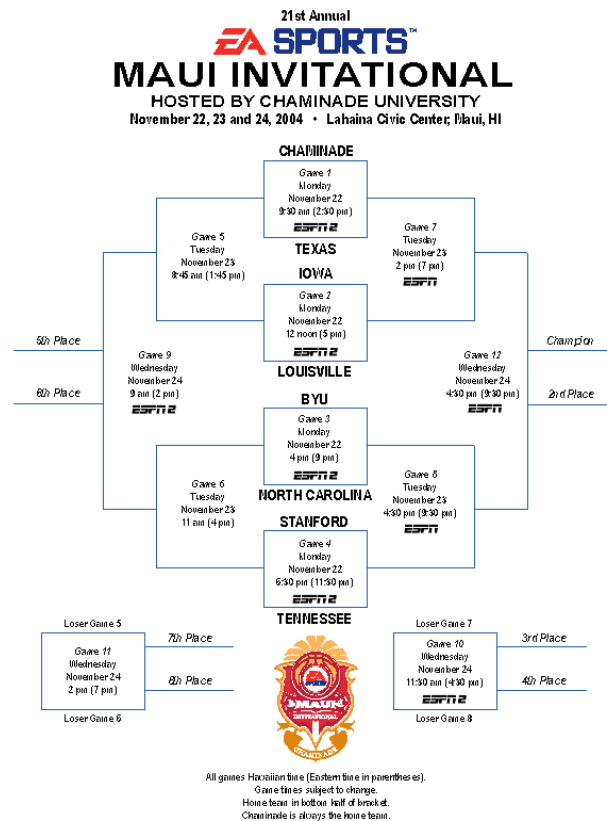

BYU FACES NO. 3 NORTH CAROLINA IN FIRST OF THREE GAMES AT THE MAUI INVITATIONAL

BYU opens its 2004-05 regular season Monday when it faces No. 3 North Carolina at the EA SPORTS Maui Invitational. The Cougars and Tar Heels tip off at 4 p.m. HT (7 p.m. MST) in a nationally televised contest on ESPN2 being played at Lahaina Civic Center. An annual tournament hosted by Chaminade University, the EA SPORTS Maui Invitational boasts a strong field in 2004 with No. 3 North Carolina, No. 13 Louisville, No. 15 Texas and No. 25 Stanford being joined by BYU, Tennessee, Iowa and host Chaminade. The Cougars will play either Stanford or Tennessee in the second round on Tuesday.

BYU AT A GLANCE

BYU coach Steve Cleveland lost the services of five of the eight players who played double-digit minutes for him a year ago, including four of his top five scorers, but his roster includes eight let-termen, six from last year's NCAA Tournament team, and adds a top-20 recruiting class. His young squad includes seven sophomores and three freshmen. While the relative youth of the BYU roster leaves some unanswered questions, the Cougars do have a good idea of what to expect from returning All-MWVC guard and MWC Defensive Player of the Year Mike Hall. Joining Hall with starting experience is senior center Jared Jensen and sophomore forward Garner Meads. Senior point guard Terry Nashif has made seven starts over his career. With some talented new-comers, the Cougars have the depth and talent to develop as a team and earn a sixth straight postseason bid. The Cougars were picked fifth in the MWC poll by the league's media, but they hope to earn their fourth NCAA invite in the last five years and challenge for the MWVC title.

LOOKING AT NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina opens the season vs. Santa Clara Friday at the Pete Newell Challenge in Oakland, Calif. Predicted to place second in the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Tar Heels are ranked No. 3 in the preseason ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and are rated No. 4 in the Associated Press rankings. Under the direction of second-year coach Roy Williams, UNC returns all five starters for the second consecutive season and features three preseason Wooden Award candidates in junior swingman Rashad McCants, junior forward Sean May and junior guard Raymond Felton. With the talented trio, Williams can put on the floor ACC's leading scorer (McCants, 20.0 ppg), rebounder (May, 9.8 rpg) and assist man (Felton, 7.1 apg) from last season - the first time in ACC history that one team has had three different players lead in three categories. Also returning from last year's 19-11 NCAA team are three experienced seniors in guards Jackie Manuel and Melvin Scott as well as forward Jawad Williams. The three seniors enter the season with a combined 272 college games and 2,400 points to their credit. The Tar Heels return virtually all their production from last year as the four players lost from a year ago only contributed a total of 36 of UNC's 2,464 points. The talent on the floor is guided by one of college basketball's best coaches. Williams begins his 17th year overall in his second season at UNC. He is the winningest active coach by winning percentage in the nation and ranks fifth all-time in college basketball history with a .796 success rate (437-112 record). UNC won the Maui Invitational in its last trip in 1999.

LOOKING AT THE SECOND ROUND

BYU will play either No. 25 Stanford or Tennessee in the second round. A win Monday would put the Cougars in a 4:30 p.m. HT (7:30 p.m. MST) matchup on ESPN while a loss will put BYU in a 11 a.m. HT (2 p.m. MST) contest with no television coverage.

