### BYU OPENS REGULAR SEASON AT HOME AGAINST LONG BEACH STATE

BYU men's basketball will open the 2008-09 regular season on Friday at home against Long Beach State at 7 p.m. The Cougars finished the 2007-08 season with a 27-8 overall record and as the Mountain West Conference regular season champions. BYU defeated Concordia University and Georgetown College in two home exhibition contests by an average of 29.5 points. Last season BYU opened at Long Beach State and won 74-34. The 49ers were 6-25 overall last season. Saturday's game will not be televised but can be heard live on the radio beginning with the pregame show at 6 p.m. MT on KSL Newsradio 102.7 FM and 1160 AM out of Salt Lake City or via the Internet at KSL.com.

### UP NEXT

BYU will play its first road game of 2008-09 on Tuesday, Nov. 18, at Pepperdine. Tipoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Firestone Fieldhouse.

### COUGAR QUICK HITS

— Two-time MWC Coach of the Year Dave Rose has guided BYU to three-straight 20-win seasons and three-straight postseason appearances. In his first season the Cougars were 20-9 and made a trip to the NIT. In his second campaign he guided the Cougars to the outright MWC title, a top-25 ranking, a trip to the NCAA Tournament and a 25-9 overall record. Last season he led BYU to a 27-8 overall record, a second-straight outright league title and a trip to the NCAA Tournament.  
— BYU has been picked to finish second (five first-place votes) in the MWC preseason poll by the league's media.  
— BYU went 16-0 at home last year and enters the 2008-09 season with the nation's longest active home winning streak at 47 games. The streak is the longest in school history.  
— This year's BYU squad returns two starters among six lettermen from last year's outright league leaders (14-2 MWC record) as well as returned missionary Chris Miles, who made six starts as a freshman in 2005-06, and Gavin MacGregor, who sat out last season with an injury.

**LOOKING AT LBSU**

Long Beach State opens the 2008-09 season at BYU on Friday after finishing last season with a 6-25 overall record. The 49ers return six players from 2007-08 that averaged 4.4 points or more per game including last season's leading scorer Donovan Morris. Morris averaged 21.2 points per game while also leading the team in rebounds per game (5.2). He has been named to the CollegeHoops.net Preseason Mid-Major All-America Team. Dan Monson enters his second season at the helm of the Long Beach State program. Including last season's 6-25 record, Monson's career record is 176-148 in 11 seasons as a Division I head coach. He was 52-17 (.754) in two years at Gonzaga, leading the Bulldogs to the Elite Eight in 1999. In eight years at Minnesota he compiled a 118-106 (.527) mark with five postseason appearances.

**LBSU'S LAST OUTING — 49ERS PLAY TWO PRESEASON SCRIMMAGES**

Long Beach State did not play any exhibition games this preseason. The 49ers elected to play two scrimmages against San Diego and Air Force. Both scrimmages were closed to the spectators.

**SERIES NOTES**

This will be the ninth meeting between Long Beach State and BYU. The Cougars tied the series with a 74-34 victory at Long Beach in the 2007-08 season opener. BYU owns a 3-1 advantage in Provo, having won the last meeting, 94-75, at the Cougar Classic in 1985. Two overtime games have been played in the series, including a 95-90 LBSU victory in the inaugural contest at the 1972 NCAA Tournament and an 81-77 LBSU win in the 1982 Cougar Classic. The 49ers have won back-to-back meetings twice in the series while the Cougars have done so twice. BYU currently owns a two-game winning streak in the series.

**QUOTING COACH ROSE**

"This is a time of year that our players are excited for. Now that the exhibitions are over the guys are excited for the season to start. There was a new energy today in practice. The team is ready to play on Friday."

"Long Beach has an experienced group back but they will also rely on a lot of new players. I expect them to be an athletic group and good perimeter shooters. They will attack the basket and have better size than they had last year."

**BYU IN SEASON OPENERS**

BYU has a 73-33 record in season openers for a .687 winning percentage. BYU is 55-15 (.786) when opening at home, 15-15 (.500) when opening on an opponent's home floor and 3-3 (.500) when opening on a neutral floor. In the 11 seasons since Dave Rose first came to BYU as an assistant, the Cougars are 8-3 in season openers with a 4-1 mark at home, a 3-1 tally in away games and a 1-1 record on neutral floors. Last year, BYU defeated Long Beach State 74-34 on the road. Rose is 1-2 in season openers as a head coach.

**LAST YEAR AT LONG BEACH STATE**

LONG BEACH, Calif. (Nov. 10, 2007) - The BYU men's basketball team came out firing and never looked back as the Cougars opened the season with a 74-34 win at Long Beach State Saturday. The 40-point victory marked BYU's largest winning margin over a Division I opponent since 1995. Junior Lee Cummard led the Cougars with 15 points on 6-for-12 shooting while adding nine rebounds. Fellow junior and 2007 All-Mountain West Conference selection Trent Plaisted also scored in double figures with 12 points. Freshmen Jimmer Fredette and Chris Collinsworth each scored nine points in their Cougar debuts while Fredette added three assists and Collinsworth contributed six rebounds. Senior Ben Murdock tallied a game-high five assists to go along with his eight points. BYU opened the season hot with a 10-0 run in the first three minutes of the game, including four points and an assist from Cummard. Long Beach State finally got on the scoreboard at the 16-minute mark, but Cummard quickly took it the other way with a driving layin to put the Cougars up 12-2. Fredette and Collinsworth made their respective Cougar debuts early on as they both checked in at the 15:31 mark. Collinsworth immediately made his presence felt with two rebounds, including an offensive board leading to a bucket for Plaisted and a 14-2 BYU lead. Jonathan Tavernari got the Cougars going again with a three-pointer after a four-minute scoring drought that saw BYU miss seven shots. However, the Cougars stormed back with four straight makes from long range, including two from Fredette, to take a 27-4 lead. Plaisted then made some noise of his own with a dunk at the 6:15 mark to cap a 14-0 Cougar run. The BYU momentum continued with a three-pointer from Murdock, which gave the Cougars a 26-point lead at 32-6 that turned into a 36-12 halftime advantage. Long Beach State made just three buckets in the first 20 minutes of the game as BYU allowed its fewest points in a half since giving up a record-low 10 points against Air Force in 2003. Murdock made it back-to-back scores with a three-point play before Plaisted converted one of his own to put BYU on top 47-19. Senior Vuk Ivanovic heated up in the last 10 minutes of the game with six points in a three-minute span, sparking a 14-0 Cougar run. The spurt featured seven points from Collinsworth and was capped by a dunk from Chris Miles to give BYU a 74-34 lead, which would hold until the final buzzer.

