### BYU TO PLAY AT PEPPERDINE IN FIRST ROAD GAME

Coming off a season-opening victory at home against Long Beach State, BYU men's basketball will play its first road game of the 2008-09 season on Monday at Pepperdine. The Cougars defeated Long Beach State 75-65 behind Lee Cummond's career-high 36 points to extend the school record and nation's best home winning streak to 48 games. Pepperdine is 1-1 on the year and led by Mychel Thompson's 17.5 points per game. Saturday's game will not be televised but can be heard live on the radio beginning with the pregame show at 6 p.m. PT on KSL Newsradio 102.7 FM and 1160 AM out of Salt Lake City or via the Internet at KSL.com.

### UP NEXT

BYU will host the Basketball Travelers Invitational from Nov. 20 to 22 at the Marriott Center. The Cougars will play three games in three days against North Florida on Nov. 20 at 7:30 p.m., Rice on Nov. 21 at 8:30 p.m. and Cal Poly on Nov. 22 at 8:30 p.m.

### COUGAR QUICK HITS

- BYU extended its nation's-best home winning streak to 48 games with a 75-65 victory at home over Long Beach to open the 2008-09 season. The Cougars went 16-0 at home last year. The streak is the longest in school history.
- Two-time MWC Coach of the Year Dave Rose has guided BYU to three-straight 20-win seasons and three-straight postseason appearances. In his first season the Cougars were 20-9 and made a trip to the NIT. In his second campaign he guided the Cougars to the outright MWC title, a top-25 ranking, a trip to the NCAA Tournament and a 25-9 overall record. Last season he led BYU to a 27-8 overall record, a second-straight outright league title and a trip to the NCAA Tournament.
- BYU has been picked to finish second (five first-place votes) in the MWC preseason poll by the league's media.
- Lee Cummond has been named a 2008-09 preseason candidate for the John R. Wooden Award All-America Team and Player of the Year trophy

**LOOKING AT PEPPERDINE**

Pepperdine has opened the 2008-09 season by splitting two home games. The Waves defeated CS Monterey Bay 91-82 in the opener. Mychel Thompson scored 25 points and Ryan Holmes added 22 points in the win. Thompson hit 3-of-5 from downtown in the win while Holmes was 10-of-13 from the free throw line. Keion Bell scored 17 points to lead the Waves in their 66-65 loss to Arkansas-Little Rock. The Waves had two game-winning opportunities but Thompson missed a 15-footer and Jonathan Dupre' missed a baseline jumper. Tom Asbury is in his seventh season as head coach of the Waves but his first since 1993-94. Asbury was 125-69 from 1989 to 1994 and led the Waves to three NCAA Tournament appearances and two trips to the NIT. Following his stint at Pepperdine Asbury was the head coach at Kansas State from 1995-2000 and an assistant coach at Alabama from 2004-07. Last season the Waves had an overall record of 11-21. The Waves play in the West Coast Conference and finished sixth in league play last season with a 4-10 record.

**PEPPERDINE'S LAST OUTING — WAVES FALL TO ARKANSAS-LITTLE ROCK**

After opening the season with a 91-82 victory over CS Monterey Bay, Pepperdine dropped a close on to Arkansas-Little Rock, 66-65 at home. The Waves had two chances to win the game but came up empty. Keion Bell scored 17 points to lead four players in double figures. Dane Suttle, Jr., came off the bench and hit 4-of-5 three-pointers for 12 points.

**SERIES NOTES**

This will be the seventh meeting between Pepperdine and BYU. The Cougars trail the series 3-4 but have won the last two meetings, including last season's 86-67 win at the Marriott Center. The Waves lead the series in Malibu 3-0, winning the last meeting 82-79 in overtime in 2002. Pepperdine won the first three meetings of the series with the first game dating back to 1944. The Waves won again in 1959 and then in 1985 before BYU picked up its first win of the series at home in 1997.

