Cougars Face Two Washington Teams in Tournament

BYU stays on the road this week, playing in a four-team tournament, with games against Washington (4-4-0) and Washington State (5-2-1) on Thursday at 7 p.m., and Friday at 4:30 p.m., respectively. New Mexico is the other team in the tournament. tLive stats for the game against Washington will be available at http://livestats.gohuskies.collegesports.com/livestats/data/w-soccer/414598/gt_index.html.

The Cougars enjoyed two 1-0 victories last week over Pacific and Utah State. Sophomore midfielder Katie Larkin scored both game-winning goals, including a golden goal in overtime against the Aggies. Larkin earned Mountain West Conference and Top Drawer Soccer Player of the Week citations for her efforts.

Larkin leads BYU with three goals and seven points. Also scoring goals for the Cougars are Alyssa Vander Veur (2), Brooke Bowman, Kelsea Kakadelas, Amberlea Anderson, Haylee Cuthbert and Katie Fellows. Carolyn Swenson leads BYU with three assists. Goalkeeper Erika Woodbury has accumulated 221 saves on the season.

Washington's offensive attack is led by Melissa Beal with three goals and two assists. Shuree Hyatt has also netted two goals, while Dani Bridges has assisted on two goals. Five other Huskies have scored goals on the season. Senior keeper Kelsey Rasmussen has saved 37 total shots.

These two teams have played each other three times in the programs' histories with each team winning one game and tying the other. The last game was played on Sept. 21, 2001 and resulted in a 1-1 tie.

Washington State is led by Anna Miller, Carly Dobratz and Kim Bonnes, who have each scored two goals apiece. Dobratz also leads the Cougars with three assists. Amber Wittmers and Brynn Bemis split time in the net for a combined 29 saves.

BYU leads the series with Washington State, 2-1, with the last game resulting in a 2-1 BYU loss on Sept. 25, 2004.

WEEK IN REVIEW:

Pacific:

Behind the steady foot of sophomore Katie Larkin, No. 18 BYU handed Pacific its first loss as the Cougars scored with just five minutes remaining in the game to win, 1-0.

BYU's lone goal came in the 85th minute off a cross from Booke Bowman to Larkin in the middle of the goal box. Larkin blasted in her second goal of the year to secure a Cougar victory.

For the first time this season Pacific failed to protect a shut-out. Tiger goalie Jaime Souza spent about 660 minutes in the net without allowing a single goal until Larkin's score.

The game was a hard fought battle with both teams earning six shots on goal apiece. The Tigers outshot BYU 14-11. Goalkeeper Erika Woodbury secured six crucial saves, while Pacific's Jaime Souza made five.

Utah State:

It took extra time before either team got on the board Saturday, but a left-footed shot from Larkin in the sixth minute of overtime secured a 1-0 victory as BYU defeated Utah State in the face of a treacherous hail storm.

It was BYU's first-ever trip to Logan, and the Cougars now take a 4-0 all-time series lead.

BYU outshot Utah State, 22-8, including 13-2 in the second half and finished with a 10-3 advantage in shots on goal.

The Cougars had several chances, including opportune shots in the 53rd and 60th minute, but Ali Griffin made leaping, sprawling saves. In the 61st minute, a Cougar shot got past Griffin, but Alyssa Lowry was on the line to clear the ball away.

The lone goal of the game came after the Aggies attempted to clear the ball toward the midfield. Larkin gathered the ball, took a couple dribbles, planted her right foot and fired the left-footer just under the cross bar in the upper-right corner of the net.

LARKIN BOASTS INDIVIDUAL ACCOLADES:

BYU sophomore midfielder Katie Larkin has been named the Mountain West Conference Co-Offensive Players of the Week, along with Katelyn Lev of New Mexico, the MWC announced Monday.

Larkin, from Draper, Utah, scored the game-winner in both of BYU's games over the weekend. She earned five shots and four shots on goal in both wins against Pacific (1-0) and Utah State (1-0 OT). Larkin leads the Cougars with three goals and seven points on the season.

Larkin was also named the National Player of the Week by Top Drawer Soccer.

HEROIC MOMENT:

Thanks to the heroics of goalie Erika Woodbury, the women's soccer team defeated Georgia in a top-20 showdown on Fri. Sept. 1 in Atlanta. Fifteen minutes before game time, Woodbury jumped headfirst into the post while saving a warm-up shot. Shaken and bleeding from the head, she mustered up her strength and played one of the best games in her career. Trainer Carolyn Billings placed gauze on the wound and taped the majority of her head before kickoff. At halftime, the dressing was replaced as Woodbury had already bled through the bandages. After losing a substantial amount of blood and leading her team to victory, Woodbury was finally able to receive staples.

