ON THE TUBE

Saturday's game will be broadcast live to a national television audience on CBS-College Sports. Dave Ryan will provide play-by-play coverage, with Aaron Taylor lending analysis. Brooke Olzendam will report from the sidelines.

CBS College Sports will also broadcast its pregame, halftime and postgame studio shows live from LaVell Edwards Stadium.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- A victory on Saturday would give BYU a three-game win streak against Washington, the best in program history against the Huskies.
- The first win of 2010 will give BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall his 50th career win as a head coach in just his sixth season, all at BYU. He will become only the second coach in Cougar history to reach the 50-win mark, with LaVell Edwards earning his 50th win in the middle of his seventh season against San Diego State, 21-3, in 1978. Mendenhall's 49 wins in his first five seasons as a head coach is tied for 10th all-time among FBS coaches.
- With Consensus All-American and current Baltimore Ravens Dennis Pitta and MWC Second Team selection and current Buffalo Bills Andrew George graduating after playing tight end for the Cougars last season, five freshman tight ends will compete to fill in at what has historically been a prolific position at BYU.
- After opening the 2009 season against Oklahoma and 2008 Heisman Trophy winner Sam Bradford, BYU will begin 2010 by hosting Washington quarterback Jake Locker, a top Heisman Trophy candidate coming into the season.
- BYU will start a quarterback other than Max Hall (now with the NFL's Arizona Cardinals) for the first time since December 2006.

THE BYU-WASHINGTON SERIES



BYU and Washington have come together to play only seven times, but it seems as if each turns into something memorable. Last time the two teams met in 2008, the Huskies scored on a late drive to set up a potential game-tying extra point. BYU's Jan Jorgensen blocked the kick, giving BYU the victory. Other notables games include the Cougars' late win on a 38-yard pass from quarterback Kevin Feterik

to unknown freshman Chris Hale for a 35-28 victory, breaking a streak of four-straight losses to Washington. The losing streak included the only black mark on a 14-1 season for BYU in 1996, a team led at quarterback by current Washington head coach Steve Sarkisian.

LAST TIME: BYU 28, WASHINGTON 27 (2008)

SEATTLE (Sept. 6, 2008) – BYU extended its nation-leading win streak to 12 games on Saturday after a narrow 28-27 victory over the Washington Huskies. Junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen blocked the potentially game-tying extra point with two seconds remaining on the game clock to secure the Cougars' victory.

With the Cougars up 28-21 following a 15-yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Max Hall to tight end Dennis Pitta, the Huskies regained control of the ball with 3:31 remaining in the game. Washington made its way down the field, finally stopping at the three-vard line. The BYU defense was unable to hold back the Huskies, as guarterback Jake Locker ran in for a three-yard touchdown.

Washington kicker Ryan Perkins attempted to tie the game as he prepared to kick the extra point. Jorgensen's block on the attempt solidified the win for BYU, its first non-conference road win since Oct. 4, 2002 when the Cougars defeated Utah State 35-34.

Junior quarterback Max Hall led the Cougars by completing 30-of-41 passes for 338 yards and three touchdowns. For the second week in a row, junior tight end Dennis Pitta was the game's leading receiver, pulling down 10 catches for 148 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore running back Harvey Unga recorded 136 yards on the ground.



BYU'S LAST OUTING



In the first-ever MAACO Bowl Las Vegas matchup pitting two top-20 teams, the Mountain West Conference runnerup dominated the scoreboard to earn its third 11-win season in the last four years. Only three schools—Boise State. Florida and Texas—have won more games over the last four years while BYU has achieved a 43-9 record.

BYU's senior class anchored the win as quarterback Max Hall earned himself Most Valuable Player honors after completing 19-of-30 passes for 192 yards and three touchdowns. Manase Tonga contributed two touchdowns, while senior tight ends Andrew George and Dennis Pitta led all receivers with 46 and 45 yards, respectively.

