Season Outlook

Ladell Andersen's smile is a little bigger this year than it has been the last two basketball seasons.

That's because, unlike the two previous campaigns, Ladell has a group of veterans returning from last year's 18-14 team that contended for the Western Athletic Conference championship and reached the quarterfinals of the National Invitational Tournament. Plus, he will be on the receiving end of the LDS missionary program instead of being a major contributor, as he has been the two previous years.

Returning this year are four starters from the 1985–86 squad, in addition to three other players who started at one time or another before serving two-year LDS missions. In all,

10 lettermen will be suiting up with the Cougars.

A pair of second team All-WAC selections, forward Jeff Chatman and guard Bob Capener, head the list of returnees. Chatman, a 6-6 junior, averaged 17.5 points and 5.2 rebounds per game last year. His .545 field goal percentage was best on the team.

Capener was close behind Chatman, averaging 14.9 points per game and handing out an average of 3.25 assists per game. Although normally a shooting guard, Capener was moved to point guard last year. This year, he likely will return to his normal position and should benefit from the new three-point rule because of his excellent outside shooting.

Another key figure on last year's team, which at one point won 12 consecutive games, was center Tom Gneiting. The 6-10 postman was a dominating force during the second half of the season and finished the year earning honorable mention All-WAC honors. He averaged 8.6 points and 7.4 re-

bounds per game.

The only player to start all 32 games last year was 6-9 forward Brent Stephenson. The junior college transfer provided quickness to the front line. He averaged 6.5 points and 4.1 rebounds while averaging slightly more than 22 minutes of playing time per game.

Other key reserves who are returning this year include forward Greg Humphreys (4.3 points and 3.4 rebounds per game) and guard Brent Wade (1.9 points per game).

Returned missionaries who will be rejoining the team this year include 6-9 center Jim Usevitch, 6-91/2 forward Mike Smith, 6-5 guard Brian Taylor, 6-6 forward Alan Astle and 6-2

guard Marty Haws.

Of the returned missionaries, Usevitch, Smith and Taylor have starting experience at BYU. Usevitch, a junior, was BYU's starting center when the Cougars advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament in 1984. He was called "the best center in the WAC" by Andersen after he scored 25 points, blocked five shots and had 11 rebounds against UTEP that year.

Smith, a former national high school athlete-of-the-year, grew an inch on his mission. He started at forward for BYU during much of his freshman year, averaging 8.0 points and 5.3 rebounds per game. He is an excellent passer and outside

shooter.

Taylor will give BYU additional strength at the big guard position. The junior also has excellent passing and shooting skills. He averaged 2.7 points per game his sophomore season.

Marty Haws redshirted before leaving on a mission to Florida. Although only a freshman, he likely will figure heavily into BYU's plans this year. The former Utah state sprint and long

jump champion will add needed quickness to BYU's guard line. Haws played for the gold-medal-winning West squad at the U.S. Olympic Festival this summer, despite having returned from a mission only weeks earlier.

Ladell obviously looked for help at the guard line while recruiting last year. All three new recruits are are backcourt players. Nathan Call, a 6-0 point guard out of Mission Viejo, Calif., is the most heralded of the recruits. One organization chose him as the outstanding high school athlete in Southern California last year. Also signed were two local athletes—Todd Gentry, a 6-5 guard from Orem, Utah, and David Reeves, a 6-3 Provo native.

This will be the tallest team Andersen has had in his 13 years of coaching on the collegiate level. Also, it could be one of the deepest. While he has had to plug holes in the lineup the last few years, Ladell will have talented players coming off the bench this season.

With Andersen's philosophy, a starting assignment is not as important as the number of minutes an athlete plays during the game. Occasionally, a backup player will see more action than the player who "starts." How well the players accept their roles this year could be a key to the success of this year's team.

Even with experienced players returning, BYU could have difficulty early in the year because of a tough schedule. After an exhibition game with the Yugoslavian National team, BYU plays in the preseason National Invitational Tournament against Oklahoma at Norman. If they win that game, the Cougars will advance through the nine-day tournament until they lose or reach the championship game in Madison Square Garden.

