. He was invited to the NBA Players Camp during the summer, where he was rated No. 47 among the nation's top high school players. He has been ranked as high as the No. 2 post player in the West. A Street & Smith All-America High Honorable Mention selection, the 6-foot-10, 225-pound forward is a quick and versatile player, tough defender and outstanding shot-blocker. He is on track to become the No. 2 all-time shot-blocker in Utah high school history during his senior season behind former BYU and current NBA center Shawn Bradley. Gonzaga, Utah State, Utah, Kansas, Oregon State, Connecticut, UCLA, Vanderbilt, Wyoming and Texas Tech also recruited Miles.

**TRENT PLAISTED**

Plaisted is a 6-foot-10, 220-pound forward who led Clark High School in San Antonio to the 2003 District 28-5A title and regional quarterfinals in Texas' largest classification. The only junior named to the All-District 28 First Team, Plaisted averaged 12.5 points and 5.5 rebounds as a junior while helping his team (which is preseason No. 2 in Texas this season) achieve a 31-7 record. A left-handed shooter and young player who just turned 17 in October, he has earned MVP honors at numerous tournaments and has been nominated for McDonald's All-America recognition. He averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds this summer on his AAU team, the San Antonio Bulls, where he was given the opportunity to play more on the perimeter. Rated the No. 10 player in Texas, Plaisted impressed at the Texas Elite Camp and made a national name for himself at the 2003 Kingwood Classic in Houston. Long and athletic, Plaisted runs the floor well and has a soft shooting touch to 18 feet. He is a good shot-blocker and solid rebounder. Among schools recruiting Plaisted were Florida State, Stanford, Kansas, Oklahoma State, Washington State, Texas A&M, Utah, Arkansas, New Mexico, Texas Tech, and Vanderbilt.

**QUICK 2002-03 RECAP**

In 2002-03, BYU earned its fourth straight postseason berth and second NCAA bid in the last three years while claiming a share of the Mountain West Conference regular season title for the second time in the last three years. Playing among the nation's toughest schedules, including 11 different conferences on its non-league slate, the Cougars finished the year with a 23-9 overall record, going 11-4 through the pre-conference schedule before earning a share of the MWC regular season title with Utah at 11-3. The Cougars went 1-1 at the MWC Tournament before losing to No. 5-seed Connecticut at the NCAA Tournament in Spokane, Wash. BYU went 13-1 at home and 10-8 away, including a 4-3 neutral record and 6-5 road mark. The Cougars had the MWC's top defense and also won the preseason Paradise Jam title in St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands. BYU was led by senior guard Travis Hansen, junior swingman Mark Bigelow and junior center Rafael Araujo. Hansen, one of two first-team All-MWC consensus players, led the team in scoring (16.8) and blocks (20) and was second in assists (2.4) and rebounds (4.8). Bigelow, a third-team All-MWC selection, was second in scoring (13.9), third in rebounding (3.7) and the team's top three-point shooter (63). Araujo, a third-team All-MWC pick, was the third-leading scorer (12.0) and top rebounder (8.9). Sophomore forward Jared Jensen, who received All-MWC honorable mention, added 7.5 points and 3.3 rebounds while JC transfer Kevin Woodberry averaged 6.3 points and 2.5 assists at the point.

**BYU PICKED AS FAVORITE TO CLAIM 2004 MWC CROWN**

Bigelow, Araujo selected to preseason All-MWC team

The Mountain West Conference released its men's basketball preseason media poll and all-conference team today at the league's media day being held at the Denver Marriott Tech Center. The league media selected BYU to claim the Mountain West Conference men's basketball title with 144 total points and 13 of the possible 19 first-place votes. Utah was picked second with 138 points and was the only other team to garner first place votes with six. Defending MWC Tournament Champion Colorado State came in third with 107 points, followed by UNLV fourth with 97. Wyoming placed fifth with 73 points, followed by San Diego State (55), New Mexico (36), and Air Force (35). BYU has earned a share of the conference titles in 2001 and 2003, but this is the first time in more than 10 years the Cougars have been the preseason MWC favorites. The Cougars and Utes shared the conference's regular season crown last season with 11-3 records. BYU went 23-9 overall and fell to Connecticut in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Utah finished the 2002-03 season 25-8, defeating Oregon in the first round of the NCAA Tournament before falling to Kentucky in the second round. The Mountain West Conference has sent six of its eight teams to the postseason each of the past two seasons and is the only league in the country to have sent 75 percent of its members to the postseason two straight years. BYU seniors Mark Bigelow and Rafael Araujo were selected to the preseason first-team All-MWC team. Other athletes picked were Utah's Tim Frost and Nick Jacobson, Air Force's Tim Keller and the top MWC returnee Matt Nelson from CSU.