POTENTIAL SECOND-ROUND OPPONENT STANFORD

No. 25-ranked (coaches poll) Stanford, like North Carolina, opens the season at the Pete Newell Challenge in Oakland, Calif. The Cardinal play Bay-area foe San Francisco on Friday before heading to Hawaii. Stanford returns three starters and a total of 10 lettermen from last year's 30-2 team that won the Pac-10 title with a 17-1 record. First-year coach Trent Johnson does have some holes to fill as the team's top three scorers - Josh Childress, Matt Lottich, and Justin Davis - are gone. Johnson, who coached Nevada to the Sweet 16 last year and has a 79-74 record in six seasons, will look to preseason first-team All-Pac-10 pick Chris Hernandez to fill the void. Stanford is picked to finish third in the Pac-10 behind Arizona and Washington.

POTENTIAL SECOND-ROUND OPPONENT TENNESSEE

Tennessee returns all five starters and a total of nine lettermen from last year's 15-14 NIT team. The Volunteers, who have earned a postseason berth six of the last seven years, return 88 per-cent of their scoring and 86 percent of their rebounding from last year. Tennessee is led by senior guard Scooter McFadgon, who was fourth in the SEC in scoring at 17.6 ppg last year, forward Brandon Crump, who averaged 14.8 points and 6.8 rebounds last year, and guard C.J. Watson, who was second in the SEC with 5.0 assists per game while adding 11.5 points per outing. Tennessee coach Buzz Peterson will likely have freshman Chris Loftin in his starting lineup. The 6-foot-3 guard was Kentucky's Mr. Basketball with a 26.7 scoring average. Peterson (North Carolina, 1986) enters his fourth year at Tennessee (47-42; 152-92 overall in nine seasons).

CHAMINADE - POTENTIAL FIRST MEETING

LOOKING AT THE THIRD ROUND

BYU could face No. 13 Louisville, No. 15 Texas, Iowa or host Chaminade in the third round on Wednesday. Three of the four games on Wednesday will be televised, with the title game airing on ESPN and the 3rd-4th and 5th-6th deciders appearing on ESPN2.

POTENTIAL THIRD-ROUND OPPONENT LOUISVILLE

Louisville returns four players with starting experience, including three starters from last year's 20-10 team in guards Taquan Dean and Larry O'Bannon and forward Francisco Garcia. Forward Ellis Myles, a three-year starter who sat out last season due to an injured knee, is also back for the Cardinals. Coach Rick Pitino's team is the favorite to win Conference USA according to the league's coaches. Louisville is ranked 13th by the in the nation by the coaches and 14th by the Associated Press. Pitino is in his fourth year at Louisville with a 64-30 record entering the team's opener at BYU-Hawaii on Saturday. Pitino is 416-154 overall entering his 19th year.

POTENTIAL THIRD-ROUND OPPONENT TEXAS

No. 15-ranked Texas returns three starters and six lettermen from last year's 25-8 team that finished second in the Big 12 Conference. The Longhorns finished the season ranked 10th in the coaches poll and 12 by A after advancing to the regional semifinals of the NCAA Tournament before a loss to Xavier. Returning starters include junior forward Brad Buckman, junior guard Kenton Paulino and sophomore forward P.J. Tucker. The 6-foot-5 Tucker averaged 10.4 points and 6.8 rebounds a year ago while the 6-foot-8 Buckman added 5.7 points and 4.5 rebounds from the othe forward slot. Paulino, a 6-footer; added 4.8 points last season. Coach Rick Barnes enters Friday's opener against Texas State with a 141-58 record in six years at Texas. He is entering his 18th year overall having compiled a 343-192 resume.

POTENTIAL THIRD-ROUND OPPONENT IOWA

Iowa returns three starters and six lettermen from last year's fourth-place Big Ten finisher. The Hawkeyes earned their fourth straight postseason invite with an NIT bid last year after a 16-13 mark overall and 9-7 league record. Iowa should be led by returning starters Pierre Pierce (16.1 ppg, 5.7 rpg), Jeff Horner (13 ppg, 5.3 rpg) and Greg Brunner (10.9 ppg, 8.2 rpg). Brunner was second in the Big Ten in rebounding while Pierce ranked among the scoring and defensive leaders. Horner led the Big Ten in free throw percentage while dishing out 4.2 assists per game and making 42.5 percent from long range. Pierce and Horner were both third-team All-Big Ten selections. In his sixth year, Iowa coach Steve Alford has an 89-71 record entering the team's opener vs. Western Illinois on Friday. Alford is 245-148 overall in 13 years as a head coach.

