TRAVELING TO TULSA

Coming off a tough loss at No. 13 UCLA, the Cougars will travel to the state of Oklahoma for a matchup against former WAC foe Tulsa. Game time is scheduled for 8 p.m. (CDT) from Skelly Field at H.A. Chapman Stadium and will be broadcast nationally on CSTV. The game will mark the second of two straight road games for BYU while Tulsa had last weekend off after a 35-17 win over Louisiana-Monroe to start the season. The Cougars are 6-0 all-time against the Golden Hurricane, including a 2-0 mark in Tulsa.

THE BYU-TULSA SERIES



For the second year in a row BYU will play Tulsa, an old WAC foe. The Cougars hold an all-time record of 6-0 against the Golden Hurricane, most recently taking a 49-24 victory at LaVell Edwards Stadium in 2006. Tulsa finished the 2006 season with an 8-5 overall record, including a trip to the Armed Forces Bowl. The bowl game marked Tulsa's third post-season appearance over the past four seasons. Saturday's game will mark the first time BYU has played in Tulsa since 1996. The Cougars won that game, 55-30, en route to a 14-1 season. BYU first played at Tulsa in 1971, beating the Golden Hurricane, 25-7. The Cougars also beat Tulsa in 1984, 38-15. The two teams played three straight years (1995, 1996 and 1997). The two team met last season in Provo for the first time since 1997. The Cougars prevailed, 49-24, in a game that was delayed in the second half due to hurricane-like conditions.

ON THE TUBE



Saturday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on College Sports Television (CSTV). Tom Hart will call the action and Trev Alberts will lend analysis. Hart graduated from the University of Missouri after playing a season of football at Quincy (Ill) University. His television play-by-play experience includes national coverage of the Conference USA Football Game of the Week, men's and women's basketball, and baseball for CSTV. Alberts is a former consensus All-American linebacker from the University of Nebraska. A 1993 Dick Butkus Award winner, Alberts was drafted with the fifth overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts in 1994. Alberts went on to play three seasons in the NFL before retiring in 1997. After his retirement from the NFL, Alberts spent five years working for CNN/SI and Sports Illustrated as a college football analyst. From 2002-05, Alberts was a college football analyst for ESPN's College GameDay Scoreboard and College GameDay Final.

LAST GAME RECAP

Despite racking up 435 yards of total offense, including 391 yards passing, BYU saw its 11-game winning streak come to an end, as No. 11 UCLA beat the Cougars 27-17 in front of 72,986 fans at the Rose Bowl. The Cougars held the Bruins to just 236 total yards but fell short in their bid to upset UCLA at its home field. BYU sophomore quarterback Max Hall threw 30-of-53 attempts for 391 yards and two touchdowns, while a stifling defense held UCLA junior quarterback Ben Olson to just 126 passing yards.

SERIES INFORMATION

Saturday's game will mark the seventh meeting between BYU and Tulsa, dating back to the 1971 season. BYU owns a 6-0 advantage over its former WAC foe, including a 49-24 win last season in Provo. Following are brief highlights of each BYU/Tulsa game:

Oct. 23, 1971 -- BYU 25, Tulsa 7 at Skelly Stadium in Tulsa, Okla.

Trailing 6-7 at the half, BYU scored 19 second half points to secure the victory in the first matchup between the two teams.

Sept. 15, 1984 -- Tulsa 15, BYU 38 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah

Robbie Bosco had 314 yards passing, as four different Cougars found the end zone.

Nov. 4, 1995 -- Tulsa 35, BYU 45 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah

BYU senior FB Hema Heimuli gained 93 yards on 14 carries and scored two rushing touchdowns.

Oct. 19, 1996 -- BYU 55, UCLA 30 at Skelly Stadium in Tulsa, Okla.

Senior QB Steve Sarkisian threw five touchdown passes and junior RB Brian McKenzie rushed for 132 yards.

Nov. 8, 1997 -- Tulsa 39, BYU 49 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah

Kevin Feterik tossed four touchdown passes and racked up 246 passing yards, while Brian McKenzie gained 187 yards on the ground and rushed for two touchdowns.

Sept. 9, 2006 -- Tulsa 24, BYU 49 at Edwards Stadium in Provo, Utah

Senior RB Curtis Brown ran for 125 yards and had 82 yards receiving, including a 62-yard touchdown run.