Defensively, senior linebacker Matt Bauman recovered a key fumble, returning it for 34 yards and the touchdown. The score marked the first fumble recovery for a touchdown in BYU bowl history. Fellow team captain Scott Johnson intercepted an Oregon State pass in the fourth guarter and returned it 56 yards to set up BYU's final touchdown of the

NATIONAL RANKINGS

BYU has been among the nation's top-25 teams during 32 of the last 33 weeks from November 2007 to the final polls in 2009, finishing 12th in the USA Today and Associated Press polls and 14th in the final BCS rankings. In this year's preseason rankings, BYU is just outside both major polls, coming in 28th in the USA Today Coaches' Poll and 34th in the Associated Press Top 25.

FAMILIAR FACE...

BYU welcomes back former Cougar quarterback Steve Sarkisian, now the football head coach at the University of Washington. Sarkisian started for BYU in 1995 and 1996, tallying a 21-5 record including a 14-1 season and No. 5 final ranking his senior season. Sarkisian led the nation in passing efficiency on his way to being named an All-American and winning the Sammy Baugh Trophy.

After playing in the Canadian Football League for three seasons, Sarkisian spent one year as the quarterbacks coach at El Camino Junior College before being hired on as the quarterbacks coach on Pete Carroll's staff at USC where he would help the Trojans win a national championship while tutoring such quarterbacks as Carson Palmer and Matt Leinart. Sarkisian also spent one season as an assistant coach with the Oakland Raiders. He was hired as Washington's head coach on Dec. 8, 2008, going 5-7 last season.

... FAMILIAR BEGINNING

The 2010 season opener against Washington is the third time BYU has started its season playing the Huskies, all of which games have also been played in Provo. The Cougars are 1-1 in previous season openers against Washington, losing 42-20 in 1997 and winning 25-28 in 1999, the last time Washington visited Edwards Stadium.

PERFECT ON THE ROAD

With the win at University Stadium against New Mexico last season, BYU secured an undefeated 6-0 road record for the first time since 1984.

Defeating New Mexico also gave the Cougars a perfect 4-0 road record against MWC opponents for the fifth time since the inception of the league. BYU also went undefeated in MWC road games in 2001, 2006 and 2007.

ENDING AN 18-YEAR DROUGHT

Before securing a 14-13 win over No. 3
Oklahoma on Sept. 5, 2009, the last time BYU beat a nonconference team ranked in the Top 10 was its 28-21 win over No. 1 Miami on Sept. 8, 1990. The win over the Sooners gave the Cougars their first win over a ranked nonconference opponent since it defeated No. 14 Arizona State, 26-6, on Sept. 12, 1998. Since that day, BYU lost 12 consecutive games to ranked nonconference opponents. The last time BYU beat a ranked nonconference opponent on a neutral field was the Las Vegas Bowl game last season when BYU beat No. 18 Oregon State, 44-20.

PULLING OUT THE CLOSE ONES

After a close 24-19 victory over the Lobos on Nov. 14, 2009, the Cougars have won 10 consecutive games decided by seven points or fewer.

DON'T LOOK BACK

In the Bronco Mendenhall era, BYU is 41-4 when leading at halftime and 39-1 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter. Mendenhall's teams have won 27 straight games when leading by at least 14 points at the halftime break, 74 overall as a team. The last time BYU lost a game after leading by at least 14 points at the half was on Oct. 10, 1987 when it lost, 29-27, in its homecoming game against Wyoming.

REYNOLDS, RICH NAMED 2010 TEAM CAPTAINS

PROVO, Utah (Aug. 26, 2010) — BYU head football coach Bronco Mendenhall announced Thursday team captains for the 2010 season as well as several personnel notes entering the first week of the season.

Senior safety Andrew Rich and junior offensive tackle Matt Reynolds have been selected to serve as team captains. Both Rich and Reynolds have played in all 26 games the past two seasons and enter their third year as a starter for the Cougars.

"Andrew and Matt are both fantastic representatives of our program and outstanding football players," Mendenhall said. "Both have demonstrated they are capable of leading our team on and off the field."

Rich has started in 16 games and earned All-MWC Second Team honors in 2009. He is a 2010 Lott Trophy Award candidate. Reynolds has started all 26 games of his career and is a preseason All-American, Lombardi Trophy and Outland Trophy candidate in 2010. He was a Freshman All-American in 2008 and a CFN All-Sophomore selection in 2009 while earning first-team all-conference accolades.

