BYU extended its season-high winning streak to seven games, before having it come to an abrupt halt at the hands of No. 5 Stanford two weeks ago. The Cougars had a week off in preparation for this week's six games.

At the Stanford Classic two weeks ago, BYU won its first three games. Two of the three victories were shutouts making a total of four shutouts in its last five victories. The Cougars beat Middle Tennessee State 4-0 before crushing Miami [Ohio] 10-0 and slipping past Wisconsin 7-6 in 11 innings. Stanford beat BYU 8-0 in six innings to end the winning streak.

Watch for DePaul's pitching ace, Tracie Adix, who leads the Blue Demons in dearly every pitching category including her team-high 5-1 record and team-low 1.02 ERA. Amber leads DePaul in batting average, posting a .371 mark.



Oregon (13-9) - Mar. 24, 2 and 4 p.m. (MST)

When the BYU takes on Oregon, the Cougars will be looking to avenge a pair of shut losses at the hands of the Ducks last season. BYU was 16-3 when it traveled to Oregon to take on Oregon, Oregon State and Portland State. The Cougars went 1-5 last year.

This year, the Ducks are batting .281 as a team while holding their opponents to just a .231 mark. Breanne Sabol leads Oregon in hitting (.382) and RBI (20).



Akron (6-9) - Mar. 25, 12 p.m. (MST)

Akron and BYU face off for the first time in program history. The Zips are the only team that the Cougars will face for the first time in Oregon. Akron is led by Cali Stratton, who is currently hitting .286 with a home run and seven RBI.



No. 8 Oregon State (21-2) - Mar. 25, 2 p.m. (MST)

BYU will be looking to improve on its 1-7 all-time record against Oregon State. The Cougars lost twice to the Beavers last year in Corvallis including a 5-4 nailbiter that was called due to darkness. OSU enters the week having won an astonishing 21 consecutive

games. The Beavers lost their first two games and haven't lost since. The winning streak includes victories over five ranked opponents.

Oregon State has been dominant, sporting a team batting average of .349 while holding its opponents to just .234 at the plate. The Beavers also enjoy a team ERA of 2.20 while their opponents post a 6.27 mark. Oregon State leaders include dualthreat Brianne McGowan who is batting at a .458 mark while posting a 12-1 record and 1.68 ERA from the pitchers circle. Adrienne Alo leads the Beavers in run production with six home runs and 24 RBI.

Cougars in the Preseason Top-25

For the first time in its five-year history, BYU softball entered the season ranked in the Top-25. The ESPN.com/USA Softball poll ranked the Cougars No. 25. BYU eaned its first ranking in program history last year after winning the Mountain West Conference Tournament. The Cougars first game as a nationally ranked team was a 1-O victory over then No. 2 California in the NCAA Regionals in Fresno, Calif.

Who's Hot

- After a strong week, laneta Le`i is leading BYU is several offensive categories including home runs, doubles, RBI, hits and slugging percentage. Le`i tallied seven RBI, a homer and double at Stanford.
- Andrea Ramirez went 7-for-16 with a double and four RBI at the Stanford Classic.
- Daniella Urincho continues to lead the Cougars with a team-best 1.41 ERA after a strong outing against Wisconsin in the no-decision.

About the 2006 Sauad...

- There's no mystery as to where senior catcher Paige Paramore inherits her softball skills. Paramore's father, Glen, played minor league and collegiate baseball. Paige also has two brothers that are currently playing Division I baseball: Price plays at the Air Force Academy while Preston plays at Arizona State.
- Only four players on BYU's roster of 21 hail from the state of Utah.
 Seven Cougars come from California which largest number of players from one state.
- BYU head softball coach Gordon Eakin has been selected as one of 16 coaches to the Quadrennial Coaching Pool, assigned to various duties with the U.S. National Team over the next three years, all in preparation for the 2008 Olympics.
 - "It is a tremendous honor to be associated with the National Team," Eakin said. "It is an exciting opportunity to work and associate and help develop the best players in the world. It is also an honor to be around some of the best coaches in the world."
- BYU had two players named to the 2005 Easton All-American Second Team, including returner laneta Le`i and graduated senior Lauren Watson-Perry. Interestingly, Watson-Perry also took home Mountain West Conference Player of the Year honors in 2005 while Le`i brought home the same award in 2004 as a sophomore.
- Le`i along with fellow Hawaii imports Ashlyn Russell and Emi Snow could soon carry the appellate "Hawaiian Assasins" due to their offensive prowice. Le`i smacked 10 home runs and had a team-high 53 RBI while Russell led the Cougars with 17 homers on the year while driving in 50 runs. Snow, in limited action had a home run while posting a .333 batting average.
- BYU ranked in the Top-15 in four offensive categories last year: batting (.309), scoring (5.88 runs per game), slugging (.510) and homers (1.15 pg).
- Brooke Boyce-Humbert added the Humbert to her naming during the offseason when she married Mark Humbert. She is the only married player.
- BYU set a team record for single-game margin of victory when it beat Texas Southern 20-0 March 4. The Cougars were ahead 17-0 after two innings and pitcher Summer Tobias pitched a no-hitter.