**WHAT WAS SAID AFTER THE GAME ...**

**BYU Head Coach Dave Rose**

"I'm really pleased with our players, especially with their intensity and how hard they played. There are a lot of things we can work on to play better, but I was excited to watch them in this situation, our first game of the year and our first road game. A lot of times you have first-game jitters, but our guys did a good job of playing hard."

"The thing I'm pleased about with the first half and our new guys going in there was the opportunity they got to go in and play and get those first-game jitters out. You could tell there was a lot of emotion at play for those guys, but once they settled down a little bit, they played the way we know they can in the second half."

**NOTES FROM THE 2007 MATCHUP**

- In BYU's first game of the year, head coach Dave Rose elected to start two seniors in Ben Murdock and Sam Burgess, returning All-Mountain West Conference selections Trent Plaisted and Lee Cummard and 2007 MWC Freshman of the Year Jonathan Tavernari. Cummard started all 34 games last season, and Plaisted made 33 starts. Burgess made one start as a sophomore in 2004-05 while Murdock and Tavernari each earned their first career starts against the 49ers. Rose used the same starting rotation in both of the Cougars' two exhibition games.
- Scouts from six NBA teams attended the game as the Atlanta Hawks, Miami Heat, Memphis Grizzlies, Los Angeles Clippers, Detroit Pistons and Dallas Mavericks were represented.
- BYU is now 73-33 all-time in season openers and 15-15 when opening on the road. The Cougars are also now 8-3 in openers since Dave Rose has been at BYU. The victory against Long Beach State was Rose's first season-opening win as the Cougars' head coach.
- The Cougars are now 1-0 this season when leading at the half after a 36-12 lead at the break in Long Beach. BYU was 22-4 last year when holding the halftime advantage.
- BYU's 40-point margin of victory (74-34) was its largest winning margin against a Div. I opponent since a 41-point victory (110-69) against Morgan State on Dec. 28, 1995.
- Ten of the 12 players who saw action in the game scored, led by Cummard with 15 points.
- The 12 points given up by the Cougars in the first 20 minutes of the game marked the fewest points allowed in a half by BYU since allowing a record-low 10 points against Air Force in 2003. Long Beach State shot just 11 percent in the first half on 3-of-27 shooting.
- BYU scored the first 10 points of the game before Long Beach State got on the scoreboard at the 16-minute mark after missing its first five shots.
- After missing their first five three-point attempts of the game, the Cougars made their next five shots from long range, including two from Jimmer Fredette, two from Tavernari and one from Murdock, during a 17-2 run.
- Cummard scored four of the Cougars' first five points and six of the first 12 with a 3-for-3 start.
- True freshmen Jimmer Fredette and Chris Collinsworth made their respective Cougar debuts as they both checked in at the 15:31 mark of the first half. Collinsworth immediately made his presence felt with two rebounds, including an offensive board leading to a bucket for Plaisted. Fredette also made noise in the first half with two three-point makes during a 14-0 Cougar run.
- Michael Loyd, Jr., another true freshman, made his first regular-season appearance in a BYU uniform at the 13:25 mark while fellow freshman Nick Martineau entered the game at the 6:15 mark in the first half. Archie Rose became the final eligible Cougar to make his BYU debut with four minutes to play in the second half.
- Returned missionary Chris Miles also saw first-half action for the Cougars for the first time since the 2004-05 season.
- Lamont Morgan, Jr. made the trip but did not play as the coaching staff has elected to redshirt the junior college transfer.

**BYU'S LAST OUTING - COUGARS FINISH EXHIBITION PLAY WITH BIG WIN OVER GEORGETOWN COLLEGE**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 11, 2008) – The BYU men's basketball team eyes the season opener after completing exhibition play with an 80-53 win over Georgetown College at the Marriott Center Tuesday night. As head coach Dave Rose split time between every player, Cougar fans got a taste of what to expect on both sides of the ball as BYU dominated Georgetown College. BYU shot 54.4 percent from the field while limiting the Tigers to a 30.8 percentage. The Cougars forced 21 turnovers with 11 blocks, while Georgetown achieved 16 turnovers and no blocks. Every BYU player who dressed not only saw time but also scored at least two points and pulled down one rebound. Junior Lamont Morgan and sophomore Jackson Emery distributed the ball well, dishing out six assists apiece. Emery led the Cougars with 16 points, while junior Jonathan Tavernari put up 15 points of his own, falling shy of a double-double with a team-leading eight rebounds. The Cougars jumped ahead quickly, taking an 8-0 lead before Georgetown College hit a three after 2.5 minutes of play. BYU's man-to-man defense handcuffed the Tigers, forcing a shot clock violation before Georgetown College was able to make offensive adjustments. After taking a 15-10 lead, both teams struggled as turnovers and fouls resulted in a three-minute scoring drought. Lee Cummard broke the stand still after a timeout. Georgetown College pulled within two points of the Cougars when they narrowed the score to 19-17 before freshman Noah Hartsock hit a bank shot and Cummard nailed a three to secure a 24-17 lead. After a close battle, BYU stretched its lead to 35-21 with a nine-point run. The defense continued to provide a spark as more than a third of the Cougars' points came off turnovers. Freshman Charles Abouo added two points off a steal, which he returned down court blasting the first dunk of the night. The Cougars continued to make their run before the end of the period. Tavernari put up free throw after free throw, and Cummard hit his second three-pointer of the night to head into the half with a 43-27 lead. As the core of the BYU roster started the second period, the Cougar dominance grew. Miles blocked three shots in an 18-second stretch and Morgan and Emery hit back-to-back threes to put BYU up 54-32. Emery kept the BYU momentum flowing when he stole a Georgetown College pass for a fast break followed by a three to put BYU up 59-35. Relief came in from the BYU bench without losing intensity for the remainder of the game. The bench totaled 27 points on the night, led by Abouo's 11 points.