**LAST YEAR VS. PEPPERDINE**

No. 25 BYU (9-2) won its 37th straight home game with a convincing 86-67 win over Pepperdine (5-7) Saturday night in the Marriott Center. Junior guard Lee Cummard led all scorers with 21 points on 10-of-12 shooting, while junior center Trent Plaisted posted his fourth double-double of the season with 18 points and a season-high 18 rebounds. Plaisted's 18 boards also matched his career high. Jason Walberg paced Pepperdine with 17 points, while Malcolm Thomas chipped in 14 points and seven rebounds. BYU shot 57 percent for the game to the Waves' 31 percent. The Cougars recorded 24 assists on their 37 field goals. BYU also won the battle of the boards, 46-37. The Cougars applied a balanced attack early on as Sam Burgess followed up a lay-in with a head fake and kiss off the glass to give him a quick four points. Plaisted scored on a strong post move going left, while Cummard nailed a trey from the top of the key giving BYU a 9-2 lead. Minutes later, Plaisted flushed a layup and a dunk in succession to give the Cougars a double-digit lead little more than five minutes into the game. Carrying a 20-8 edge with 11 minutes remaining in the first half, BYU got a little sloppy. Thanks in large part to the Cougars' 12 turnovers in the game's first 12 minutes the Waves used an 11-2 run to get back in the game. Leading by only three points at 22-19, BYU went back to work in the paint. After another Plaisted slam, freshman Chris Collinsworth put down a layup to extend the Cougars' cushion to seven at 26-19. Freshman guard Michael Loyd, Jr. knocked one down from beyond the arc and then swished a 15-footer along the left baseline. Pepperdine responded with back-to-back three-pointers to cut BYU's lead to 31-28 with five minutes to go in the half. Seconds later it was Loyd, Jr. again bringing a little show time basketball to the Marriott Center. The Las Vegas native stole the ball and drove the length of the court before throwing up a perfectly timed alley-oop to Cummard. A Ben Murdock three and a Plaisted jump-hook in the paint brought the Cougars' lead back to 10 at 38-28. With just under two minutes remaining, Cummard went coast-to-coast for a two-handed slam that gave BYU its largest lead of the half at 40-29. Pepperdine scored four unanswered points in the low post to make it a 40-33 game at the break. The Cougars shot a smoldering 62 percent from the field in the opening half, while holding the Waves to just 34 percent.

**WHAT WAS SAID AFTER THE GAME ...**

**BYU Head Coach Dave Rose**

— "I am proud of our players for how they rallied around each other after how many turnovers we made. We made some adjustments at the half that helped us with avoiding turnovers in their press. Overall it was a good game for us."  
— "The heart and soul of our team has a lot of experience in finding the best shot possible. When they pass up a good shot for a better shot, it becomes contagious throughout the whole team. That helped us out a lot tonight."

**BYU Head Coach Vance Walburg**

— "They're a better team, smarter and more experienced. They're a top-25 team and have a lot more experience than us."  
— "We turned the ball over 24 times. We're not going to beat anyone by doing that. When we create turnovers we need to take advantage of them on the other end of the floor, and tonight we didn't do that."  
— "This team has little experience. We have a long way to go, but we're going to get better. When all five players on our defense are where they're supposed to be and are doing their jobs good things can happen."  
— "For us to have any success we can't beat ourselves. Tonight we beat ourselves."

