COUGARS TRAVEL TO VEGAS

After taking the weekend off, the Cougars will return to action this week, traveling to Las Vegas to take on UNLV in Mountain West Conference action. After winning just one of their first three games, the Cougars have put together back-to-back victories to improve their overall record to 3-2, including a league-leading record of 2-0 in MWC play. The Cougars picked up an important 31-24 victory at New Mexico before the bye week to capture their first road win of the season. The Rebels enter Saturday's contest at Sam Boyd Stadium with a 2-4 overall record and a mark of 1-1 in league play. After recording a 27-0 victory over Utah, the Rebels have lost two straight, including a 17-point loss at Air Force on Saturday. Game time at Sam Boyd Stadium in Las Vegas is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. (PT). The game will be broadcast regionally on The mtn.

THE BYU-UNLV SERIES



BYU will be looking for its 11th straight MWC win and its seventh consecutive victory in Las Vegas. The Cougars hold an all-time record of 11-3 against the Rebels, including a perfect 6-0 record over UNLV in Las Vegas. BYU is 2-0 against the Rebels during the Bronco Mendenhall era. BYU won six in a row from 1981-2001 but have never won more than two consecutive contests over the Rebels at any other time. A LOOK BACK: BYU 31, NEW MEXIOC 24



BYU improved to 3-2 on the season and collected its first road victory of the season, defeating New Mexico 31-24. The Cougars got their 10th consecutive Mountain West Conference win and eighth straight MWC road victory behind quarterback Max Hall's 18-40, 251-yard night. Hall threw two touchdown passes on the night. Sophomore Austin Collie caught four balls for 98 yards, including a season-long 59-yard touchdown recep-

tion wih 9:23 left in the third quarter to give the Cougars a 21-6 lead. The defense came up big, collecting five turnovers, including three fumble recoveries and two interceptions. Senior linebacker Bryan Kehl had his first-career interception, returing it 36 yards to give BYU an early 7-0 lead in the contest. All totaled, BYU scored 24 of its 31 points as a result of turnovers.

ROAD WARRIORS

The Cougars' game at Tulsa marked the fourth time during the Bronco Mendenhall era the Cougars have had back-to-back road games during the regular season. In 2005, BYU played at San Diego State and at New Mexico in back-to-back weeks and at UNLV and Wyoming. Last season, the Cougars played at Air Force, followed by a game at Colorado State the following week. The Cougars are 3-1 in the second of two-straight road games. This week's game at New Mexico marks the second of two straight road games for the Cougars this season. Following this week's game in Albuquerque, the Cougars will have a week off before traveling to Las Vegas to face UNLV. Overall, the Cougars' will have started the season with four of six games on the road.

BYE WEEK RECORD

Since the first official year of football at BYU, the Cougars are 36-27-2 (.569) in games following a bye week. Since winning the National Championship in 1984, BYU has won 19 of 27 games following a bye week. During the Bronco Mendenhall era, the Cougars are 1-1, including a 50-51 overtime loss agianst TCU and a 52-7 victory over UNLV last season. Since the 2000 season, BYU has played on the road three times following a bye week, recording a 2-1 record. Interestingly, Saturday's game will mark the third time since the 2001 season the Cougars have played the Rebels following a bye week. BYU is 2-0 in the previous two meetings, including a thrilling 35-31 victory at Sam Boyd Stadium in 2001 and a 52-7 win in Provo last season. Since the 2000 season, the Cougars have scored an average 35.7 points per game following a bye week, allowing 26.8 points per game. Over the past six seasons, BYU has won post-bye weeks games by an average 8.9 points per game.

SECOND STRAIGHT SELLOUT

The Air Force game marked the second consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium and the first time since November 20, 1999 the Cougars have had a sell-out in back-toback games during the same season. A capacity crowd of 64,525 attended the Cougars' season-opening victory over Arizona on September 1. Since 1999, the Cougars are 9-4 in games with a sell-out crowd. Speaking of sell-out crowds ... this week's game at University Stadium in Albququerque is expected to be sold out.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME TO START THE SEASON

Dating back to the Cougars first season in 1922, BYU has posted a record of 29-11-1 when opening the season in Provo -- that's a winning percentage of 72 percent! In overall home-openers, the Cougars are 52-29-1 (64 percent) since 1922. Interestingly, BYU's longest home-opening win streak covers 10 seasons, dating from 1930 through 1939. Since 1998, the Cougars have posted a record of 8-2 (.777) in home-opening games.

