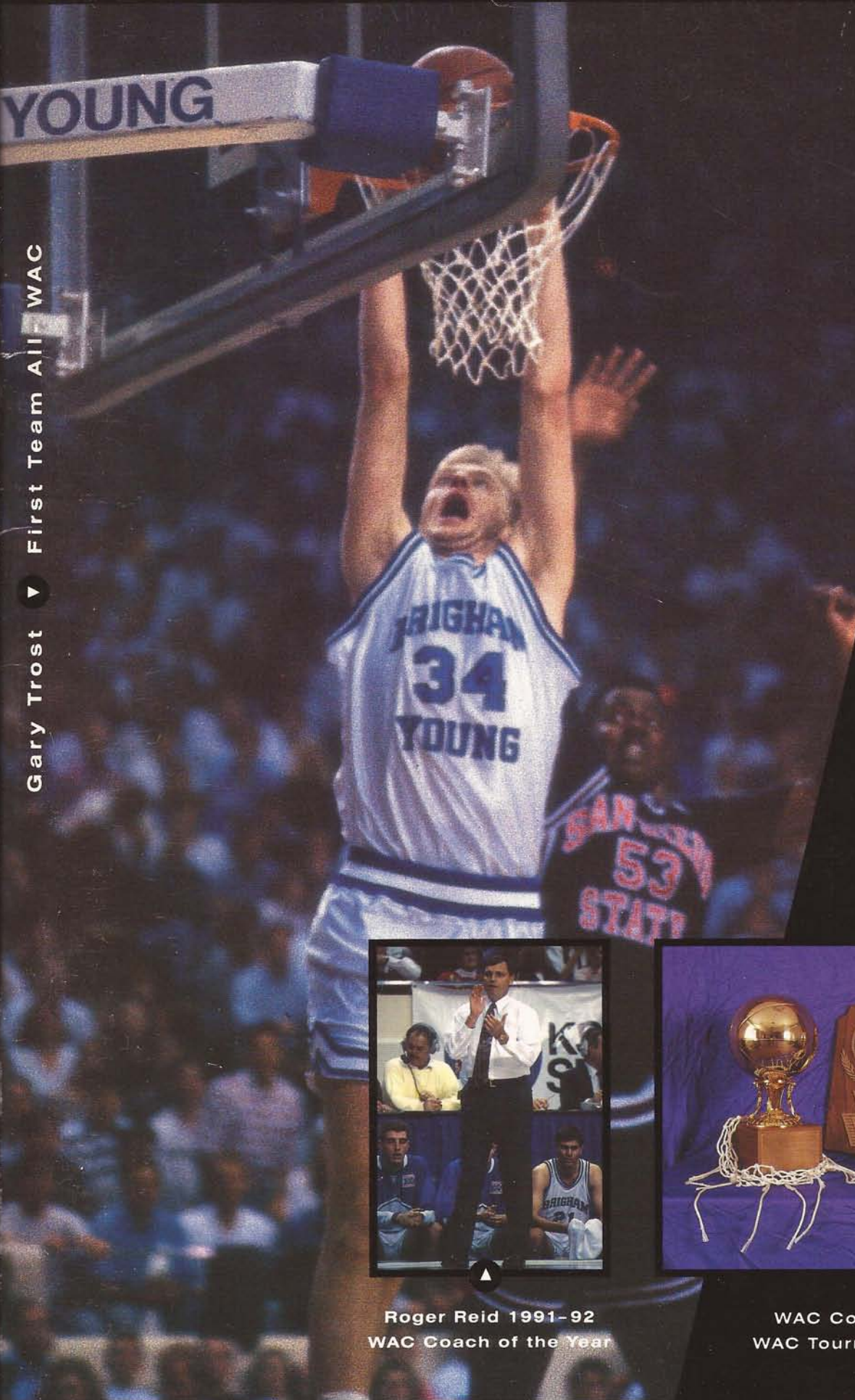
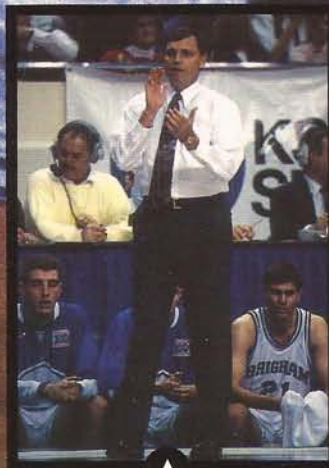

Head Coach: Roger Reid (Weber State '68) in 15th season at BYU, 4th as head coach, 67-29 (.698) record in three years at BYU.

Assistant Coach: Tony Ingle (Huntingdon '76) was head coach at Alabama-Huntsville (Division II) and Gordon College (NAIA), 4th year at BYU.

Assistant Coach: Charles Bradley (Wyoming '81) has been an assistant one year at Wyoming and two years at San Diego State, 4th year at BYU.

Part-time Coach: Jeff Reinert (Gonzaga '85) spent two years at Nebraska as a graduate assistant, 2nd year at BYU.

Season Outlook

Roger Reid begins his fourth season as head coach at BYU in an unfamiliar position--he's listed among the favorites in virtually every pre-season publication.

In 1990, he took a team picked sixth and tied for the Western Athletic Conference title. In 1991, he was picked fifth but placed second and won the WAC Tournament. Last season, he was picked fourth and tied for the championship and won the league tournament again.

And in each of those years he had only one starter returning. This time around the entire front line returns although a stress fracture to **Kevin Nixon's** foot is a concern.

