COUGARS SET TO BATTLE FIGHTING IRISH

Riding a two-game win streak, the Cougars, 3-3 overall and 2-2 in the MWC, will take a one-week hiatus from conference play and take a trip to Indiana for a game with the No. 9 Fighting Irish of Notre Dame. BYU's most recent win was Saturday against Colorado State in this year's homecoming game. The Cougars struck twice in the second quarter on a four-yard run by Curtis Brown and a two-yard scoring pass from John Beck to Daniel Coats. BYU added a third-quarter field goal before yielding two touchdowns to the Rams, which cut the Cougar lead to 17-14. BYU responded after the second when Brown scored from two yards out in the fourth, capping a 14-play, 76-yard drive that ate 6:53 off the clock and left Colorado State down 10 with 2:07 remaining. The Cougar defense held to secure the 24-14 win. Brown had season highs of 147 yards, two touchdowns and 31 rush attempts.

A LOOK AT THE IRISH



The No. 9 Irish are 4-2 and coming off a near-upset of the No. 1-ranked USC Trojans. Notre Dame held the lead three times during the game, including 31-28 with 2:02 remaining after quarterback Brady Quinn scored on a five-yard run. The Trojans answered as Matt Leinart took his team to the goal line with just seven seconds remaining and scored the game-winning touchdown. Quinn finished the game completing 19-of-35 pass attempts for 264 yards and one touchdown. Jeff Samardzija caught six passes for 99 yards and a touchdown while the Irish ran for 153 yards. For the season, Quinn has thrown for 1,885 yards and 14 touchdowns. He is averaging 314.2 yards per game. Samardzija has caught nine of those touchdown passes and has 598 receiving yards. Darius Walker is the team's top rusher with 600 yards and three touchdowns.

COMPLETE BROADCAST PLANS

TELEVISION: BYU's game against No. 9 Notre Dame will be broadcast nationally on NBC. Kickoff is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. (CT). The game can be seen locally on KSL-TV Channel 5.

RADIO: Fans can also catch the game by tuning into KSL Radio, 1160 AM and 102.7 FM, and follow the game live as Greg Wrubell calls the action, Marc Lyons offers expert analysis and James Dye reports from the sideline. Westwood One will also broadcast the game with Tony Roberts, Allen Pinkett and Al Smith calling the action.

SERIES INFORMATION

Saturday's game will be the sixth meeting between BYU and No. 9 Notre Dame. The Irish lead the series 3-2 and hold a 2-1 advantage in Notre Dame. The two teams opened their respective 2004 schedules in Provo and BYU prevailed, 20-17. The Cougars jumped out to a 13-0 lead on a five-yard touchdown run by Fahu Tahi and two field goals by Matt Payne, including a 53-yarder. After a Notre Dame field goal, the Cougars increased their lead to 20-3 in the third on a 42-yard pass from Matt Berry to Austin Collie. The Irish came back with 14-unanswered points to get within three but BYU managed to run out the clock, preserving the victory. The last time the teams met in Notre Dame was in 2003. The Irish defeated the Cougars 33-14.



THE RANKED TEAMS

The Cougars' game at No. 9 Notre Dame will be their second against a ranked opponent this season. BYU started the season with a loss to then No. 22 Boston College. The Cougars are now 0-11 against ranked teams since defeating No. 23 Colorado State, 34-13, on Sept. 16, 1999. During that streak BYU is 0-3 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU has not defeated a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on Sept. 20, 1997.

CONFERENCE STANDINGS

With Saturday's 24-14 win over Colorado State, the Rams fall to 2-1 in league play and trail TCU. The Horned Frogs lead the league with a 4-0 record against MWC opponents. Wyoming, New Mexico, BYU and San Diego State are tied for third with a 2-2 conference record. Air Force is in seventh place with a 2-3 league record, while Utah and UNLV are tied for last with a 1-3 MWC record.

GOOD GRIEF CURTIS BROWN

Curtis Brown carried the ball 31 times for 147 yards and scored two touchdowns, marking season-high numbers in each category. Brown had his eighth career 100-yard game--tied for second most in BYU history--by halftime as he ran for 103 yards on 18 carries in the opening half. Brown opened the scoring in the second quarter with a four-yard touchdown run--his fourth rushing touchdown of the year. For the season, he has 504 yards and five touchdowns on 106 carries. BYU is 7-1 when Brown rushes for over 100 yards. The only loss came in 2004 against UNLV when he had 102 yards on eight carries.