BYU, TEXAS AGREE TO HOME-AND-HOME SERIES

PROVO, Utah (Aug. 20, 2010) — Brigham Young University and the University of Texas today announced the two schools have agreed to a home-and-home football series for the 2013 and 2014 seasons.

Two of college football's most successful programs over the past four seasons, the Cougars and Longhorns are scheduled to meet in 2013 at LaVell Edwards Stadium in Provo, and again in 2014 at Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium in Austin, Texas. Game dates for the series are still being finalized.

"We are excited to announce this series with Texas," said BYU Director of Athletics Tom Holmoe. "We are always looking for opportunities to schedule storied football programs like the Longhorns. I'm really excited for our coaches, our players and the rest of Cougar Nation to have Texas visit LaVell Edwards Stadium."

The addition of the two-game series creates three future matchups between the Cougars and Longhorns. The two schools are already slated to face each other in Austin on Sept. 10, 2011.

BYU and Texas are two of only five programs nationally to win 10 or more games each of the past four seasons. BYU is 43-9 over the last four years while Texas has achieved a 45-8 mark over the same span. Ohio State, Boise State and Virginia Tech are the only other teams with double-digit victories each of the last four seasons.

BYU holds a 2-0 advantage against Texas with wins in 1987 and 1988. The Cougars earned a 22-17 victory in the inaugural meeting in Austin on Sept. 12, 1987. BYU won the last contest on Sept. 8, 1988, earning a 47-6 home victory in Provo under Hall of Fame coach LaVell Edwards.

GETTING STARTED

Over the past 10 seasons, BYU is 7-3 in season openers, including a 6-1 record when opening at home. The lone setback at home during that stretch was against Boston College in 2005 in Bronco Mendenhall's first game at the helm of the Cougars. After losing the opener on the road at Arizona the following year, BYU has won its last three season openers under Mendenhall, including the team's 14-13 upset of No. 3 Oklahoma in Dallas last year. Dating back to 1972 when LaVell Edwards became BYU's coach, BYU is 23-15 in season openers, including an 11-4 resume at home, 10-8 mark on the road and 2-3 record at a neutral site. Mendenhall is 2-1 at home, 0-1 on the road and 1-0 at a neutral site. BYU and Washington have met twice previously in BYU's season opener with BYU winning 35-28 in 1999 and losing 42-20 in 1996. Both games were played in Provo.

2010 COUGAR FOOTBALL Y QUARTERBACK WEEKEND

ONE WEEKEND, EIGHT ALL-AMERICAN QUARTERBACKS

For the first time in school history, eight All-American quarterbacks — who played for legendary coach LaVell Edwards — are returning to Provo to take part in a fund-raiser for the BYU Football program. Y Quarterback Weekend is scheduled for Sept. 3-4, and will feature All-Americans Virgil Carter, Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon, Steve Young, Robbie Bosco, Ty Detmer and Steve Sarkisian. Y Quarterback Weekend begins on Friday, Sept. 3, with a golf tournament at Riverside Country Club. The tournament is scheduled for the morning and will feature a limited number of teams. That evening on the BYU campus, LaVell Edwards will host a dinner and auction, where each All-American quarterback will provide a unique item to be auctioned.

The festivities conclude on Saturday, Sept. 4, with a special ceremony at halftime of the BYU vs. Washington football game. All money raised during the weekend will be used to endow scholarships at BYU. One fully endowed athletic scholarship is approximately \$250,000.

CURRENTLY SERVING MISSIONS...

There are 51 members of the BYU football program currently serving two-year church missions in 16 different countries, including Argentina, Bulgaria, Chile, Democratic Republic of Congo, Costa Rica, Ghana, Guatemala, Japan, the Marshall Islands, Mexico, New Zealand, Panama, Philippines, Russia, South Africa and the United States. Members of the BYU football program who are currently serving missions cover six of the globe's seven continents and speak a total of eight different foreign languages, including Bulgarian, Japanese, Marshallese, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Tagalog.

SERVED MISSIONS...

Junior defensive lineman Romney Fuga, is one of 74 players (62 percent) on the team roster who has served a church mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Fuga recently returned home from a mission to Madagascar.

Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in a total of 24 countries and one territory, including Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, England, Germany, India, Jamaica, Japan, Madagascar, Mozambique, New Zealand, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Russia, Samoa, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Taiwan, and the United States.