Anchoring the 1992-93 Cougars is 6-10 All-WAC center **Gary Trost**, the leading scorer (14.2) and rebounder (6.6) from last year.

"We have good strength and depth on the front line but Gary needs to have another great year," says Coach Reid. "We're counting on him for leadership."

Jared Miller, the 6-8 muscle man who came into his own after two years of knee problems, will be at one forward. Nixon, the 6-8 offensive whiz who won the WAC championship game with a shot from back-court at the buzzer, was second in scoring (10.9.)

Without him at the start of the season, the Cougars will turn to 6-10 **Russell Larson**, who averaged 9.9 points and 5.1 rebounds coming off the bench last year. He was the WAC Freshman of the Year and BYU had hoped to use him in the same role off the bench.

Backup players who have been impressive in spot duty are 6-9 **David Astle**, 6-8 **John Fish** and 6-8 **Shane Knight**. The Cougars also are excited about the return of 6-7 **Mark Durrant** from a church mission and the presence of burly 6-7 freshman **Tony Woods**.

Durrant started during the WAC season as a freshman in 1989-90 and Woods was highly recruited.

But for all the talent and depth on the front line, the guard line is a question mark. The two missing starters, Nathan Call and Mark Heslop, were excellent shooters. Call set a school assist record and was the league's top three-point shooter. His defense was superb and he was the floor general.

Nick Sanderson, who finished third in scoring (10.4) coming off the bench, is a leaper who will move into a starting role.

An excellent athlete, the 6-4 senior sparked last year's comeback which nearly nipped Michigan.

Beside him will be one of two freshmen recently returned from church missions--6-2 **Randy Reid** and 6-4 **Ryan Cuff**. **Kurt Christensen**, a hustling six-footer, also could figure in the rotation.

The two freshmen are among the most highly recruited high school players to come out of the state of Utah but neither has played a minute of college ball.

Reid, the coach's son, red-shirted and Cuff didn't attend college prior to his two-year missionary assignment.

In other years, he would be a redshirt candidate but the Cougars don't have that luxury this time around.

Both are hard workers and good shooters who averaged nearly 30 points in high school. How soon they adjust to the next level will

determine whether BYU can match last year's 25-7 record.

"We should be a good rebounding team," analyzes Reid. "But we have to play good defense and our guys have to be hungry. It's not the talent you have--it's what you do with it. We have one of our toughest schedules ever and someone saying you're good doesn't translate into any victories.

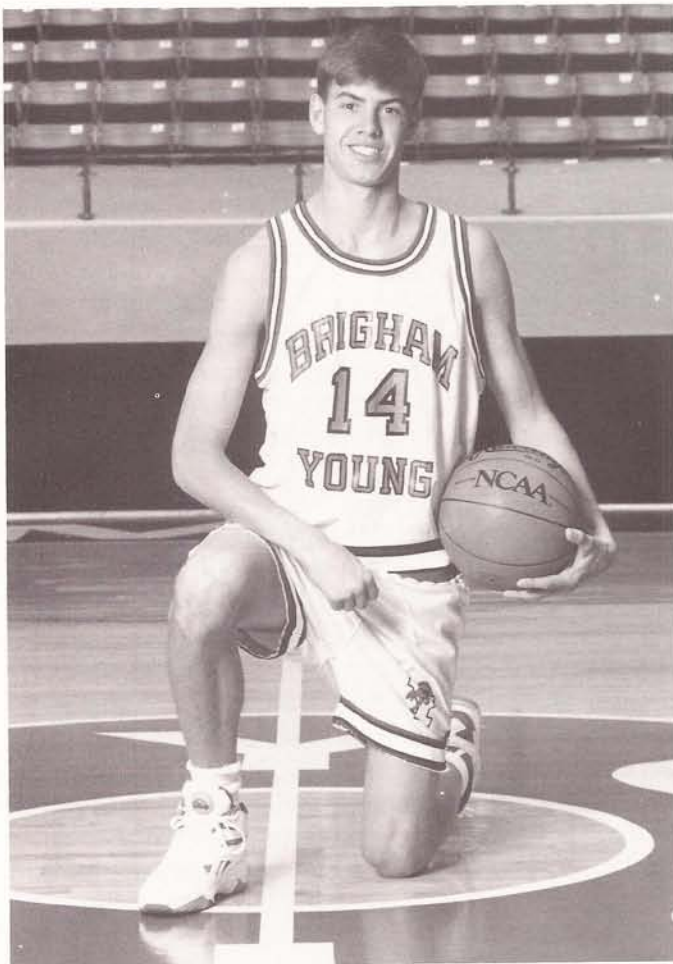
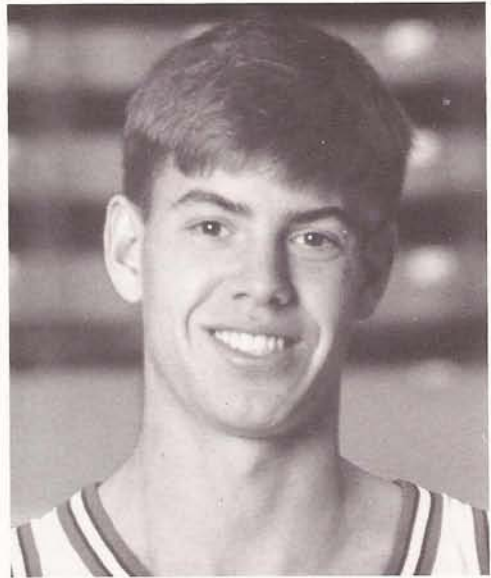
"Another thing we know is that with our winning traditions and great fan support (fifth nationally in attendance last year), whether we're picked sixth or first, people still want to beat us.