**NOTES FROM THE 2007 MATCHUP**

— True freshman Chris Collinsworth made the second start of his Cougar career Saturday against Pepperdine. He received the starting nod for the second straight game along with Ben Murdock, Sam Burgess, Lee Cummard and Trent Plaisted, who have each started all 11 games for BYU this season.  
— With the win, BYU gained sole possession of the nation's longest active home victory streak at 37 games, surpassing Memphis. The Cougars have not lost at home since Nov. 18, 2005, a 73-81 loss to Loyola Marymount.  
— With the 19-point win, BYU is now outscoring its opponents by 17.2 points on the year. That margin jumps to 22.9 points in the Cougars' nine wins.  
— BYU is now 9-0 when scoring at least 70 points in a game and 7-1 when holding opponents under the 70-point mark. The Cougars are also now 5-0 when scoring at least 80 points.  
— With 18 points, Plaisted remains the only Cougar to score in double figures in every game this season. Plaisted reached double figures in the first half as he posted 10 points and seven rebounds in the first 20 minutes of the game.  
— Plaisted also recorded his fourth double-double of the year and 13th of his career with a career-high-tying 18 rebounds to go along with 18 points. On the year, Plaisted leads the Mountain West Conference in both scoring and rebounding.  
— With 21 points on 10-for-12 shooting, Cummard has now scored at least 20 points in three games on the year and five in his career. Including a season-high 27 points Wednesday against Lamar, Cummard averaged 24.0 points in two games this week.  
— As a team, BYU connected on seven three-pointers. The Cougars have nailed at least six from behind the arc in each game this season.  
— With a 40-33 halftime lead against Pepperdine, the Cougars have now led at halftime in 10 of 11 games this year, going 9-1 in those contests and outscoring opponents by an average of 12.7 points in the first half.  
— BYU has held all 10 of its opponents this year under 40 points in the first half. BYU has scored at least 30 first-half points in every game this season and has topped 40 points in seven games.  
— The Cougars made seven of their first nine shots from the field to open up a 15-5 early lead. Overall, BYU shot a first-half season-high 62.1 percent from the field in the opening period.  
— After going 4-for-5 for nine points in the first half, Cummard scored the first six points of the second half for BYU, including his third dunk of the night and sixth of the season.

**BYU'S LAST OUTING - CUMMARD NETS A CAREER-HIGH 36 POINTS IN SEASON OPENER**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 14, 2008) – In its season opener against Long Beach State (0-1), the BYU men's basketball team (1-0) came out victorious with a final score of 75-65, leading the series 5-4. "I'm really proud of our players as a group," said BYU men's basketball head coach Dave Rose. "We did a lot of good things as a team." Wooden Award candidate Lee Cummard dominated the game with back-to-back three pointers and shot accuracy to produce 22 of the first 31 points for BYU in the first half against LBSU. "I just felt fortunate to make my shots," said Cummard. "I was trying not to look up [at the scoreboard] and see what I was doing. We were playing at our pace in the second half and expending just as much energy on the defensive end as we were on offense." With a total of 36 points, Cummard earned the title of the most points scored by a BYU basketball player since Russell Larson in 1993. "Lee was incredible tonight," said junior forward Jonathan Tavernari. "I say thanks to Lee for showing up in the first half." It was Tavernari who got Cougar fans to their feet early on, starting off the season-opener with a dunk, leveling out the score 2-2. Despite opening with a bang and a seven-point run, BYU was unable to hold the momentum of the home-court. The 49ers fought back closing in from behind and eventually taking the lead 15-12. The remainder of the first half was a back-and-forth battle between the two teams with neither one able to gain a lead of more than 5 points. Unfortunately BYU could not pull ahead, going into the second half trailing 31-38. Determined to claim a win, the Cougars came into the second half, taking the first lead of the night 41-40 due to a layup by Cummard. From there, BYU continued to gain momentum and continuously steal the lead giving Cougar fans the show they came to see. In the final seconds of the game the Cougars were able to hold back the 49ers bringing their field goal percentage down from 46.9% in the first half, to 34.5% in the second and earn their greatest lead of the lead of the night at 10 points with the final score 75-65. Cummard led the Cougars with the double-double in total points (36) and rebounds (11). He also led in three pointers. Chalking up the second-most points of the night was Tavernari with 19. Tavernari also led in assists (five) and came in second for rebounds with seven.

– "I'm really proud of our players as a group. We did a lot of good things as a team."  
– "We put ourselves in a difficult situation in the first half. We were rushing and everything was in a hurry. We had some nice shots but we were playing at their pace."  
– "We have a lot of work to do but I'm proud of our players. It's a learning process. Hopefully on Tuesday we will be a better team."