OFF TO A QUICK START

For the first time since the 2004 season when BYU edged Notre Dame, 20-17, at LaVell Edwards Stadium, the Cougars won its season opener, 20-7, against Arizona. The Cougars lost at home to Boston College to start the 2005 campaign before dropping a 16-13 decision to Arizona on a last-second field goal to start the 2006 season. BYU won four straight season-openers from 2001-2004. Bronco Mendenhall is 1-2 in season-opening games, including a mark of 1-1 in Provo.

RUSHING DOMINANCE

Entering Saturday's game at UNLV, the Cougars own a record of 93-18 when rushing for 100 (or more) yards since the 1991 season. The Tulsa game marked only the fifth time since 1991 that the Cougars had gained over 150 yards rushing in a game and lost. (BYU is 73-5 since 1991 when rushing for 150 or more yards.) During the Bronco Mendenhall era, the Cougars are 17-3 when rushing for 100 or more yards. This season, BYU has rushed for 100 or more yards in four games, including Arizona (104), Tulsa (157), Air Force (159) and New Mexico (112).



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RETIRING No. 14



Two of college football's all-time greatest quarterbacks, Gifford Nielsen and Ty Detmer, were honored together on Saturday, Sept. 1 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The No. 14 jersey, worn by both Nielsen and Detmer, was retired during halftime of the Cougars' seasonopener against Arizona.

Throughout the history of BYU

football, dating back to 1922, only three jerseys have ever been retired. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie's No. 40 jersey, along with Marion Probert's No. 81 jersey and Steve Young's No. 8 jersey all hang from the pressbox at Edwards Stadium.

Nielsen, a member of the College Football Hall of Fame and recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, passed for over 5,800 yards and collected 55 touchdowns throughout his career. Earning All-America honors in 1976, Nielsen led the NCAA in touchdown completions, ranked second in total offense and helped the Cougars to their first-ever national ranking. After what appeared to be a careerending injury during his senior season, Nielsen went on to play six years for the Houston Oilers and remains the last quarterback to lead the team to the AFC finals. Nielsen and his wife, Wendy, are the parents of six children and reside in Houston.

Detmer, the winner of the 1990 Heisman Trophy, set nearly every passing record ever imagined during his time in Provo. A two-time Davey O'Brien Award winner, Detmer set 62 records during his career at BYU, including the NCAA record for career passing yards with 15,031. He was a consensus All-American in 1990 as the nation's leading passer and earned his second consensus All-American title in 1991 after leading the nation in total offense. He still holds the NCAA record for career touchdown completions with 121. Detmer played 14 seasons in the NFL and currently resides with his wife, Kim, and four daughters in Austin, Texas.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME



Currently BYU has four former players and a head coach enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Ind. Legendary coach LaVell Edwards was inducted in 2004 after serving 29 seasons as head coach, posting an amazing record of 257-101-3. Steve Young was inducted in 2001 with Jim McMahon, Marc Wilson and Gifford Neilsen earning Hall of Fame status in 1998, 1996 and 1994, respectively. With a long

history of successful quarterbacks making their way to the College Football Hall of Fame, it seems only a matter of time before Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer receives an invitation to South Bend. BYU has produced more than just top-ranked quarterbacks over the years. Defensive lineman Jason Buck, offensive lineman Mo Elewonibi, offensive lineman Nick Eyre, running back Eldon Fortie, defensive back Kyle Morrell, punter Pat Thompson and tight ends Chris Smith and Gordon Hudson are also candidates for the Hall of Fame.

FOLLOWING A BOWL VICTORY...

In seasons following a BYU bowl victory, the Cougars have compiled a combined record of 66-21 (.758), averaging 9.4 wins per season. Of BYU's seven previous post-bowl victory teams, all but two teams have returned to a bowl game the following season.

EASTERN WASHINGTON - After three straight MWConference games, the Cougars will wrap up non-conference play when they play host to Eastern Washington on October 20. It will be the first meeting between the two schools. The Cougars have never lost to

SEASON-OPENERS

Since 1922, the Cougars have posted a 46-35-2 record in season-opening games, including a 20-7 victory over Arizona in the 2007 season-opening game.

"FAN"TASTIC FANS

Over 350,000 (363,146) fans attended six different home games at Edwards Stadium during the 2006 season, averaging 60,542 fans per game. BYU finished ranked fourth overall in the west behind USC (91,480), UCLA (64,955), California (64,318). BYU has annually been the top school in average attendance for teams from conferences that do not receive automatic BCS bowl bids. BYU has led the MWC in home attendance in all eight years of the league's existence. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds. Through two home games, the Cougars are averaging 64,514 fans per game -- that's 101% of the stadium's 64,045 capacity.