"The guys have worked hard and we're excited about the season. It's hard to overestimate the loss of a Nate Call but I think our young guards are going to surprise people."

Reid thinks Utah is the WAC team to beat with 1991 Player of the Year Josh Grant back from knee surgery. He calls Colorado State a "sleeper" and thinks Hawaii, New Mexico and Texas-El Paso return enough talent to challenge for the title.

Head Coach Roger Reid



Roger Reid enters his fourth season with a veteran front line and is one of the conference favorites after surprising the league with teams not picked anywhere near the top.

In three seasons he has a share of two Western Athletic Conference titles and a second-place finish along with two WAC Tournament Championships.

After becoming the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989, he promptly went out and won 21 games (21-9, 11-5) with a 6-7 center.

He took a team picked sixth and tied for the WAC title. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of the Year.

His team set a school record for three-point shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 to watch a 15-0 season.

Only an errant alley-oop shot in the final seconds kept the Cougars from upsetting heavily favored Clemson in the NCAA Tournament.

And, if all that wasn't enough, Coach Reid and his able assistants had one of the country's top recruiting classes, led by 7-6 Shawn Bradley.

Bradley was named to the nation's All-Freshman Team and set a frosh record for blocked shots with 5.2. He was MVP of the WAC Tournament, which BYU won for the first time ever.

Coach Reid's team--picked fifth in the WAC--finished second (21-13, 11-5) and then defeated Virginia in the NCAA Tournament.

Last year he took a team picked fourth and went 25-7 (12-4). It took the NBA's first pick, Shaquille O'Neal, and his LSU teammates to oust the Cougars from the NCAA Tournament. Once again he was WAC and District Coach of the Year.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978 after five losing seasons. His first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four titles.

The 45-year-old Reid worked under Frank Arnold five seasons and six under Ladell Andersen.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics in Australia. Roger has been on the NABC committee to plan the national convention as well as on the Awards Committee. He also is the WAC representative on a new committee to interface with the NABC.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game.

Reid enrolled at BYU (1964) and played freshman basketball and baseball. In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to the College of Eastern Utah, where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and was named a JC All-American.

Reid moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also was all-conference in baseball two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves farm systems, advancing to AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And his baseball teams were 35-11.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield (Utah) High. He took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. His Clearfield record was 60-24.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have three sons and a daughter: Randy, 21, who redshirted in 1990 and is back from a church mission; Robbie, 18, a basketball and baseball star at Spanish Fork High; Darren, 12; and Kelli Ann, 10.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced but it hasn't slowed him--or his success--a bit.

Assistant Coach Tony Ingle

Tony L. Ingle came to the Cougars in 1989 after a year at Alabama-Huntsville and says there is only one reason he gave up a head coaching job to be an assistant--Roger Reid.

"There is nobody else I could be an assistant coach for on the collegiate level. Roger and I have the same values. I understand where he's coming from and he understands where I am coming from. I really put a lot of faith in Roger and the BYU program."

Their friendship started in Atlanta at the NCAA Regional in 1981, when they met the day Danny Ainge made the winning basket against Notre Dame.

Ingle was born June 11, 1952, in Dalton, Georgia. He graduated from North Whitfield High School there.

At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards.

The 1971-72 team won 34 straight games and was ranked as high as second in the NJCAA polls. The 1972-73 team was ranked as high as fifth. In those two years his teams had a 61-10 record.

Transferring to Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain for two years. He received a degree in physical education (1976) with a minor in biology and in 1980 earned a master's degree (P.E.) at North Georgia College.

He returned to his old high school in Dalton in 1976 as an assistant. By then it had been renamed Northwest Whitfield.

Ingle went to Southeast Whitfield for a year as head coach before moving to Cherokee High (Canton, Ga.), where he was 107-47 in seven seasons from 1978-85. He was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985-88) as head coach at Gordon Junior College (Barnesville, Ga.), he was 60-33. His teams scored more than 100 points 23 times and made the state playoffs each year.

After going 18-11, 21-10 and 21-12 and being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club JC Coach of the Year in 1988, he moved to Alabama-Huntsville.

His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.

Ingle has directed two dozen basketball camps in recent years and had worked at the BYU camp several times prior to becoming a Cougar coach.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (17), Sunshine (14), Golden (11), Tony, Jr. (10), and Israel (8). The Ingles recently moved from Spanish Fork to a new home in Orem.

The children have performed basketball dribbling and ball-handling routines as the "Little Nuggets" at haltime shows for a number of NBA games.

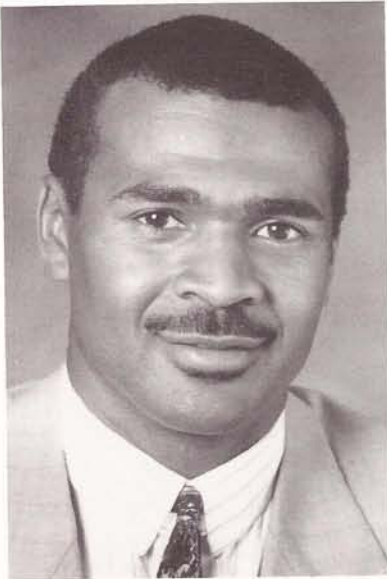
They also have a half-hour video tape (Dribbling to Dreams) on basketball skills.