POTENTIAL THIRD-ROUND OPPONENT CHAMINADE

Host Chaminade returns one starter among its eight returning lettermen from last year's 11-14 team. The Pacific West Conference team will look to senior Nick Frey for leadership in 2004-05. Frey is a 6-foot-9 center who averaged 11 points and 71 rebounds for the Silverswords last year as a starter. Chaminade is coached by Aaron Griess, who has earned a 55-51 record in his four years at the Honolulu-based school. Chaminade opened the 2004-05 season by beating Winona State University 67-64. Zack Whiting led the Swords with 18 points. Chris Nelson tallied 14 points and 6 rebounds and Chris Reaves finished with 10 points, including 6-of-7 from the free throw line. Forward Chris Powell gave the Swords a much needed spark off the bench. He scored 9 points, pulled down 9 rebounds and blocked 3 shots in just 18 minutes of play.

EXPERIMENTAL RULES USED AT MAUI INVITATIONAL

Three experimental rules will be used during the EA SPORTS Maui Invitational. BYU also competing using the rules during its exhibition wins in Provo over BYU-Hawaii and the University of Calgary. The rules, set up by the NCAA, include:

- Moving the three-point line 9 inches behind the current three-point arc to create an experimental distance of 20 feet, 6 inches.
- Widening the free throw lane by 1 1/2 feet on each side. The experimental lane will serve both as the three-second lane and the free throw lane.
- Placing a restricted-area arc two feet from the center basket ring.

STARTING THE SEASON IN MAUI

BYU and Tennessee are the only two teams who will open their seasons at the Maui Invitational. The other six teams all play once prior to beginning the tournament on Monday. Louisville does open in Hawaii but will play its first game on Saturday at BYU-Hawaii.

2004 FIELD IN THE MAUI INVITATIONAL

Six of the eight teams have played in past Maui Invitationals. North Carolina is the lone team to have won the title, winning in its last appearance in 1999. UNC has a 7-2 record in the tournament. Louisville is 3-3, BYU and Texas are 2-1 and Stanford owns a 2-4 Maui record. Host Chaminade is 4-54.

LAST TIME AT THE MAUI INVITATIONAL

BYU is playing in the Maui Invitational for the second time. The Cougars' first appearance in the tournament was in 1992 when BYU finished second. The Cougars came to Maui with a 5-1 record with their only loss an overtime defeat at Weber State. BYU opened the tournament on Dec. 21 with a one-point victory over Oklahoma, 76-75, and then outlasted Penny Hardaway and Memphis 73-67 in overtime to advance to the title game. The Cougars lost in the final to Duke, 89-66. The other teams to play in the event in 1992 in addition to host Chaminade were DePaul, LSU and Stanford. Russell Larson led BYU to its win over Oklahoma with 17 points and 10 rebounds while Kevin Nixon and Gary Trost added 14 points and Shane Knight contributed 11. Against Memphis, Trost scored 16, Nick Sanderson added 15, Nixon 14 and Larson 11. Hardaway went 13-of-27 from the floor, including 6-of-15 on threes to score 37 points while playing all 45 minutes. Against Duke, Larson scored 16, Trost 13 and Sanderson 11 for the Cougars while Grant Hill totaled 27 for Duke followed by Thomas Hill with 21 and Bobby Hurley chipped in 14 points along with his 11 assists. Grant Hill made 12-of-18 attempts from the floor. Mark Durrant, currently the game analyst for BYU radio broadcasts heard on KSL Newsradio 1160 and the BYU Radio Network, was a member of the Cougar team in 1992 when BYU last came to Maui. Having recently returned from two years of missionary service in Kentucky, Durrant was a sophomore for the Cougars. He had 2 points, 2 rebounds, 1 assist, 1 steal and 5 fouls 15 minutes vs. Oklahoma; 2 rebounds and 2 fouls in 2 minutes vs. Memphis and 2 rebounds, 1 assist, 1 block and 3 fouls in 18 minutes vs. Duke.

BYU IN HAWAII

While this is the second time for BYU to play in Maui, the Cougars have made numerous trips to Hawaii as a basketball program. As members of the Western Athletic Conference, BYU made annual trips to face the University of Hawaii in Honolulu. The Cougars have also made additional visits for tournament play over the years. BYU has played in the Rainbow Classic three times, 1970, 1977 and 1997. In addition to the 1992 Maui, BYU also played in the 2000 Yahoo Sports Invitational in Laie, Hawaii. In that visit - BYU's last to the Islands - BYU defeated Boise State before two tough defeats to Iowa State and USC.

DAWES, REISMAN, BURGESS RETURN TO HAWAII

Redshirt sophomore center Derek Dawes is the only member of this year's BYU team who has competed as a Cougar in Hawaii. He was a freshman on the 2000-01 team that played in Laie at the Yahoo Sports Invitational. He played in two of the three games. He logged three minutes vs. Iowa State, grabbing two rebounds and missing his only field goal attempt. He played eight minutes vs. USC, grabbing three boards, blocking one shot and again going 0-1 from the floor. Newcomer Joshua Reisman is the only member of the current BYU team who has played previously in the Maui Invitational. The junior college transfer out of San Jose City College was a red-shirt freshman on the Gonzaga team that played in the 2002 Maui Invitational won by Indiana. Junior forward Joshua Reisman also returns to Hawaii. He redshirted as a freshman at BYU-Hawaii in 1999-2000.