ROAD WARRIORS

Saturday's game at Tulsa will mark the fourth time during the Bronco Mendenhall era the Cougars have had back-to-back road games during the regular season. In 2005, BYU played at San Diego State and at New Mexico in back-to-back weeks and at UNLV and Wyoming. Last season, the Cougars played at Air Force, followed by a game at Colorado State the following week. The Cougars are a perfect 3-0 in the second of two-straight road games.

OFF TO A QUICK START

For the first time since the 2004 season when BYU edged Notre Dame, 20-17, at LaVell Edwards Stadium, the Cougars won its season opener, 20-7, against Arizona. The Cougars lost at home to Boston College to start the 2005 campaign before dropping a 16-13 decision to Arizona on a last-second field goal to start the 2006 season. BYU won four straight season-openers from 2001-2004. Overall, the Cougars have won five of their last six home-openers.

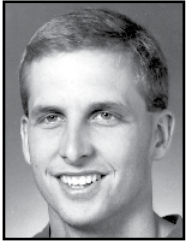

RETIRING No. 14



Two of college football's all-time greatest quarterbacks, Gifford Nielsen and Ty Detmer, will be honored together on Saturday, Sept. 1 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The No. 14 jersey, worn by both Nielsen and Detmer, will be retired during halftime of the Cougars' season-opener against Arizona.

Throughout the history of BYU football, dating back to 1922, only three jerseys have ever been retired. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie's No. 40 jersey, along with Marion Probert's No. 81 jersey and Steve Young's No. 8 jersey all hang from the pressbox at Edwards Stadium.

Nielsen, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, passed for over 5,800 yards and collected 55 touchdowns throughout his career. Earning All-America honors in 1976, Nielsen led the NCAA in touchdown completions, ranked second in total offense and helped the Cougars to their first-ever national ranking. After what appeared to be a career-ending injury during his senior season, Nielsen went on to play six years for the Houston Oilers and remains the last quarterback to lead the team to the AFC finals. Nielsen and his wife, Wendy, are the parents of six children and reside in Houston.

Detmer, the winner of the 1990 Heisman Trophy, set nearly every passing record ever imagined during his time in Provo. A two-time Davey O'Brien Award winner, Detmer set 62 records during his career at BYU, including the NCAA record for career passing yards with 15,031. He was a consensus All-American in 1990 as the nation's leading passer and earned his second consensus All-American title in 1991 after leading the nation in total offense. He still holds the NCAA record for career touchdown completions with 121. Detmer played 14 seasons in the NFL and currently resides with his wife, Kim, and four daughters in Austin, Texas.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME



Currently BYU has four former players and a head coach enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Ind. Legendary coach LaVell Edwards was inducted in 2004 after serving 29 seasons as head coach, posting an amazing record of 257-101-3. Steve Young was inducted in 2001 with Jim McMahon, Marc Wilson and Gifford Neilsen earning Hall of Fame status in 1998, 1996 and 1994, respectively. With a long

history of successful quarterbacks making their way to the College Football Hall of Fame, it seems only a matter of time before Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer receives an invitation to South Bend. BYU has produced more than just top-ranked quarterbacks over the years. Defensive lineman Jason Buck, offensive lineman Mo Elewonibi, offensive lineman Nick Eyre, running back Eldon Fortie, defensive back Kyle Morrell, punter Pat Thompson and tight ends Chris Smith and Gordon Hudson are also candidates for the Hall of Fame.

FOLLOWING A BOWL VICTORY...

In seasons following a BYU bowl victory, the Cougars have compiled a combined record of 66-21 (.758), averaging 9.4 wins per season. Of BYU's seven previous post-bowl victory teams, all but two teams have returned to a bowl game the following season.

NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS



TULSA - The following week, Sept. 15, the Cougars will travel to former WAC foe Tulsa. EASTERN WASHINGTON - After three straight MWConference games, the Cougars will wrap up non-conference play when they play host to Eastern Washington. SEASON-OPENERS

Since 1922, the Cougars have posted a 46-35-2 record in season-opening games, including a 20-7 victory over Arizona in the 2007 season-opening game.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME TO START THE SEASON

Dating back to the Cougars first season in 1922, BYU has posted a record of 29-11-1 when opening the season in Provo -- that's a winning percentage of 72 percent! In overall home-openers, the Cougars are 52-29-1 (64 percent) since 1922. Interestingly, BYU's longest home-opening win streak covers 10 seasons, dating from 1930 through 1939. Since 1998, the Cougars have posted a record of 8-2 (.777) in home-opening games.

