PAC-10, WE MEET AGAIN

BYU looks to extend its winning streak against the PAC-10 to three games when it travels to Pasadena to take on No. 13 UCLA. In their last two games, the Cougars have defeated Oregon, 38-8, in the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl and Arizona, 20-7, to open the 2007 season. A lopsided series, BYU will be aiming for just their second win against the Bruins since the two teams first played at the Rose Bowl in 1983. Saturday's game will mark the first time the two teams have met in 12 years.

THE BYU-UCLA SERIES



The two teams first met in 1983 at the Rose Bowl with the Cougars coming away with a 37-35 victory. That was the last and only time BYU beat the Bruins. Saturday's contest will mark the eighth meeting between the two teams. UCLA owns a 6-1 record in the series, including six consecutive wins dating back to 1985. The Bruins' have beaten the Cougars by an average margin of 15.5 points in their six wins. Saturday's game will mark the first time the two teams have

played in Pasadena since the 1997 season, when UCLA walloped BYU 68-14. UCLA holds a 2-1 record over BYU in Pasadena, while the Cougars have gone 0-3 against the Bruins in games played in Provo. In 1986, UCLA posted a 31-10 win over BYU in the Freedom Bowl at Anaheim.

ON THE TUBE



Saturday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on VERSUS. Ted Robinson will call the action, Kelly Stouffer will lend analysis and Lewis Johnson will report from the sidelines. Robinson is the lead announcer of NBC's coverage of the French Open and Wimbledon. He is currently the radio play-by-play announcer for Stanford football and several men's basketball games. Robinson also worked as a radio and TV

announcer for the San Francisco Giants for nine seasons, as the TV play-by-play announcer for the Minnesota Twins for six seasons, and as a TV and radio announcer for the New York Mets for four seasons. Stouffer is an NFL alumnus who spent his four-year professional career with the Seattle Seahawks. He is currently the color analyst for Minnesota Vikings pre-season games and for ESPN college football games. Additionally, Stouffer went 1-2 against BYU during his tenure as QB for the Colorado State Rams, suffering a 52-9 loss and a 42-7 defeat at the hands of the Cougars. Johnson, a former all-American middle-distance runner at the University of Cincinnati, is currently a reporter for NBC sports and for Notre Dame football home games. In 2001 and 2002 he served as a reporter for the NBA Finals on NBC and for the network's Arena Football telecasts from 2003 through 2006.

BYU vs. THE PAC-10

Over the years, BYU has played at least two games against each member of the Pac-10. The Cougars have posted an overall record of 29-55-1 against Pac-10 competition. For the fifth time since 1999, BYU will play at least two teams from the Pac-10 during the season. Of the 10 members of the Pac-10, BYU owns a winning record against California (2-1), Washington State (2-1) and has a 3-3 record against Oregon. Of all the teams in the Pac-10, the Cougars have more wins (9) against Arizona than any other team.

2007 BROADCAST PLANS

For the second straight season, the Cougars have game times and television programming plans completed for each of their 12 games well before the start of the season. Each of BYU's first three games will be televised nationally, including a season-opening rematch Sept. 1 against Arizona (VERSUS), a Sept. 8 trip to UCLA (VERSUS) and a Sept. 15 trip to Tulsa (CSTV). The Cougars will play a total of six nationally televised games with the annual rivalry game against Utah being simulcast on CSTV, VERSUS and The mtn.

SERIES INFORMATION

Saturday's game will mark the eight meeting between BYU and UCLA, dating back to the 1983 season. UCLA owns a 6-1 advantge over BYU, including a 23-9 win in the last match up in 1995. The following are brief highlights of each BYU/UCLA game:

Oct. 1, 1983 -- BYU 37, UCLA 35 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Steve Young threw 25-36 for 270 yards and two touchdowns.

Sep. 7, 1985 -- UCLA 27, BYU 24 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah BYU failed to hold on to a 3-point halftime lead, allowing 11 fourth quarter points.