BYU VS. NORTH CAROLINA — IN HAWAII — THE SEQUEL

Monday's opening-round game against No. 3 North Carolina will be the second time the two teams have met in Hawaii - even though this will be only the fourth meeting between in the overall series. North Carolina defeated BYU on Dec. 28, 1977 at the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu, 94-81 in the closest of BYU's three defeats to the Tar Heels. Forward Keith Rice led BYU with 31 points on 14-of-21 shooting from the floor while adding a Rainbow Classic record 5 steals in his 33 minutes. His roommate, freshman Danny Ainge, who was listed as "Dane" Ainge in the final box score, added 23 points from the guardline on 11-of-17 shooting while making 4 steals for the Cougars. Center Alan Taylor totaled 11 points and a team-best 8 rebounds. Tar Heel star Phil Ford equaled Rice for game-high scoring honors with 31 while Mike O'Korn scored 25. UNC led 51-40 at the half and managed a two-point edge over the final 20 minutes for the 13-point win. Both teams burned the nets as UNC shot 64.3 percent for the game, including 70 percent in the first half, while BYU made 57.1 percent of its attempts, including 60 percent in the opening half.

BYU ANNOUNCES 2004-05 SCHEDULE**BYU Schedule Includes Maui Invitational, Delta Center Contest, Six Potential Games against Teams from the ACC and Pac-10 and a Minimum of Three ESPN or ESPN2 National Telecasts**

Participating in the EA Sports Maui Invitational, a return trip to the Delta Center and six potential contests against Atlantic Coast Conference and Pac-10 Conference opponents highlight the 2004-05 BYU men's basketball schedule announced today by head coach Steve Cleveland.

BYU will play 16 potential regular-season games against teams that qualified for postseason last year, including four ranked in the top 25 of the final 2004 poll.

"This is probably as good a schedule as we've had since I've been at BYU," Cleveland said. "I think the community and students will be excited about the quality of opponents we will play. We're committed to playing great teams to help our team reach its full potential."

The Cougars will play two teams from the ACC in the same season for the first time in nearly 50 years when they face possible preseason No. 1 North Carolina to open the season at the Maui Invitational on Nov. 22 and host North Carolina State in the Marriott Center on Dec. 21. The last time BYU had a schedule with two ACC teams was the 1955-56 season when the Cougars played at both NC State and Wake Forest.

NC State's visit to Provo this year also marks the first time an ACC team will face the Cougars on their home floor. Both North Carolina and NC State finished last season ranked in the top 25 and return strong teams. The Tar Heels are one of only two teams in the nation to have three players named to the preseason John R. Wooden Award list, while the ACC runner-up Wolfpack are led by fellow Wooden Award candidate Julius Hodge, the ACC Player of the Year and a first-team All-America selection by ESPN.com.

BYU will also play a minimum of three Pac-10 teams, with a fourth Pac-10 foe, Stanford, a possible second-round opponent at the Maui Invitational. After playing North Carolina in the tournament's primetime opening-day nationally televised game on ESPN2, the Cougars will meet either the Pac-10 Champion Cardinal (30-2 last year) or the Southeastern Conference's Tennessee Volunteers in the second round. The final day will pit Texas, Louisville, Iowa or host Chaminade against the Cougars.

After a well-received debut last year against Oklahoma State, the Cougars will again play a game at the Delta Center in Salt Lake City. The Cougars of Washington State will join BYU for a Dec. 11 contest on the home floor of the Utah Jazz. BYU's other games against Pac-10 opponents include the regular-season home opener against California on Nov. 27 and a road game at USC on Dec. 4.

The first of four instate games during December tips off on Dec. 1 when BYU travels to Logan for the second straight season to challenge Big West Champion Utah State. BYU and Utah State will meet twice in the same season for the first time since 1992 when the Aggies return to Provo on Dec. 18 for a rematch in the Marriott Center. The Cougars will sandwich Christmas around games against Weber State in Ogden on Dec. 23 and versus Southern Utah in Provo on Dec. 28.

Two other tough opponents will grace the Marriott Center court prior to the new year, with Boise State coming to Provo on Dec. 8 and Santa Clara helping BYU close out 2004 with a Dec. 31 contest. The Broncos out of the Western Athletic Conference finished 23-10 last year, including a 2-1 NIT record, while the Broncos of the West Coast Conference finished 16-16 after losing 63-62 to top-5 ranked Gonzaga in their conference tournament semifinals.

BYU travels to California to play Saint Mary's, a 19-12 team and West Coast Conference finalist last year, on Jan. 4 prior to starting MWC action in Provo against San Diego State on Jan. 8. Before resuming its MWC schedule, the Cougars will take one more dip into non-conference play on Jan. 11 when they host Montana State-Billings. The Pacific West Conference team led NCAA Division II teams with 12.4 threes per game last year and was fourth in scoring at 93.1 points per game.