Preseason No. 1 in MWC

After winning the 2005 regular-season and tournament championships, the No. 25 BYU Cougars have been selected to win the Mountain West Conference softball regular-season title in a vote by the league coaches. BYU and UNLV each received three first place votes.

BYU, which also won both the regular-season and tournament crown in 2001, collected 23 points to capture the top spot in the poll. 2005 Mountain West Conference regular-season and tournament runner-up UNLV tallied 22 points to place second in the poll, followed by San Diego State [16 points], Colorado State [14 points], Utah (eight points) and New Mexico (seven points).

2006 Season Outlook

Optimism rings loud for BYU softball as the Cougars enter the 2006 season coming off their best year in program history.

Champions of the Mountain West Conference regular season and tournament, the '05 squad recorded a program-best 45-14 record while going 16-2 in conference play.

BYU earned a trip to the NCAA Regionals and recorded an upset victory over No. 2 California.

The Cougars enter this season determined to be even better in 2006. BYU head coach Gordon Eakin said this year's team is special.

"This team knows they belong among the best teams in the nation now," he said. "They are fearless and want to show they are for real."

Having only two starters graduate from the 2005 team, BYU will enter the season with an experienced and talented squad. The Cougars have a unique mix of speed and power coupled with a strong defensive squad and possibly their best pitching rotation ever.

"Certainly we have the core of last season's team back," Eakin said. "This is the deepest team we've ever had as far as speed, power and depth are concerned."

BATTING

BYU lost its most efficient hitter of '05 with the graduation of Lauren Perry. Perry posted a .421 batting average, good for 14th best in the nation. Also gone is Debbie Dodds who finished the season hitting .392 in MWC play. Dodds and Perry will contribute to the 2006 team as graduate assistants.



"We can't replace what those girls brought to our team," Eakin said.

Fortunately for the Cougars, the well isn't dried up when it comes to good hitting. The nation's sixth best scoring team (5.88 runs per game) in 2005 will have an arsenal of offensive weapons in 2006. laneta Le`i, 2005 second-team Easton All-American, returns for the Cougars. Le`i batted .346 with 10 home runs and 53 RBI. She was 25th in the nation with .93 RBI per game.

Not far behind Le'i in RBI production, Paige Paramore drove in 50 runs while posting a .348 average. Paramore's batting average is the best among all BYU returners. She also led the Cougars last season with 13 doubles.

BYU will have plenty of power with the return of Le`i, Paramore and slugger Ashlyn Russell. Russell led the Cougars with 17 homers last season, good for 27th in the nation. Russell also was third on the team in RBI, driving home 47.

In front of the power and run production, BYU also returns good speed and experienced base runners. Jennifer Whitely led the Cougars in triples with four and successfully stole eight bases in 11 attempts. Krystle Chamberlain was 11-for-13 in base stealing attempts.

"Krystle and Jennifer are productive left-handed slap hitters and add excellent speed to our team," Eakin said.

PITCHING/DEFENSE

"We have always been a good

hitting team," Eakin said. "But, this season our strength will be our pitching."

BYU returns its best three pitchers from last season. Summer Tobias, who transferred to BYU from Nebraska last season, led the Cougars in wins (19), ERA (1.73) and saves (5). Tobias best demonstrated her dominance when she hurled a perfect game March 30, 2005, against Utah Valley State.

Tobias is joined by veteran Brooke Boyce Humbert and sophomore Daniella Urincho. Humbert holds many of the Cougars all-time pitching records. She is coming of a solid season where she went 8-4 with a 3.57 ERA.

Urincho is the reigning MWC tournament MVP. She had the best winning percentage (.842) among BYU pitchers last year, posting a 16-3 record. Urincho also struck out 81 batters in 125.2 innings while sporting a 1.89 ERA.

"Dani (Urincho) was dominant at the end of the season last year," Eakin said.

Eakin said defense will be another stronghold for the '06 Cougars.

"This year's team will be probably the best defensive team we've had here," he said. "We have a lot of speed in our outfield and a lot of experience in the infield."

NEWCOMERS

As if having a plethora of experienced talent returning wasn't enough, BYU has a number of incoming prospects with a lot of talent and bright futures. Topping the list are transfers Tracee Hoch and Cortney Nix.

Hoch transferred to the Cougars

after a stellar junior college career. Hoch was a junior college All-American who will likely make an immediate impact playing second base. Hoch will replace the departed Dodds. Nix transferred from the University of Arizona and will team up with Paramore to fill the void left behind the plate with the graduation of Perry.