Last Game:

Lisa Collison scored what proved to be the decisive goal in the 80th minute Sunday, helping the Buckeye women's soccer team win its own Ohio State Tournament with a 2-1 victory over Washington at Jesse Owens Stadium.

Collison's game-winner came on a breakaway as she ran on to a through ball from Melissa Miller and scored at 79:09.

UW trimmed the deficit to one seven minutes later on the first career goal from freshman forward Veronica Perez-Murillo (San Mateo, Calif.). She received a cross from sophomore Melissa Beal (Portland, Ore.) and netted the ball from the left side at 86:32.

The Huskies had a late opportunity to tie the score, but an 88th-minute shot by Beal was stopped by OSU goalkeeper Lauren Robertson.

Washington opened the game with strong surge up field that was halted when junior forward Shuree Hyatt injured her leg while being tackled. She was sidelined the remainder of the contest.

The Husky injury gave momentum to the Buckeyes, who controlled play for the early portion of the game. They attempted the first six shots before UW sent its initial attempt toward goal, a strike by junior Dani Bridges that was saved by Robertson.

Rasmussen added six second-half saves for a season-high total of nine. She increased her career total to 228, a figure ranks third among all-time UW goalkeepers.

Ali Schwach opened the scoring two minutes into the second half, capitalizing on a rebound. Rasmussen blocked a shot by OSU's Lara Dickenmann, but Schwach pushed the carom into the goal at 46:57.

Bridges was named to the all-tournament team along with UW teammates Katie Hall and Nikki Murray.

SOUTH STADIUM

South Stadium is the place the Cougars love to call home, a home all opponents hate to visit.

For the past 11 years, South Stadium (formerly South Field), has been the battlefield for the Cougars as the team has taken on, and defeated, the top teams in their conference and in the NCAA.

The Cougars have amassed an 94-21-6 (.802) record at home, which is among the best in the nation over the same time period. Of those 97 home wins, an outstanding 55 have ended in a shutout.

BYU consistently manages to hold its opponents scoreless when playing at South Stadium with 59 percent of all the Cougars' wins ending in shutout victories, while BYU has been shutout only 10 times in the stadium's history.

Aside from the Cougars' history of defeating tough teams at home, another factor making South Stadium a formidable place for opponents is the large and loud crowd of fans that pack the stadium at every game.

Consistently among the top 15 in the NCAA, South Stadium packs in some of the largest crowds in the country. With an average attendance of 2,069 fans during the 2005 campaign, the Cougars rank among the highest every year for largest attendance average in the country. BYU also packed in a total of 24,830 fans over 12 games, recording the third-highest attendance mark in the nation and making South Stadium one of the toughest places for opponents to play in women's college soccer today.

Located just south of the Smith Fieldhouse, South Stadium boasts one of the best-maintained grass playing surfaces in the NCAA. The Wasatch Mountains serve as a scenic backdrop for the capacity crowd of 3,000 fans. South Stadium is also equipped with state-of-the-art field lights, making night games a favorite among fans.

Last Game:

The Washington State women's soccer team improved its record to 5-2-1 Sunday as the Cougars shut out Idaho 2-1 at Lower Soccer Field. The win marks WSU's third consecutive victory.

Washington State's Kim Bonnes tallied her second game-winning goal as many matches when she put the Cougars on the scoreboard in the sixth minute. Bonnes sent a header to the left corner of the goal beating Vandals keeper Michelle Jordan. Elysse Van Leer earned an assist on the play.

The Cougars put the game away 10 minutes later as Carly Dobratz touched in the deflection of her own shot at the 15:38 mark to notch her second goal of the season.

The Cougars controlled possession for much of the match and recorded 10 shots to Idaho's five. Dobratz paced the Washington State offense with three shots with Van Leer adding two. Cougar keeper Amber Wittmers earned her the second shut out of the season recording two saves in the match.

**COUGARS PICKED TO WIN MWC CROWN**

In a vote by the Mountain West Conference coaches, BYU received four of eight first-place votes and was selected to win the 2006 MWC women's soccer regular-season championship in the preseason poll. The Cougars collected a total of 46 points to capture the top spot in the poll. Utah, which won the last year's MWC regular-season title, received three first-place votes and took second place in the poll with 44 points. San Diego State was picked to finish third with 35 points, while also tallying one first-place vote.

