COUGARS RETURN TO EDWARDS STADIUM, PLAY HOST TO UNLV

Following the Cougars' worst conference loss in school history, a 52-9 defeat at Air Force on Oct. 12, BYU (3-3) will return to Edwards Stadium for the first time since Sept. 6. The Cougars will play host to MWC foe UNLV (2-4) on Saturday, Oct. 19, beginning at 5 p.m. (MT). Both BYU and UNLV will enter the game having lost three of their last four games. While the Cougars will look to protect their 10-game home win streak, the Rebels will be looking for their first road win of the season.

BROADCAST PLANS

Saturday's game will be produced by SportsWest and broadcast live on KSL-TV, Ch. 5, and on KLAS-TV, Ch. 8 in Las Vegas. Kickoff is scheduled for 5:06 p.m. (MT). Dave McCann will call the action, with former Cougars quarterback, Blaine Fowler, lending color analysis. Fans can also tune to KSL 1160-AM with Greg Wrubell calling the action and Marc Lyons lending expert analysis. Bill Riley will report from the sidelines. THE REBELS

UNLV will come to Provo searching for its first road win of the season ... The Rebels have lost at Oregon State (47-17) and at Toledo (38-21) ... Saturday's game will mark only the third road game for UNLV this season ... Last week, the Rebels lost to New Mexico, 25-16, marking their fourth loss of the season ... UNLV has not defeated BYU in Provo since 1981 ... BYUis one of two MWC team UNLV head coach John Robinson has not defeated throughout his career ... After outscoring UNLV 130-42 from 1996 to 1999, the Rebels have lost the last two games by a slim margin of just 7 points ... Last season, the Cougars needed a last-minute drive to overcome a 31-28 UNLV lead ... In 2002, UNLV has been outscored by an average of 15.2 points per game.

BYU vs. UNLV

Saturday's game against UNLV will mark the 10th meeting between the two schools, dating back to the first meeting on Dec. 2, 1978 in Japan at the Nikkan Yokohama Bowl. The Cougars own an 8-1 record against the Rebels, including a mark of 3-1 in Provo and a record of 4-0 in Las Vegas. (BYU is 1-0 against UNLV when playing at a neutral site.) After losing to UNLV in 1981, the Rebels' first-ever victory over a ranked opponent, the Cougars have gone on to win six straight games, including a 35-31 come-from-behind win at Sam Boyd Stadium last season. In the nine previous meetings, BYU has outscored UNLV by an average 36.1-18.1. During the 1996 season, the Cougars posted series-high 63 points against UNLV, and has recorded two shutouts against the Rebels, including a 27-0 win in 1982 and a 29-0 win in 1999.

A LOOK BACK (BYU 35, UNLV 31)

BYU improved to 4-0 on the season after a thrilling fourth-quarter, come-from-behind victory over UNLV, 35-31, on Saturday, Sept. 29, 2001. In the Cougars' first game since the tragic events of Sept. 11, marking a 20-day layoff, BYU showed plenty of rust early on. Luke Staley fumbled the opening kickoff and UNLV's Derek Olsen returned the fumble 22 yards for a touchdown. BYU answered on its next possession, driving down the field and scoring on a 15-yard Staley reception. But UNLV owned the first quarter, taking a 21-10 lead into the first break. The Cougars stole the momentum in the second quarter, scoring 18 unanswered points and taking a 28-21 lead into the locker room. But the UNLV defense held BYU scoreless in the second half until Doman's late-game heroics. The Cougars failed to produce a single point in the third quarter, marking only the third time in the Cougars' first four games they did not scored during a single quarter of play. Down 31-28 with just over two minutes remaining, "The Domanator" Brandon Doman led the Cougars 91 yards for a touchdown with 1:12 remaining in the game. Facing fourth down and four on the BYU 38-yard line, Doman completed a pass across the middle to Mike Rigell, who advanced the ball all the way to the UNLV 22-yard line -- a crucial 42yard gain. On the next play, Doman rolled left then darted back to the right and took it all the way into the end zone for the game-winning touchdown. UNLV advanced the ball all the way to BYU's 30-yard line on the ensuing possession before Jason Thomas threw an errant pass on fourth down to seal the Cougar victory.

BERRY TO START AT QUARTERBACK

BYU head coach Gary Crowton announced on Monday, redshirt freshman Matt Berry will start at quarterback against UNLV on Saturday. Berry saw his first varsity action on Saturday at Air Force, completing 6-of-8 attempts for 95 yards, including a 13-yard touchdown pass to tight end Gabe Reid. Saturday's game will mark the first start for Berry since his final high school game in November, 1998. The 6-foot-5, 218-pound, native of Redmond, Wash., replaces sophomore Bret Engemann as the starting quarterback. Engemann, who led BYU to back-to-back wins against Syracuse and Hawaii to start the season, as well as an impressive come-from-behind win at Utah State, will remain in the mix for playing time. Berry gained valuable experience during the JV season, completing 12-of-23 attempts for 144 yards against top-ranked Dixie State College, including a touchdown pass to Kish Beverley. Against Snow College, Berry led the Cougar offense on an 80-yard drive, finishing with a 28-yard touchdown pass to tight end Andy Hadfield.