Following the NIT, BYU hosts Utah State before going on the road to face tough Notre Dame and Iowa teams. Other non-conference teams on BYU's schedule include Weber State, Oral Roberts, Pittsburgh and Southwest Missouri State. BYU will play in three tournaments this year. In addition to the NIT, BYU will host the 13th Cougar Classic, which features Arizona State, Texas Christian and Cal-Fullerton. Plus, BYU will join Michigan State, Wake Forest and Santa Clara in the 20th Cable Car Classic.

Ladell's Views

Question: Unlike the last couple of years, you have a solid nucleus of players returning this season. Will you approach this year differently from a coaching standpoint than you have in the past?

Answer: Yes, because of the three-point play. We will have to approach the game differently than in the past and give more credit to the outside shooting ability of our players, as well as keeping a strong inside attack, which I think will be the basis of any good offensive approach.

Question: Five players are returning from LDS missions. How will they fit into the team picture?

Answer: We're counting heavily on our returning missionaries to give us more depth, more height and more quickness in the lineup.

Question: Bob Capener was moved to point guard last year. Will he stay there, or will you move him to the off-guard position?

Answer: Capener had an excellent year last year playing mostly point guard, and I think you can look to see him at either position. But I think his best strength is the off-guard position.

Question: The NCAA has added the three-point shot this season. How will it affect (a) your coaching strategy and (b) this year's team.

Answer: It definitely changes your approach somewhat to give more credit to the outside attack than we have in the past. And I believe this year's team has some good outside shooters to go along with a good inside game.


Question: This year you are blessed with four returning starters, plus three more players who started before they left on missions. What is your philosophy about "the starting five" as opposed to the number of minutes a player is on the court?

Answer: I have never stressed starting fives being more important than the entire squad. Starting fives are well-liked by the news media, and even some parents feel like that is very important. In order to have a good team effort, we must de-emphasize the importance of starting and emphasize the importance of how you play. It never will be how much you play; it will be how you play during the time you are in the ballgame. We feel this is the best philosophy. I normally play eight to nine players regularly.

Question: Will you consider redshirting any of your returned missionaries?

Answer: That question will have to be answered later in our practice season. It's always a consideration on any squad, however.

Question: What do you feel are the strengths of this year's team?



Mike Smith is one of five returned missionaries who rejoined the team after a two-year absence. Three were former starters.

Answer: I think the strengths will be depth and a good percentage shooting team, as well as a more experienced team than we've had in the past.

Question: What are the weaknesses?

Answer: Overall lack of speed and quickness. And we'll have to offset that with good work habits and great anticipation

Question: How do you picture the WAC race this year?

Answer: As always, I think there will be three to four teams that will crystallize halfway through the year. And it'll be a dog fight going down the wire.


Question: Evaluate this year's overall schedule.

Answer: This year's team may be better than any team since I've been head coach, and that team will admirably match a very good schedule.

Ladell Andersen, Head Coach



Winning seasons and post-season success have become synonomous with BYU head basketball coach Ladell Andersen, Consider:

*In 13 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Ladell has produced 11 teams with winning records and seven teams with 20 wins or more. In eight of those seasons, Andersen's teams have gone on to post-season play.

*This past summer, Ladell coached the West squad to the gold medal at the U.S. Olympic Festival in Houston. It was the

West's first championship ever.

*In ten years as head coach at Utah State University, Andersen became the winningest coach in Aggie history with a 176-95 (.649) record.

*As head coach of the Utah Stars in the American Basketball Association (ABA), Andersen compiled the best two-year mark in ABA history 115-53 (.685), and his Stars won the Western Division championship twice.

Indeed, Ladell is well acquainted with basketball success, and this comes as no suprise to those who are familiar with the 57-year-old's career. For years, Andersen has known what it takes to be a successful basketball player at any level.

Almost 40 years ago, Ladell began his career in college basketball at Utah State on a make-good scholarship. Not content with simply making the starting five, he went on to become a two-time All-Skyline selection at guard.

