BYU in NCAA Statistics

NCAA statistics are out for the first time in 2006, but BYU is not among the nation's leaders. The best rating for BYU is 56th in stolen bases (1.68) and individually, Stetson Banks is 41st in sacrifice hits (.0.25). Last year BYU was:

- First in doubles with a 2.78 average
- First in slugging with a .545 percentage Third nationally with a .337 batting average
- •Third in home runs per game with a 1.46 average •Sixth in scoring at 8.5 runs per game
- 35th in win-loss percentage at .66948th in triples with a 0.32 average
- •49th in double plays per game with a 1.0 average
- •Ben Saylor was ranked third in RBI per game with an average of 1.43
- •Ben Saylor was ranked fifth in doubles per game with a 0.46 average
- Jeff Hiestand was ranked 30th in runs per game with an average of 1.18

Coach Vance Law and staff

Vance Law played 14 years of pro ball, including 11 years in the majors with six different teams. In 2001 he was named Coach of the Year for the Mountain West Conference. The 49-year-old coach is in his seventh year at BYU and has a 195-155-2 (.557) record coming into the 2006 season. He is assisted by Ryan Roberts, in his fourth year at BYU. Pitching coach Bobby Applegate is in his third year with BYU, having last coached at the Air Force Academy. Volunteer assistant Brad Eagar is in his first year on the BYU staff.

Three games will be televised by BYUTV: April 21 vs. TCU, May 6 with New Mexico, and May 12 with San Diego State. The three BYUTV games will be carried live in three languages: English, Spanish and Portuguese.

BYU Scoring With Two Outs

The accompanying chart to the left shows BYU practices what Coach Vance Law preaches, you can still score with two outs. In 2005 BYU won 25 of its 39 games in come-from-behind fashion.

Team Notes

- Kasey Ko leads the team with current eight-game hitting streak and behind him are Ben Saylor at seven, and Jeff Hiestand and Marcos Villezcas at five. Seth Johnson led the team with a 10-game hitting streak, the longest for the Cougars this season, but it ended last Saturday. Apana Nakayama currently has a four-game hitting streak, a streak carried over from the 2005 season, but he has not yet been cleared to play.
- Jeff Hiestand's hitting streak ended last season in game three vs. UNLV at 29 consecutive games as he was walked three times and hit by a pitch in his fourth appearance at the plate. Counting that game, he had been on base 43 consecutive games and has only missed one game this season being on base in his 48 games.
- Apana Nakayama lead the team with 25 multiple hit games last year, followed by Ben Saylor and Marcos Villezcas with 24.
- Adrian Molina leads the team with three game-winning RBI this season (a double at So. Utah, a sac-fly and a homer vs. N. Mexico St.). Others who have hit the game-winning RBI this season include Jeff Hiestand (a single vs. N. Mexico St. & a two-run homer at UNLV), Kent Walton (a double vs. St. Mary's), Blake Crosby (a sac-fly vs. No. Colorado), Dane Nielsen (a walk-off single vs. No. Colorado), Marcos Villescas (a walk-off single vs. New Mexico) and Casey Nelson (a single vs. So. Utah) and Ben Saylor (a two-out double at UVSC).
- This season BYU is 2-0 in extra-inning games. Last season BYU was 1-2 in extra-inning contests.

Last Years' Average Attendance Highest Ever at Miller Field

Last year, in its fifth full season at Larry H. Miller Field, attendance passed the 100,000 mark in the very first game. BYU averaged 1,442 fans per game for 2005 in 18 dates. The Cougars have ranked nationally in attendance in all five years at Miller Field.

Attendance Ranks Nationally

Attendance at Larry H. Miller field ranked 37th nationally in 2005 with an average of 1,442 in 18 games and a total of 25,952 fans. The Cougars' entered this season with a 67-25 (.728) record at Larry H. Miller Field.

Fifth Full Year at Home in New Ballpark

This is BYU's fifth full season at Miller Field, named in honor of Larry H. and Gail Miller, who made a significant financial contribution toward the facility. The baseball field is built on the site the original field was constructed on in 1969 and is named Larry H. Miller Field. The baseball portion seats 2,204 (675 in the lower bowl) and mirrors a back-to-back concept with the adjoining softball field and a shared press box. Both fields have lights. The field measures 400 feet in center, 388 in the alleys and remains at 345 down the lines. BYU played its first night games in Provo with the opening of Miller Park.