BYU also welcomes one of the most highly recruited high school players in infielder Andrea Ramirez. Ramirez was the Los Angeles Times high school MVP last season while playing at Royal High School in Simi Valley, Calif.

Monica Gonzales, also from Southern California, looks to contribute to the Cougars early and often. Gonzales will battle for playing time in the outfield and adds excellent speed and slap hitting ability.

"Andi (Ramirez) has the potential to be one of the best players in collegiate softball," Eakin said. "And Monica led our team in hitting in the fall and will see significant playing time right away."

SCHEDULE

BYU opens its season with tour-

nament trips to Honolulu, Las Vegas, Houston, College Station, Texas and Palo Alto, Calif. Eakin said it will be another season full of quality opponents.

"We have another challenging schedule this year," he said. "We will play a lot of Top-25 teams and our conference will have more parity."

Included in the Cougars' schedule are perennial powerhouses like Texas A&M, Stanford and Oregon State, all three of which Eakin feels will be ranked in the Top-10.

The home schedule begins
March 30 for BYU when the
Cougars welcome conference foe
UNLV to Gail Miller Field. BYU will
play 15 home games, including
contests against in-state opponents
Utah, Utah State, Southern Utah
and Utah Valley State.

The Cougars expect an exciting season while looking to win the conference and make a return trip to the NCAA Regionals and beyond.

"This is a determined bunch of girls, they will be a fun group to watch," Eakin said.



Cougar Softball Playing Below Potential

It could be argued that to compile an 8-2 record, a team needs to be performing at or near its peak ability.

But if you ask BYU softball coach Gordon Eakin about his 8-2 team, he'll tell you it's still playing far below its potential — a scary thought to anybody who has a date with the Cougars later this spring.

"Obviously we're pleased with our 8-2 record," Eakin said. "But I don't think we've played anywhere near our potential."

First baseman laneta Le'i and shortstop Jodi Norton have become the Bash Sisters early in the season, tying for the team lead with three home runs each. Norton is second on the team in batting average (.364) while Le'i is fifth (.345).

Le'i, the only Cougar to have started all 10 games, leads the team in nine categories, including hits (10), RBIs (10), total bases (25) and slugging percentage (.862).

Norton was named the Mountain West Conference Player of the Week in the season's first week for her dominant performance at the Hawaii Tournament.

Eakin said both players have played well, but Norton and other players have struggled with leaving players on base.

"We're leaving too many runners on base — I'm talking 10, 11, 12 runners a game, many of them in scoring position with our big hitters at the plate," Eakin said. "Obviously, we can't continue leaving that many runners on base and expect to continue winning."

The team also needs to reduce its strikeout percentage, which is at 24 percent, Eakin said, to at least 15 percent.

He did cite the team's pitching staff of Daniella Urincho, Summer Tobias and Brooke Boyce-Humber as a strong point on the team so far.

Tobias, who is carrying a 5-1 record and 1.68 ERA, has already earned MWC Pitcher of the Week honors, back in the first week of the season.

Urincho, while getting slightly less playing time, has made the most of every opportunity, compiling a 3-1 record and a team-leading 1.05 ERA.

The team's best quality so far, Eakin said, has been its obvious desire to win.

"Our team never quits, which has been pleasing," he said.
"We've come back and won some games in which we've been trailing, and we believe we can win any game. What I like about our team, and what good teams do, is they find a way to win."

The team has gone 4-1 in both tournaments in which it has competed this year, the first in Hawaii and the second in Las Vegas. Still more than a month from their first home game, a March 30 date with conference foe UNLV, the team still has two more tournaments slated — at Texas A&M this week and at Stanford next week — as well as a six-game road trip through Oregon.

Eakin said he expects the team to improve as the weather warms

up and players can begin to practice outside.

"It's hard coming out of the snow, because we haven't been able to come outside and practice, and it's always different when you play inside," he said. "It's difficult in the first few tournaments of the season when you play warmweather schools that have been practicing outside."

And while he said he has not received the kind of performance he expected from his veteran players to this point, Eakin said the team has been working hard in the areas in which it is struggling and remained confident that the improvement will come.

"I think the main point is we're a very talented team that hasn't played up to its potential yet, but we're still 8-2 and that's encouraging," he said. "Once we get it all together, we're going to be a very dangerous team."

Pollsters are starting to agree with that assessment of the team's talent level, it would seem, as BYU debuted at No. 25 in this week's ESPN.com/USA Softball poll. Eakin said he would prefer to have the team in that spot later in the season, when it will become important for postseason positioning, as opposed to early in the season, when it basically creates "a bull'seye for other teams."

But he's confident that his team is up to the challenge.

"Our goal is to get better every day," he said. "We look at that and we try not to look too far ahead. We obviously feel we can win the Mountain West Conference, then qualify for the NCAA Tournament and go deep into the postseason."
