HEADING TO THE SUPERDOME

Playing in its second NFL stadium in as many weeks, No. 9 BYU travels to New Orleans to face Tulane in the Superdome on Sept. 12. After an upset win over No. 3 Oklahoma last week, possibly one of the program's biggest wins in over 15 years, the Cougars are 1-0 heading into this game with the Green Wave.

Tulane enters Saturday's game 0-1, after suffering a 37-13 loss in its season opener against Tulsa on Friday, Sept. 4.

ON THE TUBE



Saturday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on ESPN2. Terry Gannon will provide play-by-play coverage, with David Norrie giving analysis. The game will mark the second of 12 BYU games available nationally during the 2009 season. Last week's game against No. 3 Oklahoma was shown on ESPN.

AGAINST CONFERENCE USA



The Cougars have a 38-13-1 overall record against current Conference USA opponents. BYU has faced seven of the 12 teams in the conference, including Marshall, Southern Mississippi, Rice, SMU, Tulane, Tulsa and UTEP. The Cougars have a winning record against Tulsa (6-1) and UTEP (28-7-1).

The last C-USA vs. BYU matchup was on Sept. 15, 2007 when the Cougars were defeated, 55-47, at Tulsa.

The Cougars' first game against a current C-USA opponent was on Nov. 22, 1946 when they handed UTEP a 14-13 loss.

WHAT THE GAME MEANS



- With a win on Saturday the Cougars would start the season with a 2-0 record for the second straight year. In 2008 BYU opened with wins against Northern Iowa and Washington.

- A win at the Superdome would not only mean a 2-0 start to the season, but also a 2-0 start on back-to-back road games. The last time the Cougars

started the season with two road wins was back in 1994 when they claimed victories at Hawaii and Air Force.

THE BYU-TULANE SERIES

The series between the Cougars and Green Wave is tied 1-1 after a Tulane win at the 1998 Liberty Bowl (41-27) and a BYU win on Aug. 25, 2001 (70-35).

LAST TIME: BYU 70, TULANE 35 (AUG. 25, 2001)

In a shootout normally reserved only for the Wild West, BYU defeated Tulane 70-35. The 70 points was the most for the Cougars since the 70-31 victory against Utah in 1989. The record-setting game started off with a bang, before some of the 49,008 fans had the chance to sit down. Tulane jumped on top just over a minute into the game with a 75-yard touchdown run from Mewelde Moore. The teams proceeded to trade touchdowns for the rest of the quarter, ending the first quarter tied at 21.

BYU opened up the second quarter scoring just four seconds into the period with an eight-yard pass to tight end Spencer Nead. The Cougars, armed with a 28-21 lead, never looked back. BYU scored 21 more points in the quarter, taking a 49-28 lead into the half. The 49 points tied a LaVell Edwards Stadium record for the most points in a half, set in the first half of the 1989 Utah game. The offensive output slowed down in the second half, but with 14 more points in the third quarter, BYU took a 63-35 lead into the final quarter.

Brandon Doman left the game after three quarters, finishing 25-31 for 286 yards, with three touchdowns. He also ran for 115 yards and one touchdown, earning him BCA Classic MVP honors. Both Luke Staley and Brian McDonald scored three rushing touchdowns for the Cougars. Spencer Nead, a transfer from Ricks College, caught two touchdown passes in the second quarter. Ten different receivers caught passes for a total of 297 yards, and eight different Cougars combined for 437 yards, short of BYU's all-time record of 465 yards. The 734 total yards fell only 43 yards short of the BYU record.

TULANE'S LAST OUTING

NEW ORLEANS (Sept. 4, 2009) -- Sophomore quarterback Joe Kemp threw for a career-high 278 yards and a touchdown in his first collegiate start and junior wideout Casey Robottom snared a personal-best six passes, but it was not enough as the Tulane University football team dropped its season opener to Conference USA foe Tulsa, 37-13, Friday evening at the Louisiana Superdome.

The Golden Hurricane stormed out to a 17-0 lead over the first nine minutes of play and withstood the Green Wave offense's best efforts to cruise to the 24-point victory. With the loss, Tulane (0-1, 0-1 C-USA) dropped its fifth straight game to Tulsa (1-0, 1-0 C-USA) dating back to 2005 when the Hurricane joined C-USA.