**WHAT WAS SAID AFTER THE GAME ...****BYU Head Coach Dave Rose**

– "I was pleased with how we played tonight. We had good energy defensively. The first eight to nine minutes were well executed and set the tone for the rest of the game."  
– "We still have a lot to work on. We were late blocking out some key players, letting some shots go, but we did keep them off the offensive glass, which a strength of their."  
– "I'd like to get the full lineup started but someone keeps getting hurt. I'm more interested in having the top eight or nine that can give us a good start, rather than focusing on who are the starting five."

**Georgetown College Head Coach Happy Osborne**

– "BYU is a very well coached team. They are a good team inside and out and I love how they pass the ball."  
– "We're better than what we played tonight. What's disappointing for me is that I wanted to play well enough for Coach Rose to ask us to come back and we clearly have a long way to go."

**BYU NOTES FROM LAST OUTING**

– BYU's second and last exhibition game of the 2008-09 season saw last year's starters, Lee Cummard and Jonathan Tavernari, and juniors Chris Miles and Lamont Morgan, Jr. and sophomore Jackson Emery lead the Cougars off for the first six minutes of play.  
– All 10 BYU players who suited up saw action in the game and scored. Senior Archie Rose (injury), sophomore standout Jimmer Fredette (injury), Michael Boswell (redshirt) and Michael Loyd, Jr. (injury) did not dress.  
– First off the bench was senior Gavin MacGregor who did not play last year due to injury. MacGregor came off the bench at the 14:11 mark in the first half to score six points and wow the crowd with one of the two dunks on the night.  
– The Cougars took advantage of 13 Georgetown turnovers in the first half, turning them into 17 points. BYU scored 10 points off turnovers in the second half.  
– The only returning starters, Cummard and Tavernari, led the Cougars at the half with 10 points apiece. Tavernari was second in scoring on the night with 15 total points.  
– Fresh off a two-year LDS mission, Emery led the Cougars in three pointers hitting 4-for-6 on the night. Emery was the leading scorer on the night with 16 total points.  
– The Cougars held the Tigers scoreless for the first two and a half minutes before Jerry Turner scored Georgetown's first points of the game with a three-point bucket.  
– Morgan, Jr. and Emery led the Cougars in assists, posting six dimes apiece on the night.  
– Starting center Miles had four blocked shots on the night. BYU finished with 11 blocks as a team with Noah Hartsock and Gavin MacGregor adding two apiece.  
– BYU out-scored the Tigers 34 to 14 in the paint.  
– After setting a program record with 285 three-pointers last season, the Cougars picked up where they left off with 11 makes from long range against Georgetown. BYU recorded double-digit three-pointers in 11 games last year.  
– BYU also continued its strong offensive production from last season, defeating Georgetown 80-53. The Cougars notched 20 double-digit wins last year while defeating opponents by an average of 16.9 points in their 27 victories.

**EXHIBITION #1 - CONVINCING EXHIBITION WIN AGAINST CONCORDIA**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 6, 2008) – In its first exhibition game of the 2008-09 season, the BYU men's basketball team handily defeated Concordia 96-54 at home in the Marriott Center. The 42-point victory matched the offensive productivity seen last season when the Cougars notched 20 double-digit wins. Sophomore Jimmer Fredette led all scorers with 26 points, going 6-of-8 from behind the new three-point line. Team captains Lee Cummmard and Jonathan Tavernari both contributed 15 points apiece with Cummmard leading the team with nine rebounds. Returning starters Tavernari and Cummmard were joined in the starting lineup by Fredette, and juniors Lamont Morgan, Jr. and Chris Miles. Combined, the starting five contributed 65 of the team's 96 total points. Reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year Cummmard picked up where he left off last season, scoring seven of BYU's first nine points. After jumping out to quick 5-0 start, the Stingers went on a 7-2 run to overtake the lead before a running layup by Cummmard put the Cougars up 9-7 heading into the game's first media timeout. Fredette extended the BYU lead to four points after a made three-pointer with 13:46 remaining in the first half. After Tavernari scored his first points of the game on a beneath-the-basket make with 9:08 to play in the half, his steal on Concordia's following possession helped set up a dunk for newcomer Charles Abouo. In what seemed like *deja vu*, Tavernari recovered a Stinger turnover on the ensuing play resulting in a second dunk by Abouo. Back-to-back makes by Tavernari capped a 21-4 run by the Cougars, giving them a 39-19 lead with 4:20 remaining until the halftime break. With under one minute to play in the half, Tavernari made his first three-pointer of the night to help put BYU up 23 points at the half. After making two three-pointers in the first half, Fredette came out strong to start the second, connecting on 3-of-3 attempts from beyond the arc in the first five minutes. Tough defense and turnovers on both sides of the ball kept either team from scoring for the next two minutes until Morgan drew a foul on a fast-break layup, giving the Cougars a 78-39 lead.

**WHITE BEATS BLUE AT COUGAR TIPOFF**

PROVO, Utah (October 29, 2008) – Fans got their first official taste of the 2008-09 BYU Men's Basketball team Wednesday as the White team beat the Blue team 59-51 during the Cougar Tipoff at the Marriott Center. "I was really pleased with our progress from the first half to the second half," said BYU head coach Dave Rose. "I thought we settled in and played a lot more like we are going to play." The night featured the annual Blue/White game between players and showcased the team to fans. The White team held the Blue team scoreless through the first 13 minutes and jumped out to an 11-0 lead before the first timeout of the game at 15:12. Jonathan Tavernari led all scorers with 23 points on 9-15 shooting. Senior forward Lee Cummmard, the 2007-08 MWC Co-Player of the Year had 11 points. Freshmen Charles Abouo and Matt Pinegar also contributed with 11 points each. Tavernari and freshman guard Jackson Emery led all rebounders with eight apiece. Both teams shot above 70 percent from the free-throw line, with the Blue team shooting 75 percent and the White team shooting 73.3 percent. The game featured some exciting moments. The end of the first half was punctuated with a shot by guard Jackson Emery, who then stole the inbounds pass and dished the ball behind his back to Jimmer Fredette, who laid the ball in the hoop, but the shot was called off because the halftime buzzer had already sounded. Just three minutes into the second half, Emery passed the ball forward to senior center Gavin MacGregor who drove down the lane for a one-handed dunk. "I think the talent level of this group is good," said Rose. Our athleticism is improved and we have good strength. Hopefully that will help us defensively and allow us to be more diverse offensively." BYU fans can next catch the Cougars at the Marriott Center when they face Concordia University in an exhibition game Thursday, Nov. 6 at 7 p.m. MT. BYU will then face Georgetown College on Tuesday, Nov. 11 at 7:30 p.m.