COUGARS RECORD 10th STRAIGHT HOME VICTORY

With a 35-32 victory over Hawaii on Sept. 6, the Cougars extended their home win streak to 10 straight games. The current home win streak dates back to Oct. 26, 2000 (vs. Wyoming). Since Cougar Stadium was renamed LaVell Edwards Stadium on Nov. 18, 2001, the Cougars have never lost a game in Provo, posting a 9-0 record. The current streak marks the longest home win streak for the Cougars since winning 17 straight from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991. With a perfect 6-0 record in Provo last season, the Cougars have recorded 12 undefeated home seasons since the 1967 campaign. In fact, since the stadium was expanded to 65,000, the Cougars have posted eight different seasons without losing a game in Provo. The 2001 perfect home season marked the first since 1998.

HOMECOMING NOTES

Saturday's game will mark the 78th Homecoming game at BYU since 1922. The Cougars have posted a record of 37-18 (.673) since the 1974 Homecoming contest -- a 27-12 win over Utah State. During the LaVell Edwards era, the Cougars posted a 27-13 (.675) record in Homecoming games. Last season, under first-year head coach Gary Crowton, the Cougars recorded a 63-33 win over Air Force, marking the second time BYU has recorded 63 points in a Homecoming Game. The Cougars chalked up a 63-28 win over UNLVin the 1996 Homecoming contest.

Wrubell's broadcast partner is former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons, entering his 21st season as game analyst. Lyons, a math teacher at Olympus High School, also contributes to KSL's comprehensive pregame and postgame shows.

Bill Riley, now in his second year as an on-air personality at KSL will join the broadcast team from the sidelines. Riley, who anchors "Sports Final" nightly on KSL, also hosts the midweek "Gary Crowton Show" and "Coordinators Corner".

KSL Chief Engineer John Dehnel begins his 17th season on the BYU broadcast crew, while longtime spotter Doug Martin and veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky round out KSL's lineup in the booth.

Following the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," "Cougar Lockerroom Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show", "Cougar Replay" and "Cougar Call-In Show."

KSL's in-week coverage of BYU Football includes the "Gary Crowton Show," and the Coordinators Corner with Mike Borich and Ker Schmidt.

Air Force quarterback Chance Harridge ran for 104 yards on 22 carries, scoring four touchdowns to lead the undefeated Falcons (6-0, 3-0) to a 52-9 victory over Brigham Young (3-3, 0-1) on Saturday, Oct. 12, 2002. Looking to avenge last season's 63-33 loss in Provo, the Falcons not only dominated the game on the offensive side of the ball, finishing with 463 total yards, but the defensive side as well. The Air Force defense held the Cougar offense to only 304 total yards, with 325 yards passing and a season-low --16 yards rushing. The Cougars started things off with a 35-yard Matt Payne field goal, capping a 10 play, 62 yard drive to start the game. The Falcons came storming back, running the ball 12 times for 80 yards, including a one-yard touchdown run by Harridge. After BYU went three-and-out on the very next series, Air Force came back with nine more running plays to reel off 67 more yards and another Harridge touchdown. On the ensuing kickoff, the Falcons gave BYU a dose of its own medicine, executing the on-side kick. (Last season, after the Cougars scored on the opening drive, BYU used an on-side kick to take a quick 14-0 lead.) Facing a fourth-and-one from the BYU 44 yard line, Leotis Palmer picked up 16 yards to extend the Air Force drive as the first-quarter expired. The fourth-down gamble paid off, as a few moments later, Darnel Stephens found the endzone on a 7-yard run, marking his first career touchdown. In all, the Falcons reeled off 45 unanswered points before backup quarterback Matt Berry found tight end Gabe Reid on a 13-yard touchdown pass late in the fourth quarter. Air Force put the icing on the cake with another one-yard Falcon touchdown run by Tim Gehrsitz, completing a nine-play, 49 yard drive. On the night, Bret Engemann finished with 10-of-22 completions for 143 yards and two interceptions. Todd Mortensen was 6-for-15 for 70 yards, and also had two interceptions. Berry was 6-for-8 for 95 yards and had one touchdown completion. Running back Marcus Whalen led the Cougars with 41 yards rushing on just nine carries.

MWC OPENERS

Including the Cougars' 52-9 loss at Air Force on Saturday, BYU has posted a 2-2 record in leagueopeners since joining the Mountain West Conference in 1999. Entering the 2002 season, the Cougars were tied with Air Force, New Mexico, Utah and San Diego State with a 2-1 record in league-openers. Interestingly, Air Force has been responsible for both of BYU's MWC seasonopening losses. The last time BYU lost its MWC season-opener, the Cougars responded with a 10-7 win over UNLV to improve to 1-1 in league play.

FOURTH AND GO FOR IT

Including four fourth-down attempts at Air Force, BYU is 12-of-26 (.462) on fourth-down attempts this season. Against the Falcons, the Cougars failed to convert a fourth-down attempt. BYU recorded a season-high four fourth-down conversions at Utah State. Against Nevada, the Cougars were a perfect 3-for-3 on fourth-down attempts. On the season, BYU is averaged two fourth-down conversions on 4.3 attempts per game. Last season, the Cougars were 16-of-21 (.762) on fourth-down attempts, averaging 1.2 conversions on 1.6 attempts per game.

