### BYU FACES SEATTLE PACIFIC THURSDAY IN FINAL EXHIBITION CONTEST

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 7, 2005) – The BYU men's basketball team plays its final exhibition game Thursday when the Cougars host Seattle Pacific University at 7 p.m. in the Marriott Center.

Thursday's game will be broadcast live on KSL Newsradio, which can be heard on 102.7 FM or 1160 AM. Greg Wrubell and Mark Durrant will call the game, which is also available online at KSL.com.

BYU is coming off an 81-54 victory over the University of Victoria on Friday. Freshman guard Lee Cummond led the Cougars with 23 points in his Cougar exhibition debut, making 10-of-16 shots while adding five rebounds, four assists and two steals in 27 minutes.

"We did some things well and found some things we need to work on in our game against Victoria," BYU coach Dave Rose said. "We hope to keep making progress Thursday when we face Seattle Pacific. Seattle Pacific is a much bigger and more physical team than Victoria. It's going to be a lot tougher for us against bigger, stronger guys. Our emphasis is going to be on getting on the offensive boards and getting second shots as well as being stronger on the defensive glass."

Seattle Pacific returns three starters from its 20-9 NCAA Tournament team a year ago. The Division II Falcons play BYU Thursday prior to a road contest at another Mountain West Conference school, New Mexico, on Saturday. Seattle Pacific made its preseason debut Nov. 1 by beating a collection of ex-collegians, Another Level Blue Angels, 102-79.

West Point, Utah, native Jared Moultrie is a 6-foot-2 guard at Seattle Pacific this season. The Clearfield High School graduate played at Salt Lake Community College before transferring to Seattle Pacific for his junior season.

After playing Seattle Pacific Thursday, the Cougars will prepare for their regular-season opener on Nov. 18 against Loyola Marymount in the Marriott Center.

**SEATTLE PACIFIC**

Seattle Pacific returns three starters from its 20-9 NCAA Tournament team a year ago. The Division II Falcons play BYU Thursday prior to a road contest at another Mountain West Conference school, New Mexico, on Saturday. Coach Jeff Hironaka is back for his fourth year after marching his team to the NCAA Division II tournament faster than any coach in program history. Hironaka hopes to build off that success this season with three returning starters providing a sound foundation. Point guard Tony Binetti (Sr., 6-1, Enumclaw, Wash.) averaged 13.4 points, 4.4 assists and hit 48 percent of his three-pointers. Dustin Bremerman (Jr., 6-4, Yakima, Wash./Eisenhower) has proven to be a versatile scoring threat, averaging nearly 13 points over his first two seasons. Chad Williams (Sr., 6-8, Burlington, Wash./Burlington-Whatcom CC), the squad's No. 2 rebounder (5.7), returns to the high post. The Falcons are without their top two scorers, plus a high-scoring nonstarter, from last year's team. Redshirt Robbie Will (So., 6-10, Seattle, Wash./O'Dea-Bellevue CC) takes over for two-time all-region center Jason Chivers. Will averaged 13.1 points, 6.0 rebounds and 1.6 blocked shots as freshman at BCC in '03-04. Among the candidates for the other starting spot are Drew Matzen (Jr., 6-4, Bothell, Wash./Lynnwood) and Brian Lynch (Jr., 6-1, Missoula, Mt./Great Falls), a transfer from Montana. Last year Seattle Pacific got 15 points per game from senior Jordan Lee while Ralph Steele was a steady contributor off the bench. The Falcons are a member of the Great Northwest Athletic Conference.

**LAST GAME**

Seattle Pacific made its preseason debut Nov. 1 by beating Another Level Blue Angels, a collection of ex-collegians, 102-79. Bremerman led the way with 21 points and Mike Bushmaker (Sr., 6-7, Yakima, Wash./Eisenhower) added 19 off the bench. In all, six players finished in double figures and, despite having only 12 practices, only 14 turnovers were committed. The Falcons shot just 8-28 outside the arc but their transition game helped elevate it to 47 percent overall.

**COACH JEFF HIRONAKA**

SPU coach Jeff Hironaka took Seattle-Pacific to the NCAA tournament in only his third year-faster than any predecessor. Entering his fourth year, his record is 50-33. A former aide at Idaho State and The Master's, Hironaka became Ken Bone's top assistant in 1991 and from there the Falcons won 236 of 253 games, claimed five conference championships and qualified for eight NCAA tournaments, including a Final Four in 2000. Hironaka is the second Japanese-American head coach of a four-year collegiate program.

This is the first meeting between BYU and Seattle Pacific. This is the Seattle Pacific's first trip to Utah since playing the University of Utah in 1990-91.