WEARING OUT THE TURF

The Cougars relied on the rushing game in Saturday's 24-14 win over Colorado State. Led by Curtis Brown and Fahu Tahī, BYU amassed 274 yards rushing on 52 attempts. Brown accumulated 147, Tahī had 86 and John Beck added 37. It was the most rushing yards gained by BYU since the Cougars had 410 yards on 45 carries against Colorado State on November 1, 2001. The Cougars defeated the Rams 56-34 in that contest.

MAKING HIS PLACE IN THE MWC

When John Beck completed a 19-yard pass to Jonny Harline on BYU's first drive of the night against Colorado State, he moved into fifth-place on the MWC career passing yards list with 5,180, passing Adam Hall of San Diego State who had 5,173. Later in the first quarter, Beck passed former Utah quarterback Alex Smith on a 13-yard pass to Joe Griffin. The completion gave Beck 5,210 yards. Smith had 5,203 yards during his career. Beck had 168 yards for the game and now has 5,329 career yards.

STAT WATCH

John Beck and the Cougar offense are among national and conference leaders. Beck currently ranks seventh nationally in passing yards per game (317.0 p/g) and in total passing yards (1,902). He leads the Mountain West Conference in both categories. BYU's passing offense is 11th in the nation and first in the conference while its total-offense average of 432.3 yards per game is second in the conference and 26th in the nation. Beck is second in the conference and is 11th nationally in total offense (313.8 yards p/g). Jared McLaughlin is fifth in the conference in scoring (6.2 pts/g). Curtis Brown is fourth in the conference and 40th nationally in rushing yards per game (84.0). Jonny Harline is fifth in the conference in receiving yards per game and 45th nationally (75.0).

IN GOOD COMPANY

Through his freshman and sophomore years, John Beck compiled 3,427 yards passing. Only two BYU quarterbacks passed for more yards in their first two years of college football. Heisman trophy winner Ty Detmer recorded 5,812 yards in 1988-89, including 4,560 in 1989 as a sophomore. John Walsh had 4,678 yards from 1991-93, including 3,727 as a sophomore in 1993. He threw for 857 in 1992 before going down with a shoulder injury and being granted a medical redshirt. Six games into his junior season, Beck has thrown for 5,329 career yards, including 1,902 yards this season. Following lists each players' total yards through five games as a junior.

ONE PUNT

Punter Derek McLaughlin set foot on the field just once against Colorado State, punting for 38 yards in the third quarter. The last time BYU punted only once in a game was Nov. 9, 2002 against Wyoming, a 35-31 Cougar win at home. The last time a BYU opponent had just one punt was Utah on Nov. 20, 2004.

WHERE'S THE BEEF?

The BYU offensive line doesn't order salads when it goes out to eat. Each starter weighs over 300 pounds for an average of 325 and a total of 1,625 pounds. They will be going up against a Notre Dame defensive line that weighs an average of 271.0 pounds. The Irish offensive line weighs on average of 294.6 pounds while BYU's defensive line weighs an average of 298.3.

SCORELESS QUARTERS AND FIRST-HALF SHUTOUTS

BYU led 14-0 at the half against Colorado State, marking the Cougars' second first-half shutout of the season. The Cougars also kept Eastern Illinois scoreless in the first half. BYU has shut out its opponents in seven quarters this season, including three consecutive quarters from the fourth at New Mexico through the first half against Colorado State. The Cougars nearly made it four-straight but the Rams scored as time expired in the third.

ONLY ONE PASS

BYU quarterback John Beck completed 13-of-18 attempts for 168 yards in the Cougars' 24-14 win over Colorado State. He had only one pass in the entire second quarter--a two-yard touchdown pass to Daniel Coats that gave the Cougars' a 14-0 lead with 1:32 left in the second quarter. The pass concluded a 10-play, 74-yard drive.

PAPER OR PLASTIC?

Through the first five games of the year, BYU recorded just seven sacks. Against Colorado State, the Cougars had their most successful game getting to the quarterback, recording four sacks. Justin Luetgerodt led the way with 2.5 sacks for 15 yards. Colorado State quarterback Justin Holland had only been sacked three times entering the game.