SEASON TICKET HOLDERS ARE FULLY INVESTED

BYU has sold over 53,500 season tickets for the 2007 season -- that's an increase of 7,900 over last year's total of 45,600. Interestingly, nearly 84 percent of the Edwards Stadium capacity will be occupied by season-ticket holders during the season.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 318.4 pounds and average 6-feet-5. The front five will be going up against a UNLV defensive front that measures an average 6-feet-2, 275 pounds. Defensively, the Cougars' front three average 6-feet-2, 270 pounds, while the Rebels' offensive line tips the scales at an average 6-feet-4, 295 pounds per man.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are 28 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 12 different countries, including Argentina, Australia, Bulgaria, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Germany, Japan, Madagascar, Mexico, Sweden and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions speak a total of seven different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, German, Japanese, Malagasy, Portuguese, Spanish and Swedish.

RETURNED MISSIONARIES

Of the 105 players on the Fall Camp roster, over 70 have served a church missions in a total of 19 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Honduras, Hong Kong, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, Samoa, Spain, Taiwan, Uruguay and Venezuela. Current members of the team have served missions in 16 different states within the United States, and members of the team who have previously served church missions speak a total of six different foreign languages, including Chinese, German, Japanese, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.



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WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. Mormon missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world.

Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language.

Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea.

A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize.

Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.

SCORING DOMINANCE

Not only did BYU lead the nation in home scoring margin in 2006, the Cougars also led the nation in overall scoring margin, defeating opponents by an average 22.1 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars have outscored opponents by an average 5.0 points per game.

EDWARDS STADIUM

LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium, it was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000 in permanent seats.

HOMELAND SECURITY

BYU's victory over Air Force runs the Cougars' consecutive home winning streak to eight games, dating back to the 2006 season. Over that span, the Cougars have defeated their opponents by an average of 31.2 points per game During that stretch, BYU is allowing just 10.6 points per game. The Cougars have allowed seven points or less in five of the last eight home games. In the first two games this season, the Cougars have outscored opponents by an average 19.0 points per game and have allowed just 6.5 points per game. The Cougars' current win streak is the longest since posting a 10-game home win streak from October 26, 2000 to September 6, 2002. Following the UNLV game, BYU will play four its next six games in Provo.

HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



Bronco Mendenhall is in his third season as head coach at BYU. In his first season (2005), Mendenhall took a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and compiled a 6-5 regular-season record, a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference standings and earned a trip to a bowl game for the first time in three seasons.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted a 10-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Chamts 0 means days a newly RVU saturated to the Diseaser DuraVi

pionship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC—this time, as conference champions.

Along the way, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.54 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.46 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.7 points per game. The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging 1.08 turnovers per game. BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.69 points per game -- the lowest per-game average for the Cougars since the 1985 season.

BYU outscored its opponents during the season by an average 36.7 to 14.69 (+22.01). More impressively, the Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo last season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006. Not only did BYU win each of its home games, it did so in record fashion. Not only did the 2006 Cougars finish the season as the most dominate team in the nation, but also they finished as the most dominate home team in BYU Football history. BYU averaged 47.2 points per game at LaVell Edwards Stadium while holding opponents to just 12.0 points per contest. The +35.16 margin not only led the nation in home scoring margin, but also set a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979. LSU finished the season behind the Cougars in 2006, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin.

In his first season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record. Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing.

During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons.

BYU WELCOMES MARK WEBER TO ITS STAFF



During the off-season, BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Mark Weber (last name is pronounced WEB-er) has been selected to coach the Cougars' offensive line. During his coaching career, including stops at Fresno State, UCLA, UNLV, Nevada and Oregon State, Weber has mentored several All-America, all-conference and NFL-caliber players. At Fresno State, Weber coached offensive tackle Logan Mankins, who earned All-America honors and was a first-round draft pick for the New England Patriots. Mankins went on to start all 16 games as a rookie for the Patriots. In 2002, all five

offensive line starters earned post-season honors for UCLA. Offensive tackle Mike Saffer earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors, as well as second- and third-team All-America honors. In his second year with the Bruins, Weber coached Outland Trophy winner and first-team All-American Kris Farris. In 1997, Chad Overhauser, earned first-team All-America honors for the Bruins.