Current members of the BYU football team have served missions in 18 different states, including Alabama, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and Washington.

Overall, 54 current members of the BYU football team speak a total of 17 different foreign languages and dialects, including Fante, French, Haitian Creole, German, Hawaiian, Jamaican Patois, Japanese, Korean, Malagasy, Mandarin Chinese, Portuguese, Russian, Samoan, Spanish, Tagalog, Tongan and Twi.

WHAT IS A MISSION?

- * The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. Mormon missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities.
- * The missionary effort is based on the New Testament pattern of missionaries serving in pairs, teaching the gospel and baptizing believers in the name of Jesus Christ (see, for example, the work of Peter and John in the book of Acts).
- * More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world.
- * Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries work with a companion of the same gender during their mission, with the exception of couples, who work with their spouse. Single men serve missions for two years and single women serve missions for 18 months.
- * Missionaries receive their assignment from Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate. Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language.
- * Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 15 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching. The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Ghana, Guatemala, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, South Africa and Spain.
 - * Male missionaries are addressed with the title "Elder" and women are addressed with the title "Sister."
- *A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study. The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m.
- * In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions. Those missionaries do not proselytize.
- * Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions except for their transportation to and from their field of labor and are not paid for their services.
- * Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ

LAVELL EDWARDS STADIUM

"FAN"TASTIC FANS

The 64,301 fans in attendance for the Cougars' 26-23 overtime win over Utah marked the 18th consecutive sell-out at LaVell Edwards Stadium. The current streak marks the longest streak of consecutive sellouts since the 1990-92 seasons. In six games last season BYU is averaged 64,236 fans per game. The last time the stadium was not sold out was against New Mexico on Nov. 18, 2006 when 63,814 fans were in attendance—231 short of a sellout.

TOP 10 EDWARDS STADIUM CROWD

In 2009. BYU hosted two of the top-ten crowds since LaVell Edwards Stadium was modified in 2003. The crowd of 64,641 at the TCU game ranks third, ranking behind the crowd of 65,251 for the 2004 game against Notre Dame and the 64,749 in attendance for the 2007 Utah game. The Cougars' overtime contest against Utah last season is currently tenth with 64,301 fans attending the game.

HOME BOYS

A majority of the BYU two-deep includes athletes who grew up in hometowns just a few miles from Provo. Wide receiver Luke Ashworth and offensive linemen brothers Matt and Houston Reynolds even went to high school in Provo at Timpview High. Others from Utah County include left guard Ryan Freeman from Orem, tight end Richard Wilson from Spanish Fork and fullback Zed Mendenhall from Alpine.

Other Utahns on the depth chart include left guard Braden Hansen from Sandy, right guard Jason Speredon from West Valley City, right tackle Braden Brown and running back Mike Hague from Salt Lake City, quarterback Riley Nelson from Logan and running back Bryan Kariya from Kaysville.

HE'S GOT YOUR BACK

BYU starting offensive lineman Matt Reynolds enters the year as a preseason All-American after being named to the All-MWC First Team and College Football News All-Sophomore Team First Team. A Lombardi and Outland Trophy candidate, the 6-foo-6, 322-pound junior has started every game for the Cougars the past two years and was named a team captain coming into 2010.

BEHIND THE LINE

The Cougar offensive line was one of the best in the country in 2009, ranking eighth in the nation in tackles for loss allowed while protecting the backfield enough to give BYU the best conversion percentage on third down in the nation.

TALE OF THE

BYU's starting five offensive linemen weigh in at an average 306 pounds and average 6-feet-5.

BYU PLANS TO UTILIZE TWO QBS IN 2010

PROVO, Utah (Aug. 27, 2010) — BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall announced that the Cougars plan to utilize a two-quarterback system in 2010 featuring junior Riley Nelson and freshman Jake Heaps.

"We plan on playing both Riley and Jake at quarterback and feel both will be effective leading our team," Mendenhall said. "Each is a talented player with a different style, which will pose some difficulties for opposing defenses. Both players are committed to this decision and excited to lead our team."

Nelson appeared in seven games last year as the backup to Max Hall, completing 7-of-10 passes and one touchdown with a strong 186.16 efficiency rating while running for 122 yards (5.8 ypc) and three touchdowns.