– Wooden Award candidate Cummard dominated the season opener scoring the most points in a single game since Russell Larson in 1993 with 36. He shares the eighth highest single-game point total with eight other Cougars. The last time an individual Cougar scored more than 30 points was Keena Young at UNLV in 2007, where he scored 34 points.  
– Tavernari started off the Cougar points with a dunk to wow the crowd and was second in scoring points for the Cougars on the night with 19.  
– BYU is now 74-33 in all-time season openers.  
– The Cougars maintain the nation's longest home winning streak at 48 games.  
– Back-to-back three pointers and rapid fire shooting produced 22 of the first 31 points from All-America candidate Lee Cummard. **EXHIBITION #1 - CONVINCING EXHIBITION WIN AGAINST CONCORDIA**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 6, 2008) – In its first exhibition game of the 2008-09 season, the BYU men's basketball team handily defeated Concordia 96-54 at home in the Marriott Center. The 42-point victory matched the offensive productivity seen last season when the Cougars notched 20 double-digit wins. Sophomore Jimmer Fredette led all scorers with 26 points, going 6-of-8 from behind the new three-point line. Team captains Lee Cummmard and Jonathan Tavernari both contributed 15 points apiece with Cummmard leading the team with nine rebounds. Returning starters Tavernari and Cummmard were joined in the starting lineup by Fredette, and juniors Lamont Morgan, Jr. and Chris Miles. Combined, the starting five contributed 65 of the team's 96 total points. Reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year Cummmard picked up where he left off last season, scoring seven of BYU's first nine points. After jumping out to quick 5-0 start, the Stingers went on a 7-2 run to overtake the lead before a running layup by Cummmard put the Cougars up 9-7 heading into the game's first media timeout. Fredette extended the BYU lead to four points after a made three-pointer with 13:46 remaining in the first half. After Tavernari scored his first points of the game on a beneath-the-basket make with 9:08 to play in the half, his steal on Concordia's following possession helped set up a dunk for newcomer Charles Abouo. In what seemed like *deja vu*, Tavernari recovered a Stinger turnover on the ensuing play resulting in a second dunk by Abouo. Back-to-back makes by Tavernari capped a 21-4 run by the Cougars, giving them a 39-19 lead with 4:20 remaining until the halftime break. With under one minute to play in the half, Tavernari made his first three-pointer of the night to help put BYU up 23 points at the half. After making two three-pointers in the first half, Fredette came out strong to start the second, connecting on 3-of-3 attempts from beyond the arc in the first five minutes. Tough defense and turnovers on both sides of the ball kept either team from scoring for the next two minutes until Morgan drew a foul on a fast-break layup, giving the Cougars a 78-39 lead.

**WHITE BEATS BLUE AT COUGAR TIPOFF**

PROVO, Utah (October 29, 2008) – Fans got their first official taste of the 2008-09 BYU Men's Basketball team Wednesday as the White team beat the Blue team 59-51 during the Cougar Tipoff at the Marriott Center. "I was really pleased with our progress from the first half to the second half," said BYU head coach Dave Rose. "I thought we settled in and played a lot more like we are going to play." The night featured the annual Blue/White game between players and showcased the team to fans. The White team held the Blue team scoreless through the first 13 minutes and jumped out to an 11-0 lead before the first timeout of the game at 15:12. Jonathan Tavernari led all scorers with 23 points on 9-15 shooting. Senior forward Lee Cummmard, the 2007-08 MWC Co-Player of the Year had 11 points. Freshmen Charles Abouo and Matt Pinegar also contributed with 11 points each. Tavernari and freshman guard Jackson Emery led all rebounders with eight apiece. Both teams shot above 70 percent from the free-throw line, with the Blue team shooting 75 percent and the White team shooting 73.3 percent. The game featured some exciting moments. The end of the first half was punctuated with a shot by guard Jackson Emery, who then stole the inbounds pass and dished the ball behind his back to Jimmer Fredette, who laid the ball in the hoop, but the shot was called off because the halftime buzzer had already sounded. Just three minutes into the second half, Emery passed the ball forward to senior center Gavin MacGregor who drove down the lane for a one-handed dunk. "I think the talent level of this group is good," said Rose. Our athleticism is improved and we have good strength. Hopefully that will help us defensively and allow us to be more diverse offensively." BYU fans can next catch the Cougars at the Marriott Center when they face Concordia University in an exhibition game Thursday, Nov. 6 at 7 p.m. MT. BYU will then face Georgetown College on Tuesday, Nov. 11 at 7:30 p.m.