BYU'S LAST OUTING



ARLINGTON, Texas (Sept. 5, 2009) -- Led by a strong defensive effort and quarterback Max Hall's 329 yards passing, No. 20 BYU defeated No. 3 Oklahoma 14-13 Saturday in the first college game played in the new Dallas Cowboys Stadium in Arlington, Texas.

A sellout crowd of 75,437 filled Cowboys Stadium and enjoyed not only the spectacle of the massive state-of-the-art stadium but also the excitement of two top-20 programs battling to the final minute on college football's opening weekend. In the end, a strong overall team effort helped BYU come out on top as the Cougars earned their first victory over a top-3 ranked team since defeating No. 1 Miami on Sept. 8, 1990.

Hall completed 26-of-38 passes to total his 329 yards through the air while connecting on touchdowns to tight end Andrew George and wide receiver McKay Jacobson. A local product from Southlake, Texas, Jacobson had more than 100 family and friends watch him catch the final touchdown in the back of the end zone with just 3:03 remaining. The BYU defense stepped up as they had many times during the game to hold off the Sooners and force a failed 54-yard field goal attempt with 1:23 left on the clock.

2009 BROADCAST PLANS

All 12 of BYU's games this season will be broadcasted to a national audience on ESPN, ESPN2, The Mtn., VERSUS and CBS College Sports Network. The season opener against Oklahoma will be shown on ESPN. ESPN2 will cover the Tulane game the following week. The Cougars will have seven games televised on The Mtn., including a simulcast of the season ender against the University of Utah with CBS-C. Direct TV launched The Mtn. nationally on Aug. 27, 2008, giving fans from across the country ultimate access to Mountain West Conference sports. VERSUS will carry the Florida State and TCU games, and CBS-C will televise the Air Force and Utah games.

NATIONAL RANKINGS

One of three Mountain West Conference schools ranked among the nation's top-25 teams, BYU entered the season nationally ranked in both major college football polls for the second consecutive year. The Cougars were ranked No. 20 in The Associated Press Top 25 after receiving a No. 24 preseason ranking in the USA Today Coaches Poll earlier in August.

Last year, BYU ranked No. 16 in the preseason AP poll and No. 17 in the preseason Coaches' poll after going unranked in the preseason polls since 1997. The Cougars finished 2008 with a 10-3 record and a No. 21 national ranking in the Coaches' poll and No. 25 ranking by AP. BYU has been ranked in both the Coaches' poll and AP Top 25 each week dating back to Nov. 18, 2007, following a 35-10 win over Wyoming.

COMPETING AS A RANKED TEAM

With the win against Oklahoma, the Cougars are 149-44 when nationally ranked in the Top 25. A ranked BYU team has won 18 of its last 21 games, dating back to 2006.

The Cougars' No. 9 national ranking in the AP Top 25 Rankings is their highest since earning the same ranking on Oct. 12, 2008 after defeating New Mexico. That same week BYU was ranked No. 8 in the USA Today Coaches' Poll.

COIN TOSS

BYU won the toss before the start of the OU game, elected to defer and eventually went on to win the game. Last season the Cougars won the toss seven times, going 5-2 in those games.

SEASON OPENERS

Last week's win over Oklahoma marked the third consecutive season BYU has opened with a win. The Cougars defeated Arizona, 20-7, at LaVell Edwards Stadium in 2007 and Northern Iowa also at home, 41-17, in 2008. Since 1922, the Cougars have posted a 49-35-2 record in season-opening games. The last time BYU opened the season with a road win was back in 1994 when it defeated Hawaii, 13-12, in Honolulu.

OTHER NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS



FLORIDA STATE - Meeting for only the third time, Florida State will visit Provo on Sept. 19. The Seminoles, who are led by head coach Bobby Bowden, are coming off a 9-4 record and No. 21 final ranking in 2008. The team has been picked by the media to win its ACC division this year.



UTAH STATE - BYU's final non-conference game will be against in-state rival Utah State on Oct. 2. The Cougars hold a 42-33-3 lead in the series, which dates back to 1922. BYU's 38-0 win against the Aggies in 2006 marked the Cougars first shutout win since 1999.

TEAM NOTES

AGAINST THE BIG 12

With the Oklahoma victory the Cougars now have a 15-22 overall record against Big 12 opponents. BYU has faced every team in the conference except Nebraska, and has a winning record against Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Texas A&M.