**CUMMMARD, TAVERNARI NAMED TEAM CAPTAINS**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 4, 2008) – BYU men's basketball head coach Dave Rose announced Tuesday that senior Lee Cummmard and junior Jonathan Tavernari have been selected to serve as captains on this year's team. "Both our captains are great examples of what we want all our players to strive for," Rose said. "Lee and Jonathan are both great competitors, do well in the classroom and are good ambassadors of our program in the community. Lee did an outstanding job as a captain last year and has proven leadership ability both on and off the court. Jonathan has been a key member of our team the past two years and has earned the respect of a team leader." Cummmard is a three-year starter and the reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year. He earned Associated Press All-America honorable mention last year after helping the Cougars win their second straight outright MWC title and a 27-8 overall record. A 6-foot-7 swingman from Mesa, Ariz., Cummmard is a do-everything player who led the Cougars in scoring (15.8), field-goal percentage (.569), three-point percentage (.472) and blocked shots (1.0) last year while ranking second in rebounds (6.3), assists (3.5), steals (0.9) and free-throw percentage (.857). Tavernari followed his MWC Freshman of the Year season in 2006-07 with a record-setting sophomore campaign last year. This summer he was the lone nonprofessional player to make the Brazilian Senior National Team that competed at the Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece.

**PRESEASON MWC POLL**

The Mountain West Conference media selected two-time defending MWC Tournament champion UNLV as the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West Conference men's basketball regular-season title in 2008-09. Three teams earned first-place votes, with UNLV capturing 16 of 24 first-place votes and 206 points for the top spot in the poll. **LEE CUMMARD TABBED AS WOODEN AWARD CANDIDATE**

The 2008-09 preseason candidates for the John R. Wooden Award All-American Team and Player of the Year trophy were announced Nov. 7 by Richard "Duke" Llewellyn, Wooden Award Chairman and founder. The list is composed of 50 student athletes who, based on last year's individual performance and team records, are the early frontrunners for college basketball's most prestigious honor. BYU senior guard Lee Cummard has been named as one of the 50 preseason candidates for the 2008-09 award. The reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year, Cummard is a three-year starter who earned Associated Press All-America honorable mention last year after leading the Cougars to a 27-8 overall record and their second straight outright MWC title. A 6-foot-7 swingman from Mesa, Ariz., Cummard is a do-everything player who led the Cougars in scoring (15.8), field-goal percentage (.569), three-point percentage (.472) and blocked shots (1.0) last year while ranking second in rebounds (6.3), assists (3.5), steals (0.9) and free-throw percentage (.857). Tyler Hansbrough of North Carolina, last year's Wooden Award winner, returns to Chapel Hill for his final collegiate season and has a chance to become only the second repeat men's Wooden Award winner. Ralph Sampson of Virginia won the Award twice, in 1982 and 1983. Other returning Wooden All-Americans include Notre Dame forward Luke Harangody and Davidson guard Stephen Curry. Returning players from last year's Wooden Award ballot, in addition to the three All-Americans above, include UCLA's Darren Collison, Connecticut's A.J. Price, Tennessee's Tyler Smith and Robbie Hummel of Purdue. Transfers, freshmen and medical redshirts are not eligible for the preseason list. These players and others who excel throughout the season will be evaluated and considered for January's Midseason list and the official voting ballot released in March. North Carolina (Hansbrough, Wayne Ellington, Ty Lawson) had three players on the list. Six schools placed two players on the list: Louisville (Earl Clark, Terrence Williams), Duke (Kyle Singler, Gerald Henderson), Marquette (Jerel McNeal, Dominic James), Pittsburgh (DeJuan Blair, Sam Young), Connecticut (Price, Hasheem Thabeet), and Texas (Damion James, A.J. Abrams). In all, 42 schools and 13 conferences are represented on the Wooden Award Pre-Season list. Leading the way is the Big East (12), followed by the ACC (8), Pac-10 (5), SEC (5), Big 12 (5), Atlantic-10 (2), Big Ten (3), Conference USA (3), Mountain West (2), West Coast (2), Colonial Athletic Association (1), Ohio Valley (1), and the Southern Conference (1).

- Played on Brazilian Senior National Team at Olympic Qualifying Tournament, the only non-professional to make the team.

**TEAM/PLAYER NOTEBOOK**

— With a 14-2 league record in 2007-08, BYU became the first two-time outright MWC Champion and back-to-back MWC Champion in league history. The titles also mark the first back-to-back league crowns for the Cougars since the 1978-79 and 1979-80 seasons. BYU is tied for ninth among all NCAA Division I programs for most regular-season titles won or shared with 27. BYU's 87 MWC wins in the nine-year history of the league leads all MWC teams.

— With a 27-8 record in 35 games last year, the Cougars achieved the second-best 35-game record in the 105-year history of the program. The 2007-08 Cougars are one of only two teams in program history to play 35 games in a single season. Last year's BYU team also set the program record for regular-season wins, becoming the first Cougar squad ever to achieve 25 victories prior to the start of postseason play.

— Entering his fourth year guiding the program, Rose has seen his team earn the respect of the national voters for the second consecutive season. Last season BYU first entered the national rankings on Nov. 26, earning the program's earliest appearance in the national polls since the 1980-81 season, before finishing the year ranked No. 24 in the AP Poll. The prior year, BYU entered the polls on Feb. 19 to receive the program's first national ranking since 1993. BYU finished that season ranked No. 24 in the final AP Poll, something a Cougar team had not accomplished since 1988. BYU has now been ranked in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1980-81 and 1981-82.