ROOKIE HEAD COACHES

Bronco Mendenhall became BYU's 14th head coach, the 13th man to hold the job, on Dec. 13, 2004. The coaches have had varied levels of success in their first year at the helm. Four head coaches have enjoyed winning records at the beginning of their tenures, including Eddie Kimball (twice), LaVell Edwards and Gary Crowton. Two coaches won half of their games while the rest had losing seasons. In their debut games, rookie coaches are 7-7. It is interesting to note that both Bronco Mendenhall and LaVell Edwards started 1-2. Edwards went on to finish 7-4 in his first campaign. LAST SEVEN YEARS

Since 1999, the victorious team in the BYU-Colorado State series has won by 10-points or more. Last season, BYU defeated the Rams 31-21 in Fort Collins. The largest margin of victory during that stretch was 45 when Colorado State defeated the Cougars 58-13 in 2003 in Provo. Since the 1999 season--the first year of the Mountain West Conference--the Cougars have posted a 4-3 record against the Rams.



BRONCO MENDENHALL

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including the past two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach at Brigham Young University on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall becomes the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (38)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country--has served the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many

accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter (5), Breaker (3) and Raeder (18 mo.).

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff leads the Mountain West Conference with five members of its coaching staff who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played for Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. Quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman was drafted by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002 and also played with the Washington Redskins. Cornerbacks coach Brian Mitchell was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons where he played for three seasons. He also played for the Dallas Cowboys.

SOMEBODY'S WATCHING YOU...

Six members of the 2005 BYU football team - John Beck, Curtis Brown, Daniel Coats, Cameron Jensen, Jake Kuresa, Lance Reynolds and Todd Watkins - have been named to various "watch lists" for postseason awards.

John Beck, 6-2, 210, Quarterback: John Beck has been selected to the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award watch list, which honors the nation's best quarterback. Beck started 10 of 11 games his sophomore year and threw for 2,563 yards and 15 touchdowns. He averaged an MWC best 261.0 yards per game against league opponents. Beck earned second-team All-MWC honors as a sophomore.

Manaia Brown, 6-4, 310, Defensive Line: Manaia Brown has been named to the Lombardi Award watch list. Brown started eight of 11 games in 2004, registering 26 tackles, nine for a loss of 48 yards. He also registered 4.5 sacks. He was named All-MWC Honorable Mention.

Curtis Brown, 6-0, 210, Running Back: Curtis Brown has been named a Doak Walker Award candidate. In 2004, Brown had over 100 yards in four-straight games, including a season-high 159 against Wyoming. Against the Cowboys, he threw a 40-yard touchdown pass and ran for the score that put the Cougars ahead for good. He is only the fourth BYU player to crack the 1,000-yard rushing mark during his sophomore year.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 250, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He played all 11 games for BYU as a sophomore, catching 13 passes for 160 yards. He had a season-best four receptions for 42 yards against Air Force. As a freshman in 2003, Coats earned freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Jake Kuresa, 6-5, 330, Offensive Line: Jake Kuresa has been named to the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists. He has started every game (23) in his two year career. As a freshman, he played both guard and tackle and played exclusively at tackle as a sophomore. Kuresa helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Cameron Jensen, 6-5, 330, Linebacker: Cameron Jensen has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award watch lists. He started all 11 games in 2004 and led the team in total tackles with 103, solo tackles with 49 and assisted tackles with 54. His 12.0 tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries tied him for first on the team and he added two interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown against UNLV.

Lance Reynolds, 6-3, 293, Offensive Line: Lance Reynolds has been named to the Rimington Trophy watch list. He started every game in 2004 at center. He helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Todd Watkins, 6-3, 194, Wide Receiver: Todd Watkins has been named to the Biletnikoff watch list. He led the Mountain West Conference with 1,042 yards receiving in 2004 and set a league single-season record, averaging 94.7 yards per contest. He also caught 52 passes and six touchdowns, four of which were for 68, 69, 70 and 79 yards.

BECK NOTES:

- With 168 passing yards against Colorado State, Beck moved into fourth in the MWC for the most career passing yards with 5,329 career yards. He now needs 358 yards to take sole possession of third place on the all-time list.
- With 371 yards passing against New Mexico, Beck has seven career 300-yard games.
- With 32 career touchdown passes, Beck needs three more to move into a tie for fifth place on the Mountain West Conference career touchdown completions list.
- With 517 yards against TCU, Beck became only the third player in league history to pass for over 500 yards in a game.