"The Little Nuggets have retired," Tony explains about his family's entertainment activities. "The demands of recruiting and of our schedule made it too hard to be flying around the country doing halftimes."

A comedian who could rival successful nightclub performers if he weren't so committed to coaching, Ingle jokes about a lot of things but he's serious about the Little Nuggets--and about BYU's recruiting.



Assistant Coach Charles Bradley



It's no wonder Charles Bradley is such a hit at BYU. It was like he always had been a part of Cougar basketball.

The former first-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics played four years at Wyoming (1977-81), coached a year for the Cowboys (1986-87) and coached two years at San Diego State (1987-89).

Add several years helping at the BYU's

summer basketball camps and Bradley feels right at home in the Marriott Center.

"We have one of the fine basketball coaches in the area in Charles Bradley," says Coach Roger Reid. "He's a great addition to our program and he understands what it takes. Charles is a great asset to Cougar basketball."

Charles W. Bradley was born May 16, 1959, in Havre de Grace, Maryland, and graduated from Edgewood (Maryland) High in 1977.

By his senior year at Wyoming in 1981 he was 6-5, 215 pounds and earned All-America and Academic All-America honors. He was MVP at the Pizza Hut All-Star Game after earning All-WAC honors three times.

A four-year starter who averaged 17 points and shot 53 percent from the field, Bradley earned a B.A. degree in elementary education in 1981 and received a teacher's certificate but went on to professional basketball instead.

He spent two years with the Boston Celtics and one with the Seattle Supersonics. He also spent some time with the Wyoming Wildcatters (Casper) of the Continental Basketball Association.

Charles and his wife, Suzanne, settled in Denver after their marriage in 1984 and he coached the freshman team at Mullen High School for a year and was involved in sales and marketing for Pizza Hut.

In 1986, Jim Brandenburg hired Bradley as an assistant at Wyoming. The Cowboys won the WAC Tournament and had an overall 24-10 record. They defeated Virginia and UCLA before bowing to top-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas in NCAA regional action.

Bradley went to San Diego State with Brandenburg in 1987 and his recruits helped turn a 5-25 team to one which went 12-17 and upset nationally ranked BYU.

When Coach Reid was appointed, he contacted Bradley about becoming the first assistant ever to coach at three WAC schools.

"I've always been impressed by the BYU players, fans and people in the community," says Bradley. "The University has a great basketball tradition and I enjoy working with Coach Reid and Coach Ingle."

Charles' older brother, Dudley, starred at North Carolina and played for the Atlanta Hawks.

The Bradleys have three daughters: Taryn, 6, Alexa, 4 and Brynn, who will be two in January. They reside in Orem.

Charles currently serves on the NABC Assistant Coaches' Committee. He also is an avid jogger and biker in the Provo area and enjoys golf.

Chad Bunn, a native of Richmond, Utah, is the video specialist and is executive secretary of the National Video Coordinators Association. A 1989 BYU graduate (communications), he is pursuing a master's degree in that area.



This will be his third season involved with basketball although he was a football manager during his undergraduate days. He and his wife, Lorie, have a two-year-old daughter, Elisha.

Chris Boettcher is in his fourth year as a manager. He is majoring in mathematics. The Weiser, Idaho, native served an LDS mission in Japan. His wife's name is Cinthya.



Bryan Piggott is in his second season with basketball. He attended Bountiful (Utah) High and served a mission to Portugal. Bryan will graduate in April with an accounting degree. He and his wife, Kristen, have a year-old daughter, Lauren.



Kent Crossley and **Kent Orton** are the student trainers. Crossley was a trainer at Provo High during the fall while Orton was at Mountain View High in Orem. Crossley's wife's name is Kirstin, and he is from Soda Springs, Idaho. Orton is from Provo and served a mission in Michigan. He and his wife, Lorna, have a two-year-old daughter, Kami.

President Rex. E. Lee

Perhaps the best example of President Rex E. Lee's national reputation came in 1991 when he was asked to chair a committee to review the NCAA's rules enforcement and infractions process. Among those serving under him is Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice of the United States.

Lee, 57, a former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989. He was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–1976, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division.

Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law



Institute. In late April, 1990, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.

The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School

teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Lee married Janet Griffin in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple in 1959. They have seven children and six grandchildren.

R. J. Snow, Student Life Vice President

R. J. Snow is in his third year as Student Life Vice President at BYU. He accepted the position after returning from the South Africa Johannesburg Mission where he served as mission president from 1987–1990.

Before his mission call, Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984–1987. Prior to that, he served for nearly a decade as the vice president of university and student relations at the University of Utah.

He also served as director of the Robert H. Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Snow received his associate of science degree from Dixie College in 1957. He then enrolled at the University of Utah where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Snow continued his education at Northwestern, where he completed his doctoral degree (1965) in political science.



In 1967, Snow moved to California where he served on the political science faculty for the University of California, Santa Barbara, until 1973.

Snow has also completed post-doctoral work at the University of Oregon, Harvard University and has worked with the University of Pau and the University of Bordeaux as part of a UC Santa Barbara study abroad program.

Snow has been very active in civic and community service having served on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as board member of the Utah Symphony and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service on more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations include board membership of the Salt Lake United Way, and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

Born in Cedar City as Reuben Joseph Snow on Oct. 15, 1937, he and his family moved to St. George when he was six months old. In 1962, he married the former Marilyn Melville in the St. George Temple. They have four children, two of them married.