— BYU has won a school-record 47 straight games in the Marriott Center, which also ranks first nationally. The Cougars set the record with their 67-59 win over Utah in the Marriott Center on Feb. 20, their 45th straight home win. The Cougars were 16-0 at home last year and won 17 home games the prior season after going 14-1 at home in 2005-06. BYU's last home loss was in the 2005-06 season opener against Loyola Marymount. BYU has since won 23 straight over nonconference opponents and 24 consecutive over MWC foes. BYU's last league loss at home was its season finale in 2005 to UNLV. BYU is 419-116 (.783) all-time in the Marriott Center, and Cougar head coach Dave Rose is 47-1. Prior to the current streak, BYU's longest homecourt victory streak was 44 games from Feb 19, 2000 to Jan 16, 2003.

— Guard Lee Cumnard returns for his senior season after earning AP All-America honorable mention last year. The All-America candidate and reigning MWC Player of the Year surpassed the 1,000 career point mark in BYU's final game last season, becoming the 38th member of BYU's elite 1,000 Point Club. He ranked in the top 10 in the MWC in eight statistical categories last year while averaging 15.8 points, 6.3 rebounds and 3.5 assists per game and leading BYU in scoring 16 times and rebounding eight times.

— Forward Jonathan Tavernari returns for his junior season after spending the offseason playing with the Brazil Senior National Team. An All-MWC Third Team pick last year, Tavernari set the BYU single-season and sophomore MWC three-point records with 88. He averaged 13.1 points and 5.3 rebounds per contest.

— The Cougars also return guards Michael Loyd, Jr. and Jimmer Fredette as well as center Chris Miles to the lineup this season. All three made significant contributions for BYU off the bench last season.

— Four new faces will join the program for the 2008-09 season. Forward Noah Hartssock and guard/forward Charles Abouo signed National Letters of Intent while guard Jackson Emery has signed a scholarship agreement to return to the Cougars and freshman Michael Boswell will walk-on to the team. Hartssock, who previously signed with BYU out of high school, and Emery, who played for the Cougars as a freshman in 2005-06, have both recently returned from service as missionaries for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

**COUGARS TO FACE ACC AND PAC-10 TEAMS IN 2008-09**

BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose has announced the Cougars' 2008-09 schedule that includes teams from 10 different conferences, including the ACC and Pac-10, and features a three-day, six-game tournament hosted by the Cougars in the Marriott Center.

"We are looking forward to the coming season," said Rose, who has guided BYU to outright MWC titles the past two seasons. "I think our fans will enjoy watching our team this year. We are excited to get our guys ready to face the teams on our schedule and hope to be ready to meet the challenges of defending our back-to-back Mountain West Conference championships."

The Cougars will play 12 games against teams that qualified for postseason play last year and be featured 19 times on the MWC television schedule with broadcast partners CBS College Sports Network (CBS C), VERSUS and the MountainWest Sports Network (The Mtn.). All of BYU's MWC games will be televised this season as well as nonconference outings with Boise State, Portland and Wake Forest. Additional television games will be announced once finalized.

Among the highlights on the schedule is the first-ever visit by Wake Forest to the Marriott Center and only the second such trip by an ACC team (NC State in 2004). The Cougars will look to avenge their defeat in Winston-Salem last season when the two schools meet on Jan. 3. The game will be televised on The Mtn.

BYU will also participate in the first-ever basketball games played at the football venue University of Phoenix Stadium in Phoenix. The four-team event will pit Louisville against Minnesota at noon followed by the Cougars taking on local-favorite Arizona State at 2:30 p.m. on Fox Sports. The Sun Devils return their top seven scorers from last year's 21-13 team that advanced to the NIT quarterfinals.

The Cougars also host the Basketball Travelers Invitational at the Marriott Center from Nov. 20-22 and face in-state rival Utah State at EnergySolutions Arena in Salt Lake City. Cal Poly, Rice and North Florida will join the Cougars for three straight nights of double-header action in the Basketball Travelers' event, while the neutral-court matchup with Utah State will allow fans from both schools to enjoy an exciting atmosphere as the longtime rivalry resumes after a one-year hiatus.

Excluding exhibition play, BYU will play 30 regular-season games before the 2009 MWC Tournament being played at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas, Mar. 11-14.

The Cougars start the season with exhibition outings against Concordia University (Montreal, Quebec) on Nov. 6 and Georgetown College (Georgetown, Ky.) on Nov. 11. Georgetown is an NAIA power that went 35-1 last year and finished the season ranked No. 1 in the final poll.

BYU's regular-season opener is against Long Beach State on Nov. 14 in the Marriott Center. Prior to the Basketball Travelers Invitational from Nov. 20-22, BYU plays at Pepperdine on Nov. 18 and finishes the month of November with its first trip to Pocatello, Idaho, since 1977 to play Idaho State on Nov. 29.

December begins with in-state outings at Weber State (Dec. 3) and vs. Utah State in Salt Lake City (Dec. 6) before home dates with Boise State (Dec. 10) and Portland (Dec. 13). After taking on the Pac-10's Arizona State at the 2008 Stadium Shootout in Phoenix on Dec. 20, the Cougars host Western Oregon on Dec. 23 and play at 2008 College Basketball Invitational Champion Tulsa on Dec. 30 before concluding their nonconference slate against the Demon Deacons on Jan. 3.

The Cougars begin league action at Colorado State (1 p.m., The Mtn.) on Jan. 10 and finish their MWC schedule at home against Air Force (7 p.m., The Mtn.) on Mar. 7. BYU travels to Salt Lake City to face in-state rival Utah (8 p.m., The Mtn.) on Jan. 27 and hosts the Utes (3 p.m., CBS C) in the return on Feb. 28 in the Marriott Center.

BYU will host MWC Tournament Champion UNLV on Jan. 21 in a featured contest on CBS C. The Cougars and Rebels will also appear on CBS C for their Las Vegas matchup on Feb. 21. The Mtn. will carry 15 Cougar games while CBS C airs three and VERSUS one — BYU's game at New Mexico on Jan. 17.

In addition to television opportunities, Cougar fans will have the chance to attend 21 games in the Marriott Center this season including exhibition play and the Basketball Travelers Invitational. BYU fans will also receive tickets to the Utah State game in Salt Lake City as part of the season-ticket package. Season-ticket prices start at just \$75 and are on sale now at the Marriott Center Ticket Office (800-322-BYU1 or 801-422-BYU1, hours 9 a.m.-5 p.m.) or online at [BYUtickets.com](http://BYUtickets.com)

Overall, the Cougars will face teams from the ACC, Pac-10, Big West, West Coast, Conference USA, Big Sky, Atlantic Sun, Great Northwest Athletic and WAC during the 2008-09 season.