In 1951, Ladell graduated from Utah State and went on to play basketball in the Army while he was stationed at Sandia, New Mexico. In his two years there, Andersen accumulated more honors as he was selected All-Fourth Army and All-Service. In 1952, he played in the Olympic playoffs at Madison Square Garden.

After Army ball, Ladell went on to play with the Denver Bankers of the National Industrial League and was named All-League twice before he retired as a player and took up coaching at the University of Utah in 1956.

Andersen's first coaching experience came as an assisant to Ute head basketball coach Jack Gardner. In addition to his basketball duties, Ladell coached the Ute golf team. He is a scratch golfer with a handicap that has been as low as two. After five years at the Salt Lake school, Andersen got his first crack at head coaching at Utah State in 1961.

For 10 years, Andersen sat at the head of the Utah State bench and coached Aggie greats such as Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts, Nate Williams and Shaler Halimon while becoming Utah State's all-time winningest coach. His Aggie teams competed in five NCAA tournaments and one NIT

In 1971, Andersen moved to the professional ranks and coached the ABA's Stars. In addition to winning two division championships, Ladell also was asked to coach the ABA all-stars twice. After the 1972–73 season, Ladell accepted Utah State's athletic directorship. At that point in time, it looked as if Andersen's outstanding coaching career was over.

During the next 10 years, Andersen still managed to make his mark on basketball. As the Aggie A.D., he championed Utah State's admission into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. And for five years during that span, he also served on the important NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee. One of those years, all four major Division I teams in the state (BYU, Utah, Utah State and Weber State) were selected in the 40-team field. The state of Utah represented the best basketball played in the country.

But Andersen missed coaching, and when BYU went looking for a replacement for Frank Arnold in 1983, Ladell answered the call. In April of that year, he was named BYU's 12th head basketball coach.

In three years as the Cougar mentor, Andersen has posted three winning seasons, and two of his teams have gone on to post-season play. His record at BYU is 53-39.

He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches' Board of Directors and serves as chairman of the prestigious All-America committee. Andersen, the originator of summer basketball camps in the Rocky Mountain area, still runs his own camp each summer at BYU.

Ladell and his wife Donna have five sons, Clint, Larry, Richie, Bob and Jim. They also have 11 grandchildren.

Roger Reid, Assistant Head Coach

Roger Reid came to the BYU basketball program eight years ago and brought with him a wealth of experience both as an athlete and as a coach.

Under coach Ladell Andersen, Roger has been responsible for BYU's defensive schemes. The 39-year-old Reid also has been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since the joined the staff in 1978. He has served as chairman (1980–81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

This year, Roger has been put on the NABC committee to

plan the national convention for the Final Four.

Reid was a star athlete at Springville High School, where he was studentbody vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year. Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball

squad which made the trip to Mexico City.

He later transferred to the College of Eastern Utah, where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and twice was named to the junior college All-America team in that sport. From CEU, he moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations, advancing as far as AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins and 24 losses during that period.

Thoughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the

tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter: Randy, 16; Robbie, 12; Darren, 7; and Kelli Ann, 5.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and also has served on a high council in the LDS Church.



Carl Ingersoll, Assistant Coach

One of the most successful high school coaches in Utah during the 1970s was Carl Ingersoll, who joined the BYU staff

seven years ago.

Carl, 53, built his reputation as a successful coach mainly at American Fork High, where he directed the team for eight years. During his last six years there, Carl's teams reached the championship round of the state tournament four times and won the state title twice (1976 and 1979).

Ingersoll received the *Provo Daily Herald* Coach-of-the-Year award in 1976 and 1979 and also received several awards for his involvement with the Utah Cerebral Palsy

charity program.

After leaving American Fork, he spent a short time at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah, before joining BYU's staff as a graduate teaching assistant in 1980. He was the 1986 recipient of the "Coaches Award," presented by the Utah High School Basketball Coaches Association in appreciation for outstanding service and dedication to youth. The award was presented at the annual high school all-star game.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU in 1958 with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he also was an assistant football coach for sev-

eral seasons.

He played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.


