No. 9 California couldn't hang on to a 1-0 halftime lead, as the Golden Bears lost to No. 4 Santa Clara, 2-1, in double overtime Sunday afternoon. Cal fell to 6-1-1 with its first setback of 2005.

Senior forward Liz Eisenberg gave the Bears a 1-0 lead with her sixth goal of the season in the fourth minute. Santa Clara defender Micaela Esquival tied the game at 1-1 in the 67th minute on a 22-yard shot from the left side of the field.

SCU reserve forward Tina Estrada started the final 10-minute overtime period on the bench but re-entered the game with 5:35 on the clock. About three and a half minutes later, Estrada received a pass from Jordan Angeli and freed herself by dribbling around several Cal defenders. Estrada's 15-yard shot found the back of the net for the game winner.

Statistical Leaders: Liz Eisenberg leads the Golden Bears' offensive attack, scoring six goals and posting one assist for 13 points. Right on her tail is Lindsay Clute who has found the back of the net five times in eight games. Tallying three goals and three assists, Dania Cabello has added nine points to California's offense. Ashley Sulprizio has saved the ball 19 times in 660 minutes of action.

Eastern Washington University tied Boise State 1-1, on Sunday, during the last game of the Third Annual Soccer Etc. Nike Classic in Boise.

Eastern scored first in the ninth minute of play with an unassisted goal from 15 yards out by sophomore forward Cyeeta Mott. A little over four minutes later, the Broncos scored with a free kick by Nicole Coleman from 19 yards out.

Mott earned a spot on the All-Classic Team, accumulating four shots along with her second goal of the season. Goalkeeper Tiera Como captured eight saves which now ranks second in all-time career saves at EWU with 204. The win snapped a four-game losing streak.

Statistical Leaders: Cyeeta Mott fronts the Eagle's offense, scoring two goals for four points. Beth Russell and Kelsey Tufnail have each posted one assist. Goalkeeper Tiera Como has amassed 57 saves during her 730 minutes in the net.

Week in Review:

Overtime Goal Seals Victory over No. 14 Wisconsin

The BYU women's soccer team beat No. 14 Wisconsin 2-1, on Friday, the second game in a row in which the Cougars defeated a Top-25 team, beating No. 22 Texas on Monday. The game required two overtimes with BYU netting the game-winning goal in the second extra period.

The game was a fierce battle between two competitive and talented teams. BYU got on the board first with a goal by Jessica Aquino in the 34th minute. The score remained 1-0 for most of the game, until Kara Kabellis put the ball in the net for the Badgers near the end of the second half. Although both teams had looks, neither team was able to connect for most of the first two overtimes.

With only minutes left in the second overtime, Jaime Rendich Beck and a Badger defender were both sprinting up field, each trying to recover a loose ball. It was a oneon-one race that Rendich Beck won, putting in the golden goal.

The win put BYU at 7-0, already matching last season's win total and off to its best start since 1997 when the Cougars started off 11-0.

BYU Remains Perfect with Win over Colgate

The BYU women's soccer team won its eighth game in a row on Saturday, defeating Colgate 2-0. BYU was named champions of the Big Toe Invitational by defeating the Patriots, as well as No. 14 Wisconsin.

The game was scoreless until Brooke Bowman added a spark for the Cougars in the 29th minute when Jaime Rendich Beck saw Bowman open, crossing the ball from the right side of the field. Bowman found it and headed the ball into the top left corner of the net for her first goal of the season.

Annie Zwahlen scored the second goal of the game, also off an assist from Rendich Beck, in the 78th minute. The goal marked her first of the season.

BYU dominated the Patriots, recording 18 shots and 9 shots on goal to Colgate's two.

Rendich Beck, Harmon Named MWC Players of the Week

Senior forward Jaime Rendich Beck and BYU freshman defender Jessica Harmon have been named Mountain West Conference Women's Soccer Offensive and Defensive Players of the Week, respectively.

Rendich Beck, from Canyon County, Calif., tallied two goals and two assists to lift the Cougars to a 3-0 mark for the week, including victories over two ranked opponents. She scored the game's only goal in a win vs. No. 22 Texas and knocked home the deciding goal in the second overtime to defeat No. 14 Wisconsin, 2-1, on the road. Rendich Beck also assisted on both goals in a 2-0 win vs. Colgate.

Harmon, a Provo, Utah, native, led a Cougar defense that allowed only one goal last week (at No. 14 Wisconsin), also only the second goal allowed this season. She assisted on Rendich Beck's gamewinning goal vs. the Badgers.