Dec. 30, 1986 -- UCLA 31, BYU 10 at Anaheim Stadium in Anaheim, Calif. The Bruins won their second straight game over the Cougars in the two teams' first Freedom Bowl appearances.

Sep. 7, 1991 -- BYU 23, UCLA 27 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. UCLA TB Kevin Williams rushed for 132 yards on 13 carries, including the gamewinning touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Sep. 19, 1992 -- UCLA 17, BYU 10 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah Daron Washington, another Bruin TB, scored two rushing touchdowns in this narrow UCLA win.

Oct. 9, 1993 -- BYU 14, UCLA 68 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Bruins Derek Ayers (174 yards) and James Milliner (113 yards) rushed for a combined 287 yards, while the UCLA defense had 11 sacks on the day.

Sep. 9, 1995 -- UCLA 23, BYU 9 at Cougar Stadium in Provo, Utah BYU QB Steve Sarkisian's 305 passing yards were not enough to overcome a 17point UCLA third quarter outburt that put the game away.

OFF TO A OUICK START

For the first time since the 2004 season when BYU edged Notre Dame, 20-17, at LaVell Edwards Stadium, the Cougars won its season opener last week, 20-7, against Arizona. The Cougars lost at home to Boston College to start the 2005 campaign before dropping a 16-13 decision to Arizona on a last-second field goal to start the 2006 season. BYU won four straight season-openers from 2001-2004. Overall, the Cougars have won five of their last six home-openers.

POOR HOSTS

The Cougars will have their work cut out for them when they enter the Rose Bowl on Saturday. Over the last five years, UCLA posts the 20th best home record in the nation. With a mark of 20-5, the Bruins have won a stingy 80 percent of their games in Pasadena since the start of the 2003 season.

RETIRING No. 14



Two of college football's all-time greatest quarterbacks, Gifford Nielsen and Ty Detmer, will be honored together on Saturday, Sept. 1 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The No. 14 jersey, worn by both Nielsen and Detmer, will be retired during halftime of the Cougars' season-opener against Arizona.

Throughout the history of BYU football, dating back to 1922, only three jerseys have ever been retired. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie's No. 40 jersey, along with Marion Probert's No. 81 jersey and Steve Young's No. 8 jersey all hang from the pressbox at Edwards Stadium.

Nielsen, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, passed for over 5,800 yards and collected 55 touchdowns throughout his career. Earning All-America honors in 1976, Nielsen led the NCAA in touchdown completions, ranked second in total offense and helped the Cougars to their first-ever national ranking. After what appeared to be a careerending injury during his senior season, Nielsen went on to play six years for the Houston Oilers and remains the last quarterback to lead the team to the AFC finals. Nielsen and his wife, Wendy, are the parents of six children and reside in Houston.

Detmer, the winner of the 1990 Heisman Trophy, set nearly every passing record ever imagined during his time in Provo. A two-time Davey O'Brien Award winner, Detmer set 62 records during his career at BYU, including the NCAA record for career passing yards with 15,031. He was a consensus All-American in 1990 as the nation's leading passer and earned his second consensus All-American title in 1991 after leading the nation in total offense. He still holds the NCAA record for career touchdown completions with 121. Detmer played 14 seasons in the NFL and currently resides with his wife, Kim, and four daughters in Austin, Texas.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME



Currently BYU has four former players and a head coach enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Ind. Legendary coach LaVell Edwards was inducted in 2004 after serving 29 seasons as head coach, posting an amazing record of 257-101-3. Steve Young was inducted in 2001 with Jim McMahon, Marc Wilson and Gifford Neilsen earning Hall of Fame status in 1998, 1996 and 1994, respectively. With a long

history of successful quarterbacks making their way to the College Football Hall of Fame, it seems only a matter of time before Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer receives an invitation to South Bend. BYU has produced more than just top-ranked quarterbacks over the years. Defensive lineman Jason Buck, offensive lineman Mo Elewonibi, offensive lineman Nick Eyre, running back Eldon Fortie, defensive back Kyle Morrell, punter Pat Thompson and tight ends Chris Smith and Gordon Hudson are also candidates for the Hall of Fame.