TURNOVER MARGIN

The Cougars rank last in the MWC and 104th nationally in turnover margin at -1.00 per game and -6 overall. Interestingly, the offense has turned the ball over 13 times, fourth in the MWC. However, the defense has produced seven takeaways, five less than any other team in the conference.

Beginning with the 2005 season, the Cougars will wear the uniform that still remains the visible icon of the great football tradition at BYU. The home uniform will feature a dark-blue jersey with white pants, while the road uniform will include the white jersey with dark-blue pants. Both the home and road uniforms will be trimmed with "Northwestern" style stripes on the sleeves, as well as down the sides of the pants. In addition, the Cougars will wear white helmets with the traditional helmet logo and blue stripes.

While there have been three uniform changes in the past six years, Mendenhall said the new, traditional uniform is back to stay. Mendenhall also said the names of the players will also be displayed on the back of the uniforms, and players will receive "cougar head" helmet decals for notable performances both on and off the field.

Since 1999, when BYU changed its official school colors, the Cougars have had three different uniforms. BYU unveiled a new uniform in 1999, followed by a revision in 2000. Last season the Cougars sported a new look that featured the "UCLA" insert over the shoulder.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity and immaculate surroundings, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000. In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding pressbox working area."

Dallas, a freshman, was heavily recruited out of high school and joined the Cougars this season after serving an LDS mission in Seattle, Washington.



ON THE AIR

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is KSL NEWSRADIO (1160 AM and 102.7 FM) in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 5th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as the sideline/locker-room reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 24-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts and co-host of the midweek "Bronco Mendenhall Show." A pair of BYU greats join the KSL Broadcast team this season, with two-time all-conference kick returner James Dye reporting from the sidelines and locker-room, and three-time NFL Pro-Bowl selection Chad Lewis joining Lyons and Dye on the pregame "Cougar Countdown Show." The gameday studio host is KSL's Scott Haws, a former BYU student-athlete and all-conference pitcher for the baseball Cougars.

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 21st season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

KSL's game day coverage begins two hours prior to kickoff with the "Cougar Countdown Show." The "Cougar Pregame Scoreboard Show" starts the broadcast's second hour, with the "Cougar Pregame Coach's Show" 35 minutes prior to kickoff, followed by the "Cougar Kickoff Show."

BIG-TIME YARDS

The BYU offense racked up 614 yards of total offense against TCU, including 97 on the ground and 517 in the air. It was the first time BYU had over 600 yards of total offense since the Cougars had 615 yards against Syracuse in 2002. It was the first time since 1999 BYU had over 500 passing yards when Kevin Feterik had 501 against Washington. The TCU game was the first time a quarterback had three-or-more touchdown passes since 2004 against San Diego State when Beck had three. Three of those touchdowns went to Todd Watkins, making it the first time since 2001 when Doug Jolley had three against Air Force. One of his scores was a 67-yard grab, the first time BYU scored on a 50-yard-or-more passing play since Austin Collie caught an 82-yarder against San Diego State in 2004. Watkins' 176 yards was the first time a receiver had 150-or-more yards since he had 153 against Air Force in 2004.

CAREER HIGHS AND SINGLE-GAME RECORDS

When John Beck completed a 37-yard pass to Jonny Harline against TCU, he had 420 passing yards, surpassing his career high of 390, which came against Boise State in 2004. He finished the day with a Mountain West single-game record 517 yards. Beck also set a new career high and tied a MWC record for touchdown passes with five when he completed a 25-yard scoring strike to Todd Watkins in overtime. His previous high was four against Air Force in 2004 when the Cougars won 41-24. Watkins finished with 176 yards and an MWC record three touchdowns.

STORK REPORT

BYU center Lance Reynolds and his wife, Becky, gave birth to an 8-pound baby boy on Sept. 26. Lance, Jr. and his wife named their son, whatelse? Lance Reynolds III.