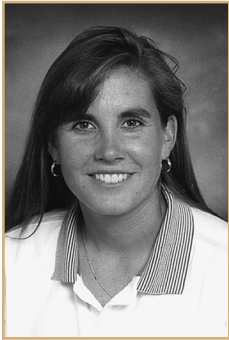

After completing her 11th season, head coach Jennifer Rockwood has taken the BYU women's soccer team to national prominence and established herself as one of the premier coaches in Division I soccer today.

Rockwood currently ranks 11th in winning percentage among active NCAA coaches with an impressive 180-58-14 overall record for her career. Over the last 11 seasons, Rockwood accumulated a .742 winning percentage.

In the past 11 years, Rockwood has guided the Cougars to five conference championships. On the national scene, her teams have made eight appearances in the NCAA Tournament in the last nine years and reached the Sweet Sixteen in 1998, 2000 and 2003. In 2005, BYU received its first-ever No. 4 seed in the NCAA tournament and was ranked as high as No. 6 in the country, the highest ranking awarded to the Cougars in school history. BYU regularly maintains a consistent top-25 ranking. During Rockwood's tenure, the team finished in the top-10 three times, including a recent run in the 2003 NCAA College Cup. The tournament ended with BYU finishing No. 5 in the country after making their first Elite Eight appearance in the program's history.

Among the many achievements and awards she has received over her career, Rockwood has been honored with two Coach of the Year citations, one by the Western Athletic Conference in 1996, and again by the MWC in 2000. She also became the first MWC coach to eclipse the 100-win total mark when the Cougars shutout Milwaukee-Wisconsin 2-0 on Sept. 23, 2000.

Under Rockwood's tutelage, a long list of All-American soccer players has emerged from BYU's program. These athletes include Jaime Rendich Beck, Aleisha Rose, and Michelle Jensen. Among the players who have been coached by Rockwood are four additional All-American athletes that were drafted by the women's United Soccer Association: Shauna Rohbock, Maren Hendershot and Staci Reynolds. Sara Reading was also selected to play for the WUSA.

Prior to becoming the head coach, Rockwood led BYU's highly successful club soccer team for seven years. In that time she amassed an overall record of 128-25-9, and the final two years she took her teams to the Western National Collegiate Club soccer Association (NCCSA) title and placed second in the NCCSA National Championships.

The Lake Oswego, Ore. native was a four-sport athlete in high school playing soccer, softball, basketball and track. After one year at Rick's College on a basketball scholarship, she transferred to BYU where she became a four-year starter at center midfield on the Cougars' club soccer team and graduated in finance, business management. Rockwood has also coached the Utah ODP, youth club programs and high school teams.

CHRIS WATKINS • Assistant Coach

Assistant coach Chris Watkins' technical knowledge has helped guide the BYU women's soccer team to eight NCAA tournaments in the past nine years, including a No. 5 finish in 2003.

When Watkins was hired in 1996, he brought impressive credentials, both professional and collegiate, to a young but talented Cougar squad. He played four years for the semi-professional Salt Lake City Flamengo team (1992-95). Watkins was also the Gatorade Player of the Year in his home state of Kansas. Most recently, he played for the Utah Blitz in 2002, scoring the golden goal to win the Western Conference. During college, he played NCAA Division I soccer at Drake University and held the single-season scoring record there. He later graduated from BYU.

Watkins also coaches the BYU men's soccer team, compiling an overall record of 140-35-13 in ten years. Chris and his wife Karen live in Mapleton, Utah with their sons Drake, Ethan and Tanner.

ALEISHA ROSE • Assistant Coach

Aleisha Rose, a four-year All-American midfielder for BYU, enters her third season as an assistant for the women's soccer team. Rose became one of the Cougars' most prominent recruits after being named the 1999 National High School Player of the Year before joining the Cougars. She lived up to her billing as a freshman by scoring seven goals and contributing 13 assists. She also received All-Conference First-Team honors, as well as the ESPN/Soccer Times Freshman of the Year Award.

As a senior, Rose received her fourth All-America honor after being named to the NSCAA All-American Third Team. She was also a Soccer Post All-American First Team, Soccer American MVP and Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Year. Among the numerous awards and citations Rose won during her career, she also graduated as the No. 1 all-time career assist leader at BYU with 47 assists.

After playing four seasons at BYU, Rose received a bachelor's degree in Marriage, Family & Human Development. She lives with her husband Chris and daughter Hannah in Provo.