Heaps, a true freshman out of Skyline High School in Sammamish, Wash., was ranked the No. 1 high school quarterback in the nation by Scout.com and the top pro-style signal caller by Rivals.com. He led Skyline to three state championships while posting a 40-2 record as a three-year starter.

"I know this will give us an opportunity to have a highly successful season," Nelson said. "Jake and I both have the ability to lead our team and offer unique skills that will help us be successful as an offensive unit. I am excited about this opportunity and fully expect that we will carry on the great tradition and legacy of the quarterback position here at BYU."

"I am 100 percent behind this decision," Heaps said. "I feel the coaches have made the right decision for both Riley and I and this football team. Riley is a great player and I'm excited to have the opportunity to contribute. This isn't about me or him; it's about us—it's about doing what we can to help our team."

2010 COUGAR FOOTBALL DEFENSIVE NOTES

WHERE IN THE USA?

The defensive two-deep hail from all corners of the country. Players hail from Alaska, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Texas and Utah.

WITH EXPERIENCE

BYU's secondary is as deep and talented as any in recent memory. Three of four starters return, including All-MWC strong safety Andrew Rich, SportsIllustrated.com All-America honorable mention Brian Logan and cornerback Brandon Bradley, fourth on the team with 64 tackles last season.

Junior corner Corby Eason and sophomore corner Robbie Buckner also have experience defending the passing game while lettermen Steven Thomas and Travis Uale are also on the two-deep after seeing playing time last season.

On the defensive line, Romney Fuga, Vic So'oto and Matt Putnum return while Jordan Pendleton Brandon Ogletree and Shane Hunter bring experience to the linebacker corp.

A LONG ROAD

Defensive lineman Vic So'oto has come a long way to his spot in the starting lineup after originally joining the team in 2005. So'oto came in to the program as a tight end, playing in 11 games. After redshirting in 2006, So'oto enjoyed a sophomore season in which he saw action in all 13 games at both tight end and on special teams, grabbing 12 receptions for 124 yards.

It was after So'oto's sophomore year that the BYU coaching staff asked So'oto to switch sides of the ball, converting the tight end to a linebacker. Unfortunately, So'oto suffered a season-ending injury in just the second game of the season at Washington. After receiving an extra year of eligibility, So'oto returned in 2009, this time as a defensive lineman, backing up Mountain West Conference career sack leader Jan Jorgensen.

Finally, So'oto is the anticipated starter in BYU's first game of the 2010 season against Washington, the team he last started against playing linebacker in 2008 before sustaining his injury.



RICH GETS RICHER

Starting safety Andrew Rich was named a Preseason All-Mountain West Conference selection at MWC Media Days, joining BYU offensive lineman Matt Reynolds as the only two Cougars named to the team. Rich, a former walk-on after one year at Snow College (Ephraim, UT), enters the 2010 season as a team captain (along with Reynolds) and the top returner in solo tackles, assisted tackles, total tackles and interceptions for BYU.

BACK AS A COUGAR

After starting every game as a freshman in 2007, defensive lineman Eathyn Manumaleuna returns to the Cougars and the starting lineup after serving two years in the Oklahoma Oklahoma City Mission for the LDS Church. Best known for preserving a 17-16 win over UCLA in the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl by blocking a last-second Bruin field goal, Manumaleuna totaled 25 tackles and one sack during his first season.



PAYNE CLOSING IN ON RECORDS

With 59 PATs last season, Payne became the BYU and Mountain West Conference career PATs made leader with 156, surpassing his brother Matt's record of 150 career PATs made.

The senior will look to pass other marks this year. Payne is currently 18 PAT attempts from passing Kurt Gunther's (1980-82) mark of 179 in the BYU record books and seven PAT conversions from jumping Gunther's BYU record in that category. He is also 87 points away from scoring the most points of any Cougar player in BYU history, a record currently held by kicker Owen Pochman (1997-00) with 333 points.

In the MWC record books, Payne is 66 points away from passing his brother for first all-time in career kicking points. Payne kicked the third-most extra points in a season in MWC history in 2009 with 59 PATs. He also holds the MWC record for juniors for most PATs made in a game, converting eight against UNLV in 2009.