**NEWCOMERS SHOW PROMISE IN EXHIBITION WIN**

A trio of newcomers helped BYU open exhibition play Friday with an 81-54 victory over the University of Victoria at the Marriott Center in front of 8,407 fans. Freshman Lee Cummard led the way for the Cougars with 23 points in his debut, fueling a second-half surge that turned a tight first half into a blowout. With 19 of his game-high total coming in the second frame, Cummard paced BYU to outscore the Vikes by 23 points in the final 20 minutes while adding five rebounds, four assists and two steals. Trent Plaisted, a freshman who received a medical redshirt last season after playing in five games, showed his return to full health by posting 11 points and six rebounds as the starting center. Junior-college transfer Fernando Malaman made his presence felt early, scoring seven points in his first 2:20 of playing time while adding a rebound and a block. The 6-foot-7 junior from Limeria, Brazil, finished with 11 points on 5-of-6 shooting and had two blocks.

**COUGAR CRUISE IN SECOND HALF**

BYU used a 19-4 second-half run to build a 60-39 cushion and cruise to the 81-54 victory. After a 39.4 percent shooting performance in the first half, the Cougars warmed up to sink 60 percent of their shots from the floor in the second half. BYU's new-look offense started to click in the second half as the Cougars scored 16 points on the fast break. BYU held the Vikes 19 points below their season scoring average of 72.7 and won the rebounding battle 45-33.

**QUOTING COACH ROSE**

"In the second half our guys played with a lot more purpose. I really believe that the last 10 to 12 minutes came down to mental toughness. For the most part I was pleased with our effort."

"In the first half we were really impatient. A lot of guys were hunting out shots. Our effort was really good, but we've got some execution issues to deal with."

**OTHER NOTABLES**

- Freshman Lee Cummard didn't take long to get involved in the Cougar offense, compiling two assists in the first 1:40 of the contest. Cummard earned the first assist on the first possession when he dished to Trent Plaisted for the first points of the game. On BYU's second possession Cummard scored on a tip-in off of a Plaisted miss. That was only the beginning for the freshman as he finished with 23 points as the game's leading scorer.
- Fellow newcomer Fernando Malaman made his presence felt in the Cougar lineup, scoring seven points in 2:20 of first-half play while adding a blocked shot on defense. Malaman finished with 11 points.
- Junior Jimmy Balderson was one of four Cougars in double figures with 10 points, including 2-of-3 from beyond the arc.
- Junior Keena Young led the Cougars with three steals.
- Four players led BYU with six rebounds each. Junior guards Austin Ainge and Jimmy Balderson shared honor with the redshirt freshmen post players Trent Plaisted and David Burgess. Burgess led BYU with 11 rebounds at Cougar Tipoff.
- Senior Brock Reichner dished out a team-best five assists while adding eight points.

**INJURY ISSUES**

Two players were held out of Friday night's action against the Victoria. Mike Rose did not play due to a laceration to his lip he suffered on Wednesday, Nov. 2. Rashaun Broadus did not play due to an ankle sprain sustained on Oct. 28 during practice. Both players are expected to be ready to play by BYU's regular-season opener on Nov. 18 and will be evaluated this week to see if they will play Thursday vs. Seattle Pacific.

**SAM BURGESS TO REDSHIRT**

Junior guard Sam Burgess will redshirt the upcoming season. The 6-foot-3 guard from Alpine, Utah, is one of nine juniors on the roster this year. Junior Vuk Ivanovic will also redshirt while he sits out the season due to NCAA transfer rules. Burgess scored a game-high 21 points at Cougar Tipoff, the team's annual blue-white scrimmage. He went 7-for-12 from the floor, including 4-for-6 on threes, and was 3-of-4 from the line while adding five rebounds, one assist and one steal in 33 minutes on the floor.

"As a coach there are guys you love to coach and Sam is that kind of player," Rose explained. "He has a competitive spirit, is a good athlete and plays to win. He also has the mental toughness to use this year the best. He will work hard and improve and still help our team this season (in practice). He is plenty good enough to play this year but with so many players in this class, we needed to address that situation. As a staff, we feel this will help our team in the long run and also be good for Sam. We want to invest in Sam and commit to him another year. In that third year, he's going to be a player who will really help us."

- BYU has had four 20-win seasons, second among MWC schools behind Utah's five. UNLV has had three, Wyoming three, New Mexico two, San Diego State and Air Force one and Colorado State none.
- BYU has had the league's top RPI three times, been second once and third once (this year was seventh).
- BYU has played the toughest schedule on average of any team in the MWC (average strength of schedule rating the past six years is 53rd, Utah is next at 67th.) BYU has had the league's toughest schedule the past two seasons.
- BYU has the second-most overall wins in the six years of the MWC (117, Utah leads at 140).
- BYU is tied for second with Wyoming in conference wins (48, Utah has 63).
- BYU has the second-most MWC regular-season titles (two) along with Wyoming (Utah leads with four).
- BYU is one of six MWC teams to win the MWC Tournament title.

Dave Rose was named to succeed Steve Cleveland as BYU Men's Basketball Head Coach on April 11, 2005.

Rose, who has served the past eight seasons as Cleveland's lead assistant, was promoted to BYU's head job two days after Cleveland announced his resignation to take the head-coaching position at Fresno State. A tireless worker, gifted motivator and strong strategist, Rose served as associate head coach the past five seasons and takes over the BYU program with 22 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons as a head coach at the junior college and high school levels.