Record Breaking Attendance

The Cougar fans have shown undaunted support for the women's soccer team, as over 2,000 fans have attended each home game this year. An enormous crowd of 3,322 fans, the largest crowd in Cougar history was on hand to help BYU on its way to victory over No. 22 Texas on Sept. 12. Over the past four home games BYU has averaged an attendance of almost 2,600 fans.

South Stadium

South Stadium is the place the Cougars love to call home, a home all opponents hate to visit.

For the past ten years, South Stadium (formerly South Field), has been the battlefield for the Cougars as the team has taken on, and defeated, the top teams in their conference and in the NCAA.

The Cougars have amassed an 86-19-4 (.807) record at home, which is among the best in the nation over the same time period. Of those 86 home wins, an outstanding 47 have ended in a shutout.

BYU consistently manages to hold its opponents scoreless when playing at South Stadium with 43 percent of all the Cougars' wins ending in shutout victories, while BYU has been shutout only nine times in the stadium's history.

Aside from the Cougars' history of defeating tough teams at home, another factor making South Stadium a formidable place for opponents is the large and loud crowd of fans that pack the stadium at every game.

Consistently among the top 15 in the NCAA, South Stadium packs in some of the largest crowds in the country. With an average attendance of 1,191 fans during the 2004 campaign, the Cougars rank among the highest every year for largest attendance average in the country. BYU also packed in a total of 13,106 fans over 11 games, recording the second highest mark in the MWC and making South Stadium one of the toughest places for opponents to play in women's college soccer today.

Located just south of the Smith Fieldhouse, South Stadium boasts one of the best-maintained grass playing surfaces in the NCAA. The Wasatch Mountains serve as a scenic backdrop for the capacity crowd of 3,000 fans. South Stadium is also equipped with state-of-the-art field lights, making night games a favorite among fans.

Utah, which received seven first-place votes and collected a total of 49 points, was selected to win the regular-season championship. BYU picked up the final first-place vote.

BYU welcomes ten of 11 starters back, including First Team All-MWC selections Jaime Rendich Beck and Claire Thomas. The 2005 MWC Women's Soccer Championship takes place on the campus of UNLV, Nov. 2-5.

The Rockwood File

After completing her tenth season, head coach Jennifer Rockwood has taken the BYU women's soc cer team to national prominence and established herself as one of the premier coaches in Division I soccer today.

Rockwood currently ranks tenth in winning percentage among active NCAA coaches with an impressive 165-56-10 overall record for her career. Over the last ten seasons, Rockwood accumulated a .736 winning percentage.

In the past ten years, Rockwood has guided the Cougars to five conference championships. On the national scene, her teams have made seven appearances in the NCAA Tournament in the last eight years and reached the "Sweet Sixteen" in 1998, 2000 and 2003. The Cougars regularly maintain a consistent top-25 ranking. During Rockwood's tenure, the team finished in the top-10 three times, including a recent run in the 2003 NCAA College Cup. The tournament ended with BYU finishing No. 5 in the country after making their first "Elite Eight" appearance in the program's history.

Among the many achievements and awards she has received over her career, Rockwood has been honored with two Coach of the Year citations, one by the Western Athletic Conference in 1996, and again by the MWC in 2000. She also became the first MWC coach to eclipse the 100-win total mark when the Cougars shutout Milwaukee-Wisconsin 2-0 on Sept. 23, 2000.

Under Rockwood's tutelage, a long list of All-American soccer players has emerged from BYU's program. These athletes include Aleisha Rose, Jeni Viernes and Michelle Jensen. Among the players who have been coached by Rockwood are four additional All-American athletes that were drafted by the women's United Soccer Association: Shauna Rohbock, Maren Hendershot, Sara Reading and Staci Reynolds.

Prior to becoming the head coach, Rockwood led BYU's highly successful club soccer team for seven years. In that time she amassed an overall record of 128-25-9, and the final two years she took her teams to the Western National Collegiate Club soccer Association (NCCSA) title and placed second in the NCCSA National Championships.

The Lake Oswego, Ore. native was a four-sport athlete in high school playing soccer, softball, basketball and track. After one year at Rick's College on a basketball scholarship, she transferred to BYU where she became a four-year starter at center midfield on the Cougars' club soccer team and graduated in finance, business management.

Rockwood has also coached the Utah ODP, youth club programs, and the high school level.

Rockwood Among Coaching Elite

Rockwood currently ranks 10th in winning percentage among active NCAA Division I coaches with an impressive 165-56-10 (.735) overall record after the 2004 season. Anson Dorrance, Becky Burleigh, Jerry Smith, Chris Petrucelli, Len Tsantiris, John Walker, Randy Waldrum, G. Guerrieri and Patrick Farmer are the only coaches ahead of her.