The last Big 12 vs. BYU matchup was on Jan. 1, 1997 when the Cougars defeated Kansas State, 19-15, at the Cotton Bowl.

The Cougars' first game against a current Big 12 opponent was the University of Colorado, which handed BYU a 41-0 loss on Oct. 20, 1923.

ENDING AN 18-YEAR DROUGHT

Before securing a 14-13 win over No. 3 Oklahoma on Sept. 5, the last time BYU beat a nonconference team ranked in the Top 10 was its 28-21 win over No. 1 Miami on Sept. 8, 1990. The win over the Sooners gave the Cougars their first win over a ranked nonconference opponent since it defeated No. 14 Arizona State, 26-6, on Sept. 12, 1998. Since that day, BYU lost 12 consecutive games to ranked nonconference opponents. The last time BYU beat a ranked nonconference opponent on a neutral field was the Cotton Bowl game of Jan. 1, 1997, when BYU beat No. 14 Kansas State, 19-15.

PULLING OUT THE CLOSE ONES

After a close 14-13 victory over the Sooners last week, the Cougars have won nine consecutive games decided by seven points or fewer. Last season BYU pulled out nail-biters against Washington, UNLV and Colorado State.

MENDENHALL TEAMS DEFEATING RANKED FOES

Under Bronco Mendenhall, BYU is now 2-6 vs. ranked foes, with its wins a 31-17 victory over No. 15 TCU on Sept. 28, 2006 and a 14-13 win over No. 3 Oklahoma on Sept. 5, 2009.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 33-4 when leading at halftime and 32-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

NIGHT GAMES

The Oklahoma game marked the first of five night games for the Cougars, with later starts (after 5 p.m.) also against Florida State, Utah State, UNLV and TCU.

FIRST CAREER STARTS

The Oklahoma game marked the first career starts for several Cougars, including, linebacker Jordan Pendleton, defensive back Brian Logan and offensive linemen Braden Hansen, Terence Brown and Nick Alletto.

RACKING UP THE WEEKLY AWARDS

Based on their performances, Cougars are beginning to accumulate weekly awards on both the Mountain West Conference and national levels.

TEAM CAPTAINS

Offensive seniors Max Hall and Dennis Pitta, along with defensive seniors Matt Bauman, Scott Johnson and Jan Jorgensen, have been selected by their teammates to serve as captains for the 2009 football season.

Collectively the captains have 103 starts, with Hall, Bauman and Jorgensen starting each game last season.

Hall ended the 2008 season ranked No. 6 in the nation in passing yards per game (304.38). Pitta, an All-American tight end, was a unanimous first-team All-MWC selection and John Mackey Award semifinalist last season.

At linebacker, Bauman was credited with a team-high 108 tackles on the 2008 season, including a career-best 50 solo tackles. Johnson has moved over to safety from corner, where he recovered a fumble and returned it for a 64-yard touchdown against Wyoming. After picking up five sacks last year, Jorgensen is now the MWC's all-time career sack leader with 22.5.

Their accomplishments extend off the field as well, with Pitta, Bauman, Johnson and Jorgensen earning Academic All-MWC honors last year. Both Bauman and Johnson were named to the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District team, with Bauman going on to earn Academic All-America honors.

FLAG BEARER



BYU has a tradition of selecting a player before each game to run the team flag onto the field. In 2008, the team implemented a new tradition—an alumni flag. The team selects a former Cougar to carry out the alumni flag, along with the chosen current player who runs out with the current team flag. Both flags are white with a blue "Y" logo. The team flag has been signed by each member of the team, while the alumni flag has been signed by former BYU players. Their signatures reflect their commitment to uphold the tradition, spirit and honor of the BYU football program and to be a flag bearer of the University. As part of the 25-year anniversary celebration of BYU's national championship, each alumni chosen to carry out the flag this year will be a member of the 1984 team.

CURRENTLY SERVING MISSIONS...

There are 45 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 18 different countries, including Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Ghana, Japan, Korea, Madagascar, Marshall Islands, Mexico, New Zealand, Panama, Phillipines, Puerto Rico, Russia, South Africa and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents and speak a total of eight different foreign languages, including Filipino, Japanese, Korean, Malagasy, Marshallese, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish.

SERVED MISSIONS...

The September issue of ESPN the Magazine featured a story on sophomore defensive lineman, Romney Fuga, one of the 60 players on the team roster who has served a church mission (57-percent). Fuga recently returned home from a mission to Madagascar.

Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 23 different countries around the world, including Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, England, Germany, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Madagascar, Mozambique, New Zealand, Phillipines, Puerto Rico, Samoa, Spain, Taiwan, United States and Uruguay. Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 15 different states, including California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, New Mexico, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Texas. Current members of the BYU football team who have previously served church missions speak a total of nine different foreign languages, including Filipino, German, Italian, Japanese, Malagasy, Mandarin, Portuguese, Samoan and Spanish.

WHAT IS A MISSION, YOU ASK?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. "Mormon" missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities. More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world. Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language. Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea. A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize. Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services. Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.

HOME WIN STREAK CONTINUES

With BYU's 41-12 win over SDSU on Nov. 8, 2008, the Cougars have not lost in Edwards Stadium since a 41-34 overtime thriller to Utah on Nov. 19, 2005. BYU has won 18 straight home games, dating back to Sept. 9, 2006—setting a new BYU record. Over that span, the Cougars have beaten their opponents by an average of 27.8 points per game and have allowed just 11.3 points per game. The Cougars won 17 consecutive home games 16 seasons ago from Oct. 7, 1989 to Nov. 23, 1991. Since the stadium was built in 1964, BYU has gone undefeated at home 15 times:

"FAN" TASTIC FANS

The 64,107 fans in attendance for the Cougars' 41-12 win over SDSU on Nov. 8, 2008 marked the 12th consecutive sell-out at Edwards Stadium. The current streak marks the longest streak of consecutive sellouts since the 1990-92 seasons. Over 380,000 (384,613) fans have attended the Cougars' six home games at Edwards Stadium this season, averaging 64,102 fans per game. The last time the stadium was not sold out was against New Mexico on Nov. 18, 2006 when 63,814 fans were in attendance—231 short of a sellout.

TALE OF THE TAPE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 317.4 pounds and average 6-feet-4. The front five will be going up against a Tulane defensive front that measures an average 6-feet-3, 265 pounds. Defensively, the Cougars' front three average 6-feet-3, 261.7 pounds, while the Tulane offensive line tips the scales at an average 6-feet-5, 297 pounds per man.

CONSECUTIVE CATCHES

All-American tight end Dennis Pitta caught his first pass of the Oklahoma game with 3:51 remaining in the first half. He has now caught a pass in 31 consecutive games dating back to Oct. 23, 2004 (at Air Force), prior to his mission. Pitta finished with a game-high 90 yards and seven catches.

KARIYA CONTRIBUTES

In only his second career start, sophomore running back Bryan Kariya totaled 76 yards receiving on four catches and 42 yards rushing to lead the team. His receptions included a 49-yarder to set up the Cougars' first score of the game.

PAPER OR PLASTIC?

Senior linebacker Terrance Hook's sack against Oklahoma's Landry Jones marked the first of the season for BYU. Junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen's sack against CSU's Billy Farris in 2008 gave him 21.5 career sacks, breaking the previous MWC record of 20.5 he shared with New Mexico's Michael Tuohy, TCU's Chase Ortiz and former Cougar Brady Poppinga. Jorgensen added a second sack and forced a fumble with just 22 seconds remaining to help secure the win and bring his career sack total to 22.5. HEAD COACH BRONCO MENDENHALL



BRONCO MENDENHALL FIFTH SEASON

During his four seasons as the head coach at Brigham Young, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001, Mendenhall has guided his teams to four straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and consistent national top-25 rankings.

After a 6-6 season in 2005, Mendenhall's Cougars have earned a 32-7 record over the past three seasons, including two Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl victories in 2006 and 2007. Only five teams in the last three years have won more games than BYU. Boasting a 38-13 overall record, Mendenhall has coached his team to 20 wins in the last 23 games to help the Cougars become one of only nine teams to be ranked in the final BCS standings in each of the last three seasons.

In his first season, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl -- the team's first postseason bowl appearance in three seasons. Over the next two seasons, he coached the Cougars to back-to-back 11-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents.

In 2008, BYU posted a 10-2 regular season to achieve three straight 10-win seasons for only the third time in school history. In doing so, Mendenhall's teams became the first in Cougar history to go unbeaten at home over three consecutive seasons. While defending its home turf in 2008, BYU produced many memorable moments, including a 59-0 win over 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl opponent UCLA.