HAVE BAGS; WILL TRAVEL

Interestingly, Hall of Fame Coach LaVell Edwards opened the season in Provo only nine times during his 29-year career. From 1978 to 1995, BYU opened the season on the road in 16 of 18 seasons. He was 5-4 in season-openers at Cougar Stadium.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are 28 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 12 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Bulgaria, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Madagascar, Mexico, Sweden and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions speak a total of seven different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, German, Japanese, Malagasy, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish.

RETURNED MISSIONARIES

Of the 105 players on the Fall Camp roster, over 70 have served a church missions. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 19 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, Samoa, Spain, Taiwan, United States, Uruguay and Venezuela. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 16 different states, including Alaska, California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Washington. Current members of the BYU football team who have previously served church missions speak a total of six different foreign languages, including Chinese, German, Japanese, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.



WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. Mormon missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world.

Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language.

Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea.

A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize.

Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.

“FAN”TASTIC FANS

Over 350,000 (363,146) fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2006 season, averaging 60,542 fans per game. BYU finished ranked fourth overall in the west behind USC (91,480), UCLA (64,955), California (64,318). BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU has led the MWC in home attendance in all eight years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds.

SEASON TICKET HOLDERS ARE FULLY INVESTED

BYU has sold over 53,500 season tickets for the 2007 season -- that's an increase of 7,900 over last year's total of 45,600. Interestingly, nearly 84 percent of the Edwards Stadium capacity will be occupied by season-ticket holders.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats.

BEST HOME TEAM IN THE COUNTRY — PERIOD.

The Cougars finished the 2006 regular season as the most dominant home team in the nation. In posting a perfect 6-0 record in Edwards Stadium, BYU defeated its opponents by an average 35.2 points per game. LSU finished second in home scoring margin, averaging a 31.2-point margin in 2006.

SCORING DOMINANCE

Not only did BYU lead the nation in home scoring margin in 2006, the Cougars also led the nation in overall scoring margin, defeating opponents by an average 22.1 points per game.

HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

Last season, BYU averaged 47.16 points per game at home while limiting its opponents to just 12. The margin of difference had the Cougars beating their opponents by an average of 35.16 points. The differential is an all-time BYU record.

HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



Bronco Mendenhall enters his third season as head coach at BYU. In his first season (2005), Mendenhall took a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and compiled a 6-5 regular-season record, a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference standings and earned a trip to a bowl game for the first time in three seasons.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted a 10-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC—this time, as conference champions.

Along the way, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.54 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.46 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.7 points per game. The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging 1.08 turnovers per game. BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.69 points per game -- the lowest per-game average for the Cougars since the 1985 season.

BYU outscored its opponents during the season by an average 36.7 to 14.69 (+22.01). More impressively, the Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo last season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006. Not only did BYU win each of its home games, it did so in record fashion. Not only did the 2006 Cougars finish the season as the most dominate team in the nation, but also they finished as the most dominate home team in BYU Football history. BYU averaged 47.2 points per game at LaVell Edwards Stadium while holding opponents to just 12.0 points per contest. The +35.16 margin not only led the nation in home scoring margin, but also set a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979. LSU finished the season behind the Cougars in 2006, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin.

In his first season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing.

During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the

secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons.



BYU WELCOMES MARK WEBER TO ITS STAFF



During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Mark Weber (last name is pronounced WEB-er) has been selected to coach the Cougars' offensive line.

"When rumors started circulating about an opening at BYU, I was immediately interested," Weber said. "We weren't going to take just any job. We were looking for a good program, a great community and an opportunity to work with great people. This is a great job--a great opportunity."

During his coaching career, including stops at Fresno State, UCLA, UNLV, Nevada and Oregon State, Weber has mentored several All-America, all-conference and NFL-caliber players. At Fresno State, Weber coached offensive tackle Logan Mankins, who earned All-America honors and was a first-round draft pick for the New England Patriots. Mankins went on to start all 16 games as a rookie for the Patriots. In 2002, all five offensive line starters earned post-season honors for UCLA. Offensive tackle Mike Saffer earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors, as well as second- and third-team All-America honors. In his second year with the Bruins, Weber coached Outland Trophy winner and first-team All-American Kris Farris. In 1997, Chad Overhauser, earned first-team All-America honors for the Bruins.