MAYBE THIS YEAR

BYU junior O'Neill Chambers returns as the primary kickoff and punt returner for the Cougars. Chambers has yet to return a kick for a touchdown during his career, coming closest on a 97-yard kickoff return against UNLV and a 43-yard punt return against Utah, both career highs. Last season Chambers averaged 25.6 yards per kick return to rank second in the MWC and 34th nationally. Also an All-MWC candidate at wide receiver this year, Chambers ranked 11th in all-purpose yards in the MWC in 2009 at 77.1 yards per game.

HERE COMES THE BOOM

MWC honorable mention honoree Riley Stephenson returns at punter for BYU after a successful freshman campaign. Stephenson is known for his ability to place punts near the goalline, putting eight kicks inside the 20 last season. The sophomore can also boom kicks when needed, totaling eight punts over 50 yards in 2009, including a career-high and BYU bowl game record 60-yard punt against Oregon State in the Las Vegas Bowl.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

BYU has been unable to return a kickoff for a touchdown for 144 consecutive games. Mike Rigell was the last Cougar to accomplish the feat, turning in a 96-yard touchdown in a 31-9 victory at Hawaii on October 17, 1998.

The last time BYU returned a punt for a touchdown was back on Nov. 9, 2006 when freshman McKay Jacobson ran one back 77 yards against Wyoming at Edwards Stadium. Forty-two games have passed since then.

With a 38-28 win over San Diego State on Oct. 17, 2009, the Cougars picked up their sixth win of the season, qualifying for their fifth straight bowl game. BRONCO MENDENHALL SIXTH SEASON

During his five seasons as the head coach at Brigham Young University, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that was coming off three losing seasons. Mendenhall has guided his teams to five straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and consistent national top-25 rankings.

Under his leadership, the Cougars have earned a 49-15 record--the best record of any first-time head coach over the past five seasons and a mark topped by only 11 coaches overall. Mendenhall's .766 wining percentage ranks No. 4 among all active FBS head coaches with at least five years of experience. Mendenhall has led BYU to bowl wins in three of the last four year while achieving a 43-9 record in that span, a ledger topped by only four other teams--Boise State, Florida, Texas and Ohio State. In doing so, the Cougars have achieved four straight seasons with 10 or more wins for the first time in school history.

While recording an 11-2 record and 7-1 league mark, Mendenhall's 2009 team went 3-1 against ranked opponents, incluing a 14-13 season-opening win over No. 3 Oklahoma and a 44-20 season finale Maaco Bowl Las Vegas victory over No. 16 Oregon State. BYU finished No. 12 in the final polls to earn its highest finish since 1996 and earn the distinction of being one of only six programs nationally to be ranked in both the final polls the past four seasons. At No. 14 in the final 2009 BCS standings, Mendenhall's Cougars are one of just seven programs to finish in the final BCS standings the past four year and the only program to do so from a non-automatic qualifying

the Cougars to back-to-back 11-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents.

In 2008, BYU posted a 10-2 regular season to achieve three straight 10-win seasons for only the third time in school history. In doing so, Mendenhall's teams became the first in Cougar history to go unbeaten at home over three consecutive seasons.

The Cougars have received five straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first five teams to a bowl game.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

In 2007, BYU finished the season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings--three places higher than the 2006 Cougars. In the final polls of the season, BYU finished ranked 14th in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll. Defensively, BYU ranked 9th in the nation, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

In 2008, BYU earned a spot in the national polls each week of the season, including a ranking as high as No. 7. With just two regular-season blemishes on its resume with road losses at No. 6 Utah and No. 11 TCU, BYU earned a No. 16 ranking in the final BCS standings and an invitation to the 2008 Las Vegas Bowl.

> Off the field, BYU has had five Academic All-Amerian citations in the past two seasons. In 2008, only Penn State (4) placed more student-athletes on the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America First Team. Cougar starters David Oswald (offensive tackle), Matt Bauman (linebacker) and Kellen Fowler (safety) each earned the high honor as BYU had three first-teamers for the first time during the same season. In 2009, Scott Johnson earned first-team honors and Bauman was a second-team selection.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85, winning the NJCAA National Championship and earning first-team all-conference, all-region, secondteam NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Montana. The couple has three sons.