SECOND HIGHEST SCORING GAME

BYU and TCU combined for 101 points in the Horned Frogs' 51-50 victory over the Cougars, making it the second highest scoring game between Division I-A opponents this season. Texas Tech defeated Sam Houston State, a Division I-AA team, 80-21, on Sept. 17. The combined 101 points was also an MWC record for most points scored in a conference game. On Oct. 9, Ball State and Western Michigan combined to score 117 points in Ball State's 60-57, five-overtime win.



OVERTIME

Before the Cougar's overtime loss to TCU, BYU was 5-0 in overtime games since it was implemented in 1996. BYU's previous overtime game was a 27-20 victory at UNLV in 2003.

SLOW START, GOOD FINISH

While BYU fell 20-3 in its season opener to Boston College, historical trends indicate the Cougars should still have a successful season. Since 1974, BYU has opened 12 seasons with a loss. In those 12 seasons, the Cougars had winning records in 11 and were .500 in the other. The last time BYU opened the season with a loss and had a losing record was 1973 when the team finished 5-6. On the other hand, BYU opened with a win from 2002-04 and finished with a losing record. The following is a list of the 12 seasons since 1974 BYU opened with a loss:

TOP 40s

When Curtis Brown punched the ball in from one yard out in the fourth quarter against TCU, BYU hit the 40-point mark for the second-straight game. BYU scored 45 against Eastern Illinois. The last time the Cougars had back-to-back 40-point games was in 2004 when they put up 41 against Air Force and 49 on San Diego State. The Cougars finished the TCU game with 50 points, marking the first time BYU has scored 50 points in a game since Nov. 1, 2001 against Colorado State. The Cougars defeated CSU, 56-34.

CAREER 300-YARD GAMES

BYU has traditionally focused on the pass, leading to 21 different Cougars throwing for 300 yards in at least one game for a combined 181 games. Junior John Beck has made a contribution of seven games to that list. He entered the 2005 season with four but threw for 330 yards against No. 22 Boston College, 517 against TCU and 371 at New Mexico, giving him seven. Beck has now taken sole possession of 10th place. Against Eastern Illinois, he had 110 yards and scored one touchdown and versus New Mexico, Brown had 104 yards and one score on 20 carries. In the 24-14 win over Colorado State, he had 147 yards and two scores on 31 carries. PARTY LIKE ITS 1999 ... or 98

Several Cougars started their BYU football careers before the start of the 21st century, including Spencer White, Fahu Tahi, Nate Soelberg, Brian Sanders, Chris Hale and Matt Berry, who joined the team in 1999 before serving missions. But they aren't the oldest Cougars. That honor belongs to T.J. Sitake, who redshirted in 1998. Hale and Tahi both made big impacts in 1999. Hale caught four pass for 55 yards, including the game-winning 38-yard touchdown reception in the season opener against Washington at home. Tahi led the team in rushing yards that season, totaling 445 yards on 102 carries. To put in perspective how long these players have been associated with the program, the newcomers straight out of high school were 11 or 12-years old and still playing pickup football in their backyards.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are currently 62 returned missionaries (59 percent) on the BYU roster who have served full-time, two-year missions for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in over 21 countries. Members of this year's team have served missions in Australia, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Portugal, Russia, Samoa, Spain, Tonga, United States and Uruguay. Members of this year's team can communicate fluently in at least 12 different languages. The Church of Jesus Christ operates more than 330 missions around the world with approximately 56,000 missionaries. There are four lettermen from last year's team who are currently serving missions, including Matt Bauman (Harrisburg, Pa.), R.J. Willing (Albuquerque, N.M.), Dennis Pitta (Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic) and Freshman All-American receiver Austin Collie (Buenos Aires, Argentina).

HARLINE EARNS NATIONAL TIGHT END WEEKLY HONOR

After totaling over 100 yards receiving in back-to-back games, and helping BYU to a come-from-behind win over New Mexico, BYU tight end Jonny Harline has been named the national John Mackey Tight End of the Week by the Nassau County Sports Commission. Harline grabbed a career-high 10 receptions and equaled a career-high 123 yards. A week earlier he had seven receptions for 123 yards against San Diego State. Harline is the first BYU tight end to record 246 yards over two games since Chris Smith totaled 284 yards over two games in 1990. Smith had 125 yards on eight receptions against Utah and eight receptions for 159 yards against Utah State. Gordon Hudson holds the tight end record for receiving yardage over a two-game stretch, posting 396 yards in two straight games during the 1981 season. He totaled 137 yards against Colorado State, followed by 259 yards against Hawaii the following week.