Carl has been involved with Cougar Basketball Camps since 1973 and has also helped in Medalist Clinics. In 1981, he was invited to participate with Kresimire Cosic in a basketball clinic in Yugoslavia, sponsored by Converse.

His father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920's, and at 6-4 was the tallest

Hansen, a former basketball player at Moscow High School in Idaho, is familiar with Andersen's style of coaching. In addition to serving as a graduate assistant coach at BYU last year, Hansen has also worked under Ladell at the BYU sum-


mer basketball camps.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

In his six years as president of Brigham Young University, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland has made "excellence" his byword for all areas of the university.

"We cannot do everything at BYU," President Holland has said. "Perhaps we will not even continue to pursue all of the things we have tried to do in the past. But what we choose to

do, we intend to do superbly well."

That same philosophy carries over to athletics at BYU. "It (athletics) has a legitimate place, and, like everything else in the college experience, if it's going to be done, it should be done well," he says.

During his term as president, Dr. Holland has played an instrumental role in the University's "Excellence in the Eighties" fund-raising campaign, which will be completed Dec. 31,

1986.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a standout performer on the Dixie High School basketball and football teams. He later became captain of the conference-champion

Dixie College basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960–62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The

Viable Years—1835 to 1883."


Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reached more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor or director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.


A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bancorporation, Intermountain Health Care, Inc., all in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He also serves as a vice-president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU). He currently represents the Western Athletic Conference as a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) Presidents' Commission.

President Holland is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Patricia Terry of St. George, Utah. They are the parents of three children, Matthew, Mary Alice and David.





Dean, Athletic Director

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative



Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 13th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for seven years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelors and

masters degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. he was a faculty memeber at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies. including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, and Noteworthy Ameri-

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director



Most of the large strides in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.

Since he assumed the directorship in 1976, the Cougars have claimed 10 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

In 1985, he was inducted into the Utah

Sports Hall of Fame. He also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the BYU baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the world series.

In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1977 Tuckett was president of the American Association of

Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. At the time of his retirement from coaching, he was the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA.

A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine seasons, during which time he returned to the University of Utah to obtain a B.S. degree in 1953.

He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he worked with the football, basketball and baseball teams. In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. In addition to his coaching, Tuckett taught health classes and was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament, only the second time a USA team had won in the tourney's 27-year history. He was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his

athletic director appointment.

Glen has served on the following committees: NCAA Commitee on Committees, NCAA Television Committee, College Football Association Executive Committee, and College Football Association Television Committee.

A popular public speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters; Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



Brigham Young University



The BYU campus covers 631 acres at the base of the 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range.

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23, compared to the national average of 19. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

The J. Reuben Law School, founded just 13 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with it fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

BYU's music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with an unusually extensive course offering, and its large number of faculty researching family issues.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and

has recently devised a new, rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing and mathematics, arts and sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture alongside the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

The Marriott Center



The 22,700-seat Marriott Center.

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is the nation's second-largest on-campus basketball facility. Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger. Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but it is owned by the city of Lexington.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,504 per game. By the end of the 1986–87 season more than four million fans will have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,506, set during the 1980–81 season.

Despite sub-par attendance during the 1985–86 season, BYU still ranked fifth nationally with an average of 16,572 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, Louisville and New Mexico drew more fans than the Cougars.

A three-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also recently acquired a new lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

In the planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus as possible; it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

Western Athletic Conference

As the Western Athletic Conference enters its 24th year, it is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athetic programs of its member institutions. Last year, two WAC teams, UTEP and Utah, were invited to play in the NCAA basketball tournament. BYU, Wyoming and New Mexico were participants in the National Invitational Tournament. Wyoming took second place in the NIT, while BYU reached the quarterfinals.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features. The WAC traditionally ranks in the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. And last year, two WAC schools, New Mexico and BYU, ranked in the top five nationally in per-game attendance. Two other teams, Utah and UTEP, ranked in the top 25 nationally.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the highlights in WAC history was BYU's winning the 1984 National Championship in football.

Based near Denver, Colo., the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Jeff Hurd serves as director of information for the WAC. Mark Hollis is an administrative assistant.