**COUGARS COMING OFF SUCCESSFUL SUMMER TOUR TO AUSTRALIA**

Getting an early jump on the upcoming season, BYU participated in a six-game tour of Australia against professional teams in Sydney, Brisbane and Cairns. "Four years ago when we went to Europe it helped us get a head start on the season," BYU Coach Steve Cleveland said. "This was a nice opportunity to implement our system and give the players some good experience. Everyone got a chance to play significant minutes." BYU earned the first of four consecutive postseason tournament berths under Cleveland in 2000 after its summer 1999 trip to England, Croatia and Italy. The NCAA allows a foreign tour once every four years. The team was also allowed 10 additional practice days to prepare for the trip. All of last year's returning players were allowed to make the trip, including redshirt freshmen Austin Ainge and Garner Meads. Newcomers Mike Hall and Michael Rose, along with returning missionary Derek Dawes, were not eligible for the trip. The Cougars played six games in seven nights, posting a 4-2 record. Senior Mark Bigelow led the team, scoring 21.6 points in 27 minutes per game. Senior center Rafael Araujo added 14.0 ppg and a team-high 7.7 rpg in 20 minutes of action. Redshirt freshman Garner Meads scored 9.3 ppg and pulled down 6.0 rpg. The tour also includes visits to the Sydney Opera House, Taronga Zoo, Manly Beach and the Great Barrier Reef.

**WINNING BASKETBALL TRADITION**

With its all-time record of 1450-931 (.609), BYU is the ranked 40th all-time in winning percentage among all Division I basketball programs. In terms of total wins, BYU is in the top 25. The Cougars have had 81 winning seasons in their 101 years of basketball and have made 29 postseason appearances, including 20 NCAA bids, and won 26 conference championships.

**CLEVELAND GETTING IT DONE (HONORED AS 2003 MWC COACH OF THE YEAR)**

BYU coach Steve Cleveland was named MWC Coach of the Year in 2003. At 23-9 last year, BYU achieved its fourth straight postseason tournament invitation and third 20-win season in the last four years. Only eight BYU teams have ever achieved more victories in a season than last year's team. The BYU record for wins is 28 (9 losses) in 1951 when the Cougars won the national title as NIT champs. The 2002-03 season was Cleveland's third 20-win season in the last four years, including a 24-9 record in 2001. The only BYU coaches to have more 20-win seasons are Stan Watts (7) and Roger Reid (6). Cleveland joins Frank Arnold and Ladell Andersen with three 20-win seasons.

BYU closed out its tour of Australia with a 111-84 win Tuesday over the Kuiyam Pride of the Australian Basketball Association. The Cougars compiled a 4-2 record on the trip, playing six games in seven nights. In the finale, BYU coach Steve Cleveland gave senior Mark Bigelow some deserved time off. Cleveland played his leading scorer just two minutes before taking him out for the rest of the game. Entering the game with a 21.6 scoring average, Bigelow did not attempt a shot Tuesday. Senior center Rafael Araujo (11 points in six minutes) and senior forward Jake Shoff (three rebounds in seven minutes) were effective but also spent the majority of Tuesday's win watching from the bench. Austin Ainge was one beneficiary, playing a team-high 30 minutes and getting his first start. Hitting a team-best four treys, the 6-foot-1 point guard took advantage of his time on the floor. He and fellow redshirt freshman Garner Meads each scored 17 points and shared team-high rebounding honors with eight.