Since coming to Provo in 1997 along with Steve Cleveland, Rose has played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play five of the past six seasons, including three NCAA bids, while claiming two MWC titles. As associate head coach, Rose fulfilled a variety of responsibilities under coach Cleveland and his efforts earned notice, such as being named the top assistant in the Mountain West Conference by Street & Smith in the 2004-05 College Basketball Preview,

Rose was the team's defensive coordinator and worked with the post players. He possesses a complete knowledge of the game and worked hard in developing the team's defensive game plans. An outstanding teacher, he coached defensive skill development and implemented the defensive game plan. With Rose overseeing the defense, BYU has been the top defensive team in the Mountain West Conference two of the past four seasons.

A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose has managed BYU's recruiting efforts the past eight seasons. Rose's success as a recruiter is evidenced by his being named one of the top 25 college basketball recruiters in 2004 by Rivals.com. Each year the Cougars have brought in talented newcomers to contribute to and take advantage of the BYU program. The 2004 class was rated No. 17 nationally and No. 3 in the West by Rivals.com. The 2000 recruiting class also ranked in the top-20 nationally.

Proving that Rose has excelled in recruiting and developing players, eight recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major conference award in their first season as a Cougar in the eight years Rose has been in Provo. Including Rafael Araujo being named the league's top newcomer by the MWC media members in 2003 (the MWC discontinued the newcomer award that year), five BYU players have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. Most recently, Mike Hall was named the 2004 MWC Defensive Player of the Year. Below is the list of player honors earned the last eight seasons by Cougar recruits in their first seasons in Provo.

Rose has also worked closely with scheduling. BYU has played many of the nation's top teams over the past several years, thanks in part to relationships Rose has developed with programs across the country. His efforts have helped the Cougars receive invitations to tournaments like the 2004 EA SPORTS Maui Invitational, where BYU faced eventual NCAA Champion North Carolina.

Prior to coming to BYU, Rose was head coach at Dixie College in St. George, Utah. Rose compiled a 167-57 record in seven seasons as head coach at Dixie. Rose guided six of his seven teams to national top-20 rankings, including a ranking as high as No. 2, while earning three conference titles. His peers honored him as the 1993 Scenic West Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. While at Dixie, Rose coached three NJCAA All-Americans as well as longtime NBA player Keon Clark. At BYU he recruited and coached two future NBA Draft picks in Rafael Araujo and Travis Hansen.

Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie. He was the head basketball coach at Millard for three years from 1983-86.

Rose becomes the 17th person to guide the Cougar basketball program since its first season in 1903. He follows the coaching pedigree of Basketball Hall of Fame coach Stan Watts, who is BYU's all-time leader in coaching victories with a 372-254 record from 1949-1972 and also coached at Millard High School and Dixie State College before coming to BYU.

### PLAYING CAREER:

Rose was a two-sport athlete at Dixie College before transferring to Houston, where he was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished second in the NCAA tournament. At Houston, Rose played in 1980-81, redshirted in 1981-82, and played his final year in 1982-83.

At Dixie, Rose was first team all-league in both basketball and baseball. Rose was also the Region 18 batting champion hitting .421 as a center fielder. While playing basketball for Houston's Northbrook High School, he led the District 16AAAAA in scoring, was selected first team all district and All-Greater Houston, and was named team MVP.

### PERSONAL:

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose, 47, is married to the former Cheryl Lang and they have three children and one granddaughter. Daughter Chanell played forward on the BYU women's basketball team from 2000-2003 and is married to Brock Reichner, who is a guard on the BYU team. Rose's wife Cheryl is actively involved in helping families who have children with cancer as vice chairperson of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation. Rose follows Cleveland as the second returned missionary to serve as BYU men's basketball head coach. Rose served a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79 between his two years as a player at Dixie College. His son Garrett returns in August 2005 from his two-year mission in Little Rock, Ark.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE

Dave Rose was one of the first coaches in Utah to become involved with Coaches vs. Cancer while at Dixie State College. He helps the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation and has been a volunteer coach for youth groups. He served on the Academic Excellence Committee at Dixie. Dave and his wife Cheryl were Chamber of Commerce Citizens of the Year in St. George. Cheryl is extremely committed to serving in the community. She received the Beacon of Hope Award in 2005. After Dave got her involved, she now serves as the Vice Chairperson for the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation. She served on the Utah State Substance Abuse Committee of Higher Education and was on the Washington County Substance Abuse Prevention Team. She spoke across the region about substance abuse while fulfilling an appointment by the U.S. Department of Education as the Regional Coordinator for the Network of Colleges and Universities Committee to the Elimination of Drug and Alcohol Abuse on Campus, serving Utah, Arizona and Nevada. Cheryl has also served on the Women's Conference Board, including a stint as Charwomen in 1995. Other involvements have included the Washington County Fair Queen Pageant Committee and being the longtime chairwomen for the Miss Santa Clara Pageant.