THE CROWTON FILE




In 2001, Gary Crowton, a native of Orem, Utah, took over a BYU program that had been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards (257-101-3; .716). In his first season, Crowton guided the Cougars to an impressive 12-2 season, climbed as high as No. 9 in the national polls, lead the nation in scoring and yards-per-game average, won the MWC title and earned a trip to the 2001 Liberty Bowl.

Crowton, 45, came to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to

serving two seasons as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997. Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50-or-more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60-or-more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season. Under Crowton, Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including a school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school-record 4,943 yards passing.

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under

Edwards at BYU. While at BYU he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer, Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985. From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois for one season, before taking



over as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire.

In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterbacks coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton, who is the first-ever head football coach at BYU to serve an LDS Church mission, is married to the former Maren Peterson of Bountiful, Utah. The couple was married in 1985 and have seven children.

IT'S NO COINCIDENCE

While at Louisiana Tech, Gary Crowton recorded three straight seasons with a scoring average of 33 points per game or better. In 1996, the Crowton-led Bulldogs averaged 36.4 points per game, but dropped off to a mere 33.1 points per game in 1997. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs published a 41.1 points-per-game average. During the 2001 season, his first year at BYU, Crowton and the Cougars lead the nation with an amazing 46.7 points per game average.

CROWTON NOTABLES

- Crowton is the first coach in BYU history to win more than seven games in his first season.
- In only his fourth year as a Division-IA coach, Crowton recorded his 30th career victory — a 56-34 victory over Sonny Lubick and the Colorado State Rams.
- In his fifth season as a collegiate head coach, Crowton coached in his 50th career game, defeating Hawaii, 35-32.
- Crowton became only the second coach in BYU football history to win 12 games in a single season after defeating Mississippi State, 41-38, during the 2001 season. LaVell Edwards accomplished the feat three different times during his 29-year career, including a 14-win season during the 1996 campaign. Crowton's previous single-season best win total was 9-2 at Louisiana Tech during the 1997 season.

NOT SO FAST

Matt Payne's 35-yard field goal with 11:40 remaining in the first quarter against Air Force marked the first first-quarter points scored by the Cougars since posting seven first-quarter points in the season-opener against Syracuse. Through six games, BYU has scored just 10 points in the first quarter of play. In fact, the Cougars have been outscored 44-10 during first-quarter action. Prior to Payne's field goal, the Cougars had not scored in the first quarter since recording a 6-yard touchdown pass from Bret Engemann to Andrew Ord with 8:14 remaining in the first quarter against Syracuse. Prior to the Air Force contest, the Cougars had 16 different first-quarter possessions, and had crossed midfield only six different times. Over that four-game span, BYU's average first-quarter field possession was its own 46 yard line. Over the past five games, including Saturday's game at Air Force, the Cougars have entered the Red Zone only once. Following is a quarter-by-quarter breakdown of BYU's scoring:

SEEING YELLOW

In the first three games of the season, the Cougars were flagged a league-leading 37 times for 325 yards, including 13 times for 140 yards at Nevada. The Cougars averaged 12.3 penalties for 108.3 yards per game. Against Georgia Tech, BYU was flagged for a season low seven times for only 31 yards. Against Utah State, the Cougars were penalized 10 times for 71 yards, marking the fourth game this season BYU has had 10 or more penalties. Against Air Force, the Cougars were flagged just three times for a total of five yards, marking the fewest penalties in a game since being flagged twice for 10 yards at New Mexico on Oct. 3, 2001. On the season, BYU is averaging 9.5 penalties for 72.0 yards per game.

POINT PRODUCTION DOWN

Entering last Saturday's game with a 31.6 points-per-game average, the Cougars scored just nine points against Air Force. The BYU point total marked the fewest points scored in a game since posting just three points against Florida State in the 2000 season-opener. The Cougars'point production also marked the fewest points ever scored against the Falcons. After opening the season with a 42-point effort, the Cougars'point production has continued to fall. Since the season-opener, BYU has scored 35 points twice (vs. Hawaii, vs. Utah State), 28 (at Nevada), 19 (at Georgia Tech), and just 9 points at Air Force. At home the Cougars are averaging 38.5 points per game, while on the road, BYU has averaged 22.8 points per contest.

ROAD WOES

After losing four straight road games, dating back to the Cougars'loss at Hawaii last season, BYU defeated Utah State in Logan on Friday to record its first road win since upending Mississippi State inStarkville, Miss., on Dec. 1, 2001. Saturday's loss at Air Force marked the Cougars'third road loss of the season. The UNLV game will be the first game at in Provo since playing back on Sept. 6. Following the Oct. 19th game against UNLV, the Cougars will take to the road yet again, traveling to Colorado State. Over a span of the first seven weeks of the season, BYU has played just two home games. The Cougars are 7-4 (.636) on the road under head coach Gary Crowton.

THE STREAK IS STILL ALIVE ... 344 GAMES AND COUNTING

With Matt Payne's 35-yard field goal in the first quarter (at Air Force), BYU extended its NCAA record streak to 344 games without being shutout. BYU was last shutout during the 1975 season (Sept. 27, 1975 vs. Arizona State.) The Cougars don't have a single person on their 2002 roster that was alive the last time BYU was shut out.