Collectively, the group has racked up 91 games of experience, including Kehl who has played in 35 career games and Allen who has played in 31. Aulai started and played in 12 games during the 2006 season, while Poppinga saw action in all 13 games for the Cougars last season.

Aulai is a 2006 Mountain West Conference second-team performer and has been tapped as an honors candidate for the 2007 season. Kehl is also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer. He ranked third on the BYU roster last season with 70 tackles, including eight tackles for a combined loss of 33 yards. Poppinga, also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer and recent BYU graduate, totaled 36 tackles during his junior season, posting two sacks and two interceptions.

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

Matt Allen-WR

Allen returns as a leader of the outside receivers. The only senior with significant playing time in the deep unit, Allen returns after a stellar junior season. As a junior, Allen caught 27 passes (tops among all returners for BYU this year) for 420 yards and three touchdowns.

Austin Collie-WR

After returning from a mission in January, Collie will look to contribute similar numbers as those when he was a Freshman All-American in 2004. In the '04 season, Collie led BYU in receptions (58) and receiving touchdowns (8). Collie showed flashes of brilliance in spring football.

Dennis Pitta-TE

Like Collie, Pitta has also returned from a church mission during the offseason. Pitta also logged significant playing time as a true freshman in 2004. Pitta led all tight ends in receptions with 17 grabs while scoring two touchdowns.

Kelly Poppinga-LB

After a successful 2006 at outside linebacker, Poppinga will move to the middle to replace three-year starter and team captain Cameron Jensen. Last season, Poppinga played in all 13 games recording 36 tackles, two sacks, 3.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions.

Michael Reed-WR

Another experienced outside receiver, Reed returns to the Cougars for his junior season after logging significant playing time as a freshman and sophomore. Reed had 25 catches for 339 yards and three touchdowns a year ago.

Vic So'oto-TE

Coming off a redshirt year following an injury, So'oto will be part of a three-headed monster at tight end that will replace outgoing seniors Daniel Coats and Jonny Harline. So'oto, who played in 11 games as a true freshman in 2005, was a highly touted recruit coming out of high school.

Harvey Unga-RB

After missing the majority of the 2006 season with an injury, redshirt freshman Harvey Unga is expected to make a large and immediate contribution to the BYU offense. A large, yet quick runner, Unga has the ability to step in and make an immediate impact. Many believe Unga was the "surprise" of Fall Camp.

Max Hall-QB

Named the starter after spring practice heading into summer workouts, Hall has three years of eligibility left. The Arizona State transfer sat out last season due to transfer years. It was still a productive season for Hall as he had success quarterbacking the 2006 offensive scout team against a BYU defense that ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense.

Interestingly, in Hall's first shot at the Blue/White Game, he put up more impressive numbers than 2006 MWC Player of the Year John Beck did in any of his spring games. Hall completed 15-of-19 passes (.789 completion percentage) for 139 yards. Though used in a limited roll in 2006 spring game (2-of-5 passing, sacked twice), Beck completed 15-of-24 passes (.625) for 116 yards as a junior in 2005. Each was intercepted once.

ACTIVE WINNING STREAKS SNAPPED

College football's two longest active winning streaks were snapped on Saturday as Boise State fell to Washington, 10-24, and BYU lost to UCLA, 17-27. Boise State had won 14 straight prior to Saturday, and BYU's 11-game winning streak was its longest since the 2001 season. No. 5 Wisconsin now owns the NCAA's longest current winning streak at 11 games after toppling UNLV, 20-13 over the weekend.

UNDEFEATED AT HOME

BYU finished the 2006 season with a perfect 6-0 record at home. The last time BYU had a perfect record at home was 2001 when the Cougars went 6-0 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. Since the stadium was built in 1964, BYU has gone undefeated at home 13 times:

SELLOUT

The Cougars saw a capacity crowd (64,045) for the season-opener against Arizona. The game marked the first home-opening sellout since the 2004 season when the Cougars opened in Provo against Notre Dame. Prior to the 2007 season-opener, BYU had had 10 opening-day sell-outs, dating back to 1982 -- the first year of the expanded stadium. Last week's game also marked the first opening-day sell out during the Bronco Mendenhall era. It was also the first sell out since November 19, 2005 when the Cougars played host to Utah. Since 1985, the Cougars are 8-3 (.727) when playing in Provo for the home-opener in front of a sold-out stadium.