Despite an outstanding team effort and another big-time performance by Mark Bigelow, the BYU men's basketball team came out on the losing end of a hard-fought 108-105 battle against the Cairns Taipans of Australia's elite National Basketball League. A thrilling finish, the Taipans won on a three-pointer at the final buzzer after BYU guard Terry Nashif tied the game with a clutch trey of his own just five seconds earlier. "Tonight was the best game of the trip," BYU coach Steve Cleveland said. "This was the best team we have faced and we competed hard and played very well. Our young men are certainly getting valuable experience. We're coming together as a team. Hopefully that will pay off in November and December." If one thing has become apparent during BYU's first five games in Australia, it is Bigelow's capable leadership. The 6-foot-7 senior forward has led BYU in scoring in all five games, including a 28-point effort Monday against Cairns. He shot 57 percent from the floor, including 4-of-5 three-pointers, and added four rebounds and four assists in 33 minutes. Senior center Rafael Araujo had his best game of the trip, missing only once from the floor in nine attempts on his way to 23 points. He added 10 rebounds in his 25 minutes before fouling out.

BYU improved to 3-1 on its exhibition tour in Australia with its third straight win, edging SEQ Invitational Black 93-91. Close throughout, For the fourth straight game, senior forward Mark Bigelow led the Cougars in scoring with 17 points, sharing the honor with teammate Marc Roberts. Bigelow also contributed eight rebounds while Roberts added two boards in his 22 minutes of action. Redshirt freshman Garner Meads, who started for the second straight game, tallied 15 points, 11 rebounds and a team-leading three steals in 25 minutes. Junior Jared Jensen started at center and pulled down a game-high 12 rebounds to go with six points. Junior point guard Terry Nashif got his first starting assignment on the trip and dished out a game-best nine assists, while senior guard Luiz Lemes had eight points, three rebounds and three assists playing a team-high 31 minutes in his second straight start.

Led by Mark Bigelow's continued stellar play and strong performances from its post players, the BYU men's basketball team pulled out an amazing 98-90 come-from-behind win Friday over the Brisbane Bullets of the National Basketball League, Australia's top professional league. Kevin Woodberry made two of his three steals in the third period and Araujo proved to be a handful down low, running the floor and contributing offensive rebounds to help BYU outscored Brisbane 28-14 in the third to trail by only four points entering the final quarter. The fourth quarter opened with Brisbane's Daniel Egan hitting a pair of baseline jumpers to widen the Bullets' margin, but some great shooting by Bigelow and strong play in the post garnered the victory for BYU and the vocal support of the several hundred Cougar fans in attendance.

Bigelow led BYU in scoring for the third straight game, making 11-of-13 free throws on his way to 27 points. Araujo added 19 points, nine rebounds and three steals, while Jared Jensen contributed 13 points and nine rebounds and Dan Howard totaled a double-double with 11 points and a team-high 12 rebounds in only 12 minutes of play. Lemes and Terry Nashif each distributed a game-high five assists.

In the second game of its Australian exhibition tour, BYU had no trouble defeating the Canberra Australian Institute of Sport from the South East Australian Basketball League, winning the game 94-60. Mark Bigelow led the way for the Cougars scoring 15 points, pulling down five rebounds and dishing out two assists in 19 minutes. Marc Roberts added 12 points in 20 minutes while Luiz Lemes had 11 points in 14 minutes.

Senior forward Mark Bigelow scored a game-high 21 points for BYU in the first game of the Cougars' summer tour of Australia. Coach Steve Cleveland gave all 12 players significant minutes in the 97-80 loss to the Hunter Pirates of the National Basketball League, Australia's top professional league. Bigelow had the most impressive outing for BYU, scoring 21 points in just 24 minutes. Araujo, who played a team-high 28 minutes, recorded a double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds, while redshirt freshman point guard Austin Ainge and junior guard Marc Roberts added nine points each.

**IN THE MARRIOTT CENTER**

BYU finished last season 13-1 at home in 2002-03. Lone senior Travis Hansen concluded his three seasons as a Cougar having lost only once at home. BYU earned a 44-1 record in Hansen's three years at BYU – the best three-year home record in school history. The second-best home record over three years was a 39-2 mark from 1979-81 in Danny Ainge's final three seasons. BYU has won 49 of its last 50 games at home and is 44-1 over the last three seasons. The 44-1 record is the school's best-ever three-year home record. BYU won a school-record 44 straight home games in the Marriott Center before losing to Utah, 79-75, on Jan. 25. The streak was the longest active streak in the country over part of last season and this season. BYU continues its string of non-conference home wins. The Cougars have defeated 34 straight non-conference opponents in the Marriott Center since starting the streak with a 61-59 win over Utah State on Jan. 2, 1999. The last non-league foe to win in Provo was the California Bears, who edged BYU 71-70 on Dec. 19, 1998.