Last Year's Attendance

BYU drew 25,952 fans in 18 dates, including two doubleheaders that were forced by postponed games, for an average of 1,442 fans who witnessed a 16-4 home record at Miller Park. The top crowd for the 2005 season was 2,545 fans, fourth-best in school history, on the doubleheader date against UNLV on May 14. BYU drew 6,448 for an average of 2,149 fans during the three-game SDSU series, including the seventh-best crowd, 2,369 in the five-year history of Miller Park.

On the Road Again

The Cougars will be on the road for more than 11,000 miles this season. With an early-season California trip, road trips to Seattle (Washington) and Colorado (Northern Colorado and Air Force), and the first-ever mid-season MWC tournament held in San Diego, the baseball team will tally some long hours in the bus. Prior to conference play the Cougars will net some 6,275 miles. By season's end they will have traveled a total of 8,574 miles for nonconference games.

Home Season Begins

On March 14 BYU opened its home season in a rare non-conference game with Utah, the fifth time BYU has opened the home season vs. Utah. It was a non-league game due to the MWC schedule of three-game series at one venue and the mid-season league tourney in San Diego.

Movie Night At Miller Park

On April 4th Movie Night at Miller Park featured "The Sandlot" plays on a big screen in the outfield.

Crossing Mendoza Line (.200)

Jeff Hiestand finally broke the Mendoza Line late last month when he raised his batting average to .206 and now at .277. Hiestand had been at .083 after three games, .091 after six games, .081 after 12 games and .095 after 15 games. Ben Saylor was at .172 after nine games and is now batting .322. The Cougars are now batting .261, but broke the Mendoza Line in early March.

Close Calls

BYU has had several close games, including six one-run losses. At UC Riverside made a diving catch in the outfield to end the seventh inning in the 2-1 loss. The Cougars won two one-run games against Northern Colorado and one this past week against New Mexico in the 12th inning, 3-2.

Outdoing the Opposition

BYU has out-hit its opponents 12 times, winning nine of those games. The Cougars have had nine games of errorless play, winning six of those games. BYU's opponents have had nine errorless games, winning once.

Villezcas Pivotal in Double Plays

Of BYU's 30 double plays, 23 have involved shortstop **Marcos Villezcas**, starting 10. Last year BYU turned 59 double plays in as many games.

Sandwiched Between Seniors & Freshmen

There are only six Cougars on the current squad who aren't seniors or freshmen: five juniors and a sophomore.

PITCHER WINDS UP FOR RETURN TO THE TEAM

Prigham Young University pitcher Patrick Wells struck out six batters and allowed two runs on five hits over six innings in his second start of the season. It represented a triumph for the senior.

Although the Cougars eventually lost 4-3 - the second of three consecutive setbacks to the San Jose State Spartans - Wells was gratified to turn in a solid game on the mound.

When he last faced San Jose in 2005, a left elbow injury cost him the rest of his season.

"It felt good to go out there and do well," Wells said. "I had a couple memories of the injury happening last year, but I was able to put that behind me."

Wells enters his senior season - put on a hold a year ago - hoping to recapture the pitching prowess that got him drafted by the Houston Astros and distinguished him as BYU's top pitcher two years ago.

Getting drafted

West Jordan High School rarely pops to mind when considering a Major League Baseball scout's travel itinerary, but Wells drew some serious attention there after shining in an out-of-state tournament.

During his senior year at West Jordan in 2001, the Jaguars traveled to an Easter baseball tournament in Las Vegas. Wells took the mound against Phineas Banning, an elite Southern California team.

He wasn't the reason Major League Baseball scouts came to watch, but after striking out 10 batters and delivering a 5-3 win, Wells gave them enough reasons to stick around.

"He pitched really well," said fellow BYU pitcher Brandon Christiansen, also a teammate at West Jordan. "In my opinion, that's the game that got him drafted. Out at West Jordan High School, not many scouts come and watch your games."

Wells continued to impress scouts with a solid season, culminating with him helping lead the Jaguars to a runner-up finish at the Class 5-A tournament.

When the MLB draft came around, Wells learned he had been selected by the Astros in the 42nd round. The moment seemed almost surreal to him and his family.

"They were excited," Wells said. "My parents had always given me a lot of support growing up playing baseball. They always believed in me and thought I could do it. They were really excited about that and so was I."

Once his initial enthusiasm subsided, Wells realized he need-



ed to improve his draft position to increase his shot of catching on in the majors.

"I was a little young at the time, so I felt that it would be in my best interest to not go play professional ball and go to school," Wells said.

He took the junior college route and further honed his skills. Two years at the College of Eastern Utah validated his draft status with impressive stats.