"Our fans will have many opportunities to watch BYU basketball this year," Rose said. "We appreciate the great support of our fans and believe we will have a team they will enjoy following."

**INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS AT BYU**

- Including incoming freshman Charles Abouo, 28 international players have played basketball at BYU.
- The Cougars have had an international player on their varsity roster in 37 of the past 57 years.
- In the last five years, BYU has rostered eight international players, including three on this season's team – Charles Abouo (Cote d'Ivoire), Archie Rose (Bahamas) and Jonathan Tavernari (Brazil).
- Foreign players at BYU have received nine all-conference citations, two conference player of the year awards (Timo Saarelainen – 1985, Rafael Araujo – 2004), one conference freshman of the year award (Jonathan Tavernari – 2007) and eight All-America citations (Kresimir Cosic – 1972 and 1973, Rafael Araujo – 2004).
- According to a book about basketball in Finland by Mikko Simon, BYU has the distinction of being the first NCAA Division I school to have an overseas player on its roster when Timo Lampen, a native of Lahti, Finland, took the court for the Cougars in 1960-61.
- BYU also boasts the first foreign All-American in Kresimir Cosic, whose BYU jersey was retired on March 4. The Zadar, Yugoslavia, native played on the Cougar varsity team from 1971-73 and earned six All-America citations and three first-team All-Western Athletic Conference awards. He is the only BYU player to be inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame. Cosic passed away in 1995.
- During the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, CBS Television analyst Billy Packer singled out Cosic during a discussion of the quality of international players now playing college basketball. Said Packer, "Kresimir Cosic, who played for BYU, was really the first great international player to play basketball in the United States."

**TAVERNARI, ARAUJO COMPETE IN OLYMPIC QUALIFYING TOURNAMENT**

BYU junior-to-be Jonathan Tavernari and former Cougar All-American Rafael Araujo were both members of the Brazilian Senior National Team this summer. Brazil played in the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece. The top three teams in the qualifying tournament earned spots in the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing this August. A brief summary of Brazil's games in the qualifying tournament are included below.

**GAME 1 – Brazil 94, Lebanon 54**

Jonathan Tavernari scored two points, grabbed three rebounds and dished out four assists while Rafael Araujo totaled 16 points and four rebounds in Brazil's 94-54 thrashing of Lebanon to open the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece.

Araujo went 8-for-11 from the floor in 17 minutes of play to dominate inside. Point guard Marcelo Huertas scored a team-high 17 points on 7-of-8 shooting to lead three Brazilians in double figures. Tavernari logged 18 minutes with his four assists tied for second on the team.

Brazil will play host Greece in its second game of the tournament. Greece defeated Lebanon 119-62 on in its opening contest. With Lebanon having already lost twice, both Brazil and Greece will advance out of Group A into the quarterfinals regardless of the outcome. The loser will face the Group B winner, likely Germany with NBA players Dirk Nowitzki and Chris Kaman, while the winner will play Group B's second-place team, likely New Zealand.

Brazil played Greece just last week in the warm-up Acropolis Tournament in Athens, ultimately losing a close contest by a 72-65 tally. In that outing, Tavernari scored two points on 1-for-4 shooting from the field with two rebounds, two assists and two steals in 14:38 on the floor. Araujo also scored two points with four rebounds and a blocked shot in 19:02 of play.

**GAME 2 – Greece 89, Brazil 69**

Jonathan Tavernari did not score in 16 minutes of play while Rafael Araujo logged only three minutes in Brazil's 89-69 loss to host Greece at the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece.

With the loss, Brazil finished as the second-place team in Group A and will face Group B winner Germany in the quarterfinals. Germany features NBA players Dirk Nowitzki and Chris Kaman. Greece meets New Zealand in its quarterfinal matchup while Croatia will play Canada and Slovenia takes on Puerto Rico in the two other quarterfinal contests.

Three of the four quarterfinal winners will qualify for the Olympics.

**QUARTERFINALS**

**GAME 3 – Germany 78, Brazil 65**

Brazil was eliminated at the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece, losing 78-65 to Germany in the quarterfinals.

Former NBA MVP Dirk Nowitzki (Dallas Mavericks) led Germany with 20 points while fellow NBA player Chris Kaman (Los Angeles Clippers) added 12 points and a game-high 14 rebounds. Germany took over the game with a 31-13 advantage in the second period to take a 19-point lead at the half.

BYU's Jonathan Tavernari did not play in the first half but helped Brazil rally from a 27-point deficit when he entered the game to get within 11 points. He made a game-high three steals and had one assist while scoring four points for Brazil on 1-for-3 three-point shooting and a 1-of-2 night at the line in 14 second-half minutes. Former Cougar Rafael Araujo logged 17 minutes for Brazil and totaled two points with four rebounds and one steal. He went 1-for-4 on field-goal attempts and 0-for-1 at the line.

Since becoming head coach of the BYU Men's Basketball program on April 11, 2005, Dave Rose has guided the Cougars to an impressive array of on-the-court awards and accolades while his unassuming approach to service and the community has been recognized at the top of his profession.

Cougar fans have had plenty to "Rise and Shout" about with Rose at the helm. He has produced a three-year resume that is nearly unmatched. In fact, only eight other coaches have ever won more games in their first three seasons at the Division I level. Rose has returned BYU to the national stage with back-to-back appearances in the top-25 polls

and back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths. Under his tutelage, Rose's teams have not only broken into the top-25 rankings but also achieved the MWC's first-ever two-time outright league championships. Rose is the only BYU men's basketball coach to win conference coach-of-the-year honors in back-to-back seasons. He has also received district coach of the year accolades and honorable mention for national coach of the year. Another evidence of Rose's commitment to excellence is that his basketball program ranks in the top 10 percent nationally in multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate scores. As a result, the NCAA has honored BYU with Public Recognition awards in each of the past two seasons for their high academic achievement.