New England Patriots, who started every game as rookie) and 1998 Outland Trophy winner and All- American Kris Farris at UCLA. In 1998, the UCLA offense racked up 5,847 yards of total offense to set a single-season school record. During that same season, the Bruins won the Pac-10 with a 10-2 record. Was with Idaho State when it won the NCAA Division I-AA National Championship in 1981.

TEAM CAPTAINS

Seniors Bryan Kehl, Kelly Poppinga, Matt Allen and Sete Aulai have been selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2007 football season. Kehl and Poppinga are top linebackers for the Cougars, while Allen is a veteran wide receiver and Aulai is the team's starting center.

Collectively, the group has racked up 111 games of experience, including Kehl who has played in 40 career games and Allen who has played in 36. Aulai started and played in 12 games during the 2006 season, while Poppinga saw action in all 13 games for the Cougars last season. Aulai is a 2006 Mountain West Conference second-team performer and has been tapped as an honors candidate for the 2007 season. Aulai allowed just one sack as a junior and did not allow a single sack against MWC opponents last season. Allen is an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer who graduated with a degree in exercise science earlier this month. Allen racked up 420 yards receiving, averaging 32 yards per game. Kehl is also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer. He ranked third on the BYU roster last season with 70 tackles, including eight tackles for a combined loss of 33 yards. Poppinga, also an Academic All-Mountain West Conference performer and recent BYU graduate, totaled 36 tackles during his junior season, posting two sacks and two interceptions.



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ROOKIE QB's AND BOWL GAMES

Sophomore quarterback Max Hall made his collegiate debut on September 1 against Arizona. Hall threw 26-of-39 for 288 yards and two touchdowns. The game marked Hall's first game in over four seasons. Hall is the first BYU quarterback to start the season without any previous experience since Steve Sarkisian started in 1995. Hall will also look to become the first quarterback since Brandon Doman to lead the Cougars to a bowl game in his first season as the regular starter. Since John Walsh led BYU to a Holiday Bowl appearance in 1993, Brandon Doman is the only quarterback to lead the Cougars to a bowl game in his first season as a regular starter.

HALL IN A DAY'S WORK



Sophomore quarterback Max Hall totaled 251 yards passing on 18-of-40 attempts in the Cougars' 31-24 victory over New Mexico. He was credited with two touchdown completions, including a season-long 59-yard pass to Austin Collie in the third quarter to give the Cougars' a 21-6 lead. Hall started his career with a 288-yard, two-touchdown performance in the Cougars' 20-7 victory over Arizona. Following another twotouchdown performance at UCLA, Hall racked up a careerbest 537 yards passing and four more touchdown completions against Tulsa.

On the season, Hall has completed over 59 percent of his attempts (131-221) and is averaging a league-best 352.0 yards per game. Hall is on pace to pass for over 4,200 yards on the season and rank among the top-five single-season performances in BYU football history. Hall had two touchdown completions against New Mexico, adding to his season total of 12.

Through five games as a starter, only Ty Detmer had totaled more yards than Hall. In addition, Hall ranks behind only Detmer and Marc Wilson with 12 touchdown completions on the season.

CONSECUTIVE SELLOUTS

Saturday's 31-6 victory over Air Force marked the second consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium and the first time since November 20, 1999 the Cougars have had a sell-out in back-to-back games during the same season. A capacity crowd of 64,525 attended the Cougars' season-opening victory over Arizona on September 1, while attendance for Saturday's game against Air Force was listed at 64,502. Since 1999, the Cougars are 9-4 in games with a sell-out crowd. Following is a look at the 12 sellouts since the 1999 season.

QUARTERLY REPORT

BYU's first-quarter shutout against New Mexico marked the third time this season, and the second straight game, the Cougars had posted a first-quarter shutout. All totaled, the Cougars have held opponents scoreless in eight of 20 quarters this season. Against Air Force, the Cougars held the Falcons scoreless in the first two quarters of the game, marking the second time in four games BYU had shut out its opponent in the first half. The Cougars then held Air Force scoreless in the fourth quarter, marking the seventh out of 16 total quarters that the BYU defense has held its opponent scoreless this season.

FIRST BLOOD

The Cougars have scored first in 16 of the last 17 games, including the New Mexico game when Bryan Kehl picked off Donovan Portorie for a 36-yard interception return for a touchdown. BYU is 14-2 when it is the first to score in the game.