FOLLOWING A BOWL VICTORY...

In seasons following a BYU bowl victory, the Cougars have compiled a combined record of 66-21 (.758), averaging 9.4 wins per season. Of BYU's seven previous post-bowl victory teams, all but two teams have returned to a bowl game the following season.

END A SEASON; START THE NEXT VS. PAC-10

For the second straight season, BYU began its season against a Pac-10 opponent after finishing the previous season against a Pac-10 foe in a bowl game. In 2005, the Cougars fell to California, 35-28, in the Las Vegas Bowl. Eight months later, BYU started its 2006 season with a 16-13 defeat at Arizona. The Cougars finished the 2006 campaign with a 38-8 drubbing of Oregon in the Las Vegas Bowl and will now face Arizona in their opening game of 2007 on Sept. 1. Prior to the 2005-2006 seasons, the Cougars had never finished one season and started another against Pac-10 opponents. Since 1978, the first year of the expanded Pac-10, BYU holds a 2-2 record in season-openers against Pac-10 opponents. Interestingly, the Cougars also hold a 2-2 record in bowl games facing Pac-10 teams.

OTHER NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS



TULSA - The following week, Sept. 15, the Cougars will travel to former WAC foe Tulsa. The Golden Hurricane finished the 2006 season with an 8-5 overall record, including a trip to the Armed Forces Bowl. The bowl game marked Tulsa's third post-season appearance over the past four seasons. The Cougars are 6-0 against the Golden

Hurricane, dating back to the 1971 season.



EASTERN WASHINGTON - After three straight MWConference games, the Cougars will wrap up non-conference play when they play host to Eastern Washington. It will be the first meeting between the two schools. The Cougars have never lost to a Division I-AA

opponent.

LAST GAME RECAP

The BYU defense held Arizona scoreless through 59 minutes in a 20-7 victory over the Wildcats to extend the nation's second longest active win streak to 11 straight games. Sophomore QB Max Hall went 26-39 for 288 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions.

The Cougars also saw a big performance from red-shirt freshman running back Harvey Unga. He led BYU in rushing (68 yards on 15 carries) and receiving with 127 yards on nine receptions. Unga also had two touchdowns, one through the air and one on the ground.

SEASON-OPENERS

Since 1922, the Cougars have posted a 46-35-2 record in season-opening games.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME TO START THE SEASON

Dating back to the Cougars first season in 1922, BYU has posted a record of 29-11-1 when opening the season in Provo -- that's a winning percentage of 72 percent! In overall home-openers, the Cougars are 52-29-1 (64 percent) since 1922. Interestingly, BYU's longest home-opening win streak is 10 seasons, dating from 1930 through 1939. Since 1998, the Cougars have posted a record of 8-2 (.777) in home-opening games.

HAVE BAGS; WILL TRAVEL

Interestingly, Hall of Fame Coach LaVell Edwards opened the season in Provo only nine times during his 29-year career. From 1978 to 1995, BYU opened the season on the road in 16 of 18 seasons. He was 5-4 in season-openers at Cougar Stadium.

COUGARS ON NATIONAL TELEVISION

Each of BYU's first three games will be broadcast nationally. The Cougars will have at least six nationally televised games (bowl game pending). The season opener



against Arizona was the first of two consecutive weeks that BYU will appear on VERSUS. The Cougars will play on CSTV at Tulsa Sep. 15. BYU will play three MWC opponents in front of a national audience: at New Mexico (Sep. 29, CSTV), TCU (Nov. 8, VERSUS) and Utah (Nov. 24, simulcast on CSTV and The mtn.)