"Our preseason should create great opportunities to prepare for conference and postseason play," Cleveland said. "The Mountain West Conference is full of veteran teams returning top players. Obviously, we lost a lot of significant contributors from last year, but we plan to be competitive and compete for the conference championship. I want this team to learn to reach its full potential, to focus on being the best it can be. If we do, with this schedule, we'll have a

BYU LAST YEAR VS. TOP TEAMS

BYU defeated then No. 25 and eventual Final Four participant Oklahoma State. It was BYU's first win over a top-25 team since an 81-76 victory over No. 13 Stanford on Dec. 22, 2001 at the Las Vegas Showdown. BYU went 11-6 last year against teams that qualified for postseason the prior year (21-point win over Weber State at home; five-point win over then No. 25 and current No. 7 Oklahoma State on a neutral floor; 29-point and six-point wins over CSU; two 14-point wins over Wyoming and a five-point win over the Cowboys; three-point and one-point wins over UNLV; 14-point OT win over SDSU; 13-point win over Utah; two-point loss at now nationally ranked Utah State; one-point loss at Cal, 27-point loss at nationally ranked North Carolina State, four-point loss at SDSU and an eight-point setback at Utah and three-point defeat to the Utes). BYU went 12-6 in 2002-03 against teams that qualified for postseason play in 2002. BYU posted a 4-2 record last year against teams that won their conference titles the prior season.

chance to reach our goals in January and February."

After its MWC opener with SDSU, BYU takes the Front Range road swing for two television contests. The Cougars face Colorado State on Jan. 15 in the weekly MWC Game of the Week on ESPN+Plus at 1 p.m. The Wyoming Cowboys then host BYU on Jan. 17 in the first of two 10 p.m. (MST) ESPN games featuring the Cougars.

BYU hosts reigning regular-season champion Air Force on Jan. 22 and New Mexico on Jan. 24 before playing in-state rival Utah on Jan. 31 in a 10 p.m. ESPN tip in the Marriott Center. After the three-game home stand, BYU travels to UNLV (Feb. 5) and San Diego State (Feb. 7), with the game in Las Vegas slated for ESPN+Plus.

Return games in Provo against Wyoming (Feb. 12) and Colorado State (Feb. 14) and road contests at New Mexico (Feb. 19) and Air Force (Feb. 21) precede BYU's rematch with Utah in Salt Lake City on Feb. 26. The Cougars and reigning MWC Tournament Champion Utes play at 1 p.m. in the featured Saturday game on ESPN+Plus.

BYU concludes the regular season against UNLV in the Marriott Center on Mar. 5. The MWC Tournament will be conducted for the second straight year at the Pepsi Center in Denver, March 10-12.

As part of preparing for its challenging schedule, BYU should receive some tougher-than-usual tests in its two exhibition games. After the Cougar Preview on Oct. 29, Cleveland will see how his young squad performs against BYU-Hawaii on Nov. 5 and the University of Calgary on Nov. 12.

The Cougars' Division II sister school from Laie, Hawaii, won the Pacific West Conference title last year with a 23-6 record and features two former Cougars in All-American Jake Chrisman and point guard Shawn Oponui. Last year the Seasideers defeated three Division I teams with victories over Baylor, Northern Illinois and San Jose State. Calgary, meanwhile, posted a 25-11 record as one of Canada's top four teams, advancing to the semifinals of the Canadian Interuniversity Sport Championship.

"We have two challenging exhibition games, which should really help us," said Cleveland, who has seven sophomores and three freshmen on his roster in 2003-04. "I have a lot of respect for Ken Wagner and the success he has achieved at Dixie and BYU-Hawaii. In both exhibitions, we will play against two well-coached teams that have proven programs."

Including the Preview and exhibitions, Cougar fans will be able to see BYU play 17 games in the Marriott Center and one contest at the Delta Center. The regular season also includes 11 games on the road and four on a neutral floor. Three games will be nationally televised on ESPN or ESPN2 and three will be featured on ESPN+Plus. All MWC Tournament games will also be televised on either ESPN or ESPN+Plus. Additional television games are still to be determined.

BYU's schedule includes 10 teams that finished in the top three in their respective league standings, with eight finishing as either the league champion or runner-up. Seven teams played in the NCAA Tournament and five were invited to the NIT, while eight opponents achieved 20-win seasons last year: North Carolina, North Carolina State, Stanford and Texas all finished the season in the final top-25 rankings.

Nine non-conference opponents played BYU last season. The Cougars achieved a 6-3 record in those games with home wins over USC (85-61), Weber State (86-65), Saint Mary's (70-55) and Southern Utah (88-54) and road victories over Boise State (75-69) and Santa Clara (68-66). The three setbacks came on the road at California (47-46), Utah State (76-74) and North Carolina State (89-62). BYU will meet Montana State-Billings for the first time and could also have its first-ever game against Chaminade should the two schools meet at the Maui Invitational.