Even before the 2002 season began, the Cougars lost three players to season-ending injuries. Redshirt freshman **C.J. AhYou** was lost on the first day of Fall Camp, suffering a torn ACL. AhYou, who was slated to start at defensive end missed the majority of last season also with a torn ACL. Just under two weeks prior to the Cougars' season-opener, senior offensive tackle **Ben Archibald** was lost for the season after suffering a mid-shaft compound fracture. Archibald, an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate, is expected to apply for a sixth-year following the 2002 season. Reserve senior cornerback **Todd Barker** injured his surgically-repaired shoulder and will be unable to return for his final season at BYU. Following is this week's injury update. GOOD GRIEF, CURTIS BROWN

In his first career start (at Utah State), true freshman Curtis Brown ran for 217 yards and three touchdowns, helping BYU record its largest come-from-behind victory in school history. Fueled by Brown's performance, the Cougars erased a 27-point halftime deficit to beat Utah State, 35-34, on Friday in Logan. Brown, who averaged 6.6 yards on 33 carries, also added 49 yards on 4 receptions and was named the MWC Offensive Player of the Week. Brown became the sixth back in BYU history to rush for over 200 yards in a single game, and his performance ranks fourth on the school's single-game rushing list. Brown is the second BYU player to have earned MWC Player-of-the-Week honors this season. Quarterback Bret Engemann was named the Offensive Player of the Week after leading BYU to a 42-21 victory over Syracuse in the opening game of the season.

A WHALE OF A TALE

After redshirting the 2001 season, sophomore running back Marcus Whalen is doing his best to answer the question, "How will BYU deal with the loss of Doak Walker Award winner Luke Staley?" In the season-opener (vs.Syracuse), Whalen turned in 140 yards on 19 carries, averaging 7.4 yards per carry. Whalen was credited with a career-high 58-yard run to the goal line, then bullied his way in to the endzone on the very next play for his first TD of the season. Against Hawaii, Whalen was credited with a career-high 30 carries, racking up 141 yards and two more touchdowns. In the third game of the season, Whalen turned in 135 yards on only 14 carries, averaging 9.6 yards per carry. During the first quarter, Whalen broke loose for what appeared to be a 92-yard touchdown run, but was returned to the 21 yardline after a illegal block was called on the Cougars. Whalen was officially credited with a career-long 71 yard run on the play. At Georgia Tech, Whalen played through the first quarter before being forced to sit the remainder of the game with a pulled abductor muscle. Prior to leaving the game, Whalen produced 14 yards on four carries. Whalen did not play against Utah State while still recovering from the muscle injury. in his first game action since Sept. 21, Whalen carried the ball nine times for 41 yards against Air Force, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. On the season, Whalen ranks third in the MWC with a 94.0 yardsper-game average, and ranks 10th in overall scoring, averaging 4.8 points per game. Whalen is on pace to eclipse the 1,100 yard mark this season. With his 100-yard performance at Nevada, Whalen became the first running back in BYU history to start a season with three straight 100yard outings.

NATIONAL RANKING SHORT LIVED

Following the Cougars' 35-32 victory over Hawaii on Sept. 6, BYU climbed from among the unranked to No. 24 in the Sept. 8th USA Today/ESPN Coaches' Poll. After a 31-28 loss at Nevada, the Cougars fell from the top-25. BYU has been ranked in the top-20 or top-25 polls in 23 of the last 27 seasons. The only years in which BYUhas never been ranked during the season (since 1976) were 1978, 1987, 1998 and 2000. Last season BYU broke into the top-25 on Sept. 9, following a 44-16 win at Cal. The Cougars climbed as high as No. 7 in the USA Today/Coaches' Poll and No. 8 in the AP Top-25 poll. The Falcons represent the first ranked team BYU has faced this season, and the first game against a ranked opponent since taking on No. 22 Louisville on Dec. 31 in the 2001 Liberty Bowl.

INTERCEPTION STREAK COMES TO AN END

The BYUdefense failed to record an interception against Air Force, marking the first time in 20 games the Cougars did not pick off an opposing quarterback. The streak of 20 straight games dated back to the Cougars'34-27 win over Utah on Nov. 24, 2000. During that stretch, BYU recorded 36 interceptions, averaging 1.8 interceptions per game. The Cougars posted six games of three or more interceptions, including a streak-high four interceptions against Hawaii earlier this season. During the 2002 season, BYU has produced two or more interceptions in four of six games. On the season, nine different players have recorded at least one interception, including cornerback Brandon Heaney who has a team high three interceptions. Linebacker Levi Madarieta and cornerback Kip Nielsen each have two picks.

BYU vs. NATIONALLY RANKED OPPONENTS

Since the 1979 season, the Cougars have posted a 16-20 (.444) mark against ranked opponents (not including bowl games).