BIG-TIME SCORE

Matt Allen picked an opportune time to score his first career touchdown. With the Cougars down 24-19 late in the fourth quarter against New Mexico, Allen took a pass from John Beck and ran it in from 23 yards out for the go-ahead score. Allen caught two passes for 40 yards in the game.

TOUCHDOWN DROUGHT ENDS

When Daniel Coats scored with 10:27 left in the first quarter against New Mexico on an 11-yard pass from John Beck, it was a reunion with the endzone more than two years in the making. The last time Coats scored a touchdown was September 20, 2003 against Stanford. The Cougars lost that game, 18-14, in Provo. He also added a score against Colorado State on a two-yard reception in the second quarter.

ALL IN THE FAMILY

When Zac Collie caught a seven-yard touchdown pass from John Beck on BYU's first drive against TCU, it was the 13th touchdown scored by the Collie family for the Cougars. Zac's father, Scott Collie, scored four TD's when he played for the Cougars from 1979-82 and his brother Austin scored eight as a freshman in 2004. Zac added the 14th for the family later in the first quarter on a 37-yard reception from Beck to put BYU up 21-10. It was the second two-game touchdown for a member of the Collie family. Austin scored two against San Diego State in 2004.

SETTING RECORDS

Beck's 41 completions on 60 attempts against the Boston College Eagles, Sept. 3, was a career high for the junior quarterback. It was also a LaVell Edwards Stadium record and a Mountain West Conference record. He set the MWC and Edwards Stadium records for attempts when he threw 67 passes against UNLV in 2004.

YOUNG GUN

While Mendenhall has 16 years of assistant coaching experience, he is now a head coach for the first time in his career. Despite his extensive experience, he is the fourth youngest coach in NCAA Division I-A football at the age of 39. Mike Gundy of Oklahoma State is 38 and is one year, five months and 22 days younger than Mendenhall.

IT'S AUTOMATIC ... ALMOST

BYU, known traditionally for its high-octane offenses, rarely gets shutout. Until the Cougar's 3-0 loss to the University of Utah to end the 2003 season, BYU had scored in 361-consecutive games, which remains an NCAA record, dating back to the 1975 season. The Cougars started a new streak in 2004, scoring in every game and extending the streak to 17 games against Colorado State, Oct. 15, 2005. Since October 3, 1975, BYU has scored in 378-of-379 games. MWC PLAYER OF THE WEEK (Sept. 25)

John Beck was named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week after posting a MWC record 517 yards passing in BYU's 51-50 loss to TCU. He completed 30-of-51 (.588) attempts, and became just the third player in league history to pass for over 500 yards in a game. Beck also tied a MWC single-game record with five touchdown passes. His third-quarter strike found wide receiver Todd Watkins for a 67-yard touchdown, marking the Cougars' longest score of the season. On the first play of the overtime period, Beck went to the corner of the end zone to find Watkins for the 25-yard touchdown, giving BYU a 50-44 lead in overtime.

MWC PLAYER OF THE WEEK (Oct. 8)

John Beck was named the MWC Player of the Week after completing 34-of-44 passes (77.3 percent) for 371 yards and three touchdowns in BYU's come-from-behind 27-24 victory at New Mexico. Trailing 24-13 with over seven minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, Beck put together two different scoring drives that led to 14 unanswered points. The comeback started on a 13-play, 93-yard drive that cut the Lobo lead to 24-19. During the drive, Beck was 8-of-10 for 94 yards. With the Cougars still down by five points with 2:48 remaining in the game, Beck drove BYU 80 yards in five plays, connecting on five straight pass attempts, including a 23-yard pass to Matt Allen for the game-winning touchdown. This marks his second player of the week award this season and the third of his career.

TRAILING AT THE HALF

Including the 2004 season and the game at New Mexico, the Cougars have trailed at the half in nine-of-the last-16 games. With the 27-24 win over the Lobos, BYU's record is 2-7 in those nine games. The Cougars trailed 21-13 at the half against New Mexico but BYU outscored the Lobos 14-3 in the second half to earn the win. It was the Cougars' first win after being down at the half since defeating Air Force 41-24 on October 23, 2004. BYU trailed 10-3 at the break against the Falcons.