TAKING THE LEAD

After quarterback Max Hall found sophomore wide receiver Austin Collie for a 59yard touchdown reception in the third quarter, the Cougars held a 15-point advantage over the Logos. The score marked the biggest lead BYU has had since posting a 20-0 advantage over Arizona in the fourth quarter of the season-opener. A 29-yard touchdown pass from Hall to Harvey Unga gave the Cougars a 24-0 lead at the 10:54 mark of the third quarter, marking the largest lead BYU has held at any point this season.

FIRST-HALF DOMINANCE

Dating back to the 2006 season, the Cougars have led at halftime in 17 of the last 18 games, including four out of five games this season. During those 17 games, BYU is 15-3.

THE 100-YARD CLUB

Sophomore Dennis Pitta's 114 yards receiving against Air Force marked the second consecutive game BYU has had a 100-yard receiver (Pitta, Michael Reed and Austin Collie all caught for 100+ yards against Tulsa). Also, Harvey Unga's 111 yards on 22 carries marked the second consecutive game the freshman running back had rushed for at least 100 yards. The game marks the second straight contest the Cougars have had a 100-yard receiver and a 100-yard rusher. Collie came up just two yards shy of hitting the 100-yard mark against New Mexico. The Super Sophomore was credited with four receptions for 98 yards, including a career-best 59-yard reception in the third quarter to give BYU a 21-6 lead.

SEEING PITTA FROM THE POCKET



Sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta caught five passes for 114 yards against Air Force and racked up 113 receiving yards the previous week against Tulsa. The last BYU player to have two consecutive games with 100+ yards receiving was Jonny Harline in 2006. Harline totaled 118 yards against Utah and racked up 181 receiving yards the following game against Oregon in the 2006 Las Vegas Bowl. Against New Mexico, Pitta had four receptions for another 49 yards and a touchdown.

So far this season, Max Hall and Dennis Pitta have teamed up on 24 balls for a team-leading 375 yards. Pitta is averaging over 76 yards receiving per game. With both Pitta and Hall being only sophomores, they are on pace to become BYU's all-time leading quarterback-receiver duo. Currently, Ty Detmer and tight end Chris Smith own that distinction with 2,221 yards between 1988 and 1990.

BALANCED ATTACK

The Cougars have scored 20 touchdowns on the season. Of the 20 TD's, 12 have been scored via the passing game while seven have been scored on the ground. Running back Manase Tonga leads the team with five rushing touchdowns while sophomore receiver Austin Collie has a team-leading four touchdown receptions. Running back Harvey Unga is tied with Collie with a team-leading four total touchdowns, including two rushing TD's and two touchdown completions.

Austin Collie-WR

After returning from a mission in January, Collie has worked hard to return to pick up where he left off after the 2004 season as a Freshman All-American. Collie is a big, physical receiver who has the ability to rack up big yards after the catch. He has been slowed by an ankle injury and did not play the full game against Air Force after posting over 300 all-purpose yards against Tulsa. Collie returned to full action against New Mexico, recording four receptions for 98 yards and a touchdown. Collie hauled in a career-long 59-yard reception in the third quarter and raced to the endzone to give the Cougars' a 21-6 lead. Collie has 15 receptions for 241 yards and three touchdowns on the season. Collie recently became engaged to his father's college roommate's daughter, Brooke Pendleton. The couple plans to marry in January.

Dennis Pitta-TE

Pitta also returned from a church mission during the offseason. Pitta also logged significant playing time as a true freshman in 2004. Pitta led all tight ends in receptions with 17 grabs while scoring two touchdowns during his freshman campaign. Picking up where he left off, Pitta leads the Cougars with 20 receptions for 326 yards and two touchdowns.

Kelly Poppinga-LB

After a successful 2006 at outside linebacker, Poppinga moved to the middle to replace three-year starter and team captain Cameron Jensen. Last season, Poppinga played in all 13 games recording 36 tackles, two sacks, 3.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions. Thi sseason Poppinga ranks second on the roster with 28 tackles, including 16 solo takedowns. He has a team-leading 6.0 tackles for a combined loss of 12 yards, two pass break-ups and two hurries.

Michael Reed-WR

Another experienced outside receiver, Reed returns to the Cougars for his junior season after logging significant playing time as a freshman and sophomore. Reed had 25 catches for 339 yards and three touchdowns a year ago. An athletic receiver, Reed ranks third on the roster with 21 receptions for 263 yards and one touchdown. Reed was credited with a season-high 132 yards and one touchdown against Tulsa.