Faculty Rep., Ath. Director

Clayne R. Jensen, Associate Vice President

Dr. Clayne Jensen served 18 years as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompassed BYU athletics.

In the summer of 1991, he was elevated to a new post of Associate Vice President-Student Life. He oversees men's and women's athletics and has been the Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976.

A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen was a Professor and Associate Dean seven years and chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board nine years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at



Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award.

He is author or co-author of 17 books, most of which remain in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields.

The former dean served as U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has served on numerous committees of the NCAA, and is a former member of the governing council of that organization. Also, he is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, Noteworthy Americans and 2000 Outstanding Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and was selected to the Western International League all-star team in 1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.

In 1959 he became head baseball and an assistant football coach at BYU. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award. A popular speaker, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 U.S. team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in 27 years.



In 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 13 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

He was president of the Association of Baseball Coaches (1977) and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame (1979).

He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee and the College Football Association Television Committee. Tuckett serves on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee and has been on the NCAA Baseball Tournament Committee.

In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame and also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Athletic Personnel

Pete Witbeck, Asso. AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics for 43 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team.

While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and was nationally ranked.

He has been the right hand to the athletic director since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, an elementary school principal. They have three children.

Mike King, Asst. to AD-Finance



Mike King has been the Cougars' business manager for 13 years and became an assistant AD in 1989. He came to BYU from BYU-Hawaii, where he was controller and director of financial services.

King was athletic business manager at Idaho State from 1974-78 and managed the ISU Minidome from 1970-74.



He received a B.A. degree at Idaho State in 1970. Mike, an LDS bishop at BYU, is married to the former Jeannette Bertoch, and they have four children.

Val Hale, Asst. to AD-Public Relations

Val Hale is in his fourth year as assistant to the athletic director for public and media relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the Sports Information operation and coordinating public relations, marketing and promotional efforts.

Hale has been assistant director of BYU Development, where he supervised and managed fundraising efforts in several clubs and academic areas. He was promotions and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982 through 1987.

He was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981 and received his M.A. degree in communications in 1987. Val and his wife, the former Nancy Allred, have three children. He serves as an LDS bishop in Orem.

Ralph Zobell, Sports Info. Dir.

Ralph Zobell is in his fourth year directing efforts to publicize the Cougars nationally and coordinating news releases, statistics and media visitors. 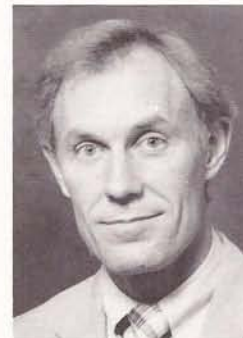

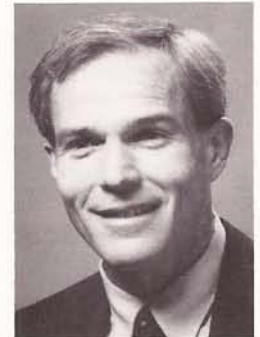

Western Athletic Conference



Now in its fourth decade (31 years), the Western Athletic Conference is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of the member institutions. In 1991-92 it also began competition for women.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyoming, to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's 10 members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks with the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked fifth nationally in per-game attendance, New Mexico 11th, and Utah 16th.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State joined the Pac-10. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy joined in 1980. Fresno State became the 10th member in 1992.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Margie McDonald, formerly in charge of the High Country Athletic Conference, is the deputy commissioner. Jeff Hurd serves as associate commissioner, while Dee Anne Menzies and Mark Hollis are assistant commissioners. Dan Willis is assistant director of media relations. Guy Gibbs is supervisor of basketball officials.

The office is located at 14 West Dry Creek Circle, Littleton, Colorado 80120. The telephone number for the WAC office is (303) 795-1962. The WAC office has been in the Denver area since the conference's beginning, with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix, Arizona, from 1964-66.

BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of more than 4,000 makes it twice as large as any other booster organization in the league.

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and pre-season basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at an annual banquet and with an Athletic Hall of Fame.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. In return, contributors receive passes for parking, football and basketball yearbooks, monthly newsletters and other benefits.

The executive director since 1975 has been Dale McCann, a business management graduate of BYU (1966). He attended West High in Salt Lake City and worked for General Dynamics and at Signetics prior to his current job. He is married to the former Andrea Schmidt and they have 10 children.

KSL and the Cougars

The BYU Athletic Department and KSL Radio and Television entered into an agreement in 1991 to market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events.

The agreement is designed to help advertisers reach BYU's large sports audience via electronic media and in-arena promotions.

Under the arrangement, sponsors may contact a single source, KSL/BYU Sports, for advertising opportunities associated with BYU athletic events.

Advertisers may purchase packages which include television and radio exposure, as well as opportunities for in-arena exposure.

KSL-TV

KSL Television, the CBS affiliate in Salt Lake City, has televised a number of BYU basketball games in recent years.

Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of the University of Kansas, provides play-by-play for the fans.

Color commentary is provided by Jay Cheesman, who played center for the Cougars from 1974-77. He was All-WAC in 1976 and earned second team all-conference honors in 1977.

The sports director is Doug Miller.

KSL Radio

For more than 41 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 42 years' experience. An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. This is his 28th season doing BYU games.

Paul Ruffner, BYU's center from 1968-70, provides the color commentary. He was second team All-WAC in 1969. The next season he had 37 points and 18 rebounds in a game against Georgia.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar basketball. Some away games are carried live and all home games are shown at 10:30 p.m. by Channel 11. The play-by-play announcer is radio veteran Jay Mosen, BYU's electronic media coordinator for the athletic department, and commentary is provided by former BYU All-American Tom Steinke, now the athletic director at Westminster college.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS Sports, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel and local affiliates of national networks.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals for demanding standards.