**COUGARS RATED HIGH IN RPI AND SAGARIN RATINGS**

As a league, the Mountain West Conference had the sixth-best RPI rating in the nation 98th in Sagarin). BYU had been the top-rated MWC team throughout much of the year in the Sagarin and RPI and entered the NCAA Tournament as the league's second-rated RPI team and top team in Sagarin. As of March 26th in RPI computed by CBS.Sportsline.com, BYU had a No. 25 rating while Utah was No. 18. In the RPI compiled by Collegiate Basketball News, BYU was 24th and Utah was No. 19. BYU was rated 32nd in the Sagarin Ratings with Utah at 39.

**STATISTICS SHOWED STRENGTH**

BYU's strong play and conference championship was reflected in the MWC statistics. BYU finished the regular season in the top three in 17 of 19 statistical categories in league play. BYU led in five statistical categories, was the second-rated team in six and finished third in six more. The lone two categories BYU was not in the top three were FG percentage (5th) and blocks (7th).

**AMONG NATION'S TOUGHEST SCHEDULES**

BYU achieved a 23-9 record playing among the toughest rated schedules in the nation. BYU's schedule was rated 26th most difficult by CBS.Sportsline.com. It was rated the 49th toughest in the nation by Collegiate Basketball News RPI and No. 66 in the Sagarin Ratings. BYU played teams from 11 different conferences, excluding the MWC -- Big East, Pac-10, Big 12, Atlantic 10, Big Sky, Big West, Mid-American, Mid-Continent, Missouri Valley, West Coast and Western Athletic.

**RECORD AGAINST TOP TEAMS**

BYU finished last season with a 7-2 record against teams that were conference champions in 2002. BYU went 12-6 against teams that qualified for postseason play in 2002. BYU played 12 games last year against eight teams that earned an invitation to the 2003 NCAA Tournament. BYU had a 5-7 record in those games (UConn 0-1, Arizona State 1-0, San Diego 1-0, Utah State 1-0, Colorado State 2-1, Weber State 0-1, Creighton 0-1, Oklahoma State 0-1, Utah 0-2). Seven of BYU's nine losses in 2002-03 came against teams that qualified for the NCAA Tournament. UNLV and San Francisco were the two teams to beat BYU that didn't advance to the NCAA tournament.





Steve Cleveland enters his seventh year at the helm of the Cougars in 2003-04. During his tenure at BYU, Cleveland has proven to be a first-rate recruiter, an excellent coach and player developer, and above all, a winner.

He was honored as the MWC Coach of the Year in 2002-03, as voted by the league's coaches and media members, after guiding BYU to a share of the MWC regular season title and a 23-9 record. He has guided BYU to four straight post-season appearances and three 20-win seasons in the last four years. Only two other BYU coaches have ever achieved more 20-win seasons.

In 2002, Cleveland coached BYU to a win over No. 13 Stanford and advanced to the second round of the NIT before losing at eventual champion Memphis despite having lost four starters and six of his top seven players from the prior season. In 2001, Cleveland guided BYU to its first NCAA tournament bid since 1995, its first conference regular season title since 1993 and its first conference tournament championship since 1992. While rebuilding a program that finished 1-25 before his arrival, he has posted records of 9-21, 12-16, 22-11, 24-9, 18-12 and 23-9. The 1999-2000, 2000-2001 and 2002-03 seasons all rank among of the school's best years ever in terms of wins. In fact, since BYU's first season in 1903, only five BYU teams have ever recorded more wins than the 24-9 team in 2000-01.

Cleveland has brought the magic of the Marriott Center back in Provo. BYU averaged 14,468 fans in 2002-03, including the largest crowd (22,702) since 1992. BYU had the nation's largest percentage increase in attendance in 2003. The

Cougars owned the nation's longest homecourt victory streak for much of the 2002 and 2003 seasons until it finally ended at 44 games. BYU has won 49 of its last 50 games at home, including back-to-back unbeaten seasons of 15-0 and 16-0 in 2001 and 2002.