Harvey Unga-RB

After missing the majority of the 2006 season with an injury, redshirt freshman Harvey Unga entered the season expected to make a large and immediate contribution to the BYU offense. A large, yet deceptively quick runner, Unga made his presence known from the season-opener against Arizona. Unga racked up 194 all-purpose yards in the Cougars' 20-7 victory over the Wildcats. Unga picked up 67 yards rushing and 127 yards receiving. After picking up another 71 all-purpose yards against UCLA, Unga posted 135 all-purpose yards against Tulsa, including a game-high 100 yards rushing. Against Air Force, Unga tacked on another 160 all-purpose yards to his season total. Unga ran for 111 yards and was credited with 69 yards receiving. On the season he leads the roster with 306 yards rushing and two touchdowns and has 254 yards receiving and 2 touchdowns. Unga is averaging 76.5 yards rushing and 63.5 yards receiving on the season.

Max Hall-QB

Named the starter after spring practice, Hall is in his first of three years of eligibility. The Arizona State transfer sat out last season due to transfer rules. It was still a productive season for Hall as he had success quarterbacking the 2006 offensive scout team against a BYU defense that ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense. In just his first five starts, Hall is making his mark on the BYU Quarterback Factory. Only Ty Detmer has posted more passing yards through five starts in BYU football history. Hall has completed 113 of 181 attempts for 1,509 yards and 10 touchdowns. He racked up a career-high 537 yards passing and four touchdowns against Tulsa. Hall ranks among the nation's top passers with a 377.2 yards-per-game average. As a result of his performance at Tulsa, Hall holds the MWC all-time and sophomore single-game record for total offense with 548 yards, he tied the MWC sophomore single-game record with 34 completions against the Golden Hurricane, and set the all-time and sophomore single-game passing yardage record with 537 yards.

HOME WIN STREAK CONTINUES

The Cougars' 31-6 victory over Air Force extended BYU's home win streak to eight straight games. The Cougars will look to win their ninth straight home game for the first time since winning 10 straight from Oct. 26, 2000 to Sept. 6, 2002 when they play host to Eastern Washington on October 20.

UNDEFEATED AT HOME

BYU finished the 2006 season with a perfect 6-0 record at home. The last time BYU had a perfect record at home was 2001 when the Cougars went 6-0 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. Since the stadium was built in 1964, BYU has gone undefeated at home 13 times:

ON THE ROAD vs. RANKED OPPONENTS

The Cougars' 17-27 loss to No. 11 UCLA marked the first road game against a ranked opponent since BYU knocked off No. 15 TCU in Fort Worth last season, 31-17. The victory over the Horned Frogs gave BYU its first win over a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on September 20, 1997. BYU is now 1-13 in games against ranked opponents, dating back to the 1999 season.

MWC ROAD WARRIORS

The Cougars' victory at New Mexico marked the first road win of the season and extend the Cougars' conference road win streak to eight straight MWC road victories. The streak equals the most consecutive road wins in league play since the Cougars won eight straight league games from September 30, 1995 through September 27, 1997. The current streak started with a 27-24 win at New Mexico during the 2005 season.



OPENING-GAME SELLOUT

The Cougars saw a capacity crowd (64,045) for the season-opener against Arizona. The game marked the first home-opening sellout since the 2004 season when the Cougars opened in Provo against Notre Dame. Prior to the 2007 season-opener, BYU had had 10 opening-day sell-outs, dating back to 1982 -- the first year of the expanded stadium. The Arizona game also marked the first opening-day sell out during the Bronco Mendenhall era. It was also the first sell out since November 19, 2005 when the Cougars played host to Utah. Since 1985, the Cougars are 8-3 (.727) when playing in Provo for the home-opener in front of a sold-out stadium.

FOOL ME ONCE ...

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 6-2 in games following a loss during the regular season. Before the Tulsa loss (following the UCLA loss), the Cougars' only loss following a loss came on October 1, 2005 when BYU dropped a 31-10 decision at San Diego State following a 51-50 overtime loss against TCU. The Cougars improved to 6-2 during the Mendenhall era with a 31-6 victory over Air Force, which was following the Tulsa loss.