FOOL ME ONCE ...

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 5-1 in games following a loss during the regular season. The Cougars' only loss following a loss came on October 1 when BYU dropped a 31-10 decision at San Diego State following a 51-50 overtime loss against TCU.

DOUBLE JEOPARDY

Saturday's game at Tulsa will mark the fourth time in the Bronco Mendenhall era the Cougars have played back-to-back road games. Interestingly, regardless of the outcome of the first road game, BYU is a perfect 3-0 when playing the second of two straight road games.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 17-3 when leading at halftime and 16-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

SLOW START

UCLA took a 3-0 lead with 3:39 left in the first quarter when the Bruins connected on a 37-yard field goal. It marked the first time since September 2, 2006 that BYU failed to score first in a game, ending a streak of 12 straight games.

A WORD ABOUT COLLIE

Sophomore receiver Austin Collie scored his first touchdown of the season with 8:19 remaining in the third quarter, cutting the UCLA lead to 20-10. The touchdown marked Collie's first since the 2004 season. Collie did not play in 2005 or 2006, serving a Church mission in Brazil. Collie scored again with 6:04 left in the third quarter to cut the Bruins' lead to just 20-17. Collie, a freshman All-American in 2004, caught seven balls for a game-high 79 yards and two touchdowns.

CALLING ALL TIGHT ENDS

BYU quarterback Max Hall completed nine passes to three different tight ends for a combined total of 147 yards. The BYU tight ends accounted for nearly 40 percent of the Cougars' passing offense. Sophomore Dennis Pitta had five receptions for 66 yards, Andrew George hauled in three receptions for 62 yards and Vic So'oto had one reception for 19 yards.

A 20-POINT DEFICIT

The Bruins held a 20-0 lead late in the second quarter, marking the largest deficit in a game the Cougars have faced since trailing in the third quarter against California, 35-14, in the 2005 Las Vegas Bowl. BYU mounted a come-back against the Golden Bears, but eventually lost the contest, 35-28. Interestingly, the Cougars mounted a comeback against UCLA, trailing 20-17 with just over a minute remaining in the game.

AVOIDING A FIRST HALF SHUTOUT

The Cougars scored with five seconds left in the first half at UCLA to avoid the first halftime shutout since trailing Boston College, 10-0, in the opening half on September 3, 2005. Mitch Payne connected on a 27-yard field goal to cut the Bruins' lead to 20-3.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

The Cougars currently have the 8th longest streak in the nation of consecutive games without returning a kickoff for a touchdown. BYU has been unable to accomplish the feat in 107 straight games.

A LITTLE YELLOW

A total of 12 penalties were called in the season opener against Arizona. Against UCLA, a total of 11 penalties were called against BYU alone. Interestingly, UCLA was only flagged a total of four times.

TURNOVER TROUBLES

The Cougars allowed 10 points on two different turnovers in the first half to give the Bruins a 20-3 halftime lead. Trey Brown had a 56-yard interception return for a touchdown while, the Bruins also took advantage of a BYU fumble to pick up a 40-yard field goal with 3:28 left in the second quarter.

UNCOMMON FIRST QUARTER

Trailing 10-0 at the end of the first 15 minutes of Saturday's game at UCLA marked the first time the Cougars have trailed after the first quarter of play since trailing Air Force last season (October 28, 2007), 14-0. BYU came from behind to score 33 points over the next three quarters to defeat the Falcons in Colorado Springs. Over the final three quarters at UCLA, the Cougars tied the Bruins, 17-17.

PICK 6

With just under two minutes remaining in the first quarter, UCLA's Trey Brown intercepted Max Hall and returned it 56 yards for a touchdown. The play marked the first interception returned for a touchdown against BYU since New Mexico returned a John Beck interception 88 yards for a touchdown on November 18, 2006.

THIRD DOWN NOTES

The Cougars started the game failing to convert their first six third-down attempts. BYU was 0-for-4 on third-down attempts in the first quarter and 1-for-4 in the second quarter. In the second half, BYU seemed to gain momentum after picking up critical third-down conversions. The Cougars converted 2-of-3 attempts in the third quarter and 3-of-5 in the fourth quarter. All totaled, the Cougars converted 6-of-16 third-down attempts and held the Bruins to just 2-of-12 third down attempts.

