BYU Looks to Mess with Utah Teams

The Cougars (2-0-0) return home to Provo on Friday to face a talented Weber State University (1-1-0) squad in the first of a four-game home stand. BYU will then look for its fourth win against in-state rival Utah State on Monday. The games will be played at South Stadium with game times slated for 7 p.m., and 8 p.m., respectively.

Weber State

Coming into this week, the Wildcats have compiled a 1-1-0 record. The matchup with the Cougars will be their third road game in a row, with two more on the way, before returning to Ogden.

Weber State University opened up the 2005 regular season with a strong defensive effort, which paid off with a 1-0 win over Utah Valley State College. The Wildcat defense held UVSC to only five shots for the game, all of which came in the second half. The Wildcats then fell to Arizona State, 5-2, on Sunday despite a pair of career-first goals and 10 saves from senior goalkeeper Kandice Golar.

Week in Review: Lui Named Tourney MVP in Native Hawai'i

George Mason

In an impressive showing on both ends of the field, Brigham Young overwhelmed George Mason, 4-0, during the Cougars first game of the season at the OHANA Hotels & Resort No Ka Oi at the Waipio Peninsula Soccer Stadium. The Cougars dominated from the outset, scoring a pair of goals in each half. BYU out-shot George Mason, 23-3 and held the advantage in corner kicks, 7-2.

Four players scored for the Cougars. Sophomore Natalie Nate put BYU on the scoreboard early at the 6:15 mark sending a straight-away rocket from 35 yards into the goal. Less than 10 minutes later another sophomore, Carolyn Swenson stole a Patriots pass and hit a left-footed shot from close range to make it 2-0.

The second half saw two more BYU goals. On a free kick, senior Jamie Beck fed Brooke Thulin who bent a shot past Patriot goalie Olivia Brown in the 79th minute of the contest. Just two minutes later, freshman Jessica Harmon making her first college appearance, scored off a corner kick.

University of Hawai'i

In the Championship game, Charlene Lui scored the game-winning goal with 33 seconds left in the second overtime period to lift BYU to a 1-0 win over Hawai'i in the championship match of the OHANA Hotels & Resort No Ka Oi at the Waipio Peninsula Soccer Stadium.

Both teams played to a scoreless tie for more than 109 minutes of soccer action before senior midfielder/ defender Charlene Lui found some open space and kicked the ball from 35 yards out for the game-winning goal. The Honolulu native was named tournament MVP. Teammates Katie Larkin, Natalie Nate, Claire Thomas, Jaime Beck and Carolyn Swenson were named to the All-Tournament Team.



Cougars Picked Second in MWC

In a vote by the league's coaches, BYU was selected to finish second in the 2005 Mountain West Conference women's soccer regular-season championship in the preseason poll.

Utah, which received seven first-place votes and collected a total of 49 points, was selected to win the regular-season championship. BYU picked up the final first-place vote.

BYU welcomes ten of 11 starters back, including First Team All-MWC selections Jaime Rendich Beck and Claire Thomas. The 2005 MWC Women's Soccer Championship takes place on the campus of UNLV, Nov. 2-5.

Leadership

Entering the 2005 season, the Cougars are a team full of young athletes, though with more experience than the 2004 squad. Returning are eight sophomores, along with nine freshmen. Over half of the 2005 team is comprised of underclassmen. Ten juniors and

five seniors are also on hand to help guide this young team back to its winning ways.

Fortunately, the Cougars have some experienced players who will be expected to provide leadership to the young team.

According to Rockwood, senior goalkeeper Ashley Smith will be one of the main leaders on the 2005 team. "Ashley is such an amazing young lady," said Rockwood. "She understands that on or off the field, she can have a huge impact on the team with her ability to lead."

Rockwood also believes junior goalkeeper Natalie Evans and senior midfielder/defender Charlene Lui will have a tremendous influence on the young Cougar team.

"These three young ladies are all extremely well-rounded individuals, three of our hardest workers and three of our best role models," said Rockwood. "The impact that they can have on the younger players is going to be fun to watch."

Returning Players

This group of players brings with them experience and the same love for the game that has defined the nationally respected Cougar program. BYU will continue to follow the style of soccer and system that has enabled them to be successful over the years, with a few minor changes that will allow players new and better opportunities.

Senior Jaime Rendich Beck took on a new role during the 2004 season. She thrived under a system that allowed her more opportunities to shoot and counted on her to provide a strong offensive presence. As a junior, Beck was named to the Second Team All-West Region by Soccer Buzz, All-MWC First Team and MWC All-Tournament First Team. Scoring nine goals and posting three assists in 2004, Beck led the Cougars with 21 points and hopes to far exceed that number this year.

"Jaime is a tremendous offensive threat and one of our most talented players," said Rockwood. "She understands the work ethic necessary for success. She will be a key leader for us as she helps our offense through scoring and assisting goals."

Also returning to the Cougars for her junior season is First Team All-MWC defender Claire Thomas. Thomas earned seven points for BYU last season and Cougar fans can look for even greater numbers this season.