Rose first came to BYU as an assistant in 1997 to help newly hired head coach Steve Cleveland rebuild the Cougar program. Rose served eight seasons with Cleveland, including the last five as Associate Head Coach, before being promoted to BYU's head job. Rose played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play in eight of the past nine seasons, including five NCAA bids, while claiming four MWC titles. A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose has a proven record as a top recruiter. He has been recognized as one of college basketball's top-25 recruiters as BYU has had multiple top-20 recruiting classes with Rose overseeing or coordinating its efforts. Ten recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major league award in their first season as a Cougar in the 11 years Rose has been in Provo.

With 25 years of coaching experience, including 13 seasons as a head coach at the Division I, junior college, and high school levels, Rose has a proven record of constant success. Prior to coming to BYU as an assistant in 1997, Rose compiled a 167-57 record at Dixie State College (St. George, Utah). Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie.

Rose excelled in both baseball and basketball as a two-sport athlete at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, before serving a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79. Upon returning home, he transferred to the University of Houston where he completed his degree and was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished as the national runner-up.

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose and his wife Cheryl have three children and two grandchildren. Currently the Honorary Chairman of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation, Rose works with his wife, Cheryl, and the team to annually serve and comfort local families who endure the challenges of raising a child who has cancer. Dave

and Cheryl are also actively involved in a variety of other service and community initiatives. In 2008, Rose was honored by the National Association of Basketball Coaches with its Game Pillar Award for Service, one of only four Pillar Awards (Education, Leadership, Service and Advocacy) that the Association annually bestows on the most deserving among its vast membership. In 2008, Rose also became the 63rd recipient of the Dale Rex Memorial Award given annually to the person who has done the most for amateur athletics in the state of Utah.

## Assistant Coaches

### DAVE RICE 3rd year (UNLV 1991)

Dave Rice joined the BYU coaching staff as an assistant in May 2005 and was promoted to Associate Head Coach in April 2008. Rice has 17 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons at the Division I level at BYU, UNLV and Utah State. As a player, Rice was a member of UNLV's 1989-90 National Championship and 1990-91 Final Four teams that won a school-record 45 consecutive games.



An excellent recruiter and on-the-floor coach, Rice coordinates the team's offense and recruiting efforts. In his three seasons coordinating the Cougar offense, BYU has generated the Mountain West Conference's top attack two years and ranked second once. On the national level, the Cougars ranked 21st in assists per game (16.8) and 22nd in scoring margin (+10.5) this past year while also setting a school record for assist-to-field goal ratio at 64.8 percent. In 2006-07, the Cougars ranked among the top 30 in the nation in three-point field-goal percentage (.5th, .415), scoring (24th, 78.1 ppg) and scoring margin (25th, +9.0). In his first season at BYU, Rice helped the Cougars become the nation's second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record.

Rice has helped BYU earn three straight 20 wins seasons and a 72-26 overall record while recording back-to-back outright Mountain West Conference Championships—the program's first back-to-back outright titles since 1979 and 1980. The Cougars have also appeared in the national top-25 polls in each of the last two seasons while making consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. The last time BYU was ranked in back-to-back season was in 1981 and 1982 and the previous BYU team to be ranked was in 1993.

Rice came to BYU from Utah State University where he helped Coach Stew Morrill and the Aggies earn a 24-8 record, Big West Conference Tournament title and an NCAA Tournament bid in 2004-05. In his one season at Utah State, Rice's coaching duties included working with the offense and coaching the guards. In 2004-05, the Aggies led the nation in field-goal percentage (school-record .525) and ranked fourth nationally in scoring margin (+14.6), 10th in assists (17.2) and 20th in three-point field goal percentage (.391).

Rice spent 11 seasons as an assistant coach at UNLV, which is the second-longest tenure ever for an assistant in that program. During his time at UNLV as both a player and a coach, the Rebels had 12 players go on to play in the National Basketball Association, eight of whom were drafted in the first round, including six lottery picks. While in Las Vegas, Rice worked under four head coaches in Jerry Tarkanian, Tim Grgrucic, Bill Bayno and Charlie Spoonhour. In his last eight seasons at UNLV, the Runnin' Rebels received seven postseason invitations and averaged 20 wins per year.

In addition to his Division I experience, Rice served as an assistant coach for one season at Chaffey (Calif.) College in 1994, helping the Panthers to a 32-6 record and an appearance in the California State Final Four. He also spent one season at Claremont (Calif.) High School, where he was an assistant coach under his father Lowell, a long-time high school coach. That team went 21-7, winning the Baseline League Championship and reaching the CIF quarterfinals. Rice earned his bachelor's degree in political science from UNLV in 1991 and his MBA in 1993. He was also a two-time UNLV Scholar-Athlete of the Year and a Rhodes Scholar candidate.

Prior to playing at UNLV, Rice began his college career at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif., where he earned All-South Coast Conference honors as a sophomore and was chosen from among more than 13,000 student-athletes as the 1989 California Junior College Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He graduated from Claremont High School. A native of Claremont, Calif., Rice and his wife Mindy have two sons, Travis (10) and Dylan (5).

### JOHN WARDENBURG 7th year (BYU 1986)

Boasting a 20-year, championship-filled coaching resume, John Wardenburg has been a key part of BYU's success since first coming to Provo in 2001.



Wardenburg joined the Cougar coaching staff as an assistant coach in May 2001 under former BYU coach Steve Cleveland before serving the past three seasons with current Cougar head coach Dave Rose. Wardenburg and Rose have a long coaching history together. Wardenburg served as an assistant to Rose at Dixie State College and later joined Rose as an assistant on Cleveland's staff at BYU.

On Rose's staff the past three seasons, Wardenburg has helped the Cougars earn three straight 20 wins seasons and a 72-26 overall record while recording back-to-back outright Mountain West Conference Championships—the program's first back-to-back outright titles since 1979 and 1980. BYU has also appeared in the national top-25 polls in each of the last two seasons while making consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. The last time the Cougars were ranked in back-to-back season was in 1981 and 1982 and the previous BYU team to be ranked was in 1993. During their first season with Rose at the helm in 2005-06, BYU become the nation's second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record.