DOUBLE JEOPARDY

Saturday's game at UNLV marks the fifth time during the Bronco Mendenhall era that the Cougars have played back-to-back road games. Prior to the loss at Tulsa, BYU was a perfect 3-0 on the back end of two-straight road games. Currently BYU is 3-1 in the second of two straight road games during the Mendenhall era.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 19-4 when leading at halftime and 17-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter. The loss at Tulsa marked the first time since September 16, 2006 the Cougars lost a game after holding a halftime lead. BYU led 34-31 at halftime against the Golden Hurricane; however, TU outscored the Cougars held a 17-0 lead and added 14 more points in the second half to defeat the Falcons 31-6. At New Mexico, BYU held a 14-6 halftime lead, but entered the fourth quarter tied at 21. The Cougars outscored the Lobos 10-3 in the fourth quarter to claim the 31-24 road victory.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

The Cougars currently have the 8th longest streak in the nation of consecutive games without returning a kickoff for a touchdown. BYU has been unable to accomplish the feat in 108 straight games. Mike Rigell is the last Cougar to return a kickoff for a touchdown. Rigell turned in a 96-yard touchdown in a 31-9 victory at Hawaii on October 17, 1998.

COLLIE BREAKS SCHOOL, MWC RECORDS



Against Tulsa, sophomore receiver Austin Collie was credited with 366 all-purpose yards, including 245 combined return yards and 121 receiving yards, to break Pete Van Valkenburg's 35-year-old school record. Van Valkenburg racked up 306 all-purpose yards in a 33-14 win over Wyoming on November 4, 1972. Collie's total also eclipsed Larry Ned's Mountain West Conference single-game record of 319 yards in San Diego State's October 6, 2001 victory over Eastern Illinois. Additionally, Collie's mark set the new MWC sophomore record, clipping Aaron Brown's mark of 285 yards in TCU's victory over Colorado State on November 25, 2006. Collie, a 6-foot-2, 212-pound sophomore from El Dorado Hills, Calif., also set the Mountain West Confer-

ence single-game individual and sophomore kick return yardage records with 237 yards on eight returns. Previously, Colorado State's George Hill held both records with 218 yards against Minnesota on September 10, 2005. Collie came up just three yards short of breaking Golden Richards' 36-year-old record of 247 combined return yards. Richards had 219 punt return yards and 28 kick return yards against North Texas during the 1971 season. Collie had 237 kick return yards and 8 yards on punt returns. Collie scored his first touchdown of the season with 8:19 remaining in the third quarter of the Cougars loss at UCLA, cutting the Bruins' lead to 20-10. The touchdown marked Collie's first since the 2004 season. Collie did not play in 2005 or 2006, serving a Church mission in Argentina. Collie scored again with 6:04 left in the third quarter to cut the Bruins' lead to just 20-17. Collie, a freshman All-American in 2004, caught seven balls for a game-high 79 yards and two touchdowns.

Collie set a career-high with a 59-yard touchdown reception to give BYU a 21-6 lead over New Mexico. He finished the night with four receptions for a team-best 98 yards -- just two yards shy of his second 100-yard game of the season. Collie has had at least one reception in 15 of his 16 games at BYU.

YELLOW FEVER

Throughout the first five games of the season, the Cougars have been plagued with penalties. In the season-opener against Arizona, BYU had 7 penalties for only 56 yards. In Week 2, the Cougars were flagged 11 times for 84 yards. At Tulsa, BYU gave up a season-high 138 yards on 14 penalties. Things improved slightly for the Cougars against Air Force, giving up 65 yards on 8 penalties. In game five, BYU was flagged seven times for 56 yards -- the same numbers as the season-opener against Arizona. The Cougars rank 109th nationally with 38 penalties for 314 yards. BYU opponents have just 17 penalties for 134 yards. The Cougars rank 108th in the country with an average 74 penalty yards per game. In addition, BYU ranks 110th nationally, averaging 9.0 penalties per game.

SAME FACES, DIFFERENT PLACES

• UNLV offensive line coach Keith Uperesa was an all-WAC offensive tackle at BYU and was a graduate assistant with the Cougars after his playing days

• BYU junior DL Mosese Foketi is a former teammate of UNLV junior RB Frank Summers. In 2005 the two won a Golden Gate Conference championship with Laney Community College in Oakland, Calif.

• UNLV teammates and brothers Thor and Tolu Pili are Orem, Utah natives. They both graduated from Timpanogos High School. Their father, Falema'o Jr., lettered at BYU, while their uncle, Ifo, is a former Cougar who played for the New England Patriots and Philadelphia Eagles.

• Cougar sophomores Ian Dulan and R.J. Willing and freshman Kaneakua Friel all went to Kamehameha High School in Hawaii. So, did UNLV sophomore Kamu Kapanui. Dulan, and Kapanui graduated in 2005, while Friel graduated a year later in 2006. Willing graduated in 2002.