**CUMMMARD, TAVERNARI NAMED TEAM CAPTAINS**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 4, 2008) – BYU men's basketball head coach Dave Rose announced Tuesday that senior Lee Cummmard and junior Jonathan Tavernari have been selected to serve as captains on this year's team. "Both our captains are great examples of what we want all our players to strive for," Rose said. "Lee and Jonathan are both great competitors, do well in the classroom and are good ambassadors of our program in the community. Lee did an outstanding job as a captain last year and has proven leadership ability both on and off the court. Jonathan has been a key member of our team the past two years and has earned the respect of a team leader." Cummmard is a three-year starter and the reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year. He earned Associated Press All-America honorable mention last year after helping the Cougars win their second straight outright MWC title and a 27-8 overall record. A 6-foot-7 swingman from Mesa, Ariz., Cummmard is a do-everything player who led the Cougars in scoring (15.8), field-goal percentage (.569), three-point percentage (.472) and blocked shots (1.0) last year while ranking second in rebounds (6.3), assists (3.5), steals (0.9) and free-throw percentage (.857). Tavernari followed his MWC Freshman of the Year season in 2006-07 with a record-setting sophomore campaign last year. The 6-foot-6 forward from Sao Bernardo, Brazil, earned All-MWC Third Team honors and set the BYU single-season and sophomore MWC three-point record with 88 treys last season. This summer he was the lone nonprofessional player to make the Brazilian Senior National Team that competed at the Olympic Qualifying Tournament in Athens, Greece.

**LEE CUMNARD TABBED AS WOODEN AWARD CANDIDATE**

The 2008-09 preseason candidates for the John R. Wooden Award All-American Team and Player of the Year trophy were announced Nov. 7 by Richard "Duke" Llewellyn, Wooden Award Chairman and founder. The list is composed of 50 student athletes who, based on last year's individual performance and team records, are the early frontrunners for college basketball's most prestigious honor. BYU senior guard Lee Cumnard has been named as one of the 50 preseason candidates for the 2008-09 award. The reigning Mountain West Conference Player of the Year, Cumnard is a three-year starter who earned Associated Press All-America honorable mention last year after leading the Cougars to a 27-8 overall record and their second straight outright MWC title. A 6-foot-7 swingman from Mesa, Ariz., Cumnard is a do-everything player who led the Cougars in scoring (15.8), field-goal percentage (.569), three-point percentage (.472) and blocked shots (1.0) last year while ranking second in rebounds (6.3), assists (3.5), steals (0.9) and free-throw percentage (.857). Tyler Hansbrough of North Carolina, last year's Wooden Award winner, returns to Chapel Hill for his final collegiate season and has a chance to become only the second repeat men's Wooden Award winner. Ralph Sampson of Virginia won the Award twice, in 1982 and 1983. Other returning Wooden All-Americans include Notre Dame forward Luke Harangody and Davidson guard Stephen Curry. Returning players from last year's Wooden Award ballot, in addition to the three All-Americans above, include UCLA's Darren Collison, Connecticut's A.J. Price, Tennessee's Tyler Smith and Robbie Hummel of Purdue. Transfers, freshmen and medical redshirts are not eligible for the preseason list. These players and others who excel throughout the season will be evaluated and considered for January's Midseason list and the official voting ballot released in March. North Carolina (Hansbrough, Wayne Ellington, Ty Lawson) had three players on the list. Six schools placed two players on the list: Louisville (Earl Clark, Terrence Williams), Duke (Kyle Singler, Gerald Henderson), Marquette (Jerel McNeal, Dominic James), Pittsburgh (DeJuan Blair, Sam Young), Connecticut (Price, Hasheem Thabeet), and Texas (Damion James, A.J. Abrams). In all, 42 schools and 13 conferences are represented on the Wooden Award Pre-Season list. Leading the way is the Big East (12), followed by the ACC (8), Pac-10 (5), SEC (5), Big 12 (5), Atlantic-10 (2), Big Ten (3), Conference USA (3), Mountain West (2), West Coast (2), Colonial Athletic Association (1), Ohio Valley (1), and the Southern Conference (1).