COUGARS OVERCOME 27-POINT HALFTIME DEFICIT

After trailing by as many as 27 points at Utah State on Friday, Oct. 4, BYU mounted a 28-point second half to produce the largest come-from-behind win in school history. Led by true freshman Curtis Brown's 217 yards rushing and Bret Engemann's 294 yards passing, BYU pulled off a 35-34 win over Utah State in front of a sold-out crowd in Logan. In his first career start, Brown reeled off 217 yards on 33 carries, averaging 6.6 yards per carry. Brown tallied a career high three touchdown runs, including a 32-yard touchdown run with 5:55 remaining in the third quarter to pull the Cougars to within 13 points. He also added 49 yards on four receptions, including a career-best 45vard reception in the second quarter. By the end of the first half, the Cougars were trailing 24-7, and with only four seconds remaining in the half, Utah State's Jerome Dennis intercepted an Engemann pass and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown. Everything changed for the Cougars in the second half as the offense found its rhythm, and the defense shut down the Aggie offense, marking the second second-half shutout for the Cougars this season. Reno Mahe made a strong showing, recording his fourth career 100-yard receiving game. Mahe caught five receptions for 102 yards and rushed four times for 30 yards against the Aggies. BYU took the opening drive of the second half 70 yards, scoring on Brown's one-yard run. Four minutes later, Brown scored again on a 32-yard run, cutting the USU lead to 34-21. After a Utah State drive that took over five minutes off the clock, the Cougars got the ball back and marched 70 yards for their third straight touchdown. The game-winning catch came with 6:46 left in the game when Engemann found tight end Gabe Reid in the end zone on an 18-yard pass, capping the 7 play, 82-yard game-winning

DRIVIN' THE DISTANCE

On Aug. 29, the Cougars drove 99 yards (vs. Syracuse) to set a BYU record for the longest scoring drive in school history. The drive, which lasted nine plays and took 2:59 off the clock, was highlighted by a 58-yard run by sophomore running back Marcus Whalen. Against the Orangemen, the Cougars racked up drives of 99, 92, 80, 73 and 71 yards. Against Hawaii, the Cougars posted long-distance drives of 65, 80 and a game-high 95-yard drive in the third quarter that produced the go-ahead touchdown. At Nevada, BYUposted its fourth 90-yard drive of the season, recording a 92-yard scoring march in just five plays. At Utah State, the trend continued with scoring drives of 82, 80, 70 (twice) and 53 yards. During the 2001 season, BYU produced 20 different 80-yard drives. In the first game of the 2002 season, the Cougars produced two 90-yard scoring drives, equaling last year's entire season total. On the season, BYU has recorded four 90-yard scoring drives and eight different 80-yard drives.

WHAT A PAYNE

BYUkicker Matt Payne has been pulling double duty this season, serving as the Cougars' punter and kicker. Admitting he likes to punt more than kick, Payne unloaded for a total of 402 yards on seven punts in the Cougars'31-28 loss at Nevada. Against the Wolfpack, Payne averaged a season-high 57.4 yards per punt. During the game, Payne was credited with a career-long 72 yard punt, surpassing his previous long by eight yards. At Utah State, Payne had three punts for 136 yards, averaging 45.3 yards per punt, including a 51 yarder. Against Air Force, Payne averaged 41.5 yards per punt. Currently, Payne leads the Mountain West Conference and ranks second in the nation with a 46.73 per-game average. Payne leads the nation in net punting, averaging 43.0 yards per punt. In the kicking department, Payne is 4-for-6 on field goal attempts, including a two-for-two outing at Georgia Tech. On PATs, Payne is 18-of-21 (.857) on the season.

CROWTON HITS MINI-MILESTONE

Gary Crowton, now in his second season at BYU -- his fifth as a college head coach -- coached his 50th career game this season (vs. Hawai'i). In his first year at BYU, Crowton led the Cougars to a 12-2 season, marking a five game improvement over the Cougars'6-6 record in 2000. With a five-game improvement, Crowton's success ranked fifth overall in the nation, and tops among first-year coaches. Since arriving in Provo, Crowton has led the Cougars to a 15-5 (.750) record.

COUGS PERFECT IN PAYBACK OPPORTUNITIES

Since 1980, BYU has had 62 different opportunities to repay an opponent for a previous loss. When the Cougars face an opponent, having lost in the previous meeting, they have recorded a 41-21 (.661) record. Since Nov. 7, 1998, BYUhas not lost to an opponent in a payback situation, posting a perfect 15-0 record. BYU knocked off Syracuse on Aug. 29, the held off Hawaii on Sept. 6 for two straight payback opportunities this season. Following is a look at the Cougars' payback victories since the 1998 season:

28 STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS AND COUNTING

Following a 63-33 win over Air Force on Oct. 20, 2001, the Cougars claimed their 28th straight non-losing season. BYUhas not had a losing campaign since posting a 5-6 mark in 1973—former head coach LaVell Edward's second season as head coach. The Cougars'streak of 28 straight seasons ranks 11th all-time at the NCAADivision I-Alevel and is currently the third longest non-losing streak in the nation. (Nebraska ranks No. 1 with 40 straight seasons without a losing campaign.)

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

Of all the members of the BYU roster, 70 players have served a full-time, twoyear mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (63.3 percent). Over 60 percent of those returned-missionaries, 60 percent speak a foreign language, including 28 players who speak Spanish as a second language. BYU players have served missions all over the world. Members of this year's team have served on all seven continents, including head coach Gary Crowton, who served a mission in Korea. 96 players on this year's roster are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (87.3 percent). Interestingly, 43 different players are married (40.9 percent). Of the 43 married players, there are 10 couples with children and three couples expecting children in the near future.Reserve offensive lineman Nake Mali leads the group with two children, while receiver Reno Mahe has a son and is expecting a daughter in November. Running back Marcus Whalen and his wife, Faith, gave birth to a 4 pound, 14 ounce baby boy on Friday, Oct. 11. The average age of the Cougars'22 starters is 22 years old. Following is a breakdown of the different languages spoken by members of this year's team:

ATTENDANCE FIGURE RANKS NATIONALLY

The Cougars' season-opener against Syracuse drew a capacity crowd of 65,612 fans at LaVell Edwards Stadium, marking the 56th sellout at the stadium (since it was expanded in 1982.) That crowd also marked the 15th largest gathering in the nation on opening weekend. Michigan hosted a national leading 111,491 fans in the Wolverine's season-opener victory against Washington. Interestingly, BYUranked 12th nationally in accumulated capacity. Edwards Stadium was filled to 100.94 percent of its capacity. In two home games this season, the Cougars are averaging a league-leading 64,349 fans per game.