Wells compiled an 8-2 record with a 1.29 ERA as a sophomore at CEU. He pitched five complete games and recorded two shutouts and one save in 63 innings. Those solid numbers landed him a scholarship with BYU and a prime spot in the Cougars pitching rotation.

Losina a season

Wells' junior season at BYU followed the same successful blueprint. He ranked second on the Cougars pitching staff with 61 strikeouts and twice struck out seven batters during a game.

Wells was expected to anchor a talented Cougar bullpen in his second year, but that plan was short-circuited by his second start.

His left elbow surged with pain after a 13-5 win over San Jose. Wells struck out five batters during the game, but his arm just didn't feel right.

"I was his roommate in the hotel room and I knew his arm was bugging him," Christiansen said. "I don't think he or I knew it was that bad of an injury."

Wells learned a buildup of scar tissue had generated a whole

mess of nerve problems. He traded in a once promising season for a medical redshirt.

It delivered a big blow to BYU's pitching staff, leaving only two other left-handed pitchers in Lance Beus and Ryan Chambers. As the season wore on without him, the Cougars fell out of first place in the MWC and exited early from the conference tournament.

"We would have loved to have him last year because he would have been the missing ingredient for a championship," BYU coach Vance Law said.

The injury built up, in part, after Wells overworked his arm.

He had 17 starts and threw three complete games as a junior - both team highs. Then he left to play summer league ball in Missouri for the Nevada Griffons.

Wells left the Griffons early when his elbow problems began to surface. BYU coaches tried to get his arm healed up before the spring, but, after leaving San Jose, it became obvious rest was his only option.

"We thought we had worked through that in the fall, but after a start or two it was apparent it was still bothering him," Law said.

The road back

Since returning to the pitching rotation, Wells is 0-2 in his first three starts with an ERA of 10.97. His arm remains a little rusty and Wells initial numbers aren't up to his usual standard.

But his elbow feels much stronger. Wells is confident that both he and BYU - which lost eight of its first nine games - can recover from their respective slow starts. And he is hungry to show his arm that once impressed major league scouts is back to form.

Most importantly, he doesn't want to relive frustrations of not being able to contribute to his team's success.

"I just felt like I could have helped the team win more games than we did," Wells said. "It was dissatisfying to sit on the bench and watch a lot of the games."

Saylor, who is ranked fifth in the nation in doubles per game, has been listed on the 2006 Wallace Watch list.


The Wallace Award is presented annually to the national college baseball player of the year.

PROVO, Utah (February 6, 2006)—This season the Cougar baseball team will


be clinging on to a little reminder from 2005.

In a season which saw BYU go 39-19-1 and finish second in the Mountain West Conference, every member of the team carried their own minted

of the many things BYU pitching coach Bobby Applegate brought with him from the Air Force

Academy. The coins were given to each player after the team ran up the white "Y" on a nearby mountain which overlooks the campus in the fall of 2004 and again in the fall of 2005.



player of the commitments they have made to the team and the accomplishment of running up the mountain. The coin had inscribed on one side "The Road to the Top" and "We Go as a Team."

Like last year this season's club will be carrying its own newer version of the coin. Once again the words, "We Go as a Team," are inscribed on one side. This year the 2006 coin has phrasing like "No One Left Behind," "Bound By Baseball," and "United By Brotherhood."

"It sounds kind of corny," head coach Vance Law said of using the do-it-for-the team clichés. "But we rely on each other. We ran up to the 'Y' together and it was a total team effort, guys didn't leave each other behind, we ran together."

One side of the coin is engraved with a team photo taken at the top of "Y" mountain. Around it are the words "Preparation, Execution, Champions."

The various military institutions have similar programs. In the military each soldier has the opportunity to earn a special-

ly minted coin. The coins are issued by a company's commanding officer and are a very big honor. Each individual coin is minted especially for a given unit. Also, each individual military



operation—such as Operation Iraqi Freedom—has its own coin created for the soldiers who participat-

The soldiers are required to always keep their coin with them. As encouragement, the military has developed an incentive. At any time a soldier can pull his coin on a fellow soldier. If his counterpart does not have his coin at the time the other pulls it, the counterpart has to buy

a drink that night. However, if the counterpart can show the coin, he gets the free drink.

BYU has developed a similar system. If a player or coach pulls the coin on his teammate (or coach) and the teammate doesn't have the coin, the teammate must buy a drink for all of his teammates who have theirs.

The coin provides a great opportunity to create and build team unity.