Traveling with an experienced team of engineers and technicians, the KBYU truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with state-of-the-art cameras, long lenses, one-inch and 3/4-inch tape machines, video monitoring, special effects, Chyron graphics and a complete internal communication system.

Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. Earlier this year, BYU joined the top 10 rankings for National Merit Scholars in attendance.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

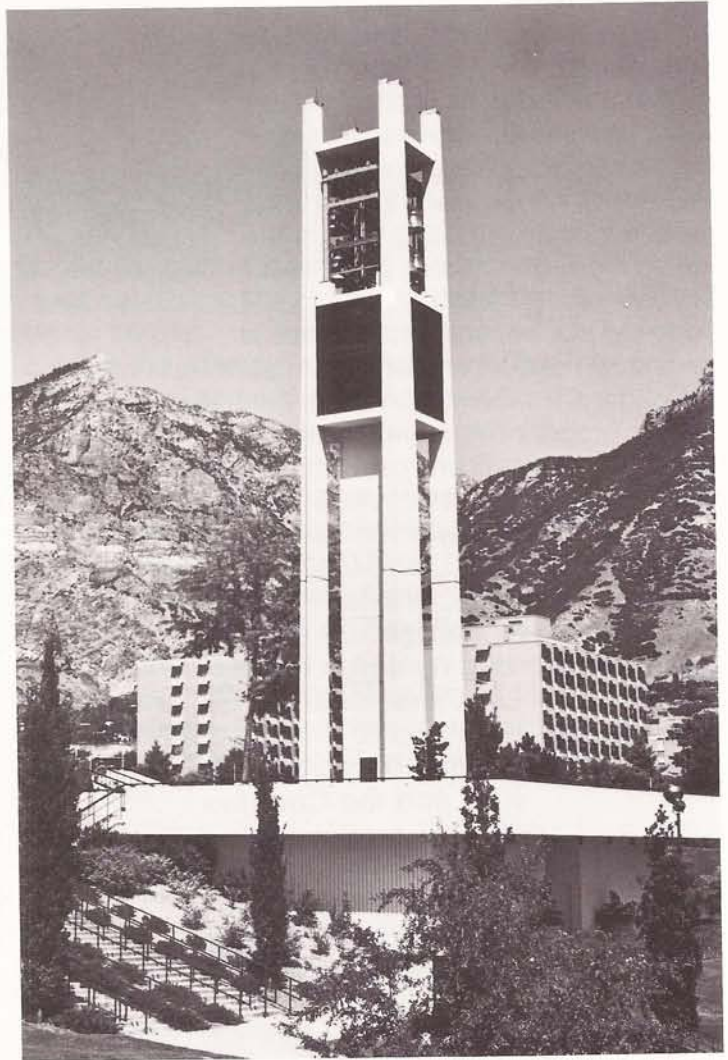
Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public



Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new art museum is nearly complete.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Israel, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.



One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God. Despite steady growth during those early years, the fledgling institution was nearly overcome by a series of setbacks, including persistent financial problems and the destruction by fire of the school's original building in 1884. The campus eventually moved to a new location on Provo's University Avenue, where new facilities were completed in 1891.

As its high school and college curriculum improved and strengthened, the academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903. In 1909, under the administration of George H. Brimhall, work began on the Maeser Memorial Building, the first of many structures on "Temple Hill," the university's present site. Throughout the administrations of Franklin S. Harris and Howard H. McDonald, the university gradually increased its enrollment and facilities.

President Ernest L. Wilkinson, who began his tenure in 1951, oversaw the university's greatest era of physical growth, greatly increasing both the number of buildings and the size of the student body. He also inaugurated the school's first doctoral program in 1957. President Dallin H. Oaks' administration, begun in 1971, saw a deepening and refining of the scholastic mission of BYU, which by then had an enrollment of 26,000. His commitment to academics continued during the administrations of Presidents Jeffrey R. Holland and Rex E. Lee as the university maintains its quest to provide excellent instruction in a gospel-centered atmosphere.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 87,000 in a valley of 275,000, is situated 4,560 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

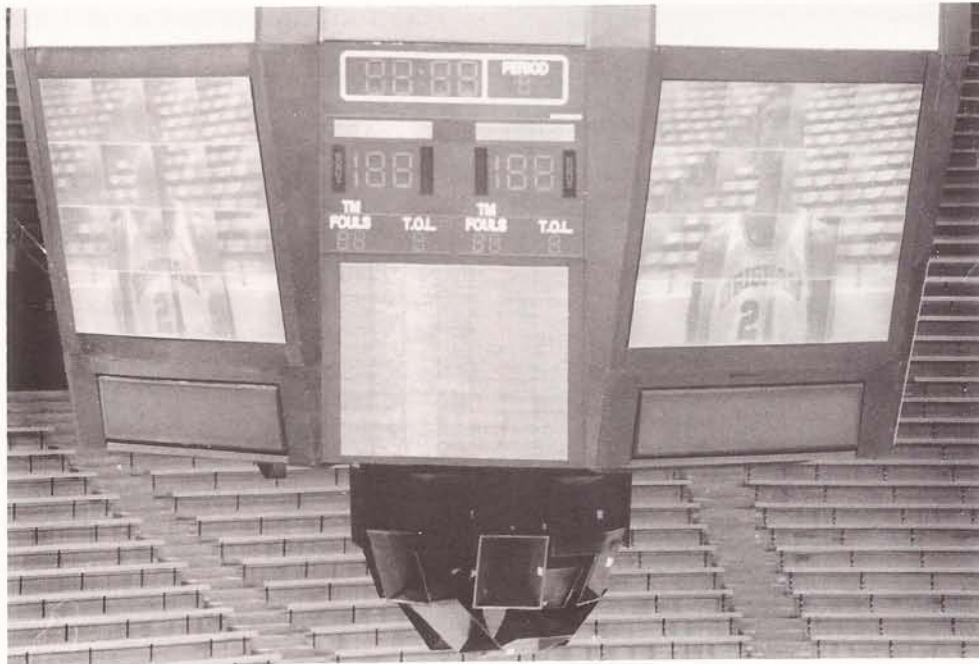
Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