The Cougars have received four straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first four teams to a bowl game. In fact, with BYUs invitation to attend the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU football history to take a team to a bowl game in three straight seasons during his first three years as a head coach.

On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach in 2005, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted an 11-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC. In dominating fashion, and with a swagger similar to that of the glory years of BYU football, the Cougars handed Oregon a 38-8 defeat in the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The 2007 season started out in similar fashion, winning just one of the team's first three games; however, under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars rebounded to win the final 10 games of the season, and like the previous year, garnered the attention of local, regional and national voters. BYU finished the season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings--three places higher than the 2006 Cougars. In the final polls of the season, BYU finished ranked 14th in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll, marking the highest finish for the Cougars since finishing No. 5 following the 1996 season.

During the regular season, the Cougars did not allow a single 100-yard rusher. One of Mendenhall's jobs as the head coach and defensive coordinator is to manage points. Defensively, BYU ranked 9th in the nation, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

In 2008, BYU earned a spot in the national polls each week of the season, including a ranking as high as No. 7. With just two regular-season blemishes on its resume with road losses at No. 6 Utah and No. 11 TCU, BYU earned a No. 16 ranking in the final BCS standings and an invitation to the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl. Off the field, only Penn State (4) placed more student-athletes on the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America First Team than BYU in 2008. Cougar starters David Oswald (offensive tackle), Matt Bauman (linebacker) and Kellen Fowler (safety) each earned the high honor as BYU had three first-teamers for the first time during the same season.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple has three sons.

LUKE ASHWORTH-WR

After returning home from an LDS mission in 2007, Ashworth saw action in all 13 games in 2008, including four starts. He caught three passes for 49 yards, averaging 16.3 yards per reception.

BRANDON BRADLEY-DB

Bradley earned letterman honors as a sophomore in 2008, seeing action in 12 games for the Cougars, including three starts at corner. He totaled 40 tackles on the season, including 33 solo takedowns, recorded three pass breakups and returned a fumble for a 38-yard touchdown in the game at Utah State.

O'NEILL CHAMBERS-WR

As a true freshman in 2008, Chambers saw action in all 13 games for the Cougars, including his first career start in the game against Utah State. As BYU's primary kick returner, he returned 35 kicks for 809 yards, averaging 23.1 yards per return. His 35 kick returns in 2008 set a BYU and MWC record for most kickoff returns in a season. Di Luigi earned letterman honors as a redshirt freshman last year. A main contributor on special teams, he also gained 48 yards rushing on 13 carries.

ANDREW GEORGE-TE

The other half of what might be the best tight end tandem in the country, George returns for his senior year after scoring six touchdowns in 2008. He picked up his first in 2009 during BYU's upset win over No. 3 Oklahoma in its season opener. Earning three starts last season, he set season highs with five receptions for 62 yards against Air Force and caught two touchdown passes in BYU's win over New Mexico. He has seen action in 36 games over the past three seasons.

TERRANCE HOOKS-LB

Hooks started his senior season with a sack against Oklahoma's Landry Jones in BYU's season opener. He saw action in five games in 2008 after returning from a knee injury suffered during spring ball. He competed in 12 games in 2007, recording a season-high five tackles against Eastern Washington.

After starting three games in 2008, Rich has become a vocal leader for the BYU defense. He was named MWC Defensive Player of the Week following his performance in BYU's win over Oklahoma on Sept. 5. During that game he recorded five tackles, including four solo stops, one tackle for loss and two forced fumbles to aid the BYU upset victory.

VIC SO'OTO-DL

Playing at his third position while at BYU, So'oto is eager for a healthy start to the 2009 season. As a linebacker in 2008, he started the first two games of the season before suffering a season-ending leg injury. He also saw time at tight end in 2005-06.

RUSSELL TIALAVEA-DL

Tialavea returns to BYU's defensive line in 2009 after starting 12 games last year. He totaled 17 tackles on the season and two pass breakups. He also blocked a field goal attempt in BYU's shutout win over UCLA. Tialavea will leave to serve an LDS mission to Chile at the conclusion of the season.

MANASE TONGA-RB

After sitting out the 2008 season due to academics, Tonga returns to the Cougar backfield. During 2005-07 he totaled 138 carries for 530 yards and 12 touchdowns. He is also a weapon on the receiving end, catching 55 balls for 528 yards and two touchdowns.