BASE-BOX: COUGAR PITCHERS PUNCH UP THEIR OFFSEASON TRAINING

ROVO — Sometime in mid-March, once winter snows have melted and the BYU baseball team has finally begun its home schedule, a Cougar pitcher will inevitably encounter a healthy dose of adversity at Larry H. Miller Field.

The opposition will but the pitcher's offerings through the thin mountain air like whiffle balls at a summer picnic. The hurler will step off the mound, doff his cap and use his sleeve to wipe sweat from his brow.

Digging deep, searching for the wherewithal to quell his opponent's rally, the BYU pitcher will find solace and strength in . . . his fledgling career as an amateur boxer?

Don't laugh — such a scenario could well play itself out this spring. The Cougar pitching staff has incorporated boxing into its offseason training regimen.

The idea to have pitchers moonlight as boxers was the brainchild of BYU pitching coach Bobby Applegate.

"I just kind of tried to think of something a little bit different that these guys weren't used to," Applegate said. "I tried to put them in a different arena where everyone started from the same place basically, so they could work their way up and they could all learn it together."


Applegate's exposure to boxing came during five years as an assistant baseball coach at the Air Force Academy, where all freshmen are required to take a combative course such as wrestling or boxing.

According to Applegate, the overlap in the skill sets required for boxing and pitching makes the sweet science a natural fit for a pitching staff's offseason cross training.

"In boxing, there's basically a lot of the upper-body workout (that pitchers need)," Applegate said. "I mean, we're getting a lot of fast-twitch fibers firing in our upper body, our shoulders. It's a great conditioning workout for upper body, and most important is to try to work on our leg endurance and foot speed as well."

But netting the physical benefits inherent in boxing was just a part of what Applegate was looking to do—instilling confidence and mental toughness was on the agenda, too.

"One important part of this is just the confidence factor," Applegate said. "We're really trying to develop a confidence within



these players where they know that they've tried something new through some difficult situations and learned how to overcome some adversity.

"Obviously, the higher level of competition that you go in baseball, the more the talent pool evens out and there's less of a (talent) difference between the players. So I think our edge will come if we can compete a little bit harder and create some mental toughness over the other guys, and boxing played into that."

Because of the dangerous nature of boxing, Cougar players took several precautions aimed at minimizing the risk of injury. Such measures included the use of protective headgear and 16-ounce practice gloves as well as an emphasized preference on body blows over head shots.

To Applegate's delight, BYU pitchers took to boxing like ducks to water.

"It was a lot of fun," pitcher Justin Su'a said. "We were rooting for each other, cheering for each other, and when you weren't boxing you were someone else's corner man. It brought us together in a way I didn't think it would."

In the case of Su'a, a senior right-hander, boxing was so well-

received that it even infiltrated his subconscious.

"I just got so into boxing that I was boxing in my dreams," Su'a said. "This one time, I was sleeping and in my dream I was dreaming like I was boxing. My wife, Melissa, was awake in bed next to me.

"In my dream, I could feel myself just going at it. Finally, I was ready to throw the knockout punch. I threw a right hand in my dream, but in reality I threw the covers off the bed. Melissa woke me up; she was like, 'Hey, hey—take it easy! I'm afraid you're going to hit me!

The foray into pugilism ended Dec. 5 with a "box-off." Nine matches consisting of two three-minute rounds were held. An imprompturing and arena were erected, and a referee and judges were on hand.

According to Applegate, top performers included Jesse Craig, Brandon Christiansen, Mitch Woolf and Su'a.

Ultimately, the boxing experiment proved to be such a success that it's a good bet to return next offseason.

"Obviously, it's a different sport," said Applegate. "But we work real close with our players to make sure we get feedback, and the feedback we got was 100 percent positive. They would all like to do it again next year; they thought it was great."

JEFF HIESTAND: WALK-ON NOW KEY PLAYER

Jeff Hiestand picked up his first plastic bat and ball not long after he picked up walking. At two years old, he was already being pitched to, and he could slam his plastic ball across the yard.

Two years later when Jeff started his first tee-ball league, his mother Julie said he couldn't figure out what they needed the tee on home plate. "He's always been able to hit the ball," she said. "And he's always wanted to play baseball."

Along with his toddler bat and ball, his parents gave him a football, basketball and golf clubs. Golfing entertained him some of the time. But, it was evident early on that Jeff's real passion was baseball. When Jeff's mom asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up, he would reply; "a baseball, a golf or a meat-cut (like grandpa)."

For the most part, Jeff has given up golfing and meat cutting, but baseball has always been an integral part of his life. So his family decided to join the team. Before high school, Jeff's dad was often team manager or coach; his older sister Heather would announce or keep score and his mom took on the role of cheerleader, proudly calling out "that's my boy" every chance she got.