Cleveland's teams have traditionally been prepared to play their best at the end of the season. BYU went 5-2 in March in 2002-03 and earned its second conference regular season title and NCAA bid in the last three years. BYU has been to the post-season four straight years. In 2001-02 BYU

won in the first round of the NIT before losing at eventual NIT champion Memphis. In 2000-01, BYU won five straight games on the road to secure a share of the MWC regular season title and earn the automatic NCAA bid by claiming the MWC

Tournament in Las Vegas. The Cougars won six of their last eight games the

prior season, including two MWC tournament wins and two NIT victories. In Cleveland's first year, BYU completed a rare sweep of New Mexico and UTEP on the road to earn a WAC tournament berth. The road sweep of New Mexico and UTEP was the first for BYU since 1990-91 and the 83-62 upset of No.15-ranked New Mexico in the Pit ended the Lobos' 41-game home winning streak. In Cleveland's second season the Cougars had a blowout win over UTEP before a 90-74 conference tournament upset victory over TCU to achieve BYU's first conference tournament win since 1994.

Cleveland's teams have advanced to the finals of the MWC tournament in two of the four seasons the event has been played, winning the title in 2001.

As a recruiter, Cleveland has made a similar impact on BYU's program. Cleveland's recruits have proven they are not only committed to Cleveland's vision but also are the kind of players to help make that vision a reality in Provo. Cleveland and his staff have been able to attract top talent from Utah and beyond.

Cleveland has a string of top conference newcomers. Six players have earned conference newcomer honors in Cleveland's six years as the Cougar coach, including four who have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. He would have added his seventh newcomer award if you consider the MWC did not have the award in 2002-03, but JC transfer Rafael Araujo was named the Newcomer of the Year by the conference media members in a poll conducted by the Las Vegas Review-Journal.

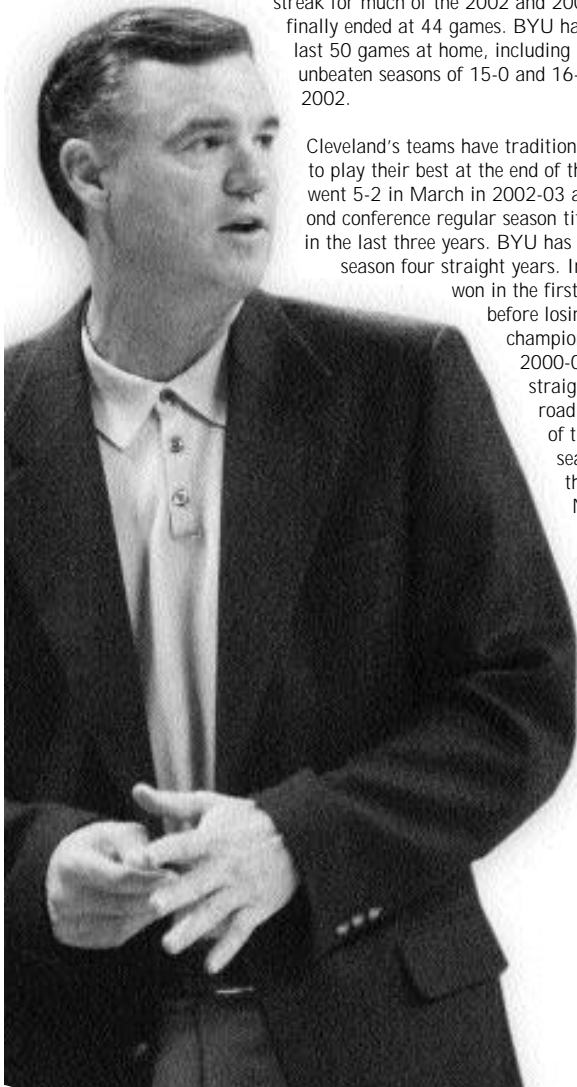
In October 2001, Cleveland signed a multi-year contract extension with BYU. Before taking the helm with the Cougars on March 11, 1997, Cleveland compiled a 157-77 record at Fresno City College in Fresno, Calif. Cleveland was named coach of the year two times while at FCC and led the Rams to post-season playoffs in each of his seven seasons in Fresno. Cleveland coached 10 years at Fresno's Clovis West High School, compiling a 180-70 record.