BYU trailed Long Beach State 38-31 at the half before coming back to win 75-65 in the season opener. Last season the Cougars trailed at the half five times and finished 2-3 in those games. BYU was also 0-2 in games tied at the half. Against Long Beach BYU fell behind 9-7 at the 15:07 mark in the first half (the score was tied briefly at 9-9 at the 14:50 mark) and did not lead against until 41-40 with 15:02 to go in the second half. After Jimmer Fredette's free throw with 9:23 remaining gave the Cougars the lead at 51-50 BYU led the rest of the way.

**REBOUNDING ADVANTAGE**

BYU continued the trend of winning when outrebounding its opponent over from 2007-08 to the season opener against Long Beach State. The Cougars held a 43-36 advantage on the boards in the victory and were 21-2 in 2007-08 when winning the battle of the boards.

**BYU IN HOME OPENERS**

With the 75-65 season and home-opening victory over Long Beach State, BYU is 83-24 (.776) all-time in home openers, including a 27-11 (.711) mark in the Marriott Center. The Cougars won their home opener last season with a 90-69 victory over Idaho State. BYU is 3-1 in home openers under Dave Rose.

**LATE GAME FREE THROWS**

BYU struggled from the free throw line early on in the season opener against Long Beach State, hitting just 3-of-9 from the charity stripe in the first half, including a 1-of-7 start. The Cougars improved slightly in the first 15 minutes of the second half, hitting 6-of-10 from the line. BYU was clutch from the line in the final five minutes of the game as Lee Cummond and Jimmer Fredette were both 4-of-4 for a combined total of 8-for-8.

**ALMOST EVEN IN THREE-POINT SHOOTING**

Lee Cummond leads teammate Jonathan Tavernari in career treys by one, 120-119. Cummond hit three in the season opener while Tavernari drained two. They both came into the season with 117 career makes from long range. They are currently fifth and sixth all-time at BYU in career threes behind Terrell Lyday, who hit 127 threes in two seasons from 1999-2001. Tavernari, a junior, owns the single-season record for made three-pointers with 88 in 2007-08. The all-time leader for career threes is Mark Bigelow with 213.

**FIRST DUNK**

Junior Jonathan Tavernari scored BYU's first points of the 2008-09 season on a dunk 1:41 into the game. Not only was it BYU's first points of the season and first dunk of the season, it was Tavernari's first career slam.

**HIGH-PERCENTAGE SHOOTING**

Senior Lee Cummond scorched the nets in BYU's season opener by hitting 81.3 percent (13-of-16) from the field, 75.0 percent from downtown (3-of-4) and 100.0 percent (7-of-7) on free throws. His career percentages are now 55.1 percent from the field (currently seventh all-time at BYU), 45.1 percent on threes (currently third all-time) and 82.3 percent on free throws (currently seventh all-time).

**1,000-POINT MAN**

With 36 points in the season opener against Long Beach State, Lee Cummond now has 1,049 career points. Cummond surpassed Dave Eastis (1,015 points) and Bernie Fryer (1,031 points). He trailed Scott Runia (1,051 points) by two points and former teammate Keena Young (1,068 points) by 19 points.

**THE STARTING FIVE**

BYU head coach Dave Rose started Lamont Morgan, Jr., Jackson Emery, Lee Cummond, Jonathan Tavernari and Chris Miles in the 2008-09 season opener. Lee Cummond now has 84 career starts, Tavernari has 30, Miles and Emery have seven apiece and Morgan, Jr. has one.

**TRUE BLUE FANS**

In the 2008-09 home opener 15,753 fans were in attendance, at total that is 3,600 more than the 2007-08 home opener. Last season BYU averaged 13,518 fans per home game to finish ranked No. 21 in the nation in home attendance. The Cougars were third behind Memphis (No. 10) and Creighton (No. 15) in teams not from a BCS football conference in home attendance. BYU was second in the MWC in home attendance behind New Mexico (No. 18, 14,361 per game).

**INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS AT BYU**

- Including incoming freshman Charles Abouo, 28 international players have played basketball at BYU.
- The Cougars have had an international player on their varsity roster in 37 of the past 57 years.
- In the last five years, BYU has rostered eight international players, including three on this season's team - Charles Abouo (Cote d'Ivoire), Archie Rose (Bahamas) and Jonathan Tavernari (Brazil).
- Foreign players at BYU have received nine all-conference citations, two conference player of the year awards (Timo Saarelainen - 1985, Rafael Araujo - 2004), one conference freshman of the year award (Jonathan Tavernari - 2007) and eight All-America citations (Kresimir Cosic - 1972 and 1973, Rafael Araujo - 2004).
- According to a book about basketball in Finland by Mikko Simon, BYU has the distinction of being the first NCAA Division I school to have an overseas player on its roster when Timo Lampen, a native of Lahti, Finland, took the court for the Cougars in 1960-61.
- BYU also boasts the first foreign All-American in Kresimir Cosic, whose BYU jersey was retired on March 4, 2006. The Zadar, Yugoslavia, native played on the Cougar varsity team from 1971-73 and earned six All-America citations and three first-team All-Western Athletic Conference awards. He is the only BYU player to be inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame. Cosic passed away in 1995.
- During the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, CBS Television analyst Billy Packer singled out Cosic during a discussion of the quality of international players now playing college basketball. Said Packer, "Kresimir Cosic, who played for BYU, was really the first great international player to play basketball in the United States."

**PRESEASON MWC POLL**

The Mountain West Conference media selected two-time defending MWC Tournament champion UNLV as the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West Conference men's basketball regular-season title in 2008-09. Three teams earned first-place votes, with UNLV capturing 16 of 24 first-place votes and 206 points for the top spot in the poll. Two-time defending MWC regular-season champion BYU (181 points) collected five first-place votes, while San Diego State (170 points) earned three first-place votes to finish second and third, respectively. Utah tallied 148 points for fourth and New Mexico earned 132 points for fifth. Wyoming received 75 points to finish sixth, followed by Air Force (66 points) in seventh, Colorado State (53 points) in eighth and TCU (49 points) in ninth to round out the poll. Five seniors representing five institutions were chosen for the 2008-09 preseason all-MWC team. BYU's Lee Cummond and UNLV's Wink Adams shared Preseason MWC Player of the Year honors, while UNLV's Tre'Von Willis garnered Preseason Newcomer of the Year accolades and New Mexico's Phillip McDonald received Preseason Freshman of the Year kudos.

**IN THE NINE YEARS OF THE MWC ...**

- BYU has had seven 20-win seasons, leading all MWC schools. Utah has had five, UNLV five, San Diego State four and Air Force, Wyoming and New Mexico three.
- BYU has had the league's top RPI three times, been second three times and third on three occasions. The Cougars were second last year (25) behind UNLV (24).
- BYU regularly plays one of the toughest schedules in the MWC. Last year, BYU's schedule was rated third behind UNLV and Utah.
- BYU has the most overall wins (189).
- BYU is also has the most conference wins (87).
- BYU is tied for the most MWC regular-season titles (four) with Utah.
- BYU is one of six MWC teams to win the MWC Tournament title.

**LEE CUMMOND NAMED TO MWC 10TH ANNIVERSARY TEAM**

PROVO, Utah (Oct. 13, 2008) - BYU senior guard Lee Cummond was one of 10 players named to the Mountain West Conference Men's Basketball 10th Anniversary Team. Cummond joins UNLV senior guard Wink Adams as the only two current players named to the team.

The team, announced by the MWC Monday, was selected by a combined panel of media, institutional and conference personnel and an on-line fan poll. In order to be eligible for consideration, candidates must have been an All-MWC First Team selection at least once in their careers.

The reigning MWC Player of the Year, Cummond leads a BYU team that has won back-to-back outright regular-season championships and holds the nation's top home victory streak at 47 games. The All-America candidate was the lone Cougar named to the team.

Anniversary teams will be chosen for each of the 19 conference-sponsored sports during the 2008-09 seasons in celebration of the Mountain West's 10th anniversary.