Beck and Thomas are joined by two Second Team All-MWC players, Lui and sophomore goalkeeper Erika Woodbury. Lui's greatest strength is her technical ability, which serves her well as she leads the organization of the Cougar midfield. Take out space Woodbury was also named the MWC Freshman of the Year with 1.18 goals against average and seven shutouts. Rockwood expects more of the same from these two players this year.

Junior midfielder/forward Bobbi Tillotson also had great opportunities to impact the team as a sophomore, leading the team with eight assists, while posting 12 points. The BYU squad will continue to depend upon her to find the right people at the right time.

Fresh Faces

Many young and talented players will have an opportunity to play quality minutes in hopes of making an immediate impact on the team. In arguably one of the most balanced and talented recruiting classes, the Cougars add nine high-impact freshmen to a team that returns 10 of its 11 starters. BYU women's soccer was listed No. 9 regionally in the SoccerBuzz 2005 Top Recruiting Classes and No. 36 nationally.

"I think our incoming freshmen will have a big impact," said Rockwood. "They certainly have plenty of talent. We will be looking for a couple of them to play significant minutes for us."

The Cougar freshmen are led by Katie Larkin, a two-time NSCAA High School All-American and Utah 5A MVP. She led the state in goals and assists and will look to add her offensive talents to the Cougar line-up this season.



The Rockwood File

After completing her tenth season, head coach Jennifer Rockwood has taken the BYU women's soccer team to national prominence and established herself as one of the premier coaches in Division I soccer today.

Rockwood currently ranks tenth in winning percentage among active NCAA coaches with an impressive 165-56-10 overall record for her career. Over the last ten seasons, Rockwood accumulated a .736 winning percentage.

In the past ten years, Rockwood has guided the Cougars to five conference championships. On the national scene, her teams have made seven appearances in the NCAA Tournament in the last eight years and reached the "Sweet Sixteen" in 1998, 2000 and 2003. The Cougars regularly maintain a consistent top-25 ranking. During Rockwood's tenure, the team finished in the top-10 three times, including a recent run in the 2003 NCAA College Cup. The tournament ended with BYU finishing No. 5 in the country after making their first "Elite Eight" appearance in the program's history.

Among the many achievements and awards she has received over her career, Rockwood has been honored with two Coach of the Year citations, one by the Western Athletic Conference in 1996, and again by the MWC in 2000. She also became the first MWC coach to eclipse the 100-win total mark when the Cougars shutout Milwaukee-Wisconsin 2-0 on Sept. 23, 2000.

Under Rockwood's tutelage, a long list of All-American soccer players has emerged from BYU's program. These athletes include Aleisha Rose, Jeni Viernes and Michelle Jensen. Among the players who have been coached by Rockwood are four additional All-American athletes that were drafted by the women's United Soccer Association: Shauna Rohbock, Maren Hendershot, Sara Reading and Staci Reynolds.

Prior to becoming the head coach, Rockwood led BYU's highly successful club soccer team for seven years. In that time she amassed an overall record of 128-25-9, and the final two years she took her teams to the Western National Collegiate Club soccer Association (NCCSA) title and placed second in the NCCSA National Championships.

The Lake Oswego, Ore. native was a four-sport athlete in high school playing soccer, softball, basketball and track. After one year at Rick's College on a basketball scholarship, she transferred to BYU where she became a four-year starter at center midfield on the Cougars' club soccer team and graduated in finance, business management.

Rockwood has also coached the Utah ODP, youth club programs, and the high school level.

Rockwood Among Coaching Elite

Rockwood currently ranks 10th in winning percentage among active NCAA Division I coaches with an impressive 165-56-10 (.735) overall record for her career. Anson Dorrance, Becky Burleigh, Jerry Smith, Chris Petrucelli, Len Tsantiris, John Walker, Randy Waldrum, G. Guerrieri and Patrick Farmer are the only coaches ahead of her.

South Stadium

South Stadium is the place the Cougars love to call home, a home all opponents hate to visit.

For the past ten years, South Stadium (formerly South Field), has been the battlefield for the Cougars as the team has taken on, and defeated, the top teams in their conference and in the NCAA.

The Cougars have amassed an 86-19-4 (.807) record at home, which is among the best in the nation over the same time period. Of those 86 home wins, an outstanding 47 have ended in a shutout.

BYU consistently manages to hold its opponents scoreless when playing at South Stadium with 43 percent of all the Cougars' wins ending in shutout victories, while BYU has been shutout only nine times in the stadium's history.

Aside from the Cougars' history of defeating tough teams at home,

another factor making South Stadium a formidable place for opponents is the large and loud crowd of fans that pack the stadium at every game.

Consistently among the top 15 in the NCAA, South Stadium packs in some of the largest crowds in the country. With an average attendance of 1,191 fans during the 2004 campaign, the Cougars rank among the highest every year for largest attendance average in the country. BYU also packed in a total of 13,106 fans over 11 games, recording the second highest mark in the MWC and making South Stadium one of the toughest places for opponents to play in women's college soccer today.

Located just south of the Smith Fieldhouse, South Stadium boasts one of the best-maintained grass playing surfaces in the NCAA. The Wasatch Mountains serve as a scenic backdrop for the capacity crowd of 3,000 fans. South Stadium is also equipped with state-of-the-art field lights, making night games a favorite among fans.