**PLAYING CAREER**

Cleveland played college basketball at UC Irvine and was the Anteaters' MVP and leading scorer his senior season in 1975-76. Prior to attending UC Irvine, Cleveland was Fresno City College's Most Outstanding Player in 1973-74. Cleveland received a B.A. degree in social science from UC Irvine in 1976, and received a Master's in education administration from Fresno Pacific in 1979.

**PERSONAL**

Cleveland, 50, was born in the Los Angeles area and spent most of his life in Fresno, Calif. He served a full-time mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to England from 1971-73. Cleveland was the first head basketball or football coach at BYU to have served a church mission. Cleveland and his wife Kip have three children: sons Casey (25) and Skyler (22) and daughter Katie (13).

**CAPSULE:** Bigelow is an MWC Player of the Year candidate ... He will be looked to as a leader as a four-year starter in 2003-04 ... He earned third-team All-MWC honors in 2002-03 as BYU's second-leading scorer (13.9) and was honorable mention All-MWC in 2001-02 ... He was BYU's leading scorer (15.0) and rebounder (6.3) and WAC Pacific Division Freshman of the Year and All-WAC Second Team in 1998-99 before going on a two-year LDS Church mission to Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. ... An excellent shooter and extremely intelligent player, Bigelow is BYU's all-time three-point leader and holds the record for consecutive games with a trey (22) ... A gifted offensive player who moves well without the ball and has a nice mid-range game, he can play either wing position for the Cougars ... 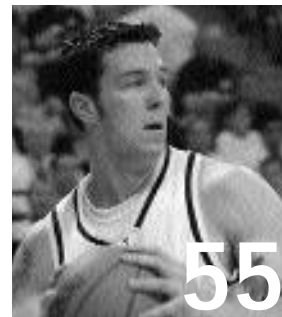

**CAPSULE:** Jensen is an all-conference candidate who earned All-MWVC honorable mention in 2002-03 ... A talented offensive player in the low-post, he can receive almost any entry pass with exceptionally soft hands ... He earned MWC Co-Freshman of the Year honors in 2001-02 when he finished first in the Mountain West Conference with a team-leading 59.1 field goal percentage (sixth single-season best percentage in school history) ... Although he did not get as many touches as Rafael Araujo, Jensen took advantage of his opportunities last year, shooting .574 on the year to finish fourth on the team in scoring (7.5) ... He also was fourth in rebounding (3.3) ... He was fourth on the team in scoring and rebounding at 8.6 points per game and 3.5 rebounds per contest his freshman season ... Starting both years at BYU, he came to the Cougars as the most prized high school recruit from the state of Utah, earning the 2001 Deseret News Mr. Basketball Award, scoring 25.8 points and pulling down 13 rebounds per game at Fremont High School ... He has career highs of 20 points and 10 rebounds.

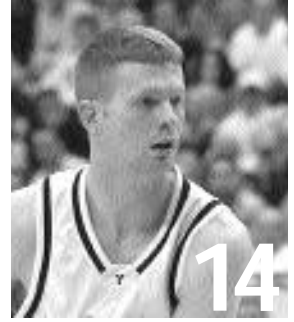

A strong physical player inside, he was third in the nation in average rebounds per minute played in 2000-01 at Weber State ... Aggressive with good size and agility, he makes an impact on the game even when logging limited minutes ... 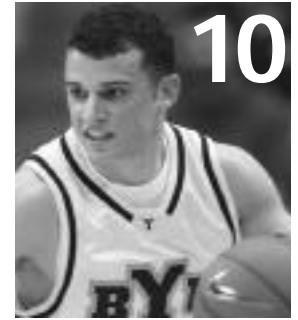

Played point guard as a freshman before being moved to the wing because of his shooting ability (made 66 threes sophomore season from the wing) ... 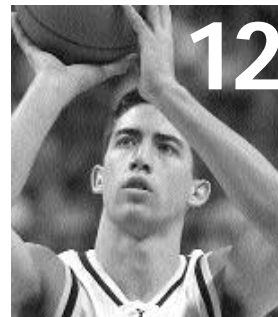

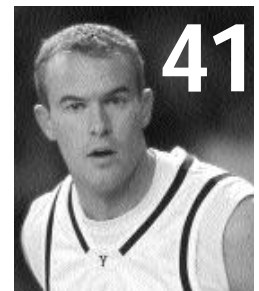