CURRENTLY SERVING MISSIONS...

There are 28 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 12 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Bulgaria, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Madagascar, Mexico, Sweden and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions speak a total of seven different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, German, Japanese, Malagasy, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish.

SERVED MISSIONS...

Of the 105 players on the Fall Camp roster, 63 have served a church mission. (60 percent of the Fall Camp roster are returned missionaries.) Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 19 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, Samoa, Spain, Taiwan, United States, Uruguay and Venezuela. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 16 different states, including Alaska, California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Washington. Current members of the BYU football team who have previously served church missions speak a total of six different foreign languages, including Chinese, German, Japanese, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.

"FAN"TASTIC FANS

Over 350,000 (363,146) fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2006 season, averaging 60,542 fans per game. BYU finished ranked fourth overall in the west behind USC (91,480), UCLA (64,955), California (64,318). BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU has led the MWC in home attendance in all eight years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats. Record: 185-61 (.752)

The Cougars finished the 2006 regular season as the most dominant home team in the nation. LSU finished second behind the Cougars, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin

HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

Since it was built in 1964, the Cougars have fielded several dominating teams. Last season, BYU averaged 47.16 points per game at home while limiting its opponents to just 12. The margin of difference had the Cougars beating their opponents by an average of 35.16 points. The 35.16-point differential is a BYU record in scoring margin in the stadium's 42-year history (and the program's 84vear history):

HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



Bronco Mendenhall enters his third season as head coach at BYU. In his first season (2005), Mendenhall took a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and compiled a 6-5 regular-season record, a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference standings and earned a trip to a bowl game for the first time in three seasons.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted a 10-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Chamt & 0 meand the Studies of the Diseaser DureVi

pionship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC—this time, as conference champions.

Along the way, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.54 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.46 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.7 points per game. The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging 1.08 turnovers per game. BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.69 points per game -- the lowest per-game average for the Cougars since the 1985 season.

BYU outscored its opponents during the season by an average 36.7 to 14.69 (+22.01). More impressively, the Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo last season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006. Not only did BYU win each of its home games, it did so in record fashion. Not only did the 2006 Cougars finish the season as the most dominate team in the nation, but also they finished as the most dominate home team in BYU Football history. BYU averaged 47.2 points per game at LaVell Edwards Stadium while holding opponents to just 12.0 points per contest. The +35.16 margin not only led the nation in home scoring margin, but also set a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979. LSU finished the season behind the Cougars in 2006, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin.

In his first season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing.

During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as

the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons.

BYU WELCOMES MARK WEBER TO ITS STAFF



During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Mark Weber (last name is pronounced WEB-er) has been selected to coach the Cougars' offensive line.

"When rumors started circulating about an opening at BYU, I was immediately interested," Weber said. "We weren't going to take just any job. We were looking for a good program, a great community and an opportunity to work with great people. This is a great job--a great opportunity."

During his coaching career, including stops at Fresno State, UCLA, UNLV, Nevada and Oregon State, Weber has mentored several All-America, all-conference and NFL-caliber players. At Fresno State, Weber coached offensive tackle Logan Mankins, who earned All-America honors and was a first-round draft pick for the New England Patriots. Mankins went on to start all 16 games as a rookie for the Patriots. In 2002, all five offensive line starters earned post-season honors for UCLA. Offensive tackle Mike Saffer earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors, as well as second- and third-team All-America honors. In his second year with the Bruins, Weber coached Outland Trophy winner and first-team All-American Kris Farris. In 1997, Chad Overhauser, earned first-team All-America honors for the Bruins.

For the first time since 1997, BYU will kick off the season ranked among the nation's top-25 programs. According to *The Sporting News College Football Yearbook*, the Cougars will enter the 2007 campaign ranked 25th. In the preseason Associated Press Top-25 poll, the Cougars are ranked 37th, while BYU is ranked 34th in the USA Today Top-25. BYU finished the 2006 season ranked as high as No. 15 with an 11-2 record, including a 38-8 victory over Oregon in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl.