PUNTING NOTES

With 9:12 left in the first quarter, CJ Sanitago was credited with a career-long 75-yard punt. The play marked the longest punt since Matt Payne was credited with a 79-yard punt against top-ranked USC on September 11, 2004. The punt was five yards shy of Lee Johnson's 80-yard punt against Wyoming on October 8, 1983. Santiago finished the night with 10 punts for an average of 46.2 yards. Santiago is averaging 43.8 yards per punt and has six punts downed inside the 20-yardline.

WINNING TIME OF POSSESSION BATTLE

The Cougars rank third nationally in time of possession. BYU has owned the ball an average of 33:49 per game.

SCORING NOTES

The Cougars posted a season-high 47 points on Tulsa, marking the most points scored since beating Wyoming 55-7 on November 9, 2006. The game marked the most points BYU has scored in a losing effort since falling to TCU in overtime, 50-51, on September 24, 2005. It's also the most points scored during regulation in a losing effort since losing to Utah State, 56-58, on October 30, 1993. Interestingly, since that game in 1993, the Cougars are 31-2 in games when the team scores 45 (or more) points.

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UNGA NAMED MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK



Running back Harvey Unga (pronounced: OO-nguh) was 2007's inaugural Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week for after leading the Cougars to a 20-7 season-opening victory over Arizona. Unga, a redshirt freshman from Provo, Utah, racked up a game-high 194 all-purpose yards, including a game-best 67 yards rushing and 127 yards receiving. Unga was also credited with two touchdowns, including a 27-yard pass and run with 6:02 left in the first quarter that gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead, and an 11-yard run in

the fourth quarter that extended BYU's lead to 20-0. Prior to Arizona's final drive of the game, Unga had totaled more offensive yards than the entire Arizona offense combined. For the game, Unga averaged 4.5 yards per carry and averaged over 14 yards per reception. Unga's offensive total against the Wildcats marked the top performance by a freshman running back in the country.

KEHL NAMED MWC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK



Senior linebacker Bryan Kehl helped lead BYU to a 31-24 victory at New Mexico on Saturday, posting 10 tackles, a sack, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and an interception with a 36-yard return for a touchdown.

Kehl, a defensive co-captain, scooped up a deflected Donovan Porterie pass on the fourth play of the game and returned it 36 yards to

give the Cougars an early 7-0 lead with 13:06 left in the first quarter. The play marked Kehl's first career interception.

With just under 10 minutes left in the third quarter, Kehl stripped the ball from Porterie and recovered the fumble to give BYU a first-and-10 at the Cougars' own 41-yard line. Kehl was also credited with a sack and a tackle for a loss on the play. Three plays later, BYU quarterback Max Hall connected with Austin Collie for a 59-yard touchdown to give the Cougars a 21-6 lead with 9:23 left in the third quarter.

The 6-foot-3, 231-pound senior leads the BYU roster with 42 tackles on the season, including a team-best 25 solo tackles. He has recorded five tackles for loss, including two sacks on the season.

Kehl's performance helped the Cougars improve to 3-2 on the season and now sit alone atop the MWC standings with a 2-0 league record. BYU has won 10 straight league games, and extended its Mountain West Conference road win streak to eight straight games.

In two of the Cougars' four games this season, BYU has held its opponents scoreless in three of four quarters. The Cougars held Arizona scoreless through 59 minutes. The Wildcats scored with just under a minute remaining in the game. Against Air Force, the BYU defense pitched a shutout through the better part of three quarters. The Falcons scored with 3:31 left in the third quarter, but would not score again. Interestingly, Air Force is the only team in the Mountain West Conference the Cougars have never shut out for an entire game. Shaun Carney's eight-yard touchdown run in the third quarte ended the Cougars' chances of doing so Saturday last Saturday. BYU has had 11 shutouts since the 1984 season. Interestingly, three of those shutouts were against New Mexico. (1984, 1988, 1992). The Cougars have only been shut out twice in the past 401 games.



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THE TONGAN TWOSOME?



BYU's Tongan Trio, featuring running backs Manase Tonga, Fui Vakapuna and Harvey Unga, has been reduced to a twosome for at least a few weeks. Vakapuna broke his hand

Sept. 15 against Tulsa and is expected to miss the next three weeks following surgery. The junior is averaging 7.6 carries per game and 3.2 yards per carry. Tonga and Unga have combined for 500 rushing yards and 431 yards receiving through the first five games, averaging 186.2 all-purpose yards per game. The Tongan Twosome has accounted for 40 percent of the Cougars' total offense. Tonga and Unga have been credited with 86.8 percent of the team's total rushing yards and 24.4 percent of the team's receiving yardage.