TOP RECRUITS

The BYU coaching staff managed to assemble one of the nation's top recruiting classes this past season. This years list of signees was rated No. 22 in the nation and tops in the Mountain WestConference. This year's class was highlighted by the signing of the nation's top high school quarterback, Ben Olson. While Coach Crowton has indicated Olson and Jake Kuresa (OL) will redshirt this season, incoming signees James Allen (CB), Curtis Brown (RB), Chad Barney (CB), and Shaun Nua (DL) have made significant contributions.

POPPINGA PREFERS PAPER

In the first game of the 2002 season (vs. Syracuse), the Cougars allowed just one sack, while producing three sacks against the Syracuse offense for a combined loss of 13 yards. Sophomore defensive end Brady Poppinga had one of the team's sacks, forcing a SUfumble in the process. In the Cougars' 31-28 loss at Reno, BYU produced a season-high five sacks. Poppinga lead the team with two sacks for a combined loss of 11 yards. Against Georgia Tech, Poppinga was again credited with a sack, marking his MWC-leading fifth QB stuff of the season. Through six games, Poppinga is averaging a league-best .83 sack per game. He also leads the Mountain West with 11 tackles for a combined loss of 48 yards. Last season, the BYU offense gave up 24 sacks, averaging 1.8 sacks per game. Defensively, BYU recorded 25 sacks, averaging 1.9 sacks per game. This season, the Cougars have tallied nine sacks, averaging 1.5 sacks per game. Offensively, BYU has allowed 14 sacks through the first six games.

ENGEMANN BY THE NUMBERS

Nearly two years after being sidelined with a shoulder injury, junior quarterback Bret Engemann made his return to the field in the Cougars'season-opener against Syracuse. In his first start since Sept. 30, 2000, Engemann led BYU to a season-opening victory, recording three touchdown completions and running for another in the Cougars' 42-21 victory over Syracuse. Engemann completed a career-high 35-of-54 (.648) attempts for 386 yards, marking the second 300-yard game of his career. In his come-back performance against the Orangemen, Engemann was responsible for four touchdowns on the evening, including a career-high three TD completions and a three-yard run. The 6-foot-5 Provo, Utah, native started things off with an 11-for-15 (.733) performance in the first quarter, racking up 111 yards and a six-yard touchdown strike to Andrew Ord. In the second quarter, Engemann racked up another 105 yards, 10 more completions, and a two-yard pass to Toby Christensen to put the Cougars up 14-7. During the second quarter, he also engineered a school-record 99-yard scoring drive to give BYU a 21-7 lead with 4:53 remaining in the first half. After the half, Engemann kept up his blistering assault on the Syracuse defense, posting 12 more completions on 15 attempts (.800) for 80 more yards. After the Orangemen had tied the score at 21-21, Engemann led the Cougars on a 10-play, 92-yard drive and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a three-yard run. On the night, Engemann produced scoring drives of 99, 92, 80, 73 and 71 yards. Against Hawaii, Engemann racked up 26 yards on 21-of-46 attempts, including a touchdown pass to Toby Christensen. Trailing by 10 in the final minutes of the second quarter, Engemann got the Cougars on the board with an 11-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 19-yard strike to Toby Christensen in the endzone. In the third game of the season, Engemann ran into a tough Nevada defense. Engemann completed just 6-of-16 attempts before turning things over to reserve QB Lance Pendleton in the second half. During the first half, Engemann found Andrew Ord for a 31-yard touchdown pass, marking his fifth TD pass of the season. At Georgia Tech, Engemann got off to a blistering pace, going 5-for-5 to start the game. However, the Yellow Jacket defense settled down to force two interceptions and a fumble, all in the first quarter. Engemann battled to complete 11-of-18 attempts for 92 yards before being sidelined. Against Utah State, Engemann engineered a 28-point come-from-behind victory, throwing for 294 yards on 26-of-43 (.605) attempts. In the first half, Engemann was 10of-21 for 106 yards. In the second half, Engemann and the Cougars rallied to score 28 unanswered points, upending the Aggies, 35-34. In the second half, Engemann was 16-of-22 (.727) and completed his only touchdown pass of the night -- the 18-yard, game-winning pass to tight end Gabe Reid. On the season, Engemann has produced 1,221 yards on 109-of-199 (.548) attempts. He has completed six touchdown passes, and has given up seven interceptions.