1985-86 Season Summary



One of last year's highlights was an 80-76 overtime victory over Notre Dame. Tom Gneiting had 18 points and 14 rebounds in that game.

Anyone who enjoys rollercoaster rides would have loved the 1985–86 BYU basketball season. The Cougars experienced the gamut of emotions last year, ranging from the high of winning 12 straight games and reaching the quarterfinals of the National Invitational Tournament to the low of losing seven of their first nine games and coming within one game of winning the Western Athletic Conference championship.

Projected to finish sixth in the WAC before the season began, BYU did nothing to disprove the prognosticators early in the year. The Cougars started the season slowly, losing three games before finally defeating Fordham in the Kactus Klassic in Tempe. In the next four games, BYU managed only one more win.

However, an 88-86 overtime win against Weber State seemed to put a spark into the Cougars, and they began to play with renewed enthusiasm as conference play began.

BYU's first conference games were on the road against WAC favorites UTEP and New Mexico. The Cougars took UTEP to overtime, only to lose 69-64. Against New Mexico, BYU again came close but lost 60-57. That was the last defeat the Cougars would experience in nearly seven weeks.

Led by center Tom Gneiting, forward Jeff Chatman and guard Bob Capener, the Cougars reeled off 12 straight victories. Eleven of those were conference wins. The other was an 80-76 overtime upset victory over nationally ranked Notre Dame.

By the middle of February, the Cougars sat atop the Western Athletic Conference heap, having beaten every team in the conference except Wyoming, a team they had to play twice in the last two weeks of the season. Had the Cougars split with Wyoming, they would have been assured at least a share of the regular-season WAC title.

The Cowboys, however, smelled a conference title of their own and defeated BYU 66-56 in Laramie and 65-62 in Provo. Also, BYU lost to Utah near the end of the season to finish fourth in the conference, one game behind WAC tri-champs UTEP, Wyoming and Utah.

With the WAC post-season tournament, BYU still had one last chance to reach the NCAA tournament. But New Mexico upended the Cougars, 79-68, in Laramie to stiffle any further hopes of the Cougars going to the NCAA party.

New life was breathed into the Cougars, however, when BYU received an invitation to play in the post-season NIT. Southern Methodist visited the Marriott Center in the first round and lost 67-63 to the Cougars. In the second round, BYU played a powerful Cal-Irvine team and again came out ahead, 93-80.

The quarterfinal matchup featured BYU against Ohio State. The game was played in Columbus, and BYU dropped its last game of the season, 79-68.

Overall, there were many standout performers for BYU. Chatman was named to the first team All-District 7 squad and to the All-WAC second team after averaging 17.5 points and 5.2 rebounds per game. He also was the Cougars' best field goal percentage shooter with a .545 average.

Capener, a true big guard, switched to point guard and averaged 14.9 points per game, mainly on long-range jump shots. He, too, was a second team All-WAC selection and twice was named WAC player-of-the-week.

One of the key performers in the Cougar attack was Gneiting. The 6-10 center started the season slowly and was benched after a couple of games. Midway through the season, however, he replaced an ailing Alan Pollard and began to tear up the opposition. He pulled down double-figure rebounds in six straight games when the Cougars started their win streak. As Gneiting went, so went the Cougars.

Even Coach Ladell Andersen was in on the awards at the end of the season, being named District 7 coach-of-the-year for his part in turning the Cougars around and producing an 18-14 season, despite predictions that BYU's record would be much worse.

Cougar Basketball History



Former BYU Coach Stan Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame this year. He won 372 games at BYU from 1950-72.

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders

and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921-25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon

and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel

Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of

Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sellout crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.

Since the opening of the Marriott Center, four coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972-75) and Frank Arnold (1976-83).

Three years ago, the Ladell Andersen era began at BYU. The veteran coach left the athletic directorship at Utah State to become the 12th coach at BYU.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge and Devin Durrant. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country.





Press passes will be issued on an individual game basis and requests must be received in the Sports Information Office no later than three days before the game.


Game Statistics