Wardenburg's primary responsibilities on the staff have included defensive skill development, game film preparation, defensive game plan preparation, summer basketball camp director and recruiting. His efforts on the defensive end helped the Cougars become the 11th-ranked team in the nation this past season in field-goal percentage defense, holding opponents to a combined 38.9 percent on the year. In addition to field-goal percentage defense, the Cougars were also the MWC's top team in three-point field-goal percentage defense (.300) and had the largest margin on the boards, grabbing 4.3 more rebounds per game than their opponents.

Prior to coming to BYU, Wardenburg had 13 years of coaching experience at the high school and junior college levels. He compiled a 105-62 record in seven years as a head coach at Payson High School (1988-93) and Pine View High School (1999-01) while guiding his teams to five league titles and seven state tournament berths. In those seven years, his teams earned three fifth-place state tournament finishes, one third-place finish and a 3A Utah State Championship with his 2001 Pine View team.

After Wardenburg's Payson teams claimed three league titles and posted a 76-43 overall record, he served as an assistant coach from 1993-97 at Dixie State College under current BYU head coach Dave Rose and helped the Rebels to a 95-31 record and a national ranking as high as No. 2. Wardenburg left coaching for two years to serve as Dixie's Director of Athletics. He returned to coaching as the head coach at Pine View High School in St. George where he recorded two highly successful seasons before joining BYU's staff in 2001.

Wardenburg's Pine View teams won the league title both seasons he was the coach while achieving a 29-19 record. Wardenburg earned 3A Coach of the Year honors in 2000 after coaching his team to a third-place state finish and was named Championship Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding his team to the state title.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Wardenburg was a multi-sport athlete at Kiel High School in Kiel, Wis. He served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to The Netherlands from 1977-79 and earned a BA in political science from BYU in 1986 and an MA in health, physical education and recreation from Utah State in 1992.

Wardenburg and his wife Pam have four sons, Scott, Jonathan, Adam and Barrett, and one granddaughter.

## 2008-09 BYU Men's Basketball

### TERRY NASHIF 1st year (BYU 2005)

A former BYU point guard, Terry Nashif was hired as an assistant coach in June 2007 after serving two seasons on Dave Rose's staff as the Cougars' director of basketball operations from 2005-07.



In his first season as an assistant coach, Nashif helped the Cougars achieve the second most wins in school history with a 27-8 record and become the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win two outright league titles. The 2007-08 Cougars won their second-straight outright regular-season MWC Championship with a 14-2 mark to become the first Cougar teams since 1979 and 1980 to achieve back-to-back outright titles. BYU has also appeared in the national top-25 polls in each of the last two seasons while making consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. The last time the Cougars were ranked in back-to-back season was in 1981 and 1982 and the previous BYU team to be ranked was in 1993.

In his three years overall on Rose's staff, Nashif has been a part of three straight 20 wins seasons and a 72-26 overall record. Nashif's efforts this past season assisting with game film and defensive game plan preparation helped the Cougars become the 11th-ranked team in the nation in field-goal percentage defense, holding opponents to a combined 38.9 percent on the year. On the defensive end, the Cougars were also the MWC's top team in three-point field-goal percentage defense (.300) and had the largest margin on the boards, grabbing 4.3 more rebounds per game than their opponents.

A native of Vancouver, Wash., Nashif first came to BYU in 2001 as a walk-on point guard and eventually earned a scholarship. A smart floor leader, Nashif appeared in 103 games for the Cougars, including 14 starts, as a member of two NCAA Tournament teams. As a sophomore in 2002-03, Nashif helped the Cougars claim a share of the Mountain West Conference regular-season title by ranking first among MWC players in assist/turnover ratio during league games. That season he played in every game, including six starts, and led BYU in assists (3.0) while averaging 2.2 points, his highest scoring average of his four-year career. He posted a career-high 11 points on 3-for-3 three-point shooting in 30 minutes at San Diego State and had one of the best games of his career against UNLV, tallying seven assists, four rebounds and two blocks while matching up against future NBA first-round draft pick Marcus Banks.

As a junior, Nashif played in 23 of 30 games despite missing a month due to illness, averaging 1.1 assists and 1.0 points per game. During his senior campaign in 2004-05, Nashif achieved a career-high eight rebounds against California and dished out a career-best 10 assists at USC while averaging 1.7 assists per game. He led the team in assists six times in 27 appearances with seven starts.

After graduating from BYU in 2005 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Nashif was hired as the Director of Basketball Operations in Rose's first season at the helm. Nashif's primary responsibilities included coordinating team travel and providing support for academics, marketing and recruiting. He also organized team banquets and golf tournaments and provided assistance with all team-related activities.

Prior to coming to BYU, Nashif prepped at Evergreen High School in Vancouver, Wash., where he was the KVAN Radio Athlete of the Year, Columbian Player of the Year and Evergreen Defensive Player of the Year.

Nashif served a two-year mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Columbia, S.C. from 1999-2001. He and his wife Katie have one daughter, Macie.

**SUMMARY:** A 6-foot-7 guard from Mesa, Ariz., Cummard was the Mountain West Conference Co-Player of the Year and received Associated Press All-America honorable mention this past season. The do-everything junior swingman led the Cougars in scoring (15.8), field-goal percentage (.569), three-point percentage (.472) and blocked shots (1.0) while ranking second in rebounds (6.3), assists (3.5), steals (0.9) and free-throw percentage (.857). Known as a fierce competitor and all-around contributor, Cummard also led the team in shooting, steals and minutes while ranking second in assists and blocks and third in scoring and rebounds as a sophomore. A three-year starter and top perimeter defender, Cummard has good ball-handling skills, excellent shooting range and the toughness to rebound and finish in traffic. He has helped the Cougars achieve a 72-26 (.735) record and three straight postseason invitations, including NCAA Tournament bids the last two years. Under the tutelage of third-year BYU coach Dave Rose, Cummard and the Cougars have earned recognition in the top-25 rankings during each of the past two seasons while becoming the first MWC team to achieve back-to-back outright MWC championships. The Cougars defeated No. 6 Louisville and earned a 27-8 record in 2007-08, the second-most wins in school history.

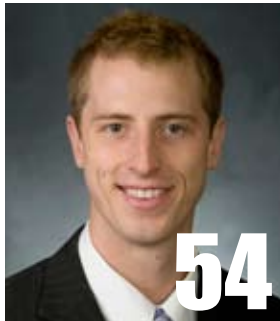