"We've always supported him," his mom said. "But we also taught our kids, you can't get through on anyone's coat-tail. You've got to do it yourself." Jeff took that advice to heart. "He's never been a brown-noser," she said. "It's just hard work."

Looking back, Jeff said he doesn't remember ever thinking he would even go on to play college baseball. He just played because he loved it. But Jeff's dedication payed off, and he played for Chino High School in Chino, Calif., where he set the school records for batting average, hit by pitches and walks.

He was also named first team all-league, team captain and MVP in 2000 and MVP in both pre-season tournaments and first-team all-league. He was later recruited to the American Legion team, which went on to become the Area Nine district and California state champions.

After his senior season at Chino High School, his mom said he took all the awards at the closing awards ceremony. "I was so embarrassed," she said. "I turned and apologized to the mother sitting next to me, and all she said was, 'he deserves it.""

After a successful high school career, Jeff decided he wanted to keep playing, and he wanted to play for BYU.

"I tried to get my high school coach to call BYU and talk to Coach Law, but he said I wasn't good enough to play at BYU," Jeff said.

The University of San Francisco offered Jeff a scholarship to come and play, but he had already decided he would only play for BYU. "I didn't really know the difference between Division I and junior college baseball, I just wanted to come to BYU," he said.

Without the help of his coach, Jeff decided to take matters into his own hands. "I just decided I could come to BYU and try out and make the baseball team," Jeff said. "I didn't think twice about it."

Coach Vance Law remembers the first time Jeff showed up at the field his freshman year at BYU. He described Jeff as a brick of a guy, short, stocky, strong and basically fearless.

"Normally walk-ons come in and they're scared to death because their window of opportunity is very small, we've got a lot of good players," Law said. "But he hit a bunch of balls off the wall, a couple home-runs in tryouts and the next thing you know he's one of our main guys."

Jeff's freshman year as a walk-on he started 34 of 45 games, had the fourth best slugging percentage on the team at .556, hit home runs against every league rival except UNLV and was voted honorable mention Freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball.

"Even as a freshman he had a major contribution throughout the conference tournament," Coach Law said. After his freshman season Jeff was called to serve a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Denver, Colo. Coach Law offered him a scholarship if he would come back to BYU and play after his mission.

"It wasn't like I wanted to play baseball so I could get a free college education," Jeff said. "But it worked out that way."

Jeff returned to the 'Y' in 2004, ready to play. He led

the Cougars his sophomore season with a .651 slugging percentage and 30 walks to help the team finish second in the league. Jeff was called a top hitter returning for 2005, but prior to the season he broke his hamate bone in his right hand doing medicine ball pushups.

"I throw right and bat left, so it's my bottom hand when I bat," he said. "So it's the most important hand, and my throwing hand."

That still didn't stop Jeff, he went to practice that same day, and kept going. "I really wasn't able to play to my potential, but I tried to," he said. "I played the whole season. I only missed a few games to give my hand a rest."

Not playing to his full potential, Jeff recorded a 29game hitting streak, led the Cougars with a .371 batting average and was on base all but one of his 50 games.

"Jeff not only played with a broken hand, he played well," Law said. "He was still able to get his hits, driving a lot of runs. I only wish we could have seen what could happen if he had been healthy."

In 2005, the Cougars came just one win away from winning the Mountain West Conference Tournament. Coach Law said he expects the Cougars to continue winning in the 2006 season just like 2005. And Jeff will be ready.

Jeff had surgery on his hand over the summer between his junior and senior season so he could be ready for his final season at the 'Y'.

Even with the surgically repaired hand, Coach Law says sometimes Jeff doesn't know how strong he is.

Normally, when Coach Law's players hit home runs he tries to shake their hands as they round third base. Even with his broken hand, Law said he was always cautious when Jeff comes around.

"He's a real big strong guy," he said. "So I try to temper that a little bit when I shake his hand or make sure I get in deep, otherwise he'll squeeze my fingers too hard."

But that makes for good hits, and that's what Jeff is looking forward to.

"I want to be able to contribute to the team as much as I can," he said. "We really are going to be good this year."

During the preseason, Jeff is focusing all his time towards baseball.

"I actually don't really have free time," Jeff said. "It's nice to have a break but all I want to do is play baseball."

Coach Law said he is also looking to Jeff this season for leadership.

"He's very competitive, he likes to win," Law said.
"That's the kind of guy we want, who competes fairly, but is relentlessly trying to achieve the goals we set as a team and individually."