The university traces its roots to Utah's rich pioneer heritage. In establishing the original school on October 16, 1875—first known as Brigham Young Academy—on a little over one acre of land in what is today downtown Provo, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures. No longer an obscure primary school in a little pioneer town, BYU is a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arenas.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington. Two other arenas—at Tennessee and North Carolina—also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, more than five million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fifth nationally with an average of 17,658 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina, and Louisville drew more fans than the Cougars.

A new addition to the Marriott Center is an eight-sided, 26' wide by 16' high scoreboard which features four large video walls designed to show live

game action and instant replays. In addition, the scoreboard will have four fully animated matrix boards.

The video screens, manufactured by Electrosonic, Inc., are each made up of 16 video cubes and will measure approximately 8'4" high by 11' wide. Each cube contains an Electrosonic Procube II projector and is operated by a Picbloc III processor, which creates a large number of special effects capabilities.

The matrix panels each will measure 6'6" high by 8' wide. They will be fully animated and will be used to display up-to-the-minute player and team statistics, as well as messages for the audience.

In addition to men's basketball games, the new scoreboard also will be used for other selected athletic events, devotions, forums and firesides in the Marriott Center. The cost of the scoreboard is being funded entirely by corporate advertising.

Daktronics has provided scoreboards for the 1992 Summer Olympic Games in Barcelona and the Professional Golf Association. Other Daktronics boards have been installed in the Los Angeles Forum and at the Michigan, Purdue, and Wisconsin collegiate arenas.

Electrosonic has video wall systems in place at the Target Center in Minneapolis, at the Met Center in Minneapolis and at the new America West Arena in Phoenix.

The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

A Look at Last Season

Depth, outside shooting touch, and a strong inside game paved the way for BYU's men's basketball team to rise above expectations.

Few, if any, thought at the beginning of the season that BYU would finish the season at **25-7 overall and 12-4** in the Western Athletic Conference, tie for the league title and win the automatic berth through the WAC post-season tournament.

The bubble finally burst when the Cougars, a number-10 seed, lost to Louisiana State, 94-83, in the NCAA first-round at Boise, Idaho.

"It was a fantastic year with big surprises," said BYU Coach Roger Reid. "The strength was our team concept, the unselfishness and the balance. We accomplished a lot in the classroom and on the court."

Reid, 67-29 in three years at the BYU helm, has been successful in leading BYU to **three consecutive 20-win seasons, three NCAA berths, two WAC regular season titles, two league post-season crowns, and has been named WAC and Kodak District 13 (NABC) Coach of the Year twice** in his three years.

The Cougars got their **11th claim to the WAC title and won the U.S. WEST WAC Tournament** thanks to a 54-foot buzzer-beater by **Kevin Nixon** against UTEP. The 73-71 victory over UTEP boosted BYU above the .500 mark for the first time in the eight-year history of that tournament.

BYU was picked fourth in the pre-season WAC poll, but tied with UTEP for the league title with a 12-4 mark and won the Oquirrh Bucket for in-state supremacy for the sixth time with a perfect 5-0 record. BYU was unblemished in league play at the Marriott Center at 8-0. BYU won its first seven games of the season and closed the season with another seven-game winning skein until the LSU loss.

The Cougars were led by center **Gary Trost**, a first-team All-WAC performer who made the U.S. WEST WAC All-Tournament Team for the second year in a row. The 6-10 junior was also named WAC Player of the Week in the final week of regulation play, was All-District by the writers and coaches and made the All-Red Lobster Classic Team.

Other Cougar honors were 6-10 **Russell Larson** being selected as WAC Freshman of the Year and

being named, along with 6-8 teammate **Kevin Nixon** to the WAC All-Newcomer Team. Larson was MVP of the Cougar Classic and was joined by Nixon.

Transfer **Nick Sanderson**, 6-4, was named to the All-Red Lobster Classic team and **Jared Miller**, 6-8, was named GTE Academic All-District.

Perhaps the key to BYU's season was point guard **Nathan Call**, 5-11, who was named to the WAC All-Defensive Team and was second team All-WAC. Call set the BYU record with 129 games played in a career and finished second in the career assists with 528 assists (**Danny Ainge** had 539 in 188 games).

Injuries, primarily, forced BYU to use five different starting lineups, but the lineup of **Mark Heslop**, Trost, Call, Nixon and Miller started 20 games and was the Cougar mainstay.

Reid often played nine Cougars in games to secure a 14-1 home record, an 11-6 road record, shoot 50 percent from the field, 43 percent from three-point range, out-rebound opponents by an average of four and out-score the opposition by 11 points.