THE TETON TERROR

Known over the past 20+ years for its All-American quarterbacks, BYU is quickly becoming known for its outstanding tight ends. Senior tight end Spencer Nead is making a solid case to join the ranks of BYU's long line of outstanding tight ends, including Gordon Hudson, Chad Lewis, Itula Mili and Doug Jolley. Nead started the 2002 campaign with a career-high 80-yard performance in the Cougars' 42-21 win over Syracuse. Nead was one of three different receivers with five receptions on the night. All totaled three different BYU tight ends, including Gabe Reid and Aisaac Aiono accounted for 133 vards on 11 receptions. Against Hawaii, Nead recorded three receptions for 41 vards, including a team-high 22-yard reception. After just one reception at Nevada for 12 yards, Nead returned to form at Georgia Tech, recording three receptions for 21 yards. He was the only tight end with a reception against the Yellow Jackets. Against Utah State, Nead played a major roll in the comefrom-behind victory, recording a team-leading 6 receptions for 47 yards. A week later, Nead again led BYU with 5 receptions for 77 yards (at Air Force). On the season, Nead ranks second on the BYUroster with 23 receptions for 278 yards, averaging 46.3 yards per game. He is just one of three receivers with over 200 receiving yards on the season.

MACKEY WATCH LIST

In addition to being named among those being considered for the Lombardi Award, senior tight end Spencer Nead has been listed as a candidate for the John Mackey Award, which honors the top tight end in the country. Nead is the Cougars'top returning tight end after recording 22 receptions for 266 yards as a junior last season. Nead averaged 12.1 yards per reception and scored five touchdowns as a junior.

LOMBARDI WATCH LIST

Three BYUplayers were originally named to the preseason Rotary Lombardi Award watchlist, which annually honors college football's top lineman. Senior offensive lineman Ben Archibald was on the list, but due to a season-ending injury has been removed. His capable bookend, left tackle Dustin Rykert (6-foot-7, 315) is also a candidate for the Lombardi Award. Senior tight end Spencer Nead has also been listed as a candidate for the prestigious award.

THIRD-DOWN WOES

Against Syracuse, BYU converted 11-of-18 (.611) third-down attempts, including five-straight conversions on the Cougars' first drive of the game. All totaled BYU reeled off seven straight third-down conversions before the Orangmen were able to stop BYU on a third-and-22 attempt early in the second quarter. Against Hawaii, the Cougars were a mere 7-of-20 on third down attempts, including an 0-for-4 start in the first quarter. In Week No. 3, the Cougars continued to struggle on third down, converting just 4 of 14 attempts. Week 4 proved no different. Battling humid conditions at Georgia Tech, the Cougars were a sluggish 4-of-17 (.235) on third-down attempts. At Utah State, BYU again struggled on third-down, converting just 9-of-19 (.474) attempts. The Cougars'slump continued at Air Force, converting just 4-of-13 (.307) third-down attempts. On the season, the Cougars are 39-of-101 (.390) on third-down conversions. Over the past three games, BYU has converted just 17-of-49 (.347) third-down attempts.

BEST IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

In the three-year history of the Mountain West Conference, the Cougars have posted a 16-6 (.727) record against league opponents. Entering the season, BYU was tied with ColoradoState for the best league record. (The Cougars have posted a 2-1 record over the Rams since 1999.) ULTIMATE EXPOSURE

Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average three times per season, including a single-season record six national television appearances during the 2000 season. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 49-33-2 (.595) while playing on national television, including a 23-16 (.590) mark on ABC and a 29-18-2 (.612) mark on ESPN. Current assistant coach Robbie Bosco led the Cougars to a 20-14 win over Pittsburgh in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast in 1984. BYUwas 5-2 last season when playing on national television, and are already off to a 2-1 start this season. The Cougars have a total of four national television appearances scheduled this season (all on ESPN or ESPN2).

UNLUCKY No. 13

Many people have long held superstitious regarding the number 13. Starting quarterback Bret Engemann wore the number during his sophomore campaign before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury against Syracuse. He has switched to No. 5 this season. Interestingly, 13 days prior to the season-opener (against Syracuse), senior offensive lineman Ben Archibald suffered a season-ending compound fracture in his left leg.

OVERTIME FACTS

Since the NCAA instituted overtime in 1996, the Cougars have played four overtime games, posting a perfect 4-0 record. Of the 31 teams which have played four or more overtime games, the Cougars are the only team to post a perfect 4-0 record. Interestingly, the Cougars have never played an overtime game in Provo. LAVELL EDWARDS STADIUM

On November 18, 2001, Cougar Stadium was forever changed, honoring the man who built BYU's football tradition from the ground up. President of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Gordon B. Hinckley, announced the historic name change prior to Edwards' final home game (vs. New Mexico). Now known as LaVell Edwards Stadium; the stadium has been home to 120 games since it was expanded to 65,000 seats in 1982. BYU has produced a 98-22 (.817) record in the Stadium since the 1982 season, including a 37-13 victory over New Mexico in Edwards' final game in the stadium. Fittingly, Edwards retired with a perfect record (1-0) in LaVell Edwards Stadium. Since 1972, BYU has posted an impressive 140-22 (.864) record in Provo. The Cougars have won 10 straight in Provo, including a stretch of nine straight games since the stadium was renamed.

A WINNING TRADITION

Over the past two decades, BYUhas consistently ranked as one of the nation's top winning programs. During the 1990s, BYU ranked 16th nationally with an 86-40-2 record (.670). In the 80s, the Cougars won 102 of 128 games to rank third nationally. Since the 2000 season, BYUhas posted an impressive 21-11 (.656) mark, including a 12-2 record during the 2001 campaign.

FUTURE FACTS

- BYU will play at USC and Notre Dame in 2003. The Cougars'home schedule will include games against Boise State, Georgia Tech and Stanford.
- The Cougars will have as many as 15 of 22 starters returning for the 2003 season, including 10 defensive starters.