BYU returns six lettermen from last year's 21-9 NCAA Tournament team, including three players with starting experience in senior guard Mike Hall, senior forward/center Jared Jensen and sophomore forward Garner Meads. The Cougars will be without the services of five of the eight players who played double-digit minutes a year ago and four of the team's top five scorers, including All-American center Rafael Araujo - the No. 8 pick in the 2004 NBA Draft. Three true freshman and three junior college transfers are among the nine players on this year's roster who did not suit up last season for the Cougars.

BYU IN MWC STATS

BYU led all Mountain West Conference teams in field goal percentage, free throw percentage and assists in 2003-04. The Cougars rated second in scoring offense, scoring margin, rebounding margin and assist/turnover ratio. The Cougars ranked third in steals, turnover margin, rebounding defense and scoring defense. In MWC games, BYU also led all league teams in steals.

COUGAR PROGRAM ACHIEVES ANOTHER 20-WIN SEASON

Last year's 21-9 NCAA team was Steve Cleveland's fourth 20-win team in the past five years. In his seven seasons in Provo, Cleveland has rebuilt the 1-25 program he inherited into a regular conference contender and NCAA participant. Only three BYU coaches have had more 20-win seasons.

FIVE STRAIGHT POSTSEASON INVITES

BYU earned its fifth straight postseason invitation in 2003-04, including its third NCAA Tournament berth in the last four years. The Cougars earned their second consecutive NCAA at-large invitation after finishing the year with the MWC's best RPI rating and strength of schedule ranking. The Cougars also had the league's top win with its victory over Big 12 Champion and NCAA Final Four participant Oklahoma State.

CONFERENCE TITLES

BYU has won two regular season MWC titles (2001 and 2003) and one MWC Tournament crown (2001) during the five years of the Mountain West Conference. BYU finished second in the regular season this year and was the 2000 MWC Tournament runner-up.

MWC SUCCESS

With BYU's 10-4 conference record last year, Steve Cleveland now has the most MWC wins of any coach. He passed Wyoming's Steve McClain last season and now has 45 MWC wins compared to McClain's 41.

BYU SUCCESS EVIDENT BY MWC AWARDS

BYU players have earned 15 All-MWC honors in the five years of the league, including last year when Rafael Araujo (1st team), Mark Bigelow (2nd team) and Mike Hall (3rd team) were recognized. Two players, Mekeli Wesley in 2001 and Rafael Araujo last year, have earned MWC Player of the Year accolades, while two others, Travis Hansen in 2003 and Mike Hall last year, have been named Defensive Player of the Year. Cougar coach Steve Cleveland was named MWC Coach of the Year in 2003.

NONCONFERENCE SUCCESS

BYU has had the best success of any MWC team against nonconference competition in the five years of the league. Cleveland has coached BYU to a 56-21 (.727) record against nonconference teams in the five years of the MWC, including the league's only unbeaten home nonconference record at 39-0. Overall, the Cougars have defeated 40 straight non-conference opponents in the Marriott Center since starting the streak with a 61-59 win over Utah State as a member of the WAC on Jan. 2, 1999. BYU has also achieved top nonconference wins with victories over nationally ranked opponents Oklahoma State (2003-04) and Stanford (2001-02).

PLAYERS IN THE PROS

In the past five years the BYU program has helped several players go on to professional basketball opportunities. Rafael Araujo was the No. 8 overall pick in this year's NBA draft, selected by the Toronto Raptors. Travis Hansen was the second-round pick of the Atlanta Hawks in 2003. After playing one year with the Hawks he signed a lucrative one-year contract to play in Spain. Others to play professionally over the past five years include Mekeli Wesley (Belgium), Terrell Lyday (France), Trent Whiting (Italy), Eric Nielsen (Spain) and Silester Rivers (Chile). In addition to Araujo, Mark Bigelow and Luiz Lemes joined the professional ranks overseas from last year's team.

BYU TOPS MWC IN ATTENDANCE

BYU led the Mountain West Conference in attendance and was ranked 11th nationally in home attendance after averaging 15,300 in 13 home games in 2003-04. The prior season in 2002-03, BYU averaged the 17th largest crowd in the nation overall at 14,468 and had the nation's largest percentage increase over the prior season (during the 2002 Olympic Games hosted in Salt Lake City). Last year BYU had a season-high 22,718 attendance vs. Utah, the largest crowd since 1992 and the 21st largest crowd ever in the Marriott Center.

WINNING BASKETBALL TRADITION

With its all-time record of 1471-940 (.610), BYU is No. 19 all-time in Division I victories. The Cougars rank 36th all-time in winning percentage among all Division I basketball programs. The Cougars have had 82 winning seasons in their 102 years of basketball and have made 30 postseason appearances, including 21 NCAA bids, and won 26 conference championships.

WINNING WAYS

- With its win at UNLV last year to conclude the regular season, BYU achieved its 28th 20-win season. The Cougars have averaged 20 wins every 2.7 years (BYU has played 76 seasons in which it has played at least 20 games in a season).