IT'S THE FINAL SCORE THAT MATTERS

When reviewing the final stat sheet from Saturday's game, BYU held the advantage in several statistical categories; except the only one that mattered -- the scoreboard. The Cougars had 23 first downs to UCLA's 15 ... 21 passing first downs to UCLA's 7 ... 391 yards passing to the Bruins' 126 ... 435 yards of total offense to UCLA's 236; ... 78 offensive plays to the Bruins' 65 ... averaged 5.6 yards per play to the Bruins' 3.6 ... and in time of possession, the Cougars controlled the clock for 31:49 compared to the Bruins' 28:11.

A FEW POINTS TO CONSIDER

UCLA scored 27 points against the Cougars, including 10 points from turnovers. Interestingly, the difference in the game was just 10 points. The Bruins' 27 points marked the most points BYU has allowed since giving up 31 against Utah last season. All totaled, the Cougars have allowed 27 or more points in just two games over the past 15 games.

FIRST-EVER LOSS ON SEPTEMBER 8

Since the first official year of football at BYU in 1922, the Cougars have played on September 8 six different times, including Saturday's game at UCLA. The Cougars entered Saturday's game having won all five previous games on Sept. 8, including wins over Texas, Texas A&M, Baylor, Miami (Fla.) and California.

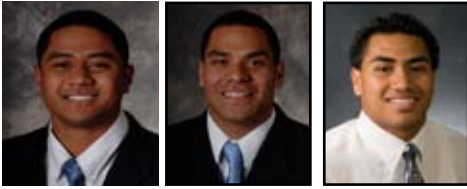
FLAG BEARERS

DEBUT OF THE TONGAN TRIO



Saturday's game at UCLA was the debut of the Tongan Trio, featuring running backs Manase Tonga, Fui Vakapuna and Harvey Unga. While Tonga did not play against Arizona, serving a one-game suspension for violation of team rules, Vakapuna and Unga combined for 230 of the Cougars' 392 total yards in the 20-7 victory over Arizona. The Tongan Trio boasts an all-around game, providing speed, quickness, athleticism, agility and power to the high-powered BYU offense.

ON THE ROAD vs. RANKED OPPONENTS

The Cougars' 17-27 loss to No. 11 UCLA last Saturday marked the first road game against a ranked opponent since BYU knocked off No. 15 TCU in Fort Worth last season, 31-17. The victory over the Horned Frogs gave BYU its first win over a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on September 20, 1997. BYU is now 1-13 in games against ranked opponents, dating back to the 1999 season.

UNGA NAMED MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK



Running back Harvey Unga was 2007's inaugural Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week for after leading the Cougars to a 20-7 season-opening victory over Arizona.

Unga, a freshman from Provo, Utah, racked up a game-high 194 all-purpose yards, including a game-best 67 yards rushing and 127 yards receiving. Unga was also credited with two touchdowns, including a 27-yard pass and run with 6:02 left in

the first quarter that gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead, and an 11-yard run in the fourth quarter that extended BYU's lead to 20-0.

Prior to Arizona's final drive of the game, Unga had totaled more offensive yards than the entire Arizona offense combined. For the game, Unga averaged 4.5 yards per carry and averaged over 14 yards per reception.

Unga's offensive total against the Wildcats marked the top performance by a freshman running back in the country.

MISSIONARY REUNION

Saturday's game will be a homecoming of sorts for BYU offensive coordinator Rob Anae, who served an LDS Church mission to Tulsa, Oklahoma.

YOU NEED A HALL PASS



BYU quarterback Max Hall made his Division-I debut against Arizona, marking his first action in over four years. The native of Mesa, Ariz., led the Cougars to a decisive 20-7 victory over the Wildcats. Hall completed 26-of-39 attempts for 288 yards and two touchdowns. Hall did not have any interceptions and was only sacked one time. Among members of BYU's Quarterback Factory, Hall's completion percentage in his first career start ranks second behind only Ty Detmer who completed 68.6 percent of his attempts in his first career start. Hall completed 26 passes in his first career start, marking the most completions of any of the members of BYU's Quarterback Factory.

In only his second career game, Hall completed 30-of-51 (.588) attempts for 391 yards and two touchdowns against No. 13 UCLA. The game marked the first 300-yard game of his career at BYU. Over the first two games, Hall is averaging 339.5 yards passing per contest and has a total of four touchdown completions.