Mike Borich (wide receivers), Mike Empey (tight ends) and Barry Lamb (safeties) will be in the pressbox.

JV NOTES

Sixth-ranked Snow College racked up 488 total yards en route to a 38-27 rain-drenched win against the BYU-junior varsity squad on Saturday. The win marked the Badgers' first of the season, and their sixth straight, dating back to last season. Snow scored first on its third possession of the game when Paul Peterson, brother of former BYU quarterback Charlie Peterson, engineered a 54-yard drive that ended with a 13-yard pass to Ameen Shaheen. Snow missed an opportunity earlier when they had the ball on the BYU-JV 14 yard line after a fumble, but an interception gave the ball back. The Cougars matched the Badger score after Matt Berry led the offense on an 80-yard drive, capped by a 28-yard strike to tight end Andy Hadfield. Hadfield, a junior tight end, was the favorite target all afternoon for the BYU-JV quarterbacks as he accounted for nearly 200 of the 298 yards receiving. Snow College answered back with two touchdowns on an 11-yard pass from Peterson to Ben Anderson and then a 14-yard pass to Nate Meikle. The Badgers missed the first PAT and then missed the two-point conversion after the second touchdown, leading 19-7 midway through the second quarter. Mid-way through the second quarter, BYU defender David Johnson picked off a Peterson attempt, returning it 35-yards for the touchdown. Trailing 19-14, the Cougars then gave up 19 unanswered points in the driving rain before they were able to put more points on the board. The Badgers scored with 6:58 remaining in the third on another Peterson to Anderson strike that covered 30 yards. Those two teamed up again at the 3:30 mark of the quarter on a three-yard strike. Both PAT's failed, but Snow College led 31-14 going into the final quarter of play. Peterson threw his sixth touchdown of the game when he found Shaheen open in the end zone early in the fourth quarter from ten yards out. The PAT was good and the Badgers were ahead for good 38-14. The Cougars made a run late in the fourth quarter, scoring on a Steve Later three-yard touchdown run with 6:43 remaining. Todd Mortensen threw a ten-yard pass to another junior, Jay Omer for the final touchdown with 1:19 left on the clock. The two-point conversion failed. Saturday's game marked the final game for the BYU-JV squad. The Cougars finished their abbreviated season with a 1-1 record, including a hard-fought 21-14 win over top-ranked Dixie State College.

COUGARS LEAD MWC IN HOME ATTENDANCE

BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all three years of the league's existence, averaging over 63,500 fans per game since the 1999 season. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-eight crowds.

COACHING: A FAMILY TRADITION

BYU safeties coach Barry Lamb is in his ninth season as a member of the coaching staff. Prior to coming to Provo, Lamb served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at San Diego State. Prior to his stint at SDSU, Lamb also coached at Idaho, UNLV, Arizona State and Oregon. His wife, Karen, was recently named the head women's volleyball coach at BYU, replacing Elaine Michaelis, who had coached the program for the past 40 years. Karen began her coaching career in 1978, serving as an assistant at BYU. After additional coaching experience at the high school and junior college ranks, Karen returned to the collegiate level with head coaching assignments at UNLV and Washington State.

BY A SLIM MARGIN

Throughout the 2001 season, the Cougars tallied 608 points, averaging a nation's best 46.8 points per game. BYU allowed 396 points, giving up an average 30.5 points per contest. Overall, the Cougars registered a +16.3-point margin of victory. The Cougars won four games on the season by 30 or more points, including a season-high 45-point win over Nevada on Sept. 1. The 2002 season got off to a similar start, with the Cougars posting 42 points on Syracuse. BYUoutdistanced the Orangemen by 21 points. In the second game of the season, (vs. Hawaii), the Cougars held on for a three-point victory. The margin narrowed to just +7 after falling to Nevada, 31-28. After losing a second straight game (at Georgia Tech), the Cougars'scoring margin dropped to +3. A 3 point win at Utah State and a 43-point loss at Air Force reversed the Cougars'margin of victory to -5.

TURNOVER A NEW LEAF

In the Cougars' season-opener against Syracuse, the Cougars and Orangemen were all even in the turnover category. The Cougars recovered on SU fumble, and were credited with two interceptions. Syracuse forced two fumbles and were credited with one interception. In the second week of the season, things were a little different. The Cougars won the turnover battle by an overwhelming 4-0 margin. BYU defenders recorded four interceptions, including two by walk-on Kip Nielsen. Two of the Cougars' four turnovers led to 14 points. In the Cougars' 31-28 loss at Nevada, BYU recorded two fumble recoveries and an interception, winning the turnover battle, 3-1. Despite losing the turnover battle at Georgia Tech, 4-3, the Cougars forced three opponent turnovers for the fourth straight game this season. Junior cornerback Brandon Heaney was credited with two interceptions against Tech.

BYU's opponents for the 2002 season had a combined 70-70 record in 2001. Four of those teams, including Syracuse, Georgia Tech, Colorado State and Utah, recorded bowl game victories last season. The Cougars open the season against two team that posted a combined 19-6 record. In fact, three of BYU's first four opponents had eight or more wins during the 2001 campaign. Following the first six weeks of competition, BYU opponents have posted a combined record of 31-43 (.420) on the season.