PLAYERS TO WATCH...

Matt Allen-WR

Allen returns as a leader of the outside receivers. The only senior with significant playing time in the deep unit, Allen returns after a stellar junior season. As a junior, Allen caught 27 passes (tops among all returners for BYU this year) for 420 yards and three touchdowns.

Austin Collie-WR

After returning from a mission in January, Collie will look to contribute similar numbers as those when he was a Freshman All-American in 2004. In the '04 season, Collie led BYU in receptions (58) and receiving touchdowns (8). Collie showed flashes of brilliance in spring football.

Dennis Pitta-TE

Like Collie, Pitta has also returned from a church mission during the offseason. Pitta also logged significant playing time as a true freshman in 2004. Pitta led all tight ends in receptions with 17 grabs while scoring two touchdowns.

Kelly Poppinga-LB

After a successful 2006 at outside linebacker, Poppinga will move to the middle to replace three-year starter and team captain Cameron Jensen. Last season, Poppinga played in all 13 games recording 36 tackles, two sacks, 3.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions.

Michael Reed-WR

Another experienced outside receiver, Reed returns to the Cougars for his junior season after logging significant playing time as a freshman and sophomore. Reed had 25 catches for 339 yards and three touchdowns a year ago.

Vic So'oto-TE

Coming off a redshirt year following an injury, So'oto will be part of a three-headed monster at tight end that will replace outgoing seniors Daniel Coats and Jonny Harline. So'oto, who played in 11 games as a true freshman in 2005, was a highly touted recruit coming out of high school.

Harvey Unga-RB

After missing the majority of the 2006 season with an injury, redshirt freshman Harvey Unga is expected to make a large and immediate contribution to the BYU offense. A large, yet quick runner, Unga has the ability to step in and make an immediate impact. Many believe Unga was the "surprise" of Fall Camp.

Max Hall-QB

Named the starter after spring practice heading into summer workouts, Hall has three years of eligibility left. The Arizona State transfer sat out last season due to transfer years. It was still a productive season for Hall as he had success quarterbacking the 2006 offensive scout team against a BYU defense that ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense.

Interestingly, in Hall's first shot at the Blue/White Game, he put up more impressive numbers than 2006 MWC Player of the Year John Beck did in any of his spring games. Hall completed 15-of-19 passes (.789 completion percentage) for 139 yards. Though used in a limited roll in 2006 spring game (2-of-5 passing, sacked twice), Beck completed 15-of-24 passes (.625) for 116 yards as a junior in 2005. Each was intercepted once.

ACTIVE WINNING STREAKS

Heading into the 2007 season, BYU owns the second longest winning streak among Division-IA teams. The Cougars have won 11 consecutive games, three behind Boise State's 14 consecutive victories. BYU's current 11-game winning streak is its longest since the 2001 season. The top, current winning streaks in the NCAA are as follows:

SELLOUT

The Cougars saw a capacity crowd (64,045) for the season-opener against Arizona. The game marked the first home-opening sellout since the 2004 season when the Cougars opened in Provo against Notre Dame. Prior to the 2007 seasonopener, BYU had had 10 opening-day sell-outs, dating back to 1982 -- the first year of the expanded stadium. Last week's game also marked the first openingday sell out during the Bronco Mendenhall era. It was also the first sell out since November 19, 2005 when the Cougars played host to Utah. Since 1985, the Cougars are 8-3 (.727) when playing in Provo for the home-opener in front of a sold-out stadium.

WIN STREAK CONTINUES

Last Saturday's victory marked the Cougars' seventh consecutive home victory and the team's 11th straight win overall. BYU has the nation's second longest winning streak behind Boise State's current run of 14 games.



NOT IN OUR HOUSE

BYU is just three home wins away from collecting its 10th straight home victory - a feat the Cougars accomplished from 2000 -02.