- Last year was BYU coach Steve Cleveland's fourth 20-win season in his seven years in Provo since rebuilding the program from its 1-25 season in 1996-97. Cleveland has the second-highest percentage of 20 win seasons (57%) in BYU history behind Roger Reid (75%). Only three BYU coaches have had more than four seasons of 20 wins:

CLEVELAND NO. 2 ON MARRIOTT CENTER VICTORY LIST; NO. 2 IN ALL-TIME BYU WINS ON HORIZON

Cougar head coach Steve Cleveland has guided BYU to the second-most Marriott Center wins. He needs nine more Marriott Center wins to have the most ever by a BYU coach. With his 84-18 record in the Cougars' home arena, he is currently second, having passed Frank Arnold's 81 victories with his win vs. New Mexico last year. Roger Reid has the most Marriott Center wins with 92. Ladell Andersen is fourth with 71. With a 129-87 overall record in his seven seasons in Provo, Cleveland is fifth on BYU's career coaching victories list but is only 24 wins from moving into second. He needs nine wins to move into fourth. He moved past Ladell Andersen (114-71 record from 1983-89) last season. Legendary Cougar coach Stan Watts has the most wins in school history with 372 triumphs from 1949-72. Ott Romney (1927-35) and Roger Reid (1989-96) both achieved 152 victories and Frank Arnold (1975-83) is currently fourth with 137 wins.

BYU AMONG 14 TEAMS TO HAVE PLAYER DRAFT EACH OF THE LAST TWO SEASONS

BYU is one of 14 teams to have at least one player drafted in each of the last two NBA drafts. Former BYU center Rafael Araujo was the No. 8 overall pick in the 2004 draft, being selected by the Toronto Raptors. Former BYU guard Travis Hansen was the No. 37 pick overall, taken in the second round by the Atlanta Hawks in the 2003 draft. Following is the list of teams that have had a player drafted the past two seasons (number of players drafted in parenthesis): Arizona (2), BYU (2), Connecticut (3), Duke (3), Georgia (2), Gonzaga (2), Memphis (2), Minnesota (2), Missouri (2), Oregon (2), Stanford (3), Texas (2), UCLA (2), Xavier (3).

NCAA TOURNAMENT TRADITION

BYU gained an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament after making a solid case for entry into the annual championship field. The Cougars achieved 21 wins even though they played more games (16) away (8-8 record) from home than they did in the Marriott Center where BYU was a perfect 13-0. The Cougars finished the season strong, winning nine straight games until being upset 54-51 by Utah in the MWC Tournament semifinals. BYU had an RPI of .31 and strength of schedule rated No. 35 when selected. BYU had quality wins, including a neutral court victory over nationally ranked and Final Four qualifier Oklahoma State, the Big 12 champs.

- BYU made its 21st NCAA Tournament appearance. The Cougars have an 11-24 record in the NCAA Tournament.

- BYU coach Steve Cleveland has guided the Cougars to the NCAA Tournament three out of the last four seasons, including back-to-back appearances the last two years. In his seventh year at BYU, Cleveland has guided the Cougars to postseason play in each of the past five seasons. He has returned the Cougar program to an annual tournament participant since taking over a program that was 1-25 the season before his arrival.

ALL-AMERICA TRADITION

BYU senior Rafael Araujo was named to the Basketball Times All-America Second Team and was an Associated Press honorable mention pick last season. Regarded as the nation's No. 2 center by Basketball Times, Araujo earned second-team honors while Connecticut center Omeke Okafor received first-team accolades and Duke center Shelden Williams was selected to the third team. Araujo led the Cougars in scoring last season at 18.4 points per game and pulled down a team-leading 10.1 boards per game, which ranks 11th nationally. He had the fourth highest combined points and rebounds averages in the nation last year. The MWC Co-Player of the Year, Araujo also topped BYU in steals (1.4 spg) and blocks (0.8 bpg) and led all MWC players in steals in league action. The 6-foot-11 280-pound native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, recorded 16 double-doubles games, the fifth best single-season total all-time at BYU, while leading the Cougars to a 21-9 record and their second straight at-large NCAA Tournament berth. Araujo was joined on the second team by Wisconsin point guard Devin Harris, North Carolina wing Rashad McCants, Providence forward Ryan Gomes, and Mississippi State forward Lawrence Roberts. Araujo is the 19th Cougar basketball player to earn All-America honors and the first since 2001 when Mekeli Wesley earned Associated Press honorable mention honors. Araujo was also named an honorable mention AP selection, as Okafor was the only center selected to the three AP teams. Araujo is the first Cougar since Mike Smith in 1988 to receive second-team honors. He recorded career highs of 32 points and 17 rebounds in BYU's win over now No. 3 Oklahoma State and finished his season with 24 points and 12 rebounds against defending national champion Syracuse in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.





Steve Cleveland is entering his eighth year at the helm of the Cougars in 2004-05. During his tenure at BYU, Cleveland has proven to be a first-rate recruiter, an excellent coach and player developer, and above all, a winner.