Since becoming head coach of the BYU Men's Basketball program on April 11, 2005, Dave Rose has guided the Cougars to an impressive array of on-the-court awards and accolades while his unassuming approach to service and the community has been recognized at the top of his profession.

Cougar fans have had plenty to "Rise and Shout" about with Rose at the helm. He has produced a three-year resume that is nearly unmatched. In fact, only eight other coaches have ever won more games in their first three seasons at the Division I level. Rose has returned BYU to the national stage with back-to-back appearances in the top-25 polls

and back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths. Under his tutelage, Rose's teams have not only broken into the top-25 rankings but also achieved the MWC's first-ever two-time outright league championships. Rose is the only BYU men's basketball coach to win conference coach-of-the-year honors in back-to-back seasons. He has also received district coach of the year accolades and honorable mention for national coach of the year. Another evidence of Rose's commitment to excellence is that his basketball program ranks in the top 10 percent nationally in multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate scores. As a result, the NCAA has honored BYU with Public Recognition awards in each of the past two seasons for their high academic achievement.

Rose first came to BYU as an assistant in 1997 to help newly hired head coach Steve Cleveland rebuild the Cougar program. Rose served eight seasons with Cleveland, including the last five as Associate Head Coach, before being promoted to BYU's head job. Rose played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play in eight of the past nine seasons, including five NCAA bids, while claiming four MWC titles. A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose has a proven record as a top recruiter. He has been recognized as one of college basketball's top-25 recruiters as BYU has had multiple top-20 recruiting classes with Rose overseeing or coordinating its efforts. Ten recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major league award in their first season as a Cougar in the 11 years Rose has been in Provo.

With 25 years of coaching experience, including 13 seasons as a head coach at the Division I, junior college, and high school levels, Rose has a proven record of constant success. Prior to coming to BYU as an assistant in 1997, Rose compiled a 167-57 record at Dixie State College (St. George, Utah). Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie.

Rose excelled in both baseball and basketball as a two-sport athlete at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, before serving a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79. Upon returning home, he transferred to the University of Houston where he completed his degree and was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished as the national runner-up.

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose and his wife Cheryl have three children and two grandchildren. Currently the Honorary Chairman of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation, Rose works with his wife, Cheryl, and the team to annually serve and comfort local families who endure the challenges of raising a child who has cancer. Dave

and Cheryl are also actively involved in a variety of other service and community initiatives. In 2008, Rose was honored by the National Association of Basketball Coaches with its Game Pillar Award for Service, one of only four Pillar Awards (Education, Leadership, Service and Advocacy) that the Association annually bestows on the most deserving among its vast membership. In 2008, Rose also became the 63rd recipient of the Dale Rex Memorial Award given annually to the person who has done the most for amateur athletics in the state of Utah.

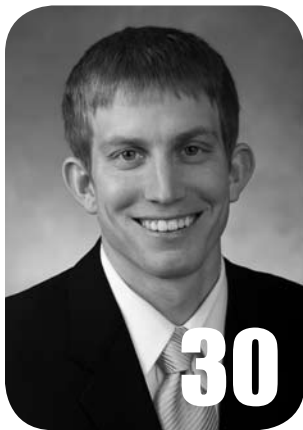

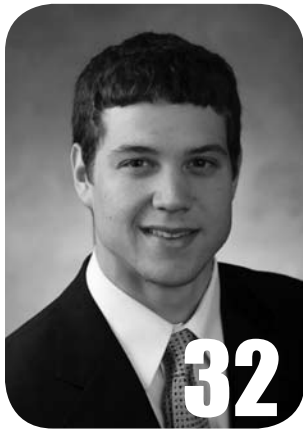

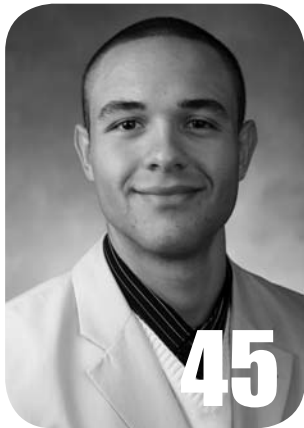