FIRST WIN

Saturday's 20-7 victory over Arizona marks the first season-opening victory for BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall. Mendenhall is now 1-2 in season-opening games.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 17-3 when leading at halftime and 16-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

FIRST BLOOD

Dating back to the 2006 season against Tulsa, the Cougars have scored first in 13 straight games. The last time an opponent scored first against BYU was September 2, 2006 when Arizona took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter in Tucson.

PITCHING A SHUTOUT

The BYU defense held Arizona scoreless through three quarters. In fact, Arizona did not score until there was less than one minute left in the game. The Cougars held their opponents to a total of 23 scoreless quarters in 2006, including three first half shutouts. Over the past two games, the Cougars have held two different Pac-10 opponents scoreless in six of eight quarters.

FIRST HALF DOMINANCE

Dating back to the 2006 season-opener, the Cougars have led at halftime in 14 consecutive games.

RUN, UNGA, RUN!

After scoring his second touchdown of the day last week, BYU freshman running back Harvey Unga had racked up combined total of 194 yards. As a team, Arizona had only 177 yards of total offense to that point. The Wildcats finished the game with 255 total yards after scoring a touchdown on its final drive of the game.

vs.THE PAC-10

In its last two games, the Cougars have kept each of their PAC-10 opponents under 10 points on its way to outscoring the two by a total of 58-15.

SINCE 1922 ...

Since the first official year of football at BYU (1922) the Cougars have posted a 46-35-2 record in season-opening games. Interestingly, BYU has posted a record of 29-11-1 when opening the season in Provo; that's a winning percentage of 72 percent.

FULL HOUSE

Attendance for Saturday's game was listed at 64,525, marking the first season-opening sellout since the 2004 season (vs. Notre Dame). Last week's game was the first sellout since November 19, 2005 (vs. Utah).

DEJA VU

For the second consecutive year, BYU's season-opening offensive drive resulted in a lost fumble. In 2006, tight end Jonny Harline turned the ball over on a reception. Today, quarterback Max Hall lost the ball after being sacked.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

The Cougars currently have the 8th longest streak in the nation of consecutive games without returning a kickoff for a touchdown. BYU has been unable to accomplish the feat in 106 straight games.

A LITTLE YELLOW

A total of 12 penalties were called in today's game. The first penalty was called at the 9:00 mark in the second quarter. The first penalty called against BYU occurred with 5:02 remaining in the first half. By contrast, last year's season-opener in Tucson featured 18 penalties including an offensive pass interference that nullified a potential game-winning touchdown for the Cougars.

Running back Harvey Unga has been named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week after leading the Cougars to a 20-7 season-opening victory over Arizona.

Unga, a freshman from Provo, Utah, racked up a game-high 194 all-purpose yards, including a game-best 67 yards rushing and 127 yards receiving. Unga was also credited with two touchdowns, including a 27-yard pass and run with 6:02 left in the first

quarter that gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead, and an 11-yard run in the fourth quarter that extended BYU's lead to 20-0.

Prior to Arizona's final drive of the game, Unga had totaled more offensive yards than the entire Arizona offense combined. For the game, Unga averaged 4.5 yards per carry and averaged over 14 yards per reception.

Unga's offensive total against the Wildcats marked the top performance by a freshman running back in the country.

GET A HALL PASS



BYU quarterback Max Hall made his Division-I debut against Arizona, marking his first action in over four years. The native of Mesa, Ariz., led the Cougars to a decisive 20-7 victory over the Wildcats. Hall completed 26-of-39 attempts for 288 yards and two touchdowns. Hall did not have any interceptions and was only sacked one time. Among members of BYU's Quarterback Factory, Hall's completion percentage in his first career start ranks second behind only Ty Detmer who completed 68.6 percent of his attempts in his first career start, marking the most completions of any of the members of BYU's Quarterback Factory.