Cleveland has guided BYU to five straight postseason appearances and four 20-win seasons in the last five years. Only three other BYU coaches have ever achieved more 20-win seasons. He was recognized as the Mountain West Conference's top strategist in the 2004 Street & Smith College Basketball Preview. He was honored as the MWC Coach of the Year in 2002-03,

as voted by the league's coaches and media members, after guiding BYU to a share of the MWC regular season title and a 23-9 record.

In 2003-04, Cleveland coached the Cougars to a 76-71 win over then No. 25 and 2004 Final Four team Oklahoma State in the Delta Center. The Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference and advanced to the NCAA Tournament before losing 80-75 to defending national champion Syracuse. In 2002-03, Cleveland's team finished 23-9 and tied for the MWC title before earning an NCAA invite. In 2001-02, Cleveland coached BYU to a win over No. 13 Stanford and advanced to the second round of the NIT despite having lost four starters and six of his top seven players from the prior season. In 2000-01, Cleveland guided BYU to its first NCAA tournament bid since 1995, its first conference regular season title since 1993 and its first conference tournament championship since 1992. While rebuilding a program that finished 1-25 before his arrival, he has posted records of 9-21, 12-16, 22-11, 24-9, 18-12, 23-9 and 21-9. The 1999-2000, 2000-2001 and 2002-03 seasons all rank among the school's best years ever in terms of wins. In fact, since BYU's first season in 1903, only five BYU teams have ever recorded more wins than the 24-9 team in 2000-01.

Cleveland has brought the magic of the Marriott Center back in Provo. BYU averaged 15,300 fans in 2003-04, including the largest crowd (22,718) since 1992, to rank 11th nationally. BYU had the nation's largest percentage increase in attendance in 2003. The Cougars owned the nation's longest homecourt victory streak for much of the 2002 and 2003 seasons until it finally ended at 44 games. BYU has won 62 of its last 63 games at home, including unbeaten seasons in 2001, 2002 and 2004.

Cleveland's teams have traditionally been prepared to play their best at the end of the season. BYU ended the 2003-04 season on a nine-game winning streak through February and March until losing in the MWC semifinal game, earning its third NCAA bid in the last four years. BYU has been to the post-season five straight years. In 2001-02 BYU won in the first round of the NIT before losing at eventual NIT champion Memphis. In 2000-01, BYU won five straight games on the road to secure a share of the MWC regular season title and earn the automatic NCAA bid by claiming the MWC Tournament in Las Vegas. The Cougars won six of their last eight games the prior season, including two MWC tournament wins and two NIT victories. In Cleveland's first year, BYU completed a rare sweep of No. 15 New Mexico and UTEP on the road to earn a WAC tournament berth. The road sweep of New Mexico and UTEP was the first for BYU since 1990-91 and the 83-62 upset of nationally ranked New Mexico in the Pit ended the Lobos' 41-game home winning streak. In Cleveland's second season the Cougars had a blowout win over UTEP before a 90-74 conference tournament upset victory over TCU to achieve BYU's first conference tournament win since 1994.

Cleveland's teams have advanced to the finals of the MWC tournament in two of the five seasons the event has been played, winning the title in 2001.

As a recruiter, Cleveland has made a similar impact on BYU's program. Cleveland's recruits have proven they are not only committed to Cleveland's vision but also are the kind of players to help make that vision a reality in Provo. Cleveland and his staff have been able to attract top talent and develop them into better players.

Cleveland's recruits have been honored with a string of conference newcomer or major awards in their first seasons at BYU. Eight players have been honored in Cleveland's seven years as the Cougar coach, including five who have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. The last two years Rafael Araujo was named the Newcomer of the Year by the conference media members in a poll conducted by the Las Vegas Review-Journal (the MWC no longer has such an award) and Mike Hall was named MWC Defensive Player of the Year. In October 2001, Cleveland signed a multi-year contract extension with BYU. Before taking the helm with the Cougars on March 11, 1997, Cleveland compiled a 157-77 record at Fresno City College in Fresno, Calif. Cleveland was named coach of the year two times while at FCC and led the Rams to post-season playoffs in each of his seven seasons in Fresno. Cleveland coached 10 years at Fresno's Clovis West High School, compiling a 180-70 record.

PLAYING CAREER

Cleveland played college basketball at UC Irvine and was the Anteaters' MVP and leading scorer his senior season in 1975-76. Prior to attending UC Irvine, Cleveland was Fresno City College's Most Outstanding Player in 1973-74. Cleveland received a B.A. degree in social science from UC Irvine in 1976, and received a Master's in education administration from Fresno Pacific in 1979.

PERSONAL

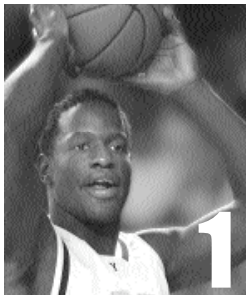

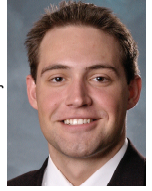
BURGESS OF LATE: Averaged 7.0 points and 4.0 rebounds in 7.5 minutes per game in BYU's two exhibition wins.