BYU played four teams from last year's NCAA Tournament, beating ninth-seeded UTEP two out of three times, defeating Princeton and losing to NCAA runnerup Michigan and La Salle. BYU opponents which played in the NIT included James Madison, Florida, New Mexico and Utah. BYU had a 3-3 record against opponents in the NCAA tournament and a 6-1 record against its opponents selected for the NIT.

Cougar Basketball History

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921-25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a college basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who led the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon (1937-38) and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200--although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor--the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but Skyline Conference action was played in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the league championship. They also won the National Invitational Tournament in New York City.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened in December of 1971 and the home attendance was more than 21,000.

This will be the 22nd season in the Marriott Center, praised by visitors for its cleanliness and a new video scoreboard will be used for the first time.

Since the opening of the Marriott Center, five coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972-75), Frank Arnold (1976-83) and Ladell Andersen (1984-89).

In March, 1989, the Roger Reid era began at BYU. The long-time assistant was elevated to the top spot when Coach Andersen retired.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge and Devin Durrant. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country.

And Michael Smith was the inaugural Academic Player of the Year selection by GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

In 1990, Andy Toolson was a first-team Academic All-America selection and in 1991 Steve Schreiner won an NCAA scholarship.

The 1991 team featured 7-6 Shawn Bradley, one of the tallest players ever in college basketball. He set an NCAA record for most blocked shots by a freshman (5.2).

Press row tickets for all home games will be limited to working member of newspapers, radio and television stations, and visiting information directors. There also is an area for college scouts on the concourse level.

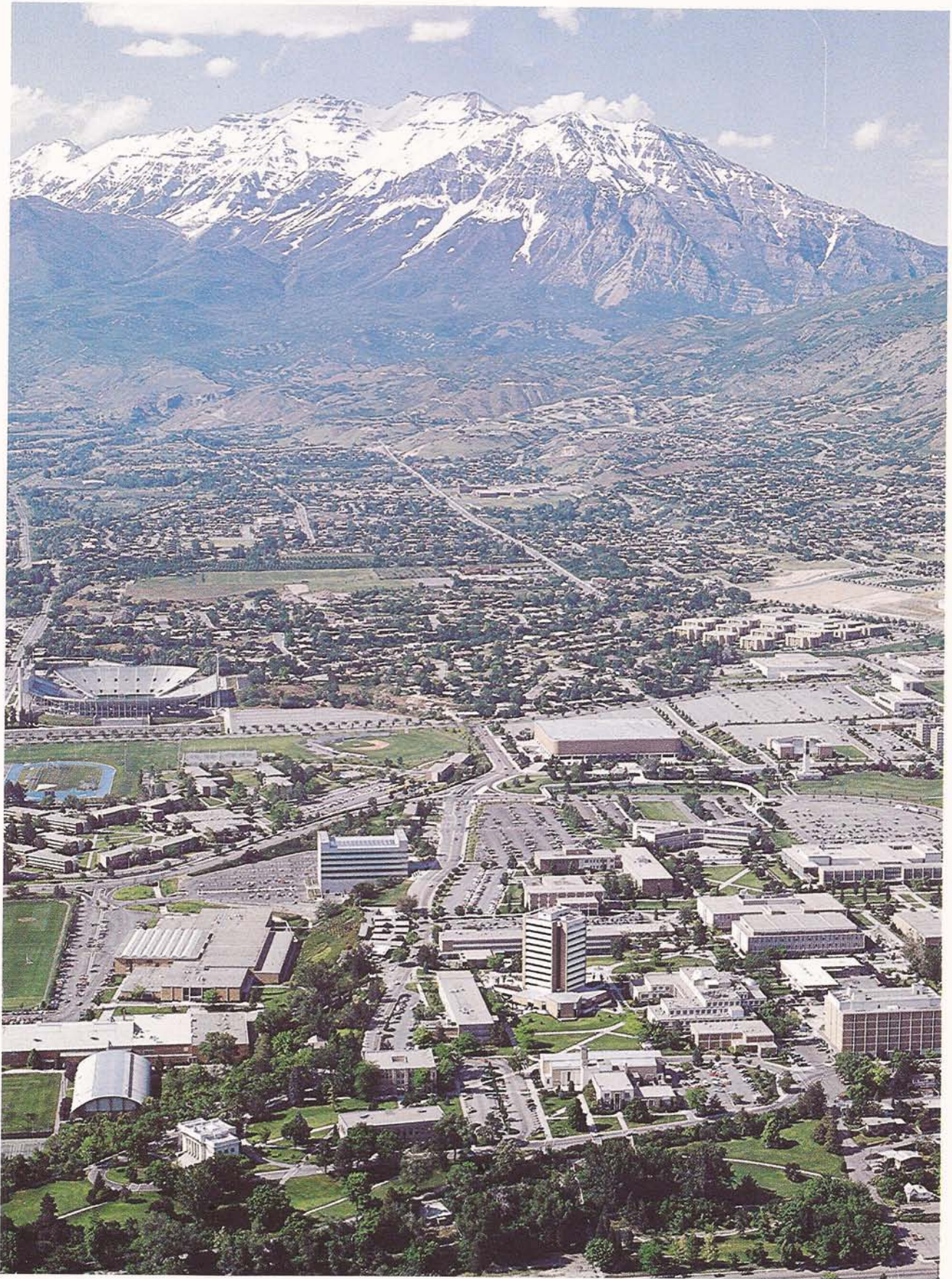
Press passes will be issued on an individual game basis and requests must be received in the Sports Information Office **no later than three days before the game.**
